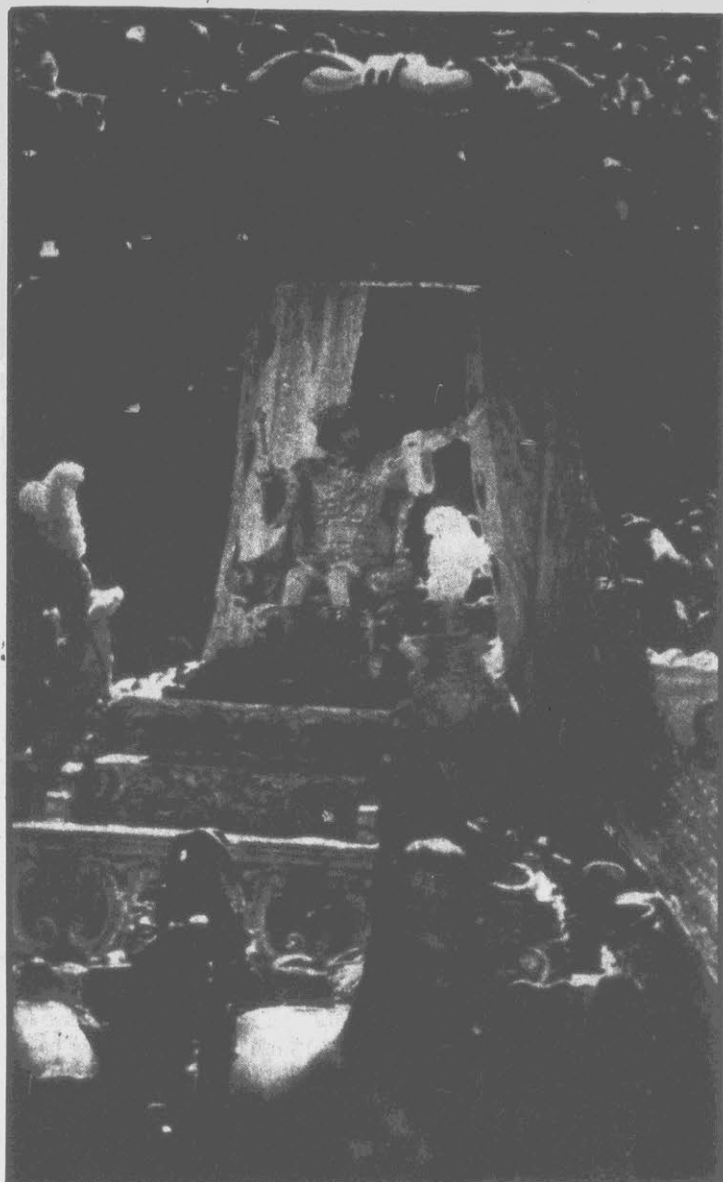

## Aide Says Reagan Will Admit Mistake, But Won't Apologize

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, who an adviser says is prepared to admit he made mistakes in the Iran-Contra affair, is giving his first detailed response to the Tower commission report in an address to the nation today.

Reagan, under increasing pressure to accept blame as he tries to shake off doubts about his ability to govern, was to deliver the speech from the Oval Office at 9 p.m. EST.

On the eve of his speech, Reagan announced his selection of FBI Director William Webster as the new chief of the CIA. Webster accepted the job after Robert Gates asked Reagan to withdraw his nomination

and former Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, turned the job down.

Gates, who will remain CIA deputy director, pulled out when it became apparent his confirmation would be delayed by congressional investigations into the Iran arms sale and diversion of profits to the Nicaraguan rebels.

A senior adviser to Reagan said the president would say that there were a lot of things going on in the Iran affair that he did not know about. The adviser, speaking on condition that he not be identified, said Reagan would say, "not only were mistakes made, but I made mistakes."

However, Reagan will not apologize

for his management style or say that he will change dramatically, the adviser added.

Justice Department sources said discussion was still under way over who would be nominated to take over the FBI from Webster but that the leading candidate was U.S. District Court Judge Lowell Jensen, who had served as deputy attorney general in the Reagan administration before being appointed to a judgeship in San Francisco.

Also mentioned for the FBI job was John Simpson, head of the Secret Service.

There is a widespread belief that Reagan's speech tonight is critical to

repairing his damaged presidency.

House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said "it is essential that the president recognize and acknowledge not only errors in implementing that policy, but the fundamental errors inherent in the policy itself."

Wright said those mistakes included sending arms to the terrorist government of Iran, doing so covertly in contradiction to stated U.S. policies and to America's urgings of its allies, and violating numerous laws.

He said the administration "flouted the clear legal requirements" for notification of Congress in several statutes.

## Nancy's Role Is On Line

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nancy Reagan's supporters say they hope President Reagan's speech tonight on the Iran-Contra affair will silence talk the president has been manipulated by an overly assertive wife.

In accounts that echo the negative reception she endured during her early days in the White House, Mrs. Reagan is being portrayed as everything from a "dragon" to a "power-hungry first lady" who has overstepped her role by pushing Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan from the White House.

"People are on this track now, and maybe for the next few days we have to keep smiling and swallow all of this stuff," Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, Elaine Crispin, said Tuesday. "It's all fiction."

Mrs. Reagan, the spokeswoman said, knows "this kind of thing happens, you're caught in it, but we hope the cutoff date is Wednesday night."

Reagan was scheduled this evening to give the nation his response to the Tower commission report on the Iran-Contra arms affair.

The panel said the president did not seem to be fully aware, nor demand to know, what his staff was doing in regard to the sale of arms to Iran and the apparent diversion of funds to the Nicaraguan Contras.

Reagan resigned one day after the Tower board held him responsible for the "chaos" that descended on the White House in the wake of the Iran-Contra disclosures.

Reagan had been under fire for failure to manage the controversy, but he also had engaged in a months-long struggle with Mrs. Reagan, who associates said privately had battled the presidential aide over her husband's work schedule and other matters following the president's pro-state surgery.

Reagan's departure set off a spate of reports that her power had grown to its peak, including one in the New York Times that she planned to use the remainder of Reagan's term to press for an arms control agreement with the Soviet Union.

"That's silly," Mrs. Crispin said. "Sure, she's interested in arms control; she's interested in peace. But



## Support Set For Webster

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bipartisan support is emerging rapidly in Congress for President Reagan's decision to switch FBI Director William H. Webster to the CIA, where Webster again would be assigned to restore the image of an agency enmeshed in scandal.

The nomination of the 62-year-old former appellate judge quickly won praise from Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia, who called him "a highly regarded professional who will bring much-needed credibility to the CIA." Byrd wrote the law setting a 10-year term for the FBI director; Webster is the first to serve under that provision.

Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, vice chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, said, "Barring some remarkable revelation, I would expect the director of the FBI will achieve quick confirmation." Hearings could begin as soon as next week, he said.

## Warren Has Surgery

State Rep. Ed Warren of Greenville is "recovering nicely" from surgery performed at Pitt County Memorial Hospital Tuesday, his wife said this morning.

Joan Warren said today that the representative entered the hospital Monday and underwent surgery to remove "a blockage in one of his veins" on Tuesday.

But Mrs. Warren said her husband is "recovering nicely from surgery (and is) scheduled to go home by the end of the week." Warren will "be back in Raleigh in a week or so," she said.

"He's really ahead of schedule as far as his recovery is concerned," Mrs. Warren said.

## Muskie Hints At Bribery

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Secretary of State Edmund Muskie, a member of the Tower commission, said today he suspects some of the profits from covert arms sales to Iran were paid as bribes to Iranian officials. But he said he has no proof.

Muskie was quoted in today's San Francisco Examiner as saying that Iranian arms dealer Manucher Ghorbanifar, who served as a middleman in the clandestine Reagan administration dealings, had told the commission "there were expenses that accompanied this. He treated it as an expense of doing business."

Asked by a reporter for the newspaper how he interpreted Ghorbanifar's reference to "expenses," Muskie was quoted as saying: "That was the euphemism. It was my impression he wanted to communicate that to us. They were bribing each other to get the deal through."

Interviewed today, Muskie said the commission had no proof that bribes had been paid and that "no one, as far as I know, has said that."

The former secretary of state said someone in the arms industry — whom he did not identify — had told him bribes were paid to Iranian officials.

But, referring to the commission report released last week, he added that "you don't state (that) as facts until you can prove them, especially in a document supposed to be authoritative."

Asked if he would characterize his opinions as suspicions that could not be confirmed, Muskie replied, "That's about it."

## Ruling Produces Differing Views

Two local health professionals have differing views of Tuesday's U.S. Supreme Court ruling protecting jobs of people with contagious disease.

Dr. Tim Monroe, medical director of the Pitt County Health Department, said "I think it's a good ruling. The only reason a person with a contagious disease should be excluded from the work place is that he or she is putting someone else in danger. It should depend on medical knowledge of how the disease is transmitted."

"The test case was that of a woman with tuberculosis. Once she was on treatment, she was no longer infectious and it's right that she be allowed to continue to work."

Dr. E.D. Glover, a professor in the department of community health at East Carolina University, expressed less confidence. "The ruling frightens me," he said. "It seems to make the assumption that we know all there is to know about every disease process. This is just not so. The AIDS research, for example, shifts every week. I'm a very liberal person, but it bothers me that this ruling would be made on what I consider to be a faulty assumption."

Tuesday's 7-2 ruling said employers who are recipients of federal aid may not discriminate against people with contagious diseases if they are otherwise qualified to work or take part in some activity, that each employee must be treated by the employer on a case-by-case basis, taking into consideration medical knowledge and the individual's job setting.

## Reagan Recalls Negotiators To Plan Strategy On Arms

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, emerging from the shadows of the Iran-Contra scandal, is staking out an active role in plotting U.S. strategy for an "effectively verifiable" agreement with the Soviet Union to rid Europe of medium-range nuclear missiles.

Making his first appearance in the White House press room in more than three months, Reagan said Tuesday he would recall his three top arms control negotiators from Geneva to discuss "the important issues which remain to be resolved."

Echoing his frequent assertions of Soviet cheating, Reagan said the most important issue was verification and that the United States would insist on full compliance with what would be his first major weapons accord with Moscow in more than six years in office.

Before returning home, the three negotiators — Max M. Kampelman, Maynard Glitman and Ronald Lehman — will present a treaty draft to the Soviets "to translate areas of principle into a concrete agreement."

Reagan praised Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev's offer Saturday to divorce tougher issues from the Euromissile talks. "This removes a serious obstacle to progress," Reagan said. But he quickly raised the verification issue, and a senior U.S. official, briefing reporters afterward, said Gorbachev had not taken a new position.

"It really represents a Soviet retrenchment, back to the position that they took at the Geneva summit" in November 1985, the official said. Kampelman, meanwhile, called Gorbachev's proposal to isolate the medium-range issue a "rehash" of an old Soviet position.

Reagan attributed Gorbachev's gesture to "our

## Martin To Close Farm Life School

WILLIAMSTON — After serving students in Griffin Township for more than 64 years, Farm Life School will close its doors at the end of this school year.

The Martin County Board of Education has voted to close the school, which has 94 students enrolled, at school's end in June.

The vote at this week's meeting was 4-2 to close the school. An earlier motion by member Wayne Peel to keep the school open indefinitely died from the lack of a second.

Peel touched on the way the matter has been handled — from an initial decision to close the school taken in executive session last summer with the board later telling the public it did not realize that a public hearing must precede such an action — to the final public hearing held in February.

"I know ... we all know that the school's days are numbered," Peel said. "My concern is the way we've handled this thing."

He added that "my main concern is that the school is not having a full year to adjust to closing."

Board chairman Macon Holliday told Peel that his remarks were "only rehearsing feelings that have been brought out before."

Boyd Bailey, superintendent of Martin County schools, reiterated factors that led to board to take action to close the school.

Primary among those factors is that the school's enrollment is below 100 students, which under state regulations leads to the loss of a full-time principal. Another important factor is that administration costs for the school are no longer justified.

Students at the kindergarten through grade six level in the school year 1987-88 will be transferred to Williamston Primary, E.J. Hayes and Williamston Junior High, all in Williamston.

The board will meet Monday with teachers at Farm Life to review an assignment policy for them for the next school year. "We don't know at this point where they will be going," Bailey said.

# Scientists Forecast Cancer Vaccines, But Not For Colds

NEW YORK (AP) — Doctors will give cancer vaccines by the year 2000 and cure AIDS by 2010, but they still won't be able to cure a cold when the new century dawns, scientists predict in a survey released today.

The survey, by Louis Harris and Associates, included 227 biomedical scientists but most questions were asked only of specialists in the question's topic. Interviews took place between July and November, mostly by phone.

The scientists were nominated by other researchers as being leaders in their fields, the report said, and their opinions should not be generalized to any other population.

The study was commissioned by Bristol-Myers Co.

Thirty-four percent of the scientists said cardiovascular disease would be the leading health problem in industrialized countries in the year

2000, while 27 percent specified age-related problems. Seven percent chose AIDS.

Specific questions about acquired immune deficiency syndrome were directed only to specialists in biotechnology, cancer or infectious disease.

Of 85 scientists asked to estimate the nation's cumulative AIDS cases by the year 2000 if no dramatic advance in cure or prevention appears, 32 percent said more than 1 million was likely, 18 percent said fewer, and half said they were not sure.

Twenty-eight percent of 89 scientists expected an AIDS cure to be generally available in the 1990s, and 24 percent expected it in the first decade of the next century. Fifteen percent said never.

Forty-six percent of 90 scientists also said they expected a safe and effective AIDS vaccine to be generally available in the 1990's. Fifteen per-

cent expected it between the year 2000 and 2010. Twenty-eight percent were not sure when a vaccine would become available.

In addition: — Twenty-four of 40 cancer scientists said they thought vaccines for some kinds of cancer would be possible by the year 2000.

— On the overall cure rate for cancer in the year 2000, the cancer scientists' predictions averaged 6 percent. Today's rate is about 50 percent.

— Ten of 21 cardiovascular scientists said heart bypass surgery would be less used in 2000 than today, but 11 foresaw no decline or "somewhat more" use.

— Among infectious disease scientists, 21 of 40 said they expect virtually no improvement in treatment of colds by 2000, and only one expected anything approaching a cure.

The comic books were meant for distribution in schools in earthquake-prone Los Angeles, but about 400 letters have poured in since a national magazine for children reported a week ago they were available free.

"I'm in the first grade. I want to please have a copy of Yogi Bear's Book on Earthquakes and what to do in case of one. Thank you for your time. Say hello to Boo Boo," wrote Cathy Mullin of Troy, N.Y.

"Please send me three copies. I need one for my two sisters," asked Shalene Rustad of Santa Rosa.

"Enclosed is money (25 cents) for the booklet. Please hurry," wrote John Cribbs of Lexington, Ohio.

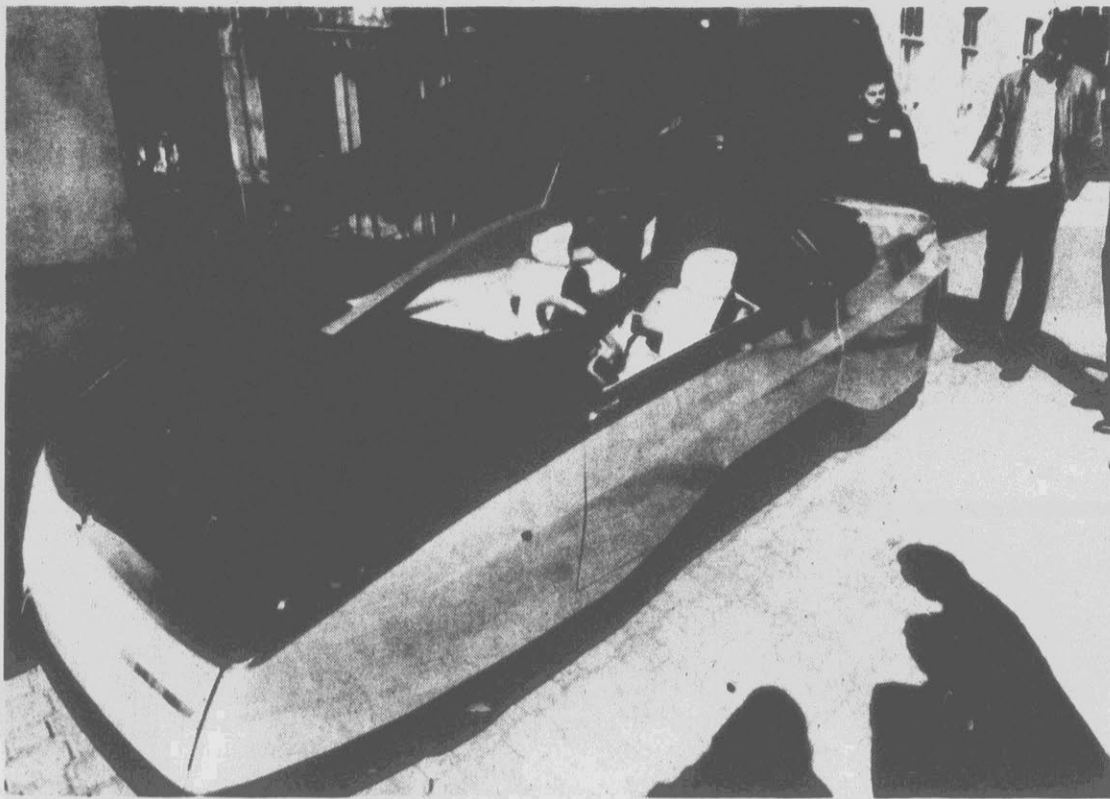
Councilman Hal Bernson, the city's earthquake coordinator, got the idea of using cartoon characters while in Japan to observe its earthquake education program, Margaree Klein, Bernson's press secretary, said Tuesday.

Hanna-Barbera, creator of the bear in the porkpie hat, agreed 3½ years ago to make Jellystone Park's biggest thief of picnic baskets the "spokesbear" in the city's effort to reach schoolchildren, said Ms. Klein.

## GM Designs Futuristic Car That Cruises At 150 MPH

WASHINGTON (AP) — While Congress debates the wisdom of increasing the speed limit on rural highways to 65 mph, General Motors Corp. engineers designed a futuristic car to whisk people along routinely at better than twice that speed.

The car, dubbed Chevrolet Express, is touted in GM literature as "an alternative to the hassle of short-distance air travel" and compared with Japan's bullet train.

There are a few catches including a need to build a new electronic road system, but these engineers as well as senior GM officials believe one day automobile travel between cities will approach cruising speeds of 150 mph.

A sleek, fully operational prototype of this 21st century automobile was put on display Tuesday on Capitol Hill as members of a House subcommittee held hearings on turbine engine technology. Earlier it attracted attention outside a downtown hotel.

"This is a research vehicle," said H.E. "Gene" Helms, one of the GM engineers involved in developing the turbine-engine car, as he glanced at ultra-modern, four-passenger vehicle. "The basic technology is there. It's the refinement of the technology that's needed to make it practical for production."

He estimated the prototype car may be worth several million dollars. But Helms said he's convinced within a few decades such cars "will be affordable to the average man on the street" with motorists routinely traveling up to 150 mph on highways equipped with electronic and radar navigational systems.

"We call it drive by wire," said Helms. On other roads and at lower speeds the car would drive as a conventional vehicle of today.

A GM news release describes the Express as "what you picture your very own private bullet train to be like" in the 21st century. "It's a streamlined, whisper-quiet, tur-

bine-powered, ground-hugging, four-passenger, 150-miles-per-hour alternative to the hassle of short distance air travel."

GM is not alone in developing such high-speed, aerodynamically precise cars of the future. Spokesmen for Ford Motor Co. say similar vehicles are being worked on under its "Probe-5" and "T2008" projects, although a spokesman said speed is not a top priority.

And the Japanese are at it, too. "At the Tokyo motor show in 1985 the Nissan Company showed the car of the future, and the car of the future was a turbine-powered sleek vehicle, not as pretty as this one, but the same concept," said GM's Helms.

While routine automobile travel at speeds of up to 150 mph might be considered unthinkable today, Helms said technology will change people's minds.

"Speed is a key element in our society," he said.

Helms, 62, compares the automobile his father drove in the 1920s with those of today. "The peak travel speed in those days was 30 or 35 miles an hour" and the speeds of today were unthinkable. In the next century people will look back at today's highway travel as we today look at the 1920s, he suggested.

## Virginia Sets Up Vote On Lottery

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina lawmakers say they're worried that a lottery referendum approved by the Virginia General Assembly may take millions of dollars away from the Tar Heel state as residents head north to play the game of chance.

"North Carolina is not Virginia, but I think it will give more fuel to lottery proponents," Rep. Coy Privette, R-Cabarrus, said of Virginia's referendum. "My immediate comment is, let's see what Virginia does about it."

On Saturday, just before it was to adjourn for the year, the General Assembly in Virginia approved bills to establish a lottery board and a referendum in November on a state lottery.

The next move in North Carolina seems to belong to Rep. Frank E. Rhodes, R-Forsyth, who introduced a bill for a lottery referendum that narrowly passed the House in 1985. Rhodes said this week he plans to introduce a similar bill within two weeks.

