## Charges Of Fraud Mar Korean Voting

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Government candidate Roh Tae-woo took a strong lead in early returns today from the first direct presidential election in 16 years.

The opposition accused the government of extensive fraud.

With 13 percent of the nationwide vote counted, the Central Election Commission said Roh, a former army general, was leading with about 45 percent.

Opposition candidate Kim Young-sam was trailing with 26 percent,

followed by rival opposition candidate Kim Dae-jung with 19 percent. Kim Jong-pil, one of two minor opposition candidates, had about 9 percent of the vote.

Whoever wins the largest number of votes is elected. A majority is not required.

The National Coalition for Democracy said it received reports of thousands of cases of fraud in Seoul and other cities. The opposition alliance claimed about 3,000 cases of fraud in Seoul alone.

Opposition leaders repeatedly predicted during the campaign that

the government would resort to fraud to retain power. The opposition said people would take to the streets in widespread demonstrations if Roh were declared the winner.

The government rejected the fraud charges and accused the opposition of trying to wreck the election. The governing Democratic Justice Party said the opposition tried to slip phony ballots into ballot boxes to frame the government.

More than 70,000 police guarded polling stations and military units were on combat alert across the country in case of trouble, but voting proceeded quietly apart from a few scattered incidents. It was a cold, clear day with the temperature hovering around the freezing mark.

The Central Election Commission, which is controlled by the government, said after the polls had closed that 89 percent of the country's 26 million eligible voters had cast ballots.

"We have to wait and see if democracy will come after the election," said Ki Tae-yul, 74, after casting his vote.

Roh expressed confidence when he

## Girl Shot In Show Of Israeli Force

GAZA CITY, Occupied Gaza Strip (AP) — Israel's army today staged a major show of force in the occupied Gaza Strip, and hospital officials said an 8-year-old girl and two men were shot and wounded in protests at refugee camps.

The army sent hundreds of soldiers and several tanks through the streets of Gaza City, the largest city in the Gaza Strip.

Soldiers opened fire during protests at the Jabaliya and Nusseirat refugee camps, wounding the girl and two 25-year-old men, officials at Shifa Hospital in Gaza City said.

One of the men was in serious condition after being shot in the back, the officials said. They said five

teen-age Jabaliya residents suffered injuries from beatings.

Army officials said they were checking the reports.

The army crackdown followed riots in which soldiers shot and killed at least four Palestinians on Tuesday. Two protesters died in a clash at Shifa Hospital.

It was the ninth straight day of violence in the occupied Gaza Strip, which Israel captured in the 1967 Middle East war, along with the West Bank. The violence has been among the worst in 10 years.

About 30 protesters gathered outside Shifa Hospital, throwing stones

## Holiday Can Be A Happy Season

The Christmas season should be one of the happiest seasons of the year, but the rush to get things done can lead to carelessness that could mar the holiday.

In an effort to prevent problems from developing, interim Greenville Police Chief Randy Nichols has offered suggestions on how to prevent thefts and traffic accidents which tend to increase as more people are shopping, partying and traveling from place to place.

Nichols said shoppers should refrain from displaying large sums of money while shopping. He cautioned women shoppers not to leave their purses unattended on store counters or in shopping baskets or in fitting rooms.

To reduce the chance of having Christmas gifts or other items — such as purses or wallets — stolen from cars, Nichols suggested drivers park in well-lighted areas, lock the car doors and place valuables in the trunk, out of sight of would-be thieves.

In an effort to reduce the number of thefts from homes, Nichols said residents should have adequate locks installed on all exterior doors and be sure all doors and windows are locked when leaving the house, even for short periods.

"Don't admit uninvited salesmen or strangers into your home," close blinds, shades and drapes at night, and "hang up immediately on unknown phone callers," Nichols suggested.

"Don't advertise your absence." If you are going to be away over the holidays, Nichols suggested, "Have a trusted neighbor collect your mail; stop delivery of your daily paper or have the neighbor pick the paper up each day; (and have the friend) turn outside and inside lights on and off," so it appears someone is at home.

Motorests should "drive safely and defensively ... wear seat belts," and be aware of winter driving hazards, according to Nichols. Traffic accidents, which normally increase during the winter months, are even more frequent during holiday periods, he said.

"The seat belt law is saving lives and preventing serious injury," according to Nichols. "We've seen people walk away from accidents this year when before they would have been carried away. The difference is the people had on their seat belts."

"Start the buckle-up habit during the holidays," Nichols urged.

"Anticipate situations that call for reduced speed — slick road surfaces, poor visibility, turning maneuvers,

## Flue-Cured Leaf Quota To Increase 6.8 Percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Flue-cured tobacco farmers next year will be allowed to increase their crop by 6.8 percent, the first significant hike in the basic tobacco quota in more than a dozen years.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., a major force in the 1985 overhaul of the federal tobacco program that resulted in the quota formula, called Tuesday's announcement by U.S. Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng "a fine Christmas present for our tobacco farmers."

Helms said representatives of several tobacco organizations had told him they would be happy with a 1988 quota increase of about 7 percent because a sharper increase might result in too much unsold crop.

Last season's undermarketings of flue-cured tobacco are expected to exceed overmarketings by 50 million pounds, which will effectively raise the 1988 quota to 805 million pounds, or 65 million pounds more than the adjusted 1987 quota.

Verner N. Grise of the depart-

ment's Economic Research Service said the boost is the first increase in the basic flue-cured quota since 1975, when it was raised to 1,491,000 pounds from 1,297,000 pounds in 1974.

The annual quota has been reduced or held steady since then, Grise said. A reduction in tobacco inventories and rising imports of cigarettes and leaf led to the quota increase, he said.

Lyng's announcement said that the 1988 flue-cured price support will be

## Bar Gives Support To Judge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anthony M. Kennedy was endorsed today by the American Bar Association as someone whose integrity, temperament and intellectual abilities make him highly qualified to be a Supreme Court justice.

"No one doubted his integrity or intellectual ability," ABA leader Harold R. Tyler Jr. told the Senate Judiciary Committee at its third day of hearings on the nomination.

The ABA's glowing endorsement comes on the heels of support for Kennedy from key Senate Democrats who say his confirmation chances are excellent.

In response to questions, Tyler said the ABA panel that reviews judicial appointees considered the fact that Kennedy had been a member of the all-male Olympic Club in San Francisco. Kennedy quit the club in October and had raised objections to its discriminatory policies in 1986.

Tyler, the chairman of the ABA panel, said, "This business was not a disqualifying factor at all. I suppose one can say he might have been more sensitive to the problem earlier than he was. But on balance he behaved in a responsible fashion."

Tyler added that federal judges "should avoid that type of place." But he said there was no evidence "Judge Kennedy intended to be part of an organization that purposely discriminated."

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, suggested the ABA report virtually "canonized" Kennedy and asked whether the panel had found any "negatives."

Although the Judiciary Committee will not vote on the nomination until late January, Democratic leaders had warm words of praise for Kennedy on Tuesday as he completed his own appearance before the panel.

## City Hall Getting New Offices

The sound of hammers hitting and buzzsaws roaring isn't quite Christmas music, but that's the sound being heard this holiday season for those employees working on the first floor of City Hall.

A renovation project, which will provide additional office space on the first floor, is currently under way at the 5th Street and Washington Street location.

Five small offices are being constructed in space which was previously sections of the front,

public lobby and side hallway.

City Finance Director Ron Kimble said the office additions are intended to increase convenience for the public by making front offices more accessible.

According to Kimble, an office being constructed to the right of the main lobby is planned for the joint use of City Council members and the receptionist for the mayor's office.

To the left of the main lobby, the existing personnel office will be expanded, providing better access and visibility.

Three offices, to be utilized by the

Personnel Department, are being constructed along the hallway on the left side of the tax office.

Besides the noise, Kimble said the office additions are creating some cramped quarters in City Hall.

"We're quickly running out of space here," he said.

Kimble said the construction project is being done in-house, with the Department of Engineering providing the blueprints and Public Works Building and Grounds performing the construction.

Approximately \$7,200 was originally estimated for the cost of materials.

A budget ordinance was passed at the Nov. 12 City Council meeting which, in addition to other items, appropriated the construction money from the 1987-88 General Fund.

Shelton Harris, construction supervisor, said the project, employing four Public Works people full-time, is scheduled to be completed in approximately three weeks. Shelton described the project as going well and under budget.

Also working on the construction are Thomas Stencil, Johnny Braxton and Danny Boyd.

## Toy Weapon

RALEIGH (AP) — Judge Richard Chaney set a possible precedent when he ruled in Durham County Juvenile Court that, under certain circumstances, a toy cap pistol is a deadly weapon.

The circumstances in question: firing the pistol at motorists while driving at speeds of up to 65 miles per hour.

Chaney found a 15-year-old boy guilty of assault with a deadly weapon for firing a cap pistol at a Durham police officer and others Nov. 4 on Interstate 85. Sentencing was delayed until Jan. 25, 1988. The teen-ager, who is on probation in Granville County for breaking and entering, faces up to two years in prison for the toy gun offense.

Court officials said that Chaney's ruling on the cap gun will be precedent-setting if it is appealed and affirmed by the N.C. Court of Appeals.

# A-G Students Help Develop Ads For Hospital Campaign

Pitt County Memorial Hospital trustees Tuesday afternoon heard plans for hospital marketing of health professions opportunities.

Beth Nelson, the hospital's marketing director, and Linda Burnham, chief nurse recruiter for the hospital, said billboards and radio spots sponsored by Pitt and other eastern North Carolina hospitals will begin near the first of 1988. They showed drafts of the proposed billboards and let the trustees listen to a radio spot with a "rap" theme designed to appeal to youth. They said they have received guidance from members of the Ayden-Grifton High School student body in planning the advertising campaign.

United Way volunteers among hospital employees were recognized by the board. Linda Dunham, one of the co-leaders of the hospital campaign, reported that the hospital employees exceeded their \$80,000 goal by 9 percent, raising \$87,350.

Kathy Barger, a CPA employed by the Ernst and Whinney accounting firm who is acting as chief financial officer of the hospital until a permanent one can be hired, was introduced. She reported that accounts receivable are up and every effort, including the hiring of a firm to assist, is being done to bring in some \$8.2 million owed the hospital that is deemed collectible.

A board of trustees policy statement drafted in April

1983 was reiterated by the board. The statement reads: "Pitt County Memorial Hospital Board of Trustees promotes consolidation of hospital services in an attempt to reduce expensive duplication of resources and deliver quality patient care at the most reasonable cost."

The following comment on the statement was issued: "This policy statement is constructed to promote level of utilization consistent with the delivery of quality health care in the hospital setting. Professional skills, high cost technology and expensive construction, are consolidated in units that share resources within the framework of a single hospital configuration."

These logics were used to consolidate the medical school and the community hospital mission into a single hospital in this community. This policy has contributed to the development of a unique service in this community and region."

It was reported that the hospital's EastCare air ambulance service logged 27 interhospital transfers and one scene flight during November. Fifty-seven percent of those transferred came to Pitt Memorial, with Wake Medical Center in Raleigh receiving the next greatest number — six. Flight revenue amounted to \$50,280, some \$13,988 shy of expenses, it was reported.

Dr. Robert Brame was presented a plaque honoring his year of service as hospital chief of staff. Dr. Mike Weaver was introduced as the chief of staff for next year, along with Dr. Mary Raab, chief of staff-elect.

# Planning Panel Approves Plat For Project In Cannons Area

A preliminary plat near Cannons Crossroads containing 75 single-family lots was unanimously approved by the Greenville Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday.

The preliminary plat, South Hall, is situated on 76.9 acres located west of S.R. 1700, east of the CSX railroad, and north of White Road.

In another matter pertaining to the Cannons Crossroads area, a request by Greenville Properties to rezone two tracts of land on the northwest corner of that intersection was withdrawn until the next meeting.

The request called for the first

tract, 4.36 acres located on the northwest corner of S.R. 1700 and White Road, to be rezoned from RA-20 (residential-agriculture) to CN (Neighborhood Commercial), and the second tract, 3.93 acres located west of tract one, be rezoned from RA-20 to O&I-2 (office and institutional).

Dorothy Hudson, who lives along S.R. 1700, spoke at the meeting against the rezoning, citing concern of potential commercial overdevelopment.

In other matters, the commission unanimously approved a request by the city Planning and Development Department to rezone a 2.3-acre tract

located on the northwest corner of 12th Street and Clark Street from R-6 (high density residential) to IU (unoffensive industry).

The rezoning is part of the South Evans Redevelopment Project Plan. Also unanimously approved was the preliminary plat of Tucker Farms Development, Phase 2, located south of the U.S. 264 Bypass and west of the proposed Tobacco Road extension.

The plat involves three commercial and office-institutional lots on a 32.64-acre tract.

The commission also agreed to meet on Jan. 26 at 7 p.m. to discuss Topic 3 of the zoning ordinance update.

Topic 3 involves the discussion of zoning districts, permitted and special uses, non-conformities, and definitions.

Two other agenda items, a request by Methodist Retirement Homes Inc. to close an unopened portion of Third Street, and a request to approve a 10.3-acre preliminary plat east of Tobacco Road and west of Rollinwood Cluster Homes, were withdrawn.

# Board To Consider Permit For Shelter

The Greenville Board of Adjustment will consider a request to obtain a special use permit, allowing the operation of a night shelter for the homeless, at its regular monthly meeting Thursday at 7 p.m. in City Council Chambers.

The request, brought by the Greenville Community Shelter and Denison D. Garrett Jr., if approved, would allow the shelter to be operated at the former Agnes Fullilove School Site on the corner of Manhattan Avenue and Chestnut Street.

The City Council unanimously approved on Dec. 9, the property be

rezoned from R-6 (high density residential) to O&I (office and institutional).

A public hearing on the subject will be held.


In other matters, the board will consider a request by James A. Arnold Jr., to obtain a special use permit to maintain the operation of Beau's nightclub located in the Carolina East Shopping Center on N.C. 11, consider a request to obtain a special use permit to operate a salon and health club at 2408 S. Charles St., and consider a request for a variance allowing a detached garage at 310 E. 13th St., to be used as a dwelling unit.

# Toll In Blizzards, Twisters Reaches 65

West Coast residents braced today for an intense Pacific storm expected to sweep across the nation like the system blamed for Midwest blizzards, Southern tornadoes and at least 65 deaths.

As the new storm crawled east, a homeless man died in a doorway in Los Angeles. National Guard armories across California opened their doors to the homeless on the order of Gov. George Deukmejian, and Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley directed city recreation centers to do the same.

"This is supposed to be a whacking big storm, and the shelters will stay open as long as the weather is as bad as it is," Los Angeles Deputy Mayor Mike Gage said.

The homeless man, who carried no identification, had a body

temperature 20 degrees below normal, authorities said.

Gale warnings were posted for most of the California coastline, and storm and high-wind warnings were issued for the central coast.

"You could call it the sister of this storm," said Roy Pringle of the National Weather Service in Milwaukee, referring to the storm that began over the weekend and closed Chicago's O'Hare Airport and schools in 11 states.

Millions of Americans spent Tuesday cleaning up from record snowfalls in the Southwest, blizzard conditions in the Midwest and tornadoes in the South.

The system blew from the Great Lakes into Maine overnight, smothering parts of the state under as much as a foot of snow, much to the delight of ski resort operators. More snow was expected to fall in the

state's northeastern section, changing to a mixture of rain and snow along the coast before ending on Thursday.

Wind, combined with up to 14 inches of snow in the Midwest on Tuesday snapped power lines, tore loose trees and caused widespread power outages, including ones that affected 170,000 Chicago-area residents and 114,000 people across Michigan.

The weather service warned residents of California's central coast and southern mountains to expect 2 to 5 inches of rain today because a strong storm expected had stalled at sea and was intensifying just west of the San Francisco Bay area.

"I don't know if it will be the worst storm in years, but it will be cold, windy, with high surf. It's a winter storm," said meteorologist Michael Lewis.

Five inches of snow covered Eugene, Ore., and schools closed in Portland and outlying areas. Traffic snarled as a pair of trucks jackknifed on Interstate 5 in southern Oregon,

and one man was killed when his car collided with a logging truck on U.S. 20 in the central part of the state.

The other storm left highways icy or snowpacked across the Plains, and caused school closings in parts of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, Oklahoma and Wisconsin.

Blizzard conditions Tuesday in southern Wisconsin diminished to flurries early today, but not before snowfall totaled 12.8 inches at Madison and 10 inches at Green Bay. Winds gusted to 73 mph at Janesville.

Workers plowed the runway at Milwaukee's Mitchell Airport, which was closed Tuesday, to allow an emergency medical jet to fly to Seattle with bone marrow needed in a transplant operation for a 6-year-old leukemia victim. The operation for Brooke Ward was scheduled to take five hours today at Fred Hutchinson Memorial Cancer Center.

In the Midwest, Tuesday's efforts to dig out were summed up by Don Hodo, a dispatcher for the Missouri State Highway Patrol, who said, "You might call today the Big Meltdown."

'Truth In Preference To Fiction'

Liability

The old Greenville Utilities power plant, which once was the pride of the town, is now a liability.

The plant, located off West Third Street, has long been abandoned. Now officials have discovered it is full of asbestos, a cancer-causing material. Removing it will be expensive.

The plant's generators were replaced by more efficient giant generating facilities located far away from the area they serve.

But the buildings are there, perhaps to serve some new use. But the asbestos is a serious hazard to the building and must be reckoned with before the plant is either used or torn down.

To safely remove the asbestos Greenville Utilities must spend between \$450,000 and \$500,000, and the structures must be carefully surveyed prior to that to determine the magnitude of the problem.

No one questions that the money should be spent. To do nothing would leave the asbestos-containing buildings in the central part of the city. Although they are no longer used, they are still a hazard.

To put the project off would only increase the cost in the future — and in the meantime the buildings could not be used nor demolished to make way for a more feasible use of the property.

Greenville Utilities has no choice but to proceed with the asbestos removal, just as it did at considerable expense when the substance was found in the main office building.

It is but a modern day cost of mankind's past ignorance on the subject of dangerous materials.

Proper Move

The City Council has acted in the best interest of all concerned in approving the annexation of Brook Valley, Holly Hills, Azalea Mobile Home Park and Highland Mobile Home Park.

Council member Lorraine Shinn was the only council member voting against the move, and she did not express valid reasons for her stance. She cited what she saw as an excessive interest rate (12 percent) to be charged by Greenville Utilities to finance sewage tap-in fees, and the loss of some trees to install the system.

Greenville Utilities representatives explained that the financing is offered only as a service and potential customers are free to obtain it somewhere else. As for the displaced trees we would hope that the sewage system will be planned so that as few trees as possible will be taken, and those that are removed are replaced with new trees. Certainly that should not be a major additional expense.

Those reservations must be weighed against the problem of such a large number of septic tanks in service in a concentrated area. No one is certain what that does to the ground water supply or, indeed, how it will eventually affect the health of residents.

Certainly it is clear that a properly installed sewer system which takes the waste to a well-operated treatment plant is superior.

It is inevitable that as a city grows, adjacent areas will be annexed. This should not be done in the spirit of territory grabbing, but with the knowledge that a well-planned metropolitan area is essential.

These new areas have been nearby for many years and their inclusion in the city of Greenville is logical and proper.

Public Forum

To the editor: I and about 500 others experienced a real treat and an exercise in openness at the recent installation of the City Council. The program and the comments of all persons on stage were inspiring, encouraging and apparently aimed at bringing the Greenville community closer together.

Further, I was pleased at the wisdom of the Council in taking time out of town for getting more fully acquainted and thinking together about the future. Progressive educators and administrators, both in official agencies and in business and industry, have long recognized the need for unhurried workshops for the purpose of generating teamwork and imaginative approaches to common problems.

Your editorial comment the day after the swearing in of the new Council could have served a better purpose by encouraging the Council, rather than disparaging it. I agree totally that our official boards need to be in touch with and available to the citizens. But your criticism was weak and unfortunate.

Why has the editor not suggested, simply, that all boards and official bodies of the city and county meet for business at times and places where large numbers of citizens would find it convenient and comfortable to attend? The recently announced plan of the County Commissioners to have early morning meetings escaped your criticism. And the limited experience I have had with Council meetings was in cramped and inconvenient quarters. Maybe these things could be remedied.

Hart Re-Entry May Undermine Race

McALLEN, Texas — Gary Hart's dramatic renewal of his quest for the presidency threatens to undermine, rather than broaden, the Democratic search for a presidential nominee, top party leaders and political analysts said Tuesday.

The six other Democratic candidates, who gathered here on the Texas-Mexico border Tuesday for their 14th debate of the campaign, have, yet to stir much excitement. But Hart's entry may bring the wrong kind of attention.

"It adds confusion, which is exactly what the Democrats don't need," said William Schneider, political consultant to the Los Angeles Times. "They need clarity. If Hart becomes a front-runner based on name recognition, then they have two front-runners, Hart and Jesse Jackson, neither of whom is electable."

Not surprisingly, the Republicans were gleeful. "It seems only fitting that during the Christmas season that the Democrats would be visited by the ghost of candidate past," said Frank Fahrenkopf, chairman of the Republican National Committee. "What it really shows is the disarray of the Democratic Party going into 1988, when a man who in effect resigned from the race in disgrace feels that he can come back and win the nomination."

Hart re-enters the campaign with some notable assets. He has higher name recognition than any of the candidates now in the race, with the possible exception of Jackson. He can try to exploit the sense of ennui that some attach to the present Democratic field. And he can count on nearly \$1 million in matching funds.

But he has no organization, and faces filing deadlines in 17 states in the next month. He has yet to answer

a flock of questions about his dalliance with Miami model Donna Rice and about reports of other extra-marital entanglements. He left the presidential campaign last May denouncing the political process for overemphasizing personality, and it is not clear how he plans to come to terms with this problem.

Los Angeles Deputy City Attorney John Emerson, Hart's former deputy campaign manager, predicted that in the next few weeks Hart "is going to be skewered by the press and the political establishment. ... Quite frankly, there's going to be some ugly things written in the next few weeks. The political establishment obviously doesn't like this (re-entry)."

For example, Democratic National Chairman Paul Kirk said: "I had said initially after the story of his withdrawal from the race that I thought he did the right thing. And I haven't heard from him yet in terms of the reasons for getting back in and until I do I'll sort of leave it with my initial statement on it."

It may be possible for Hart to capitalize on an anti-establishment feeling, said Patrick H. Caddell, a former political strategist who worked for Hart in 1984.

Polls have showed consistently that most people did not think Hart should have gotten out of the race and that he was driven out by media,

Caddell said. "It all depends on what kind of hearing voters give him."

Caddell called the decision a "gutsy, gutsy move," and predicted that Hart "is going to do better than anyone expects."

Washington political consultant Robert Squier, who is neutral in the 1988 race, said "if he finishes second in New Hampshire, he's born again." But Squier doubted that would occur. Hart "has become the subject of dirty jokes, and when they start telling dirty jokes about you, you've had it," he said.

It is not clear where in the Democratic Party Hart can turn for support. Former California Democratic Chairman Larry Lawrence of San Diego said Tuesday that "I think I can still raise some money for Gary," but most of Hart's former backers have aligned themselves with other candidates.

"There are some remnants left, but I don't know how many of them Hart can get," said Joe Trippi, formerly deputy campaign manager of the Hart campaign and now deputy political director for the presidential campaign of Missouri Rep. Richard Gephardt.

"My guess is that if someone takes a poll in the next few days, Hart will show up near the top, just because of name recognition," Trippi said. "But

he is going to find it a lot harder to build a coalition than he thinks."

"Hart is a flawed candidate," said Andrew Kohut, president of the Gallup Organization. "A man can't run successfully for president when you have 43 percent of the American public saying they have an unfavorable opinion of him."

The reactions of the other Democratic candidates were cautious Tuesday, in part because they do not want to anger former Hart supporters in Iowa, many of whom are still undecided and could provide crucial support in 1988's first voter test next February.

"Things are getting curiouser and curiouser," Gephardt said when told that Hart had gotten back into the race.

Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis, who is leading in New Hampshire polls and stands to lose the most to Hart there, reacted with an icy prediction Tuesday: "I will beat Gary Hart in New Hampshire."

"We will soon know if he is going to be a front-runner or a ghost of Christmas past," said former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt.

Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., said through an aide, "I know Gary feels deeply about the issues. I hope he isn't fooling himself. My concern is that we don't trivialize the campaign. We should not have a campaign that focuses on what someone did some weekend somewhere."

"In politics, you can win without winning, and to that extent that is what Gary Hart's situation is," said Caddell. He is a very productive, intelligent man in public life who has almost been reduced to caricature because of Donna Rice. And apparently what he wants to do is restore his credibility as a public spokesman."

Oakdale And Atlanta Are Too Quiet

Critical questions about Federal Bureau of Prisons practices remain unanswered in the wake of the commendable, patient negotiations that finally freed 122 hostages seized by Cuban detainees at two prisons.

Though the hostages were released, millions of dollars in damage was done to the prisons. In addition, the riots forced the transfer of hundreds of inmates to other, already overcrowded, institutions.

How was complete control lost at two institutions — an aging maximum-security prison and a new detention center?

First, it is evident that there was not enough communication between government agencies about the progress of negotiations that would send 2,500 Cubans back to their homeland. Ideally, the Bureau of Prisons should have been following the negotiations, with their sensitive security implications, through its sister Department of Justice agency, the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Given lead time, the bureau could have transferred the more aggressive and volatile detainees from the Oakdale, La., detention center to more secure facilities.

