Pitt Voter Turnout Light

Despite good weather, Pitt County voters in state and local primary elections started off light today, according to a local election official.

As of 10 a.m., only 4,534 Pitt County voters had cast their ballots, according to Margaret Hardee, supervisor at the Pitt County Board of Elections.

"I believe the reason voting is light is because there is no presidential nominee on this ballot. I guess people feel they've already voted once this year in the Super Tuesday election and they feel their voting obligation

has been filled, which it hasn't," she said.

Today's election marks the first time Pitt County voters are electing county commissioners according to the new system with six electoral districts plus three consolidated districts.

Mrs. Hardee said few problems had occurred as a result of the new system of election.

"We have had no phone calls regarding districting confusion. We took every precaution to make sure the correct ballots were distributed to the precincts," she said.

Mrs. Hardee also said few problems have resulted from the change of location of three Pitt County polling places.

The Grifton voting place had been moved from the Fire Rescue Building to the Fire-Police Building; the Bethel voting place had been moved from the town office to the Public Service Building, while the Greenville Precinct 4 voting place had been moved from Holy Unity Church to the new Agnes Fullilove School Gym on Watauga Avenue.

"Some people were going to the old Agnes Fullilove school which is now a

Interest In Races Is Cool

RALEIGH (AP) — Veteran North Carolina election director Alex Brock says he expects about 35 percent of the state's registered voters to go to the polls today.

"If it ain't (35 percent) we'd better call 'em all off," Brock said Monday.

But he predicted it was hot local races, not the swarm of statewide candidates, which would draw voters

to the polls in some areas, boosting the statewide total.

"People get steamed up about boards of education," he said.

The polls opened at 6:30 a.m. and close at 7:30 p.m.

Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan was expected to win the Democratic nomination for governor by a landslide, but little else was clear because the races for

lieutenant governor, secretary of state, superintendent of public instruction, labor commissioner and other state offices have struggled to capture the public's fancy.

"People simply have not paid attention to this race like they have in the past," said former state Rep. Parks Helms, one of five Democrats running for lieutenant governor.

Pitt School Board Approves Budget Asking \$12 Million In Local Funds

The Pitt County Board of Education approved a 1988-89 budget Monday that will ask Pitt County Commissioners for an additional \$2.6 million or about \$12 million to maintain a break-even status in the base operating budget and to include an expansion budget covering instructional, personnel, operational, athletic and transportation services.

The school system's 1987-88 county

allotment was about \$9.6 million, and additional local sources providing the school system with funds included \$425,000 from fines and forfeitures, \$162,000 from interest earned and \$1,669,128 from the fund balance for a total of more than \$11.5 million.

Dan Thomas, the school system's financial controller, said the county needs to add \$1,018,822 to the budget to keep the status quo, because the fund balance or equity is projected to

decrease by that amount to \$650,306, which is used for appropriations, Thomas said. "The fund balance can't be a continuous source of revenue."

In explaining the concept, he said a person that uses the \$5,000 in a bank account to buy a car will not have that \$5,000 to use toward other purchases. The projected \$650,306 fund balance was determined after subtracting \$1 million, which is considered the constant need of the school system for operating capital and is requested to be maintained by the local government commission, the certified public accountant and the county finance office.

In addition to the fund balance differential, the school board approved funding for other items in the base budget, including funding two-year measures at a cost of \$100,000, a salary increase that would cost \$431,000 and benefits for the salary increase at a cost of \$86,000.

Two-year measures include state funding provided by the state for two years to aid in consolidation transition. The funds for those measures — two maintenance positions, two administrative positions and two community school allotments — will be paid by the school system in '88-89.

The salary and benefit figures attached to it provide a 7 percent increase.

The expansion budget includes funds for alcohol and drug education programs, teacher and principal supplement increases, extra-pay for extra-duty supplement, a teacher recruiter, security systems and school grounds improvements, athletic insurance, an intramural program for sixth through 12 grades and radio communication from each school to the garage and the central office. The list of items total \$1,034,000.

The school board must submit the budget to the Pitt County Board of Commissioners by May 15 and will meet the commissioners to discuss its finance position paper regarding the amount of money it should receive from the county Monday.

In other matters, the board approved a budget amendment covering Jan. 1 to March 31 and personnel recommendations in addition to a substance abuse policy and a tobacco policy for employees and students.

In the substance abuse policies, employees and students are not to possess, use, sell, distribute or be under the influence alcoholic beverages, controlled substances or counterfeit controlled substances while engaged in any school activity or while on school property.

Also, all candidates for employ-

Ayden Will Pay Off Bonds Early

AYDEN — The Town Board, at a special meeting Monday night, unanimously approved a plan to pay off water and sewer bonds under a one-time offer by the federal government.

As part of the federal deficit-reduction plan, Ayden will be allowed to pay the Farmers' Home Administration the remaining principle on the loans, plus accrued interest, totaling about \$391,000. The town owes about \$642,000 on the water and sewer bonds.

Russell told the board that the Charlotte firm that handles the town's financial account could wire him the money and he could pay off the loan Thursday.

Paying the debt will not hurt the town's cash flow or limit services provided to the community, Russell said, but it will require a number of budget amendments which need the approval of the board.

Russell ended the special meeting after the group approved the plan and the board began its regular workshop session.

The board discussed an agreement with Pitt County in which the county would install a 12-inch water line to the Weyerhaeuser plant scheduled to open near Ayden next year. After the water line is completed, the county will turn the line over to the town, Russell said.

The wording of the agreement states the line will be used for future Pitt County customers, and Russell said he wanted the language clarified to indicate that the line will only be available for customers locating nearby.

Once the water line is installed, the town will receive water and sewer revenue and be responsible for maintenance, Russell said.

The town will own a lift station the county will install to serve Weyerhaeuser, Russell said. The lift station will be capable of handling 175,000 gallons of water per minute and will be able to serve other industries that may move into the area.

Jerry Cox, director of the Ayden Housing Authority, also presented the board a proposal to purchase a three-station IBM Personal System II computer network for the authority.

The total cost, including hardware, software and installation, will be about \$20,000, Cox said, and the system would be adequate if the authority doubled in size.

Long-Range Planning For Schools Changed

The Pitt County Board of Education approved a revised long-range plan for the school system that tentatively sets a price tag of about \$11.5 million to move the schools into the early 1990s. But, it still has concerns about the effects of the plan.

The cost attached to the new long-range plan, which includes building a new kindergarten through fifth grade school in the Stokes area and changing the use of Third Street School from a teaching facility, is about \$3 million less than the original plan approved by a former board, said John McKnight, deputy superintendent of the school system, as he outlined major changes from the previous plan to the board.

But, the current figure does not include an estimated cost of converting Greenville Middle School into a high school, he said. An earlier estimation for the renovation was about \$4.5 million, but McKnight said he would prefer a more accurate assessment before including it in the plans.

Anne McGaughey, who voted against the plan in addition to Mark

Owens, said "my concern is for the 129 students from Moyewood" designated to attend Falkland Elementary School beginning in the 1990-91 school year.

The students will be sent to Falkland through grade five and will then be sent back into schools in Greenville, she said. "There's no way you can say that Moyewood does not identify with Greenville City ... I am seeing not one positive thing that can result from this move."

Mrs. McGaughey said parents of Moyewood students may be the "least responsive of parents in the school system," and it becomes the responsibility of the board to consider those students.

Board member Howard Parker said he telephoned several parents in the Moyewood area, and "they had no problems" with the students attending Falkland School. "My personal belief," he said, "is that we're one system and we should be able to make this move. Whatever difficulties can be worked out."

Walter Morehead said the move

Knowles Calls For 7.8% Increase

To accommodate the rapid growth of the city, Greenville City Manager Greg Knowles has proposed an expansion of the city operational budget by 7.8 percent — a rise from \$19,656,163 to \$21,693,443 — which would not affect taxes.

However, Knowles is also proposing that the City Council consider an additional \$498,060 capital improve-

ment program which, if passed, would create a tax increase.

"We tried to present an operational budget without a tax increase that maintains services and, in some cases, increases services because of the annexations of various areas including Brook Valley," Knowles said.

Knowles cited several factors contributing to the proposed budget increase of 7.8 percent.

He said the council's decision to annex several areas, including Brook Valley, has placed heightened demands for city services, which in turn are reflected in the proposal.

The proposed budget recommends the hiring of 20 additional city staff members during the 1988-89 budget year.

Those recommended additional staff are six fire-rescue trainee workers; three police patrol officers;

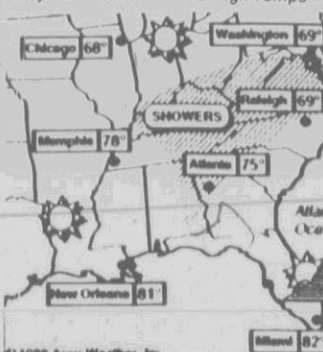
two police support and services workers; two refuse collectors; an additional animal control officer; a code enforcement officer; an electrical inspector; a city planner; a police detective; a police investigator; and a secretary/clerk-typist.

Knowles also said the proposed budget increase can be attributed to what he referred to as a major drop in city revenues from federal pro-

GHA Holding Line On Expenses

A mid-year review of Greenville Housing Authority finances indicates the low-cost housing provider's expenses are well within projected amounts, said a GHA official.

Kenneth Noland, executive director of the authority, told GHA commissioners at Monday's monthly meeting that the six-month finance report indicates the authority is in a favorable economic position as projected by the original budget six months ago.

"We're operating within our eco-

nomical boundaries and doing a good job," Noland said.

Included in his report were figures which show routine maintenance and operations, which had been projected at a cost of \$49 per unit, are currently running at \$42.64 per unit. Also contributing to the positive report was the GHA utility cost findings for the winter months.

"We did real well in utilities except for gas, and that will even itself out as the warm weather comes upon us," Noland said.

In the GHA's annual meeting conducted before the monthly matters, the commissioners unanimously

renamed Roscoe King as chairman and John S. Bell Jr. as vice chairman. Those positions are until May of 1989.

In another election, commission members re-elected King as president and Anne S. Duffus was elected to the board and named vice president of the Greenville Housing Development Corp.

The GHDC is an entity founded to provide financial assistance to private development. According to Noland, the organization works in conjunction with the GHA.

Also at Monday's meeting, GHA Commissioners recognized Roscoe C.

Norfleet, who completed a five-year appointment with the authority. Norfleet, who was GHA vice chairman, received a plaque commemorating his efforts with the GHA from May 1983 to May 1988.

The commissioners agreed to conduct a tour of GHA projects for the monthly meeting in June. The tour is scheduled for June 7 from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Noland also reported to the commissioners that authority staff is currently acquiring computer-related information which will

Sanford Holds Hearing On Rural Health Care Needs

Competition with urban centers for health care professionals and federal money are major challenges for those seeking to provide quality health care for rural people, health care providers testified during a U.S. Senate Budget Committee hearing held here Monday.

Rural areas must compete with urban centers in clinical facilities, salary and benefits for increasingly scarce health care professionals, James Bernstein, chief of the North Carolina Office of Health Resources Development, said during the hearing conducted at the East Carolina University School of Medicine by Sen. Terry Sanford Monday. He called this "an impossible situation for financially distressed rural hospitals" and said he believes we are as yet only seeing the "tip of the iceberg" in the health manpower shortage crisis.

According to Bernstein, the state's recruitment staff receives about 190 requests for physicians from 120 communities each year. Working with a pool of 450 physicians, a total including private individuals and those in government programs, the

state has been able to recruit an average of 61 a year.

Bernstein said a cutback in the National Health Service Corps program would sharply reduce the number of physicians available for recruitment in rural areas. He said 54 of the 73 physicians recruited in 1985 came from the federal program, 49 of 63 in 1986 and 28 of 54 in 1987. This year only nine of 53 will be in the federal program.

Next year, he said, the state will be competing for 241 participants of which only 36 will be family-practice specialists that are especially needed in rural areas. He said North Carolina would be lucky to recruit one of the doctors.