Lottery proponents may try to maneuver sponsorship of the referendum into Democratic hands to increase its chance of passage. But Rhodes said he is feeling no pressure to turn the bill over to a member of the House majority.

Sen. Kenneth Royall Jr., D-Durham, said Virginia was feeling the effect of lotteries in neighboring Maryland and Washington, D.C. Royall said North Carolina will feel the same effect if Virginia has a lottery.

"It will have a tremendous effect," Royall said.

Royall sponsored a lottery-referendum bill in the 1985 Senate that died in a 24-24 vote as Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan declined to break the tie. He said he does not have a lottery bill under way, but he will not wait to see what Virginia does before he takes action on the issue.

Already, Rhodes said, North Carolinians are spending an in-calculable amount of money to buy lottery tickets through truck drivers and out-of-state relatives. If Virginia enacts a lottery, he said, millions and millions of North Carolina dollars will go to benefit Virginia.

He said his bill, if approved by the legislature and the voting public, would use a lottery to generate about \$200 million a year for a special education fund.

she's interested in arms control only to the point that it affects his (Reagan's) planning and his policy and what he's doing with it."

Mrs. Reagan's former press secretary, Sheila Tate, agreed.

"She gets involved with people, yes. Policy, no," said Mrs. Tate, a long-time aide now working in public relations.

One observer took a different view. "At a time he most needs to appear strong, President Reagan is being weakened and made to appear wimpy and helpless by the political interference of his wife," New York Times essayist William Safire wrote.

Safire asserted in a column Monday that "the power-hungry first lady" had campaigned for months to force Regan from office because the chief of staff had not only pressed the president "to get off his duff," but had "dared to refuse to defer to her advice" against Reagan working too soon following surgery.

The columnist called the first lady a "powerhouse of patronage" who manipulated appointments and held "the only federal office in which the holder can neither be fired nor impeached."

Mrs. Reagan has acknowledged she is the first to get involved if she believes someone is taking advan-

tage of her husband. "All my little antennas go up," she says, adding that she tries to stop it "by telling him or telling someone else."

Many who know the first couple might argue over how pervasive Mrs. Reagan's influence is, but few White House officials are willing to be quoted by name on the subject.

Former Sen. Howard Baker, Reagan's new chief of staff, showed during his first meeting with the White House press corps on Monday just how delicate the subject is.

Queried about a comment he had made previously of Mrs. Reagan that "when she gets her hackles up, she can be a dragon," the Tennessee politician replied by praising her as "a distinguished citizen" and "a great lady."

"She obviously is a lady of strong convictions. That's what I meant," Baker explained with a sheepish grin.

Amid banter about reports of phone calls from Mrs. Reagan to White House officials, Baker acknowledged he intended to speak with the first lady later in the day. "There's the phone now," he quipped as a telephone rang in the background.

Asked what he would discuss, Baker responded, "Whatever she wants to talk about," as the room erupted in laughter.

# Editorials

## The Buck Stopped

The American public is not allowed to forget the little sign on President Harry Truman's desk reading "The buck stops here". Even President Reagan occasionally alluded to the truism. It was indirectly brought up by the Tower Commission report, which was critical of Reagan's failure to control his national security staff.

The report blamed chief of staff Donald Regan as bearing a primary responsibility for the chaos which descended upon the White House. It was his job to shield the president and his failure made him the logical target when people and the chain of events got out of hand.

Former Senator Howard Baker was tapped to replace Regan. The choice has been praised by Republicans and Democrats alike. It was an auspicious first step by President Reagan to clean up the wreckage but there is a long way to go.

There is reason to think many of the remaining months of the Reagan presidency are going to be spent under the cloud of the Iran-Contra affair. The tough part for Howard Baker in his new role is something nobody likes to face or discuss; that part is changing the beleaguered president's management style.

At one time his aloofness from the details of government was hailed as a model. Now it is being re-examined and questioned. It is entirely probable he will now be required to change his casual approach to "running a tight ship" and oversee what his overseers are doing.

Unless Howard Baker can change the presidential style he stands a fair chance of being in the similar plight Donald Regan endured. The Tower Commission report made it clear that reforms in the National Security Council system require more than the setting of policy by the president; he must also require an accountability on how that policy is implemented. There are other fields of policy-setting, too, and they will require that same surveillance.

Devoting the rest of his presidency to damage repairs and avoiding other missteps is a glum prospect. There should be opportunities for strengthening the forces for peace, for improving trade between peoples, for dealing with extremes of poverty and hunger, for cooperation in matters of health, science, the arts. In short, there should also be opportunity for progress.

But not if echos of the Iran-Contra affair distract attention and energies of the White House. That's the sad part of the story.

The buck did stop at the White House desk, and that's where it belonged.

## Reagan Pressured To Tell The Truth

WASHINGTON — Almost imperceptibly, the television camera in the Oval Office closed in until the screen was filled with Ronald Reagan's ruddy, reassuring face.

"The charge has been made that the United States has shipped weapons to Iran — as a ransom payment for the release of American hostages in Lebanon — that the United States undercut its allies, and secretly violated American policy against trafficking with terrorists," the president said.

"Those charges are utterly false." That statement made three months ago was aimed at the same people who will search Reagan's face when he speaks Wednesday at 9 p.m. EST. They are a complex audience of average Americans, politicians and world leaders who once were the wellspring of Reagan's phenomenal popularity.

In the 30 minutes or less that he usually takes for a televised speech, the 76-year-old former Hollywood actor will seek to overcome an image of an aging, ailing president who unleashed in the White House what

**'Wright called on Reagan Tuesday to promise publicly that he is now committed to laws that the speaker said were violated by the arms shipments to Iran, and to admit "the fundamental errors" in his arms-sale policy.'**

Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., Tuesday called "these screwballs in the basement."

Between his last broadcast Nov. 13 and now, Reagan's measured assurances were turned to dust by the Senate Intelligence Committee and Tower commission reports.

"The president's reaction was quite enthusiastic," Robert McFarlane had told the Tower panel, recounting when he first put the arms-for-hostages scheme before Reagan in 1985. "Perhaps excessively enthusiastic given the many uncertainties involved."

McFarlane's testimony was a flake in a snowstorm of evidence of Reagan's duplicity confronting writers of Wednesday night's speech.

ridicule has gotten under Reagan's political skin.

One possible escape route for Reagan — "I was not fully informed" — now seems impassable. The president will be seeking to counter the image that his hand was not on the rudder. The Tower report and some of the panel members have portrayed him as a remote, unaware president who showed an "appalling" lack of alertness during two interviews where he offered conflicting accounts on whether he approved the Iran arms sales.

One adviser, who also served President Richard M. Nixon during the Watergate scandal, sees an important difference between the two presidents.

"People were very willing to believe Nixon did everything he was accused of doing," the adviser said. "They are less willing to condemn Reagan." But the adviser, one of Reagan's most ardent supporters, doubted the president will rebuild his popularity.

### Catching Up

Motorists will be looking to driving on a four-laned highway from Washington to Raleigh within seven and a half months.

Randy Doub, N.C. Department of Transportation member from Pitt County, says all of the contracted work on U.S. 264.

It should be completed by October of this year. It includes the additional lanes being built between Washington and Greenville, and several segments from Greenville to Wilson. The Farmville bypass and the northwest Greenville bypass are not yet under contract nor is rehabilitation of the two existing lanes between Greenville and Washington. Both are included in the Transportation Improvement Plan, however.

Other projects are in the planning stages for Pitt County including widening of Evans Street from Tenth to Greenville Boulevard. Intersection improvements, signalization and paving of rural roads are also being planned or under way.

Certainly the project of most importance to the Greenville and Washington areas, however, is the dual laning of U.S. 264. It will provide the east-west highway that is essential to our economic development.

Another plan which can be important to us was mentioned by DOT Secretary James Harrington in a talk to the Ayden Chamber of Commerce last week. He referred to work on N.C. 11 to provide an access from this area to I-40. Work is currently under way on I-40 which will lead from the Raleigh-Durham-Chapel Hill area to Wilmington. N.C. 11 is already four laned from Greenville to Kinston and then south of Kinston. The multi-lane road could be extended from that point to intersect with I-40, thus giving our area multi-lane access to Wilmington and points south. That could be important to our economic future.

Since the development of the automobile our area has dreamed of adequate highway access to other parts of the state and nation. Gradually we are seeing the needed highway links being planned and constructed. We are far behind but perhaps we are beginning to catch up.

# South Seeking More Federal Research Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Southern political, business and education leaders are joining forces to obtain more federal research and development money in hopes of refocusing the region's economic development efforts toward higher-paying technology based industries.

More than 100 Southern leaders turned out for a seminar Tuesday designed in part to find ways to end the South's long-standing dependence on low skill industries lured from the North by the promise of cheap labor.

"We made low skill, low wage labor one of the hallmarks of our economic development," former Mississippi Gov. William Winter told the group. "But that sends exactly the wrong signal today. We're no longer competing with the Frostbelt, we're competing with the rest of the world."

Winter, who chaired the 1986 Commission on the Future of the South, said the region must develop a "flexible, globally competitive workforce" if the South is to solve its current problem of thriving cities coexisting with depressed rural areas.

A report prepared by the Sunbelt Institute and the Southern Technology Council said the Southern states haven't been getting their fair share of federal research and development funds, causing the region to lag behind in the creation of new jobs in technology based industries.

The report found that Virginia and Alabama were the only Southern states where per capita federal research and development expenditures exceeded the national average of \$204.

Virginia, because of its proximity to Washington D.C., received an average of \$447 per person in federal

research dollars in 1985, while Alabama, primarily because of Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, received an average of \$229 per person.

Elsewhere in the South, the average federal research expenditure per person in 1985 was \$114 in Florida, \$55 in Georgia, \$28 in Louisiana, \$68 in Mississippi, \$81 in North Carolina, \$38 in South Carolina, \$121 in Tennessee and \$106 in Texas.

Since most of the country's basic research is funded by the federal government, the report said the South also has been shortchanged in the research investment by private industry because such investments generally follow the federal expenditures.

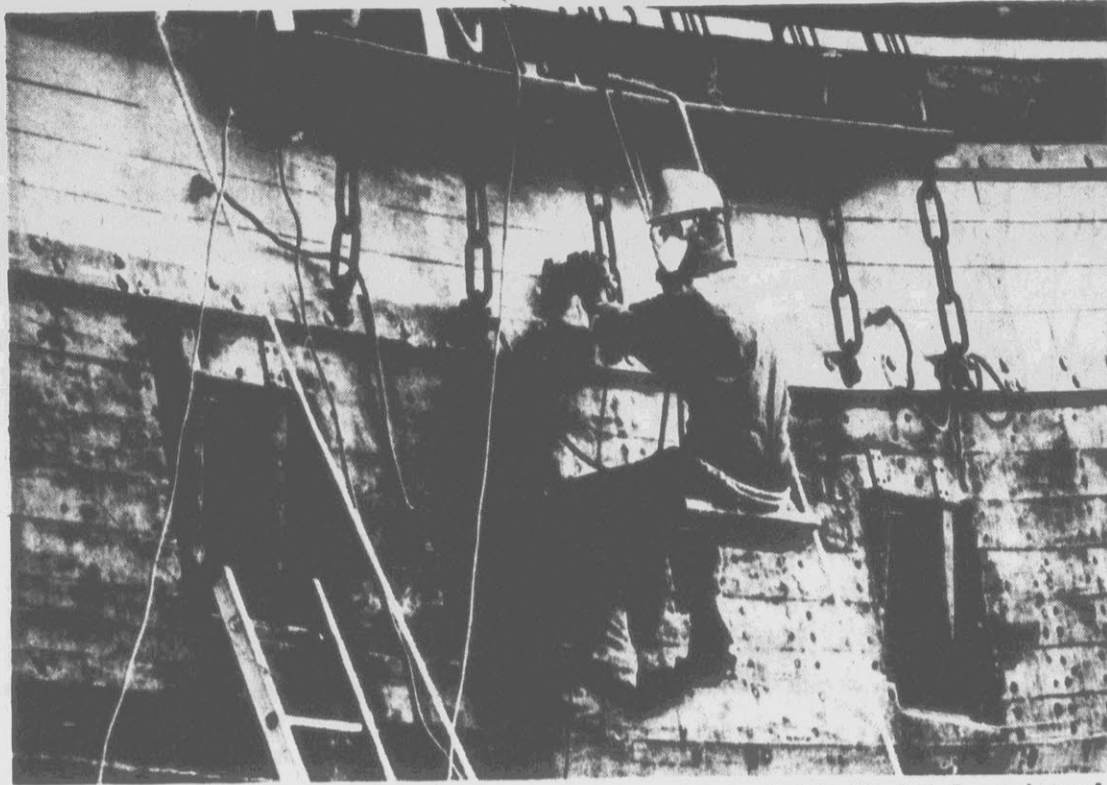
"The paucity of federal research and development investments has limited the region's technological capacity and, consequently, economic growth," the report said.

Rep. Buddy MacKay, D-Fla., chairman of the Sunbelt Institute, said the region's ability to attract more federal research and development money depends on the will- ingness of the private sector to upgrade the South's universities.

During 1985, Texas A&M and the University of Texas- Austin were the only two Southern universities that ranked in the top 20 nationwide in research and development funding, according to the National Science Foundation.

The NSF rankings placed Georgia Tech 29th nation- wide, the University of Georgia 34th and Auburn Univer- sity 85th.

"We must see to it that more of our Southern institu- tions, our research institutions, receive the funding to de- velop the scientists and engineers that will make us com- petitive with the rest of the world," Winter said.

## Senate Panel Gives Quick Support To Rural-Aid Plan

RALEIGH (AP) — A proposal to fund a "brain trust and action center" to breathe new life into stag- nant rural areas and small towns won quick support of a Senate committee and appears a sure bet for enactment.

The Senate Economic Growth Committee took only 20 minutes Tuesday to endorse a bill to allocate \$4 million over the next two years for the North Carolina Rural Economic Development Center, a brainchild of a study panel appointed by Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan.

The center, which legislators said would be the first of its kind in the South and possibly nationwide, is one of Jordan's top priorities for this year's session, and Gov. Jim Martin has added his endorsement.

"The most important thing we can do is provide a viable quality of life in rural areas and small towns," former Mississippi Gov. William Winter told the Senate committee.

Winter, chairman of the 1986 Commission on the Future of the South, urged the Legislature to follow the recommendations of his panel in an address to a joint session Monday night. The commission, in a report issued last November, urged Southern states to preserve their tradition-rich rural communities.

Sen. Bill Staton, D-Lee, chairman of the Senate panel, said he did not expect every economic initiative to glide through as easily as this one. He said members likely were influenced by the fact that William Friday, former University of North Carolina president, is director of the center.

"He's so well respected, people tend to want to support things Presi- dent Friday supports as a volun- teer," Staton said.

As envisioned by the Jordan com- mission, the center would have four primary tasks: sponsoring demonstration projects to test new ideas; conducting research projects

to seek solutions to local develop- ment problems; training local lead- ers to identify barriers to economic growth; and collecting and disseminating information on rural North Carolina's economic and social situations.

Research projects might include analyses of potential markets for products. A typical local economic development initiative might be a program to respond to plant closings or help small businesses find capital.

Billy Ray Hall, the Jordan com- mission's staff researcher, described the proposed center as "a brain trust and an action center."

"A sound, coordinated effort must be in place to analyze the unique prob- lems and assist in the generation of appropriate solutions," said Sen. Kenneth Royall, D-Durham, sponsor of the bill. He called funding the center "a statement of our com- mitment to rural North Carolina."

Friday said the center was needed to help North Carolina's suffering rural areas survive. "When you've got 21 counties where 25 percent or more of the people are below the poverty level, it's time for us to do something."

## Scott Says Literacy Drive Is Key To State's Growth

RALEIGH (AP) — Virtually every department of state government should join the war on illiteracy in North Carolina and everyone can help by erasing the stigma that keeps many people from admitting they can't read, former Gov. Bob Scott said.

Scott, president of the state Community Colleges system, told the Senate Higher Education Committee Tuesday that greater literacy is a key to economic development.

"Our whole objective is to take it to them instead of sitting on a tree-lined

campus and saying 'if you want it, you've got to come and get it,'" Scott said.

Scott said the 58-campus communi- ty and technical college system was prepared to play a major role in help- ing illiterate adults learn basic skills.

North Carolina has more than 835,000 adults over age 25 who have not completed eighth grade, Scott said. An additional 700,000 have not finished high school. The state dropout rate is rising and now ex- ceeds 27,000 per year.

"What we are witnessing is a dizzy- ing compounding of illiteracy in our state," Scott said in a written state- ment. "In short, illiteracy among adults in North Carolina is out of con- trol."

Scott has joined several state lead- ers working to reduce illiteracy. In his State of the State address, Gov. Jim Martin proclaimed 1987 the "Year of the Reader" and announced creation of a Governor's Literacy Council to coordinate the state's lit- eracy programs.

## Free Corn's Value Questioned

CHARLOTTE (AP) — State agriculture officials say \$5.5 million worth of free corn seed being distributed in North Carolina and South Carolina could jeopardize their 1987 harvest because it is not identified by variety.

The seed, donated by Midwest dealers and distributed by Church World Service, could be devastated by Southern heat and disease, ex- perts say.

"The unknown seed, unknown company is too great a risk," said Joe Zublena, corn specialist at South Carolina's Clemson University. "You still invest your time, your labor,

your equipment, your fertilizer, your herbicides. You're putting up the ma- jority of the money."

Officials warn that the unmarked seed has several potential problems, including:

— Most of the seed matures in 95 to 110 days. Most Southern farmers prefer to plant corn that matures in 115 to 128 days.

— Lack of resistance to fairly common Southern diseases, in- cluding a virus carried by Johnson grass.

— Only 80 percent of the seed is guaranteed to sprout, according to the bags. Most retail seed promises at least 95 percent.

After an investigation, Georgia of- ficials learned that only 14 of 26 varieties that may be in the bags have been tested in that state.

Bill Jack, sales manager for Jac- ques Seed Co. in Prescott, Wis., said Tuesday that his company gave part of the Church World Service seed. Jack said he knew at least two other companies that contributed.

Jack said the gift was only for destitute farmers who otherwise could not plant. "When I'm giving something away I don't have to say any more about it than I want to," said Jack, who said he wouldn't plant seed without knowing the variety.

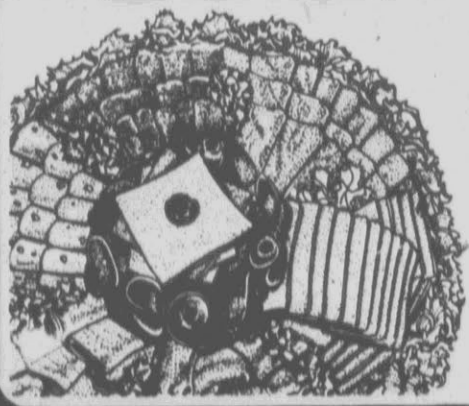

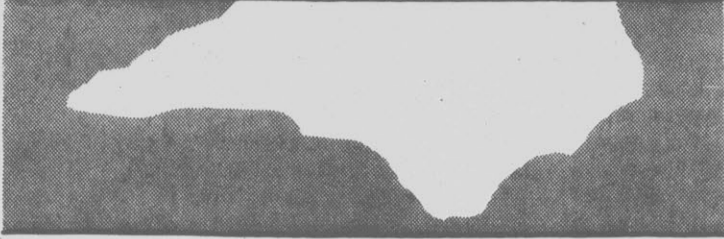

## IN THE STATE



### Questioned

FAYETTEVILLE (AP) — A former Green Beret who says he briefed Lt. Col. Oliver North on gun-running operations to Nicaraguan rebels has been interviewed by a federal investigator and ordered to appear next week before a congressional committee investigating the sale of arms to Iran.

Iain Crawford, 30, said Tuesday he was questioned about his involvement in the supply network last year.

Crawford said he has been ordered to appear next Tuesday before the House Select Committee to Investigate Covert Arms Transactions with Iran.

Crawford, of Fayetteville, in January revealed his involvement in a civilian-run operation that ferried equipment, food and arms from a base in El Salvador to Contra rebels fighting the leftist Sandinista government.

### RJR Earnings

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — RJR Nabisco expects to generate \$1 billion in excess cash over the next three years, but it will be used to lower the company's debt-equity ratio rather than buy new companies, a letter to stockholders says.

The company's annual report released Tuesday also says that chairman J. Tylee Wilson will step down April 16, more than eight months earlier than the company had previously indicated.

The company said last August that Wilson, who was the chief executive of RJR Nabisco until Jan. 1, would remain chairman until the first of next year. He was replaced as chief executive by F. Ross Johnson.

### Convicted

RUTHERFORDTON, N.C. (AP) — A woman who testified her husband forced her into prostitution and made her eat dog food from a pet dish over the last 20 years has been convicted of voluntary manslaughter for killing him.

A Rutherford County jury of six men and six women deliberated less than two hours Tuesday before finding Judy Norman, 40, guilty of the lesser offense.

She had faced first-degree murder charges for shooting her husband, John Norman, in the head three times. She faced a maximum sentence of 20 years during sentencing today.

