## Cheney Nomination As Defense Secretary OK'd

WASHINGTON — The Senate Armed Services Committee voted 20-0 today to approve the nomination of Defense Secretary-designate Dick Cheney, praised by the panel as having "high standards of personal conduct and integrity."

The vote came exactly one week after the Senate rejected the nomination of former Texas Sen.

John Tower and handed President Bush a major defeat in his first high-stakes clash with Congress.

Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said the full Senate would take up the nomination on Friday, before the Senate begins a two-week recess. Easy confirmation was expected.

The committee took only about 10 minutes to discuss Cheney and vote.

The panel's report said Cheney's "high standards of personal conduct and integrity would help to restore

public confidence in the integrity of defense management."

"Congressman Cheney is highly qualified to be secretary of defense," committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., who led the fight against Tower, said before the vote.

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., the ranking Republican on the committee, said the swift action on the nomination resulted from the speed with which Bush relayed the FBI background report, and because Cheney, as a member of the House,

had filed financial reports for past years.

"There have been many who have questioned our motives from time to time," said Sen. James Exon, D-Neb., referring to the bitter fight over Tower. "We should salute the president for his nomination of Dick Cheney."

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., asked if the unanimous committee vote showed that the Senate had not been torn by the vote on Tower, said, "That was just one of the storms

that come along, and they all sweep out to sea."

The Wyoming congressman won wide popularity among his colleagues on Capitol Hill as House minority whip, the second-ranking Republican leadership post in the chamber.

"We found nothing in the financial report, nothing in the FBI report, nothing in our questioning of him that would in any way interfere with his ability to be secretary of defense, and I believe a successful secretary

of defense," Nunn said.

Warner said it was "very important for national security interests" that the full Senate act quickly on the nomination.

After the rancorous, six-week debate over Tower, who was dogged by allegations of drinking and womanizing, the committee moved with lightning speed on Cheney.

On Tuesday, the committee held nearly four hours of hearings in an

## Groups Offer Views On Location Of New U.S. 264 Wilson Bypass

WILSON — North Carolina Department of Transportation officials heard opposing views at a public meeting here Wednesday night on where a proposed U.S. 264 bypass south of Wilson should be located.

Representatives of the Wilson County Board of Commissioners, the city of Wilson, the chamber of commerce and development organizations voiced support for an "inner loop" which would skirt the southwestern edge of the city.

But a number of citizens suggested an "outer loop" plan, which would carry traffic as much as 2½ miles from town, would serve the best interests of the community and the motoring public.

Whatever the location of the bypass, the 13.5 mile roadway linking the interstate quality U.S. 264 west of Wilson with the limited access highway to the east, will cost about \$100 million, DOT spokesman Lubin Prevatt said.

The state has proposed three alternate routes for the project.

Alternate A — at \$99.45 million — would take the bypass along an "outer loop" arc from west of I-95 to the N.C. 58 intersection east of Wilson.

Alternate B — at \$100 million — would join U.S. 264 to the west with the eastern leg at the N.C. 58 intersection on an "inner loop" route which would run through a portion of the city limits.

The third proposal — Alternate C, which would cost an estimated \$111.1 million — would join the two freeway sections of the new U.S. 264 by following the present highway over I-95 and on to Airport Road, then turn south on a new location and join the Alternate B route at the N.C. 42 intersection.

A fourth proposal — now supported by city and county officials — would follow the Alternate B route, but add an uncontrolled connector from the N.C. 42 intersection to join the present uncontrolled section of U.S. 264 at Airport Road. That proposal, according to the DOT, would cost an estimated \$110.15 million.

Those speaking in favor of the fourth alternate suggested that an outer loop location would hamper growth of the city, while an inner

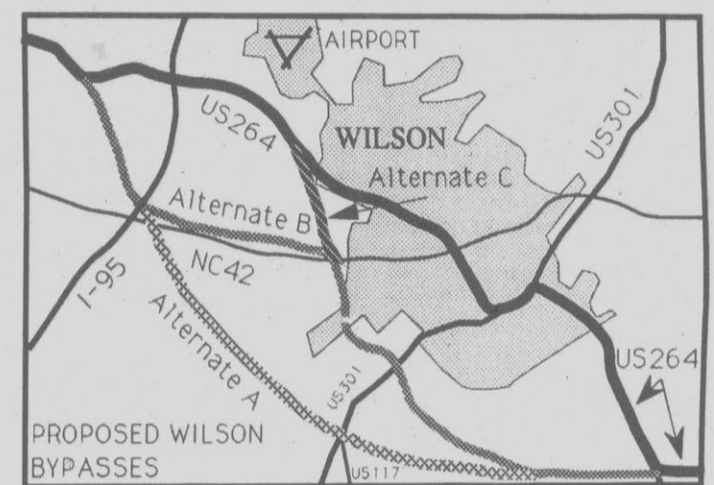
loop with connector road would enhance development.

Preston Harrell, chairman of the Wilson County Board of Commissioners, said the board supports the inner loop because "We want a highway that can become an integral part of the transportation system in Wilson, not a highway far from the reaches or use of most people in Wilson County. We want a highway that can help spur logical

controlled growth, not a highway that will encourage hopscotch costly sprawl."

Wilson Mayor Ralph Ramey said, "We feel that the alternate (suggested by the city, the county, the chamber and others) is a win-win situation. It will benefit the local economy while aiding the transportation needs of the entire state. We

## Astronauts Capture Earth On Film

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Discovery's astronauts, working again at full electrical power, received a call from President Bush and focused cameras on the wounds inflicted on Earth by man's pollution and nature's violence.

Flying upside down 180 miles high, the five-man crew captured thousands of views of Earth with television, movie and still cameras. Some of the film will be edited into a study of ecological trouble spots.

The president and the crew talked briefly in a combined television-telephone hookup that let Bush see the astronauts in their space cabin from the White House.

Bush congratulated them on their flight — which nearly had to be cut short one day because of an electrical-system problem — and said, "I am determined to go forward with an active space program."

When Discovery commander Michael L. Coats revealed that the crew was "flying something for the new first lady" it prompted a presidential invitation.

"You better come up here and give it to her personally," said Bush. "You're invited. When you get back head this way."

Asked about a camera used to photograph environmental targets, pilot John E. Blaha said the crew was "getting a lot of great film that will show a lot of people around the world how fragile the planet Earth is in this big vastness of space."

"There is so much interest today

on the global environment," replied Bush. "I think a lot of people will see from just your important mission the contribution that space exploration can make to the world's environment."

Discovery's crew started the day by pre-empting the usual wake-up call from Mission Control with tape recordings of their own. They ended their eight-hour sleep by radioing to Earth the theme music from "Star Trek."

Then, the recorded voice of William Shatner, who played Capt. Kirk in "Star Trek," sent congratulations to Mission Control.

"Discovery," responded a Mission Control communicator, "tell Scotty to beam me up."

A rousing medley of school songs from the alma maters of the crew members was the official wake up sound from Mission Control.

The tape included "Anchor's Aweigh" for Naval Academy graduates Michael L. Coats, James A. Buchii and Robert C. Springer; "Wild Blue Yonder" for Air Force Academy graduate John E. Blaha, and the Drexel University fight song for Dr. James P. Bagian, a physician who earned a bachelor's degree from the Philadelphia school.

Their fourth day in orbit was the first with a trouble-free electrical power supply system. On Wednesday, they followed special operating instructions from Mission Control to correct an erratic flow from a hydrogen tank that supplies reactant to chemical power generators on the shuttle.

Flow from the tank became troublesome shortly after Discovery was

launched Monday and Mission Control feared that fuel from the tank would not be available for use. Engineers asked the astronauts to dim lights and turn off computers, and said the five-day mission could be cut short a day if the problem wasn't corrected.

The fuel cells on the shuttle combine hydrogen and oxygen to make electricity and pure water.

Discovery became an orbiting movie studio for part of today. The astronauts were using a 70mm camera to take high fidelity pictures of environmental targets on Earth for

a joint project of the Smithsonian Institution and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Photo targets included a coral reef being destroyed by pollution off east Africa, the scars left by fires in Florida's Everglades and the forests of the western United States, areas of deforestation in South America and an active volcano in Guatemala.

"We got plenty of shots of Florida," Bagian reported. "And we

## Farm Plan Backed

MOSCOW — Communist Party leaders today rallied around President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's plan to

give peasants control of the land they farm and the crops they plant in a drive to overcome chronic food shortages, Tass said.

Speakers urged the 300-member Central Committee to approve the radical reform plan, which Gorbachev said would end decades of "power and pressure methods" that have brought disaster to the Soviet countryside, according to the official news agency.

In a nearly two-hour speech on Wednesday, Gorbachev painted a bleak picture of Soviet agriculture, with chemically despoiled land, investments gone sour and the deliberate destruction of traditional systems. The situation is so bad that it will be years before the country can feed itself, he said.

The Central Committee was expected to approve the policy today, although conservatives such as agriculture chief Yegor K. Ligachev have not been enthusiastic about leasing collective farm land to families and groups.

Gorbachev's detailed report on years of failed reforms made it clear that he believes nothing less than radical change will free Soviets from rationing of meat and cheese now found in many cities.

His proposal to abolish a government superagency created in 1985 to oversee the country's farm sector was a tacit acknowledgement of the failure of even his early attempts to revitalize agriculture.

Essentially, Gorbachev's plan would give farmers freedom to choose their own crops, equipment and markets. Prices would be adjusted and eventually nearly decontrolled.

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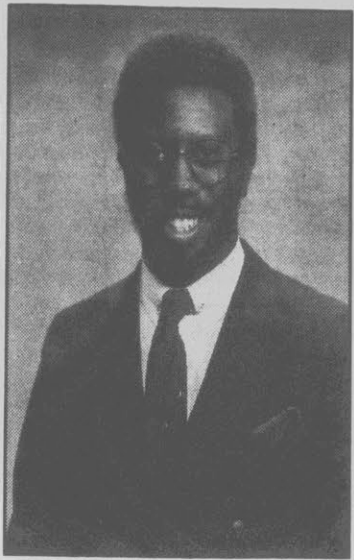

feel strongly that corridor A would leave us holding the short end of the stick."

Eddie Fulford, a member of the Wilson Antique Dealers Association, suggested that the outer loop would mean "the kiss of death for me."

Eddie Price, commander of the American Legion Post in Wilson said the 504-member post "supports the outer loop," as did Donnie Prince, who said an inner loop would add "noise and traffic congestion" and deter future growth.

Roy Davis, another spokesman favoring the outer loop suggested that selecting the inner loop would be choosing "short term profits over long term benefits."

Wayne Wilson of Goldsboro, a member of the U.S. 117 Association, said it up to the residents of Wilson County to support whichever route they choose. But he suggested that "you ought to drive along the U.S. 70 bypass" at Goldsboro to see the congestion and problems a close-in bypass can cause.

Prevatt, who conducted the meeting for the DOT, said a decision would be made on which route the proposed bypass should follow "in the next two to three months."

### Somber Welcome

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Thirty-three special forces soldiers were given a somber welcome home to Fort Bragg on Wednesday from a training exercise that left 11 from their unit dead in the fiery wreckage of a crashed Air Force helicopter.

"The loss of a single soldier is tragic at any time," Brig Gen. James A. Guest told returning members of C Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Special Forces Group at a brief welcome at Pope Air Force Base.

"The loss of 11 highly trained Special Forces soldiers is especially painful," said Guest, commander of the group's parent unit, 1st Special Operations Command.

A memorial service is scheduled for 11 a.m. Monday in the John F. Kennedy Memorial Chapel on Fort Bragg.

He said right-of-way acquisition is set to begin in 1992, with construction set to start 1994, and "it will take about three years to build."

### Murder Arrests

BEATRICE, Neb. (AP) — An investigation into the murder of a Beatrice, Neb., woman more than four years ago resulted in arrests late Wednesday evening of suspects in North Carolina and Alabama, officials said early today.

Arrested in Cullman, Ala., about 11:30 p.m. CST Wednesday was Joseph Edgar White, 26. Arrested about 25 minutes earlier near Asheville, N.C., was Ada Joann Taylor, 25.

Both were arrested on warrants issued in Gage County Court Tuesday charging them with first-degree murder in the death of Helen Wilson.

Mrs. Wilson, 68, died of suffocation sometime late Feb. 5, 1985, or early Feb. 6, in her apartment in Beatrice. Pathologists reports indicated she had been raped and that there was extreme violence to her body.

## Below Average

### It's OK To Be Near The Bottom

The 1988 Greenville cost of living index is the stuff that makes the Chamber of Commerce and development people happy.

The index for the last quarter of 1988, prepared by the American Chamber of Commerce Researchers Association, showed Greenville at 96.6 with 100 being average for an American city.

The ranking placed Greenville 13th out of 14 North Carolina cities. Only Hickory was lower with an index rating of 91.9. In this case, being below average is desirable and being near the bottom is OK.

Above were Charlotte at 101.5, Raleigh at 103, Durham at 105.3, Chapel Hill at 109.6 and the Outer Banks area at 110.8.

The index rating is important to those who promote our area as a good place to live and locate businesses because it tells those considering us that the living costs are moderate.

Most of the larger cities of the nation rated above Greenville. New Orleans had an index rating of 97.5, San Antonio, 97.6; Indianapolis, 98 and Jacksonville, Fla., 99.1. Above 100 were Houston at 102.9; Phoenix, 105.3, Denver, 105.3; San Diego 127.1 and Philadelphia, 128.2.

There is some comfort to those of us living here that our cost of living index is lower than many other places. But cost of living involves not only necessities but our wants. A loaf of bread still costs 75 cents and a quart of milk 99 cents. More to the point a moderate size car still costs \$16,000 to \$18,000 and the dream home that most middle class local families want is now edging \$100,000 or more.

The lesson in it all is we know there are distinct advantages in residing in the Greenville area. The cost of driving to work is less. It is a competitive retail town which tends to hold down cost of necessities. Even the cost of housing is somewhat less than some more populous areas, particularly given the competitive housing market here.

In the end, though, it takes a lot to live on a middle class level in the Greenville area, just as anywhere else — and the things we want as opposed to what we need determine the cost of living for individual families as much as any other factor.

## Right Time

### Don't Stall On Highway Program

North Carolina legislators are in the process of fine tuning the proposed revenue sources for an \$8.6 billion boost in state highway construction, but the message is clear: the public wants improved roads.

Key legislators last week called for care in considering changes in the financing plan. Rep. Bob Hunter, D-McDowell, said it was a balanced package. He told a joint meeting of three House subcommittees that they should be wary of reducing fees and taxes which the bill sets to finance the highway construction program. A 5½ cent gasoline tax is at the heart of the financing. Concerns have been expressed that the financing puts too much burden on low income individuals; also that the vehicle transfer tax might drive auto sales to other states.

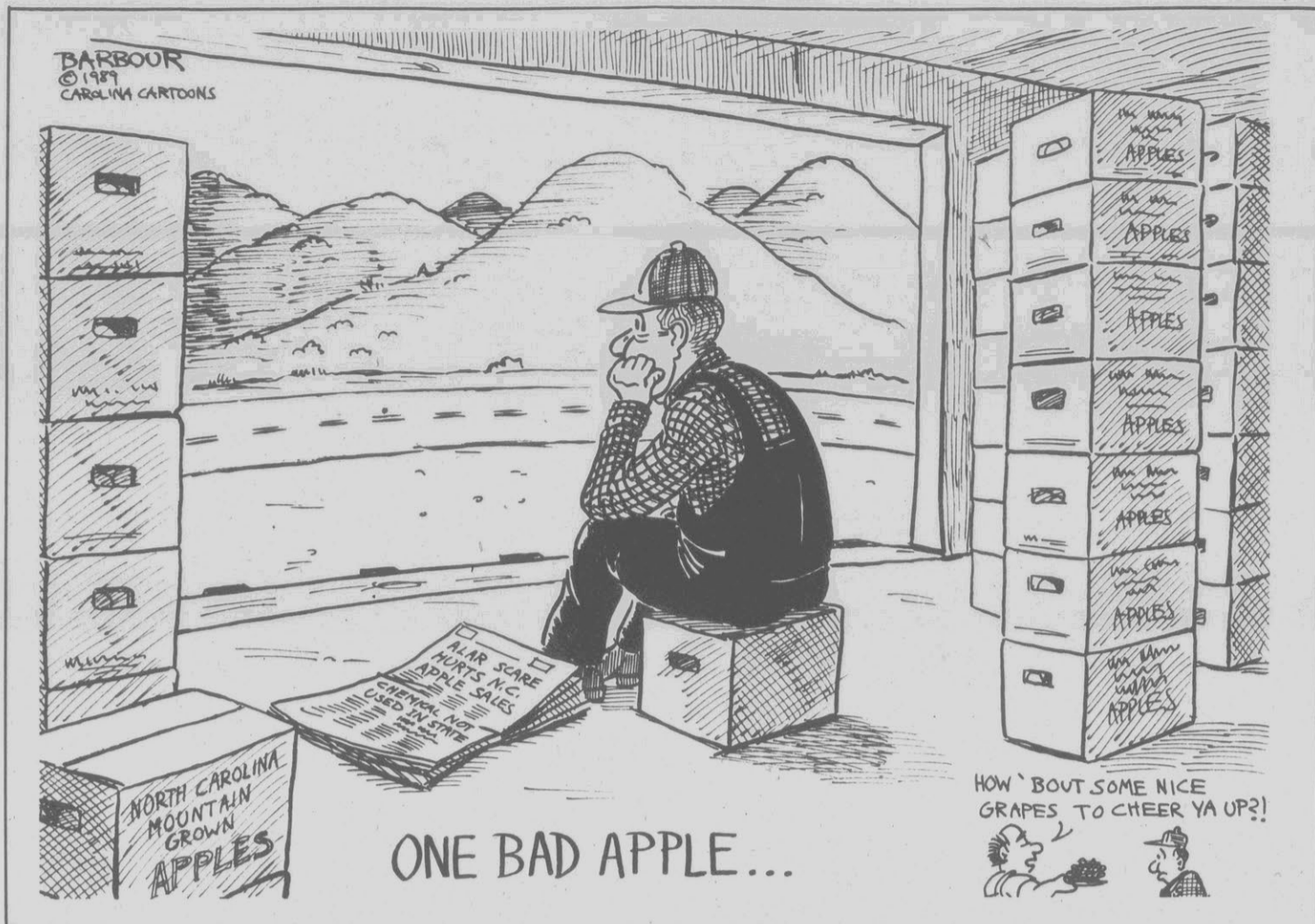
The answer to the concerns is that an equitable financing package has been worked out and the pending bill spells out road projects which will be of greatest benefits to all regions of North Carolina.