Dr. Theresa Lawler, a nursing educator from East Carolina University, said nurses are the backbone of health care delivery, especially in rural communities. She said the federal government must be supportive of innovative programs for nurses including recruitment, retention, respite and reorganization.

In her opinion, recruitment from as early as the junior high years must be used. For retention, supportive work climates must be developed,

she said, including participative management, support for further education, higher salaries and sound benefit packages. Nurses, especially those in critical care, must be provided respite and reassignment at times to relieve or prevent burnout. She believes that baccalaureate programs must be emphasized, with associate nurses becoming the technicians and baccalaureate nurses the administrators of tomorrow.

Sanford stated in his opening remarks that part of the reason for the hearing was to learn of innovative programs used in eastern North Carolina that can be shared with the rest of the nation. Dr. Lawler mentioned the Co-Adventure program for nurse retention as one that could well be emulated elsewhere.

She stated, too, that public health is a large part of the health delivery picture in rural areas and said, in her opinion, the public health program of South Carolina is a model one.

Dr. Tim Monroe, who heads the Pitt County Health Department, said he differs with her opinion. He said he has worked in the public health

program of South Carolina, one operated from the state level with regional departments, and that he believes there is better community support and participation is achieved with the decentralized (100 departments in 100 counties with local government setting much of the policy) programs used in this state.

Several speakers, including Dr. Jane McCaleb, a family physician working in a community-based practice in Northampton and Halifax counties with 10 physicians and two physician assistants, said many communities are at risk of losing obstetrical service, while several other counties will soon be at real risk of having "no medical care available within a reasonable distance." Legislation to limit or differentiate medical malpractice insurance might be one answer, it was suggested.

Richard E. Harrell, administrator of Duplin General Hospital in Kenansville, said changes in reimbursement under the federal Medicare program for low-income people reduced the amount a rural hospital could receive from 80 cents on the dollar to 60 cents. He said the uncollectible amount especially hurts Duplin General because one out of three patients are covered by Medicare and almost half of the hospital's revenue comes from the program.

"If Congress cuts Medicare farther, we would have a very difficult time making up the lost revenue," he said.

Harrell criticized a policy that allows hospitals in urban areas to receive a higher level of reimbursement than a hospital in a rural area. He said rural hospitals are obliged to offer wages and benefits comparable to urban hospitals in order to keep their doors open.

Walter Sheppard, assistant dean for health services research and development of the East Carolina University School of Medicine, told about the medical school's Community Health Advocacy Program, which trains and provides continuing support for volunteers in various communities of the region to serve their neighbors in letting them know what is available in health care.

Bernstein acknowledged three de-

velopments since the early 1970s that have increased the availability of health care within eastern North Carolina. These, he said, are the establishment of the East Carolina University medical school, which has a record of graduating primary care physicians; the establishment of the state Area Health Education Centers program, which helps retain health professionals by providing them quality continuing education, and the

creation of the North Carolina Office of Rural Health Services, which has helped establish 45 rural health centers.

Sanford said Monday's hearing was intended to focus more attention on the special health care needs of rural areas. The testimony will be used in deliberations on the federal budget for fiscal year 1989, he said, and will also be sent to committees that authorize new programs.

Hearings Begin

N.C. House and Senate Appropriations Committees will begin hearings May 16, according to Rep. Ed Warren, D-Pitt, who serves on the House committee.



Quality Highway

Bypass Should Be Model Road

If the U.S. 264 bypass on a route northwest of Greenville is built as planned it will be a modern controlled access highway which should serve the county's needs into the 21st century.

The highway, as now planned, could also provide the pattern for the proposed Wilson bypass and for upgrading the portions of the new U.S. 264 now open to the standards that the county must have. The interchange planned at U.S. 264 west of Greenville will be designed for extension southeastward and the northwest bypass could determine the eventual design of a southeast bypass.

Department of Transportation officials at a recent public hearing explained that the northwest bypass will be constructed on a 280-foot right-of-way minimum. It is recommended that it have two 24 foot roadways with a 46 foot median.

The plans exhibited by DOT officials at Wellcome school call for interchanges at U.S. 264, N.C. 43, N.C. 33 and U.S. 13-N.C. 11. There will be separated crossings with no access at state roads 1404 and 1401. The project will also include bridging the Tar River.

At U.S. 13-N.C. 11 the highway will join the current U.S. 264 at the Burroughs Wellcome plant. From that point, U.S. 264 is four-laned to Washington.

West of Greenville the northwest bypass will join the new U.S. 264 to Farmville. From there construction is currently under way on the Farmville link. A Wilson bypass is projected with indications that its construction could be moved up if more highway construction money is forthcoming. West of Wilson U.S. 264 and 64 are currently fully controlled access to Raleigh.

The results of an important link like the Greenville northwest bypass for Pitt County and counties east is clear. If it is built as now planned it will provide the pattern for the remainder of U.S. 264 to the west. Most of what already exists can be made fully controlled with the addition of several interchanges. That is the quality highway the area must have to the west if it is to develop its full economic potential. The Department of Transportation's foresight in designing a northwest bypass to meet long range needs should be applauded. Local leaders should do all in their power to see that it is built to the planned standards and the remainder of the new U.S. 264 is brought up to those standards as rapidly as possible.

Bush, Dukakis, Trade Handicaps

Despite very real differences on issues, presidential candidates George Bush and Michael S. Dukakis have a lot in common.

The presumptive nominees were born within five miles of one another in Massachusetts. Both are dull campaigners who try to compensate by projecting an image of competence and relevant experience. The latest polls show them in a virtual dead heat.

And, in a country where presidential elections are normally won in the middle of the road, both are under pressure to make potentially disastrous concessions to party elements that are outside the American mainstream.

Dukakis has some things going for him. The experience of the last 30 years suggests, however, that his problems are less manageable than Bush's.

On the plus side for Dukakis, a recent poll showed that one-fifth of voters who went for Ronald Reagan in 1984 expect to vote Democratic this time.

There is, however, another set of political arithmetic.

Assuming Dukakis gets the nomination, the Democrats will have chosen a Northern liberal for the fourth time in the last six elections.

The previous three — Walter Mondale, George McGovern and Hubert Humphrey — all lost. To win, Dukakis must do very well in the South, where Bush is strong, and among white blue-collar workers who so far have not been especially turned on by his message.

This means that Dukakis, the liberal activist, must move toward the center. But to do that will risk serious erosion of support among blacks, the Democrats' most faithful constituency.

Jesse Jackson has no chance of winning the Democratic nomination. But he has won too many votes in the primaries to be ignored. Jackson probably can be counted upon to work for a Dukakis victory in November — for a price.

Signals from the Jackson camp indicate that he will try to use his leverage to nudge Dukakis into campaigning on the Jackson agenda, which includes items of broad appeal but on balance is well left of center.

If Dukakis accommodates Jackson, he will lose votes among Southerners and other conservative Democrats. If he doesn't, a lot of black voters may stay home on election day.

Bush has his own problems with the Republican right wing, which

fumes that he is taking them for granted. He would not like to see them sit out the campaign. But his strong following among rank-and-file Reagan loyalists puts him in a good position to resist their extremist demands.

Bush also has the edge in the battle of the resumes. If you can believe some polls, the voters want the next president to be a competent leader who knows his way around Washington. Bush has served in Congress and as ambassador to the United Nations, GOP national chairman, envoy to China, director of the Central Intelligence Agency and vice president.

Dukakis is a governor and former state legislator. Period. He has never worked in Washington and has exhibited a dubious grasp of foreign affairs.

The governor has scored some success in claiming competence on the basis of his state's economic gains. Bush strategists are confident, however, that they can deflate the "Massachusetts miracle" — the state has actually lost factory jobs during Dukakis' tenure — and exploit his weakness on defense issues. Bush's most intractable problem springs from the nature of the vice presidency — a notoriously dubious

launching pad for a presidential bid. (No sitting vice president has been elected to the top job since 1836.)

A vice president finds it difficult to establish his identity as a strong leader with ideas of his own. He cannot appropriately disavow unpopular policies of the president he hopes to succeed, and he is inhibited from making positive proposals in conflict with the policies of the outgoing administration.

Bush, for example, could be mightily damaged by the "sleaze factor" if Attorney General Edwin Meese remains in office much longer. But he cannot publicly demand Meese's removal.

It is hard to believe that Bush really thinks the anti-plant closing provisions of the trade bill would destroy U.S. competitiveness. But he has supported that Reagan absurdity, leaving Dukakis free to pose as the champion of workers and communities threatened by corporate callousness.

For Bush, there is no easy way out of the dilemma. It's a safe bet, though, that he wouldn't trade his problems for those faced by Dukakis.

Saudi Decision Good For Consumers

BONN, W. Germany — Saudi Arabia and the other Arab oil states of the Persian Gulf have made an important choice regarding their oil price strategy, and the result is good news for consumers worldwide.

At the meeting of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries that ended early Monday in Vienna, the Saudis and their allies decided to sacrifice their long-term interest in widening the influence of OPEC as a whole. They deliberately scuttled an unprecedented offer from six independent oil-producing countries last week that OPEC and the non-OPEC states adopt joint production cuts to push up prices.

Instead, the Saudi-led bloc chose to advance its objectives of strengthening its own position within OPEC and of punishing Persian Gulf rival Iran, according to U.S. and Arab oil analysts.

For the moment, that means that the Saudi bloc is aiming to keep oil prices stable, or even allow them to fall a bit. It is doing so against the declared wishes of an OPEC majority of eight of the cartel's 13 members.

The Saudi bloc — Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Iraq, the United Arab Emirates and Qata — does not want to use production cuts to engineer a rise in prices at a time when Iran desperately needs extra oil revenues to finance its war against Iraq.

"The ones who stand to benefit the most right now from a rise in prices are the Iranians, who are their (the Saudi bloc's) biggest enemies," a U.S. government oil analyst said.

On Sunday, Hashemi Rafsanjani, the speaker of Iran's parliament, accused the Persian Gulf Arab states of "flagrant treachery" in their oil policy. "The Saudis and Kuwaitis refuse to lower their production, and the

idea is to damage the Islamic revolution in Iran," Rafsanjani said.

The Saudis and their allies who sit on the world's largest oil reserves — also have economic reasons to avoid jacking up prices. They want to keep prices stable to encourage long-term demand for their oil, and to put pressure on the non-OPEC states to take on a greater share of the burden of cutting production.

Oil prices may rise modestly later this year because of rising demand, but the Saudis and their friends do not want to give that process a push, oil specialists say. Furthermore, the collapse of the OPEC talks has increased the likelihood that prices will not rise at all in the second half, they said.

World oil markets responded accordingly Monday as free-market prices dropped by 5 percent, or nearly a dollar a barrel. Traders had expected the meeting to produce some kind of output cut, and they marked down prices in disappointment. (On the New York Mercantile Exchange, the futures price for West Texas intermediate, the U.S. benchmark crude, slid to \$17.14 per barrel for June delivery, down 85 cents from Friday's close.)

For years, the Saudis and their allies have endorsed the view that OPEC needed to cooperate more with non-OPEC states in order to increase its leverage on world markets.

When OPEC met Thursday to consider the offer from the non-OPEC countries, however, it quickly became clear that the Saudi bloc would prevent a reduction as large as 5 percent. Instead, they suggested that OPEC match the non-OPEC offer barrel for barrel, meaning that OPEC would cut 183,000 barrels.

But the Saudi group made clear its real interest — to block an agreement with non-OPEC producers altogether — by attaching a second condition to its proposal. It said it wanted OPEC's production cut divided equally among the 12 participating OPEC members.

That part of the Saudi bloc's proposal clearly was designed as a spoiler, industry specialists said. OPEC's tiny producers, like Gabon and Ecuador, were not about to accept the same size production cut as that adopted by Saudi Arabia, which pumps more than 20 times as much oil.

Museum Might Draw Visitors

An interesting proposal has been advanced to raise \$1.5 million for development of an aeronautical museum in the Pitt-Greenville Airport area.