But the situation of a few thousand Cubans may not have been a priority in the overcrowded federal prison system, with its more than 48,000 prisoners.

It is equally evident that prison and INS officials were unaware of the depth of the detainees' feelings against returning to Cuba, and the extent to which they would go to avoid returning.

The renewed U.S.-Cuban agreement to deport many Cubans who had come here in 1980 was announced Friday, Nov. 20, a few hours after

Justice officials were notified. That evening the Oakdale detainees demonstrated their displeasure by starting a fracas in the cafeteria, breaking plates and glasses. This warning was ignored, possibly because of a reluctance to call in extra staff members to bolster what is in most prisons reduced weekend staffing. In any event, the detainees took over the center in a full-scale riot the next day.

Officials at the 85-year-old Atlanta prison must have been aware of the initial disturbance at Oakdale. Considering that theirs was a more hardened, larger group of detainees, their failure to heed the signal from Oakdale is perplexing.

Looking back, it's clear that detainees should have all been locked in their cells while the situation was assessed. But if that did not seem justified at the time, certainly basic precautions were. Non-critical activities could have been halted, large gatherings of inmates prevented, feeding done in small escorted groups, inmates and cells searched for weapons and more staff members deployed. Armed officers probably could have been placed on roofs and a tactical response team assembled.

While the failure to prepare at both facilities is difficult to understand, the failure to respond effectively when the riots began is even more troublesome. How were the institutions seized and so many hostages taken? The detainees had less time to make elaborate preparations to revolt than their guards had to prevent it. It seems unlikely that the factions among the inmates could implement a "synchronize-your-watches" strategy, but the guards should

have had a well-drilled response plan for any contingency.

How, then, did the detainees effect a surprise? Surely there were officers on posts and patrol trained to spot trouble and equipped to call for immediate assistance to deal with it.

Why weren't the initial trouble spots isolated and contained? Who was making the vital decisions in the initial minutes of the riots? Was some needed permission to act lacking? One rioter was shot by a tower officer at Atlanta. Would decisive fire there, not necessarily to wound or kill but to separate and isolate riotous groups, have prevented a takeover?

Where did inmate weapons come from? Hostages tell of machetes being used. Now, prison inmates are adept at making weapons, but most often they are made from melted

plastic (toothbrush handles are favored), sharpened bed springs and pieces of metal broken from lockers or filched from industrial operations. But machetes? Dangerous tools and equipment suitable for fashioning weapons should be carefully controlled and stored safely.

It is important that the questions be answered honestly and promptly. Needed corrections should be made at once. After all, there are 45 other federal correctional facilities across the nation whose inmates studied the response at Oakdale and Atlanta. Hostage negotiations may not be so successful the next time.

# Congress Needs Voice On National Security Council

## Analysis

The report of the congressional inquiry into the Iran-Contra scandal was a bitter disappointment for those who hoped that last summer's hearings might lead to a serious effort at reforming the exercise of the Constitution's war powers.

The Tower commission report of last February had already delivered a ringing indictment of the Reagan administration.

But what the earlier report lacked was an adequate set of recommendations. That was the congressional group's opportunity: to present a plan for restoring checks and balances to the conduct of national security affairs. What we got instead was a detailed list of proposals for fine-tuning the laws that govern the reporting of covert activities.

It is a futile exercise. Why should we expect future officials to respect the laws any more faithfully than President Reagan's appointees did?

The president says that "out of this experience has come a new wisdom about the process of governing in America." If we could safely rely on the wisdom of public officials, we would not need a Constitution.

It was one of the framers' most fundamental goals to establish a system in which no one person could

take this nation to war. Is there any way to force a president, and those who serve at his or her pleasure, to share this awesome power?

Rules of law can never be sufficient. Congress cannot deny the need for exceptions to rules about reporting covert activities. As soon as exceptions are granted, foolish people in the White House will be able to find loopholes for misbegotten activities.

Is there any way to make the White House want to consult with political adversaries before undertaking major initiatives in foreign policy?

One way would be to revise the organic statute that created the National Security Council. Passed in 1947, it names four members to the council, besides the president and the vice president: the secretaries of state and defense, the director of the Central Intelligence Agency and the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. In addition, the president may invite anyone else whose counsel he wants. The NSC director and staff serve at the president's pleasure, without senatorial confirmation.

Congress should amend this statute to provide that four of its own members serve on the NSC. They should be appointed by the president (to avoid any implication that his ultimate responsibility for foreign relations is being compromised) with the understanding that he choose a bipartisan and bicameral representation.

There should be no problem with the constitutional provision that members of Congress may not hold any "office" in the executive branch. As the Tower commission emphasized, the NSC is an advisory body. It has no administrative responsibilities. Members of Congress often serve on advisory bodies.

What would people like Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan.; Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga.; Rep. Thomas Foley, D-Wash., and Rep. Richard Cheney, R-Wyo., bring to the NSC? Are they wiser, stronger people than Secretary of State George P. Shultz? No, they are not. The difference is that Shultz serves at the president's pleasure. His ultimate leverage is to resign —

which he apparently considered over the sale of arms to Iran.

Dole and his colleagues would have brought a different weight to bear. The president has no control over their place in government. They owe their political allegiance to their constituents and their fellow legislators.

Could the president circumvent a reconstituted NSC that opposed a plan that he was determined to carry out? Yes, he could. The reconstitution of the NSC is no panacea — any more than a Council of Economic Advisers guarantees that a president will heed sound economic counsel.

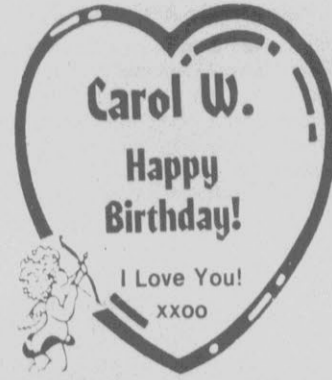
But having members of Congress on the NSC would strengthen the hand of legislators who were convinced that a president was embarking on a foolish venture. They could confront him with the choice between going alone or modifying his tactics.

The Constitution and existing statutes no longer check the president's war powers effectively. If we accept the notion that all we need is a new face in the Oval Office, we are merely setting the stage for a repetition of recent disasters, sooner or later.

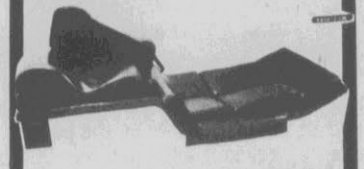
Perhaps we can accomplish the

needed structural change by revising organic statutes in the manner outlined here. If those efforts fail, however, we will have to consider more radical alterations in our constitutional architecture — or concede that national security is no longer compatible with constitutional governance.

## Familiar Sins Committed

The treaty on intermediate-range nuclear forces signed last week in Washington and hyped with an unusually comprehensive array of bad arguments is but the latest product of a so-called arms-control process that unerringly generates trivial or dangerous agreements.

In this new era of good will, it seems churlish to make the point that virtually every argument that has been advanced in praise of the INF treaty, in praise of the idea of a downstream strategic-arms-reduction treaty and generally in admiration of arms control is simply wrong. Moreover, the popular arguments about arms control are demonstrably wrong according to the evidence of history and the logic of world politics.

The arms control that is important is the measure of control secured over the Soviets' use of their arms by the U.S. and allied defense effort. Every major arms-control agreement negotiated between democratic and totalitarian states in the 20th Century to date has been either trivial or dangerous in its consequences for international security. To this list the INF treaty now removes an important part of the North Atlantic alliance's solution to the more general problem posed by military imbalance (strategic nuclear parity and conventional inferiority), again in the absence of any theory of how the problem can be solved.

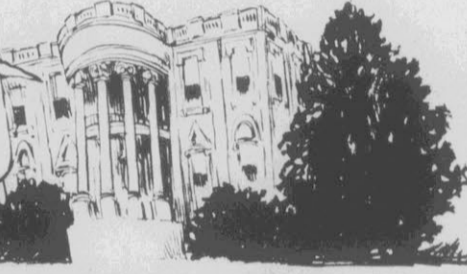
From the perspective of strategic common sense, the INF treaty probably is a lost cause. However, a bruising fight over INF ratification could dampen official enthusiasm for a START treaty. The problem with a START treaty, as with the INF treaty, really is external to the legal documents concerned. The INF agreement is harmful to Western security not because its terms, narrowly viewed, are unfavorable to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. In fact, they are not; a one-for-four ratio of weapon reductions cannot be all bad. The treaty harms our security because it removes a critical link for deterrence between a European battlefield and U.S. central strategic forces. In this context NATO has no plausible theory for the provision of more effective non-nuclear defenses, and there is no political enthusiasm for the idea of trying to regain some leverage with a strategic nuclear advantage. To the contrary, the START agreement most likely will reduce still further the relevance of strategic forces for regional security.

The Reagan administration, despite the fact that many senior officials certainly know better, is committing many familiar sins in the elusive name of peace and the much-abused name of arms control. For example: A treaty has been negotiated for its own sake (there is no security rationale for eliminating INF); weapon reductions are being praised in their own right (even

though there is no known relationship between levels of armament and the risks of war; radically intrusive verification procedures are being overtouted (but a real U.S. sanctions policy for response to the certainty of Soviet cheating is nowhere in sight — verification is not identical to compliance); the INF treaty is another case of arms control by promissory note (this treaty allegedly is a modest but essential step toward the treaty that we really want on START — even though a worthy START treaty may not be negotiable).

An administration willing to sign a new treaty while it rhetorically condemns its treaty partner for violating old agreements is scarcely to be trusted to be serious about treaty compliance. If our wondrous new verification procedures should spotlight probable villainy, what would we do about it? On the evidence to date, nothing. Similarly, an administration that hails arms reductions and the elimination of whole classes of weapons as significant achievements, without providing strategic argument for improved Western security, merits careful watching.

To the general public the prospect of a 50 percent cut in strategic arsenals seems dazzling and by definition desirable. Unfortunately, a 50 percent cut in strategic offensive forces is almost certain to be damaging to our security unless it is accompanied by a decision to deploy strategic missile defenses. Because the superpowers, particularly the United States, have crammed so many nuclear weapons onto individual carrier vehicles, a radical scale of cuts in force levels is much more likely to increase the vulnerability than to decrease it. Such a reduction could leave too few missile-carrying submarines facing too large an anti-submarine-warfare menace, too few aircraft and cruise missiles facing too large an air defense system, and too few intercontinental ballistic missiles facing too many ICBM warheads.

Thus the START treaty that may be on the horizon bids fair to undo

much of what should have been the Ronald Reagan legacy in a responsible strategic policy.

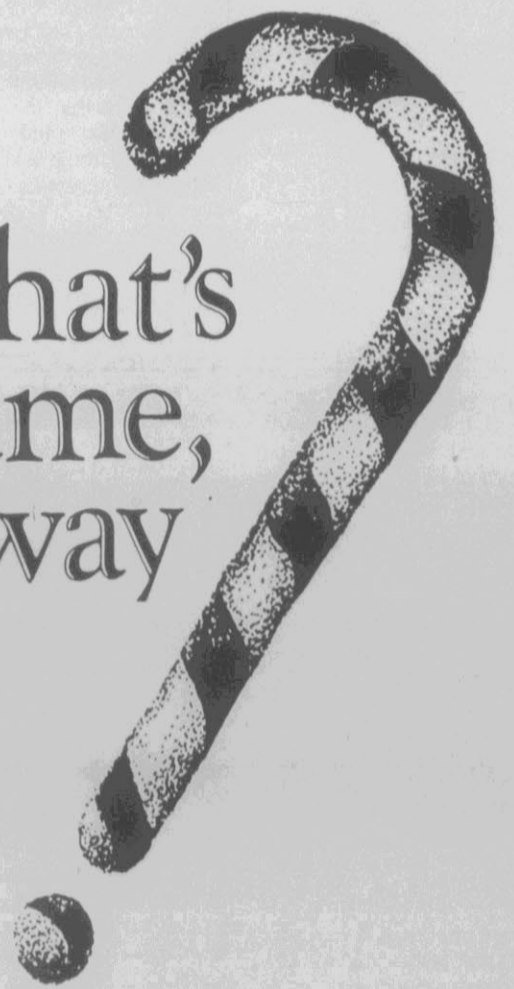

# Martin Says Public Aware Of His Leadership

RALEIGH (AP) — Republican Gov. Jim Martin says his legislative record with a legislature controlled by Democrats is a mixed bag, but he blames partisan politics for most of the failures.

"There's enough (success) there to show what we can do when we work together, when we put aside the partisan differences and put North Carolina first," said Martin, who is winding up his third year in office and preparing for a re-election battle in 1988.

Martin, the second Republican elected governor of North Carolina this century, said Democrats' contention that he is a do-nothing governor with no vision for the state's future is not taking hold.

"I think the public is aware of the leadership we've provided," he said Tuesday in an interview in his Capitol office.

He said some of the defeats on his scorecard look worse for his opponents than for him — a contention likely to surface on the campaign trail.

Example: Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan and other Democratic leaders turned down Martin's proposal to expand the career ladder pilot program for teachers over the next two years.

"We should have moved forward," Martin said. "We didn't because the Legislature wanted to use that money for something else — not for education. And that's not a reflection on my leadership; it's a reflection on theirs."

Martin also contends he should be judged on more than his win-loss record at the General Assembly, where Democrats dominate both chambers. His Cabinet and other appointees have administered the government efficiently, he says.

He's done well as an industrial recruiter, he says, although Demo-

crats say he's fallen short and blame him for some plant closures and the loss of the RJR-Nabisco headquarters from Winston-Salem to Atlanta. Martin says he's brought in far more jobs than have disappeared on his watch.

State employees come under less political pressure than during previous administrations, Martin says, calling it ironic that three former state employees are suing him, claiming they were fired because they are Democrats. "Rank-and-file employees in state government know they're being treated more fairly."

Another success story: growth of the Republican Party. Martin doesn't apologize for making party building a top priority, saying a strong two-party system makes for better government.

"That's been one of the most frustrating things in the job — that

when we when we accomplish something and announce it, it's not generally reported (by the news media) to the extent that people are aware of it," Martin said. "And then you hear the echo waves from the politicians on the other side criticizing us because ... they're not aware of what we've been doing."

At 52, Martin is a gifted and attractive politician — smart, quick-witted and engaging. His black hair has gotten a bit grayer, but he seems none the worse for wear after three years of sometimes bitter feuding with legislative Democrats.

Next year, he faces perhaps his toughest test — a re-election campaign against a Democratic Party vowing to avenge his upset victory over Rufus Edmisten in 1984. Martin's likely opponent is Jordan, with whom the governor has clashed often but who also at times has been a valuable ally.

Martin will have the advantage of incumbency, but may not enjoy several factors that benefited him three years ago. For one, Ronald Reagan won't be on the ballot and Democrats are praying their presidential

nominee won't be as unpopular in the South as Walter Mondale was.

Secondly, the disunity that plagued the Democratic Party in 1984 has yet to resurface. Jordan seems likely to be nominated for governor without opposition — which only one other North Carolina has managed this century.

To win, Martin must keep his outnumbered Republican troops together and again persuade a significant number of Democrats to cross party lines. He was reluctant to discuss strategy, but said he would combine a glowing account of his administration's first term with ambitious proposals for a second.

A former Davidson College chemistry professor and Mecklenburg County commissioner, Martin had 12 years of experience in Congress but none in state government when he took office in 1985.

He made "one united state" the theme of his inaugural address and deep tax cuts the centerpiece of a short legislative agenda. The Legislature reduced taxes by \$171 million, about one-third as much as Martin wanted.

In 1986, Martin and Jordan joined forces to push a \$220 million highway financing program. This year, Martin threw his support behind funding of the \$800 million Basic Education Program, an eight-year school improvement blueprint the Legislature approved in 1983.

"If you look at the historic responsibilities of governors, it's to strengthen the quality of life in our state through better schools, better roads and better jobs," he said. "I and my administration have a very strong record on that."

## Judge May Take Over County Jail

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — A Forsyth County Superior Court judge says if county officials don't improve unsafe and unsanitary jail conditions within 10 days, he may take over the jail or declare the officials in contempt of court.

Warning that county commissioners could be held personally liable for "willful negligence" of long-term problems, Judge C. Preston Cornelius said that he wants a report from the county by Christmas Eve on how it plans to improve jail conditions.

He said that he is prepared to hold hearings in 30 days to see if the county is acting on that report.

County officials said that they haven't ignored the problems at the jail, but several declined comment until a commissioners' briefing Thursday.

Cornelius made the demands in a cover letter, dated Monday, which he sent to County Manager Graham W. Pervier along with a copy of the Forsyth County grand jury's latest report on jail conditions.

"The Court's alternatives are to either take over the operation of the jail facility," the letter says, "or cite public officials for contempt in failure to deal with these problems for which they have long been aware."

The grand jury inspected the jail Sept. 28. The report of that inspection was delivered to Cornelius Monday. But he sealed the report until Tuesday so he could write the letter demanding action from the county.

The letters were hand-delivered to the commissioners Tuesday — along with a request from the county staff that the commissioners not comment.

Thomas Ritter, the chief of jails in North Carolina, said he was unaware of any similar action ever being taken in the state.

"This is unusual," he said. "This is the first time I've ever heard of this, but it is within his (Cornelius') rights to do this."

"The thing is, they'll take some action now. I know it's going to change something," he said.

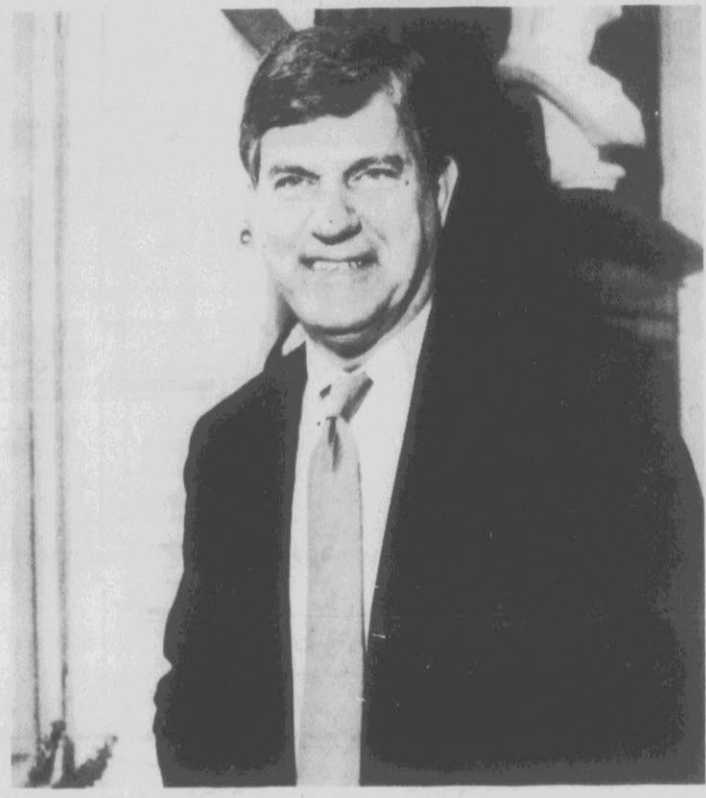
The grand jury report begins by saying "First, the Grand Jury would like to state that we found the Forsyth County Jail to be a disgrace to our community." The criticisms that follow have been made repeatedly over the past three years: crowding, food stored improperly, leaking toilets and inadequate medical care.

"I would like every resident of the County of Forsyth to go through and see what we saw," Ira Craddock Jr., the grand jury foreman, said Tuesday. "It's just indescribable."

"The basic problem with the jail is it's overcrowded," he said. "This causes most of the other problems."

"It's cluttered. These people are having to sleep on pads in the cells. They're just walking all over each other, it's such a crowded condition," he said. "I'm sure it makes personal hygiene difficult in a situation like that."

The 34-year-old jail, which the state rates as having a capacity of 180 inmates, held 257 prisoners Tuesday night.

## DOT Secretary Cites N.C. Plans

RALEIGH (AP) — U.S. Transportation Secretary Jim Burnley says North Carolina will benefit if Congress adopts a philosophy of gradually reducing federal involvement in highway construction.

"Historically, Congress recognized that the states were well-equipped to decide their own priorities, and traditionally authorized the spending of federal highway funds in advance under a fixed formula so states could know in advance what federal aid they could expect," Burnley said in a speech to the North Carolina Street and Highway Management Conference.

But in recent years, he said, Congress has funneled more money into "demonstration projects" that often are awarded funds because of their sponsors' political clout instead of merit.

"Increased state authority and flexibility would mean greater fairness among states," Burnley said. "Each state could use its funds to build the projects that have the most merit and the highest priority. ... You could also be given the ability to experiment with innovative financing mechanisms."

One way to foster greater local control, he said, would be repealing a portion of the federal motor fuels tax and ending federal involvement in highway projects "that can best be handled at the state and local level."

Another option is a "revenue return" under which the federal tax and other user charges would remain in place but fees collected would be turned over to the states for highway programs, he said.

Burnley said North Carolina is a national leader in seat belt usage and battling drunken driving, but probably won't see a big increase in federal highway funding anytime soon.

But Burnley said an opportunity to change the funding formula that has shortchanged the state for years might arise in the next decade, when the interstate highway system begun in the 1950s is completed.

"I would hope that in the days to come, North Carolinians who care about these issues will be heard loudly and clearly," Burnley said at a news conference prior to a ceremony in which he presented Gov. Jim Martin a plaque that praises the state for its highway programs.

He said, however, that Congress had locked the nation into current funding formulas until 1991 at the earliest.

The state Board of Transportation this year adopted a multi-year road improvement program based on receiving about \$280 million in federal assistance per year. Funding for fiscal 1987-88, however, is uncertain because Congress is wrestling with spending cuts required by a deficit reduction package.

Burnley praised the Martin administration's proposed "Strategic Corridors Network" designed to give people in virtually all parts of the state relatively good access to a four-lane highway.

North Carolina earned its plaque by placing second, to Maryland, in a nationwide survey of seat belt usage conducted by the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill Highway Safety Research Center.

Seat belt usage in Maryland was found to be 66 percent, while North Carolina rated 64 percent, Burnley said.

The 1983 Safe Roads Act and Martin's proposals tougher anti-drunken driving laws are among the nation's strongest programs in that area, he said.

## IN THE STATE

### Peanut Quota

WASHINGTON (AP) — The national poundage quota for the 1988 peanut crop will be 1,402,200 tons, an increase of 46,700 tons from this year's level, Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng announced Tuesday.

By law, the annual quota is set at a level equal to the estimated quantity of peanuts that will be needed for edible uses, seed and related purposes in the coming year.

The 1988 quota will be allocated to each state based on the state's share of the 1987 national poundage quota, Lyng said.

### Arrested

BURNSVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Yancey County lawmen arrested a man Tuesday in the weekend slayings of two Burnsville area men.

Carroll Bennett Penland Jr., 27, of Burnsville was arrested by Yancey County Sheriff Clyde McIntosh and charged with the Saturday shooting deaths of Herman Lee Penland, 31, of Burnsville and Dallas Neal Honeycutt, 25, of Green Mountain.

Penland was in custody Tuesday night, with a first-appearance hearing scheduled for Wednesday. Bond will be set at that hearing, McIntosh said.

Herman Penland had been shot once in the chest and once in the throat at close range with a shotgun. Honeycutt was shot once in the face, also at close range, McIntosh said.

### Scholarships

RALEIGH (AP) — Sixty-two high school and college students will be awarded up to \$20,000 each to become teachers at colleges in North Carolina.

Directors of the N.C. State Assistance Authority recently announced the 1987-88 Paul Douglas Teacher Scholars, selected from more than 200 nominees.

Awards were based on grades, activities, leadership and promise to teach. Recipients are eligible for up to \$5,000 a year for four years. They generally must teach two years for each year they receive the scholarship.

The scholarships are funded by Congress to encourage outstanding high school graduates to teach.

### Search

DURHAM (AP) — A 12-member committee has been named to undertake a national search for a new head of Duke University Medical Center.

The committee is expected to identify from three to five candidates to succeed Dr. William Anlyan. Anlyan, currently chancellor for health affairs and executive vice president, will assume the position of university chancellor on July 1.

The tentative title of the new medical center head is dean of the school of medicine and executive vice president for health affairs. The search committee will try to finish its search by late spring so a recommendation can be presented to the board of trustees at its June 1988 meeting.

### Marine Dies

VANCEBORO, N.C. (AP) — A Marine en route to U.S. Marine Corps Air Station at Cherry Point to report in as a recruiter was killed Monday

when his car hit a tractor-trailer truck head-on.

James Bedara, 26, of Bayonne, N.J., was killed on impact about 8:15 a.m. when his car crossed the center lane of U.S. 17, hitting a tractor-trailer two miles north of Vanceboro.

Bedara had been a recruiter for the U.S. Marine Corps for three years in New York, according to state Highway Patrol Trooper G.R. Leggett.

Eighteen-year-old Michelle Lee, Bedara's fiancée, of Staten Island, N.Y., was in the intensive care unit in critical condition at Craven County Hospital Tuesday, a spokeswoman said. Ms. Lee is being treated for head injuries and facial lacerations.

### Charged

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — Johnny Gray, a key prosecution witness in the controversial Darryl Hunt murder trial in 1984, has been charged with murder in the death of a 66-year-old Winston-Salem man whose body was found in October.

