Fund-Raiser Charged In Iran-Contra Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The independent counsel investigating the Iran-Contra affair today charged fund-raiser Carl R. "Spitz" Channell with conspiracy to defraud the U.S. Treasury of taxes owed on more than \$2 million raised for Nicaraguan guerrillas by the foundation he headed.

In a one-count criminal information filed today by independent counsel Lawrence Walsh in federal court, Channell was charged with

conspiring with others "known and unknown to the independent counsel" to defraud the Internal Revenue Service "by impeding, impairing, defeating and obstructing the lawful governmental functions of the IRS" in the collection of income taxes.

The charge, the first filed since Walsh's position was created in December, carries a maximum penalty upon conviction of five years imprisonment and a \$250,000 fine.

A criminal information is a charge filed by a prosecutor without going before a grand jury.

The fact that Walsh brought in an

information rather than an indictment means that Channell waived his right to have the case heard by a grand jury. In virtually all cases, this means that the defendant charged in the case has agreed to plead guilty to a specific charge and cooperate with the prosecutor.

Gail Alexander, a spokeswoman for Walsh, said the charge "carries the same weight (as an indictment) but is just a different instrument. A defendant can waive his right to an indictment for a number of reasons."

Asked why Walsh proceeded without going to the grand jury, she

said, "I think at a court hearing this afternoon it will become apparent."

A hearing was set this afternoon before U.S. District Court Judge Stanley Harris, she said.

Channell could not be reached for comment. His spokesman, Jared Cameron, said, "I don't know anything about it."

The information charged that the non-profit corporation Channell headed, the National Endowment for the Preservation of Liberty, was being used for unlawful purpose, "namely, to solicit contributions to purchase military and other types of

non-humanitarian aid for the Contras," the Nicaraguan rebels.

The information charged that the foundation defrauded the IRS by falsely stating that contributions it collected were tax-deductible when in fact by law they could not be deducted from a donor's income tax because "they were made for a non-deductible purpose, namely to purchase military and other types of non-humanitarian aid for the Contras."

In a list of 12 overt acts, the information charged that Channell, with the help of an unidentified govern-

ment official, raised \$2.12 million in cash and securities for the foundation from April 1985 to May 1986.

The overt acts charged in the information described a series of meetings that Channell and the unidentified government official had with contributors before donations were made to the endowment.

The information charged that on July 9, 1985, the official met with Channell and a consultant to his foundation. The information charged that the official met with at least

Mayor's Panel Calls For City To Reconsider Radio Purchase

Despite the Greenville City Council's decision to approve a bid for a \$651,720 communications system, a mayor's advisory group created to study the set-up has issued a report listing its shortcomings.

"As members of the ad hoc committee convened by you to examine the bids for the city of Greenville radio system, we feel we would be remiss in our duties if we did not report all our findings and conclusions," the report from the Mayor's Communications Ad Hoc Committee said.

Robert Sickels, a member of the committee, presented the report to Mayor Les Garner Tuesday.

The City Council unanimously accepted the radio package, which includes a design by Omnicom Inc. and equipment from Motorola, at an April 9 meeting.

Upon the request of Council

member Janice Buck, who served on the committee, council members agreed to make final payments 90 days after the system begins operation, and conduct a simulated emergency drill with city and county participation during that 90-day period.

President Defends Arms Talks

Reagan Pledges Europe Won't Be Put In Vulnerable Position

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, seeking to console uneasy NATO allies and rebut critics at home, says he has no intention of agreeing to a nuclear arms pact that would make Europe vulnerable to superior Warsaw Pact conventional forces.

Reagan took exception Tuesday to complaints that U.S. arms negotiators are focusing so heavily on intermediate-range nuclear force reduction talks that fixing the con-

ventional force imbalance is being overlooked.

In an interview with a half-dozen White House correspondents, the president said that while he's receptive to Soviet willingness to seek an arms control treaty, "it doesn't mean that you're going to roll over and just give into something without protecting yourself."

"Remember that contrary to what has been said too many times, this is not a de-nuclearization of Europe," Reagan said.

"I have always believed and have

stated many times ... that if and when we succeed in reducing what I think are the most destabilizing weapons, the nuclear weapons ... you cannot proceed with that to the point that their conventional superiority is increased and leaves an imbalance," the president said.

Some of the allies are concerned that a treaty withdrawing U.S. missiles and barring the installation of new ones would lower Western defenses to Soviet attack. But Reagan rejected that argument.

He also offered assurances that the Soviet edge in conventional troops in Europe will be "taken into account" in dealings with Moscow.

However, Reagan did not embrace a proposal from former President Richard M. Nixon and former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, who said the United States should not sign an agreement on nuclear weapons without resolving the imbalance in ground forces.

"It's wrong to assume that we're not aware of that," Reagan said.

Reagan brushed aside critical comments made by retired Army Lt. Gen. Edward Rowley, who said the United States had unwittingly played into Gorbachev's hand by agreeing to focus on the INF issue.

"We're focusing on minutiae. We're focusing on the wrong problems," said Rowley, one of Reagan's senior arms advisers. "Why focus on (Soviet leader Mikhail S.) Gorbachev's agenda?"

Asked about this, Reagan said, "You have to recognize that I expect diverse opinions in the shop and among the people and the Cabinet,

and everything else. And I've always been that way."

He added, however, that "once I've made the final decision, no matter how they may have felt about it, right or wrong, ... they'll carry it out."

In a speech at the University of Minnesota, Vice President George Bush urged students to "remember that a country like ours was not built by self-deceivers or wishful thinkers."

American Volunteer Dies In Contra Attack On Sandinista-Held Village

MATAGALPA, Nicaragua (AP) — American colleagues of the Oregon engineer killed by U.S.-backed Contra rebels today blamed the Reagan administration for his death and reaffirmed their commitment "to stand alongside the Nicaraguan people."

The body of 27-year-old Benjamin Ernest Linder, 27, of Portland, arrived in this provincial capital early today, his coffin carried by four men from the village more than 20 miles away where he was slain Tuesday.

Linder was the first American volunteer working on behalf of the Sandinistas to be killed by the Contras in the rebels' 5-year-old guerrilla cam-

paign against the leftist government. Nicaraguan accused the Reagan administration of criminal responsibility for his death.

Nicaraguan officials said Contra rebels killed Linder and two Sandinista militiamen in an attack in the northern village of La Camaleona in neighboring Jinotega province, where the rebels have been increasingly active in recent months.

Linder was working on the construction of a small hydroelectric plant in the village 85 miles northeast of Managua.

An American acquaintance of Linder said he usually carried an assault rifle "for protection" when

he ventured outside the village, but did not know if he had the gun with him Tuesday. One report said he was unarmed at the time of the Contra raid.

About 50 foreign volunteers, most of them Americans, paid last respects at the office of the presidential delegate in Matagalpa, where Linder's coffin was placed. Dozens of wreaths surrounded the open casket holding the body of the red-bearded volunteer.

"We hold the Reagan administration and the U.S. Congress fully and directly responsible for the murder of Benjamin Ernest Linder and call on the people of the U.S. to demand an immediate end to all us support

for this unjust war," said a statement drafted by Linder's fellow volunteers and read by Mary Risacher, of Washington.

"Rather than being intimidated by this assassination, we U.S. citizens working in the northern war zone of Nicaragua reaffirm our decision to continue to stand alongside the Nicaraguan people in their struggle for peace and justice," the statement said.

After the statement was read, someone shouted the name of the slain man, and those gathered shouted in unison, "Presente! Presente!" — meaning "He is with us." A wake was to be held for Linder tonight.

Fifth Graders Touring Virginia

Students at South Greenville School, with the assistance of grants and donations, left today for a three-day trip to visit historical sites in Virginia.

The 128 fifth-grade students and 10 teachers will visit Jamestown, Williamsburg and Yorktown to study the beginnings of the nation.

"Our children are knowledgeable, they know the material and they are ready to see it first-hand," fifth-grade teacher Becky Groome said. "These children enjoy learning and

get excited over learning. I think that is the most important thing and that is what I think education is about. If we as educators can help students get excited over learning then our job has been accomplished."

Archaeology and map skills are emphasized in Jamestown; government and industry are featured in Williamsburg, and military life and the Revolutionary War studied in Yorktown. The students will complete study packets consisting of maps, diagrams and questions which relate to objects seen in the museums

and information learned from the guides.

Special day programs include "Jamestown: A Beginning," "Occupations in Williamsburg" and "Fortunes of War." Evening programs are "Lantern Tour" and "Colonial Dancing."

The tour will be concluded by students re-enacting the Battle of Yorktown and the surrender of the British. Student actors have been chosen to play specific historical parts and the roles of American, British, French and Hessian soldiers.

This will be the last study tour of

Virginia the students at South Greenville will take. Funding problems for the trip have caused additional work for the teachers and staff of the school.

The school has received a \$7,500 grant from the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation for the tour. Additional funds have been secured from a local grant and from donations from local businesses and civic groups. Contributions total \$12,680.

"The \$12,000 has been raised by the principals and staff of the schools."

Lorraine Shinn Joins New State Panel For Families

Members of Gov. Jim Martin's Commission for the Family will work to prevent the weakening and break-up of the state's traditional family units, Greenville City Council member Lorraine Shinn said.

"I think this commission was put together to look at the public and private sectors roles in doing something about strengthening the families in North Carolina," Mrs. Shinn after she was sworn in Tuesday by Mayor Les Garner as a member of the commission.

"It's a spinoff from the Commission on Child Victimization that the governor had," Mrs. Shinn, a member of the victimization committee said.

Mrs. Shinn said the governor's wife, Dottie Martin, will chair the committee and some members of the victimization committee will serve on the new 26-member panel.

"We found out when we were looking at child victimization that we had to look at the family in order to deal with the child victimization issues because most of them came from the

problems in the family," Mrs. Shinn said.

"We've looked at areas of family violence and economic deprivation in families. We've looked at one-parent families, and the lack of educational opportunities for these one-parent families where the mother couldn't go out and work because she didn't have any background."

Martin signed an executive order establishing the Governor's Commission for the family to promote positive means of strengthening the state's families, as well as considering ways government policies contribute to the problems which cause the weakening of the family unit.

"The foundation of our great state is in jeopardy because of increasing threats to the family unit," Martin said. "These threats take many forms: social pressure, economic burdens, health problems, just to name a few."

"Through the work of this commission, we hope to not only heighten public awareness of the need to strengthen our families, but work to find ways to reduce the factors that place undue stress on so many of our families," he said.

ECU School Accredited

The East Carolina University School of Business has achieved continuing accreditation of its bachelor's and master's program in business administration by recent action of the Accreditation Council of the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.

The announcement came during special ceremonies held during the organization's annual meeting in New Orleans. The ECU school has held national accreditation at the graduate level for 10 years and for 20 years at the undergraduate level.

Approximately 1,200 colleges and universities in the United States offer undergraduate business degrees, but less than 260 are accredited by AACSB. Of the more than 600 master's programs, approximately 230 are AACSB accredited. In accounting, only approximately 65 schools have received accreditation at various degree levels.

To achieve accreditation, a business school must meet a wide range of quality standards relating to curriculum, admissions, degree requirements, library and computer facilities, financial resources and intellectual climate. Miller Needs Help

There are times in the world of reporting the news when one is not quite sure whether to laugh or shed a tear. Such an occasion arose last week when Glenn Miller purportedly proclaimed 17 "demands" as part of a peace offer to the federal government. If the government failed to meet any one of those demands by Saturday he threatened to unleash a "race war".

The demands were not met. Saturday came and went; the "race war" remains on Miller's leash.

Those demands included payment of \$888,000 in damages to himself and his followers. He also wants a public apology from the government for "violating our rights these past three years" and he wants his conviction for operating a paramilitary group to be overturned.

An "all-points bulletin" has been reissued for the former White Patriot Party leader who today is a fugitive. That is a follow-up to an arrest warrant issued for Miller on charges he violated bail rules and allegedly signing a letter declaring total war on Jews, blacks and federal officials.

Somewhere in hiding there is a fearful man with a fearfully distorted view of the same world we share. He sees his troubles as someone else's fault. Miller may also have a nagging doubt why it is that only a pitiful handful could see the world as he sees it.

Maybe he's brooding about that, too; anyway, precautions have been taken.

Any person with deadly weapons and the illusions or delusions of a Glenn Miller is dangerous not only to others but to himself.

We hope any friends who know where he is hiding will inform authorities before it is too late. Miller needs help.

Perspective

A group of leading American physicists produced a 422-page study last week which found "a decade or more" of research necessary to decide whether lasers or other high energy devices can work in the Administration's anti-missile defense planning.

The president was so exultant in 1983 over what the plan could mean to this country and the world that he applied the "Star Wars" label. It stuck.

The scientists' report puts a chill on over-enthusied rushing into the Star Wars project. Defense Secretary Casper Weinberger and others who have been pushing for a decision to deploy the system by the early 1990s rather than the previously targeted later date, lost the wind in their sails.

In light of their research, the physicists' finding sounds like a far more logical piece of advice.

Of course we need cheerleaders to keep enthusiasms alive and kicking; but we have to remember the rooting section is not the sector that overcomes problems or bears the responsibility for undue costs, mistakes or failure.

The involved team came from our leading educational centers as well as industrial and military-oriented laboratories ... probably the best to be found in the world. Their study puts the Strategic Defense Initiative into better perspective than we were previously offered.

U.S. Actions Boost Japan's Arrogance

Americans are committing a colossal error in their relations with Japan. We are fostering attitudes of arrogance and superiority among Japanese leaders that could rebound to hurt us.

Throughout Japan's history the pendulum of the national psyche has swung between feelings of inferiority and superiority toward the outside world. Commodore Matthew Perry's black ships with their cannons and industrial technology engendered

feelings of inferiority in Japan, until military victories in Asia changed them to feelings of superiority. Defeat in 1945 reversed those feelings, but now Japan's mood is swinging back toward superiority.

Americans returning from Japan often mention a new arrogance among younger Japanese. During a recent parliamentary exchange with Japan's Diet, American congressmen were stunned by a 45-minute lecture by a freshman Japa-

nese representative on what the United States was doing wrong to resolve trade issues.

Many an American exporter has had his product dismissed because the Japanese consider it to be of poor quality. The trend is to view the United States as a place where lawyers overrule engineers and where consumption, not production, is king. The explosion of the space shuttle Challenger has become a symbol of American decline.

The Japanese attitude of superiority in the scientific and technological arena is apparent in their absence at international science conferences, which they once attended in droves. When one is ahead, why bother?

Should the Japanese attitude matter to Americans? Yes. Traditionally, America has been considered superior — an awe-inspiring, technological giant. Japanese, therefore, have willingly put up with American ignorance of things Japanese and conceded to U.S. demands.

Note, however, Japanese treatment of other countries to which they feel superior. Thais, Koreans, Taiwanese and some Europeans fully appreciate the implications of being on the "inferior" end of a relationship with Japan.

Americans contribute to these attitudes in Japan in several ways. First, by Japan-bashing — especially in making Japan a scapegoat for domestic U.S. economic problems. By blaming Japan for our own failings, we breed arrogance and disdain for things American. The Japanese know full well that, despite all the rhetoric, they are not the primary cause of the U.S. trade deficit.

To make matters worse, we have allowed ourselves to become indebted to Japan. Over the past two years Japan has invested more than \$75 billion in the American economy, much of which winds up financing the U.S. budget deficit. Who can blame the lender for feeling superior to the borrower?

Competitiveness Involves All Aspects Of Economy

The sudden upsurge of public interest in "competitiveness" clearly has been triggered by the fact that America's merchandise balance-of-trade deficit reached a record \$170 billion at the end of 1986.

This trade deficit has performed a useful political role in shaking the nation from its complacency. But the only policies that make sense in trying to make America more competitive are those that we should

undertake even if we were not worried about foreign competition.

Competitiveness has to do with how the performance of the American economy compares to that of other rich nations. This can be measured in three ways.

The most obvious is the rate of economic growth.

A second is the growth of the gross national product per capita, which divides a nation's GNP by the

number of people in that country. The former measure is more appropriate if one views competitiveness as a measure of national economic strength, the latter if one is interested in comparing the rate of increase in national living standards.

A third useful indicator of competitiveness is productivity. This measures a nation's ability to generate increased wealth per worker each year, and is strongly influenced by such factors as the amount of investment in new plant and equipment and the skill level of the work force.

How does recent U.S. performance compare to that of Japan and West Germany, our two major competitors? Between 1979 and 1985 the American economy grew on average only half as rapidly as Japan's, though somewhat more rapidly than West Germany's. However, based on the other two indicators, America clearly was in third place. Our average growth in gross national product per capita was only one-third that of Japan, while Japan's productivity grew five times as rapidly as the United States'. West Germany also performed better than the United States, although not by as much as Japan.

While it is certainly encouraging that it did not take a major recession for Americans to become concerned about the longterm performance of their economy, there is a danger in focusing on the trade deficit as a symptom of our nation's economic difficulties. For there are any number of ways in which the United

States could easily reduce or even eliminate its merchandise balance-of-trade deficit — none of which would mean that our economy has become any more "competitive."

The most obvious is to encourage a still further decline in the value of the dollar against the currencies of major U.S. trading partners. Although many Americans seem to prefer foreign-produced goods, at some point, if the dollar were to sink low enough, we would purchase far fewer foreign products and foreigners would substantially increase their consumption of American produced goods and services.

To take an extreme example, if the yen were valued at 15 to the dollar instead of 150, our trade deficit with Japan would vanish overnight. Unfortunately, this also would mean a major decline in American living standards. We would each have to work 10 times as hard to purchase an equivalent "basket" of Japanese products. And each Japanese would have to work only one-tenth as long to purchase the same amount of American-made products.

Our trade deficit also would decline if American workers and investors were willing to accept substantially lower wages and profits than their counterparts in other nations. Just as an individual employee can become "competitive" by being willing to work for lower wages, so would American firms become more "competitive" if they lowered their prices. But the result would be the

same: a decline in our standard of living. Any nation can improve its trading position if it is willing to become poorer.

America can never hope to dominate the world economy as it did in the quarter-century after World War II. Nor should it want to. The recovery of Europe and Japan and the industrialization of nations such as Taiwan, South Korea and Brazil should be cause for celebration. In any event, given the relative size of its population, America will likely always have the world's largest gross national product.

A more realistic and responsible goal is to improve on our own undistinguished economic record of the last 15 years. We need to figure out how and why America was able to grow twice as rapidly during the 1960s as it has grown during the 1980s. Why have our annual gains in productivity since 1973 averaged less than one-third what they were between 1947 and 1973? Why has our annual investment in new plant and equipment been declining since the late 1960s?

Returning to the growth rates of the 1960s would not necessarily make America more "competitive." That would depend on how our performance compared to other nations'. But it would certainly make us richer than we would otherwise have been.

