Shultz Says Arms, Summit Agreements Near

MOSCOW (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz said today an agreement eliminating superpower medium-range missiles from Europe and likely leading to a summit in Washington is "close at hand."
But both Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze told reporters hard work remained before the superpowers could sign such an agreement.
Shultz held a news conference in

Moscow after three days of talks with Communist Party chief Mikhail S. Gorbachev and other Soviet leaders.

"I think we made quite a lot of progress and perhaps we can see prospects with hard negotiations ahead, but prospects close at hand of reaching agreement in that area," Shultz said.

"Very considerable headway has been made and we should be able to work out agreement in this field with hard work and creative efforts," he said.

Shultz and Shevardnadze met for several hours before the secretary of state addressed reporters, and afterwards the Soviet foreign minister offered an upbeat assessment of the possibility of a superpower summit in Washington.

Shevardnadze said there was a "rather good prospect" of another summit meeting between President Reagan and Gorbachev. Asked what was needed, he said, "to tuck up our sleeves and work."

Gorbachev offered Tuesday to

scrap short-range missiles in non-Soviet Eastern Europe and seek a compromise on the U.S. "Star Wars" program, the official Tass news agency reported.

Gorbachev also told Shultz he was willing to meet with Reagan to conclude a treaty on medium-range missiles and work out "key provisions" in three other areas, the agency said.

At his news conference, Shultz did not go into the specifics of Soviet proposals, but said he would be discuss-

ing the areas of negotiation with America's European allies in Brussels on Thursday.

Those areas are strategic offensive weapons, anti-missile defenses, and nuclear tests, it said.

Tass did not say whether Gorbachev would accept Reagan's invitation for a Washington summit this year. Gorbachev told reporters Tuesday that "generally, without reason, I do not go anywhere, particularly America."

U.S. officials in Moscow did not

immediately respond to the latest Soviet report on the Shultz-Gorbachev meeting Tuesday. One U.S. official said earlier the two sides had agreed not to talk about the substance of Shultz's meetings with Soviet officials until after they were concluded.

Shultz met this morning at the U.S. Embassy with 19 Soviets who have been refused permission to join their spouses or other relatives in the United States.

GUC Approves Renovation Project For Headquarters

Renovation of the second and third floors of the Greenville Utilities Building at West Fifth and Washington streets will begin soon.

Approval for combined contracts to do the interior improvement work was given Tuesday night by the Greenville Utilities Commission. Included is a reworking of the heating and cooling system of the building and a new lighting system on the two floors.

Brittle wiring from light fixtures in use in the building for many years was passed around for commissioners to see. Alterations will include functional ones like moving walls, as well as decorative improvements.

James G. Hite is the architect for the project. Ross-Markham Inc. will

do most of the work. Cost of the project is expected to be \$180,324 or \$12.17 per square foot. First-floor work is planned after this project is completed.

Louis H. Zincone, former vice chairman, was elected chairman of the commission, replacing William H. Taft Jr. James Ebron Jr. was elected vice chairman. John Ferren, assistant general manager and budget officer of the commission, was re-elected secretary.

The board affirmed the City Council's decision that a four-year joint city-library-utilities audit be done by Lowrimore Warwick Co. of Greenville. The commission had been in favor of employing another firm, but bowed to the city council's wishes.

Awarding of bids for materials were as follows: pipe and fittings from Furguson Enterprises Inc. for

\$22,385.74; 750 MCM cable from Westinghouse Electric Supply Co. for \$45,178; 1272 MCM conductor from Tennessee Valley Electric Supply Co. for \$11,630.02; 795 conductor from Tennessee Valley Electric Supply Co. for \$27,102.87; 40 115-KV horizontal post insulators and trunion clamps from Mill-Power Supply Co. for \$12,696; and 100 25 KVA transformers from Eastern Electric Supply Inc. for \$49,200.

Approval was given for the purchase of an agricultural tractor with harrow from Tarheel Tractor Inc. for \$37,571.

As a first step of the commission's budget preparation process, various department heads briefed the commissioners on the currently updated five-year capital improvement plan. It was explained that projections must be done on how it is believed the city and surrounding service area will be developed over time.

GUC director Malcolm Green explained that no concrete sewer expansion plans were made, because providing sewer to all the areas that could feasibly be annexed by the city in the next five years is fiscally impossible. Sewer rates would have to go too high for customers to bear. He said planning for servicing Brook Valley and the surrounding area being considered for annexation by the city is under way. It's much more economically feasible, he said, to consider supplying service to newly developed areas where developers are required to tap onto city lines than to retrofit existing developed areas that now have septic tanks.

Approval was given for water-sewer service to a new residential development called Treetops Section V near Winterville. The developer bears all the cost. Concurrence must come from the city council and planning and zoning.

A second water service to the Ronald McDonald House, located on land owned by Pitt County, was given approval.

Roger Jones, electric systems director, reported that a \$128,282 reduction in electric service billing was realized during March.

Deadline Here For Tax Filers

Pitt County procrastinators may be scurrying to finally get those tax forms completed as today is the final day to file state and federal taxes.

State and federal taxes filed with the North Carolina Department of Internal Revenue and the U.S. Internal Revenue Service, respectively, must be postmarked April 15 to prevent tax penalties.

Late filers have to pay the state "10 percent of the taxes owed plus interest" unless an extension has been granted, said R.B. McLamb, state revenue tax office manager.

Extensions are granted to ill persons who request it, he said. "Usually we require no documentation" to determine the validity of the requests, but filing patterns in previous years are checked.

Those still waiting for filing records such as the W-2 form also may be granted an extension, he said, and those receiving federal extensions may receive state extensions, too.

Most extensions are 60 days, and usually account for less than 5 percent of the total state returns filed in a given year, McLamb said.

The state office located at 400 N. Greene St. was to be open until 5 p.m. today to assist those filing.

Late taxpayers risk two penalty charges when filing federal taxes, said an IRS representative. The failure to file penalty is based on the

balance due on the return and carries a 5 percent charge on that total for each month the money is not received.

Taxpayers who file taxes but cannot pay face a failure to pay penalty. They are charged one-half of 1 percent of the unpaid tax for each month the money is not received.

There is an "automatic four-month extension only if you don't owe taxes and can't get the paperwork done," she said. But, those taxpayers still have to file for an extension postmarked by today.

Those who owe money and want an extension must "estimate as close as possible" the taxes owed and send it with an extension form postmarked today, the representative said.

Postmaster Charles Caulk of the Greenville Post Office said mail going out of the city today must be at the post office before 6 p.m. Mail received between 6 p.m. and midnight will be postmarked April 15, but may not leave the city until Thursday.

The post office usually does not postmark mail in Greenville after 6 p.m., Caulk said. But, "this particular occasion, in order to give people the benefit of the doubt, we postmark (the mail)."

While a heavier bulk of mail is expected today, it should not slow down the process handling in Greenville, he said, because "we don't process mail here. It's done in Rocky Mount."

Pentagon Says Three Marines Under Arrest

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon today denied a published report that it had arrested a fourth Marine embassy guard on suspicion of espionage, as pre-trial proceedings resumed against the first Marine arrested.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said "a number of Marines" were still being questioned by military investigators. "But there

have been no more arrests; there have been no more charges. The suggestion that another person has been detained or arrested is wrong."

The Washington Post, quoting unidentified sources, reported today that another guard who had worked at the Moscow embassy with Sgt. Clayton Lonetree and Cpl. Arnold Bracy had been arrested and placed in the brig at the Quantico, Va., Marine Base.

Lonetree, whose pre-trial hearing

resumed at the Quantico base this morning, and Bracy have both been charged with espionage. The two allegedly became involved sexually with Soviet women while posted in Moscow and then allowed Soviet agents inside the embassy on "numerous" occasions last year, the Marine Corps has charged.

The Post did not identify the guard but said he was serving in the U.S. Embassy in Brasilia when he was

Dollar Climbs, Stocks Rebound

NEW YORK (AP) — The government released more dismal economic news today showing U.S. industrial production dropped sharply last month, but the battered dollar strengthened and the stock market rebounded from its four-day malaise.

The Federal Reserve said a 0.3 percent drop in March industrial production was the biggest decline since a 0.4 percent fall last May,

reflecting widespread reductions in a range of industries.

U.S. manufacturers have been hurt by a barrage of imports that have pushed the trade deficit to record highs and forced widespread layoffs and production cutbacks over the past two years.

Other government reports today were mixed. The Commerce Department said retail sales ad-

vanced slightly last month but re-

mained depressed compared with levels of late last year. The department also said U.S. business plan to increase capital spending by 1.8 percent this year after a big cutback in 1986.

In the currency markets today, the dollar rose broadly in lively trading, boosted by a Japanese announcement of international intervention to

revive the battered currency.

In Tokyo, the dollar closed at 141.85 Japanese yen, up from the record closing low of 141.35 yen hit Tuesday. Later in London it rose to 142.45 yen.

The dollar's renewed strength helped the stock market advance early today after four dismal sessions. The Dow Jones of 30 industrial stocks, which had lost 119.18 points since Thursday, was up 28.98.

First Family Files Tax Return

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — President Reagan, declaring \$336,640 in income for 1986, filed his tax return to the accompaniment of a familiar refrain: "No tax hike!"

Reagan filed jointly with his wife Nancy, and the first couple showed a drop in adjusted gross income from 1985 to 1986 — \$336,640 compared with \$394,492. The bulk of those figures represented his \$200,000 salary as president.

Their tax liability to the federal government for 1986 was \$92,460.

At the same time, White House press aides who accompanied the Reagans to California for the couple's Easter vacation released a statement in which Reagan called April 15 "the last gasp of the old tax code."

Repeating his threat to fight any move in Congress to enact general tax hikes or increases in rate struc-

tures, Reagan said, "We will not break our word to the American people. There will be no tax hike. Tax rate cuts will go ahead as scheduled."

"Let me put this in plain English: no way."

At tax filing time in 1986 Reagan admitted he "didn't understand" his return at the time, even after it was explained to him.

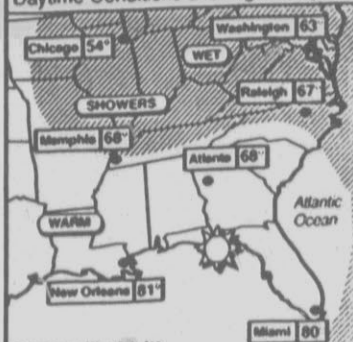
"Starting this year," he said in

Tuesday's statement, "America has the sleekest, most modern, most competitive tax structure of all the major industrialized nations."

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater, commenting on the Reagans' drop in earnings, said the major factor was that the president's blind trust did not perform as well as in the past. He said Reagan "regrets that."

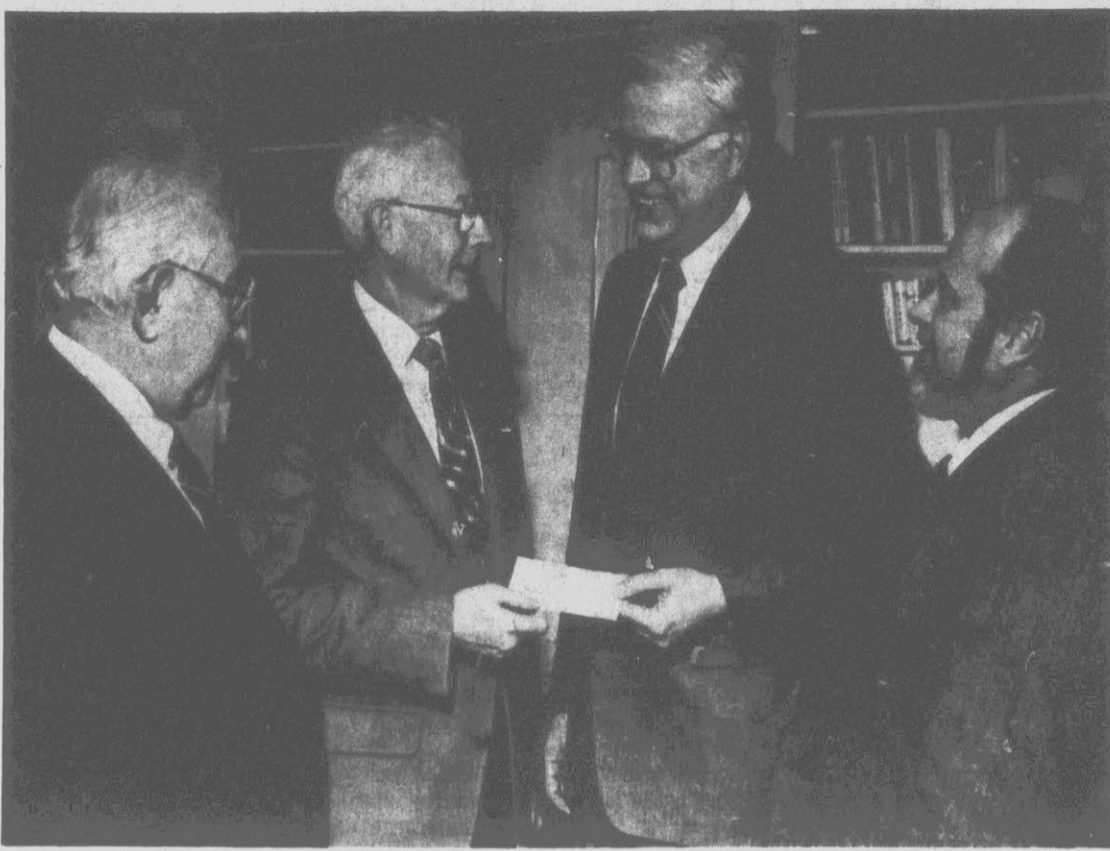

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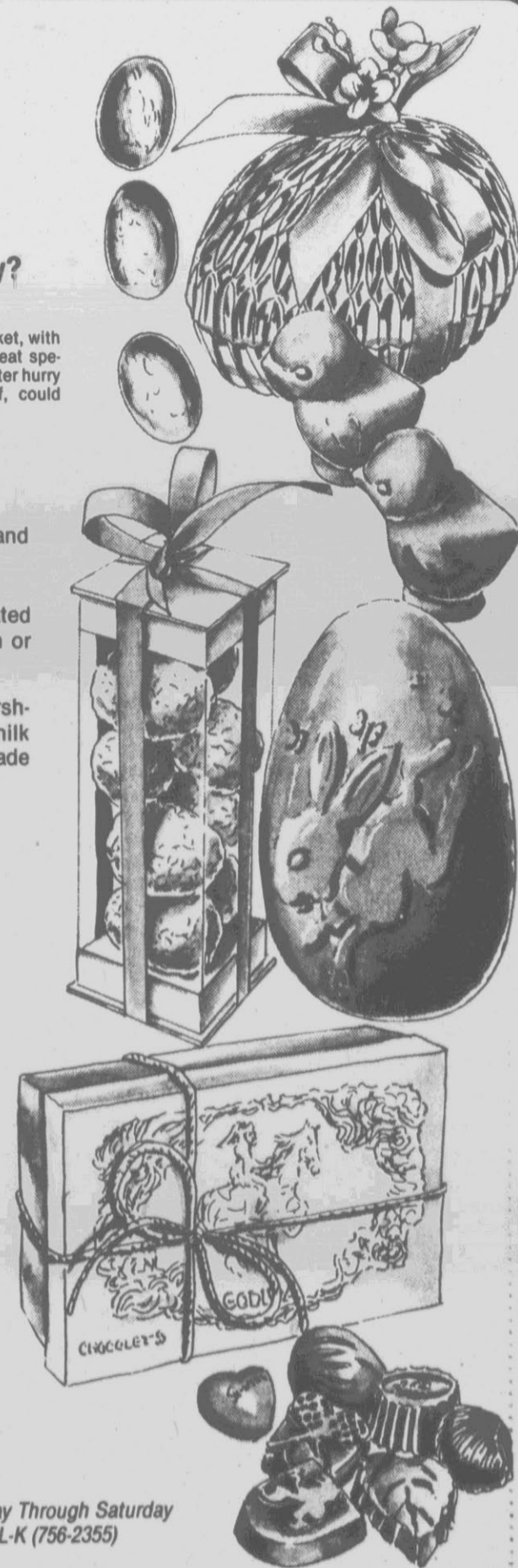

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Tornado Watch Set For 28 Counties

A tornado watch was issued this morning for 28 counties in the coastal plain, Piedmont, mountains and foothills of North Carolina, and the National Weather Service said there was a slight chance of more severe thunderstorms across the state tonight, with large hail and damaging winds.

The tornado watch, which means conditions are favorable for a twister and severe thunderstorms, was issued at about 9:30 a.m. for 15 coun-

ties in the Piedmont, 10 counties in the coastal plain and three counties in the North Carolina mountains and foothills.

A line of thunderstorms moved into the western part of the state early today, bringing hail the size of ping-pong balls in Clay County. A large tree was blown down and a house was struck by lightning in Cherokee County.

A large area of low pressure will continue to control the weather across the state through Thursday.

Sound Decision

The Pitt County Commission made a sound decision Monday when it opted for a 6-3 election plan that allows three members of the board to be elected by at-large voting.

The community should recognize the strengths of this plan, acknowledge its benefits to Pitt County and support it with enthusiasm.

Commissioners acted responsibly and in the best interest of the county's citizens. They can rest assured they have selected a system that can provide Pitt County's citizens with a balanced, representative board of commissioners.

The plan can also provide important minority representation without polarizing voters. Blacks should put aside objections to the plan. It can provide minorities with a visible voting voice.

Stipulating that six commissioners be elected by residency district voting, while allowing three commissioners to be elected by all voters is an intelligent choice for good government. The plan represents a compromise between district-only voting, which could produce a board dangerously narrow in scope, and a totally at-large election system, which could effectively dilute minority voting power.

The combination 6-3 plan incorporates the strengths of both methods of electing representation. By opting for six representatives to reside in and be voted on only by individual districts, the plan protects the interests of Pitt County's diverse areas, from rural Bethel to urban Greenville, as well as its minority citizens. A board composed entirely of district-elected officials, however, would encourage provincialism. It would be quite easy for board members to work only for the interests of their district — a fact that could cause bickering and restricted perspective.

By mandating that the new system of voting include three representatives who can reside anywhere and are voted on by all citizens, the 6-3 election plan works against this type of disunity. These three officials will be politically responsible to all the citizens in Pitt County, and must make decisions based on this accountability.

The commissioners approved a strong method of election for Pitt County's officials. The plan should be accepted by those citizens it works to benefit.

Miracle Bill

If a bill now before the N.C. Legislature passes, more wonders like Marvin Huffman's miracle will be possible.

Huffman was Pitt County Memorial Hospital's first heart transplant patient. His prognosis without a new heart was dismal. With the organ of someone else beating in his chest, he has a chance for life.

The miracle could not have occurred if the victim of an accident had not been an organ and tissue donor.

Unfortunately, the potential for transplantation far exceeds the number of organs and tissues available for donation. For this reason, state lawmakers are considering a law that would require hospitals to ask the family of brain dead or near death patients for consent to donate the patient's organs and tissue for surgical transplantation in others.

The bill is based on a sound premise — that doctors can reach more potential donors by sensitively pointing out the value of a dying patient's organs and tissue.

Pitt County has a large stake in the issue through East Carolina University Medical School. The med school's kidney transplant program is a very active unit. Now, with the cardiac unit performing its first transplant, that stake has increased.

The request must be made, of course, with care — and with attention to the emotional upheaval family members may feel at the time of a loved one's death. Hospitals must plan for implementing a procedure like this — perhaps by designating one person — or a team of persons — and training them for approaching families about donation.

Lawmakers should support this legislation which could bring extended resources to a concept that has the potential for giving life.

Let The Syrians Do It

WASHINGTON — A strange twist of events has positioned implacable enemies Israel and Syria in an unspoken alliance of convenience out of fear and hatred of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO), a convergence that might conceivably lead to basic change in the seemingly immutable Arab-Israeli struggle.

The PLO, grown to several thousand fighters who are mostly retreats from Israel's 1962 invasion that drove them from southern Lebanon, is restoring its political and military structure north of the Israeli border. These Fatah fighters, representing Yasir Arafat's dominant PLO faction, are hated by Syria's President Hafez Assad almost as much as they are feared by Israel.

Reagan administration officials believe that this mutual fear and hatred may bestow a silent Israeli blessing on a Syrian military thrust south from Beirut to a point only a few short miles from the Israeli border. As projected by high officials

here, the Syrian move toward the border would come in the next two or three months. If Israel permits it, other forms of unacknowledged cooperation might follow.

Israel has sent no hard word here — and presumably not to Damascus either — that a Syrian military operation would be accepted so close to the Israeli border. But signs point to a non-lethal response based on Israeli self-interest: since Israel would not dare to invade Lebanon again to accomplish the disposal of the PLO that the 1982 thrust failed to achieve, let the Syrians do it.

