Inflation Slows As Prices Ebb

WASHINGTON — Inflation slowed in June as consumer prices rose a modest 0.2 percent, the smallest advance in 16 months, the government reported today.

The price moderation reflected the biggest drop in energy prices in more than two years and the smallest increase in food costs this year.

The 0.2 percent June rise in the Consumer Price Index, the government's primary gauge of inflation at the retail level, was just one-third the 0.6 percent increase recorded in May.

Even with the slowdown, prices at the consumer level rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.9 percent in the first six months of 1989, the fastest pace for the first half of a year since 1982.

But the moderate June advance, the smallest increase since a similar 0.2 percent rise in February 1988, was certain to be seen as good news at the Federal Reserve Board, which has been concerned that the country might be on the verge of another inflationary spiral.

In a separate report, the Commerce Department said today that housing construction, reflecting lower interest rates, rebounded 7.0

percent in June after falling for four straight months and reaching the lowest level in May since 1982.

Fixed mortgage rates, which peaked at 11.22 percent in March before falling to 10.07 percent by the end of June, had been blamed for the recent decline in housing activity.

The Commerce Department reported that new homes and apartments in June were built at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.40 million units, up from 1.31 million units in May when construction fell 2.5 percent.

Today's report on consumer prices, coupled with news last week that wholesale prices actually fell in

June, provided concrete evidence that the spurt in prices in the early part of 1989 was finally beginning to moderate.

Patrick Jackman, a Labor Department analyst, said price pressures over the next several months should moderate enough to keep consumer inflation for all of 1989 down at around 5 percent. Prices rose 4.4 percent in both 1987 and 1988.

The trouble at the beginning of the year was that energy prices, driven by the run-up in world petroleum

Strikers Threaten Reforms

MOSCOW — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev said today that thousands of striking coal miners and other workers are urging railway employees to join the work stoppage and that the unrest threatens his economic reforms.

Strikes have shut down more than 200 mines and factories in the country's two top coal-producing regions, official reports said. In a report to the Supreme Soviet, Gorbachev said they have resulted in a 1 million-ton drop in coal production.

Following Gorbachev to the podium, legislator Anatoly Saunin said each lost work day cost millions of rubles that might otherwise help improve living conditions. "You mustn't hold a knife to the throat" of the government, he told strikers.

Saunin, from the Donetsk region of the Ukraine, the country's top coal region, said the number of striking mines there increased from 20 on Tuesday to 58 today.

"Now there are reports of calls to railroad workers to join the strike as of Aug. 1," Gorbachev said during the parliamentary session, which was broadcast on television and radio.

"Such a development of events poses a threat to the implementation of plans projected by the policy of perestroika," he said, referring to his efforts to restructure the economy.

Miners began walking out July 11 in Siberia's Kuznetsk Basin coal region. Workers in other industries in the region soon followed. On Saturday, miners in the Donetsk coal basin began walking off the job.

The miners are demanding more local control over their industry as well as higher wages and better living conditions.

Gorbachev said he and Premier Nikolai I. Ryzhkov sent a telegram to miners in the Ukraine assuring them that any concessions granted to Siberian miners would apply to other mining regions as well.

Khashoggi Returns To Face Charge He Hid Marcos Assets

BERN, Switzerland — Adnan Khashoggi, the Saudi financier and arms dealer, was extradited to the United States today to face charges he helped hide assets Ferdinand Marcos and his wife allegedly plundered from the Philippines.

Under the extradition agreement, the United States will drop racketeering and conspiracy charges against Khashoggi, the Justice Ministry said.

Khashoggi, escorted by two police officers, left on a plane for New York three months after he was arrested in a Bern hotel on a U.S. warrant, said ministry spokesman Joerg Kistler.

Khashoggi, the Marcoses, five other people and a California bank were indicted in October by a U.S. District Court in New York. The indictment accuses the ousted president and his wife, Imelda, of stealing more than \$100 million from the Philippine treasury to buy real estate and art in New York.

The U.S. government says Khashoggi posed as the owner of some of the assets as a cover, according to prosecutors.

Khashoggi, 53, is charged in the indictment with racketeering, conspiracy, obstruction of justice and mail fraud.

A Justice Ministry statement said extradition was denied for the racketeering and conspiracy charges and authorized only for those alleged offenses that also are punishable under Swiss law.

The statement said Swiss law does not recognize conspiracy or the U.S. Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, known as RICO.

Ministry spokeswoman Ursula Riedel said this meant that he was extradited on condition that he will not be tried for racketeering and conspiracy charges.

The U.S. racketeering statute prohibits conducting an enterprise in a pattern of criminal activity, consisting of at least two specified crimes in a 10-year period. Under the statute, prosecutors can seek pretrial restraint of assets and those convicted face up to 20 years in prison.

Pitt Memorial Increasing Rates

A 10 percent room rate increase and a 17.2 overall increase in hospital care prices is called for in the budget approved Tuesday night by the Pitt County Memorial Hospital board for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

Under the new room rate schedule, the hospital's most prevalent room rate will increase from \$210 to \$230.

Kathy Barger, vice president of financial services, said the budget projects gross patient charges of approximately \$207 million. About \$152 million of the net revenue is expected to be realized because of shortfalls in payments from Medicare, Medicaid and uncollectible accounts, she said.

The revenue includes \$11.4 million in funds from the state which the hospital receives because of its affiliation with the East Carolina University School of Medicine. These funds help offset bad debt expense and other costs related to serving as eastern North Carolina's tertiary

care center, including teaching and resident costs.

Operating expenses are projected to be \$151.8 million, which is an increase from \$137.5 million in 1989. Without the rate increase, the hospital would face a \$14.3 million shortfall, Ms. Barger said.

"Financial problems are plaguing hospitals statewide," she said. "Part of the problem can be traced to the federal government's repeated cuts in the Medicare budget. This year, when a patient receives his or her hospital bill, approximately 26 cents of every dollar in that bill will be spent paying for the health care of someone else. The hospital is raising its rates to offset those anticipated losses."

In other business, the board approved a contract with Carolina Lithotripsy organization to bring a mobile lithotripsy kidney stone disintegration unit to the hospital grounds at intervals for the procedure to be available to people at PCMH. Board members said the service will become available within the next 60 to 90 days.

Carter Files For Another Term As Greenville Mayor

Greenville Mayor Ed Carter announced his bid for re-election Tuesday, saying, "I'm excited about this and ready to lead this city into the '90s."

Carter, now finishing his first term as mayor, said, "I'm confident that I am the best choice."

One challenger, Council member Nancy Jenkins, has filed to run against Carter in the Nov. 7 municipal elections.

Carter said the only issue of the campaign would be continuing progress made in all areas during his first term. "I think the record speaks for itself."

Carter said the city needs to continue long-range planning. "Greenville certainly needs orderly growth and development. Greenville must grow."

The city also needs to plan for increasing traffic congestion inside and around Greenville, he said.

The mayor called for continued efforts to solve drug problems and the housing needs of low and moderate income families. He called for

greater cooperative efforts among governments and private industries.

"We need strong leadership in the mayor's office," Carter said.

The office needs to work toward

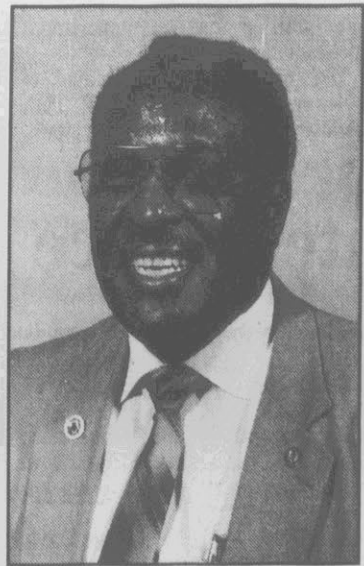
unifying the council, according to Carter. "We need leadership that will try to build unity on the City Council," he said.

"One thing that I'm proud of above all else is that we've brought back reputation to the government of our city," Carter said.

Carter works for Burroughs Wellcome as the department head of administrative services. He is a member of several civic and governmental organizations, including the Governor's Crime Commission, the national and state League of Municipalities, and state and federal transportation committees.

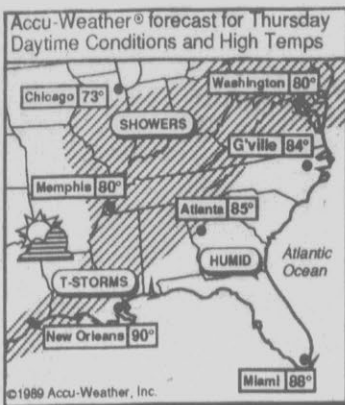

Shinn, Brew File For City Council

The race for Greenville's City Council grew more crowded Tuesday as two more candidates filed for seats on the board.

Lorraine Shinn, incumbent council member and mayor pro-tem, and Daniel T. (Danny) Brew filed for different posts on the board.

Ms. Shinn, filing for the at-large seat on the council, said the position needs a representative with an understanding of all the city, not just one district.

"The at-large seat is such a unique position that you need to have 'the big picture,'" Ms. Shinn said. She also called for responsible leadership from the council regarding financial and solid waste management plans.

"There will come a day when we have to bite the bullet and I think it will come soon," Ms. Shinn said. "You can't keep increasing taxes to fund excessive spending."

As the Washington, N.C., regional manager of the state Department of Natural Resources and Community Development, Ms. Shinn said she has the experience to properly address pollution programs in the area.

Ms. Shinn also claimed the financial experience to direct the city in budgetary matters because of her experience as a bookkeeper and office manager in the private sector.

Ms. Shinn called for an at-large representative elected by all the

voters who could speak across racial, social and economic lines.

Ms. Shinn earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from East Carolina University and also attended the governor's executive management program.

As a member of the council, Ms. Shinn is a representative to the Parks and Recreation, Planning and Zoning, Environmental Advisory and Downtown Revitalization commissions. She is also a member of the governor's commission on child victimization and the governor's commission on the family.

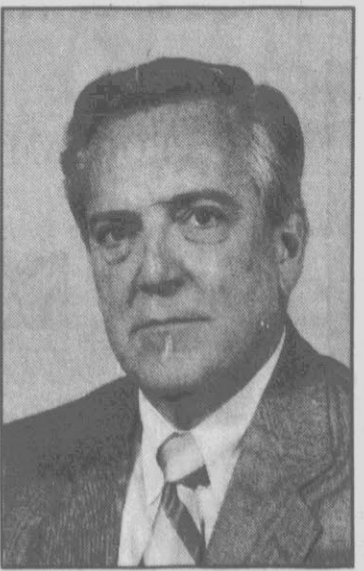
She is married to Stuart Shinn, an electrician and plumber, and has two daughters, Kimberly Shinn-Simpson and Gena Shinn.

Brew filed for the District 1 seat on the council, saying he is basing his election bid on "proper and orderly growth" for the city.

"I felt it would be a pleasure, a joy and an honor to represent others in the city and to be a voice in the cultivation of a better Greenville," Brew said in prepared statement. "I have always wanted to serve my community and to do what I can to see it grow and prosper."

Brew is seeking the seat held by Council member Mildred Council, representing a district that includes the northern and northwestern portions of the city. District 1 includes

Rates Change

Effective Sept. 1, The Daily Reflector will adjust its subscription rates for carrier home delivery and mail subscribers.

The basic monthly price will increase from \$5 to \$6 for daily and Sunday delivery. Sunday-only delivery will increase from \$3.25 to \$4 a month. Discounted rates for three, six and 12 months will be offered for the first time.

Although the subscription rates for home and mail delivery will go up, the daily and Sunday newsstand prices will remain at 25 cents and 75 cents respectively.

The price increase — the first change in the newspaper's subscription price since July 1987 — is being shared with the newspaper's carriers, who operate as independent contractors.

Subscription prepayments for up to 12 months from Sept. 1 will be accepted until Aug. 15 at the existing \$5 per month. Customers who wish to renew or extend their subscriptions are encouraged to do so.

National Spinning Co. Puts Washington Plant On Block

WASHINGTON, N.C. — Officials at National Spinning Co., which includes three plants in one at its site in Washington, say the business is up for sale.

Don Barham, vice president and divisional vice president of manufacturing at the Washington plant, said, "Joe Leff of New York, primary owner of the company as well as chairman of the board and chief officer, has made a decision to put the plants, all four located in North Carolina, up for sale."

Other National Spinning facilities are also located in eastern North Carolina, at Beulaville, Warsaw and Whiteville.

National Spinning in Washington employs 1,900 workers. Most are drawn from the work force in Beaufort County, but it also employs people from Martin, Pitt and Washington counties, Barham said.

"Altogether," he said, "the four plants provide employment for more than 3,300 employees."

dyes fabrics manufactured by the other three plants. "Our three plants constitute the largest single operation of the firm," Barham said.

National Spinning has its home office in New York City and is represented by sales offices in New York, Greensboro, the Midwest and New England.

Barham said the sale of the firm will be offered through the investment brokers firm of Goldman-Sach and CNB. "The company expects to find somebody to buy at the right price. Hopefully the buyer will have as its primary concern the goal of keeping the company operating and not only that, but to expand its growth opportunities," he said.

Citing age as the principal motivation in his decision to sell National Spinning, Leff, in a letter to company employees, said, "We need ever larger investment in new equipment to maintain market share, to improve efficiency and quality. Much of this machinery is two or three years away from installation and operation."

"It is becoming difficult to program that kind of investment as I grow older," Leff wrote. "By the end of the year, I will be 66 and realize that for National Spinning to have the future you deserve, this company must be sold to a new owner with a less limited time horizon."

Barham said his personal opinion "as well, I think, as that of all the company's employees, is gratitude that Leff has always had a close relationship with all his people."

"He has expressed his determination that whoever the new owner may be, it will be someone who is sincerely interested in the company and its workers, someone dedicated to maintaining the high quality the company is noted for."

Focus Attendance Increases Slightly

Focus 2007, a strategic regional planning group, held its second public hearing Tuesday night at Wellcome Middle School to gather comments from area citizens and to present goals and objectives of the group's strategy teams.

The second forum drew seven area citizens, slightly more than Monday's meeting when only three citizens attended the group's initial hearing at Ayden-Grifton High School.

Richard Duncan of Greenville suggested Tuesday that churches be utilized as possible support networks for prevention and rehabilitation in drug related cases, according to professional staff team leader, Janice Faulkner.

Some discussion defending or explaining some aspects of the strategic planning followed presentations by strategy team leaders, Jordan Whichard, group vice chairman, said.

"We had good comments and quality participation," said Whichard. "We hope that everyone who wants to be involved will attend the next two meetings."

A series of four meetings are being held this week to provide the public a chance to discuss and offer suggestions on the panel's aims to establish Pitt County as a "metropolitan center, pursuing excellence

in education, economic development, and cultural/social activities."

Each meeting follows a similar agenda. Strategy team leaders present the objectives and goals of their focus groups which include education, economic development, transportation, government services, crime and substance abuse, recreational and cultural activities and research and development.

The public is then encouraged to offer comments or questions.

"Any of the suggestions made will be filtered back through the process," said Ms. Faulkner, the director of the Regional Development Institute at East Carolina University.

Public hearings will be held from 7:30 to 9 p.m. today at Farmville Community Center and at the same time Thursday in the upstairs auditorium of the Pitt County Office Building

Overton Wins Rezoning Of Bells Fork Property

The slogan for a local sporting goods store reads: "Overton's has it all." And the Greenville Planning and Zoning Commission, in a split vote, recommended a request Tuesday by the owner of the firm that would allow him to build even more.

Parker Overton would not commit to relocating his business on the site he requested for rezoning but he fought for, and won, a higher-density zoning. He would not say what type of business he would build on the Bells Fork site.

Overton, the owner of Overton's Sports Center Inc., had submitted a request at the June meeting to rezone nearly 19 acres near the southern edge of town from RA-20 (residential-agricultural) to a shopping center designation. He said in June that he intended to relocate his business in the area south of Bells Fork.

Overton asked the board in June to delay a decision on the request until he could meet with adjacent property owners and the Historical Commission.

When he returned Tuesday, objections to the rezoning had vanished, and the city and county historical

societies were satisfied Overton would preserve or move an old house on the property.

But Overton also backed off of his plans to relocate his sporting goods store on the property.

The city development staff maintained the 69 acres in the rezoned Bells Fork area, which did not include Overton's property, would sufficiently handle commercial needs in that area.

Commission members split on Overton's proposal.

"It just seems logical to me that this should be commercial," Tony Lewis said of the area near Harris

Supermarket. "I have a hard time turning this down."

Board member William Roberson sided with the development staff, and said the area outlined for commercial development had been established. "If we don't do it here where do we do it at?" Roberson asked.

"I don't want to see another Greenville Boulevard anywhere in Greenville," Roberson said.

Overton supporters, including Mayor Ed Carter, argued strongly for recommendation of the proposal.

Carter said the area was not considered in the city's long-range planning, and the owner should have some say in the development of the property even after it has come in the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction.

"I told the property owners that I would not put anything in the area to hurt them if I did not put my business there," Overton told the board.

Adjacent property owners, some of them the same residents who spoke against the proposal at the June meeting, spoke in favor of the request Tuesday.

"I'd a whole lot rather see that man put a shopping center there than see a whole row of apartments

in my front yard," said Franklin "Sam" Porter.

The vote by commission members, like the debate, split with Bruce Sauter casting the deciding vote in favor of recommending that the City Council approve Overton's request. Favoring the request were Lewis, J.B. Surles, Steve Blades, Myron Brown and Sauter, while Bruce Flye, Catherine Bullock, Ruth Leggett and Roberson voted against the matter.

On a different issue, residents of Peed Drive found no satisfaction in the board's action as commission members voted to approve further subdivision development of an area over the residents' objections.

A preliminary plat for a development submitted by Leroy Cherry divided the board because of safety concerns in the area.

Residents of the existing Summerfield Gardens subdivision contended that further development and an extension of Peed Drive would greatly increase traffic on what they said is a poorly built and poorly maintained road.

"Our concern is people coming in using Peed Drive as a thoroughfare, a cut through," said area resident William Lee IV.

Peed Drive connects Tobacco Road and Memorial Drive. Extending Peed to connect with Rollins Drive, as Cherry plans, would provide a direct link between Greenville Boulevard and Memorial Drive.

The board accepted the idea that allowing continued development would also upgrade the roads in the area and make them safer. P&Z recommended approval of the plat by a five to four vote, with Sauter, Brown, Surles, Blades and Ms. Leggett favoring and Ms. Bullock, Flye, Roberson and Lewis opposing the preliminary plat.

Brew is a member of Burger King Corporation's Business Planning Council and serves as vice chairman of the BPC for the Richmond region.

Brew is a member of the Pitt County Board of Special Olympics and is involved with the Association for Retarded Citizens. Brew has been a member of the Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce since 1981.

In his statement, Brew called for "proper and orderly growth in Greenville" through zoning, code compliance and thoroughfare planning. Brew also called for an increased recycling effort in the city to save landfill space.

"I have a concern of the 'proper and orderly' growth in Greenville," Brew said. "We need good council members to project five, 10, 15 years into the future to best cope with these situations."