Plans were shown at a meeting in Greenville last week. It is anticipated it would be constructed on donated land at the airport.

A board of prominent local citizens will oversee the fund drive and the development of the museum. They say the location at the airport is ideal since it is convenient to downtown and the museum will bring visitors to Greenville who might then travel further eastward. The aeronautical museum would join other attractions here such as cultural events, art and entertainment for visitors' enjoyment.

It is expected the museum would include airplanes from various phases of aviation history, manuscripts and an honors room for North Carolina aviation pioneers.

The concept certainly has possibilities. Pitt County can't claim a great deal in the early development of air travel. On the other hand, our county is the state population area closest to the birthplace of aviation at Kitty Hawk. Travelers could fly to Greenville on regularly scheduled flights, view the museum and rent cars to visit the Wright Brothers Memorial.

If the project proves feasible, however, it should be done with contributed funds and it should be demonstrated it can operate without city or county appropriations.

Pitt County has shown it has the ability to attract travel and tourism business. If we expect people to visit for meetings or recreation there must be things to do here.

Why not an aeronautical museum? If the group which has proposed the project can raise the funds to build and operate it, the museum can only be a positive additional attraction for the county.

With the state primaries almost behind us, your front page article on May 1 was a timely reminder that the public needs to vociferously back House Bill 1124 in order to secure for the average citizen the means to run for state office in the future. This June the North Carolina Senate will consider HB 1124 which would establish a fund supported by a provision allowing individuals to elect to contribute all or part of their income tax refund to the fund. It would then provide matching grants to general elections candidates who agree to limit campaign expenditures in the general election. Application deadline would be August 1 of the year in question. The House passed the bill by a 40-vote margin during the last session of the General Assembly.

The League of Women Voters of the United States position regarding campaign financing reads as follows: "the methods of financing political campaigns should ensure the public's right to know, combat corruption and undue influence, enable candidates to compete more equitably for public office and allow maximum citizen participation in the political process." Supreme Court Ruling Could Affect Operations Of Outlets, Discounters

GREENSBORO (AP) — A Supreme Court ruling making it easier for manufacturers to withdraw their products from discount stores could have a significant impact on North Carolina's outlet malls and furniture stores, discount representatives say.

"It's an abomination," Barry Lefkowitz, a lobbyist hired by Burlington Coat Factory, said of Monday's court ruling. "This decision

should frighten people because it shows the court is only sensitive to big business and not to the consumers."

Lefkowitz said the ruling could have a detrimental effect on North Carolina, where there is a big discount trade. "Full price retailers will have a field day with this ruling," he said.

For the past year, Burlington Coat Factory, based in Burlington, N.J.,

has been asking its customers to write their congressmen to support a pending bill that would strengthen discounter rules.

The high court ruled Monday that a manufacturer's agreement with a full-service dealer to stop doing business with a discounter does not violate antitrust law unless the agreement includes "some agreement on price or price levels."

Two North Carolina discount fur-

niture retailers — Rose Furniture of High Point and Parkway Gallery Furniture of Boone — have filed an antitrust suit against a manufacturer that wants to drop them as dealers.

Both stores do a thriving business shipping furniture to out-of-state customers at discount prices.

U.S. Middle District Court Judge Hiram Ward ruled against the retailers last month, but Fox said they plan to appeal.

Convicted

RALEIGH (AP) — A drifter was sentenced to life imprisonment plus 40 years Monday for the murder of an 84-year-old Raleigh woman and other violent crimes.

William Lahmar, 38, pleaded guilty in Wake County Superior Court to a reduced charge of second-degree murder in the July 9 death of Alberta Jones, as part of a plea arrangement.

Lahmar also pleaded guilty to first-degree burglary, first-degree kidnapping, breaking and entering, common law robbery, larceny of a motor vehicle and two counts of armed robbery for unrelated crimes. Lahmar could have been sentenced to 250 years in prison or two life terms plus 150 years if convicted of all the charges.

state alcohol laws, snared 135 people in Wilmington on various alcohol and motor vehicle violations over the weekend, officials say.

About 40 Alcohol Law Enforcement agents, State Highway Patrol troopers and New Hanover County SAFE Squad officers watched dozens of bars and restaurants, and set up road blocks Friday night and all day Saturday, said Tom Parker, an ALE supervisor.

The crackdown netted 26 charges of driving while impaired, 26 alcohol violations, six charges of driving with license revoked, 16 speeding charges, 58 assorted traffic violations, two misdemeanor drug violations and one disorderly conduct charge, Parker said. Seventeen of the alcohol violations were for possession of alcoholic beverages by a minor.

HICKORY, N.C. (AP) — A 29-year-old Hickory man has been arrested in connection with the 1986 stabbing death of a 66-year-old woman, authorities says. Police said the arrest of Jerry Lynn King closes the investigation of Hickory's only unsolved murder.

King was being held without bond in the Catawba County Jail, charged with the first-degree murder in the death of Nancy Brown Covington, who was found in her bedclothes by a sister and niece who checked on her daily at her mobile home.

King was served with a murder warrant in the Stanly County unit of the North Carolina Department of Correction, where he is serving a three-year sentence for receiving stolen property.

UNC Study

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — A task force, reporting on its six-month study of communications between the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the school's constituents, has called on members of the independent Alumni Association to form a bridge between the school and lawmakers.

The UNC-CH Board of Visitors task force said faculty members fear that Chancellor Christopher C. Fordham III's insistence on compliance with the no-lobbying rule puts the university at a disadvantage with some other campuses in the system. The task force, however, supported continuing adherence to UNC System rules that only the system should lobby in Raleigh.

Informed alumni advocacy is the best way to improve legislative relations, according to an executive summary of the task force's preliminary report. A final version of the report will go for approval in June before the UNC-CH Board of Trustees.

Tax Fraud

ROANOKE (AP) — A federal judge placed on probation a Roanoke architect suffering from leukemia and convicted of a multimillion dollar tax shelter scheme.

"He's been sentenced by a greater judge than Judge Turk," said Edmunds J. Brokans, a prosecutor with the Justice Department's tax division. Brokans presented no evidence at the hearing Monday and agreed with defense attorney Keister Greer that Griggs should not be put in prison.

Griggs pleaded guilty in September 1986 to charges of filing false income tax reports and obstructing justice by attempting to destroy documents he had forged. His plea was part of a bargain in which the government dropped charges of tax shelter fraud.

Shooting

RALEIGH (AP) — A Burgaw man was shot to death early Sunday morning after he broke into his estranged wife's house in Raleigh and tried to attack the occupants with a butcher knife, police said Monday.

Charles Leroy Smith, 34, broke in through the back door of the home of Norma Smith, 36, about 4:20 a.m. Sunday, said Raleigh police Capt. B.W. Peoples. The Smiths had been separated for two years.

Smith forced open a locked bedroom door and began attacking Bernard Rhines Carree of Cary with an 8-inch butcher knife, Peoples said. Carree, 38, of Raleigh, shot Smith with a handgun, Peoples said, but he was not charged. Carree was not injured.

WILMINGTON (AP) — Operation Eagle, a project designed to enforce

Bee Hive

DURHAM (AP) — A swarm of 20,000 to 30,000 hungry bees made a home in downtown Durham Monday, prompting police to call in a beekeeper armed with a bar of honey to subdue the offending insects.

The bees settled in a tree across from the main post office. They kept to themselves, and no bee stings were reported. But they got the attention of police, who blocked off traffic in the right lane of Chapel Hill Street coming into the city, and called in beekeeper Jim Rich.

Rich, an employee of Edward Weck Inc. in Research Triangle Park, is an on-call bee expert for the police department, the Durham County Sheriff's Department and the animal control department.

Rich placed a wooden white box baited with a bar of honey in the street near the tree.

"They were hungry and smelled the honey," Rich said. "Once the queen bee went in, they turned around like little soldiers, started flapping their wings and followed her in."

The problem still wasn't solved. Rich had to wait until dark to move the box of bees.

"You can't move them during the day. They get real ill," Rich said.

Edgecombe Voting Observed

RALEIGH (AP) — The U.S. Justice Department is sending pollwatchers to Edgecombe County to make sure there is no interference with the right of minorities to vote, federal officials say.

Edgecombe County is the first county in the nation to be targeted for U.S. Justice Department observation this year, said Deborah Burston-Wade, a spokesman for the Justice Department. It will be the only coun-

ty in North Carolina to be observed in the primary election.

"We need to be purposely vague in announcing the decision to send observers," Ms. Burston-Wade said Monday. "This is the only observation we've had to send out this year." She could not say if Edgecombe will be observed for the general election in November.

Ms. Burston-Wade said she could not be specific on what type of con-

cerns had prompted the action by the Justice Department. The number of observations have decreased over the years since the Voting Rights Act of 1965, she said.

She said the department will send 39 observers, who are employees of the Office of Personnel Management and other federal government agencies.

"We will also have two attorneys on hand," she said. "There will be a lot of close contact so that if there are any questions everyone is poised for action."

Burning Ban Set

RALEIGH (AP) — State Forester Harry Layman imposed a burning ban Monday for 38 more North Carolina counties because of dry weather conditions, low humidity and high winds.

A ban on outdoor burning has been in effect since April 29 for 44 western and southeastern counties.

The burning ban is in effect in all North Carolina counties except Surry, Yadkin, Davie, Rowan, Stokes, Forsyth, Davidson, Rockingham, Guilford, Randolph,

Caswell, Alamance, Person, Orange, Durham, Granville, Vance and Wake counties.

Those 18 counties have not had the forest fire activity that others across the state have experienced in the past week.

All outdoor burning is prohibited except within 100 feet of an unoccupied dwelling if the fire is in a container from which it cannot escape, or if the fire is in a protected area where a competent person will keep it from escaping.

Monitor Salvage May Cost \$20 Million

HOUSTON (AP) — An engineer studying the sunken Civil War ship USS Monitor says it could cost \$20 million to raise the ironclad vessel from its 125-year-old grave off North Carolina.

But James Jenkins, a corrosion and metallurgical engineer with the Navy Civil Engineering Laboratory in Port Hueneme, Calif., also said that federal officials are uncertain whether to raise the ship.

"Personally, I'd like to make sure anything done there is done carefully so we don't waste the 120 years that it's been down there," Jenkins said Monday at the Offshore Technology Conference here. "We really don't know today what could or should be done."

Already, \$3 million has been spent

on research, and estimates of costs to raise the ship range from \$10 million to \$20 million, he said.

"There are major structural components, like the armored deck, the turret, the guns, the engine and the boilers, that appear to be relatively intact and probably could be retrieved," he said.

On New Year's Eve 1862, the USS

Monitor sank in a storm off Cape Hatteras.

Nine months earlier, on March 9, 1862, it battled the Confederate vessel Merrimack to a draw in the first combat between two ironclad ships. Neither ship was able to inflict serious damage on the other in the battle, which occurred at Hampton Roads off Virginia.

Bid To Lure Marine Lab Fails

RALEIGH (AP) — A federal marine geology laboratory will stay in Woods Hole, Mass., despite the efforts of four North Carolina universities to lure it to the Triangle.

Last November the U.S. Geological Survey's Branch of Atlantic Marine Geology sent out letters advising universities and other institutions in a number of states that its "non-renewable" lease with the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution would expire next fall.

U.S. Geological Survey officials invited bids for relocating the unit, and they selected four finalists. One of those four bids was submitted jointly by the University of North Carolina

at Chapel Hill and North Carolina State, East Carolina and Duke universities.

But the ground rules changed in March.

"They put out the thing (the invitation) that said, 'We have a non-renewable lease, and that was wrong,'" said Dirk Frankenberg, director of the marine science program at UNC-Chapel Hill. "It turned out to be a renewable lease."

In a March letter, Dallas R. Peck, director of the U.S. Geological Survey, wrote Frankenberg that the Woods Hole institution's administration had found a way to avoid evicting the marine geology branch.

"In the past two weeks, (Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution) has identified funds for the construction of a new facility to meet their own pressing space needs," the letter said.