For Assad, destruction of the Fatah guerrillas is becoming a political imperative because of his alliance with the Amal Shiite movement, now being threatened and undermined by the PLO's rebirth as a fighting force. If his Amal allies ask Assad to help protect their positions in the south against the resurgent PLO, officials here believe Assad will have no choice but to come to their aid.

That would force a major extension of Syria's military operations, now largely confined to the Beirut area. Assad would move some of his nearly 10,000 troops south and bypass Beirut suburbs that are dominated by Hizballah, the Iranian-supported Shiite fundamentalists. With his forces exposed to relatively long lines of supply and communications, Assad could be dealt a heavy blow by Israeli air power, operating from behind Israel's border.

Such a response would gain Israel nothing but dead Syrians. It would sacrifice a golden opportunity for Israel to use its hated enemy to clean out the PLO. And beyond the PLO is another enemy in southern Lebanon that U.S. officials view as a far graver threat to Israel in the long run than the PLO: the Hizballah.

Assad's alliance with Iran's Shiite fundamentalist regime and its Lebanese adjunct, the Hizballah, has always been regarded here as tenuous. It is based far more on hatred of

Iraq's President Saddam Hussein than on love for the Ayatollah Khomeini. Indeed, the ruling Alewite faction in Syria that Assad heads might be brutally overthrown by pro-Iranian Islamic factions if Iran won its war with Iraq.

When Israel examines the matter carefully, the conclusion is that the Jewish state gains almost as much as Syria from destroying the vanguard of Islamic fundamentalism that threatens large regions of the Middle East. Reducing Hizballah to a token force in Lebanon would destroy its first stronghold outside Iran itself.

There are no illusions in the Reagan administration that this confluence of interest in Syria and Israel will quickly transform their hatred. But if self-interest is a motivating force in foreign policy, what starts as an unspoken alliance of convenience could have unforeseen and unpredictable consequences.

Thank you for the excellent editorial in Sunday's Daily Reflector about the problems of the Pamlico River. The editorial nicely summarizes some of the symptoms and causes of the river's problems.

The Pamlico River forms a river-estuarine system with the Tar River at its upper end and the Pamlico Sound at its lower end. It is the second-largest such system in the country, just behind the even more severely impacted Chesapeake Bay.

Awareness of the river's problems, while important, is not enough to preserve the integrity of this system. Political consensus is required if the Pamlico-Tar River is to survive. A concerned citizen can take the following concrete actions to help bring about that consensus:

First, let your representatives know that you care about a healthy environment. A timely plug to your state representative for the phosphate ban law — a simple, effective and inexpensive step in the right direction — would help.

Second, learn about and support the joint EPA-state study of the Pamlico-Albemarle estuarine system currently beginning. The study attempts to firmly establish the causes of the problems and define the best ways to deal with them. To get on the mailing list of this study, which actively seeks public involvement, call or write Doug Rader, the project coordinator, at 733-5083; Dept. of NRCD, Box 27687, Raleigh, N.C. 27611.

Third, join the local organization, the Pamlico-Tar River Foundation, which attempts to preserve and restore the health of this vital river system in our back

Pursuing The Presidential Greased Pig

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the barbed words of his "Devil's Dictionary," published in 1906, satirist Ambrose Bierce described the presidency as "the greased pig in the field game of American politics."

Eighty-one springs later, little has changed. In the final quarter of Ronald Reagan's presidency, so many politicians are chasing that political greased pig that they are literally running into each other.

Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., standing on a small, bare wood box, announced last Thursday his intention to announce May 18 that he too is a candidate for president.

As his supporters applauded, he immediately ducked out a back door and nearly collided with Senate Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas who also is in hot pursuit of the White House.

Dole was standing in the corridor outside the room in which Simon had announced his intention to announce, addressing a group of Kansas senior citizens seated in folding chairs.

The two candidates for their parties' nominations made small talk, then went about their respective campaigns.

The Dole constituents, by the way, wore large orange and black paper sunflowers, the emblem of their state.

Simon almost always wears bow ties, and his supporters and staff members paid tribute with small silver bow tie lapel pins.

The last Illinois politician to seek the presidency was Adlai Stevenson. His symbol was also a lapel pin. It was shaped like a shoe with a hole in the sole.

A little more than 24 hours after Simon strode purposefully to the microphones in the Mike Mansfield Room in the Senate wing of the Capitol, another senator was in the same room before the same microphones making the same announcement.

Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., said he also wanted to be president of the United States and would make his formal announcement later in the spring out of the belief that while it's late in the season, "It's far from too late."

As his 4-year-old son attempted to climb a marble Senate fireplace which served his father as a backdrop, Gore told a news con-

ference that space achievement was one of his goals.

The nation should, he said, put "men" — "I mean human beings" — on the "moon" — "I mean Mars" — by the end of the century, he told a chuckling audience.

A homestate reporter asked if it was seemingly for Gore, a freshman who won election to his first Senate term only two years ago, to leave Washington suddenly and "go off galivanting around the country."

The senator said he had not heard that complaint from any of his constituents and had received nothing but encouragement from Tennesseans.

Gore is under 40. If he were nominated and elected, the voters would be replacing the nation's oldest president with the youngest ever.

"You're only 38," said one

reporter, evidently about to question Gore's experience and maturity.

"No, 39," said his wife, Tipper, interrupting.

"Let me say that if I was only 38, I wouldn't consider it," the senator said.

Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., also has presidential ambitions.

Unsurprisingly, they surfaced last week during a session of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Biden was questioning a witness, Gene Upshaw, a former guard with the Oakland Raiders football team who is now executive director of the National Football League Players Association.

During his younger years, Biden said, he had great ambitions to play football.

But after playing a little, he said, he soon learned that his talents lay not with football but in another direc-

tion entirely: politics and the presidency.

A former football ace is chasing the presidential greased pig from the House side of the Capitol.

Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., is a former star quarterback for the Buffalo Bills. Last week, comedian Mark Russell drew laughs with a political punch line when he told a Washington audience that Kemp's advisers were telling him to play down his football past and emphasize his congressional career.

Russell said Kemp would be better advised to "forget the congressional part and play up the football."

Kemp tries to finesse the football issue. He introduces his wife, Joanne, to political audiences as, "the real quarterback in the Kemp family."

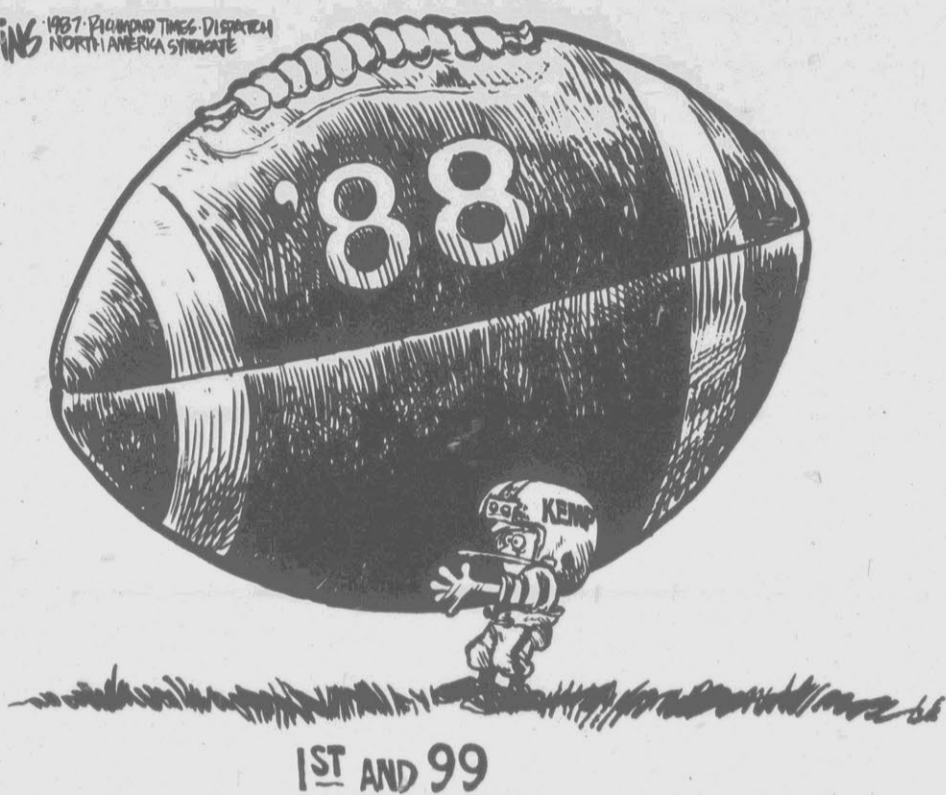
And so the chase after the greased pig goes on.

Bierce, in his usual biting manner, said every president of the United States is in a unique position.

The president, said Bierce, is "the leading figure of a small group of men of whom — and of whom only — it is positively known that immense numbers of their countrymen did not want any of them for president."

Hart Is Everyone's Target This Time

WASHINGTON (AP) — Enter Gary Hart determined to be a different kind of front-runner in the race for the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination.

And no wonder. This is the same Gary Hart whose mastery of guerrilla politics transformed the battle for the 1984 Democratic presidential nomination and earned him the unenviable status as 1988 front-runner.

It's the same Gary Hart who ambushed front-runner Walter F. Mondale in the New Hampshire primary and then stunned him five days later in the Maine caucuses.

"We genuinely hope this campaign will be different," Hart told a Denver news conference Tuesday, 24 hours after announcing his candidacy for president.

You bet he hopes it will be different.

Hart was flying south three years ago after his twin victories in New Hampshire and Maine had propelled him to the forefront of the Democratic field.

He chatted with a reporter who said Hart looked like he was headed for the nomination but then would face a popular incumbent president in the general election.

"If you run a good race against President Reagan, but he is re-elected, that means you start out the '88 campaign as the Democratic front-runner," the reporter said. "How does that strike you?"

Hart threw his hands up in mock horror and replied, "I don't even want to think about it."

Neither Hart nor Mondale nor the reporters covering the Democratic campaign could sense back then what troubles lay ahead for Hart — the questions about his name and his age, the way Mondale's question "Where's the beef?" caught hold and blunted Hart's new ideas theme.

"I hope we will be better prepared for victory and defeat," he said as he launched his latest campaign.

"I was not prepared for all the scrutiny," he added.

Ready or not, there's no avoiding the scrutiny this time around. The

early polls put Hart far ahead of any of his potential rivals, but it's a distance attributable to the fact he is far better known than the other Democrats.

To the predictably crusty voters of New Hampshire, all the other candidates will have the advantage of being seen as alternatives to the front-runner.

Mondale was the front-runner in 1984, the candidate being scrutinized for his ties to special interest groups, his service as Jimmy Carter's vice president and his history as a Minnesota liberal in the Hubert Humphrey tradition.

His Iowa neighbors were kind to Mondale but there was something about him New Hampshire voters didn't like. They looked around and there was Hart, the candidate who

had finished second in Iowa. He got their support.

How does Hart plan to avoid the same sort of ambush?

To begin with, he's trying to control the debate, make people talk about his issues, erase the perception that he is a question mark, a candidate of uncertain background.

"I have this strange notion that people care about ideas," he said while quickly taking the offensive on taxes, arms control, farm policy and AIDS.

This time around, a growing field of Democrats harbor the hope this campaign won't be all that much different from 1984.

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Senate Passes Taft-Sponsored Bill Aimed At Reducing Vaccine Prices

RALEIGH (AP) — The state Senate decided a promise might be better than a threat before approving a bill designed to get drug makers to slash prices for childhood vaccines.

The bill to make changes in a 1986 law to insulate manufacturers from some vaccine-related lawsuits was approved 40-4 and sent to the House Tuesday, but only after lengthy debate over whether the entire act should expire in 1989.

Sen. Jim Johnson, R-Cabarrus, said drug makers knew the sunset provision was in the 1986 law when they endorsed it and promised to cut prices.

"They came to us last time and said, 'Boys, you just give us this break and we're gonna drop those prices,'" Johnson said. "Now they come back in and say, 'Hey, we got sandbagged and you boys gotta help us out a little bit more."

"Do you think that if we put in this sunset provision, they're gonna go broke? No way. Absolutely no way."

But Sen. Tom Taft, D-Pitt, sponsor of the bill, said it was crucial manufacturers have some assurance the law would remain in effect before

they stop adding the cost of lawsuits to the prices of the vaccine.

"We're very comfortable ... that the price of a dose of DPT is going to go from \$12 to \$3.60" if the changes are enacted, he said.

Sen. Dennis Winner, D-Buncombe, said it would be better to keep the sunset as a threat to be removed after the drug makers reduce prices.

"If we take this sunset off, you can bet your bottom dollar the cost isn't going to go down," he said.

But Sen. Joe Johnson, D-Wake, said it was unreasonable to expect a manufacturer to cut prices until the door was closed to large lawsuits.

An amendment to restore the sunset clause failed, 32-13.

Sen. Bill Martin, D-Guilford, then offered an amendment to allow suits in cases where a drug maker was negligent in designing, labeling or storing a vaccine.

"I don't think any of us would want to absolve the manufacturer in any areas of liability in which commonly they would be liable," he said.

Taft, however, said the U.S. Food and Drug Administration controls design and labeling. He also noted that the rules would apply only in cases

where the state attorney general believes there is negligence rather than a rare, biological reaction by an infant given the vaccine.

Sen. Dan Simpson, R-Burke, persisted that the attorney general's hands would be tied without the amendment, but it was defeated 27-18.

Taft said the main reason for the 1986 law and the current cleanup bill is to head off "an avalanche and crisis among pediatricians" who started sending children to public health facilities for free vaccines when prices skyrocketed.

"That turned 35 years of public policy around in North Carolina," he said. "Most children, the first time they ever see a pediatrician ... is when they go back for their DPT vaccinations. ... It's the most important moment in the early childhood health of that infant."

Taft said his bill would streamline the process set up last year to channel vaccine-related cases through the Industrial Commission instead of the courts and have the Department of Human Resources provide lifetime care for those injured.

Taft said he expects both amendments to be tried in the House, where he said the North Carolina State Bar Association will continue lobbying for the changes.

House Gives Tentative Approval To Crime Victims' Aid Package

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina's stillborn crime victim compensation program may never be revived unless the Legislature makes difficult decisions about who

will be eligible, lawmakers say.

The House was expected to take a final vote today on a bill that would revise the guidelines for the program, which was enacted in 1983 but has yet to begin operating because the Legislature hasn't decided how to

pay for it.

The measure received tentative approval Tuesday, 112-2.

The bill is part of a package that includes bills to appropriate \$1 million for the program in each of the next two fiscal years and to raise the monthly fee paid by criminals on parole or probation from \$10 to \$15. The latter measure would generate \$1.3 million per year that could not be earmarked directly for the crime victim program, but is designed to offset its cost.

The appropriation and parole fee bills are pending in House committees.

Rep. Bob Hunter, D-McDowell, chief sponsor of the package, said the regulatory bill was a compromise hammered out by the House Judiciary IV Committee after weeks of debate.

"We tried to keep it conservative ... to have something that would pass, that would get funded and that we could get operational," Hunter said. "We tried to make sure ... it could operate as quickly and efficiently as possible."

Under the bill, no victim could receive more than \$20,000 from the fund. Hunter said the average award probably would be around \$2,500.

Only victims whose injuries are not covered by other compensation, such as insurance, would be eligible for the program. It would cover only personal injuries and deaths. Property damage would be excluded except for medical equipment such as eyeglasses, hearing aids and wheelchairs.

Compensation for lost work would be limited to 26 weeks from the date of the injury and to \$200 per week. Payments for funeral expenses would be capped at \$2,000.

Another limit was challenged by Rep. Coy Privette, R-Cabarrus, who offered an amendment to delete a provision exempting injuries involving motor vehicles from compensation.

"If we really care about the victims in this state, I think this is a category of victims that ought to be included in the victims' compensation bill," Privette said, citing two cases in his district in which a woman was maimed and a child killed by drunk drivers.

House Panel Backs Court Elections Bill

RALEIGH (AP) — With two lawsuits challenging North Carolina's method for selecting Superior Court judges, the state House is poised to consider a bill to encourage the election of more black judges.

The House Committee on Courts and the Administration of Justice overcame muted Republican objections Tuesday to approve the bill sponsored by Rep. H.M. "Mickey" Michaux, D-Durham. If the bill is enacted, 10 of the state's 73 Superior Court judges would be elected from predominantly black districts.

Lawsuits in North Carolina and

Washington, D.C., allege the current system, in which only one district is mostly black, dilutes minority voting strength.

"This is hopefully to moot the lawsuits," Michaux said. "We felt that this was the least expensive way to go."

Rather than setting up all new districts, the bill would replace eight special Superior Court judge positions filled by the governor with permanent elected positions in areas with high black representation. It also would add one new position in Robeson and Scotland counties.

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
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Congressional Club Appeals for Money

RALEIGH (AP) — The National Congressional Club is telling supporters that it may have to close soon unless conservatives come up with some fast donations.

A mass-mail letter addressed to "Dear Friend" says that unless each recipient sends \$95 by April 24, the club will cease operating. If that happens, the letter says, "the impact on the conservative movement will be catastrophic."

"I hope I can count on you for your full \$95 share right away," says the letter, signed by the club's executive director, R.E. Carter Wrenn. "And if you can give more than \$95 by April 24th, then God bless you! It could make a difference in our keeping the doors open."

Wrenn told the News and Observer of Raleigh Tuesday the club's financial problems stemmed, in part, from this non-election year, during which political fund-raising traditionally is difficult. He said the club was in worse financial shape in 1985 when its debt reached \$1 million. But he said the current situation is critical.

"We are at a point where we've got to raise some money to pay some bills with," Wrenn said.

The four-page letter says the club, the political organization for Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., is \$508,180.34 in debt. But it emphasizes that the debt results not from reckless spending, but from efforts to help more candidates that the organization could afford to support.

The letter lists several conservatives helped by the club, including Sen. Steven Symms, R-Idaho; former Sen. Jeremiah Denton, R-Alabama, and Helms.

"We knew then our debts were mounting, but we couldn't turn our backs on Senator Helms," the letter says.

Wrenn acknowledges Tuesday that the club has laid off staffers recently, but declined to say how many. He also declined to say how many of the letters were mailed.

"The loss of the Congressional Club, God forbid that happened, would be a devastating blow to the conservative cause," said Barry McCarty of Elizabeth City, the club's candidate for state Republican Party chairman. "I don't think conservative people will stand by and let it die. ... I certainly plan to send in a contribution myself now that I know about it."

Robeson Citizens Plan Easter March

LUMBERTON, N.C. (AP) — A Robeson County citizens group will march on the county courthouse Easter Monday to call for better law enforcement and changes in the judicial system in the wake of the shooting death of a Lumbie Indian by a sheriff's deputy.

"I don't have to tell you that there is as great a need here as anywhere on the globe for justice," John Godwin of Pembroke, chairman of Concerned Citizens for Better Government, said at a news conference Monday.

"It's very important that this march be successful. It's the first attempt ever for the citizens of Robeson County to get together and demand justice," he said.

Speakers at the news conference said the march is a response to the county's courtroom practices, unsolved murders and last year's fatal shooting of Jimmy Earl Cummings of Fairmont.

Cummings was shot to death Nov. 1 by Robeson County narcotics agent Kevin Stone when Cummings ran as Stone tried to arrest him on drug charges. Stone, son of Sheriff Hubert Stone, later was cleared of wrongdoing when a coroner's inquest jury ruled that the shooting was an accident and/or self-defense.

Cummings' family members have complained they did not have adequate time to hire a lawyer to represent them at the inquest.

Also speaking at the news conference was Linda Cromartie of St. Pauls, sister of Joyce Sinclair, a black woman found stabbed to death near St. Pauls on Oct. 31, 1985. Mrs. Sinclair was kidnapped from her home by a man earlier that day, authorities said. No arrest has been made in her murder.

"I know that it (the march) won't bring Joyce back, but we want justice done anyway," Mrs. Cromartie said.

Southeast Compact OKs Proposal Aimed At Keeping Members Intact

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — A member of the Southeast Compact Commission says it will be at least a year before a proposed bylaw change could take effect and make it harder for a state to leave the group.

Fred Braswell, an Alabama commissioner who serves on the compact's two-member bylaws committee with the state's other representative, Aubrey Godwin, said it would take that long for legislatures in all eight member states to clear the way for the change.

Braswell and Godwin, meeting Tuesday, approved the proposed amendment to the bylaws of the regional waste disposal group.

The resolution will be discussed at the full commission's May 21 meeting in Oak Ridge, Tenn., Godwin said.

But the commissioners said the change must not take effect until all eight member states and Congress agree to amend the commission's charter, which has legal precedence over the bylaws. It would take at least 12 months for all the state legislatures to approve the change, said Braswell.

The proposed amendment was in response to a vote by the full commission that urged the states to change the charter to make it more difficult for states to leave the compact.

The amendment was proposed by

North Carolina, which has been picked as the first host of a regional facility to dispose of low-level nuclear wastes. Alabama was listed No. 2 in the suitability rankings that led to North Carolina's selection.