The public recognizes the need for improving our vast system of highways which serves such diverse areas of the state. If we don't act this year the right combination of circumstances might not come together again for a number of years.

North Carolina has more miles of highways than any other state. Much of that mileage — urban, primary and secondary roads — is totally inadequate to serve the needs of the people. We will be embarking on what one legislator called the greatest public project ever undertaken in our state.

The highway package will open economic doors for many areas of North Carolina. It will provide safer, more pleasurable highways for all of us to travel. The sooner the bill is passed the sooner the funds can be put to work. The highway bill should be scrutinized, but it should be kept in mind that changes in the financing formula or the projects it authorizes can mean the entire package could come unraveled. One could only guess when it could be put together again.

Let's move with the highway package. The time is right now to go forward with a sound road improvement program.



## A History Of Good Teamwork

WASHINGTON — Here are three things to understand about Rep. Dick Cheney (R-Wyo.), which will explain why President Bush made such a superb choice in naming him as secretary of Defense following the John Tower fiasco. Cheney is smart, he is tough and he is totally trustworthy.

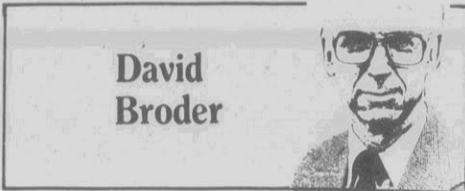
Put those qualities together, and you have a man who will bring real strength and rare judgment to the administration. At 48, Cheney already has proven himself exceeding competent in both the executive and legislative branches of government, performing admirably as President Ford's White House chief of staff and then rising in very few years to the second-ranking leadership position of House Republicans.

His brain is as good as anyone's in town, and he is totally unafraid to voice his convictions in any company. From the time I first encountered him as a University of Wisconsin Ph.D. candidate working on the staff of an equally brainy young congressman, the late Bill Steiger, he has displayed qualities that command the respect of people much older than he is — and often of very different policy views.

Though he is a conservative by conviction and a staunch partisan Republican, he is admired by dozens of Democratic colleagues. He has a particularly close relationship with House Majority Leader Tom Foley (D-Wash.), a man of similar talent and temperament. Like Foley, Cheney downplays his own importance and conceals his shrewdness behind an engaging Western humor.

Cheney and his wife, Lynne, the head of the National Endowment for the Humanities, are perhaps the most literate couple in town, individually turning out highly readable essays and, jointly, a fine book on leaders of the House. But Cheney's true calling is government and, in that field, there are few better.

Although Cheney's career roots are in Congress, his viewpoint is almost always that of a President's man. No one fought harder during

the post-Watergate period and in the Iran-contra affair against measures he thought would inhibit future Presidents from exercising their full powers as commander in chief and negotiator in chief. An essay Cheney wrote for an American Enterprise Institute conference this week, on what he calls "congressional aggrandizement" in the national security area, criticizes "aggrandizers" as varied as Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.) and Speaker Jim Wright (D-Texas) and doubtless will provoke questions at Cheney's confirmation hearings.

But Cheney is totally consistent in his view, favoring a strong President — even if it's a Democrat. He told reporters in a 1987 interview that he would far rather see the Democrats nominate Sen. Sam Nunn (D-Ga.), the Armed Services Committee chairman and architect of Tower's defeat, than "a governor with no foreign-policy experience," like Massachusetts' Michael Dukakis. Nunn would have a far better chance of beating the Republican nominee, Cheney allowed. But that was more than offset, in his view, by the prospect that if Nunn won, the nation would get what he considered a highly qualified President.

The Cheney nomination demonstrates, once again, that George Bush has quick recuperative powers and the ability to do well with his second efforts. Bush showed that earlier by winning the presidency on his second try and, in that second effort, recouping in New Hampshire what he had lost in the opening contest in Iowa.

Recovery skills are about as useful a trait as a

President can possess. No way will the occupant of the Oval Office go through four years, or eight, without bumping into adversity. The ability to come back from such a blow, to shake off the after-effects and think clearly about what needs to be done, is what distinguishes the political survivors from those who contribute, willy-nilly, to their own political demise. Bush is a survivor.

In choosing Cheney, Bush has completed what may well be the most skilled, politically sophisticated trio of national security officials Washington has seen in decades. Along with Secretary of State James A. Baker III and national security adviser Brent Scowcroft, he forms a team of highly competent, compatible lieutenants, with the capacity to adjust policies to a changing world and defend those policies in the domestic political arena.

Scowcroft is the old pro of the trio, the retired general who served as deputy to Henry A. Kissinger and then established his own model of reticence, probity and professionalism in the national security adviser's post under President Ford.

Baker is the old smoothie in the bunch, the well-bred Texan who can deflect criticism as deftly as he can maneuver to reduce the opposition to impotent frustration. He is the consummate operative, perhaps the most impressive unelected official the capital has seen since Clark Clifford.

In terms of personal chemistry and past history, I cannot recall any matchup of men in these jobs that promises as much compatibility and teamwork as these three. Cheney and Scowcroft worked side by side in the Ford White House; Cheney and Baker were the twin strategists of Ford's courageous 1976 campaign, which turned a looming landslide defeat into a breathlessly close finish.

The country is lucky to have them working together again.

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## The Climate: Heat Without Seriousness

WASHINGTON — W.H. Auden said he could never be friends with anyone who liked his steak well done. There is something refreshing about that, a straightforward prejudice presented straightforwardly, not all dolled up as a philosophic principle. Perhaps we should regard politics that way in this especially depressing period.

We are 10 weeks into a new Congress that spent its first weeks in a cowardly minuet concerning a pay raise it seemed to deserve until the Senate spent additional weeks tracking down the swizzle sticks in John Tower's past and improvising rules of virtue for people imprudent enough to contemplate government service outside the safe haven of the legislative branch.

Now comes a fresh excuse for not focusing on important public business, such as a believable budget. Speaker Jim Wright is about to become the subject of another seminar on "ethics." Wright is certainly no subscriber to exacting standards of propriety, but what may be coming his way in the way of chastisement will be yet another episode in a tit-for-tat process of paybacks.

John Tower paid a price for the nature of last autumn's Bush campaign. (When you are deploring the trashing of Tower, remember the mud hurled at Dukakis concerning his alleged psychiatric problems.) Dukakis suffered for the Democrats' treatment of Robert Bork.

Posturing in Washington about peripheral matters (peripheral, that is, to great questions of governance) is bringing on a bitterness that should not be confused with seriousness. There is at work in Washington a political law of inverse proportionality: The anger invested in disputes today is inversely related to the real differences between the disputants.

For example, in the coming argument about the budget there will be sound and fury signifying unwillingness to allow the slight differences between the two sides to seem slight. The fix is in. Both sides are collaborating in sufficient frauds to facilitate a third year of violation of the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction "law."

The mock debate about the budget will be an example of what Freud called "the narcissism of small differences," the exaggeration of small differences to give a little dispute the appearance of moral gravity. But there was acrimony when those specialists in

that, the Democrats, gathered recently in Philadelphia.

The occasion was a meeting of the Democratic Leadership Council. It is one of those political organizations the title of which advertises what the group aspires to but has not attained. The DLC is not to be confused with the leadership of the Democratic Party.

The DLC is a redoubt of "moderates" (e.g., Virginia Sen. Chuck Robb) who met last week to get out of their system their usual argument: We should win by expanding our appeal to the middle class, not by deepening our appeal to our base among the lower orders. The DLC was visited in Philadelphia by the ambulance chaser of the Western world, Jesse Jackson, fresh from the class struggle, a stint walking the Eastern Airline picket line.

In Philadelphia, Ron Brown, the black man recently elected party chairman, said the predictable things about all Democrats pulling together. But then he did what only pessimists predicted: He waffled about attending, as he has promised to do, the Democratic unity dinner in Chicago five days before the April 4 mayoral election.

Richard Daley, who is white, recently won the Democratic nomination, beating Mayor Gene Sawyer, who is black. Jesse Jackson is backing the independent candidacy of a black alderman, Tim Evans, against the nominee of his, Jackson's, party. The appropriately named Gus Savage, a rabble-rousing black congressman from Chicago, says that "when Ron Brown brings his Oreo-you-know-what into Chicago, I'll guarantee I'm going to help organize a reception party for him at the airport and to follow him all the way to some white hotel to denounce his coming into Chicago.

The Washington Post delicately describes Savage as "outspoken." National Democrats, their moralism depleted by the Tower crusade, have no words of censure for Savage.

At least national Republicans reacted strongly against the odious right-winger who, running as a Republican, won a Louisiana state legislative seat. (When asked about his statements questioning whether the Holocaust occurred, David Duke "explained" thusly: "I believe there are certainly atrocities in the war.") And Republican leaders in Arizona are fighting the hijacking of their party by lunatics who have made the party officially declare that the United States is "a Christian nation" and "a republic based upon the absolute laws of the Bible, not a democracy."

Arizona politics is not the narcissism of small differences. But it is symptomatic of the political temper of the time, heat without seriousness.

got some very good pictures of Hawaii."

The astronauts also aimed cameras at Indonesian volcanoes, the Great Barrier Reef off Australia, the Andes Mountains in South America, the Aswan Dam in Egypt and the Baja California portion of Mexico.

Mission Control remotely operated television cameras on Discovery to capture startling views of lightning playing across the skies over South America and Australia.

From the Discovery's camera perch, the lightning could be seen bursting like a string of flashing white lights on a Christmas tree. Earlier studies from space have shown that lightning bolts seem to trigger each other in sequence along the front of a moving thunderstorm.

The astronauts also tended to their strange collection of orbiting companions — four crippled rats, 32 fertilized chicken eggs and a miniature plot of plants — that are among the experiments aboard.

Four caged rats with intentionally injured bones are being flown to test how weightlessness can affect healing.

The chicken eggs will be examined after Discovery lands to determine how weightlessness affect the embryo development and a similar study is being made on the roots of a group of plants growing in a box on board.

The flight is the first of the year and NASA hopes to have six more as the agency builds toward a planned one-a-month flight rate within two years. The mission is third since U.S. flights resumed following the 1986 accident that destroyed space shuttle Challenger and killed seven astronauts.

A draft law on leasing was presented to the party, and Gorbachev said it could be decreed by the government Presidium. That implied he would not wait for installation of the nation's new parliament, which is expected in May.

It will take time, however, to replace the current system with one allowing farmers to choose and pay for their own seed, equipment and fertilizer.

Leasing experiments have been going on for a year, but approval of the plan would make leasing standard rather than the exception. Gorbachev called food shortages "our society's biggest wound." Meat, sugar and many other foodstuffs must be rationed in numerous Soviet regions.

The Central Committee began a two-day meeting Wednesday largely devoted to agricultural reform, seeking ways to increase the food supply and improve dreary rural life.

When Josef Stalin forced agricultural collectivization in the 1930s on a populace that was 80 percent agrarian, millions of peasants were deported to Siberia and other remote regions or fled to cities. Catastrophic famine ensued.

Ever since, farmers working for state-owned farms have generally delivered their yields to market at fixed prices to meet quotas set by the state bureaucracy.

The 58-year-old Gorbachev, the former party overseer for agriculture and son of a Russian peasant, said conditions in some rural regions were causing mass migration to cities.

In 1988, gross Soviet farm output rose by just 0.7 percent, and grain harvested was only 195 million metric tons, 16 million below the annual average achieved in 1986-87, according to Washington-based PlanEcon Inc.

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# Driving Limits For Teen Violators Proposed

RALEIGH — Suspending driving privileges of teen-agers convicted of alcohol or drug law violations would give youngsters additional incentive to resist peer pressure, a representative of Students Against Drunk Driving said.

"Drug and alcohol abuse begins at the early ages, at time when 'fitting in' and 'being cool' are all important characteristics," said Jerry Meek, 18, of Fayetteville. "Parental force, just say no campaigns, and medical warnings are not competitive forces in the world when acceptance is of such great importance."

Meek, former national Teen Democrats president, appeared at a news

conference Wednesday with House Speaker Pro Tem Don Beard, D-Cumberland, who introduced a bill that would suspend until age 18 the driving privileges of teen-agers convicted of alcohol or drug law violations.

"Wheels are important to these children," Beard said. "If young people realize that mere possession or using controlled substances can postpone that privilege for another two years, they will be less willing to take the chance."

Under the bill, a youth under age 16 convicted of any crime or infraction involving use or possession of alcohol or drugs could not receive a driver's license until his 18th birthday. If the youth is 16 or 17, his license would be suspended until he turns 18.

Sen. Marc Basnight, D-Dare, has introduced a bill that would suspend a teen-ager's driving privilege for up to a year. Beard said his measure was tougher. He said he would support keeping teen-age substance abusers off the roads until they are 21 but doubted the Legislature would approve that.

Meek said he sees children as young as 14 abusing drugs and alcohol "on a daily and weekly basis."

In other legislative action:

- Succession**  
The governor, lieutenant governor and other Council of State officers could serve three consecutive terms — but no more — under a bill filed by Rep. Steve Wood, R-Guilford.
- Currently, the governor and lieutenant governor are limited to two successive terms. But other officers on the Council of State, such as the attorney general, state treasurer, auditor, labor commissioner and secretary of state, may serve as many four-year terms as they win in statewide elections.**
- Wood's bill calls for a statewide referendum in November 1990 on his proposal.**
- Warrantless Arrests**  
Law enforcement officers could make arrests without warrants in some cases under a bill filed by Rep. Lawrence Diggs, R-Mecklenburg. The bill would allow warrantless

arrests for assault, communicating a threat, domestic criminal trespassing, assault on a female and impaired driving.

- Life Sentences**  
Rep. Johnathan Rhyne, R-Lincoln, filed a bill to require judges in capital punishment cases to tell juries that giving the defendant life in prison might result in the person's eventual release.
- Under North Carolina law, the death penalty can be imposed only on the recommendation of a jury after a sentencing hearing. The bill would require that when giving the jury final instructions, the judge include a statement that if the defendant is given life imprisonment instead of death, he might become eligible for parole some day.**
- Agent Registration**  
A bill that would establish state regulation of agents for college athletes was filed by Sen. Frank Block, D-New Hanover.
- Under the bill, agents representing athletes at the state's colleges and universities who have never signed contracts with professional teams would be required with the Secretary of State's office.**

Before doing business in North Carolina, the agents would have to post a surety bond of \$100,000 to assure his payment of damages for fraud, deceit or other abuses of his contract.

The secretary of state could revoke an agent's certificate if he violated rules regarding contacts with amateur athletes.

**Team Tickets**  
The governor and lieutenant governor would run as a team under a bill filed by Sens. George Daniel, D-Caswell, and Bob Martin, D-Pitt. Currently, the governor and lieutenant governor are elected separately.

A similar bill is pending in the House.

# Court Pondering 'At-Will' Firings

RALEIGH — A century-old policy allowing employers to dismiss workers for any reason could be altered or abolished by the North Carolina Supreme Court, which is mulling its first workers-rights case ever.

The state's highest court Wednesday heard arguments of a lawsuit filed by Mark Coman, who was fired in 1987 from Thomas Manufacturing Co. of Thomasville. He contends his dismissal resulted from refusal to disobey a federal requirement that commercial truckers rest eight hours for every 10 they drive.

The court could abolish the "at-will" doctrine, which permits firings for any reason or for no reason. But Associate Justice Burley Mitchell indicated during the hearing that the court might limit itself to deciding whether an additional exemption to the law should be established.

"Here it seems to me we have a very narrow case to decide," Mitchell said. "We won't even be deciding cases where an employer has a mixed reason for firing an employee — refusing to violate public policy and poor job performance."

Coman, 31, filed suit last year after losing his job as a truck driver with Thomas Manufacturing Co. He said he broke federal law by driving 40 hours without sleep to Michigan for his company and lost his \$30,000 job when he refused to do it again.

The at-will doctrine has been state law since 1877, but there are exceptions. For example, workers cannot legally be fired because of their age, sex or race, for filing a workers' compensation claim or wage and hour claim, or for exercising rights under occupational safety law.

In 1974, the state Court of Appeals ruled in a case called Sides v. Duke University that an employee could not be fired for refusing to lie in court. Coman's lawyers argued that his firing involved similar principles.

"Mr. Coman contends he was discharged because he did what was right," said David Tamer, a Winston-Salem lawyer. "He obeyed the law just like any other citizen."

But Kenneth Broun, a Raleigh lawyer for Thomas Manufacturing Co., argued that the matter should be dealt with on the federal level. He urged the justices to uphold rulings by a Superior Court judge and the state Court of Appeals that Coman has no right to sue in state court.

If the rulings are overturned, "Every time an employee is fired there would be the allegation, 'I was fired for doing the right thing,'" Broun warned.

But Chief Justice Jim Exum said the courts could "ferret out frivolous claims."

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# GOP Lawmakers Author Alternative Budget

RALEIGH — An alternative budget hammered out by Republican legislators who oppose higher taxes has little chance of passing but could pose political problems for Gov. Jim Martin, lawmakers say.