Gray, 39, is accused of murder and common law robbery in the death of Willis Eli Mabe, 66.

Mabe was found Oct. 26 on the living room floor of his three-room duplex by a friend. Police went to the house to investigate the death as suspicious, but the next day Lt. M.V. McCoy of the Winston-Salem Police Department said Mabe had died of a stroke.

Gray was identified by police in 1984 as the person who reported the murder of Deborah Sykes, a copy editor for the Winston-Salem Sentinel.

### Sentenced

HIGH POINT, N.C. (AP) — William W. Snouffer, a convicted drug trafficker who has helped state and federal authorities with drug and corruption investigations at the Greensboro Coliseum, has been sentenced to eight years on state drug charges.

Snouffer pleaded guilty in Guilford County Superior Court to one count of possession with intent to sell and deliver cocaine. The felony carries a maximum 10-year prison sentence.

### Murder

RALEIGH (AP) — Raleigh police have charged a man with murder in connection with the death of an 84-year-old woman who died last summer, hours after she was found bound and beaten in her East Raleigh home.

The man, William Lahmar, 38, had been in Wake County jail from Dec. 8 until Monday, when police took him to the station and charged him with the murder. He was returned to the jail.

# Professor Develops Market For \$5 Textbook For 9th Grade Economics

CHARLOTTE (AP) — In a textbook case of how to become an entrepreneur, economics professor Irvin Tucker III saw a need and moved to fill it.

In this case, what Tucker saw was a demand for a \$5 economics textbook for North Carolina's ninth graders, so he and his wife started a mom-and-pop publishing business to take on the giant national publishers.

"I saw a need for an affordable book and designed it so every school district could afford it," he said. "I feel like David against Goliath. I'm up against the biggest companies."

Several years ago, Tucker said, the state required schools to offer an economics course to ninth graders. But many school districts have been unable to afford a textbook for the course.

"The reason is that the state allocates \$22 per student for social studies textbooks," said Tucker, who teaches economics at the University of North Carolina-Charlotte. "The

first priority is civics, and those books usually cost about \$17."

So Tucker and his wife, Noni, wrote, designed and edited a 277-page hardcover economics textbook that they are selling for \$5 a copy.

Tucker is currently criss-crossing the state, holding meetings with representatives from local school districts. Many of the meetings have opened with the same question.

"They want to know how I can do it," he said. "I tell them I don't have the expenses of the big publishing houses. I have no overhead. I'm the author, publisher and salesman."

"I've been wearing so many hats lately that I don't know which one I have on half the time," he quipped.

Tucker said so far the response has been "really gratifying."

"One teacher told me she was so glad someone had finally written a book that ninth graders can understand and the school districts could afford to buy," he said. "Most are amazed that a hardback could be sold at this price, especially when

there isn't another book in the room for less than \$12."

North Carolina is one of only a handful of states that require economics in the ninth grade, Tucker said, so some of the big publishers don't put out a text suitable for that age group.

"There isn't enough money in it for them," he said.

Tucker's book, titled "Economics for Young Americans," uses examples that any ninth grader can understand to introduce them to the economic theories of Adam Smith, Karl Marx and John Keynes.

"Why does a Michael Jackson concert ticket cost more than one for the Kingston Trio?" asks one question. It's now up to the schools to determine whether Tucker's venture makes good economic sense.

"I can't say I'm successful yet," he said. "I will be if the company makes money. If it doesn't, maybe it's not such a good idea. But if it does, maybe it could open doors."

"It's not a door that's easy," he

added. "You've got to be good, but at least the door is there."

## Court Overturns Brunswick Arrest

RALEIGH (AP) — The state Court of Appeals has thrown out a Brunswick County man's conviction of resisting arrest, ruling that sheriff's deputies had no right to enter his home to arrest him on a contempt-of-court charge.

The three-judge panel Tuesday vacated the conviction of Robert Hugh Hewson, who had been given a 30-day suspended sentence and fined \$100 in Brunswick Superior Court.

Brunswick deputies went to Hewson's home in June 1986 after being told that a sheriff's department dispatcher had an order for Hewson's arrest on a civil contempt charge for failing to pay child support, the panel said.

A deputy knocked at Hewson's door and asked Hewson to go with him to the department. Hewson refused, and an argument ensued. Hewson then closed and locked his door.

But four deputies entered Hewson's house through another door that was unlocked, found Hewson in his kitchen, arrested him and "forcibly handcuffed him," the appeals panel said. Hewson was taken to the county jail and served with the contempt order.

Writing for the panel, Judge Sarah Parker, said a state law allows an officer to enter private premises only when he possesses a warrant or order for arrest or has probable cause to believe a crime has been committed.

"In this case the order of arrest was issued for civil contempt, and the record discloses no basis for the officers' having probable cause to believe that defendant had committed a crime ...." Ms. Parker wrote. "Hence, under this statute, without the order of arrest in their possession, the officers had no authority to enter defendant's home, and could do

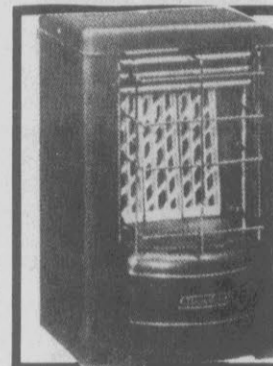
so only with his consent."

In other cases, the appeals court:

— upheld Wanda Bridges Hewell's conviction of drunken driving and felony death by vehicle. She was charged after a two-car accident in Gaston County that resulted in a death March 28, 1986.

— upheld Ernest Brewer's conviction of taking indecent liberties with minors. An Onslow County judge sentenced him to eight years in prison Jan. 22.

— upheld the second-degree sexual offense conviction of Arthur Dean Grimes. He was sentenced to three years in prison by a Watauga County judge for assaulting a woman Aug. 23, 1986.

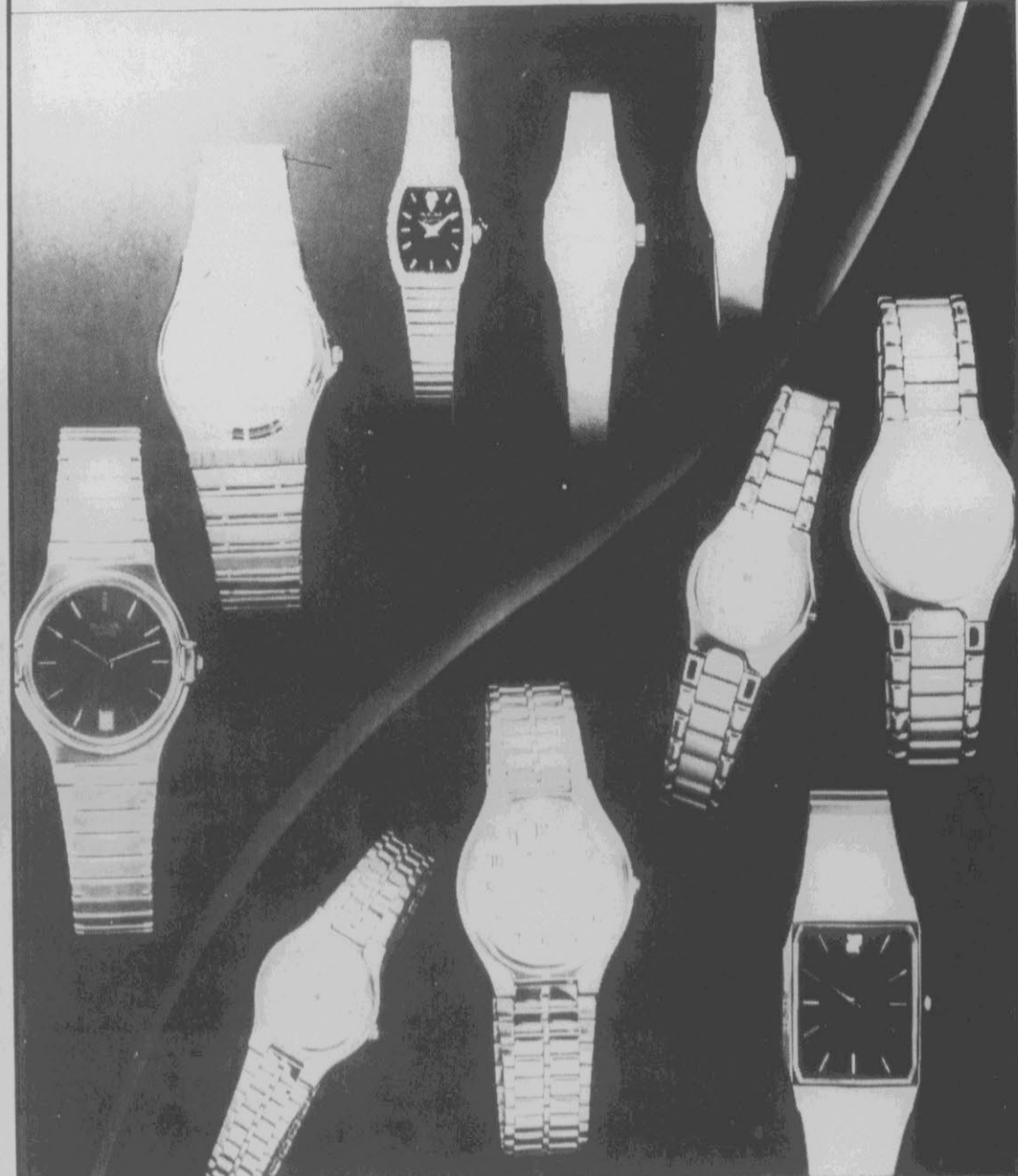

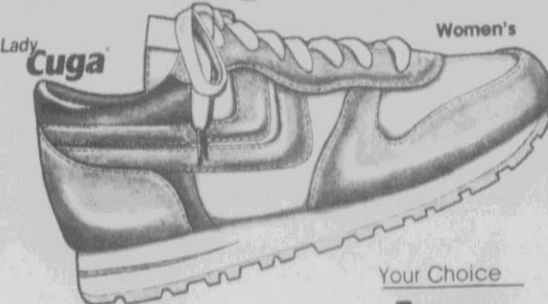

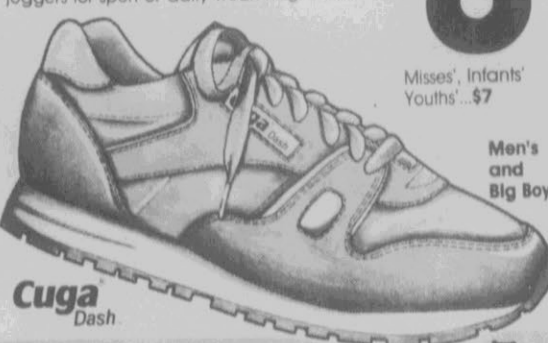

# Anti-Racism Agency Warns State Can't Become Complacent Over Hate Groups

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina has made inroads against racial and religious violence, but it would be dangerous to become complacent about hate groups, an anti-racist group says.

"We have seen the erosion and decline in civil-rights protection," Tommie Young of Greensboro said Tuesday. "The message has not been loud and clear, but quiet and clear — that it's all right to do things that have been frowned on."

A report by North Carolinians Against Racist and Religious Violence released at the news conference cited 45 violent or illegal incidents it said had resulted from racial, religious or sexual bigotry this year.

"This year's count of violent incidents and active white supremacist organizing show that citizens and public officials cannot assume that the recent federal investigations — however welcome they might be — have ended the state's Klan-Nazi resurgence," the report said.

The report, entitled, "1987: Progress & Tragedy," detailed racially motivated incidents during the past 11 months. The 22-page booklet details trials involving racial incidents and a chronology of activity throughout the state.

The group's annual breakdown of

incidents included the shooting deaths of three men at an adult bookstore in Shelby, 13 assaults, seven cross burnings, three acts of arson and a cross burning.

"Three years ago, there was a vacuum," said Mab Segrest, coordinator of NCARRV. "That vacuum has been filled in a positive way by efforts at various levels, especially victims coming forward and in some way forcing prosecution... This year, there are tools in place, but it's not over. I don't want people to say it is over."

Ms. Segrest said the effect of the 1979 shootings at an anti-Klan rally in Greensboro still lingers. Four Klansmen and Nazis were acquitted of charges stemming from the incident, in which five demonstrators were shot to death.

"It really sent a green light. It's only in the last couple of years that we have had all-white juries convict known members of hate groups," she said. "So, that's helped counter that precedent."

The group pointed out that not all incidents were committed by white supremacist groups.

"On the other hand, some of the incidents point to sources of bigoted violence well beyond the state's hate group population," the statement said.

White supremacist groups either

marched or organized gatherings on 61 occasions, with the Christian Knights conducting 44 of those marches. The incidents were up from figures reported in 1985 and 1986, according to the NCARRV.

At a news conference, the group warned against complacency and urged the Governor's Task Force on Racial, Ethnic and Religious Violence to make the most of its final year "to put in place the educational, informational and victim-support

networks mandated by Gov. Martin."

"Next year will require hard work and commitment from its members if the mandates of the Governor's executive order are to be carried out.

Officials across the state should treat the appearance of the white supremacist groups seriously, the group recommended, because of the NCARRV's documentation linking such groups and their activities to violence.

# Job Tax Credits Available In '88

RALEIGH (AP) — Businesses in 17 North Carolina counties will be eligible for job creation tax credits in 1988, the state Department of Commerce announced Tuesday.

The credits, which can range as high as \$2,800 per job created, will be available to qualifying firms in Ashe, Bladen, Brunswick, Cherokee, Columbus, Graham, Halifax, Hertford, Hoke, Hyde, Jackson, Madison, Northampton, Pender, Robeson, Sampson and Swain counties.

The job creation tax credits were authorized in legislation adopted by the 1987 General Assembly. Under the new law, businesses in as many as 20 counties may qualify for the credits. Companies engaging in manufacturing, agribusiness, warehousing, wholesaling, retailing, research and development, processing or service related operations may be eligible. Firms must must employ nine or more people to qualify.

Companies may claim the credits for employees actually added during the tax year, or for new jobs that they promise to create within two years or less.

Under the new law, the credit is made available in North Carolina's 20 most distressed counties, based on 36-month averages of per capita income and unemployment. The law also requires that counties eligible for the credit have a 36-month average unemployment of 7 percent or more. Of the 20 counties, 17 met that criteria, also.

The state Department of Commerce announces eligible counties each December for the coming year.

Temporary rules governing the tax credit program were filed by the department in November. Public hearings on the temporary regulations are scheduled in Williamston Jan. 19; Elizabethtown, Jan. 20; Asheville, Jan. 26; and Raleigh, Jan. 27.

# Thirteen Rivers To Be Protected

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Thirteen rivers that flow through national forest lands in North Carolina will get temporary legal protection to preserve their scenic and recreational values.

All 13 have been determined as eligible for permanent protection as national Wild and Scenic Rivers.

Most of the rivers are in the North Carolina mountains. They include the Nantahala, about 80 miles west of Asheville, one of the most popular canoeing and kayaking rivers in the East.

Protection for the 120.1 river miles came about as the result of a deal struck last month between the U.S. Forest Service and a national environmental group, American Rivers.

Under the deal, the rivers will be treated as though they were part of the wild and scenic river system. That means the forest service, for example, won't allow tree cutting that would harm a river's wild characteristics.

The forest service agreed to amend its N.C. management plans until it decides whether to recommend the rivers for inclusion in the national system.

Such a determination could take five years or more. Congress makes final approval.

"It gives the forest service a legal basis to withstand a challenge" from the timber industry, Jamie Fosburgh of American Rivers in Washington said Tuesday.

# N.C. Power Drops Power Line Request

In the wake of strong opposition from Currituck County officials, North Carolina Power has withdrawn an application to erect a 115,000-volt power line over Currituck Sound.

Instead, says N.C. Power regional manager John Hughes, the company is considering other ways of improving electrical service to the outage-plagued northern Outer Banks, including an underwater line across the sound.

"It's sort of like we've erased the blackboard clean," Hughes told the Virginian-Pilot and Ledger-Star on Tuesday. "We're not totally starting over, but we're starting with a clean board."

The withdrawal of the company's application was prompted by continued opposition to an overhead line from the Currituck County Board of Commissioners, who argued that the project would ruin the soundscape and possibly harm the environment.

This fall the board eased its position to a trans-sound line, saying the county would not object to an under-

water line if no other alternative could be found.

A better source of electricity is still needed on the Outer Banks north of the Wright Memorial Bridge. From Southern Shores to Carova, a high incidence of power outages continues to inconvenience and irritate residents and businesses.

The northern Banks now receive their electricity from a substation in Kitty Hawk, but the 20-mile line servicing the narrow peninsula is regularly interrupted by excavations, material failures and overloads.

The power company had applied to state agencies and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to obtain the necessary permits for the line. But on Tuesday, Cliff Winefordner, a regulatory division supervisor at the Corps' Wilmington office, confirmed that the company withdrew the application on Nov. 18.

"We anticipate receiving another application soon for a subaqueous line," Winefordner said. "They withdrew after seeing the local opposition they were receiving to the plan."

# Hart's Surprise Return Brings Mixed Greetings

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Gary Hart, again a candidate for the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination, signed autographs, held toddlers, posed with Santa — and said he would give himself a few months to

decide whether he has set off on a doomed and foolhardy quest. Some in the political world applauded and some attacked his surprise revival of his bid for the White House. Hart said he wasn't going to discuss his involvement last spring

with Miami model Donna Rice. Disclosure of that relationship led to portraits of Hart as a womanizer — and to his withdrawal as a candidate. And, in an interview on ABC-TV's "Nightline" on Tuesday night, 11½ hours after he filed as a candidate in the New Hampshire primary, Hart suggested he might be willing to settle for less than the presidential nomination.

His "baseline," he said, is having some influence on the positions the Democratic party takes in its platform.

"I'm not going to perpetuate a campaign that's not going anywhere or doesn't have any popular support or that doesn't have at least the chance to take enough delegates to the convention to condition the platform and the policies of this party into the 1990s," he said.

Once a master of the mechanics of a campaign, Hart acknowledged he may already be too late to qualify for delegates in many states.

As for questions about his personal behavior: "I know what's coming. I'm not naive. There will be some very bad stories. But there is no way in the world I intend to respond to that."

Ms. Rice was not available for comment. Her mother, Miriam Rice of Irmo, S.C., said in a telephone conversation that neither she nor her daughter wanted to discuss Hart's decision. She said her daughter, who moved from Miami to Los Angeles to pursue an acting career several months ago, is doing "OK, I guess."

Benjamin Bradlee, executive editor of The Washington Post, was quoted in his newspaper today as saying the Post would not publish the name of a woman other than Rice with whom, the newspaper said, Hart had a liaison.

The affair came to light in a report by a detective hired by a man who suspected Hart of having an affair

with the woman, the Post said, adding that it had obtained indirect confirmation from the woman on the condition she not be identified.

Some pollsters predicted Hart would surge to the front initially in public opinion surveys once again, but quickly added that his prospects were gravely weakened by the questions about his personal values.

In an "instant" poll of 298 registered Democrats conducted for USA Today and Cable News Network — the type of poll professionals say can often be misleading — Hart was the presidential choice of 29 percent. He outdistanced Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, with 15 percent; Jesse Jackson, with 12 percent; Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois and Rep. Richard Gephardt of Missouri, with 6 percent; Sen. Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee, 5 percent; and former Ariz. Gov. Bruce Babbitt, 1 percent.

With five words on the statehouse steps — "I'm back in the race" — Hart shook up the political world. Then, with his wife, Lee, he spent the rest of Tuesday reacquainting himself with voters.

"Hi, I'm Gary Hart, and I need your support," he told one person after another as he made his way down Main Street in Concord and later through a Nashua mall.

Hart introduced himself to holiday shoppers at a mall, stopping to talk to a mother holding her young daughter, signing the autograph of the young woman behind the cookie counter, thrusting out a hand to a couple sitting at a table.

Not even near-blizzard conditions could stop him on his first day back. The bad weather possibly helped him win at least one vote — a woman whose car was stuck in the snow along Hart's campaign route. Hart helped push it out.

"Because I don't have a national organization, I think the primary states are a better chance for us than the caucuses, but we're going to try everywhere we can," Hart said.

Said Mrs. Hart: "I believe in this country and its future. Whatever grief (we experience) is nothing compared to what is important."

"It's hard, but we believe so much in Dad — my mother, myself and my brother do. There was no other choice for us," 23-year-old daughter Andrea said in a television interview in Denver.

Hart paid tribute to the "perseverance and stamina" of his

six announced Democratic opponents, but made it clear that he thinks no candidate of sufficient stature has emerged.

The other Democrats gathered for a debate in Edinburg, Texas, on Tuesday night, but did not mention Hart's name.

On a post-announcement handshaking tour on the streets of Concord, he said he doubted questions about Ms. Rice would be harmful. "I don't think so. ... We're going to leave it up to the people," he said.

Reaction from some Democrats to his reappearance was hostile. Hart had denied repeatedly, and as recently as last week, that he would get back in the race.

Michael Mufic, Democratic national committeeman from Hart's home state of Colorado, said, "I wonder if he is in a middle-age crisis. ... Who does he think he is?"

Added Pat Mitchell, who once worked for Hart but has since joined Simon's campaign in Iowa, "I think it's horribly self-indulgent."

But others were delighted.

Edgar Helms of Concord, a Hart supporter who joined Gore's campaign after Hart quit, says he's going back to his first choice.

"I'm not abandoning Gore," Helms said. "It's just that I couldn't work against Gary."

Most of Hart's supporters had long since signed on with other campaigns.

"This will not be like any campaign you have ever seen," Hart said, adding that he rejoins the race without staff, funds or pollsters.

"But I have something even better. I have the power of ideas and I can govern this country," he said.

Hart must begin fund raising from scratch, and an aide at the Federal Election Commission said he must win a formal ruling before he can seek federal campaign matching funds for the donations he received before dropping out of the race.

And he must scramble to meet presidential filing deadlines in 15 states, accounting for at least 1,245 delegates to the Democratic National Convention.

## Former N.C. Backers Say Hart's Return Is Too Late

Gary Hart's bid to re-ignite his presidential campaign has sparked little enthusiasm among former supporters in North Carolina, many of whom have found new candidates to back since Hart's withdrawal in May.

"In the general weirdness of the season, I guess all you can do is laugh," said Mary Hopper of Charlotte, a 1984 Hart delegate. "Unfortunately, that's what people are going to do."

For many ex-supporters, Hart's re-entry Tuesday revived only memories of the disappointment and bitterness that surrounded his equally abrupt exit after his relationship with Miami model Donna Rice was disclosed.

"I thought he was someone with great talent ... who provided leadership for the future," said John McArthur of Raleigh, Hart's former N.C. coordinator and now director of Sen. Tony Rand's campaign for lieutenant governor.

"To have sacrificed all that for what really was a mistake in judgment was almost heartbreaking," he said. "I still feel the same disappointment in that and have serious

doubts whether he can overcome those problems."

Like McArthur, many former supporters have turned their allegiances elsewhere.

"They're gone," said Ms. Hopper, who now supports Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis. "The majority of them have already signed on with other campaigns. And we all take those commitments very seriously."

"As much as I respect (Hart's) mind and his intellect, I have no regard at all for his judgment," she said.

Former State House Speaker Carl Stewart, who supported Hart earlier this year, said the public wasn't likely to forgive Hart for his relationship with Ms. Rice.

"Well, I think enough time never goes by for the general public to forget something like that because one's campaign adversaries will always point it out again," Stewart said. "And I really think that his chances of putting together an effective campaign for the nomination would have to be rated very poor."

"Maybe he's found out that adultery is popular," quipped James David Barber, a Duke University po-

litical science professor who has written extensively on the presidency. "I don't see how there can be any kind of a plausible campaign."

Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan said Hart should have stayed out of the race.

"I think we have a good field of candidates," Jordan said in a statement. "Senator Hart made his earlier decision, and that was the correct one."

Marianne Triplette of Winston-Salem, an organizer for Hart earlier this year, said Hart's decision was "very exciting."

"We'll just have to wait and see how seriously his campaign will be taken by the public," she said. "I see Hart as like malaria. He goes underground and emerges full-blown."

"I just can't do it again," said Dan Gottovi, a Wilmington physician and longtime Hart supporter who is now leaning toward Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois.

Hart's decision to re-enter the campaign was met with unbridled glee in one corner of the state. In Asheville, Leni M. Sitnick, 43, a mother of three who worked for Hart in New Hampshire in 1984, said she would return there this weekend to work for her candidate.