"I think it is fair to say there was some displeasure on our part and on the part of other states involved in this proposed relocation," said Daniel M. Ashe, who is on the staff of the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, headed by Rep. Walter B. Jones, D-N.C.

"States like North Carolina complied in a good-faith effort, only to find them go outside the process," said Ashe.

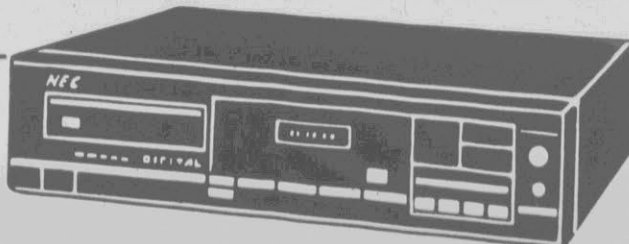

Outer Banks: Few Roads, Too Many People

NAGS HEAD, N.C. (AP) — Galloping development along the Outer Banks has left too many people with too few roads, coastal residents say, and the problems are likely to get worse.

"We have been ignored when it comes to transportation," said Sen. Marc Basnight, D-Dare, a former member of the state Board of Transportation. "It just isn't right, even if we don't grow by one more person."

State transportation officials argue that it's difficult to keep up with the growth along the Dare County coastline and other parts of the Outer Banks.

"There is constant erosion by the ocean and it makes it difficult," said Nathan Benson, assistant manager of the N.C. Department of Transportation's planning and research office.

Basnight says he is concerned that the bridges and highways connecting the barrier islands with the mainland are inadequate for an emergency

evacuation. A major hurricane combined with the tens of thousands of people who head for the beaches each weekend could spell disaster.

"We could lose a lot of lives out here," said Basnight. "I don't know what will happen."

Benson said he could understand the local residents' frustration with the lack of new highways and bridges. He said a number of large projects — including the \$21 million project to replace the Washington Baum Bridge on the Nags Head causeway — were included in the department's 10-year Transportation Improvement Program.

"I'm sure the folks feel they're not getting their share," he said. "But a lot of money is going there, and this is a big state with a lot of needs."

State transportation officials say decreases in money from the state gasoline tax, high inflation during the 1970s and reduced federal funding have strained the state's highway budget.

Local officials might have to consider charging tolls on the bridges and new roads to generate highway funds. Special assessments on construction projects also could be used for roads, according to the Dare County Carrying Capacity Report.

Traffic jams are a relatively new phenomenon on Hatteras Island, which was accessible only by ferry until the Herbert C. Bonner Bridge was built in 1962. Many of the main roads and bridges are less than 30 years old.

Ernal Foster, who was born in Hatteras in 1910, remembers hauling fish off the beach in a horse and cart when he and his brother launched their fleet of deep-sea charters in the late 1930s.

Sitting in his Albatross Fleet charter office, Foster recalled when the "all-weather road," or Route 12, was extended from the north to Hatteras after World War II. Despite warnings from locals that the placement of the road made it vulnerable to erosion, it went in as planned.

"They had to move it," he said with

a grin. "I admit I'm not smart, but it's only common sense to know what the ocean can do."

Up in Corolla, residents had to drive the beach north to Virginia to get supplies. Or they could use a boat.

"It was five miles by boat or 50 miles in a four-wheel-drive vehicle to get off the island," said Shirley Austin, who moved to the Outer

Banks nearly 30 years ago.

That all changed when Route 12 was extended north to the town line about 10 years ago. "It's a lot more convenient," said Mrs. Austin. "Now I have a grocery store, which I dearly love."

North of Corolla, the only road is the beach. Federal and state wildlife preserves blocked construction. Gates were installed to prevent

tourists from driving through the preserves. Long-time residents like Mrs. Austin could pass through, but not between midnight and 5 a.m.

She recalled when one native was arrested by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service officers for breaking the curfew.

"He told the U.S. government the tide doesn't follow their regulations," she said.

Road Bonds Suggested

RALEIGH (AP) — State Transportation Secretary James Harrington says a \$450 million bond issue over the next several years would help clear some of the state's \$11 billion highway backlog, but Democrats say the proposal is an election-year ploy.

"It is not proposed as the final solution," Harrington said Monday. "It is tailored to fit the short-term period, of our five-year forecast, to provide some walking-around money."

Harrington, in a letter mailed to the legislature's Highway Study

Commission, said the sale of bonds would be a stopgap measure.

"I ain't real hot about it," said state Sen. Bill Goldston, D-Rockingham, co-chairman of the commission. "This \$450 million is a drop in the bucket. Suppose we go with that bond issue now, and then we have to come back with a bigger one in 1989, who will the public trust?"

Pitt Board OKs Purchase Of \$1.2 Million Computer

Pitt County Commissioners approved the purchase of a new \$1.2 million computer mainframe and software for the county's data processing department, made revisions to an outdoor advertising sign ordinance passed by the board last month and gave tentative approval to the establishment of a wellness program for county workers at a meeting Monday.

In approving the purchase of the IBM computer hardware and operating system software, commissioners agreed to finance the purchase, over a three-year period, through First Wachovia at an interest rate of 6.4 percent. Under the

proposal, the county would pay a total of \$79,767 in interest, for a total repayment cost of \$1.34 million. Annual payments to First Wachovia would amount to \$447,235.

The 36-month financing plan approved Monday would save the county some \$33,200 over a proposal by IBM to finance the purchase at 7.02 percent, for a total repayment amount of \$1.37 million.

The new computer equipment is expected to be installed by June 30.

Commissioners, on the recommendation of the planning board and Jeff Ulma, the county planner, made revisions to the sign ordinance the board adopted April 12, to add language stating that the intent of the

law is to "prohibit" billboards along the U.S. 264 freeway between Greenville and Farmville.

The ordinance, which does not regulate on-premises business signs, was also modified to allow staggered setbacks for various size signs.

As adopted last month, the setback requirement for all signs on non-freeway highways in the county would be 50 feet from the highway right-of-way.

But the recommendation approved Monday would allow: signs of 21 square feet to 100 square feet to be placed 20 feet from the right-of-way; signs 101 square feet to 300 square feet 35 feet from the right-of-way; and signs 301 to 400 square feet to be placed 50 feet from the right-of-way.

Commissioners approved — in concept — a wellness program for county employees to be administered by the health department, following a recommendation by Dr. Tim Monroe, the county health department director.

Monroe, who said he would return with detailed plans and costs at budget time, estimated that the cost of a wellness program would be "less than \$50 per employee."

Monroe suggested that a wellness program would encourage employees to change their lifestyle and help prevent such things as heart attacks, cancer and accidents.

By improving employee health and reducing the risks to workers,

Monroe said the county would reduce its insurance costs and time lost due to illness and accidents.

The board Monday also began negotiating with architects on the cost of developing a master plan for county facilities. Three firms — Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum of Washington, Dudley Shoe Ellingwood & Associates of Greenville, and Carter Goble Associates of South Carolina — formed a joint venture to submit a proposal for the project.

Initial estimates of the cost of the plan, presented to commissioners Monday, totaled some \$130,000.

ment with the Pitt County school system will be screened for drug usage as in integral part of the pre-employment physical examination. The additional cost to the school system for this screening program is about \$29,000 annually. The applicant must provide proof that any prescription drugs being used are under the direction of and were prescribed by a physician.

In the tobacco policies, employees may use tobacco products in areas designated by the school principal during the regular school day, but are encouraged not to use the products in the presence of students while on duty or participating in school-related activities.

Students above age 17, who have signed permission from their parents, may use tobacco products in designated areas established by the principal. A sign-up sheet will be posted in each smoking area at the school, and students using the area must sign it with each use. A faculty member will be assigned to supervise the area.

At a cost of more than \$50,000 annually to the school system, the board approved an Employee Assistance Program Policy that will provide counseling services of the Pitt County Mental Health Center to employees confidentially and directly without contact or knowledge of any school system personnel. The services would accommodate indi-

vidual counseling needs as well as needs specified in policies for tobacco and substance abuse.

The program will provide a minimum of four visits for each full-time employee, while Blue Cross-Blue Shield would cover about 80 percent of visits needed after those paid for by the school system up to a maximum of 50 visits or \$2,200, whichever comes first (assuming the deductible has been paid).

Tiffany History Being Displayed

NEW YORK (AP) — A gallery sparkling with both historic and contemporary Tiffany jewelry finds an unusual but appropriate place among the other treasures of the American Museum of Natural History here through June 5. It contains an exhibition, "Tiffany: 150 Years of Gems and Jewelry," whose emphasis on the development of the use of American gemstones and on design based on natural forms points up the shared history of the two institutions.

fany vice president and senior gemologist, George Harlow of the museum's department of mineral sciences is the resident curator.

Such American gemstones are the Montana sapphires, Maine and California tourmalines, North Carolina emeralds and New Jersey rubies shown here. Tiffany expanded the use of the staple "precious stones" to include semi-precious stones, and their wider color spectrum with more unusual tones of orange, green, blue and lavender — opals, tourmalines, aquamarine, yellow beryl, zircons and turquoise, for example, of American origin.

The visual allure of the display — splendid chunks and crystals of gem minerals as well as scintillating pieces of finely worked jewelry — is heightened by the romantic associations of some exhibits: a pearl necklace and bracelets Abraham Lincoln gave his wife in 1861, pieces from the French Crown Jewels purchased in 1887, a 75-carat emerald that once belonged to the Sultan of Turkey, and escape artist Harry Houdini's watch with its gold chain formed of miniature handcuffs — to say nothing of Gypsy Rose Lee's fire opal bracelet.

The exhibition also follows Tiffany's development of jewelry design, with emphasis on the use of natural forms. In addition to classic flower, bird and insect forms, exhibits include the botanically correct enameled orchid brooches exhibited at the Paris exhibition of 1889; a sinuous 19th-century woven-gold snake armband with rubies; and a charming group of animal brooches in gold, diamonds and enamel, including a miniature zebra, horse, deer, falcon and tiger.

There are more than 100 pieces of jewelry on show, most of them belonging to private collectors and rarely or never before on public display, in addition to the mineral specimens.

Two large brooches are dramatically crafted in the shape of diamond- and platinum-stemmed chrysanthemums, their petals formed from the distinctively shaped long Mississippi pearls.

"One of the themes is Tiffany's development of the use of American gemstones," explains Janet Zapata, art historian and Tiffany archivist and guest curator of the exhibition together with Peter Schneirla, Tif-

The famous 128.54-carat Tiffany yellow diamond that shines out from its case near the entrance to the exhibition serves to introduce a distinguished figure in both Tiffany's and the museum's history, that of the gemologist George F. Kunz (1856-1932).

Astrologist Righter Dies

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Carroll Righter, astrologist to movie stars and writer of a syndicated daily advice column for 166 newspapers around the world, has died. He was 88.

Righter died Saturday at St. John's Medical Center, two days after being admitted with cancer of the prostate, said hospital spokesman Armen Markarian.

Good friend and fellow astrologer Thomas S. Pierson will take over Righter's column, but said the aging master had completed his predictions through October.

A native of Philadelphia, Righter once studied to become a lawyer, but charted a new course after a sports injury. He studied his own astrological chart and saw he had "physical protection in the Southwest," he once said.

Righter worked out of his Hollywood home, using an old manual typewriter and thesaurus, and surrounded himself with photographs of his famous clientele.

Although he often forgot the names of people he had met, he reportedly never forgot their birth signs and would address them as "Miss Virgo" or "Mr. Aries," friends said.

Righter also wrote several books, including "Astrology and You," the "Astrological Guide to Health and Diet" and the "Astrological Guide to Marriage and Family Relations."

Walesa Tells Striking Poles To Find New Union Leader

GDANSK, Poland (AP) — Solidarity chief Lech Walesa today told thousands of cheering workers at the Lenin shipyard that they must find another union leader as a strike took hold at the birthplace of the outlawed labor federation.

Strike leaders said 80 percent of the 12,000 workers had dropped their tools.

The yard's giant cranes were idle, and a large poster at the gate listed the strikers' demands: higher pay, reinstatement of Solidarity nationwide, release of political prisoners and reinstatement of fired activists.