Although the 26 representatives and two senators who endorsed the plan Wednesday insisted they were not rebelling against Martin, who has called for tax increases, Democrats said the move raises questions about his support within his party.

"I had understood from the governor that he had talked to his people ... and they were pretty much on board," said Senate President Pro Tem Henson Barnes, D-Wayne.

"The governor's got a real problem on his hands," House Speaker Joe Mavretic, D-Edgecombe, said. "He's got a lot of selling to do in a short period of time."

The GOP lawmakers' plan, endorsed by at least 26 representatives and two senators, would cut \$639 million in state spending, including a 5 percent reduction in the budgets of all state agencies.

It also envisions a freeze on further implementation of the Basic Education Program, a halt to state funding of non-governmental entities such as local libraries and arts councils and reduction of the school construction fund created in 1987.

Democrats attacked the proposals and even Martin described them as "drastic," saying he could not endorse them. Martin has said repeatedly that he proposed tax increases for his salary and highway plans only when convinced that spending cuts would not generate enough money.

The Republicans' plan "will halt the hiring of any additional teachers and will reduce by 7.5 percent the number of teachers, university faculty, community college staff ... prison guards ... and every other category of state employees who are already overworked," he said in a statement.

Members of Martin's Cabinet said their budgets already were tight and that another 5 percent cut would be unrealistic.

"What am I going to do, cut out Medicaid?" said David Flaherty, secretary of the Department of Human Resources. "I can see where they're coming from, but I think the governor has the better mousetrap."

Commerce Secretary Jim Broyhill and Bill Cobey, secretary of natural resources and community development, also said their budgets could not stand another round of cuts.

The GOP alternative grew out of dissatisfaction with Martin's call for the two biggest tax increases in state history over the past month.

His administration helped craft the \$8.6 billion highway package under study by House and Senate committees, which would boost the

gasoline tax by 5/4 cents per gallon and impose a 2 percent automobile title transfer fee.

Last week, Martin proposed a 1-cent sales tax increase to finance a 6 percent pay raise for teachers and state employees, lift the freeze on their salary schedules and implement the career ladder program statewide while eliminating the state sales tax on food.

The Republican legislators' plan, assembled primarily by Reps. Trip Sizemore, R-Guilford, Art Pope, R-Wake, and Larry Etheridge, R-Wilson, departs dramatically from Martin's program.

Its major components include:

— A 5 percent across-the-board budget cut, saving \$300 million in fiscal 1989-90.

— Halting all state aid to local organizations not specifically required by law, such as volunteer fire departments, libraries and arts councils. State grants to local agencies such as mental health departments would be abolished. Also targeted for fund cutoffs would be quasi-governmental agencies such as the North Carolina Microelectronics Center.

— A \$57 million reduction in the fund for school construction.

— Cutting off expansion of the BEP, an \$800 million program to upgrade public education quality. Martin's budget seeks \$113 million for the program's fifth-year installment.

The cuts would generate \$639 million next year, of which \$307 million would fund the governor's teacher pay plan. Another \$329.6 million would fund operations of the Highway Patrol, which would be shifted from the budget's highway fund to the general fund. The general fund pays for all government programs not involving transportation. Also, the Republicans would lift

the \$300 ceiling on the automobile sales tax and issue \$1 billion in bonds. With the savings produced by the Highway Patrol shift, they say their plan would generate \$587 million for the highway fund next year and \$9 billion over the 12-year life of the highway construction plan.

"We do not need to raise taxes for teachers' pay and roads," Sizemore said at a news conference. "If we fund roads and teachers first ... the people of North Carolina can see that tax increases are only necessary to fund pork barrel, failed education programs and private

organizations that do not benefit the people."

Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Kenneth Royall, D-Durham, said the GOP plan's prospects for enactment are remote. "It's unbelievable," he said.

The Republicans emphasized that Martin had urged them to make alternate proposals. "He called us together and encouraged us to do this," said Rep. Doris Huffman, R-Catawba.

House Minority Leader Johnathan Rhyme, R-Lincoln, did not endorse the GOP legislators' plan but stopped short of criticizing it.

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## More Weather Woes For N.C.

A day of warm spring sunshine generated marble-sized hail in the mountains and other parts of the state, while high winds tore the roof off a house in Hertford County.

"We did have some severe wether associated with this thunderstorm," Charles Jones, emergency management coordinator for Hertford County, said Wednesday night. "We had a roof taken off a house in Harrellsville. No one was injured, and the family there found friends and family to stay with."

Jones said the storm also broke some power poles as it blew through the county shortly after 8 p.m., causing scattered power outages.

Heavy thunderstorms began passing through Cherokee, Macon and Jackson counties about 2 p.m. Wednesday, coating some areas with 2 to 3 inches of hail, according to a spokesman at the National Weather Service at the Asheville Regional Airport.

A state Highway Patrol trooper said hail coated the eastern part of Macon County, making it "like standing on marbles."

As the storm moved east, it brought the hail with it.

Kermit Keeter, a National Weather Service meteorologist at Raleigh-Durham International Airport, said dime-sized hail had been reported in northern parts of Orange, Durham and Vance counties, and golf ball-sized hail in southern parts of Granville and Person counties.

Some places recorded as much as three inches of hail accumulation on the ground.

"The northern part of our county and Henderson received about marble-sized hail ... bigger than your thumb," said a Vance County detective who was out in the storm. "It fell for about 10 to 15 minutes."

# Hazardous Waste Measure Advances Through Panels

RALEIGH — State lawmakers were urged to do their homework in preparation for rapid Senate consideration of a bill to renew North Carolina's search for a hazardous waste facility.

Sen. Henson Barnes, president pro tem of the Senate, said Wednesday he had met with Gov. Jim Martin and some House members to decide what measures would be necessary to "tell South Carolina we're doing serious work with regards to the bill." He repeated his admonition

that passage today would be necessary to send a clear signal and possibly get South Carolina to reopen its waste site to this state.

Barnes praised the Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee and the Finance Committee for acting quickly on the bill.

The Finance Committee unanimously approved the bill Wednesday after Sen. Dennis Winner, D-Buncombe, urged speedy action.

"I hope that you will not hold this off," Winner said. "No promises have been made ... but there's been some strong indications that South Carolina may back off of this if we

can get this bill out of the Senate by tomorrow.

"I don't think this is a perfect bill," he added. "But I do think that our businesses in this state and our environment in this state need it."

Sen. Lura Tally, D-Cumberland, agreed with the urgency, saying, "People are backing up with their toxics all over the state."

Meanwhile, several House members and legislative staffers went to Richmond to consider ways the states might share responsibility for dealing with hazardous waste.

Sen. Marshall Rauch, D-Gaston, chairman of the Finance Committee, said this was one time the Senate would have to depend on the House "because we know we are sending an imperfect bill."

The bill would set up a new Industrial Waste Management Commission, largely under Gov. Jim Martin's direction, to choose a waste site. It contains siting criteria similar to those adopted by a panel looking for a low-level radioactive waste site and contains guidelines for compensating affected communities, charging fees for waste treatment and encouraging waste reduction efforts.

The Finance Committee examined only the fees, taxes and bond provisions that would pay for the siting of a facility.

RALEIGH (AP) — A Raleigh lawyer who was handcuffed to a chair on orders of a Wake District Court judge has asked the state Supreme Court to prohibit the judge from hearing the lawyer's cases until the Judicial Standards Commission can look into the incident.

The lawyer, Richard N. Gusler, complained in a petition Wednesday that the judge, Stafford G. Bullock, had threatened his livelihood and reputation by saying he never would appoint Gusler to represent indigent clients or accept a recommendation from him.

According to the petition, the judge also told Gusler that he would never continue his cases and that his clients would have to plead guilty or innocent to the charges they face. Gusler took that to mean his clients never would be eligible for a first offender's program, under which some first offenders are allowed to perform community service and avoid a conviction.

# Helms Denies Playing Foreign Policy Role

RALEIGH — Even as he threatened to delay Lawrence S. Eagleburger's confirmation to the State Department's second-highest job, Sen. Jesse Helms denied a suggestion that he is one of several lawmakers who have "set themselves up as alternative secretaries of state."

It was the latest frustration for Republican administrations, which often have found Helms, the ranking Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, a congressional obstacle in foreign policy matters.

The latest criticism has come from Rep. Richard B. Cheney, R-Wyo., President Bush's nominee for secretary of defense. In an article released Wednesday but written before he was nominated, Cheney said Congress too often has "overstepped the bounds of its competence and authority with harmful effects" in foreign affairs.

The only direct reference to Helms took up one paragraph in the 37-page article, written for the American Enterprise Institute. It said congressional investigators in the Iran-contra affair obtained 1986 State Department cables discussing a trip to Nicaragua by unidentified U.S. citizens.

According to the cables, the citizens said they were visiting Eden Pastora, then a contra leader, "at the request of Senator Jesse Helms." They agreed that the United States "would send supplies to Pastora in return for his willingness to undertake specific activities on behalf of the Nicaraguan resistance," the account said.

Cheney's article said the State Department "fired back that it was 'astounded' because the private citizens were 'not in a position to commit the U.S. government.'"

In an interview with The News and Observer of Raleigh on Wednesday, Helms said: "I never sent any word to Eden Pastora at all. ... I was amused by Dick Cheney's comments

because, how in the world did he know what he was talking about with reference to me? He hasn't called me. But I bear him no ill will, I like him. I'm going to vote for him for secretary of defense."

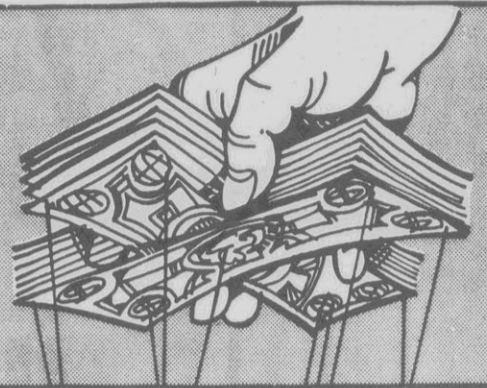
In a footnote to his article, Cheney said he based the report of the incident with Pastora on a public memo from Iran-contra investigators.

Deborah DeMoss, Helms' top aide on Central America, said the memo "was based on somebody who told somebody that Senator Helms had sent some emissaries there. ... It

was incredible. It was third-hand."

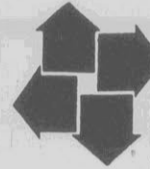
As for the nomination of Eagleburger, Helms said he was troubled by the nominee's long-standing association with former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger. The senator and other conservatives objected to Kissinger's role in the warming of U.S. relations with the Soviet Union.

Helms' actions irritated Sen. Nancy L. Kassebaum, R-Kan., a committee member.

RALEIGH (AP) — A 19-month-old boy was critically injured Wednesday when he fell from a third-story window at his parents' Raleigh apartment, police said.

Adrian Redmond, the son of Thomas M. and Crystal Redmond, suffered head injuries and was in critical condition Wednesday night at Wake Medical Center, a hospital spokesman said.

The child was at home with his father about 5:40 p.m. when he fell approximately 16 feet onto a concrete walkway, hitting his head, said Raleigh Police Sgt. K.L. Johnson.

Redmond said his son apparently pushed out the window screen. "I had my back to him, and he was evidently pushing the screen, and he went out behind it," he said in a telephone interview.

The father realized what had happened when he looked out the window and saw the child lying on the walkway below, Johnson said. Police had not located anyone Wednesday night who might have seen the child fall.

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# Court Blocks Execution Of Simmons For 1987 Murders

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Mass murderer R. Gene Simmons is back on death row today after a fellow inmate persuaded the U.S. Supreme Court to block Simmons' execution for the slayings of 14 family members.

Simmons' execution by lethal injection had been set for today, five weeks after he was convicted of the 1987 Christmas killings. The 48-year-old Simmons says he wants to die and has refused to appeal his conviction.

Jonas Whitmore, who is appealing his 1987 death penalty and conviction, filed the petition, contending that Simmons' execution — which would have been the first in Arkansas in a quarter-century — could have repercussions for other death row inmates.

Arthur Allen, Whitmore's attorney, said the U.S. Constitution requires an appeal in all death cases.

The state Supreme Court ruled on Friday that Simmons is competent to waive his appeal for the February conviction. The same court Monday rejected Whitmore's petition, claiming he lacked standing. Whitmore filed the petition with Justice Harry Blackmun on Tuesday and Blackmun referred it to the entire court on Wednesday.

The order to stop the execution was issued Wednesday without dissent or comment.

Reaction from state and local officials came swiftly.

"The ruling came as a complete shock to me and I don't understand it," Gov. Bill Clinton said Wednesday.

"Very, very surprised, frustrated," was state Attorney General Steve Clark's response. "I actually didn't think the Supreme Court would issue a stay."

In Russellville, where Simmons was arrested on Dec. 28, 1987, after killing two residents in a shooting rampage, the opinion voiced against the Supreme Court ruling was stronger.

"The decision stinks," Prosecutor John Bynum said. "The Supreme Court has let Jonas Whitmore, a convicted murderer, manipulate the judicial system and it's just not right."

After Simmons was arrested in Russellville, authorities discovered the bodies of his wife, seven children, two of the children's spouses and four grandchildren at his home near Dover, about 75 miles northwest of Little Rock.

Bynum has prosecuted Simmons twice, winning a death sentence each time. Simmons was first sentenced to death last year for the Russellville murders. That execution was postponed by state and federal courts considering the validity of Simmons' waiver of his right to appeal.

Clinton said Wednesday he would now set a death date for Simmons in the conviction for the Russellville murders. But Clark said he would expect the Supreme Court to stay any execution date for Simmons while it considers the Whitmore petition.

The stay is of indefinite duration, pending the filing of a petition to the court asking it to review Simmons' case. If the petition is denied by the court — at least four of the nine justices would have to vote to grant it — the stay would be dissolved automatically and Clinton could sign a death warrant for Simmons for the family murders.

The Arkansas Democrat, a Little Rock newspaper, published a letter Wednesday from Simmons in which Simmons called Arkansas' death penalty ineffective.

"One of the things I wanted to say in court (which would have answered one of your questions) is that Arkansas does not have a meaningful death penalty, it is a facade," Simmons wrote in response to questions contained in a note given to him after a March 9 federal court hearing.

## Former Publisher Dies

IONIA, Mich. (AP) — Fred M. Kidd Jr., former publisher of the Ionia Sentinel-Standard, died Wednesday after a long illness at age 77.

He was the third generation of Kidds to serve as publisher of the newspaper, which was founded in 1866. His grandfather, Gen. James H. Kidd, joined the newspaper shortly after he returned from the Civil War, during which he served under Gen. George Custer.

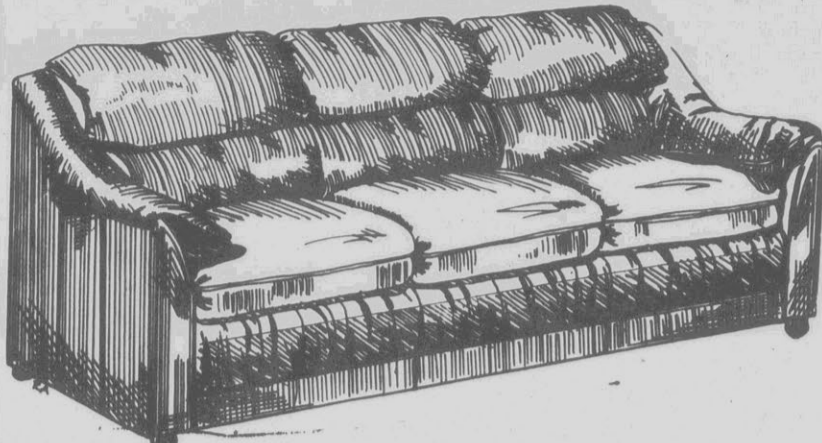
Kidd joined the newspaper in 1931 and remained active in its affairs after he sold it in 1976.

He is survived by his wife, Lois Bolt Kidd, three daughters and eight grandchildren.