Tobacco Disease

Rhizoctonia leaf spot is a fungus disease that is hurting tobacco yield in Pitt and neighboring counties this season. Pitt Agriculture Extension Director Mitch Smith said the disease is a relatively rare one promoted by the high heat and humidity prevailing so far this summer. He said there is no known management to prevent or stop the spread of the disease. Applications of protectant fungicides do little or no good, he said, since this fungus is only slightly sensitive to these materials.

Pitt CAT Scores Near State Level

Recently released California Achievement Test figures show that scores for Pitt County students are near or equal to the North Carolina average. North Carolina scores were above the national norm, according to the Associated Press.

The CAT tests students in third, sixth and eighth grades on reading, language and mathematics.

Figures released by Department of Public Instruction showed that more North Carolina students scored at or above the 77th percentile than the national norm and fewer scored at or below the 23rd percentile.

Bill Brown, division director of accountability services in the Department of N.C. Public Instruction, said the 77th percentile is considered above average and the 23rd percentile is below average.

Rod Whitley, testing coordinator

for Pitt County schools, said 31 percent of Pitt County third-graders scored at or above the 77th percentile, three points below the state average. Twenty-nine percent were above the mark in sixth grade and 27 percent were above in eighth grade. Both figures were equal to the state norm.

Related Story On A-6

Nineteen percent of Pitt County third-graders scored below the 23rd percentile, three points above the state figures. Seventeen percent of sixth-graders scored below the mark, two points above the state. Nineteen percent of the eighth-graders in Pitt County scored below the 23rd percentile, two points above the state average.

Whitley said the figures were an improvement over those recorded last year.

The mobile unit will also visit other sites in eastern North Carolina. Previously, the closest place to have this procedure of breaking up kidney stones with sound energy was Fayetteville.

A resolution was adopted acknowledging the development of a section of nuclear cardiology within the hospital's department of radiology. A commitment was made to support the realm of the means of the hospital." Dr. Assad Movahed will serve as medical director of this section.

Approval was given for a 4 percent cost of living increase to hospital retirees. The action will cost the hospital \$24,000 per year.

Authorization was given for an architect to be hired for a treatment holding facility in the vicinity of the present emergency department. The project, scheduled to begin during the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, will cost approximately \$2 million. It will provide 10 beds for people who are not considered emergencies, but who need to be observed a while before being assigned to a particular department. These people are now crowding the emergency department, so this facility will be wel-

comed by all physicians who enter patients in the hospital, Dr. Mary Raab, chief of staff, said.

A contract with the Brown & Wood law firm of New York was approved. The firm will provide counsel concerning the selling of bonds for an upcoming large addition to the hospital.

Approval was given for a number of staff classification changes, including the approval of 89 residents for reappointment in their residency training programs and for 62 resident to have house staff privileges. Neonatal nurse practitioners approved were Pamela Sue Salsbury, Lenna Sue West, Barbara B. Lilley, Barbara M. Albritton, Gail Holley, Cynthia L. Parks, Susan Tayloe, Melinda Edmundson and Victoria Bergstedt.

Dr. Ted Sunder was approved for special neurology privileges; Dr. Garrett Rogers for angiography and antioplasty privileges. Dr. Solomon Shapiro was allowed to change from active to consulting staff privileges; Dr. Joseph Wicker from active to inactive privileges.

Mrs. Barger reported that the hospital had an operating loss of \$485,026 during June. Losses during June have been experienced for the past three years and are beginning to be expected, she said. This negative trend is primarily the result of Medicaid target days and no state

reimbursement associated with bad debts and contractuals for June. She said inpatient use continued to be below budget — adults days off 837 days and newborn days off 239 days, with total year-to-date days 3,181 below budget. Year-to-date outpatient days are up 170 visits.

Equipment purchases approved amounted to \$465,651. These included a portable ultrasound unit for labor and delivery, an infant warmer for pediatric intensive care, monitors and other equipment for the neonatal intensive care unit, a power sweeper for building and grounds, computer equipment for medical records and nuclear medicine, and an echocardiograph machine for the exercise lab.

Farmville citizen David Shackelford was welcomed as a new member of the board. Board member Robert Spivey was recognized for having recently been named the News and Observer newspaper's "Tar Heel of the Week."

After the meeting, board members toured the hospital's new birthing center.

Smooth Summit

Events Continue To Unfold

The summit of seven democratic industrialized nations went smoothly last week ... so smoothly in fact that the world might assume there are no differences between the participants.

The leaders of the United States, France, West Germany, Japan, Britain, Italy and Canada were in accord in condemning the recent events in China, supporting more protection of the environment, encouragement of political and economic reforms in Poland and Hungary and concern about terrorism.

The leaders themselves were surprised by a letter from Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev in a summit which otherwise lacked surprises.

Gorbachev projected economic cooperation between the democracies and the Soviet Union. He said it is "obvious that the rest

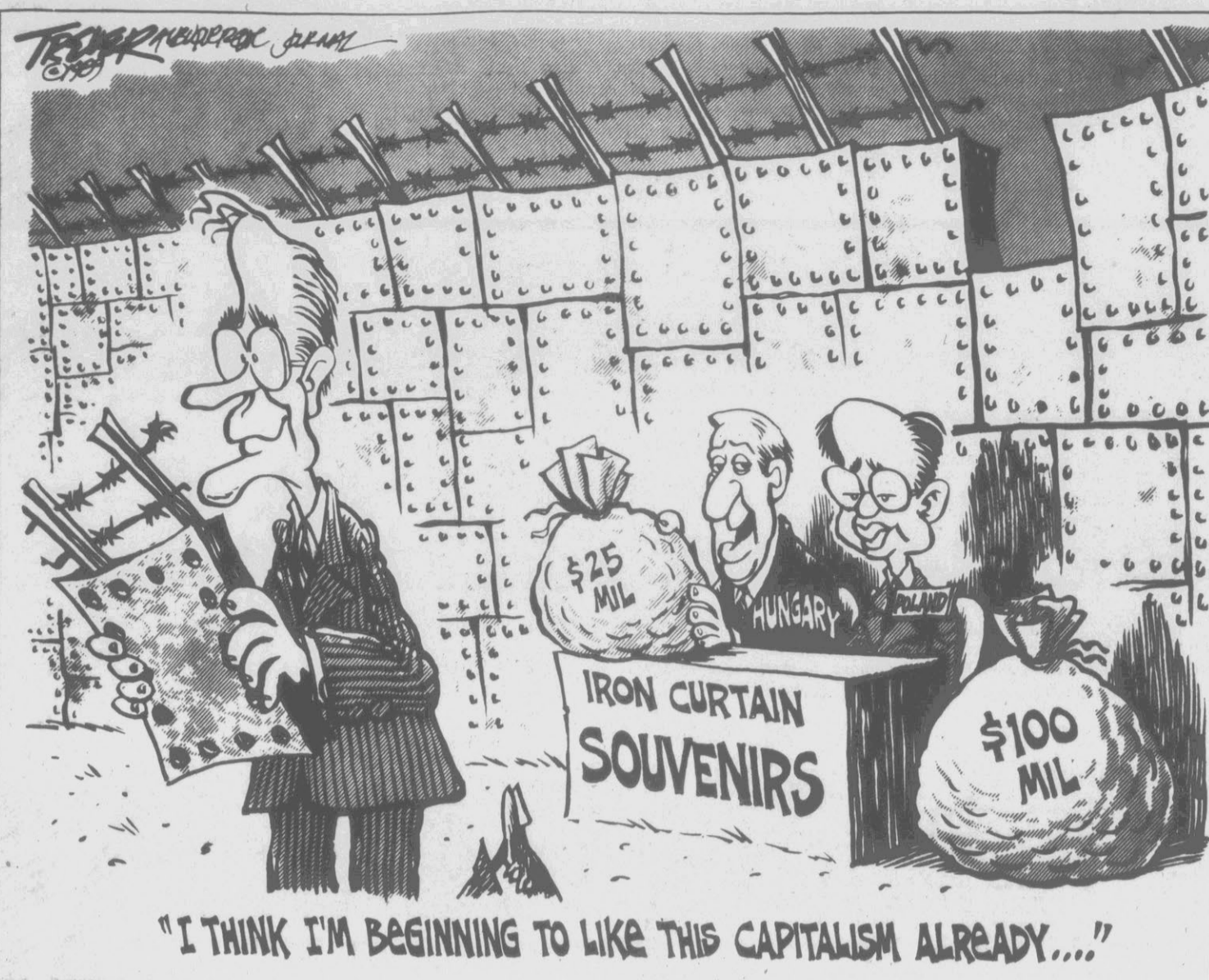
of the world can only gain by the opening to the world economy of a market such as that of the Soviet Union." He asked the nations to consider reforms now under way in the Soviet Union. While the western nations only took note of the Gorbachev letter it is clear that he was appealing for closer economic relations with the democracies.

Even with no specific action on the Gorbachev letter, it is clear that it cannot be ignored. As tensions ease there will be more trade between the Soviets and the west. It is only economic reality to expect that development.

But as the Soviet military threat recedes can we expect that future western economic summits will go as smoothly as this one? Probably not. The nations are fierce competitors and their leaders are likely to be more outspoken as security becomes less of a concern.

This one, though, went smoothly to the point of ending early, there was a friendly overture from Gorbachev and thus events continue to unfold in east-west relations that few would have expected to see in this century.

Coal Strikes: Gorbachev's 'Revolution From Below'?

MOSCOW — For months, Mikhail Gorbachev has been saying he wants a "revolution from below" to help accelerate his "revolution from above." Now, like it or not, the Soviet leader may have the beginnings of just that as the worst labor strikes since the 1920s continued to spread Tuesday in the coalfields of western Siberia and the Ukraine.

Ignoring appeals by their own leaders to go back to work, at least 150,000 striking miners in the Siberian Kuznetsky Basin stuck to their demands of independence from state control, staging what could prove to be the first in a series of assertive acts of independence and anger among this country's millions of dissatisfied laborers.

In the Donbass region of Ukraine, miners have now shut down 39 pits, including the Stakanov mine, the nation's largest. The Soviet news agency Tass said strikes have affected more than 160 coal, electronics and light industry businesses in western Siberia alone. Nearly half the country's coal production has been halted and Tass said "a catas-

trophe" is brewing at steel and power plants.

As concessions to workers' demands, the government has already flown into the Siberian mine region 10,000 tons of sugar, 6,000 tons of meat, 6,000 tons of soap and washing powder, and 5 million cans of condensed milk. They have raised pay for night shifts, lengthened vacations, raised by 50 percent the wholesale price of coal and said the miners would be allowed to sell for profit all the coal they produce in excess of state orders.

Nevertheless, one miner shown on the evening news program called the offer "stop-gap" and "half-baked." He said he and his fellow workers would stay out of the mines until their demands for better conditions and even greater control over their product, prices and profits were met.

In a conciliatory speech to miners in the Siberian town of Prokopyevsk, Gorbachev's emissary, Politburo member Nikolai Slyunkov, said, "people have lost patience and composure. We understand you, and we say we shall not limit ourselves to half-measures." He added that attempts at a solution so far were "just a beginning."

Analysis

In the Supreme Soviet, legislators said they were now putting "top priority" on passing a law regulating labor strikes. Although there have been nearly 100 such incidents in recent years, most of them minor, Soviet law still does not allow independent unions in the western sense.

Gorbachev, who seems to thrive on risk and finding ways to turn danger to his advantage, now faces a clear dilemma: to keep the strikes and demonstrations under control, and still allow workers and farmers to feel that Moscow's reforms can amount to more than what often seem abstract promises and parlor games for urban intellectuals.

If Gorbachev can prove he is trying to meet workers halfway, satisfying at least some of their demands for better conditions and greater independence, he may add not only to his political support, but also begin to erase some of the cynicism and complacency of tens of millions of Soviet citizens who are sick of food

shortages, cramped housing and miserable medical care.

But satisfying those demands will be extremely expensive for an already decrepit economy, especially if the strikes continue to spread. And with nationalist violence raging periodically in Abkhazia, Central Asia and elsewhere, some government leaders will not hesitate to demand that Gorbachev clamp down on all the unrest.

In Poland, contemporary change has its roots in the Solidarity movement's strike at the Lenin shipyards in Gdansk in 1980. But Gorbachev's perestroika reform program is only now sinking in at the grassroots level with popular elections and the strikes. Gorbachev has not yet been able to forge a Polish-style union of purpose between the intellectual elite and the workers.

So far, the Siberian strikers are on their own.

The unrest could not have greatly surprised Gorbachev. Although the strikes began spontaneously last

week, Gorbachev has been laying the groundwork for such a moment from the moment he succeeded Konstantin Chernenko more than four years ago.

He has at once tried to open up the country and establish new institutions, so that both demonstrators and progressive government officials are working, rockily, warily, but inevitably, toward similar goals.

In contrast to the current Chinese leaders, Gorbachev has decided that at least a measure of unrest and political independence is healthy. Despite extraordinary odds, Gorbachev has steadily, changed the vocabulary, psychology, and structure of Soviet society. The newspaper Socialist Industry even announced, with a note of approval, that miners were planning to form a "free basis for a new association of miners" — a plan that sounds somewhat like a nascent Solidarity movement.

The strikes could prove a moment of real awakening. Until now, there have been few signs that the millions of people here who are pleased to read better newspapers, but who see their everyday lives sinking further into decay were ready to put their hearts — and backs — into a

rebuilding effort that will take years, even decades, of enormous effort and sacrifice.

The leadership, which is capable of anger at nationalist demonstrations, has showed a certain sympathy for and even encouragement of the strikes in the Kuznetsky Basin. Politburo member Slyunkov in Siberia has even praised the strike committees for "high civic consciousness."

Despite their size, the strikes have not threatened the top leadership so far. The strikers have been non-violent. And the strike committees' demands have hit at Gorbachev's least favorite constituency — local Communist Party officials. Gorbachev has managed to make a political crisis work for him, allowing him to hack away at the conservative middle-level of the party.

Gorbachev used the same technique last week in Leningrad, when he engineered the firing of the unpopular regional secretary, Yuri Solovoyov, and then spent the better part of his speech telling party officials that factory workers were furious with them and they had best stop "chewing on stale gum" or face dismissal themselves.

Legislature Stalls, But 685 Bills Go Through

RALEIGH — With agreement over big ticket items such as highway projects and teacher salaries standing in the way of the adjournment of the General Assembly, legislators have approved 685 measures so far this year.

Out of 3,300 bills filed this session, the Legislature has passed 655 new laws and 30 resolutions, ranging from local matters like annexation or elections to nearly \$80 million in emergency spending for prison construction to settle a federal lawsuit.

In addition to the prison settlement, major issues addressed this session include environmental laws, changes in North Carolina's election regulations and a \$7 billion state operating budget that continues programs already in place.

The first bill to clear both houses of the General Assembly this session

raised the ceiling for the inmate population at the state prison system under a prison "cap" intended to alleviate overcrowding.

The changes to a 1987 measure require emergency releases of prisoners when the system has exceeded 98 percent of its 18,000-inmate capacity for 15 straight days. The original bill required the emergency releases after 15 days at 97 percent of capacity.

The new law, which was approved just three weeks after the Legislature convened Jan. 11, also gives the state Parole Commission 90 days instead of 60 to lower the prison population to 97 percent of capacity.

Prisoners eligible for immediate parole include any inmate serving a sentence of longer than six months whom the commission believes is not a danger to the community. The changes forbid any prisoner serving time for a sex offense or drug traf-

ficking to be released early.

Misdemeanor prisoners are automatically eligible to be considered for early parole, unless they were jailed for driving while impaired or any offense involving impaired driving.

In early March, legislators approved an emergency funding package of nearly \$80 million in construction and alternative sentencing funds to settle a federal lawsuit brought against the prison system for overcrowding.

The General Assembly revised its regulations on handling hazardous wastes after South Carolina Gov. Carroll Campbell banned shipments to a dump in Pinewood, S.C., from states that did not allow hazardous waste disposal sites inside their own borders.

North Carolina law had banned a hazardous waste landfill until at least one comprehensive treatment facility was operating in the state.

That restriction was lifted in a revised law on hazardous wastes that encourages a regional compact to handle wastes.

The changes give the governor the authority to negotiate with other states for a compact similar to the one used for low-level radioactive wastes.

A second major environmental bill sets up special funds to clean up environmental damage from commercial and noncommercial underground petroleum tanks.

Other environmental measures include:

- Revising appointments to the Coastal Resources Commission to ensure that members appointed from some categories do not work in construction, land development, real estate or lobbying activities.
- Allowing state officials to consider the cumulative effect of development when considering whether to issue a permit for projects in coastal areas.

- A fine of not more than \$500 for intentionally littering beaches and increasing the maximum fine for repeated non-intentional littering of \$500.
- Requiring biodegradable plastic yokes or six-pack rings for beverages sold in the state.

Black Democrats, who have pushed for years to eliminate second primaries, came close to their goal

with a new law that allows a candidate to be his party's nominee if he wins at least 40 percent of the primary vote.

The law previously allowed a second-place primary candidate to call for a runoff if the leading candidate did not get more than 50 percent of the votes cast.

Another law requires an elected official who wants to seek another elective office to resign his current position if the terms of the two offices overlap by more than 40 days.

Other new laws would:

- Grant a three-month amnesty period for back taxes and interest from Sept. 1 to Dec. 1, with tougher tax penalties to be imposed by the state beginning in 1990. Legislators say the amnesty period would raise revenues.
- Require that high schools teach the history of the founding of the United States and related documents, including the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and its amendments.

- Make it a crime to repeatedly threaten or harass people through use of a telephone answering machine, facsimile machine or computer modem.
- Bar any eligible person who refuses to register for the draft from receiving state employment or state-supported scholarships.

- Make possession of any amount of cocaine a felony.
- Re-ratify a proposed amendment to the U.S. Constitution which allows members of Congress to approve salary increases that would take effect after the next election for the U.S. House. North Carolina first ratified the amendment in 1789, but it was not approved by the required number of states at the time.

- Require that the abortion remains be disposed of through burial, cremation or approved incineration.
- Establish scholarships for nursing programs.
- Make it a misdemeanor to use a dairy crate without the consent of the owner.

House Retains Teacher Pay Plan, Basic Education Slate

RALEIGH — In an effort to clear the way for adjournment, House budget leaders agreed to stick with their plan for giving teachers a 30-step pay schedule and state employees an average 6 percent pay raise.

"I don't know about y'all, but I'm tired of coming down here," said House Appropriations Chairman David Diamont, D-Surry, a high school football coach. "Football practice starts two weeks from last night at 7 p.m., and I intend to be there."

"I want us to go ahead and get this ready so if we can get an agreement on the highway package Thursday, we can roll out an expansion budget," Diamont, D-Surry, told the panel as it began its 4½-hour meeting Tuesday.

Members of the committee voted to stick with the \$300 million salary proposal. The panel of subcommittee chairmen also agreed to back the House version of funding for the Basic Education Plan, which calls for spending \$77.4 million in fiscal year 1989-90 and \$188.6 million in 1990-91 for 1,500 new teachers, vocational teachers, teaching support staff and other expenses.