Thousands of workers, gathered in the factory's courtyard and perched on rooftops and fences, heard Walesa's speech.

"We don't want to be the beggars of Europe and of the world," Walesa told the shipyard workers as he endorsed the strike that began Monday.

Walesa, who headed the August 1980 strike at the shipyard that gave rise to the East bloc's first independent labor movement, received a loud cheer from the workers when he entered the yard this morning.

The 44-year-old electrician had been on sick leave this week, com-

plaining of back pains and low blood sugar.

Walesa told workers that Poland's labor struggle had exhausted him.

"I am not your leader. I am tired ... You have to find for yourself a new Walesa," he said.

He also told the workers they were taking up the same cause he fought for in 1980.

"We lost eight years," he said, speaking through a loudspeaker.

"Here, in the birthplace of Solidarity, I state to the authorities that they are deepening the losses, they are forcing Solidarity to lead the nation onto the road to reforms," said Walesa, winner of the 1983 Nobel Peace Prize.

The work stoppage at the shipyard was at least the fourth strike in communist Poland in a week and contributed to the worst wave of labor unrest since the government's December 1981 military crackdown on Solidarity.

In Wroclaw today, workers at a railroad car plant stopped production for about an hour. And a bitter strike at the Lenin steelworks in southern Poland entered its eighth day.

About 1,000 workers laid down their

tools for several hours at the Pafawag railroad car plant in Wroclaw, said Solidarity spokeswoman Barbara Labuda, but they resumed work after a promise for talks with management. Government spokesman Jerzy Urban confirmed the stoppage.

Alojzy Szablewski, 62, a 36-year veteran of the shipyard who led a strike at the Lenin shipyard when martial law was imposed in December 1981, has emerged as the leader of the strike committee.

"The nation has to believe somebody. It will believe only Solidarity," Szablewski said in a speech today at the shipyard gate.

Walesa "supports us," Szablewski told the strikers. "We listen to him and follow his advice."

Walesa endorsed the strike when it began Monday. But he stayed off the local strike committee to coordinate Solidarity activities nationwide, activists said.

Strikers slept outside in the shipyard overnight and police detachments roamed the city, but were not near the shipyard gate.

grams and higher city costs mandated beyond the city's control.

Cost increases include a federal gas tax on municipalities, cities having to pay a Medicare tax, a significant increase in insurance premiums, and the issuance of mandated retirement benefits to police officers.

Knowles also said the 7.8 percent proposed budget increase is really an increase over a two-year period. He said last year's budget was a "hold the line budget" and actually decreased 85 percent.

"It's time to catch up," he said. In addition to the 7.8 percent increase, Knowles is proposing the council consider an additional \$498,060 budget expense which, if approved, would expand the budget 10.36 percent over last year and create a tax hike.

That budget item would create a major capital improvement program for the city which would act like a savings bank to take care of high-cost infrastructure repairs and additions. "One of the biggest problems we have in this country is that nobody is putting any money into infrastructure," Knowles said. "We (the city) haven't put money into streets in over 25 years. Evans Street is the first major project we've done and between this year and next year it will be a \$1.4 million project that we will have funded."

"Some of the most serious problems facing America today are infrastructure-related problems like bridges collapsing, streets caving in, and potholes," he said. "This would be a program where we could take care of these things before they get out of hand, and in doing this, we will be one of the few cities around that is looking to the future in trying to take care of the infrastructure before it falls apart," Knowles said.

He explained his proposed program would be significantly different from the capital reserve system of funding projects which the city currently uses.

"Capital reserve is a sinking fund and it's usually funded from fund balance. In other words, at the end of the year, if you have any money left, you put it in there. It's possible that over time under that philosophy, you'll burn out that whole capital reserve."

Knowles also said the legal ability to transfer funds would be more flexible under his proposed funding program and appropriating money to specific projects would be significantly easier.

As for taxes, Knowles said the 7.8 percent increase in the proposed budget would create no additional tax burden to taxpayers.

"We have taken into account the revaluation that has occurred and we have adjusted in our minds how we intend to get from point A to point B. In this budget you won't see much discussion about the tax rate. We ask for dollars and then later we'll equate that to a tax rate. Last year's tax rate was 63 cents. This year's tax rate, if the council adopted the tax rate exactly the way it is, for general operations, would be 53 cents. The difference is based on the revaluation. In other words, each of those rates would provide the same dollars to the city," Knowles said.

However, Knowles said his capital improvement program as proposed would boost the tax rate to 57 cents.

The council has scheduled four budget discussion sessions during May. The first session is scheduled Thursday at 5:50 p.m. in the third floor conference room of City Hall.

"I think the council has an obligation and responsibility to look at the budget and determine whether or not it was a true reflection of what they want," Knowles said.

"Maybe they have some comments and suggestions or some changes on where we're heading. I'm sure they're going to make those known and solicit public input on some of the comments that I've made. They may cut some things here or there, but I think generally speaking you won't see them cutting a lot of the operational departments," Knowles added.

die West said there are several possibilities that will be considered, including making the building two stories and installing an elevator for the handicapped, and acquiring land adjacent to the school for building needs.

West also assured Mary Williams that he has not talked with East Carolina University officials about selling Elmhurst School. Ms. Williams brought a publication to the attention of West and the board that said the university and the school system had discussed the sale of Elmhurst in addition to J.H. Rose High School.

In other matters, the board was addressed by Don Carson of Bethel who said he represented other parents and their concerns about the "racial imbalance and quality of

education" at Bethel Elementary. Bethel has a large racial deviation but there has been no discussion about how to address the issue, he said. "Why should Bethel be treated any differently?"

West said the Bethel situation cannot fully be assessed for changes until it is determined where the new Stokes School will be located in the North Pitt attendance area. Currently the racial balance at Bethel is about 70 percent black and 30 percent white.

In response a question from Ms. Williams on where the public can get budget information and other public school documents, West said copies are sent to Sheppard Memorial Library and they are available at the school system's office in the county building.

For Nine And Two-Thirds Innings

Robinson Is Near Perfect

CINCINNATI (AP) — Ron Robinson learned the hardest thing about pitching a perfect game. There's not the slightest room for bad luck or a bad curve. Both his luck and his curve flattened out Monday night with perfection just a swing-and-a-miss away.

The Cincinnati Reds' right-hander pitched a perfect game for 8 2-3 innings before giving up a two-ball, two-strike single to Montreal pinch-hitter Wallace Johnson that ended his bid for fame and left the Reds with a sick feeling.

He then served up a two-run homer to Tim Lincecum that ended his bid for the first shutout of his career, and needed John Franco to save a 3-2 victory over the Expos.

"What can I say? I wish I could have gotten it, but I didn't," Robinson said matter-of-factly.

His flirtation with perfection ended a stunning day for the Reds, who spent the afternoon contemplating the loss of Manager Pete Rose. National League President Bart Giamatti suspended Rose for 30 days for pushing umpire Dave Pallone over a disputed call in a game Saturday night. Rose will be eligible to manage while the suspension is appealed.

Rose hadn't intended to make the game Monday night — he had arthroscopic knee surgery and was home recuperating. The Reds knew he was at home watching on television as Robinson made a run at the ultimate pitching feat.

"It's ironic that it happened the night he's not here," Robinson said. "It's too bad he couldn't have been here."

With coach Tommy Helms running the team, the Reds got off to a flashy start. Kal Daniels hit a first-inning homer off Pascual Perez, 3-3, Eric Davis singled home a run in the fourth, and Chris Sabo added a solo homer in the sixth.

Meanwhile, Robinson was breezing. Only one outstanding defensive play was required, a nice glove-and-throw by second baseman Jeff Treadway to retire Tim Wallach on a second-inning grounder up the middle. Wallach and Andres Galarraga also had infield lineouts, but the Expos otherwise didn't even come close to a baserunner through eight innings.

"All he was doing was taking something off on his fastball and using his curve and getting it over," Expos manager Buck Rodgers said. "I'd say he and (catcher) Bo Diaz did an excellent job."

"I think the fans thought about it (a perfect game) before I did," Robinson said. "They started to get into it in the sixth."

"In the eighth inning, I really realized what was going on," Treadway said. "I went into the dugout and nobody said anything. It was like, 'Let's pretend

it's not happening.' Everybody was excited about what was going on."

By the ninth, Robinson was into it, too.

"It was awesome. It was a great feeling," he said. "I've never had that feeling in pro ball."

He retired Mike Fitzgerald on a routine grounder to short and got Tom Foley to fly out. Johnson, a switch-hitter, then batted for Perez as the crowd stood and cheered and Robinson's teammates turned their hats around for good luck.

"I was trying to put voodoo or whatever on the last batter," Franco said. "We had our hats on backwards."

Johnson welcomed the final challenge.

"That's what baseball's all about," he said. "You want to be in situations like that. You thrive on situations like that."

Robinson went to a two-ball, two-strike count, and Johnson barely got a piece of his next pitch, fouling it off to stay alive. The next delivery was a flat curve over the plate where Johnson could reach it.

He hit a soft liner that bit the artificial turf in shallow left field, too shallow for Daniels to catch as he charged in. Robinson stomped his foot in disappointment.

"You could tell that it was a line-drive base hit all the way," Treadway said. "The only way that ball was going to be caught was if Kal was playing right behind the shortstop."

"Everybody out there grit their teeth. I think everybody on the field was hurting. It really makes your heart drop."

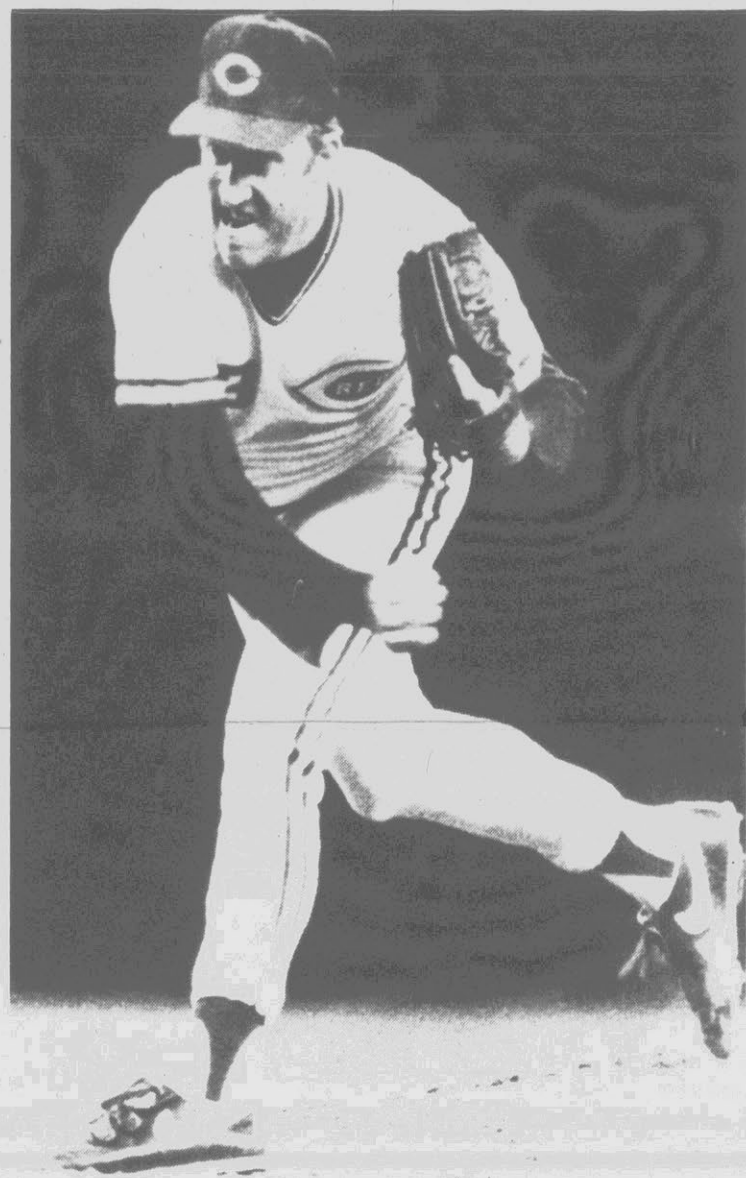
Robinson took the disappointment by trying to look on the bright side. He evened his record at 2-2 and ended the Reds' four-game losing streak. He also had his longest outing of the season in five starts.