Mrs. Norman's 45-year-old husband died at his southern Rutherford County house June 12, 1985, from gunshot wounds he received while sleeping.

### Too Many Pets

FAYETTEVILLE (AP) — Elly K. McBride says her love for animals grew out of an unfulfilled dream to become a veterinarian, but a Superior Court judge says her 295-animal menagerie on a one-acre lot near Hope Mills is a public nuisance.

Mrs. McBride has six pheasants, 37 rabbits, one guinea fowl, 71 chickens, 120 pigeons, six turkeys, seven ducks, 11 geese, five peacocks, seven goats and a dozen or more each of dogs and cats on the property, officials said.

Cumberland County Superior Court Judge J. Milton Read Jr. found Mrs. McBride, 61, in contempt of court. He told her to clean up her property and reduce the number of animals she keeps by May 6 or face the possibility that the court will dispose of the animals for her.

Mrs. McBride had been under a court order to straighten out by Monday unsanitary conditions found during previous Cumberland County Health Department inspections.

### Sex Offenses

LEXINGTON, N.C. (AP) — A High Point man who already has been charged in several counties in the molestations of 10 boys and a girl was indicted in Davidson Superior Court on seven more counts of sexual offenses involving some of the same children.

William Alfred Shealey, 48, has been accused of 71 first- or second-degree sexual offenses since October. Indictments say that the offenses occurred during the past six years, while Shealey was allegedly masquerading as a Boy Scout leader. The various counties became involved because the offenses allegedly

# Court Rejects CP&L Rate Change

RALEIGH (AP) — The North Carolina Court of Appeals has ruled that Carolina Power & Light Co. cannot recover fuel expenses it underestimated in its rate filings.

Carolina Power & Light Co. officials said Tuesday's ruling in their case would force them to refund \$4 million to customers.

CP&L filed an application with the Utilities Commission in May 1985 to adjust electric rates and charges, saying fuel costs were more than it had estimated earlier.

"They are asking ratepayers to pay for unexpected expenses for something in the past," said Karen Long of the state Attorney General's office.

The Utilities Commission issued an order allowing the company to recover 90 percent of its actual

\$15,644,406 undercollection of fuel costs for the period between Sept. 22, 1984 through June 30, 1985.

At issue was whether the Utilities Commission modified the state statute prohibiting retroactive ratemaking, and allowing the company to use a "true-up" to recover past over-recoveries or under-recoveries.

The Utilities Commission used another modified state law on fuel charges to allow CP&L to recoup past under-recoveries of fuel costs.

The court ruled that the Utilities Commission had misinterpreted the fuel statute when it allowed CP&L to make up for higher than anticipated fuel costs.

"This is what we wanted," Ms. Long said. "In the long run, the Attorney General's office believes it (a true-up) offers a disincentive to be

efficient if (a utility) knows it can recover every dollar it spends. It is a disincentive to efficiency. We have seen it in reality. In the long run, it is a disservice to the ratepayer and the utility."

Ms. Long defined a true-up as the ability for a utility to ask future ratepayers to make up for costs that are higher than estimated in a previous period.

The court said in an opinion written by Justice Harry Martin that there was nothing in the General Assembly statute that would indicate an intent to allow true-ups. It notes that true-ups are permitted in other states.

The decision noted that part of CP&L's argument was that the legislature "must have been aware that most other jurisdictions allow true-ups...."

"Though we agree with CP&L's contention that the General Assembly was no doubt aware of true-up procedures that exist in other states, such awareness, alone, certainly cannot indicate an actual intent to institute such procedures in this State," the opinion said.

"The commission's interpretation of the fuel statute has been used to both collect undercollection of fuel revenues and to make refunds of overcollections. Based on a preliminary analysis of this order, we will have to refund approximately \$14 million to North Carolina retail customers," said Richard E. Jones, vice president and senior counsel of CP&L.

"However, we are currently refunding approximately \$10 million in overcollections based on CP&L's 1986 fuel adjustment which we will now be able to retain, resulting in a net refund to customers of approximately \$4 million," Jones said.

"We think as a matter of public policy, there should be some type of true-up capability to protect both the customer and the company when actual fuel costs vary from those estimated at the time rates are placed into effect," he said.

Mac Harris, a spokesman for the company, said no decision on an appeal has been made.

## Aurora Titanium Mill Proposed

RALEIGH (AP) — An Oregon company is seeking state approval for a facility near Aurora in Beaufort County that would produce titanium — a chemical used in paint and plastics — but some groups are worried about the plant's possible effects on the environment.

Albany Titanium Inc., based in Albany, Ore., has applied for state permits for air and water discharges at a plant that would be near the Pamlico River on property owned by Texasgulf Inc., a phosphate mining company.

Initial plans call for the extraction of titanium from sand brought in by barge from Florida, with no mining in North Carolina. But some repre-

sentatives of environmental groups said deposits of the titanium-bearing sand, called ilmenite, also were available near the proposed plant site. They fear the plant might try to begin local mining operations in the future.

James D. Sheppard Jr., a spokesman for the N.C. Division of Environmental Management, said Tuesday that officials reviewing permit applications had visited other titanium processing facilities to educate themselves on learn about the process.

He said details on the proposed North Carolina operation — including the amount of material to be produced and possible pollution

discharges — were not available.

David A. McNaught, executive director of the Pamlico-Tar River Foundation, an environmental organization based in Washington, N.C., said his group was concerned the company might discharge hazardous wastes — including metals, arsenic and fluorides — into the river. He said the river's water quality already had declined.

# GAO Says S&L Insurance Fund Bankrupt

WASHINGTON (AP) — The insurance fund covering more than \$900 billion in savings and loan deposits is technically bankrupt, and even a proposed \$25 billion rescue plan will leave it walking a tightrope for years, the General Accounting Office says.

The GAO, in a report and testimony submitted to Congress on Tuesday, said the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. finished 1986 with a deficit of more than \$3 billion after GAO auditors made bookkeeping adjustments for anticipated losses.

A preliminary audit concluded the fund should have earmarked \$8 billion as a reserve against losses from insolvent S&Ls, said Frederick D. Wolf, director of accounting and financial management for the congressional auditing agency.

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which runs FSLIC, did not allow for such a reserve because it is propping up failing S&Ls to avoid drawing on the fund. As long as the thrifts are open, operating, paying interest to depositors and allowing withdrawals, there is no actual payout from the insurance fund.

Without the loss reserve, FSLIC's books showed a year-end balance of \$4.6 billion.

But the GAO said the failing thrifts cannot be kept running at a loss forever. They are losing \$6 million a day, and those sums will add to the ultimate loss the insurance fund must cover, the auditing agency said.

The agency, in a report submitted by Wolf, said more than 445 operating institutions are insolvent under generally accepted accounting principles. Eventually they will cost the FSLIC at least \$23.5 billion, assuming there are no further problems, the GAO said.

The GAO offered a qualified endorsement for a joint proposal by the bank board and the Treasury Department to pump \$25 billion into the fund, including \$15 billion borrowed in the capital markets and \$10 billion from other sources such as assessments on thrifts.

While the proposal is not perfect, it is needed too urgently to quibble over details, Wolf said.

He warned that even with the \$25 billion, the problem was not over. Raising the money will require virtually all the fund's income for years, he said, leaving it with no reserve to deal with new problems that might arise.

"The emergence of further problems is a definite possibility," Wolf said.

"Therefore, the Congress should recognize that enactment of this legislation will not necessarily preclude the need for an additional infusion of capital at some future time."

Wolf's assessment was disputed by the president of the U.S. League of Savings Institutions, William B. O'Connell, who said the GAO used "accounting conventions to create artificial deficits."

O'Connell said the audit's contingency reserve would be "for future losses which may or may not be realized" and does not consider when FSLIC would have to spend the money nor take into account the fund's current income of about \$2.5 billion a year.

The league supports a much smaller \$5 billion, two-year program to put money into the FSLIC. The league's plan would cost S&Ls less in special assessments.

Wolf said the industry's problems in part was an unanticipated result of the financial deregulation of the late 1970s. For decades, he said, thrifts paid interest on savings accounts at low, regulated rates. They made money on home mortgages written at slightly higher rates.

But when the rates on savings accounts were deregulated, depositors deserted the thrifts in droves. To hold on to the accounts, S&Ls began paying higher, competitive rates — although their income was still linked to low-yielding mortgages.

Some thrifts tried to close the gap by putting their money into higher paying, but riskier, loans. And some went far out on a limb, financing their own ventures in condominiums and shopping centers.

## Texan Executed

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Eliseo Moreno, convicted of killing six people including a state trooper during a 50-hour rampage, was executed early today after he rejected all appeals and eagerly accepted death.

"He was not afraid," said Attorney General Jim Mattox, who witnessed Moreno's death by injection. "When he came in (to the death chamber) he jumped up on the table with a smile and said he was ready for the rocket to take off so he could finally go home — and he did."

After spending his final day playing dominoes, visiting with relatives, reading his Bible and watching an old "Dennis The Menace" rerun, he became the second inmate executed in the nation this year. Both have been in Texas, which leads all states with 22 since it resumed executions in 1982.

Moreno, 27, a former lawn mower repairman from Donna, had instructed attorneys to take no action to save him.

"I'd like to say I'm here because I'm guilty," Moreno said in his final statement. "I have no grudges or anything against nobody. The word of God tells me the wages of sin are death."

"I'm willing to pay according to the laws of Texas because I know I'm guilty."

## Congressmen, Actors Join Homeless For 'Sleepout'

WASHINGTON (AP) — About a dozen members of Congress and a handful of actors rolled out sleeping bags on heating grates near the Capitol early today to call attention to the plight of the homeless.

The demonstration, which participants labeled the "Grate American Sleepout," came just hours before the House planned to take up a \$500 million, one-year emergency bill to aid the homeless.

A vote on the bill is not expected before Thursday, and no similar bill has been introduced in the Senate.

"My being here means that more of you of people will show up," actor Brian Dennehy told reporters as he unrolled his sleeping bag on a grate near the Library of Congress. "We're here for people who don't have political power."

Harley Cross, 9, was the youngest of the demonstrators.

Cross, who co-stars with actor Martin Sheen in the still-to-be released movie, "The Believers," said he has walked the streets of New York and seen the homeless, but he always looked past them.

"Here, I will see these people," said young Cross, who was accompanied by his father, Joe. "In New York, I walk by them and don't have any focus. I will see them here as homeless people."

lion. In January, Roberts said he needed \$4.5 million. Roberts' son, Richard, told viewers of his daily television program Tuesday: "You can be a part of helping to bring in this final million and a half. Step to your telephone right now. ... We are so close. Will you help us go over the top?"

For two months, Roberts has been derided by some for his assertion that God told him to complete the fund raising by the end of March or forfeit his life.

"If Oral says that is what happened, then Oral is either one of two things," the Rev. John Wolf, minister of All Souls Unitarian Church in Tulsa, told his congregation Sunday. "He is a liar or he is crazy. Either way, it's a bum rap for Christianity."

Roberts wrote followers last week that he intends to ascend into the futuristic prayer tower at the center of the Oral Roberts University campus on March 22 to pray and fast until "victory comes or God calls me home."

Bob Vander Lugt, president of the university Student Association, said most students have been supportive of Roberts though they keep a "critical distance" from the evangelist's assertions.

He said a few students believe Roberts' approach is "outright manipulation" and others think criticism from outside "is an attack on Oral."

"I think you can find most of them in between, wanting to understand," Vander Lugt said.

"He's always making very bold statements," said Linda Hopkins, editor of the university student newspaper, The Oracle. "He doesn't make half-hearted statements. He never has. I think the students overall are very enthusiastic about medical missions. I like to be identified with that mission."

Last March, Roberts first said that God told him his life would end unless \$8 million was raised in one year to allow Oral Roberts University medical students to graduate debt-free and become missionaries in Third World countries.

In an Easter sermon in Dallas last year, he said God had given him until the end of 1986 to raise the money. But during the rest of the year he said

he was told to meet the goal by the end of March 1987.

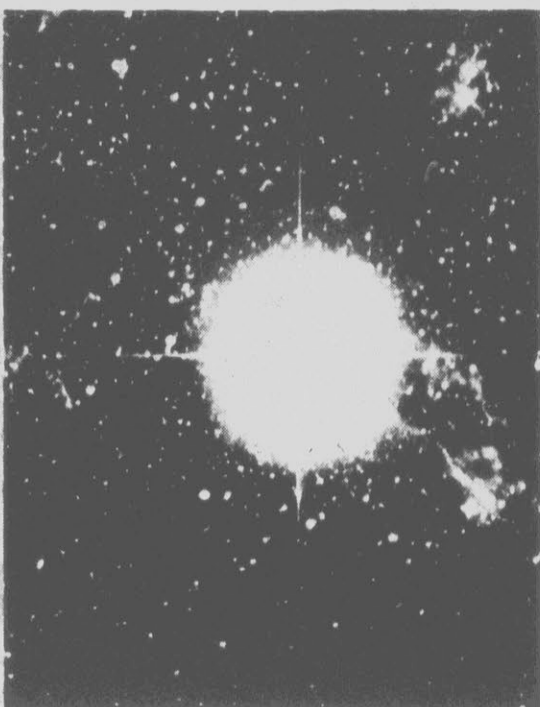
"I announced it in March last year and nobody paid any attention to me. I believe they're paying attention to me now," Roberts said on his son's television program, "Richard Roberts Live," broadcast Tuesday.

Roberts said the expense of a medical student's education keeps graduates from becoming missionaries. He said God ordered him to change that with the scholarship program.

"He said, 'If you don't turn it around in one year, I'm going to call you home,'" Roberts said on Tuesday's program. "Now, death to a Christian is not death to a sinner. I mean, to know you go home to meet Jesus was a thrill on one side. But my stomach was turning over because I'd failed the Lord."

## Peoples Temple Member Sentenced

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Larry Layton was a virtual prisoner of the Peoples Temple when he helped fellow cult members murder a congressman in 1978, a judge said in imposing a life sentence that will allow parole in four years.

The slaying of Rep. Leo Ryan, D-Calif., three newsmen and a Peoples Temple defector in Guyana triggered the deaths of the Rev. Jim Jones and 912 followers by poison and gunfire at the cult's jungle headquarters, known as Jonestown.

Chief U.S. District Judge Robert Peckham on Tuesday sentenced Layton to the mandatory life in prison, but made him eligible for parole after serving five years. Layton was given credit for the year he has already served.

"Although Larry Layton must be held responsible for his actions, a just sentence requires consideration of the environment in which Layton and other members were virtually imprisoned," the judge said.

The judge cited 60 letters in Layton's favor. One of Layton's victims, a government witness and four of the jurors who convicted him were among those who had urged leniency.

Layton, 41, son of a wealthy Berkeley family, is the only former cult member to be tried for Ryan's murder. He was convicted Dec. 1 of conspiracy, and aiding and abetting in Ryan's death and of attempted murder in the wounding of Richard Dwyer, a U.S. diplomat in Guyana.

Layton's first trial in 1981 ended in a hung jury.

Ryan, three newsmen and a temple defector were slain and 11 others, including Dwyer were wounded in an ambush. Layton wounded two defectors, authorities said.

Hours later, Jones and his followers died by gunfire and poison — cyanide-laced punch in their agricultural settlement.

Ryan had visited the compound the previous day and left with 18 members who said they wanted out.

The conspiracy to kill Ryan and his entourage was to make sure that news of conditions at Jonestown never reached the outside world, authorities said.

Peckham said although the crimes "strike at the very heart of a representative democracy," Layton's role was not as significant as that of many of the other conspirators.

Monica Bagby, who was shot by Layton, had written the court to say she bore no animosity and that to understand the events at Jonestown, "you had to be there."

# Israeli General Facing U.S. Charges In Pollard Spy Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new commander of a major Israeli air force base is facing federal charges that he recruited convicted spy Jonathan Jay Pollard to collect U.S. military secrets for Israel.

Aviem Sella, identified in a news release by federal prosecutors as a brigadier general, was charged with espionage, conspiracy to commit espionage and illegally receiving U.S. defense secrets as a foreign agent.

Sella, however, will probably never appear in court because Israel is not required under the U.S.-Israeli extradition treaty to turn over espionage suspects.

The three-count indictment against Sella, 41, was returned by a federal grand jury on Tuesday, the eve of Pollard's scheduled sentencing today by a federal judge.

Pollard, 32, a former civilian Navy intelligence analyst pleaded guilty last June to espionage charges.

He faced a possible life sentence and a \$250,000 fine for what federal prosecutors have called one of the worst spy cases in American history.

His wife, Anne Henderson-Pollard, 26, faced a possible 10-year term and

\$500,000 fine at her sentencing today on lesser charges.

Ms. Henderson-Pollard pleaded guilty to conspiracy to receive embezzled government property and being an accessory after the fact to possession of defense secrets.

The indictment against Sella charged that he recruited Pollard in the summer of 1984 and offered to pay him to obtain documents he had access to at the Navy's Anti-Terrorist Alert Center.

Sella, then a graduate student at New York University, arranged to meet Pollard through a mutual friend.

Pollard gave Sella portions of two secret Army military geography surveys of foreign countries to show his "ability and willingness to assist Israel."

The indictment said Sella told Pollard: "The documents and information were of great value to Israel and he encouraged Pollard to provide more such documents and information."

During one of the early meetings with Pollard, Sella was accompanied by an "accomplice" whose identity is not known to the grand jury, the indictment said.

Later that year, Pollard gave Sella some classified satellite reconnaissance photos and other secret materials at two meetings in the Washington area, the indictment said.

Sella also arranged for the Pollards to travel to Paris in November 1984 so that Pollard could receive instructions from Rafael Eitan, a veteran Israeli intelligence agent named as an unindicted coconspirator in the indictment.

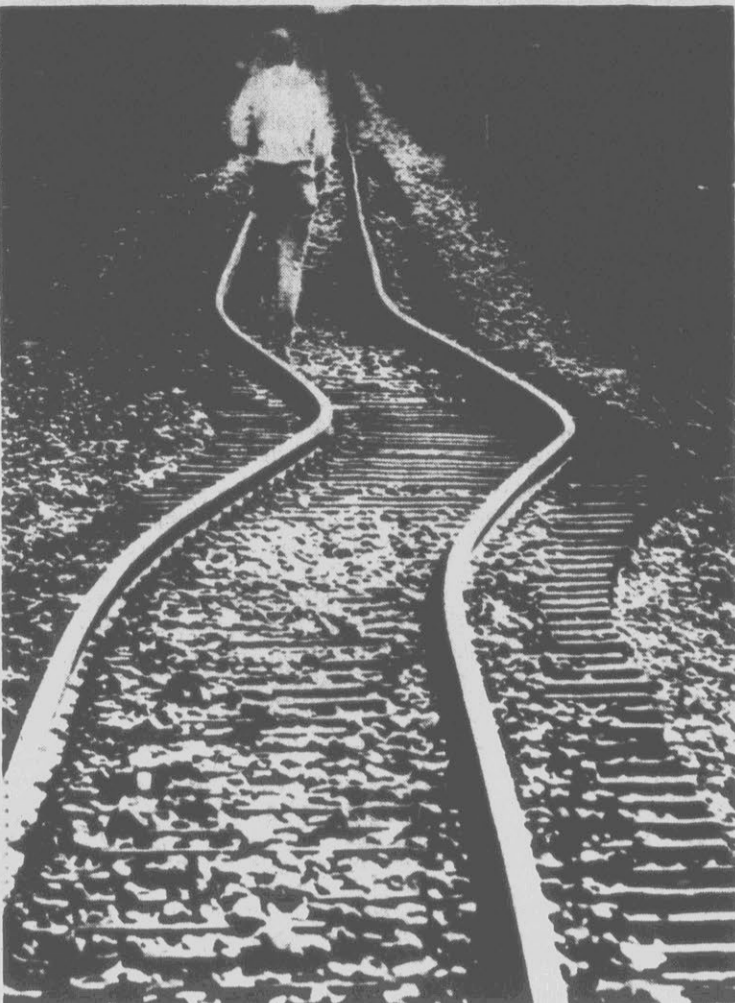
Sella introduced Pollard to Eitan, and Joseph Yagur, the science consul at the Israeli consulate in New York who was to be Pollard's "handler," the indictment said.

During the Paris visit, Sella ar-

ranged to buy a \$7,000 diamond and sapphire ring for Ms. Henderson-Pollard, the indictment said.

The indictment alleged that in the 11 months before Pollard's Nov. 21, 1985 arrest, he took classified documents home from work three times a week. He used a courier card to avoid searches by Navy guards.

Every two weeks, Pollard delivered the documents to the apartment of Irit Erb, then a secretary at the Israeli Embassy. He would meet with Yagur there or in another apartment in the same building, where the Israelis photocopied the documents, the indictment said.

## Dole, Biden Assemble Committees To Begin Campaign Groundwork

WASHINGTON — Two 1988 presidential contenders, Republican Senate leader Bob Dole of Kansas and Democratic Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr. of Delaware, announced the formation Tuesday of exploratory committees that will lay the groundwork for their expected campaigns for the White House.

