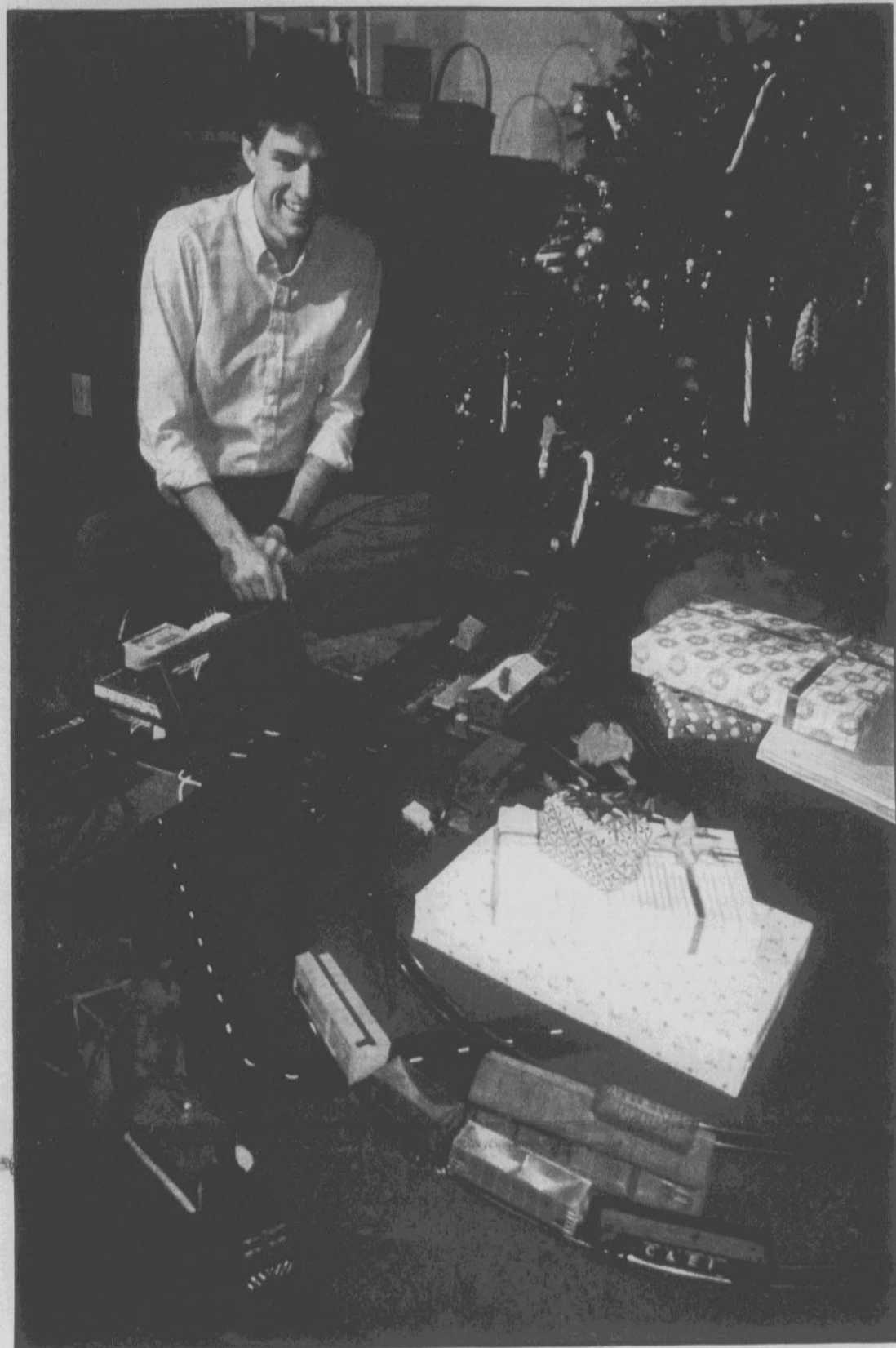

## Postal Service Cutting Hours To Save Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many post offices will be closed for at least the next two Saturdays and new construction projects cut in half as part of a package of budget-slashing measures, the Postal Service announced Wednesday.

Saturday mail delivery will continue, but as many as half the nation's local post offices will close on Dec. 26 and Jan. 2, said Postmaster General Preston R. Tisch and his deputy, Michael Coughlin.

In addition, other hours of retail service could be reduced with closings of as much as one-half day each week.

Other service reductions are also being studied, as well as changes that could slow delivery of third- and four-

th-class mail, Tisch said. But officials are working to avoid "at all costs" any delays in first- and second-class mail, Coughlin said in an interview.

The cuts were required by federal deficit-cutting legislation enacted Tuesday that Tisch contended put an unnecessary burden on the postal agency.

Requirements in the bill specifying where spending reductions must be made force the agency to cut both customer service and capital spending, Tisch said.

Coughlin said that as much as possible service-cut decisions will be left to local managers, including cuts in staff hours. Initially, staff cuts

probably will involve part-time workers, he said.

The federal budget bill requires the Postal Service to reduce its spending by \$1.25 billion over the next 21 months.

This is \$700 million less than the original cuts proposed for the agency, but it still will require cuts of \$430 million in the postal operating budget, with the rest coming from capital funds.

"Unfortunately, and in my view unnecessarily, they will still bring about important and painful alterations in our ability to meet the needs of the American people for prompt, efficient and relatively inexpensive

## Shoppers Follow Tradition

Sophisticated remote control toys are topping the list of sales for the 1987 Christmas season in Pitt County, according to information provided by three stores in Greenville that deal exclusively in toys.

Indications from all three, however, point to a decided return to more traditional toys, with an upswing in demand noted.

Mark Hopkins, manager of K & K Toys, cites "any or all talking dolls as our best seller. There are six or seven different models on the market, operated by batteries. Most play the words off cassette tapes.

"Radio control vehicles are selling better this year than last year, although their price tags range from about \$50 to as much as \$200.

"What has been unexpected," Hopkins said, "is the demand for all types of construction toys, things like Tinker Toys, wooden alphabet blocks, buckets of wooden pieces."

Plain dolls, "the kind with no gimmicks, are selling real good. I see in these trends that perhaps parents are becoming somewhat disgruntled with toys that do everything themselves, that they want to buy things that let children use their own imagination.

"And marbles are much in demand, the kind with big shooters to go along with the regular size marbles."

At Tons of Toys store, assistant manager Mark Link categorized top choices in toys as those applicable to boys and to girls.

## Clothing Takes Spot High On Holiday Shopping Lists

It's that time of year again when Santa makes his rounds through eastern North Carolina and, according to local retailers, Santa's sack of presents will be just as full as last year.

Some area merchants report sales are as strong, if not better than the previous Christmas season, despite the stock market crash in October and the subsequent speculation that an economic downturn would soon follow.

A survey of some local retailers reveals that, like most Christmas buying seasons, some items this year are selling better than others.

Clothing seems to be one of the most traditional yuletide gifts and Paulette Swank, manager of Brody's at the Plaza Mall, said clothing sales

this past week have been really strong.

"Sweaters, turtle-necks and two-piece career suits have been selling real well, along with cosmetics and gold jewelry," she said.

Ms. Swank added that two of this season's biggest selling trends, acid-washed denim dresses and leather skirts and jackets, are also helping boost sales figures.

"White, black, red and ivory are the most popular colors this season," she added.

On the men's side of the store, Ms. Swank said the biggest selling items are turtle-neck and all-cotton, fishnet sweaters and leather bomber jackets which, according to Ms. Swank, can cost up to \$400.

Ms. Swank said it's too early to tell how sales figures will match against last year's but she said she believes

the figures should be as good.

Due to the increasing number of homes with videocassette recorders, home, video movies are a popular gift item this year.

Lori Nielson, assistant manager of Video Views in the Carolina East Center, says the three top selling movies at Video Views this holiday season are "Crocodile Dundee," "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," and "Top Gun."

Nielson also said a popular trend recently has been people transferring their home movies and slides to videocassettes and giving them as gifts.

In addition, Nielson said Marilyn Monroe films were selling well. A collection of Christmas songs performed by notable rock artists

## KLM Plane Hijacked To Rome

ROME (AP) — A teen-ager who said he had a bomb hijacked a KLM airliner Wednesday night to Rome, where he released most of its 91 passengers but held the crew captive, according to the airline and news reports.

The hijacker demanded 1 million guilders (about \$450,000) and threatened to blow up the Boeing 737, but released 63 of the passengers two hours after the jet landed at Leonardo da Vinci airport, according to KLM officials.

Negotiations were continuing and the plane was on an isolated runway and surrounded by police, said a KLM official at the airport who declined to be identified. Dutch Television said the youth's grandparents

were involved in the talks.

Flight 343 was carrying 91 passengers and six crew members from Amsterdam to Milan when it was hijacked, KLM officials said. It landed in Rome about 7 p.m. (1 p.m. EST).

RAI television said the hijacker commandeered the plane shortly before its scheduled landing at Milan and forced it to fly to Rome.

The passengers were Italian, American or British, Dutch Television reported.

Italian news agencies reported the hijacker was 15 years old, was Dutch of Italian origin, and claimed to be holding a clock rigged with explosives.

In Amsterdam, KLM spokeswoman Olga Vermue said 63

of the passengers were released.

"We know it's a very young man," she said of the hijacker, adding that he spoke Dutch.

Ms. Vermue said the youth "walked into the cockpit and said what he wanted," but did not describe how he gained access to the flight deck, which is customarily locked on KLM flights.

Serena Ferraro, a KLM ticket counter official at the Rome airport, said the hijacker initially demanded the ransom money in exchange for release of the hostages, then asked for fuel to leave Rome.

It was the first hijacking of a KLM plane in almost a decade.

mail service," Tisch said in a statement.

Tisch had contended that his agency could meet the budget requirements without major service problems if allowed to manage the funds itself, rather than being told where to save the money.

Had the Postal Service been given the freedom to manage its own budget, he insisted, the spending cut "could have been accomplished with a great deal less pain and dislocation ..."

For example, the agency could borrow to build and modernize offices and could then meet service requirements from other funds, he had said last week, warning that the bill as written could force serious service cutbacks.

The director of the White House Office of Management and Budget, James C. Miller III, contended at the time that Tisch was "bluffing."

Miller was reported out of his office and unavailable for immediate comment Wednesday on the announced cutbacks.

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## Tanker Attacked

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — An Iranian vessel attacked a loaded Norwegian tanker in the southern Persian Gulf shortly before midnight Wednesday, starting a fire aboard, maritime executives reported.

The 285,400-ton Berge Big, laden with crude oil picked up at Gulf Arab ports, was attacked 25 miles off Dubai. No injuries were reported.

Twenty-five tankers or freighters have been attacked in December by Iran or Iraq, which have been at war since September 1980. This was the second Iranian raid within 24 hours.

Salvage agents, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the tanker requested help from the nearby U.S.

missile frigate Elrod, which sent a helicopter to check damage.

They said the attacking vessel, believed to be an Iranian navy frigate, fired either shells or rocket-propelled grenades that punched seven holes in the tanker's right side.

A fire erupted in one cargo tank, but as two salvage tugs rushed to help the captain reported by radio that the blaze had been extinguished, the informants said, adding that the U.S. helicopter remained overhead.

Both the latest Iranian attacks were apparent retaliations for an Iraqi air raid Tuesday on Iran's makeshift Larak Island oil terminal in the lower gulf that set fire to four huge supertankers used for storage.

The Meaning

The presents are bought and wrapped, the Christmas parties are over and the holiday itself is at hand. Now is the time when the frenetic pace surrounding Christmas eases and people settle down to share the joy of a strong belief, the fellowship of friendship and the love of fellow man.

Christmas is more than tinsel. It's more than wrapping gifts, exchanging them and enjoying the squeals of excited children. It even surpasses the religious roots of the holiday, beyond faith and into the soul of what's best in the human spirit. Christmas is caring.

That's why Christmas can be meaningful for anyone. Money is not a requisite; neither is subscription to one dogma or another. Nor is a wide-eyed belief in Santa Claus. Christmas is not getting what you want or even finding the perfect gift for someone else.

Rather, the attribute that raises the nativity to the eminence it holds in the world is its universality. The holiday can bring a smile to a diversity of faces. Regardless of faith, ideology or circumstances, Christmas strikes the spark of humanity readily. It requires no language, no prescribed ritual, no password — to receive meaning from the holiday only requires that willingness to care.

Not that the ills of the world go away during the magic of the nativity. Hunger, ignorance, hate and despair surround — sometimes even overwhelm the caring. The world must live with war and disease this yuletide just as it has since the celebration began. For this reason, the caring becomes especially important at Christmas.

As Pitt County observes this holiday of love in 1987, the community should rejoice in the dearth of suffering visible on its landscape. There is hunger, there is poverty, there is ignorance here. But armed with caring, the community has eased the pangs these plights produce. That's the meaning of Christmas and it is one anyone can share.