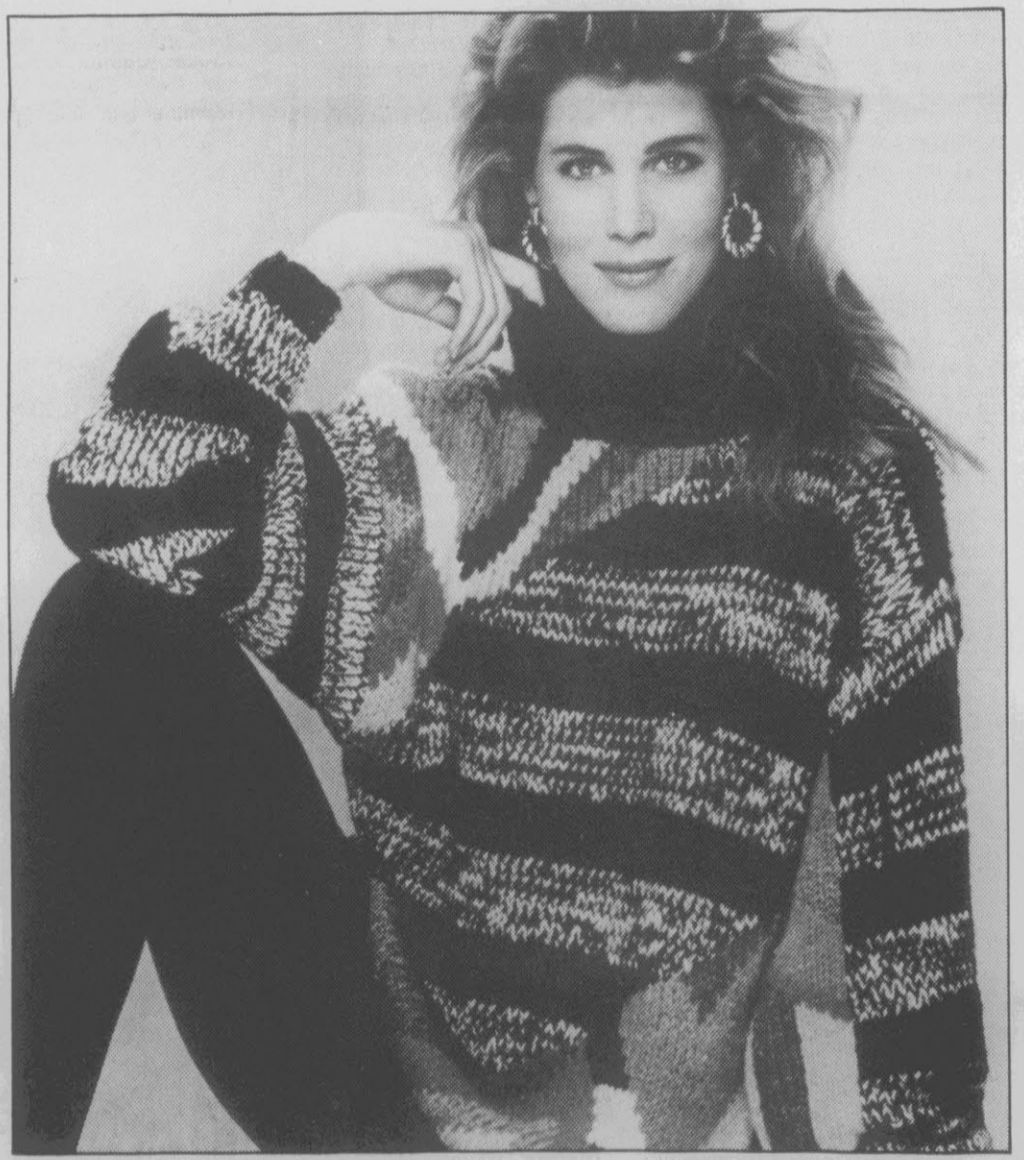

# Iran, Iraq Exchange Attacks

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — An Iranian gunboat today attacked a Greek-flagged tanker with rocket-propelled grenades in the southern Persian Gulf, and Iraq said its warplanes hit a ship off Iran's coast in a midnight raid.

The Iranian gunboat fired at the 29,990-ton World Produce tanker off the emirate of Ras Al-Khaimah near the Strait of Hormuz, said maritime salvage executives.

The tanker is owned by the London-based Niarchos Group of Greek shipping magnate Stavros Niarchos. The owners told The Associated

Press in Athens that damage was slight and that there were no casualties.

Witnesses said the vessel's stern was punctured by "at least a half-dozen RPG holes." They said a blaze aboard the tanker, which may have also been caused by machine-gun fire, took the Greek crew and three salvage tugboats about two hours to contain.

Palls of smoke billowed from the tanker, said reporters who flew over the ship in helicopters. The tanker was sailing empty when attacked.

Iraq's official news agency,

monitored in Nicosia, today quoted a military spokesman in Baghdad as saying Iraqi jets attacked a "large maritime target," which usually means a tanker, and scored "effective and accurate hits."

The London-based Lloyd's Shipping Intelligence Unit reported Iraqi fighter-bombers attacked the Cypriot bulk carrier Mimi M with missiles near the Iranian port of Bushehr at midnight. The report did not say if the vessel was hit.

The reported Iraqi air strike followed a series of attacks by Iranian gunboats in the southern part of

the gulf since Friday in retaliation for Iraqi raids on Iranian tankers. The attacks on shipping are an offshoot of the 7-year-old Iran-Iraq war.

All the Iraqi warplanes returned safely to base after the raid, the unidentified spokesman in Baghdad was quoted as saying. He said the attack was part of Baghdad's strategy "to tear apart the arteries supplying oil revenue to the aggressor Iranian regime."

Shipping sources reported that one or more Iranian frigates challenged several merchant vessels in the southern gulf today.

# Oil Prices Tumble To \$17 A Barrel

NEW YORK (AP) — Oil prices, stung by OPEC's failure to devise a convincing output agreement, appear likely to remain weak because of bountiful supplies, seasonal factors and production incentives stimulated by the weakening dollar.

On the New York Mercantile Exchange, contracts for January delivery of West Texas Intermediate on Tuesday closed below \$17 for the first time in nine months, at \$16.63 per 42-gallon barrel.

That was down 81 cents from Monday, when the contract for the benchmark U.S. crude lost 87 cents a barrel. It last closed below \$17 per barrel on March 2, at \$16.39 a barrel.

Tuesday's volume was heavy, with a record 152,846 contracts changing hands, said Mary Ann Matlock, a spokeswoman for the exchange. The previous record was 127,386 crude contracts on Dec. 9, she said.

Refined products also slid. Wholesale heating oil fell to 51 cents a gallon, down 2.36 cents for the session and 3.93 cents over two days.

Wholesale unleaded gasoline, which dropped 1.45 cents a gallon Monday, fell 1.98 cents more, closing at 43.07 cents a gallon.

On Monday, members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries agreed to a six-month extension of its current prices and production quotas, ending six days of fruitless bargaining over pricing and output.

The 13-member cartel voted 12-1 in favor of the pact, which provides for an overall limit of 15.06 million barrels a day for all members except Iraq.

Iraq, which failed to win a quota equal to that of its wartime foe Iran, said it wouldn't respect any production limits.

Iraq's output has been about 2.7

million barrels daily, higher than the unofficial 1.54 million barrel-a-day allotment offered by the cartel.

Iran failed in a bid to raise the cartel's target price to \$20.70 from \$18, though all oil producers have lost purchasing power with the declining U.S. dollar.

OPEC officials predicted the cartel's action would bolster the official \$18 price. But with supplies already more than plentiful, the prospect of an undisciplined cartel spilling more unwanted oil onto the market sent prices into a quick tailspin worldwide.

# Tanker, Ship Collide

MIAMI (AP) — The crew of a 575-foot oil tanker fought to contain flooding today after the vessel slammed broadside into a cargo ship in the Atlantic, Coast Guard officials said.

None of the approximately 28 crew members of each vessel were injured in Tuesday night's collision 700 miles off the coast, said Coast Guard Lt. Mitchell Russell.

The Kuwaiti tanker Qarouh reported that the vessel sustained a gash in its bow. The captain initially radioed that the ship was in danger of sinking, but hours later, the ship was stabilized, said Petty Officer Brian Lincoln.

The captain of the 600-foot Panamanian cargo ship Explorer reported that the Qarouh struck it

broadside shortly after 9 p.m. Tuesday as the vessels traveled in normal shipping lanes, the Coast Guard said.

The Explorer sustained damage to its port (left) side, but controlled flooding within hours.

A Coast Guard C-130 plane were circling the crash site to aid in possible rescue attempts. There were no immediate plans to evacuate the vessel, said Coast Guard Lt. Mitchell Russell.

A Coast Guard cutter, a Navy tug and a commercial salvor were heading to the crash site to help tow the tanker to Miami, officials said.

The master of the Panamanian ship said his vessel was able to limp on its own power to either Miami or Jacksonville for servicing, Lincoln said.

# Elderly Add To Museum's Information

The Bloomington Pantograph BLOOMINGTON, Ill. (AP) — The antique hog scraper is more than a museum artifact to the white-haired women and men whose chairs and wheelchairs are pulled into a circle at the nursing home where they live.

The wood-and-metal tool tells them tales of their past lives. It evokes the sights and sounds of calling a hog over on butchering day and scraping off its hair before killing it. It recalls being careful not to nick the hog's skin, which would ruin the bacon rind.

It reminds a woman vividly of how she would leave the farm on butchering day because she couldn't stand to hear the pigs squealing.

The scraper, along with once-commonplace objects such as lye soap, husking tools and a tating shuttle, is part of the McLean County Historical Society's Reminiscing Box.

The box is the focal point of a new program in which the society's Anita Bohm taps the memories of people who once used the objects and learns more about them than any reference book could ever tell her.

And she leaves behind a group of people enlivened by happy reminiscences.

"Every time I pick up something (from the museum)," says Ms. Bohm, the society's museum educator, "it's amazing how much we don't know about it," in terms of popularity, how, where and when it was used, and problems with it.

So, Ms. Bohm has begun calling on elderly people in the community for detailed reminiscences, telling how now-obsolete objects were used in their daily lives.

Her Reminiscing Box includes ice tongs, a butter mold, hair receiver, derby hat, candlestick telephone, gas iron, darning egg, curling iron and celluloid collar.

Tape recordings of the Reminiscing Box sessions will be transcribed,

with selected information and anecdotes used to augment information in the museum's files.

Reference information otherwise available about the objects, most donated by McLean County residents, Ms. Bohm says, usually is "bare bones."

The hog scraper is a good example. "Here we have several in the collection, and not one of us knew how it was used and why," until she went to nursing homes. People don't write about common domestic objects, Ms. Bohm points out, so after they fall out of use, no one knows what they were.

The Reminiscing Box idea evolved in a discussion between Ms. Bohm and McLean County Historical Society Director Greg Koos.

For the elderly, its benefits go deeper than entertainment.

When Ms. Bohm brings out an object, some residents strain to see from the back row, others throw up their hands in delight and call out the name of the thing. People talk all at once.

One woman takes the tating shuttle and spends the rest of the time working with it until she remembers how to tat lace. After one program, Ms. Bohm is told one vocal contributor ordinarily never says a word.

"Those things are a testimony to the power of the objects," Ms. Bohm says, "and how much of our memories are tied up in objects."

She suspects "confusion and disorientation" in some older people may be because "they are living outside of a context of objects that are familiar to them ... When I brought those objects into their environment, I was moved to see how much was elucidated."

As far as anyone at McLean County Historical Society knows, the Reminiscing Box is an original idea. The program is unusual in another respect, Ms. Bohm says. "I think it's unique in nursing home programs in terms of saying, 'We need you.'"

Dear Readers:

Each year I plan to make an elaborate Christmas tree skirt, but I always wait until the Christmas rush is in full swing and there just isn't enough time. Surely others are the same way, so I'd like to share directions for a quick tree skirt I just finished.

After cutting a circle of felt, I cut out stars, bells and other traditional shapes from iron-on mending tape, pressed them onto the felt circle and, presto, I had a pretty tree skirt in less than an hour. When the holiday season is over this year, instead of putting the tree skirt away, I plan to sew sequins and/or beads around the design motifs and perhaps trim the bottom edge with shiny braid.

Only when it is completed will it be packed away. Then, next Christmas and all the Christmases to come, my glittering tree skirt will be ready.

Dear Pat: I always have trouble

measuring the depth of an armhole in a knit garment. Do you measure around the armhole or straight up? — G. Dykes, Indianapolis.

Dear G. Dykes: This measurement and all other length measurements in knit or crochet should always be made straight up unless you are specifically told to do so otherwise. However, it is often difficult to find just the right row from which to measure.

Here's a pointer that has helped me. I cut a 12-inch piece of contrast yarn and after binding off at the underarm, I hold this yarn with my garment yarn and knit the next few stitches with both strands. Drop the contrasting yarn and resume knitting with single yarn. Do not tie in this extra strand.

Now you will have a clear line from which to measure. When you are finished, pull out the contrasting yarn. I find that this is easily done with a crochet hook.

## Childbirth Is Deadly Risk In Third World

For Third World women, the births of their children are risky and potentially deadly events that can take as many lives as some diseases, according to CARE, the international relief and development agency.

Recent statistics compiled by CARE experts show that, in the developing nations of Africa, Asia and Latin America, a woman's chances of dying during pregnancy or childbirth are 200 times higher than for women in industrialized countries.

While maternal deaths in developed countries range from only six to 15 per 100,000 births, the same rates soar to 650 in Africa, 400 in Asia and 250 in Latin America. CARE says most women in poorer countries deliver children without the help of trained medical personnel.

CARE reports that more than 500,000 women in developing countries die each year from complications in pregnancy and childbirth, leaving more than one million children motherless.

## Diamonds Shine In Men's World

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — While diamonds have always been considered a girl's best friend, diamond jewelry for men is fast becoming popular also, according to Woodrow Fleming, jewelry expert for a Richmond-based retailer.

Fleming points to a recent study by the Diamond Information Center which indicated that more than 25 percent of all men in the United States now own diamond jewelry, and 75 percent of all diamonds intended for men are purchased by women. In addition, the study revealed, the acquisition of diamonds for men increased 30 percent in 1986, making it the fastest growing diamond category.

Fleming, vice president of the jewelry group of Best Products, with headquarters here, says that there are several points to keep in mind when buying a diamond ring or bracelet for a man.

He advises the buyer to pay special attention to the wearer's occupation, considering such questions as: Will he wear the ring or bracelet all the time? Is it comfortable on a moving hand? Will it keep its appearance and not collect dirt and oil?

Fleming notes that diamonds come in all shapes and forms and vary in quality. He suggests that anyone planning to buy a diamond bracelet, ring, chain or earring for a man should check the American Gem Society's four basic considerations before making a selection: carat, color, clarity and cut.

Carat weight: the price of a diamond is determined not so much by carat weight as by its cut, color and clarity. A smaller, higher quality

stone will be worth much more than a larger, badly cut or yellow-hued diamond.

Color: while there are rare diamonds that are very valuable because they have an unusual color, absence of color is what makes most diamonds valuable.

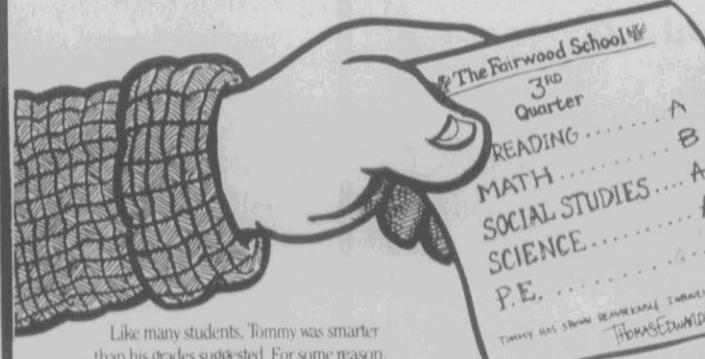

## Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices edged higher in early trading today, following a modest advance in the previous session.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which rose nearly nine points on Tuesday, was up 2.49 at 1,943.97 after the first half-hour of trading.

Advancing issues led decliners by a margin of 3 to 2 among stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange, with 669 up, 439 down and 446 unchanged.

Volume on the Big Board came to 27.81 million shares as of 10 a.m. on Wall Street compared with 35.91 million shares at the same point Tuesday.

The Commerce Department reported today that housing construction climbed 7.5 percent in November, the biggest increase in almost a year.

In a separate report, the Commerce Department said business investment spending is expected to increase by 7.3 percent next year, which would be the best showing since a 9.6 percent rise in 1985.

AMR Corp. was the most actively-traded stocks in the early going on the NYSE, rising 1 to 33 1/2.

Among other active issues, Exxon was up 5/8 at 39 1/2, American Telephone & Telegraph was up 3/4 at 28 1/2, General Electric was up 1/4 at 45 1/4 and Unisys was up 1 1/8 at 33 1/4.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks was up 0.63 at 136.24. On the American Stock Exchange, the composite market index was up 1.05 at 249.87.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials rose 8.62 to 1,941.48.

Advancing issues outpaced decliners by a margin of 9 to 7 on the NYSE, with 924 issues up, 676 down and 379 unchanged. Big Board volume totaled 214.97 million shares, against 187.69 million in the previous session.

### Father Charged

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Mecklenburg County police have charged a 38-year-old former minister with obtaining money by false pretense from the estate of his handicapped son.

According to county court records, Robert Merrill Case depleted the estate of his mentally and physically disabled son, Bobby, about 12, who was severely injured in a 1977 motor vehicle accident. Max Blackburn, Mecklenburg County Superior Court clerk, estimated that about \$90,000 was taken.

Blackburn said he asked for a police investigation after Case turned himself in to him earlier this year. Blackburn's office had notified Case that the 1986 annual account of the estate had not been filed in March.

Blackburn said Case told him he had spent the money on his injured child, bills at churches in Pineville and Gastonia, where he had pastored, and personal bills.

## Report Raps Trading Practices

WASHINGTON (AP) — Shoddy broker practices cost small investors millions of dollars in the stock market crash, according to a report to Congress today that details consumer horror stories from Wall Street's Black Monday.

In many cases, the report says, investors had been set up for a fall well in advance of the Oct. 19 market crash by misguided advice or bungled orders.

"Many investors ... including most of the truly tragic cases, reported, might not have lost as much or at all, if their brokers had observed proper sales practices in the weeks, months and years preceding the ... crash," the North American Securities Administrators Association said in the report.

The association, which represents state and provincial securities administrators in the United States, Canada, Mexico and Puerto Rico, based its conclusions on an analysis of 2,562 calls to a toll-free investor hotline between Nov. 9 and Dec. 4.

"Half of the complaints ... were the

result of a financial regulatory system which has de-emphasized the protection of individual investors in the marketplace," James C. Meyer, NASAA president, said in testimony prepared for the House Energy and Commerce subcommittee on finance.

The callers suffered projected losses in the Oct. 19 market crash totaling \$457 million, an average of \$170,000 each. Losses ranged from \$62 to \$5 million.

Meyer complained that the plight of middle-class investors has been "virtually ignored." National attention has instead been focused on "the gains and losses of high-rolling speculators, traders, arbitrageurs and Wall Street professionals."

The association offered these horror stories:

—A broker placed a 55-year-old quadriplegic woman from Texas, with no job and no income other than a small monthly disability check, into a series of exotic option strategies. She lost all but \$2,700 of her savings.

—A retiree in Sunrise, Fla., lost over \$20,000 — most of her retirement savings — when a broker garbled her

order, buying into a high-risk stock fund, rather than interest-bearing government securities.

—A Silver Springs, Md., physicist was given eight minutes to meet a margin call for additional cash or face the sale of his stock account while prices were lowest.

—A California woman lost \$40,000 because her broker was on vacation and no one else in the branch office was willing to take her order on Black Monday.

The most common complaint, 29 percent of the callers, concerned problems with brokers executing

trades late or getting the trades wrong.

The next most common gripe (14 percent) centered on brokers who put their customers in unsuitable investments such as a highly risky venture for a customer without much money to lose.

Another 14 percent of the calls concerned problems with margin accounts, in which investors put up only a portion of the purchase price of securities but are responsible for covering any subsequent losses in value. These accounts were particularly hard-hit in the crash.

Because drinking drivers contribute to a large percentage of collisions, Nichols said persons who are drinking should have non-drinkers — designated drivers — drive them home from parties.

"Worry and fatigue" can also contribute to accidents ... people rushing home or drivers rushing to go shopping after working all day and not having their minds on their driving, Nichols said. And reduced vision, because of less daylight, fogging windows and frost also contributes to more wintertime accidents.

"Make sure the windshield and rear and side windows are free of dirt, ice or fog, and make sure headlights and taillights are clean so other drivers can see you," Nichols suggested.

Tires should be in good condition, windshield wiper blades and defrosters operating, batteries should be fully charged, brakes working properly and exhaust

at soldiers and burning tires. Soldiers kept out of the range of the stones, and tossed some of them back to the demonstrators. At one point, a soldier dropped his gun, smiled and said "I surrender." The protesters laughed.

Elsewhere in Gaza City, soldiers using crowbars and chains tied to the backs of jeeps forced open stores that were shuttered in a strike against the army's shooting of demonstrators.

Soldiers from elite infantry units lined the road leading into the city of 150,000.

Children darted into the streets occasionally to throw stones and or set tires on fire. One group set a fire in the main cemetery.

Soldiers arrived almost immediately after about 50 schoolchildren set fire to a makeshift barricade. The soldiers waved their

automatic rifles to frighten away the children. They then stopped several Arab motorists, seized their identity cards and forced them to remove the burning debris.

Columns of smoke rose from the Jabaliya refugee camp near Gaza City. About 40,000 Palestinians live in the camp's shacks.

Israel's parliament today began debating five left-wing motions of no confidence against the coalition government's tough handling of the unrest, which began Dec. 8.

## Rose Claims Shot Came Too Late Last Shot Wins For Cards

After 32 minutes of play, it came down to one call, a call that left one team elated and the other angry.

Jacksonville's Dennis Watson put in a layup at the buzzer to give the Cardinals a 58-57 win over Greenville Rose Tuesday night on a call that left even the officials momentarily split.

Rose had gone ahead 57-56 with five seconds to play when Keyford Langley hit one of two free throw attempts.

The Cardinals inbounded the ball to Watson and he drove the length of the court to put in his only field goal of the night. Initially, one official ruled the basket no good while another scored it. The latter decision stuck and that sealed the Rampants' hopes.

"That's the second time in my coaching career that I've won a game and also lost it," said Rose coach Jim Brewington, thinking back to a 4-A playoff game at Smithfield-Selma several years ago and an almost identical play.

"Two officials called it no good, (one official) said it's good. I didn't think that he could even hear the buzzer. Evidently he did."

On the other side, Jacksonville coach Robert Hurley was just happy to get the win.

"I thought the clock was out, but we'll take anything they give us," he said.

The game-ending play was typical of a see-saw game that saw both teams battle back and forth with neither one taking control for extended periods of time.

Rose actually led 56-51 with 1:26 remaining after Errol Wooten nailed a 3-pointer, but Jacksonville fought back.

Neil Jones followed Wooten's shot with a basket inside to make it 56-53.

With 46 seconds remaining, Wooten drew a technical for questioning a call and Jacksonville's Rod McLean calmly hit three of four free shots to pull the Cardinals into a tie.

"It's hard," Brewington said of the

technical on Wooten. "The kid just questioned the call."

Rose set up its final shot and Langley made a move into the lane and drew a foul with five seconds to go. He hit the first shot but missed the second following a Jacksonville time out to set the stage for Watson's game-winning shot.

"The thing that bothered me was the one official said it wasn't his call to make," Brewington said. "But if it's wrong, it's wrong. The boy was dribbling the ball while the buzzer went off."

Still the late technical was a big swing in the game. Rose was on the other side of the same situation late in the third quarter.

McLean was whistled for a technical with 1:20 left in the period after arguing a foul called against him. At the time, Jacksonville led, 39-38.

Langley made just one of the ensuing four free shots to knot the score but quickly redeemed himself by nailing a 3-pointer a little later to give Rose a 42-39 lead heading into the final quarter.

Hurley said those missed foul shots could have put his team away.

"It could have dug us a whole," he said. "(But) those missed foul shots gave us a lift."

That lead change was just one of many momentum swings in the ballgame.

Rose forged out to a 30-28 halftime lead but was outscored 11-2 in the first four minutes of the third quarter.

Kelvin Martin started things off with a jumper that knotted the score at 30-30. Wooten put Rose back out in front 32-30 but Timon Harper answered with a 3-pointer for the Cardinals who went on a 9-0 run to take a 39-32 lead with 4:11 to go in the quarter.

Rose called time out, regrouped and went on a scoring binge of its own.

James Teele drove the lane and dished to Wooten for an easy basket

to pull the Rampants within 39-34. Langley canned a jumper to make it 39-36.

Rose then pressured Jacksonville into two turnovers and got a jumper from Wooten out of it to pull within one, 39-38.

Wooten then came up with a steal and fed Langley who was fouled by McLean to set up the first technical.

"We kind of lost our concentration," Brewington said of the Rampants' early third-quarter play. "We came back and played really inspired ball. We came back, got the lead and I thought we had it pretty much in control."

But, as the final score would indicate, the game was far from over.

Rose actually built up an 8-point lead with 4:35 remaining when Brian Will made two big plays off Jacksonville turnovers.

First he fed Teele with an alley-oop layup pass for a 51-45 lead. Then he picked up a loose ball and made a layup to make it 53-45.

Then Rose tried to go into a semi-delay but Jacksonville regrouped and slowly crept back into contention.

Brewington played his whole roster, but said the Rampants were most effective in their three-guard lineup with James Teele coming off the bench to replace whoever is playing center.

"That's our best lineup," he said. "These games, before Christmas, we'd like to win them all but we want to play all the kids."

Rose falls to 4-1 on the year while the Cardinals move to 3-2.

Langley led Rose with 18 points while Wooten added 13.

McLean had 16 to lead Jacksonville.

Rose had defeated Jacksonville earlier in the year, 56-50 in overtime.