The committee for Dole, whom polls show to be the chief challenger to Vice President George Bush for his party's nomination, will be headed by Robert Ellsworth, a former Kansas congressman and longtime friend of Dole who was involved in the 1968 Richard M. Nixon campaign and later served in the Nixon administration as ambassador to NATO.

"I think the Republican race is wide open," Ellsworth said at a press conference here, although he ac-

knowledged that Bush was still the front-runner, as he has been from the start. "He (Bush) has been hurt by Iran, but I assume his popularity will come back up again and he will be a tough competitor."

Meanwhile, he said, as the approach of the 1988 campaign focused attention on Dole, "the more people look at him (Dole), the more seriously they take him as a possible president."

Ellsworth said he hoped that Dole would get some help from Republicans who had previously been inclined to back former Tennessee Sen. Howard H. Baker Jr., who scrapped his plans to run for the nomination when he accepted President Reagan's appointment as White House chief of staff last week.

The 63-year-old Dole will retain his post as Senate minority leader, at least for the present, Ellsworth said. He indicated, however, that the

senator would consider the possibility of stepping down from that job if the time demands of campaigning become too great.

Ellsworth said no decision had been made as to when Dole would formally announce his candidacy. Until Dole makes his formal announcement, Ellsworth said, the exploratory committee will observe the same federal financial restrictions and reporting requirements as would a campaign committee.

Other Republican 1988 contenders besides Dole and Bush are New York Rep. Jack Kemp and television evangelist Pat Robertson — both of whom, like Bush and Dole, have exploratory committees — and former Delaware Gov. Pierre S. DuPont IV, who formally announced his candidacy last year.

By filing papers for his committee with the Federal Election Commis-

sion Tuesday, the 44-year-old Biden, in his third Senate term, appeared to have ended a period of uncertainty about whether he would run. "At this point he has every expectation of being a candidate for president," press secretary Peter Smith said.

For the present, Biden will also retain his post as chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee. Smith said Valerie Biden Owens, Biden's sister, who has managed his campaigns for the Senate, would serve as manager of his presidential campaign.

Biden's rivals for the Democratic nomination include Missouri Rep. Richard A. Gephardt, who announced his candidacy last week, former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt who is expected to announce next week, former Colorado Sen. Gary Hart, who is expected to announce next month, and civil rights leader Jesse Jackson.

In addition, former Arkansas Sen. Dale Bumpers and Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis are considering entering the race and are expected to make their decisions known within the next two weeks.

## Chicago Kicks Off 150th Anniversary Of Founding

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago's throwing a year-long 150th birthday party and everybody will be there: even the ghosts of Al Capone, Mrs. O'Leary's cow and those nameless, double-dealing city fathers who took the Potawatomi Indians for that parcel of land dubbed "City of the Wild Onion."

Mayor Harold Washington was to kick off the celebration today in the nation's third-largest city by cutting the sesquicentennial birthday cake and commemorating the March 4, 1837, date of incorporation on the city seal.

"The theme will be 'Chicago's people are Chicago's history,'" said Lois Weisberg of the mayor's office.

And there's plenty of history to learn.

Chicagou, the Potawatomi term for wild onion, began as a lowland plain that when flooded by rain allowed canoe travel from the Mississippi River, north and west via the Des Plaines and Illinois rivers to the Great Lakes.

It was the route French-Canadian explorer Louis Joliet and Jesuit priest Jacques Marquette likely traveled to the mouth of the Chicago River in 1763.

And it was the route probably used

by black fur trader Jean Baptiste Point du Sable 10 years later, as he made his way from New Orleans to establish the trading post on the Chicago River's north bank.

In 1803, the government built a military post on the south bank called Fort Dearborn but ordered it abandoned after the War of 1812 because officials deemed it too difficult to defend.

On Aug. 15 of that year, more than 500 Indians attacked 100 settlers trying to reach Fort Wayne in Indiana. Half the settlers were slaughtered and the rest taken captive, and Fort

Dearborn was razed. It was the first time Chicago burned to the ground.

By 1816, American soldiers had rebuilt the fort and several survivors of the massacre found their way back.

By 1833, the population was 150. Four years later, it was 4,170.

Within 20 years, wagons, barges and 10 trunk railroad lines hauling livestock and lumber, produce and products converged daily on the city.

By 1893, Chicagoans were bragging so much about their city that New York newspaper editor Charles Dana nicknamed it the "Windy City."

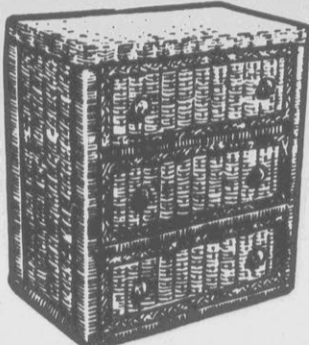

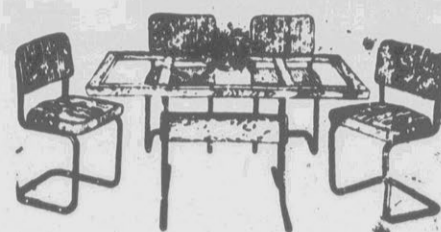

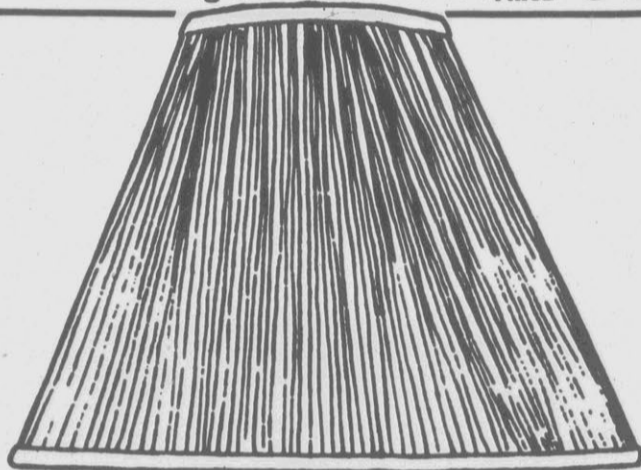

# Sprouse Returning To Fashion

NEW YORK — After nearly two years in limbo, Stephen Sprouse is returning to fashion, with a little help from General Felt-Knoll International Holdings, the company that also owns Knoll International Furniture, Color-Tile stores and the "21" club.

With "several million dollars" worth of backing, the new Stephen Sprouse company will, starting with the fall 1987 season, produce three separate men's and women's collections. They range from lower-priced jeans and T-shirts, under the new label SS 87 (the numerical year will change to 88 for spring), priced at \$25 to \$150, to a middle range of domestically made sportswear to be called Sprouse, ranging from \$150 to \$350, to a more expensive Stephen Sprouse line of tailored clothing handmade in Italy of European fabrics, including Sprouse's original

offbeat graffiti print shirts and sportswear, ranging from \$500 to \$2,000.

The initial collections will be available in September only in the designer's own store, an old firehouse at 99 Wooster St. that is being redesigned into a three-level emporium. In October, the designer's three collections will be offered to select retailers across the country, according to Andrew Cogan, who, with Sprouse, is co-managing director of the new company.

Sprouse's fashion debut in 1984 was indeed auspicious. His bold use of DayGlo colors and graffiti prints teamed with impeccably tailored jackets, coats and miniskirts garnered him a Coty Award nomination in his first year in business and he was heralded as the next major American talent to watch.

In 1985, spawning a legion of young imitators, many of whom designed from rundown lofts on the backstreets of TriBeCa, Sprouse won the Council of Fashion Designers of

America's award for best new designer. That same year, however, Sprouse's business unraveled and collapsed in controversy stemming from poor quality control and store deliveries too often gone awry.

By launching the new Stephen Sprouse business with its own store, Cogan said, "we are going to control our distribution the first year to make sure the quality and deliveries are there."

There has been little in the way of tribute to the women who have influenced fashion in this century. Chanel and Schiaparelli notwithstanding, there are many other female designers, including Americans, who have not had the luxury of a master talent to champion and continue their design legacy, as Karl Lagerfeld is doing for the Chanel label. Indeed, after their death, most of these women and the couture and ready-to-wear houses they established, along with their particular vision, have vanished into the fashion

annals, resurrected only when a designer ravages the past as a source of inspiration.

For this reason, the newest exhibit at the Galleries at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York, titled "Three Women: Madeleine Vionnet, Claire McCardell and Rei Kawakubo," which opened this week, is particularly interesting. For not only does it pay homage to three talented women, but the clothes on display underscore these designers' widely divergent design points of view.

From the bias-cut, three-dimensional draping of Vionnet (her heyday was in the 1920s and '30s), to the functional modernism of McCardell's sportswear (1940s and '50s) to the abstract shape and line in Kawakubo's voluminous cuts for her company Comme des Garcons, much of fashion today bears the trio's design imprimatur. The exhibit is worth seeing. Genius usually is.

# Women's Committee Receives Top Honor

TARBORO — The quilt-making project, which involved members of the women's committee of the Edgecombe-Martin County Electric Membership Corp. has won a top honor from a national organization.

The competition was sponsored by the National Rural Electric Women's

Association. The promoting excellence in American rural life award cited the project in the category for innovative or special projects involving women. The project was coordinated by the N.C. Association of Electric Cooperatives Women's Advisory Committee and involved the preparation of a quilt which commemorated the 50th anniversary of rural electrification in 1985.

The quilt was created from fabric squares symbolic of each of the state's 28 EMCs. The Edgecombe-Martin County EMC square was prepared by Ethel Bryant of Route 1, Tarboro.

The finished quilt was presented to NCAEC for permanent display in the organization's headquarters building in Raleigh. It was chosen as the design for the official 1986 Christmas card of the state association.

NCAEC and its Women's Advisory Committee won a first place award for an oral history project focusing on the early years of the rural electric program and its impact on rural Tar Heels.

# Crochet Purse Is Fashion Plus

Style is in the bag with this smart purse fashioned from heavy, polyester, machine-washable craft cord, which holds its shape beautifully and requires no lining. It's crocheted on a large size I hook, and the basketweave pattern adds visual and textural interest to the classic styling of the bag.

The versatile 9 1/2-by-11-inch size makes this bag perfect for anyone from teens to grandmothers, and the classic design knows no season. Best of all, you can whip it up in a matter of hours with either a shoulder strap or regular length handle.

Or you may order Kit No. C-030187 by sending a check or money order for \$12.95 to Pat Trexler Crafts at the same address. The kit price includes shipping charges, full instructions and crocheted cord in your choice of off-white, rust, camel or navy blue.

While I have from time to time featured crochet or needlepoint purses, the knit ones have been few and far between. A dear friend, Margaret Brainard, is a talented designer, and since Margaret's first love is knitting, she created her own design for a knit clutch purse. You could, however, apply this design to crochet.

To give it the necessary stiffness, she used an inner lining of 10-mesh plastic canvas used for needlepoint projects. The heavier seven-mesh plastic canvas would be too stiff for this purpose.

## Pat's Pointers Pat Trexler

The first step, after selecting yarn, needles and pattern stitch, is to knit a rectangle approximately the same size as the plastic canvas sheet. These are usually 10 1/2 by 13 inches. You will want your knit piece just a little smaller so you have to stretch it every so slightly to fit over the plastic.

Margaret's purse was done in a nubby cotton yarn in an openwork stitch to match an ensemble she made with the same yarn and stitch.

With the yarn you have selected, make a sample swatch of the pattern stitch you plan to use. From this, you can determine your gauge — the number of stitches required for each inch of knit fabric. When you find your gauge, multiply that figure by 10. This should give you a piece of knit fabric 10 inches wide.

If the stitch you have chosen has a very tight weave with little elasticity — as will be the case with many crochet stitches — you might need to make it the full 10 1/2-inch width, but most knit pieces will stretch easily.

This is a great project for experimenting with fancy pattern stitches as there are no increases or decreases to be concerned with and the complete piece is relatively small.

With pattern stitches, you will be concerned with the multiple of stitches — that is, the number of stitches required for each repeat of the pattern. To see how this works, let's take an example.

Suppose your gauge is five stitches

per inch. This multiplied by 10 gives you 50, which is the number of stitches you will need. But your pattern stitch is a multiple of six stitches, meaning you must work on a number of stitches evenly divisible by six. Fifty just doesn't fit the bill. A multiple of six can be worked on 48 or 54 stitches, however, and my choice would be to take the smaller of these two numbers and stretch the piece to fit. Or you could add a stitch or two to be worked plain at each end.

That's all the figuring you need do. Knit along until your piece is just slightly shorter than the plastic canvas sheet. Bind off.

Now, cover your canvas with a "slipcover" made of fabric, which will serve as your lining. Shape it just like a pillowcase, slip the canvas inside it and whip the open edges of fabric together.

Now, whip the knit fabric to one side of the lining and fold it up so that

the cast-on edge of the knit piece is within 2 to 2 1/2 inches of the top. Fold down the top edge for the flap of the purse. Sew the two side edges together, leaving the flap free.

To create a sharp fold in the canvas, follow these steps. Complete the purse except for the flap fastener. Lay it on a padded ironing board and cover it with a couple of thicknesses of toweling. Use a steam iron on a cool setting and press down on the piece. Repeat as necessary to create the fold line in the plastic inner lining. Take care not to let too much heat get to it or the plastic canvas could disintegrate. Start with a cool setting and very gradually increase the heat.

Fasten with a covered snap, pieces of Velcro, or make a button loop and sew on a button. Now you're ready to step out with a new purse to match the sweater, coat, suit or dress you have just finished.

GM's advance accounted for more than half of the Dow Jones industrials' gain.

ITT gained 1 1/2% to 63 1/2 in active trading. The company said Tuesday it is considering spinning off some of its operations.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks rose .41 to 162.57. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 1.35 at 323.69.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average rose 6.05 to 2,226.52.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 9 to 8 on the NYSE, with 811 up, 719 down and 419 unchanged. Big Board volume totaled 149.24 million shares, against 156.68 million in the previous session.

strength of purpose" and urged the Soviets to join now in tacking the details of an accord.

"We are committed to genuine and lasting arms reductions," he said.

Reagan last appeared in the press room Nov. 25 when the administration disclosed that payments from secret U.S. arms sales to Iran apparently had been deposited in Swiss accounts for the Nicaraguan Contras.

He read his statement on Gorbachev's overture smoothly, shook off a couple of questions from reporters and left the lectern to the senior U.S. official to hold a briefing on the arms control talks.

The official, who could not be identified under the rules, said, "There is no evidence whatsoever" that Gorbachev timed his move to Reagan's problems over the clandestine Iranian arms purchases and the Contra diversion.

"Indeed, I would echo statements that have been made by some of our allies ... that this move vindicates a policy of

firmness on the part of the NATO alliance," he said.

A Soviet diplomat told reporters, meantime, that Gorbachev's overture was not related to "recent developments" in Washington. "We made resolution for ourselves that we are going to negotiate very persistently and ... we have been saying that since they started unraveling that we are going to try to deal with this U.S. administration," said Vitaly I. Churkin of the Soviet Embassy.

The president's stress on tight verification measures raised anew an issue that has been at the center of his view of dealing with the Soviet Union.

In two reports to Congress, Reagan has accused Moscow of flouting a number of arms control treaties with the United States. Arms control director Kenneth L. Adelman said Monday there would have to be on-site inspection of the plants in which the Soviets produce, assemble and store their SS-20 medium-range missiles.

# Webster Finds Quick Support

As director of central intelligence, Webster would replace William J. Casey, who resigned after undergoing surgery for brain cancer.

As Reagan's nominee for the job, Webster replaces acting CIA director Robert M. Gates, who asked Reagan to withdraw his nomination on Monday. Gates, who will remain as deputy director of the agency, faced stiff Senate opposition based on the CIA's involvement in the Iran-Contra affair.

During nine years as FBI director, Webster won a substantial reputation on Capitol Hill for revamping the bureau with tough rules against misconduct. Even the Abscam investigation of members of Congress — in which FBI agents posed as Arab businessmen seeking political favors — did not undermine the popularity of Webster, who personally supervised the probe.

At the White House, Reagan said, "Bill Webster will bring remarkable depth and breadth of experience, as well as an outstanding record of achievement, to this position.

... Bill is well known as a man of honor and integrity, as a man who is committed to the rule of law and as a professional who is dedicated to the pursuit of excellence."

Leaving FBI headquarters Tuesday, Webster said he took the job because "the president asked me to do it and I'm pleased to do what I can in line of duty." Asked if he anticipated problems with his confirmation, Webster laughed and replied, "I never predict that at all."

He said that rivalries between the FBI and the CIA are "old stuff. We're working very closely together."

When Webster took over the FBI in 1978, Congress had recently completed investigations that uncovered FBI harassment of civil rights groups and leaders in the 1960s and 1970s, illegal surveillance and break-ins aimed at anti-Vietnam war protesters and misconduct by FBI Director L. Patrick Gray during the Watergate investigation.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said there were "no candidates yet" to replace Webster at the FBI.

## Defensive Quickness Too Much For Goldsboro As Rose Posts 71-58 Victory

Rose High School's quickness on defense proved too much for Goldsboro High School Tuesday night as the Rampants rolled up a 71-58 win in the first round of the state 4-A basketball playoffs.

The Rampants, who won the Big East championship and that league's top seed, had little trouble with Goldsboro, which finished fifth in the Mideastern Conference. Goldsboro completes its year with a 12-12 record while Rose, 19-5, advances to the second round on Thursday night.

Rose will play host to Fayetteville 71st, a 77-70 victor over Kinston Tuesday night. That game will be played in the Rose gym at 7 p.m. Thursday.

Elsewhere in the Big East, only Wilson Beddingfield came away a winner, downing Eastern Wayne, 89-74. In addition to the loss by Kinston, Pine Forest downed North-eastern, 61-47, and Jacksonville nipped Wilson Fike, 59-55.

Rose had trouble shaking the Cougars, who used a strong board attack to keep close to the Rampants. But the Rose defense finally did the trick at the end, forcing a total of 30 turnovers by the Cougars in the game.

"It wasn't what I would have liked as far as the rebounding goes," Rose coach Jim Brewington said of the 36-25 margin held by the Cougars on the boards. "But I think we played better in the second half. We're going to have to work on our rebounding to keep going too."

"I thought that we shot our free throws well, but not as well as we shot from the floor," he added. Actually, Rose canned 27 of 54 from the floor for an even 50 percent. From the line, the Rampants made 17 of 22, 77.3 percent. Rose did make its first 11 from the stripe, however.

At the same time, Goldsboro was held to just 23 of 53 from the floor, 43.4 percent, with 12 of 17 at the line, 70.6.

"Our quickness was the difference," Brewington said. Rose constantly harassed the Cougars on defense, although there were a few lapses. "We thought that we'd have to stop their outside people, and we did. But their inside people hurt us somewhat."

Both teams seemed tight at the beginning, both suffering turnovers and missed shots before Goldsboro hit the opening basket after a minute plus of play. Rose tied it up, but a three-point play by Ken Hamilton gave Goldsboro a 5-2 lead.

Rose battled back, however, and

finally tied it up on a three-point play by Terry Warren with 1:37 left at 11-11. Errol Wooten then scored off the fast break following a steal to give Rose a 13-11 lead.

That held the rest of the quarter.

Goldsboro tied it up on the first basket of the second period, but Rose went back out in front and gained a 17-14 lead on a layup by Warren. But Goldsboro again came back and baskets by David Best and Hamilton, both off rebounds, put the Cougars in to the lead once more, 20-19 with 4:54 left in the half.

Johnny Ebron tossed back a missed shot for Rose and Wooten scored off the break for a 23-20 Rose lead with 4:05 left, however, and the Rampants never trailed again.

After another Goldsboro basket, David Lee made two free throws and Kevin Cobb and Brian Wille both hit field goals for a 29-22 lead with 2:17 left.

Goldsboro hit the final basket of the half, however, to trail 29-24 at intermission.

The Cougars scored five in a row in the third period to tie the game one more time, at 33-33, with 5:20 left. Best started it with the second of two free throws and Hamilton added another pair at the line. Carlos Parker then nailed a jumper in the lane for the tie.

But with 5:08 showing, Lee drove in for a basket, Melvin Jenkins followed from underneath, Keyford Langley hit one from the key and Cobb scored

off the fast break to give the Rampants eight straight points and a 41-33 lead with 3:59 to go.

Rose held to most of the margin, taking a 49-42 lead into the final quarter.

Jenkins and Warren scored the first two baskets of the final period to up the lead to 53-42, and that stretched to 59-46 on a basket by Cobb with 4:47 to go.

The two exchanged points until the final minute and a half when Rose ran off six more in a row to up the lead to 15, 71-56, before Goldsboro scored the final basket of the night.