"I'm just glad a guy with arm surgery could go that far," he said.

Robinson had arthroscopic surgery last Oct. 6 to remove a bone chip. His fastball has been drastically reduced as a result.

He was perhaps the most unlikely pitcher on the Cincinnati staff to come that close to the first perfect game since California's Mike Witt retired all 27 batters against Texas for a 1-0 victory on the final day of the 1984 season. Robinson, 26, was shifted from the bullpen to the rotation last season. He has a 28-19 career record in 40 starts and 128 relief appearances. He's never thrown a shutout and has just one complete game in his career.

"There are a lot of 'ifs' in this game," Robinson said. "All you want to do is come out on top."

Malone Saves Washington

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — With the Washington Bullets teetering on the brink of elimination from the NBA playoffs, Jeff Malone took it upon himself to help his team survive to play at least one more night.

Malone scored eight of his 35 points in overtime Monday to help the Bullets remain alive with a 114-106 victory. Detroit still holds a 2-1 lead in the best-of-five series that continues Wednesday night.

After the Pistons opened the fourth quarter with a 12-1 run to take an 87-81 lead, Malone began to assert himself. He scored nine points in the final 3:22 of regulation, then dominated the overtime with a variety of long-range jumpers.

"We were struggling, and I figured someone had to take over," Malone said. "I decided to be the one to do it."

It was the only game played Monday night. Tonight, the Chicago Bulls, led by Michael Jordan, who on Sunday became the first player ever to score 50 points in consecutive playoff games, try to eliminate the Cavaliers at Cleveland. Also, the defending champion Los Angeles Lakers try for a sweep when they visit the San Antonio Spurs.

Elsewhere tonight, Dallas visits Houston and Denver is at Seattle. Those series are tied at 1-1.

On Wednesday night, Boston takes a 2-0 lead to New York and Milwaukee tries to stave off elimination at home against Atlanta. Also, Portland visits Utah in a series tied at 1-1.

Malone had extra incentive to play well. Last year, he was stung by criticism in the wake of Detroit's three-game playoff sweep after he shot only 37 percent from the floor and averaged a mere 15 points per game.

"This year, I was ready to show my leadership," Malone said. "It was a frustrating, terrible series last season, so this year I figured I had to assert myself."

Malone scored 33 points in the opening game of the series and 31 in Game 2, but the Bullets lost both. Things were different Monday night, however, as Malone led Washington to victory by hitting 15 of 22 shots from the floor, including his last seven.

"This is the best I've ever seen of Jeff," Washington Coach Wes Unseld said. "He's given us a lift offensively that's been missing."

With the score tied at 104-104 in overtime, Malone hit a 15-foot jumper with 2:08 left. After a Detroit miss, John Williams' basket made it 108-104.

A driving basket by Isiah Thomas cut the Washington lead to 108-106, but Malone and Darrell Walker hit consecutive field goals to give the Bullets a 112-106 advantage with 43 seconds left.

Moses Malone scored 23 points for the Bullets, who blew a 12-point first-half lead but fought back down the stretch after being held to one field goal in the opening 6:17 of the fourth quarter.

"I said all along that this was a potential five-gamer, and I hope our guys are ready for it," Detroit Coach Chuck Daly said.

Thomas led the Pistons with 29 points and Adrian Dantley, limited to 26 minutes because of the flu, scored 22.

After struggling through most of the final period, Washington grabbed a 93-92 lead with 1:59 left on Jeff Malone's 15-foot jumper.

After two free throws by Thomas gave Detroit a 98-96 advantage with 34 seconds remaining in regulation, Bullets forward Bernard King responded with a jumper from the corner with 19 seconds to play. With two seconds left, a shot by Detroit's Joe Dumars from the top of the key banged off the rim.

The Bullets took a timeout with one second left but could not get off a shot.

In the first half, Washington scored eight straight points to take a 45-33 lead with 4:56 left, but Detroit got six points from Dumars in an 8-0 run to cut the gap to 45-41.

After Washington worked the margin back up to 52-44, the Pistons closed the half with seven consecutive points, including a 35-foot jumper by Thomas at the buzzer, to pull within 52-51.

Tonight's Games

Chicago (2-0) at Cleveland (0-2)

Despite the presence of Jordan, the Cavaliers remain confident. Cleveland, which split the season series 3-3, was up by a point with a minute to

go Sunday before Jordan hit a jumper and two free throws.

"There's no doubt in my mind we'll get them in Cleveland," guard Mark Price said.

Jordan has dominated the series, often driving past two and three defenders with ease.

"He plays in an area where no one ever before has played," said Gary Fitzsimmons, the Cavaliers' player personnel director.

Los Angeles Lakers (2-0) at San Antonio (0-2)

The Lakers, 7-0 against the Spurs during the regular season, picked up right where they left off, breezing to victory by 122-110 and 130-112 in the first two games.

The Spurs believe the law of averages is on their side, however.

"Their number is ready to come up in San Antonio," guard Alvin Robertson said. "We're going to beat them. We play much better at home."

Dallas (1-1) at Houston (1-1)

"We're fortunate to be even with them at this point," Nuggets coach Doug Moe said of the SuperSonics. "They've played two great games."

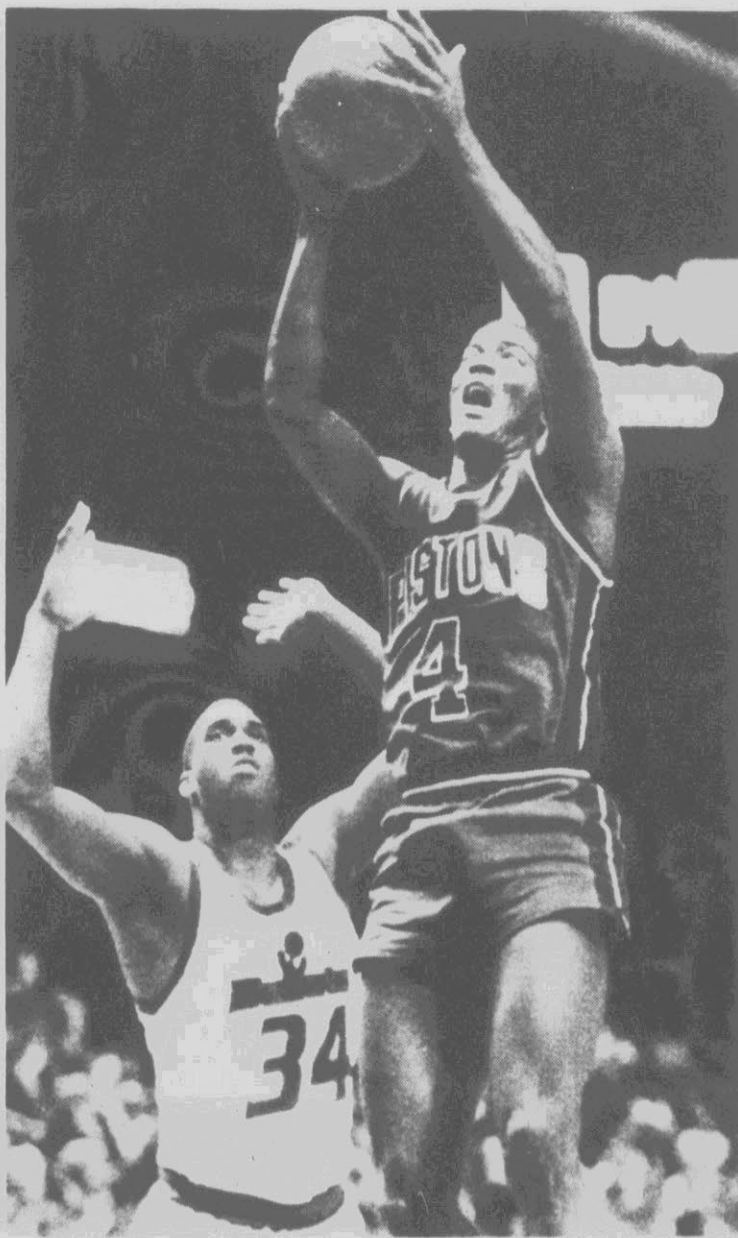

Winning Wait Was Long One

Phil Parsons felt it would take time to get his car into victory lane, but he admits that five years was a little longer than he had planned.

Parsons ended his frustration Sunday by winning the Winston 500 at Talladega.

"Probably when we came into it, we weren't ready to win," Parsons said in a telephone interview. "Then, after a couple of years, we felt like we were ready but we couldn't win."

The younger brother of 1973 Winston Cup champion Benny Parsons began his racing career by competing in a series of NASCAR races for subcompact automobiles. Driving from his college campus in Michigan into the Southeast, Parsons earned rookie of the year honors in 1978, and in 1979 he was voted the circuit's most popular driver.

Later that year, the younger Parsons joined his brother's racing team in Savannah, Ga. In 1980, Phil Parsons began running a Late Model Sportsman team out of Asheboro, N.C., and it took three years before he took a checkered flag.

In 1983, Parsons broke into the

Winston Cup level and was runner-up for rookie of the year honors. But it was in 1983, at that year's Winston 500, that Parsons was involved in one of the most spectacular crashes in NASCAR history, flipping his car three or four times and catching fire in the process.

The wreck landed Parsons' car in the International Motorsports Hall of Fame Museum and put him out of action with a fractured scapula. But his enthusiasm didn't wane.

"I couldn't wait to get back to Talladega. We were running well when we crashed," Parsons said.

"Everybody has had crashes," he added, referring to Richard Petty's spectacular crash this year at Daytona. "When he goes back, he'll run just as strong as ever. You forget about them and go on."

Parsons went on until this season, when he posted a third-place finish at Daytona and worked his way into contention with a strong run on Sunday.

"I think, number one, we had just an incredibly strong car. Leo Jackson built the engine and it was just a tremendous engine as it was all week," Parsons said. "All the guys in the shop put a real good car together."

And Parsons needed all the horsepower he could muster for a 10-lap dash that arose after Ricky Rudd's blown engine brought out a caution flag that compressed the field.

"When that caution flag came out, I almost had a heart attack," Parsons said. "If you don't get a good start, you get hung out to dry and you never get back in line."

Parsons had just passed Geoff Bodine to take the lead when blue smoke drifted from Rudd's car to slow the field. Parsons and Bodine went side-by-side on the backstretch at about 196 mph and nearly scraped metal before Parsons drove his Oldsmobile by Bodine's Chevrolet to start the fight to the finish line.

"Before the caution, I was just thinking about holding Bodine off," said Parsons, the younger brother of former Winston Cup champion Benny Parsons. "I was going to do my best to keep him behind me. When the caution came out, I was going to try and keep three or four or five cars behind me."

Bodine dropped to third and Parsons had to fend off native son Bobby Allison, who finished just .21 seconds behind the checkered flag. That made winning at Talladega against a fast-closing field secondary to winning against a cagey veteran like Allison.

"It's not the fact that it was in Alabama, but that Bobby Allison is one of the best that ever was," Parsons said. "He knows a lot of the tricks of the trade. Had we had equal cars, his experience might have come true."

Orioles Release Veteran Pitcher McGregor

BALTIMORE (AP) — Veteran left-hander Scott McGregor, one of the five winningest pitchers in baseball since 1980, has been released by the Baltimore Orioles after more than two years of declining performances, the Orioles announced today. McGregor, 34, who has won 107 games over the past nine years, is 0-3 this season with an 8.83 ERA. He has a 13-25 record since the start of the 1986 season. The only four pitchers who have won more games this decade than McGregor are Jack Morris of Detroit, Ron Guidry of the New York Yankees, and Phil Niekro and Dave Stieb of the Toronto Blue Jays.