Georgia, South Carolina,

Mississippi, Tennessee, Virginia and Florida also are members of the commission.

Currently, all that is needed to remove a state from the compact is approval by its legislature and governor.



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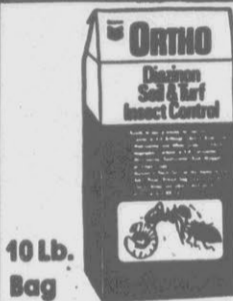
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Two Baking Companies Plead Guilty To Charges They Rigged Bread Prices

GOLDSBORO, N.C. (AP) — Two North Carolina bakeries have been fined more than \$1 million after pleading guilty to charges they rigged bids for bread sales to military bases.

Franklin Baking Co. of Goldsboro was fined \$750,000 and Fox's Holsum Bakery of Wilmington was fined \$300,000, Gloria Dupree, a spokeswoman for U.S. Attorney Sam Currin, said Tuesday.

Franklin Baking Co. was accused of bid-rigging in connection with the sale of bakery products to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, Camp Lejeune Marine Corps Base and the Cherry Point Marine Corps Air Station between 1979 and 1984. The company pleaded guilty March 27, Mrs. Dupree said.

Another count charged that from 1982 until 1984, Franklin Baking Co. participated in a bid-rigging conspiracy for contracts to supply baking products to schools in Johnston and Sampson counties, Mrs. Dupree said.

Fox's Holsum Bakery also was charged with bid-rigging in connection with sales of bakery products to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, Camp Lejeune and Cherry Point from 1979 to 1984, she said.

That company also pleaded guilty March 27, she said.

Jeffrey Butler Franklin, a vice president of the Goldsboro bakery, also pleaded guilty to one count of bid-rigging, Mrs. Dupree said. He is expected to be sentenced next month.

The maximum penalty for the charge against an individual is three

years imprisonment and a \$100,000 fine. For companies charged with violating the Sherman Antitrust Act, the maximum fine is \$1 million, court officials said.

By pleading guilty to the Justice Department's information, Mrs. Dupree said the defendants waived a federal grand jury indictment.

Franklin Baking, in a prepared statement, said it had been the subject of a federal antitrust investigation for two years and had cooperated with the investigation.

"The findings reveal that employees of the company made errors in the past and that these errors formed the basis of the charges to which the company has pleaded guilty," the company said.

"Franklin Baking Co. Inc. deeply

regrets that they occurred and apologizes for them. The company is determined that such mistakes shall not be made in the future and has taken steps to ensure that they will not," the company said.

Charles F. Rule, acting assistant U.S. attorney general in charge of the antitrust division, said the information against the defendants followed an extensive grand jury investigation of alleged bid-rigging and price fixing in North Carolina.

Rule said the investigation was continuing.

Tommy Jarrett, an attorney for Franklin Baking, declined specific comment on the case, but said most companies lack in-depth knowledge of the Sherman Antitrust Act.

"Unless one is fully aware of the law, and all of its consequences, it is a relatively easy matter to slip into situations where the law is violated," he said.

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State To Try Upshur Again

DURHAM (AP) — An assistant district attorney prosecuting Nathaniel Mark Upshur says the trial, which ended in a mistrial Monday, could end up costing \$100,000 — and that doesn't count the emotional costs.

Superior Court Judge E. Lynn Johnson declared the mistrial after jury foreman George Farmer admitted he discussed the case with co-workers after the jury had begun its deliberations. A new trial has been ordered, but not yet scheduled.

"I wouldn't be at all surprised if we're not talking about \$100,000 or so for the whole thing," Assistant District Attorney Michael Nifong told the Durham Morning Herald.

Nifong also talked about the emotional costs of the proceeding.

"How do you measure them?" he asked. "I don't know how. There's just no way. There are a lot of emotional costs that are really hard to quantify. But I can tell you they were high. It was a tremendous emotional strain to do this case."

Nifong said, for example, that he received only three or four hours of sleep each night during the two weeks of jury selection and he had muscle spasms from tension during the jury selection.

Upshur, 17, is accused in the Nov. 16, 1985, rape and slaying of Elizabeth Wilson and the stabbing of her 7-year-old daughter, Karen.

Richard Wilson, husband of Elizabeth Wilson and father of Karen Wilson, agreed with Nifong that the emotional costs of the trial were high.

"It was a tremendously difficult experience to go through," he said Tuesday. "I think it really tested Karen to testify. It was just draining."

And Wilson expressed frustration about the mistrial and the fact that the proceeding will have to be repeated.

"It makes me incredibly angry that I'll have to go through the whole trial again," he said. "We were hoping to put the whole thing behind us and have a resolution. The mistrial was bizarre. Karen doesn't want to testify again. But I think we're both prepared to do what we have to do in the future."

The mistrial followed about a week of hearings for pre-trial motions, two weeks of jury selection, four days of testimony and three hours of jury deliberation.

Upshur's trial was costly, officials said, because of the length of the trial, and because the teen-ager's two lawyers — Bill Cotter and Robert Mahler — were court-appointed.

Cotter said Tuesday that he put about 500 hours into the case.

Dallas Cameron of the Administrative Office of the Courts said Cotter conceivably could receive as much as \$50 per hour for a maximum of \$25,000. The actual fee will be set by the trial judge.

The attorneys have not yet reported the total numbers of hours

spent on the case.

The court also paid a large amount in jury fees, which included money to each of the 70 prospective jurors questioned before a seven-woman, five-man jury was impaneled. Defense expert witness testimony also was paid for by court funds.

Ban Rejected

TAYLORSVILLE, N.C. (AP) — The Alexander County Board of Education has rejected a parent's request to remove two books from county school libraries.

A move by board member Roger Payne to remove the award-winning books "Angel Dust Blues" and "Run, Shelley, Run!" from Alexander Central High School and East Junior High School died Tuesday for lack of a second.

"According to our board's policy, the only valid reason that a book can be removed from a school library is that based on legitimate educational criteria," said board Vice Chairman Guy Kerley, who chaired a subcommittee examining books.

Marine Slaying

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) — A Marine Corps officer and his wife were stabbed to death at their home on the base, and another Marine was being questioned about the slayings, military authorities said.

The victims, 1st Lt. James F. Lotz, 28, and his wife, Joan M. Lotz, 28, of Scranton, Pa., said Lt. Col. David Tomsky, director of the base Joint Public Affairs office.

No charges had been filed. Naval Investigative Service agents discovered the victims' bodies Tuesday morning after a car belonging to the couple was involved in a traffic accident on U.S. 17 near Jacksonville.

Superintendent

ASHEBORO, N.C. (AP) — Bob W. Gordon, a Thomasville native with 22 years in education, has been named superintendent of Asheboro city schools.

Gordon, 56, superintendent of Vance County schools for the past three years, agreed to a four-year contract, beginning July 1. He replaces Duane Mattheis, who resigned Jan. 1 after a contract dispute.

Busts Stolen

KILL DEVIL HILLS, N.C. (AP) — Orville and Wilbur Wright are missing again.

Busts of the brothers were reported missing Tuesday from the Wright Brothers National Memorial at Kill Devil Hills, site of the brothers' historic flight.

A worker noticed Monday that the busts were missing, but told officials he didn't report the disappearance until a day later because he thought they had been moved for maintenance.

It's the second time the busts of Wilbur and Orville have disappeared. The busts were stolen in July 1985, but were recovered and the culprit arrested after a resident tipped off police.

Authorities report no leads in the latest theft.

Rabies

YANCEYVILLE, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina had 10 cases of rabies last year, far fewer than surrounding states, but concern about rabies has Caswell County officials worried about stray animals.

"It's only a matter of time before it gets to North Carolina, and Caswell County in particular," said Mitch Foster, a veterinarian at Carolina-Virginia Animal Hospital. "North Carolina is extremely lucky it hasn't had a real problem yet."

According to statistics furnished by Nancy Garrett of the state Environmental Epidemiology Branch, South Carolina had 61 confirmed cases of rabies last year, while Georgia had 202, Tennessee had 152 and Virginia had 200.

President

GREENSBORO (AP) — Dr. William B. DeLauder, dean of the school of arts and sciences at North Carolina A&T, has been named president of Delaware State College, the school announced Tuesday.

DeLauder, 49, will succeed Dr. Luna I. Mishoe, who will retire on June 30.

DeLauder came to A&T in 1971 as an associate professor of chemistry, later serving as acting chairman and chairman of the department of chemistry. He was named dean of the school of arts and sciences in 1981.

Winter Costs

RALEIGH (AP) — State highway officials say it cost a record amount of money to remove snow and ice from North Carolina's streets and highways this winter and spring.

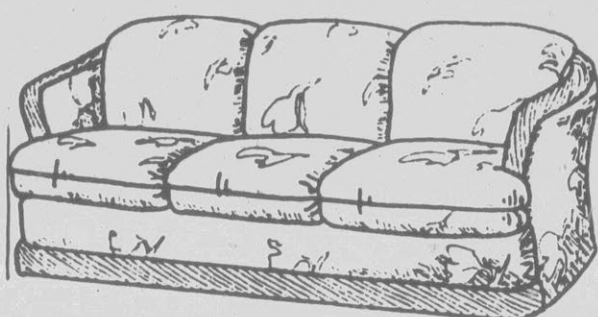

The mixture formed a hard crust of ice on roads that was difficult and expensive to remove.

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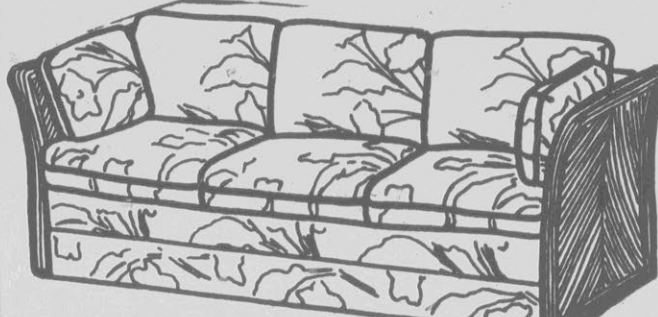


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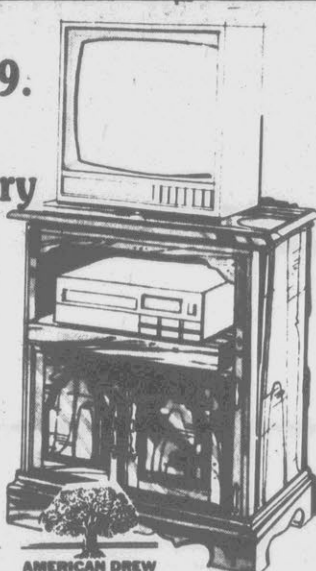
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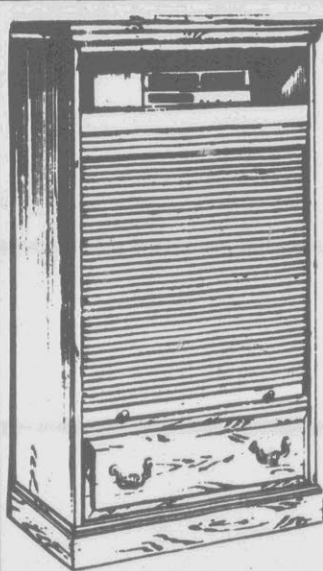
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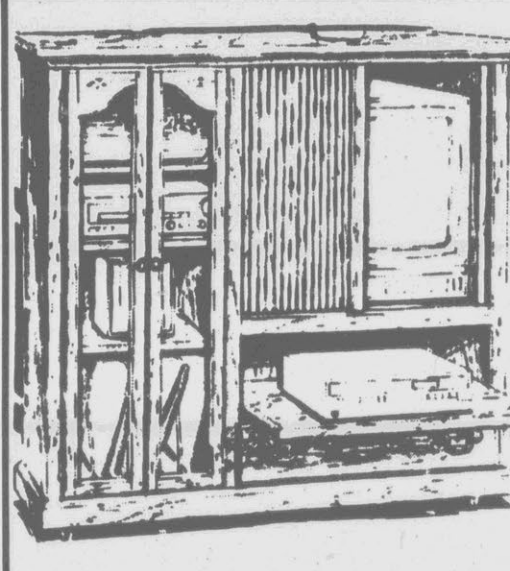
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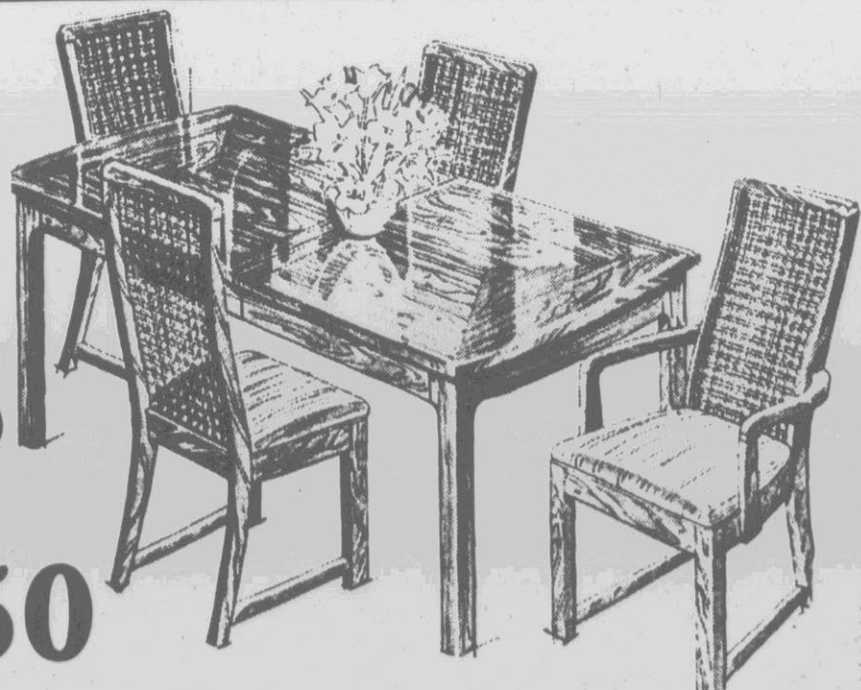
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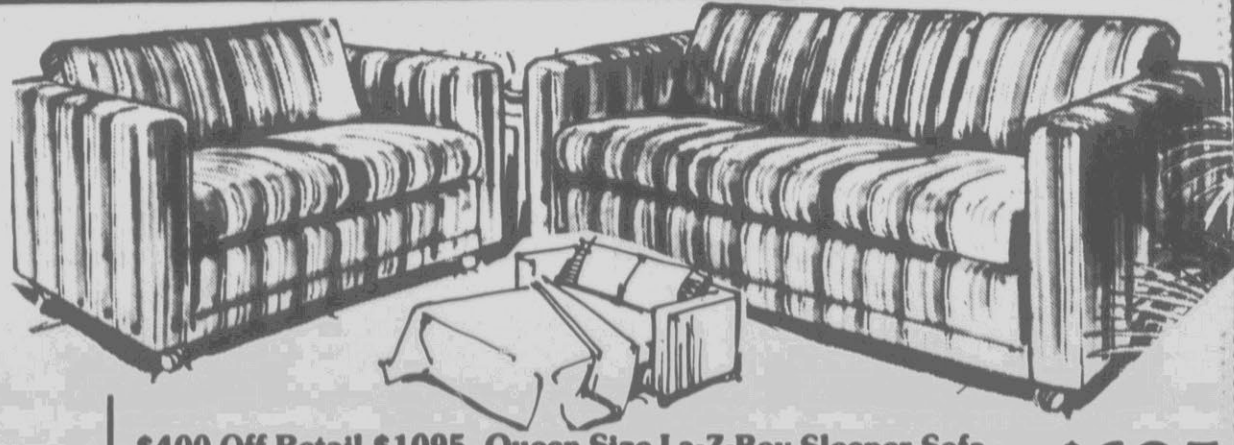
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Workers Clean Up Chemical Spills In Utah, Indiana

Workers today cleaned up a 2,000-gallon chemical spill in Utah that killed one person and forced 1,000 from a 2-square-mile area, while 1,000 evacuees in Gary, Ind., have been allowed to return after containment of an acid leak.

Gary Mayor Richard G. Hatcher said Tuesday questions remained about whether company officials waited too long to notify authorities following the leak, which critically injured one person and sent 92 others to hospitals.

Fumes from both accidents have dissipated, authorities said.

Residents of four evacuated homes in North Salt Lake, Utah, returned

Tuesday and workers were expected back on the job today at the 30 businesses closed after the spill, Mayor DeWayne Simmons said.

However, it may take a day or two to clean up all the spilled trichloroethane, a solvent used in liquid resins, at Hodson Laboratories Inc., said South Davis Fire Chief Brent Argyle.

"The solvent has impregnated the carpet and walls," he said.

The chemical ate into a concrete floor and flowed into an alley behind the building. Workers plugged a drain to prevent it from leaking into the sewer system and built an earthen berm around the 50- by 70-foot building.

Crews used a vacuum truck and absorbent material in the cleanup, said Richard Harvey, Davis County environmental health director.

James Lee Hodson, the plant manager of the family-owned business who was killed in the accident, was alone in the plant when the chemical gushed from a broken pipe, said Owen Hogle, Hodson's executive vice president.

Hodson arrived early to take a shipment of trichloroethane and apparently was transferring the new solvent from one tank to another when "an elbow ruptured on a holding tank," Hogle said.

"With just 15 seconds of exposure,

you can become unconscious," Hogle said.

Six people, including two paramedics and a North Salt Lake police officer, were hospitalized briefly.

In Gary, Hatcher lifted an evacuation order Tuesday afternoon, nearly eight hours after a hydrochloric acid spill caused about 1,000 people, in-

cluding students at two public schools, to flee the area around an industrial cleaning products company.

One person was hospitalized in critical condition, at least one other was held overnight for observation, and the others were treated for minor

respiratory complaints and released, hospital spokesmen said.

Hatcher said the spill at Gary Products Co. apparently was discovered Monday night by a company worker who failed in an attempt to stop the leak. City authorities were not notified until Tuesday morning, Hatcher said.

Suspected LSD Dealer Sets Off Bomb In Courthouse

KOKOMO, Ind. (AP) — A man who set off a bomb in a briefcase, apparently killing himself and injuring 15 people during a break in his drug trial, told his mother he dreaded the four 100-year prison terms he could have faced.

Robert Gray, 42, charged with two counts of dealing a controlled substance, LSD, was "believed to be dead" in the blast Tuesday in the sheriff's office at the Howard County courthouse, said county prosecutor James Andrews.

The prosecutor, however, refused further comment on Gray's fate, as did other law enforcement officers.

Among the injured were Gray's lawyer, Charles Scruggs, who was hospitalized in fair condition, and Sheriff John Beatty, who was in serious but stable condition with burns over 40 percent of his body and other injuries.

the trailer, said Grant County Sheriff Ron Mowery.

However, a state police bomb squad found only four "dummy sticks" resembling dynamite connected to a timing device, said sheriff's Sgt. John Lawson. Deputies also found two water pistols resembling machine guns.

"We believe someone occupied the house earlier in the evening and left these as a prank," Lawson added.

Officials also evacuated parts of the Chrysler Corp. transmission plant where Gray worked in Kokomo, and searched for explosives in the plant lockers used by Gray and his girlfriend, Andrews said. He did not identify the girlfriend or say if she was a suspect.

Gray was carrying the briefcase

when he returned for the afternoon session of his trial and went into the sheriff's office to confer with Scruggs, Andrews said, adding that authorities had "some concern about that briefcase."

Scruggs said he had just asked Gray to go out in the hall to talk about what was in the briefcase when Gray said, "Let's just end it here," according to Bob Shirley, a friend of the lawyer.

Gray was seated across the desk from the sheiff, with the case between his ankles, when the explosion occurred. He reached down and flipped a toggle switch on the case, Shirley said Scruggs told him.

The building sustained substantial interior damage on the floor where the blast occurred, Andrews said.

The others injured, including two police officers, were listed in good or fair condition, or were treated and released.

Scruggs said he saw Gray reach down to flip a switch on the briefcase at the time of the explosion, a friend of the lawyer said.

Gray's mother, Betty McKinley of Marion, said he told her he could not bear to think of spending a long time in jail. But she was mystified as to why he may have detonated the bomb.

"I don't have an idea about what went through my son's head," she said.

Police later evacuated about 50 people from a three-block area surrounding Gray's mobile home in Marion, 25 miles away, for about six hours and found "live bombs" inside

Judge Says X-Cars Safe

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge, rejecting a proposed fine and recall of 1.1 million General Motors cars, said consumer complaints that the vehicles tend to skid and swerve dangerously were only "anecdotal accounts."

U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson on Tuesday ruled against the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration in a suit alleging that GM's 1980 X-cars contained a design defect linked to 1,417 accidents, including 18 fatalities and 400 injuries.