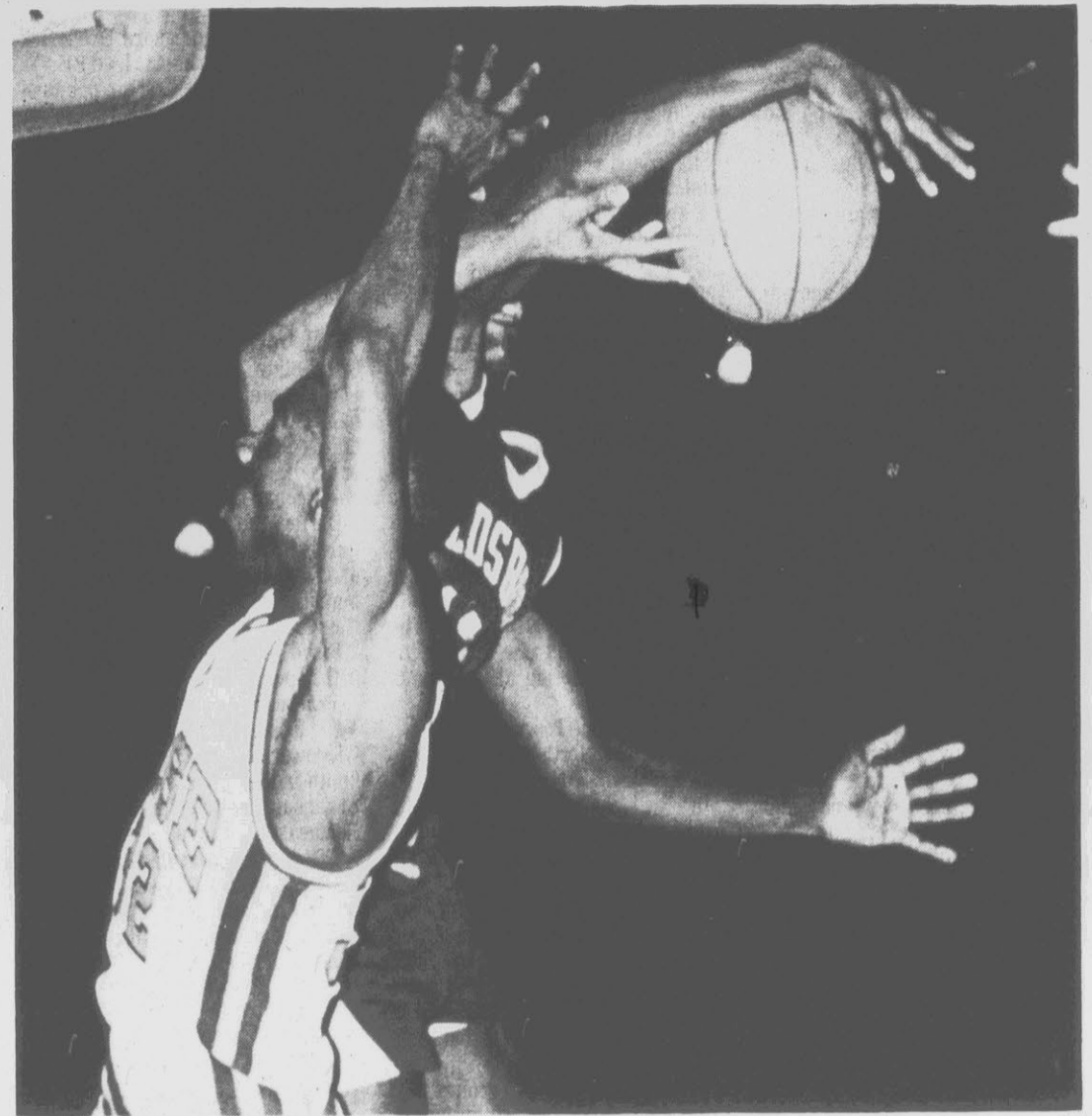

Al Sneed and Reese each hit a basket for Franklinton to make it 51-48 with 1:33 left but Reid connected on a three-point play for Farmville to make it 54-48 with 1:17 remaining.

Sneed hit again for the Red Rams to make it 54-50 but with 41 seconds left, Joyner nailed both ends of a one-and-one to make it 57-50. Sneed hit for Franklinton before Joyner added another free throw with 10 seconds left to make it 58-52 before Reese hit a shot in the waning seconds to provide the final margin.

"It was not a good game for us," Terrell said. "I don't know if we were tight. We just didn't play our kind of game."

The Jaguars suffered through 18 turnovers and Williams, the Jaguars leading scorer, suffered through a 5-17 shooting performance.

"If we had shot better it would have been a different ballgame," Terrell said. "The two things I'm concerned about is our shooting was not that good and (we had) a lot of turnovers."

The majority of the the turnovers came against the Franklinton press which Terrell said the Jaguars handled poorly.

Still though, a win is a win, and Farmville improved its overall record to 19-5. Next up for the Jaguars is Ahoskie, at Farmville on Thursday.

"It's the first game of the playoffs," Terrell said. "It's good to get the first win."

Joyner led the Jaguars with 17 points while Reid chipped in 11 and Williams 10. Sneed led Franklinton, 14-9, with 12 points.

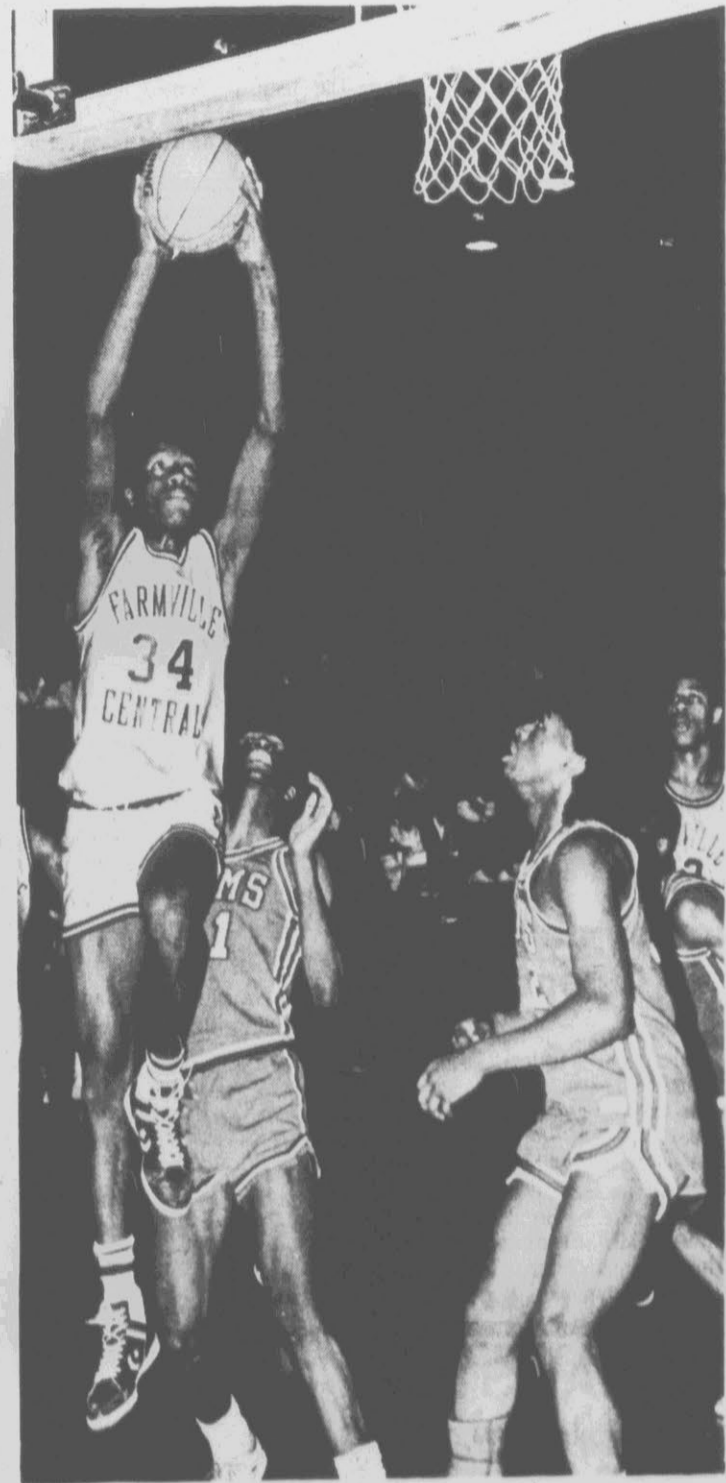

# Temple Runs Past St. Joseph's

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Sharp-shooting guard Nate Blackwell has given eighth-ranked Temple the reputation as a team that lives by the three-point shot. But Tim Perry showed St. Joseph's the Owls can mix it up inside.

The 6-foot-9 junior forward grabbed eight offensive rebounds and the Owls finished with 21 to defeat St. Joseph's 84-68 Tuesday night and advance to the championship game of the Atlantic 10 Conference basketball playoffs.

"He's been improving all along, but I don't want to get into the adjectives yet," Chaney said. "I'm not surprised at what he does and his best basketball is still in front of him."

While Perry controlled the boards, Blackwell scored 14 of his 25 points during a 6½-minute Temple surge in the second half.

Leading 49-45 with 13:48 to play, Temple went on a 19-5 run to build an 18-point lead with 7:16 remaining. Blackwell scored 14 points during that streak, and had a string of 11 consecutive points.

Chaney said he wanted Blackwell to have the ball in a position to pass or shoot. The Owls' leading scorer, who entered the game making 42 percent of his three-pointers, connected on 3 of 4 3-point shots and 11 of 15 from the field overall.

"He elected to shoot so we just rode in with him," Chaney said.

The Owls took an early 13-6 lead, but St. Joseph's rallied behind Greg Mullee and took a 22-17 advantage on a layup by James Flint with 9:52 left in the first half.

## Jaworski Won't Play In Philly

SEWELL, N.J. (AP) — Minutes before his eyes welled with tears, Ron Jaworski joked that he might have to change the name of The Eagles' Nest, a restaurant and golf club he owns across the river from Veterans Stadium.

The quarterback mentioned the "Raiders Roost" or "Falcons Crest" for the New Jersey business, then turned serious, starting a news conference Tuesday by formally announcing he will not play another season in Philadelphia.

The 14-year veteran blinked back tears and swallowed a sob at the thought of leaving Philadelphia, where he has played the past 10 seasons.

"I may not have been the most revered athlete in the town as far as fan appreciation," Jaworski said. "But I think I had their respect, and that's more important than anything else."

The news conference came two days after the Eagles' deadline for guaranteeing the veteran's contract passed without the team taking action. Club officials said they would welcome Jaworski at preseason camp, but his starting position — and \$600,000 annual salary — would not be guaranteed.

The team's decision essentially makes Jaworski a free agent.

Jaworski said he had one regret in leaving the city.

"If there's one disappointment I have, it's not being able to bring a football championship to Philadelphia," Jaworski led the Eagles to Super Bowl in 1980, which they lost to the Oakland Raiders.

Jaworski, who said his family would remain in the area, said he would not return to his former team.

"It's beyond the talking stage with the Eagles," Jaworski said. "This is

a day I hoped would never come, but unfortunately has."

Now, Jaworski believes another team can pick him up at a bargain price.

Jaworski's agent, John Langel, said the Eagles would not be compensated if another team signs him.

# Dandridge, Never Major Leaguer, On Way To Hall

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Ray Dandridge never reached the major leagues during a professional baseball career that spanned 20 years, but he's on his way to the Hall of Fame.

A star in the Negro Leagues four decades ago, Dandridge was a surprise selection Tuesday of the 18-man Veterans Committee that elects a maximum of two old-timers for enshrinement each year.

"I thought it would never come after so many others went in and I kept missing," Dandridge, 73, said by telephone from his home in Palm Bay, Fla. "I thought they had forgotten about me."

Little known to baseball fans because he played most of his career during an era when blacks were excluded from the majors and media coverage of the Negro Leagues was minimal, Dandridge spent five years in the minor leagues after Jackie Robinson shattered the color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947.

Monte Irvin and Roy Campanella, members of the Veterans Committee as well as the Hall Fame, played with and against Dandridge in the 1930s and 1940s. They describe him as a remarkable third baseman who, like many other Negro League stars, was simply born too early.

"The real losers were the major-league fans because they didn't see all these excellent players," Irvin said. "Dandridge didn't get a chance

to play in the majors, but he had major-league talent. He was a superstar."

Dandridge began his career with the Detroit Stars of the Negro National League in 1933. He finished in 1953 after four seasons with Minneapolis of American Association and one split between Sacramento and Oakland of the Pacific Coast League.

He was 37 years old when he hit .311 with 11 home runs and 80 runs batted in to earn most valuable player honors in the American Association in 1950. He hit .324 with eight homers and 61 RBI the next season.

Irvin compared Dandridge's fielding skills to those of Brooks Robinson, the former Baltimore Orioles infielder who was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1983.

"He was a natural third baseman because he was short, stocky and quick as a cat. ... You almost couldn't hit the ball past him," said Irvin, who played with Dandridge on the Newark Eagles in the late 1930s.

"The only reason they didn't bring him up (to the majors) is they said he was too old," Irvin added. "I wish they had brought him up because he could play even at that age. ... He was flashy. People would have paid to see him play third base, let alone hitting."

The Veterans Committee gave Dandridge the required support of 75 percent of the votes — at least 14

from the 18-member panel — on the second of two ballots allowed. Vote totals were not released, but Irvin said there was considerable support for former New York Yankees shortstop Phil Rizzuto.

Rizzuto, a 68-year-old Yankees' broadcaster, campaigned for his election the past few years. When his No. 10 was retired at Yankee Stadium in 1985, he said it was "the biggest thrill of my life, much better than getting into the Hall of Fame."

Still, "The Scooter" was disappointed he did not get in to the Hall.

"I've got to be disappointed ... but I feel honored for just being mentioned all these years," Rizzuto said. "It would have been the icing on the cake."

"I wouldn't be human if I wasn't disappointed ... maybe next year," Rizzuto said.

"He came pretty close," Irvin said. "He got quite a few votes."

Others who figured prominently in the balloting but failed to receive the necessary 14 votes were Richie Ashburn, Tony Lazzeri, umpire Al Barlick, Babe Bernhart, Carl Mays, Red Schoendienst, Vic Willis and Mel Harder, according to Ed Stack, president of the Hall of Fame.

The Veterans Committee can elect up to two people from a list that includes former executives, managers, umpires, Negro League stars and ex-major leaguers who have been retired at least 23 years.

# USC President Calls Violations Minor

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The rule violations that prompted the NCAA to place South Carolina's basketball program on two years' probation were a "minor glitch," according to university President James B. Holderman.

The NCAA also banned South Carolina from postseason play during the 1987-88 season because of NCAA rule violations from 1982 to 1985 under ex-coach Bill Foster, who resigned after the 1985-86 season.

The most serious rule violation cited by the NCAA Committee on Infractions in its report released Tuesday was a "well-organized and well-executed scheme" run by several assistant coaches that allowed players to sell complimentary season tickets to boosters.

But Holderman said the rule violations uncovered by the school's seven-month in-house investigation were not indicative of problems in the program.

"I think it's a minor glitch," Holderman said at a noon news conference Tuesday. "I think the university has dealt with it as an institution, according to the NCAA, with extraordinary speed and a sense of earnestness. ... I would consider it over the long haul a minor glitch."

Foster, who was replaced by Coach George Felton and is head coach at Northwestern, didn't return telephone calls to his office Tuesday. But during the Big Ten's weekly teleconference, Foster said: "I've not heard anything. I cannot comment. I am on the road recruiting."

Holderman said the university wouldn't appeal the NCAA's ruling, meaning the probation will begin as soon as the school notifies the NCAA of that decision. At the end of the first year, the school can ask the NCAA to rescind the second year of probation, something Holderman said the university plans to do.

"None of us like to get a report card which gives us some ... sugges-

tion of things we've done wrong," Holderman said at a news conference at which the report was released.

"But I think in all fairness the report deals with us with equity and deals with the problem with a great deal of fairness, that's why I've indicated we have no ... desire to appeal the matter. We'd like to put it behind us."

Other violations outlined in an eight-page report from the NCAA infractions committee include:

—The loan and lease of automobiles to several possible recruits and players.

—Transportation, meals and lodging being provided for possible recruits and players.

But the committee said the "most distressing and serious" rule violation was the scheme set up and run by members of the coaching staff in which players sold their complimentary tickets at face value to boosters. One ticket costs \$7.

The players didn't "have contact with the ticket purchasers and received remuneration for their tickets directly from a member of the men's basketball coaching staff," the report said.

"The ticket purchasers neither negotiated nor passed money directly to the student-athletes, but rather, arrangements for the sale of the tickets were handled by members of the coaching staff," the report said.

The report didn't identify the coaches, players or boosters who took part in the scheme, and the university declined to release the names.

The committee said the scheme was a "willful and reprehensible violation" of NCAA rules. But the six-member committee also noted that without the university's help much of the information about the scheme would have gone undiscovered.

University officials met with NCAA officials on Valentine's Day to go over its seven-month in-house investigation of allegations of NCAA

rule violations during Foster's tenure.

The committee said the violations occurred after Foster suffered a heart attack during a game in 1982.

"As a consequence of this illness, ... Coach Foster delegated much of the responsibility for the day-to-day operation and supervision of the men's basketball program to members of his staff," according to the report.

"At the same time, there were inadequate structural controls within the athletic department and the institution for the proper supervision of the men's basketball program after 1983," the report said.

The committee said most of the violations occurred because of the "absence of institutional constraints."

Under the NCAA's ruling, the university must:

—Implement a job-monitoring program in which athletic officials will review and approve any jobs arranged for players.

—Require coaches who receive complimentary season-ticket books to report, in writing, the names and seat locations of recipients of the tickets.

—Notify auto dealers and each travel agency doing business with the school that failure to adhere to NCAA rules could result in penalties against the school and any person breaking the rules.

The school also has put in place a "compliance program" that expands on the requirements set down by the NCAA. The program, which is designed to explain NCAA rules to coaches and players, includes:

—Hiring a consulting firm to study the athletic department and assist in the development of a written policies and procedure manual. The firm's report will be available this spring.

—A stipulation in coaches' contracts that says a coach may be suspended without pay or fired if found involved "in deliberate and serious violations of NCAA regulations."

The release of the report ended several weeks of speculation about the university's fate. A week ago, the South Carolina Network reported the school would receive a year's proba-

tion and would be ineligible for postseason play this season.

Holderman said he thought the radio network's report had no influ-

ence on the NCAA's decision.

"It turned out to be inaccurate," he said. "I don't know that it had any impact."

# Gamecock Officials Glad The Investigation Is Over

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — University of South Carolina officials say the NCAA's decision to put the school's basketball program on two years' probation was a fair ruling that brings to an end a "rigorous" period.

"I'm relieved that we can now put an end to it," university attorney Joe McCulloch said Tuesday. "It was a right rigorous six to seven months. I'm quite happy with the report and the result."

University President James B. Holderman said he was pleased with the NCAA decision.

"We are pleased, if you can be pleased with this kind of activity, with the results, compared to what was within the purview of the committee to impose upon us," he said at a news conference Tuesday.

"We had no television penalties, no lack of revenue there, ... no restrictions ... of recruiting activities or the number of grants in aid, no reductions in scholarships and no finding of wrongdoing by any personnel presently at the University of South Carolina," Holderman said.

Athletic Director Bob Marcum said the "penalties assessed to us are fair."

"In all honesty, if we were aware of the situation (with the violations), I'm sure we would have dealt with it in a different way. But we were unaware these things were taking place," he said.

In its eight-page report, the NCAA Committee on Infractions said the university's own investigation turned up several violations of NCAA rules, including a "well-organized and well-executed scheme" run by several assistant coaches in which players sold complimentary tickets to boosters.

The violations occurred under former Coach Bill Foster, now head coach at Northwestern. Foster resigned after the 1985-86 season.

Holderman said the school's own seven-month probe "was a good reflection upon the University of South Carolina and our capacity to police ourselves."

All along, Holderman and other university officials said they hoped the in-house probe would be taken into account when the NCAA handed

down its decision. The cooperation paid off.

While the NCAA put the school on two years' probation, the final year could be rescinded — a direct result of the school's cooperation with the NCAA. Whether that occurs, however, will depend on how well the school follows guidelines it has set up and others required by the NCAA to make sure the school complies with NCAA rules.

"We've already begun to implement the proposals by Athletic Director (Bob) Marcum, against which we will be measured for the removal of the second year of probation," Holderman said. "Their invitation is there for us to do that, and we will accept that invitation. ... We think the chances of the NCAA dropping the second year of probation are very, very good."

"We established the criteria we would be judged by for the removal of probation at the end of the first year," Holderman said. "That's encouraging to us."

McCulloch, who conducted the school's in-house probe, said the recommendations are "really recommendations to do better what we were doing in the past, which unfortunately was not enough back then."

"The NCAA in its findings did not find the athletic department was not doing what it was supposed to do," McCulloch said. "In fact, they were."

"We were acting in a manner, policywise, consistent with the NCAA rules and regulations. We just simply have added some new and improved means of doing what we were doing well in the past."

Marcum said he didn't know whether the decision would hamper Coach George Felton's recruiting.

"I think Coach Felton is in a better position to answer that than I am," Marcum said. "Any time you have something that's a negative in regard to your program, you could say, yes, it could have an affect."

"But at the same time, I don't think we're dealing with something that's taken place in the last 24 hours. I think Coach Felton and a number of our coaches have prepared our recruits in regard to the possibility of penalties coming down. ... So really, I don't think they're dealing with anything new."