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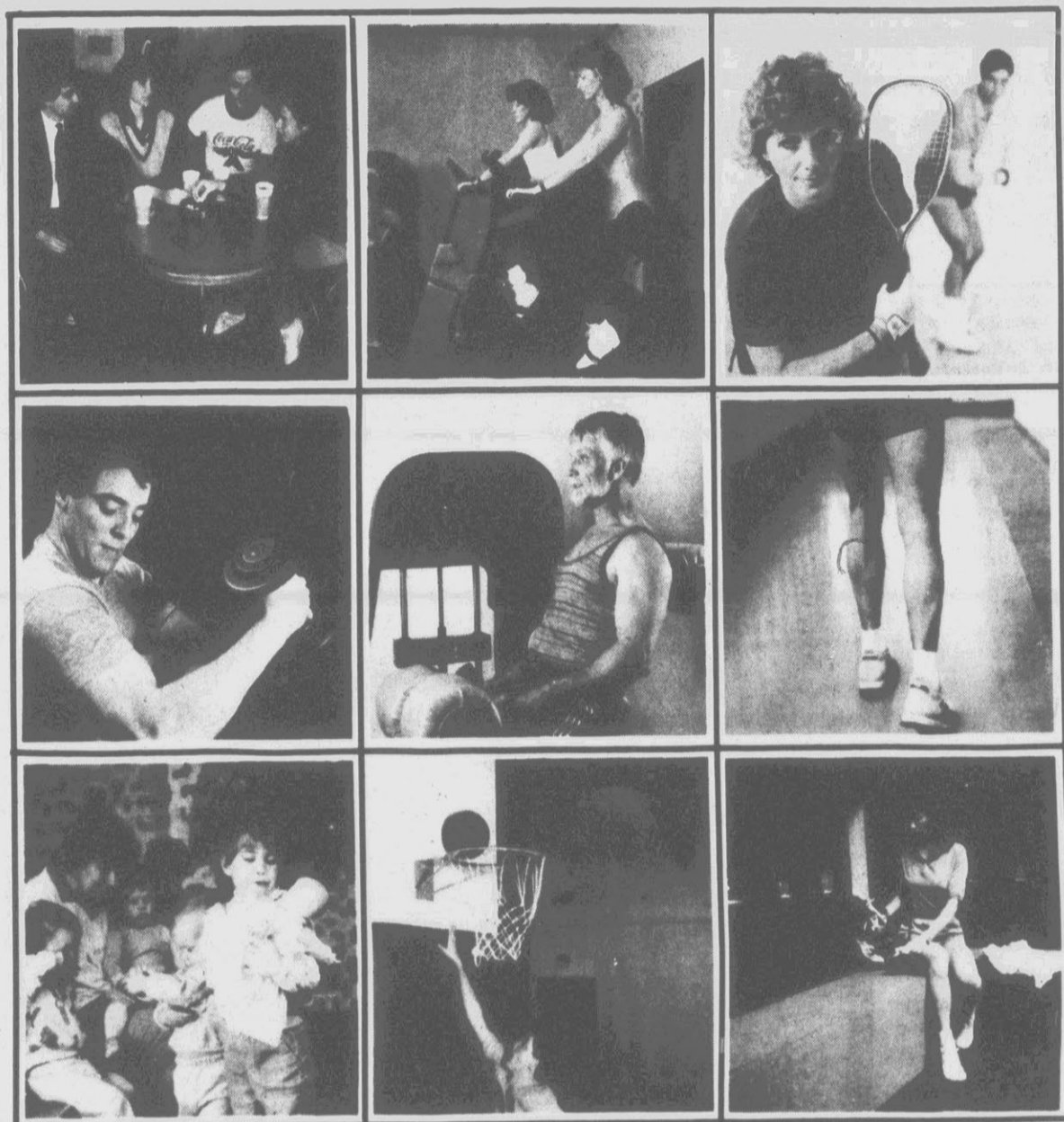
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'Out Of The Question'

Falwell Rules Out Any Return By Jim Bakker

FORT MILL, S.C. (AP) — The Rev. Jerry Falwell said today that any appearance by PTL founder Jim Bakker on the ministry's television program is "out of the question" anytime soon.

"I certainly am never going to say 'never' to anyone, but I can only say this. At this time or even anywhere in the foreseeable future, a guest appearance (by Bakker) would be out of the question," Falwell said on NBC-TV's "Today."

Falwell said he hasn't heard from Bakker since the new PTL board cut off payments to Bakker, his wife and the woman whose tryst with Bakker led to the scandal Falwell says has shattered faith in all evangelists.

Falwell said he doesn't expect an attempt by Bakker to make a comeback at PTL.

"I would be deeply disappointed and very surprised if Reverend Bakker indicated that he was more concerned about himself than the future of the ministry," Falwell said. "I've said it before and I'll say it now: His return to PTL would guarantee the end of the ministry and I don't think that's what he wants."

The new PTL board needed to "clean house" at the ministry to restore credibility to all evangelists, Falwell said.

Falwell, a television evangelist and founder of the Moral Majority, said Tuesday that PTL needed "new faces and a new administration."

The board decided during a five-hour meeting at PTL's Heritage USA complex that Bakker and Bakker's wife, Tammy, no longer will receive salaries or bonuses from PTL. Bakker will not be allowed to return as head of PTL, Falwell said.

The board accepted the resignation of the Rev. Richard Dortch, a board member who succeeded Bakker as president of the ministry, and stopped all PTL payments to him.

Falwell was to take Dortch's place today as host of the PTL Club.

The board named Harry Hargrave, a Dallas investments consultant, as chief operations officer. His job will include sorting through PTL's financial problems.

Bakker gave control of his television ministry and Christian retreat to the new board, with Falwell as chairman, on March 19 after admitting a tryst with Jessica Hahn and what turned out to be \$265,000 settlement to keep it secret.

The board decided Tuesday to stop monthly payments to the former church secretary and to try to get back the money PTL already has paid to her and her attorneys.

The growing scandal of sexual indiscretions and financial mismanagement has mushroomed into an attack of all television and radio ministries and has adversely affected all Christian churches in America, Falwell said.

"We have all been hurt. There's a general distrust out there we must heal. I don't ever remember a time when people were having such a hey-day ridiculing all that is Christian," he said during a news conference Tuesday.

"There is a national distrust of all who preach the Gospel. A lot of faith has been shattered."

He said the board's executive committee will investigate claims that Bakker was involved with prostitutes and homosexuals. Those allegations were made publicly by another TV evangelist, the Rev. John Ankerberg. Bakker, who has denied the allegations, will be allowed to "face his accusers" when the committee interviews them individually, Falwell said.

Tapes the board heard Tuesday from people who made the claims to Ankerberg were "convincing," Falwell said.

"These people are credible people," Falwell said Tuesday night on CNN's Larry King Show. But Falwell said he needs to hear Bakker's response to specific allegations before forming a final opinion on the allegations.

The Bakkers, who were co-hosts of PTL's daily television show, reportedly were paid \$1.6 million in salary and bonuses in 1986. Those payments were made even though the ministry is at least \$50 million in debt, Falwell said. Attorneys will help settle royalties the Bakkers earn from sales of records and other items, Falwell said.

After Falwell's news conference, Mrs. Bakker stepped into the hot afternoon sun outside her Palm Springs, Calif., mansion and said she and her husband will miss the people at the Christian retreat they founded.

"We're very sad right now," she said as her voice broke. Bakker may comment on the board's action later in the week, she said. Asked where Bakker was, she replied: "I won't say."

Attorney Norman Roy Grutman, counsel for the board, said Tuesday that PTL no longer would make monthly payments to Miss Hahn because her public talk about Bakker violated the provisions of the payments.

Some \$265,000 in PTL money had been set aside for Miss Hahn to ensure her silence about the encounter with Bakker. A total of \$150,000 was placed in a trust fund. Miss Hahn received a small amount of the remaining \$115,000, with the rest going for legal fees. The payment was arranged by Dortch.

Grutman, who said April 9 that he thought the funds had been cut off, said PTL would seek repayment of money already given to Miss Hahn.

"Under the terms of the agreement, any dispute between the parties, and certainly with respect to Miss Hahn, is to be referred to binding arbitration," Grutman said.

Miss Hahn, tearful and visibly upset, told reporters Tuesday that it was a former aide to Bakker who leaked the details of the tryst and settlement.

"I have done everything I've been asked to do. I've kept quiet," she said in front of her house in West Babylon, N.Y.

"My main interest is seeing this over. It has nothing to do with money right now," she said. "I'm tired of people being ruined by this thing. There's no reason for this to go on week after week. I would like it to end so people can feel encouraged when they go into church — so they can feel peace."

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The board, meeting the second time at PTL headquarters since Bakker stepped down March 19, also accepted the resignation of the Rev. Rex Humbard Sr. from the board and fired David Taggart, Bakker's personal aide.

Falwell said Humbard, a Pentecostal, told him: "I'm a little older than you are, and I'm not able to ride this horse."

Falwell had said Monday that Bakker told him he would wage a "holy war" if he were not allowed to return to PTL. Falwell said Tuesday there would be no such war: "A holy war requires two combatants, and there will be no warfare from our side."

Falwell said he is unsure who will replace Dortch as host of the PTL Club television talk show, but said he will preside for the next few days.

"I do not plan to permanently sit in that seat," Falwell said.

Falwell said he is concerned about the future of the ministry but predicted it would survive. PTL, which stands for Praise the Lord or People That Love, reported \$129 million.

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Angry Jessica Hahn Says She's One Being Hurt By PTL Scandal

WEST BABYLON, N.Y. (AP) — Jessica Hahn says she's angry at people who have accused her of leaking the story of her sexual tryst with ousted PTL leader Jim Bakker, thus violating her \$265,000 agreement to keep quiet.

"The one that's being hurt is me and I'm tired of it," she said Tuesday. "Why on God's earth would I want that story in the paper?"

At a news conference in front of her Long Island apartment, Miss Hahn said she has "done everything I've been asked to do."

"I've kept quiet. I have not been hostile to Jim Bakker or the (PTL) ministry. I have not even commented about Jim Bakker."

Miss Hahn has become a focus of the sex scandal involving Bakker and his PTL ministries following revelations that she had sex with him at a Florida motel seven years ago.

"I'm tired of people being ruined by this thing," she said. "There's no reason for this thing to go on week after week. I'm tired of it," Miss Hahn said, her voice shaky and her eyes teary.

Since the scandal erupted a month ago, Miss Hahn has limited her

public comments to her thoughts about religion and the effect the scandal could have on churchgoers.

Bakker turned his ministry, which stands for People That Love or Praise The Lord, over to the Rev. Jerry Falwell on March 19.

On Tuesday, the PTL board banished Bakker and his top deputies from the ministry and cut off payments to Miss Hahn, a former church secretary.

About \$265,000 in PTL money had been set aside for Miss Hahn, \$150,000 of it in a trust fund, to ensure her silence about the tryst. She received a small amount of the remaining \$115,000, with the rest going for legal fees.

The payment was arranged by the Rev. Richard Dortch, a PTL board member who succeeded Bakker and whose resignation the board accepted Tuesday.

Attorney Norman Roy Grutman, the board's counsel, said PTL no longer would make the monthly payments because Miss Hahn's public statements about Bakker violated the provisions of the payments.

Miss Hahn said, "No contract is broken."

"My side of the story has not been told," she said. "I don't intend to tell

it. I will not talk about that incident. I refuse to."

She said that if she had to, she would take a lie detector test to disprove claims she spoke publicly.

Miss Hahn said she had been told that an aide to Bakker who had been fired took a file containing information about the tryst and leaked it to the media.

tion in revenues last year from its TV ministry and associated enterprises, including the Heritage USA theme park, shopping center and hotels.

Falwell said later on "The MacNeil-Lehrer News Hour" that he met will all 2,000 PTL staff members Tuesday afternoon.

"Several minutes they stood in an ovation. I promised them my total commitment. I introduced the new executive people who've just moved in there. I think that we have a team effort now, and I think the partners there will join with us. We're going to make it."

Falwell said PTL no longer is offering or accepting lifetime "partnership" contributions to the ministry while PTL is being audited. The lifetime partners generally pay \$1,000 to the ministry.

The PTL board is "not riding a ship that's destined for doom," Falwell said. But he said the board felt a duty to protect the assets of PTL to pay off creditors and to make sure people who have invested in the ministry "will not lose a dime."

"We're concerned with the little widows out there who put their life savings in here," he said. Those duties, he said, take precedence over compensating Bakker for his work in founding the PTL ministry.

Attorney Grutman said PTL will seek to dismiss a \$601 million class-action lawsuit brought against the board in Ohio. Three members of a

family charged that their contributions to PTL were used for illegal, illicit and immoral purposes.

Grutman said it was "preposterous to have asserted liability on this board for actions of the previous board."

The ministry also is under scrutiny by the government. The Charlotte (N.C.) Observer reported Tuesday that the Internal Revenue Service has told PTL it could lose its tax-exempt status for 1981-1983 because a "substantial portion of PTL's net earnings" those years went to benefit Bakker, his relatives and other PTL officers.

The Observer reported that Dortch received \$350,000 in salary and bonuses. Dortch had said earlier he would not accept any payment this year.

PTL's 2,300-acre Christian retreat 15 miles south of Charlotte includes television studios, a hotel, an amusement park, housing developments, a campground and an outdoor amphitheater.

Falwell's enterprises include his 21,000-member Thomas Road Baptist Church in Lynchburg, Va., the "Old Time Gospel Hour" telecast and Liberty Broadcasting Network.

North Carolina government officials should reduce the nitrogen that enters the Pamlico River by declaring the river basin nutrient-sensitive, the draft of a new state report on the river recommends.
That would allow the state to help farmers pay for ways to control the runoff from their fields, which are the sources of most of the nitrogen entering the river.
But the report stops short of recommending that limits be placed on the phosphorous discharged into the river by

wastewater treatment plants and industries. That would allow Texasgulf Chemicals Co. to continue to dump a ton of phosphate and millions of gallons of fresh water into the river each day from its phosphate mine and fertilizer plant in Beaufort County.

The state's nutrient-sensitive program allows such controls, but the report says that more research is needed on the effects of those discharges.
Adding the 17-county Tar-Pamlico River Basin to the

nutrient-sensitive program is the most important of the 39 recommendations made in the final draft of the report by the state Division of Environmental Management.

Others suggest that the state step up its monitoring program and begin to control the amount of fresh water and sediments that enter the river.

The draft of the report was sent last week to 55 scientists and researchers for review. The final version isn't expected until July, but the report already is being crit-

icied by some environmentalists, who say it doesn't go far enough.

"The state's trying to walk a political tightrope," said David McNaught, executive director of the Pamlico-Tar River Foundation, a conservation group in Washington, N.C. "It seems ludicrous to address the problem by confronting only the major sources of pollution."

The discharges from the municipal wastewater treatment plants and industries, called point sources, also should be controlled, McNaught said.

Senate Approves Bill To Protect Burlington

RALEIGH (AP) — The state Senate has approved proposed legislation designed to shield Burlington Industries Inc. from a hostile takeover that bill supporters say could cost North Carolina hundreds of textile jobs.

The bill, introduced Monday night, was rushed through the Senate Judiciary IV Committee Tuesday morning. It cleared the Senate 43-3 and was sent to the House, which decided against taking a quick vote.

A co-sponsor said it probably would become law, but not by 4:30 p.m. today — the deadline Burlington's would-be purchasers set for the company to respond to their offer of \$2 billion for the remaining stock.

The bill would extend to Burlington, the nation's biggest textile manufacturer, the protections afforded North Carolina businesses under a law enacted last week. That measure says buyers of in-state companies must pay all shareholders the same price for their stock. The law also bars mergers not approved

by 95 percent of the shareholders.
Burlington is not covered by the new law because it was chartered in Delaware and technically is not a North Carolina company. But its corporate headquarters are in Greensboro and it does a majority of its business in North Carolina.

The textile giant employs some 22,000 North Carolinians in 56 plants located in 22 counties across the state, lawmakers said. Its payroll exceeds \$360 million.

A buyout by New York investor Asher B. Edelman and Canadian textile company Dominion Textile Inc.

could result in plant closings and job losses in North Carolina, lawmakers warned.

Edelman and Dominion announced Friday they had purchased 7.6 percent of Burlington's stock since Feb. 23 and were offering \$60 per share for the rest.

"Right now, the textile industry is enjoying a very good economy," Sen. Richard Conder, D-Richmond, said during Senate debate. "Once that economy dips, and those folks up at Dominion Textile... need to cut, they ain't gonna cut Canada. They're going to cut us here in North Carolina."

Sen. Bob Shaw, R-Guilford, said Edelman and his Dominion allies were "interested in one thing and that's making money, which is fine. But when you're greedy, that's another thing. His (Edelman's) job is to protect his pocketbook. Our job is to protect the citizens of North Carolina."

Sen. Larry Cobb, R-Mecklenburg, was not on hand for the vote but argued against the bill earlier, calling it "blatantly unconstitutional on its face" and saying it would violate interstate commerce law.

"No matter how good the purpose or the intent of introducing legislation of this type is, I don't think we should pass something that we know will not be upheld by the courts," Cobb said.

Other senators said that was a risk worth taking.

"If we can delay Mr. Edelman and

people of his ilk, and make it more expensive for them... maybe they'll forget about (Burlington) and go on to something else," Shaw said.

The bill's Senate sponsor, R.C. Soles, D-Columbus, acknowledged during the judiciary committee meeting that enacting the bill would send the Legislature down a largely uncharted legal path.

Sen. Dennis Winner, D-Buncombe, asked whether any court had vali-

dated a law passed by one state involving mergers of companies chartered in other states.

Soles and Miller acknowledged there was none, but contended that the U.S. Supreme Court had sent a signal last week in upholding an Indiana law making it more difficult to acquire businesses in that state.

That ruling is "reflective of the court's concern that... where (a) facility is and the impact it has on that

state should be given preferential consideration...," Miller said.

The Senate amended the bill to have it expire June 30, 1989, before passing it and sending it to the House under a parliamentary provision that allowed its immediate consideration there. But the House took no action, as Miller said its Judiciary III Committee preferred to wait until its regular meeting Thursday to vote on the bill.

Phosphate Ban Wins Senate OK

RALEIGH (AP) — Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan applauded the Legislature's enactment of a statewide ban on phosphorus in household laundry detergents — a move he hoped might help his political future even as it "turned the Tide" on his own household.

After the state Senate voted 42-2 Tuesday to concur in minor House amendments on the bill, Jordan acknowledged it might be important in a possible gubernatorial matchup against Republican Gov. Jim Martin, who fought the bill.

"It was one of those things that on opening day I said I wanted to see us do and we've done it," Jordan said. "Yes, I've worked hard on it and yes, I want some credit for it."

"It's not easy to pass bills over the objections of the governor," he added. "We not only had to fight the governor, we had to fight the people in the administration that had to do what he wanted them to do."

But Jordan admitted the new law would prompt changes in his own Montgomery County household, where his wife washes with Tide.

"I was reading to her all the different Tide products that she can still buy that are non-phosphate," he said. "We were using Tide and we will continue using Tide — non-phosphate."

The enactment, delayed Monday night by a question over the exemptions in it, drew little debate Tuesday. But opponents said after the vote that the law had more political overtones than environmental protections.

"It's a run-on bill as far as I'm concerned," said Sen. Paul Smith, R-Rowan, who joined Sen. Howard Bryan, R-Iredell, in voting against concurrence.

Smith echoed arguments that have plagued the bill since its introduction, saying it would do little to curb phosphorus that spurs algae growth, robbing water of oxygen and killing fish. He also criticized industry exemptions put in the bill to ease its passage.

"So many people can use the (phosphorus-containing) detergents and yet the housewife is the only one that can't use it," he said. "I think it would be better to either cut everybody out or let everybody stay where they were."

Sen. Russell Walker, D-Randolph, Senate sponsor of the bill, repeated assurances that housewives would not suffer under the new law, which will take effect on Jan. 1.