The Senate has proposed a 25-step pay plan for teachers, and spending \$60.3 million on the BEP this fiscal year and \$182.6 million next year.

A conference committee from the House and Senate is negotiating an \$8.6 billion highway funding package which includes using increased sales taxes on vehicles for the first two years of the 12-year plan to fund 6 percent pay raises.

The highway package would become part of the state expansion budget for new or increased spending.

The House pay proposal would put teachers on a 30-step plan, with teachers moving up one step and getting an automatic 2 percent pay raise each year. The only exception would be between the fourth and fifth years, when teachers would get a 5 percent pay increase.

The plan, which would be phased in over the next

three years, would add a 2.5 percent longevity pay increase beginning at the 25th step in the plan.

When fully implemented in three years, a beginning teacher would earn \$2,050 a month for the 10-month school year, while a teacher with 20 years experience would earn \$3,137 a month. A teacher with 30 years experience would get \$3,748 a month.

The pay would not include any across-the-board raises approved by the legislature or local pay supplements.

Teachers had a pay plan until 1982, when teachers were frozen at the step they then occupied. They have gotten across-the-board increases since, but no increases under the pay plan, essentially bunching teachers with several years experience at the same pay as new teachers.

The House panel, the only group meeting while many legislators were at a conference in Baltimore, agreed to accept a Senate proposal that would give the State Board of Education the equivalent of 6 percent pay increases with instructions to develop a separate pay schedule for school administrators.

The House panel also voted to stay with its proposal for the Basic Education Plan, the eight-year program approved in 1984 to guarantee that every student in the state is offered the same educational opportunities under programs funded by the state.

The House plan calls for full funding for 1,500 additional teachers, 725 teaching support positions, 300 clerical workers and 33 vocational teachers. The Senate plan does not fully fund all of those positions.

Diamont told the group the differences between the House proposal and the original schedule for the BEP amount to shifting funds around within the program.

"It's still an eight-year program," Diamont said. "We're just taking some of the money designated for the fifth year of the program (in the original plan) and moving it to the last three years of the program."

Brown Lung Award Ordered

RALEIGH — The state Court of Appeals overturned a state panel decision and granted a \$48,000 award to the estate of an Alamance County man who died in 1987 of brown lung disease.

James C. Hogan, of Whitsett, had sought brown lung benefits under workman's compensation in 1976, the ruling said. Hogan had worked in the card room of a Cone Mills Corp. textile factory from 1932 to 1959, but sought other work after a doctor advised him that exposure to cotton dust was causing him breathing problems.

The state Industrial Commission dismissed his case in 1977, saying his last exposure to cotton dust had been

before 1963, the limit then set by state law.

After new laws were approved in 1980 eliminating the 1963 cutoff for brown lung claims, the Industrial Commission wrote Hogan and invited him to refile his claim, which he did. The commission approved benefits for him in 1981.

But Cone Mills and Liberty Mutual Insurance Co. appealed, saying the 1977 dismissal prevented Hogan from getting benefits. The appeals court agreed with Cone Mills and the insurance company, but the state Supreme Court said the commission could set aside its own 1977 ruling denying benefits.

The executrix of Hogan's estate, Linda Hogan, filed a motion for the commission to set aside its 1977

dismissal and grant benefits.

The commission in March 1988 refused to overrule the 1977 denial.

Judge Clifton Johnston, writing for the majority in the split decision, said the commission had asked Hogan to refile for benefits. Citing an earlier Supreme Court ruling, Johnston wrote that the court was justified in overturning the commission's 1988 decision because allowing it to stand "amounted to a substantial miscarriage of justice."

Judge Eugene Phillips agreed, but Judge Gerald Arnold dissented, saying the commission had the discretionary authority to set aside its 1977 ruling and the court should not substitute its own judgement for the commission's.

Scores Improve

RALEIGH — North Carolina students continued to improve their scores on the California Achievement Tests this year, according to a report released Tuesday by the Department of Public Instruction.

North Carolina students, on average, scored higher in all subject areas on the tests than the average student in a national norm group. The tests are given each spring to students in the third, sixth and eighth grades.

Compared to the national norm group, North Carolina had a greater proportion of students scoring at or above the 77th national percentile. While the norm group had 23 percent at or above the 77th percentile, North Carolina had 34 percent score that high at grade three, 29 percent at grade six and 27 percent at grade eight.

Similarly, North Carolina had a smaller proportion of students scoring at or below the 23rd national percentile. The norm group had 23 percent scoring at or below the 23rd percentile, but North Carolina only posted 16 percent at grade three, 15 percent at grade six and 17 percent at grade eight.

State Superintendent Bob Etheridge called the test results encouraging.

The tests are a combination of scores from reading, language and mathematics.

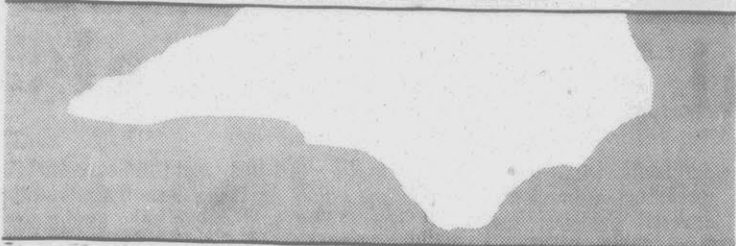

Bomb Debris

GOLDSBORO, N.C. (AP) — Retired Air Force Col. Mathew Perry, who was in charge of recovering a nuclear bomb after the crash of a Seymour Johnson AFB B-52 in January 1961, says no dangerous material was left in the ground at the crash scene.

Now a Goldsboro business man, Perry ended 28 years of public silence on the subject in a talk to Goldsboro Kiwanis Club on Monday.

He was chief of the weapons division at Eighth Air Force at the time of the crash at Musgrave's Crossroads near Goldsboro. He said digging crews recovered the "main item, the item we needed to recover" on the fourth or fifth day.

Perry did not identify the "main item" but for years speculation has been that a piece of radioactive material had been lost. Perry branded as "absolutely not true" reports that radioactive material remained in the ground.

"I assure you if there was anything left out there I would still be sitting in a little house next to that hole," Perry said.

Police Fences

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Charlotte police posing as thieves sold everything from VCRs to beer in an undercover investigation that ended with 30 arrests of neighborhood grocers, used car dealers and even convenience store clerks.

Police used \$7,500 of a \$30,000 state grant to buy the items they later sold as stolen goods to suspected fences, people who buy and sell stolen property. The rest of the money was used for equipment and other costs of the investigation, Cmdr. Bruce Treadaway said Tuesday.

The 30 people were arrested at 23 businesses on a total of 70 charges.

All were arrested on charges of attempting to receive stolen property, a misdemeanor, because police were not actually selling stolen property.

The investigation was prompted in part by a surge in store and house break-ins. Charlotte store break-ins are up 22.4 percent for the first six months of 1989, compared to the same period last year. House break-ins are up 11.4 percent, officials said.

Southern Legislators Told Prison Construction Isn't Only Solution

BALTIMORE — New prisons fill up as quickly as they are finished and aren't the solution to prison overcrowding, but that doesn't mean states can stop building them, Southern legislators have been advised.

A federal judge, a former state attorney general and a prison administrator told lawmakers attending the annual meeting of the Southern Legislative Conference on Tuesday that new prisons must be built, but that states should also look for other ways of solving overcrowding problems.

U. S. District Judge Frank Kaufman of Baltimore said society wants offenders locked up for longer periods, and "if that's what our society wants, then as a democratic society that's what we ought to do."

Kaufman warned that states are "going to have to spend more money...if we're going to keep putting more people away for longer and longer terms."

Kaufman, Former Tennessee Attorney General Michael Cody and Daniel J. Moore, president of the Correctional Industry Association, told lawmakers that there are no easy or quick solutions to prison

overcrowding problems.

Cody said states must either divert inmates away from prison at the front end of the system or release violent offenders earlier at the other end.

He said many people charged with minor, non-violent crimes who are sent to prison simply because they can't make bail are candidates for alternative approaches such as monitored house arrest.

The N.C. General Assembly this year appropriated \$80 million for prison construction and alternative sentencing programs in response to a federal lawsuit. Legislators also enacted changes in the law that governs prison "population emergencies."

The changes to a 1987 measure require emergency releases of prisoners when the system has exceeded 98 percent of its 18,000-inmate capacity for 15 straight days. The original bill required the emergency releases after 15 days at 97 percent of capacity.

Moore, general manager of State Use Industries for the Maryland prison system, said states should put more inmates to work in prison industries.

In the early 1900s, about 60 percent of inmates worked, but today only about 10 percent of the 500,000 in-

mates in state and federal prisons are employed in prison industries, he said.

"That's very poor," Moore said. He said work programs can make money for states and also can teach skills to inmates that help them make it on the outside.

He said 22 percent of the inmates in Maryland's prison apprentice programs return to jail, a figure about half the recidivism rate for all prison inmates nationally.

Kaufman, defending the role of federal judges in demanding that states reduce inmate populations in crowded prisons, said he and other judges are aware of the problems their orders can cause and the concern they arouse in the public.

He said, however, that judges have a responsibility to balance the needs of society against "what common decency tells us in 1989 we must do" to comply with the constitutional prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment.

"Judges ... are not supposed to read the law in terms of what public opinion calls for," he said.

Kaufman told of touring an old Maryland prison, which he did not name, on a hot summer day a decade ago to view conditions and see

how inmates were affected by crowded conditions.

"We went through that day, and the place was sickening. You couldn't imagine yourself living for even an hour under those conditions," he said.

Kaufman said when he first got involved in suits filed by inmates alleging that their constitutional rights were being violated because of crowded conditions, there was a lot of stonewalling from Maryland officials.

"The attitude you got from the Maryland attorney general's office was, 'Federal court go away. Please leave us alone,'" he said.

That attitude seems to have changed in Maryland and other states, Kaufman said.

Woman Charged In Arsenic Poisonings

GRAHAM, N.C. — Investigators are probing additional deaths after charging an Alamance County woman with murder and assault in the poisonings of her husband and two other men.

The arrest of Blanche Taylor Moore, 56, Tuesday night came after a judge ordered the exhumation of the woman's father in a probe to see if he died from arsenic poisoning.

The Burlington Police Department charged her with first-degree murder in connection with the death of her first husband, James Taylor, in 1973. The Forsyth County Sheriff's Department also issued a warrant charging Mrs. Moore with first-degree murder in the death of Raymond Reid, a former boyfriend, who died in 1986.

In addition, the Alamance County Sheriff's Department charged Mrs. Moore with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill in connection with the arsenic poisoning of her current husband, the Rev. Dwight Moore.

The charges were announced hours after an Alamance Superior Court judge's order was filed Tuesday to exhume the body of the

woman's father, Parker D. Kiser Sr.

Authorities declined to say how many deaths they are investigating or to further characterize the possible victims, but they said all are from Alamance County. Officials also would not say when they will know if there are other victims.

Mrs. Moore was arrested at 6 p.m. at a residence outside Burlington, authorities said.

Ninety minutes later, the dark-haired Moore — wearing a white jacket and olive green pants and surrounded by five officers — was whisked from an unmarked police car to the Alamance County Jail, where she was held without bond.

She was scheduled to make a first appearance at 9:30 a.m. today in Alamance County Court.

At a news conference, authorities provided few details of their two-month investigations, which have enlisted at least eight officers from Alamance and Forsyth counties, Burlington and the State Bureau of Investigation.

They declined to talk about their cases against Moore or suggest a motive, and they would not say who owned the residence in which Moore was arrested, how long Moore had

stayed there, or whether she was alone when arrested.

"We're just going where the investigation leads us," said Lt. Steve Lynch of the Burlington Police Department. "This is just when the investigation merited the arrest, and the investigation will continue as scheduled."

Bond was set at \$100,000 on the assault charge. No bond has been set on the two murder charges.

"We still have some more leg work to do in our investigation. But basically, our investigation on the Rev. Dwight Moore is done at this time," Alamance County Sheriff Richard Frye said. "Any information we get, we still have some follow up to do. We'll continue that pending the trial."

Frye said there was additional evidence gathered in the case that he would not reveal prior to a trial.

Moore was taken to N.C. Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill complaining of nausea and vomiting May 7. The arsenic was discovered within a few days after his admission.

Alamance County District Attorney Steve Balog has said investigators believe Moore might have ingested more arsenic at the hospital, but hospital officials have said they

don't believe that could have happened.

Moore's poisoning led to the exhumation of two other men. In mid-June, investigators unearthed the body of Mrs. Moore's ex-boyfriend, Raymond C. Reid Sr. Reid, a 50-year-old Kernersville grocer, died of cardiac arrest in a Winston-Salem hospital in October 1986. A subsequent autopsy revealed his heart failure was caused by arsenic poisoning, Butts said.

Reid signed a will a month before his death bequeathing equal shares of his estate to Mrs. Moore and his two sons, Steven and Raymond Jr. Mrs. Moore reported she received more than \$22,500 from Reid's \$68,000 estate.

Mrs. Moore's first husband, James N. Taylor, died of heart failure caused by arsenic poisoning, state medical examiner Dr. John Butts said. Taylor was a 45-year-old furniture refinisher when he died at home in October 1973. His body was exhumed almost two weeks ago.

Taggart's Lawyer Plans To Call Bakker To Testify In Tax Hearing

CHARLOTTE — As lawyers prepared to argue over a call for testimony from PTL founder Jim Bakker, two former ministry accountants testified in the tax evasion trial of David and James Taggart they had difficulty getting documentation of expenses at the ministry.

The attorney for the Taggart brothers said he intends to follow through on his request for testimony from Bakker.

"I would never have issued the subpoena if we didn't want him to testify. Our role is not to play games," attorney Ben Cotten said in an interview outside the U.S. District courtroom Tuesday.

Cotten predicted the two sides would argue the matter today.

Bakker's attorney, Harold Bender, filed a motion last week the quash the subpoena and informed the court that Bakker will not waive his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination. Bakker is scheduled to be tried on fraud and conspiracy charges next month.

The Taggarts are charged with evading \$487,000 in federal income taxes while they were associated with the PTL ministry.

Two former PTL accountants who were responsible for compiling records for an ongoing IRS audit, testified Tuesday about problems they had getting expense receipts from David Taggart.

Terry Steen testified that during the years 1980-87 it was nearly impossible to convince Taggart to turn over any records.

"If you looked at the dollar amounts compared with the total (cash) advances that were due, it was very large," Steen said.

Lee Fichtner took over in 1984 as the PTL accountant responsible for providing documents to the IRS. He testified that he handled the IRS document requests pertaining to David Taggart's travel expenses covering the years 1984-85.

"Did David Taggart ever turn

those records over to you?" the prosecution asked.

"Not to my recollection," Fichtner said. "I never turned them over to the IRS."

Maxine Raudenbauch, a secretary in Bakker's office, recalled one occasion when David Taggart came into his office with a briefcase full of receipts some time in late 1986 or early 1987.

"They were all hodgepodge, in no order," she said. "There were a couple of hundred of them."

She testified that David Taggart declined her offer to help straighten them out.

"He said, 'I say every year I won't do this and I end up doing it,'" she said.

The Taggart brothers joined PTL in the late 1970s as piano players. Within a few years, David, 32, was promoted to Bakker's top personal aide and James, 35, became PTL's interior decorator.

Both were fired when Jerry Falwell took over at the television ministry following Bakker's resignation in March 1987 following revelations of the Jessica Hahn sex-and-money scandal.

William Spears, a certified public accountant who was hired by PTL to help it fight the IRS audit, testified that Taggart once showed him three binders containing travel receipts.

Eastern Travelers Delayed 10 Hours

RALEIGH (AP) — About 300 New York-bound Eastern Airlines passengers were stranded here for more than 10 hours when their jet broke down and Eastern had problems finding a replacement, the Raleigh-Durham Airport Authority said.

The L-1011 jumbo jet, which left Atlanta at 9:27 a.m. with 316 passengers and a crew of 11, lost power in one engine and made a precautionary landing at 11 a.m., said Teresa Damiano, spokeswoman for the airport authority.

"I'd say it's probably par for the course," said passenger Don Eubanks of Tampa.

Passenger Norm Bass of Atlanta had said the pilot and crew planned to charter a plane back to Atlanta where they would get another L-1011 and fly to Raleigh-Durham to pick up the passengers. Eastern spokeswoman Bobbi Giordano said it would be "ludicrous" for the crew to leave the passengers in Raleigh and denied the company had chartered a flight.

However, Aero Services Inc., a Raleigh-Durham aircraft charter firm, confirmed Eastern chartered a Cessna Citation business jet and that the aircraft did depart for Atlanta.

Striking pilots union members said that while en route, the Eastern crew was told by Atlanta maintenance technicians that no airworthy widebody jets were available, the Palm Beach Post reported today.

Finally at 5:30 p.m., a jet was dispatched from Eastern's Miami headquarters to pick up the stranded passengers. Flight 102 departed for New York at 8:50 p.m. and landed at 10:02 p.m. — nearly 10½ hours after its scheduled 11:40 a.m. arrival.

Giordano said the jet ferried to the site would contain whatever ground crew would be necessary to transfer baggage from the stricken plane to the replacement.

Eastern suspended regular service at Raleigh-Durham when its mechanics went on strike. It plans to resume service at the airport Aug. 1, but so far has no ground crew there.

An Eastern employee said Tuesday night that it appeared that more than 90 percent of the passengers had to stay with Flight 102 because connections to New York are limited out of Raleigh. The travelers were served meals and drinks.

A spokeswoman from American Airlines, the dominant carrier at Raleigh-Durham, said Eastern did not contact American for help in ferrying the passengers to New York.

Paper Says 'Miracle' Pilot Faced Probe By Federal Drug Officials

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Two days before pilot Thomas Root's mysterious, 800-mile unconscious flight, a special task force under federal drug czar William Bennett began investigating him on suspicion of running guns and drugs, a newspaper reported today.

The investigation of the Washington lawyer began eight days ago, after a meeting of state and federal law-enforcement officials

from the Washington, Maryland and Virginia, officials in Bennett's office told the Sun-Sentinel in Fort Lauderdale.

The task force opened its investigation after 35 guns and five gallons of ether, a chemical that can be used to process cocaine, were found during an April 24 search of the hangar where Root stored his plane, said Emile Manara, a special agent with Bennett's Office of National Drug Policy.

Task force members told the

Sun-Sentinel that the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration has uncovered evidence suggesting that Root, who specializes in communications law, also had made unscheduled landings in remote areas.

While Manara said such behavior fits the pattern of suspected drug smugglers, he cautioned that the task force had not found any hard evidence linking Root to drug smuggling or gun running.

"We thought that this guy warranted some looking into," Manara said.

The latest disclosure came as a gun manufacturer, a police chief and a doctor who treated Root all cast doubt on his version of events.

Root, 36, who remains listed in stable condition at Memorial Hospital in Hollywood with a gunshot wound to the abdomen, has insisted that he does not remember getting shot. He was flying to Rocky Mount when his ordeal began.