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Home Mortgages End Long Slide As Interest Rates Climb Steadily

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mortgage interest rates appear to have hit bottom and begun climbing again, but industry economists express hope the rise will be modest and rates will stabilize at near 10 percent or below.

The Veterans Administration led the surge late last week, boosting its fixed-rate, 30-year mortgage from 8.5 percent to 9.5 percent, the first time since August 1983 that the VA has imposed a full percentage point increase at one time.

About the same time, the Federal

Home Loan Mortgage Corp. said its survey of market rates showed average fixed-rate mortgages at 9.27 percent in late March, up from 9.07 percent a week earlier. These rates do not include the add-on financing charge called points.

The increases stem a long slide. Fixed-rate mortgages hit their lowest level in nine years in early March, averaging an effective rate of 9.48 percent when adjusted for points, according to the Federal Home Loan Bank Board.

But economists for industry trade organizations said the VA hike does

not necessarily presage a major increase in the cost of home loans.

"It is possible we are looking at a momentary market aberration that could be partially reversed," said John A. Tuccillo, chief economist for the National Association of Realtors. "We expect mortgage interest rates to remain stable for the rest of the year," with quoted rates averaging about 9 percent.

Martin Regalia of the National Council of Savings Institutions noted that VA loans carried a high number of points, and those are expected to decline now that the interest rate has

gone higher. When that is accounted for, he said, the VA increase is "not quite as onerous as would be suggested."

But Regalia and others also said the mortgage rates have bottomed out, meaning the only way they can move is up.

"If anyone's been sitting on the sidelines waiting for the rates to hit bottom, they just missed it," said Mark Obrinsky of the U.S. League of Savings Institutions.

"On the other hand, you shouldn't start to panic," he added. While the trend is up, he said, "it's going to bounce around" and should stabilize between 9.5 percent and 10 percent.

Bond Denies He Has Used Cocaine, But Refuses Test

ATLANTA (AP) — Veteran civil rights activist Julian Bond described reporters as "sharks in the water" and complained bitterly about coverage of his wife's allegation, since recanted, that he used cocaine.

"I've never used cocaine. Never at all," Bond said on a radio talk show Tuesday.

At a news conference earlier, the former state senator said he was satisfied with his estranged wife's retraction of her allegation to police. "As far as we are concerned, the matter is closed," he said.

He said he had "not committed or been charged with any crime" and pledged cooperation with a federal grand jury which, according to news reports, is interested in the matter.

However, Bond vowed he would not take a drug test. "I think it's a real

invasion of my privacy, as this whole thing has been," he said on the talk show.

"First, this involves a domestic dispute. And that's, although typically not for the Atlanta newspapers, but that's good newspaper fare ...

"Secondly, it involves drugs, and particularly the magic drug of today, cocaine. That's on everybody's lips and far too many people's noses and it's a hot subject today. ...

"Then there's hint of some police impropriety and there are black political figures involved. So mix all this together and these people become like sharks in the water. There's blood and they're after it," he said.

Alice Bond has been separated for six months from her husband of 25

years. On March 19, she walked into the city police narcotics unit, and told officers her husband was abusing cocaine, according to a confidential police memorandum cited in reports by Atlanta television stations, The Atlanta Journal and The Atlanta Constitution.

She also named other prominent Atlantans as users or suppliers of the drug, but their names were not disclosed.

Bond, a founder of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee in the 1960s, served 20 years in the Georgia Legislature before retiring last fall to run for Congress. He lost to his longtime civil rights colleague, John Lewis.

Households Smaller

WASHINGTON (AP) — The typical American household is less crowded than ever before, with the number of people in each home less than half what it was in the mid-19th century.

The average household as of July 1, 1986, included 2.67 people, an all-time low, the U.S. Census Bureau reported Tuesday.

That was down from an average of 2.76 people in 1980, and fewer than half the 5.55 people in the average 1850 household.

Shrinking household size has attracted considerable attention in recent years, and the shift reflects changes both in the age pattern and social activities of the American people, said Census Bureau population expert Campbell Gibson.

The presence of children in a population tends to increase household size, Gibson observed, while a larger share of adults generally results in people going off on their own and setting up smaller, independent households.

Puppeteer Follows In Footsteps Of Father And Mother

YELLOW SPRINGS, Ohio (AP) — Puppets have been a source of pleasure and sometimes resentment in Jim Rose's life. But they always have been more than just child's play.

Rose, 53, is the son of Rufus and Margo Rose, whose best-known marionette was Howdy Doody. Rose continues the family tradition with a one-man show — Antioch Puppet Theater.

"I cut my teeth on puppet legs, literally," he said. "Puppetry is a natural to me because I was weaned on the stuff, so they don't seem cute and mysterious to me."

His first performance was in a puppet version of "Rip Van Winkle" at age 10.

Rose's artistry goes beyond puppets to a general love for theater in almost any form, especially its technical aspects.

"Audience is my first love," Rose said, and puppets are his props. "I am very much tuned in to creating a character in my puppets which is appealing to an audience."

It might have been easy for Rose to follow in the footsteps of his parents with the Rufus Rose Marionettes. But Rose said his years at a New London, Conn., high school, where there were three drama coaches on the faculty, had shown him the value of teaching, not just performing.

Rose's roots are here. His father attended Antioch College in the 1930s as a business major and met his mother, Margo Skewis, at a Tony Sarg puppet show in Xenia. She worked with the troupe as a painter and sculptor.

They later formed the Professional Puppeteers of America, which will celebrate its 50th anniversary this summer in Cincinnati.

Rose graduated from Antioch in 1956, then got a master of fine arts degree from Yale. His goal always was to return to Antioch to teach; he was chairman of the Antioch theater department from 1965 until it was dissolved in 1984.

Rose also performs in the Drama Trio, a group specializing in dramatic readings, and has had parts in Antioch stage productions.

His favorite marionette is Pepito, a 14-year-old boy who is a 15th-century entertainer. Rose describes him as an orphan who does not speak, primarily so Rose, who often walks Pepito in street fairs, can get the audience to concentrate on the marionette and its winsome smile.

As Rose manipulates Pepito's 18 strings, the marionette seems so lifelike one wants to reach out and shake its hand.

"I don't know if it's an extension of myself. I know that I make use of feelings and experiences I have" in designing the puppets, Rose said.

He says he has designed between 50 and 100 puppets, mostly marionettes, and finds them to be "a marvelous combination of theater arts," including painting and sculpting.

In many ways, Rose's least-favorite puppet is Howdy Doody.

The freckle-faced television star of the 1950s was created by Frank Paris. But when Paris left and took his creation with him, NBC in 1952 asked Rufus and Margo Rose to recreate the figure and most of the other characters.

Their Howdy Doody is the one most people remember, Rose said. The show gave his parents enough money to help put him through college, but Rose also admits resentment.

"My first experience with that was to disclaim it as just for kids ... nothing but sound and noise," he said. "I've always been thought of by people who write articles as the son of Howdy Doody."

But he rejects the notion that puppetry is only for children, or is only an obscure part of theater.

"I think if we judge puppetry by a rather narrow scale of whether it sells on TV, we're imposing our concepts on it. It's a prejudicial question," he said.

To look at puppetry as child's play is to deride the importance of puppetry as an ancient art and the importance of children, he said.

"In my view there is no distinction to be made between a child and an adult," Rose said.

Dear Pat: I have lost my favorite crochet lace directions. Will you please send me the directions for making the laces called Mile a Minute and Two Miles a Minute? — Loretta P., Jacksonville, Fla.

I've received several requests recently for these directions, so I will repeat my earlier column on this crochet trim, which is a tried-and-true favorite with many of you.

Dear Pat: I was crocheting lace today and showed it to my grand-

mother. She told me you had written about a lace trim called Mile a Minute. She said mine was faster, and I decided to call it Two Miles a Minute lace.

I chain 6, insert hook in the next chain, yarnover and pull yarn through. I leave that yarn loop on the hook and pull up loops in all the rest of the chains (as you do in afghan stitch). Then I yarnover and pull the hook through all the loops and single crochet in top of last stitch.

Just keep doing that until the strip is as long as you wish. I will be 10 years old on Sept. 2 — Kari Pankey, Greensboro, N.C.

Kari must be 14 by now, and I hope she is still crocheting and creating new stitches. I again thank her for sharing her stitch with us.

How many variations of the traditional Mile a Minute trim there are, I do not know, but here are two versions for you to try:

Row 1: Chain 4 and make a single crochet in the 4th chain from the hook; chain 2 and make 2 double crochets in the same space where the 2 double crochets are made.

Row 2: Chain 3 stitches, turn your work. In the chain-2 space made on the previous row, work 1 single crochet, chain 2 and work 2 double crochets in the same chain-2 space. Repeat row 2 over and over until the trim is the desired length.

Another version of Mile a Minute I have used for many years is worked along an edge of single crochet stitches. With the yarn attached at the beginning of a row of single crochet, chain 7 stitches. Work 1 double crochet in the 4th chain from the hook and work another double crochet in the same single crochet where you started the chain of 7 stitches. Then, skip 3 single crochets, and, in the next single crochet stitch, work 1

double crochet, chain 4, 1 double crochet in the same single crochet stitch. Repeat the steps given in the last sentence all along the edge to be trimmed.

As the names would indicate, each of these trims works up quickly and easily once you become familiar with the pattern.

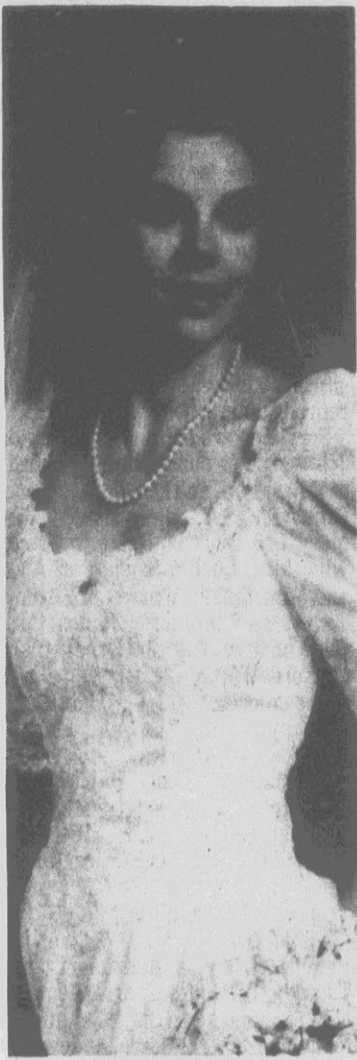

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Hat Designer Bucks Trend

NEW YORK (AP) — To Marsha Akins, Popeye Doyle is about as cool as they come.

So cool, in fact, that Doyle, the New York City detective who broke the French Connection heroin case, and his scrunched-down porkpie hat set the theme for Ms. Akins' newest line of men's headwear.

Ms. Akins designs hats, and in a time when men's fashion hats have been replaced by baseball caps touting broods, beer and booze, she's one of the bright spots in men's upscale headwear.

For an industry that reached its highwater mark in the 1910s, that's no mean feat.

Fashion hatters across the nation sold about 36 million items a year in that decade. Now only several million are sold annually, according to Roy Langenberg, a headwear industry specialist and the owner of Langenberg Hat Co. of Washington, Miss., the oldest hat company in the United States.

Indeed, only 20 percent of the \$1 billion spent last year for hats went to the fashion end, he said.

"Fashion hats have become a costume. It's no longer part of your wardrobe," said Jack Hyde, head of the Menswear Design and Marketing Department at New York's Fashion Institute of Technology. "The big kick in the pants came at the end of World War II. All those GIs came home, and none of them wore hats."

The 1960s further added to the downfall with its focus on long hair.

"Who was going to notice all those golden locks if you hid them under a hat?" Hyde asked.

Americans moved further away from fashion headwear in the 1970s and '80s as the nation's leisure time expanded, Langenberg said.

"Outdoorsmen's hats, backpacking hats, tennis hats — those are the things that sell," Langenberg said. "Fancy hats, fashion hats are a thing of the past."

But Ms. Akins has bucked the trend. Using high-quality goods and

classic designs with a modern twist, Ms. Akins has carved a niche in "fashion-forward" wear for the head.

"It's frivolous. Hats are just frivolous," said Ms. Akins. "I used to think, 'How am I going to change the world making hats?' But I'm doing my bit."

Ms. Akins started her Makins Hats Co. in September 1974 in a dingy, fourth-floor, walk-up apartment in Manhattan's East 20s, using an unemployment check of \$90 as her first investment.

"I'd get up when the quiz shows started on TV, around 10. And when 'Give Us This Day' rolled around at about 6 in the morning, I'd lay down," she said. "But I was young, in my 20s, and when you want something bad you just do it."

Her days were filled with steam, hat blocks, felt and leather. She used her oven to bake the hats and a hock-shop sewing machine to stitch them.

"It was Indian summer when I started. It was 90 degrees outside and 190 inside," she said. "I lost a lot of weight."

After two months of hustling, the orders began coming in. By December of that year, she had her first factory.

Three years later she won a now-defunct COTY American Fashion Critics Award "for injecting excitement into the long-dormant category of men's headwear." In 1983, she won a Cutty Sark Fashion Award for accessory designing.

Her hats are all hand-made, pulled and stretched over a wood block by skilled craftsmen, with each one slightly different than the next.

"I train my employees, try and teach them a craft. We work a lot with ex-convicts and poorer folks. That's where I can have a little effect," said the former political activist and self-described "child of the '60s."

From the little apartment in the East 20s, Makins Hats has grown to a company of 17 employees, with hats featured in Bloomingdale's, Marshall Fields, Nieman Marcus and

Bergdorf Goodman, among other retail outlets.

Ms. Akins wouldn't reveal how much she makes, "but it's enough to keep me happy in my nine-room West Side co-op."

Makins' newest line, a series of about a dozen black hats, takes its inspiration from Popeye Doyle, the after hours clubs in Harlem in the 1960s and the French "film noir" movement. It evokes an urban melancholy of rain-soaked alleyways and men in dark coats smoking cigarettes under street lamps.

There are porkpies, fedoras and berets, in soft fur felt, retailing from \$45 to \$75 each.

"The future in hats is here," she said, pointing to the collection. "It's not in baseball caps. If hats are going to survive, they've got to evolve."

"I make the hats to go with people's personality," she said. "They're mood setters. My customers grow very attached to them."

SCHRAMM NAMED

WASHINGTON (AP) — Carl J. Schramm of Johns Hopkins University has been elected president of the Health Insurance Association of America.

The association's directors named Schramm to succeed retiring James L. Moorefield on May 4.

The association represents some 335 commercial insurance companies that underwrite about 60 percent of the health insurance sold in the United States.

For the past seven years, Schramm has directed the Johns Hopkins Center for Hospital Finance and Management, a "think tank" that he founded.

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Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices advanced strongly in early trading today.

At 10 a.m., the Dow Jones industrial average stood at 2,261.96, up 28.98 points. In the previous four sessions, the closely watched index had lost 219.18 points.

Gainers outpaced losers by almost 5-to-1, with 1,006 issues up, 218 down and 329 unchanged.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange totaled 36.84 million shares. On Tuesday, 266.54 million shares changed hands, the heaviest trading since Jan. 23, when volume hit a record 302.39 shares.

The plunging dollar; the swelling trade deficit; rising interest rates; worries over escalating trade tensions and fears of resurgent inflation had been undermining the market's confidence in recent days.

But just the same, some positive signs were pointing to a stronger performance as today's session began.

In the last half-hour Tuesday, the market had shaved off about 30 points from what had been a 65-point deficit, suggesting that at least a short-term floor had been reached.

Also, U.S. stocks were sharply higher in European trading overnight, as the dollar, which plummeted Tuesday, rebounded against most major currencies.

In New York, bond prices were also sharply higher in early trading.

By 10 a.m., the New York Stock Exchange's index of all its listed issues stood at 160.29, up 1.96.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 1.55 at 827.66.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials fell 34.09 points to 2,252.98, hard on the heels of Monday's 51.71-point loss.

Losing issues outnumbered gainers by about 10-to-1, with 1,646 issues down, 163 up and 203 unchanged.

The NYSE's composite index fell 3.83 points to 158.31. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was down 7.97 at 326.11.

taken to the brig at Quantico. The Associated Press reported last week that at least one other Marine guard had become the subject of "intense questioning" by military investigators.

Pentagon sources said today that the Marine, who had worked previously in Brasilia and then recalled to the United States. But the sources added that he had not been moved to Quantico; was still being questioned, and had not been arrested as yet.

"When we have someone who we want to charge, we'll arrest him," said Sims. "And we haven't made any more arrests."

Besides Lonetree and Bracy, the Marine Corps has charged one other Marine with espionage — Sgt. John J. Weirich, who worked as a guard at the U.S. consulate in Leningrad in 1981 and 1982.

On Tuesday, the Pentagon announced that four guards formerly stationed in communist-bloc countries were being recalled from Austria for questioning about alleged fraternization with residents of Warsaw Pact countries.

Earlier, the Pentagon said it was recalling for questioning the entire 20-man guard detachment in Moscow and the six-man unit posted to Leningrad.

Meanwhile, The New York Times reported today that the Marine Corps is having trouble gathering evidence to prosecute Lonetree and Bracy. Officials not identified in the story were cited as saying the Reagan administration was divided over whether to give immunity from prosecution to the two guards.

secution to Bracy to improve its case against Lonetree.

Sims declined to comment on that report, saying the pre-trial hearings that resumed today would decide the adequacy of the government's case.

A news blackout was in effect for Lonetree's hearing, which got underway at 9 a.m. EDT. Lonetree's attorneys said earlier, however, that they expected the Marine Corps to call several witnesses against their client.

The hearing is part of what is known as an Article 32 investigation, which is similar to a grand jury hearing in the civilian legal system. A military hearing officer, Maj. Robert J. Nourie, must review the adequacy of the evidence against Lonetree. Bracy's Article 32 investigation is to begin on Thursday.

Nourie must recommend to the commanding general at Quantico whether Lonetree should be court-martialed and, if so, whether he should be tried on all charges filed by the Marine Corps.

Lonetree's pre-trial hearing was recessed last month following the corps' decision to increase the number of charges against him. Those new charges — bringing the total to 24 counts — disclosed that investigators now believe Lonetree and another guard allowed Soviet agents inside the Moscow embassy on "numerous occasions" last year.

He told the group he had told Reagan in a telephone conversation Tuesday evening that he would be meeting them.

"He sends you his best wishes," Shultz said. "You are always on our minds."

He also visited the grave of Soviet writer Boris Pasternak and had lunch at the U.S. Embassy with several Soviet intellectuals.

Radio Moscow this morning called Gorbachev's proposals "new ideas" but said the United States didn't seem interested in taking advantage of them.

On Tuesday night, Tass quoted Gorbachev as virtually daring the Reagan administration to take Moscow up on its offer.

"What are you afraid of?" the agency quoted Gorbachev as saying. "We are for a reliable agreement with the most stringent and all-bracing control."

Gorbachev "expressed the readiness to record an agreement on medium-range missiles (including) the Soviet Union's obligation to eliminate its shorter-range missiles within a relatively short and clearly defined time frame," Tass said.

The offer covers short-range Soviet SS-12 and SS-23 missiles deployed in Czechoslovakia and East Germany.

Regarding Star Wars, the U.S. program for developing a space-based missile defense formally called the Strategic Defense Initiative, Tass today quoted Gorbachev as saying, "We look for compromise decisions."

It said Gorbachev wanted Star Wars research restricted to laboratories and proposed the two sides draw up a list of devices that would be barred from testing in space.

Reagan has rejected previous Soviet demands to limit Star Wars testing to laboratories.

In Santa Barbara, Calif., where Reagan is vacationing, deputy White House press secretary Dan Howard said: "I can say that the ideas presented in Tass are interesting and we would take them seriously if true." He said any such proposal must be discussed with NATO allies.

The issue of short-range missiles,

which have a range of 350 to 600 miles, has been a sticking point in negotiations to eliminate the superpowers' medium-range missiles in Europe, a goal shared by both Moscow and Washington. Medium-range missiles have a range of 600 to 3,000 miles.

The Tass account said Shultz insisted on the U.S. right to deploy short-range missiles to match those that would remain in the western Soviet Union. Washington has no short-range missiles deployed in Europe, though the West Germans have 71.

The Soviets have 130 short-range missiles in East Germany, Czechoslovakia and the western Soviet Union.

The Soviet news agency also said Gorbachev was prepared to eliminate battlefield tactical missiles. The two sides have thousands of such weapons with ranges of up to 350 miles.

Tass charged, "The U.S. leadership is practically unprepared to act vigorously, to go its part of the way."

Shultz, in a 4 1/2-hour meeting with Gorbachev, delivered a new invitation from Reagan to go to Washington for a summit meeting this year. But Gorbachev stressed that any summit should produce solid results, saying: "This cannot be just a stroll."

Terrel said no one was injured in the incident, which is under investigation by the police department and the FBI.