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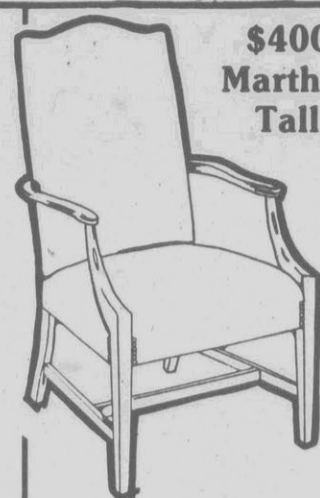


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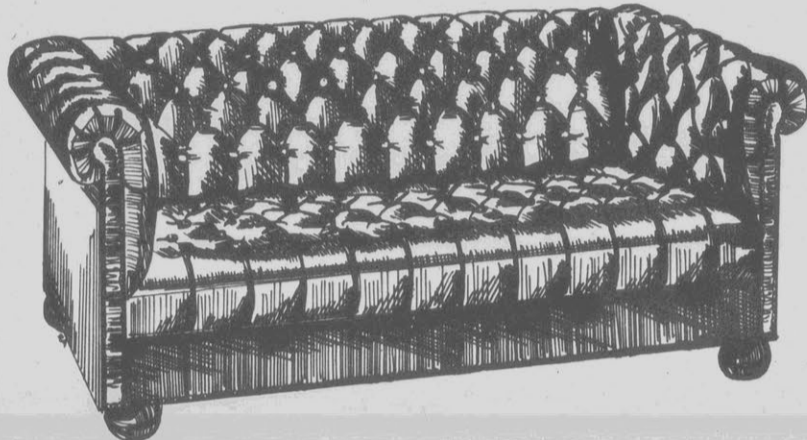
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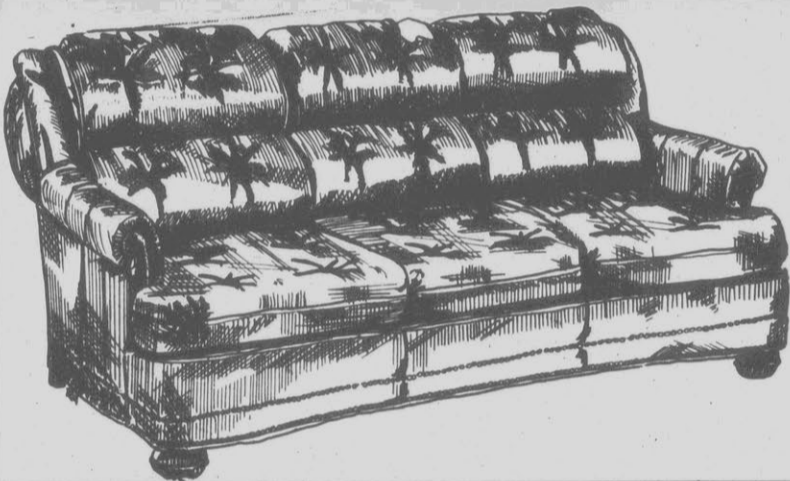


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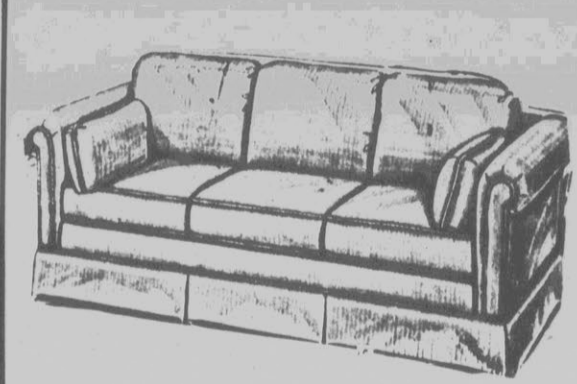
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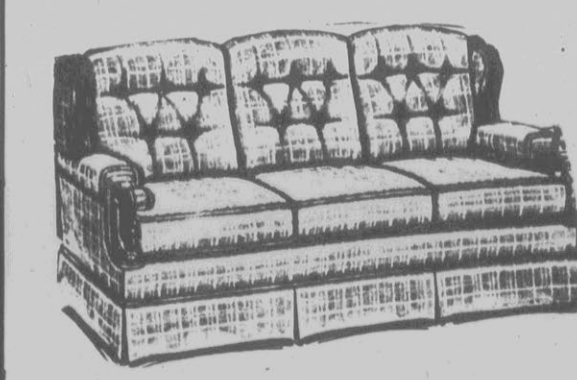
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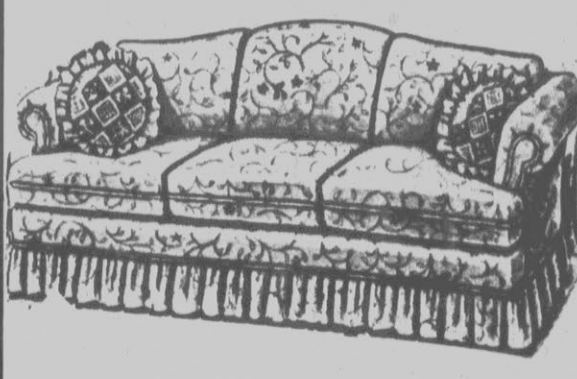
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# IRS: Tax Answers Are Wrong Half The Time In Some Areas

WASHINGTON — Internal Revenue Service employees in some parts of the country are giving correct answers to telephoned tax questions barely half the time, the IRS says.

Nationwide, say auditors for the General Accounting Office, the IRS is correct only 60 percent of the time — not the 69 percent claimed by the IRS less than a week ago. Some of the answers that IRS considers correct could lead taxpayers to foul up their returns, GAO said.

Robert LeBaube, IRS director of taxpayer services, quarreled with the GAO estimate — but only slightly. "As far as the IRS is concerned, whether we are answering 30 percent of the questions wrong or 40 percent of the questions wrong, either number is absolutely unacceptable," he told the House Govern-

ment Operations consumer subcommittee Wednesday. The IRS' own tests of its telephone-assistance system indicate a performance no better than last year's, even though employees have had an extra year to acquaint themselves with the big 1986 tax overhaul. While the IRS figures it is correct 69 percent of the time nationally, in some of the 29 calling sites the accuracy rate is in the 50s and in others it is in the 70s, LeBaube said.

He did not identify those areas. In an effort to improve performance, LeBaube said, the IRS is switching to a more permanent workforce, hiring fewer people to work only during the filing season. The agency also is assigning more supervisors and using new procedures to discover problem areas of tax law that are causing most problems for the telephone "assistors."

LeBaube advised taxpayers who call the IRS toll-free numbers to

write down their question, the date and name of the person who provided the answer. If an answer leads to an incorrect tax return and the taxpayer produces such a record, LeBaube said, the IRS will waive any penalty.

"The assistors are not properly trained to answer questions right 100 percent of the time?" asked Rep. Matthew Martinez, D-Calif. "That, to me, is really an intolerable situation."

The IRS blames a complicated tax law for part of the problem, as well as the frequency of changes in the law. GAO has said some IRS employees are reluctant to probe for additional information from taxpayers before answering their tax questions.

The IRS has about 5,000 employees answering telephoned tax questions during this filing season; about 1,500 of them are temporaries. All are required to have at least a high school education and receive at least five

weeks' tax training. GAO complains that the IRS is overstating its accuracy rate prompted Chairman Doug Barnard Jr., D-Ga., to call his subcommittee into session for a rare public airing of a dispute between two government agencies.

GAO and IRS agreed to work together on one test of the telephone-assistance system and hammered out 62 questions that IRS officials are expected to ask clandestinely about 15,000 times this filing season.

GAO and IRS agreed to score answers in only three ways: Correct; correct and complete, or incorrect. After the tests got under way, the IRS wanted a fourth grade: an answer that while not technically correct likely would not result in a faulty return.

GAO refused to go along, contending some of those answers from IRS employees were potentially misleading. IRS insisted and on its own began scoring those answers — which were 8.8 percent of the total — as correct.

Thus, GAO came up with an accuracy rate of 60.4 percent. IRS added the 8.8 percent in the fourth category and reached a total accuracy rate of 69.8 percent.

# Child Care Assistance Plans: Who Will Take Credit For It?

WASHINGTON — The Republican Bush administration and the Democratic-controlled Congress are vying furiously to gain credit for helping American families afford satisfactory child care.

The White House rushed a long-promised child-care bill to Capitol Hill on Wednesday as the Senate Labor and Human Resources approved, by an 11-5 margin, a rival \$2.5 billion program of direct subsidies.

Only those families making \$13,000 or less would be eligible for assistance under Bush's plan; the congressional proposal's income ceiling would be each state's median income. The national median for a family of four is \$32,777.

"It's not a question of whether or not we're going to do something on child care this year, but the direction it's going to take," said Sen. Dan Coates, R-Ind., as the Senate panel worked toward approval of the measure drafted by Sen. Chris Dodd, D-Conn., and co-sponsored by about 40 Senate colleagues, including a handful of Republicans.

The Bush proposal, outlined by press secretary Marlin Fitzwater, would provide a tax credit of up to \$1,000 for each child under age 4 in working families who make up to \$13,000 a year. He said 2.5 million American families would initially benefit from the legislation.

Such families would be given credit toward the first 14 percent of the income they report for tax liability purposes. This would mean that people in the lowest, minimum-wage categories of less than \$8,000 a year would get less of a benefit than those at the upper end of the scale.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., today called the administration's approach a "2 percent solution" that should be part of the more ambitious Democratic approach.

"I think we'll probably end up with both," she said on ABC's "Good Morning America." "One (the Republican bill) is a child allowance bill, and that's fine. ... But it doesn't deal with child care."

Fitzwater was questioned aggressively at the midday news briefing about the Bush administration formula.

"You can always pick some number and say, 'Is this enough, or is this too little?'" he said.

"But the fact is, you need to start someplace. It reflects budget considerations — that we can't afford unlimited costs here and obviously if you could pick any number you wanted to, and you had unlimited billions to spend, you'd rather pick a much higher figure, but you do the best you can with what you've got."

During his presidential campaign, Bush repeatedly cited child-care assistance for American families as one of his top priorities.

Under existing law, parents are allowed a \$720 credit for child care costs incurred in order to accept or keep employment, but it applies only to families with sufficient income to pay federal income taxes.

Under Bush's plan, if a family's income tax liability was less than \$1,000, it would get a refund reflecting the difference between the amount owed and the \$1,000 credit.

The Dodd bill, similar to a measure that reached the Senate floor last year but was blocked by an informal filibuster, would provide benefits to families with children up to age 15 whose income does not exceed the median income in the state where they live.

Aside from the scope and cost of the programs, a major difference is that the Dodd bill would set up minimum federal standards for day care providers — although states would be given more than six years to comply — while the Bush measure would leave standards solely to the states, as they are now.

Bush said emphatically in a statement that he opposed having the federal government get into the business of regulating the quality of child care.

"Federal policy should increase, not decrease, the range of choices available to parents," he said. "The federal government should not become involved in licensing decisions and federal financial support should not be made contingent upon state licensing decisions."

At a news conference, Dodd welcomed Bush's determination to push for child care assistance but ridiculed some aspects of the president's proposal as "utterly amazing."

"I'm opposed to any suggestion this is a substitute somehow for a meaningful child care bill," Dodd said. He said the administration's bill would cover less than 2 percent of the population.

While Fitzwater gave no estimate of what the Bush proposed tax credits might cost the Treasury, Dodd and others have said it would be minimal — probably just a few million dollars.

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
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
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# Runyan Mushes To Iditarod Win

NOME, Alaska — Musher Susan Butcher was about 70 miles from the finish line in the 1,168-mile contest when she knew she wouldn't catch Joe Runyan, who broke her three-year winning streak in the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race.

"I'm not disappointed," said Butcher. "Everybody says it's hard to fall from the top. But I've had a lot of good races. I thought it would hurt, but it didn't hurt at all. So I don't feel bad."

Butcher, 33, of Manley, finished second Wednesday, arriving in Nome with nine dogs about an hour behind Runyan, 40, of Nenana, and his team of 12.

Runyan crossed the finish line in the 17th annual race after 11 days and 5½ hours on the Iditarod Trail between Anchorage and Nome, about three hours short of Butcher's 1987 record time.

Forty-nine mushers left Anchorage on March 4 with up to 18 dogs each.

The race was inspired by a sled-dog relay of serum to Nome during a 1925 diphtheria outbreak.

Butcher was followed by Rick Swenson, who holds a record four Iditarod victories achieved over six years.

Fourth-place musher Dee Dee Jonrowe finished the 22-mile stretch of trail between Safety and Nome at 10:47 p.m. Wednesday, with 36 other teams strung along the route as far back as Kaltag, 357 miles from the finish.

Nome was a partying town on victory night. The bars were packed

with residents and people who traveled to the remote town of 4,300 for the race and the Iditarod Basketball Tournament.

Runyan's arrival in the finish chute drew crowds that dispersed after he was interviewed by reporters. He then walked into the lobby of a hotel with his wife and 2-year-old daughter. Race watchers, some sitting atop buildings on the south side of Front Street, reassembled for Butcher's arrival an hour later.

"It feels good to be at the end," said Runyan, who won Europe's Alpirod last year and in 1985 won the Yukon Quest from Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, to Fairbanks.

"The main goal was just to get here first," said Runyan, who received \$50,000 of a \$250,000 purse shared by the top 20 finishers. "I

didn't care about the record."

The timing of breaks was important in Runyan's race strategy. He waited until McGrath, 407 miles into the race, before taking a mandatory 24-hour layover that most mushers completed earlier.

Runyan said Wednesday that his dogs were in good shape.

"We've gone over 200 miles in 24 hours," he said. "The Alaska husky is unlike any animal on Earth. They can go 100 miles a day on rough terrain and they can take it."

Runyan's wife, Sherri, said she saw a change in her husband during the race. "Each time when I saw him on TV, or heard him on the radio, I could tell he was getting more aggressive, which is really out of character," she said. "He's really a quiet guy."

Some race watchers said Butcher fell victim to a jinx that seems to

plague mushers who are at the race's halfway point first. Butcher put on a strong surge to beat Runyan by two minutes to the ghost town of Iditarod and win \$3,000 in silver ingots. Only once in race history has the halfway winner gone on to victory.

But Butcher said she dismisses the notion that getting the halfway money rules out winning the \$50,000 first prize.

## Timber Sale Injunction Turned Down By Judge

SEATTLE — A judge's refusal to halt logging on federal land that is home to the spotted owl provides relief to the timber industry and time to settle the issue, say members of the state's congressional delegation.

U.S. District Judge William Dwyer rejected requests Wednesday by nine environmental groups for an injunction delaying the sale of timber on as much as 50,000 acres of U.S. Forest Service land in Washington and Oregon.

Dwyer also rejected a request by the Washington Contract Loggers Association to stop the forest service from reducing the allowable timber cut. That issue, too, should be resolved at trial or in negotiations, he said.

The judge asked all parties to state by March 29 what should be done to resolve the issue. The suit, filed Feb. 8, claimed the agency's

owl management plan failed to set aside enough land to protect the bird.

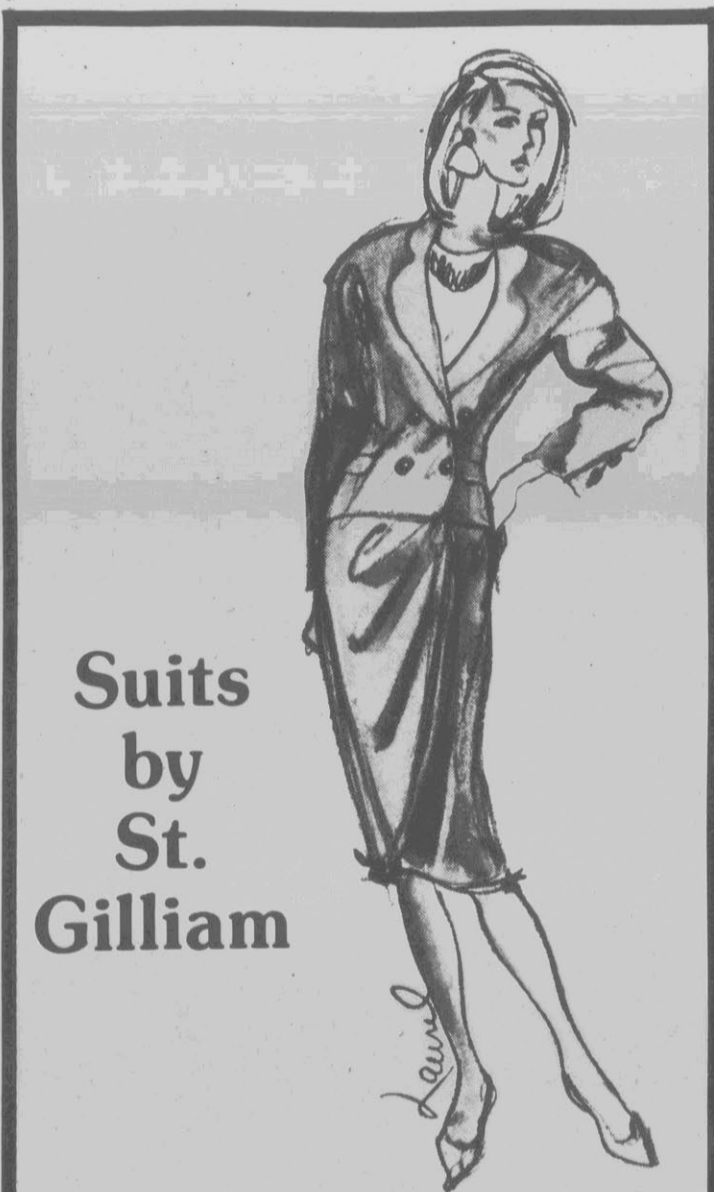
"I'm really delighted with the decision because it buys us time, which I feel is what we need," said Rep. Jolene Unsoeld.

Unsoeld said in a telephone interview from Washington, D.C., that small mill owners, labor and environmentalists have indicated a willingness to discuss how to maintain a "sustainable timber industry, as well as achieve some of the environmental objectives."

Todd True, an attorney for the Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund, said environmentalists were reviewing their options.

"The biological evidence is that the owl is at the threshold of extinction and that it can not afford to lose additional habitat," he said.

The two sides have disagreed sharply on the extent of the threat to the owl, used as an index for other wildlife in the rapidly shrinking virgin forests of the Pacific Northwest.

## Hungarian Rallies Mark 1848 Revolt Anniversary

BUDAPEST, Hungary — Thousands of people, some chanting "Russians go home," marched in twilight across the Danube River to demand Hungary's full independence and celebrate its first small steps toward democracy.

An estimated 100,000 people took to the streets of the capital on Wednesday to mark Hungary's 1848 revolt against Austrian rule, an anniversary that has become a symbol for reformers demanding greater freedoms.

Unlike in previous years, when authorities cracked down on celebrations, the anniversary this year was declared a public holiday and both government and opposition rallies took place peacefully across the nation.

In Budapest, thousands of people sporting national emblems marched, listened to poetry and folk songs and chanted slogans during rallies and other events held throughout the day.

Crowds applauded calls for an independent Hungary, the withdrawal of Soviet troops, free elections and a multi-party system and expressed solidarity with jailed activists in neighboring East bloc countries.

A five-hour march through the capital to symbolic sites of the 1848 revolution, which Austria crushed in 1849 with the help of Russian troops, was followed in the evening by a candlelight procession across a Danube bridge and up a steep road to the Castle Hill.

Police made no move all day to interfere with the marchers.