In the girl's game, Rose, with two players out with injuries and another one hobbling with a pulled hamstring, fell behind early to the Lady Cardinals, 9-4, but rallied to take a 47-23 win.

The Rampettes outscored Jacksonville 17-6 in the second quarter to take a 21-15 halftime lead.

Then, Rose outscored Jacksonville 26-8 in the second half to seal the victory.

Andrea Rogers and Nicole Maxon led the way with 14 and 12 points respectively.

"We came out and didn't play well," said Rose coach Bill Kuykendall. "We were down 9-4. We went to the press. The press had hurt them down there. They started throwing the ball away. That was the majority of our comeback."

Rose was missing inside players Lori Sharkweiler and Cammie Smith as well as Elka Moore. In addition, starting guard Lisa Leisten played with an injured hamstring.

"Andrea Rogers did a good job," Kuykendall said. "She did a lot of scoring. Nicole Maxon scored 12. Jenny Stoneham and Angie Mills did a good job in place of Lisa."

Rose returns to action Friday against Terry Sanford at home.

## Brown To Be Named At UNC

CHAPEL HILL (AP) — Mack Brown, head football coach and athletic director at Tulane, will become the new football coach at North Carolina, the university said today.

Brown will be introduced at a news conference at 3 p.m. at the Smith Center, said North Carolina sports information director Rick Brewer. Brown will replace Dick Crum, who announced his resignation in late November.

Brown has a career 17-27 record, including a 6-5 year as head coach at Appalachian State University in 1983. His three seasons at Tulane have been 1-10 in 1985, 4-7 in 1986 and 6-5 in 1987.

Starting his college coaching career at Florida State in 1972 as an assistant coach, Brown has been an assistant at Southern Mississippi, Memphis State, Iowa State, Louisiana State and Oklahoma.

A native of Cookeville, Tenn., the 36-year-old Brown graduated from Florida State in 1974 and earned a master's degree from Southern Mississippi.

Brown's ascension to the head coaching job at North Carolina came as Air Force coach Fisher DeBerry withdrew from consideration.

DeBerry, who interviewed Tuesday with the UNC committee seeking a replacement for former head coach Dick Crum, withdrew his name several hours after his return to Colorado.

"After officially visiting the university of North Carolina earlier on Tuesday, I have requested that my name be withdrawn from further consideration for their head coaching position," DeBerry said in a statement released through the Air Force Academy sports information department about midnight Tuesday EST.

"I have really thought and prayed about this, but due to the timing and the tremendous commitment I feel to my players and staff and administration, I feel it would be best to withdraw my name."

The Durham Morning Herald, meanwhile, reported today that UNC officials were close to completing a deal with Brown that would make him the school's 30th head football coach.

The newspaper said sources in New Orleans said the last remaining details in the deal involved the length of Brown's contract.

The Fayetteville Times also reported today that Brown indicated to his team Tuesday that he would accept the UNC coaching job.

"He's gone — you can tell," the Fayetteville newspaper quoted an unnamed source within the Tulane Athletic Department as saying. "You can always tell what a man is thinking. It's a great opportunity."

Brown, 36, who also serves as athletic director at Tulane, has remained mum on the UNC job possibility. He was in Chapel Hill on Monday to be interviewed by the search committee.

Brown, whose Tulane team plays Washington Saturday in the Independence Bowl at Shreveport, La.,

has a 17-27 record in four seasons as a head coach. His Appalachian State team went 6-5 in 1983. After spending the 1984 season as offensive coordinator at Oklahoma, he was hired as head coach and AD at Tulane in 1985.

Mark Duffner, head coach at Holy Cross, also was interviewed Monday by the committee. Marc Dove, an assistant under Crum the past four seasons and the Tar Heels' defensive coordinator in 1987, also reportedly interviewed for the job.

## Seven Lose Eligibility

Seven players have lost their athletic eligibility and investigations continue into the dealings of other players named by a sports agent as having signed contracts in violation of NCAA rules.

Auburn's Sugar Bowl-bound football team has lost cornerback Kevin Porter and Texas A&M will be without lineman Tony Bartley and running back Melvin Collins for the Cotton Bowl. Those three were ruled ineligible by their respective universities after agent Jim Abernethy reported that they had signed contracts with him.

Of the nine athletes that Abernethy said had signed contracts with him, seven have subsequently lost their eligibility.

In a copyright story Tuesday, the Atlanta Journal-Constitution said Abernethy had signed nine college athletes and presented copies of contracts for eight of them.

In addition to Porter, Bartley and Collins, the agent said he had contracts with Memphis State basketball players Marvin Alexander and Sylvester Gray, Georgia Tech football player Riccardo Ingram and TCU football players Tony Jeffery, John Booty and Wayne Waddy. Only Booty and Waddy retain their eligibility.

It is against NCAA rules for players to accept benefits from agents or to sign contracts with them.

Abernethy said Collins' contract, the only one not given to the newspaper, was in a safe-deposit box and would be brought to the paper this week.

"These guys all knew what they were doing. Every one of them," Abernethy said. "I mean, they'd sit there and bid and dicker with me."

All the football players named by Abernethy are seniors except Collins, who is a junior. The basketball players are underclassmen.

Abernethy said that either he or his former associate, Gary Wilson, had dealings with three other players scheduled to participate in bowl games — Clemson's Michael Dean Perry, South Carolina's Sterling Sharpe and Auburn's Tracy Rocker.

"I don't have contracts on those guys," Abernethy said. "But based on (NCAA) rules, I know Perry shouldn't have been eligible this season."

## ECU Women Nip Howard

Gretta O'Neal Savage spent a good deal of the game on the bench after getting her head banged on the floor in the first half and then sat back down quickly in the second half with four fouls.

But she came back in late to help the Lady Pirates hold off Howard for a 56-55 basketball victory Tuesday night in Minges Coliseum.

Howard, down by 14 points at the half, rallied back and took a 4-point lead with 2:24 left in the game.

But Savage hit a turnaround from 10 feet away to pull back within one, then Alma Bethea made good on a 3-point play to put the Lady Pirates back in the lead, 54-53, with 1:11 to go.

Arlene Hector scored off the baseline at the 59 second mark, but Savage then scored with 37 seconds left to play to put the Lady Pirates back into the lead.

On the following play, Howard missed a short shot and Savage was there for the key rebound, dishing it out to guard Irish Hamilton, who was fouled with 17 seconds left.

She missed on the free throw, however, and Howard called time to set up a final play. On the play, Volanda Lockamy attempted to drive the lane — but again Savage was there to take a charge with five seconds left, and the Pirates ran out the clock after that, preserving the win.

"We'll take it," a relieved Coach Pat Pierson said afterward. "I thought the kids played great 'D' down the stretch. I knew that (Howard) would heat up in the second half and they did. They are a good team — I can see now how they beat (N.C.) State."

Pierson said that Savage came through with several key plays at the end to help pull out the game. "She took a heck of a blow to the head in the first half."

And even though the Pirates blew every bit of a 14-point lead, Pierson credited much of that to the play of the Lady Bison, who made a strong surge behind the shooting of Vanessa Graham in the second half.

"(Graham) is a heck of a shooter," Pierson said. She was six of 12 in the second half, but missed on the key shot right before Savage's key rebound at the end.

"I don't think that we got overconfident (with the lead)," Pierson said. "I just thought that they got hot. We did come down and take several bad shots in a row, and that helped them, too. But (Howard) has six seniors on the team and they are a very strong club."

"Our morale was down (after three consecutive losses), and if we had lost tonight, I think it would have been tough for us to come back and be encouraged. This was a moral victory for us too because we knew we can win the close ones. This is two we've won right at the end (Central Michigan by one in the Lady Kat Classic). This will help us down the line when we're in another close one. We'll be able to look back on this and gain encouragement."

After Howard scored first, East Carolina came back and took the lead on two straight baskets by Hamilton and Monique Pompili and never trailed again in the half.

The Lady Pirates built their lead up to as much as nine at 19-10, only to see Howard put on a rally and cut it to three behind balanced scoring. But after a 19-16 score, East Carolina scored the next nine points, four of them by Pompili, to push out by 28-16. Hamilton made two free throws and Pompili hit off a drive with four seconds left to give East Carolina a 24-20 halftime lead.

Behind a couple of goals by Arlene Hector, Howard trimmed the lead back to eight early, but the Pirates still maintained a 44-34 lead midway the half.

But Graham then led another charge that cut the lead back to two at 49-47. Graham hit the game's lone 3-pointer to do that damage. Hector then hit a layup and was fouled, but missed the free throw — and the opportunity to put Howard into the lead.

# Clemson Handed Rare Home Loss

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP) — Southern Mississippi coach M.K. Turk says his team made some mistakes, but accomplished what it wanted in handing Clemson its first non-conference home loss in 34 games.

"It was a great win in a hostile arena," Turk said after his team's 88-85 victory Tuesday night. "I guess the greatest motivating factor was that Bill McLellan told me not to come back to Hattiesburg without a win."

McLellan served as Clemson athletic director before leaving in 1985 and eventually becoming athletic director at Southern Mississippi.

In the only other game involving an Atlantic Coast Conference team Tuesday night, Wake Forest defeated Campbell 89-63.

There was little doubt in Clemson coach Cliff Ellis' mind that his team had run into a well-prepared opponent.

"Their experience made a big difference early in the game," he said. "We were in awe. We stood and watched. They dunked it and took 3-point shots and we didn't know how to react."

"At about the five- or six-minute mark (of the first half), we found out what it takes to play an excellent

team. We worked hard and never quit."

Forward Derrek Hamilton and guard Casey Fisher scored 22 points each to lead Southern Mississippi to the victory.

All five starters scored in double figures as the Golden Eagles charged to as much as a 26-point lead before holding off a Clemson rally.

Hamilton hit 11 of 19 from the field and Fisher was four of five from 3-point range and seven of 10 overall to lead Southern Mississippi to their second victory in as many games.

Center Elden Campbell led Clemson with 27 points and 14 rebounds.

# Knight Satisfied After Hoosiers Win, 103-75

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Bob Knight says he is satisfied that his fifth-ranked Hoosiers played a complete game in their victory over Eastern Kentucky.

"We played good at times in the Miami-Ohio and Notre Dame games, but tonight was the first full game we played well in," the Hoosiers coach said after Indiana's 103-75 victory Tuesday night.

It was the only game involving a ranked team. Virginia Tech at No. 16 Missouri was postponed because of snow and rescheduled for tonight. In other games tonight, it will be Arkansas-Little Rock at No. 2 Arizona, Ohio State at No. 11 Florida and Maryland-Baltimore County at No. 18 Georgetown.

"This was a very good game for us, and we've had a lot of these games in December that have put us in situations that we need to be in to see if we are a good team," Knight added.

Dean Garrett, who started the game on the bench after scoring just two points when Indiana beat Washington State 63-56 Saturday, had 25 points, 18 rebounds and seven blocked shots.

"Garrett played better than he has in the past two games, and that was good to see," Knight said.

Eastern Kentucky Coach Max Good said, "The greatest motivator is the bench."

Garrett hit nine of 11 field goals and seven of eight free throws for Indiana, 6-1.

Four other Hoosiers were in double figures as Indiana took advantage of cold shooting by Eastern Kentucky, 3-2, at the start of each half.

"I really enjoyed watching our team play tonight," Knight said. "Our offense was far and away the best it's been all year."

The Hoosiers outrebounded the Colonels 51-39 and held them to just 37.5 percent shooting.

"We got baptized tonight by a big-time basketball team," Good said. "They just humiliated us. When we got the ball deep, we ate some of the shots. Indiana is awfully quick, and we didn't rebound the basketball. Playing a team like Indiana will reveal your weaknesses. They certainly put a big question mark on us."

Indiana ran up 10-2 lead in the game's first 4 1/2 minutes, led by Rick Calloway with four points. Eastern Kentucky took nine shots and hit just one, while the Hoosiers were four of eight in that span.

Indiana led 29-14 with 7:31 to play as Garrett and Calloway scored 13 of the Hoosiers' first 29 points.

Jeff McGill led the Colonels with 25 points.

"Eastern Kentucky is a really good aggressive tough team, and they came out on us on the defense about as well as you can against us," Knight said. "McGill played extremely well. (Steve) Eyl did an excellent job on him in the second half."

Indiana outrebounded the Colonels

27-12 in the first half, hit 12 of 15 free throws and led 46-32 at halftime.

Indiana outscored Eastern Kentucky 10-2 in the first 2:19 of the second half, taking a 56-34 lead on a dunk by Garrett. The Hoosiers' biggest lead was 76-48 with 8:45 remaining, after a free throw by Eyl.

Unranked Teams Elsewhere Tuesday, it was American 78, George Washington 63; Southern Mississippi 88, Clemson 85; Wake Forest 89, Campbell 63; Michigan State 78, Illinois-Chicago 64; and Arkansas 101, Alcorn State 55.

Mike Sumner and Dale Spears scored 17 points apiece for American, which held favored George Washington to 33 percent field goal accuracy, including shooting 7-29 before halftime.

Derrek Hamilton and Casey Fisher scored 22 points each for Southern Mississippi as all five starters scored

in double figures for the Golden Eagles. Southern Miss charged to as much as a 26-point lead before holding off a Clemson rally.

Elden Campbell led Clemson with 27 points and 14 rebounds.

Antonio Johnson's 23 points, including five 3-point field goals, paced Wake Forest, which took the early lead and wasn't threatened.

HATTIESBURG, Miss. (AP) — Five names are on the list of finalists submitted to Southern Mississippi president Aubrey Lucas and athletic director Bill McLellan for consideration as the Golden Eagles' new head football coach, a Gulf Coast newspaper reported today.

The Sun Herald of Biloxi-Gulfport quoted sources as saying the list includes Florida State defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews, Michigan State offensive coordinator Morris Watts, Appalachian State head coach Sparky Woods, Texas A&M defensive secondary coach Curley Hallman and George Belu, offensive coordinator at Indiana University.

The new coach will succeed Jim Carmody, who resigned under pressure earlier this month.

Watts was the only finalist available for comment Tuesday night. "Good, I'm glad to hear it," Watts

told the newspaper when told that he was one of the finalists. "I'm still very interested in the job, but I don't really know anything much about what's going on right now. I don't want to make statements about what (I'm) not on top of."

An 11-man search committee appointed by Lucas concluded five days of interviews with prospective candidates Monday night, and on Tuesday presented Lucas and McLellan with their top choices.

A statement released by McLellan and search committee chairman Bob Mixon on Tuesday acknowledged that the committee had concluded its assignment. McLellan had no further comment on the committee's list. Lucas was unavailable for comment.

Sources had said Monday that a decision on a new coach could be made before Friday. Any hiring would have to be approved by the State College Board.

# Ueberroth Says Expansion Coming, But No Time Soon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Baseball is ready to expand but anyone holding his breath until it happens could become blue in the face.

Commissioner Peter Ueberroth met with a group of congressmen Tuesday to give them the latest feelings out of baseball's winter meeting. He told them little that they didn't know.

Baseball, he said, would expand when baseball is ready and the cities meet the guidelines set down in October 1985. Not before.

However, Ueberroth told the 10 senators and one delegate from the District of Columbia, the criteria aren't chiseled in stone.

He met for about an hour with representatives wanting teams in Colorado, Arizona, Ohio, Indiana, Florida and the District of Columbia. Others who want teams but did not attend the meeting represent Louisiana, New Jersey and Tennessee.

The cities most discussed are Denver, Indianapolis, Washington, D.C., Miami, Tampa or St. Petersburg in Florida, New Orleans, Phoenix, Ariz., Nashville, Tenn., Columbus, Ohio and Northern New Jersey.

After the meeting, Ueberroth told newsmen that baseball wants to expand, but there is no timetable and no commitments have been made to any city.

"We talked about all kinds of scenarios," Ueberroth said, flanked by the senators in the Capitol. "The

numbers that get interesting are 30 or 32 teams down the line. There is no commitment from baseball.

"But in the past, it was only whether (to expand). No one (among the owners) is saying 'no expansion' now. It is only when, how and where," he said.

Everyone attending the meeting described the discussion as "frank." Ueberroth said, jokingly, "These guys beat me up. They ganged up on me."

Sen. Tim Wirth, D-Colo., who has organized the 16 senators as an ad hoc committee and wants a team for Denver, said the congressmen and Ueberroth had a "long and thorough discussion of the expansion of major league baseball."

"It is very clear that the members of the task force have been most concerned about a timetable for the expansion of major league baseball," Wirth said. "The criteria for expansion was very clearly laid out by major league baseball in October of 1985. We're now very concerned about a timetable. And coming out of the meeting today, it is very clear that timetable is very dependent on both constituencies, dependent on major league baseball and dependent on our own constituency to organize, period."

"I think it is fair to say that Commissioner Ueberroth has been a longtime advocate of the expansion of major league baseball. He will be

working with his constituency, with the owners, to move toward a timetable as rapidly as possible. And each of us will be working with our own constituencies, those cities that are interested in expansion of major league baseball, to get together a package that meets the criteria."

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., supporting a team for the nation's capital, said Ueberroth told the group that the only timetable he could give them was that six teams could be added to the current 26 within the next 10 years.

Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind., who wants a team in Indianapolis, said, "There is no doubt about it. There is a commitment to expansion."

Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., said Ueberroth did not give a definite date. "He said he would go back and see if he could get a definite date. He just gave us the criteria for a city getting a team."

Ueberroth described the criteria for baseball awarding an expansion team to a city as: a group of owners with one leader, roots in the community, one stadium for baseball alone, and political support that he described as "long term. After all, we play 81 to 85 games. We're there all summer."

Then, he said, the criteria "is not absolute. There can be a mix. There are a lot of factors. There has to be flexibility."

 Flagler was sued by Walters for breach of contract and the case is still pending in the New York Supreme Court. Flowers is attempting to reach a settlement to repay Bloom.

## Washburn Traded To Atlanta Hawks

ATLANTA (AP) — Chris Washburn, a second-year forward-center, thinks he'll fit right in with the Atlanta Hawks.  
 "The Hawks are a good team. I need to be on a young team like the Hawks. They run and I'm a runner, too. I think I can blend in with them," said Washburn, 22.  
 "For a player in my situation, the trade is beneficial," said Washburn. "I think I can do positive things for the Hawks."  
 The Hawks acquired Washburn from the Golden State Warriors in exchange for the rights to Ken Barlow, who is currently playing in Israel, the NBA club announced Tuesday.  
 "Chris is a 22-year-old player of enormous potential," said Hawks President and General Manager Stan Kasten. "He's as gifted an athlete as one could find in a seven-footer and he's the type of athlete that we always want for our team."  
 Washburn was the third player chosen in the 1986 NBA draft. He left North Carolina State after his sophomore season after averaging 17.6 points per game.  
 Washburn averaged 3.8 points in 35 games last season for the Warriors and spent part of the season undergoing treatment under the NBA Drug Program. He was averaging 4.1 points a game this year in eight games.  
 He was to join the Hawks today and be in uniform when Atlanta travels to Milwaukee Friday night.  
 Barlow, a 6-foot-10 forward from Notre Dame, was acquired by the Hawks from the Los Angeles Lakers along with Mike McGee for the rights to Billy Thompson and Ron Kellogg in 1986. Barlow was a No. 1 draft choice of the Lakers, the 23rd player chosen overall.  
 The Hawks traded McGee to the Sacramento Kings Monday in exchange for a second round draft choice in 1991 and another in 1995.  
 Barlow played in Italy last year and averaged 16.9 points and 8.4 rebounds in 30 games. His statistics this year in Israel were not available.

## Seeking NFL Team For Charlotte

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Spartanburg, S.C., businessman Jerry Richardson says other cities have been trying for years to win an NFL expansion team, but he believes Charlotte can sell itself as a pro football city.  
 "Yes, we're behind," Richardson said Tuesday in announcing his plans to seek an NFL team. "But we know the other cities involved and we can't see any reason why this city can't compete. We wouldn't be going into this unless we felt we could do it."  
 At a news conference, Richardson's son, Mark, unveiled artist renderings of a proposed 65,000 seat, \$80 million stadium that the family plans to build with its own money in the Charlotte vicinity, possibly in South Carolina.  
 "We're committed to it," Jerry Richardson said. "If we don't get one of these expansion teams it might be 20 or 25 years before we get another shot. We feel this is a critical time."  
 NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle has said he would like to expand the 28-team league by two by 1990. He is expected to appoint an expansion committee before or at the March NFL owners' meeting in Phoenix.  
 Richardson, 51, who played for the NFL Baltimore Colts in 1959 and 1960, is president of TW Services, which had \$3.3 billion in revenues last year from operations including more than 1,600 Hardee's, Denny's and Quincy's restaurants.  
 The team would be owned by his family, Richardson said, which includes his wife, Rosalind, and sons John, 28, and Mark, 27.  
 The stadium, which is being developed by H.O.K. Sports Facilities group of Kansas City, would have 9,000 premium club seats and 100 luxury boxes, he said.  
 Richardson said he preferred getting an expansion team rather than moving an existing NFL franchise to Charlotte.  
 "We have a friend in St. Louis and he's devastated by the possibility that his team might be leaving," he said. "I don't want that."  
 The price of an NFL franchise is expected to be \$60 million to \$90 million. Former NFL cities Baltimore and Oakland, Calif., are among those interested in NFL franchises. Also interested are Phoenix, Memphis, Jacksonville, Fla., and Birmingham, Ala.  
 "We're in the warmup period," said Mark Richardson. "We are behind, but the race hasn't started yet."  
 His father hinted that he would follow the lead of Charlotte businessman George Shinn, who won an NBA franchise for the city this year when many thought he had no chance. Richardson already has hired Max Muhleman Marketing Inc., which helped Shinn land the basketball franchise.  
 "We're going to work and continue to work to build a case so when they form an expansion committee we'll tell our story," Richardson said. "The owners will make the decision and who knows what they'll do. But we'll get our name in the pot."  
 Richardson is the second area businessman to seek an NFL franchise for Charlotte. Bruton Smith, owner of the Charlotte Motor Speedway, has said he would try to secure an NFL franchise and play at the speedway.

# How They Voted

WASHINGTON — Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Dec. 4.

**HOUSE**  
**CLEAN AIR EXTENSION** — By a vote of 162 for and 257 against, the House rejected the longer of two proposed delays beyond Dec. 31 in enforcement of ozone and carbon monoxide standards of the 1970 Clean Air Act.

This left intact an eight-month delay, to Sept. 1, 1988, of Environmental Protection Agency enforcement under the current law. Congress will use the time to complete work on an updated version of the statute.

The vote defeated an amendment to postpone for 21 months the deadline now set for Dec. 31, an approach that would have given Congress until late 1989 to rewrite the Clean Air Act.

Environmentalists wanted the shorter delay while industrial lobbyists generally favored the 21-month postponement.

EPA enforcement would have been essentially frozen during the 21 months, except that the agency could have moved ahead in 1988 with planned construction bans on major new sources of pollution in 14 metropolitan areas it views as most recalcitrant in meeting federal air quality standards.

The vote occurred as the House passed and sent to the Senate a "continuing resolution" (HJ Res 395) to fund most government programs in fiscal 1988. The \$587 billion appropriations measure is the costliest spending bill ever debated in Congress.

Members voting yes favored the

longer of two proposed delays in federal clean air enforcement.

North Carolina voting yes: Walter Jones, D-1, Howard Coble, R-6, Alex McMillan, R-9, Cass Ballenger, R-10. Voting no: Tim Valentine, D-2, Martin Lancaster, D-3, David Price, D-4, Stephen Neal, D-5, Charles Rose, D-7, W.G. Hefner, D-8, James Clarke, D-11. Not voting: None.

**FAIRNESS DOCTRINE** — By a vote of 259 for and 157 against, the House adopted an amendment to HJ Res 395 (above) to write into law the Federal Communications Commission's "fairness doctrine" requiring broadcasters to air a diversity of views on controversial topics.

President Reagan earlier this year successfully vetoed separate legislation to codify the fairness doctrine, and this vote increased chances he will also veto the continuing resolution.

Supporter Thomas Bliley, R-Va., said "the fairness doctrine simply enforces the commitment (of broadcasters) not to impose a single viewpoint on the American public."

Opponent Harold Rogers, R-Ky., said the fairness doctrine is government infringement of free speech, "as if we gave King Edward editing power over Tom Paine's newsletter."

Members voting yes wanted to codify the fairness doctrine.

North Carolina voting yes: Walter Jones, Valentine, Lancaster, David Price, Neal, Rose, Hefner and Clarke. Voting no: Coble, McMillan, Ballenger. Not voting: None.

**SPENDING FREEZE** — The House rejected, 198 for 220 against, a motion to freeze discretionary fiscal 1988 spending under the "continuing

resolution" (above) at the 1987 level, by cutting \$3.4 billion from the \$587 billion measure.

Sponsor Jerry Lewis, R-Calif., said "the continuing resolution to the people of America must be an astonishing prospect. It takes virtually all of the spending of government, over one-half a trillion dollars, puts it into one huge basket, asks people to make sense out of it, and then you have an up or down vote on it."

Opponent Leon Panetta, D-Calif., said the motion would "undercut the whole thrust of the Summit agreement" in which Congress and the Administration have agreed to lower the 1987 deficit by \$30 billion, by destroying the trust between the two branches and both parties the summit has nurtured.

Members voting yes wanted to freeze 1988 federal spending and the fiscal 1987 level.