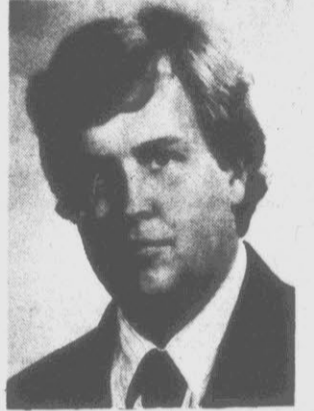
University officials said Felton did

not want to comment on the matter, but in a one paragraph statement issued by the school the first-year coach said he was "happy the cloud of dust is finally resolved."

"We accept the penalties the NCAA Committee on Infractions have imposed upon our program," Holderman said. "I feel optimistic about the future of Carolina basketball."

# Recruiting Improprieties Uncovered At Texas Tech

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — The NCAA has placed Texas Tech on probation for a year and taken away three football scholarships because boosters and coaches paid recruits who wound up playing elsewhere.

The NCAA on Tuesday placed the Tech football program on probation for one year and limited the Red Raiders to 22 football scholarships, instead of the usual 25, for the 1988-89 school year.

Tech Coach Spike Dykes, who said his concern about the potential penalty grew last week when the NCAA banned football for a year at Southern Methodist, called the punishment "very fair and just."

"I was relieved," he said.

The NCAA report said the recruiting violations, which the school said involved former Coach Jerry Moore and several assistants who are no longer at Tech, occurred in the "excessively competitive environment" of Texas football.

"This fact, however, does not excuse the flagrant disregard for the association's regulations," the report said.

Tech became the third Southwest Conference team to be placed on probation for recruiting violations. Last Wednesday, Southern Methodist was stripped of its 1987 schedule and the home portion of its 1988 season because of repeated violations. Texas Christian is serving a probation through next year.

Tech officials expressed relief that

the NCAA didn't take sterner steps, such as a ban on television games or bowl appearances. School President Lauro Cavazos said Tech's cooperative attitude may have helped avoid stiffer punishment.

The NCAA report acknowledged Tech's "cooperative, non-defensive attitude" and noted that the school had never before been punished for rules violations.

"This is really a very black day in athletics at Texas Tech," Cavazos said.

Bob Swayze, Tech's faculty representative, said the school would not appeal the NCAA penalty. Rex Fuller, a Tech regent, said, "We are receiving what we deserve, I believe."

The NCAA cited 15 violations from 1982 through 1984, many concerning improper gifts to prospective players. According to its normal practice, the NCAA didn't reveal names of coaches, boosters or students. But the university did.

The former assistant coaches named as participating in improper recruiting are Rodney Allison, Richard Ritchie and Jim Bates. Moore was fired in 1985 after compiling a 16-37-2 record in five seasons. Bates, Ritchie and Allison left before the 1985 season.

Named as "representatives of the university's athletics interests" who violated NCAA rules were Danny and Charles Whisenhunt of Lubbock and Jack Henry of San Antonio.

Tech Athletic Director T. Jones said the Whisenhunts have been "disassociated" from the school.

Four violations involved Ron Morris, a wide receiver from Cooper, Texas, who ended up at SMU. Six violations involved Chris Pryor, a highly touted running back from Converse Judson.

Because of academic problems, Pryor never enrolled at Tech. He now attends Howard Payne University at Brownwood, Texas.

"No one who was alleged to be illegally recruited ever played a down at Texas Tech," Cavazos said.

The inducements offered recruits ranged from providing \$80 to \$300 in cash and groceries to an offer of a pair of ostrich-skin boots and a trip to Las Vegas for Pryor. Other violations included providing free meals and transportation to prospective players.

The Tech report said Pryor and a high school teammate, Norman Lambert, allegedly were given cash after signing letters of intent with Texas Tech. Lambert also didn't enroll at Tech.

Morris, who received gifts including a Tech sweat suit, has said, "I never asked for anything. It was always given to me."

Another player who enrolled at SMU, quarterback Bobby Watters of Garland, Texas, was provided meals and transportation during his visit to Tech, according to the report released by Texas Tech.

# More Wrongs Found At SMU

DALLAS (AP) — Claims of a cover-up accompanied reactions of shock and outrage after Gov. Bill Clements' revelation that he and other Southern Methodist board members knew about improper cash payments to football players.

A group of vice presidents and deans of the university deplored the decision to continue some of the payments and called for those involved to resign if they are still associated with the university.

"We had been told by the (former) athletic director (Bob Hitch) that the problems had been cleaned up," said Cary McGuire, a Board of Governors member. "The whole thing is a shock to everybody."

Complicating matters was a statement from current board chairman William L. Hutchison that contradicted Clements and said the board didn't know what he was talking about. Hutchison slated an emergency board meeting for this morning to discuss what additional actions should be taken.

Student body president Trevor Pearlman claimed there had been a cover-up "simply because it has gone as high as it has, with the governor of the state of Texas admitting that he knew about illegal payments that were continuing."

Clements, who resigned as chairman of the SMU's Board of Governors before being sworn in as governor in January, is the first member of

SMU's governing body to acknowledge knowing of payments cited a week ago when the NCAA hit the school with the stiffest penalties ever imposed on a football program.

His comments came Tuesday in response to questions at a routine news conference in Austin.

"We, with a capital 'we,' we made a considered judgment decision over several months that the commitments had been made and in the interest of the institution, the boys, their families and to comply with the NCAA, that that program would be phased out and that we would comply in a full sense of integrity to all the rules and regulations," the governor said.

Clements said the decision to phase out the payments was made in August 1985, but he did not say over what period of time they were phased out.

Clements said the improper system for payments of athletes at SMU began as far back as 1976 during the coaching tenure of Ron Meyer and former athletic director Russ Potts.

He said the full scope of the scheme surfaced in 1983.

"That's absolutely ludicrous ... If such a thing was going on, I had no knowledge of that — absolutely none. I totally and unequivocally deny that. It's inconceivable to me that anyone would say that," said Potts.

"I can't believe that. I was not

aware of anything — nothing to my knowledge. Everything I was involved with at the time came out in the investigation ... I think it's a matter of how far back you want to go," said Meyer, now the coach of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts.

Last week, in banning football at SMU for 1987 and limiting the Mustangs to only seven road games in 1988, the NCAA said payments continued through December 1986.

When the football suspension was announced, SMU officials said there was no evidence to indicate university board members were involved.

But the Dallas Times Herald reported Tuesday that sources close to the athletic department said the "power structure" of the university, including Clements, decided to honor payment contracts to football players.

The newspaper said the decision was made by Clements and some SMU board members at a meeting that took place after the school was placed on three years probation in August 1985.

Today's Dallas Morning News said Clements implied that the NCAA was aware of the board's decision to continue payments to the student-athletes already on campus.

But NCAA Enforcement Director David Berst said, "What he (Clements) assured us of was that the institution intended to comply with NCAA rules. The approach that was taken in order to get into compliance is completely a design of those individuals involved in the process. There would not have been anyone associated with the NCAA who would say, 'Sure, go ahead and honor commitments.'"

"He made a presentation to the Committee on Infractions in '85, and that presentation was that there would be no violations at SMU. It was at the beginning of this investigation that our staff learned that there had been a group of people who had made the determination that the payments were going to be continued."

Pressed on the matter at his news conference, Clements said, "These matters were all considered by the Board of Governors and the administration at SMU. And there was a decision made that we would phase out and eliminate in due course all of these arrangements that had been made in the recruiting of certain athletes at SMU."

Clements said the decision was made with the understanding SMU

football would "return to a program of absolute integrity. That we gave that pledge to the NCAA and we also had commitments from the athletic director (Bob Hitch) and Coach (Bobby) Collins that they would abide by that decision. And that we would return to an absolutely clean program at SMU ..."

Asked about the existence of actual "contracts" with players, Clements said, "I'm not sure there's any such thing as a written contract. I never saw such a contract. And I have never paid a player 5 cents nor have I ever recruited a player in athletics. I've never done that."

Clements then refused to answer further questions on the subject. His press secretary, Reggie Bashur, said later he didn't know how long the period for phasing out payments took.

Hutchison later issued a statement saying "neither the SMU board of governors nor the board of trustees had any prior knowledge of payments" until they became public.

He said the board was told in 1985 that "all violations had been dealt with, that the program was clean and no violations were still occurring. I have been disappointed and distressed that this was not the case."

Bashur said the governor didn't say "all the board members were involved."

Most members of the board of governors were not available for comment and did not return calls Tuesday from The Associated Press. Two members, Leo F. Corrigan Jr. and Robert Folsom of Dallas, said they didn't know about any meetings of the kind Clements described.

Interim President William Stallcup said Tuesday he was disappointed by Clements' disclosure.

"I'm disappointed that the SMU community was told two years ago that the whole thing had been cleaned up when it had not," he said.

In suspending SMU's 1987 football program, the NCAA said it found a \$61,000 slush fund that was used to pay 13 players.

SMU already was on probation at the time, making the school the first to be eligible for the so-called "death penalty," in which a school's athletic program can be suspended for up to two years.

Hitch and Collins resigned in December after the latest allegations of cash payments surfaced.

President L. Donald Shields also resigned, citing health reasons aggravated by the NCAA investigation.

# Biggs, Tyson May Get Fight In Future

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Tyrell Biggs recalls a two-round sparring session he had with Mike Tyson when both fighters were amateurs.

"He was trying to knock me down, there's no doubt about that," Biggs said.

In June, Tyson again could be trying to knock Biggs down, this time with the World Boxing Council and World Boxing Association titles at stake.

Saturday night at an outdoor arena at the Las Vegas Hilton, Tyson, who is the WBC champion, will try to win the WBA title from James "Bonecrusher" Smith in a scheduled 12-round bout.

Tyson is a 7-1 favorite. On the same card, Biggs is favored to maintain his No. 1 WBA ranking against David Bey in a scheduled 10-round fight.

Pinklon Thomas, the former WBC champion and now the No. 1 WBC contender, also will fight on Saturday's card. He will meet Danny Sutton in a scheduled 10-round bout.

Tyson's co-managers, Jimmy Jacobs and Bill Cayton, have been talking to Biggs' manager, Shelly Finkel. The Hilton has asked the Nevada State Athletic Commission for June 12, 13 and 14 as dates for a fight.

The winner of the Tyson-Smith fight was supposed to fight for the undisputed championship against Michael Spinks, who won the International Boxing Federation title from Larry Holmes.

But Spinks signed to fight Gerry Cooney in a bout outside the HBO heavyweight title unification series, and HBO went to court to block the fight.

Spinks then had title recognition withdrawn by the IBF for refusing to sign for a mandatory defense against top-ranked Tony Tucker. Tucker will now fight second-ranked James "Buster" Douglas for the vacant title, but it could be some time before the IBF champion meets the WBC-WBA champion.

"I feel ready," Biggs, reached by phone in Houston, said of a possible title fight. "Now is as good a time as any."

In recalling that sparring session before the 1984 Olympics, Biggs said: "That's the way he (Tyson) always fights. He tries to nail you."

"I've always thought with his style of fighting that he'd be a much better pro than he was an amateur."

The aggressive Tyson, who was beaten out by Henry Tillman for the heavyweight berth on the Olympic team, became at age 20 the youngest man to win a heavyweight title when he knocked out Trevor Berbick in the second round here last Nov. 22.

That was his 26th knockout in 28 fights in a mercurial, unbeaten pro career that began March 6, 1984.

The 25-year-old Biggs won the Olympic super heavyweight championship, then turned pro Nov. 15, 1984. But he has had only 13 pro fights, winning them all, eight by knockout.

His career was slowed when he suffered a broken collarbone in the second round of a 10-round decision over Jeff Sims last March 23. He didn't fight again until Aug. 14.

"As far as ability-wise, I think I fought tougher opponents in 13 fights than he has in 28," Biggs said of Tyson.

They do have two common opponents — Sterling Benjamin and James "Quicik" Tillis.

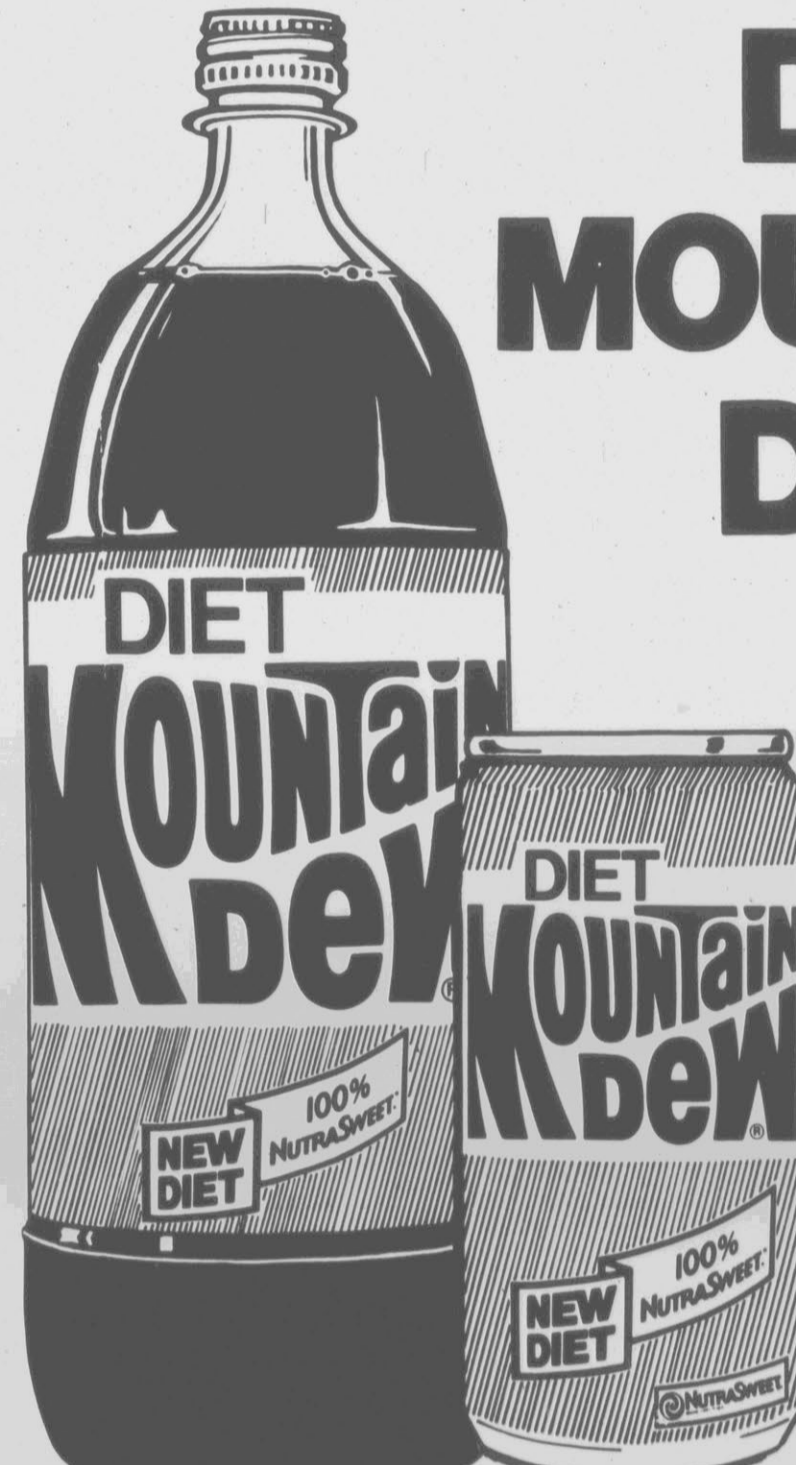

## Resignation

WHITEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — The executive director of Sencland Community Action Inc., which is being investigated by the SBI and the FBI, has quit her post, citing health reasons.

Colene Stanley submitted her resignation Feb. 16 in a letter to Clemmon Jacobs, chairman of Sencland's board of directors. The two-paragraph letter said Friday will be Mrs. Stanley's last day on the job.

Sencland was shut down by its directors Feb. 13 after they learned the agency could not produce payroll withholding taxes for the past six months. The money was deducted from employee paychecks but apparently never deposited in a trust account, as required by law.

Mrs. Stanley, the only staffer still on Sencland's payroll, would not comment.

## In Flying, Basics Make Difference

Flying a plane is much like driving a car, said a local flight instructor. "Once you've learned your basics, it's easy."

Jeffrey Crosswaite said people who come to Air Center East near Pitt-Greenville airport for flying lessons usually have not flown before. Potential students are given a ride in the airplane "to give them a good idea of what's expected," he said.

Learning to fly may cost from \$2,500 to \$3,000, Crosswaite said, so they need "to see if they want to make the investment."

The Federal Aviation Administration requires at least 40 hours of training time — 20 hours with a certified flight instructor and 20 hours alone — before a private pilot's license may be issued, Crosswaite said. But, the average person flies about 55 hours before getting a license.

When students begin flying lessons, they work toward the first solo flight, or "handling the airplane by themselves," he said. Students make three takeoffs and landings on the solo flight.

The average student flies solo in a "real tight radius around the airport" after about 10 hours of instruction, Crosswaite said.

After the solo flight, students work on cross-country skills that use navigational techniques and gauges.

"We rely more on them looking at the map and looking at the ground" for land marks when determining their location, Crosswaite said. Cross-country training also includes some night flying and flying in clouds.

In order to get an instrument rating that measures navigational skills, however, instrument flying lessons may be taken about 50 hours after earning the private license.

After the cross-country training, students may take the flight test, which includes an actual flight and involves an oral question-and-answer session, flight planning and demonstration of flying skills.

Students are tested by an FAA or designated examiner.

An ambitious student may get the private pilot's license in a month, Crosswaite said, but "it's very rare." Most students have their license after about two or three months of training.

"We emphasize using a checklist of helpful things to remember" when preparing to fly, he said, because most accidents are pilot error.

"There are a lot of things to look at and to be concerned with" when flying, Crosswaite said. "If you forget one, it could come back to haunt you."

The learning process in getting a private pilot's license often is extended because of factors such as the weather and the amount of time a student has to spend on learning to fly, he said.

"We like them to take instruction about twice a week" so they will not forget what was learned in the previous lesson.

Student pilot Garland Lancaster Jr. said he has been taking lessons about eight months in his spare time. He has just completed his cross-country training and is preparing for the flight test.

"The weather is a tremendous factor" when working on getting a license, he said. When the weather prohibits consistent flight training, "you have to be retaught things."

But, Lancaster said he seizes every opportunity to practice and plans to use his flying skills for recreational activities. "I want to just fly to the beach one day and fly back," he said.

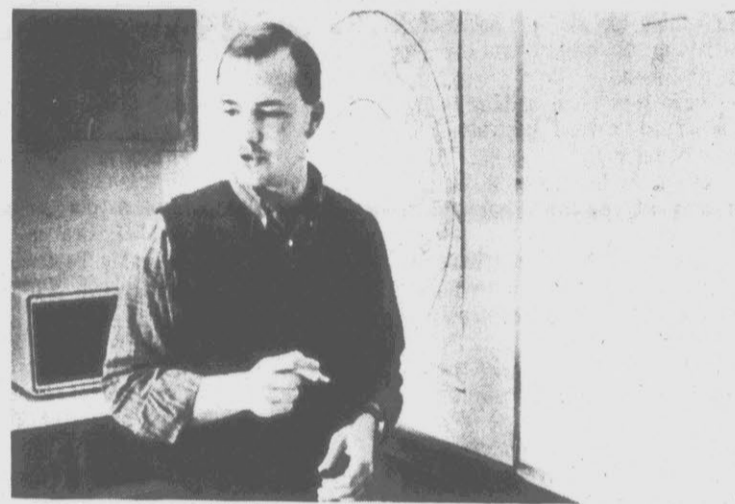
Flying is "sort of intimidating the first time" like most new experiences, Crosswaite said, but "do it a few times, practice — it's a piece of cake."

## Slam! Bam! Wham! Old Batman Takes New Stand

**NEW YORK** — There is no sunlight in Gotham City.

An industrial pall, like the first thunderheads of nuclear winter, permanently coats the sky. The streets are choked with shadows and litter. Strange shapes move through the alleys; inhuman cries are heard from the river's edge. Those who venture out for sustenance risk getting sliced by the Mutants, a gang of post-punks who kill to keep from getting bored.

Millionaire Bruce Wayne, in his 60s, sits in his mansion on the outskirts of town and broods, a drink in his hand.

It has been 40 years since he began jumping from building to building, fighting crime in a mask and a cape, and 10 years since he quit. But though it disgusts him, his city, Gotham, can

no longer cope with itself.

It needs help. It needs the rampaging creature he can no longer suppress. It needs Batman.

Once again, in the pages of America's only native form of popular literature — the swirling, fantastic shapes of the comic books — New York must depend on the kindness of costumed strangers.

It's been that way since the day in 1938 when Clark Kent got a reporting job in Metropolis. They have come with differing talents, wearing different uniforms — Superman, Batman, Spiderman, Wonder Woman — but they're not needed in the well-lit malls of suburbs and country. Sooner or later, they must battle the evils of the city, and that city is always, unmistakably, New York.