Pro-democracy activist Sandor Szilagyi, one of the organizers of

Wednesday's mass march through the capital, said this was a sign the Communist Party was sincere about taking steps toward democracy.

In past years, large numbers of police escorted demonstrators at unofficial gatherings or forcibly dispersed them and detained protest leaders. In 1986, the State Department protested violent a police crackdown on a March 15 rally.

In a further sign of Hungary's recent reforms and greater independence from Moscow, no Soviet-style red flags hung anywhere in the capital for the first time on any national holiday in three decades.

The day amounted to one of the biggest outpourings of nationalist pride since another unsuccessful Hungarian revolt, the anti-Soviet uprising of 1956, was crushed by Russian tanks.

Miklos Tamas-Gaspar, a leader of the opposition Federation of Free Democrats, told the crowd gathered before the candlelight march that March 15 was not only a celebration of 1848, but also of 1956.

"The aim is the same," he said. "Constitutional democracy and national independence."

Wednesday night, a crowd estimated by Western reporters and independent activists to be about 80,000 to 100,000 marched across the river to the castle, with some chanting "Russians go home."

Themes of democracy and independence marked events throughout the day, as Hungarians celebrated the newly recognized holiday and recent reforms endorsed by Parliament that could usher in a bona fide multi-party system.

Denes Csegey, a popular leader of one of the largest independent groups, the Hungarian Democratic Forum, told a cheering crowd that March 15 should not be the only day of freedom.

## U.N. Peacekeeping Plan Agreed To By Diplomats

UNITED NATIONS — Central American diplomats have reached tentative agreement on a plan that would bring U.N. peacekeeping troops into the region to monitor guerrilla movements.

The foreign ministers of Nicaragua, Salvador, Honduras, Costa Rica and Guatemala are to meet March 29-30 in San Jose, the Costa Rican capital, to adopt the plan.

Deputy Foreign Minister Victor Hugo Tinoco of Nicaragua said adoption would be "a formality." Honduran Ambassador Roberto Flores Bermudez and U.N. officials also confirmed Wednesday's agreement in principle.

Up to 11,000 Nicaraguan Contra rebels supported by the United States have bases in Honduras from which they launch raids into Nicaragua. They are the prime focus of the U.N. plan.

A U.N. diplomat, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the peacekeeping plan does not conflict with President Bush's intention to supply humanitarian aid to the Contras.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III said Tuesday that an international border patrol force was "not inconsistent" with the Bush administration's policy goals.

The U.N. military observers are to operate in the region to verify

reports of guerrilla activity and, by their presence, deter such raids.

The United Nations has drafted a plan calling for up to 100 military observers backed by 60 pilots, drivers and civilian administrators from Canada, Spain and West Germany.

The peacekeepers are to focus on the Nicaragua-Honduras border to check allegations of raids by the Contras, and the El Salvador-Honduras border, according to the draft proposal.

El Salvador says the leftist insurgents trying to overthrow El Salvador's U.S.-supported government operate from secret bases in Honduras without that government's

permission, and that Nicaragua supplies the rebels.

The peacekeepers also are to monitor the Costa Rica-Nicaragua border, and will use speedboats to patrol the Gulf of Fonseca, which links Nicaragua, Honduras and El Salvador on their Pacific coasts.

### Barbershop Shooting

CATANIA, Sicily (AP) — Two men shot a customer to death in a barbershop and a plainclothes policeman sitting next to the victim then killed one of the gunmen, the Italian news agency ANSA reported.

The other assailant was also hit by the policeman's fire but escaped, the agency said.

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# Striking Subway Workers In Seoul Arrested

SEOUL, South Korea — Riot police stormed a subway depot and arrested more than 2,300 workers who staged a wildcat strike today,

paralyzing Seoul's subway system and stranding thousands of commuters.

Most of the system's workers went on strike to demand dismissal of the subway chief for bad faith in labor negotiations. The government organized emergency transport with

about 10,000 extra buses and military vehicles.

The 3 million people who use the subway daily in the city of about 10 million people struggled to find alternate transport. Buses were packed and taxis carried up to five passengers each.

About 4,000 riot police stormed a subway depot to disperse 3,000 strikers who had seized the facility during the night and erected barricades. Police armored trucks fired tear gas and bulldozers knocked down the barricades.

Some strikers, armed with steel pipes and clubs, hurled firebombs at police before they were overpowered.

Police officials said 2,344 strikers had been arrested at the subway depot. Most would be released, but charges were being prepared against about 30 union leaders for leading an illegal strike, the officials said.

Officials of the city-owned Seoul Subway Corp. said they were maintaining limited service on some lines with managers, non-striking workers and locomotive drivers from the national railroad system, officials said.

A sudden snow storm that hit Seoul during the morning added to congestion and confusion in streets

clogged with heavy traffic.

Subway officials said about 6,000 of the system's 7,732 workers were involved in the protest. It was the first strike in the subway's 15-year history apart from a two-hour stoppage last June.

Mayor Koh Kun apologized to commuters for the inconvenience. "We want the strikers to return to work and drop their unjust demands," he said.

Subway President Kim Myong-nong ordered strikers to return to work by early Friday or face disciplinary action. But union officials, who declined to be named, said they had no intention of returning until their demands were met and all arrested strikers were released and charges dropped.

The strikers had ignored a government order for a 15-day cooling off period imposed late Wednesday after last-minute negotiations failed on their demand that the subway corporation president be dismissed.

Union leaders said Kim had acted in bad faith during earlier labor talks and demanded Koh sign a new agreement on pay and working conditions because they did not trust the subway corporation.

The mayor said he could not sign the agreement because he did not represent the subway corporation.

Strikers also demanded withdrawal of law suits against labor leaders who organized protests last week. Subway workers allowed commuters to ride free for four days last week.

# Afghan Radio Claims Rebel Assault On Jalalabad Failed

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Hundreds of guerrillas were killed in a failed attempt to wrest the eastern Afghan city of Jalalabad from government forces, state-run Radio Kabul reported. The rebels denied the claim.

In a broadcast monitored in Islamabad on Wednesday, the radio said Afghan government air and ground forces repulsed the guerrillas after the insurgents fired 5,000 rockets and shells in an attempt to take the city.

It said that over the previous 24 hours, 560 guerrillas and supporters were killed and 252 were wounded. It said the dead included four Americans, a Saudi national, and some Pakistanis.

The guerrillas admitted that bombing by communist forces hampered their advance on Jalalabad, but claimed to have shot down five airplanes and killed more than 100 government soldiers in fighting this week.

They reported heavy civilian casualties from the bombing.

Pakistan, the United States and Saudi Arabia back the Moslem guerrillas in their war with the communist government but deny having any nationals fighting in Afghanistan.

The battle for Jalalabad, 42 miles from the Pakistan border, is the first test of strength of Kabul's communist rulers and their guerrilla opponents since the last Soviet soldiers left Afghanistan on Feb. 15.

The city's fall would be a blow to the morale of the mainly conscripted army and a big boost to the guerrillas, who have been fighting 10 years to establish an Islamic republic in their homeland.

The guerrillas began their offensive March 6 and by last weekend had captured the communist garrison at Samarkhel, six miles east of Jalalabad.

The communists retaliated with heavy, high-altitude aerial bombing.

"The (air) forces are taking a direct part in defending the country and demolishing the gathering place of the invaders. ... This success worried the enemy, and they are thinking: 'These are not Afghan pilots,'" Radio Kabul said Wednesday night.

Guerrillas have claimed the fighter-bombers are piloted by Soviets in violation of the U.N.-mediated accord that provided for the Soviet withdrawal.

Despite communist claims, guerrilla sources say they have lost only about 150 men in the offensive and captured more than 700 government troops.

Government and guerrilla versions of the fighting usually contradict and tend to be exaggerated.

However, journalists and witnesses have reported the battle for Jalalabad has sent hundreds of wounded guerrillas and thousands of civilians over the border into Pakistan.

The guerrilla-run Afghan News Agency said insurgents also were attacking communist posts around the northern city of Baghlan and the southeastern city of Kandahar, the country's second-largest.

It said attacks near Baghlan on Monday killed 70 communist troops, wounded 50 and destroyed five tanks.

## PLO-U.S. Talks Set

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — Yasser Arafat says the next round of direct talks between the PLO and the United States will be held next Wednesday, and insists the uprising in the Israeli-occupied territories will continue.

Arafat, chairman of the Palestine Liberation Organization, announced the date to reporters after meeting Wednesday with Tunisian President Zine el-Abidine Ben Ali. The U.S. Embassy in Tunis declined comment.

The first formal meeting between a four-man Palestinian delegation and U.S. Ambassador Robert Pelletreau Jr. was held Dec. 16. Pelletreau and Palestinian officials have since had several informal meetings.

## Shoppers Enjoying Convenience Stores

NEW YORK (AP) — America's shoppers — pressed for time — are making more visits and spending more dollars in convenience stores than ever before, reports a marketing communications company.

Recent statistics indicate that 63 percent of the adult population patronizes a "C-store" at least twice a month, according to the New York-based Howard Marlboro Group.

More than half of those shoppers spend some of their shopping dollars at a convenience store at least once each week, the study shows. Americans spent nearly \$66 billion in such stores in 1987, the most recent year for which full annual figures are available.

What once were small outlets where a customer could make a late night stop for a quart of milk and a pack of cigarettes have evolved into almost full-service stores, reports the communications company.

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# Alzheimer's Patients Receive Love At Center

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — No scary halls or threatening mirrors await the unwary. Doors blend with the walls to hold down wandering, and the bathrooms have adult-size diapering tables.

The yard is fenced and free of danger, and reassuring hugs are ever available to combat the fog of advancing childhood.

"We love these people, and they know it," said Nadine Grashot, director of the Alzheimer's Day Care Center of Memphis. "They've lived lives of dignity and respect and they deserve dignity and respect now."

The center's building is one of the first in the country designed for Alzheimer's day care, and the service it provides shows how badly others are needed.

"Every community needs one," said Joan Dashiell of the Alzheimer's Foundation, a national organization headquartered in Chicago.

"There's a desperate need. We have more than we had eight years

ago or three years ago, but there aren't enough," she said.

While the cause of Alzheimer's is unknown, the effects of the debilitating brain disease are all too clear to the families of its 2.5 million victims in the United States.

Generally striking late in life, Alzheimer's leaves its victims totally dependent on others. Day care centers, while giving aid and comfort to the victims, also offer families a much-needed break.

"It's every caregiver's sanity. I could not work without that center. My career would be completely and totally on hold," said Patti Mooney, whose 73-year-old mother attends the Alzheimer's center in Memphis.

The center has 37 participants; nine of them, including Mrs. Mooney's mother, attend daily.

People who have never lived with an Alzheimer's victim have difficulty understanding how much supervision is required, Mrs. Mooney said.

Like children, Alzheimer's patients must be closely watched at all times, but it's more difficult than caring for a child.

"You can't put your mother in the grocery cart when you go to the store," Mrs. Mooney said.

Before finding the Memphis center, Mrs. Mooney paid \$1,200 a month for private duty nurses and hired part-time sitters for \$20 an hour.

The Memphis center, which charges her \$18 a day, provides more than just financial relief. It offers her mother safety, affection and understanding.

"From the minute she walks in the door she's smiling, and when I pick her up in the afternoon she's relaxed and calm," Mrs. Mooney said. "They bring her out to me and they're holding her hand. They hand her over to me with their arms around her."

The center's staff gets its direction from Mrs. Grashot, whose husband, Louis, died in 1982 after an 11-year struggle with Alzheimer's. She and five friends founded the private, non-profit center in 1983.

It began in two rooms of a senior citizen center operated by the city. In 1986, the Memphis City Council approved a grant of \$100,000 for the Alzheimer's program, and a loan of \$350,000 led to construction of the new building, located on a small city park.

The center, which costs about

\$300,000 a year to operate, runs primarily on grants and donations. Occasionally, there are gifts of food, cleaning supplies or other items. Volunteers handle a variety of odd jobs, from patient care to fund raising.

The center provides a monthly support group for caregivers, 24-hour telephone counseling for times when the going gets especially rough and training sessions on understanding and caring for Alzheimer's patients.

"I'll find something for you to do if you want to volunteer," Mrs. Grashot said as she took a visitor on a tour of her building.

While the center has room for 50 participants at a time, attendance is limited by the size of the staff. Salaries are small and the work is demanding.

The center's founders, most of whom have had relatives suffering from Alzheimer's, drew on expert advice and their own experience in designing their building and programs.

Since Alzheimer's victims dislike tight surroundings, the building is open and airy. The walls are brightly colored but the floors have a dull

finish so the participants don't see their reflections and become confused. There is only one mirror in the building, in the employees' lounge.

Doors the program participants are to use are a different color than the surrounding walls. Ones they are not to use are the same color as the walls, and are therefore unseen.

Toilets are equipped with large, doorless stalls, showers for emergency cleanup and diaper-changing tables built for adults. Alzheimer's victims eventually become incontinent, and many day care centers turn away participants after they reach that point.

Participants at the Memphis center are welcome until they become bedridden.

It's important, Mrs. Dashiell said, that day care centers accept Alzheimer's victims as long as possible, even after they become disoriented and incontinent.

"That's when the families really need help," she said. "When they can get relief like this (at the center in Memphis) that let's them main-

tain the person at home longer.

"The families want to keep their loved ones out of the nursing homes as long as possible," Mrs. Dashiell said. "And they want them to be involved in an environment that has dignity."

At the Memphis center, program participants take part in group sing-alongs, waving their arms and shuffling their feet for exercise. They work on arts and crafts and are encouraged to socialize. With the center's yard cleared of obstacles and surrounded by a high fence, they are allowed occasionally to take walks by themselves, without their well-meaning but ever-wat- chful loved ones.

"It gives them a freedom they haven't known for a long time," Mrs. Grashot said.

One of the women had three chins and the other couldn't see her shoes for the overhang. I wanted to say, "I heard the horse she rode in 'National Velvet' has gone to pot, too!" My God, when is the public going to give this woman permission to be 57 years old and in charge of her own life?

Who cares if Oprah had a hamburger or if the grease dripped off her elbows? Or if she eats both ears off a 6-foot-tall solid chocolate bunny? Fans want their idols to stop the clock. They don't want to see Barbara Walters wear glasses, Raquel Welch become a grandmother or Angie Dickinson with gray hair.

I don't know the logic, but it probably has something to do with the public's own mortality. They're the

same age and they could look that good if they had money. They don't make those same kinds of demands of public politicians, authors, artists, musicians or corporate executives.

At a luncheon recently, I quietly observed four women at the next table. Between all the lifts, tucks and nips, there was enough skin and fat left over from the four of them to make a fifth person. All of them sat around with a surprised look on their faces. If the stock market crashed, not one of them could have blinked an eye, let alone express emotion.

It occurs to me there should be some kind of correlation between your mind and your body. What does it profit a 78-year-old woman to sit around the pool in a bikini if she cannot feed herself? Or to have your face lifted and not remember who took it?

There's a compulsory age for everything in this country. You are told when to receive Social Security, to retire, to reach adult status, to drink alcohol, vote, and enter the first grade.

Is it too much to ask, "When am I old enough to pig out?" without having to fall on your knees and confess, "Bless me, Jean Nidetch, for I have sinned"?

open session marked by praise for Cheney and general questions about his defense policies.

After receiving the necessary financial documents, FBI background check and White House reports, the committee met in closed session with the nominee Wednesday morning.

Nunn and Warner said that despite the quick action, consideration of the nominee has been thorough and complete.

"We've had exactly the same procedure on this one as we've had on every other nomination since I've been chairman," Nunn said. "I don't know of any deviation."

He added that the committee could take "another week or two but it would be exercise in futility based on the information we have now."

Warner noted that since Cheney is a member of Congress, information on him was readily available, and Nunn pointed out that the White House moved quickly on the FBI background check.

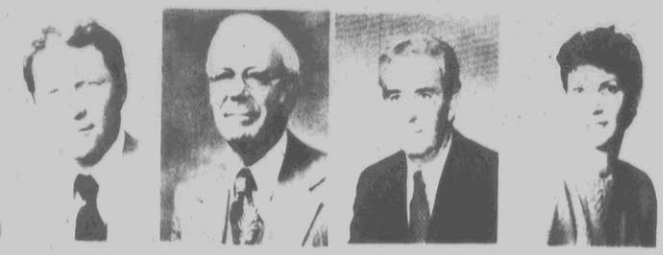
The committee did make an extra effort on the question of Cheney's health, contacting other physicians and having them review the lawmaker's medical reports. The 48-year-old Cheney has suffered

three heart attacks and underwent coronary bypass surgery last summer.

"We had no indication from any physician that there is any kind of problem here in terms of him being able to perform his duties," Nunn said.