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Farmers Ordered To Supply Sanitation Facilities For Workers Within A Month

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's growers are being given a month to provide nearby drinking water and three months to set up field toilets and wash basins for nearly half a million farm workers.

The government, in ordering the facilities, said they will reduce infectious parasitic diseases among farm laborers by more than two-thirds. The improvements also will reduce heatstroke and other heat-related illnesses and deaths in agriculture by 90 percent, officials say.

The regulations, issued Tuesday by Labor Secretary William E. Brock, end a 15-year struggle by migrant labor and Hispanic groups to force growers to provide sanitation facilities that the government has required of other employers for decades.

"Basic human decency demands that suitable drinking water, toilets and handwashing facilities — fun-

damental needs taken for granted at other American work sites — be provided these workers," Brock said.

Farm group officials said growers will have little trouble meeting the May 30 deadline to supply workers with "suitably cool" and "readily accessible" drinking water.

But they said it will be more difficult for all growers to meet the July 30 deadline for separate handwashing basins and toilets for every 20 field hands, within a quarter mile of where they are working.

Roughly half of the workers covered under the new rules are in three states: California, 137,000; Florida, 63,800; and North Carolina, 39,600. Other states most affected by the regulations are Kentucky, Washington, Hawaii, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Idaho, Texas, Georgia, Oregon and Tennessee.

North Carolina already requires drinking water and hand-washing facilities, but no toilets.

"The providing of toilet facilities is

probably the most expensive item," Robert Broughton, general counsel to the N.C. Farm Bureau Federation, said Tuesday. "We felt like some of the requirements for the toilet facilities would put a tremendous financial burden on the farmer."

Of the estimated 471,600 farm workers covered by the regulations, one-fourth are migrants and 25 percent to 30 percent are women, said Terry Mikelson, a spokesman in the Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Growers employing fewer than 11 field workers are not covered because of a congressional prohibition forbidding OSHA from enforcing its regulations on them. The handwashing and toilet facilities also are not required if workers are in the fields for only three hours or less each day.

OSHA officials estimated that the new regulations will cost 54,000 growers a total of \$24.1 million a year.

For a typical farmer, the regulations will raise daily labor costs about \$1.09 per worker, or about 3 percent. But the overall increase in farm production costs will amount to less the 0.2 percent, OSHA officials said.

They said those increased costs are offset by an estimated savings of \$49 million to \$79 million in productivity among farm workers because they will be less susceptible to heat stroke, parasitic diseases and illness resulting from exposure to agricultural chemicals.

The officials said the regulations will reduce parasitic diseases among farm workers from the current 219,292 calculated cases that occur annually by 142,541, or roughly two-thirds.

Urinary tract infections, most common among female farm workers because toilet tissue currently is not provided for them, should fall by 85 percent, from 18,964 cases to 2,380 cases a year, they said.

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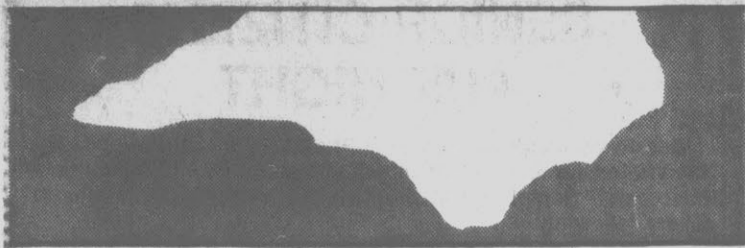
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Gates Opened

CLARKSVILLE, Va. (AP) — The rising waters of Buggs Island Lake have forced the Army Corps of Engineers to open the flood gates of the John H. Kerr Dam for the first time since the dam was completed 36 years ago.

Water was allowed over the spillways Tuesday as the rain-swollen lake rose to a record 319.4 feet above sea level. Normal elevation of the lake is 302 feet.

The Corps of Engineers predicted the flood-control reservoir will crest sometime today or Thursday at 319.8 feet. With a normal surface area of about 50,000 acres, the lake may expand to as much as 83,000 acres.

Until Tuesday, the highest level recorded for Buggs Island Lake had been 318.85 in 1975. Max Grimes of the Corps of Engineers said that since the reservoir rose to 319.89 feet above sea level at 7 a.m. Tuesday, "every minute we've been setting a new record."

Lake Gaston to the east, with a normal elevation of 199 to 200 feet above sea level, rose to 201.3 Tuesday and was expected to crest near 203 feet today or early Thursday.

Frescoes

WEST JEFFERSON, N.C. (AP) — Leaders of a mountain Episcopal parish say they will not move a tiny church containing a fresco of "The Last Supper" and have put plans to move a second church containing frescoes on holding pending further study.

Plans to move Holy Trinity Church and St. Mary's Church to another site in Ashe County embroiled the parish in controversy last year, with some opponents saying the frescoes would be damaged and Glendale Springs would lose the economic benefit of tourists who visit the churches.

"Because of the difficulty of moving the frescoes of 'The Last Supper' and because of the economic damage its removal from Glendale Springs would cause to that community, Holy Trinity Church and the Mission House will not be moved in the foreseeable future," said Dr. John Long, the vestry's senior warden.

FmHA Loans

RALEIGH (AP) — Farmers Home Administration officials say a national pool should satisfy the needs of all farmers who need direct operating loans this year.

FmHA officials in Washington "have indicated to us their projections are there will be funds to fund all requests in the nation," said Eddie Miller, special projects representative for the state FmHA in Raleigh. FmHA serves 10 percent to 15 percent of the state's farmers and is considered the lender of last resort.

Miller said North Carolina farmers are expected to get about \$5 million in additional direct operating loans from the national pool, which has about \$200 million.

Evacuation

ASHEVILLE (AP) — About 75 elderly residents of an Asheville apartment house were evacuated today following an early-morning fire at the facility.

The fire started around 3 a.m. in one wing of the home, authorities say. By 6 a.m., 30 apartments had been destroyed.

One person was taken to an Asheville hospital for smoke inhalation, but no serious injuries had been reported.

Murder Arrest

HENDERSONVILLE, N.C. (AP) — An arrest has been made in an six-year old Henderson County murder case, officials say.

The arrest, made Monday in Miami, was in connection with the death of Carl Frank Lyda of Edneyville, who was shot in the head and left lying in his yard in November 1980.

Ricky Allen Remington, 34, of

Miami was charged with first-degree murder in connection with the shooting, and "there might be more arrests in the future," Henderson County chief detective George Erwin said.

Child Dies

DURHAM (AP) — An 8-year-old Mebane girl who was hit by a car died at Duke Medical Center Monday, a hospital spokesman said.

Kristy Lynn Leach died from injuries she received in the Thursday accident. Trooper T.D. Hurley said the girl "had just gotten off the school bus and had gone to get the paper or something" when she was hit by the car.

No charges were filed in the accident.

EPA Claims

RALEIGH (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency is accepting claims for payment and requests for disposal of certain Dinoseb pesticides which are now suspended and canceled.

All claims must be postmarked no later than July 14 to be considered.

On Oct. 7, 1986, the EPA issued an emergency suspension of all registrations of the herbicide Dinoseb. From that date, all persons were prohibited from using, selling or distributing any Dinoseb products.

Jordan Warns Pay Raises May Be Smaller Than State Workers Expect

RALEIGH (AP) — Salaries and benefits must be competitive with private industry if state government is to keep good employees, says Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan, who told state employees that a pay raise is a top priority for the General Assembly.

"You can hire people to work for you. That's not difficult," Jordan told a group of state employees who visited the Legislature to lobby for their proposal. "But you have to have the kind of relationship where employees will work with you."

But Jordan warned that employees might not get the salary boost they are seeking.

State employees are seeking a 10 percent across-the-board pay raise or — if that is impossible — a raise

comparable to what is voted for teachers. Gov. Jim Martin has proposed 4.5 percent pay boosts for employees and teachers.

"I wish I could stand here today and say you could get the salary increase you are requesting," Jordan said in a speech in the Legislative Building.

"But ... I cannot make any promises to you other than to assure you that a raise for state employees is certainly among the top priorities in the budgeting process," he said. "We are very interested and very sensitive to your needs."

Jordan said the Senate State Personnel Committee, which he created this year, has been looking at issues facing state employees, including general personnel practices.

He said the committee chairman,

Sen. Tom Taft, D-Pitt, has introduced a bill to create a pay policy for state employees and revise the merit pay system in effect.

The bill would amend a law to require compensation plans to be established and maintained by the State Personnel Commission. It would allow the commission to conduct annual compensation surveys, and the governor could make salary appropriations requests based on those surveys.

The bill says that employees whose performance is unsatisfactory would not be allowed to receive performance awards, which are given to employees in graduated amounts for performance above the satisfactory level.

"... I think it is important that the evaluation process be as fair and as

tightly structured as possible, or the system will not work and will quickly lose credibility," Jordan said.

Jordan pledged that he would work to protect employees as much as possible from partisan politics. "You are hired to do a job, and if you do it well, then you should be able to work without fear of being involved in political hiring and firing and bipartisan disputes," he said.

House Speaker Liston Ramsey told the employees that lawmakers would not know how much money was available for raises for several weeks, because state merchants do not have to send in money gained from sales taxes until May 15.

"I am confident we will do everything possible in the 1987 session to get raises," Ramsey said. "We are tight on money."

State Wants Extremists To Register

RALEIGH (AP) — A bill that would require extremist groups with violent tendencies to register with the state apparently would not apply to any organization currently active in North Carolina, supporters say.

But a spokesman for the state attorney general's office told a House committee Tuesday that the measure was needed to head off violence before it starts.

"We're trying to ... take preventive steps to assure that these violent activities which are not constitutionally protected are stopped before they

ever occur," Alan Briggs, deputy state attorney general, told the House Judiciary II Committee.

The panel set up a subcommittee to study the bill, sponsored by Rep. Dan Blue, D-Wake.

It would require registration of groups that advocate overthrowing or seizing control of the United States government through violent means or groups that engage in "civilian military activity."

The groups would be ordered to report their leaders' names, addresses and nationalities; qualifica-

tions for membership in the groups; their contributors and assets; publications they issue or distribute; the firearms they own; and documents relating to their powers and purposes.

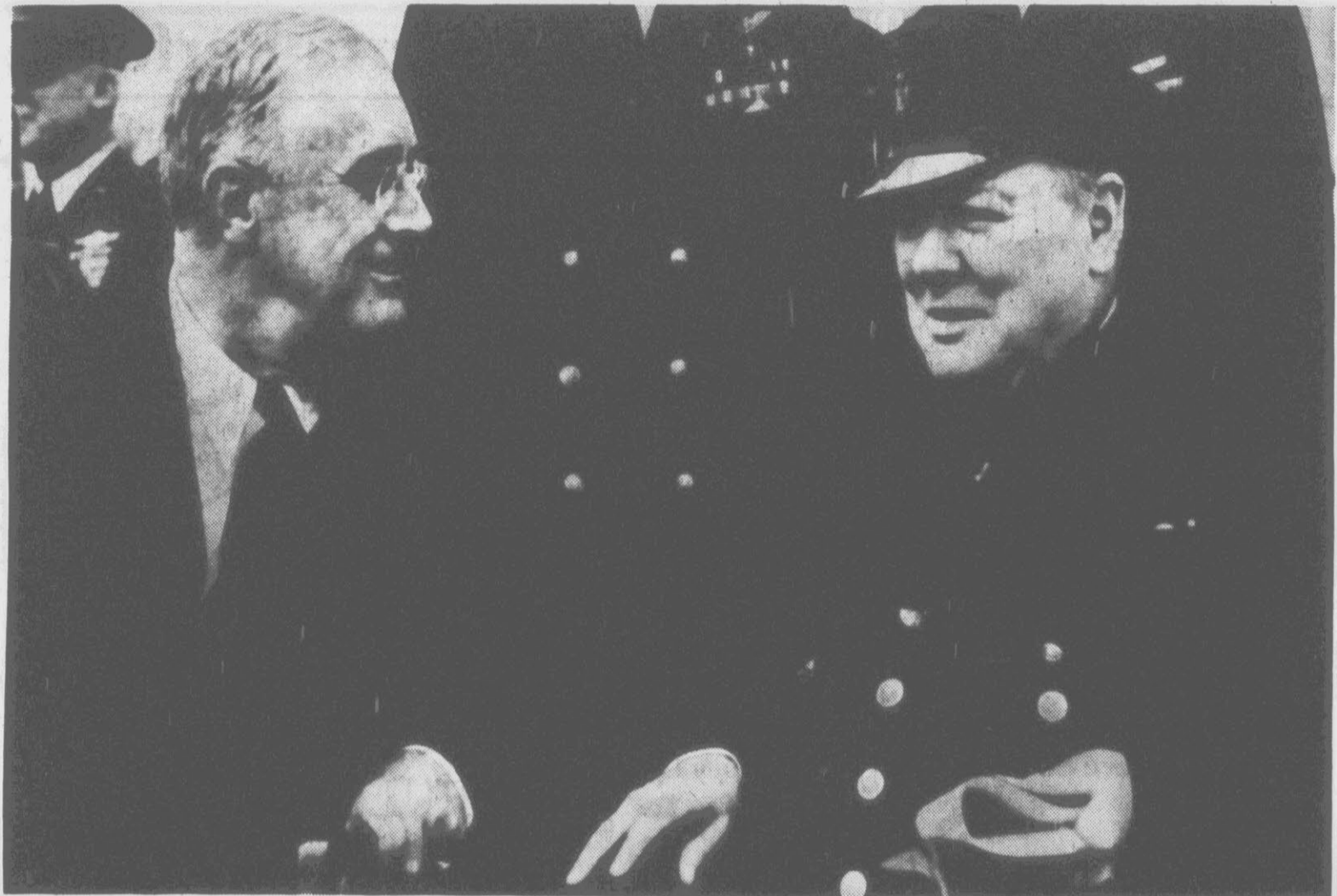
None of the various white supremacy groups in the state appear to advocate violent seizure of the government or to be involved in paramilitary activities, Briggs said.

But although North Carolina is "in a low ebb in the cycle," that situation could change quickly if the trend

toward violence that's apparent in other states spreads, Briggs said.

In an interview, Briggs noted that Glenn Miller, former leader of the defunct White Patriot Party, threatened over the weekend to ignite a race war.

Miller, convicted last summer of violating a federal court order to refrain from paramilitary activities, has dropped out of sight and is being sought by state and federal law enforcement officers.



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Dukakis Enters Race For Democratic Bid

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) — Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis today joined the roster of contenders for the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination, offering leadership that would leave America "greater, better, stronger, prouder and more beautiful."

Dukakis formally announced his candidacy in a speech combining an attack on Reagan administration policies, a subtle dig at Democratic front-runner Gary Hart, and an appeal to voters to judge his own fitness for the White House by his performance as governor for nearly a decade.

"Ask more than what we are going to do. Ask what he have already done," Dukakis said at a renovated mill building in snowy New Hampshire.

"Ask more than whether we have new ideas. Ask whether we have already made new ideas work," he said in remarks that seemed designed to challenge Hart's self-styled campaign of "new ideas."

paign as a long shot in national polls, hoping to parlay his popularity in New Hampshire — the nation's first primary state — and the economic turnaround of his own Massachusetts to the party nomination.

Two recent polls have said that Dukakis is even with front-runner Hart in New Hampshire.

In his first speech as an official candidate, Dukakis likened the race for the nomination to a marathon. But his schedule for the first day seemed more of a sprint, with stops in Boston, Atlanta and Des Moines, Iowa, after New Hampshire.

"Above all, I believe our children have a right to live in a land of vibrant and sustained economic growth that provides genuine opportunity," he said.

On foreign policy, he declared that Americans "don't deserve a shooting war in Nicaragua. ... They don't deserve secret wars cooked up by armchair Rambos."

In a leader, he said, "they deserve a president who knows what's going

on — and who knows what he's doing."

Dukakis declared that while it is impossible to predict the problems that will confront the next president, "we can predict the character and competence of the person. ..."

"I want Americans not only to imagine me in the White House — but also to study me in the state house, because as a sitting governor I am tested every month, every week and every hour."

By his announcement, Dukakis joined Hart, former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt and Rep. Richard Gephardt of Missouri as official Democratic candidates. Sens. Joseph Biden of Delaware, Paul Simon of Illinois and Albert Gore of Tennessee as well as the Rev. Jesse Jackson are expected to run, and Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton is also considering a campaign for the Democratic nomination.

In an early morning television appearance, Dukakis refused to criticize Hart when asked to distinguish himself from the former Colorado senator and the acknowledged Democratic front-runner.

"I want to run a positive campaign," he said. "I'm sick to death of the kind of negative campaigning that we had in the fall of '86."

Dukakis' decision to run seems in part a result of New York Gov. Mario Cuomo's decision not to, as well as a widespread perception that Hart's support is not strong enough to carry him to the nomination.

Until Cuomo announced he would not seek the nomination, Dukakis, as a fellow northeastern governor, seemed to have little running room. As for Hart, Dukakis finished even with the front-runner in a Boston

Globe survey taken last month in New Hampshire.

Because New Hampshire voters frequently get their news from Massachusetts television stations and newspapers, Dukakis is very well known in the first-primary state.

In addition, he has taken a strong position against opening the controversial Seabrook nuclear power plant in New Hampshire, a few miles

from the Massachusetts border. By refusing to approve proposed emergency evacuation plans, Dukakis has effectively blocked the plant from receiving an operating license.

Dukakis was first elected governor in 1974. He was defeated in a Democratic primary in 1978, then mounted a comeback that resulted in new terms in 1982 and 1986.

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Laxalt On Brink

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Nevada Sen. Paul Laxalt announced Tuesday formation of an exploratory committee, saying his decision to run for the Republican presidential nomination is "as close to final as it could be."

"Do we build on our successes or do we turn back the calendar and reinstate the failed policies of the '70s? It's my overriding conviction we are on the right course and that to turn back would be a terrible

mistake," Laxalt said. "There is much unfinished work to do."

"In Western parlance, this hired hand is ready to take over as foreman," Laxalt added to the cheers of his supporters. He denied he would be a Reagan "clone."

Laxalt, 64, said a pending libel suit involving his prior ownership of a Nevada casino would not affect his campaign, expressing confidence he would prove in court the story was false.

April Shower Turns To 15-Inch Snow In Surprised Northeast

BOSTON (AP) — An April shower that shocked New England by turning to snow piled it at least 15 inches high today, and plows and sanders set out ahead of morning rush-hour motorists who already had removed their snow tires.

"We had our summer over the weekend," state Trooper Todd Bell joked Tuesday in the central Massachusetts town of Cheshire. "We're looking forward to winter now."

Snow also fell this morning over Maine, New Hampshire and Rhode Island, but much of it was expected

to begin melting later today. Temperatures in the 50s and a 30 percent chance of showers were forecast in Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

The storm on Tuesday snarled traffic and strained local snow-removal budgets.

Worcester in east-central Massachusetts received at least 14 inches at the rate of 2 inches an hour Tuesday. Worcester Airport remained closed today, and more than 150 snowplows were called out.

The city's snow-removal budget already has a deficit of at least \$1 million, and the storm was expected to

cost an additional \$50,000 to \$60,000, said Richard Grant, deputy commissioner of public works.

In Gardner, where the Public Works Department budget was almost depleted, the highway division sent out sanders and plows to remove about 6 inches of snow, said Dennis Landry, a highway division foreman.

"It's a little rough going because a lot of them (motorists) have taken off their snow tires already," he said. "It's like a mini-blizzard."