Over the years, the comic books have helped make New York almost as much a character of the American imagination as the caped figures who romp in it.

In the case of Gotham, in particular, the Batman books have created a climate of twilight dread along the city's streets that has added immeasurably to its dubious mystique.

But only in recent months, in a sensational new incarnation of Batman, along with several other comics definitely not meant for children, has New York sunk to the final depths. It has become The Abyss.

"Batman: The Dark Knight Returns" looks very little like a comic book, and its visions bear only a superficial resemblance to the clownishness of Batman's mid-1960s TV show.

The 200-page trade paperback, published in November by Warner Books, costs \$12.95 and is lushly printed and bound on heavy stock. Inside, it reveals a city awash in living sewage and corruption.

Gotham City was hardly bucolic when Batman forged his identity 40 years back. It was on a Gotham sidewalk, after all, that Bruce Wayne stood as a boy and watched his parents shot to death during a mugging.

As he became a nocturnal crimefighter in passionate revenge for that moment, his chosen city seemed ideally cast, its threatening canyons full of maniacal sociopaths who could not be brought in with "traditional" police methods.

"I usually tell my Batman writers to consider Gotham City as a huge, gothic mansion, full of dark corners, where every shadow might conceal some sort of lurking menace," says Denny O'Neil, editor of Batman and the Dark Knight series for DC Comics. "Batman is essentially a tragic figure, reliving that same moment

## Your Prescription For Change

# Motivation And Game Plan Can Help Get Rid Of Unwanted Habits

People may change unhealthy habits by taking responsibility for the needed change, said Cindy Mayo, a cardiovascular clinical nurse specialist at Pitt County Memorial Hospital.

"Nothing is free," she said, but "you can change with motivation."

Ms. Mayo was speaking to the fifth class in the six-week series "Eating for Heart Health" that meets in the Eastern Carolina Family Practice Center on Tuesday nights.

"When people are trying to make changes, they need self-defense skills" or behavior modifications, Ms. Mayo said. "We know we can change people's behavior and attitudes given the right skills and the right knowledge."

Behavior modifications may liberate people trapped in unhealthy habits, such as smoking, overeating or not exercising, through six stages, she said.

First, identify the problem, Ms. Mayo said. "Get a handle on what that thing is you'd like to change," and "find a buddy or partner to work with you."

Building confidence and commitment to change is the second stage, she said. Phrases such as 'I

can't find time,' 'I'm too tired' or 'I can't do that' are "negative things you say to yourself that sabotage your efforts," Ms. Mayo said.

"Match negatives with positives such as 'I can find time' or 'I'll feel better once I get back,'" she said. "When you catch yourself being negative, you really have to give yourself a sale job" or positive monologue. "You need that as part of your armament," Ms. Mayo said.

When building confidence, concentrate on small gains such as parking the car away from the door and walking to the building or using the stairs as opposed to the elevator. "Don't go out and walk a mile" on the first day of the exercise program, she said.

In the third stage, "increase awareness about the behavior that causes the problem," Ms. Mayo said. Keeping a diary of all daily activities, including meals, snacks, resting, exercising and working, may help "to find out where your cues are" for different activities.

For example, a person wanting to decrease sugar intake in the diet may discover a habit of going to the snack machine at break time or a habit of eating when reading a book.

After becoming aware of the problem, develop a plan and implement it, Ms. Mayo said. "Plan your work, and then work your plan."

"Part of that is contracting with yourself" to make small gains, she said. For example, plan to increase your daily pedometer reading by an extra quarter mile per day for two weeks.

"If you don't win with the short-term goal, go back and find out what happened and begin again," she said. If the planned activity was at the wrong time or if the habit was encouraged by a specific activity, try to change those things.

Also, write down the goal, Ms. Mayo said. "Keep a record of what it is you plan to do and keep it out there so you can look at it."

Evaluating change is the fifth stage, she said. "Give yourself credit for the things you do. Even your smaller achievements are positive achievements."

Maintaining the change is a constant sixth stage, Ms. Mayo said. Review the good gains, and concentrate on the "things that helped you achieve this change in the first place," she said. "It doesn't happen by mistake."

Alan Arkin Stars In ABC's 'Harry'

By KATHRYN BAKER AP Television Writer NEW YORK (AP) — In the opening episode of "Harry," a medical school dropout is given a Freudian explanation of his failure — unconscious fear of success that would mean "surpassing your father and thus arouse fear of castration."

"To which he replies, "Would you do something for me? Do not use the words 'arouse' and 'castration' in the same sentence."

"Would they do something for us? Do not use the word 'castration' in a situation comedy."

"And while they're at it, the producers can lose the irritating laugh track, too."

Esteemed actor Alan Arkin's first television series, debuting tonight on ABC, has plenty of problems. But also some possibilities.

"At least it's getting a decent time period for its tryout, substituting for "Head of the Class," one of ABC's few successful series this season.

Mainly there is Arkin, one of the best comedic actors around, and a wonderful supporting cast, including his wife, Barbara Dana; Holland Taylor, who played the boss in "Bosom Buddies;" standup comic Richard Lewis; Thom Bray, formerly of "Riptide," and newcomer Matt Caven.

The executive producer of the

series is Barry Levinson, writer-director of "Diner" and director of "The Natural."

Arkin is listed as co-executive producer. A couple of members of the cast have expressed reservations about the series' future because of basic philosophical differences between Arkin and ABC.

They say Arkin wants to do something of a sweetly funny character piece, while ABC has in mind more of a luff-a-minute slapstick show. The result seems to be some of both.

"Harry" is set in a big-city hospital supply room. Arkin plays the title character, the enterprising head of purchasing. Dana is a psychologist, Lewis the would-be M.D., Craven a sort of idiot savant, and Ms. Taylor is Harry's enemy, by-the-book Nurse Duckett.

Ms. Taylor was back home in New York recently helping publicize the series after finishing the first seven episodes ordered by the network.

"I think at first ABC had in mind a 'Bilko'-type show, and I think that was just a misunderstanding between them and Alan," she said. "He (Harry) is not so much a Bilko as a Robin Hood and he likes to, behind the scenes, help people out, and he doesn't always use orthodox means to do so."

Ms. Taylor considers her character the most "farfical" of them all, which is saying a lot. Bray's character, the spying Lawrence, pops up out of trash cans and file drawers.

But the comedy is not all physical. In the opening episode, Harry is accused of selling off hospital property for his own gain. The hospital administrator, played by Kurt Knudsen, confronts him: "If you have anything to get off your chest, now's the time to do it."

Harry thinks on this a moment. "I think Meryl Streep does too many accents."

Some of the best lines go to Lewis, who has the professional comic's wherewithal to deliver even the "castration" quip with aplomb. He wonders why his parents cannot accept that he flunked out of Guatemala U and works on the loading dock. "I ask them, what's the difference? M.D., Teamster ..."

NEW YORK (AP) — Mia Farrow, whose roles in companion Woody Allen's films have ranged from a psychiatrist in "Zelig" to a cigarette girl in "Radio Days," says she enjoys playing character parts.

"Many people prefer being personalities. Someone like John Wayne did a million films playing the same role and he was always terrific. I'm not like that. I just feel more at home acting a character," she says in an interview in the March issue of American Film magazine.

Actress Maureen O'Sullivan agrees with her daughter's bent: "I would say that Mia thinks along the lines of a character actress. For example, she doesn't care how she

looks; she wants to get the character right.

"Sometimes I would say, 'Lord, you aren't wearing your hair that way, are you?' or, 'You're going to wear glasses?' and she would say, 'Oh yes, I need to be very plain in this part.'"

## Welder Landscapes With Metal

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The bright daisies that once bloomed in Mark Bulwinkle's front yard have been displaced by a dark tangle of steel stretching around his house, over the roof and skyward, like a mutant metal berry bush.

Nestled together are wildly funny, confusing and, to some, offensive metal cutouts with titles such as "Tied Up," "Weird Chicken," "Weldo," "Woman Out for a Walk," "Scaredy Cat" and at the top, "Dog Barking at the Moon."

"They're Bulwinkle's poems, that's what I call them," says the bespectacled, jeans-clad Bulwinkle, a shipyard welder, printmaker, ceramics artist and sculptor.

"People come by and ask if I'm an artist, and I say, 'I don't know. Am I?'" he asks, surveying what he's wrought.

There are ghoulish, glaring faces next to simple, comic scenes and sexually explicit forms that make passersby gawk and giggle.

"Some of it's almost psychopathic and there's a whole other end of it that is real cute. It's just the way I bump into things... maybe it was the shipyards," he says.

"People are like that. Inside of each person there are a lot of different things," says Bulwinkle, who wants his work to make people reexamine their ideas and adjust conventional perceptions.

Although Bulwinkle agreed to an interview, he jealously guards the address of the home which serves as his workshop and personal gallery. Even so, the modest house sometimes attracts curious sightseers to the quiet neighborhood.

Asked how neighbors feel about his non-traditional landscaping, he says: "I know some of them hate it. It's kind of live and let live here, as long as you're not really bothering anyone."

What began as something he compulsively dabbled in for years has become a full-time, profitable job. Bulwinkle has pieces on display at galleries in San Francisco, Seattle, Portland, Connecticut and New York City. He also works on commission and sells to collectors.

At Jamison Thomas galleries in New York City, Portland and Salem, Ore., Bulwinkle's art is among the most popular, says William Jamison, adding that it appeals to adults and children alike.

"The first and foremost thing about Mark's work is that it is so direct... it touches a real chord on what American life is all about. There's a sense of humor about his work and at the same time, it sometimes is right on the cutting edge," Jamison says.

"It has sort of a folk-like quality, a sort of innocence, a frank, direct quality," says Alice Jennings at the John Berggruen Gallery in San Francisco. "It's hard not to like it for those qualities."

When he began about 20 years ago, most people didn't appreciate his work, recalls the Boston native.

"Now everybody has degenerated to that point," he adds with a wry smile. Bulwinkle studied printmaking at the San Francisco Art Institute and says he has blended techniques learned on an Alaskan pipeline project as well as in the shipyards. Steel lends itself to cutout forms and its flatness is much like paper, he says.

There are six years' and two tons' worth of work tangled together in his small back yard. In the middle are lights, wheels and a water fountain. There also are human and animal-like silhouettes. A few old work boots dangle from the metal. Bulwinkle says he used a repair welding technique to help convey a "kind of desperation" in the piece.

Some of Bulwinkle's work is left rusty, while others are painted "thick and rough like a ship." Although he doesn't like to mix materials, he uses wood or other substances if he thinks they make a piece "metamorphically correct."

"I kind of do stuff and step back and say, 'What the hell have I done this time... it's real improvisational,'" he says.

He works on one piece for a while, then moves on to something else before returning to the first. "I think it's a good way of not repeating yourself — just becoming a manufacturer. I do something more spiritual."

# Batman Returns But With Different View On Fighting Crime

over and over again, and it's natural to put him in a tragic setting. Hamlet would not work in the same areas that Falstaff inhabited."

But after Wayne gave up crimefighting and sat in solitary retirement, Gotham City turned from menace to madness, its heart of darkness congealing.

The filth of the city piled up like the vast mountains of waste at the edge of town, where the Mutants play with their M-60s and their bazookas. The Joker, released from an asylum by an indulgent psychiatrist, is invited on the David Letterman show, where he proceeds to kill Dave, Paul, Dr. Ruth and the entire studio audience in a particularly macabre manner.

In "Dark Knight," the city's disease has clearly infected Wayne. After it pushes him out of retirement and back into his costume, it also pushes him closer to a line he had vowed never to cross: taking life.

By letting criminals live and return to the streets, he decides, he is personally responsible for the deaths of their victims. His methods become far more brutal; he tortures his prey now and looks on with pleasure as their bones shatter and their flesh oozes.

And Batman knows the city is taking him down. In the eyes of his enemies — such familiar villains as the Joker and Two-Face, their comic skins ripped away to reveal a genocidal dementia — he sees only his own reflection. And he no longer cares.

"I walk the streets of this city I'm learning to hate, the city that's given up, like the whole world seems to have," says Wayne, walking down an ordinary city boulevard of the insane. "I'm a zombie, a flying Dutchman, a dead man, 10 years dead ..."

Batman's new maelstrom, the New York of nightmares, is the creation of Frank Miller, a 30-year-old comic artist who has developed a near-cult following with a series of wildly ambitious ventures into new comic-book terrain.

With his work on Batman, along with the highly acclaimed series "Ronin" and "Daredevil," he has established a trademark that denotes a new generation of creativity in the industry: a grimness of tone and a darkness of palette, a comic literature for the Age of Anxiety.

The tone, he says, comes directly from a decade of life in Manhattan, a period that ended two years ago when he moved to Los Angeles.

"I arrived in New York (from Vermont) at a particular time, when the city, to my eyes, started deteriorating very, very rapidly," he says. "The city became colder, more paranoid, generally much less pleasant. The thing that I've been trying to bring to New York City in the recent Batman stories was the sense of corruption and paranoia that's so ingrained that people almost don't see it around them."

While he was working on several books in the 1970s, he says, he moved from place to place in lower Manhattan: the Lower East Side, SoHo, Greenwich Village, Chelsea, each filled with plenty of raw material for an illustrated treatise on urban crime.

"I got mugged twice and witnessed all kinds of awful criminal activity," he says. "Lots of my drawings are based on things I actually saw in Manhattan."

But Miller makes it clear the street crime he portrays so vividly is only a symptom, a natural by-product of the official corruption and deception in the highest levels of city government.

In his latest series for DC Comics, a four-part history of Batman's origins set 40 years before "Dark Knight," the political venality is explicit.

The mayor of Gotham City, along with the police commissioner, are in league with the underworld, taking money from drug dealers and using cops as hired killers. One of Batman's first acts is to put them on warning, blasting his way into one of their dinner parties in righteous wrath.

"Ladies, gentlemen, you have eaten well," he informs the shocked crowd at the mayor's mansion. "You've eaten Gotham's wealth. Its spirit. Your feast is nearly over. From this moment on, none of you are safe."

Explains Miller: "There's been a sanctioning of greed. The paranoia is so thick now that there's almost an everyman-is-your-enemy prevalent in New York, very different from what I understand it was like in the 1940s. The basic open-handed spirit is largely gone."

Miller's comments might come as a surprise to his many critics, who fired accusations of fascism and nihilism at his vision of Batman when "Dark Knight" was first released in four-part comic-book form last summer.

Art Spiegelman — whose highly acclaimed tale of his father's harrowing flight from the Holocaust, "Maus," took the comic form in a very different direction toward high art last fall — says he was so nauseated by "Dark Knight" that he couldn't finish the book.

"The influences within the 'Dark Knight' that talk about how a leader, a certain kind of person, stands above the law and ought to seem to

me like a very dangerous, incipient fascist way of thinking," Spiegelman says. "And perceiving all criminals as psychopaths who are beyond moral redemption, that are some form of demon, completely denies any type of social problems that shape criminal behavior."

Gary Groth, editor of "The Comics Journal," a news magazine for fans, is another sharp critic of the politics of "Dark Knight," which he says are

a direct outgrowth of Miller's bleak vision.

"He really sees the world as falling apart at the seams, coming closer and closer to a kind of catastrophe," says Groth. "And I really think that view has polluted his ideological view. It's like the good liberal who sympathizes with the Bernhard Goetztes of the world. Even though he might know it's wrong, there's a sense in which there's nothing else

you can do, complete futility and hopelessness."

Miller and his editor, O'Neil, reject the charges of fascism, saying that the critics are wrongly trying to impute political motives to an adventure story.

The nearly subhuman Mutants are based on the vacuous white street gangs he has seen roaming Los Angeles, says Miller, who adds that

the portrayal is not far from accurate.

"This is the totally valueless state of mind that people who are raised on Saturday-morning cartoons develop," he says.

"What Frank does with those characters is take like the worst thing you see on the street and then double it," O'Neil says. "You've got to understand, we're not doing 'L.A. Law' or 'Hill Street Blues' here. This

is romantic melodrama. Everything has to be bigger than life. It is part of the charm of this medium, and it's part I would not like to see go away."

Miller, who declined to discuss his own politics, clearly anticipated the charges of fascism and vigilantism, and included them in the book as a Greek chorus of running commentary by the broadcast media on Batman's actions.

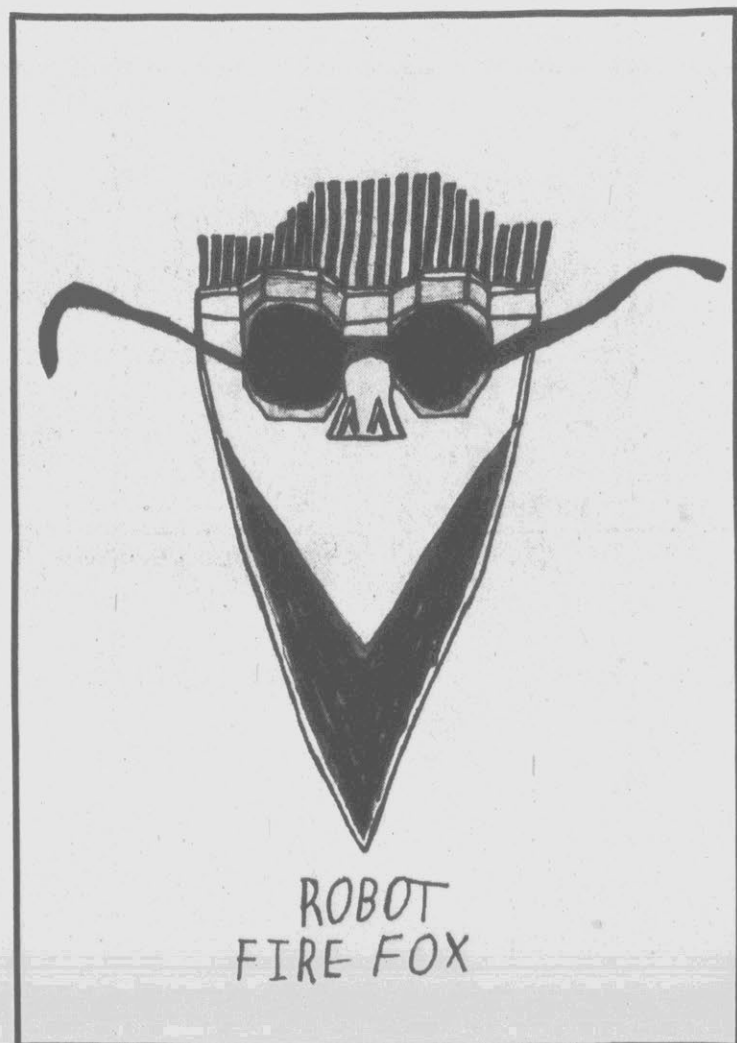

bridge players is "cover an honor with an honor." That is sound advice in most cases, but sometimes it is clearly wrong.  
 This hand is from a team game and at both tables the final contract was four hearts. Note North's free raise to two hearts: it is seldom right to pass even with slight values when you have four-card support for partner's suit.  
 At both tables the opening lead was the queen of spades. At one table declarer gaily called for the king from dummy. East won the ace and shifted to the ten of diamonds. Declarer had no option but to finesse, West won and returned the suit. In the fullness of time, declarer lost three tricks in the minor suits in addition to a spade for down one. Unfortunate, hmmm?  
 At the other table South decided West could not have been underleading the ace of spades, so

he played low from the table. West shifted to a trump, taken by dummy's six. Declarer ruffed a spade with a high trump, overtook the seven of trumps with the nine to draw the last trump, then led another spade. When East produced the ace, it was all over.  
 Declarer ruffed, cashed the ace of clubs and conceded a club. East took this trick to shift to a diamond, but it was to no avail. Declarer could afford the finesse, for even when it lost his contract was secure. He won the diamond continuation, used a club ruff to get to the board, then discarded his remaining diamond on the king of

spades. Since he was able to hold his minor-suit losers to one in each suit, the contract was in the bag and the king of spades had played a royal role in the successful operation.

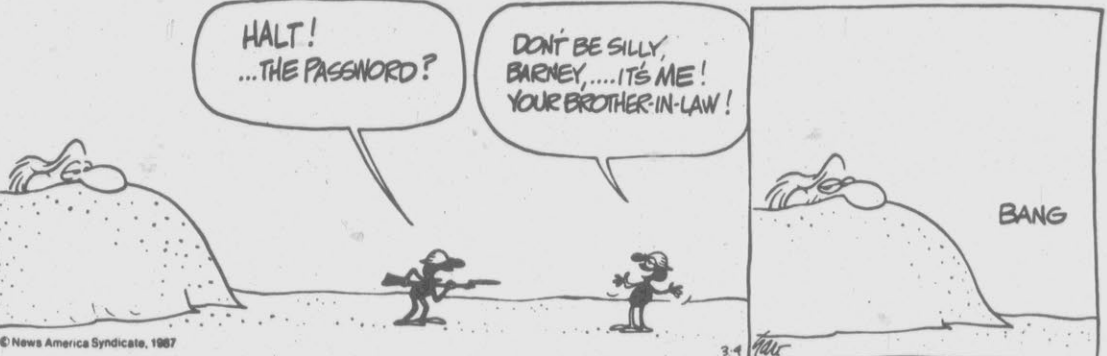

## Popcorn's Always There

I consider popcorn, not bread, to be the staff of life.