With No Hope, Gaza Seethes

LONDON — The spasm of violent Arab unrest in Israeli-occupied territories was predictable, probably inevitable, and only in a limited sense resolvable. On the other hand, it is not going to provoke a general crisis in the Middle East.

The Middle East can cope with only one major crisis at a time, and it already has an acute phase of the Persian Gulf war to handle. Indeed, to be cynical, you might say that the world's preoccupation with the gulf was the underlying reason why the Palestinians erupted in Gaza.

They feel that their grievance, now 40 years old, is neglected and unheard. The Arab-Israeli problem has been firmly put on the international back burner.

The great powers are intensely concerned about the gulf war because of its potential for dragging them into it. But they are not at present all that worried about Arab-Israeli relations. They were not on the agenda in Margaret Thatcher's recent talks with Mikhail S. Gorbachev, or at his Washington summit meeting with Ronald Reagan.

Feeling neglected, and so angry, it is easy enough for young Arabs, on the Gaza Strip or the West Bank or in Jerusalem, to become actively engaged and resort to violence against Israeli forces.

Gaza is a particularly dispiriting and violence-provoking place. It is overcrowded with young people whose grandfathers were, or say they were, dispossessed in 1948. It was a hell spot and a source of endless trouble when the Egyptians ran it. It has been on the whole much quieter under Israeli administration.

But its inhabitants have never accepted Israeli rule, and presumably never will. There is high unemployment and not many prospects for talented youngsters. Many of them have been in jail for minor breaches of regulations or acts of violence. And in jail they are indoctrinated into Arab militancy by fellow convicts.

It requires only a small incident to build up fever heat in Gaza, which can then easily spread to the West Bank (the process also works in reverse). The present cycle started early in October, when a vehicle loaded with Arabs crashed an Israeli roadblock in Gaza and the Israeli sentries killed three of its occupants.

It has built up steadily ever since — spreading to most of the occupied territories and even this week within Israel itself — partly as a result of initial Israeli over-reaction, not to say brutality. Then, when the Israelis attempted to scale down the violence, extremist Arab elements naturally managed to manipulate it.

But there is no evidence so far that any Arab state, even Syria, has attempted to exploit the crisis, except perhaps in propaganda terms. Evidently, on this occasion, they do not want to get involved. That gives the Israelis a chance to defuse the situation. Can they do it?

They start with one important

disadvantage. What Israel lacks in coping with widespread Arab violence is an adequate number of properly trained and equipped riot troops. In Northern Ireland, for instance, the British have a wholly professional force, trained over years in what are termed "low-intensity operations" and with all the sophisticated anti-riot vehicles that they can possibly need.

The Israeli army, by contrast, is a largely conscript force of mainly young people, trained and equipped primarily for battle against major Arab armies. Used in a large-scale police role, they are clumsy. They tend to be frightened and violent.

The first object of the Israeli government must be to improve the army's anti-riot response by intensive training and the rapid supply of better equipment. This may seem an obvious point to make, but it is probably the key to the whole thing. And there is no reason why the government should not handle this aspect of the problem effectively.

In many ways it is the most effective government that Israel has had since David Ben-Gurion's day. The coalition, with Yitzhak Shamir and Shimon Peres taking turns as prime minister, may be in theory an awkward arrangement, but in practice it has worked well. It has isolated

the extremists in the Israeli political spectrum. It has extricated the army from its disastrously exposed position in Lebanon. It has performed wonders with the Israeli economy, turning inflation from 200 percent plus per year to around 15 percent.

What it has not done is get the peace process working again. Indeed, this is the point on which Shamir and Peres really disagree. As foreign minister Peres tried to reactivate it earlier this year. He got a certain amount of verbal support in the West, but Shamir openly sneered at the effort, which ended in failure.

Peres believes — rightly, in my opinion — that it is essential for Israel's long-term future to be seen at all times to be doing everything in its power to reach a permanent peace with all its neighbors.

But his arguments also apply to the short term. The reason why young men are getting themselves killed in Gaza and the West Bank, in the obviously futile attempt to overthrow Israeli authority, is that they have absolutely nothing — even in the far-distant future — for which to hope.

They must be given hope. The best way to do it is get negotiations going again. The Arab states are at present incapable of taking any initiative. This means that Israel must accept the responsibility. The United States should provide all the encouragement in its power.

An Open Letter To The Candidates

Dear Candidate:

I understand you fellows like to get a feel of what the voters are concerned about. I can tell you about some things that concern me besides front-page, front-burner items like official corruption.

For the last few years we've been hearing a lot about what a great power we are, and we're No. 1, and it's morning in America, and we're the greatest in the world.

I haven't traveled enough to know how it is in all the other countries, but I know how it used to be here.

There are lots of things missing besides nickel candy bars and penny-loricice shoestrings. You used to be able to mail a letter for less than 22 cents and expect it to get across town or to a nearby city in a day or so — special delivery, if you wanted it there next morning.

They don't even have special delivery any more — it would probably just slow up service even more while they waited for a kid with a bike. Now you can get first-class letters many days late. You can still get overnight service — for about 11 bucks. But you have to take it to a post office for that.

Meanwhile, the junk mail piles up and burdens the postal employees. A lot of not-very-personal first-class mail comes from businesses that get special low rates from the postal department. They can't tell me all this stuff doesn't slow up the real letters from real people to other real people. It does, and I can see it on the postmarks. I also see it on invitations mailed in plenty of time, which arrive after the events.

You used to be able to get on a plane and expect it to take off on time and at least come close to arriving on time. Have you gone anywhere by plane lately — I mean, aside from special junkets and military planes and Air Force One? You know what I'm talking about. Deregulation shmereregulation. Don't tell me we can't do anything to get travel back on schedule in this country.

We're now down to one major bus line. And trains aren't what they used to be, either. If the railroads were improved, maybe more people would ride them, and they'd even take some of the load off the planes. I understand that in Europe and Japan they have trains that go like hell. Canada has some fine ones too. We're not No. 1 in travel, are we?

Autos — they're our biggest form of transportation. Have you tried to get yours serviced lately — and at a decent price? Frankly, most of my friends are buying imports. They say those run better, last longer and need less servicing. We hear a lot about "competitiveness," which seems to be kind of a synonym for protectionism. What about competitiveness in quality? What happened to our big lead in the auto business?

All that is just transportation. What about telephones? Since the breakup of the old phone company, I get so many bills with so many itemizations for so many special charges that pretty soon they're going to have to send these bills bound like books. We spend more money on outgoing calls and more time with unwelcome incoming calls. The junk-phone solicitations, like the junk mail, keep coming through.

The TV ads tell us that the pride is back. Okay, I'm all for pride. It's fine that there's pride in the military service, for example. But how about everyday non-military, just plain service — the old customer-is-right idea. Private service and government service have not been No. 1 lately.

And speaking of government — something else that bothers me: What about NASA? What happened to our once-spectacular space program? What hap-

pened to safety precautions and backup systems and all? Private companies in the United States have negotiated with China about launching satellites into space for them. China! And the Russians have taken ads in our newspapers to tell us that their launch service is the most reliable for us to use. Talk about competitiveness! Well, I'll bet we're still No. 1 in ad agencies, anyhow.

Now, what about the environment? What's happening with acid rain, with the ozone layer, with nuclear waste? My neighborhood hasn't yet turned into a dump, but I think the government ought to be doing something more than spinning a wheel to see what areas get dumped on. The environment I'm familiar with is closer to home. I don't like smog and pollution, and I hope they put in more no-smoking areas in restaurants and other public places. With clean air, I breathe better.

Well, if you're elected, I'd like you to do something about the greed ethic. I know you can't do everything, but you can make a beginning. You can set a tone. You can talk about a service ethic.

You can keep in mind Harry Truman's words: The buck stops here. And you can add something else: Anything-for-a-buck stops now.

Murphy has produced some elegant dishes and table decorations, including a Christmas tree of edibles. It was made green with kale and decorated with fruit slices, petit fours and the like, and dusted with powdered sugar resembling snow.

Those who must be in the Pitt County Jail on Christmas Day will have a traditional turkey dinner. According to Sue Shackelford, head matron, the meal will include turkey, dressing, candied sweet potatoes, snap beans, cranberry sauce and sweet potato pie. Each inmate will be given a Christmas stocking, courtesy of the county. Ms. Shackelford said she expects to prepare Christmas dinner for about 50. This figure is up from about 35 last year, she said.

It won't be a turkey dinner at the Eastern Corrections Center in Maury — rib eye steak is the fare. According to Albert Roberson, food service assistant, the menu will consist of steaks, baked potato, seasoned green beans, garden salad, hot rolls and butter and apple pie a la mode. He said various cookies and pies and candies have been provided the prisoners throughout the holiday season.

Christmas lasts throughout December at area nursing and rest homes, if the one she manages is any indication, Norma Foss of Carolina Long Term Care Facility said. She said the Christmas meal will be turkey with all the trimmings and pumpkin or sweet potato pie for dessert. But previous meals and parties and other gatherings for the patients have been Christmas-oriented.

Many of the residents won't be there Christmas Day, Ms. Foss said. Some spend several days away at Christmas and many go home for the day. But some will be present, as always, and not even have visitors from among families or others they've known previously, she said. So the staff will seek to make the day special for those who must stay. The facility has about 115 residents.

The Salvation Army of Greenville will feed about 400 households this Christmas, but it will be with food yet to be prepared, not in meal form. A typical food order, according to Maj. Earl Woodard, will include a baking hen, cabbage, potatoes and other vegetables, eggs, grits, flour, corn meal, a cake or cake mix, fruit, nuts and candy.

St. Gabriel's Catholic Church will take responsibility for feeding the poor of the community who have no other place to have Christmas dinner. Lisa Hieber coordinates the meal which usually serves between 20 and 50 people. The traditional turkey meal will be held at the St. Gabriel's Parish Hall.

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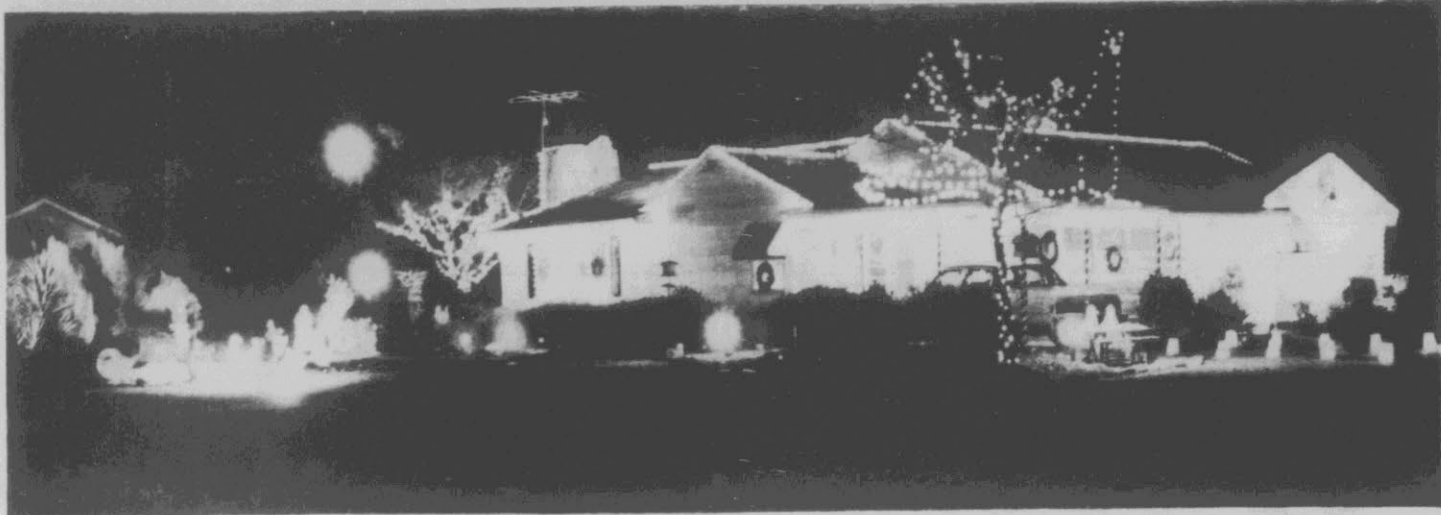

**Steelhead**

RIGGINS, Idaho (AP) — A weekend chemical spill on the Little Salmon River in central Idaho could set efforts to restore the stream's natural steelhead runs back at least a decade, officials say.

"This is the biggest spill I've been involved with — the most damaging," Don Anderson, regional fishery manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's Coeur d'Alene office, said Monday.

Thousands of wild steelhead died when a truck carrying 3,700 gallons of a toxic fungicide skidded off U.S. 95 and overturned between Riggins and New Meadows early Saturday.

Riggins temporarily shut off its water supply over the weekend.

The spilled Vitavax 200 turned the river's water bright crimson. The chemical is used to treat seed for disease and fungus.