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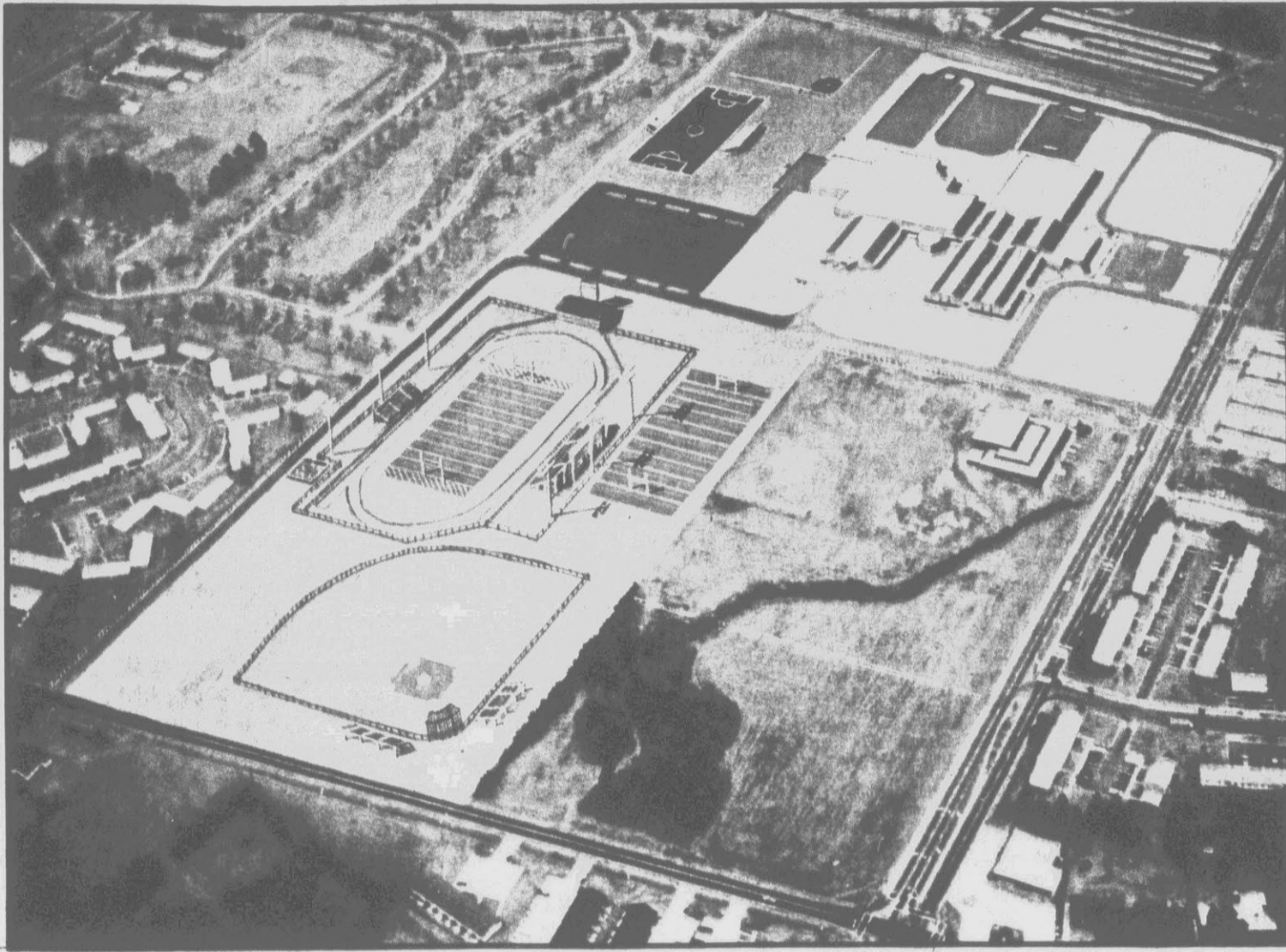

Pedro Guerrero's back, the Los Angeles relievers are back and so are the Dodgers.

Guerrero, who was out of the starting lineup for four games as Los Angeles lost its first five, hit a pair of two-out RBI singles, including the game-winning in the 12th inning, as the Dodgers rallied for a 3-2 victory over the Houston Astros on Tuesday night.

"We needed this game," Guerrero said. "It was important for us, especially with Mike Scott pitching (tonight)."

It was the fourth consecutive victory for the Dodgers after their 0-4 start, which saw their relief pitchers falter.

But in two victories over Houston, Brian Holton allowed only one run in five innings on Monday night and the Dodgers' relief corps shut out the Astros for the final seven innings on Tuesday, including the last two by Tom Niedenfuer, 1-0.

"Write something nice about the relief pitchers," Manager Tom Lasorda said. "It was a pretty good game for them to win. I'm happy not only with the fact that we won the game, but everyone contributed. Niedenfuer pitched with his heart and his arm. He got out of a lot of jams."

In other NL games, it was New York 7, Philadelphia 5; Cincinnati 6, Atlanta 3; Montreal 9, St. Louis 4,

and San Francisco 3, San Diego 2.

Mariano Duncan opened the 12th with a walk off loser Charlie Kerfeld, 0-1, and was sacrificed to second by Dave Anderson. Ken Landreaux was walked intentionally before Duncan advanced to third on a fly ball by Alex Trevino.

Guerrero, who had singled in the tying run in the eighth inning, then laced Kerfeld's first pitch into center field for the game-winning hit.

When Guerrero left the field after the hit, he and Kerfeld exchanged words, and it appeared for a moment that a fight might break out.

"I've got no respect for him anymore," Kerfeld said. "It might come back to haunt him. I don't know what his problem is."

"All he's got to do is get me out," Guerrero said of Kerfeld. "I don't know what he was saying. He wanted to fight. The pitch (that won the game) was a fastball right where I wanted it."

Houston starter Danny Darwin took a four-hit shutout into the eighth inning, but the Dodgers rallied for two runs to tie the game.

Darwin hit Duncan with a pitch and then balked him to second before Steve Sax doubled to make it 2-1. Sax then came home on Guerrero's first single.

"Hitting Duncan was the turning point of the game," Astros Manager Hal Lanier said.

Bill Doran's first homer gave the Astros a 2-0 lead in the fifth.

English became the 16th leading all-time career scorer in NBA history late in the first half. English now has 19,199 points and surpassed Gail Goodrich to move into 16th place.

Denver, leading 61-60 at halftime, outscored the Trail Blazers 17-3 to start the third period, but Portland cut the deficit to 94-85 late in the third period. Evans then ignited Denver on a 30-8 run with nine consecutive points.

"We never really established ourselves tonight," Portland Coach

Mike Schuler said. "Denver was going for that playoff spot and, my God, they really wanted it. They just did what they wanted to. I was very impressed with Denver's efforts."

The Blazers, who have the third-best record in the Western Conference and probably will play Golden State in the first round, were led by 29 points from Clyde Drexler and 23 from Kiki Vandeweghe.

"The Nuggets are a good basketball team, and in a short series, they can beat everyone and anyone," Vandeweghe said. "To beat the Lakers, they'll have to play like they did tonight."

Phoenix was eliminated from playoff consideration although Larry Nance scored 35 points and Walter Davis 27 in the Suns' victory over Sacramento.

Robbie, McCallum Get Different Orders

WASHINGTON (AP) — The professional football career of Los Angeles Raiders running back Napoleon McCallum will temporarily end on orders of the new head of the U.S. Navy, where McCallum holds the rank of ensign.

But Navy Secretary James H. Webb Jr. did say on Tuesday he would retain a different kind of commitment to Midshipman David Robinson, the All-American basketball star who Webb said has become

too tall to perform regular Navy duties.

Webb, who was sworn in last Friday, said in a statement he would insist that graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy fulfill their responsibilities as naval officers on a full-time basis, without expecting special arrangements or duty assignments that would allow them to participate in professional athletics.

Under Webb's ruling, McCallum, who played pro football for the Raiders on weekends last season after breaking 26 records for the academy, likely will be unable to play again until after he finishes his required five years of active duty.

"Secretary Webb does not foresee Ensign McCallum participating in professional athletics without special accommodation," the Navy said in a statement. "And he will be treated the same as his peers."

Webb said, however, he would honor the commitment given to Robinson.

Webb's predecessor, John F. Lehman, had ruled that Robinson had grown too tall during his four years at the academy to serve as an "unrestricted line" officer and thus would be expected to serve only two years of active duty. Robinson, a senior, entered the Naval Academy at a height of 6-foot-7 but now stands 7-foot-1.

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Earnhardt's Start Is Best In History

Dale Earnhardt's five victories in seven NASCAR Winston Cup races is the best start in the circuit's 38-year history, but auto racing officials said all the credit shouldn't go to the 34-year-old driver.

"His team is so close knit, they have an edge over other teams today," Bob Moore, Winston Cup publicity director, said. "You have got to have that teamwork. They have not lost any personnel in the last three or four years."

"A lot of drivers switch teams," Moore added, "and it usually takes a team about half a season to get going. That is one of the big edges that Dale and Richard (Petty) have over everybody else."

Just seven races into the season, Earnhardt holds a 127-point lead over second-place Bill Elliott in the point standings. The Kannapolis, N.C., native won the Goodwrench 500 on March 1, the Miller High Life 400 on March 8, the TransSouth 500 on March 29, the First Union 400 on April 5 and, last Sunday, the Valleydale 500. Along the way, he's led about 60 percent of the laps raced.

Earnhardt, the Winston Cup champion last year and winner of \$1.7 million, said he doesn't think about streaks, but is "especially proud because it reflects on how good a crew we've got."

That crew, headed by Kirk Sheldermine, has been with Earnhardt since 1980, according to car owner Richard Childress, a former NASCAR driver.

"It is just a combination of a lot of things, but the pit crew sure is working well together," Childress said.

"We sure would like to keep it going, but sooner or later we will lose a race."

"I think he is in his prime right now as far as being a top-flight driver," Childress added. "He always was a good driver, but I feel he is a great race driver now."

Chip Williams, NASCAR's director of public relations, said Tuesday that there is another reason that Earnhardt has been so successful.

"He is traditionally a strong starter, always has been," Williams said in a telephone interview from his Florida office.

Since Earnhardt's first full season on the circuit in 1979, 12 of his 25 career victories have been in the first 10 races of a season, Williams said.

Even with his history, however, this start is unprecedented. In 1975, Petty, who is currently third in the point standings, won four of the first seven races.

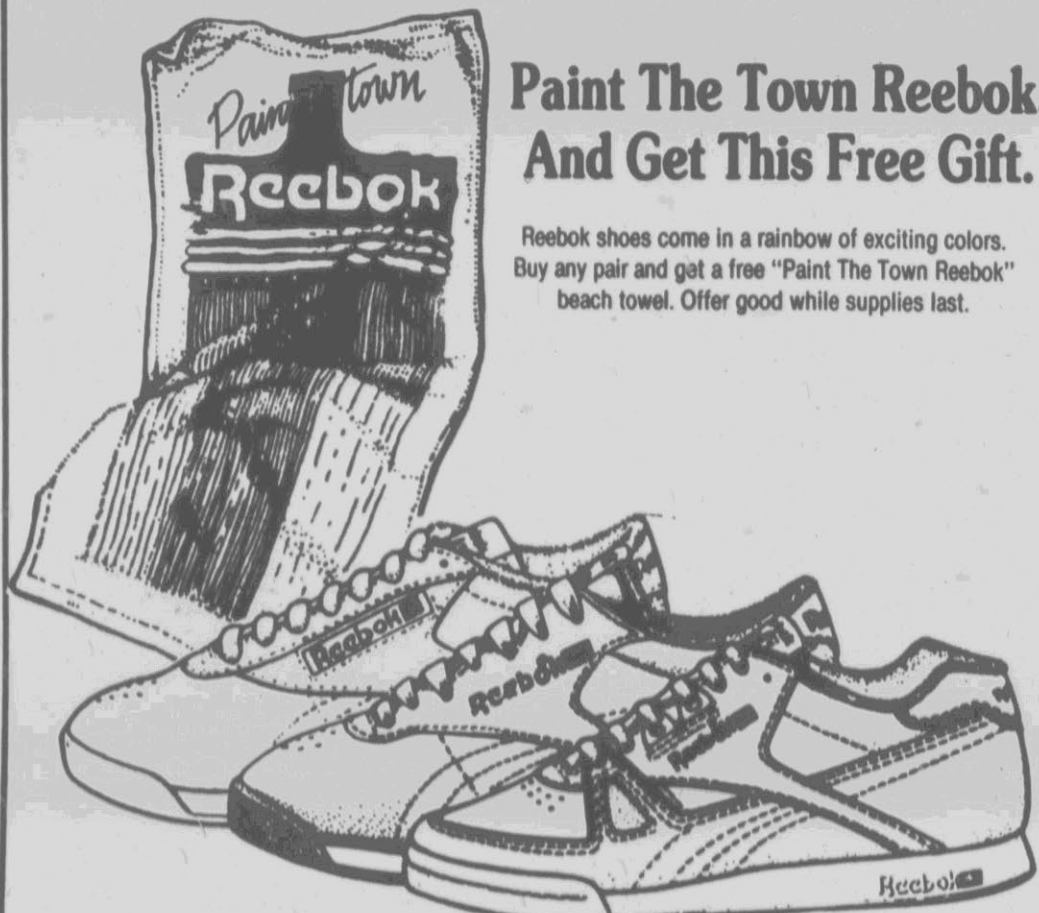
Earnhardt's victories, however, have not been without controversy.

Last weekend in the Valleydale 500 at Bristol, Tenn., two incidents with other cars marred the victory. Earnhardt tangled with pole starter Harry Gant and then was involved in a collision that knocked then-leader Sterling Marlin into the first turn wall.

Those incidents, added to some earlier ones, have angered some drivers, who say Earnhardt is a bit too aggressive on the track.

"We are going to have a meeting with Dale (Earnhardt) and Richard (Childress) to discuss some of the incidents that happened at Bristol, Tenn.," Grand National Director Dick Beaty said. "He is such an aggressive driver. I don't think he tried to spin anyone."

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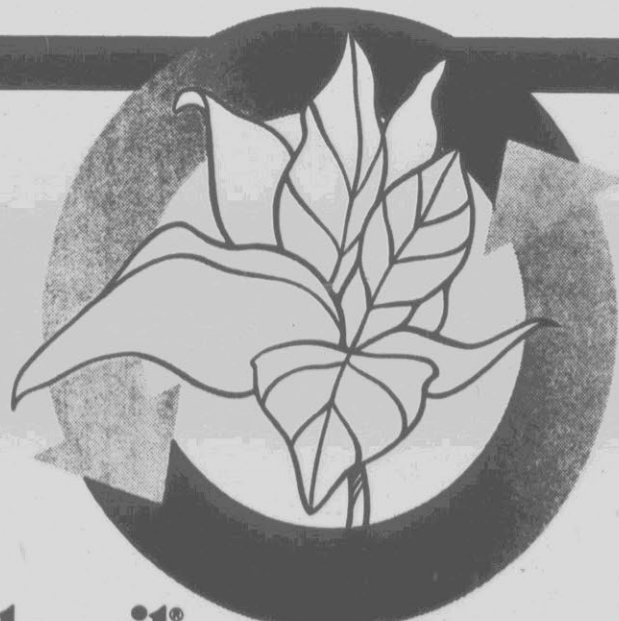

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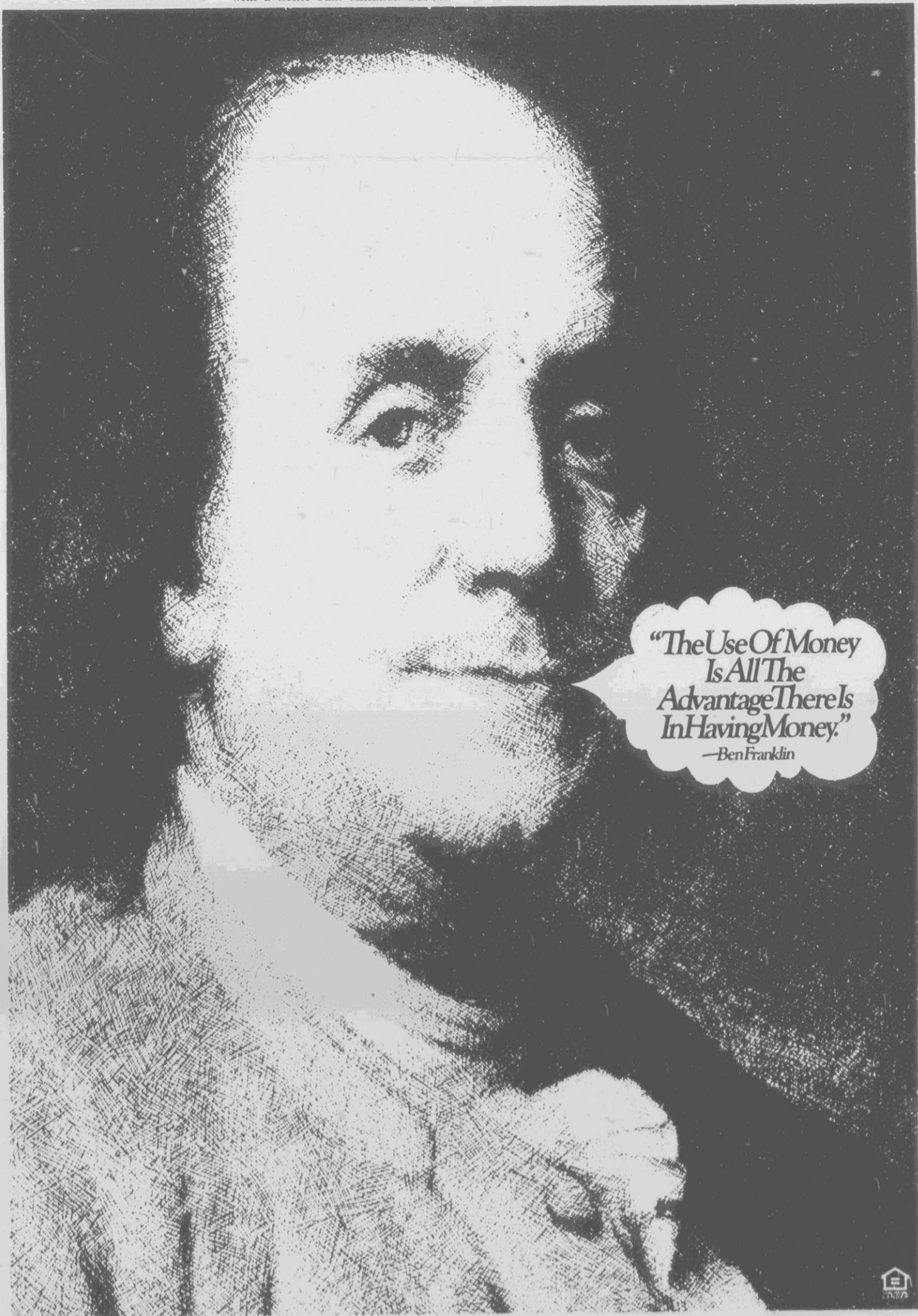
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Bo's Big Day Helps Bury Tigers

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Gold Mine Rock Burst Kills Five

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A rock burst 7,000 feet underground in a gold mine killed five workers and injured 18 others, the mine owners said today.

It was third fatal mine accident in South Africa in a week, with a total of 46 deaths.

Anglo American Corp., owner of the Vaal Reefs mine in western Transvaal province, said two workers were killed immediately in the latest accident Tuesday.

Two died overnight of their injuries and the body of a fifth man who had been reported missing was found Tuesday morning, it said.

All the dead miners and all but one of the injured men were black, company spokesman John Kingsley-Jones said.

Rock bursts, which send a shower of rocks into a mine tunnel, are caused by pressure and usually occur without warning.

On Monday, seven black miners were killed and three injured in a rock fall 2,800 feet underground in the Randfontein Estates gold mine, run by Johannesburg Consolidated Investments.

The National Union of Mineworkers said Tuesday the miners involved in that accident were doing drilling that should have been done by a machine.

Thirty-four miners were killed and 16 injured last Thursday when methane gas exploded in a coal mine at Ermelo, east of Johannesburg. The previous day, 16 miners were injured in a methane explosion at another coal mine in the same area.

Architects

RALEIGH (AP) — Three North Carolina architects have been named to the College of Fellows of the American Institute of Architects, the highest award presented by the institute.

Chosen were Charlotte mayor Harvey Gantt, Edwin Harris of Raleigh and Gerald Li of Charlotte. They raised the number of Fellows chosen from North Carolina to 37, and the three were chosen from among 45,000 members of the AIA.

Gantt has received the AIA's distinguished service citation for public service.

The three will be inducted into the College of Fellows at the AIA's national convention on June 19 in Orlando, Fla.

Wife Killed

BREVARD, N.C. (AP) — A clerk at a Brevard department store was shot and killed while she worked, and her ex-husband has been charged with murder in connection with her death, authorities say.