He said he doesn't know why he passed out during the flight and said he was shot in the abdomen when his .32 caliber Smith & Wesson revolver, kept in the plane's glove compartment, discharged during the crash in Bahamian waters.

But Dick Bachmann, vice president of Smith & Wesson, told the Associated Press Tuesday that the gun's safety features make such accidental firings impossible. "Suggestions that it could be absolutely false," he said.

And Hollywood police chief Richard Witt told the Associated Press late Tuesday night that there was "indisputable scientific proof" that Root's bullet wound was at least four hours old when he arrived at the hospital.

"I knew from the beginning his story wasn't true," said Witt, a veteran homicide investigator.

Witt's findings supported those of U.S. Coast Guard surgeon James Rahman, who said peritonitis in the wound showed Root must have been shot at least two hours before he was rescued.

"All this would indicate that Mr. Root is being less than truthful," Witt said. "He's been saying some things that are now ludicrous. Nobody is going to know what really happened until he starts to put away those things that are implausible and starts talking about what's plausible."

The National Transportation Safety Board planned a news conference at the hospital at noon today to discuss its investigation. Spokesman Paul Miller of the FBI, which is also investigating the case, commented: "There's no question that this is an unusual case."

Manara said the task force investigation of Root has been put on hold while other agencies' inquiries into last week's flight continue.

The search of Root's hangar at the Manassas, Va., airport, also turned up cyalume chemical light sticks, which smugglers often attach to drug loads tossed out of airplanes, said Bill Kelmartin, a Prince William County, Va., police investigator.

In an interview after the hangar search, Kelmartin said, Root told him and a U.S. Customs agent that he kept the cyalume sticks in the airplane's cabin for possible "backup lighting" in the event of an electrical problem.

Kelmartin, now assigned to Bennett's 100-member regional task force, told the Sun-Sentinel Tuesday that Root's explanations were "plausible, but not all that probable."

NCNB Takeover Bid Spurs Profits

ATLANTA — The stocks of seven Southeastern regional banking companies have been on a tear since late March when NCNB Corp. started its unsuccessful takeover of Citizens and Southern Corp. of Atlanta.

Unwelcome as it might have been to C&S, North Carolina-based NCNB's attempt is making money for many investors, including C&S shareholders.

NCNB's unsuccessful bid to acquire C&S brought attention to the other five super-regional banks, and falling interest rates and strong earnings for most have helped strengthen the companies' stock prices.

NCNB's 38.6 percent stock price jump leads the pack, with C&S' 27 percent increase next, but all of the seven large regional banking companies have outperformed the Dow Jones industrial average, as have bank stocks throughout the country.

"For NCNB, it is entirely the estimate of (earnings potential) from Texas," said John Mason, senior vice president at Interstate-Johnson Lane in Atlanta. "For C&S, at least half of the gain or all beyond which they would have had is due to the NCNB offer."

First Wachovia Corp. Sun-Trust Banks Inc., Barnett Banks Inc., First Union Corp. and Sovran Financial Corp. have benefited from declining interest rates and general interest in bank stocks, Mason said.

While interest in bank stocks has improved generally since lower ear-

nings in 1987, NCNB's takeover attempt was a catalyst for investor interest in the Southeast, said Jon Burke, senior vice president at Robinson-Humphrey Co. Inc. in Atlanta.

"I think people said, 'Wait a minute. There is something here,'" he said. "Their attempt did focus investor attention on small banks, as well as super-regionals."

Analysts and investors started to believe NCNB's effort signaled a possible round of consolidations in the Southeast, Burke said. There also was a feeling that other super-regionals would need to react, either as a buyer or a seller, he said.

NCNB has been the standard-bearer for super-regional stocks in recent months as investors anticipate the bank assuming 80 percent to 100 percent control of NCNB Texas National Bank and its earnings. Last week, NCNB, which owns 49 percent of the Texas bank, said \$28.8 million of its \$91.5 million second-quarter earnings from Texas.

"I don't think it hurts any of the other super-regionals to have one of their own trading for what is currently in excess of two-time stated book value," Burke said.

Drug Trial Gives Clue To Art Theft

WILMINGTON, N.C. — A drug trial here has turned up clues that could lead to solving the 7-year-old mystery of who stole four 17th-century paintings from a Detroit museum.

Anna Barnes, a convicted cocaine dealer from Miami, admitted that she once kept paintings that were stolen from the Detroit Institute of Arts in 1982. The Detroit museum values the Dutch and Flemish paintings — including one attributed to Rembrandt — at \$305,000.

Ms. Barnes, testifying Tuesday in a cocaine conspiracy trial, said she gave three of the paintings back last year to the people who stole them.

She said she gave the other painting to an FBI agent in April. That agent was expected to testify today.

"We've always been hopeful to get them back," said Museum Director Sam Sachs. "I hope someone gets in touch with us."

The painting attributed to Rembrandt, "A Woman Weeping," is said to be worth \$200,000. "Laughing Boy," attributed to Frans Hals, is valued at \$60,000, but Museum Director Sam Sachs said the painting was one of the most popular at the museum and might be worth more than the one attributed to Rembrandt.

The other missing paintings are Aelbert Cuyp's "View of the Scheldt," worth \$25,000, and "St. Michael," by Lucas Franchois the Younger, worth \$20,000.

The museum offered a \$30,000 reward when the paintings were stolen May 28, 1982, and brought in a New York art investigator to track down the thieves.

But William Smith told the Detroit Free Press in 1983 that his investigation had turned up nothing.

"It's frustrating in the sense that

there are cases where you get things that entertain you; you get a lead, something to go on," Smith said. "You like to get a little encouragement. One false lead at least brings you closer to something."

Ms. Barnes dropped a lead Tuesday. One of defendant Carl Christy's lawyers, Tom McNamara of Raleigh, asked her whether she had shown the stolen paintings to Christy.

Christy, of Hollywood, Fla., faces charges of conspiracy to possess and distribute more than five kilograms of cocaine.

Ms. Barnes said she had. She said friends from Detroit had given them to her — she didn't say who — and she kept them in a safe deposit box. When the friends needed to catch up on a drug debt last year, she said, she returned three of them.

The last one she kept until after she pleaded guilty in New Bern to conspiracy to distribute cocaine on March 31, a charge for which she could get a life sentence, although she is cooperating with the government by testifying.

Ms. Barnes said she called an FBI agent and handed over the last painting because she wanted to get rid of it before it caused trouble. McNamara asked whether she didn't worry about being charged with possession of stolen property, but Ms. Barnes said she assumed her plea agreement covered all her crimes.

Museum officials said the paintings were discovered missing when an employee checked for storm damage in a storage room and saw that the paintings had been unscrewed from their frames. Officials said whoever took them must have been familiar with the museum, but added that, judging from what was taken, it had not been the work of organized art thieves.

Hatchery Attacked

HUANCAYO, Peru (AP) — About 100 Shining Path guerrillas attacked a private fish hatchery in the Andes, blowing up laboratories and incubation tanks and killing 50 tons of trout, police said.

Guerrillas in three trucks and a microbus arrived at the hatchery Monday, tied up seven employees and set dynamite charges around the facility, which is 25 miles northeast of Huancayo and 165 miles from Lima.

Authorities said the rebels made off with some arms, radio equipment and a pickup truck. Security forces left Huancayo Tuesday to pursue the rebels.

The Shining Path is a fanatical, Mao-inspired guerrilla group that has waged an armed insurgency against Peru's elected government since 1980.

The government says more than 15,000 people have died in the guerrilla war, including police, soldiers, government officials, rebels and civilians.

'My Sister Sam' Actress Killed

LOS ANGELES — Police have few clues to why a man shot and killed actress Rebecca Schaeffer after waiting outside her apartment almost four hours. Her agent said she "didn't have an enemy in the world."

Police questioned a former boyfriend of the actress but said he was not a suspect. They haven't ruled out the possibility that Miss Schaeffer knew her attacker, Detective Dan Andrews said.

Authorities also found no indications of harassment against Miss Schaeffer, who starred in the old sitcom "My Sister Sam," but the possibility that the killer was a deranged fan "is a motive that we definitely have not ruled out," Andrews said.

"We have no record of her ever having called for assistance or being a victim of anything, or being harassed," he said.

Miss Schaeffer, 21, was shot once in the chest Tuesday morning by a young man who apparently rang her doorbell, Andrews said.

The attacker had been standing outside the two-story building for at least four hours, witnesses told police. The apartment is in the city's Fairfax district near West Hollywood and Beverly Hills.

"I was in the kitchen making coffee and I heard what sounded like a car backfiring," said Richard Goldman, a television screenwriter who lives across the street. "After the pop, there were two bloodcurdling screams."

"I looked out the window and I saw a guy in a yellow shirt jogging at a fair-clip ... as if it was ball four and he was running to first base."

Another neighbor, Kenneth Newell, rushed to help the fallen woman. "I felt her pulse. I couldn't feel any," Newell said.

The actress died at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center about 30 minutes after the shooting, said hospital spokeswoman Peggy Shaff.

The gunman was believed to be between 20 and 30 years old, police said.

"She didn't have an enemy in the world," said her agent, Jonathan

Howard. "She was a very successful young actress, on the ascent, getting job after job. I can't believe this has happened."

Miss Schaeffer co-starred on CBS' "My Sister Sam" with Pam Dawber from 1986 to 1988. She played Patti Russell, the younger sister of Miss Dawber's character, Sam.

A native of Eugene, Ore., Miss Schaeffer worked as a model in Japan in 1984, doing commercials and magazine covers. Upon her return to the United States, she took a regular role in the ABC soap opera "One Life to Live."

She also appeared in the Woody Allen film "Radio Days" and an episode of the NBC series "Amazing Stories."

She appeared most recently in the recently released movie "Scenes From the Class Struggle in Beverly Hills," playing the daughter of a character played by Jacqueline Bisset.

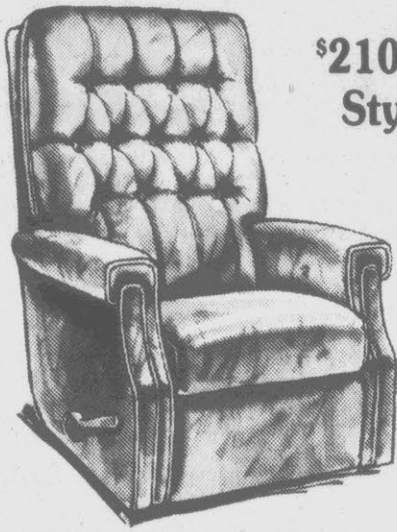
Miss Schaeffer had just completed a co-starring role in "One Point of View," an upcoming feature film directed by Dyan Cannon.

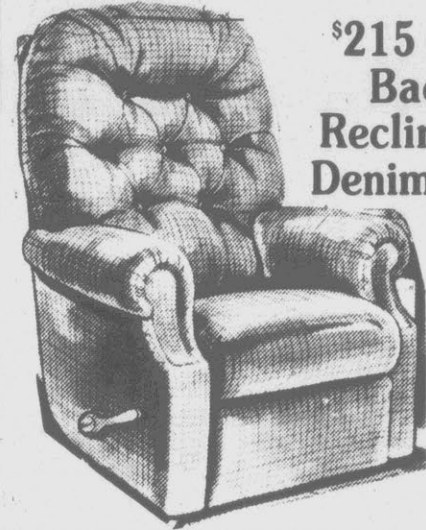

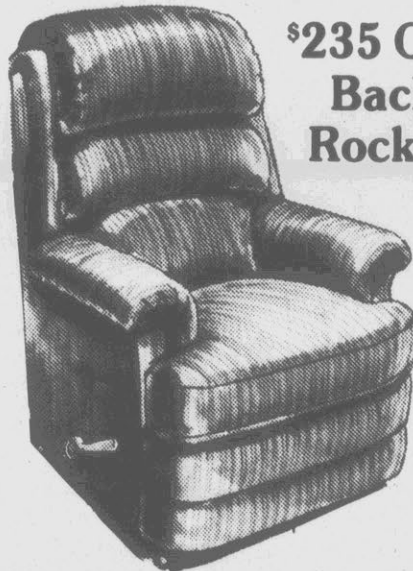

Hurricane Veers Back To Hawaii

HONOLULU — Hurricane Dalia surprised forecasters and turned north, putting it on course to pass close to Hawaii and prompting authorities to warn residents anew to stock up on emergency items.

Early Tuesday, the storm appeared to be turning away from the islands, but it shifted to a north-westerly direction and forecasters said Dalia could come closer than they expected.

"It does look like it's turning north, which makes it of a little more concern to us," said National Weather Service forecaster Hans Rosendal. "If it continues its northerly trend, it would come closer to the southern shores, but we don't know how close yet."

"It's not moving very fast, so we have plenty of time."

Hawaii Island beach parks were closed Tuesday as surf surged to more than 15 feet on the southeast coast of the southernmost island in the chain.

At 8 p.m. HST Tuesday, the hurricane was about 375 miles southeast of Hilo, on Hawaii Island, moving west-northwest at about 10 mph, the weather service said. Its maximum sustained wind speed was 75 mph; a storm is classified a hurricane when

that speed reaches 74 mph. Wind gusted to 90 mph.

By about 10 p.m. HST today it should be about 180 miles south of Hilo, the weather service said.

If the hurricane stayed on track, it would move parallel to the islands, moving south-southwest of the state, forecasters said.

A tropical storm watch remained in effect for Hawaii Island, meaning wind up to 73 mph and heavy rain were possible if Dalia moved farther north than expected.

Hawaii residents were urged to stock up on batteries, canned goods and other emergency supplies.

A high surf advisory also remained in effect for beaches along the south shore of the island, as waves reached heights of 15 feet.

"We're going to be keeping these beaches closed as a precautionary measure," said Bruce Butts, a spokesman for Hawaii County Civil Defense.

Although there were reports of waves washing up on coastal roads in some spots, Hilo police said there were no reports of injury or damage as of 10:30 p.m. HST.

Rosendal said it appeared the surf peaked Tuesday night and would subside by this morning, adding that it would surge again later today if Dalia continued to head for the island.

Scientists Find Moon Rocks Embedded In Antarctic Glaciers

WASHINGTON — American scientists are finding rocks from the moon — and perhaps Mars — in the glaciers of Antarctica, and one expert says they may have been slung into orbit by an asteroid collision during ancient times.

"We are certain that these samples are from the moon," said William Cassidy, a University of Pittsburgh geologist.

The rocks, deposited on ancient polar show fields hundreds of thousands of years ago, match chemical characteristics of lunar samples collected by astronauts on the six Apollo lunar missions, he said. Matching the samples create what geologists call "ground truth."

"We don't know from where on the

moon they came, but we know they have to (be from places) more widespread than the four percent that we've sampled (by Apollo)," Cassidy said Tuesday at the International Geological Congress.

Cassidy said it is believed that the Antarctic moon rocks got to Earth when, in some ancient time, an asteroid smashed into the lunar surface with such great violence that chunks of the moon were slung into orbit. It would take less force to do this from the lunar surface because the moon has only one-sixth of the Earth's gravity.

Once in orbit, the moon rocks could eventually be swept up by the Earth. The lunar material would streak through the atmosphere and then crash into the Earth's surface.

Most such objects hit the oceans, where they are lost, or on land surfaces where they are weathered and eroded beyond recognition.

But in the Antarctic, time is frozen in gigantic sheets of ice that lie virtually unchanged for up to 20 million years. Moon rocks that come to rest there remain untouched and nearly pristine, awaiting collection by Cassidy and his team.

Other types of rocks from space also are found on the frozen polar plains.

Cassidy said two rare samples, called shergittes, have been found that may have originated from Mars.

"We don't really know if that's the case because we don't have ground truth (matched samples from a known source)," he said. But Cassidy said the fact that moon rocks hit Earth support the idea that other samples could be from Mars.

"The lunar samples ... lend credence to the view that you really can hit a planet with an asteroid and knock off a meteoroid and get it into

orbit," he said. "This lends credence to the idea that the shergittes could have come from Mars and are really martian samples."

Final proof, he said, will have to come from a sampling mission to Mars.

Cassidy said that about 12,000 other types of meteorites have been gathered from the ice in Antarctica. He said he and his team find the space rocks by systematically searching using snowmobiles.

"The meteorites are just lying around on the ice," he said. Most are about the size of a "large olive," but some are as large as grapefruit.

The fragments are photographed, collected in sealed bags and transported, still frozen, to the Johnson Space Center in Houston. In a special laboratory there, they are warmed and dried in a pure nitrogen atmosphere. Sections are cut from

the samples and sent for study by scientists in 17 nations.

Cassidy said when the study of Antarctic meteorites first began 20 years ago, scientists hoped to find samples that were as old as the polar ice sheets where they were found.

"We hoped we could look back 20

million years," he said. "But the oldest one we've found is only about 900,000 years old. We've found two that are 700,000 years old. The bulk have fallen over just the last 300,000 years."

And in a solar system more than four billion years old, he said, that's but a brief moment.

News Reports Link Iowa Explosion To Possible Suicide Bid By Sailor

NEW YORK — A Navy investigation into the explosion that killed 47 sailors on the battleship USS Iowa in April has found strong evidence that a suicidal sailor set it off, according to two reports.

The 10-week probe, with FBI assistance, ruled out unstable gunpowder or flaws in the mechanical or electrical systems in the gun turrets where the explosion occurred, said NBC News and today's editions of The New York Times.

The network cited unidentified Navy sources Tuesday; the newspaper quoted officials in the Pentagon and Congress who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The unreleased Navy report said Gunner's Mate Clayton Hartwig, 25, may have been responsible for the

blast, according to NBC and the Times.

Navy spokesman Lt. Greg Smith told The Associated Press that the conclusion of suicide "was not based on official reports of the Navy. It is the opinion of NBC and Mr. (Fred) Francis," the network reporter.

Other Pentagon officials told the newspaper the Navy had been reluctant to issue a report, fearing it would further demoralize the ship's crew and bring on legal action, bad publicity or charges of incompetence or cover-up.

Smith said the investigation report had been submitted to the commander of surface forces for the Atlantic Fleet in Norfolk, Va., and eventually would land on the secretary of defense's desk.

The investigators based their findings on a psychological profile of

Hartwig by the FBI and 228 other exhibits, including a three-hour videotaped statement from another Iowa sailor, David Smith, NBC said.

David Smith rejected Hartwig's sexual advances the night before the explosion, he was quoted as saying in an interview with an investigator.

He also said Hartwig had discussed how to set off a bomb using a nine-volt battery and a small timer, NBC reported.

The two men talked about "explosions, that kind of stuff. How to set off the powder. All that kind of stuff," David Smith was quoted as saying.

Hartwig took him to his locker and showed him a timer, NBC reported.

"Part of me can see him doing it," David Smith was quoted as telling investigators.

In addition, a psychiatric study

done by the FBI Center for Analysis of Violent Crimes found that Hartwig was disturbed and under a lot of stress, "virtually insuring some type of reaction. In this instance, it is suicide," according to the report.