Suns Ax Wetzel After One Year

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Although Phoenix Suns president Jerry Colangelo calls his franchise "one of the most stable in the NBA," the team is searching for its fourth head coach in 15 months. Colangelo, saying his club was "going in the wrong direction" with four straight losing seasons, fired first-year head coach John Wetzel and assistant coach Herb Brown on Monday. Phoenix struggled to a 28-54 record this season, the franchise's worst since the 1968-69 expansion team went 16-66. Wetzel, 43, had been named the Suns' seventh head coach on April 27, 1987, despite having no previous NBA head-coaching experience but serving as a Phoenix assistant since 1979. Wetzel succeeded interim coach Dick Van Arsdale, who was 14-12 in the final 26 games of the 1986-87 season after John MacLeod was fired in his 14th year with the club on Feb. 26, 1987. Colangelo said he hopes to hire a new head coach "very, very soon" and he will be "an experienced NBA coach in all probability." Cotton Fitzsimmons, currently the Suns director of player personnel, may have the inside track on the job. He coached Phoenix in 1970-72 and had a combined 97-67 record, which still stands as the club's best winning percentage. Fitzsimmons, 56, also coached in the NBA at Atlanta, Buffalo, San Antonio and Kansas City, where he was the league's Coach of the Year in 1978-79.

Evert On A Roll, Set For Provis

ROME (AP) — Chris Evert was coming off an impressive victory over Martina Navratilova. Nicole Provis was coming off an unimpressive victory over Jenny Byrne. The two were to meet today in a second-round match of the \$200,000 Italian Open women's tennis tournament after taking quite different routes to the match. The top-seeded Evert beat long-time rival Navratilova in Houston last week as she prepared for the tournament she has won five times. The 33-year-old who has won 18 Grand Slam titles received a first-round bye here. Provis, an 18-year-old from Australia, didn't earn a bye and she had to beat countrywoman Byrne 7-5, 5-7, 6-3 Monday for the right to face Evert.

Sutton Fails To Get Credit

Los Angeles manager Tom Lasorda denied Don Sutton a victory, and the official scorer took one away from Alejandro Pena. Jesse Orosco eventually ended up with the victory as the Dodgers beat the visiting Pittsburgh Pirates 6-3 Monday night. Sutton had a 5-3 lead with two down in the fifth when Lasorda took him out of the game in favor of Pena. That left Sutton one out shy of the required five innings needed for a victory. "It hurts like hell," said the 43-year-old right-hander, who returned to the Dodgers this season as a free agent after seven years. "I'm sitting there thinking he (Lasorda) wishes I wasn't here and that he has limited confidence in my ability. It doesn't make sense to me." Orosco's victory didn't make sense to a number of Dodger players who felt Pena should have received credit. Pena, whose unblemished earned

run average stayed intact after to innings of one-hit ball, was denied the victory by official scorer Wayne Monroe. Monroe, who has been scoring games for nine seasons, cited rule 10.19 (c) for his decision to award the victory to Orosco, 1-0, who gave up one hit over the last 2-1-3 innings. Rose-Ump Incident Gets Skipper A Big Suspension

CINCINNATI (AP) — Pete Rose will be allowed to manage the Cincinnati Reds while he fights his 30-day suspension — the harshest for a manager in 41 years — for shoving an umpire. Rose said he was shocked to receive the month-long suspension Monday from National League President Bart Giamatti for shoving umpire Dave Pallone. The two shoves during a loss Saturday night to the New York Mets touched off an ugly scene at Riverfront Stadium, with fans hurling objects at Pallone. Giamatti called the incident "one of the worst in baseball's recent memory." He also chastised Reds broadcasters Marty Brennaman and Joe Nuxhall for their on-air criticisms of Pallone during the 15-minute barrage by fans, and summoned them to New York today for a meeting. Giamatti called their

It's the longest suspension for a manager since Leo Durocher of the Brooklyn Dodgers was suspended for the 1947 season by Commissioner Happy Chandler for "incidents detrimental to baseball." Durocher allegedly had associated with gamblers. Reds General Manager Murray Cook said the team supports Rose's position and will file a formal appeal today. Rose will be allowed to manage while his appeal is heard. If he loses the appeal, Rose would be barred from the dugout and from any area where he could give directions to the team once the games begin. "I'm assuming Pete will manage the club at this point (tonight) if he's able," Cook said. The stiff suspension and undisclosed fine — reported by several sources to be \$10,000 — were applauded by Richie Phillips, executive director of the Major League Umpires' Association. "I think that's just fine," he said. "I had asked him (Giamatti) to move swiftly and severely, and I think 30 days are justified." Pallone declined comment on the suspension. He's one of two current National League umpires who worked during the 1979 umpires' strike, and isn't a member of the union. The play that touched off the incident occurred in the ninth inning Saturday night in a 5-5 game that had already included a bench-clearing tussle over a hit batsman. Howard Johnson was on second base with two out in the ninth when Mookie Wilson hit a grounder to shortstop Barry Larkin, whose throw pulled Nick Esasky off first base. Pallone hesitated before calling Wilson safe, giving Johnson time to score the eventual winning run without a throw home. Rose shot out of the dugout and got into an animated argument with Pallone. The umpire poked Rose below the left eye, and Rose shoved Pallone. Rose then was ejected, inciting the crowd of 41,032. Radios, baseballs, marbles, golf balls and other objects were thrown on the field for 15 minutes. Pallone was told by crew chief John Kibler to seek refuge in the umpires' quarters while the rest of the crew finished the game. Asked Monday whether he waited too long to make the call, Pallone said, "My honest answer to that is no." Giamatti harshly criticized the Reds' broadcasters, saying, "There is no excuse for encouraging a situation where the physical safety and well-being of any individual is put significantly at risk. Nothing justified such unprofessional behavior." Brennaman said he stands by his criticism of Pallone. "The guy's an incompetent umpire. I said that, and I'm not backing off that one bit," Brennaman said Monday.

remarks inflammatory. The suspension touched off a flurry of irate phone calls to local talk shows Monday, left Reds players stunned by the severity, and brought calls for an equally severe sanction against Pallone. "It's kind of a harsh fine, 30 days," pitcher John Franco said. "I don't think it's fair to the players, to Pete or to Cincinnati. If anybody should be suspended for 30 days, it should be Pallone. "Thirty days is too much. There are people who commit crimes and don't spend 30 days in jail." Rose, too, thought the penalty too severe. He didn't show up at the ballpark Monday because he had arthroscopic knee surgery in the afternoon, but said in a statement released by the club that he'll challenge the penalty. Coach Tommy Helms managed the team in a 3-2 victory over Montreal.

"No player or manager has greater respect for the umpires than I do, and I have demonstrated that over the years," Rose said. "But I am shocked at the length of the suspension I received. While I expected to be suspended, I feel that this unprecedented 30 days is excessive."

Hollywood, Networks Vie For Cable TV Programming

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Cable television's rapid growth is making it a big-time player in the entertainment industry, and the broadcast networks and Hollywood producers like Steven Spielberg want a piece of the action.

As part of that trend, NBC on Monday announced plans to buy a cable television network, and said it would use it to offer business and sports programs.

As the broadcast networks scout for cable properties they can operate with existing resources, movie producers are looking at cable TV as a place they can work more creatively.

"They view cable as the thing of the future," said James S. Cownie,

president of Heritage Communications of Des Moines, Iowa. "They look at cable as a hybrid of the little screen and the big screen, and something that is not restricted editorially or with time constraints."

Cownie is chairman of the National Cable Television Association, whose annual convention here ends today.

At the request of Universal Television Productions, Cownie organized a group of executives from the country's 30 largest cable companies to talk with Spielberg, "Miami Vice" Executive Producer Michael Mann and other top-name producers about a joint programming venture.

"We haven't given them specific ideas yet," Spielberg told USA Today. "But this was to let them know

we would like to get in on the new frontier."

NBC, which operates the nation's top-rated broadcast TV network, said Monday it had agreed to purchase Tempo Television, a Tulsa, Okla.-based cable network carried on systems with about 12 million subscribers.

Tempo's parent company, Tempo Enterprises Inc., is being acquired by Tele-Communications Inc., the nation's biggest cable TV operator.

New cable services will rely on NBC's existing operations but will be markedly different from NBC Television's network programs, the company said.

NBC President Bob Wright said the move was "an important step in our efforts to broaden NBC's business base." He said that while helping the cable industry, the venture also will strengthen NBC.

Capital Cities-ABC Inc., which owns ABC-TV, made its move into cable earlier. It owns an 80 percent stake in the ESPN cable network.

Further evidence of broadcast companies' interest in cable TV is the presence of Fox Broadcasting Co. and the National Association of Public TV Stations at the convention. Both have booths on the convention floor.

Fox is proposing ways cable and broadcast can work in cooperative promotional ventures, and public TV stations have a vital interest in being carried by cable systems as more Americans are added to cable systems.

More than half the nation's approximately 90 million TV households subscribe to cable, and more than 80 percent of households are wired for it.

TCI President John Malone, speaking to financial analysts at the convention Monday, was clearly pleased by the attention cable is getting from the broadcast networks and Hollywood, both of which have feuded with cable for years.

Price Records Fall At Auction

NEW YORK (AP) — A string of price records for contemporary artists, including Jackson Pollock and Andy Warhol, fell in frenzied bidding at Sotheby's that fetched nearly \$26 million, the auction house said.

"I've never seen the bidding as heated as it was this evening," Lucy Mitchell-Innes, head of Sotheby's contemporary art department said after Monday night's sale.

The highest price bid was the \$4.84 million an anonymous Japanese dealer paid for Pollock's "The Search," believed to be his last canvas, Ms. Mitchell-Innes said.

It was a record for a work of contemporary art, as well as a record for the artist, she said.

The auction of works put up for sale by various owners as well as from Warhol's personal collection brought in \$25,954,500, a record for an auction of contemporary art, according to Sotheby's. Of 74 lots offered, 65 were sold.

Record prices were set for works by 12 artists, including Pollock, Warhol, Franz Kline, Cy Twombly, David Hockney, Willem de Kooning and Richard Diebenkorn. Six paintings sold for more than \$1 million, she said.

"The contemporary (art) world is now extremely aware of the rarity of these really important paintings," Ms. Mitchell-Innes said. "People are very sensitive to the fact that these paintings won't come up again. People know this is their last shot."

Pollock's "Search," a canvas in tones of green, red, yellow, black and white, had a presale estimate of \$3 million to \$4 million. The painting is from the Palm Beach residence of art collector Belle Linsky.

The previous record for a work of contemporary art sold at auction was the \$3.63 million Jasper John's "Out the Window" brought in 1986 and the same amount for de Kooning's "Pink Lady" last May. Both paintings were sold at Sotheby's.

The second highest bid Monday night was the \$1.87 million a U.S. dealer paid for Kline's "Ninth Street," a black and white abstract, Sotheby's said. Its presale estimate was \$700,000 to \$900,000.

The previous record for an auction of contemporary art was \$18.9 million last May, according to Sotheby's.

and Richard Diebenkorn. Six paintings sold for more than \$1 million, she said.

"The contemporary (art) world is now extremely aware of the rarity of these really important paintings," Ms. Mitchell-Innes said. "People are very sensitive to the fact that these paintings won't come up again. People know this is their last shot."

Pollock's "Search," a canvas in tones of green, red, yellow, black and white, had a presale estimate of \$3 million to \$4 million. The painting is from the Palm Beach residence of art collector Belle Linsky.

The previous record for a work of contemporary art sold at auction was the \$3.63 million Jasper John's "Out the Window" brought in 1986 and the same amount for de Kooning's "Pink Lady" last May. Both paintings were sold at Sotheby's.

The second highest bid Monday night was the \$1.87 million a U.S. dealer paid for Kline's "Ninth Street," a black and white abstract, Sotheby's said. Its presale estimate was \$700,000 to \$900,000.

The previous record for an auction of contemporary art was \$18.9 million last May, according to Sotheby's.