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# Court Upholds Teacher's Right To Express Opinions

RICHMOND (AP) — A federal appeals court, ruling in a North Carolina case, said Wednesday the free speech rights of teachers should be protected when they express opinions on the hiring and firing of school administrators.

"Teachers should have an important voice in decisions about the employment of school officials, because teachers are in one of the best positions from which to judge the officials' competence," said the unanimous 18-page ruling by a

three-judge panel of the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

The decision came in a North Carolina case in which Edwin G. Piver, a social studies teacher at Topsail High School in Pender County, was reassigned to a junior high school about 40 miles from his home after he openly supported tenure for his principal, R.J. Jourdan.

In the spring of 1982, the Pender County Board of Education decided not to renew Jourdan's contract.

Piver, who had urged the board be-

fore its vote to keep Jourdan and afterwards asked it to reverse the contract denial, was reassigned by the board in July, the month after two board incumbents who had voted against Jourdan's reappointment were defeated in an election in which Piver's wife campaigned on behalf of the challengers.

The lame duck board members told Piver he had engaged in actions that were divisive and disruptive for students at the high school.

# Soldier Receives Medal 20 Years After Heroism

FAYETTEVILLE (AP) — Sgt. James T. Coles finally won a battle he began 20 years ago in Vietnam.

Coles on Tuesday received the Distinguished Flying Cross — the Army's fourth-highest award for heroism during combat — for risking his life to save five downed helicopter crew members during the 1968 Tet offensive.

Pinning on the medal was Fort Bragg commander Lt. Gen. John W. Foss, who said the Hue fighting was among the toughest of the offensive. It took almost four weeks to dislodge the enemy from the ancient walled city.

Coles, 40, was a 20-year-old crew chief and door-gunner on a UH-1

Hue helicopter that in 1968 flew into an enemy-surrounded compound in Hue to rescue the crew of another helicopter.

His pilot, CW2 Fred Ferguson, received the Congressional Medal of Honor for the mission and until recently believed Coles' also had been honored.

Coles, a member of Fort Bragg's Post Aviation Division, inquired about the award several months ago after attending a school at Fort Rucker, Ala., where he saw a photograph of Ferguson and his medal.

Army officials say Vietnam combat medals are rarely awarded to-

day. Most considerations for Vietnam combat awards expired in 1976, said CW2 James Garrett of the Awards Branch at the Total Army Personal Agency in Washington.

But in Coles' case, there was substantial evidence he had been recommended for the award much earlier. Along with Ferguson's letter, Coles' former company commander, now retired, also wrote a letter to the Awards Branch, saying Coles had been recommended for the award.

Based on that, the Army Decoration Board approved the award. "There aren't many that are approved, but in this case, an injustice occurred," Garrett said.

# Task Force Wants More Study Of 'Safe' Cigarettes

**Escapee**  
HIGH POINT (AP) — Authorities continued their search today for a prison inmate who allegedly raped a woman after leaving his work-release job site, sheriff's deputies said.

"We're still looking for him," Capt. Ben Scarborough of the Guilford County Sheriff's Dept. said Wednesday. "We were out (until) 4 a.m. looking for him."

Officials, including personnel from the Department of Correction, are searching "anywhere west of Raleigh and east of Charlotte," said Detective E.L. Siwinski.

Stephen Michael Bureson, a native of High Point, was serving a life sentence at the Sandy Ridge Prison Unit for a 1971 rape when he escaped Tuesday with a company truck, officials said. Sheriff's officers have obtained a warrant charging Bureson with first-degree rape in connection with Tuesday's incident.

**Money Suit**

FAYETTEVILLE (AP) — The federal government has filed suit to keep more than \$125,000 in cocaine-tainted bills seized as part of a crackdown on drugs being transported on North Carolina's interstate highways.

Fausto R. Taveras of Queens, N.Y., was stopped on Interstate 95 in April by trooper C.A. Dew for failing to display a front license tag, as required by New York law.

Taveras and two companions, who claimed some of the \$127,705 belonged to them, were allowed to continue their trip from New York to Florida after authorities searched the car and confiscated the money.

Tests by the State Bureau of Investigation revealed traces of cocaine on the bills.

The lawsuit, filed by Assistant U.S. Attorney Stephen A. West, charges that the money was "either furnished or intended to be furnished" for controlled substances — or were the proceeds of such a transaction.

The suit said the money can therefore be seized and forfeited under federal law.

**Bakkers Move**

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — Defrocked evangelist Jim Bakker and his wife, Tammy Faye, have moved from Malibu Beach to the desert, where they are completing a book on their lives, a spokeswoman said Wednesday.

"They are living in Palm Springs," Marilyn Ford said of the itinerant couple, who were living in a more than \$7,000-a-month oceanfront home last month.

The Bakkers sold their southwestern-style home in Palm Springs, 110 miles east of Los Angeles, earlier this year to Los Angeles pie magnate Sam Apodoca for \$600,000.

**Signs Down**

HICKORY, N.C. (AP) — Less than 24 hours after they were erected, signs protesting the Caldwell County incinerator apparently were knocked down by a motorist, according to one of the protesters.

"We're not surprised this happened," said Boyce Roberts, one of the people who helped erect the billboards and returned to repair the damaged signs.

The Caldwell County Sheriff's Department received a report from the owner of the property where the signs had been placed. A fence also was knocked down in the process, said Maj. Edward Lynch of the Sheriff's Department.

**Arrested**

RALEIGH (AP) — Keith Lewis Freeman, arrested in Boston in connection with the kidnapping of a 6-week-old Raleigh infant, is fighting extradition and remains in a holding facility, authorities said.

R. Thomas Ford, an assistant district attorney in Wake County, said Boston officials were holding Freeman on a fugitive warrant. A federal charge against Freeman alleging unlawful flight to avoid prosecution had been dropped, Ford said, in favor of North Carolina's warrant charging Freeman with abduction of a child.

Karen Goss, 25, and her mother, Sarah Goss, told police that Freeman had taken the baby from their car last Thursday.

The child was reunited this week with his mother after she had flown to Massachusetts. Both returned to Raleigh Monday evening.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal task force called Wednesday for more research into ways to improve the fire safety of cigarettes.

The Interagency Committee on Cigarette and Little Cigar Fire Safety proposed a two-year, \$500,000 project to research ways of producing cigarettes that are less likely to set fire to mattresses and other upholstered furniture.

As many as 1,500 lives could be saved as well as 7,000 burn injuries and \$500 million in property damage prevented by development of less fire-prone cigarettes, the committee reported.

Among possible approaches, the group said, would be

smaller cigarettes, lower density tobacco, less porous paper and changes in the type of paper used.

But study is needed into the marketability of such cigarettes, plus any increased health problems that may be associated with changes in cigarettes, the group said.

It suggested establishing an advisory committee of scientists to study the issue and work with the National Bureau of Standards on fire safety research involving cigarettes.

The interagency committee includes Consumer Product Safety Commission Chairman Terrence M. Scanlon, U.S. Fire Administrator Clyde Bragdon and Assistant Health and Human Services Secretary Robert Windom.

# Seniors Protest College Cuts

GREENSBORO (AP) — Senior citizens, already angered by cuts in continuing education classes at community colleges, say they fear the cuts may go deeper in the future.

"We're very concerned about the literacy training, which has not been cut but we feel it will be," said James Carpenter, executive director of the United Services for Older Adults, which serves 12,000 retired people in Guilford County.

Carpenter said his group has voiced

its concerns about the funding cuts to legislators. He said he hopes the General Assembly will take up the matter during next year's short session.

"It's extremely short-sighted on the part of the community college system and the Legislature," he said. "I know some community college people are concerned, and I think the upcoming session is an appropriate time to change the system."

The funding plan cut in half the

amount of money continuing education courses receive from the state. The dollars instead go to pay for courses that prepare people for jobs, such as auto mechanics and fashion merchandising.


The need to restructure financing for the state's community colleges arose after the department asked the General Assembly for a budget of \$112 million. Legislators told the department to come back with some cost-saving ideas.

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

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
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# White House Lowers Projections For GNP Growth In Wake Of Crash

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration on Wednesday lowered its projection for economic growth in 1988 by more than a full percentage point and cited the "negative impact" of the October stock market plunge as a major reason.

The White House predicted an inflation-adjusted growth rate of 2.4 percent for next year, down from the 3.5 percent it forecast in August.

The stock market collapse will "slow the spending rate by consumers," Beryl Sprinkel, chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, said at a news briefing.

"Whether it's already happening, I really don't know," he said, responding to a question on whether the stock market decline was affecting Christmas sales.

With another shopping day to go until Christmas, "It's an open question," Sprinkel said.

The administration predicted that economic growth, as measured by the change in the gross national product from the fourth quarter of one year to the fourth quarter of the next,

would rebound to 3.5 percent in 1989 and stay between that level and 3.2 percent through 1993.

In other forecasts, the administration said civilian unemployment would remain at its November level of 5.9 percent through 1988, drop to 5.7 percent in 1989 and then ease gradually to 5.3 percent by 1993.

Inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, will drop to 4.3 percent in 1988 from its 1987 level of 4.7 percent, then decline to 3.9 percent in 1989 and to 2 percent in 1992, the administration predicted.

On interest rates, the administration projected that long-term rates, based on 10-year Treasury bonds, would ease to 8 percent in 1988 and to 7.4 percent in 1989 — down from 8.4 percent currently.

For short-term rates, the administration said three-month Treasury bills — now at 5.8 percent — would ease to 5.3 percent in 1988 and to 5.2 percent in 1989.

The administration issues its economic forecasts twice a year. The new projection will be used in the preparation of President Reagan's fiscal 1989 budget, expected to be submitted to Congress on Feb. 16.

For the first nine months of 1987, economic growth has been increasing at a rate of 3.7 percent, according to the Commerce Department. That compares with 1986 growth of 2.2 percent.

Sprinkel said the downward revision for 1988 "is in line with many private forecasts" and "recognizes the likely negative impact on growth in 1988 of the recent stock market crash and the increase in interest rates and the tightening of monetary policy during 1987."

"Consumer spending ... is expected to grow rather slowly as households react to the stock market decline and seek to improve savings rate from their recent low levels," he said.

Blue Chip Economic Indicators, a financial newsletter that surveys 51 top economists each month for their forecasts, says the consensus estimate is that the economy will expand at a 2 percent annual rate in 1988, with inflation as measured by the CPI rising 4.3.

Lawrence Chimerine, chairman of the Wefa Group, a private forecasting service based in the Philadelphia area, said the administration forecast "is a little on

the high side, but it is certainly within the range of reasonableness."

"I wouldn't quibble with basing their budget projections on numbers like that. I think it makes a lot of sense," Chimerine said.

Chimerine noted that growth rates between 2 percent and 3 percent — while once considered anemic — are becoming more and more the norm. "It's not possible to keep growing at the rates we did back in the 1950s and 1960s," he said.

Sprinkel declared that the overall U.S. economy remains sound, despite the current turmoil in financial markets. And he noted that the current growth rate of 3.7 percent is even exceeding the administration's own earlier projection of 3.2 percent growth in 1987.

"Continued strong growth of U.S. exports is expected to contribute significantly to economic expansion in 1988, as it has for the past year," he said.

Asked about a recession, Sprinkel said: "We have no recession projected out to 1993." But he added that doesn't mean to say there won't be another recession between now and then. "If inappropriate policies are pursued, we might get it," he said.

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# Men Watch As Women Lift Station Wagon To Free Man

VALPARAISO, Ind. (AP) — Four women lifted a station wagon and freed a man trapped beneath the vehicle as several men stood around a supermarket parking lot and watched.

"If it weren't for them doing that for me yesterday, I wouldn't be here now," Joseph Burch said afterward.

Burch, 25, of Medaryville, had jacked up his station wagon in the parking lot Monday afternoon to adjust the clutch.

Burch asked his 13-year-old sister to depress the clutch so he could tighten something in the assembly, but the jack broke and pinned Burch's chest under the car.

His mother, Mary, and his wife, Cheryl, tried unsuccessfully to lift the car.

"My daughter-in-law and I tried to lift the car, but we

couldn't," Mary Burch said. "So we were screaming for help. We knew we just had to get it off him because there was no one else around."

Two women stopped to aid them, and the four lifted the car enough for Burch to slide out from under it.

There were several men standing around watching, Mary Burch said, but none of them offered to help. She said the two other women lifted the side of the car while she and Cheryl lifted the front.

They called for someone to pull Burch from beneath the car, but no one did, so "we screamed at him, 'Push yourself out! Push yourself out!'," and he managed to get himself out." Burch was taken to Porter Memorial Hospital for treatment, and the hospital said today that he had been released.