Naval investigators also pointed to the rejection of Hartwig by Gunner's Mate Kendall Truitt, who survived the explosion. Hartwig had named Truitt as the sole beneficiary of a \$50,000 double-indemnity life insurance policy.

Asked about NBC's report Tuesday night, Hartwig's father, Earl V. Hartwig of Cleveland, said there was "no way, definitely" that his son was suicidal.

FmHA Preparing Debt Notices

WASHINGTON — The Farmers Home Administration is preparing for another round of notices to borrowers who missed paying loan installments by Jan. 1.

As of July 3, there were 15,704 newly delinquent borrowers, the agency said Tuesday. Notices telling them to settle their debts or face foreclosure will be mailed by early fall. Upon receipt, a delinquent borrower will have 45 days to respond.

Maryln Aycock, an FmHA spokesman, said the new wave of delinquencies is in addition to more

than 66,000 borrowers notified last fall that they would have to provide certain financial and production information to the agency if they wanted help in handling their debts.

If there is no response, or if a borrower is in such poor financial shape no alternative can be worked out, forced sale or foreclosure proceedings are authorized.

Aycock said unlike the earlier list of delinquents — many of whom were in arrears three years or more — the new batch involve farmers who are only six months or more behind.

The procedure is specified by the

Agricultural Credit Act of 1987, which requires FmHA collectors to tell delinquent borrowers of various liberalized debt-servicing options available to the borrowers.

Aycock said the 15,704 newest delinquencies represent a sharp reduction from more than 30,000 who missed the Jan. 1 deadline but made their payments later.

The FmHA, an agency of the Agriculture Department, is often called the government's farm lender of last resort. Eligible borrowers cannot qualify for loans from commercial lenders.

Moi sets fire to ivory pile to back up demand for worldwide ban on illegal sale of the horns

Kenya Burns Ivory Pile Worth \$3 Million To Protest Slaughter

NAIROBI, Kenya — Setting fire to 2,500 ivory tusks worth \$3 million, President Daniel arap Moi said he wanted to draw attention to a continent-wide slaughter that threatens to wipe out Africa's elephant in 10 years.

Hundreds of government officials, diplomats, journalists and conservationists watched Tuesday as Moi put a torch to the 12 tons of ivory atop a 20-foot pile of wood.

The pyre was placed on a hill in Nairobi National Park overlooking the vast Athi Plains that are home to gazelle, rhino, giraffe, zebra, lions and other wild animals.

"Actions speak louder than words," Moi said. "Kenya cannot appeal to the world to stop buying ivory if at the same time we are selling the very same commodity."

Conservationists and many nations have called for a worldwide ban on the ivory trade.

Kenya's elephant population has fallen from 65,000 in the 1970s to about 17,000. In all of Africa, poaching has cut the elephant population from an estimated 1.5 million in the 1970s to fewer than 700,000 today.

Iain Douglas-Hamilton, an elephant expert, said the burn was "immensely important" and he hoped it would help make people in ivory-consuming nations aware that if they "buy, wear or sell ivory, they're helping kill elephants."

Moi said he also will destroy 270 rhino horns Kenya confiscated from poachers, but did not say when.

Despite a rhino horn trading ban, Africa's rhino population has dwindled from 65,000 in the early 1970s to an estimated 4,000.

Conservationists say the ban has failed because the horn is still highly prized in the Far East, where it is sold in powdered form as an aphrodisiac.

Moi said his government will continue to destroy all ivory confiscated within its borders.

"I hope our action will help persuade others to appreciate the urgent need to take drastic steps to halt the wanton slaughter of elephants by declining to trade in ivory and its products both within Africa and beyond," Moi said.

The ivory burned Tuesday represented four years' worth of tusks confiscated from poachers.

More than 600 gallons of gasoline fueled the fire, since ivory only burns under intense heat. The top half of the pyre was blackened after about an hour.

Richard Leakey, Kenya's director of wildlife, said the government has increased the number of game patrols and he said poaching has fallen drastically in the past two months.

About 300 elephants were killed in the first five months of 1989.

Ivory fetches \$109 to \$154 a pound on the world market, with the higher prices going for the increasingly rare larger tusks. An average tusk weighs nearly 11 pounds, down from nearly 22 pounds a decade ago.

Kenya has joined a growing list of countries that support a worldwide ban on the ivory trade. Conservationists say the ban would likely work because the elephant tusk is used only for decorative purposes.

The EEC, Japan and the United States buy up to 75 percent of ivory on world markets. But in June, the United States, Japan, the 12-nation European Economic Community, Switzerland and Canada imposed bans on ivory imports.

The Lausanne, Switzerland-based 102-nation Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species will meet in October to consider a worldwide ban.

Zimbabwe, South Africa and Botswana oppose the ban. They say they have successfully protected their elephants while herds in other African nations have declined.

U.N. Chief Opens Talks In Namibia

WINDHOEK, Namibia — U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar today began three days of talks aimed at resolving what he called "critical problems" in a yearlong independence plan for Namibia.

The United Nations chief met with senior U.N. officials in the territory. He was scheduled to hold talks with all major political parties and Namibia's South African administrator, Louis Pienaar.

"I want to ensure that conditions are created that will enable the holding of free and fair elections" in November, Perez de Cuellar said upon his arrival in Namibia late Tuesday night.

South Africa, which has ruled Namibia since World War I, agreed in December to carry out the U.N. independence plan under terms of a regional peace accord. Under the U.S.-brokered pact, South Africa also pledged to halt aid to guerrillas battling the Angolan government.

In exchange, the agreement stipulated that the estimated 50,000 Cuban troops supporting the Angolan government would be withdrawn.

More than 5,000 U.N. personnel are in Namibia to monitor the independence process in the territory. Perez de Cuellar indicated the independence plan is on track but said "critical problems remain."

He did not elaborate, but the remark was interpreted as a reference to mutual suspicion between Namibia's South African ad-

ministration and the South-West Africa People's Organization, or SWAPO, the group favored in the elections. SWAPO fought a 23-year guerrilla war in an effort to drive out the South Africans.

On Tuesday, SWAPO accused Pienaar of creating a "war hysteria" by claiming 1,900 SWAPO fighters were massed near the Angola-Namibia border.

SWAPO and U.N. officials said they found nothing to support the claims during a visit to northern Namibia over the weekend.

More than 1,000 armed guerrillas crossed into Namibia on April 1, the day the independence plan took effect.

Nicaragua Marks 10th Year Under Rule Of Sandinistas

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — The leftist Sandinista government marks a decade in power today, but many Nicaraguans have little to celebrate in a country that now ranks among the poorest in the world.

Banks, businesses and government offices closed to commemorate July 19, 1979, when the victorious Sandinista rebels marched into Managua to take power two days after dictator Anastasio Somoza fled.

The government said it expected more than 300,000 people for an anniversary rally at the Plaza of the Revolution. That would be about one-tenth Nicaragua's population and nearly one-third of the capital's.

La Voz de Nicaragua, the official radio station, took precautions. Spots broadcast Tuesday urged: "Everybody to the plaza tomorrow! And if it rains? That's no excuse. Everybody to the plaza!"

Red-and-black flags of the ruling Sandinista National Liberation Front and blue-and-white Nicaraguan flags draped the review stand, a bunker-like building built into a small hill in front of Lake Managua.

Some Managua residents predicted most of those at the rally would be Sandinista militants or public employees afraid of losing their government jobs if they failed to attend.

"Five years ago, people were still very enthusiastic about the revolution," a technician who did not want his name used said Tuesday. "People would paint and fix their houses, and neighbors would tell each other, 'Let's go to the plaza.'"

"But Managua has been deteriorating. People are now feeling the weight of the revolution."

"The people you're going to find at the rally tomorrow are the Sandinistas and those who have to go because they work for the state."

An economic report underwritten by Sweden, Nicaragua's main non-communist supporter, said last year's per capita output was \$300, making Nicaragua poorer even than Haiti, long the poorest country in

this hemisphere with a per capita gross national product of \$330.

When the Sandinistas marched into Managua 10 years ago, huge numbers of people surged through the capital to give them a joyous reception after a civil war that claimed an estimated 50,000 lives.

"When the revolution happened, people were happy because all this killing was going to stop," said Socorro, 43, a cleaning woman at a private business who asked that her last name not be used. "But these people (Sandinistas) have taken another road."

prices, shot up at an annual rate of 40.3 percent.

However, energy prices at the consumer level actually fell by 1 percent in June, the biggest decline since a 1.9 percent drop in October 1986.

Food costs, which had been climbing at the fastest pace since 1980, moderated as well in June, rising by

just 0.2 percent, reflecting a declining impact from last summer's drought.

While both food and energy prices moderated in June, other costs were held in check as well. The Consumer Price Index, excluding food and energy, rose only 0.2 percent in June, down from a 0.5 percent advance in May.

Food prices edged up just 0.2 percent in June.

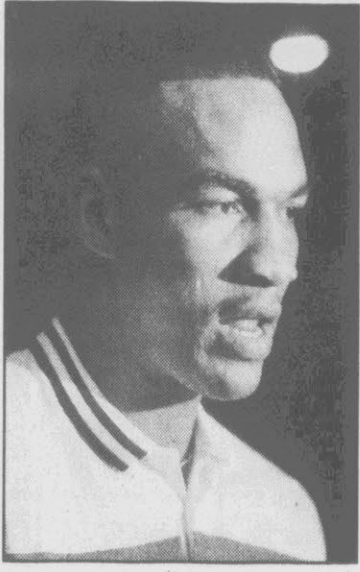

Talks Under Way Between Jazz, Edwards

Ex-ECU Star's Agent Confident Of Agreement Before Fall Camp

Blue Edwards' agent and Utah Jazz officials are talking, but the team's rookie and free agent camp is going on without Edwards for now.

"Let's just say we have a dialogue going, but it has not yet produced a contract as yet," William Pollak, Edwards' agent, said. "I'm very confident Blue will be in training camp, but I'm not sure how to categorize negotiations."

"There doesn't seem to be any obstruction. We have a view of what Blue Edwards is worth, and Utah has their view. And that's what

negotiations are all about."

Edwards was taken by the Jazz with the 21st selection July 25, but the former East Carolina University basketball star still hasn't set foot in the state of Utah.

Other draftees have also been slow to sign.

As of right now, only one of the 27 first-round selections has finalized a contract. Mookie Blaylock, the 12th overall, agreed to a deal with the New Jersey Nets that will pay him a little more than \$2 million over four years.

Utah opened its rookie/free agent camp this week. Edwards, though, won't attend without a contract. The team's regular pre-season training camp opens Oct. 8.

"I just try to stay in shape and be ready once I do sign," Edwards said. "It is a big waiting game. My agent is doing a good job of informing me about what is going on. I've got a general idea of how negotiations are going."

Utah's first pick a year ago, 6-11 center Eric Leckner, was taken with the 17th pick in the first round. He signed for \$1.1 million over three years. Centers traditionally command a bigger market value than other position players.

Pollak, of Professional Management in Washington, D.C., represents Edwards, along with fellow first-round picks Nick Anderson of Orlando (the 11th pick) and George

McCloud of Indiana (the seventh pick).

Last year, Utah's two early picks were Eric Leckner and Jose Ortiz, a 6-10 center-forward from Oregon State. Leckner signed early while Ortiz signed late after playing for Spain in the Seoul Olympics.

After the Jazz selected Edwards in the draft, Scott Layden, Utah's player personnel director and assistant coach, said it was important to Edwards' development that he attend the team's rookie/free agent camp.

"What would you expect them to say," Pollak said. "That's a company line."

One standard determinant of market value is what other relative picks sign for. In Edwards' case, what Jeff Sanders, who was taken by Chicago with the 20th pick, or

Byron Irvin, who was taken by Portland with the 22nd pick, sign for could have an impact.

"It has an effect," Pollak said. "It is a factor to put into the equation, but it alone doesn't determine anything. They drafted Blue. They didn't draft Sanders."

Phil Marantz, a Beverly Hills' lawyer who is the legal counsel for the Jazz and handles their contract negotiations, was unavailable for comment Tuesday.

Failing Career, Marital Woes Pushed Moore To Kill Himself

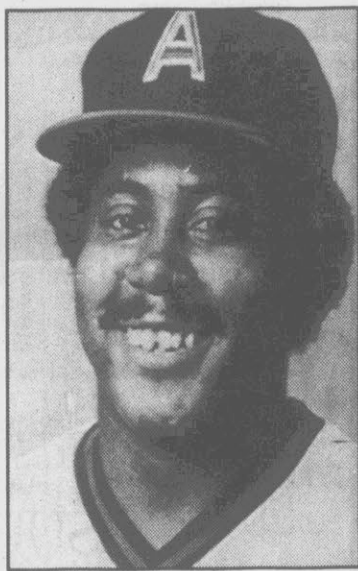
ANAHEIM, Calif. — Tormented by the memory of one pitch and despondent over his failing career and marital troubles, former California Angels pitcher Donnie Moore shot his wife numerous times before killing himself.

"All indications are that Donnie Moore and his wife, Tonya, became involved in an argument, and during the argument, Mr. Moore produced a handgun, shot his estranged wife and then turned the gun on himself," Anaheim Police Lt. Marc Hedgpeth said.

Tonya Moore, 35, was in critical condition early today suffering from at least three gunshot wounds in the upper chest and stomach, Hedgpeth said after the shooting Tuesday afternoon at the couple's home in the affluent Peralta Hills area of Anaheim.

Their 17-year-old daughter drove her wounded mother to nearby Kaiser Permanente Hospital. The couple's two sons, ages 7 and 10, also were at the house during the shooting, but none of the children were hurt.

The 35-year-old Moore was released last month by the Kansas City Royals' minor league team in Omaha. He had been plagued by injuries during his last years in the

major leagues and saw yet another comeback attempt dissolve when he was released by the Royals' organization.

He also had separated from his wife of 16 years about a month ago, said Moore's New York-based agent, Dave Pinter.

Moore was released from the Angels in 1988, two years after he carried California to within one strike of the 1986 World Series, a loss that tortured him through the years.

With the Angels ahead three games to one in the best-of-seven American League playoffs, Moore, pitching with a sore right shoulder, had a 5-4 lead, with two outs and two strikes on Boston's Dave Henderson in the top of the ninth inning of Game 5. But Henderson then hit a Moore forkball for a two-run homer that gave the Red Sox a 6-5 lead.

The Angels sent the game into extra innings, and once again Henderson victimized Moore, with a sacrifice fly in the top of the 11th that lifted the Red Sox to a 7-6 victory.

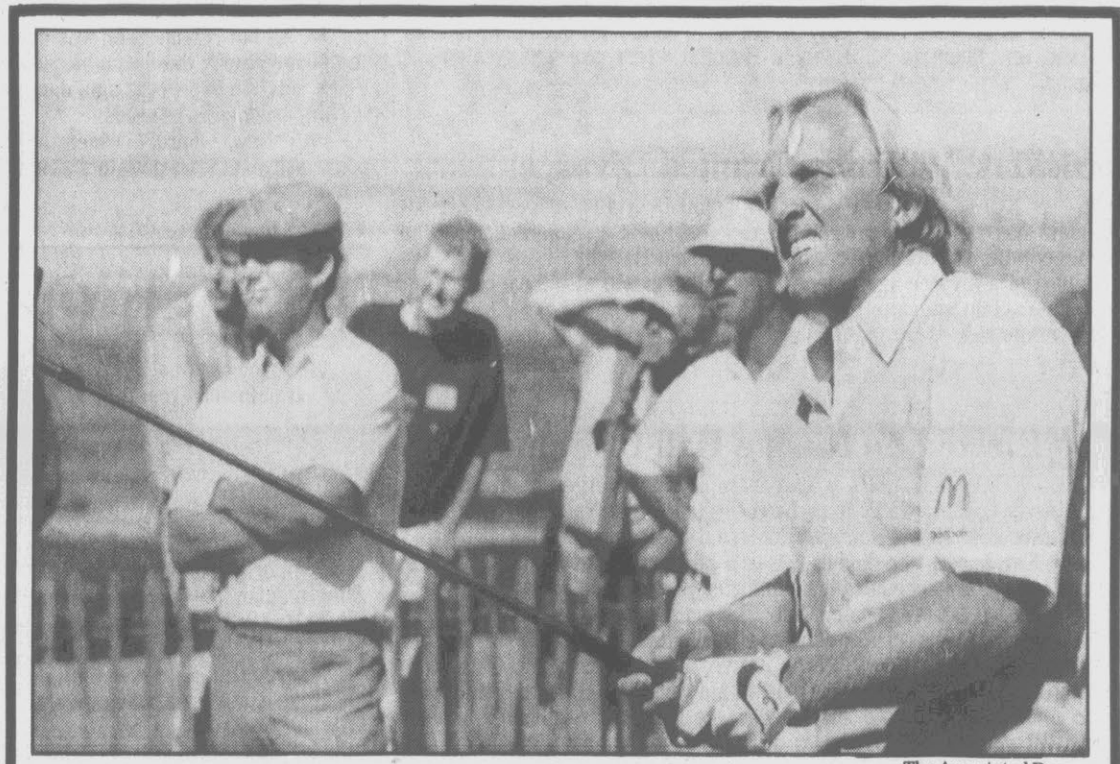
The Red Sox won the next two games in Boston and moved into the World Series, which they lost to the New York Mets.

"Everything revolved around one ... pitch," California veteran Brian Downing said in a somber Angel clubhouse in Toronto, where the players heard of their former teammate's death after their 1-0 victory over the Blue Jays.

"You (to reporters) destroyed a man's life over one pitch. The guy was just not the same after that," Downing said. "I never ever saw the guy be credited for getting us to the playoffs because all you ever heard about, all you ever read about, was one pitch."

Pinter also said Moore was haunted by the pitch.

American Hopes Doomed?

Odds makers Are Betting Against A U.S. Champion

TRON, Scotland — At first, there was open-mouthed amazement and disbelief, then growing acceptance of the long odds against an American winning the 118th British Open Golf Championship.

"Get to the bookies before they change their minds," Tom Watson advised when informed that Britain's legal bookmakers have set odds of 5-2 against an American — any American — winning the oldest of the world's golf titles.

"I'm tired of hearing about how they're better than we are. They're good players, yes. Some great players. But I don't think they're any better than we are," Mark Calcavecchia said Tuesday after a practice round for the tournament that begins Thursday at Royal Troon.

"They don't make many mistakes, but I wonder if that is realistic," said Tom Kite, the year's leading money-winner on the American tour. "We're not a bunch of dogs. We can play the game a little, too, you know."

But Curtis Strange, the two-time U.S. Open champion and one of the leading contenders for the old claret jug that goes to the

winner of this ancient event, took a different view.

"Maybe," Strange suggested after some consideration, "those are the right odds."

"For one thing, the numbers work against us. There's 156 in the field and, what, 40 Americans? So the numbers are not in our favor."

And there are at least two other factors, Strange said, that work against American chances. Actually, there are three, if recent history is included. Americans, who once dominated this event, have not won the British Open since 1983.