North Carolina voting yes: Neal, Coble, McMillan, Ballenger. Voting no: Walter Jones, Valentine, Lancaster, David Price, Rose, Hefner, Clarke. Not voting: None.

**SENATE**  
**TESTING VETERANS** — By a vote of 29 for and 67 against, the Senate refused to table (kill) an amendment in behalf of random drug testing of doctors, nurses and other Veterans Administration personnel.

The vote cleared the way for Senate approval of language to include VA staffers as possible targets of random drug testing under a program the Administration is carrying out throughout the executive branch.

The vote occurred during debate on an omnibus veterans bill (S9) that was headed for final passage, a measure that had originally sought to exempt VA personnel from random drug testing.

Senators voting yes were opposed to random testing of VA personnel for drug usage.

North Carolina: Terry Sanford, D, voted yes. Jesse Helms, R, voted no.

**AIDS TESTING** — By a vote of 24 for and 68 against, the Senate refused to table (kill) an amendment requiring Veterans Administration hospitals to offer all patients under 40 a chance to be voluntarily tested for exposure to the AIDS virus.

As later attached to S9 (above), the amendment replaced a softer provision that would have prohibited the VA from administering AIDS tests to all but high risk patients such as drug users and to others in whom doctors saw the possibility of AIDS.

Senators voting yes were opposed to the amendment.

North Carolina: Sanford voted no. Helms voted no.

## GOP Solon Calls For Wright Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — A conservative lawmaker who denounced House Speaker Jim Wright as "the most unethical speaker of the 20th century" is calling for a formal investigation into the Democratic leader from Texas.

Rep. Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., cited several news articles questioning Wright's activities on behalf of ailing Texas savings and loans, the legitimacy of a book deal he obtained, and his involvement in the development of the Fort Worth stockyards project.


"I think, based on the historical record, he is the most unethical

speaker of the 20th century," Gingrich said at a news conference Tuesday.

Asked about Gingrich's move, Wright chuckled and recalled words attributed to former Chicago Mayor Richard Daley: "They've vilified me, they've calumnied me, they've abused me, they've even criticized me."

"I don't think it really warrants too much of an answer," Wright said. "It's totally without foundation."

He said he did not believe anyone had suggested he had done anything dishonest, illegal or unethical: "My total career speaks for itself."

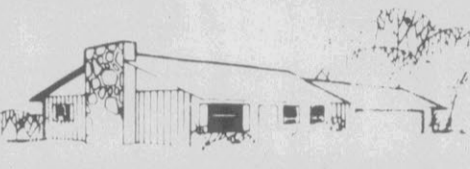

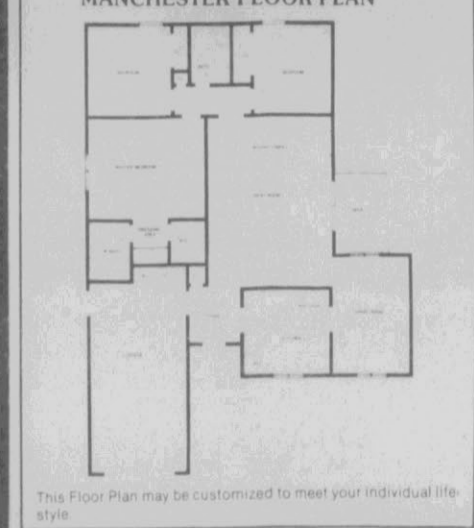

## Amish Families Find New Home In Blue Ridges

WINDSORS CROSSROADS, N.C. (AP) — For six years, David Miller drove 465 miles from North Carolina to Ohio to be with his family on Christmas.

Every year it was the same. While his parents, brothers, sisters, nieces, nephews and grandparents feasted from the dining room table, Miller sat in the corner at a wooden table set for one.

He ate Christmas dinner alone. "They had to shun me," Miller says with a shrug. "It's a law of the church," he said, when a person forsakes the Amish community.

Six years of sparse telephone calls and solitary visits were enough.

Last fall, at 31, Miller returned to the church — not in Ohio but at the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in the Carolinas' only Amish community.

Since its founding in April 1985, the sect has sprawled across North Carolina's farmland, lugging it back to the era of home-baked bread and hand-built barns, prayer in schools, modest dress and humble obedience — the puritan life David Miller says surpasses the one the rest of us live.

Miller lives with 77 other Amish at Windsors Crossroads, where Yadkin and Iredell counties meet.

The community runs along Interstate 77, 17 miles north of Statesville. Its dairy, soybean and corn farms haven't changed much in 30 years, says John Chaffin, 42, who was born within its 2 square miles.

But change came when Paul Peachy and his family moved in 2½ years ago.

Ten families followed. Now, they own about 900 acres and lease 200 more. They plan to clear two tree-covered lots to build a church and a schoolhouse.

Their neighbors don't mind. "If we had more people like them in my neighborhood, I could go to bed at night without locking my front door," says Chaffin.

That could happen. Amish average seven children, doubling their population every 23 years.

The Yadkin County Amish aren't

seeking newcomers who could hasten that growth. But they won't turn them away either.

The settlement already draws thousands of tourists.

"I happened to be up there one day and I saw three busloads come by," says Yadkin County Sheriff Jack Henderson, a Windsors Crossroads native.

"They're the kind of people that help you rather than hurt you. I don't think I've ever had a complaint up there."

If the Amish were to make trouble, they wouldn't call the law, says Uriel Miller, one of three ministers.

Instead, the congregation decides the punishment.

Amish codes forbid divorce. It means excommunication.

They pay taxes because the Bible tells them to. They don't contribute to Social Security because they refuse to collect it.

And the men rule.

"Women, just like in the Bible, are taught to be in submission to the husband," says Uriel Miller. "But the husband is also taught to exercise authority or leadership."

Also forbidden are newspapers, stereos, radios and TVs. But the N.C. Amish shop in grocery stores.

And once, Uriel Miller's wife, Viola, was so busy she served her husband a frozen potpie.

Books are selected with care: "Thinking of Others," "Christian Hymns," and plant encyclopedias fill shelves in their farmhouses, trailers and split-level homes.

Because they are of the New Order, they have refrigerators, stoves, washers, driers and tele phones. The men farm with tractors unlike Old Order Amish who denounce machines and electricity.

Of the estimated 115,000 Amish in the United States, 6,000 belong to the New Order. Another 8,000 are Beachy Amish — a faction so liberal its members drive cars.

The New Order travels in horse-drawn buggies. Only on long journeys will they ride in cars driven by the non-Amish neighbors they call the English.

## Greeting Cards Hold Century-Old Spot In Extending Holiday Cheer

More than two billion Christmas and holiday greetings travel around the mountains, over the seas, through the woods and even next door on cards.

Cards are used year-round to celebrate birthdays and anniversaries, and to express sympathy, good will and friendship. But, they seem to reach their peak of demand during the holidays.

"We sell them like crazy during the holidays," said Kate Phillips of Tapscoff in the Plaza Mall. "The boxed cards are selling," and they usually express a traditional, family-oriented greeting. But, "Individually, it's the funny card that sells."

Carolyn Harrell of Lynn's Hallmark Shop in the Carolina East Mall agrees the funny cards sell. "This year, it seems like the humorous ones are selling better than the traditional," she said.

Also, the individual cards seem to outsell the boxed cards, Ms. Harrell said. "More and more people are getting personal" and are selecting cards for mother, the family doctor and others.

Michael Ertis, manager of Central Book & News in Greenville Square Shopping Center, also said the store is selling "very little boxed cards." But, "Christmas card sales are doing as well as last year and the previous year."

Individual cards sold are about evenly divided between the humorous and the romantic-sweet, he said.

Exchanging written greetings at the start of a new year was a custom practiced by medieval Egyptians and Romans as artists engraved greetings on wood blocks, according to The Time-Life Book of Christmas. The pictures of the Nativity, other biblical figures and phrases and expressions of good luck were delivered by hand in the 18th century. But, with

the "penny post" established in England in 1840, greetings were sent almost everywhere in the country.

As the phenomenon of mailing Christmas cards became popular, some companies began producing them in addition to their regular merchandise such as playing cards, note paper and valentines. The early holiday cards resembled valentines with paper lace, ribbon, embossed surfaces and messages of love.

In 1967, Marcus Ward & Co., a firm in London, put all its resources in Christmas card design, according to the book. And by 1870, the Christmas scenes and sentiments steadily traveled to the United States for sale.

But Louis Prang, who came to the United States from Germany in 1850, is credited with developing the card in this country. Beginning by only printing business cards and novelty items, Prang decided to print a selection of Christmas cards and export them to England in 1874. The following year he printed enough to sell in the United States in response to high demand.

In addition to extending messages

across the miles, cards have been a mirror of the times, revealing many of society's trends and changes, the book said. For example, World War I marked the end of imported cards from Germany, and cards help bring families together in spirit as they were separated by the battle. Cards of the 1920s portrayed the good times with "roadster-driving" Santas, while cards of the 1930s downplayed the bad times.

Santa carried the American flag in cards of the 1940s, displaying patriotic themes, and in the 1950s, he traveled in a space capsule as the American space program progressed in the emergence of the Cold War.

Images of brotherhood and peace were illustrated on the cards of the 1960s and '70s, and the cards of the 1980s are traditional and modern with the universal Christmas symbols — the ornamented tree, stockings over the hearth, snowy scenes and Santas on roof tops. "Humor is ever-popular, nostalgia is up, red and green are in, and the Victorian look is back, but tempered a bit," the book said.

## Classic Christmas Songs Now On CD

HOLLYWOOD — "Can 12 great Christmas songs be ... (recorded) with the same feeling and sound that is found on the hit singles of (today's most exciting artists) without losing for a moment the feeling of Christmas?"

That was the challenge that Phil Spector, widely regarded as one of the most compelling record producers of the rock era, set for himself 24 years ago when he went into the studio with Darlene Love, the Crystals and others from the troupe of singers he used on such hits as "Be My Baby" and "He's a Rebel" — hits that were among the most evocative teen-age expressions of desire and dreams ever put on record.

Christmas music was a natural for Spector's "wall of sound" production style because most of the songs Spector chose for the album, from the standard "White Christmas" to the novelty "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus," reflected the same mixture of innocence and sentimentality that he wove into his regular pop recordings.

And sure enough: The album Spector came up with 24 years ago, "Phil Spector's Christmas Gift to You," just released in CD by Rhino Records, captured the spirit of his classic hits with such purity of vision and heightened emotion that it still stands as the most endearing rock-related Christmas LP ever.

Spector's album was the model for Jimmy Iovine's highly recommended "A Very Special Christmas," which is available in regular CD through A&M and in a special, higher-priced audiophile edition through Mobile Fidelity Sound Lab (a quick blindfold test of the two versions did not indicate a marked difference in sound purity). Iovine's album even opens up with a version of "Santa Claus Is Coming to Town" by the Pointer Sisters that echoes the Spector arrangement of the same song, and closes with "Silent Night," which also closed the Spector collection.

Unlike Spector, however, Iovine did not impose his vision on the music. Instead, he invited 15 leading pop-rock figures (from Bruce Springsteen and Bob Seger to Whitney Houston and the Pretenders) to contribute a track each to the charity project (profits go to the Special Olympics). While that decision leaves "Special Christmas" as a less compelling work than Spector's "Gift," it remains a warm, appealing package. Especially engaging are Madonna's remake of Eartha Kitt's teasing "Santa Baby," John Mellencamp's playful "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus" and Run-D.M.C.'s original rap, "Christmas in Hollis."

The last song also shows up on "Christmas Rap" (Profile Records), another attempt to mix Christmas sentiment with contemporary pop style. This collection of nine new Christmas raps will not satisfy Christmas purists, but — thanks to Spyder-D's "Ghetto Santa" and King Sun-D Moet's "Christmas in the City" — it offers a vitality and charm of its own.

Also recommended: works by the two singers whose voices have arguably been most identified over the past four or five decades with Christmas music: Bing Crosby's "Bing Crosby Sings Christmas Songs" (MCA) and Nat King Cole's "The Christmas Song" (Capitol).

# Sid Caesar Eyes TV While Planning His Comeback

NEW YORK (AP) — Sid Caesar has this idea for a television show: It would be live. It would have comedy sketches. And wouldn't it be great if Imogene Coca were available?

The pilot's done. He just can't get it on the air. "It hasn't been on yet," Caesar grouched, "and it's been canceled three times."

Time was when networks didn't play the "don't call us, we'll call you" game with Sid Caesar, the presiding genius on "Your Show of Shows" from 1950 to 1954.

That was the golden age of video vaudeville, when Caesar, Red Skelton, Milton Berle and others mixed music and sketch comedy. Now, in the age of the sit-com, Caesar is a struggling salesman.

"I have an idea, but it's like talking to the wall," he said, complaining that television has become a timid rehash of someone else's hits.

"Yes, we want something, but see, what we want is something altogether different, something that will really come on and shake them up, and we want it altogether different. We want it the same as this show."

"They need something," he said, and his advice is: "Take a chance. Do it live! Get comedy! And do it! Don't talk about it, don't talk it to death."

CBS has custody of the pilot for a half-hour weekly series called "The Sid Caesar Show," the same title Caesar used for an ABC series in the 1963-64 season. The new version might go on early next year as a mid-season replacement, said CBS spokesman Jim Sirmans.

Meanwhile, what's a legend to do? At 65, Caesar is a decade past conquering alcoholism, is trim and fit as a wrestler — the real kind, like they have in college — and eager to work. Recovering quickly from a broken hip in September, he is talking with a producer about a possible Broadway show, just finished a movie, "Nothing's Impossible" with Danny Thomas and Milton Berle, and is making his debut at the Metropolitan Opera.

"To be at the Metropolitan, that's top-drawer stuff," Caesar said. "I'm a little in awe of it."

He is appearing eight times in December as Frosch, the drunk who appears in Act III of "Die Fledermaus," a non-singing role which provides scope for Caesar's double-talk routines in ersatz German and Italian.

Though he is in New York to do opera, Caesar talked eagerly about television, a medium he apparently watches just enough to be disgusted.

"There's very little spontaneity on television. Even the news is on tape," he said. "Nothing is live anymore, except for the morning shows. I think that is one of the dimensions we're missing in television."

"Saturday Night Live" gets a qualified nod.

"I thought some of the early ones were very, very good," he said. "But what bothers me an awful lot is the reading of cards. I like eye contact. The whole process of acting is listening, and looking at the other person."

"Your Show of Shows" was done without cue cards, without teleprompters, 90 minutes a week, 39

weeks per season, Caesar said.

It ran from 1950 to 1954 on NBC, starring Caesar, Coca, Carl Reiner and, from 1951, Howard Morris. The talented corps of writers included Mel Brooks, Neil Simon, Woody Allen and Larry Gelbart.

After Caesar and Coca split, the show was reincarnated as "Caesar's Hour" and ran until May 1957. Caesar and Coca reunited for "Sid Caesar Invites You" in 1958, but survived just four months.

Though it still enjoys an enormous reputation, "Your Show of Shows" was a middling performer in the ratings, lagging behind big hits such as "I Love Lucy," Arthur Godfrey, Red Skelton and Milton Berle. Its best year was the 1951-52 season when "Your Show of Shows" ranked No. 8, and the show, Caesar and Coca each won Emmys. The next year it ranked 19th, and Caesar never cracked the top 25 again.

Except for "The Cosby Show," the only sit-coms which Caesar admires all had family ties to "Your Show of Shows" — "The Dick Van Dyke Show," created, written and directed by Carl Reiner; "All in the Family," with Carl's son Rob as the Meathead, and "M-A-S-H," created and frequently written by Gelbart.

Of the rest, he said, "It's all six years old and down." Lapsing into rapid-fire double talk, he offered a sample show:

"You go with him and I'll take him, or you go with her. Didn't she look like you? Well, it was dark. She didn't know; I thought she was you. And you were him, and he was you. I didn't know that she was you. I was me at that time, but I wasn't me, of

course I used to be. I had her dress on. She didn't know that."

His conclusion? "America is in bad shape."

The pilot for CBS had Dorothy Loudon instead of Coca, still his first choice as co-star, but Caesar was en-

couraged by the chemistry.

The show, he said, "was pretty good. I don't think it was great, but it showed me where I could get better."

"That's still in never-never land. Meanwhile, I have to get on with my life."

# Woody Harrelson Hopes To Expand 'Cheers' Role

NEW YORK (AP) — Woody Boyd, the naive bartender on "Cheers," has moved to new digs this season and taken up acting, giving the actor who plays him, Woody Harrelson, a chance to stretch a little.

"I certainly want to show people that I can do something besides Woody Boyd. I like comedy, and I like making people laugh, but I want to do drama as well," Harrelson said while wolfing down carryout Chinese food on a recent visit to New York.

Harrelson, 25, has in mind one day playing a far different role. He'd like to make a movie based on his father's life and play the lead.

His father's life is indeed the stuff of high drama. Charles V. Harrelson spent much of his son's formative years in prison for murder and is now serving consecutive life sentences in a Texas prison for murder and murder conspiracy in the 1979 slaying of U.S. District Judge John Wood Jr.

Harrelson is reluctant to talk about his father, whom he didn't really know until he was grown, not because he's ashamed of him, he explained, but because he's afraid what he says

will be misconstrued. He feels strongly that his father was convicted because of his prior prison record and because the FBI was under pressure to find the judge's killer.

"I don't know," he said quietly. "I feel kind of odd talking about Dad, because it's one thing for me to say it and have my personal feelings about it, but it's another thing for it to be read. I haven't done many interviews, but I've done enough to know that when I read it, it never seems to have the same tonality as what I was saying, which is why I've been very frugal when it comes to interviews."

His mother and father divorced when Woody was young, and he moved with his mother from Midland, Texas, to Ohio. He had little contact with his father as a youngster.

"He was in prison, so no. We'd write," Harrelson said. "I didn't get close to him until when I was a senior in high school. He came to Ohio."

Last year, Harrelson stood in for his father in a proxy wedding in Houston.

The government charged that Charles Harrelson was hired to kill Wood by Jamiel "Jimmy" Chagra of El Paso, who was to be tried on drug

charges by Wood, nicknamed "Maximum John."

Harrelson asserts his father's trial should have been moved to another city.

"It was in the town where the incident happened, in San Antonio which had been saturated with media coverage for a year and a half prior to the trial, and every time you saw my father's name it was 'convicted hit man Charles (V.) Harrelson.' In fact, that's how he signs his letters — 'C-H-M-C-V-H.' He has a great sense of humor."

## Rambo Films Stick Fight

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Sylvester Stallone filmed a sequence Monday in which his Rambo character fights with sticks in a Bangkok warehouse and said later that even 4-year-olds understand the "fighting machine."

"It's a very difficult character to play because he doesn't speak much and has to act," Stallone, 41, said.

"He is a man that should have lived 500 years ago, who is out of place and out of time and who lives life like a samurai," he said.

Stallone talked during a break in filming of his third Rambo film, which deals with the war in Soviet-occupied Afghanistan. He arrived here on Nov. 30 after filming in Israel.

On "Rambo III," expected to be released next year, Stallone said: "It's about war ... a movie that has a lot of sweat and blood and truth ... and about obedience and dedication."

Stallone spent a week in the northern Thai province of Lamphun working on sequences of Rambo's stint at a monastery. The character enters the monastery after becoming fed up with fighting, but events change that.

## Merv Used Hunch To Select Stars

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Merv Griffin said he uses hunches rather than research, and it paid off when he picked Pat Sajak as host and Vanna White to turn letters in the "Wheel of Fortune" TV game show.

"Vanna's picture was one of 10 on my desk," Griffin said. "I pointed to it and said: 'Her.' Why? Because her head's too big for her body. When you look at her 8-by-10s, her head's so big that all of her features — her mouth, her great big eyes — all stand out. The camera loves her!"

Griffin said he believes the same is true for several stars, including Joan Crawford, Marilyn Monroe and Bette Davis, "although her head's gotten smaller with age. But they all have

heads that are too big for their bodies."

With Sajak, Griffin said he chose the former wisecracking weatherman over plenty of protest.

"We had a terrible battle on our hands until I said 'That's easy: I stop taping 'Wheel of Fortune' until he's on there,'" Griffin said.





# Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel Can Cause Driver To Stop In Tracks

CHESAPEAKE BAY BRIDGE-TUNNEL, Va. — Motorists sometimes freeze with fear, stop their cars and are unable to drive another inch on this 23-mile, two-lane bridge-tunnel complex connecting Virginia's eastern shore with the Norfolk area.

When that happens, a Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel policeman will drive the frightened person the remainder of the way in the motorist's vehicle over and under the waters where Chesapeake Bay meets the Atlantic Ocean.

A Virginia Beach psychologist preparing a scientific paper on the matter is currently interviewing individuals who have experienced the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel phobia.

"It doesn't happen all that often. But we are always on the alert for motorists stopped on the bridge or in the tunnel with the strange anxiety. There are no shoulders on the roadway," said Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel Police Chief James M. Barcroft, 50. "We have to get them off the bridge as quickly as possible so they don't bottle up traffic."

"On rare occasions, a frequent user of the bridge suddenly experiences the phobia and stops, unable to go on. They get this uncanny closed-in feeling."

Barcroft runs one of the most unusual police departments in the nation. Most bridges and tunnels of any length have a patrol force concerned with breakdowns and traffic problems. But Barcroft's 44-man unit works every crime and situation experienced by typical municipal police departments.

This is probably the only bridge in America that operates a police academy.

In the current 12-week session of the fully accredited police school are a dozen cadets for the bridge-tunnel police force as well as 11 rookie deputies from two eastern shore sheriff's departments. The 15 instructors include members of the FBI and Virginia State Police.

Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, built with private funds from a \$200 million bond sale, opened in 1962. It is a major link along the Atlantic coastal highway from Maine to Florida, saving 95 miles and 1 1/2 hours driving.

The 31 patrolmen, four corporals, four sergeants, four lieutenants, a captain and police chief in the bridge-tunnel department contend with murders, robberies, grand larceny, suicides, kidnappings, bank robberies, narcotics, pickpockets — you name it — within their jurisdiction on the bridge-tunnel complex.

"We do it all," said Chief Barcroft, who has worked for the department since its inception 23 years ago. "We have delivered babies, captured kidnappers and bank robbers."

"Every time a bank robbery occurs in nearby cities and towns on either side of the bridge our department is notified immediately. The bridge is a natural roadblock."

He mentioned a recent kidnapping thwarted at a toll gate. "A woman screamed and jumped out of a truck as it came to a stop. She was a kidnapping victim."

"Two armed suspects also leaped from the truck and fled on foot. A manhunt ensued in the woods along the bridge approach right-of-way. One of the suspects was shot and wounded by one of my men. Both suspects were apprehended."

Barcroft's officers arrest the suspects, do the investigation and process the cases through the courts. The bridge doesn't have a jail. Suspects are held in jails on either side of the bridge.

The Police Department is still trying to solve a 9-year-old murder — a headless, handless, footless body of a woman found on one of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel islands.

There are four islands, each 1,500 feet long, 230-feet wide and 30 feet above the mean low water. The man-made islands were constructed in 35 to 45 feet of water to serve as anchors for the two-mile tunnels beneath two major shipping lanes at the mouth of Chesapeake Bay. It is on Sea Gull Island, 3 1/2 miles offshore from Virginia Beach at the south end of the bridge-tunnel, where pickpockets, robbers and narcotics suspects have been arrested. Narcotics have also been found on motorists stopped for speeding.

Sea Gull Island is a popular spot for local fishermen. The Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel may also boast the only public fishing pier as part of a bridge in this country. Nearby residents flock to the 652-foot free fishing pier to catch bass, bonito, bluefish, spot and flounder.

Long-distance travelers will often pause for a couple of hours or more while crossing the bridge to fish as a pleasurable and totally unexpected experience on their trip. The bridge operates a bait and tackle shop at Sea Gull Island, where poles can be rented and bait, line and hooks are sold.

Toll is \$9 each direction. Locals often have car pools sharing in the toll cost to fish off the pier. The bridge operates a restaurant and snack shop on Sea Gull Island as well.

"You think of a bridge and you think it's all concrete and steel. There's a lot more to it than that," said Chief Barcroft, smiling as he recalled an incident during the streaker craze a few years back.

"Our streaker was a passenger on a bus filled with church people that stopped at one of the islands. He stripped off his clothes and ran through the tunnel naked. When one of our officers caught up with him, he insisted: 'The Lord told me to do it.'"

More chickens than people use the bridge-tunnel. Hundreds of thousands of chickens are transported across the bridge each month to two large chicken-processing plants on the eastern shore. Sometimes crates of chickens fly off the trucks causing still another problem for bridge police.

Now and then someone will stop a car and jump from the bridge, committing suicide. There have been weddings on the bridge-tunnel islands and funeral services from the Fishing Pier where ashes have been scattered into the sea.

Tall, silver-haired Lucius J. Kellam Jr., 76, chairman of the 11-member Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel Commission since the inception of the complex, was a driving force for the project, called one of the great engineering feats of this century.

Kellam continues to oversee the operation of the transportation facility.

"Plans are to pay off the bonds by the year 2000," he said. "As traffic on the bridge continues to increase more and more each year, we think of expansion. We are considering constructing an identical parallel two-lane bridge-tunnel complex. They tell me to do it today will cost in the neighborhood of \$1 billion."

Crewmen on bridge tow trucks have unusual jobs. The wreckers are parked on islands ready for action. Tow truck drivers like John Wilson, 36, also do a lot of walking.