Sarah Pearlee Mason, 39, of Brevard was transported to Transylvania County Hospital, where she died about 10:15 a.m. Monday, Detective Bill Lowery said. Clyde Eugene Mason, 44, of Penrose, whom authorities identified as the victim's ex-husband, was charged with first-degree murder.

Libya Celebrates 'Defeat' Of U.S. During Air Raids

ROME (AP) — Libya is celebrating what it calls the defeat of "barbaric American aggression" one year after U.S. warplanes dropped about 100 tons of bombs on Tripoli and Benghazi.

But Libya-watchers say the festivities, including an international peace conference in Tripoli, cannot disguise the serious problems dogging Col. Moammar Gadhafi: a failing economy, military rout in Chad and international isolation.

On April 15, 1986, 18 F-111 U.S. Air Force bombers and 14 A-6 U.S. Navy attack jets struck the two cities in retaliation for what the Reagan administration said was Libya's support for international terrorism.

U.S. officials say the raids were a major success, with the loss of only one plane and its two-man crew.

"I think the raid was unfortunately necessary, but I think that it did carry the message that it was intended to: that terrorism has a terrible cost attached to it," Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said Tuesday.

But the official Libyan news agency, JANA said in a dispatch monitored in Rome: "That night, the Libyan Arab people scored a historic great victory against the most tyrannical imperialist force. The Libyan people ... defeated the American assault ... the unsuccessful barbaric American aggression."

Libya's official media reported Tuesday that more than 200 delegations from around the globe are attending "the first world peace

meeting" in Tripoli, the capital, to mark the anniversary.

U.S. officials said the targets were military. But at least one residential neighborhood of Tripoli was hard hit, and Libyan authorities said the raids killed about 40 people.

Libya also said the attack was aimed at killing Gadhafi, who has shown remarkable resilience since taking power in a coup in 1969.

Despite depression and withdrawal immediately after the attack and mounting domestic problems, Gadhafi appears firmly in power today.

"There is no evidence of a loss of power of Gadhafi. This has been greatly exaggerated," said a senior Italian official with access to reliable intelligence on Libya due to Italy's historical links with its former colony.

"His position has not been challenged in any significant way. I would say that 90 to 95 percent of the power remains exclusively in his hands," the official told The Associated Press on ground rules of anonymity. "What has been accentuated is his reliance on a smaller group of people whom he trusts."

The official said the raids have had only a subtle effect on Gadhafi's support for terrorism, echoing Weinberger's comment that the problem has been curbed but not cured.

"I don't think there has been any change except for a slightly more cautious approach by Gadhafi not to become directly involved in terrorism," the Italian official said.

Columbia University Professor Lisa Anderson, a leading U.S.

specialist on Libya, said the raids did not have "a particularly dramatic effect" on Gadhafi.

"Gadhafi's position has deteriorated since then for other reasons, the economy and the defeats in Chad," she said in a telephone interview.

She said these issues could eventually pose a challenge to his leadership.

"These are the kind of things Libyans are going to get mad at," she said. "They might galvanize people in the military institutions to want to get rid of the regime."

Gadhafi's latest setback was in neighboring Chad, a northern strip of which Libya claims. Chadian forces last month chased Libyan troops from their main base at Ouadi Doum and the Chadian oasis town of Faya Largeau. More than a third of the 4,000-man Libyan garrison at Ouadi Doum was reported killed or captured.

With the sharp fall of oil prices last year, Libya suffered a serious economic slide and a shortage of many consumer goods. Oil production, Libya's mainstay, is about half its 1978-80 level and annual oil income is less than half the \$22 billion of 1980.

The value of its exports has been halved and foreign reserves have dropped from \$14 billion to less than \$3 billion.

Aquino Asks Congressmen For More Military Supplies

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corazon Aquino today urged visiting U.S. congressmen to provide more military aid to fight Communist rebels.

Mrs. Aquino made the appeal in a meeting with Rep. Gillespie "Sonny" Montgomery, D-Miss.; Rep. Roy Rowland, D-Ga.; and Rep. Claude Harris, D-Ala. They arrived Tuesday for a four-day visit.

Montgomery told reporters Mrs. Aquino asked specifically for helicopters and medical supplies.

"We'll take the information back to the United States," he said. "It seems to me that the request is reasonable."

Western military experts say the 250,000-member Philippine armed forces have been hampered by lack of mobility in their 18-year-old war against the Communist insurgents of the New People's Army.

The military, meanwhile, said troops killed two rebels and captured six others in a shootout late Tuesday near Pagudpud, 270 miles north of Manila.

Fighting escalated after peace talks with the rebels collapsed last January and a 60-day nationwide cease-fire expired Feb. 8. More than 700 people have been killed in the fighting this year, military figures show.

Disgruntled troops have been blamed for at least five coup plots or coup attempts against the government since Mrs. Aquino came to power in February 1986 after a civilian-military rebellion ousted President Ferdinand E. Marcos.




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'Black Water' Adventure

Tar River Yields Its Treasures To Divers

The Tar River has been a watery haven for a truck, cars, a liquor still and even a Reflector newsrack, say two local recovery divers.

"It's amazing what's in that river," said Mike Wiggs who, along with Donnie Smith, has been diving to retrieve items lost in the water for about a year.

"I got started by getting a boat and a trailer for a man," Wiggs said. "It took me a while to find the truck, then I found the trailer." The truck still works, he said.

"We have located a car for an insurance company in the Tar River," Smith said.

"I thought I had swam under a stump and we were in the back seat of the car," Wiggs said. "You've got to feel out there. We've taken our lights to see under there."

Smith said, "there's a lot of turbidity and a lot of sediment in the water," and that is why the excursions are called "black water diving."

"It's dark and you see very little," he said. "You move very slowly because you don't know what's down there."

"I prefer diving in the ocean, but

this is interesting," Smith said.

"We were looking for a safe and a car" on one diving expedition, he said. "We found a box we thought was a safe and we found out it was a Daily Reflector box."

"We spent an hour on the Reflector box trying to get it out," Smith said. "We turned it in to the sheriff."

When items are lost in the water, "due to the current, they'll drift until they hit the bottom," he said. "If they have any weight, they'll stay."

Even though it is dark in the river, the divers usually have no problems finding each other or the boat, Wiggs said.

"We can hear each other beating around. Your regulator makes a lot of noise," he said. And once on the surface of the water, "you can see the other person's bubbles."

Diving equipment also is helpful in determining location, Smith said. "A compass definitely plays an important part in diving in black water. You can get back to the boat fairly well," he said.

"Be sure to carry a knife," Wiggs said as he remembered his worse diving experience of "getting caught under a log and working through the branches."

The divers also carry a rope ex-

tended from the boat, making sure not to get an air tank hung up in one, Smith said as he recalled his worse diving experience.

"My tank got hung onto the rope. I really had to get my act together and get unhooked," he said.

In addition to the vision impairments, strong water currents affect diving capabilities.

"Sometimes you can beat the current if you hug close to the bottom," Smith said. But, "I have gotten caught in the current and just let the current take me."

Other helpful equipment include a wet suit and air tank. "Water gets in the suit and your body heats it up and insulates you," Smith said.

The tank supplies oxygen in the water while diving, he said. "In the river, you can probably stay under 45 minutes to an hour without too much exertion. A tank of air will go pretty far," he said.

The air in the tanks are under a lot of pressure, Smith said, especially when a diver goes below about 33 feet. "The pressure starts increasing from there. The regulator reduces the pressure" under the water.

Divers have to be certified, he said. Smith was certified in 1975 and Wiggs was certified in 1980. The training teaches the laws of physics such as "gas in the body absorbed through breathing under water," Smith said.

They also learn physical fitness and swimming techniques, and how to use the equipment in the water through classroom and practical experience.

Undersea Explorer Finds Titanic, Has World Tracking To His Door

WASHINGTON — Suppose you discovered a new life form.

No, even better, whole colonies of new life forms that jolted man's historic assumptions about the origin and nature of all living matter.

And suppose, in addition, you managed to uncover the first firm evidence of how the Earth itself is put together, by diving in a submarine miles beneath the sea and finding the molten scar tissue of the Earth's shifting crust.

Suppose you did that and the world sort of ... shrugged.

Then suppose, as much for the challenge as for the science of the thing, you screwed a 20-year-old night-fighter's sniper scope, developed for killing Viet Cong, onto a

television camera to make a system that practically sees in the dark, and you went out and found the RMS Titanic.

And the world beat a path to your door. But your academic colleagues sniffed that you're a "popularizer" and called you "Carl Sagan with gills."

How do you deal with that? "I like my mother's comment," says ocean explorer Robert Ballard, eyeballing his glass of Chardonnay with a kind of poetic resignation. "She said, 'You know, son, you've gone to college 13 years to get your doctorate and spent 13 years doing research and getting published and getting tenure. I hope you outlive the Titanic and aren't labeled with that the rest of your life.'"

"And I said, 'Well, Mom, I'm only 44. I'm gonna work real hard.'"

It's not that Ballard, who heads the Deep Submergence Laboratory at the Woods Hole (Mass.) Oceanographic Institution, doesn't love the Titanic.

He studied accounts of its voyage for years, treasures its lore and savors the memories of that early morning hour on Sept. 1, 1985, when, after months of monotonous "mowing the lawn" of the North Atlantic with cameras and sonar, he first saw its wreckage appear on camera, 2½ miles beneath the sea.

It has made him famous and will probably make him wealthy: His book "Discovering the Titanic," for which he received a reported six-figure advance from Warner Books, is scheduled for publication Oct. 16, with a planned first printing of 150,000 copies in seven languages. He turns down 15 speaking invita-

tions for every one he accepts, at up to \$10,000 a pop, and starred in "National Geographic Explorer's" "Secrets of the Titanic" on cable television in March. The Titanic conveyed him to the White House for a dinner with the prince and princess of Wales.

But it also led to cruel, mindless press badgering of his family, and fueled jealous carping in the academic community that he is some sort of submersible cowboy, hogging headlines and foundation grants with gee-whiz projects while less photogenic science goes begging.

Most of all, he says, it has at once celebrated and overshadowed his real passion and purpose: the exploration of the 65 percent of Earth beneath the sea.

Mrs. Johnson has been painting for several years and enjoys painting, sporadically, when she is not working. When she was a nursing instructor at UNC-Greensboro she was also enrolled in art classes.

"I suppose I have about half of an art degree," she said. "I never finished it because I left there to move to here and because I just don't have the time to take all the courses an art degree requires."

Her art, mostly watercolors and a few oils, are done when she is at the beach. "I paint some at home, too, but it's hard to get in the right frame of mind at home," she said. She enjoys painting beach scenes the most.

Explorer Gets The World's Attention

Though he's logged more hours in the deep sea than any scientist in history, most of it in the cramped confines of Woods Hole's three-man submersible Alvin, the 6-foot 2-inch Ballard says he's barely scratched the subsurface.

"There is so much unexplored territory," he marvels, in town for a visit with Geographic editors here. "We know more about the topography of Mars than the top of our own planet. When the president signed into law the Exclusive Economic Zone (extending U.S. boundaries 200 miles from the shoreline of any U.S. state

or territory), he effectively doubled the size of them than Lewis and Clark did when they started out to explore the first one."

He pauses wearily, a water-logged Don Quixote in the city of windmills, over his dinner. "You sit here and watch society and see its priorities and you just shake your head. Or you just get all involved in how stupid we are."

When Ballard returned to Woods Hole after finding the Titanic, he read a brief statement to a mob of reporters and then fled. Two days later, he starred at a National Geographic press conference, then

disappeared again. The world was Titanic crazy, the phone was ringing off the hook, talk shows everywhere were after him, not to mention the foreign press. But the man some accuse of loving the limelight was nowhere to be found. Why?

"Well, in the first place, I was emotionally wasted. And I had not been prepared for that. I knew all about the Titanic and the 1,500 people lost and everything, but it was just an abstraction. I was Mr. Technology, Mr. Under Control. And we were all excited and happy as hell when we found it.

Then someone said it's 2 a.m. and

the Titanic sank at 2:30 and all of a sudden it hit all of us. And we went out on the deck. And it was like there were bodies all around us — rowboats over here and people crying for help and the (steamship) California over there, in sight but not coming to help. And it just hit me like a sledgehammer.

"Plus I was zonked from sleep deprivation. I was like a POW — I would have confessed to anything. Even days later, I remember working in my cabin aboard ship on that stupid little speech (for the Woods Hole homecoming) — what was it, a minute long? — and then not being able to see any more.

And finding the paper soaking wet. I can't explain it. I didn't talk about the Titanic with anybody for about three months. Even my wife."

But the other reason he fled from the press, he says, is "I didn't want to be a piece of meat. I had dealt with the press some before, but I had never been, like, BREAKING NEWS! And that howling mob descended, screaming questions and throwing elbows Kareem Abdul-Jabbar wouldn't attempt ...

"Reporters were trying to interview my kids between classes at school. And it really hurt my oldest son. He's kind of quiet and shy, and they were yelling things like 'Why aren't you smart and famous like your Dad?' He came home and said, 'I wish Dad was a garbage man.' But we talked about it. About whether I should become maybe a carpenter.

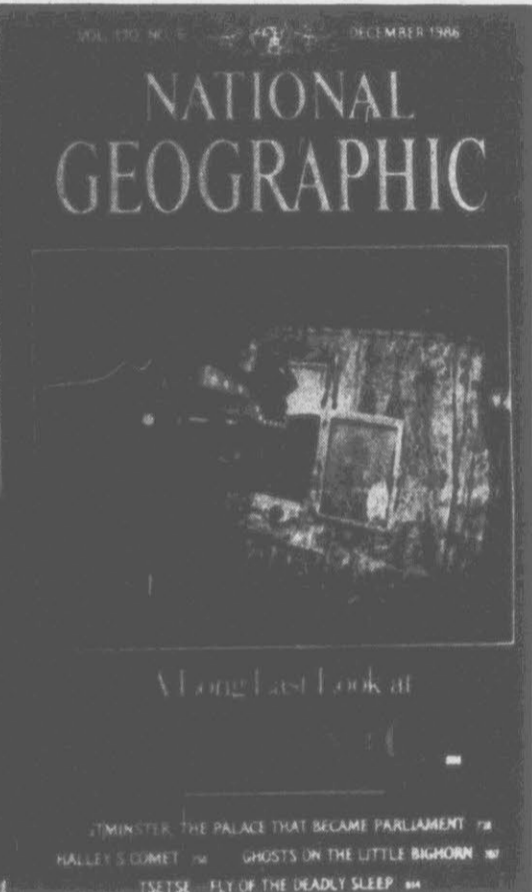
"Of course my younger son, 16, he loved all the publicity. He said, 'Hey, now I'll be able to get girls!'"

Ballard emerged from hiding, he says, when the fickle eye of the press found a new obsession: "two women shipwrecked in the Indian Ocean who survived by eating their toothpaste. The next day — equal billing. The Titanic was too important to me to go through that."

With his trim, military bearing (he served as both an Army and a Navy officer and is reactivating his commission in the Naval Reserve), his occasionally flag-wrapped rhetoric and his gold Mickey Mouse watch (a gift from the folks at Disney World), he appears the antithesis of the rumpled, data-gatherers who often populate the world of science.

Moreover, while they may spend their days in stuffy labs hunched over computer screens, Ballard cruises off to make his discoveries in places like the Tongue of the Ocean or the Mountains of the Sea. Envy stalks any man with a perpetual tan.

His latest attention-getter is a planned expedition to the Tyrrhenian Sea next year to search the ancient sea routes between Carthage and Rome for ships that foundered in Mediterranean storms.

Movie Stars Are Making Crossover To Television

NEW YORK (AP) — Charlton Heston says there just aren't many good roles for "grown-ups" in today's teen-dominated movies. Alan Arkin says his agent told him the "us against them" conflict between film and television had ended. Movie producers Richard Zanuck and David Brown wanted the "immediacy" of television. Director Robert Altman was having trouble getting a new movie made, but ABC's offer to direct one-hour dramas meant getting on the air within weeks. With fewer movies being made and at increasingly higher costs, more and more film types are turning to the small screen, where a constant need for more material means no waiting — and the number of viewers tuned in each night dwarfs that of fans in movie theaters.

Not only are film people coming to television, but when they arrive, they often find the material rather familiar.

"Gung Ho," "Starman" and "Nothing in Common" are series this season. "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" and "Peggy Sue Got Married" are being adapted for next season.

"Perfect Strangers" was inspired by Bronson Pinchot's bit part in "Beverly Hills Cop." "Beverly Hills Buntz" is the tentative title of a possible spinoff from "Hill Street Blues."

Producer Zev Braun has moved to television from theatrical-release films. His pilot "Tour of Duty" is bound to be compared to "Platoon," though Braun said the TV show was sold to CBS before "Platoon" was released last year.

"The success of 'Platoon' doesn't hurt," he said in a telephone interview. "The audience's interest is piqued. 'Platoon' has proven ... that it (the Vietnam War) is no longer verboten. People are interested in it."

Zanuck and Brown have produced numerous movies, including "Jaws," and are teaming with writer Peter Benchley on a "Jaws"-inspired television pilot, "Barrington."

"We wanted, really, the activity and immediacy of television," Zanuck said in a telephone interview from location on Long Island. "We've been doing movies all our lives, and we plan to continue. But the pace is slowed down in the whole process of movie-making, whereas with television, where there are air dates to be met, you get answers very quickly."

Altman finished directing the first of two television adaptations of Harold Pinter plays last month. "The Dumb Waiter" will air next month. Meanwhile, he despairs of getting his theatrical film sequel, "Nashville, Nashville," to the screen because of the complexities of big-budget movie deals.

"They (ABC) are giving me the opportunity to do these short plays," Altman said in a telephone interview. "They run about an hour. You wouldn't be able to do them as theatricals. Nobody's going to give you the money to do an hour movie."

Barry Levinson, director of the movies "Diner" and "Tin Men," developed a sitcom for Arkin, a series television debut for both. Arkin said in an interview he did "Harry" because "my agent told me the lines have broken down. It's no longer us against them."

"The Ellen Burstyn Show," an early, unsuccessful sitcom, was that film star's first foray into TV.

Joseph Bologna, a movie actor, is starring in the NBC series, "Rags to Riches." Blair Brown, best known for her film work, such as "Continental Divide," is making her series television debut in "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd."

George C. Scott hasn't done a television series since "East Side, West Side" two decades ago. He will be in "Mr. President" for the Fox Broadcasting Co.

Burt Young of "Roomies" is best known as Sylvester Stallone's brother-in-law in the "Rocky" movies. "Roomies" was inspired by the movie "Back to School."

Michael Murphy, a frequent supporting player in Woody Allen movies, did the series "Hard Copy." Harry Hamlin ("Clash of the Titans" and "Making Love") is in "L.A. Law."

Wilford Brimley ("Cocoon," "The Natural") got his own series, "Our House."

George Segal's sitcom, "Take Five," didn't last long, but gave him a taste of series television for the first time. The show was from the makers of the movies "Splash" and "Night Shift."

Jack Lemmon "graduated" from

television in the early 1950s, but he'll be back on the small screen next season in an NBC mini-series.

Heston, one of America's best-known movie actors, took a role on the ABC night-time soap "The Colbys."

Struggling Filmmaker Tries For Hit With Second Movie

SARANAC LAKE, N.Y. (AP) — He calls himself Adirondack Fred: dreamer, schemer, movie mogul of the mountains — "a woodchuck Woody Allen."

Fred G. Sullivan is an independent filmmaker struggling to make it in the rough and rustic Adirondack Mountains, far from the glitz and glamour of the Hollywood Hills.

His first full-blown foray into feature filmmaking was "Cold River," the story of two children lost in the Adirondack wilderness. The drama got mixed reviews as Sullivan peddled it to movie theaters around the country in 1981; he said the Baltimore Sun panned it as "the worst wilderness film of the year."

"Cold River," which was financed by private investors, lost \$1.2 million at the box office.

At the time, Sullivan was supporting a wife and four young children. They lived in a tiny, gray-shingled bungalow in a lakeside village 300 miles north of Manhattan.

"We were down to \$24 in the bank," he said in a recent interview. "And the world of movie-making wasn't exactly beating a path to my door."

He thought of taking other jobs — even considered becoming a lumberjack. But his celluloid fantasies beckoned. So he went back to his loyal backers and the local bank, and set out to make another movie.

The movie is called "Sullivan's Pavilion," an offbeat comedy about a struggling filmmaker in the Adirondacks who raises a family and tries to pursue the muse amid dirty diapers and pitchers of beer.

"A personal comic memoir is what I call it," he said.

Sullivan is a big, bearded, bearish 41-year-old with tousled curls and a broad, disarming Irish smile. He dresses in classic L.L. Bean back country style: red suspenders, blue jeans, rubber boots.

The office and studios of his Adirondack Alliance Film Corp. are behind the papered-over windows of an old storefront on the dusty main drag of downtown Saranac Lake, between the post office and the Back Door bar.