There are five players, Strange said, generally considered to be in a group by themselves at the top of the world standings.

They include defending champion Seve Ballesteros of Spain, Masters champion Nick Faldo

LeMond Increases His Lead

BRIANCON, France — Greg LeMond, the leader of the Tour de France after 16 stages, knows the most important is No. 17.

The leader with seven stages to go, LeMond finished fourth in Tuesday's 16th stage from Gap to Briancon to increase his overall lead to 53 seconds. He said today's stage through the Alps will all but decide who will wear the yellow jersey following Sunday's final leg.

LeMond, the 1986 champion who is making a comeback following two years of misfortune and injury, says No. 17 is the toughest test in the 2,020-mile race.

"The most difficult stage of the Tour is going to be l'Alpe d'Huez," LeMond said. "It will really separate a

lot of people at the top. There are steep enough climbs you think you can't make them."

The 100-mile leg is marked by four climbs, three of which are off the scale of difficulty and steepness being rated "Out of Category."

That includes the final 6-mile climb to the 5,940-foot peak with 21 switchbacks.

But LeMond has some good memories of l'Alpe d'Huez. In 1986, his victory was assured when he climbed to the top together with five-time champion Bernard Hinault.

Since then LeMond has not returned as he missed the last two Tours. A hunting accident sprayed him with shotgun pellets in 1987 and he had an emergency appendectomy in 1988 along with leg problems.

Williams Rips Tyson

Challenger Tired Of The Champ

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — Mike Tyson is not an ideal heavyweight champion in the eyes of challenger Carl "The Truth" Williams.

In the eyes of Home Box Office, the cable television network, however, the 23-year-old heavyweight champion is a meal ticket worth keeping.

So talks have been held concerning a lifetime contract between HBO and Tyson, who will defend the title against Williams Friday night at the Convention Center.

Williams told reporters on Tuesday that he believes the media is growing tired of Tyson.

"I know that you, like myself, would like to see him closed down," Williams said. "It's that time."

"A champion has to conduct himself like a champion. I feel that he doesn't and I'm sure you do, too."

Tyson scoffed at Williams' comments.

"Williams is talking all that garbage," Tyson said. "We'll see how he looks after he's been bashed around a little bit."

Tyson was a 12½-1 favorite to win the fifth fight in his current eight-bout, \$26.5 million deal with HBO.

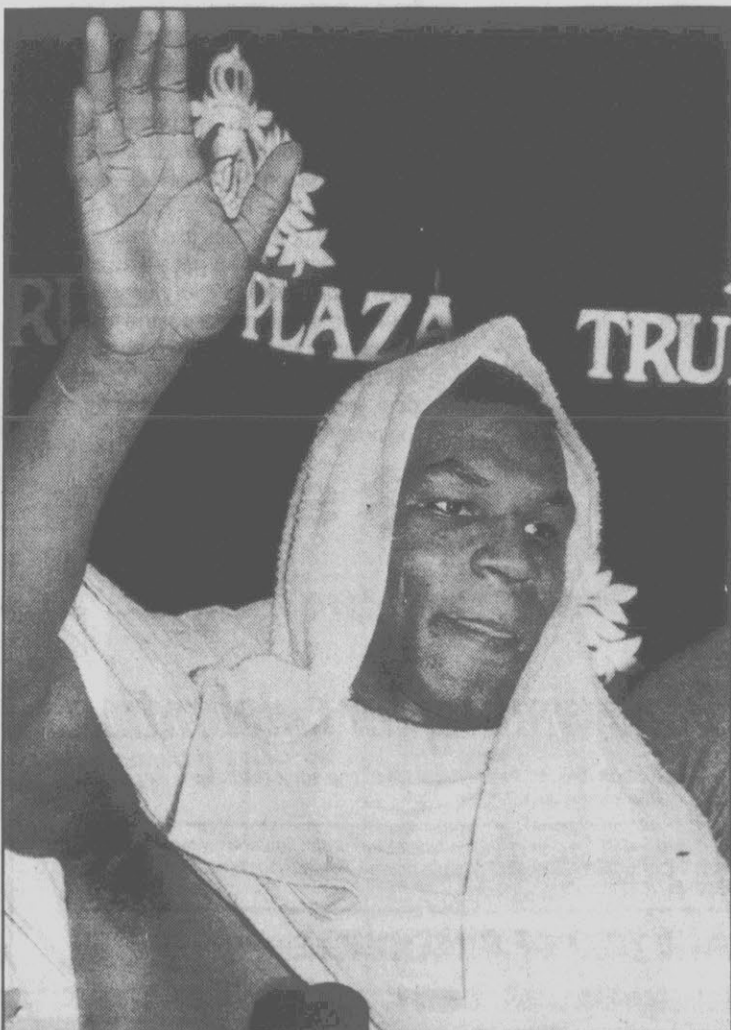
"We have not discussed dollars," Seth Abraham, HBO vice president, said of the proposed lifetime deal, which he has discussed with Tyson and promoter Don King on one hand, and with Tyson's estranged manager, Bill Cayton, on the other.

"The promoter has Mike's mind, body and spirit," Abraham said. "The manager has a contract."

Abraham said it was Tyson who mentioned a lifetime contract when a meeting was held last Oct. 26 at Las Vegas in an unsuccessful attempt to solve the dispute among King, Tyson and Cayton.

"Mike was talking about loyalty," Abraham recalled. "He said HBO was loyal and I don't care if I fight for anybody other than HBO. Let's do a lifetime deal."

Under a suggested format, Abraham said, Tyson "would fight three times a year on HBO and every 18 months he would be able to do a pay-per-view fight. HBO would have the production and the delayed broadcast rights."

NFL Moves Slowly

Dissident Owners Still Holding Out

SCHAUMBURG, Ill. — In his 29 years as commissioner, Pete Rozelle has usually been able to get the NFL owners to move on with their business.

Now that Rozelle has announced his resignation, business is moving a lot slower.

The owners met for six hours on Tuesday without reaching agreement on the creation of a new international league, although its backers seemed confident it will be approved.

Nor was any progress made in overcoming the impasse over the election of Rozelle's successor. It developed two weeks ago when 11 dissident owners kept Jim Finks from getting the 19 votes necessary to be elected commissioner.

Several of the 11, including Jerry Jones of Dallas and Patrick Bowlen of Denver, met with Rozelle on Tuesday after originally being scheduled to meet with members of the so-called "old guard" search committee that settled on Finks, the president of the New Orleans Saints.

But the dissidents weren't specific.

"We're being involved in the process," Jones said. Asked if there was any plan to work out a compromise, he replied: "There is no plan, just a real good effort to get a new commissioner. I'm confident we'll get one."

"Discussions are going on," added Mike Lynn of Minnesota, one of the leaders of the dissidents. "This will work itself out."

Rozelle was hardly more specific and said he would continue to meet with the dissidents.

"During the course of the day I had the chance to meet with some of them," he said. "I can't predict anything any more than you can. Progress? I'm still talking."

The international league proposal was to return to the table today with Tex Schramm, its commissioner, and Dan Rooney of Pittsburgh, a spokesman for the NFL's advisory committee on the league, expressing confidence it would get the 21 votes necessary for implementation.

Rooney, also a member of the commissioner search committee, said in a reference to the Finks vote: "After last week, I've learned never to anticipate what will happen in this league."

As part of a divorce agreement, Mrs. Williams will also have custody of the couple's child, said attorney Lewis Unglesby.

The settlement was to be finalized after being signed by the judge, said Unglesby.

Two Elected To Racing Hall Of Fame

DARLINGTON, S.C. (AP) — Two champions from different eras and different parts of the country have been elected to the National Motorsports Press Association Hall of Fame, officials said Tuesday.

Ralph Earnhardt, who died in 1973 of a heart attack at the age of 45, and Jerry Cook, 45, are scheduled to be inducted into the Hall of Fame on Sept. 2 at the Florence County Country Club. The induction is scheduled for the eve of the 40th annual Southern 500 at nearby Darlington Raceway.

Earnhardt, a Kannapolis, N.C., native, was the father of three-time Winston Cup champion Dale Earnhardt. He won NASCAR's national sportman division title in 1956, driving cars he built and engineered himself. Earnhardt won 32 races on 11 tracks en route to the championship.

"Ever since Henderson's home run, he was extremely depressed," Pinter said. "He blamed himself for the Angels not going to the World Series."

"Even when he was told that one pitch doesn't make a season, he couldn't get over it. That home run killed him."

Neighbors said Tonya Moore had spoken with them about her husband's career and also told them of their marital problems.

"He abused her," said Betty Bailey, who lives nearby. "She said he beat her up and left bruises."

Pinter, speaking by phone from New York, said his client had not given up on his career. The agent had spoken to Moore on the phone just hours before the shooting, and said there was no indication anything was wrong.

"He seemed fine," Pinter said. "We were just going over everything in general. He was running, lifting weights, just trying to get his comeback in order. He was having domestic problems, having problems with his career."

Pinter said he had been talking with the Houston Astros about finding a place for Moore in their organization.

"Bob Watson (Houston assistant general manager) was interested and said that he would get him a AAA spot as soon as something opened up and bring him up maybe in September for the pennant race," Pinter said.

Moore had also discussed going to Puerto Rico this fall for the winter leagues.

Moore set Angel records in 1985 by recording 31 saves and finishing 57 games.

The native of Lubbock, Texas, also played for the Chicago Cubs, St. Louis Cardinals, Milwaukee Brewers and Atlanta Braves during a major league career that spanned 13 years.

Finks Holds Up Under Pressure

SCHAUMBURG, Ill. — If he hasn't demonstrated it before, Jim Finks has now shown he has the stuff to be NFL commissioner.

Having had his life put in limbo two weeks ago by 11 owners who want a larger say in the future of the league, the president of the New Orleans Saints showed up at Tuesday's league meeting in good spirits.

He entered the session — called to discuss the new international football league — with a smile on his face, greeting a few reporters but saying nothing of substance. A couple of hours later, he came out smiling and said to the cameras that clustered around:

"A terse no comment."
Is there any other candidate with a similar sense of satire? Is there any other candidate who can retain his composure while dealing with the anarchy that has beset the NFL?

Consider what the new commissioner faces:

— A dissident "New Guard" which includes Joe Robbie, 73; Hugh Culverhouse, 70; Robert Irsay and Bud Adams, each 66, and Ken Behring, 60. All but Adams, who was absent, were among those who blocked Finks' election two weeks ago, denying him the 19 votes he needs.

— A "New Guard," which appoints as two of its negotiators Beh-

ring and Dallas' Jerry Jones, who have each been in the league less than a year. Another is Denver's Patrick Bowlen, who alienated most of the other owners by pushing through an 80-man training camp roster to save money, then making an offer to Buffalo's Bruce Smith a day later for \$7.5 million over five years.

— A dissident group whose most ambitious member, San Francisco's Edward DeBartolo Jr., shows up only for a meeting of the antis and leaves before the regular league meeting begins. Another "leader," Norman Braman of Philadelphia, considers the session so important that he is spending the time in the south of France.

In fact, the existence of the group at all is due in part to personal squabbles.

Tampa's Culverhouse, for example, was one of the most powerful owners in the league until a few months ago, when he surrendered his league chores in a huff. He is angriest at three members of the commissioner search committee — Art Modell of Cleveland, Wellington Mara of the New York Giants and Dan Rooney of Pittsburgh — because he thinks they were critical of his role as chairman of the NFL Management Council during the 1987 players strike.

England, Sandy Lyle of Scotland, Australian Greg Norman and Strange.

"There's five and there's only one American among them. So the numbers work against us there, too," Strange said.

And there are the unusually dry, hard conditions, the result of a drought and heat wave on the Ayrshire coast along the Firth of Clyde.

It was at this point that Watson, who scored the fourth of his five British Open titles here in 1982, agreed about the odds.

"These are links courses and links conditions," Watson said. "You have to play a different game, play the low shot and run the ball into the green, play the bounces."

"How often do we play these conditions? Not often. How often do the Europeans play these conditions, play links courses? A lot more than we do."

"So if there is an advantage, it has to go to people more familiar with the conditions."

Norman agreed, calling it "a home court advantage."

"We just don't play these conditions that often," Strange said. "If it favors anybody, it favors someone from over here."

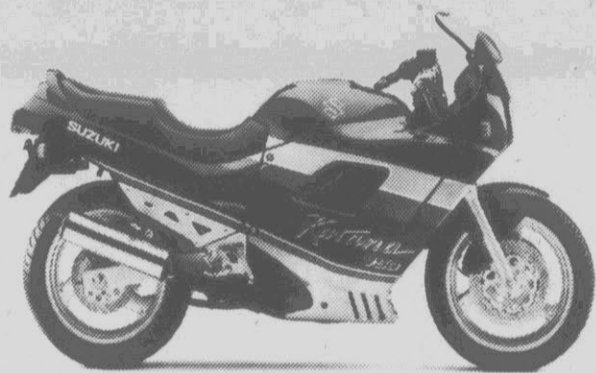
He quickly added, however, that the entire situation — Americans vs. non-Americans — is one that interests the public, press and oddsmakers much more than it does the players.

Arsenio Hall Fights Image As Pretender

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. — The gray-on-gray waiting room for "The Arsenio Hall Show" was icily elegant: wraparound sofas; a glossy wet bar; artful cantaloupe slices that former "Diff'rent Strokes" ingenue Dana Plato scarfed after confiding to 4 million viewers how special it was, sitting gap-legged and panty-free in a recent Playboy.

Then everybody saw the mouse. It sat, ignoring the photographer who leaped onto an ottoman, the reporter who dived for a table. Leisurely, as if it had every right to hang out among the semi-famous, the ultra-hip, the mouse glanced left, then right. It sniffed an open case of Soave wine and vanished.

Hall harrumphed in triumph. "I told you there was a mouse in this joint," he announced to his publicist. "Two weeks ago I saw it, but did you believe me when I told you?"

"Nobody around here takes me seriously." Believe that, you probably swallow the fascinated way Hall leans forward, elbows on his Armani-kneecaps, when celebs chatter about life in the fame lane. Because Hall has the best — and in this town, perhaps the only — guarantee for getting taken very, very seriously: a hit.

The Nielsens show that Hall's self-proclaimed, six-month-old "talk show for the MTV crowd" has strutted past David Letterman's and Pat Sajak's talkfests and is inching up on Johnny the Great's (three weeks ago Hall's show whipped Johnny's for the first time in New York). Stars like Anita Baker, Tony Danza and Farrah Fawcett call him to be on his show. Supermarket tabloids won't leave him alone ("ARSENIO PURSUES ROBIN GIVENS! ROARS IRON MIKE: 'LL KILL HIM!'").

Hall is hot. He just finished filming a role in "Harlem Nights," best pal Eddie Murphy's directorial debut costarring Redd Foxx, Richard Pryor and Murphy, and set for a Christmas release. Last month, he started cutting an album for MCA as "Chunky A" (short for Chunkton Arthur Hall), his own humongous, long-lost half-brother. (Hall wore a "fat suit" to introduce Chunky and his theme-phrase — "Chunky A is love, the overweight D.J. sent from above" — on a recent show.)

Hall's so hot that he says he doesn't have time to worry about being sued for \$10 million by Willis Edwards, head of the Beverly Hills-Hollywood NAACP, who claims that Hall defamed him last January by calling him an "extortionist" in a story in the Los Angeles Sentinel — an allegation Hall denies. Edwards last year accused Hall of not having enough black producers, directors or writers on the show's staff; Hall says that at least 30 percent of those staff positions are filled by blacks.

But that suit might help explain why Hall has largely traded his habit of trashing friends, foes and himself in interviews for the rudiments of a protective cover. "Why won't you tell me who you're seeing?" begs a reporter accustomed to the old Hall, who'd provided everything from insights on his sexual escapades to his mom's phone number. "Because you're trying to play me out in a national (publication) and I've got to watch myself," he responds.

These days, he has no intention of letting you know how worried he is, how angry. He'd rather you be taken in by that "see-all-my-gums?" grin; the schoolboy charm that allows him to get away with asking Brooke Shields if she's still a virgin and playing such flagrant on-air footsie with actress Emma Samms that everybody watching knew they'd had an affair.

But no matter how popular or charming he is, how distractingly naughty, one thing is clear: Hall knows that to some of his critics, he's like the waiting-room mouse — an undisputed attention-grabber who slipped into the wrong neighborhood.

And it drives him crazy. "This is my place," he says. "I invite people to my place, not necessarily to do an interview — I'm not a journalist — but to have conversations. I supply the keyhole for America to peep through and see their favorites talking."

Hall's problem is that nobody as def as he is has ever supplied the keyhole. Proof: The star actually uses the term — which in street vernacular connotes cool, great, the ultimate — on the show. ("For those

of you who are confused," he explained once after bandying the term with actor-hooper Gregory Hines, "we are not referring to the hearing-impaired.")

And some audiences and critics — older, often white, decidedly un-def — don't get it.

Some have complained that the show's frankly black sensibility — Hall consistently features African American celebs and music acts, and is more likely to joke about James Brown and Whitney Houston than about Dan Quayle or Ollie North — excludes them. They say that watching Hall's show is a bit like hanging out at a party to which they weren't invited, one where they're the least-hip people in the room.

Implicit in such complaints, says Hall, his voice going Dirty Harry soft, is the assumption that it's fine for shows like Carson's or Letterman's to consistently feature a white sensibility, and that it's okay for blacks, Hispanics and other minorities to do the adjusting.

"That mentality keeps television from expanding to higher levels, and expanding to other people," he says. Because white people who feel that way, he says, obviously can't imagine "what it's been like for us for all these years."

He wishes his critics would "sit down for a minute and try to understand my show as a huge amount of white America is doing, like I did when I watched my first Bob Hope special, my first 'Three Stooges.' ... My whole culturization requires that I understand everything that America is."

To drive the point home, Hall, who often searches pop culture for a witness, finds one in the lyrics to a song popularized by four fairly def white boys:

"I am black, offering a theory," he says. "Let's come together, right now, over me."

Now, even true believers may have some reservations about Hall's late-night love-in, syndicated six days weekly on 160 stations nationwide (that's 95 percent of U.S. markets), by Paramount Domestic Television, in association with Arsenio Hall Communications Ltd. Some decry his fidget-inducing penchant for over-complimenting guests; others feel his outrageousness occasionally backfires (guest Jesse Jackson's first reaction to Hall's gift of a bucket of chicken was to recoil, though he kept hope alive by munching his way through the appearance). Others wonder about the open-lap policy that encourages actresses like Mary Frann, Sally Kirkland and "Falcon Crest's" Ana Alicia to ogle, sit on or otherwise woman-handle the acquiescent Hall.

But to fans, none of this does much damage. Because even when Hall's at his naughtiest — cranking his arm and barking his trademark nasty-dog bark (his studio audience, TV's noisiest, also yaps, howls and cranks its approval), or explaining to females why their boyfriends are unfazed by skepticism about LaToya Jackson's cleavage ("Men don't care if she bought them"), he manages to seem, well, mischievous. Like the preschooler who suggests to your great Aunt Ida that she pass on the lemonade because "Mommy says you drink too much."