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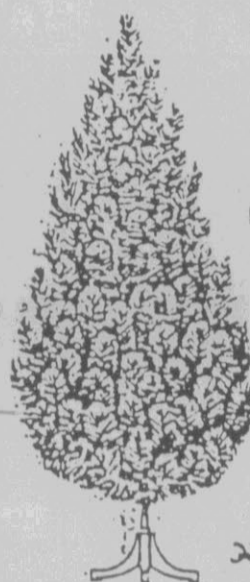
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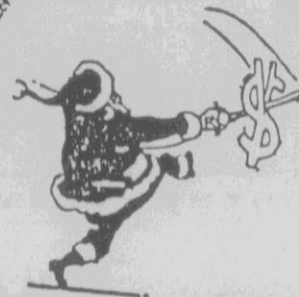

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

"Top items this year for boys include a command gun set, a monster lab, and a power man which uses sophisticated sensors to interface with a television show."

With the lab set, "children can make monster-like figures, and then melt them in a vat of acid-like solution." Link says the solution is safe.

For girls, "the top selling toys this season" are dolls, particularly three brand name dolls, ranging in price from \$70 to \$250 each.

For both boys and girls, Link said "roller racers are a favorite. Basically, these are skateboards with a seat, propelled by body motion."

Like the other toy stores, Tons of Toys is experiencing solid sales in "old stand-bys such as red wagons, standard games like Monopoly, chess and games based on TV shows."

An inexpensive item going well is "baseball cards, reproductions of prized collector items going as far back as Babe Ruth."

Manager Kathy Taylor of Circus World named a control deck toy "used in conjunction with television, radio-controlled cars that are battery operated, and Boppers dolls" as top sales items.

"Boppers are fascinating little creatures," Ms. Taylor said. "They dance to any kind of music whether it's waltzes, country, rock or whatever. I think they appeal as much to adults as to kids."

Dolls, including "Cabbage Patch dolls, are selling well. This is true also of more traditional kinds of dolls."

"This year," Ms. Taylor said, "There is a noticeable increase from past years in the demand for toys that have remained to a certain extent favorites over a long time. Train sets are selling well. So are construction sets of building pieces like Tinker Toys, log sets for construction, anything that younger children can put together."

Ms. Taylor noted that "games are still going strong. Scrabble sets, dominoes, games for young and old are being asked for to a greater extent than during the last couple of years."

All three toys stores reported brisk sales for stocking fillers — small, inexpensive items that have long had a lasting appeal at Christmas and all during the year. These include yo-yo's, bags of marbles, skip ropes and ball and jack sets.

The survey indicates that while parents are still looking to new, superpowered toys as the top preference in Christmas toy items, there is a clear indication that less sophisticated, less expensive and more durable toys of the past are very much in the picture for Christmas 1987.

**Stamp Sales**

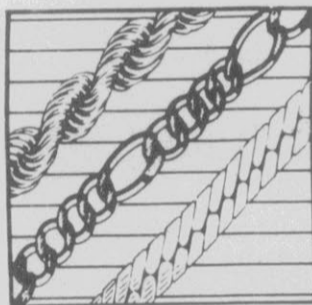
WASHINGTON (AP) — Sales have topped \$1 million in the U.S. Postal Service's new stamps-by-phone program.

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# Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices rang up a broad gain Wednesday, resuming their yearend rally and pushing the Dow Jones industrial average past the 2,000 level for the first time in more than seven weeks.

Dow Jones's average of 30 blue chips, down 11.93 on Tuesday, climbed 27.19 to 2,005.64. That marked its first close above 2,000 since it stood at 2,014.09 on Nov. 2.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 5 to 2 on the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume totaled 203.11 million shares, against 192.65 million in the previous session.

The dollar rose in New York foreign exchange trading, and interest rates fell in the credit markets, following a statement by the so-called Group of Seven industrialized nations.

In that communique, policymakers declared that the dollar has fallen far enough and suggested that they would intervene to keep it in a range they did not disclose.

Nigel Lawson, Britain's chancellor of the exchequer, said he believed the dollar was undervalued. Gerhard Stoltenberg, West Germany's finance minister, said the G-7 nations want to renew and strengthen their cooperation on economic matters.

Analysts differed in their views of the significance of those statements. But stock market participants apparently saw it as a plus for the trade outlook and prospects for at least a stable dollar.

Since Dec. 4 the Dow has risen 238.90 points in its biggest sustained advance since the crash in October.

Takeover news and conjecture accounted for several of the session's biggest winners and losers.

Phillips Petroleum rose 1 7/8 to 12 1/2 in active trading. Responding to rumors and queries, Pennzoil Co. said it owns no Phillips stock and isn't currently buying any of the shares.

Pueblo International jumped 2 1/2 to 16 1/4 before a trading halt on the NYSE. An investor group said it plans to propose a buyout of the company at \$24.50 a share.

Gull Inc. tumbled 1 3/4 to 13 1/4 as the most active American Stock Exchange issue. The company said a planned takeover by Parker Hannifin Corp. had fallen through.

Gainers among the blue chips included International Business Machines, up 1 1/4 at 119 1/2; Exxon, up 1/2 at 40 3/4; USX, up 1 1/4 at 32 3/4; Philip Morris, up 1/2 at 89 3/4, and Procter & Gamble, up 1 1/8 at 87 3/4.

As measured by Wilshire Associates' index of more than 5,000 actively traded stocks, the market rose \$31.09 billion, or 1.28 percent, in value.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks gained 1.82 to 141.36.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 248.25 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrials rose 4.14 to 293.18, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was up 3.21 at 253.16.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market picked up 4.18 to 331.48. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 260.44, up 3.47.

## Slayden, Perez Present Differing Styles At QB

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Duke's Steve Slayden doesn't like to compare himself to other quarterbacks, but Mike Perez of San Jose State doesn't mind tooting his own horn.

Slayden will quarterback the Gray team in the 50th annual Blue-Gray All Star Football Classic on Christmas Day. Perez will lead the Blue.

When asked to guess where he rates among the nation's quarterbacks, Slayden replied: "It's hard to

tell. I've played some good competition, but I have no idea how they play out West, for instance. I wouldn't say I'm in the top five or anything like that.

"I'm looking forward to getting out there with these guys and see how I compare," said Slayden, who ranked fourth in the nation in total offense.

Duke Coach Steve Spurrier has an idea of how the 6-foot-2, 185-pound senior compares to other quarterbacks.

"The last five games of the season, I think he was best quarterback in the nation," said Spurrier, who will coach the Gray team.

On the other hand, Perez won't take a back seat to any quarterback. "I'd say I'm the best quarterback in the nation," he said.

Perez led San Jose State to the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship this year, passing for 3,213 yards and 22 touchdowns. His team led the nation in passing.

"I was fortunate because we ran an offense that shows your ability," he said. "I had a great supporting cast and I was able to take advantage of it."

Perez, a 6-foot-2, 206-pound senior, said he isn't worried about trying to impress National Football League scouts who will be at the game Friday.

"I wanted to come on down and have a good time," he said. "I don't think there is any pressure or anything. I just want to see what I can do and really have some fun."

While Perez was compiling impressive numbers at San Jose State, other quarterbacks like Syracuse's Don McPheerson and UCLA's Troy Aikmen were gaining most of the attention.

"It's frustrating in a way, but you don't really think about it," said Perez, who came to San Jose State after two years at a junior college. "You play the game the best you can. If you're good, they'll find you."

Perez should be one of the top quarterbacks picked in the NFL draft next year, and he knows where he would like to play.

"I would like to stay on the West Coast," he said. "If I had my choice, it would be the Los Angeles Raiders."

Slayden said he enjoyed playing for Spurrier, who took over at Duke this season after Steve Sloan became athletic director at Alabama.

"Things changed a little bit with him because he is more open," Slayden said. "He makes football fun. He's a real professional and he has a real good rapport with all the guys."

With Spurrier coaching the Gray offense, Slayden figures to have an advantage.

"I could have learned the system in a week anyway, but it's like second nature to me," he said. "That has to help some."

## Carson Ties Record With Ninth Pro Bowl Selection; Payton Fails To Make It

NEW YORK (AP) — Linebacker Harry Carson of the New York Giants was selected today for the Pro Bowl for the ninth time, tying an all-time record, but Walter Payton of the Chicago Bears, who could have broken the record with his 10th selection, failed to make the team.

The AFC and NFC squads, selected by players and coaches, include the game's three most illustrious quarterbacks — John Elway of Denver, Joe Montana of San Francisco and Dan Marino of Miami. Elway will be the starter for the AFC and Montana the starter for the NFC.

The NFC backup quarterback is Neil Lomax of St. Louis, whose comeback season has the Cardinals in position to make the playoffs. Lomax had two sub-par years since making the Pro Bowl team in 1984.

Carson, 34, is the fifth player to make the team for the ninth time. The others were Payton and three defensive players — linebacker Jack Lambert and lineman Joe Greene, who played for Pittsburgh, and defensive back Ken Houston, who played for Houston and Washington.

The NFC team includes wide receivers Jerry Rice of San Francisco and Mike Quick of Philadelphia as the starters, with Anthony Carter of Minnesota and Gary Clark of Washington the backups.

Mark Bavaro of the Giants is the starting tight end, with Steve Jordan of the Vikings as the backup.

Jackie Slater of the Los Angeles Rams and Gary Zimmerman of the Vikings are the starting tackles, backed up by Luis Sharpe of the Cardinals.

Bill Fralic of Atlanta and Dennis Harrah of the Rams are the starting guards, with Brad Edelman of New Orleans as the backup.

The centers are Jay Hilgenberg of Chicago, the starter, and Doug Smith of the Los Angeles Rams.

Montana and Lomax are joined in the backfield by running backs Charles White of the Rams and Rueben Mayes of the New Orleans Saints as starters, and backups Herschel Walker of Dallas and Roger Craig of the 49ers.

The defensive ends are Reggie White of Philadelphia and Chris Doleman of the Vikings, with Charles Mann of the Redskins as the backup. The interior linemen are Michael Carter of San Francisco and Steve McMichael of the Bears.

The starting outside linebackers are Carl Banks of the Giants and Wilber Marshall of the Bears, with the Giants' Lawrence Taylor as a backup. It will be Taylor's seventh Pro Bowl appearance in seven NFL seasons.

Joining Carson inside are Mike Singletary of the Bears and Sam Mills of the Saints, who will be the backup.

The starting defensive backs will be Darrell Green of Washington, Jerry Gray of the Rams, Joey Browner of the Vikings and Ronnie Lott of the 49ers.

The punter is Jim Arnold of Detroit, the placekicker Morten Andersen of the Saints and the kick returner Vai Sihakema of the Cards. Ron Wolfley of St. Louis will be the special teams player.

The AFC wide receivers are Al Toon of the New York Jets and Steve Largent of Seattle as the starters, plus Carlos Carson of Kansas City and Stanley Morgan of the New England.

The tight ends are Kellen Winslow of San Diego and Todd Christensen of the Los Angeles Raiders.

The tackles are Anthony Munoz of Cincinnati, Chris Hinton of Indianapolis and Cody Risien of Cleveland, with Keith Bishop of Denver, Mike Munchak of Houston and Ron Solt of Indianapolis at guards. Ray Donaldson of Indianapolis and Dwight Stephenson of the Dolphins are the centers.

Elway and Marino are joined in the backfield by Eric Dickerson of the Colts, Curt Warner of Seattle, Kevin Mack of Cleveland and Mike Rozier of Houston.

The defensive ends are Bruce Smith of Buffalo, Jacob Green of Seattle and Howie Long of the Raiders, with Bill Maas of the Chiefs and Bob Golic of the Browns as interior linemen.

The outside linebackers are Duane Bickett of the Colts, Andre Tippett of the Patriots and Clay Matthews of the Browns, with Freddie Young of Seattle, Karl Mecklenburg of Denver and John Offerdahl of Miami inside.

The starting defensive backs are Frank Minnifield and Hanford Dixon of Cleveland at the corners, with Kenny Easley of the Seahawks and Deron Cherry of the Chiefs at safety. The backups are Albert Lewis of the Chiefs and Keith Bostic of the Oilers.

Ralf Mojsiejenko of San Diego is the punter, Dean Biasucci of the Colts the placekicker.

## Righetti, Yanks Agree To Pact

NEW YORK (AP) — Pitcher Dave Righetti, who spurned a reported \$10 million offer to play in Japan, agreed in principle Wednesday to a three-year, \$4.5 million deal that will keep him with the New York Yankees through the 1990 season.

Righetti becomes the first pitcher to get more than a two-year deal since baseball's free agent market tightened up in the winter of 1985.

"He got three years because he earned it," said Yankee General Manager Lou Piniella, who announced the agreement. "There were numerous reasons. Righetti was the top free agent pitcher and a part of our organization for his entire career. He's a foundation player as far as our organization is concerned."

"This agreement should not be viewed as precedent. Dave is a very special young man and he is being rewarded accordingly. When he was asked in 1984 to become a reliever, he did it without complaining, placing the team before individual goals. Loyalty is appreciated."