Sullivan grew up in Glens Falls, N.Y. He made a brief stab at law school before he decided to pursue a boyhood dream of making movies. For his master's thesis at Boston University in 1973, he came to

Saranac Lake to make a wilderness documentary called "Of Rivers and Men." He and his wife, Polly, decided the friendly, small-town atmosphere and scenic mountain surroundings were perfect for raising a family.

"Sullivan's Pavilion" is the life story of the filmmaker who refers to himself in the movie as "Fred G.," "FGS" or "Adirondack Fred." The self-effacing comedy stars Sullivan, his wife and their four children, all playing themselves. There are also dozens of local residents and six professional actors who play other oddball characters.

The 83-minute film comes off as an elaborate home movie that veers crazily from scatological humor and rowdy beer-drinking to musings on the deep love of a parent for a child.

There are snippets from 8mm backyard epics Sullivan made when he was 12, film footage from Vietnam and scenes from the 1980 Winter Olympics at Lake Placid. Documentary segments are interwoven with zany fantasy sequences and scenes from the sometimes chaotic, often poignantly sweet family life of the Sullivan brood.

"Saranac Lake isn't your typical jerkwater burg," says Fred in the movie.

"It's a lot like Vermont, before Vermont was discovered," says Polly.

"All of our children were born here," says Fred, "yet people keep asking, why Saranac Lake?"

He answers with a loving look at life in small-town America, with ice palaces, parades, picnics by the lake and humorous interviews with villagers.

The film garnered favorable reviews and a warm audience response in showings at the U.S. Film Festival in Park City, Utah, in January, and at theaters in Albany, where it made its commercial debut in March.

The film festival jury awarded the movie "special recognition for originality, independent spirit, and for doing it his own damn way."

Sullivan wrote, produced, directed and starred in the film, which was independently financed with the help of his two business partners and executive producers: former Philadelphia investment banker Charles L. Ritchie Jr. and accountant William A. Sweeney.

Sullivan is concentrating on marketing the film. The niche for "Sullivan's Pavilion," he said, is in the growing number of specialty houses that showcase such independent films as "Round Midnight" and "A Room With a View." However, he hopes his movie will make it into the big multiplex cinemas as well.

time greats, was a proponent of opening three-card majors, especially in spades. This hand from a pair event illustrates what can happen if you follow that style.

The one-spade opening bid was typical Meredith. After North cuebid, South had no option but to introduce one of his minor suits, and he had nowhere to go when North corrected to four spades. He could only hope his partner would produce at least four cards in the suit.

West attacked with three rounds of hearts. Declarer did not like his chances much, but he went for broke. He ruffed the third heart and successfully ran the jack of trumps. When both defenders followed to the next two rounds of trumps, there was a gleam of light. Now all declarer needed was a successful club finesse and for East to have the only trump left in the game.

a diamond and led the jack of clubs for a finesse. When that won, he reverted to diamonds. Since East had the remaining trump and was out of hearts, declarer could lose only one more trick and the contract was home with the help of two finesses, a 4-3 trump split and a heart position which could be expected from the bidding.

Not everyone bid to game on the North-South cards, and those who did played in diamonds for a score of 400. Our declarer collected 420,

for an absolute top on the board. Now we are not recommending three-card majors as the wave of the future. But "a touch of Meredith" now and then certainly does add a bit of spice to the game.

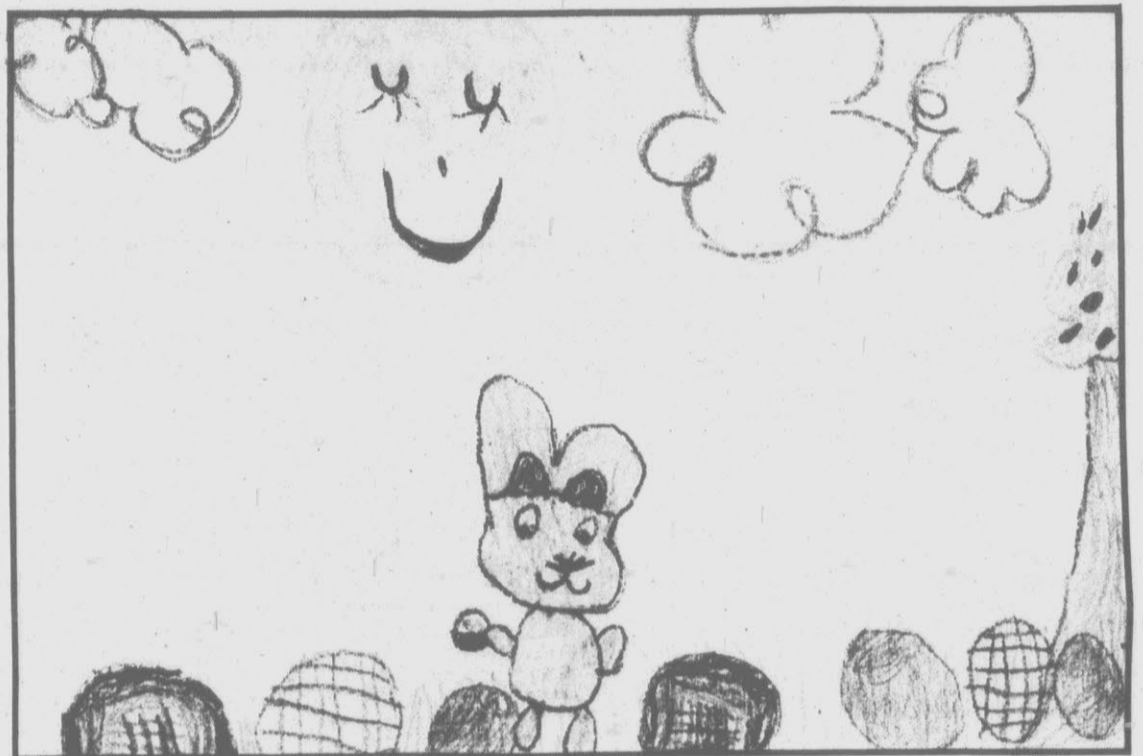

Students Gain Path To Reality In Archery

HONOLULU (AP) — Where the deep green valley ends at the base of the Koolaus, after Kalihi Street rambles into a rutted one-lane road, is Chozen-ji School of Kyudo. In its elegantly spare wood and paper buildings, 20 students of Koun Suhara learn the Way of "kyudo," the ancient Japanese art of Zen archery.

Zen archery, Suhara explained through an interpreter, is not a sport. It is a form of meditation, the Way to the reality within the individual. Jackson Morisawa, acting as interpreter for Suhara, pointed out that this concept is not easily understood in an hour-long encounter. Suhara, the master, when asked how long it takes to learn the Way, said, "Forever."

The elements of Zen archery, he said, are the same as those of meditation — to control the inner energy through breathing techniques and concentration on the proper mental and physical attitude. Already a Zen priest when he began the study of kyudo at the age of 50, Suhara found the training to be an extension of what he already knew.

And what he knew, according to Morisawa, is that the target is not the goal.

"The shooting must be pure, and not a preoccupation with hitting the target," he said. "Kyudo transcends the shooting of the arrow. Beginners shoot into the 'makiwara,' a bundle of straw, so that they concentrate on breathing and posture, rather than aiming at a target.

"When they are proficient, I put them on the target, and the mind changes. The eagle (target) comes out and they say, 'I must hit the target' and the mind is no longer focused."

Kyudo was introduced to the West by a German professor, Eugen Herrigal, who persuaded a master in Japan to teach him the art. Master Awa, proud of his student, gave Herrigal his favorite bow. He told him, however, that if he were ever to retire, the bow was to be destroyed.

When the time came, Herrigal was unable to bring himself to do this, and instead returned it to Awa's "dojo," or school. The bow was sent to Master Anazawa, one of Awa's students, and Anazawa in turn gave it to his most promising student, Koun Suhara.

With the full circle, itself a Zen concept, Suhara later founded his own school in Kamakura, Japan. He spends part of the year here at the Chozen-ji School, the only Zen kyudo training school outside Asia.

The movements of kyudo are flowing, slow and deliberate — much like "tai chi." The laminated bamboo bow, which is about 10 feet long, is held in the left hand, and in the right hand the archers hold two arrows. One is pointed away from the body, the other toward it.

Walking with a sliding motion, barely lifting the feet from the floor, the archers move one at a time to a point about 35 yards from the target. The notch in the arrow pointing toward the target is slipped into the string of the bow and, with vast concentration and ease of movement, the string is drawn and the arrow flies. Then the process is repeated with the second arrow.

In Herrigal's book, "The Way of the Arrow," he explains, "The arrow that penetrates in such a state is not the arrow itself, but a living arrow which is the spirit of kyudo. He (the archer) must turn his eyes inward in search of his soul and transcend all external preoccupation with hitting the target. When his spiritual growth allows him to 'shoot without shooting,' his character will blend harmoniously with life."

In a demonstration, Suhara's first arrow went into the mound of clay, cork and earth that supports the target, his second went directly into the eye of the eagle, as the target is called.

It didn't matter.

Innocent Plea

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union has entered an innocent plea on behalf of punk-rock singer Jello Biafra and four co-defendants charged with distributing harmful material to minors.

They are accused of failing to warn record stores against selling "Frankenchrist," an album by Biafra's group the Dead Kennedys, to minors because of sexually explicit posters included in the packages.

A trial date of June 1 was set on the misdemeanor charge by Municipal Court Judge Jacqueline Connor.

Besides Biafra, whose real name is Eric Boucher, defendants include Mike Bonanno, Biafra's partner in Alternative Tentacles Records; Deborah Schwartz of Mordam Records; Steve Boudreau of Green World Distributors and Salvatore J. Alberti of the Alberti Record Manufacturing Co.

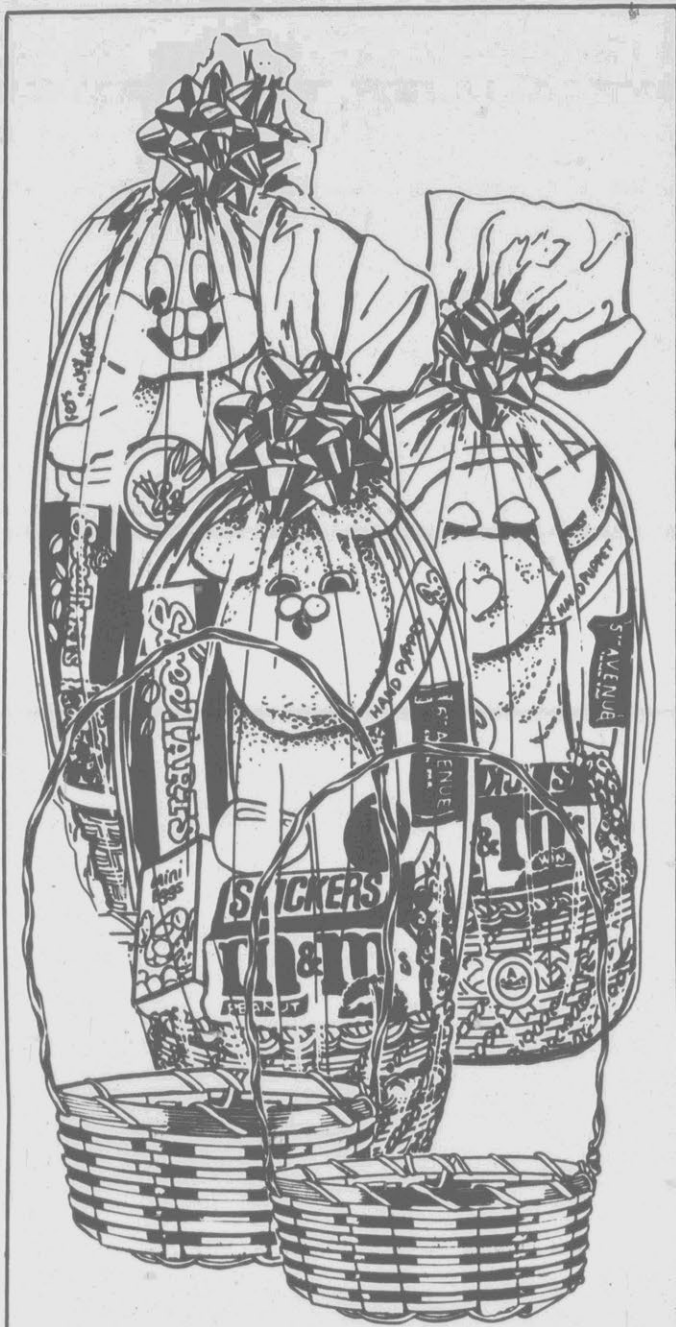

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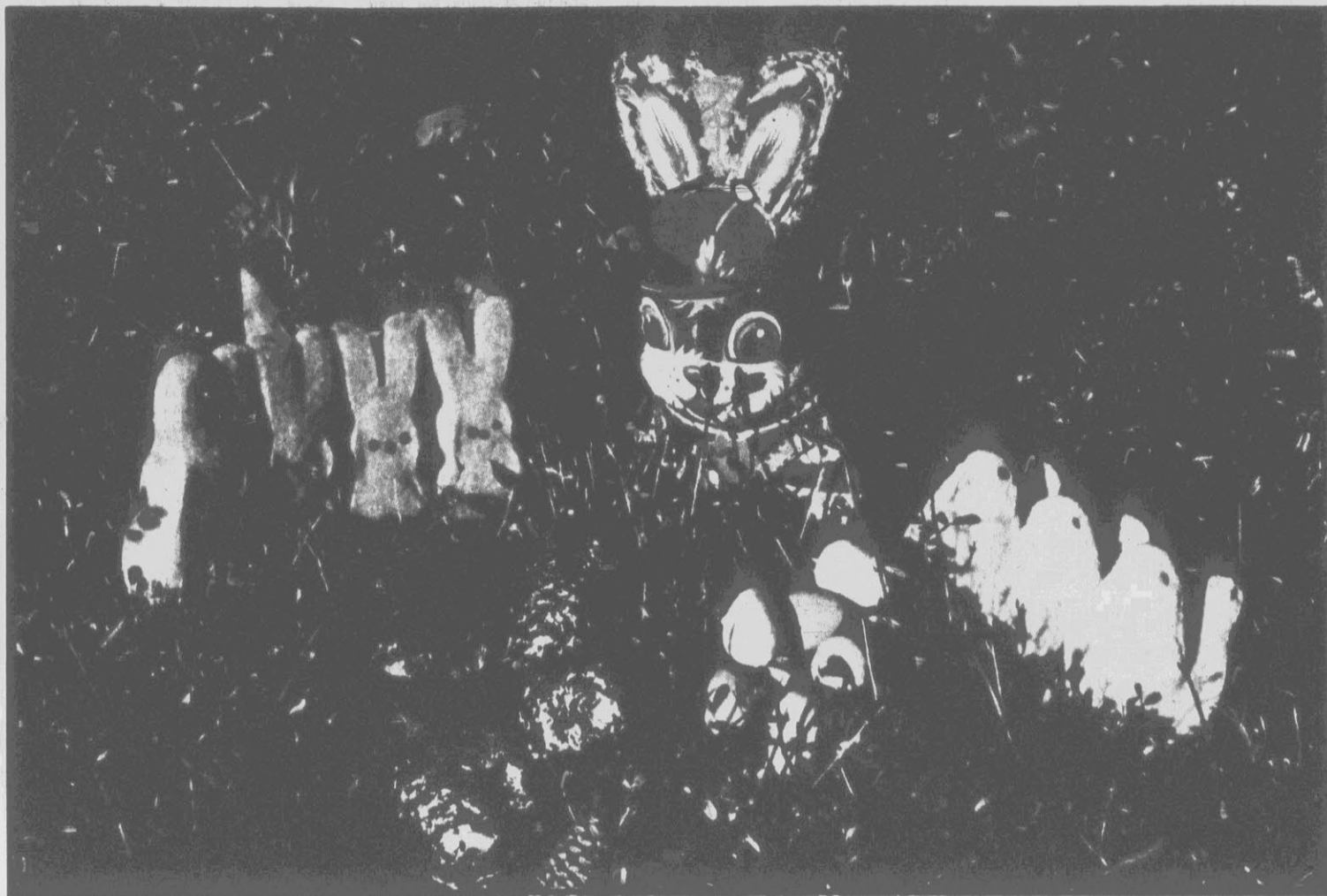

"These two also produced an egg from which the universe developed. From this egg came the extraordinary Bennu bird or Phoenix, symbol of the sun. The early Christians adopted this bird as a representation or symbol of Christ, the Saviour."

The eggs were thought to consecrate the stomach as the first nourishment eaten after abstinence of Lent. The feast of painted and gilded shells of eggs were accompanied with platters of meat.

Symbols also were used such as the sun for good fortune, the rooster for fulfillment of wishes, the stag or deer for good health and flowers for love.

Easter-Morning Brunch Adds Different Touch

Next Sunday most Christians will sit down to an Easter dinner that probably will be centered on a baked ham or a leg of lamb. The meal is easy to plan, because it is based on tradition — add a few potatoes and

the first asparagus of the season, and you're in business.

Somehow, as happens with other holidays, little thought will be given to what the family will eat for breakfast on Easter morning. The fare often can be as uninspiring as a toasted bagel or a corn muffin.

This year try an Easter-morning

brunch whose centerpiece is a version of eggs Benedict. Instead of Canadian bacon and hollandaise sauce, this poached egg lies on a bed of smoked salmon, bathed in a dill sauce and garnished with capers.

Round off the menu with a compote of sliced strawberries, kiwi fruit and bananas, a spinach salad, chocolate cookies for dessert and plenty of hot coffee.

The only thing left to do is to wait for the arrival of the Easter bunny.

POACHED EGGS WITH SMOKED SALMON AND CAPERS

- 8 eggs
- 4 tablespoons white vinegar
- 4 whole wheat English muffins, split and toasted
- Butter for spreading on muffins
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 cups half-and-half
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh dill
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 12 thin slices smoked salmon
- 2 tablespoons capers, rinsed
- Sprigs of dill for garnish

1. Fill a large skillet with cold water to the depth of 2 1/2 inches. (The water must be high enough to

cover the eggs.) Add the vinegar and bring water to a simmer. Break one egg at a time into a custard cup. Slide each egg into the hot water, one at a time, clockwise. (You can poach four eggs at a time and you will know which one to remove first.) Using a fork, quickly capture the white part and fold it over the yolk. Poach each egg 3 to 4 minutes, remove with a slotted spoon and immediately plunge into a dish of ice water. If desired, the white part can be trimmed or evened out with scissors.

2. In a small saucepan, melt butter and cook flour, salt and pepper 1 minute over low heat for 1 minute.

Add half-and-half and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in minced dill.

3. Melt 1 tablespoon butter in a skillet and quickly saute salmon slices to warm on both sides.

4. Bring fresh water to a boil in a skillet. Remove eggs from ice water and briefly heat (about 30 seconds) in the boiling water.

5. To serve, place one English muffin half on a serving plate, cover with warmed salmon and a poached egg. Spoon 1/4 cup sauce over egg and sprinkle with a few capers. Decorate with a sprig of dill. Makes 8 servings.

Even before the 13 original colonies became the United States, it was customary for a farmer to slaughter a pig in the fall and hang the hams in the smokehouse, where they would slowly steep in smoke from applewood or hickory chips and age for six months or so. About the time the ham was mature, it would be Easter Sunday.

Things are not as simple today. The upper portion of the hind leg of a pig is still a ham, but any similarity ends right there.

Now we have boiled hams, baked hams, canned hams and Smithfield types; fresh ham, smoked ham, dry- or wet-cured.

They can be ordered by mail or picked up at the local supermarket. And to complicate matters even further, some are fully cooked, others partly cooked with the bone in, the bone out, partly boned.

So how does a person choose a ham for Easter dinner? For three days I tasted a cross section of supermarket hams, canned hams, hams made by pork specialists and hams ordered through the mail, ranging in taste from mild to sweet to salty.

The ready-to-eat hams were tasted at room temperature. Those that required cooking were prepared following the manufacturer's directions. There were no big surprises, and since there is such a selection of hams available, there is one for every taste.

Here are the ones I tried, with my comments.

MAIL-ORDER HAMS

Harrington's, Main Street, Richmond, Vt. 05477, (802) 434-4444.

Cob Smoked Ham, petite boneless, 1.71 pounds, \$19.50 including shipping. These mild, moist, pale pink hams are cured with maple syrup and smoked over corn cobs and maple wood. The meat is lean, pleasant and sweet tasting.

Gwaltney of Smithfield, Ltd., Smithfield, Va., (804) 357-3131.

Smithfield Ham, \$52.95 plus \$4 postage. Gwaltney makes the definitive Smithfield ham, ranging from 8 to 10 pounds. By their nature, these hams are a deep, brick red in color and salty — a flavor that is not to everyone's taste. We tried the boneless, fully-cooked ham glazed with brown sugar and found it salty, but not overbearing. The ham merely had to be unwrapped and sliced (it is best sliced thin). These hams are cured with only salt and pepper and smoked over hard wood. They are also sold uncooked and cooked with the bone in.