Larger Sizes Increase In Fashion Merchandising

HARTFORD, Conn. — There's a sweet irony in having Cybill Shepherd speak out for the National Beef Council.

She's a hot television star, she's a former fashion model and she's got some beef on her bones. In short — or long, or wide — she's a new, acceptable image of beauty. A woman with curves. A woman with shoulders. A woman quite different than the anorexic-appearing models we've all been looking at on runways and in fashion ads for years.

Shepherd has curvy company in the popular media. Kathleen Turner has a little trouble zipping up her prom gown in "Peggy Sue Got Married." Bette Midler annually delights in winning the accentuating-the-positive-in-the-cleavage department at the Academy Awards. Tall, wide-boned Kelly McGillis plays a rugged Amish widow in "Witness" who looks as if she could work all day in the fields, cook a meal for 20, raise a barn and still be a woman — W-O-M-A-N, I'll say it again.

Granted, the idea that beauty is in the eye of the beholder has been around as long as Adam and Eve. The well-rounded woman certainly had a fan in Peter Paul Rubens, the Flemish painter with an appreciation for ample padding. Joan Crawford was the movie queen of the wide-shouldered look in the 1940s, and

sarong-clad Dorothy Lamour showed off her va-va-voom shape in all those road pictures with Bob Hope and Bing Crosby.

But since Twiggy hit the Carnaby Street fashion scene in the 1960s, skinny has been in. And it still is for most of the designers who have been showing off their fall fashion looks in New York City for the past two weeks, although many included bustier-than-usual models in their shows.

Some fashion writers have suggested the slight shift away from extreme thinness may be related to its new association in the public mind with the devastating symptoms of AIDS. For some, ultra-thinness may no longer be a desirable look.

So the mini-trend toward admiring more ample figures should be good news for women. It should make them feel better about themselves, even if they are 10 pounds over the charted ideal weights posted in doctor's offices.

Not exactly. "In the 10 years that I've been doing personal shopping for people, I've never had a woman tell me she's pleased with how she looks," says Rae Donnelly, a wardrobe consultant at Luetgens Limited in Hartford, Conn.

"It's a funny thing. When a man tries on a suit and it doesn't fit perfectly, it's the suit's fault. When a woman tries on a dress that needs a little tailoring, she thinks it's her fault."

But the beauties of the fashion world and experts in the field don't have the same worries as we average folk do. Right?

Wrong. Even fashion powerhouse Diane Von Furstenberg — hardly chunky by any reasonable standard — is worried about her looks.

"I'm too fat," she told Joan Rivers on her show recently. "I think every woman is insecure about her looks."

So if you're more inclined to pick from the size 12s or 14s on the women's clothing rack and are feeling like you should lose some weight, relax. Even the beautiful people worry about their looks.

And here's a little secret. The larger sizes often sell out first.

"Twelves and 14s are always our most popular sizes," says Michael Dvorin, vice president and general merchandise manager for Sage-Allen & Co. Inc. in Hartford.

"Real people buy those sizes, though I must admit most of the models I see are still very thin, not Cybill Shepherd types," Dvorin says.

And the same woman's body may change as she ages.

"That does happen," Donnelly says. "As we age the weights shifts around, and we tend to get a little heavier."

There will be plenty of shifting cellulite as the leading edge of the baby boom turns 41 this year.

"There is a lot more fashion merchandising for larger sizes, especially in the 16 and plus sizes," Dvorin says.

Department stores must cater to all body types. Most have set up special sections for petite women who are tired of buying clothes made out of proportion to their bodies.

Other clothing corporations cover the gamut from petite to pulchritudinous by operating different stores. The Limited Inc., described by Forbes as "the fastest-growing, most profitable specialty retailer in the country" with its 650 stores, is one example. Dear Pat: I am a self-taught needlepointer with no one to call on when I need help. I found the basic stitch easy to learn from written directions and charts, but I have a lot of unanswered questions.

For example, what does mesh size mean, and what is the best mesh size for beginners? My only project to date consists of background filling around a pre-worked center design, but I would like to try something more challenging. How about a column on tips just for beginners such as myself?

—A Nebraska Farm Wife

The mesh count for any tupe of canvas is taken over the horizontal and vertical threads of the canvas. Mesh count tells you the number of stitches and rows achieved to the inch when working a basic tent stitch.

The mesh count also will determine the length of time it takes to complete a project and the amount of design detail that can be achieved. Quickpoint is usually worked on canvas with a count of five or less while petitpoint, which allows for fine detailing, is done on canvas with 20 or

more meshes or stitches to the inch. Ten- to 14-mesh canvas is a good compromise between the two.

Novice needlepointers by the thousands have learned that they can be creative by working on canvas with the design stamped or painted on it. Usually these are done in the colors to be used so that you simply take a stitch over any given mesh in the color shown on that mesh.

Or you can work from a graph chart, which uses symbols to show the placement of stitches in the various colors. Just remember that each symbol represents one stitch and you should have little trouble following such a chart.

Directions accompanying the chart often will give you the finished size of the design. This information is helpful in centering the design correctly on blank canvas. If this is not included, however, it's not too difficult to determine the center for yourself.

Count the number of squares across at the widest point of the design. Divide this number by your mesh count and you will have the finished design width. Do the same vertically and you will have the finished design length.

Fold your chart in half lengthwise and widthwise, and the point where the folds meet will be the design center. Fold your canvas in the same way and run a basting thread down the vertical fold and the horizontal fold. The point where the two threads cross will be your canvas center.

Unless you are working with plastic canvas, be sure that your blank canvas is at least three inches larger in both directions than the total area to be worked, including any border stitches. This will give you an inch and a half of excess canvas all around, which will allow for any needed seams or hems. It also will give you room for any blocking that might have to be done upon completion of the stitching. It is better to err on the side of having too much instead of too little on these margins.

While most experienced needlepointers will start working from the center, you might prefer to run a basting thread around the outer edges to be worked to give you a good reference point for starting the stitching at the top from either the left or right edge of the canvas.

Before starting on any canvas made from fibers, either hem all edges or cover them with masking tape to prevent raveling. This also will eliminate any snagging of your clothing from raw canvas edges.

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Engaged Couples Shun Premarital Counseling

It's the details, not the big picture, that engaged couples frequently find so fascinating.

Such preoccupations as the right china pattern, the ceremony and the wedding trip divert attention from where it should be — examining the relationship, say people in the field of premarital counseling.

While premarital counseling by no means ensures a successful marriage, it can help a couple get a more realistic view of what difficulties they may encounter and can help them learn ways of dealing with conflict.

Though the benefits of such counseling have been touted for years, many couples do it only because their church requires it; many receive inadequate counseling or avoid it entirely, say some practitioners.

"The saying 'love is blind' is indeed applicable to most premarital couples," says David H. Olson, a professor of family social science at the University of Minnesota. "They are often very unrealistic about their relationship and are convinced that whatever problems they have will go away after the wedding."

And the distractions of wedding plans are most convenient for people who sense it would be perilous or simply don't want to face weaknesses in their relationships.

"People could hear something that they don't want to hear," says Robert Ryder, dean of the School of Family Studies at the University of Connecticut, Storrs.

"The couples who are most reluctant are those in which neither per-

son has been married before and typically (are) most unrealistic about the challenges of marriage," Olson said in a telephone interview.

In 1979, Olson and his colleagues developed PREPARE, an inventory designed to identify weaknesses and strengths in engaged couples' relationships. Its 125 statements, such as "At times I think my partner depends on me too much," are rated separately by both members of the couple on a five-point scale from "strongly agree" to "strongly disagree." The results serve as a basis for discussion with the counselor. About 15,000 counselors (including clergy) use the inventory, Olson says.

Clergy of all denominations make up the majority of premarital counselors, Olson says, and are the primary users of PREPARE.

The Catholic Archdiocese of Hartford requires couples to participate in a marriage preparation program, usually beginning six months before the wedding. They take an inventory similar to PREPARE, discuss it with a priest or deacon and participate in a group for engaged couples.

The Rev. Nicholas Cesaro of St. Augustine Church in Hartford sees couples both in his private counseling practice and as a parish priest. Most who come as part of the church program are not inclined to delve deeply into their relationships, he says.

"Most who come then are preparing for the wedding, and that's uppermost in their minds. That's much different from the people who come to see me in private practice asking for help on whether they should marry, whether they're going to make it."

Couples who seek premarital

counseling on their own should seek out a person trained specifically in marriage and family therapy, Ryder says. Olson says calling a community mental health center usually will lead to an appropriate counselor.

So crucial is the counseling process, Olson says, that couples should begin it a full year in advance of the wedding to prevent interference from wedding plans. It is ideal, he says, for couples to take a premarital inventory and get feedback on the results; to participate in a support group; and receive training in communication and problem-solving skills.

The strongest argument for premarital counseling, strangely enough, is not particularly convincing for young couples.

"People often do not have the slightest appreciation of the trouble and pain involved in divorce," Ryder says.

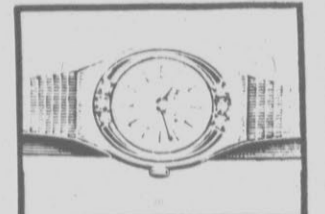

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Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market staged a broad advance today, bidding to recover from its recent selloff.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial rose 18.89 to 2,250.85 in the first half hour.

Gainers outnumbered losers by more than 3 to 1 in the overall tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues, with 839 up, 273 down and 388 unchanged.

Volume on the Big Board came to 24.90 million shares as of 10 a.m. on Wall Street.

Today the Commerce Department reported that the index of leading economic indicators rose 0.4 percent in March. That moderate increase stemmed almost entirely from gains in stock prices.

Gainers among the blue chips included International Business Machines, up 1% at 156 3/4; Ford Motor, up 2 1/2% at 83 3/4, and American Express, up 1 at 66 3/4.

Merrill Lynch dropped 3/4 to 37 1/4 in active trading. The company said it had taken a \$250 million loss in mortgage securities, which it attributed to unauthorized activities of a senior trader who is no longer employed by the firm.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks climbed 1.39 to 161.19. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 1.50 at 321.68.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average rose 1.42 to 2,231.96.

According to the report, the city should not have taken action on the bid because no alternative system configurations were put to bid, the cost appeared "excessive and unjustified," technical issues were not adequately addressed, and the reception of only one bid suggests restrictive specifications.

The committee also recommended the retention of a completely unrelated consultant to provide a second opinion review.

The committee also concluded that no city service was in jeopardy with existing radio equipment and present operating inconvenience could be resolved by maintenance improvements.

City officials have said police and fire-rescue efforts have been hampered by communications difficulties created by the antiquated equipment.

Committee members met on April 3 and unanimously agreed on the recommendations made in the report submitted Tuesday, Sickels said.

The ad hoc committee consisted of Sickels, Council member Janice Buck, Lawrence Behr, William Cope, Sheldon Daitch, Hugh Faucett, Thomas Forrest, Malcolm Green and Stuart Shinn.

"The committee has over 150 years of experience in the development, design and installation of systems with much higher levels of technology than the proposed Greenville communications systems," the report said.

According to the report, the committee is also concerned about the system's compatibility with surrounding agencies, antenna location, the turn-key system, system obsolescence, and excessive equipment.

"The systems are not compatible with the surrounding agencies with which they have to work... except by the intervention of a console operator," the report said. "At time of a major regional emergency this would be intolerable."

"The specifications are loaded with equipment that is nice to have but is very expensive."

In the report, the committee asked the City Council to reconsider its decision.

"The council should recognize the excessive cost and lack of compatibility as not being in the best interest of Greenville and vote to rescind their action awarding the communications contract," the report said.

Meanwhile, city officials said council members will decide what steps, if any, will be taken.

"We'll have to see what the council's interest is and whether they want to reconsider their previous action awarding the contract," City Attorney Mac Carley said.

Acting City Manager Mayo Allen said he was gathering information on how much equipment had been purchased and installation for council members.

— with Duncan Hines — he founded Hines-Park Foods which marketed the Duncan Hines brand of food products. Hines-Park Foods merged with Procter & Gamble in 1956 and Park served as an executive with P&G for the next seven years.

That merger, Park, now 76, said at a press conference Tuesday afternoon, provided the "grubstake" needed to begin what is now Park Communications.

The WNCT properties — bought on April 24, 1962 — were the cornerstone of a company that now owns seven television stations, 10 AM and nine FM radio stations, 33 daily newspapers, 15 Sunday newspapers, 25 non-daily newspapers, and 35 non-daily controlled distribution publications in 22 states ranging from Seattle to Manhattan and from Florida to the Canadian border.

Business Week magazine rates Park Communications in the top 15 percent of the 6,850 publicly traded companies in America and the 34th most valuable public communications company. And its value, based on the price of stock on March 20, is listed by Business Week as \$438 million.

Forbes Magazine in 1985 listed Park Communications among its "Best 200 Small Companies," while Advertising Age last year ranked Park Communications the largest communications company in the country.

Greenville has grown since Park bought the television and radio stations, he said. "When we came here," the town "was not very imposing. Now it's built up all around."

But "the most wonderful thing," Park said "is the hospital," and how the medical complex has developed.

And the television station — Channel 9 — has grown, too. "We recognized 15 or 20 people" at a barbecue dinner "that were here when we bought it," Park said, and the television station's "news department now has about as many people as the entire staff then."

"The key to our success," Park told WNCT employees at noon, "is the fact that each of you, and your counterparts at every radio and television station and newspaper in our company, consider the community you serve to be your home town."

Also at the luncheon, Park was honored with a proclamation issued by Gov. Jim Martin naming him to "The Order of The Long Leaf Pine."

He also was cited by the N.C. Agricultural Extension Service for exemplary service to agriculture.

Park concluded his visit to Greenville Tuesday by conducting a leadership development seminar at East Carolina University.

The seminar followed a reception and dinner at the home of ECU Chancellor and Mrs. Richard Eakin.

Nine of Park's newspapers — those in Newton, Morganton, Statesville, Concord, Kannapolis, Lumberton, Clinton, Marion and Aberdeen — are in North Carolina.

The official also met with a contributor at his government office on Nov. 22, 1985, the information said. On Jan. 16, 1986, that unidentified contributor issued a \$20,000 check to Channell's endowment.

The information also charged that on March 28, 1986, Channell and the government official met with another potential contributor in the dining room of the Hay-Adams Hotel in downtown Washington. Three days later, at a similar meeting at the hotel, the contributor delivered a \$130,000 check to Channell, the information charged.

The government official was present when the check was turned over to Channell, the information said.

On April 11, 1986, Channell and the official met with yet another potential contributor in the hotel's cocktail lounge, the information said. Four days later, that contributor wired \$470,000 to a bank account of the endowment, the information charged.

The information also charged that on that day the contributor transferred about \$1.15 million worth of stocks to a brokerage account in Washington that the endowment had. The contributor on May 19 transferred by wire another \$350,000 to the endowment's bank account, the information said.

Chase reached on a fielder's choice. Johnson came up and hit a grounder to Darryl Moye at second who tagged out Chase to end the game.

"We just had to hold on," Ross said. "I'm just pleased with the win. Coming in, our number one or number two pitcher was sick and we

had to bring in a relief pitcher (Stancill). (But) this is crunch time. This was a big win for us tonight."

Junkin Leads Record ACC First Round NFL Selections

Duke linebacker Mike Junkin started an Atlantic Coast Conference roll in the first round of the NFL draft, the first draft in the history of the conference that included four ACC players chosen in the opening round.

Junkin was picked fourth by the Cleveland Browns in Tuesday's draft, followed by North Carolina State wide receiver Hayward Jeffries, who was picked 20th by the Houston Oilers; North Carolina offensive lineman Harris Barton, who went as the 22nd pick by the San Francisco 49ers; and Terrence Flagler of Clemson, who also went to San Francisco as the 25th pick of 28 players chosen in the first round.

Three ACC players were chosen in the 1982 NFL draft — Hollis Hall and Jeff Bryant of Clemson and Mike Quick of N.C. State.

Junkin, a 6-3½, 230-pound inside linebacker, was picked by the Browns to replace linebacker Chip Banks. The San Diego Chargers traded their first- and second-round choices to Cleveland for the Browns' first- and second-round selections and Banks.

"We had him ranked in the top three players in the country," said Browns' Coach Marty Schot-

tenheimer. "He is one of the finest college linebackers I have ever seen."

"That will be a lot of work and there's a lot of learning to do to make the transition," said Junkin, who played middle linebacker in college, but will shift to outside linebacker. "I've never really played outside before. I've lined up and blitzed from the outside and the coach said I'd probably be doing quite a bit of that. But I don't think it will be that big of a problem."

Junkin called himself a long shot, based on the fact that just three schools, including Duke recruited him. The Blue Devils won over Rice and Louisiana Tech.

Junkin led Duke with 105 tackles in 1984, despite playing with a painful back injury. Junkin played all of 1985 on a severely injured knee and was unable to practice after the first month. Nonetheless, he led the Blue Devils with 162 tackles, including 105 initial hits.

In 1986, Junkin had 110 solo tackles and 78 assists, plus two sacks and 13 other tackles for a loss. He caused five fumbles.

Junkin is Duke's first player to be picked in the first round since Bob Matheson, also a linebacker, was chosen by the Browns in 1967. Also, he is the first player from Duke to be

drafted since quarterback Ben Bennett was picked in the sixth round in 1984.

Jeffries holds the N.C. State record with 14 career touchdown catches, breaking the mark set by Quick. Jeffries caught 40 passes last year for 591 yards for a career total of 111 catches for 1,733 yards. He was the first wide receiver chosen in the draft.

"To be picked No. 1 at my position ... it's something else," Jeffries said in a telephone interview Tuesday. "But just getting the opportunity to get drafted, it's a neat thing."

Barton is one of 11 National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athletes, and he won a \$3,000 postgraduate scholarship. He started 10 regular-season games at tackle and one at center, the position at which he began his collegiate career.

"San Francisco is a great team. I know they're a real good team to play for," Barton said in an interview from a restaurant where he watched the draft. "I can just thank my parents and everybody. This is the greatest day of my life."

Flagler rushed for 1,176 yards on 180 carries while setting 11 school records. He set a single-game mark of 275 all-purpose yards against Wake Forest and scored four touchdowns, the first Clemson player to do it since 1950. He also was the first Clemson running back to gain 200 yards or more twice in the same season.

"I never doubted myself. I knew if the opportunity came, I could do the job," said Flagler, who gained 82 yards to help Clemson beat Stanford 27-21 in the Gator Bowl. "I think the thing that helped me more than anything else was I was able to hang in there."

Clemson running back Kenny Flowers was taken by Atlanta in the second round, and Pittsburgh took Clemson cornerback Delton Hall in the second round.

Flowers, who was hampered by injuries last fall after being touted as a Heisman Trophy candidate, rushed for 595 yards on 123 carries. He set a school record of 1,200 yards in 1985 and is Clemson's career rushing leader with 2,914 yards.

Hall who intercepted five passes last fall, returned them for 121 yards and broke up 14 other passes.

Also in the second round, Donald Evans of Winston-Salem State of the CIAA was picked 47th by the Los Angeles Rams. Derrick Beasley, a defensive back from Winston-Salem State, was picked 107th in the fourth round by New England Patriots on a trade involving both the New York Jets and the Los Angeles Raiders.

Randy Watts, a defensive end from Catawba, was picked 244th in the ninth round by Kansas City.