Yankee owner George Steinbrenner had questioned Righetti's loyalty when the pitcher's agent disclosed the Japanese offer earlier this month. That suggestion angered the pitcher and it seemed at that time that he might sign with another team. There were substantial offers from Oakland, San Francisco, the Los Angeles Dodgers and Cleveland as well as Japan.

Righetti said he gave serious consideration to moving.

"The offer from the Japanese was staggering and legitimate," he said. "If I was going to play just for money, I would have accepted the Japanese offer. But I want to play in and win a World Series in the major leagues."

"There was a time when things seemed to be moving slowly with the Yankees, and other clubs were in there making some attractive offers. At that point, I wasn't sure where I would be playing next year."

Piniella, however, said he was sure that Righetti would return to New York. "He's a Yankee," Piniella said. "I felt all along he'd remain with us."

Righetti was the first player to declare for free agency this winter and after weighing the other offers, agreed last weekend to the Yankees' offer of arbitration. Negotiations between the two sides continued, however, resulting in the three-year agreement.

Piniella said that the decision of whether Righetti would remain a reliever or return to his former role as a starter would be up to Billy Martin, starting his fifth term as Yankee manager.

"Dave's been very successful out of the pen for the past four years," Piniella said. "That's where he'll probably stay. But the final decision will be made by the field manager."

Righetti was a starter for three years and pitched a no-hitter on July 4, 1983. The next year, when the Yankees lost Rich Gossage to free agency, Righetti was switched to the bullpen.

The switch cost him the opportunity to reach some incentive levels in his contract. Piniella said the new agreement contains provisions to reward his performance, whether he starts or relieves.

Righetti was 8-6 with a 3.51 earned run average and 31 saves last season. He set a major league record with 46 saves in 1986 and his 138 career saves is the third highest in Yankee history, behind Gossage's 150 and 141 by Sparky Lyle.

# Rhodes Reborn As A True Star

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Once little more than a novelty on the Iowa State basketball team, Lafester Rhodes has been reborn this year as a full-fledged star.

As a reserve during his first three seasons, Rhodes would come off the bench shooting, which endeared him to the fans but not necessarily to Coach Johnny Orr.

He averaged only 3.8 points a game during those years and actually had more success as a quarter-miler with the Iowa State track team.

But in one of the more remarkable transformations of the 1987-88 season, Rhodes now finds himself in the company of players like Wayman Tisdale and Wilt Chamberlain.

He scored a school-record 54 points — the third-best effort in Big Eight Conference history — in a 102-100 victory over Iowa last Saturday and his 24.7 average is a big reason that Iowa State is ranked 16th nationally and off to its best start in 47 years at 9-1.

"I knew it was going to be a good

year after Coach Orr gave me the opportunity to play," said Rhodes, who has more than held his own as the Cyclones' center despite his lanky 6-foot-8, 200-pound frame.

"I was just waiting until I got the opportunity. I just kept working hard in practice and I knew my time would come. I always knew I could play."

Rhodes, in only the second start of his career, scored 27 points in Iowa State's season-opening victory over Texas. He totaled 54 points against Florida and New Mexico in the final two rounds of the preseason NIT and was averaging 21.8 after eight games.

Even then, however, there were doubts. Is this guy for real or merely on a hot streak that soon would fizzle?

Since the Iowa game, those questions linger no more. Against a deep, talented team ranked seventh nationally at the time, Rhodes made 20 of 31 shots from the field — including five of eight 3-pointers — grabbed 14 rebounds, handed out five assists,

blocked three shots and made two steals.

"That will be one of the great lines in college basketball all year," Iowa assistant Bruce Pearl said.

"They're not taking me for granted now," said Rhodes. "They know I'm a ballplayer now, not just a fluke."

The only Big Eight player who has scored more points in a game is Tisdale, who had 61- and 55-point outbursts at Oklahoma. Chamberlain's best when he was at Kansas was 52 points.

Rhodes said he could have done the same thing last year, when he scored only 34 points all season, if he had been given the chance. But the games were usually out of hand when he got in so he just did what came naturally — he started shooting.

"I think I was a crowd pleaser," he said. "When I came into the game, the fans would get wild and start encouraging me to shoot. I wasn't looked at as a ballplayer. They looked at me as a shooter."

"The games were already decided

so I just tried to get some publicity for myself, tried to get some exposure. I was never conscious of what I was doing. I just went out and shot the ball and tried to score as much as I could."

Orr hasn't been surprised by Rhodes' burst into prominence, nor is he second-guessing himself for not using him more in the past.

"I don't think Lafester could have done the things he's doing now prior to this season," Orr said. "Believe me, we tried him and he couldn't do it. We went to more of a running style of play this year and it's the perfect kind of game for him."

Indeed, Rhodes has succeeded because he has outrun everybody trying to guard him.

The Memphis, Tenn., native was a state champion in the 800 meters as a junior in high school and ran on Iowa State's winning distance medley relay team at the 1985 Kansas Relays. His best effort was a 48-

second 400-meter leg at the 1987 Kansas Relays.

"He never comes out for track until the first week in April and two weeks later, runs a 48-flat at the Kansas Relays," assistant track coach Steve Lynn said. "That's pretty darn good."

"He's always fired up to run. He looks like Big Bird coming out of the starting blocks, but he gives you everything he's got."

Orr said he feels comfortable with Rhodes at center despite his lack of bulk.

"Because of his size, people wonder how Lafester can guard anybody," Orr said. "But my answer is, 'How are they going to guard him?' He's probably the fastest center in the country."

Rhodes' fast start this season may signal the end of his track career. If it looks like he has a chance to be selected in the NBA draft, Rhodes said he will concentrate on staying in

shape for basketball instead of running track next spring.

## Big Bucks

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Want a ticket to the 1988 Final Four? Got \$2,000?

A California company that specializes in selling hard-to-get tickets to sporting events says \$550 is currently the absolute minimum for a ticket to the college basketball classic, to be played at Kansas City's Kemper Arena in April.

One ticket, which admits the holder to two semifinal games and the championship game, has a face value of \$50.

"The better seats, we are now selling for \$2,000," Dave Adelman of Murray's Tickets of Los Angeles said.

## Toney Hot Off Bench

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — It was a glimpse of Christmas past and the Philadelphia 76ers are hoping Andrew Toney is here to stay.

Toney, playing for the first time in 15 games, came off the bench Tuesday night and shot 3-for-3 in a 118-115 loss to the Boston Celtics.

The Sixers, hoping that Toney is finally healthy after suffering from chronically aching feet, waived rookie guard Vincent Askew Tuesday, trimming their active roster to 11 and making room for the return of injured Tim McCormick who may see action Friday night against Atlanta.

Askew, who was drafted by the Sixers in the second round as a junior-eligible from Memphis State, shot 30 percent from the floor in 14 games.

"If Vincent was shooting 45 percent, he probably would have been playing more and probably would still be here," Sixers general manager John Nash said.

With Toney's status uncertain and the recent groin injury to David Wingate, the Sixers were hoping that Askew could rise to the occasion and fill in at the off-guard position.

By waiving Askew, who was playing with a non-guaranteed \$75,000 annual salary, the Sixers are not obligated to pay him for the remainder of the season. After Dec. 29, all contracts, except 10-day deals, are guaranteed for the remainder of the 1986-87 season.

"It was a tough decision," said Nash. "Hopefully, by waiving him a week before necessary, he'll be able to sign on with another team."

Askew started in two games against Chicago and Portland and he played 18 minutes, shooting 3-for-9 in Sunday's loss to the Celtics.

"Unfortunately, when you have to win games, you don't have the luxury of bringing a guy along," Nash said.

Toney, who hadn't played since Nov. 20, spent seven games on the injured list and was activated Dec. 9.

But Tuesday night, he showed "shades of the Boston Strangler," the Celtics' Danny Ainge said.

"He's a great player," said Ainge. "He still has it."

A sellout crowd at the Spectrum cheered when Toney came off the bench in the fourth quarter. He hit three shots, showed a blistering first step, handed out four assists and grabbed a steal.

"We needed a lift," coach Matt Guokas explained to reporters who wanted to know why he finally returned Toney to action.

"I wouldn't be surprised if he were ready," Nash said before the game. "We've given him plenty of time. If he's not, he may never be."

## Steele Is Director

East Carolina University basketball coach Mike Steele has been named as volunteer sports director for basketball by the North Carolina Special Olympics.

Steele, in his first season at ECU, has over seven years of volunteer commitment to the Special Olympics program.

Special Olympics is a sports training and competition program for people with mental retardation. Steele will assist the organization in its efforts to recruit and train volunteer basketball coaches.

The organization also announced that Rob Shamblin has been named volunteer sports director for soccer and Joyce Cates, for bowling.

Shamblin played varsity soccer at Raleigh Enloe. Cates, a YABA coach, is manager of Hillcrest Lanes in Greenville.

## Sports Notes

### Five Assistants Join Brown Staff

CHAPEL HILL (AP) — North Carolina football coach Mack Brown announced Wednesday the hiring of five members of his staff at Tulane as assistants in the Tar Heel program.

The new assistants are offensive coordinator and quarterback coach Darrell Moody; secondary coach Vince Hoch; offensive tackles and tight ends coach Terry Lewis; running backs coach Milo McCarthy; and Howard "Monk" Tomlinson, who will coach offensive guards and centers.

Moody is a 1970 graduate of North Carolina State, where he worked as a graduate assistant in 1973 and 1974 and as a full-time staff member from 1976 through 1979. His collegiate career includes jobs at Southern Mississippi, Appalachian State and Louisiana State.

A 1966 graduate of Pfeiffer, Hoch began his college coaching career at Temple in 1970. He spent 13 seasons on the Owls' staff before moving on to Memphis State, Minnesota and Kansas. Hoch was at Mississippi State for one season before joining Brown's staff at Tulane last season.

Lewis played with the NFL's Buffalo Bills before moving on to coaching, starting at the U.S. Naval Academy's prep school in 1971. He then coached at Navy, Western Michigan, Illinois, Southern, East Carolina, LSU and Tulane.

McCarthy coached at Southern Mississippi, his alma mater, and Southern Methodist before going to Tulane last season. While at SMU, McCarthy coached Eric Dickerson and Reggie Dupard.

Tomlinson has 28 years of coaching experience, including a head coaching job at Maryville.

Brown was announced as the Tar Heels' new head coach on Dec. 16. He replaces Dick Crum, who resigned after 10 seasons, on Nov. 30.

### Russ Francis Rejoins New England

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) — Former All-Pro tight end Russ Francis is back where he started in the NFL, signing a contract Wednesday with the New England Patriots.

Francis, the Patriots' top draft pick in 1975, was waived by the San Francisco 49ers last week.

He was expected to play Monday night, when New England ends its season against the Miami Dolphins.

"I feel right at home," Francis said.

The move reunites Francis with such former teammates as quarterback Steve Grogan and Coach Raymond Berry.

"A lot of this offense I know. Raymond Berry was my receivers coach when I was here," Francis said. "I can't pick it all up. There are a lot of complexities. But I think I can play in a limited role. There are some three tight end situations that I can help."

Francis played in New England through the 1980 season, including Pro Bowl appearances in 1976, 1977 and 1978.

He retired after the 1980 season, but announced a comeback in 1982, when New England traded him to San Francisco. He played six years with the 49ers before being waived off.

"He's limited in what he can do this week," Berry said. "He'll have to go through a learning process. But I think that if one of our tight ends got hurt, he could go in and learn the running game."

His contract with the Patriots runs through the 1988 season.

"If I'm going to play one more year, I can't think of a better place than where I started," said Francis, who has caught 382 passes for 5,101 yards and 40 touchdowns in 12 seasons.

### Adrian Dantley Is Suspended By NBA

NEW YORK (AP) — Forward Adrian Dantley of the Detroit Pistons was suspended for one game and fined \$1,000 by the NBA Wednesday for bumping referee Ed Rush during a 117-112 victory over Dallas last Friday.

The penalties were announced by NBA vice president Rod Thorn, who viewed videotapes of the incident.

Dantley's suspension will be in effect for the Pistons' next game, Friday against the Knicks at New York.

### Oregon State Aide Goes To Idaho State

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — Idaho State named Oregon State offensive coordinator Garth Hall as its football coach Wednesday.

Hall, 41, succeeds Jim Koetter, who was fired after five seasons.

He will attempt to resurrect a football program that was 5-16-1 in the past two seasons, including the school's worst beating in 40 years, a 63-0 loss to Montana this year.

Hall was given a one-year contract for \$46,000.

He was selected over Bill Maskill, linebacker coach at University of Oregon. Hall has also held offensive coordinator positions at Utah State, Tulane and Wake Forest. He was quarterback, receiver and running back coach at Brigham Young from 1975-82.

## Boxing Commissioners Work To Unify Rules Of The Sport

Just in case you believe those glitzy parking lot extravaganzas in Las Vegas and casino clambakes in Atlantic City with all the high rollers and beautiful people stationed at ringside are representative of boxing, Jose Torres has news for you.

"This sport is more than that," the chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission said. "This sport is club fights and four-rounders and six-rounders."