Roy L. Hoffman & Sons, RFD 6,

Box 5, Hagerstown, Md. 21740, (301) 739-2332.

Country Ham, 14 to 15 pounds with bone, \$43.95 plus shipping. Hoffman will remove the bone and wrap the ham in netting for an additional charge of 15 cents a pound and send you the bones, if requested. Hoffman hams are dry-cured with salt, pepper and "a secret ingredient" and smoked over natural hickory. The ham should be soaked for a minimum of 10 hours (ours was soaked for 24 hours) and then baked. The result was lean and tender meat with a good country flavor and a firm texture. Leftovers make great ham slices with fried apples and easy-over eggs. This was clearly my favorite.

New Braunfels, P.O. Box 1159, Braunfels, Texas 78131, (512) 625-7316.

Boneless Ham No. 107, \$43.95 delivered. Fully-cooked boneless ham, football-shaped, lightly smoked and easy to slice. Cloves and sugar used in curing give it a good flavor, and the outside is covered with lightly crushed black pepper, giving it the distinctive flavor so popular in the South. The ham we received was medium lean and medium salty.

Oakridge Smokehouse, Box 367, Schulenburg, Texas 78956, (800) 231-0773.

Honey-Glazed Smoked Ham, 10- to 12-pound size, \$46.95 including shipping charges. The whole ham is spiral cut, bone in, glazed with honey and spices. The fully-cooked ham we received was very lean, with a mild hickory flavor and a rosy-pink color. Unfortunately, it was also very watery and had a spongy texture.

McArthur's Smokehouse, Inc., Main Street, Millerton, N.Y. 12546, (518) 789-4425.

1876 American Cornucopia Half Boneless Ham, about 5 pounds, \$39.95 plus shipping. McArthur's ham was extremely mild, lean and moist, with a hint of sweetness from molasses used in curing. The top was glazed with sugar and spices and browned by a flame; the meat had a full pink color.

If you like, top with a simple glaze of confectioner's sugar, milk and candy nonpareils to add a festive touch that aptly com-

plements this culinary emblem of Easter.

(1 loaf of 8 servings)

- 1 package (16 ounces) hot roll mix
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 6 dyed* raw eggs in shell, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup confectioner's sugar, optional
- 2 1/2 to 3 teaspoons milk, optional

TURKEY BREAST ROAST BARBECUE

- 14 to 6-pound turkey breast roast
- Smoky barbecue sauce:
- 1/2 cup cooking oil
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 2 tablespoons catsup
- 1 1/2 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 1 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon liquid smoke
1/4 teaspoon pepper
Combine smoky barbecue sauce ingredients and heat to boiling point. Use to baste thawed turkey breast roast occasionally as it barbecues in a covered grill or in 325-degree oven until meat thermometer registers 170 degrees. For approximate cooking times, refer to directions on turkey breast roast wrapper.

TURKEY BURGERS

- 1 pound ground turkey
 - 8 single soda crackers (crushed)
 - 2 tablespoons catsup
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 1 tablespoon onion flakes
 - 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
 - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 - 4 bacon slices
- Combine ground turkey with remaining ingredients. Shape into patties. Wrap with bacon slice around outer edge, securing with toothpicks. Broil over hot coals for 5 to 6 minutes on each side, or until completely cooked in center of burger. Makes 4 burgers.

BARBECUED TURKEY STEAKS OR KABOBS (with Tried and True Marinade)

- 2 parts sauterne or white wine (lemon-lime soda may be substituted)
- 1 part soy sauce
- 1 part peanut, cooking or salad oil
- Variations: (add to suit taste)
- Chopped onion
- Crushed garlic or garlic powder
- Ginger root, peeled, grated or ground ginger
- Flavor enhancer (monosodium glutamate)

Worcestershire sauce
Combine all marinade ingredients and pour over turkey breast steaks or cubes of turkey breast meat. Marinate for at least two hours (and up to 24 hours) covered in the refrigerator. Broil turkey steaks or cook over charcoal until golden brown and completely cooked — do not overcook. Alternate marinated turkey breast cubes on skewers with cherry tomatoes, green pepper, mushrooms and pineapple. Cook over charcoal until done.

TURKEY SALAD POCKET SANDWICH

- 2 cups finely diced cooked turkey
 - 1/2 cup finely diced celery
 - 1/4 cup minced green onion
 - 2 hard cooked eggs, chopped
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - Dash cayenne pepper
 - 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- Combine all ingredients, mixing well. Can be covered and refrigerated for several hours to allow flavors to blend. Use as sandwich filling for pita bread for your favorite sandwich bread.

CARRIBEAN TURKEY SALAD
2 cups cubed cooked turkey
3 cups shredded lettuce
1 can (16 ounces) pineapple chunks, drained
1/2 cantaloupe, cut into balls
2 medium pears, diced
1/2 cup diced dates
1 bottle (8 ounces) chunky blue cheese dressing
1/2 to 1 teaspoon curry powder
1/2 cup toasted coconut
Combine turkey, lettuce, pineapple, cantaloupe, pears and dates in large bowl. Blend blue cheese dressing and curry powder. For each serving, place one cup salad mixture on salad plate. Spoon two tablespoons dressing over salad. Sprinkle with coconut. Serves 8.

TURKEY HAM ROLL-UPS

- 5 cups chopped cabbage, cooked and drained
- 1/2 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 8 thin slices fully cooked turkey ham (1 pound)
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 teaspoons horseradish mustard
- 1/2 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
1/4 cup bread crumbs
Combine cooked cabbage and 1/2 cup cheese. Spoon about 3 tablespoons onto each ham piece and roll

up. Place, seam side down, in baking dish. Sauté onion in 2 tablespoons butter or margarine; blend in flour. Add milk and mustard and gently bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add 1/2 cup cheese and parsley. Pour

over turkey ham rolls. Combine 1 tablespoon melted butter and bread crumbs and sprinkle over cheese sauce. Bake uncovered at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

1 teaspoon candy nonpareils, optional

Set aside 1 cup of the roll mix. In large bowl, stir together remaining mix, contents of yeast packet, 3 tablespoons sugar and cinnamon.

In small saucepan over medium heat, heat water and butter until very warm, 120 to 130 degrees. (Butter need not melt completely.) Add to reserved dry mixture along with 3 eggs and vanilla. Stir until well blended. Stir in enough of the remaining roll mix to make a soft dough. Knead on lightly floured surface 5 minutes.

Divide dough into 3 equal pieces. Roll each into a 24-inch strip. Loosely

braid strips together. Place on lightly greased baking sheet in an oval about 12x9 inches, pinching ends together to form continuous braid. With sterilized needle, carefully pierce large ends of dyed raw eggs. Place eggs in horizontal positions between plaits of braid. Cover with clean towel. Let rise in warm place until doubled and finger pushed into dough will leave imprint, 20 to 30 minutes.

Bake in preheated 400-degree oven until lightly browned, about 20 minutes. If desired, stir together confectioners' sugar and milk until smooth. Stir in candy nonpareils. Brush on bread. Cool on wire rack.

1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 yeast cake
1/4 cup warm water
1 egg, well beaten
3 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup currants
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
1 pinch ground cloves
Confectioner's sugar and milk
Combine milk, sugar, butter and salt. When lukewarm, add yeast cake dissolved in water. Then add egg and mix well. Sift flour and cinnamon together, and stir into yeast mixture. Add currants, lemon peel and cloves, and mix thoroughly. Cover and let rise in warm place until double in size. Shape dough into round buns and place on well-battered baking sheet.

Let rise again. Brush top of each bun with egg. Make a cross on each bun with a sharp knife. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) for 20 minutes. Remove from oven and brush over lightly with a cross made of confectioner's sugar moistened with milk.

EGG COLLOPS

4 hard-cooked eggs
Pepper and salt to taste
2 tablespoons grated cheese
1/2 cup thick white sauce (made with cream)
2 beaten eggs
2 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons fine bread crumbs
Shell and chop the hard-cooked eggs. Add pepper and salt, grated cheese, and white sauce. Bind with a little beaten to a stiff paste. With floured hands, form the mixture into cock shapes. Roll in beaten egg and then in bread crumbs. Fry to a golden brown in hot fat. Garnish with buttered peas and buttered parsnips.

SHROVETIDE PANCAKES

2 cups all-purpose flour
Pinch of salt
2 eggs (yolk and white beaten together)
Milk to make batter thin
Mix together flour, salt, well-beaten eggs, and just enough milk to make the batter thin. Have greased griddle very hot. Put 4 tablespoon of batter into a teacup and pour onto the griddle. Bake until golden brown on one side, then turn over and bake on the other.

GENUINE FASTNACHT KUCHE

3/4 cup thick sour cream
3/4 cup thick sour milk
1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 cup sugar
1 egg
Mix ingredients. Stiffen with enough flour to roll. Roll about 1/4 inch thick and cut into desired shape and size - 2-inch squares are preferable. Fry in deep fat. The amount of sugar may be increased, but this is not necessary if eaten in the approved manner.
To eat, split the fastnacht kuche in half and fill the inside with gwidde hunnich (quince jam). To use anything as ordinary and common as molasses on a genuine fastnacht kuche is an abomination. In the absence of gwidde hunniche, crabapple jelly may be substituted.

POSTNA ZUPA-LENTON SOUP-POLAND

4 carrots
4 stalks celery
1 onion
Salt and pepper
2 sprigs parsley
2 tablespoon butter
2 quarts cold water
Wash vegetables, cut into small pieces, and saute in butter, under cover, until they are browned. Add water and seasonings and simmer for half-hour. Strain before serving.

IRISH LENTEN CAKE (EGGLESS)

1/2 cup (1/4 pound) butter
3 tablespoons molasses
1 cup milk
4 cups sifted flour
3/4 cup sugar
3 teaspoons allspice
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup raisins
Melt butter, add molasses and milk, and cool. Sift flour, sugar, spice, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Stir butter mixture into dry ingredients. Add raisins and mix well. Pour into buttered tin and bake 1 1/2 hours in a 350-degree oven.

POPPY SEED MUFFINS (CAKES)

2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
4 tablespoons melted shortening
1 cup milk
2 teaspoons poppy seeds
Sift dry ingredients together; add unbeaten eggs, melted shortening which has been cooled, and milk to make a stiff batter. Add poppy seeds; mix well. Half fill greased muffin tins and bake in hot oven (400 degrees) for 18 to 20 minutes. Makes 13 muffins.

ORANGE BREAD

1 large orange, grated
Juice of 1 orange
1 cup sugar
3 cups flour

1 teaspoon salt
4 level teaspoons baking powder
3 tablespoons sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk
Cook together for a little while the grated orange, the orange juice and the cup of sugar. Then add to other ingredients. Mix together. Bake 45 minutes in 350-degree oven.

FIG PUDDING

1 pound chopped figs

1 cup suet, chopped
1 cup molasses
3/4 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon soda
3 cups pastry flour, sifted
1/4 teaspoon salt
Mix ingredients, turn into greased mold or covered baking dish, and steam 5 hours. Serve with hot lemon sauce or whipped cream sweetened and flavored with rum or brandy.

EASTER LAMB CAKE

1 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
4 eggs (whole)
2 cups all-purpose flour
3/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla or grated rind of 1 lemon
Cream butter, gradually adding sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time. Sift together flour, baking powder and

salt. Add to batter slowly and mix until blended. Add vanilla or grated lemon rind. Before filling lamb mold, coat both sides of mold with mixture of 2 tablespoons shortening blended with 1 tablespoon flour.
Pour batter into face side of mold, filling it level with the top. Place spoonful of batter in center of side of mold and some in ear tips. Place forms together, face side down, and set on baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for an hour.

To remove cake from mold, take off top lid and allow steam to escape. Let stand 10 to 15 minutes. Turn out on cake cooler. When cake is thoroughly cooled, cover with seven-minute frosting. Sprinkle lamb cake lightly with shredded coconut. Make face of raisins. Tie ribbon with bell around neck. Coconut tinted green serves as grass.

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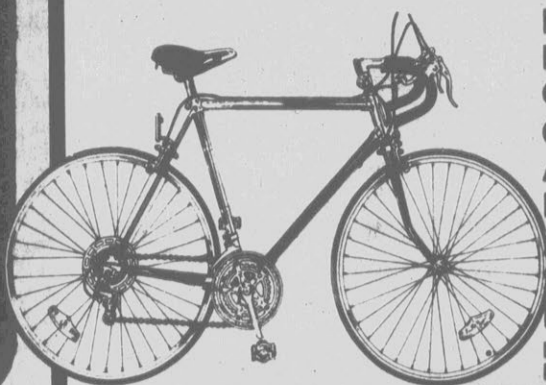

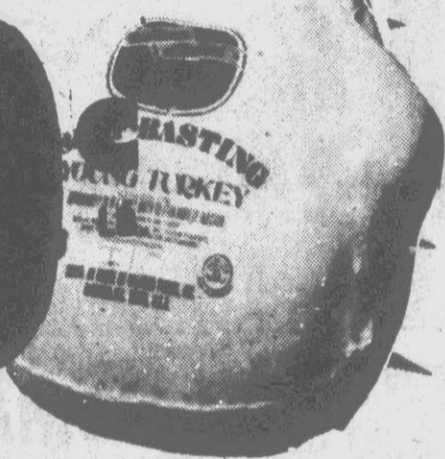

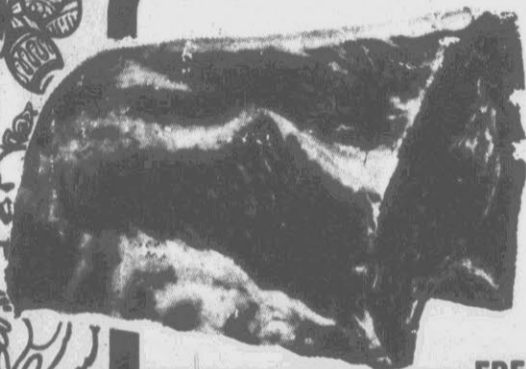

Hams Are Available Boiled, Baked, Canned, Fresh Or Smoked

Honeybaked Ham, \$4.39 a pound, either 6- to 10-pound half hams or 12- to 16-pound whole ones. These fully-cooked hams are very moist and juicy, spiral-cut and glazed with honey and spices. The one we had was medium lean. The company has 126 retail outlets in the United States. They also sell a 1-pound bag of ham-bone soup mix (with a variety of six beans and spices) for \$2.59.

Karl Ehmer Quality Meats, Inc., 60 stores in the United States, main office at 63-35 Fresh Pond Rd., Ridgewood, N.Y. 11385, (718) 456-8100 for mail orders.

Bauernschinken Ham, \$7.49 a pound, also called farmer-style ham. It is similar to the more popular Westphalian ham but is much larger, because it uses the entire hind leg. The result is a rectangular, air-dried, smoked ham, with a nice grain and a smoky flavor.

Black Forest Ham, \$5.49 a pound, a very lean ham with a deep-pink color and a robust flavor. The ham is smoked at high temperatures over hickory and dipped in beef blood to add color to the skin. Purists eat it sliced thin in sandwiches and wash it down with Kirschwasser.

Westphalian Ham, \$7.49 a pound.

This is a football-shaped, air-dried ham that is a good candidate for a buffet table. The ham is lightly smoked in the Old World tradition and should always be sliced very thin. A 20- to 25-pound ham shrinks to 6 pounds after curing, giving it a dense texture. This ham also works well in eggs Benedict or wrapped around breadsticks or melon slices.

CANNED HAMS

Krakus Polish Ham, 3 pounds, \$7.99. These fully-cooked, imported boneless hams are cooked in their own juices in the can. The tin was fairly easy to open, and the ham was wrapped in plastic wrap. Imported hams are different from domestic ones; they are less flavorful and much lighter in color. The speculation is that Krakus hogs are fed a secret blend of barley and potatoes. The one we tasted was salty in spots and tough in others. The can has been

pasturized and, according to the importers, will keep indefinitely if refrigerated.

Dak Danish Ham, 3 pounds, \$9.49, 97 percent fat-free (3 percent fat). This imported ham was rubbery in spots and mushy in others. Danish hogs are supposed to be leaner than American hogs, but this ham had streaks of fat. It was also salty and very dense. **Dak Danish Ham, 3 pounds \$9.99,** packed in Cryovac and a red net bag. This boneless ham appeared to be ham bits and chunks pressed together. It was salty, rubbery and contained crunchy pieces.

John Morell's Golden Smoked Ham, 3 pounds, \$6.49. The tin was hard to open, and there were distinct pockets of gelatin. When cooked, the ham tasted fatty and had bits of gristle.

SUPERMARKET HAMS
Jones Fully-Cooked, Skinless,

Shankless Ham, 10.5 pounds, \$2.29 a pound. This fully-cooked ham has the shank bone removed, which makes it easier to slice. It has a good ham taste — a balance of salt, sugar and smoke. Although no heating instructions were given, the company said the ham usually comes with an outer wrapper giving instructions for preparing it Virginia-style: Heat

ham for 12 to 15 minutes a pound at 300 degrees. Thirty minutes before serving, score the top and cover with brown sugar and stud with whole cloves. Moisten with sherry or ginger ale and return to oven.

Cook's, Our Super Trim, Hickory-Smoked Ham. This was a low-salt ham, offering "at least 33 1/3 less sodium."

Egg Still Special

SEVEN-MINUTE FROSTING
2 egg whites (unbeaten)
1 1/2 cups sugar
Salt
5 tablespoons cold water
2 teaspoons light corn syrup
1 teaspoon vanilla
Combine egg whites, sugar, dash of salt, water and corn syrup in top of double boiler. Beat with egg beater about 2 minutes, or until thoroughly mixed. Cook over boiling water, beating constantly, about 5 minutes, until frosting stands in stiff peaks. Use rubber spatula to scrape bottom and sides of pan. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat. Makes 4 cups of frosting.

EASTER EGG NOG PIE
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
2 eggs, separated
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1 1/2 teaspoon rum extract
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
Soften gelatin in the cold water and set aside. Combine the two egg yolks, 1/4 cup sugar, and the salt in a saucepan. Gradually stir in the milk. Cook over low heat until custard coats a metal spoon. Stir in gelatin, rum extract and nutmeg.

Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Whip the cream and fold into mixture. Beat whites of eggs until they stand in soft peaks. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar and continue beating until stiff. Fold this into custard mixture and turn into a baked cool pie shell (1 inch deep).

Chill until firm and ready to serve, then garnish with a wreath of whipped cream if you wish, and arrange six mounds of green-tinted coconut on the wreath of whipped cream. Make a depression in each mound and fill with jellybean Easter eggs. Serves 6.

CINNAMON RABBITS

7 egg whites
2 cups granulated sugar
5 teaspoons cinnamon
1 lemon rind, grated
2 cups pulverized almonds
2 cups powdered sugar
Green sugar
Currants

Beat the whites of the 7 eggs with the granulated sugar and the cinnamon until the mixture is stiff. Reserve one half of this mixture. To the other half add the grated rind of lemon, the almonds and the powdered sugar. Knead this well and roll to a thickness of 1/2 inch. Cut into forms with a rabbit-shaped cutter. Then brush these with remaining half of the mixture, sprinkle with green sugar, and add currants for the eyes. Bake until pale gold in color.

EASTER BUNNIES

Use any deluxe roll recipe. Shape dough into long ropes 3/4 to 1 inch in diameter, cut in 10 to 12-inch lengths. Tie in loose knots, bringing ends up straight to form ears. Press in raisins for eyes. Brush with diluted egg yolk. Let rise and bake as directed. While still warm, frost with confectioner's frosting; tint part of the frosting a delicate pink for the ears.

"GEFILLTE" EGGS

1/4 cup minced onion
2 tablespoons Rokeach Nyafat
1/8 teaspoon pepper
4 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
Saute the minced onion in Nyafat (seasoned fat) until golden brown. Meanwhile, cut eggs in half from tip to tip. Remove and mash yolks. Add browned onions, any melted fat in skillet, and seasonings. Blend well. Pile seasoned yolks back into egg whites. Serve on lettuce as first course, as salad, or as an hors d'oeuvre.

Peel eggs. Halve lengthwise; remove yolks and set whites aside. Halve avocado lengthwise; rub lemon juice over cut edges. Peel and mash 1 avocado half. Wrap and store remaining half for another use. Combine mashed avocado with egg yolks, mustard, lemon juice and salt. Mix well. Fill egg white halves with avocado mixture; arrange in 2 individual casseroles.

For sauce, in a small saucepan cook onion in margarine until tender but not brown. Stir in flour, bouillon granules and parsley. Combine milk and water; add all at once to flour mixture. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Pour sauce over eggs. Top with ham. Bake, uncovered, in a 325-degree oven about 15 minutes or until heated through. Makes 2 servings.