Other ACC players picked include: Reginald Rutland, defensive back from Georgia Tech, 100th in the fourth round by Minnesota; Jim Riggs, tight end from Clemson, 103rd in the fourth round by Cincinnati; Nelson Jones, defensive back from

Baker Unsure Of Strategy But Promises Heavy Foot

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) — Buddy Baker isn't sure of the best strategy to win at Alabama International Motor Speedway, but he promises to use a heavy foot during Sunday's \$625,000 Winston 500 stock car race.

"The whole race is like a big chess match," he said before today's practice rounds. "It's all knowing where to pass and when to pass so no one can come back around you. I've won here from the lead in the last lap, from second and from third."

Baker, who won the race in 1975, '76 and '80, didn't get the speed from his Oldsmobile that the top Ford drivers got during recent testing.

"I'll pick the Fords on pole day but anyone on Sunday," he said, and I'll be running with those dogs all day." The pole position and the other 19 top spots for Saturday's \$101,000 ARCA 500K and Sunday's race will be determined in qualifying Thursday,

with the remainder of the 40-car fields to be determined Friday.

Bill Elliott, who set a world qualifying speed of 212.229 mph for last year's Winston 500, turned the 3.6-mile course at 214.660 mph in a test run, followed by Kyle Petty's 212.375 and Davey Allison's 212.328, all in Fords.

Darrell Waltrip's 212.093 mph in a Chevrolet was best for General Motors Cars. Baker tested at 210.462 mph.

Baker said that 20 drivers in Sunday's race "truly believe they can win, and under the right circumstances there are six or seven more that could win."

"When you've got more than half the field that's a contender, you're looking at some show." The average qualifying speed of all 40 starters a year ago was 205.104 mph.

Allison said his car has handled better in recent days. He said his team has developed a "good engine program and the motors we have here could be the best we've had all season."

Patty Simko, entered in the ARCA race, holds the mark for the fastest qualifying lap by a woman for a closed circuit race, 192.316 mph at Daytona earlier this year.

"The car is much better now than it was then, when we had just gotten it," she said. "We feel like we've got an honest shot at 200 and should run at least better than 197."

Don Naman, the track's general manager, said he expects a Sunday crowd bigger than the record 130,000 last May. He said virtually all the 60,000 reserved seats are taken but that 15,000 unreserved seats and 10,000 standing-room tickets for the back stretch will go on sale Sunday.

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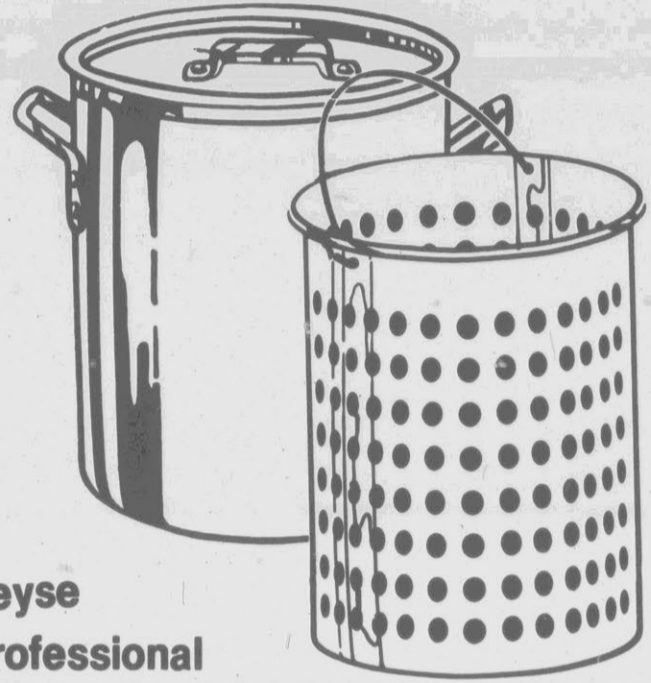
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
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
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Three Lutheran Denominations To Form New Church

 COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Lutherans from three major denominations were saying farewells in their last separate conventions today before merging into a 5.3 million-member church that will be America's fourth-largest Protestant body.

million-member American Lutheran Church based in Minneapolis and the 110,000-member Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches based in St. Louis.

The merger, five years in the making, will produce the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It will be the fourth-largest Protestant body in America, after the Southern Baptist Convention, United Methodists and the National Baptist Convention.

The 2.7 million-member Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is not taking part in the merger.

Lutheran leaders expressed some sadness at the passing of the separate denominations.

Bishop James R. Crumley, head of the Lutheran Church in America, said he would miss his branch's "certain style of operation" but expressed confidence in the new church's prospects.

Bishop Will L. Herzfeld of Oakland, Calif., president of the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, said his "sadness at presiding over the last convention is quickly replaced by the excitement of being part of the new church."

"There are gains and losses in this kind of thing," Preus said. "You just have to make sure that there are more gains than losses."

The Lutherans plan to trim the number of delegates Thursday to 1,042, apportioned according to each denomination's size: 564 for the Lutheran Church in America, 458 for the American Lutheran Church and 23 for the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches.

The new church's headquarters is to be in Chicago. The transition is expected to be finished by the end of the year.

The two larger denominations in the merger were produced by mergers in the 1960s that brought together seven separate bodies divided largely along lines of national origin.

The American Lutheran Church has about 5,000 congregations, mostly in the Midwest, the Lutheran Church in America has about 6,000 nationally and the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches has about 500, primarily in the Midwest.

"Underlying it all, however, making it all worthwhile is the conviction that the Holy Spirit calls, gathers and enlightens the church, moves it into new configurations and binds us together in a fellowship that knows no end."

About 1,800 delegates were to meet at the Ohio Convention Center today for final legislative action by the three branches before they are formally united during a convention Thursday.

Banquets were planned tonight to end sessions of the 2.9 million-member Lutheran Church in America based in New York, the 2.3

Searchers Seek Clue To Plane Lost In '27

 MACHIAS, Maine (AP) — A high-tech search is under way this week for clues to the disappearance of a French biplane that may have beaten Charles A. Lindbergh across the Atlantic by 12 days in 1927.

Since Sunday, searchers have combed a small section of dense woods 12 miles north of Machias for the wreckage of l'Oiseau Blanc, or the White Bird.

It is the 11th such search in the area by Richard Gillespie and his wife, Patricia Thrasher, of Middletown, Del., "aviation archeologists" who have made a career out of looking for long-lost planes.

The White Bird disappeared after taking off from Paris at dawn on May 8, 1927, with two aviators in quest of a \$25,000 prize offered for the first non-stop flight between the United States and France.

Less than three weeks later, on May 21, Lindbergh arrived in Paris from New York in his Spirit of St. Louis and claimed the \$25,000 prize. He was the 79th man to complete a trans-Atlantic flight, but the first to do it alone and the first between France and the United States.

Gillespie and Ms. Thrasher, founders of the 400-member non-profit International Group for Historic Aircraft Recovery, are certain the White Bird made the crossing in 40 hours, only to crash after reaching the fog-bound Maine coast.

The search has been dubbed Project Midnight Ghost after Lindbergh's remark that the White Bird had "vanished like a midnight ghost."

The search is motivated largely by "the human need to know, to finish things, to tie up all the loose ends," Ms. Thrasher said. "It's the desire to finish it up, to say, 'There, that's what happened.'"

The latest effort, unlike the 10 previous, has foliage penetration radar at its disposal and a helicopter-borne infrared sensor to assist the dozen or so volunteers combing a hillside thick with rotted logs.

The helicopter was scheduled to arrive from California this afternoon and join the search Thursday, weather permitting.

The infrared sensor will scan the terrain and display an image on a video screen in the chopper, showing the relative heat of the terrain.

"If an engine is at all exposed to sunlight, it will heat and cool at a very different rate" than rock and other objects, Ms. Thrasher explained.

Even with infrared and radar, the search is a difficult task, she said. "I would rather have to find my contact lens in a shag rug; it would be easier."

On Sunday, for example, searchers spent the day scouring a mere 1,000 feet by 300 feet. The group plans to comb through an area roughly 4,000 feet by 1,100 feet during the two weeks set aside for the expedition.

Pilot Charles Nungesser and navigator Francois Coli, decorated World War I fliers, had planned to land the white seaplane at the base of the Statue of Liberty.

The theory that they reached the Machias area and crashed after running out of fuel is based in part on reports that the plane was heard and seen May 9 and that one man, an eccentric woodsman, actually heard it crash.

Those reports were buttressed over the years by accounts from hunters who reported stumbling upon an airplane engine in the woods.

Two months ago at a seminar at the National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C., experts in such fields as forestry, aviation and meteorology reviewed the evidence and said there were no glaring inconsistencies to the theory.

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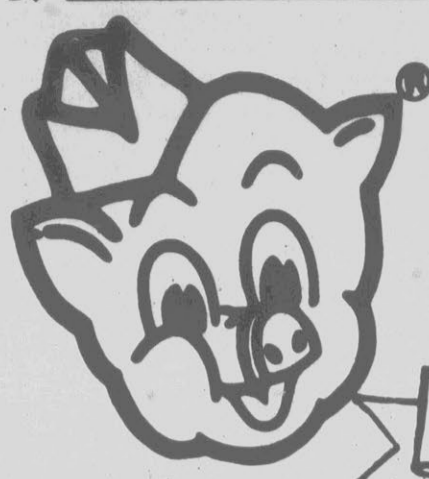

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Critics Tell Congress TV Networks Have Eroded Public Trust In News

WASHINGTON (AP) — Network news operations and their affiliate stations, granted operating licenses to serve the public good, have broken their promises and should be held accountable, critics are telling Congress.

"They got those licenses because they promised to operate in the public interest, convenience and necessity," former CBS News President Fred W. Friendly said Tuesday in House subcommittee hearings on network news. "They have welched on their promises."

"Make them keep their promises," he urged the House Energy and Commerce telecommunications subcommittee. "Let them know that the government of the United States did not give them these licenses in perpetuity."

Friendly was among a group of media critics, most of them former news executives, who said mergers and consolidations in the broadcast industry have eroded the commitment to public service.

The heads of the three network news divisions were expected to mount a defense of their operations when the hearings resumed today.

Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass.,

chairman of the subcommittee, called the hearings to question whether an increased drive for profits is contrary to the national interest when it occurs at the television networks.

In opening the hearings Tuesday, Markey acknowledged the First Amendment dangers of Congress probing the internal affairs of news organizations. But he said questions about the effects of takeovers are justified by the unique role of television in American social and political life.

The television networks "have replaced the town square and the community center as the places where the American family gathered for news and information," Markey said.

All three networks have changed hands or been targeted for takeover since 1985. General Electric acquired NBC for \$6.3 billion, while ABC was bought by Capital Cities Communications for \$3.5 billion. CBS fought off a hostile takeover by Atlanta businessman Ted Turner, but its management has been in turmoil since.

ABC, NBC and CBS also have been effectively deregulated by the Federal Communications Commission.

FCC Chairman Mark Fowler, supporting the concept of free enterprise, has called television "nothing more than a toaster with pictures."

Witnesses told the subcommittee Tuesday that the industry already has been hurt by the competitive pressure of cable and independent stations, the internal pressure of affiliates and the financial pressure of the stock market.

But the FCC must share blame because it lifted the requirement that licensees demonstrate their commitment to the public interest, said Ben Bagdikian, dean of the graduate school of journalism at the University of California at Berkeley.

"They sanctified greed," Bagdikian said.

Friendly said it may be too late to change anything.

"The time for the screaming and the desk poundings should have come when the documentary became an endangered species, when the 'CBS Morning News' was virtually eliminated, when the news specials slipped into later time periods and were scheduled less and less," Friendly said.

"Sadly, I must tell you that the television networks of which I was once a part are mercantile shadows of what they once were," he said. "Those in Congress, those in the FCC and people like myself who stand idly by are as guilty as the Wall Street traders who have changed something once licensed 'in the public interest, convenience and necessity' into a midway of junk entertainment and headline service news."

Economist John Kenneth Galbraith said financial pressures force the networks to pay too much attention to the bottom line.

"The test of achievement is what produces profits and, alas, in the very short run," Galbraith said. "In broadcasting, the audience rating and the advertising reaction are the test. Programming is a commodity to be produced at the least cost."

"These are not theoretical dangers; the future is already here," he said. "Edward R. Murrow would not now be hired by CBS, and if hired, considering his capacity to offend, his job might not be secure. Can anyone think this is good?"

Montana Snipers Escape Manhunt, Flee Into Hills

WOLF CREEK, Mont. (AP) — Wary residents kept guns at hand today as police searched the wild country for up to four snipers, including two escaped killers linked to a total of six slayings, who fled after a four-hour shootout.

Aircraft with heat sensors buzzed through the night skies over the foothills around Holter Lake, a reservoir on the Missouri River. More than 100 law officers searched for the heavily armed fugitives, who slipped away after trading hundreds of rounds with police Monday and wounding two campers.

Two of the suspects are wanted in a double-slaying last weekend in Colorado, authorities said.

"My gut feeling is they're still in the area," Lewis and Clark County Sheriff Chuck O'Reilly said Tuesday evening, but he conceded that the suspects could slip into neighboring Cascade and Meagher counties.

The snipers apparently climbed mountains northeast of a ridge where the shootout occurred, O'Reilly said. He would not say what new steps authorities might take.

Police searched cabins and boat-houses, warning residents to lock their boats.

Frenchy Forgette, who operates the Oasis Bar, said Tuesday that residents are keeping guns within reach. Forgette quoted one patron as saying he planned to have a "Wolf Creek lunch," — a can of beer and a loaded gun — and empty both.

"I got the gun out," said a clerk at the Canyon Store and service station, who refused to identify himself.

County, state and federal officers

combed the sparsely populated area Tuesday, but found no trace of the snipers. Three planes and a helicopter flew over thousands of acres surrounding the reservoir, and a tracking dog was brought in.

The shooting broke out Monday afternoon after shots were fired at officers investigating an abandoned, rolled-over van near Holter Lake.

O'Reilly said the van was taken from the scene of the double slaying.

The shooting intensified, and two campers were slightly wounded when gunfire struck their car. The shooting lasted until darkness, when deputies backed off and began evacuating residents and campers from the recreation area midway between Helena and Great Falls.

One camper, John Harrington, who lives in Great Falls, 45 miles north of the recreation area, said he spent Monday night with his wife and seven other people near the shooting area.

"We were nervous. The biggest thing to me was that these guys might want hostages," he said. "We'd doze off during the night. We were waiting for that knock at the door." He said the group pulled two motor homes and a camper on a pickup truck together, believing there is "safety in numbers."

The two male suspects were identified late Tuesday as escapees from a California penal institution where they were serving terms for homicide.

Steven Miller, 34, and John "Doc" Whitus, Jr., 36, escaped Feb. 21 from California Medical Facility in Vacaville, said prison Lt. Bob Houston. Whitus was convicted in 1972 of two drug-related killings; Miller was convicted in 1976 of two slayings, including a police officer.

HOUSE

FOREIGN AID By a vote of 209 for and 194 against, the House removed the \$651 million foreign aid section from a supplemental appropriations bill for the current fiscal year.

The fiscal 1987 spending measure (HR 1827), which later was sent to the Senate, allocates nearly \$7 billion of its \$9 billion pricetags to farm subsidies provided through the Commodity Credit Corporation. It also funds pay hikes and pension benefits for federal workers and scores of other programs including ones for defense and the homeless.

The bill also contained strict arms control language (see next vote).

Mickey Edwards, R-Okla., a supporter of eliminating the foreign aid, said "we can't just throw the money out and forget how that money gets used against us."

Opponent David Obey, D-Wis., called the aid cut "irresponsible, gutless and stupid."

Members voting yes wanted to delete the foreign aid.

TO STRIKE By a vote of 151 for and 261 against, the House rejected a motion to strike the enactment clause of the \$9 billion supplemental appropriations bill (above). This was a parliamentary attempt to kill the legislation.

House Republicans, the minority, generally voted yes to protest spending priorities and policies written into the bill by the Democratic majority.

A major GOP leadership objection was to the bill's ban on virtually all nuclear tests if the Soviets reciprocate, and its requirement that the administration obey SALT II, the 1979 strategic arms limitation treaty never ratified by the Senate.

Most members voting yes wanted to kill the bill.

DRUG TESTING The House rejected, 145 for and 242 against, an amendment in behalf of a presidential order that certain federal workers undergo mandatory drug testing.

The amendment to the supplemental appropriations bill (above) sought to restore funding for President Reagan's executive order last fall that civil servants be tested if they hold positions where drug abuse could harm public health and safety or national security.

Supporters said the federal gov-

ernment must take the lead in combatting America's drug epidemic, while opponents argued the administration program infringes too far into federal workers' constitutional rights.

Members voting yes supported Reagan's executive order last fall on drug testing.

SENATE

FAIRNESS DOCTRINE By a vote of 59 for and 31 against, the Senate passed and sent to the House a bill (S 742) writing into law the Federal Communications Commission's fairness doctrine requiring radio and television stations to air public affairs programming and a diversity of viewpoints.

The FCC wants to repeal the 38-year-old policy, which is based on the premise that the finite broadcast spectrum should not be monopolized by license holders. Stations say the doctrine abridges their first Amendment rights.

Supporter Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., called the fairness doctrine "no more than good journalistic practice that does not chill the speech of broadcasters."

Opponent Robert Packwood, R-Ore., termed the bill a test of "whether the federal government has the constitutional power to tell broadcasters what they must program, when they must program, how they must report the news..."

Senators voting yes wanted to codify the fairness doctrine.

N.C. voting: Terry Sanford, D, voted yes. Jesse Helms, R, voted yes.

STAR SCHOOLS The senate passed, 77 for and 16 against, and sent to the House a bill (S 778) creating a "star schools" program for teaching of math, science and foreign languages to American students at all educational levels beginning with elementary school.

The idea is to keep pace with the Japanese.

About \$100 million in grants would be provided over five years to enable the nation's best instructors to teach to mass audiences via satellite technology. States, school districts, businesses and other units would form telecommunications partnerships to administer the program.

"Japanese students score twice as high as our students in both chemistry and math achievement tests," said supporter Ted Kennedy, D-Mass.

Calling the program "a waster of money," opponent Jesse Helms, R-N.C., said it would duplicate telecommunications instruction being conducted by NASA and the National Science Foundation.

Senators voting yes wanted to establish a new federal "star school" program.

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Millionaire's Legacy Would Honor What He Calls The Common Man

FAIRFIELD, Calif. (AP) — A tobacco-chewing millionaire in khaki work clothes says he's going to make nothing less than the "Eighth Wonder of the World" rise from wind-swept hills near San Francisco. Some folks like the idea, others don't. A few think he's crazy. But it seems they're all taking him seriously.

Mario Sengo, a businessman with a regular-guy image, wants his legacy to be a \$200 million museum complex on the outskirts of Fairfield that he says would celebrate "the whole his-

tory of our country and all the people in it."

Principally, it would be a sort of shrine to the common man, with emphasis on agriculture, says Sengo. A 160-foot-tall statue of a farmer would be the largest in the world, surpassing a Soviet statue in Leningrad by just six inches, he says.

In its shadow would stretch acre upon acre of outdoor and hothouse gardens with every type of fruit, vegetable, flower, tree and bush in the country.

The main museum building would depict the history of United States agriculture, art, the performing arts,

nationalities, religions — and the women's movement.