Because Torres graduated from his own undercard days to become light heavyweight champion of the world, he has always been concerned with the kids who fight those bouts.

"For two years, we have tried to formulate a national body for the protection and safety of the fighters," he said. "Now we are seeing progress for the first time."

The Association of Boxing Commissions ties some 35 commissions together with a centralized computer system and will work for uniformity in boxing rules and regulations. "It will give us a structure in the sport so that somebody will be held accountable," Torres said.

That will be a new wrinkle for boxing, a sometimes tawdry business that often is treated as a stepchild sport to be shoved into any available pigeon hole by state administrators. In Texas, the boxing commission operates out of the office of the department of labor and standards.

## Tribe Is Leader

Chocowinity High School has taken the lead in the Wachovia Trophy competition in the Tobacco Belt 1-A Conference, following the end of the fall sports season.

Chocowinity earned 92½ points during the fall, paced by a tie for first place in football.

North Edgecombe finished second with 80 points while Belhaven Wilkinson was third with 60.

They were followed by Aurora with 50, Columbia 47½, Bath 32½, Creswell 20 and Mattamuskeet 15.

The trophy is presented annually to participating conferences to the team with the best all-around athletic program. Each individual conference determines its own guidelines for the awarding of points.

Leaders in the Northeastern, Eastern Plains and Coastal conferences were announced earlier. The Big East Conference standings have not been released as yet.

In Alaska, it functions as part of the department of commerce. In Alabama, it is under the department of revenue.

The message from that convoluted condition is that this is a sport without any identity beyond the high-profile promoters and champions. Torres and the association of commissions aim to change that.

Regional directors from New York, South Carolina, Michigan, California and Nevada will meet in March to select a chairperson for ABC — and that will come as close as boxing ever has to a national commissioner. Marvin Kohn, a 35-year veteran of the New York State Commission, has been appointed to coordinate the ABC effort.

"This is not just another alphabet organization like the WBC, WBA and IBF," Torres said. "Those organizations are concerned only with championship fights where the money is, not with the development of young fighters who are just beginning their careers."

"The ABC will not sanction or rate fighters. It will be concerned with the health and licensing of fighters, from the guys who fight four-rounders to the champions."

New York has led the way with a modernization campaign that com-

puterized Torres' office and made the record of every fighter and wrestler available in a central data bank. Torres remembers the reaction of state agencies sent in to improve commission procedures. "The first thing they told me was, 'This place resembles Newark at the turn of the century,'" he said.

No more. Now a boxer applying for a license in New York State pays \$29 and gets what amounts to \$400 worth of medical tests including an EEG, an EKG, a cat scan, a photo ophthalmological examination and a drug screening. Those standards are not uniformly applied in other states and that is a condition Torres hopes the creation of ABC will improve.

"There will be more order, more cooperation between states," Torres said. "The sport has had no continuity, no cohesion. ABC will change that."

All of this sounds so logical that you have to wonder why it took so long to get it going.

"Dollars and distrust," Torres said. "The small states feared that the big states would take over. That's politics. I don't care about politics. I care about fighters."

That is a distinctly unique position in a sometimes unsavory sport.

**Familiar Face Won Title; US In Unfamiliar Defeat**

In a year when certain shots were worth more than others, the NCAA championship trophy went to a familiar face while the United States was in the unfamiliar role of loser in international play.

Men's Division I teams all played with a 3-point line for the first time last season in an effort to ease the congestion in the lane. Long jumpers were launched as offensive weapons for some teams and last-ditch efforts for others.

But the college basketball season ended with a 2-point shot in the Super Dome when Keith Smart hit a 16-foot jumper with four seconds left — one which gets tougher every time it's shown — to give Indiana a 74-73 victory over Syracuse and Coach Bob Knight his third national championship.

Just as important, that winning shot sent a message to college basketball coaches that recruiting junior college players would work.

If it worked for Knight, the strictest disciplinarians, and helped him to a national championship, then surely bringing in JUCO players would be a respectable way for other coaches to right a program as in need of players as Knight was when he brought in Smart and Dean Garrett from the two-year ranks.

The attractiveness of junior college players also bloomed as Proposition 48 started affecting its second recruiting class.

The academic requirements sidelined a number of highly recruited players and coaches needed players for one season while the prospects stayed off the court and in the classroom.

The Final Four featured two teams from the Big East — Syracuse and Providence — as well as Indiana and the top-ranked team heading into the tournament, Nevada-Las Vegas.

Providence's miracle trip to the national semifinals was paved with 3-pointers as the Friars averaged 93 points in their four tournament victories on the way to New Orleans.

The bubble burst against Syracuse, however, when the Friars made just five of 19 3-pointers in the 77-63 loss to the Orangemen. Indiana rode Steve Alford's 33 points to the championship game despite UNLV making 13 of 35 3-pointers in the 97-93 loss.

The lead changed hands 24 times in

the championship game and when Smart — who scored 12 of the Hoosiers' final 15 points — hit the jumper, Knight joined John Wooden and Adolph Rupp as the only men to have won the NCAA title at least three times.

The man heading the U.S. team in the Pan Am Games, Louisville's Denny Crum, won the NCAA title twice and with a roster of 12 of the nation's top collegiate players, he looked as good as gold.

# Backs Set For Aloha Display

HONOLULU (AP) — Two of the finest running backs in the country — UCLA's Gaston Green and Florida's Emmitt Smith — will display their talents in the Aloha Bowl on Christmas Day.

For Green, the game marks the end of a brilliant collegiate career. For Smith, it's the climax to a terrific freshman season.

Although hampered by injuries, Green gained 1,098 yards on 206 carries and scored 11 touchdowns this season, giving him career totals of 3,731 yards, 708 carries and 40 touchdowns, all school records.

He has rushed for 456 yards in three previous bowl games, including a major bowl-record 266 in last year's Freedom Bowl.

"The records were my goals when I came here," Green said. "I felt if I got the chance to play, I was capable of doing the things I did. I could have done better. The injuries kept me from doing all the things I wanted to do."

Smith had even better numbers than Green this year, gaining 1,341 yards on 229 carries with 13 TDs. But he expressed ambivalent feelings about his performance.

"I didn't expect to start, I didn't expect to get 1,000 yards," he said. "The guys I'm surrounded with helped me. I think my season has been a poor one. If we could have won a couple (more) games, the season would have been more complete."

"The second half (of the season) was very poor. I felt like I didn't accomplish anything, I didn't do my job. We played tougher teams in the second half. It was a lot of mental er-

rors on my part, a lack of concentration."

Florida Coach Galen Hall hasn't been displeased with Smith's performance.

"Gaston should be a better player (than Smith) now," Hall said. "He's a senior, he has played in bowl games. Our man has a lot of good things in front of him. The two are very similar runners."

"I'm sure (UCLA) Coach (Terry) Donahue wouldn't trade those two (Green and quarterback Troy Aikman) for anyone they've played. I wouldn't trade our two (Smith and

quarterback Kerwin Bell) for anyone we've played."

"At UCLA, Gaston Green is the best of the best," Donahue said. "He's the most proficient runner in the history of the school. He has been one of the great superstars to coach. He's going to be missed, it's going to be hard to live without him. I think he's going to be a sensational pro."

About Smith, Donahue said: "I think he's terrific, he's a great back. He's fantastic, he's in Gaston's class. When you look at him on film, he jumps off the film. He can get it done."

UCLA has won bowl games following each of the past five seasons — three Rose Bowls, one Fiesta Bowl and one Freedom Bowl.

The Bruins will be trying to become the fifth team in NCAA history to win six bowl games in as many years. Georgia Tech accomplished the feat from 1951-56, Nebraska from 1969-74, Southern California from 1974-79 and Alabama from 1975-80.

Florida will be playing in its first bowl game since 1983 when the Gators defeated Iowa 14-6 in the Gator Bowl.

The Gators weren't eligible to play in bowl games following the 1984 and 1985 seasons because of NCAA sanctions announced in October 1984. Florida went 9-1-1 in each of those seasons.

Last year, the Gators were 6-5. A loss to Kentucky in the 10th game of the season kept them out of a bowl.

Florida also was 6-5 this season, but its losses were against good teams — Miami, Fla., Louisiana State, Auburn, Georgia and Florida State. All are ranked among the nation's top 20 and all are playing in bowl games.

UCLA, ranked 10th, is 9-2. The Bruins appeared headed toward the Rose Bowl, but a 17-13 loss to Southern Cal in their regular-season finale cost them that spot.

Aloha Bowl officials expect the worst crowd in the game's six-year history, but they aren't complaining. That's because the game is expected to draw its best television audience ever.

The crowd is expected to be less than last year's 23,743, which was the lowest since the game began in 1982. Aloha Stadium holds 50,000.

## Wiggins Out Of CBA

DENVER (AP) — Former Houston Rockets guard Mitchell Wiggins, banned from the NBA for cocaine use last January, failed a recent drug test and has been dismissed from the Continental Basketball Association, the CBA announced Wednesday.

Wiggins had been admitted to the CBA in February under a joint CBA-NBA rehabilitation program. He played for the Mississippi Jets last season and for the Quad City Thunder this season.

"This is an extremely unfortunate situation," CBA Commissioner Mike Storen said in a statement. "We expect Mitchell to admit himself in a rehabilitation program. Although his CBA career is over, we would look forward to him gaining a complete recovery."

Under all CBA player contracts, failure to pass a drug test results in permanent dismissal.

Wiggins' contract, adapted especially for the joint program, calls for random drug testing and an aftercare program.

Wiggins and former Houston teammate Lewis Lloyd became the third and fourth players to be banned by the NBA for cocaine Jan. 13. Previously banished for failing drug tests were Micheal Ray Richardson of the New Jersey Nets and John Drew, formerly of the Utah Jazz.

Under terms of the NBA antidrug agreement signed by the league and the NBA Players Association on Sept. 28, 1983, the players could apply for reinstatement two years after their disqualifications took effect. Both the NBA and the players union have to approve any readmission.

Wiggins averaged 11.1 points last season for Houston before being banned. He played two years in junior college and one year at Clemson and one year at Florida State. Wiggins played his high school ball at North Lenoir High School near Kinston, N.C.

He was a first-round pick by Indiana in 1983, but was traded to Chicago before the start of the season. He averaged 12.4 points while starting 40 games for the Bulls, then was traded to Houston the next season.

## Decathlete Is Charged

ESSEN, West Germany (AP) — West German decathlete Jurgen Hingsen, silver medalist at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics, is under investigation for suspected purchases of cocaine, a prosecutor said Wednesday.


Essen prosecutor Hermann-Juergen Kerl said authorities have opened an investigation against Hingsen and Rolf Milser, an Olympic weightlifting champion.

Kerl said Hingsen and Milser were suspected of buying cocaine on several occasions from two suspected drug smugglers arrested in Essen in July.


"They are being investigated as part of a larger probe in connection with the two arrests," Kerl said.

"There have been statements that have to be checked," he said.

Hingsen is one of West Germany's most popular and successful athletes.




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

# Hobbies Produce Craft Outlets

Pecan-shelled figurines, wooden items and other crafts are vogue in Pitt County this Christmas and country stores, several of them seasonal, are emerging to meet the demand of consumer interests.

Jeanette's Country Cottage on Old County Home Road is open about three months each year, surrounding the Christmas season, Jeanette Haddock, owner of the store, said.

"It's more or less a hobby for me; I really don't want to get into it real large," she said. "I was doing it as kind of something to do."

As her husband worked on their shooting reserve, Mrs. Haddock said she developed a hobby of making crafts. "I just kept playing around with it, messing with it, and I thought, well, why don't I have myself a little shop."

She works with pecan-shell figurines and wood, and she also creates basket arrangements.

But, country shops are "just like hair salons, they're on every corner," said Mrs. Haddock, who opened her shop more than a year ago. "You have to look around and do something different," which requires a good imagination.

Her imagination was cultivated by sewing, she said. When she made dresses for her daughters, "you could always do a little something different." She also is taking a painting class in Rocky Mount.

The key is to "keep coming up with something different-looking," Mrs. Haddock said. Sometimes, "I just look at a picture" of an item and think of ways to add something to it. "I love it," she said.

Mrs. Haddock emphasizes the joy in making her crafts, not the money. "You're not going to make a lot of money at this," she said. "I do fair," being open only about three months. "I do it to pass time ... I just don't want to tie myself down."

But, Mary Deitz, owner of Country Crafts near Bells Fork, hopes her hobby of making crafts will develop into a full-time job.

It has been a lifelong dream of Mrs. Deitz and her husband, Jerry, to make a go of their woodworking and tole painting crafts, she said. They recently expanded the hours of their shop, which now is open from noon to 9 p.m.

Sitting at her work table, painting a crushed pecan figurine, Mrs. Deitz said "unpainted it looks like chocolate," pointing to a long row of the figures.