Prince Wins Dismissal Of Lawsuit

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A judge has dismissed a lawsuit against rock star Prince by his half sister who alleged he used her lyrics in violation of copyright laws.

The song by Lorna Nelson, "What's Cooking in This Book," was not substantially similar to Prince's song, "U Got the Look," said U.S. District Judge David Doty.

"I don't believe it," Nelson said about the judge's order, which was filed Thursday. "We (Nelson and her lawyer) never did think the judge understood it. We're going to appeal."

The lawsuit, filed in August, also sought an accounting from their father, John L. Nelson, for money he received from Prince for use of lyrics he allegedly wrote with Ms. Nelson.

Doty said that claim falls under state, not federal, law.

The two songs are not identical, but Ms. Nelson's suit said recurring expressions in her song "take another look" and "cooking in this book" were used in Prince's song, which was recorded with singer Sheena Easton.

The lawsuit claimed that Duane Nelson, Lorna's brother and Prince's half-brother, had inspected lyrics she had written, and delivered the lyrics to Prince and his company, PRN Productions Inc., in the Minneapolis suburb of Chanhassen where Prince lives.

Doty's order said the defendants conceded a proper copyright and access to the lyrics.

'Molly Dodd' Slow To Catch On With Viewers In Thursday TV Slot

NEW YORK (AP) — Isn't it just like that Molly Dodd, TV's perplexed and perplexing, quintessential struggling single woman, to scramble NBC's neat little line of comedies that always rank 1, 2, 3, 4 in the Nielsen's.

Last week, the network's four Thursday comedies — "The Cosby Show," "A Different World," and "Cheers," with "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd" bringing up the rear — ranked 1, 2, 3, 13. Yes, that's our Molly, throwing a monkey wrench into the smooth-running NBC comedy machine.

NBC put "Molly Dodd" into the "Night Court" slot in March. "Night Court" was Top 10. Molly drops to the top 20, not good enough for No. 1 NBC.

People who fall down laughing at the ta-ta-DUM one-liners of "Cheers" apparently don't adjust easily to the offbeat, jazzy rhythms of tragi-comic half-hour that follows and they are tuning out.

Besides that, the show has run in odd 13-week spurts in the spring when prime time becomes a hodgepodge of repeats and short-run series. After the show completed its

successful run last season, there was no room for it in hit-heavy NBC's fall schedule. Many fans presumed it had been canceled.

Bob Brush, who writes the show with executive producer Jay Tarses, complains that even after all the critical praise last season, NBC gave the series little fanfare when it returned.

"I'm thrilled with the show. I'm happy it's on the air and people are seeing it. I would just like to see people get a chance to get used to it and know that it's not like the other shows they're watching," Brush said.

The show is dear the hearts of Brush and Tarses. It is the first television experience for Brush, 40, formerly a Broadway composer ("The First").

His wife, Sally Faison, who now plays Molly's sister, Mammie, had gone to Hollywood for auditions, so Brush went along, packing a script he'd written. It caught the attention of an agent who introduced Brush to Tarses. The two, said Brush, had a "psychic sympathy."

It was Brush who wrote this season's episode in which Molly's father died, and it was profound, touching, poetic television.

Entertaining her boss, Moss Goodman, in her apartment, Molly

chatted happily as she went into the bathroom to get something. There, for a split second, she saw the image of her father in a mirror. When she turned, it was gone. Then the phone rang.

Cut to Moss, droning on about whether or not his stew is adequately jelling, when he finally realizes Molly isn't there. He goes into the deserted

living room where the phone is beeping, off the hook.

It is these poignant scenes that seem to confound audiences used to solid yocks in half-hour television shows.

Brush is writer-producer on Tarses' other show for ABC, "The 'Slap' Maxwell Story." It didn't do well in the ratings, and its renewal is up for grabs, too.

Israelis Approach Syrian Troops

AIN ATA, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli tanks pushed to within a few miles of Syrian troops today, reinforcing heavily armed Israeli soldiers as they searched for Palestinian guerrillas in the rugged hills of south Lebanon.

Syrian forces went on full alert. Helicopters flew in about 500 Israeli troops to the northern edge of Ain Ata in the foothills of Mount Hermon before dawn, Lebanese police said.

The troops then fanned out around the area and began their search. Several hours later six Israeli tanks and nine armored personnel carriers rolled into the village, police said.

"It seems the Israelis are reinforcing their positions," said a police spokesman, who cannot be identified under standing regulations.

He said the Syrian command ordered its estimated 16,000 troops in the Bekaa Valley north of the village on "maximum alert" shortly after the Israeli operation started.

Before the helicopter landing, Israeli artillery shelled areas around Ain Ata and the nearby villages of Memis, Kfeer, Khalwat and Ein Zeta. There were no reports of casualties.

The operation occurred north of Israel's self-designated security zone in south Lebanon. Israel created the zone in 1985 after it withdrew most of

its forces, which had occupied Lebanon since 1982. The police spokesman said Israeli troops had not clashed with the Syrians.

"But the Syrians have their tanks dug in on hills overlooking the Israeli operational zone," the spokesman said.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir indicated his government was not seeking a confrontation with Syria. "I don't think there is such a danger ..." he told Israel radio today.

He described the operation as part of Israel's ongoing policy of conducting sweeps in south Lebanon and added: "It is a usual action of wat-

chs and securing the area from attacks of terrorists."

The operation began Monday night. The Israeli army censor held up initial reports for hours.

Acting Lebanese Prime Minister Salim Hoss instructed its ambassador at the United Nations, Rashid Fakhoury, to lodge a complaint against the Israeli action.

"This new aggression by the (Israeli) occupation forces violates the U.N. Charter," Hoss said.

Helicopters landed at Ain Ata after a column of Israeli troops in armored personnel carriers and tanks launched a sweep of villages on the slopes of Mount Hermon, located within the security zone to the south.

Hospital Toll Hits 17

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Rescuers recovered three more bodies today from the wreckage of a children's hospital annex that collapsed in northern India, the United News of India said. The discovery raised the official death toll to 17.

UNI quoted hospital authorities as saying as many as 32 people, including 22 children, were still unaccounted for and that the death toll could rise.

Arun Joshi, a reporter for the Kashmir Times, said rescuers were losing hope of finding anyone alive. "It is a terrible sight up here," he said. "No one knows how many children have died or are dying."

Rescue workers pulled 30 people alive from the rubble of the three-story hospital wing on Monday, UNI said. Twenty-three of them, mostly children, were being treated at a makeshift emergency center, state-run All India Radio said.

Civilians, police and army units with cranes today removed blocks of concrete and brick at the site. R.S. Chib, the state's health minister, told UNI he expected rescue operations to be completed tonight.

The collapse of several wards in the hospital annex was blamed on structural defects.

Coast Guard To Stay Home

WASHINGTON (AP) — Strong Capitol Hill opposition led the Pentagon to scuttle tentative plans to send Coast Guard ships to the Persian Gulf, say lawmakers who contend that the ships are needed more for anti-drug patrols.

"I'm glad we've got a secretary of defense who can count, because he would have lost," said Rep. Mike Lowry, D-Wash., author of legislation to block the plan.

The Pentagon announced late Monday that "after a thorough assessment during the past week," it was happy with the mix of U.S. warships in the Gulf.

Lowry and Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., responded by dropping plans to seek a vote on their amendment to the Pentagon budget bill.

"We would have won, we had the votes, but there's no need to go through with it now," Lowry said.

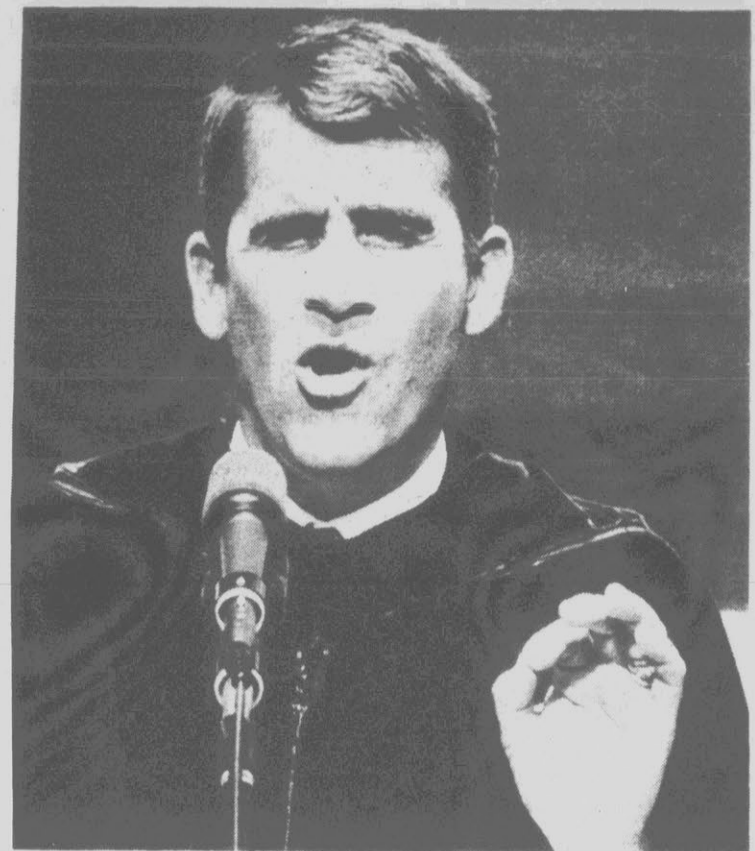
"It was an unwise decision in the first place and I'm glad it was abandoned," Pepper said.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, said the plan "was a non-starter from the beginning and I'm glad (Defense Secretary Frank) Carlucci could understand that. That idea was going nowhere."

For the past 10 days, the Pentagon had been considering taking up to six Coast Guard boats off anti-drug patrols and sending them to the Gulf. But the idea had been sharply criticized by Democrats and Republicans alike.

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., said the decision came after Carlucci listened "carefully to those of us in Congress, including myself, and the leadership, who suggested that this would not be the right time to take Coast Guard vessels from the United States."

The Pentagon plan surfaced as the Reagan administration reviewed U.S. policy.

North Sees Charges As Badge Of Honor

LYNCHBURG, Va. — Oliver L. North, who retired from the military Sunday, received a patriot's welcome Monday when he told graduates of Jerry Falwell's Liberty University that accusations brought against him in the Iran-Contra affair "are not a brand, they are a badge of honor."

In a commencement ceremony for 900 graduates of the 8,000-student school, Falwell introduced North as "a true American hero," and said the former marine isn't the first person to be falsely accused: "We serve a savior who was indicted and convicted and crucified."

North's address brought the crowd of about 10,000 to its feet for several

ovations, as he fanned the flames of two growing movements: one to seek a presidential pardon for him and a second to draft him for the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate from Virginia.

North, said he had been caught in "the middle of a political dispute between the White House and Congress," and said he had been "vilified" for "trying to help the young men of Nicaragua, trying to rescue American hostages and prevent terrorism."

Falwell, who later presented North with an honorary doctorate of humanities, said he has secured 600,000 supporters for his petition drive urging President Reagan to pardon North. Falwell said he is seeking 2 million names.

Methodists Uphold Homosexual Bans

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The United Methodist Church upheld bans on homosexual activity by clergy and others, but left the way open for America's second largest Protestant denomination to gain more knowledge on the subject.

Some leaders said the approval Monday at the denomination's governing convention of a four-year study on homosexuality had left the reaffirmed bans in question.

"It's a tacit recognition that there is some legitimacy to various points of view," said the Rev. George McClain of New York City, executive of the Methodist Federation for Social Action.

The church's nine-member Judicial Conference, a church court, must rule by Wednesday whether the study can be funded under a rule that bars funding of any homosexual

group or promoting acceptance of homosexuality. Delegates overwhelmingly approved that action, along with continuation of the bans on active homosexuals in the clergy and condemnations of such activity generally, then authorized the study.

Friction over homosexuality has continued for two decades in the 9.6 million-member United Methodist Church.