The famous people such as U.S. presidents and their wives would be honored, but nearly all the enshrined would be just the regular people that made the country he loves great, says Sengo, the son of Portuguese immigrants who owned a Central Valley dairy farm.

Regular folks could pay a fee — perhaps \$10,000 — to set up an exhibit that would include family photographs and history, he says.

A non-profit museum foundation that Sengo has formed would use donations to build the complex on 185 acres of farmland that he's buying

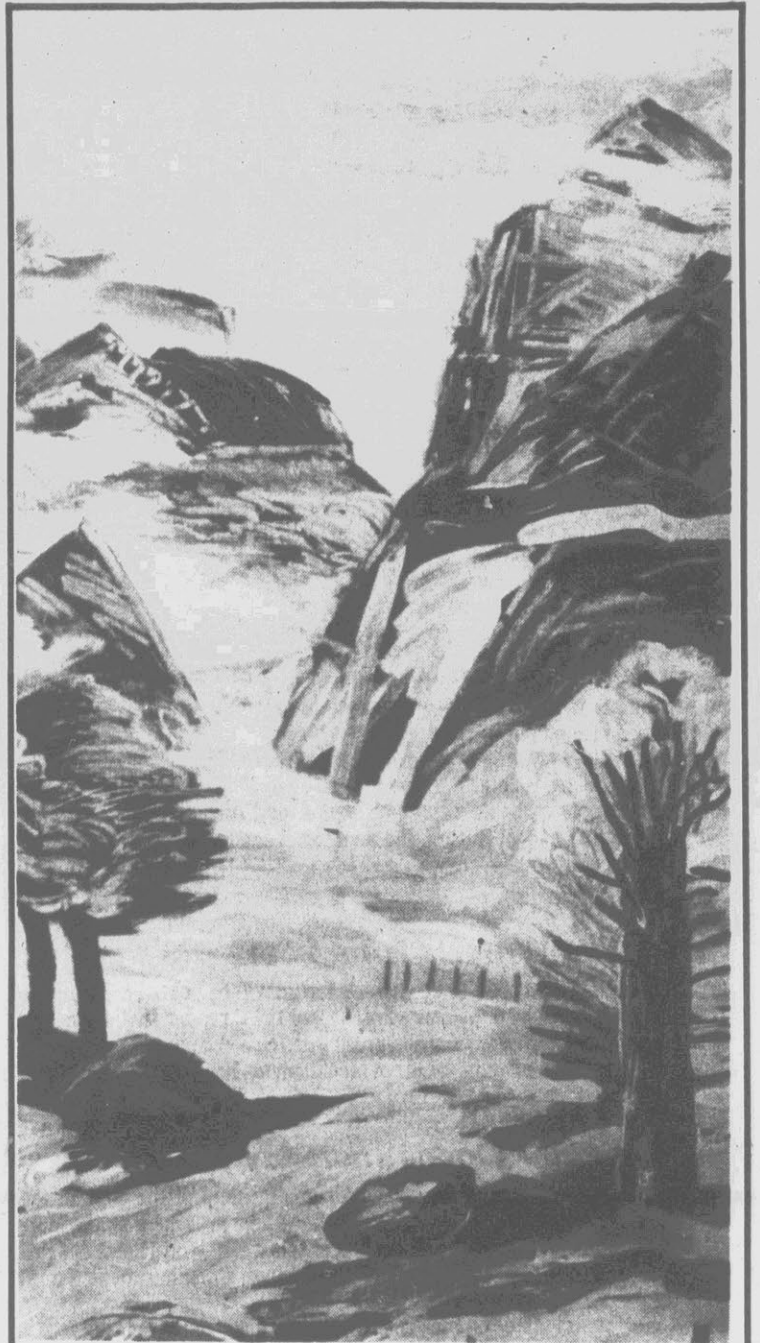
for nearly \$1 million along Interstate 80, the major east-west artery serving San Francisco, about 45 miles to the southwest.

Sengo, who installed himself as lifelong chairman of the foundation, has already spent more than \$135,000 of his own money to open an office in nearby Fairfield, staffed with full-time workers. The fruit processing plant owner says he has raised part of the money by selling off various collections.

Sengo says he won't get one penny back.

"I want my name to live," he says. That's why he's named the project

Tiny College Offers Only One Degree

School Puts Academic Focus On How To Deal With Ecology

BAR HARBOR, Maine — It is the only fully accredited college in America offering just one degree: a bachelor of arts degree in human ecology.

In its 15th year, tiny College of the Atlantic, on 25 acres of prime shoreline on Mount Desert Island, has a student body of 135 young men and women who have come here from throughout the nation.

With 11 full-time and eight part-time faculty, all Ph.D.s, the school has an eight-to-one student-faculty ratio.

"Six local residents of Bar Harbor in 1969 decided what their community needed was a small college, a school that would be very special and very different," explained college president Louis Rabineau, 62.

"All over the country there were concerns about the environment. 'That's it,' they decided. The school's entire purpose of being would be 'How to figure out how to deal with the environment.' There would be only one degree offered, a degree in ecology, human ecology."

College of the Atlantic was launched in 1972 and ever since students have come to Bar Harbor to study a wide variety of courses, each with an ecological twist.

There are classes on such subjects as plant and animal ecology, evolution, anatomy, physiology, marine biology, ornithology, math, chemistry, painting, ceramics, sculpture, philosophy, literature, history, economics, law, public policy, anthropology and education.

So, what is human ecology? It is the re-examination of traditional arts and sciences in light of contemporary thought, Rabineau said. A study of systems natural and human-made

that tie people to their environments. A study of human problems.

"It's interrelation and interdependence of all things, living things one to another, people to people, people to other things," was the way Ed Kaelber, the college's first president, put it.

The school encourages students to examine issues from many perspectives and to seek solutions that reflect an integrated perspective.

Students are encouraged to talk back, to challenge authority, to investigate assumptions, to enter into dialogue with teachers who are engaged in questioning accepted knowledge and making innovative connections to other fields.

The small classes are characterized by spirited debate and discussion.

"We're encouraged to design our own courses when a class we're interested in isn't offered," said

Kirsten Triplett, 23, of New York. "I wanted to learn about ethno-botany, the importance of plants to a culture. It wasn't taught."

She worked with a teacher to create her own class in ethno-botany, gathered a bibliography, read 10 books on the subject and did a great deal of other research, much of it at Harvard University.

Phil Girton, 27, of Binghamton, N.Y., came to the College of the Atlantic after spending six years in the Navy as a second-class machinist's mate and later working as a lab technician at a nuclear power plant.

"I like the hands-on aspect of education here, being able to do things instead of just reading about something in a book," he said.

Forty percent of the students have transferred to the College of the Atlantic from other schools; 70 percent who enroll graduate and 30 percent of the graduates go on to get their master's and doctoral degrees.

"A number of our graduates go into environmental work — into law, teaching, a couple have become clergy and a goodly number have set up businesses," Rabineau said.

Students play a big role in decision-making at the school. The college is run by committees and students are committee members. When a search for a new college president was made two years ago, candidates for the position were presented to the students as well as faculty, staff and trustees.

Two international convocations of scholars and practitioners of human ecology from 27 nations have been held on the campus. And, now there are colleges of human ecology at Cornell, Michigan State, the University of Maryland and Connecticut College.

Thesis Show Has Diverse Offering Of Art Treasure

Art in Greenville in the spring of 1987 has a true local treasure in the thesis show of five graduates now on view in Gray Gallery at the East Carolina University School of Art.

The quintet exhibiting art is Roger Gore, William Leidenthal, Betsy Markowski, Martha Petty and Mary Ann Zotto.

It's a diverse show encompassing oils, works in crayon, pastel and charcoal, small metal sculptures and jewelry, handmade paper art, and examples of slender pieces of sculpture.

Gore's minimal sculpture, lean and narrow, suggest an array of ritual walking sticks. He sculpts the sticks (or rods) in dark walnut with most pieces topped by an ornament, either of bronze or small earthenware ceramics. One piece, with dozens of shaped shards of mirror embedded into the wood, has a most appropriate title, "Aggression."

Gore shows one non-vertical work, a lollipop-size stylized form of pink and black earthenware resting on a small square pillow of silver satin — a nice contrast to aggression

Music City's Honky-Tonk Shrine May Have To Yield To Progress

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A truck wreck killed Sherman Neff's daddy in 1945. The only thing of value he left his boy, then 3, was a second-hand Gibson Centennial guitar and an itch to learn to pick it.

When Sherman was 6, a fierce Smoky Mountain storm raged in eastern Tennessee. A bolt of lightning found the Neff house, deep in the hills, and shattered that guitar.

Maybe, because ever since, Sherman Neff, now 44, has lived the sort of life set to music in a thousand old country songs.

He's been poor, hungry, broke. He's been foolish, loved, drunk, cheated on, stolen from. He's driven a truck and drag-raced a car. He's slept in a van and slept in a jail. He's been in debt, been AWOL, been tattooed. He's lost his job, lost his money, lost his wife. But he never lost the itch.

"Right now," Neff was saying the other day, "I wouldn't swap my place with anybody. Took me too long to get here."

"I play for chicken feed, but there are 50 pickers out on that street ready to take my place for half the money. Or none at all. They'd play for tips. I have, many a time."

Neff picks a guitar at Tootsie's Orchid Lounge. No wonder he wouldn't swap places.

To a vast and loyal congregation of Americans who worship country music, Nashville, birthplace of the

Call it a shrine, call it a honky-tonk. To the faithful in Music City, Tootsie's Orchid Lounge is both. But beware, pilgrims. It appears that Judgment Day for Tootsie's may be closer than any picker who spent a lifetime getting there might care to contemplate.

Grand Ole Opry, is the mother city and Tootsie's Orchid Lounge one of the holiest shrines.

A wide-eyed visitor finds that curious. Shrine? Tootsie's is a honky-tonk, one of the — is the word earthiest? — honky-tonks you ever saw.

"Yes it is," Neff said, taking a sip. "And Lower Broad is one of the earthiest streets. But this is what country music's all about."

Lower Broad — Lower Broadway — is a stretch from about Seventh Avenue to the Cumberland River.

The direction is downhill. To the Nashville Chamber of Commerce, so is the tenor. Some city boosters believe Judgment Day for Lower Broad is not far off, that new development, already afoot, will soon shove Tootsie's and its ilk into the river, replacing saloons and pawnshops with boutiques and hanging plants.

To country musicians, the essence of Lower Broad is the block between Fifth and Fourth. They call that single block The Street.

Tootsie's is one of six beer joints on The Street. Another, The Hitchin' Post, is separated from Tootsie's by a T-shirt shop. Four more stand shoulder to shoulder across the street, as close as strings on a guitar: the Say When, the Rhinestone Cowboy, Squires and The Turf. A

seventh, Wanda & Louie's, also revered as a shrine, is around the corner on Fifth.

In all seven bars, country music, live from Music City U.S.A., twangs from 8 a.m. to 3 a.m.

A few years ago five more honky-tonks, perfectly serviceable in Sherman Neff's view as seedbeds to stardom, were bulldozed off of Fifth to make room for the Nashville Convention Center. Yet another stood alongside the Merchants' Hotel, even now under renovation.

Thirteen, then. Thirteen saloons in a one-block area during The Street's heyday. None as renowned as Tootsie's.

Other establishments on The Street awaiting Judgment Day include Ernest Tubb's Record Shop next door to Rose's Pawn Shop, across the street from Friedman's Loans, Lynn's Liquors, Al's Music City Pawn Shop, Gruhn Guitars, Inc., Live Exotic Shows, Adult News, Penthouse Burlesque Cinema and two vacant shells of buildings now littered with empty Thunderbird wine bottles and empty lives.

"The street people really don't bother anybody," Neff said, taking another sip. A questionable observation. "The highbrows," he continued, "call Nashville Music City and call

knocking it down progress. Doesn't make sense.

"The Ryman Auditorium is a national landmark. Now they aim to knock down part of what made it a landmark. Tootsie's."

The Ryman Auditorium was originally the Union Gospel Tabernacle, built in 1891. The auditorium audience sat in pews. It was the home of the Grand Ole Opry before the Opry moved, in 1974, to a theme park in the suburbs.

Sherman Neff is typical of the hundreds, the thousands, of country music acolytes who have come to Nashville over the years with hearts full of hope. He also is untypical because instead of pawing his guitar at Rose's or Al's for a bus ticket home, he stayed.

Now he picks and sings at Tootsie's. Success at \$15 a session, plus tips, the going rate on The Street.

Tootsie's is special because among all those bad old joints on The Street its back door was just a few steps across a narrow alley from the backstage door of the Ryman Auditorium, convenient for an Opry performer with a thirst between sets.

That, and the happy fact that its proprietress was Hattie Louise Bess, the eponymous Tootsie.

Tootsie Bess died of cancer in 1978. When veteran pickers on The Street talk about her they tend to get weepy. With reason. Tootsie didn't wait for struggling Street pickers to become stars. She befriended them on the way up — or down.

Gettysburg Prepares For War Anniversary

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — The residents of Gettysburg are planning a celebration of peace to mark the 125th anniversary of an event that turned a tranquil, pastoral setting into an area sullied forever by the memory of one of history's grisliest confrontations.

In 1988, the 125th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg will also be the 50th anniversary of the Eternal Light Peace Memorial on Oak Hill along the Mummasburg Road, northwest of Gettysburg.

A committee of citizens has been formed to create an anniversary program that will focus national and international attention on peace.

"Our aspirations are not small. We seek to unite all aspects of our community's life in harmony with that commitment to peace," are the words drawn from a statement of purpose.

A symbol of the peace theme is the Eternal Light Peace Memorial, dedicated July 3, 1938, by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, a highlight of the last reunion of Union and Confederate veterans of the Civil War.

The monument is a 40-foot, square shaft of veined Alabama limestone, topped by a bronze urn with a perpetually burning light, now elec-

trified. On the face of the platform is the inscription, "Peace Eternal in a nation United," the theme of the memorial and the motivating force of the anniversary committee.

The idea of an anniversary celebration of peace came from a veteran of another grim chapter in American history — the Vietnam War.

James C. Roach, chief of Interpretation and Visitor Services for the National Park Service at Gettysburg, conceived of a peace theme for the anniversary in 1988.

Roach was drafted into the U.S. Army and served as a company clerk in a huge military complex in Long Binh during the height of the Vietnam War. One of his most vivid memories was having to stand in a long line outside the evacuation hospital waiting to make a phone call home. While in the phone line, Roach said, helicopters were unloading battlefield casualties. "There were people being wheeled right by us with ghastly wounds," he said.

Roach received support for the project from his superintendent, John R. Earnst, and took soundings from other community leaders, resulting in the formation of the Gettysburg Peace Celebration.

Senior Citizens Put Best Smiles Forward With Tap Dancing Troupe

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — It was a tough audience, mostly in wheelchairs and mostly uncommunicative.

The Tap Katz put on their best smiles anyway. Their tap shoes clicked and clacked keeping spirited time to a tape recording of "One" from the musical "A Chorus Line."

The troupe grabbed the Wichita nursing home audience's attention with that first number. They began working the magic they do at more than a dozen similar performances a year. Many of the residents responded with smiles and applause. Some shouted for more.

"I like people and I like to talk to people. And of course you see the reaction of those poor little things who can't even move. You see their fingers twitching and their toes tapping," said Delores Brown, who at 71 shares Tap Katz oldest-member status with Floyd Rummery. About three years ago Mrs. Brown,

a retired librarian, saw an advertisement in a senior citizen newspaper for a beginners' tap dancing class. She and several other folks in their 60s showed up. They eventually formed the Tap Katz, whose youngest member is 61.

Mrs. Brown says the twice-a-week rehearsals help her keep arthritic joints mobile.

"It's just wonderful exercise," said Wilma Rickard, 67, another of the Tap Katz. "It's just kind of blossomed into entertainment."

Mrs. Rickard joined the troupe before her husband died.

"This has helped fill the emptiness," she said. "When you get retirement age and you don't have anyone around but yourself, there's nothing more satisfying than making other people happy."

On Monday nights, Rene Forslund, a Wichita State University dance major, teaches the group. On Thursdays, June Hamilton, a gerontology student with a tap dancing

background, puts the troupe through its paces.

Ms. Forslund and Mrs. Hamilton get \$4 per student per night, but that's not the reason they keep coming back.

"It's their attitudes," Ms. Forslund said. "It makes them so happy. They're just like teen-agers."

"They work real hard," Mrs. Hamilton said. "And they get such a kick out of doing it, I love working with them."

The group has seven members, but the number on hand for rehearsals and performances varies depending on who is well and who isn't off visiting somewhere out of town.

Wichita nursing homes aren't the only locations for Tap Katz appearances. The dancers recently made a road trip to Amarillo, Texas, where they did six performances. They also plan to travel to a Junction City nursing home. Each summer they perform at a recital in Neodesha along with other students of Ms. Forslund, who is from the small-southeastern Kansas town.

The group has a repertoire of about 10 numbers. They make as many as six costume changes into outfits

ranging from evening gowns to Western wear.

At each performance, John Rodney Breth, 61, the youngest performer in the group, commands attention with his juggling act.

Breth is always joking around. He's limber, agile and is in the wings before each number doing little dance steps anxiously waiting to dance, like a prime race horse itching to leave the starting gate.

"Ever since I was 8 or 9 and saw my first movie musical I've wanted to dance," Breth said. "But that was considered sissy stuff. So I played baseball with the guys."

After 40 years of playing ball and more than 20 years of coaching and teaching in junior high schools, Breth couldn't play any more. He needed something else to keep physically active. He took up juggling. When he decided he wanted to end his performances with a song and dance routine, he took the beginner tap dancing class.

He liked it so well he studied ballroom dancing and is now in an advanced tap dancing class at Wichita State, along with fellow Tap Katz member Connie Jones, 68.

Government Bares All In Paris Show

PARIS (AP) — The latest Paris photo exhibition, tucked away in a room reached by unmarked stairs, depicts sex and sexual perversity in lurid detail. Admission is by invitation only from Interior Minister Charles Pasqua.

The display represents the latest twist in a raging controversy over whether the French government should protect children from pornography or protect society at large from censorship.

Pasqua, who opened the four-day show Monday, is attempting to demonstrate to social activists, politicians and reporters the sexually explicit publications available in France. Pasqua recently came under fire for restricting distribution of 10 adult magazines which he said would harm children.

The "Exposition de l'Horrible" — roughly translated "Horror Show" — includes 150 publications on sale in France, ranging from Penthouse to "Crime and Punishment," a picture book bearing no ties to Dostoyevsky.

Jack Lang, former culture minister, denounced the campaign as an insult to the good sense and intellectual freedom of France.

With apparent irony, he recommended to Pasqua additional items for the display: Picasso drawings, the works of Rabelais and friezes from the cathedral at Bourges.

"Might the humor of Frenchmen be such as to compel you to commit your prohibitions to the closet," Lang wrote.

For many French citizens, the issue was not funny.

Last month, Pasqua restricted 10 adult magazines on the strength of a 1949 law to protect children. Authorities can keep restricted magazines off newsstands and ban advertisements for them.

He restricted Gai Pied, a widely read weekly for homosexuals; l'Echo des Savanes, an adult comic book; Penthouse; two other photo magazines and five collections of readers' fantasies.

Church Objects To Film Based On Minister's Life

NEW YORK (AP) — The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is unhappy about fiction blended with fact in the CBS miniseries "Murder Ordained," the story of one of its former ministers who was convicted of murder.