"I normally antique all my work," she said displaying three Santa Claus figurines of the same design but with different appearances. One had not been painted, one was antiqued and

the other was painted regularly. "Customers seem to like them that way (antiqued)," she said.

The pecan-shelled figurines are "a lot like ceramics except they don't have to be fired or cleaned," she said. "Most of them are made in North Carolina. It's just kind of fun to watch them come to life."

Mrs. Deitz, who also teaches tole painting and figurine painting at her shop, also likes to add a personal touch or "something different" to her

crafts. For example, she has painted geese in blue.

The nativity scene is selling well this year, Mrs. Deitz said. This is the second Christmas her shop has been open.

Other items selling well are black figures, bears, geese and "rabbits are coming in and are much more popular," she said.

Also, "anything with a date seems to be popular. I guess that's what the collectors go for."

## NBC Claims Top Spot In Ratings

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Christmas specials captured audience attention last week, according to the Nielsen ratings, but didn't stop NBC from claiming the top five spots in the rankings with its regularly scheduled comedies.

NBC captured the first five spots on the A.C. Nielsen rating list for the week ending Dec. 20, and the overall ratings as well.

Three specials made the top 20 in the list released Tuesday.

"The Bob Hope Christmas Special" on NBC was rated No. 12 with an 18.4 rating, while CBS' venerable "Rudolph The Red-Nose Reindeer" was in 16th place with a 17.4 score. The "Candid Camera" special on CBS also made the list at No. 15 with a 17.7 rating.

NBC led the way with "The Cosby Show," with a 29.3 rating, followed by its spinoff "A Different World," with 26.9, then "Cheers" with 25.2, "Night Court," with 25.0 and "The Golden Girls" with 22.0.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million households with televisions.

NBC won the week ending Dec. 20 with an average prime-time rating of 16.3. CBS was second with 13.8 and ABC third with 12.6. For the season, NBC is leading with 16.3. CBS is second with 13.7 and ABC is third with 13.5.

The bottom half of the Top 10 show list included ABC's "NFL Monday Night Football" game between the Chicago Bears and the New York Giants with a 21.9 rating for sixth place, followed by "ALF" on NBC with 21.1. CBS' "60 Minutes" was in eighth place with a 19.9 rating, ninth place was NBC's "L.A. Law" with 19.8 and the "CBS Sunday Night Movie: Christmas Comes To Willow Creek," was No. 10 with a 19.2 rating.

# Screenwriter Does Her Research For Film On Supremacist Group

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Screenwriter Anna Hamilton Phelan went undercover to research white supremacist organizations for the HBO movie "Into the Homeland."

Phelan picked the name of the group she visited out of the telephone book, called and asked if she could hear the leader speak.

Out of that visit and additional research came the screenplay for the movie, which Home Box Office will begin running Saturday.

Phelan, who also wrote the screenplay for "Mask," says she has received several death threats as a result of her work. "I don't worry about the skinheads," she said. "They're out in front. It's the people in the background who contribute to these organizations. The people you would never suspect."

"Into the Homeland" stars Powers Boothe as a former policeman and Paul LeMat as the leader of the American Liberation Movement. Boothe is searching for his daughter who has apparently disappeared with LeMat's son. Boothe resigned from the police after accidentally killing a child during a raid on a crack house.

"I spent about eight months researching the story," she said. "I spent some time at a white supremacist group. There are over 200 of these groups active in the country today. I had trouble finding a name for the organization in the movie because there are so many real groups."

Phelan said she got to know some of the people and listened to their views.

"They were mostly middle class and there were a lot of family groups," she said. "Some even brought the grandparents. There were no single women with kids. Women were held in high esteem, but they held no positions of power. I expected to see crazed people, but they were very ordinary. Except the speeches, which were very racist."

She said more than the politics, she was interested in the families. "I wondered what would happen if a son strayed from their philosophy," she said.

Phelan said she prefers to write on speculation rather than selling a script and having to tailor it to suit a producer.

"I wanted to write it the way I saw it," she said. "I didn't want other fingers in it right away. I wrote 'Mask' on spec, too. The tradeoff is you don't get paid until you sell it."

And there's always a chance you won't.

"When I finished, I was offered development deals at two studios. But HBO wanted to film it as I'd written it. I was afraid of it getting lost in development."

This is her first project for television. In addition to "Mask," she's written "Gorillas in the Mist," which stars Sigourney Weaver as naturalist Diane Fossey. The movie was filmed in Africa and is due out in 1988. Phelan went to Karisoke, a research center in Rwanda, to research the story of Fossey, who was murdered in December 1985.

Phelan has also completed a screenplay based on the life of painter Amedeo Modigliani.

Phelan, a former actress, said she started writing when she needed audition material.

"Producers and directors get tired of hearing the same monologue over and over. My monologues were pretty good and word got around. I was soon writing monologues for other actors for \$25. I'd gear it to their personality."

"When we started 'Mask' the studio didn't want Cher. They asked her to do a screen test and go through all the emotions in the film. This is a \$70,000 screen test on a Sunday. I sat down and wrote a monologue for her. She did the scene with Val Kilmer. She blew them away."

# Pop Star Plays Robber In Film

LONDON (AP) — Pop star Phil Collins is shooting his first film, but the rock singer who found fame drumming with Genesis says his success on-screen in "Buster" means his fans won't know who he is.

"I'm trying to do my best to make people forget who I am," the short, stocky performer said during a wintry nighttime shoot in the East London docks.

"Buster" casts the 36-year-old rocker as Ronald "Buster" Edwards, one of 13 men who stood trial in 1964 for their parts in the Great Train Robbery on Aug. 8, 1963.

Over 120 mailbags containing 2.5 million pounds (then \$7 million) in used bank notes were taken off a mail train from Glasgow to London in that heist. Less than 350,000 pounds (\$980,000) was recovered, which makes the theft one of the most profitable — and spectacular — Britain has ever seen.

"I remember the publicity," said Collins, who was 12 at the time. "I was aware this was a huge crime. Then, it was the first time something like that had ever happened. Now, it happens everyday."

The \$6 million film, due for release next fall, spans the years 1963-66, from the time of the robbery to Buster's incarceration at Wormwood Scrubs prison.

The movie also examines Buster's relationship with his wife, June, played by Julie Walters ("Educating Rita," "Personal Services").

"It's one of the great love stories of our time," said director David Green, a 39-year-old whose previous film, the poorly received "Car Trouble," also starred Walters.

June fled with Buster to Acapulco, Mexico, but returned to England with their daughter, Nicky, suffering from emotional and physical dislocation. Buster followed her home, knowing that he would have to give himself up to the authorities. Hewlitt ultimately served nine years of a 15-year prison sentence and now owns a flower stall in front of Waterloo Station.

Green said he chose to cast Collins after he saw his guest stint on the TV show "Miami Vice."

"There was this London chappie playing an absolutely remarkable character role in a very, very upbeat episode of what is a very popular series," Green said of the segment "Phil the Shill," in which Collins played a con man. "He was perfect."

Collins said acting represented an important change of pace for him: "It's good for people in general to have a rest from my voice and from what I do."

He added that he has not touched a drum or a piano since July: "It's also good for me to have had a rest from it so that when I do my next album I'll have had six months of nothing (musical) happening."

Acting is not a new activity for him. As an adolescent, he played the Artful Dodger for seven months in the original stage production of "Oliver!" His 74-year-old mother has for years been an agent at the Barbara Speake Stage School in London.

"I want to make room for acting more," he said, "although not at the expense of my music."

Collins is one of several pop stars who also have film careers: Tina Turner, Sting, David Bowie and Roger Daltrey.

"It's very hard to look at a film with Sting or Bowie in it and forget they're Bowie, or Sting," said Collins. "I'm not your traditional good-looking pop star. Hopefully, my strengths will be in comedy and character parts."

His director said he was confident about Collins' crossover chances.

"Phil's going to break the mold," said Green. "He has an instinctive validity as an actor which is very different from a lot of the rock stars who have moved into the world of cinema."

"He's much lower-key than most pop stars. He's an ordinary man with extraordinary talent."

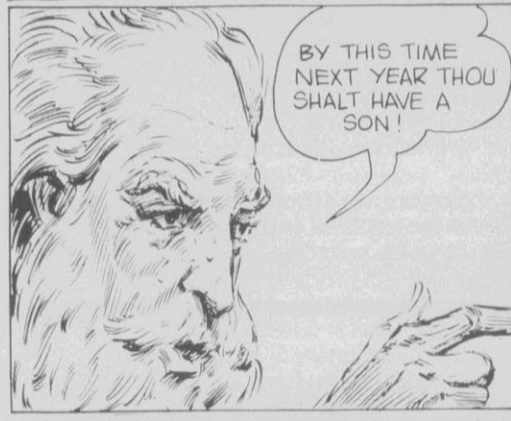

# Shock And Turmoil For Mary Lead To Joy For Christians

It began disturbingly. She, in a bewildering interlude, had become pregnant, and not by her intended husband. That unsettled her, shattered him and upset their plans for marriage.

He was a kind, good man, of firm moral character, and while he concluded he no longer could marry her, he didn't want to subject her to public disgrace by openly renouncing her.

Heartbroken, he "resolved to divorce her quietly," Matthew's account says, a procedure then necessary for engaged couples abandoning their betrothal.

It was an agonizing time for him and also for her, and it was the life-shaking prelude of the first Christmas.

The young Jewish woman, Mary, had been utterly staggered by her experience, described in Luke 2. It had been strange and incredible, yet shockingly real. She couldn't escape it.

An angelic vision, the heavenly courier Gabriel, suddenly had confronted her with the salutation:

"Hail, O favored one, the Lord is with you!"

It startled the girl, threw her into awe-struck fright. Tradition says she had gone to a well, fetching water, when the amazing presence came upon her. Her bucket rope must have slipped uncontrollably.

But the mystical words sought to calm her.

"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall

call his name Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High."

It didn't calm her, only stunned her the more, dumfounding her. She trembled, gasping, "How shall this be, since I have no husband?"

"The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God."

Shaken, confounded, she quivered, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word."

The episode ended as abruptly as it began, but it left her in utterly perplexed anxiety. She realized, if this unheard-of birth was to be, it had undermined her expected marriage.

Finally, in growing unease, inclined to flee, she left her parents' home in Nazareth and went on a visit to a cousin, Elizabeth, in Jerusalem. After hearing Mary's account, Elizabeth, also pregnant, exclaimed:

"Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!"

Elizabeth added that at Mary's report, she had felt a delighted sensation inside herself. "Behold, the babe in my womb leaped for joy."

All this, the women's mutual sharing of confidence, the encouragement of an older relative, also pregnant, reassured the young, worried Mary, buoyed her spirits, drawing from her an exalted paean, her Magnificat:

"My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has regarded the low estate of his handmaiden. For behold, henceforth, all generations will call me blessed.

"For he who is mighty has done great things for me, and holy is his name ... He has scattered the proud

in the imagination of their hearts, he has put down the mighty from their thrones, and exalted those of low degree."

That rejoicing, however, didn't resolve the marriage problem. This remained up to that good man, Joseph, driven almost to despair over the fact that his beloved bride-to-be was inexplicably pregnant.

Over many a furiously hard-working day in his carpentry shop and many a sleepless night, he must have grieved, sometimes doubtlessly falling into fits of rage, slamming his tools about, or lapsing into lonely silences.

He knew what he should do for the sake of propriety and the law he honored — issue a writ ending their betrothal. Then one night, twisting in troubled sleep, an angelic voice stabbed him in a dream:

"Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary your wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Ho-

ly Spirit; she will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

Joseph rose from his mat, his burden vanished, perhaps with a happy shout. It was all right; it was great, wonderful. He may have sobbed in gladness, for he dearly loved Mary, and she probably shed tears, too, of joy.

Wholeheartedly, they married. But that didn't end their difficulties. A Roman tax edict required their hard trip to Bethlehem. After the baby's birth in a stable cavern they had to flee a slaughter of infants. They became refugees in Egypt for a year or more.

But their devotion saved that special child, the one whose birth in a musty cave brought a winging word to bedazzled shepherds and set the heavens singing:

"Good news of great joy to all people ... For to you is born this day ... a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."

# Violence Leaves Rooms At Most Bethlehem Inns

BETHLEHEM, Occupied West Bank (AP) — The Church of the Nativity was nearly deserted Wednesday as tourists, scared off by violence in the occupied territories, stayed away from this hilltop city where Christ was born.

In the northern city of Nazareth, where Jesus spent most of his youth, there will be no decorations and no Santa Claus for the children.

The violence in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip is being felt throughout the holy land as officials call off Christmas celebrations and travelers cancel hotel reservations.

Since Dec. 8, at least 21 Arabs have been killed by Israeli troops in violent clashes in the occupied territories. Israel's tourism minister, Avraham Sharir, insists there is no danger to visitors.

"It's safer to be in Israel today than in New York, San Francisco or any other city in the United States," he said Wednesday while touring the Allenby Bridge linking the West Bank to Jordan.