Hall's willingness to make mistakes, to be open enough to let audiences peep through the keyhole, could be his biggest weakness. It's also his greatest strength. The resulting lack of pretense, of defenses, ultimately puts guests — and many viewers — on his side.

"He's like a little kid who's about to get into some devilment," says fan La Rhonda Whitehead, a Detroit singer who was among several stars of the stage show "Don't Get God Started," who met Hall recently in Los Angeles. "Like, you can't get mad at him, you know?"

Who could get mad at a guy who, in an effort not to ego-trip ("I'm saving the clippings and tapes so I can trip later"), devised a plan to help kids stay away from drugs? "Right now I've got the ear of America's 18- to 34-year-olds, so ... when I'm not doing the show, I'm trying to figure out what else I can do to help. That's how I came up with my whole drug campaign." With Paramount's help, Hall filmed a series of stark, black-and-white commercials in which he talks with young addicts about the horrors of drug addiction. Currently, the spots are airing on MTV, VH-1 and various independent stations across the country.

How could anybody not love a guy

Popularity Of Stand-Up On The Rise

Stand-up comedy, increasingly popular nationwide, is picking up steam locally, too. Each Wednesday and Friday night, area comedy lovers stand in line at the Attic in Greenville and other clubs around the southeast to see the Comedy Zone.

Joe Tronto, manager of the Attic, says the attendance for the Comedy Zone has skyrocketed: "It's my most consistent night."

The Attic is one of 68 southeastern locations in a network of clubs associated with Creative Booking Services, a subsidiary of Creative Entertainment in Charlotte.

Tom Haines, booking agent and comic evaluator for Creative Booking and owner of the Attic, says the Comedy Zone network reaches from Maryland to Florida and from the coast to the Mississippi River.

He called comedy is the top-growth industry in the entertainment business.

"It is definitely the entertainment of the '80s," Haines said.

One reason for the growth of comedy clubs, Haines says, is stricter drinking and driving laws. Calling comedy "non-drunk oriented type of entertainment," he points out that average alcohol sales are only about two drinks per person.

"It's like going to a movie,"

Haines said of stand-up. "It has a definite beginning and ending."

Lines have gotten so long at the Attic, that the club added Wednesday night to its comedy schedule and began opening an hour earlier. When the Comedy Zone started at the Attic 2½ years ago it attracted 100 to 150 people. More than 300 attend each show now.

The Comedy Zone at the Attic was recently named Comedy Club of the Month and has also received a national honor. The audiences at the Attic generated more votes for top male and female stand-up comics than any club in the country. The Attic gained mention on the American Comedy Awards show.

The largest crowd at the Attic turned out to see Rich Schydner, a nationally known comedian. About 350 fans were brought in, Tronto said, while the club had to turn more than 100 away from the door.

The market for comedians is steadily growing. Haines says his company has more than 900 comics on its computer rolls, employing 240 every month.

Some of the big names are Kevin Hughes, Lance Montalto, Todd Yohn, Scott Shaw and Schydner. Yohn is the most popular comedian at the Attic, according to Tronto.

Whoever headlines locally, the crowds are steadily growing. And one reason, Haines says, is because comedy helps alleviate stress.

"Laughter is healthy," he says, "Everybody should pick out a night and catch a show."

Comic Is 'The Far Side' On Feet

He is, The Washington Post says, "The Far Side" on feet. And after seeing a show this weekend at the Attic, Greenville-area comedy fans would probably agree.

"My brother just got a new job," says Chip Franklin. "He always wanted to work with animals ... so now he's a chef."

Not an ordinary funny man by any means, the Washington, D.C. comic says he enjoys challenging his audience. And although he was scheduled to be taped for a Showtime special during his performance at the Attic, the network's no-show didn't slow him a bit.

Franklin has a very droll, dry sense of humor. And his favorite trick seems to be catching an audience by surprise, forcing them to think about the unthinkable.

"I like to do that kind of material," he says in reference to the joke about his brother. "People

don't want to think about animals being cut up but it happens."

He loves to throw a curve. "I used to have a cat," he told the Attic crowd, "but it recently died."

The audience was sympathetic. "He had nine lives," Franklin added, "but the truck had 18 wheels."

Franklin says he doesn't like to take refuge in typical comedy material, which may be why he picked up The Washington Post nickname, but his own brand of humor seems to work well.

He has made appearances on the MTV Funny Papers, The Half-Hour Comedy Break, Showtime, The Comedy Club Network, NBC's Funny People and George Slater's Comedy Club, not to mention a bit role in the movie "Foul Play."

"I don't do that stuff like 'Why do fat people always make funny noises in elevators,'" he says. "To be good you really have to be different."

"Sex is probably 50 to 75 percent of every stand-up comic's materi-

al. But not good stand-up comics. I don't write that much about your stereotypical things."

Franklin says he would like to appear on the "Tonight Show" but thinks "Late Night with David Letterman" would be better suited to his style. He scoffs at the mention of the upstart "Arsenio Hall Show."

"The show is so sophomoric," he says. "The laughs are all cheap shots. He's still doing Rob Lowe jokes."

Phil Tagliaserri, the comedian who opened for Franklin at the Comedy Zone last week, made several remarks about the actor.

Franklin admits that his comedy doesn't go over well with everyone. "It's definitely a matter of taste," he says.

"A woman came up to me after a show and told me 'You should see a psychiatrist.' Well I'm not ashamed to say I've seen a psychiatrist. It's a good way to get to know yourself — and the court made it a condition."

Franklin says that he has depended on show business for his

income for years. He is a former rock-and-roll band member and used to play at Wrong Way Corrigan's, a local bar.

In addition to stand-up comedy Franklin has written columns for the Washington Post, several short stories and is currently working on a novel. He has also had a cartoon published in The New Yorker.

Franklin has played in cities like New York, Boston, Baltimore, Washington D.C. and Cleveland. But he says he likes to play the smaller cities, especially in the South.

"The South is a lot hipper than people think," he says. "I did a show in Rascals in New Jersey — stupidest people I've ever met. The South is a lot better, comedy audience wise, than the Northeast. Catch a Rising Star in New York City is the worst place to work. Because it's stupid people from New Jersey coming over ..."

Franklin says that music is his first love but he enjoys comedy. "In comedy you're paid to create," he says. "In music you're paid to copy."

Dear Wondering: I think it is very much OK to inquire, provided the question is asked discreetly and in a courteous manner.

'Cat's Paw' Pattern Adds A Pretty Touch

Enjoy being a girl! This lovely, feminine, knit pullover pairs beautifully with soft summer skirts, pants or shorts, and can also be an elegant sweater for gala evenings any time of year.

A fascinating "cat's paw" pattern panel adorns the front and back of the sweater, which also features an unusual band of ribbing on the bottom and sleeves. Yet another pretty touch is a delicate picot trim on the softly rounded neckline. Both pattern stitches are fun to knit and aren't too difficult.

The gauge in stockinette stitch is five stitches to the inch, and easy-to-follow directions are written for small, medium and large sizes with finished bust measurements of 36, 38 and 40 inches respectively.

Dear Pat: I recently found — in a specialty boutique — a hand-knit sweater that I am wild about. It has a ribbing that looks as if it had been done in smocking. Have you ever seen such a stitch, and if so, how is it done? — Marcia M., Seattle

Dear Marcia: You're in luck, I believe the Sheaf Stitch Ribbing in today's featured sweater is just what you're looking for. To try it out, cast on a multiple of 8 stitches plus 2 (any number of stitches evenly divisible by 8 plus 2 additional stitches). For your sample swatch, cast on 26 stitches.

The odd-numbered rows are worked on the wrong side and the even-numbered ones on the right side. Rows 1, 3 and 5 are worked as follows: Step 1 — knit 2; Step 2 —

purl 2; knit 2. Repeat Step 2 across to end of row.

Rows 2 and 4 are worked as follows: Step 1 — purl 2; Step 2 — knit 2, purl 2. Repeat Step 2 across to end of row.

Row 6 is a bit more involved, but you won't find it too difficult with a little practice. For this row, work as follows: Step 1 — purl 2. Step 2 — insert right needle from the front between the 6th and 7th stitches on the left needle and draw through a loop of yarn; Step 3 — slip this loop onto the left needle and knit it together with the first stitch on the left needle and knit it together with the first stitch on the left needle; Step 4 — knit 1, purl 2, knit 2, purl 2. Repeat Steps 2 through 4 across to end of row.

Rows 7, 9 and 11 are worked the same as Row 1. Rows 8 and 10 are worked the same as Row 2.

For Row 12, work as follows: Step 1 — purl 2, knit 2, purl 2. Steps 2 through 4 are worked the same as in Row 6. Repeat Steps 2 through 4 across to last 4 stitches and end with knit 2, purl 2. Work rows 1 through 12 once and then work Rows 1 through 8 once.

The "cat's paw" pattern stitch also used in today's featured sweater uses two decreases that may be unfamiliar to some readers. One of these is abbreviated as "ssk." To do this, slip the first and second stitches, one at a time, from left to right needle, inserting the right needle tip into each as if you were going to knit it. When both are on right needle, insert the left needle tip into the front of these two stitches and knit them together from this position.

The other, which is abbreviated as "sl 1, k2tog, pss0," is worked as follows: Slip 1 stitch, knit 2 stitches together, pass the slipped stitch off the right needle over the stitch left

after knitting 2 together, thus making a double decrease.

After completing the final row of your ribbing, you will need to work a decrease row to get the correct number of stitches to work the cat's paw pattern. Decrease row: Purl 2 stitches together, purl 8, place a marker on the needle, purl 7, place another marker on the needle, purl 9.

From this point on, work Row 1 and all odd-numbered rows and the stitches before and after the markers on the even-numbered rows in stockinette stitch. These stitches between markers form a panel done in the pattern stitch.

Pattern panel, Row 2: Knit 1, knit 2 together, yarnover, knit 1, yarnover, work the "ssk" decrease on the next 2 stitches, then knit 1.

Pattern panel, Row 4: knit 2 together, yarnover, knit 3, yarnover, work "ssk" on last 2 stitches. Pattern panel, Row 6: Knit 2, yarnover, "sl 1, k2tog, pss0," yarnover, knit 2. Repeat these 6 rows in sequence for desired length.

Andrea Koppel Is No Clone Of Her Famous Dad

BALTIMORE — "Ted Koppel's daughter." For nearly as long as Andrea Koppel can remember, she has been introduced that way.

And six months at the ABC affiliate WJZ-TV here hasn't changed that, the 25-year-old reporter learned while covering a recent Chinese student rally.

"Ted Koppel's daughter?" an incredulous student asked, a tone of reverence creeping into his voice. Despite slowly carving out her own niche here, she once again had found

herself relegated to the "daughter of" status.

"It's interesting to be Ted Koppel's daughter, but that's not all I'm about," she said after the rally. "I'd like to be known as my own person."

Then, mocking a newsman's enunciated baritone, she quipped: "But they expect me to act like Ted Koppel's daughter."

And how does Ted Koppel's daughter act?

Just like everybody else, say friends and employers. They describe her as down-to-earth, enthusiastic, bright and curious. She is willing to pay her dues, they say, and wants to avoid capitalizing on a last name that spells respectability

in TV news circles. In essence, her actions seem to say: No preferential treatment required.

Sounding more like a proud father than a hard-nosed "Nightline" host, Ted Koppel says, "Quite frankly I'm a biased viewer, but I think she's coming along very well."

Natalea Brown, news director of WJZ-TV, acknowledges, however, that if Ms. Koppel's last name had been Smith, the young reporter with less than three years' experience in radio news probably wouldn't have been granted an interview.

"You do have the advantage in interviews," Ms. Koppel concedes. "But when you get the job you have to prove yourself."

Proving herself at WJZ has meant demonstrating enthusiasm and innovation more often than the non-sense style of her father.

It was during one of Ms. Koppel's first telecasts that Ms. Brown knew the former radio reporter had the affable style to make it in local television. As the season's first snowstorm loomed, she was teased by colleagues about covering the event, which inevitably would find her on the 41st Street bridge — a rite of passage for WJZ's newest reporter. But Ms. Koppel showed up on the bridge, and on the air, seated at a breakfast table she had set up, eating croissants and drinking coffee amid falling snowflakes.

"I was totally surprised," Ms. Brown recalled. "It showed a lot of creativity and humor and a lot of moxie for someone who was there only three weeks. After that I knew she was not a miniature version of her dad."

Her zeal has not kept her from making mistakes, such as missing her deadline on a news story in which a man had barricaded his dead wife and frightened neighbors in an apartment. It was supposed to open the 6 p.m. broadcast, but Ms. Koppel was three minutes late editing the segment. The delay meant the difference between getting prime placement and being buried in the newscast.

While there have been gaffes, there also have been successes. Ms. Brown lauds Ms. Koppel's coverage of a recent house fire, where she managed to convey the story through two shots: one of the mantel, where family portraits lay among the rubble, and another of the family dog, who, unharmed, wagged his tail in the charred kitchen.

If it means sitting in the Batmobile, hopping across lily pads at the zoo or befriending a dog that sits in a golf cart, she comes back to the

station with the goods. It's all in a day's work.

Her father sees these light news stories as good experience for his daughter, whom he describes as a "real rookie."

"If you can handle those dumb feature stories with any dignity, then you can handle others later on," he said.

For much of her life, she, her three younger siblings and her mother, a lawyer, followed their journalist father from New York to Egypt to points around the globe. Despite seeing the thrills of journalism firsthand, Ms. Koppel never thought of pursuing a career in television news.

"I didn't want people thinking I was just doing it because of my dad. I almost convinced myself it (wasn't) a possibility because of him."

She attended high school in Bethesda, Md., where she was the editorial page editor of the student newspaper.

Fans Pour In To Hear The Rainmakers' Lyrics

Bob Walkenhorst, front man for the Rainmakers, says lately that he has been deluged with letters from fans. What do they ask about? His favorite color? His marital status? Career advice?

"It's always the lyrics," said the 35-year-old singer-songwriter-guitarist for the Kansas City, Mo., foursome. "They tell me what they got out of them. It's the perfect completion of the circle. I have these experiences, put them into songs, people hear them and write back to me and tell me what they mean."

The Rainmakers are a fine roots rock 'n' roll band. But Walkenhorst's witty observations and provocative messages set the group apart. Which makes Walkenhorst's anger that the lyrics are not printed on the inner sleeve of the band's third Mercury-PolyGram LP, "The Good News And The Band News," understandable. "Some cheap SOB at PolyGram decided on a policy not to print lyrics (with) LPs any more. The lyrics are included with the tape and the CD. It's punishment for people who buy albums instead of tapes or CDs."

Walkenhorst said that lack of a lyric sheet will hurt the Rainmakers in countries where English is a

foreign tongue, and particularly in No way, where the band recently spent a good chunk of a six-week European tour. "We're hot stuff there for some unknown reason, always have been, right from the word go. On our first tour of Europe, people were waiting in the snow for us."

Walkenhorst said that his songwriting technique could account for the way he connects with fans. Contrary to many tunesmiths, "I don't write until we're out touring. It's all a result of direct experience. It's just the vibe of what's going on in people's lives."

He said that while he tends to write songs "about the problems of

life," they "don't come off pessimistic. It's like, 'Hey team, let's identify the problem, discuss it and see what we can do.' The bad news is, life is tough. The good news is, you can do something about it."

The band's current single "Spend It on Love," which Walkenhorst calls "a song of conscience," is a good example. Although it spotlights the way money can distort the values of people and governments, its message is essentially positive. Two other tunes echo that theme. "Dry Dry Land" tells of a wealthy man "eaten up by self-concern," while "Horn O Plenty" makes the question of the haves vs. the have-nots personal.

"Doing what I do," Walkenhorst said, "there's always the possibility I might have a lot of money. So I'm asking, if that happens, am I gonna live up to this idealistic stuff or become an elitist rich jerk?"

There isn't always light at the end of every tunnel. "Reckoning Day," Walkenhorst's impression of the 1988 presidential election, "is about a break of faith between the candidates and the people voting for them. You couldn't even vote for people you wanted to, because they knew better than to run."

And on a more personal level, "Hoo Dee Hoo" and "Battle of the Roses" are rooted in the breakup of a marriage: his own.

The new album is as direct as Walkenhorst's songs. Whereas 1987's "Tornado" LP utilized synthesizer and a fuller sound, "The Good News" has the sparseness of the band's self-titled debut. "That was very intentional," Walkenhorst said. "For a long time we hadn't been allowed to record live — record company rules. We changed producers. We tried to find someone who believed all you needed was a good band and a couple of microphones."

That someone was Jeff Glixman, whose production credits include another band of raucous rockers, the Georgia Satellites.

Band's New 'Deadheads' Bring Trouble

From their laid-back lifestyle to the self-deprecating humor of their nickname, the Deadheads, those hard-core followers of the Grateful Dead, had always seemed a fairly benign force in the rock world. One of the last bastions of hippie gentility, Deadheads balanced an intense devotion to their favorite band with an amiable, peace-and-love attitude toward the rest of the world. If there was such a thing as mellow fanaticism, those smiley-faced, tie-dyed Deadheads embodied it.

At least, that was the legend. But there was nothing mellow about the loud and agitated crowd I found milling about outside Grateful Dead concert in Baltimore two years ago. On the way in, I had to pass an extremely angry young woman who was repeatedly screaming, "Pigs! F— pigs! You people are pigs!"

Of course, long-term Grateful Dead partisans would point out that such brazen behavior is not the stuff of which Deadheads are made. Most Grateful Dead concerts are peaceful events, populated by the sort of fan who would never yell at anyone, much less a fellow concertgoer.

Maybe so, but as its popularity has mushroomed over the past few years, the Grateful Dead has attracted almost as much trouble as new fans. For instance:

Washington, D.C., Council member Nadine P. Winter tried to introduce emergency legislation to prevent the Dead from playing RFK stadium, citing neighborhood complaints in the wake of a 1986 appearance at the stadium. "They were defecating in the area, and you could cut the odor of pot smell with a knife," she told the council. Although the band was banned from playing its hometown of San Francisco after complaints of public defecation there a few years ago, Winters' failure to give the D.C. Council 24 hours' notice ultimately quashed her motion.

Concerts, scheduled this weekend in Wyandotte County, Kan., were canceled after the local government, in response to violence in other cities, raised the show's security requirement from 20 to 140 officers.

In April, some 500 fans trying to get into an Irvine, Calif., concert without tickets began reportedly throwing rocks and bottles at police; two officers were injured and 40 people were arrested, mostly on drug-related or assault charges. A total of 79 arrests was made in the course of the band's three-day stand at the Irvine Meadows Amphitheatre.

That same month, a Cincinnati high school principal called for a ban on Grateful Dead concerts there, alleging that Deadheads sell drugs at the shows. "Our students were really hustled down there by drug dealers," complained Anderson Township High School's Mike Hall.

In Pittsburgh, 25 people were arrested when police tried to move nearly 20,000 fans without tickets off the grounds of the Civic Arena. Ten people were treated for injuries in the ensuing melee; 40 were arrested on charges ranging from drug possession to starting fires.