The 4-hour miniseries, airing Sunday and Tuesday, May 3 and 5, portrays a love affair between the Rev. Thomas P. Bird of Emporia, Kan., and his church secretary and their conspiracy to kill their spouses.

In real life, Lorna Anderson Eldridge, the remarried former church secretary, pleaded guilty in a plea bargain arrangement last year to soliciting the murder of her first husband. Bird was convicted of similar charges and, later, first-degree murder in the death of his wife. He has maintained his innocence.

Both are serving prison sentences. Bird's case is on appeal.

Lorna Anderson is played by JoBeth Williams. Stage actor Terry Kinney plays Bird. Keith Carradine is a highway patrolman who investigates Sandra Bird's death.

The Rev. Paul Devantier, a spokesman for The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, a large, conservative denomination of Lutherans, said he had seen the miniseries, and it confirmed his fears.

"It leaves a perception that we think could be harmful to the church, its teaching, its clergy, and more importantly the innocent victims, the children of Lorna Anderson and Tom Bird, the parents, the close friends, all of whom will have to live for the rest of their lives with 'Murder Ordained' as part of the history of the case," he said in a telephone interview from St. Louis.

He said the church would have preferred either a documentary or a totally fictionalized account.

"The problem we see is mixing the two and giving the impression, and I think the impression was clearly given in the miniseries, that what was being portrayed was basically fact," he said. A disclaimer says the miniseries is based on a true story and real names are used for the main characters, though the name of Bird's church is changed.

The miniseries was shot on location in and around Emporia, where the events on which it is based occurred in 1983.

"Murder Ordained" is a high-quality production, a compelling murder mystery with a first-rate cast, down to the supporting roles. The direction, by Mike Robe, and the writing, by Robe and James Sadwith, are excellent.

The story is told without sensationalism.

Coquettish Lorna runs around having affairs while her husband drinks. He won't give her a divorce because of their two young daughters. Her indiscretions become the talk of their new town.

The couple has recently moved to Emporia. Lorna starts attending the local Lutheran church and falls for the popular young minister. The relationship begins innocently. Bird offers to help Lorna through her marital problems and offers her a job as his secretary.

Bird is unhappily married, too, threatened by his wife's successful career as a computer technician.

Lorna initiates an affair. They plot to marry and move to New Mexico to start up a new ministry. But they need money. Lorna takes out an insurance policy on Marty's life. She and Bird shop around for a hired killer. They rationalize that it is all part of God's plan.

Sandra Bird's body is found floating in the Cottonwood River next to her overturned car. Patrolman John Rule is suspicious when he finds her watch on the bridge above and

blood on trees leading down to the river. But the Kansas Bureau of Investigation takes over the case and closes it as an accidental death.

Months later, Lorna stops the van on the side of the road during a drive home from a family outing. She runs off onto the shoulder to be sick. Marty goes to help her and is shot to death by a masked gunman.

The sheriff who investigates is more thorough. But it is not until after Bird is convicted of soliciting someone to kill Marty that the investigation into Sandra's death is reopened and charges filed.

In the real case, prosecutors concluded that the plot to kill Marty Anderson was never carried out, and no one was charged with the actual killing, though investigators continued to say someone would be.

The movie suggests the someone is Bird.

In the movie, Bird is supported by many in his congregation who can't believe that the minister committed either crime.

In real life, the Lutheran Witness, the denomination's publication for lay people, plans to run an article in June after the miniseries airs recounting the torment the case has caused Bird's parents, who firmly believe their son is innocent. Tom Bird's father, Ralph, is also a Lutheran minister.

Repeats Lead TV

NEW YORK (AP) — Repeats dominated the schedule and the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings last week, as the networks took a breather between the traditional end of the season and the beginning of the May sweeps.

Forty-two of the 70 prime-time programs in the week ending April 26 were repeats. CBS' "60 Minutes," which tied for fifth with NBC's "Golden Girls," was the highest-rated original programming.

The only other original programs in the top 10 were NBC's "Nothing in Common" in seventh place and "Pack of Lies," a "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation on CBS, in ninth place.

On the other hand, the four lowest-rated programs were all originals: "Follow Your Dreams" on CBS, the "Grand Reopening" of Carnegie Hall on CBS, "Our World" on ABC and, in last place, an "ABC News Closeup" report on nuclear bomb factories.

Carol Olwert, a spokeswoman for ABC News, said the low ratings for this "Closeup" would not discourage further documentaries.

"It's not unusual for a documentary not to get good ratings, and that's not why we do them," she said.

ABC's new venture in news, "The Jennings-Koppel Report," placed 55th on its premiere with a 9.6 rating and a 17 percent share of the audience.

NBC, with seven of the top 10 programs, won the week with an average rating of 14.4, followed by CBS at 11.9 and ABC at 11.7. For the 31 weeks of the current season, NBC's average is 17.6, followed by CBS at 15.7 and ABC at 14.0.

Each rating point represents 874,000 homes with television; the share is the portion of sets in use at the time.

Olwert said ABC plans three more Jennings-Koppel programs this year and four next year.

Last week's top 10 were "Family Ties," "The Cosby Show" and "Cheers" on NBC, ABC's "Moonlighting," a tie for fifth between NBC's "Golden Girls" and CBS' "60 Minutes," followed by "Nothing in Common" and "Matlock" on NBC, "Pack of Lies" on CBS and "L.A. Law" on NBC.

NBC finished first in evening news with a rating of 10.5, followed by CBS at 10.3 and ABC at 9.3.

Witty News Magazine Turns Into Poland's Top TV Show

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Who said TV news in Eastern Europe can't be fun?

Poland's smash TV hit of the year is an irreverent, witty news magazine called Teleexpress that has shattered ratings records and has become the most watched show in the country.

At the same time it is breaking down the traditional formula for news broadcasts in the Soviet bloc, which is usually wooden, ceremonious and consequently boring.

The fast-paced, 15-minute program, which airs each afternoon at 5:15, mixes hard and light news with rock video clips, dramatic film footage and man-on-the-street interviews about such topics as love affairs and fashion.

"People are tuning in to us because they never know what they'll see next," said Jozef Wegrzyn, the show's 43-year-old creator and chief editor.

Teleexpress was launched last June as part of an effort by the ruling Communist Party to make television more attractive to young viewers. Relying exclusively on announcers in their 20s and 30s who breathlessly read the day's stories from a studio resembling a newsroom, the show quickly caught on with young people. By late last year, its popularity had exploded.

In December, it passed the main

evening TV news program, broadcast two hours later, as the top-rated show in the country. By January it was gaining an average of 300,000 new viewers a day.

Its popularity peaked Feb. 3 when 21 million people, an astounding 77 percent of the country, tuned in. Teleexpress now has a regular audience of 17.6 million, although viewership frequently tops 20 million.

Its success has induced state broadcasting officials to live up to the party's primary vehicle for reaching the people — the main news show. This program occasionally runs light stories, such as one recently seen about a dog who lives on the roof of its owners' house in Florida. It also has switched to a single announcer who is attempting to appear more relaxed on camera.

"Teleexpress doesn't show councils, meetings or 'talking heads,' which is the beast of the main news," wrote one glowing review in Reporter magazine.

But Teleexpress consistently goes beyond the boundaries of the more conservative main news in content as well as style.

In recent months it broadcast video footage taken by Western news organizations of Soviet dissident Andrei Sakharov's return to Moscow from six years internal exile and of Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev's visit to a Roman Catholic Church in

Riga. Neither was shown on the main news.

Interviewed in his spacious office at the state television studios, Wegrzyn said he believed the Teleexpress approach is more in keeping with the greater political and cultural openness advocated by Gorbachev.

Although he is a Communist Party member, Wegrzyn said he gives the 27 young people who write and produce the show a great deal of freedom about what they put on the air.

The studio for Teleexpress is a former conference room at the state TV building in downtown Warsaw. The show is taped with only one camera and two lights.

The room also serves as the show's editorial offices, and during the day it takes on the atmosphere of a student organization where ideas on what should appear on the program are informally discussed among the crew.

Those on the show say they are overwhelmed by its success.

"It's been the adventure of my life," said Wojciech Reszczynski, 34, the main announcer who last year was named the top new personality on Polish TV.

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Women Create Refuge For Disabled Animals

SANTA PAULA, Calif. — Some people like living on a farm for the soothing certainties to be found there. Corn grows, ducks fly, hens roost.

But take a closer look at a backyard farm here and you'll see a cast of animals no one ever mentioned in "Old MacDonald." There's a duck named Dancer, crippled by arthritis; a flightless Canadian goose with an amputated wing, and a hen with a deformed foot who requires a custom-designed roost to stay perched.

Disabled animals are part of almost any barnyard. If folks rarely see them, that's because they're often "culled out," a euphemism for being killed. Lynn Grizzard saw this happening when she worked as a veterinarian's assistant. When clients brought in disabled animals, they were usually put to sleep or sold at auction for meat.

Ms. Grizzard, 32, began taking the doomed animals home with her — a brain-damaged cat here, a broken-billed duck there.

"It was hard to say no to anyone," she said.

Now Ms. Grizzard and her partner, Devon Finnegan, 26, are ringleaders of what may become a burgeoning disabled animals' liberation movement. As proprietors of the Grinegan Farm for Differently-abled Animals, the two declare that a disabled duck that cost 75 cents has as much right to live as a healthy thoroughbred racehorse. As Ms. Finnegan said, "A life's a life."

When the two acquired their first charges three years ago, among them a trio of cats named Peace, Freedom and Justice, their rented house was not set up as a sanitarium for disabled critters; and the two didn't have the money to fix it up (Ms. Finnegan is a special education teacher and Ms. Grizzard now works at an exotic bird farm). They made

do, however. They found a bunch of wire; someone donated chain-link fencing ... and the animals kept arriving.

The two are now housemothers to two goats, three dogs, three cats, six chickens, one guinea hen, 11 ducks, five rabbits, two cockateels, a cockatoo, a Canadian goose and an Egyptian goose, an Amazon parrot and a blackbird that one of the cats hunted down, and which is currently convalescing in the bathroom.

Expenses have grown with the increasing head count. Chicken feed alone costs Ms. Finnegan and Ms. Grizzard about \$100 a month; and their gas bill has soared since they have been keeping the house warmer than usual for their Moluccan cockatoo, Baby. (Baby has beak-and-feather syndrome, a disease that weakens her feathers so that they break off and provide little warmth. The condition is usually fatal in cockatoos, which can live to 70 years or more.)

Ms. Grizzard and Ms. Finnegan survive the lean months by eating vegetables from their garden supplemented with large portions of rice.

"We may not have a lot of money to go to the grocery store, but the animals always eat," said Ms. Grizzard. "They eat us out of house and home, but there are compensations," she added. "I have never known an animal to be quite as entertaining as a duck."

On a sunny Saturday, while other people play softball or go to the movies, these two take their amusement in the backyard. There's a new duck pond with a specially constructed access ramp for the mobility-impaired fowl. The farm proprietors never seem to tire of watching Dancer waddle up the ramp, her feet slapping noisily, then perch on the floating platform before slipping off into the water.

Elsewhere in the yard, they might see Daffodil Bill, a duck, charge after any dog that has the misfortune to

wander into the enclosure. (Daffodil Bill lost half his bill in a fight, and since then has shown an affinity for attacking others. Because of the bill deformity, he requires a deep dish for dining.)

Or, if Bill is feeling docile, they might watch Mime, the lame guinea hen (her face is masked with white like a mime), spar with the king of the chickens, Banana, one of the able-bodied animals on the farm.

Seriously impaired animals such as Pepper, a Plymouth Rock hen, are kept in separate enclosures because chickens will sometimes attack an injured animal, Ms. Grizzard said. Pepper has a twisted leg, the result of a birth defect. Her foot points in the wrong direction, and she drags it about.

Ms. Grizzard said they intend to shell out funds for an operation to have the leg amputated (they have spent as much as \$1,000 in veterinary bills for a single animal) but until then, Pepper gets along on daily doses of human small talk and affection.

Pepper is one of many residents the farm got from a feed and supply store, the Mill. It's the place where local farmers take unwanted animals to be adopted. Ms. Grizzard said the clerks at the Mill are always happy to see the Grinegan Farm duo approaching because if they have a particularly hard-to-place animal on hand, they know Lynn and Devon are likely to take it home.

the Mario Sengo Museum, and the surrounding grounds the Isabel Botanical Gardens after his wife. The idea first came to him 25 years ago when a friend died "and left nothing behind," Sengo says.

He's not worried by the hurdles on the road to immortality, such as government permits. At a recent hearing, Sengo asked the Solano County Board of Supervisors to waive or postpone \$25,000 in government processing fees and grant him a use permit.

The five elected overseers of the county were split over whether the government should pay the processing fees. They finally agreed that before any decision, they want Sengo to pay for a feasibility study showing how the project would affect traffic and area services.

County staff advisers have recommended the project be rejected as inconsistent with the general plan because it's on land in the buffer zone between Fairfield and Vacaville.

Supervisors also want to know how Sengo will finance the museum, which could take a decade to construct. Sengo says he plans to get about 20 percent each from corporations and non-profit foundations, 10 percent from various government sources, and the rest from private donors.

The admission charge to the museum would be adjusted to pay for staff, he says, and any profits above operating costs would go to the poor.

Sengo believes the museum will be approved, but if it isn't, he vows to move it to another city or county.

Though optimistic about the ambitious undertaking, he works tirelessly to promote it. Sengo bustles around Fairfield in his white and green Continental drumming up support wherever he can with a folksy manner which belies the sharp instincts that made him wealthy.

He often wears blue-collar work clothes and cowboy boots, rather than the fancy garb and expensive jewelry of his earlier days. He won't say how old he is, just that he's in his 60s.

Though born and raised in the Central Valley, Sengo moved his family to San Jose and got into the restaurant business. Later, he made a small fortune in real estate before getting into the fruit-processing business.

Sengo, admitting that he could know more about history, says he would recruit volunteers such as university professors to work with acquired and donated materials.

More than just a museum, the project would feature picnic areas and a lagoon that would lure waterfowl, he says.

Besides the farmer statue, smaller statues would depict a cowboy on a horse, the American bald eagle, and California's symbol, the grizzly bear.

She let a guy named Willie Nelson sleep on an upstairs cot in exchange for sweeping out. Everybody knows what became of him. She let a guy they called Cityview sleep on the roof. Nobody knows what became of him.

She celebrated, their struggling triumphs and comforted them in failure. Somebody wrote a song about her, "The wettest shoulder in town."

She kept their beer tabs in a cigar box, hoping, with them, for lightning to strike, a big payoff. Some years ago, while she was alive, a one-time struggler named Tom T. Hall came back after lightning struck and redeemed his and all the other tabs in the box. Something like \$600 worth.

She also put their pictures on her walls. For luck.

The pictures have become a Toot-

sie's trademark, pictures floor to ceiling, some in plastic frames provided long years ago by Oertels 92 Beer, others thumbtacked, pictures upon pictures, curled and faded. Stuck among the pictures are hundreds of business cards and scrawled on the oak parquet bar hundreds of names. I was there!

The facade is a color you might get by mixing leftover paint so it doesn't go to waste. Tootsie fancied it a shade of orchid. Inside, the decor is plain old American Honky-Tonk: seven round bar stools with torn vinyl cushions, a couple of dozen wobbly tables, tin ashtrays, beer-ad lampshades strung from a buckled ceiling by electrical wires, cracked linoleum floor.

If you saw the movie "Coal Miner's Daughter" you got a glimpse of Tootsie's. In fact, the fellow who got slid down the bar was Robert Moore,

Tootsie's current proprietor. The scene was poetic license. Nobody can remember a brawl at Tootsie's. Tootsie kept order with a hatpin. One struggling customer, Charlie Pride, returned to present her with a jewel-encrusted one.

At the front end of the bar on a platform behind the tip jar, Sherman Neff picks and sings. He has sandy hair going to gray and a rusty, down-home voice. Some of his songs are of his own creation.

Some time back he picked up the nickname Sherman Tank, inevitable, perhaps, even though there is nothing in his blue eyes that is hard or threatening. Anyhow, he adopted Sherman Tank as a stage name. It at least allows him a between-songs gab about his brother Septic.

He was born in Townsend, Tenn., population 1,800, joined the Navy at 17, finally got to Nashville in 1974, the year the Grand Ole Opry moved to the suburbs. For seven years he drove a tour bus off and on and picked his guitar at night for tips. Once he picked for nothing, just meals and a bed at a motel.

"If I had got here sooner I might have been lucky quicker," he said without bitterness. "I get along with people and I might have rubbed shoulders with some of those good old boys who made it big. Making it big is mostly luck."

On another level, he explains, making it big is playing regularly at Tootsie's.

Does that mean he has given up hope of becoming a star?

"Anybody who does what he loves to do and people come to listen to him do it and he entertains them is a star. 'I'm a star.'"

In about two dozen drawings and paintings, Leidenthal confirms his ability to present the truest essence of landscapes in sizes ranging from very small to very large, both in black and white and in brilliant color. His trees are blunt, muscular plant forms, his hills heavyset and massive even when low in scale.

Leidenthal has the commendable courage of adventure in painting trees in whatever manner strikes his fancy, in vivid red, royal blue, mauve. And it works, dramatically and lyrically. One vertical landscape, "Eternal Spring," is a marvel of light-infused multicolors encompassing sky, hills, water, trees and stones — all achieved in a minimum of heavy, paint-laden brush strokes.

His black and white drawings convey the same sense of robust landscapes with an effective contrast of dark areas permeated by luminous light.

Mrs. Markowski's metal work is widely known in this area, in North Carolina and at the national level. She has exhibited at numerous prestigious shows. Hers is an art of meticulous care, patience, of long hours designing and then crafting these exquisite pieces. The nine pieces she shows at Gray Gallery reveal a fine imagination, colored by what is an apparent sense of fascination with the richness of details reminiscent of the Renaissance days.

In several of these pieces, Mrs. Markowski incorporates small handwoven tapestry — most noticeably in "Scheherazade," an exquisite creamy-blond figure in a Middle Eastern setting, gowned in silver cloth and beads, seated cross-legged on woven tapestry atop a wonderfully detailed table of silver.

Another piece utilizing tapestry is "Mummy," with a miniature mummy wrapped in intricately interlaced ribbons, lying in a beautifully detailed casket. Mrs. Markowski's talent for metal surface design is perhaps best shown in "Temple of Selene and Friend." Open at the front, the three enclosure side panels features stylized birds, fish, frogs, a palm leaf and arabesques.

Mrs. Markowski's is enchanting art of fairy tale work by a contemporary master working in silver, pewter, coral, ivory and other precious materials.

Sophistication within a framework of precision marks the art of Martha Petty. Using charcoal, conte crayon and pastel, she achieves quietly mysterious art much lighter in mood than the blacks, grays and touches of color and off-whites might seem to imply.

These works, most of them depending to a great degree on the formal pattern of placements of circles, squares and rectangles, are an evocation of cut-aways of machine-like designs transformed into interior landscapes. She shows also a few representative works.

In Ms. Petty's hands, the paintings become temples of technology, a contemplation, a contemporary homage to the beauty that an artist can discover in the most unlikely sources.

My only argument with this interesting group of paintings is the high sheen of clear plastic covering the works — likely a necessary precaution to protect the fragile pastels and charcoals from accident.

The art of handmade paper art is rapidly gaining favor in the art world. Locally, one of the most prolific and talented practitioners of this rather difficult technique is Mary Ann Zotto. A couple of examples of her paper art were shown recently, along with others, at the Greenville Museum of Art.