Bethlehem Mayor Elias Freij said the number of visitors to the city this Christmas is far lower than the 10,000 who visited last year. He said some Bethlehem hotel owners have received room cancellations, and he put much of the blame on the U.S. State Department for advising Americans to exercise caution when visiting the occupied lands.

"It was not fair. No single tourists have ever been hurt in Bethlehem, but it's too late to do anything about it (the warning)," he said.

Two tour buses were parked at Manger Square, and only a smattering of tourists wandered around the adjacent Church of the Nativity, built over the cave where tradition says Jesus was born.

For the second straight day, soldiers carrying clubs and submachine guns patrolled the central square and the city's main streets. Troops were deployed on rooftops overlooking the square.

Nan Nelson, 66, of Akron, Ohio, said she wasn't concerned for her safety.

"We have no fear because the spirit of God is with us. I'm sure people in the United States are worried about us, but I think the reports are exaggerated."

David Lawes, an 18-year-old student from Sidney, British Columbia, said he and a friend spent the night on the outskirts of Bethlehem.

"We slept with knives in an open field. In the morning, soldiers were all over the place. We expected soldiers to be around, but no so many," he said.

Some Christian residents of Bethlehem say they are experiencing their gloomiest Christmas in decades.

"The economic situation is bad, the political situation is bad," said Joseph Bandak, 50, who owns a furniture store on the main road. As he spoke, a skinny teen-ager in a plastic Santa Claus suit waved a bell at passing motorists, trying to lure them into a toy store. No one stopped.

Bandak and other Christians said they would not attend the Christmas Eve celebration at Manger Square this year because they feared a terrorist attack and harassment by Israeli soldiers.

"Maybe there is a bomb, and then they pick up all the Arabs. It's better to stay at home," said a 28-year-old pizza maker who would identify himself only as Tony.

Tony said he was stopped by soldiers Tuesday as he drove along the main road and was forced to pick up stones thrown onto the highway by demonstrators.

In Nazareth, strings of colored lights that were hung in the city's streets last week won't be lighted for Christmas, and no ornaments will be placed on the city's Christmas tree, said Deputy Mayor Ramiz Jaraisy.

City officials also canceled the distribution of presents to young children by Santa Claus figures who traditionally tour the city's neighborhoods.

Jaraisy said the measures were taken to "express our solidarity with the people in the occupied territories and protest against the killings."

# Korean Election Protesters Clash In Seoul With Police

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Hundreds of radicals shouting "Nullify rigged elections!" and "Down with the military dictatorship!" battled riot police in downtown Seoul Wednesday.

Police fired tear gas to break up 500 firebomb- and rock-throwing protesters, who marched into the streets after a rally at Myungdong Cathedral, the headquarters of the country's 2.3 million Roman Catholics.

There were no immediate reports of injuries or arrests in the one-hour street demonstration.

Some of the 500 protesters also shouted for the execution of governing party candidate Roh Tae-woo, a former army general who won presidential elections Dec. 16 with 36.6 percent of the vote. Opposition candidates Kim Young-sam and Kim Dae-jung divided 55 percent of the vote.

The demonstration followed a

two-hour rally at the cathedral, in which speakers charged that Roh won the elections through massive fraud.

"We can never accept the outcome of the rigged election," dissident leader Moon Ik-hwan told 4,000 people during the rally.

Moon and other leaders of the National Coalition for Democracy, a main dissident group, charged that the government rigged election computers, stuffed ballot boxes and offered bribes for votes.

Roh, 55, is scheduled to take office Feb. 25 when President Chun Doo-hwan steps down in what could be the first peaceful transfer of power in modern South Korean history.

The two Kims, under fire for their failure to field a single opposition candidate, have called for protests aimed at nullifying the election results. The appeals have largely been ignored.

The government denied charges that the election was rigged.

On Wednesday, Kim Dae-jung's Party for Peace and Democracy decided to take part in next year's parliamentary elections, a move expected to help ease post-election tension.

The Reunification Democratic Party, headed by Kim Young-sam, softened its position Tuesday and decided to participate in the upcoming elections, expected to be held in April.

Minor skirmishes were reported Wednesday in the southern city of Kwangju where some 200 people hurling rocks and firebombs fought riot police in downtown areas. No arrests were reported.

In nearby Chunju, small bands of students tried to stage street demonstrations Wednesday but police firing tear gas drove them into a university.

# Sandinistas Said Ready For Truce

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — The Defense Ministry said Wednesday that Sandinista troops would lay down their arms after midnight to honor a two-day Christmas truce in their war against Contra rebels.

Government soldiers patrolled the northeastern gold mining region following two days of heavy battles in what the rebels called their largest offensive in the six-year war. No major combat was reported Wednesday.

Both the leftist government and the U.S.-supported rebels claimed they had achieved their objectives.

President Daniel Ortega said Tuesday night that the Contras suffered more than 100 dead in the attacks on three villages that began before dawn Sunday. He said 24 government soldiers died and 23 were injured.

Sixteen civilians were killed and 75 wounded, he said.

"They tried to give the impression they are a large force, to try to take the villages, thus to influence the (U.S.) Congress," the president said in a nationally broadcast speech.

Congress on Tuesday approved \$8.1 million in aid to the rebels as a stopgap measure. A request by the Reagan administration for \$270 million more has been postponed until early next year.

"The hands of those who voted in favor of these funds are covered with blood," Ortega said.

The rebels said 3,000 troops backed by 4,000 support forces raided the towns of Siuna, Rosita and Bonanza, about 170 miles northeast of the capital.

The Contras reported 170 Sandinistas killed, but did not report their own troop losses. They claimed to have destroyed key radar installations and captured 600 rifles, 60 machine guns, uniforms and more than 1.5 million rounds of AK-47 rifle ammunition.

# Cosmonauts Dock With Space Station

MOSCOW (AP) — Three cosmonauts docked their Soyuz TM-4 capsule with the Mir space station Wednesday and were welcomed aboard the "hospitable scientific complex" by its record-setting commander.

The three-man capsule, piloted by veteran cosmonaut Vladimir Titov, nosed into one of the docking ports at the Mir complex at 3:51 p.m. Moscow time (7:51 a.m. EST), the official Tass news agency said.

The nightly newscast "Vremya" showed the five cosmonauts, clad in red and blue coveralls, seated in one of the metal-lined compartments of the Mir after the linkup.

They exchanged greetings and bobbed in the zero-gravity of space. "We welcome you on board our hospitable scientific complex," said Yuri Romanenko, who has been in space for 321 days and holds the record for the longest time spent on a single mission.

He and cosmonaut Alexander Alexandrov will be replaced by Titov, 40, and his flight engineer, Musa Manarov, 36, who is making his first trip into space. The third cosmonaut aboard the TM-4, test pilot Anatoly Levchenko, is to return home with Romanenko and Alexandrov. Soviet media have said the three should be back on Earth by New Year's Day.

Romanenko, 43, blasted off from Earth on Feb. 6, along with flight engineer Alexander Laveikin. Laveikin developed heart problems after five months in space and was replaced by Alexandrov in July.

While together, the five will conduct a series of scientific, technical, medical and biological experiments, Tass said without elaboration.

Romanenko and Alexandrov also will give the newcomers some pointers on how to handle and operate the Mir, Tass said.

The U.S. manned space program has been on hold since the Jan. 28, 1986, explosion of the space shuttle Challenger, in which all seven crew members died.

Since then, the Soviets have sent four manned missions aloft, including the Soyuz TM-4.

The capsule carrying the three cosmonauts blasted off from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Soviet Central Asia on Monday.

The arrival of the TM-4 and the planned replacement of Romanenko and Alexandrov will mark the first time that Soviet space officials have made a complete onboard crew rotation in space.

It has not been clear from the latest Soviet media reports whether the Soyuz linkup signals the start of permanent operations aboard the Mir, which was launched Feb. 20, 1986, as the basic building block of a continuously manned space station.

Last year, cosmonaut training chief Vladimir Shatalov said further unmanned periods were envisioned for the orbital module before the Soviets began permanent operations.

Also docked at the Mir is the Kvant Laboratory Module, where Romanenko and Alexandrov have been carrying out medical and scientific experiments, and another Soyuz capsule, the TM-3.

A Soviet-Syrian crew flew that capsule to the Mir in July, and the flight engineer aboard the Soyuz, Alexandrov, replaced the ailing Laveikin.

Little information has been disclosed on the latest Soviet space mission and it was not known whether space walks, extensive scientific research or major construction projects are planned.

Soviet medical researchers are eager to examine Romanenko to learn more about the effects of prolonged weightlessness on the human body.

# Navy Says 141 Bodies Are Found

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Grieving relatives of people who died in the sinking of an inter-island ferry camped outside the office of the shipping lines Wednesday and surged toward its gates when word spread that more bodies were recovered.

The navy said 141 corpses have been found since the Dona Paz, believed to have been carrying more than 1,600 people, collided with the tanker Victor and sank in blazing seas Sunday night.

Only 26 people survived the century's worst peacetime sea disaster.

All but two of the survivors were from the ferry, which was crowded with poor people from other islands traveling to Manila for Christmas. A passing ship plucked them from the shark-infested waters.

The relatives surged toward the gates of Sulpicio Shipping Lines, owner of the 2,215-ton Dona Paz, when it became known that a commercial ship was bringing in eight bodies Wednesday.

The ship docked elsewhere in Manila harbor. The bodies, in netting on the rear of the ship, were transferred to a coast guard vessel and taken to a funeral home.

Many relatives expressed frustration at the seeming slowness of recovery operations and the lack of information. Several shoved and shouted at Sulpicio officials and one man smashed a window at the dockside office.

The Dona Paz, which sank in about 1,800 feet of water in the Tablas Straits, may have become a mass grave for most of those aboard. Many bodies that floated free could have been swept away by strong currents in the area off Mindoro Island, 110 miles south of the capital.

A famous expert once gave a course for intermediate bridge play-

ers. At his first class, he opened the proceedings by remarking: "Not every four no trump bid is Blackwood!" Half the class promptly got up and walked out.

Of course, our lecturer was right. Today's hand is a case where four no trump is a natural bid. Since South was prepared to play three no trump, his bid over four clubs was natural, saying he thought he could make 10 tricks.

South was our good friend and sometime partner, French internationalist Christian Mari. His opponent knew him well, and had infinite faith in his honesty. West reckoned that if Mari thought he could make four no trump with a club or a spade lead, there was no reason to doubt him. In this analysis, West was remarkably prescient. With a spade lead, declarer would have made 11 tricks as the cards lie; a club lead would have held him to 10—it would have been too risky to win the club in dummy and lead a spade, since the defenders might have been able to collect three heart tricks in addition to the ace of spades.

South's jump to three no trump suggested a long running suit, and it had to be diamonds. That left an obvious opening lead—the ace of hearts!

The rest was easy, with East playing his part by signalling with the seven of hearts to ask for a spade switch. A spade to the ace and the king-jack of hearts concluded a well-reasoned defense and gained a top score for East-West.

# Bomb Spurs Conciliatory Moves

ENNISKILLEN, Northern Ireland (AP) — They come together in small groups, meeting in homes or school rooms, Protestants and Catholics trying to talk to each other. They are drawn together along a mental tightrope by the memory of Nov. 8, when an Irish Republican Army bomb in the town of 13,000 killed 11 Protestants at their annual war memorial service. The revulsion felt throughout the island over the slaughter of innocents at prayer has forged a determination that it will never happen again. "Dare we hope?" asks the Impar-

tial Observer, the town's newspaper. "Will it last? We must make it last!" Much of the credit for this change of heart goes to Gordon Wilson, who lay with his 20-year-old daughter, Marie, under the rubble and held her hand as she died. A day after the tragedy, he said he prayed for the killers and sought no revenge — just peace. His soft-spoken fortitude inspired Northern Irelanders on both sides of the religious divide. "It disposed Christians to think religiously rather than tribally," said the Rev. Macartan McQuaid, headmaster of St. Michael's, a Catholic school in Enniskillen.

John Maxwell, a Protestant lecturer who lost his son in a 1979 IRA bombing, observed: "Gordon Wilson did a very rare thing in this society: he spoke directly from the heart and he cut through all the rubble, both metaphorical and literal, that was on top of him." "It touched people emotionally and enabled them to say things that they wouldn't have said otherwise." A few days ago, Wilson said in a TV interview: "Hearts have been softened, attitudes have changed. This has to be good." "If enough people's hearts have been softened and enough attitudes have changed, then maybe Marie's

death would seem a little worthwhile and we might, just might, be nearer peace and reconciliation in this country." According to Maxwell, who has long been active in promoting reconciliation, Catholics and Protestants converse at two levels, spoken and unspoken, to avoid becoming embroiled in irreconcilable argument. "There were the things that were actually said, but at the back of the protagonists' minds there would be another conversation: 'I'll bet he doesn't really mean that' ... 'I'll bet he's just saying that to stay friendly with me.'"