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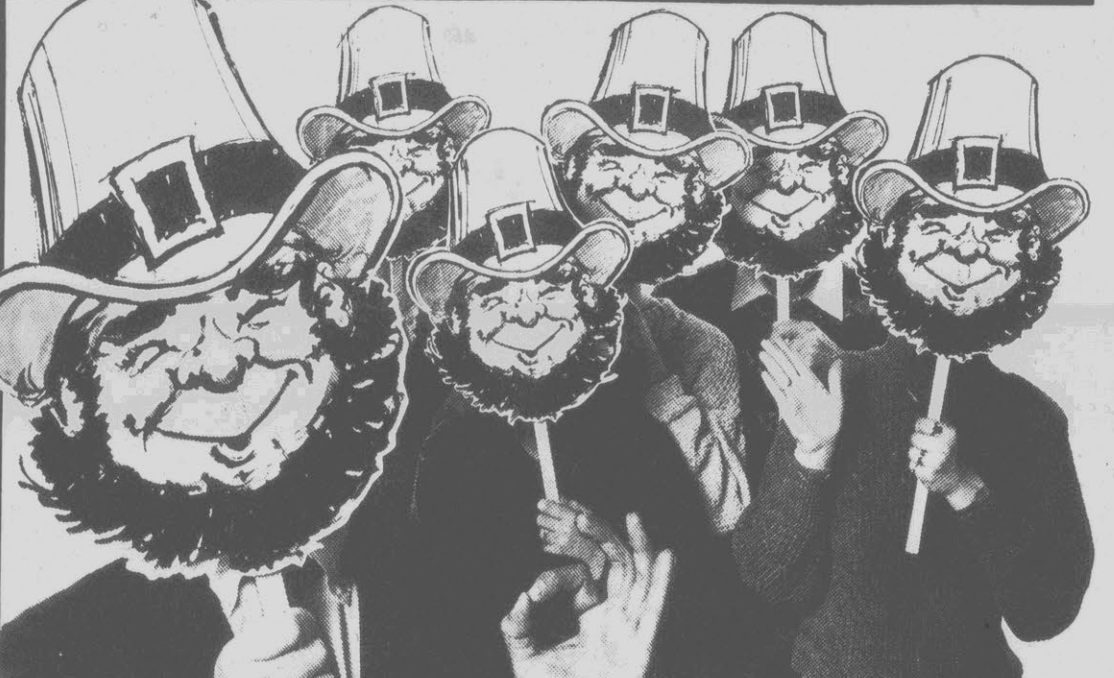
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## Ayden-Grifton Falls To Cougars

FAYETTEVILLE — Wake Forest-Rolesville coach Larry Lindsey got a good scouting report on Ayden-Grifton and he made the most of it.

The Cougars kept Charger stars Leon Dixon and Ronnell Peterson from doing their usual amount of damage and as a result took a 65-53 win in the semifinals of the Eastern 2-A Regionals Wednesday night at Cumberland County Memorial Arena.

Dixon and Peterson, who combined for an average of almost 40 points a game, are the two biggest reasons the Chargers made the regionals.

But foul trouble did in Dixon early while Romas Lucas kept Peterson from his usual heroics, limiting him to 15 points on six of 20 shooting from the field.

"I thought the key to the ball game was they did a good job of taking our best two ball players out of the ball game," Charger coach Bob Murphrey said. "Even when Dixon was in the ball game, we had to work awful hard to get him the ball and we just weren't willing to do it."

Together, Peterson (averaging 21.0 points and 11.1 rebounds per game) and Dixon (18.5 ppg and 8.3 rpg) have been a formidable force on the offensive boards, but Dixon picked up four fouls in the early going and his final one early in the second half. That left Peterson to do it alone and that was just too much.

"When he went out, our game plan changed to an inside game," Lindsey said. "The only thing you can hope with (Peterson) is that he misses, which he did."

The Chargers led in the early going, 8-4, but Jonathan Wright hit a basket and then added two free

throws to tie the game at 8-8.

Reggie Lucas added another bucket for the Cougars after an Ayden-Grifton turnover to make it 10-8.

James Woodard, though, tied the game up for the Chargers when he scored on a drive to make it 10-10.

Wright then broke free again, scored and drew a foul from Peterson. He added the free throw to make it 13-10.

On the Chargers' next play down the floor, Dixon was whistled for a charge, his third foul, with 2:33 remaining. That sent him to the bench and gave the Cougars breathing room inside.

By the end of the second quarter, Wake Forest-Rolesville led 19-13 and went on to lead by as many as 13 at 34-21 after another basket by Reggie Lucas.

Ayden-Grifton managed to put together a rally toward the end of

the half and pulled within 36-32 by the end of the second quarter.

Dixon, though, picked up his fourth foul, during the spurt.

"I told them let's try to cut it to four or five points before halftime," Murphrey said. "We went in a lot closer than I thought we would. I felt good at halftime, except for the foul trouble."

Ayden-Grifton managed to stay within four during the early moments of the third quarter, but after a basket by John Tyndall made it 40-36 with just under six minutes remaining, the Cougars gradually pulled away.

Nelson Harris hit to make it 42-34. After a turnover by the Chargers, Romas Lucas hit to make it 44-36.

Tyndall hit two free throws to pull the Chargers within 44-38, but on Ayden-Grifton's next series, Dixon fouled out with 2:44 remaining.

Wake Forest-Rolesville led 50-40 by the end of the third quarter and Ayden-Grifton never got closer than 10 points the rest of the way.

Lindsey felt Lucas' defensive job on Peterson was a key.

"The guy guarding him is 195 pounds and is just as quick as he is," he said. "Peterson is a good player but so is the guy guarding him. You're not going to (totally) stop Peterson. We were just hoping Dixon wouldn't hurt us."

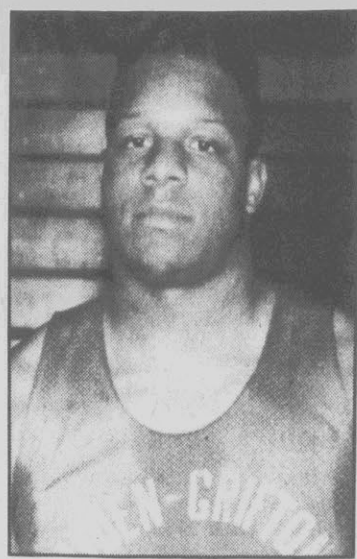
Woodard did his best to keep the Chargers in the game, scoring 18 points to lead his team, but it wasn't enough.

"We got a little frustrated," Murphrey said. "That was as good a defense as we've seen this year. They made Peterson work hard to catch the ball where he wanted."

Romas Lucas led the way for the Cougars with 27 points while Wright added 15.

Ayden-Grifton closes the year at 22-5. Wake Forest-Rolesville moves to 23-6 and takes on the winner of the Bunn-Farmville Central game in the Eastern Finals Saturday.

ROMULUS, Mich. — Michigan's basketball team left for the NCAA tournament without the coach whose guidance helped it qualify and insisting his sudden departure hadn't sapped the Wolverines' spirit.

Meanwhile, Athletic Director Bo Schembechler said he would "seek the greatest basketball coach in America to coach this team" and was going to old friend Bobby Knight of Indiana for advice in replacing Bill Frieder, named Arizona State coach on Wednesday.

The Wolverines boarded a jet Wednesday bound for Atlanta, where they'll prepare under interim coach Steve Fisher for their game against Xavier, Ohio on Friday in the first round of the tournament.

"I don't think you'll see any intensity level going down," guard Terry Mills said Wednesday, about 12 hours after Frieder said he was leaving Michigan for Arizona State.

"We had a talk with Schembechler before we left (campus) ... . We promised us the best," Mills said. "We're Michigan. We've got to go out and play like Michigan."

"All the veteran players have to come together and play really hard," Mills said.

Glenn Rice said he was trying to focus on Friday's game.

"We've just got to be concentrating on playing Xavier," Rice said. "We're not really worrying about the coach."

Frieder offered to coach the 10th-ranked Wolverines, seeded third in the Southeast regional, but Schembechler told a news conference Wednesday afternoon his answer was no.

"I don't want somebody from Arizona State coaching the Michigan team," Schembechler said. "A Michigan man is going to coach Michigan."

Frieder, who flew to Atlanta on Wednesday night to meet his old team, said he had planned to coach throughout the tournament, but when he was told of Schembechler's decision he said, "It made some sense to me."

Frieder's salary at Michigan was \$94,000, and he more than doubled that through a shoe contract and his basketball camp. The Arizona State job includes a reported \$300,000 in salary.

Schembechler and many of the players said Frieder's announcement stunned them.

"I had no forewarning at all," Schembechler said. "We just assumed that if anything would occur, it'd be after the NCAA tournament."

"I was totally shocked when Bill told me yesterday he was going to take the job," Fisher said.

Frieder called his players in the middle of the night Wednesday from Arizona to tell them of his decision.

"I was kind of surprised," forward Mike Griffin said. "There was a bit of disbelief. It was a total shock to

most of the guys."

He said the players heard a rumor Tuesday morning that Frieder might leave, and their suspicions were confirmed when the coach didn't attend their team regular team meeting.

Frieder blamed the timing of the announcement on pressure from Arizona State Athletic Director Charles Harris, who himself was under pressure to name a new coach for the Sun Devils, who had been coached by Bob Schermerhorn since Steve Patterson resigned Feb. 4. Arizona State finished the season 12-16.

"All I can say is ... there will be some negative things said about me at that end, but I think what's negative about me at that end will be positive at this end," Frieder said in Arizona.

Frieder has compiled a 191-87 record — including six straight 20-victory seasons — at Michigan since taking charge of the team in 1980. He led the Wolverines to Big Ten titles in 1985 and 1986, and to a 24-7 overall record this season.

When D.H. Conley and Eastern Alamance meet in the Eastern Regional semifinals tonight, both teams will be trying to stop the other's inside scoring attack.

The Eagles run a double low post with 6-5 senior center Thomas Garner and 6-4 sophomore Tyrone Satterfield. The two have combined to average 39.5 points per game for Eastern Alamance.

"I think it will be a very tough game," Conley coach Cobby Deans said. "We're going to have to really do a good job on the boards. I'm not so much worried about their height as where they play the height. One of the kids (Garner) goes out up top and can shoot the jumper well."

Conley, on the other hand, counters with 6-3 junior forward Terry Williams and 6-4 junior center Paul Merritt. Williams and Merritt have averaged a combined 25 points per game.

"We know that they are very well coached, athletic and that they are a very outstanding defensive team," Eastern Alamance coach Hal Jobe said. "We will have a lot of trouble with them. We're an inside-oriented team and I kind of feel like Conley will try and take that away from us."

Eastern Alamance enters the game with a 22-6 record, while the Vikings sport a 22-5 record. The Eagles finished in first place in the Mid-South Conference regular season race and also swept the

league tournament. They defeated Jamestown Ragsdale, 52-49, and Northwest Guilford, 86-78, in sectional play. Conley took home regular season honors in the Coastal 3-A Conference before falling to Havelock in the league championship tournament. The Vikings topped Apex, 78-51, and East Carteret, 65-45, in sectional play to reach the regionals.

Both coaches have placed the favorite role on the other team.

"It was probably the toughest draw that we could get but if we're going to win and our aim is to win then we're going to have to beat them anyway," Deans said. "I think it is important for us to go in with a positive attitude. I'm just glad to be able to go to Fayetteville because once you get there you don't necessarily have to be the best, you just have to play your game the best and if you do that you should come out a winner."

Even with the success of the Eagles this season, Jobe is worried about how the team will react to its first-ever appearance in the regionals.

"One advantage they (Conley) have is that they've played there (Cumberland County Arena)," Jobe said. "This is our first-ever appearance in the regionals. We'll have to get accustomed to size of the building and the distance from the goal to the wall. We've just got to line up and play and try to not worry about the size of the building. My concern is that we play hard and aggressively. If we do that, win or lose, I'll be satisfied with the outcome."

Balance will be key word when Farmville Central and Bunn tip it off in the Eastern 2-A Regional Basketball Semifinals Thursday.

Both teams boast a number of weapons from which to choose and that makes for an interesting matchup.

Farmville, 23-4 overall, is led by 6-5 junior center Jarvis Lang (19.6 points per game and 11.1 rebounds per game). Other Jaguar leaders are 6-3 senior forward Reggie Barrett (12.8 ppg) and 6-0 senior guard George Burnette (10.2 ppg).

Bunn is 26-1 on the year and won the Capital Area 2-A regular season and tournament titles. The Wildcats are led by 6-4 center Romeo Debban (17.6 ppg) and 6-0 senior forward Bobby Richardson.

"They play a control game, very halfcourt (oriented) on offense," Farmville coach Mike Terrell said. "They will run if given the opportunity. They play a lot of man and they play a lot of pressure. They'll trap fullcourt and halfcourt. To beat them, we have to remain stable against pressure defense."

Two years ago, Farmville advanced to the 2-A regionals in Fayetteville and went on to the state championship where the Jaguars lost to Salisbury.

Lang and Burnette were on that team, but neither played a significant role. In fact, both had just been brought up from the JV squad at the end of the season.

Bunn, on the other hand, went to the regionals last year, falling to eventual state champion Pender County in the semifinals. The Wildcats return a number of key players off that squad.

"Bunn may have the advantage in that three starters played here last year," Terrell said.

Since neither team relies on just

one or two players, Terrell expects a good matchup.

"They appear to be like my boys," he said. "I watched them play Monday night. As far as size, we'll matchup pretty good. We have a balanced team. If one of our kids is off, we have other kids to pick up the slack. Bunn is also a balanced team."

That kind of variety has been a key to Bunn's success, according to Wildcat coach Andy Wheeler.

"We've played pretty good defense and on offense it's been spread out," he said.

"We've had a different person every time. We've had several games with a number of people in double figures."

The last time the Jaguars played in Cumberland County Memorial Arena, they spent the first half just trying to find the basket and didn't really get rolling until the second half.

"We're going to stress that it's important to get off to a good start," Terrell said. "We were kind of scared (last time)."

"In the first game, you have to go through an adjustment. Hopefully, this team will be mature enough to start well."

In a girls' game tonight, Chocowinity, 25-5, takes on Hobbton, 20-6, at 8:30 p.m.

The Lady Tribe, winners of the Tobacco Belt 1-A Conference, are led by senior forward Chrylene Myers (17.2 ppg) and senior center Drusilla Crawford (10.5 ppg).

Hobbton, which won the Carolina 1-A Conference, is led by 6-2 junior center Louretha King (23.0 ppg). These two teams met in the regional finals last year with Hobbton winning and advancing to the state title game before falling to Hayesville.

King is the sister of Wake Forest standout Chris King.

## Eagles, Jets Set Game In Raleigh

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina and South Carolina football fans will get a chance to prove they want a professional football franchise in August, when Raleigh hosts a preseason game between the New York Jets and the Philadelphia Eagles.

Officials from the both states said Wednesday's announcement is the beginning of a competition for a franchise, and Gov. Jim Martin said he hoped that fans would show that they would support an NFL team the way they have embraced professional basketball and NASCAR events.

"We've showed that a large number of people would travel to other events," Martin said. "It's a way of showing that we've got the interest, that we've got the market."

The game will be played at 7 p.m. on Aug. 19 at North Carolina State University's Carter-Finley Stadium, said Jerry Richardson, a former pro football player who has been working for two years to land an expansion team in the Carolinas.

"This is much more than a football game," said Richardson, who announced plans two years ago to build a privately owned 65,000-seat stadium in the Charlotte area. "The competition among cities for these expansion teams is fierce. This is our chance to send a strong message to the NFL about the interest and football tradition in the Carolinas as well as demonstrate the tremendous market this region represents."

There is no indication of when the NFL will consider expanding, but Richardson said that organizers need to be ready and a sell-out in the preseason game could show that there is sufficient interest in North Carolina and South Carolina to merit consideration.

"Not only will this event bring the excitement of the National Football League, but it also will draw attention to getting an NFL team right here," said Gov. Jim Martin, who attended the announcement.

"We believe that this will mean so much to our states," he said. "It will be a good investment."

Max Muhleman, president of Muhleman Marketing, Inc., said he expected the next major growth area in expansion to be regional rather than metropolitan. He said that within a 150-mile radius of Charlotte, which would include Raleigh-Durham, Winston-Salem-Greensboro in North Carolina, and Columbia and Florence in South Carolina, there is a market of 9.3 million people and 2.8 million television households.

"We think they're going to expand shortly," said Muhleman, whose consulting firm worked with the Richardson family to do demographic studies on interest in the NFL. Muhleman also was a consultant to George Shinn's successful effort to bring an NBA franchise to Charlotte.

"We want to win this game, and win the richest prize in professional sports," Muhleman said.

Richardson, the president of TW Services Inc., a food-service operation, was a small college All America at Wofford, and was a receiver for the Baltimore Colts. He was the team's rookie of the year in 1959, and left professional football after the 1960 season to begin a business career.

Richardson said preliminary plans call for a stadium within a 25-mile radius of Charlotte, but he said no land would be purchased until the NFL forms a siting committee for expansion.

Steve Gutman, president of the New York Jets, said the game would be interesting for the fans because it comes in the second week of the preseason when no cuts have been made.

"They (the players) are literally fighting for their career lives," Gutman said.

Muhleman said tickets would be available beginning sometime in April. He said prices for the tickets had not been determined.

# Richmond Wins By Threes

The Richmond Spiders demonstrated a mathematical truth: threes add up quicker than twos.

Richmond sank a school record 10 of 17 shots from 3-point range Wednesday night as the Spiders defeated the cold-shooting Temple Owls 70-56 in a first-round NIT game.

"I just felt like I was in the groove," Richmond's Ken Atkinson said. "Every time I touched it, I wanted to shoot it."

Atkinson, who had a career-high 24 points, hitting 6-of-9 from 3-point range, said his performance was no accident, thanks to Richmond coach Dick Tarrant.

"Earlier in the week, Coach Tarrant pulled me aside and said, 'Hey, work on the 3-point shot,'" Atkinson said. "He never usually does that."

Tarrant said the Owls "are very tough in the paint, and we knew in practice all week that our threes would be there."

Tarrant was right, and the Spiders were right on target.

"I was very impressed with the way in which they shot the basketball," Temple coach John Chaney said. "They made the best use of the shots they got."

Tonight, the first round continues with Kent State at Michigan State, Georgia Southern at Alabama-Birmingham, UC Santa Barbara at Wichita State, Arkansas State at Nebraska, Pepperdine at New Mexico State, Santa Clara at New Mexico and Hawaii at California.

On Friday, Boise State travels to Oklahoma State.

The second round will be played March 20-21 and the third round March 22-24. Sites for both rounds have yet to be determined.

The semifinals will be held at New York's Madison Square Garden on March 27, with the title match of the 52nd annual postseason tournament scheduled for March 29.