At Gray Gallery, Ms. Zotto has the opportunity, in the display of a dozen pieces, to reveal more of the possibilities of this art form. The underlying colors of the handmade papers — grays, charcoal, grayish white, provide the basis on which the artist superimposes areas of saturated color to the paper's surface. The areas of color in Ms. Zotto's work are handled primarily in shades of lilac, brick reds, somber greens and blues to suggest pictorial representations of an abstract nature. In several of the papers, she has made raised surface areas to add structural interest.

May 9 is the final exhibition date for this collection of thesis art work by the five graduate students. It's an opportunity not to be missed.

Viewing hours at the Gray Gallery on campus are from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays, with the gallery remaining open until 8 p.m. on Wednesdays. Admission is free.

Go For Taste! Let Curry Add Spice To Meals

Variety, some say, is the spice of life. We disagree. The one and only true spice of life is curry. Curry, as in chicken curry, vegetable curry, venison curry, shrimp curry.

Served with garnishes of fresh apples, oranges, kiwi, coconut, crumbled bacon, green onion or chutney, curried meals can give an ordinary evening a kick, make the commonplace extraordinary. And don't let its looks mislead or deter you. Sure its cooked color is vaguely reminiscent of pine pollen, but what good is a culinary adventure that doesn't involve some risk. So sprinkle on the curry, the more the better!

For best results, soak one cup lentils in a cup of milk or cream over night. If you're in a rush, you can let the lentils soak about an hour or until the skin on the beans begins to wrinkle.

When lentils are softened, pour lentil-cream mixture into a sauce pan in which you have sauteed diced chicken strips, onion, cashews, celery, garlic and pepper. Let mixture simmer for about two hours.

About 20 minutes before serving, cook long-grain white rice. For an extra dash, add a scant handful of wild rice. Finally, stir curry powder and lemon juice into meat dish seconds before dishing concoction over a bed of rice.

Serve on a gaily spread table complete with individual topping dishes of coconut, crumbled bacon, chopped egg yolk, green onion, apples or chutney. For a libation, provide glasses of ice-cold water, orange juice or beer. All are excellent compliments to this eastern dish.

(Mixed vegetables, shrimp and venison can be substituted for chicken.)

Spring Vegetables Signal A Season Of Green

Spring is the color green. The earth awakens with the first timid shoots of asparagus, as sure a sign of the season as the vernal equinox.

Add robust spinach, early lettuce, sweet and tender peas, luscious artichokes — all green, all delicious.

PASTA WITH THREE PEAS

- 1/2 pound snow peas
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup chopped shallots
- 1 red pepper, sliced thin
- 1/2 pound sugar snap peas
- 1 cup small fresh green peas

- 3. Cook pasta al dente according to package directions. Toss with vegetable mixture and sprinkle with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

EIGHT-LAYER SALAD

- 2 cups fresh green peas
- 1 head iceberg lettuce
- 1/4 cup chopped scallions

2 tablespoons chopped green pepper

- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 8 slices lean bacon, cooked, drained, crumbled
- 1. Steam peas in a small amount of water until tender, about 3 minutes.

2. Remove core from lettuce. Wash and pat dry. With a sharp knife, shred into 1/4-inch slices.

3. In a glass bowl place the ingredients in this order: lettuce, peas, scallions and green pepper. Spread top with mayonnaise and sprinkle with sugar, cheddar cheese and bacon. Cover tightly with plastic

wrap. Refrigerate at least 8 hours. Makes 12 servings.

Q. After reading all the news stories about salmonella and poultry, I am afraid to serve it to my family. What do you recommend instead of poultry for a healthy diet? Mrs. H.H., Greenville.

A. There is no need to stop serving poultry to your family. It still is an excellent protein food in a heart healthy diet. The recent stories about food poisoning remind us that we need to be careful in handling and storing foods so we do not get flu-like symptoms of diarrhea and vomiting or worse consequences of food poisonings. Older people, children and people with any diseases that impair their immune system are the most susceptible.

All raw meat, fish and poultry are likely to have some Salmonella or other bacteria on them. Following the recommendations below will help ensure the poultry you serve to your family will not cause food poisoning.

Pay special attention to No. 3. That is the one we are careless about, and it probably causes most of the food poisoning in our area.

1. Select poultry, meat and all perishables last, just before going to the check-out counter. Then take those food items home and refrigerate or freeze them. Stop at the cleaners, the drug store and other places before doing the grocery shopping.

2. Always keep poultry refrigerated or frozen until ready to cook. Thaw frozen poultry in the refrigerator, in the microwave or under cold running water before cooking. If cooking whole pieces of poultry, just adjust the cooking time and cook from the frozen state. Break the habit of thawing poultry on the counter and at room temperature.

3. Avoid cross contamination of food. Wash knives, cutting boards and hands that have touched raw meat thoroughly with hot and soapy water before touching other food. Cooking temperatures destroy the bacteria, but bacteria often is reintroduced after the food is cooked.

Many of us are guilty of just wiping the knife after cutting raw poultry and then using it to carve the cooked poultry — that recontaminates the poultry.

We sometimes wipe the cutting board lightly and then cut vegetables for salad. Since those vegetables will not be cooked the bacteria can grow if they are left at room temperature for very long.

4. Use a meat thermometer to determine doneness of meats. Cook poultry until it reaches 180-185 degrees. If you have stuffed the poultry, make sure the dressing reaches 165 degrees.

5. And lastly, refrigerate leftovers right away.

If you follow these recommendations, you can continue to enjoy poultry without the risks of food poisonings.

Potato Chip Survives Attacks On Snack Foods

NASHVILLE — Straight from the vast convention floor of SnaxPo '87, the colorful international conclave of the snack food industry, comes a spicy sociological morsel to chew on: Despite America's fitness fervor, the potato chip has withstood the nutrition crunch.

Potato Facts

The lowly potato is lower in calories and higher in nutrition than many people think. A medium (1/3rd pound) baked potato contains about 100 calories; it's the trimmings or the frying that piles up the calories.

Eat a potato, skin and all, and you'll get significant amounts of protein, iron, vitamin C, B vitamins and fiber. Keep these points in mind as you buy and cook potatoes.

How many potatoes to buy: Three medium baking potatoes weigh about 1 pound. For mashed potatoes, 1 pound of potatoes makes about 4 servings. One pound of potatoes yields about 2 cups of cubes or slices.

flavored cheese twirls, chocolate tortilla chips, Szechwan sausage sticks, passion-fruit popcorn and much, much more — said potato chips continue to break sales records every year.

Despite steady attacks on the familiar snack from diet, fitness and nutrition gurus, potato-chip makers (known in the trade as "chippers") rang up sales of about \$3 billion in 1985. (One trade journal, Chipper Snacker Magazine, reported a wholesale sales volume of \$3.29 billion; another, Snack Food Magazine, reported \$2.77 billion.) Consumption increased by more than 7 percent over the year before, according to Chipper Snacker. Assuming a wholesale price of \$1 per pound, that translates to about 12 pounds of potato chips consumed for every man, woman and child in the country.

Several theories are offered as to why salty, oil-fried potato chips continue to sell so well at a time when "lite," "diet" and "lo-salt" seem to be the nation's nutritional watchwords.

Many leaders of the Snack Food Association, the trade group representing salted-snack manufacturers and the host of the convention here, say part of the credit lies with campaigns mounted by chippers around

the country that are designed, as one trade publication here put it, "to take on the 'junk food' issue."

"We are not telling people that potato chips are a basic food," said John Cady, the association's president, as he munched a jalapeno-flavored chip on the convention floor. "But we are putting out some straightforward information: A one-ounce bag of potato chips has more Vitamin C than a small apple, less sodium than a six-ounce glass of tomato juice and, usually, no cholesterol."

On the other hand, the evidence suggests that lots of people simply ignore nutritional considerations when they buy potato chips, pretzels and other snacks. Snack-makers have raced to keep ahead of the fitness fad with health-food versions of traditional munchables such as unsalted nuts and low-sodium nacho chips. For the most part, though, these nutritious variants have been flops in the market.

The paradigm, as noted by Snack Food magazine, is the granola bar, a snack food that did not exist a decade ago and now accounts for some \$440 million (at wholesale) in annual sales.

Granola bars, the magazine says, were designed to be a "healthful, nutritious... candy bar alternative." Today, the growth area in the

granola-bar business is in bars containing "marshmallows, caramel, fudge and other 'goopy fun' ingredients." Consumers seem to favor granola bars with "caloric count and sugar content... comparable to those of leading candy bars," Snack Food concludes.

The real reason for the continued popularity of potato chips may be that just about every American grew up eating them — most likely, a local or regional brand.

"It's amazing how loyal people are to their home-town potato chip," said Stephen Eure, the association's legislative director and supervisor of the group's political action committee, known as — what else? — SnackPac.

"When I'm going to offices on (Capitol) Hill, the people from Milwaukee always say, you know, 'Geiser's Potato Chips are the world's best.' And the guy from Massachusetts says 'Oh, no, it's Tri-Sum, that's the best potato chip.' And

the Californians say, 'Laura Scudder's Potato Chip is the best on earth.'"

But in the crowded aisles of the convention at the Opryland complex here, the talk ran to whether these traditional regional chippers will be devoured by a few giant potato-chip conglomerates. National firms such as Frito-Lay and Borden's have been swallowing local companies rapidly, and recently the Southland Corporation, parent company of 7-Eleven stores, has been buying potato chip-makers as well.

"The potato-chip business is going the same way as the beer industry," lamented James Frick of McCormick & Co., who had come here hoping to interest chip-makers in a line of new flavors such as "Chipotle" (a spicy barbecue flavor) and "Oriental Barbecue."

"There used to be hundreds of local brewers around the country, and now they've pretty much been bought out by the national brands. And that's

what you're going to be seeing in the chip business."

As a seller of flavorings, Frick is worried that a nationalized chip industry might be less willing to experiment with new tastes. But this year's convention shows that the nation's chippers remain willing to experiment. The astounding range of new potato-chip flavors up for grabs included curry, yogurt, cheese and garlic, lemon and herb, Sicilian, cajun, ketchup, grilled steak, sour-dough, apple, carrot, banana, plantain potato chips and even one called the "Yammer," made from sweet potatoes.

Your intrepid correspondent tried every flavor in a diligent effort to ascertain the nation's best new 1987-model potato chip. And the winner is: the thick and tangy Mesquite Potato Chip, pride and joy of an Indianapolis chipper called Krunchers that adorns each bag with its corporate philosophy — "No More Wimpy Chips!"

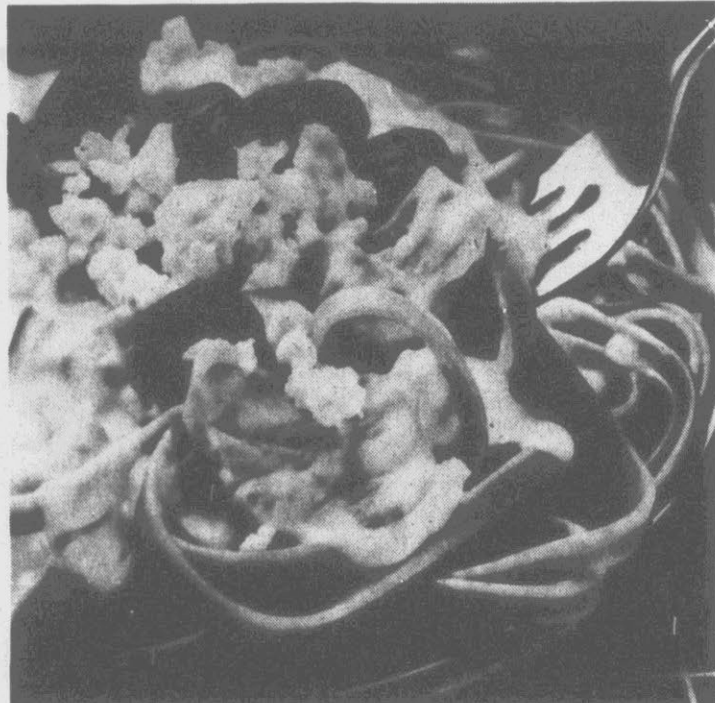
A gift from Greece, feta cheese is now available in most supermarket dairy cases. It crumbles easily and has a sharp, slightly salty taste.

 - 1 cup crumbled feta cheese (4 ounces)

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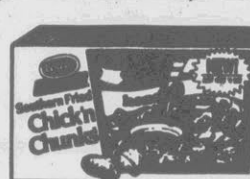
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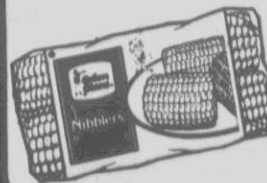

Each ring of leaves will snap off farther from the base until the central portion that is green only at the tips is exposed. Cut off 1 inch of the top. Scrape out the fuzzy choke using a teaspoon or a sharp knife. Trim off any outer dark green areas with a sharp knife.

2. Combine lemon juice with water in a bowl, and as each artichoke is trimmed, place it in the water.

3. In a small bowl combine the parsley, garlic, mint and salt to taste. Remove the artichokes from the water, pat dry, and stuff the interiors with the parsley mixture, bending down a leaf or two to secure stuffing. Lightly salt the outsides of the artichokes.

4. In a large saucepan heat olive oil and lightly saute the artichokes on all sides. Arrange artichokes, stems up; add 2 cups water. Cover pan with foil and a tight-fitting lid. Cook over medium heat for about 45 minutes to an hour, until artichokes are tender. Check water level once or twice during cooking. Remove artichokes from pan and drizzle a teaspoon of olive oil over each one. Serve at room temperature. Makes 6 servings.

GREEN TERRINE

- 2 pounds spinach
- 2 bunches watercress
- 4 long thin carrots, peeled
- 4 eggs
- 4 slices whole-wheat bread
- 1 cup milk
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 2 cups chopped onions
- 8 ounces ground turkey or chicken
- 4 eggs
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon tarragon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1. Wash spinach, trim stems and steam 2 minutes. Drain well and chop fine, but do not puree. Blanch watercress 1 minute and chop. Cook whole carrots until almost tender. Hard-cook 4 eggs and when cool, remove shells.

2. In a medium bowl soak bread in milk for 10 minutes. Squeeze out and discard milk. Tear bread into tiny pieces.

3. In a medium skillet heat 2 tablespoons olive oil and saute garlic and onions 5 minutes. Remove vegetables from pan, heat remaining olive oil and saute ground turkey until it loses its color, breaking it apart with a fork.

4. In a large bowl combine greens, bread, onion mixture, 4 raw eggs, thyme, tarragon, salt and pepper. Mix well.

5. Butter a terrine or a 9-by-5-by-4-inch loaf pan and line the bottom with parchment paper. Press half the spinach mixture into the terrine and line up the hard-cooked eggs in the center. Press the carrots into the spinach mixture alongside the eggs. Cover with remaining mixture. Cover with buttered parchment. Bake in a 350-degree oven for 1 1/4 hours. Cool for 30 minutes. Run a knife along the sides and unmold. Turn out onto a serving platter. Makes 6 servings.

ASPARAGUS WITH LAMB AND BEAN-THREAT NOODLES

- 1 pound lean lamb, cut into thin strips
- 2 tablespoons dark soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons dry sherry
- 4 dried cloud-ear mushrooms
- 1 pound fresh asparagus
- 3 tablespoons peanut oil
- 1 tablespoon minced ginger
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1/4 cup chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon corn starch
- 2 ounces bean-thread noodles
- peanut oil

1. In a medium bowl marinate lamb in soy sauce and sherry, refrigerated, for 30 minutes.

2. Soak cloud-ear mushrooms in warm water for 20 minutes. Discard water and slice in strips.

3. Wash asparagus and snap off woody end of stem and discard. Slice stalks diagonally into 2-inch pieces.

4. In a large skillet or wok heat 1 tablespoon oil. Add asparagus and stir-fry 1 minute. Add 2 tablespoons water, cover pan and steam 1 minute. Remove and set aside.

5. Wash pan and heat remaining oil. Add ginger and garlic and stir-fry 1 minute. Add lamb and stir-fry until it is no longer pink. Return asparagus to pan. Combine chicken broth and corn starch and add to pan. Cook until thickened. Serve over fried bean thread noodles.

6. To deep-fry bean thread noodles, heat oil 1 inch deep. When very hot, drop a small handful of noodles at a time into the oil. Turn over, if necessary. Act quickly; they are done in an instant. Remove with slotted spoon when lightly golden and drain. Makes 4 servings.

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Bacteria In Food Supply Said At 'Crisis' Stage

WASHINGTON — Bacterial contamination of America's food supply has reached "crisis" proportions, said Frank E. Young, U.S. Food and Drug Administration commissioner.

The problem has worsened in recent years as potentially harmful bacteria continues to invade the food chain in both numerous and novel ways, Young said in a recent address to the National Food Policy Conference here.

More than 200 food industry executives, consumer group activists and government representatives attended the two-day gathering, which also featured presentations on hunger, nutrition and medical research. But the food safety issue surfaced repeatedly, as Young and several other speakers sounded warnings about the presence of bacteria, pesticides and other chemicals in food.

Estimates have placed the number

of Americans who become ill with some form of salmonella poisoning to be as high as 2 million annually. An equally large number are said to suffer from campylobacter, another pathogen, each year. The cost of such food-borne illnesses in terms of lost work and medical bills is said to be between \$600 million and \$1 billion a year.

The FDA commissioner cited imported foods and meals prepared at home as two problem areas.

"I'm very concerned about some imported foods available in this country," he said. "We must ensure that these imports have the same degree of safety as domestically produced products. That is not true now and it's a real area of concern."

For instance, Young cited several European soft cheeses examined by the FDA in the past year which contained much higher levels of *Listeria monocytogenes* bacteria than did the Jalisco soft cheese which was linked to several deaths and numerous illnesses in the Los Angeles area in

1985. The FDA was able to detect the contamination before the cheese entered the country, he said.

The soft cheese incident is but one indication that foods are being manufactured in foreign countries under sanitation standards well below those required in the United States. One reason for the development, Young said, is that other nations have taken a greater role in marketing finished products. In the past, many of these same nations were satisfied with just shipping raw commodities to this country for further processing.

Even so, Young held out little hope

that his agency could ensure any significant increase in its monitoring activities.

"There is a marked increase in the number of imports, but we are only looking at 9 percent of these entries," he said, adding that this figure will increase only slightly in the near future because of budget limitations.

Evolving eating habits are also responsible for the increases in food-borne illness, Young said.

"A shift in consumers' lifestyles has brought changes in the use of food We now are having others prepare food for us vs. our own in-home preparation. This has put a

chink in the armor of food safety," he said.

Improperly handled or stored meals purchased at restaurants, delicatessens, cafeterias and other takeout businesses are thought to pose a threat to an increasingly large audience.

The FDA commissioner called consumer awareness of the contamination issue one of the best means for controlling the problem.

"The informed consumer is the first line of protection. Without providing information to them (on this issue) then we (at the FDA) will have failed," he said. "Consumers need to

read, be informed and protect themselves."

The food safety issue was also discussed by two members of Congress who spoke before the conference.

Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kansas, expressed an interest in increasing the federal government's role in pesticide monitoring. "I am concerned about agricultural chemicals. We need to find out what the (health) problem is in that area," said Dole, who is expected to announce his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination shortly. "I am concerned about it."