Popcorn keeps well on a shelf. It is always at the ready when payday is far away, when depression threatens, when midnight hungers strike. That's popcorn for you: reliable, dependable the way an old friend is.

I realize that the phrase "back home on the farm" has a hackneyed sound, but I can't help it; my back home really was on a farm. Back home on the farm, we raised our own popcorn and sometimes we just shelled it off the cobs as needed.

A big bowl of it, absolutely dripping with my grandmother's home-churned butter, was a Sunday afternoon treat that had no equal. No Sunday, winter or summer, was complete without it.

On sticky August afternoons, I would lie down atop the thin rag rug in the long hallway, where a cross-breeze wafted through the house. I

would prop myself on my elbows and bury my nose in the inky fragrance of the Sunday color comics. That smell went perfectly with the popcorn, for some reason.

That was bliss.

But then, popcorn was ever so comforting scooped out in greedy handfuls while I was sitting at the oilcloth-covered kitchen table near the cheerful warmth of a wood fire in our big black stove. Hungers deep in the heart seemed to get fed. With a crisp apple, it was Sunday supper.

That, too, was heaven.

When I think back to those times, I recall having both yellow popcorn and white popcorn, which had such sweet, tender little kernels. The white is a scarce commodity nowadays. I wish I had some now, this very minute.

It was the white corn we popped at holidays, because it looked prettier for balls and stringing. We made big dishpans full of it to shape into popcorn balls, dampening our hands to keep the sugar syrup from burning them, working quickly. On the Sun-

day nearest New Year's, my grandmother took popcorn balls to Sunday School and gave them out to everyone.

When I was in college, popcorn was a dietary supplement. With our hair in pink curlers, we would go to the student lounge of the dormitory and pop several electric poppers full. Popcorn helped us make it through the night.

This was back in the dark ages, when boys lived in men's dorms and we lived in women's dorms. My friend Jim used to come over to my

## New Ways To Enjoy Tasty Tangerines

Tangerine. Say it slowly, tangerine. What a pretty word, tangerine.

Do the bright little fruits really taste so delightful to our buds or is it just that their name rolls so beautifully off our tongues? Are they really the jewels of the citrus crop? Or does it just sound as if they ought to be?

Hardly anyone ever eats tangerines any way but out of hand. Asians have dried the peel for centuries and combined it wonderfully with beef, lamb and poultry dishes. But, that is about it for tangerine cooks.

You can find recipes in Chinese cookbooks using the dried peel and lately a few recipes have popped up in very expensive cookbooks for tangerine mousse, tangerine cordial and such. No doubt they taste as delicious as the sound of their star ingredient.

I have always just eaten them, plain, like most every one else, spitting and cursing the seeds. But now I have done something else with my store-bought crop.

I use both the juice and peel to lend the lovely flavor of the fruit to pork medallions. In another, whole little seckel pears, which share the season

with tangerines, are poached in tangerine juice and white wine then spangled in long thin strands of peel. In a third recipe, tangerine juice replaces part of the vinegar in a simple vinaigrette.

**PORK MEDALLIONS WITH TANGERINE AND PINE NUTS**

8 (3-ounce) pork medallions cut from tenderloin

Salt  
White pepper  
1 tablespoon olive oil  
4 tablespoons butter  
Grated peel and juice of 3 tangerines

Dry white wine  
2 tablespoons toasted pine nuts

Pound medallions to flatten just slightly. Season to taste with salt and white pepper. Heat oil with 1 tablespoon butter in large skillet over medium-high heat. Add medallions and cook 2 to 3 minutes on each side until golden brown. Remove meat to plate and keep warm.

Pour excess fat from pan. Measure juice and add enough wine to equal 2 cups. Pour liquid into pork pan over high heat, stirring to loosen any browned bits. Bring to boil then reduce to 1/2 cup. Whisk in remaining

## Dessert: The Easy Way

The incredible strawberry production pictured here did not come from a pastry shop. That complicated looking Strawberry Mousse Cake Wheel is so simple to make you wouldn't believe it. To start, buy a couple of baskets of fresh Florida strawberries, the winter berries available now at your supermarket.

(Isn't it wonderful we don't have to wait until summer to have strawberries?)

While you're there, pick up some frozen pound cake and a carton of whipping cream (the other ingredients you're likely to have on hand). Simply follow the instructions in the recipe below and in short time you

will be the proud producer of this beautiful dessert. Chill it, lightly covered, several hours or overnight, if you wish; then make your entrance.

Our second strawberry dessert is a Walnut Strawberry Shortcake, whipped up in four simple steps in a few minutes, using a baking mix for the shortcake. Combine the sliced berries with a little sugar and orange liqueur and refrigerate while the cake is baking. Whip some cream; then bake the shortcake using the sweetened biscuit dough plus the crunch of finely chopped walnuts. Last, layer the slightly warm shortcake with the chilled strawberries and whipped cream and serve.

**STRAWBERRY MOUSSE CAKE WHEEL**

2 packages (10-3/4 ounces each) frozen pound cakes, thawed  
2 tablespoons strawberry preserves  
2 pints Florida strawberries  
2 envelopes unflavored gelatin  
Sugar  
3 eggs, separated  
1 cup milk  
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract  
1 cup heavy (whipping) cream

Cut off top crust from cake. Using a long serrated knife split one cake in half horizontally. Brush preserves over cut side of bottom layer. Top with remaining layer; trim off edges. Then cut crosswise into seven 1/2-inch slices. Arrange slices upright around the edge of a 9-inch spring form pan. Line bottom of pan with enough 1/4-inch thick slices from unsliced cake to cover. (Use remaining cake for another purpose.) Set aside.

Hull strawberries; slice enough to make 3 cups; reserve remaining for garnish. In an electric blender or food processor puree 1 1/2 cups berries; set aside.

In a medium saucepan, combine gelatin and 1/2 cup sugar; mix well. Beat egg yolks with milk. Add to gelatin; let stand for 1 minute. Stir over very low heat just until gelatin is dissolved, about 5 minutes. Stir in pureed berries and vanilla extract. Chill until slightly thickened, stirring occasionally.

In a large bowl with an electric mixer beat egg whites until frothy. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar; beat until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture.

# Give Your Kitchen A Caribbean Flavor

To bring the taste of Caribbean food into your own home, you will need some familiar foods such as a pineapple, a few okra, a coconut or two, a jar of thyme and several allspice berries.

On the other hand, the exotic ingredients you will need come only from ethnic produce stores. Among these foods are:

—Ackee, a delicate-tasting fruit that resembles scrambled eggs when cooked. Salted dried cod with ackee is considered the national dish of Jamaica.

—Breadfruit, introduced to the islands by Captain Bligh of "Mutiny on the Bounty" fame. The cooked, peeled fruit is a substitute for potato.

—Callaloo, a green, spinach-like vegetable that can be mixed in a soup with meat, seafood or vegetables.

—Cassava, also known as manioc,

mandioca, yucca or yuca, a tuberous root with hairy skin and hard, white flesh. Cakes and breads can be made from cassava flour.

—Plantain, the largest member of the banana family, eaten green, half-ripe and fully ripe, but never raw. It can be used as an ingredient in soups, as a starchy side dish or even as dessert. Fried plantains make a potato-chip substitute.

—Sweet potato, or boniato, brown- or pink-skinned with white flesh; minimally sweet.

—Soursop, a large, dark-green fruit with a rough skin and a refreshing, slightly acid-tasting juice, used in punch or ice cream.

Here are a few recipes to make at home while dreaming of an island in the sun.

## CALLALOO SOUP

4 ounces salt pork, diced  
1 large onion, chopped  
1 clove garlic, chopped

4 cups chicken stock  
1 cup liquid from fresh coconut  
1 pound callaloo with stems, chopped (see note)

1 small yam, peeled and diced  
3 scallions, chopped  
1 fresh hot pepper, seeded, chopped  
1/2 teaspoon dried thyme  
Salt and pepper to taste  
10-ounce package frozen okra  
1/4 cup grated fresh coconut  
1/4 pound shrimp, shelled, cooked

1. Heat a skillet and cook salt pork until it renders its fat. Remove bits to stockpot, reserving fat in skillet. Add onion and garlic and saute 5 minutes. Remove with slotted spoon and add to stockpot. Discard any remaining fat.

2. Add chicken stock and coconut liquid to stockpot and bring to simmer. Add callaloo (if using fresh), yam, scallions, hot pepper, thyme and salt and pepper and simmer 1 hour, or until vegetables are tender. In a separate pot, cook okra until tender. Add to soup for last 10 minutes of cooking. Stir in callaloo, if using canned, coconut and shrimp. Reheat, if necessary. Makes 6 servings.

Note: Spinach, Chinese spinach or

swiss chard may be substituted for callaloo.

## JAMAICAN BEEF PATTIES

3 tablespoons vegetable oil  
1 pound very lean ground beef  
1 cup fine-chopped onion  
1/4 cup fine-chopped green pepper  
1 fresh hot pepper, seeded, chopped  
2 cloves garlic, chopped fine  
1 cup canned crushed tomatoes  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1/2 teaspoon Picapeppa sauce or Worcestershire sauce,

or to taste  
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper  
1/2 teaspoon thyme

### For pastry:

2 2/3 cups all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon baking powder  
1 cup solid white shortening  
6 tablespoons cold water  
1 egg white, lightly beaten

1. In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil and add beef, breaking it up with a wooden spoon. Cook until it browns. Remove beef and drain. Clean pan.

2. Heat 2 remaining tablespoons oil and saute onion, green pepper, hot pepper and garlic 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, salt and pepper, Picapep-

pa sauce, cayenne pepper and thyme. Add cooked beef and mix well. Cook 3 to 4 minutes, stirring occasionally, until mixture is dry. Place mixture in a strainer over a bowl and set aside to drain and cool.

3. To make pastry, combine flour, salt and baking powder in a bowl and toss lightly with a fork. Cut in shortening with a pastry blender or fingertips. Add water and stir with fork, adding another tablespoon water, if necessary. Form mixture into a ball.

4. Divide pastry into 12 equal portions. Roll out each piece 1/8 inch thick and cut into a 6-inch-diameter circle. Place 1/3 cup meat mixture on lower half of circle. Moisten upper edge of pastry with water. Fold upper half down and crimp edges with fork. Brush tops with egg white and prick tops with fork. Bake in a 425-degree oven 20 to 25 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes about 12 patties.

## MERLE'S CURRIED GOAT

2 pounds goat meat (see note)  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1 teaspoon black pepper  
1 fresh hot pepper, preferably Scotch bonnet, chopped

3 to 4 plum tomatoes, chopped  
1 large onion, chopped  
Sprig of fresh thyme, or 1/2 teaspoon dried

6 to 8 whole allspice, or 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice

3 tablespoons curry powder  
3 tablespoons vegetable oil  
Hot cooked rice

1. Cut goat meat into cubes, leaving any bones attached. In a large nonmetal bowl, combine meat, salt, black pepper, Scotch bonnet, tomatoes, onion, thyme, allspice and curry powder. Toss gently to cover meat. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

2. Remove meat and scrape off seasonings, setting them aside for later use. In a large skillet, heat oil and all meat all at once. Cook over low heat until meat loses color (it will not brown). Cover meat to 1 inch above with water and simmer 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Meat will not be tender. Add reserved seasoning and continue cooking for another 1 to 1 1/2 hours, or until meat is tender. Serve over rice. Makes 8 servings.

### MEDITERRANEAN STEW

3 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into 1-inch cubes (3 cups)  
4 medium carrots, peeled and sliced into 1-inch pieces (2 cups)  
2 medium onions, cut into chunks  
1 pound beef stew meat, cut into 1-inch cubes  
8-ounce can tomato sauce  
1 cup dry red wine  
2 tablespoons wine vinegar  
1 tablespoon brown sugar

1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/8 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 cup raisins  
1 inch stick cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon whole cloves  
1 bay leaf

In a 3 1/2-quart electric slow crockery cooker place potatoes, carrots, onions and stew meat. In a medium bowl combine tomato sauce, wine, vinegar, brown sugar, salt, cumin, garlic powder and pepper, stir in raisins, stick cinnamon, cloves and bay leaf. Pour mixture over meat in cooker. Cover and cook on high-heat setting for 5 to 6 hours, or on low for 10 to 12 hours or until tender. Remove stick cinnamon, cloves and bay leaf before serving. Makes 5 or 6 servings.

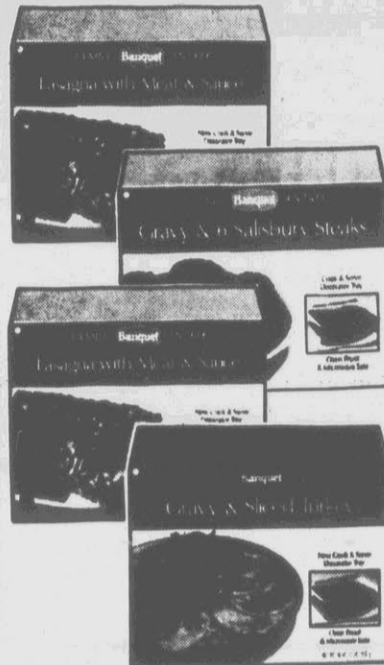

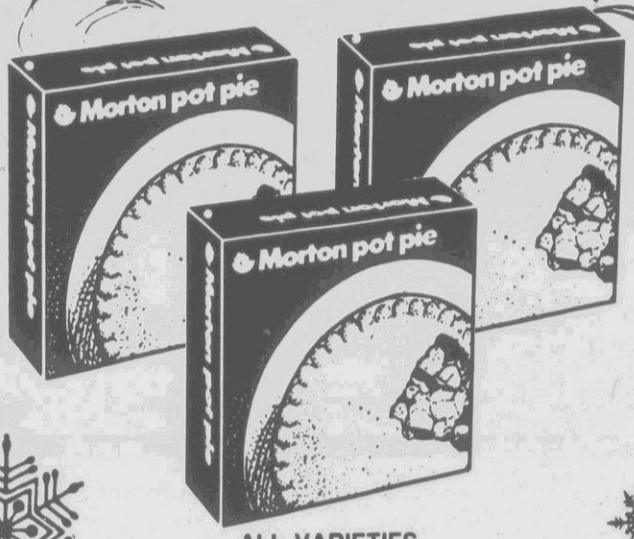

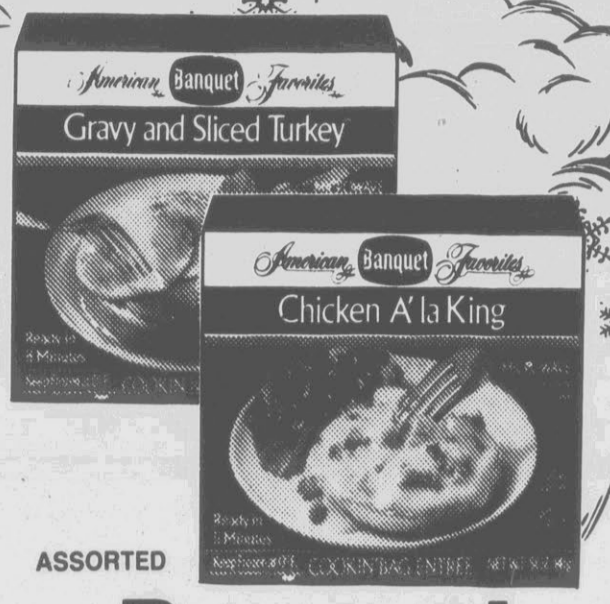

- CODFISH STEW WITH ACKEES, TOMATOES AND ONIONS**  
 2 dozen fresh ackees in pods, or 19-ounce can of ackees  
 1 pound dried salted cod  
 2 ounces salt pork, chopped  
 1 large onion, chopped  
 1 red pepper, sliced  
 1 green pepper, sliced  
 1 fresh hot pepper, seeded, chopped  
 1 sprig fresh thyme, or 1/2 teaspoon dried

2 cups chopped tomatoes, fresh or canned  
 1/2 cup chopped scallions, using white and several inches of green

1. If using fresh ackees, remove from pods and discard the seeds and pink membrane. To keep them from falling apart during cooking, tie them in a square of cheesecloth.

2. Soak cod in cold water for 30 minutes. Drain and soak in clean water another 30 minutes. Continue soaking and renewing water until water loses its overly salty taste. This will depend on how dry the cod is and will take from 1 to 24 hours.

3. Place the cod in a pot with fresh water and simmer until tender, 15 to 20 minutes. Remove the fish, reserving water. Set fish aside and, when cool enough to handle, break into pieces, discarding bones and skin. Cook fresh ackees in cod water until tender, about 15 minutes. Remove and set aside.

4. Heat a large skillet and cook salt pork until it gives up its fat. Remove bits and set aside. Add onion, red pepper, green pepper and hot pepper to pan and saute 10 minutes. Add thyme and tomatoes. Gently fold in cod and ackee (either cooked fresh or drained canned), reserving several for garnish. Arrange mixture on serving platter. Sprinkle with scallions. Garnish with ackee. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

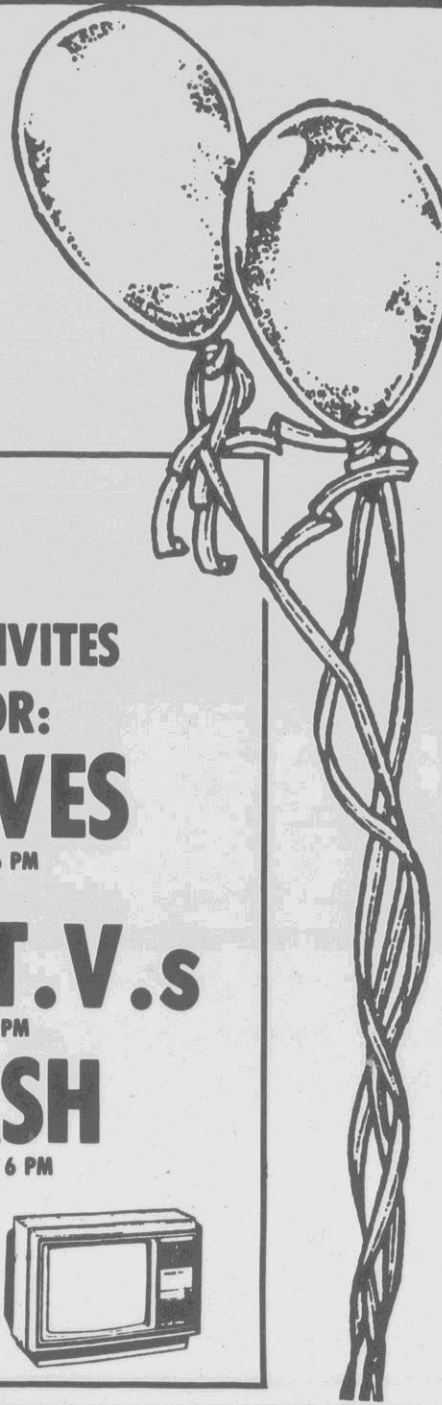

**WALNUT STRAWBERRY SHORT-CAKE**

2 1/2 cups buttermilk baking mix  
1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts  
Sugar  
3/4 cup milk  
1/3 cup butter or margarine, melted

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract  
2 pints Florida strawberries  
3 tablespoons orange liqueur, divided

2 cups heavy (whipping) cream

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Butter and lightly flour an 8-inch square baking pan; set aside. In a medium bowl, combine baking mix, walnuts and 1/3 cup sugar. Add milk, butter and vanilla extract; stir just until dry ingredients are moistened. Turn into prepared pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, about 20 minutes. Turn out on to a wire rack.

Meanwhile, hull and thickly slice strawberries. In a large bowl, toss strawberries with 1/4 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons orange liqueur; refrigerate. Whip cream with 2 tablespoons sugar and remaining 1 ta: blespoon liqueur.

To assemble: Split cake in half horizontally. Place bottom half cut side up on a serving plate. Top with half the strawberry mixture then half the cream. Cover with cake top, cut side down. Spread with remaining cream, then spoon on remaining strawberries. Yield: 9 to 12 portions.

dorm at night and stand outside the window, not serenading, but waiting to catch the bag of popcorn I'd throw to him. We are friends still.

I don't feel secure unless I have popcorn in the house. I can pop it in a long-handled wire basket over the fire, as we used to do at home. I can pop it in a black iron skillet, with oil or without. As long as there is popcorn, there is never nothing to eat.

I do not even have an electric popcorn popper, now, but if I ever purchase a microwave oven I will do so with only one purpose in mind: popcorn.

In early, lonely days in New York, I would pop a sackful of corn and take my own around the corner to the Elgin, now the Joyce, where I sat through all the Truffaut movies as many times as I could - "Shoot the Piano Player," mostly, with "Jules et Jim" a close second.

Movies are undeniably better, with popcorn. Books seem better when read while eating popcorn.

Some popcorn is almost always better than no popcorn. Even cold popcorn may be better than none at all.

But I draw the line at popcorn that is pre-popped, trucked into theaters, warmed and sold masquerading as fresh popcorn. I could name names. That popcorn, I boycott.