Homestanding Richmond avenged a 22-point loss to Temple in the East region semifinals of last year's NCAA tournament. It was the Spiders' 16th victory in their last 18 games as they improved to 21-9. Temple, which had appeared in five straight NCAA tournaments before this season, wound up 18-12.

In the first half, Richmond hit 5 of 11 shots from 3-point range. The Owls missed all seven of their first-half 3-point attempts. For the game, Temple connected on just four of 27 shots from beyond the bonus arc.

Mark Macon led Temple with 13 points.

Connecticut, 17-12, set the tempo from the tip as its full-court pressure defense forced two turnovers in the first 30 seconds and the Huskies scored the first nine points.

After the Huskies took a 29-24 halftime lead, UNCC, 17-12, rallied on the strength of 3-point shooting, pulling within 57-54. But a 5-0 run secured Connecticut's victory.

Henry Williams led UNCC with 26 points.

Ohio St. 81, Akron 70

At Columbus, Ohio, Perry Carter scored 19 points, while Jamaal Brown added a career-high 18 points and seven assists as the Buckeyes ended an eight-game losing streak with their victory over Akron.

Ohio State, the runner-up in the

NIT last season, advances to the second round with a record of 18-14. Akron, which had won its previous eight games, ended its season at 21-8.

The Buckeyes, who trailed 34-33 at the half, took control of the game midway through the second half by outscoring the Zips 19-2 over a five-minute span.

St. Louis 87, SIU 54

Anthony Bonner scored 20 points to lead St. Louis to a surprisingly easy victory over visiting Southern Illinois.

Charles Newberry added 19 points, Monroe Douglass had 18 and Roland Gray 16 for the Billikens, 24-9, who are unbeaten in 15 home games this season. St. Louis is 20-0 at home over two seasons, tied for the sixth-longest current streak in the country.

Freddie McSwain led Southern Illinois with 13 points. He was the only scorer in double figures for the losers.

Wisconsin 63, New Orleans 61

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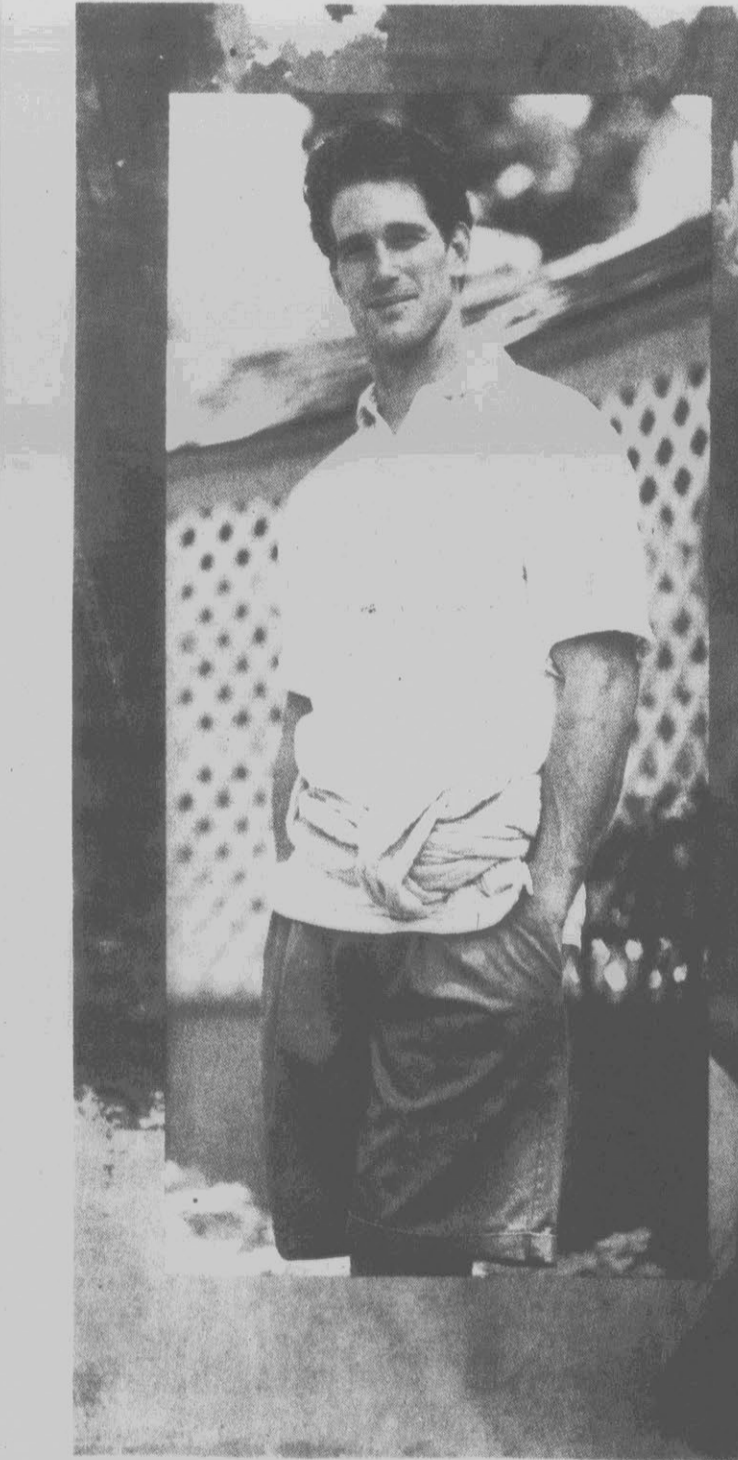

## AP Sues To See Pacts

**RALEIGH** — The Associated Press asked a state court to order the University of North Carolina System to make public employment contracts for athletic directors and Division I football and basketball coaches.

Salaries of the coaches and athletic directors are public. The AP sought the contracts to look at conditions of employment, including whether outside income was allowed from sources such as endorsements, camps and public appearances.

"The issue here is whether employment contracts between the state and its employees are public records within the meaning of the public records law," said Wade H. Hargrove, a Raleigh attorney who represents the AP.

"If they are, then the public is entitled to see them. Some of the contracts with athletic officials involve significant financial obligations by the state, and The Associated Press believes North Carolina's taxpayers have the right to know the full extent of these financial obligations."

The lawsuit, filed Wednesday in Wake County Superior Court, names North Carolina State University, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, East Carolina University, Western Carolina University and the schools' chancellors.

East Carolina University athletic director Dave Hart Jr., said he would have no comment on the suit.

The AP in February asked the state-supported schools for copies of the contracts. The AP was surveying the schools following a controversy over the contract for Joe Morrison, the late football coach at the University of South Carolina.

**FAYETTEVILLE** — After talking about his team's 65-53 Eastern Regional semifinal loss to a number of reporters, Ayden-Grifton coach Bob Murphrey shook his head as he walked up the steps from the press room to greet some friends.

The season had come to an abrupt ending with the defeat and Murphrey was still deep in thought about the game.

The Chargers had won 12 games in a row — en route to a tie for the Eastern Plains Conference regular season title, and then they won the conference and sectional crowns en route to the regionals.

The Chargers had overcome the loss of a number of players during the season, most notably forward Eric Nobles early in the year, and guards David Dixon and Darryl Moye a few weeks ago.

Each time the losses required adjustments. Yet, through it all, Murphrey kept pulling the right strings and the Chargers kept winning.

The mainstays all year were 6-1 senior swingman Ronnell Peterson and 6-4 center Leon Dixon.

Peterson could kill you from outside or inside and was the Chargers' best ball handler. Dixon was as tough a low post scorer as there is in the East. Together, they were a force on the offensive boards.

Two other seniors, James Woodard and John Tyndall had also been big keys. Woodard became a 3-point specialist while Tyndall was the designated defender for the Chargers. The other senior on the squad, Jimmy Martin, provided rebounding and defense.

Despite a thin bench, Ayden-Grifton had been able to keep winning.

But somewhere between 5:30 p.m. Wednesday and 7:15 p.m., that all came to an end.

Dixon got in early foul trouble and Peterson struggled on offense for the first time in recent history. It was too much to overcome for the Chargers.

"It's hard right now to appreciate what we did (this season)," Murphrey said. "As time goes on, I think we'll appreciate it more."

The numbers finally caught up with Ayden-Grifton.

"I think it showed up tonight," Murphrey said. "We've been mighty lucky with the foul situation. Tonight, we really felt it. It hurt us."

The game closed out the careers of the Charger seniors. For the last three years, Dixon and Peterson have been among the best players in the EPC. Peterson, in particular, has been something special.

He suffered a knee injury during football season and it caused him to struggle early on this year. But over January, and especially February and early March, there had not been a player who did more for his team down East. He handled the ball, was a focal point of the offense and a surprising force on the boards given his 6-1 height.

His last game wasn't his best, but the future should be brighter. Next year, Peterson will move on to the college ranks. It could be in a junior college or it could be on the Division I level. Time will tell.

"He's a great player," Murphrey said. "You hate to see him go out like this."

## Linda Ellerbee Will Join CNN

will join Cable News Network on Monday as a regular commentator, CNN said Wednesday. She will contribute essays three

From 1975 to 1986, Ellerbee was at NBC News, where she anchored and wrote the news magazine "Weekend" and "Summer Sunday-USA," plus several documentaries, "NBC News Overnight" and the "Today" show feature series "TGIF."

In 1986 she moved to ABC and won an Emmy award for her writing on the "Our World" historical series.

In 1987 she left ABC to form her own company, Lucky Duck Productions. Last year she also began writing a syndicated newspaper column.

Her book about television, "And So It Goes," was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize.

## Mike Connors Is Zapped In 'Murder, She Wrote'

LOS ANGELES — Mike Connors, television's long-time good guy, private eye and FBI agent, finally bites the dust on screen in an episode of CBS' "Murder, She Wrote."

"Let me tell you, lying on the floor is the easiest acting I've ever done," said Connors.

Connors, who dodged bullets on "Tightrope," "Mannix" and "Today's FBI" and is host of the syndicated show "Crimes of the Century," is the victim on Sunday's episode of "Murder, She Wrote." The hit series stars Angela Lansbury as crime-solving mystery writer Jessica Fletcher.

He plays a screenwriter who's adapting one of Jessica's books as a movie.

"He's a throwback character, a combination of Humphrey Bogart and John Garfield," said Connors. "He's driving from Las Vegas and takes a detour and sees an old girlfriend slinging hash. He says, 'There she was, a little worse for wear, but still a hot cup of coffee to a thirsty guy like me.'"

"We do some flashbacks in black and white. Then I'm shot, and I grab a tape recorder and start telling the story of why I was shot. It's because of that style that I was intrigued with the show."

Connors said the only other time he has been killed on screen was early in his career when he did a movie for Roger Corman.

He will also be seen in May when the final 12 hours of "War and Remembrance" are telecast by ABC. He plays Hack Peters, a colonel who is working on the atomic bomb and gets involved with Rhoda Henry, the wife of Pug Henry.

His latest series is "Crimes of the Century," which re-creates famous crimes from the Lindbergh kidnapping to the "Yorkshire Ripper" in England.

"What's so fascinating is not the crime but the information that

comes up," said Connors. "Information that might have changed the outcome of the case. Sam Sheppard (whose conviction in the bludgeoning death of his wife was later overturned) claimed that he saw a bushy-haired man. But the murder weapon, believed to be fire tongs, was never found."

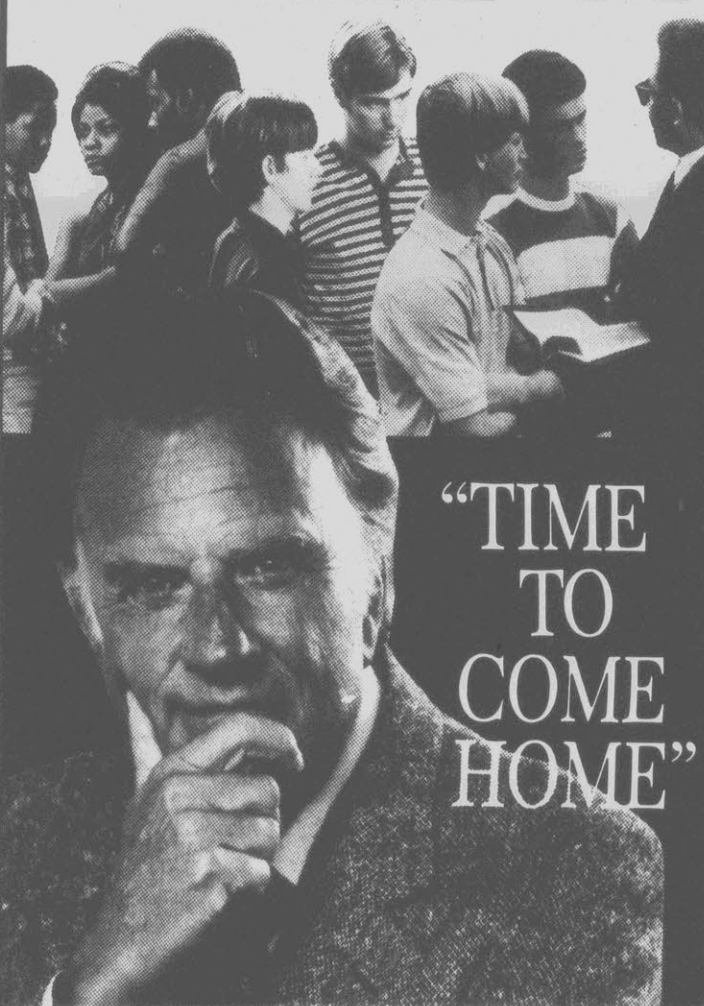

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## Colorization Protection For Future Films Eyed

WASHINGTON — The Copyright Office wants a law to protect future films from colorization, but believes it would probably be unconstitutional to extend such protection to existing movies.

In addition to protecting against colorization, the office also recommended on Wednesday that Congress protect film makers from technical processes that speed up or slow down movies to fit the time frames of television or which alter the shape of the image to fit the television screen.

Since most movies are now made

in color, the furor about computer-added color has been largely over application of the process to films, including some Hollywood classics, made in the heyday of black-and-white production in the 1930s through the 1950s.

The Copyright Office, which is an arm of the Library of Congress, recommended in its report that an industry-wide committee be formed to draft guidelines governing colorization of such works.

The Patent and Trademark Office, in a report released at the same time, recommended that no changes in the trademark law should be made but left the door open to changes in copyright law.

Both reports were requested by the House Judiciary Committee's subcommittee on copyright, which held hearings on the issue last year and concluded that no legislation was needed.

The Copyright Office said it would prefer legislation that would also protect visual artists, such as sculptors and painters, by giving them "moral rights" to bar unauthorized alteration of their works.

But it said it could support legislation applying to film makers alone.

The Copyright Office's report drew lukewarm reaction from the subcommittee chairman.

Rep. Robert Kastenmeier, D-Wis., promised to review both reports carefully but added, "We must ask the proponents of change to bear the burden of proving that the change is necessary, fair and practical."

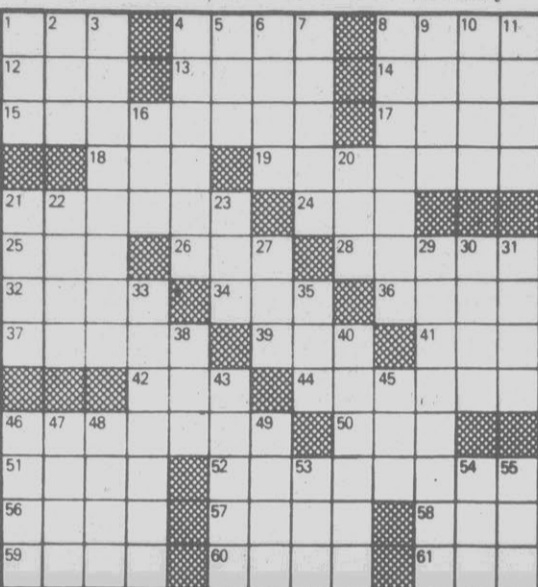

North-South arrived at a fairly routine contract of three no trump. It was the right game to reach—as the cards lie, five of either minor stood no chance after a heart lead.

East's ten of hearts was allowed to hold the first trick. Anxious to advise his partner that his entry was in the lowest-ranking side suit, East returned the jack of hearts and, when that too was permitted to win, he emphasized his message with an exclamation point by continuing with the two. West signalled vigorously in diamonds.

develop. He decided to take the defenders' carding at face value. Since he had been informed that East held the king of clubs, declarer went after the diamond suit. West took his ace and dutifully shifted to a club, but it was too little, too late. Declarer rose with the ace of clubs and cashed out his nine tricks—three spades, one heart four diamonds and one club.

In situations of this sort the defenders shouldn't bother to signal at all! After winning the first trick with the ten, East should simply continue with the king and queen of hearts,

and West should do nothing to tip off his diamond holding. In view of the overall, declarer is more likely to place East with the ace of diamonds than the king of clubs, and so take the club finesse. That would result in a three-trick set!

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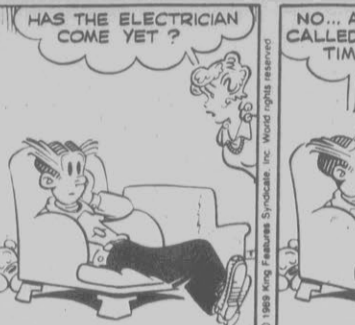

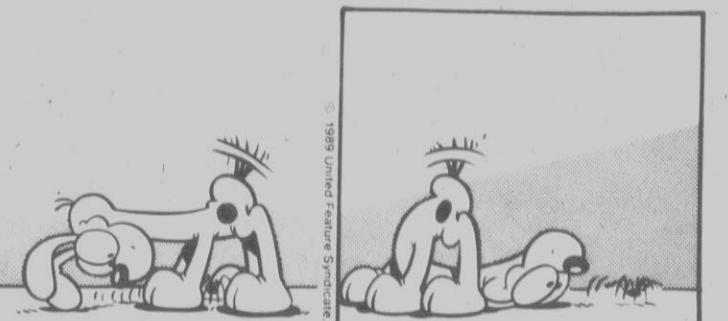
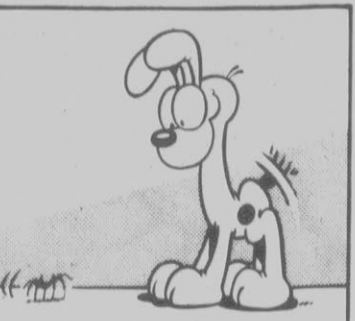

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# Hostage Policy Firm As Anderson Starts 5th Year

WASHINGTON — Terry Anderson begins his fifth year as a hostage in Lebanon today with Bush administration officials reiterating that their policy of making no concessions is the best course.