"We alternate two hours on the tow truck, two hours walking through the tunnel, two hours back on the truck, two hours back in the tunnel," Wilson said.

It takes two hours to patrol the tunnel on foot, walking one mile from one end to the other, then a mile back again along a narrow walkway four feet above the traffic lanes.

"As we walk through the tunnel we observe traffic to make sure it's flowing properly. There is a phone every 50 feet. If there is a breakdown or an accident, I call it in and tow trucks and police units respond immediately."

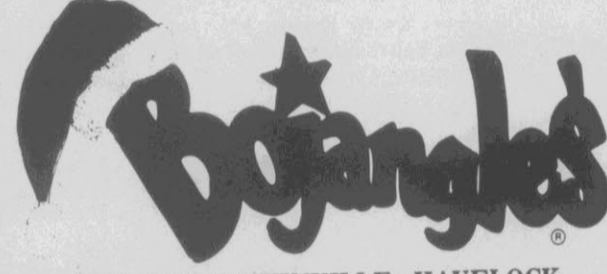

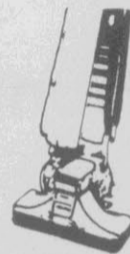

# Town Has It Big When Yule Arrives

CHRISTMAS, Fla. (AP) — Most people think of this citrus town only during the holidays, when visitors come for a special postmark on their yuletide mail.

But residents of this unincorporated hamlet in central Florida, who celebrate the town's sesquicentennial this weekend, say they have something special year-round.

Christmas was named for a frontier fort built by infantry troops on Christmas Day 150 years ago. Fort Christmas burned down after a few years, but in 1975, the county commissioned a \$100,000 reconstruction of the fort and dedicated it two years later.

Many of Christmas' 3,700 residents descend from a few families of cattle ranchers and farmers who homesteaded the area after the Seminole

Indians moved south in the 1800s.

"When I moved here, everybody was related by blood or marriage," said Juanita Tucker, a Christmas resident since 1932. Her husband, Cecil, is a descendant of one of the first Christmas families.

Daisy Nettles Yates Tanner, 81, is related by blood or marriage to four of the area's first eight families.

"I've traveled all over the world, and this is the best place to live," she said.

A highway sign outside Christmas touts the town as the place where the holiday spirit of love and good will is practiced "every day in the year."

"We try to foster the pioneer spirit of neighborliness and community," Mrs. Tucker said. "They (Christmas residents) are real good about helping other people."

# Amish Find Home

(Continued from C-1)

The rules seem arbitrary to outsiders. But Uriel Miller says each has an explanation.

"Our main reason for avoiding driving cars would be to preserve our families from too easy access to influences that would be detrimental to our religion and our church life," he says.

"There are groups that have cars. But there's a tendency to get into more mischief..." Uriel Miller, 50, came from a 100-family settlement in Guthrie, Ky., where most N.C. Amish lived.

They chose Yadkin County because of its moderate climate and high-yielding soil and because the state allowed its Christian school.

"It's not uncommon for a group to strike out," says Uriel Miller. "We feel when a group gets too large or a group of young people gets too large, it's too hard to maintain a proper spiritual atmosphere."

"In a small group, there's more closeness."

That closeness is what drew David Miller back.

Now he lives in a rented house about a mile from Uriel Miller, the man he calls his second father even though the two aren't related. Uriel Miller, like other Amish pastors, was selected by lot. That way, the Amish say, God does the choosing.

In Uriel Miller, he chose a man with sun-reddened cheeks and forearms the size of 2 x 4s.

His black beard hangs 4 inches from his chin. His mustache, considered soldier's symbol, is shaved.

"We realize we're here temporarily and our main concern is to lead a life that is God-fearing and to teach and bring up our children in this way," he says. So their children attend the Whispering Pines Christian Day School, which is registered with the state and meets its health and testing requirements.

Twenty children attend the two-room school with outdoor toilets.

The first through eighth graders sit in unmatched desks in one room. A bookshelf holds 11 paper back King James Bibles.

Tacked above the chalkboard is a cardboard placard with students' names: Naomi, Nevin, Luke, Abner, Rachel, Verna and Benueel.

The day begins at 8:30 a.m. at Yoder's Market, when Rosanna Yoder rings the copper cowbell on her desk.

Her father, Samuel Yoder, runs the general store down the road.

Tourists flock to Yoder's Country Market.

They eye the 5-pound, \$10 German chocolate cakes slathered with sticky coconut frosting.

They buy miniature shoofly pies, oatmeal bread, fried apple pies, pints of apple butter and homemade grape jelly packed in Jif peanut butter jars.

Yoder and his daughters stock the worn shelves and sell Amish hats and Christian coloring books. But most Amish work traditional jobs after the eighth grade.

Women and girls bake at home in ovens that hold 24 loaves of bread.

"We believe in and we encourage all our people to teach children to work — responsibility — to provide work for our children at home," says Uriel Miller.

"Industry is Virtue" says a sign on one Amish barn.

While the women bake, the men build or farm.

They wear their work on their faces — the men and the boys tanned, freckled and sturdy from hoisting and hammering outdoors — the women and girls pale after baking and minding their children.

"Our main concern is to lead a life that is in accord with Scripture, with the Bible," says Uriel Miller.

And, so, each family begins its week with three hours in church.

They open the Sunday morning

devotion with Pennsylvania Dutch hymns. Each minister preaches a sermon in the same musical language, unless outsiders are visiting. Then, at least one minister reads in English. In the services that rotate from home to home, the men sit up front.

Next are the boys, their feet dangling from kitchen chairs. And then the single men.

The girls follow. Behind them are two rows of single women.

The married women come next, cradling infants or bridling toddlers.

And finally, on sofas pushed against a back wall, the most comfortable seats, sit the community's five oldest women.

Each woman wears an identical long-sleeved pleated dress in deep brown or green or shades of blue.

While Uriel Miller emphasizes the Amish desire for privacy, he welcomes visitors to his church.

"We find it a privilege to witness to people about our faith and our faith in God, but we don't look for, nor do we appreciate, just being a gazing stock," he says.

They share their religion, he says, because it's all they have.

"Worldly ambitions come to an end sooner or later," he says.

This is the life for David Miller, the modern-day prodigal son.

It meant surrendering his stereo and his pickup.

It meant trading his truck and his Levis for his buggy of plywood and oilcloth and his royal blue broadfalls — button-top pants Amish men wear.

And still, a year later, David Miller says he's happy.

"Just to get that back — back in their good graces — that was good," he says of his family. "My life wasn't going anywhere."

"I felt like I could never trust a girl from out there enough to marry her because they have such a low esteem of marriage. They thought if it didn't work out, there was always divorce. I felt like coming here and getting a Christian girl would help me."

"I know how it is on both sides. And there comes a point when you have to choose."

# Blind Spaniards Boost Their Image By Catering To Lust For Gambling

MADRID, Spain (AP) — They stand on street corners, recognizable by their white canes and the lottery tickets looped around their necks. In the 50 years since they started, they have become as much a national figure in Spain as bullfighters.

They are members of the National Organization of Blind Spaniards, formed during the Spanish Civil War to find jobs for the indigent blind.

In the past few years, the organization has become an economic powerhouse, fueled by revenues from the lottery tickets its people sell in the streets.

It is more commonly known as ONCE, the acronym derived from its name in Spanish and by coincidence the Spanish word for eleven, was the brainchild of a group of blind civilians who found the Spaniards' passion for gambling a way to give jobs, training and dignity to the blind in the bitter winter of 1938.

But ONCE's skyrocketing fortunes over the last four years have surpassed even the most optimistic hopes of its pioneers.

"In the long run, the idea of the lottery was to provide funds to train the blind," said Francisco Gutierrez, 76, a founder and the organization's first national director.

"We set up the lottery as an attempt to eliminate the factors that made it necessary."

But while ONCE has succeeded in educating Spain's blind and changed public stereotypes about them, it has by no means phased itself out of existence.

The organization spent the equivalent of \$4.5 million this fall on an advertising campaign aimed at increasing by 20 percent the \$1.5 billion the lottery earned in 1986. It offered a weekly grand prize of 100 million pesetas (\$880,000) in addition to the daily prizes of up to \$80,000 in pesetas — far in excess of the 2.5

pesetas it offered as the prize in 1938.

ONCE's 18,500 ticket sellers — 13,000 of them blind and the rest physically handicapped — earn an average monthly salary of \$1,100, which is well above the government-decreed \$415 national monthly minimum wage.

According to Gutierrez, a retired physical therapist who was left sightless by a childhood eye infection, the change since Dec. 13, 1938, when ONCE began the lottery, has been enormous.

"In those days, if you didn't have a family with money you had to beg in the streets," he said. "Around 90 percent of the blind population was illiterate then."

The organization's recent economic leap from earnings of \$348 million in 1982 to \$1.4 billion four years later was engineered by a group of young, blind professionals who swept aside the old guard and transformed ONCE from a modest institution into a major political and economic force.

"The takeoff was logical," said an ONCE spokesman, Juan Gonzalez. "The group elected in 1982 was younger and more dynamic with lots of new ideas. Before then, ONCE was run by very conservative, very elderly gentlemen."

Said founder Gutierrez, who is now involved in the fight for better pensions for ONCE's 12,000 retirees: "The boys who run the organization today were educated in our schools. They are the new blind who don't

have to go around playing music in the streets."

ONCE's success is due in large part to gambling's being a way of life in Spain even before 1763, when the Marquis of Esquilache, King Carlos III's economy minister, introduced the state-run lottery.

According to government figures, Spaniards spent \$20 billion on legal

gambling last year. Spain trails only the United States and the Philippines for the distinction of the world's top gambling countries.

Slot machines alone, legalized in 1977 after a 53-year ban and now found in nearly every Spanish bar, earned \$9.9 billion last year, followed by the state-run lotteries, bingo parlors and ONCE.

# Checkers Champion Reins Quietly Without A Peer

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Some may scoff at checkers as a game of children and old men, but Marion Tinsley smiles and says there is often a great deal of complexity lurking beneath what first appears to be quiet, unassuming and simple.

An accomplished mathematician, Tinsley is the undisputed king of checkers.

"Every good checker player needs to be able to play blindfolded," said Tinsley, who can use that technique to play games on up to 20 different boards at the same time.

The Encyclopedia of Checkers says this of him: "Marion Tinsley is to checkers what Leonardo da Vinci

was to science, what Michelangelo was to art and what Beethoven was to music."

Tinsley is ill at ease with that praise. To fend it off, he quotes the Jewish historian Josephus as saying, "Greeks have a high regard for form, but no regard for the truth." He prefers the latter.

Gently spoken, the 60-year-old professor of higher mathematics at Florida A&M University is tall and thin with a courtly manner, not the sort of fellow you would expect to carry a nickname like "Two-Ton." Tinsley, the ruthless world champion of checkers who successfully defended his title in August in Petal, Miss. "It's deceptive," he said of

checkers. "The rules in checkers are simple so the untutored mind naturally assumes it is simple to play as well."

But, as in math, number systems with the simplest rules turn out to be the most complex, he said.

For that reason, Tinsley said checkers is actually more complicated than chess, which has more extensive rules. And checker players use only half of the 64-space board on which both games are played.

If chess is like playing a game on an open field, Tinsley says checkers is looking into a deep well. That is because a checkers player has to look ahead of the game and see all possible moves in order to counter an opponent's move.

"I have to analyze and look ahead 15 or 20 moves and consider nearly all the possibilities," he said. "I just can't pick it out by judgment. The player who can look two moves ahead will beat one who looks only one move ahead."

Tinsley, whose IQ was tested above the genius level when he was a child, entered Ohio State University at 15 after skipping four grades. It was there that he found a book on checkers and mastered the game, mainly to keep from getting beaten by other family members.

"I was well-conditioned to losing and I hated to lose," said Tinsley. "I found the book and said, 'Oh, revenge.'"

The study paid off. In about 30 years, Tinsley has lost four games.

He has successfully defended the title seven times since 1955. He retired from the tournament circuit in 1958 when he came to Tallahassee and relinquished the title. He returned to competition in 1970, recaptured the title in 1975 and has held it since.

He defeated his best student, Don Lafferty of Kentucky, in a best-of-40-games match that lasted two weeks in August.

Tinsley still lives a quiet life in his two-story house on a hilltop. Currently on sabbatical, he is looking for-

ward to retiring from the university and spending his time with mathematical research and his checkers. But mainly he wants to continue his church work.

Tinsley is deeply religious and has preached at two Tallahassee churches. One of his fondest wishes is to spend at least part of his retirement in a traveling, tent-revival ministry.

A bachelor, Tinsley said he planned to keep on playing checkers as long as he felt healthy enough to continue. He points to Asa Long, considered the grand master of checkers, who is 84 years old and still competing in tournaments.

# Students At Small School Miss Their Prom But Get Plenty Of Attention

STONY FORK, Tenn. (AP) — There are no proms, pep rallies or football games at the state's smallest school, tucked in the coal-mining reaches of East Tennessee.

But what Stony Fork School lacks in the usual extras is offset by a closeness among students and the extra attention that comes when seven teachers are assigned to 82 students from kindergarten through the 12th grade, some say.

and development office, said she knew of no other public, comprehensive school with an enrollment smaller than Stony Fork. There are 1,600 schools in the state's system, she said.

Some teachers said the small size and remoteness of the school foster good traits in the students.

"Other kids seem to take for granted things these kids don't," said Suzanne Sharp, a special education teacher. "I wouldn't want to trade this school for anything else."

Perry said more of the school's students are entering some type of college nowadays, but some students and others find the quieter mountain scenario and the familiar circle of friends to their liking and plan to stay.

After graduation, 16-year-old Keith said he'll stay in the region because there is "no way I'm moving across the mountain. There's too many people over there."

"Over here, you can just step up in the woods and hunt," he said.

"My students are like a part of me," said Alice Ford, who teaches home economics at the Campbell County school. "I can tell about them just like my own."

The small, brick school sits on Cross Mountain — one of the steepest rises outside of the Great Smoky Mountains — and serves tiny, former coal mining camps such as Pee Wee, Round Rock and Beech Fork.

The nearest supermarket is a 45-minute drive away.

At times, state officials have discussed busing the students to a larger school, but driving a busload of children over the mountain would be too hair-raising, and so the plan has never become reality, said Hugh Perry, the school's principal.

"It would be ludicrous," especially in winter, he said. "This road across the mountain is just one lane. In January and February, the top's froze over."

Teachers resort to four-wheel-drive vehicles to get to work those months, he said.

Anna Blackmon, of the state Education Department's research

Ms. Sharp said she was surprised to learn that many children do not watch television because of poor reception, religious convictions and other reasons.

Sondra Raines, who teaches sixth, seventh and eighth grades, said she appreciates the students because "there are no discipline problems."

The students spend some of their free time hunting, looking for wild ginseng in the woods and riding around the mountain on dirt bikes, but much of their free time is spent on work such as chopping wood, pulling weeds and housecleaning, said Ms. Ford.

"I try not to give a lot of homework because these kids work at home," she said. "They just don't go in and sit down."

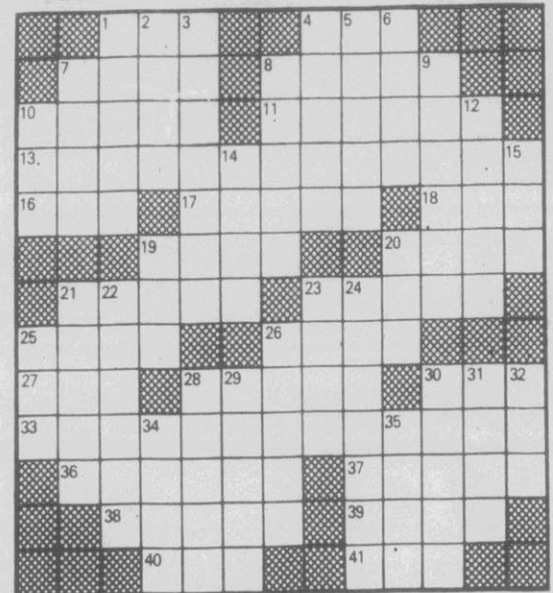

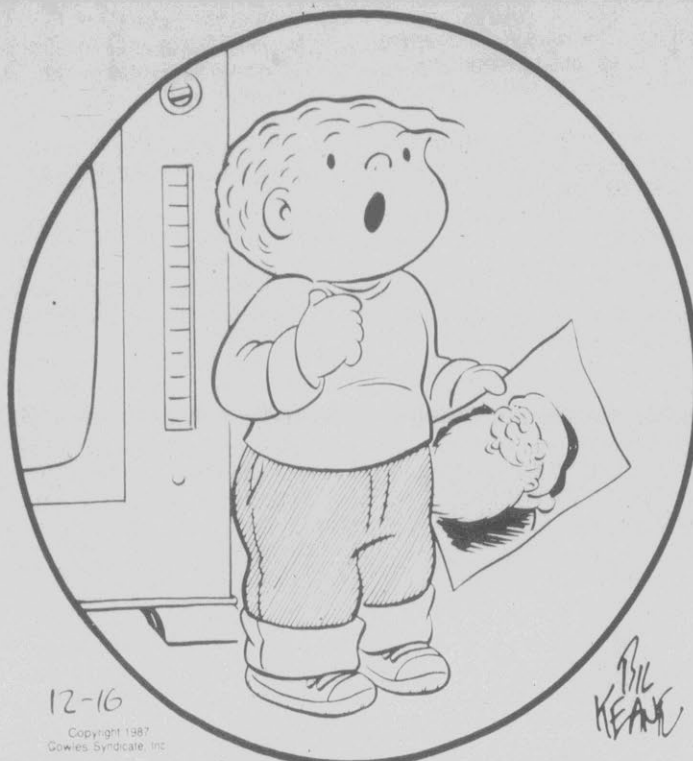

player in the history of the game. But if you ask any of the *cognoscenti* about who is the greatest duplicate player, the result would be unanimous—the late Barry Crane.

Before his tragic death, Crane had won more pair titles than any other half-dozen players combined, including the World Mixed Pairs with Kerri Shuman. This hand, from that event, shows vividly the combination of skill and luck that earned Crane his reputation.

He arrived at a contract of three no trump after an auction that was duplicated at most tables in the room. The difference is that, while others were struggling for nine tricks, Crane coasted home with 11.

After a diamond opening lead, most declarers led a heart to their hand to make sure of an entry. Not Crane. At trick two, he banged out the king of clubs. When West chose

to hold up, Crane continued with the jack of clubs. That tempted East into covering with the queen, and declarer had set up his club suit with the loss of only one trick! He was already way ahead of the field. When West chose to continue with a diamond, declarer overtook dummy's queen with his ace and returned the nine to force out the ten and set up his diamonds. All that remained was to win the spade return with the ace, cash out the minor suits and take a winning heart finesse for two tricks more than the field.

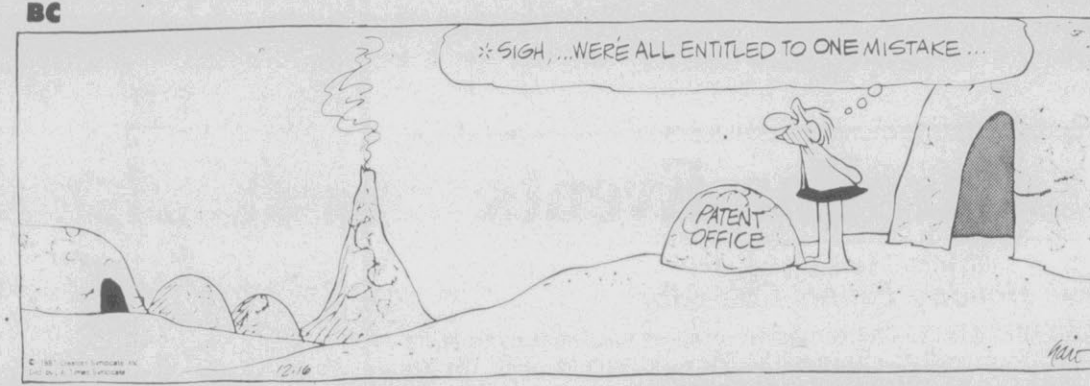
Yes, Crane benefited from a poor

play by East when he covered the jack of clubs. But he had already won the battle over the field when he elected to go after clubs at trick two rather than lead a heart to his hand.

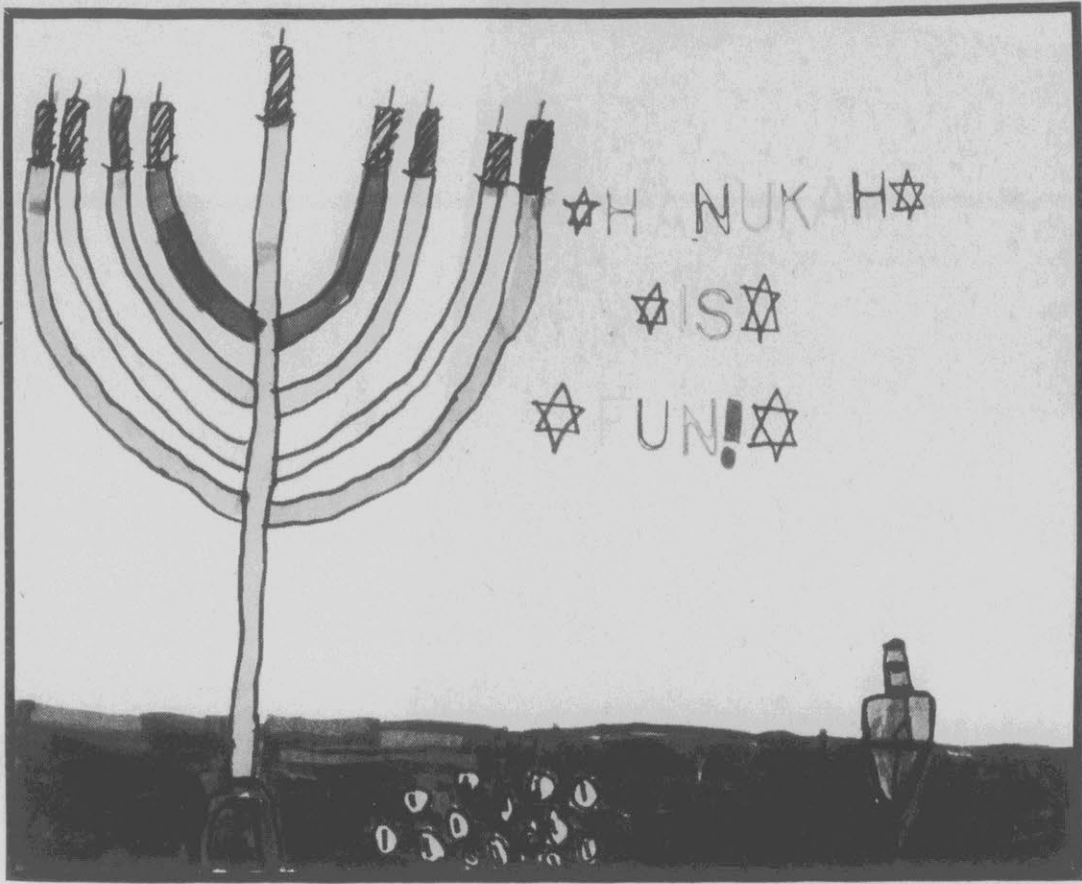

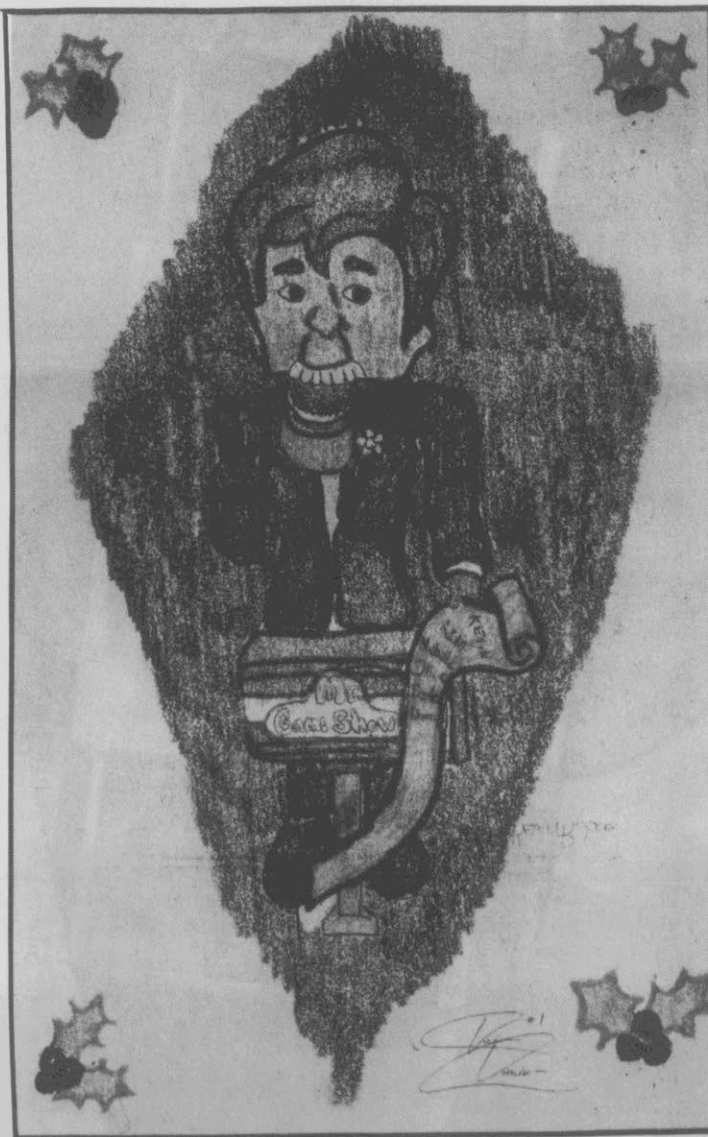

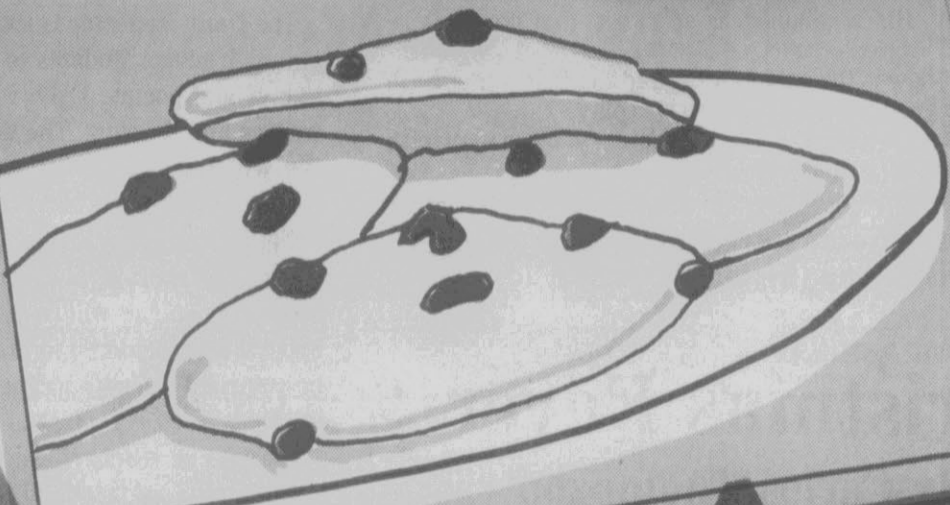

## Uncle Sam Goes Food Shopping For The Holidays

WASHINGTON — Shopping for your family during the holidays may seem like feeding an army. Think again. Think about Uncle Sam.