Bush, who took office barely two months ago, has continued the former Reagan administration's policies that he helped develop as vice president, U.S. officials said.

"In terms of our policy, there has been no change, and I don't foresee one," said a State Department Middle East expert who refused to be

identified by name. He called the policy the only one that might work.

Since the Reagan administration was embarrassed in November 1986 by revelations it had sold weapons to Iran, the U.S. policy has been, "No concessions, but we're willing to talk to anyone," another official said.

But Sen. Daniel P. Moynihan, D-N.Y., a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he would not accept "the explanation that nothing can be done." Moynihan was to introduce a resolution today in the Senate condemning hostage-taking.

"Something must be done, the executive branch must seek to use every avenue, formal and informal,

to win the hostages freedom," Moynihan said in a statement released Wednesday by his office.

On Capitol Hill, several groups planned to hold a ceremony for Anderson, 41, a correspondent for The Associated Press. Sponsors include No Greater Love, a humanitarian organization, and the Journalists Committee to Free Terry Anderson.

Anderson's sister, Peggy Say of Cadiz, Ky., a leader in the drive to win her brother's freedom, was attending the ceremony. She has been critical of U.S. government efforts on behalf of the hostages.

"You want to hope they are working on it, but let's face it, four years

speaks for itself," she said. Say said she does not think the Bush administration has made any new drives to free the hostages.

"Basically, things are just status quo."

She listed specific initiatives the United States could pursue, including payments to the families of Iranians killed last July when the USS Vincennes shot down an Iranian jetliner in the Persian Gulf. The State Department said it is working on a payment plan.

"You begin to wonder what it takes to move people," Mrs. Say said. "They have heard and read how hostages have died, how they have gone mad, how they exist from day-to-day in the most barbaric conditions and the world does not respond."

Officials say different factions hold the nine American hostages who have been seized in Lebanon, but they are elements of the umbrella group, Hezbollah, over which

Iran exhibits control. The United States has called for the unconditional release of all hostages before it will talk with Iran.

The families' frustration follows a brief sense of optimism that followed Bush's Jan. 20 inaugural address in which he repeated his opposition to any deals, but seemed to send a signal to the captors.

"There are today Americans who are held against their will in foreign lands and Americans who are unaccounted for," Bush said. "Assistance can be show here, and will be long remembered. Good will beget good will."

Since then, other developments have intervened, most recently the furor over "The Satanic Verses," a book by Salman Rushdie that Moslems consider to be blasphemous. The Iranian government has called for Rushdie's death.

"The situation has fallen apart again," Mrs. Say said.

Mammod Faksh, a professor of

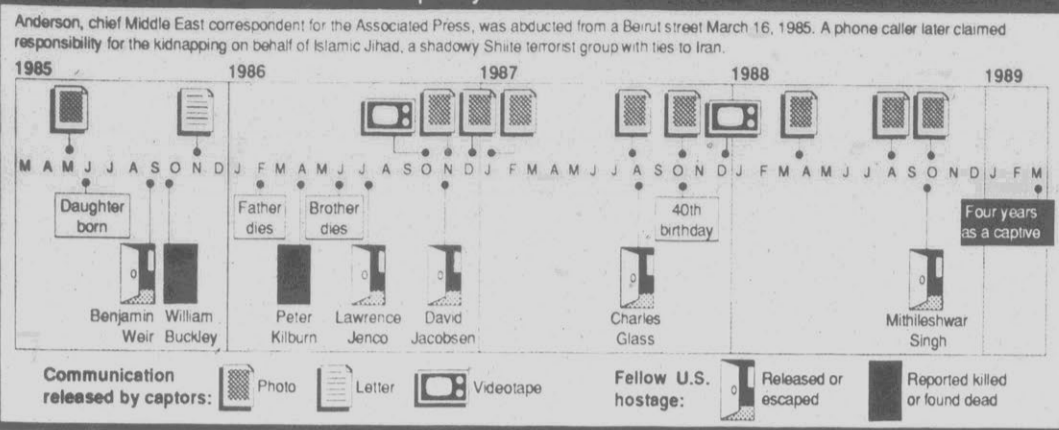
Middle Eastern studies at the University of Southern Maine, said he doesn't expect any good news for the hostages soon.

"The Lebanese civil war is still ongoing and there is more factionalism in Lebanon now than ever," he said. "So many things don't bode well for the hostages. They are still alive because it is in the best interest of the hostage-takers to keep them alive."

At the State Department, Michael Mahoney is the designated contact with the family members. He said he tries to call the families every two weeks to reassure them "someone is paying attention to them," and to put current events in their proper context.

Mahoney also monitors the dozens of letters the department receives each month from Americans on the hostages. In the 18 months he has worked at the job, Mahoney said he has not noticed any change in the volume.

## Terry Anderson: Four Years of Captivity in Lebanon



## Ex-Captive Says Hostages Imprisoned By Indifference

PARIS — Hostages in Lebanon live in a world of hopelessness and neglect, imprisoned as much by public indifference as by their extremist captors, a former hostage says in an editorial published today.

Jean-Paul Kauffmann, a French journalist held by Shiite Moslem kidnapers in Lebanon for three years, marked the anniversary of the capture of fellow hostage Terry Anderson with a wrenching plea for rekindled interest in the captives.

Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press, was captured four years ago today and has been held longer than any of the other 14 Western hostages in Lebanon.

In today's editions of the newspaper Le Monde, Kauffmann says the hostages are no longer objects of mass compassion, no longer bargaining chips, no longer even political symbols.

"The truth is that the hostages in Lebanon today have become the damned of the West," he wrote. "Without hope of being saved, imprisoned in silence and darkness, deprived of the sight of the world of the living, forgotten, they no longer represent anything."

Hostages such as Anderson are kept blindfolded and chained, robbed of their humanity, he wrote.

"This absence of senses is the

worst punishment that one can inflict on a human being. The most tragic thing is that this torment is administered as much from the outside by countries and people indifferent to their fate as on the inside by their captors, who also work to make them 'insignificant' as men."

The captors "condemned us to the chain, they made us blind better to bend us and subjugate us. We had to become things. A hostage is above all a package, which is logical because he is the object of a swap."

He said Britain and the United States also consider the hostages "as merchandise" and "in believing they are devaluing the hostages by abandonment and silence ... have made them non-existent ... The Western hostages no longer exist for anybody except for their families."

Perhaps the governments "think the kidnapers will end up by getting tired and letting them go," Kauffmann said. "But this calculation has proved false."

France won the release of its countrymen because it "cared about its hostages," he said. "It was the spirit of solidarity of the French people that provoked the political will of the government."

Charles Glass, an Australian journalist who escaped after two months of captivity in 1987, said in London:

"Now is the time for the kidnapers and those for whom they work to release Terry Anderson and the

other hostages in Lebanon and show the world that they believe in the mercy of God."

Hesham el Essawy, chairman of the London-based Islamic Society for the Promotion of Religious Tolerance, said: "We hope and pray that this tragic situation will end soon. We are very confident that this aspiration will be supported by every honest Moslem in the world today."

Their statements were released through Article 19, an anti-censorship organization.

Also, the Australian Journalists' Association today called on the Australian government to take whatever steps necessary to aid in the release of the hostages.

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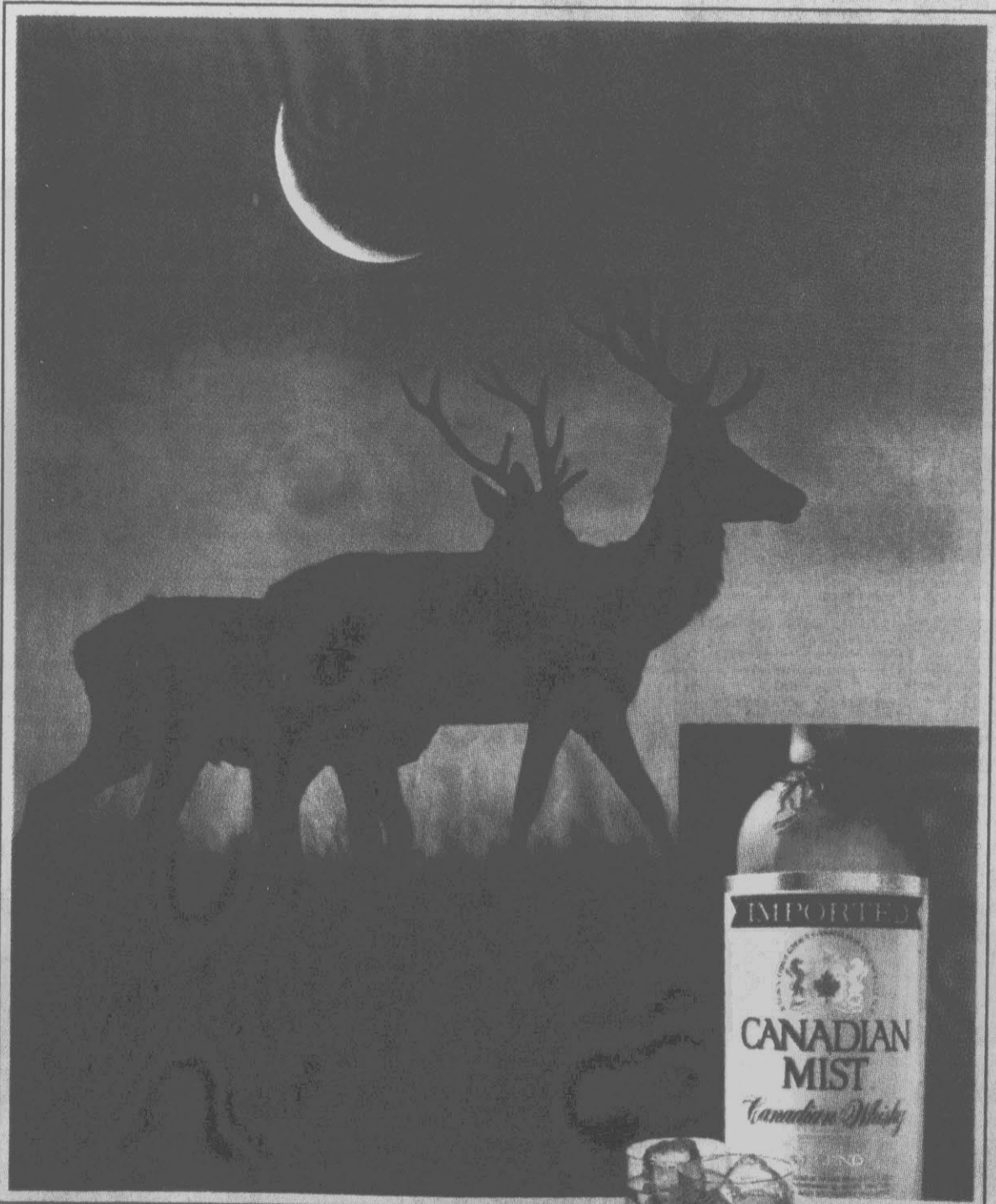
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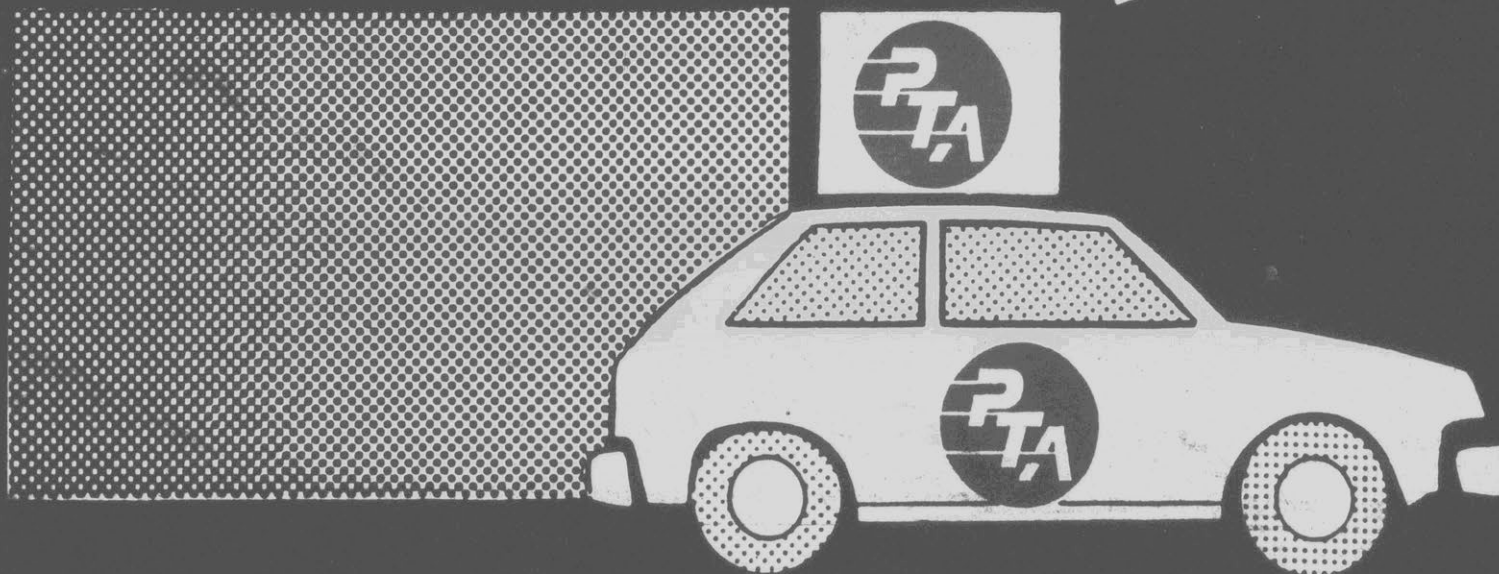
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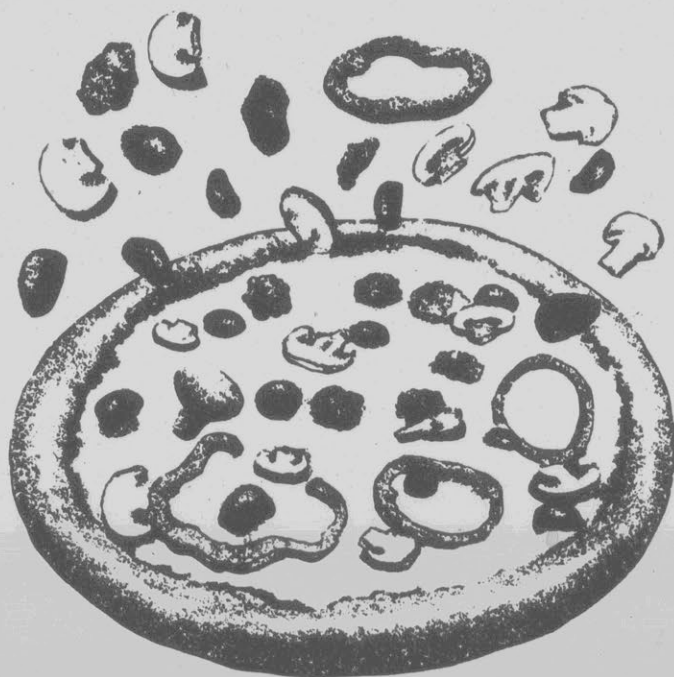
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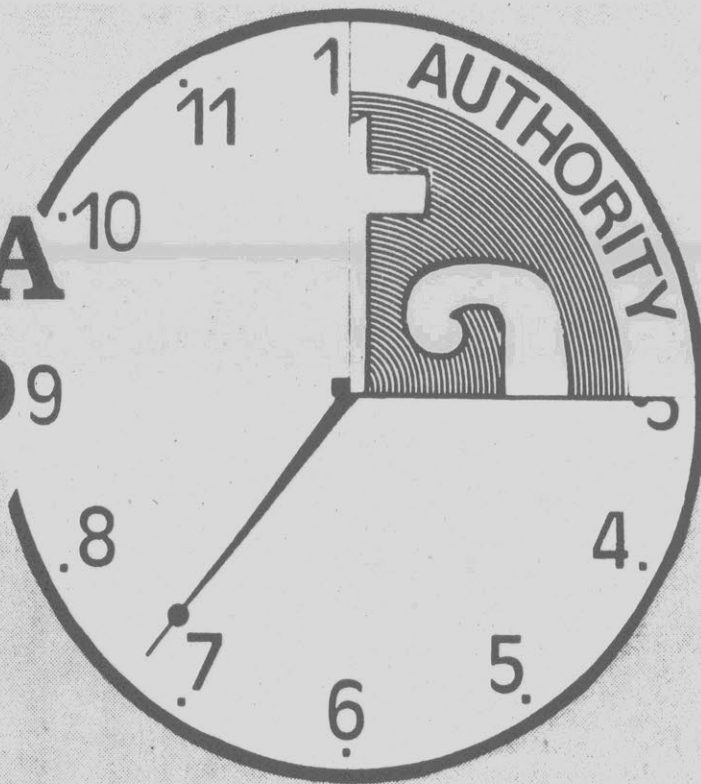