He does feed the Army, not to mention the Navy, the Air Force, the Marines and the Coast Guard — whether on aircraft carriers or submarines, in dining halls, veterans hospitals or commissaries.

This year's holiday shopping list — and just for troop dining halls in Europe and the Middle East — includes:

- 12,600 pounds fruitcake
- 243,000 pounds cranberry sauce
- 421,000 pounds sweet potatoes
- 7,500 pounds hard candy

This doesn't take into consideration the 4.1 million tons of holiday food that were shipped overseas to be sold in commissaries throughout Europe and the Middle East, or the groceries for domestic troops.

And while you might plan your shopping list a day or two before you go to the store, Uncle Sam has to order for his Thanksgiving and Christmas larder by late spring.

Whether it's during the holidays or the rest of the year, peacetime or wartime, the logistics of feeding the military are more complicated than

staging a Bob Hope special in the Persian Gulf.

The U.S. government is probably the largest single buyer of food in the world, feeding more than 9 million people daily at a cost of \$5 billion annually.

Given the immensity of this task, the military's reputation, when it comes to defense spending and the service's lengthy lists of rules, specifications and acronyms, it's a wonder that anybody gets fed. In fact, the distribution network has so many tentacles that even the individuals entangled in it don't always agree how it operates.

Command central is located at the Defense Personnel Support Center (DPSC), a barracks-like complex in South Philadelphia that covers 11 city blocks. Aside from its responsibility for food ("subsistence" in military parlance), DPSC buys medical supplies and clothes, houses the nation's only government-owned military-clothing facility and operates a lab that tests everything from the bullet resistance of helmets to the durability of GI boots.

Worldwide, there are about 1,700 individuals involved in buying, managing and transporting food for the military. Some work in the 23

## Southern Cooking Has Rich Tradition

It is no surprise that a large number of important regional cookbooks in the market today should center around the South, where America's great cooking began and continued through even its bleakest period after the Civil War.

The proud Southern cooks who have paid homage to fine Southern American cuisine are some of the big names in the food world — Craig Claiborne, author and former food critic for the New York Times, Camille Glenn, one of Kentucky's favorite cooking teachers and food journalist, and Nathalie Dupree, Atlanta cooking school teacher and television personality.

"Craig Claiborne's Southern Cook-

ing," by Craig Claiborne (Times Books; \$19.95, 364 pages).

The book, which would make a fine holiday gift for cooks who really cook, is a personal compendium of Southern recipes from Claiborne's past and present. There are authentic Southern recipes from his own mother's boarding-house kitchen in Mississippi, such as fried chicken, field peas, collard greens, fresh corn on the cob, sliced tomato with vinaigrette sauce, and home-baked pecan pie topped with vanilla ice cream. Recipes from the repertoires of famous modern Southern chefs are also included; among the examples are yellow bell pepper and Serrano chili soup, halibut fillets with mango and basil sauce.

Because Southern cooking spans Cajun, Creole and Tex-Mex cuisines,

the book is richly laden with recipes from the sub-regional cuisines, such as Cajun-style gumbo, blanched crawfish tails, tamale pie and flour tortillas, as well as the refined Southern recipes that can be traced to their French influences when the South was in its infancy.

"The Heritage of Southern Cooking," by Camille Glenn (Workman Publishing; \$14.95 paperback, 480 pages, illustrated.)

Camille Glenn, who was raised in the kitchen of her parents' Kentucky country inn and taught gourmet cooking for 29 years while writing for the Louisville Courier, is lucky to have had a family who were "terribly interested in superb food."

Her cookbook reflects the pride and dedication to a cuisine that encompasses her experiences. There are 550 recipes representing a culinary tour of Southern cuisine culled from a vast number of recipes

gathered while traveling and living in Charleston, New Orleans, Virginia, Maryland and Washington, the Carolinas, Georgia and Alabama.

There is Chesapeake Bay oyster stew, New Orleans Remoulade rouge, Deep South red beans and rice, Louisiana crab meat and shrimp stuffing, Kentucky beer cheese, North Carolina Moravian sugar cake, among hundreds of other authentic Southern specialties.

Not that there are no deviations from the authentic. A cornmeal puff pastry was an outgrowth of the teaching of puff pastry preparation. "A little cornmeal gives the puff pastry large dimension, especially if used as turnovers for cocktail parties," said Glenn during a recent interview. Cornmeal also figures in a Melba bread that Glenn created because she wanted something to serve with country ham, butter and cheese.

Q. We have been wondering about the theory that eating oatmeal can lower your blood cholesterol. Can you tell us something about it? Ms. M.A.B., Greenville.

A. It's great to hear good things about foods we like to eat. Many folks grew up eating oatmeal and have pleasant associations with it. But, it's not a magic cure for high cholesterol. Even so, I do encourage people with high cholesterol to eat more oats. Patients who have elevated blood cholesterol levels need to examine their diets, and generally, make several dietary changes. First, if they are overweight, I try to help them find ways to bring their weight down. Most people find that increasing their dietary fiber (and that can include eating cereals like oatmeal), helps them lose weight. Next, it's very important for people with high blood cholesterol to eat less fat. I ask patients to read food package labels and eat less of foods with saturated fats (animal fats) and cholesterol. Then, I encourage them to eat more apples and more oat containing foods.

There is good evidence that reducing body weight and saturated fat intake can lower blood cholesterol levels for many people. So, I strongly encourage patients to follow those eating patterns. But, the evidence about how oatmeal works is just beginning to emerge. As you said, it's a "theory." I am convinced from the research that some patients already following a lower fat diet might get some extra benefit from eating oatmeal and more fruit, so I make that recommendation. I believe it might help and it won't hurt to eat oat foods.

The theory works something like this. Soluble fibers in fruit and in oatmeal are thought to lower blood cholesterol. These types of fiber form a gel and when moving through the intestine the gel is thought to interfere with the metabolism of cholesterol. In the human studies that showed oatmeal to be effective, the patients were already on a low fat diet. The amounts of oatmeal they were fed varied in the studies. I have seen reports that say it takes 2 ounces of oatmeal (that's about 2 cups of cooked oatmeal or about two muffins) to lower cholesterol. Other reports suggest it takes up to 4 to 7 bowls of oatmeal or four to six muffins per day before a lowering effect is seen. So, right now we don't really know how much it takes.

You probably have seen advertising claims made for oatmeal. The food companies can point to enough studies that support their claims to allow the ads. But remember, just because you heard it in an ad doesn't mean it will work for everyone.

It doesn't matter if it is the old fashioned, quick cooking or instant oatmeal. However, if you are watching your sodium intake, remember instant oatmeal has about 300 milligrams of sodium per 1 ounce dried cereal. If you are making muffins or breads or other baked goods with oatmeal, you want to use corn or safflower or canola or other vegetable oil in making them. If you buy them already made, avoid baked goods with ingredient labels that read hydrogenated shortening or coconut or palm oil. If you tire of oatmeal, we counted at least 18 different ready-to-eat available in Greenville markets that have oats in them.

Many magazines have run recipes using oatmeal. And, naturally, Quaker Oats Consumer Affairs Center, Chicago, Ill., 60654 will be happy to send you recipe booklets if you write and ask.

## CORN AND OYSTER CHOWDER

The secret to success when you prepare this quick and easy soup is keeping the heat low. This guarantees the soup's velvety smooth texture.

- 1 10-ounce package frozen cut corn
- 1/2-pound leeks, cut into 1/2-inch slices (1 1/2 cups)
- 1 teaspoon instant chicken bouillon granules
- 1/8 teaspoon white pepper
- Dash salt
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 cups milk
- 5 slices process Swiss cheese, cut in small pieces
- 28-ounce cans whole oysters
- Fresh chives
- Julienne of red pepper

In a 3-quart saucepan, combine corn, leeks, bouillon granules, white pepper, salt, bay leaf and 3/4 cup water. Bring to a boil; reduce heat. Cover and simmer over medium heat for 6 to 8 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender. Do not drain. Stir in milk. Cook and stir over low heat for 2 to 3 minutes or until milk is heated through. Stir in undrained oysters. Heat through. Remove bay leaf. Ladle into individual serving bowls. Garnish with chives and red pepper.

## SWEET POTATO AND CARROT BUNDLES

You're able to dazzle guests with these eye-catching vegetable packages that can be assembled ahead and stored tightly wrapped in the refrigerator until minutes before dinner. At serving time, dip each bundle in the egg-and-herb mixture and bake as directed below. Go ahead, let your guests believe you fussed!

- 2 medium sweet potatoes
- 2 large carrots, peeled and cut into julienne
- 3 medium parsnips, peeled and cut into julienne
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
- 1 teaspoon dried marjoram, crushed or
- 1 tablespoon snipped fresh marjoram
- 1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger root
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 10 to 12, 8-inch chives or green onion tops, blanched

Cook sweet potatoes covered, in enough boiling salted water to cover for 30 to 35 minutes or until tender around the outer edges but slightly firm in center. When cool enough to handle, peel potatoes and cut into julienne. Meanwhile, cook carrots and parsnips in enough boiling salted water to cover for 10 to 12 minutes or until tender. Drain and cool.

To assemble, in medium bowl gently toss together cooked sweet potatoes, carrots and parsnips. In small bowl combine eggs, melted butter, gingerroot, marjoram, salt and pepper. Working with one portion of the julienne mixture at a time, form a bundle about 1-inch in diameter. Gently tie bundle together with one chive or green onion. Holding chive securely in place, dip bundle into egg mixture till well-coated. Place on greased baking sheet. Repeat with remaining julienne mixture and chives. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes or till set. Makes 10 to 12 side-dish servings.

## HOLIDAY CAULIFLOWER AND LINGUINE

To shave minutes when you prepare this dish, omit the bundle-making step with the pasta and layer the pasta in the bottom of the dish. Spoon the saucy cauliflower topper in the center — heat and serve as directed below.

- 1 small head cauliflower cut into flowerets
- 9 ounces fresh spinach linguine
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
- Dash nutmeg
- 2 cups light cream or milk
- 1/4 cup and 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup snipped parsley
- 1/4 cup cooked and crumbled bacon

Cook cauliflower in enough water to cover for 15-20 minutes or till just tender; drain. Cook pasta according to package directions; drain into a colander. Immediately toss with the cooking oil. Meanwhile, in a 3-quart saucepan cook the garlic in the butter or margarine for 1 to 2 minutes. Stir in the flour, salt, white pepper and nutmeg. Add the light cream all at once. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened and bubbly. Cook and stir 1 minute more. Stir in the cauliflower until well coated with sauce.

To assemble, toss together cooked pasta and 1/4 cup of the Parmesan cheese. Slowly twirl a portion of pasta onto a long-tined fork into a greased 2 1/2-quart oval baking dish or shallow casserole. Repeat with the remaining pasta, forming a circle of nests around outer rim of dish. Spoon cauliflower mixture into center of pasta ring. Sprinkle parsley, crumbled bacon and the remaining 2 tablespoons of Parmesan cheese on top of cauliflower mixture. Cover and bake in a 350 degree oven about 20 minutes or until heated through. Makes 8 to 10 side-dish servings.

2 cups whipping cream  
1/4 cup powdered sugar

Sprinkle sides of cake with remaining 1/2 cup ground hazelnuts. Place remaining cream in pastry bag with decorative tip and make crisscross pattern on top and rosettes around outer edge of cake. 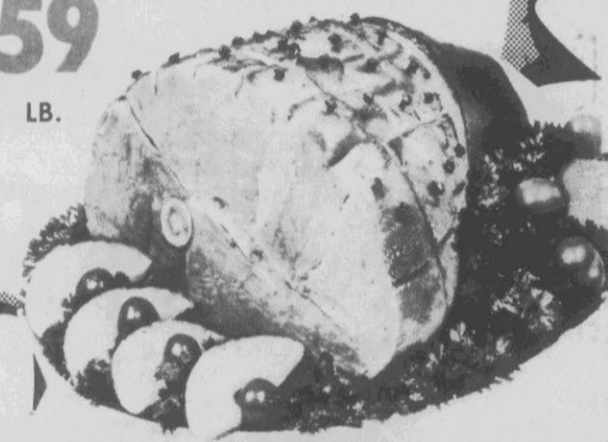

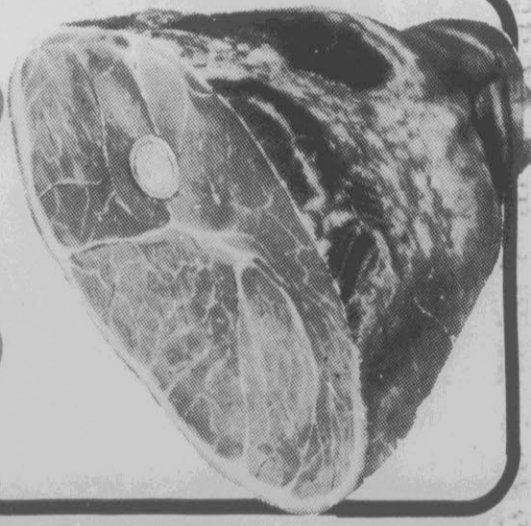

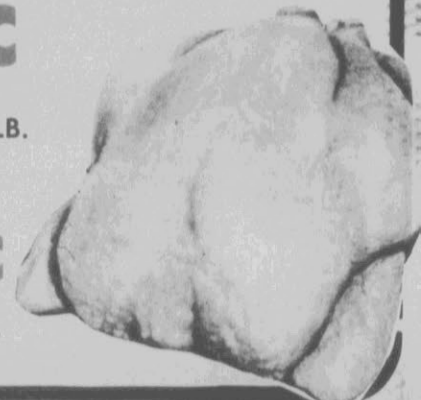

warehouses in this country, buying fresh fruits and vegetables and storing frozen foods, or are employed in the four storage facilities that warehouse semi-perishables such as flour and sugar.

At the Philadelphia facility, about 650 employees are involved in procuring food, whether it's dehydrated, freeze-dried, frozen or canned.

Somebody has to buy condiments in self-serve packets — that's Judy Nordone. Nordone, who also buys eggs for the East Coast, has a map of the continental United States tacked on her bulletin board that delineates her egg-buying territory. Other procurement agents specialize in such items as turkeys or canned green beans.

DPSC receives orders by computer directly from its customers all over the world. If the items are not stocked, the orders go to the procurement division. Written solicitations are then sent to companies that have expressed an interest in selling, proposals are returned and DPSC chooses a bidder.

If the items are already in stock, the orders are sent to one of the country's 27 storage locations, which in turn deliver the frozen or semi-perishables to the customer. Milk, dairy products and eggs are supplied by direct delivery.

Similar to stockpiling arms, buying food for the military involves keeping a production base alive during peacetime in the event of war. In other words, the government buys a lot of food that it doesn't currently need. In 1987, for example, DPSC bought 516 million ready-to-eat meals at a cost of \$172 million.

The rations, which have about a six-year shelf life, are stored in underground caves and above-ground warehouses around the world. They are rotated and used for field exercises prior to expiration.

The government buys food from both small and large companies, according to A.E. Cardone, assistant chief of contracting and production. Del Monte and Green Giant help feed the troops and Pillsbury supplies the bulk of the military's flour.

Not surprisingly, whatever DPSC buys has to be grown, manufactured or packaged in America. No items may be purchased from communist countries, either, so military personnel in Europe can't buy Czechoslovakian hams in their local commissaries.

The buy-American regulation is bent only when it comes to buying highly perishable items, such as milk, for overseas units. (Nevertheless, commissaries in Turkey do sell Philadelphia Cream Cheese — airlifted because of its perishability. Most of the food for overseas goes by sea.)

The government often sets tedious specifications for food packaging, due to the need for durable containers to withstand shipping stresses, the heat of a desert or prolonged shelf life. Jellies, jams, cake mixes — even bacon — come in a can, particularly necessary for Navy vessels where glass containers are obviously impractical.

The food itself must often adhere to rigid guidelines. Two years ago, to make a point about how overspecification contributes to America's military procurement problems, Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., told the Senate about the military's requirements for fruitcake contractors.

The recipe included instructions that the candied pineapple be in quarter-inch chunks, the shortening have the stability "of not less than 100 hours" and that the cooled cake, "bisected" horizontally or vertically with a sharp knife, "shall not crumble nor show any compression streaks, gummy centers, soggy areas, be excessively dry or over-processed and display an even grain structure throughout."

So that a serviceman might have coffee with his cake, taste-testers at the Army's research lab in Natick, Mass., conducted tastings to determine the military's uniform blend for the 7 million pounds that is purchased annually (none of it decaffeinated).

Tasters at the lab also help DPSC award bids for items such as pie fillings, soup and gravy mixes and dehydrated soups.

On this particular day, a DPSC staffer is packaging samples of salad dressings from competing companies to ship to the Natick lab. The six samples each of creamy Italian and Thousand Island dressings ("We don't call it Russian," joked Tom Lydon, chief of DPSC's Depot Stock Section), are marked with A, B, C and so on for blind tasting. After the pass-fail results come back, the dressing buyer in Philadelphia will award the contract to the company with a "pass" product at the lowest cost.

As is to be expected for a buyer with political purse strings, the subsistence division gets calls "all the time" from members of Congress who want the agency to buy products from their constituents, according to Cardone.

Cardone says that DPSC may help the constituent get on the mailing list for solicitations or will call the company and explain how to participate in the program. But when it comes to awarding contracts, Cardone said that the low bidder gets the award.

Nor are food specifications driven by politics, according to Cardone.

"You would think there would be much more," he said, "but there aren't."

During the Carter administration, Cardone recalls, troop-issue specifications for ground beef were altered to include less-costly soy protein.

Servicemen with flight status or those stationed in submarines still get pure ground beef, however — and not because of politics. According to

George Dunkin, chief of DPSC's meat section, soy protein in combination with rapid changes in depth or altitude causes flatulence.

Across the street from a supermarket chain's warehouses in Landover, Md., is the local food warehouse, or Defense Subsistence Office (DSO) for the Washington area, responsible for supplying about 50 military installations and commissaries, from Andrews Air Force

Base to the Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

The local DSO receives and stores chilled and frozen foods, such as meats, that have been ordered through DPSC. Two produce buyers purchase fresh fruits and vegetables daily from Washington wholesale markets. Records and bills for all purchases are sent by computer to Philadelphia.

A recent morning's expedition

yielded about 125 different produce items, ranging from 601 cases of bananas to one case of Japanese eggplant.

Eight Army food inspectors work full-time at the warehouse, inspecting the food to make sure it is the correct size, shape and quantity. In fact, the military may eat some of the country's most highly scrutinized groceries.

Landover's inspection room is

equipped with an egg candler to test for blood spots and other internal egg defects, a microwave to check the texture of frozen vegetables and a deep-fat fryer to ensure that frozen-fish portions don't "warp" or curl when fried.

At a Ft. Belvoir, Va., dining hall, SP-4 Josia Borom, 20, tall, lean and hungry, sits down to a dinner of a hamburger on a roll, slathered with condiments.

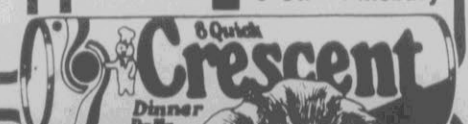

Her loyalties, however, remain Southern. "I've studied at the Cordon Bleu, taught a lot of French pastry, but I am a Southern cook first," she said.

The cakes in the book are typically Southern. A chocolate pound cake is beautiful and freezes well, to boot. Southern breads, such as an orange and apricot bread, are served typically at receptions or as a late night snack, never with meals.

"New Southern Cooking," by Nathalie Dupree (Alfred A. Knopf; \$18.95, 345 pages).

Nathalie Dupree could be said to represent the new breed Southern cook and this, her second book on Southern cooking, proves it. A cooking teacher at Rich's Cooking School in Atlanta, where she lives, as well as a television cook, Dupree offers 350 recipes representing both tradition and innovation, most of it reflecting the way Southerners cook today.

You get the feeling thumbing through the book, that of meeting her Southern neighbors: Jewell Hoefer's Brown Sugar Pound Cake, Billy's Baked Shad, Cicero's Sauteed Shad Strips, Barbara Persons' Marinated Shrimp and Scallops. There is also a sort of teatime, gossipy introduction of some of the recipes that is equally captivating. "When my friends the Bentleys and I grilled a duck one day, it occurred to us to use duck fat rather than traditional streak-o-lean in cooking these peas, and my goodness, are they good this way."

Or, "Like Shirley Corriher's grandmother, Kate doesn't measure her flour and is particular about using White Lily Flour and Crisco," Dupree writes when introducing a recipe for sweet-milk biscuits. It's the sort of homey, intimate book that makes you want to get the neighbors together for a kaffeeklatsch or start cooking Southern.

"Getting Better All The Time," by Liz Carpenter (Simon & Schuster; \$17.95, 304 pages). A reflection on the life experiences of a veteran journalist from Texas who was aide to Lyndon Johnson and press secretary to Lady Bird Johnson may not have anything to do with cooking, but when you see recipes stuck smack in the middle of the pages, you know you are in Texas territory and the recipes are real.

Aunt Lucille's Green Grape Cobbler, Faires Sutherland's Fried Fish, Bob Lee and John D. Sutherland's Cabrito Cold Goat, Sister Alice's Buttermilk Candys, and meat loaf are all you get, but they'll make you want to throw the kind of party Carpenter has used as a powerful tool for making friends, influencing people and having a damned good time throughout her life.

If the recipes do not do it for you, her good-humored, down-home, non-sense but infinitely sensitive advice for dealing with life after 65 will inspire. The only thing missing is an index and a recipe for Texas chili.

## OYSTER GUMBO

- Roux
- 3 tablespoons salt butter
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 pint freshly shucked oysters, standards, and their liquor
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 2/3 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced green onion tops
- 1 tablespoon finely minced garlic
- 2 tablespoons finely minced parsley
- 1/2 cup finely chopped fried bacon
- 2 quarts cold water
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1 bay leaf, crushed
- 1/8 teaspoon file powder (optional)
- Boiled rice

Heat butter and vegetable oil in heavy 7 to 8 quart saucepan over medium heat. Add flour gradually, stirring constantly to keep the mixture smooth. Cook over medium-low heat, stirring constantly, until a medium brown roux is formed, form 20 to 30 minutes. Add the chopped vegetables (except parsley). Stir vigorously, then cook for about 10 to 15 minutes more, until vegetables are lightly browned.

Add 1/4 cup water and chopped bacon. Mix thoroughly and continue browning over low heat, stirring constantly, for 10 minutes longer. Add parsley and all seasonings except the file powder. Raise heat to medium, then gradually pour in remaining water. Bring the gumbo to a boil, then lower heat and simmer for 1 hour, stirring frequently.

Add oysters and oyster liquor. Cook for 4 to 5 minutes longer, just until oysters curl around edges. Remove pot from heat. Add file powder and mix well, then allow gumbo to steep in pot for 5 minutes before serving. To serve, mix thoroughly, then ladle into soup bowls over boiled rice. Serves 8-10.

Try cashews spiced, curried and served with broiled chicken. Cashew butter is good over vegetables, with baked fish and in frostings.