It has gotten to the point where even the band itself seems alarmed. "We're running out of places to play, and we're running out of ways to say the obvious," warned the group in a letter sent out to fans on the Deadhead mailing list earlier this summer. Among the advice offered in the letter were such tips as "not trashing up where you go, not using people's lawns for bathrooms, not violating local laws."

Otherwise, the band said, "the circus won't be able to travel no mo'."

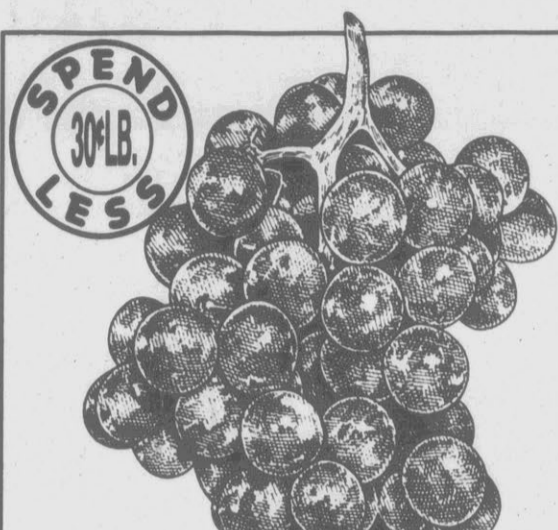
How did it get to this state? Certainly, the size of the band's current audience is a factor. Although the band's audience has always been intensely loyal, it was until recently fairly small. But beginning with the band's 20th anniversary in 1985, the Grateful Dead's popularity has increased exponentially over the past few years.



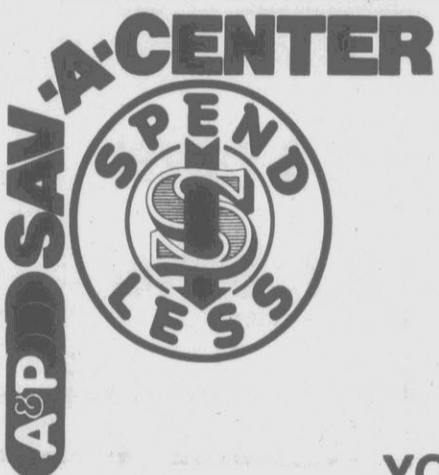

Hall Finds His New Popularity Has Price

who refuses to go bowling with Mr. Box Office himself, Eddie Murphy ("He calls me all the time with, 'Let's go bowling,' and I say, 'Yo, man, bowling's bull — when you're ready to not bowl, we can hook up'")? A guy who admits, "I could easily get caught up in gold chains, fur coats in the summer, sitting in a nightclub saying, 'Bring me another sloe gin fizz and tell that ho over there I'd like to meet her.' But my mom used to say, 'Idle mind, workshop of the devil.' So I stay busy."

Like, is it possible not to be captivated by a fellow who, as a Christmas present last year, moved mom Annie Hall from Cleveland to her very own Los Angeles condo? Who insists on taking out his own garbage and parking his own car? Well, sure. Because just often enough, Hall's likableness and sense of purpose are tempered by a hair-singeing display of ego. Like when he asserts, "I don't believe you can look in the archives of talk show hosts and find a guy who does it as well as I've done it in less than a hundred shows," or "When I look at the other talk show hosts around, there are no comic geniuses there; they don't do as many things as I do."

Hall is a born chameleon, just like the Cleveland kid who distanced himself from the neighborhood children but spent hours practicing magic tricks so he could wow them at self-promoted magic shows. This was a kid Annie Hall had to beg to "go play, get on a baseball team, get your ass out of the house and do something," he recalls. The only child of a Baptist preacher who died a decade ago, Hall was raised by his divorced mother, grandmother and godmother. From the beginning he was a loner who spent most of his

time at home, doing magic, listening to the Temptations and the Miracles while trying to copy their steps, and writing newspapers that nobody read.

And he was obsessed with talk shows.

His mother has said that the pre-adolescent Hall used to watch Johnny Carson and announce, "I want to do what he's doing." Even Hall's show logo — an illegibly scrawled Arsenio — is the result of hours spent in study hall copying the way Dinah Shore signed her name on her show. "I knew I was going to use it someday," he says now.

There wasn't much demand for the autograph when Hall, just graduated from Kent State University, signed on as a salesman with the Detroit company that makes Noxzema skin cream. Perhaps he was taking his cue from the college drama counselor who'd sniffed, "There are audiences and there are stars. You were meant to be in the audience." Still, he started his comedy career in Detroit, refined it in Chicago and eventually took it to L.A.

If there was one turning point in Hall's early career, it was the moment three years ago when singer Patti LaBelle, for whom he was opening, advised the young comic to ignore the "experts" who'd told him he was too "ethnic," too "up" and too "physical" and just to be himself.

And who, exactly, is that? Hall laughs, adjusting his customary off-the-air baseball cap. "If I tell you who I am, my publicist will go crazy, but I'll tell you anyway," he says. "I am an entertainer who was given many talents in many areas so I could do what I'm doing better than anybody's ever done it before. ... I feel I was born to do it."

What Hall did with it the night of the LaBelle show was to cut loose

with his own brand of cocky-humble-innocent-bawdy badness. And he got his first standing ovation for doing it.

His break into prime time was engineered by Joan Rivers, who felt Hall's insouciant, no-holds-barred style was a good match for her own. One night when she was guest-hosting for Johnny Carson, presidential daughter Patti Davis canceled her appearance and Rivers subbed Arsenio, despite Carson's lukewarm feelings about the comedian. When Rivers was fired from her own much-hyped Fox Broadcasting talk show, "The Late Show," Arsenio filled in for her, surprising everybody with a show that was loose, unpredictable — on one show, he challenged Elliott Gould to a game of one-on-one basketball, soundly spanking him — and, yes, def.

Murphy and Paramount lured Hall away from Fox with a movie contract and an offer to costar in "Coming to America." By the time the studio approached him about launching his own show last year, he knew exactly what position he required — executive producer and star. He also knew precisely who he wanted in his audience: MTV fans.

"These kids didn't have a talk show. Where do they see Duran Duran when they want to hear them talk? Where does the urban contemporary audience see Bobby Brown, the number one pop — not R&B, but pop, that means white people bought it — crossover artist in America, who could not get on a talk show?"

Not that the be-bop crowd is the only one tuning in. Hall gets letters from grandmothers who thank him for introducing them to Tiffany and Lisa Lisa and Cult Jam; from 6-year-olds miffed that their moms won't let them stay up to watch. And sacks of them from adoring women who say ...

Women. These days, they're not Hall's favorite interview subject. Because despite the show's rampant lap-hopping, despite the rumors that have paired him with everyone from Brooke Shields to Whitney Houston to Marlee Matlin (we won't even deal with Hall's favorite, which had him in a love triangle with Mike Tyson and Murphy), despite the eager groupies who've seemingly made a career of hopping from him to Michael Jordan to Murphy to Tommy Hearn, Hall has only one true love — his show.

How committed to the show is he? So committed, he jokes, that if "A Different World's" Jasmine Guy — of the taut dancer's body and witchy siren's face, who holds a lifetime spot on Hall's World Class Def list — yanked him by his 100 percent cotton collar and growled, "Marry me," he'd gasp, "No."

Is it normal, he wonders, to enjoy being alone so much? Is it smart to reject the joys of a wife and a family in lieu of, like, a TV show?

"It's one of my most agonizing thoughts," says Hall. "I'm 30 (actually, boyhood acquaintances put him closer to 34), but I guess I can always hook up with a young girl — the time factor isn't as much a consideration for men as it is for women."

"But I don't see any end in sight," he continues. "I wish I wasn't so into what I'm doing. Because you have to have a balance. Some people can do it, have careers and families. They want to do the family thing. And it scares me that I haven't had that desire."

His voice gets softer, more urgent. "Is it going to be too late when I decide? Do I want to do it and I'm too stupid and obsessed with my career? I'm totally scared about my future and when it's all going to happen."

 It is sometimes very difficult not to take tricks when the opportunity presents itself. On occasion,

though, it can be very costly to grab them.

The auction was routine. With a balanced hand of sound opening-bid strength facing an announced opening bid, North had an easy raise to three no trump.

West made the unusual lead of a spade (we find fourth-best of your longest and strongest to be more effective in the long run!). Declarer won in hand and, with eight fast tricks available, decided to try for the ninth in hearts. She cashed the ace and continued the suit to learn the bad news when West pitched a diamond on the second round. East won cheaply and shifted to the queen of clubs, continuing the suit when declarer held up.

Reading the hand perfectly, declarer cashed her remaining spade tricks as East discarded a heart and West a club. She returned to hand with the king of diamonds and exit-

ed with her last club. West could not resist the temptation of rising with the king of clubs to cash his remaining club. But then he had to lead away from his queen of diamonds into declarer's combined ace-jack tenace. Making three-odd.

West should never have end-played himself. If he simply plays low on the third club, East will win. Since declarer must protect against East's hearts, declarer has to discard

a diamond from the board on this trick. So East simply exits with a diamond to dummy's now bare ace and wins the last two tricks with his king-jack of hearts—down one.

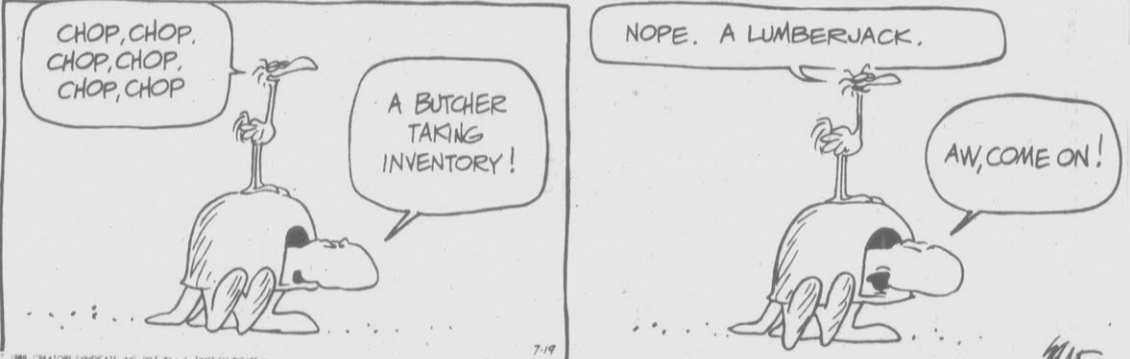

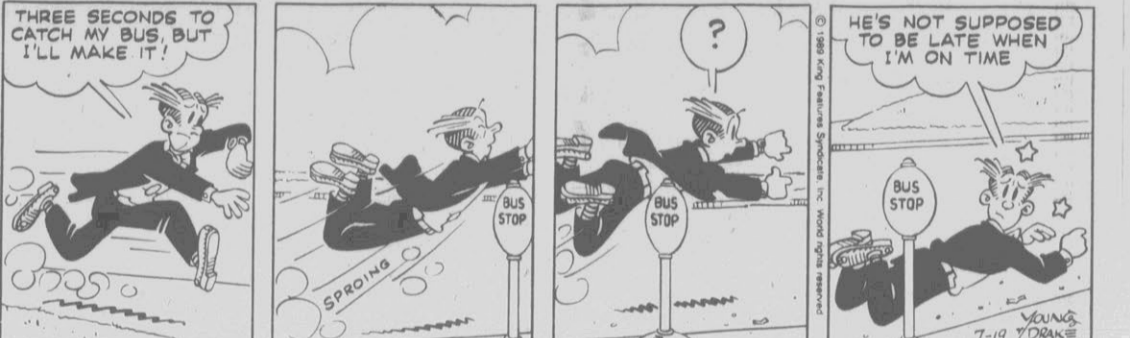

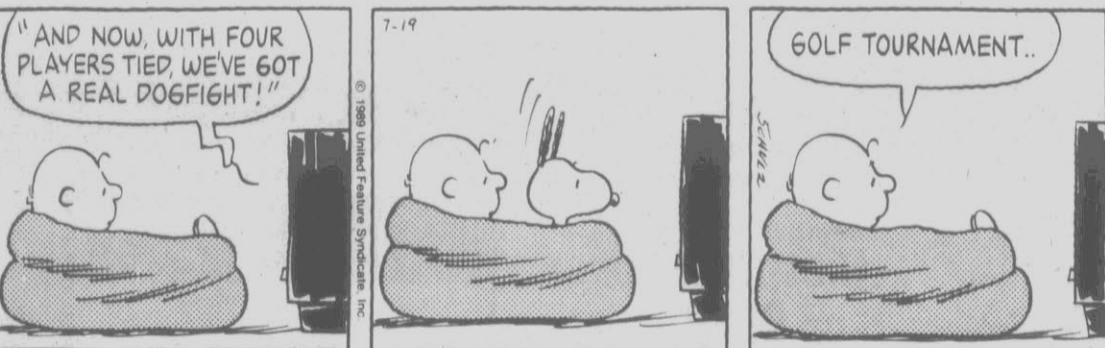

State's Moviemaking Industry Is Second Only To California's

DURHAM — The stars are hanging out in North Carolina, and they're not just in the sky.

Projects featuring such movie actors as Faye Dunaway, Robert Duvall, Natasha Richardson, Debra Winger and Nick Nolte are solidifying North Carolina as a hotbed for moviemaking.

"They're major caliber people and major caliber projects. Both of those are looking at Academy Award-type situations," said Bill Arnold, director of the North Carolina Film Commission.

In the past few months, two movies with those actors have been shooting in North Carolina: "The Handmaid's Tale" in Raleigh and Durham, and "Everybody Wins" in Wilmington.

"I think we started out with major films and higher caliber pictures than had been the general rule in the South," Arnold said.

Starting with such movies as "Being There," starring Peter Sellers, in 1979 and "Brainstorm," starring Natalie Wood, in 1983, North Carolina has also made Steven Spielberg's "The Color Purple," "The Year of the Dragon" and many others.

North Carolina is one of the fastest growing moviemaking locations in the country, and is second to California in the number of sound stages and studios, Arnold said, with 18 sound stages and four studios with plans for a fifth.

"We also have the largest resident work force of crew and technical people on the East Coast, after New York," he said.

Still, even though 42 states have film offices and actively compete for business, California remains the film leader of the United States, with New York close at its heels.

Though not always cheaper, it's easier to make a movie outside California. One-stop, state-controlled film offices are preferred to California's patchwork approach, where local governments issue permits with fluctuating fees and have requirements that are 70 years old.

And the long-held belief that Hollywood could re-create anything from the Tara plantation in "Gone With the Wind" to the Las Vegas Strip in "One From the Heart" has been abandoned by filmmakers who want greater realism.

North Carolina's moderate climate and diverse landscape are attractive to Hollywood producers.

"It's the best," said Michael Stroud, location manager for "The Handmaid's Tale."

"Everyone makes it so easy for you, and the bureaucracy is nil. This really is the ideal place to film — I think the South, in general."

The movies "Bull Durham," a delightful romp about life in minor league baseball, and "Winter People," a drama about intense relations starring Kelly McGillis were both filmed in 1987.

"Winter People" is a depression-era, very cold, snowy film. "Bull Durham" is just the opposite," Arnold said. "But they were both shot in November and they both got what they want."

Since North Carolina can offer a variety of "looks," film company have fewer location moves.

"The Handmaid's Tale," which is being filmed entirely in the state, needed seasonal changes and also the look of a New England college, which it found at Duke University. Based on the acclaimed novel by Margaret Atwood, the book is a daring move into the future and tells the tale of what happens after a right-wing religious revolution has swept America, imposing a dictatorial regime and ruthlessly executing any dissenters.

'Batman' Grabs Top Spot

HOLLYWOOD — "Batman" has passed such stellar hits as "The Exorcist," "Gremlins" and the original "Superman" to become the highest-grossing film in Warner Bros. history.

Although it finished second on the weekend box-office charts, with

receipts of \$15.1 million, "Batman" has collected \$167.6 million to date, and will almost certainly become this summer's biggest hit, surpassing "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade."

Meanwhile, "Lethal Weapon 2" claimed the No. 1 spot for the second consecutive week, leaving the new James Bond film "Licence to Kill" reeling in its wake.

"Lethal Weapon 2," starring Mel

Gibson and Danny Glover as Los Angeles policemen out to smash a South African money laundering scheme, grossed \$17.2 million nationwide to lead all other titles, according to figures released Monday by Exhibitor Relations Co.

In third place over the weekend was the Disney comedy "Honey, I Shrank the Kids," which continues to attract waves of moviegoers. "Honey," starring Rick Moranis, sold \$8.806 million worth of tickets, topping the opening of "Licence to Kill."

The latest Bond film, starring Timothy Dalton, debuted weakly, grossing \$8.775 million to finish in fourth place. The last Bond film, "The Living Daylights," netted more than \$11 million in its opening weekend in 1987.

In fifth was Disney's re-release of the animated "Peter Pan," with sales of \$5.6 million. It was followed in sixth by Steven Spielberg's "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," with a gate of \$4.6 million.

The comedy sequel "Ghostbusters II," starring Bill Murray and Dan Aykroyd, was seventh on proceeds of \$4.33 million. In eighth was Robin Williams in "Dead Poets Society," which grossed \$4.26 million.

Rounding out the Top 10 were "Weekend at Bernie's," with \$3.7 million, place, and "Do the Right Thing," with \$3 million. The new romantic comedy "When Harry Met Sally..." had a strong opening in a limited release, selling \$1.1 million worth of tickets in only 41 theaters.

Yogurt Goes Mainstream In The 1980s

Hardly anything is truly new in the food world.

Kiwis were just fuzzy gooseberries and orange roughy swam in the Pacific Ocean for eons before New Zealanders began air-freighting them to America. Tomatoes dried in the sun and goat milk produced tart cheeses for centuries until trendy chefs started throwing them into everything imaginable.

But if anything ever qualified as a novelty food, it's frozen yogurt.

Twenty years ago, it was an unknown (Of course, back then yogurt itself was lumped together with granola, peace marches and communes).

Today, frozen yogurt is a national best seller, as American as ice cream, and an ideal substitute for high-fat desserts.

The cool, creamy confection that you enjoy today from the supermarket freezer case or from stores like the Lemon Tree and TCBY, the nation's largest yogurt franchise, may not be the same stuff you tasted back in the early 1970s. It was too tart for many palates, so manufacturers toned down the flavor by changing the way the milk is cultured to make yogurt.

That, coupled with the national penchant for light-but-luscious desserts and yogurt's move from the "health food" image to the mainstream, pumped up the frozen yogurt boom of the 1980s.

An estimated 5,000 retail outlets and franchises feed our frenzy for frozen yogurt, said Tracy Boyle, spokeswoman for the International Ice Cream Association. Grocery store packages are a relatively new phenomenon, but already products by Dannon, Yoplait, Edy's and Brice's are the hottest things in the freezer case, with sales of \$80 million last year, almost double 1987 sales of \$42 million, Ms. Boyle said. The association estimates that half of its more than 250 ice cream manufacturing members are getting into frozen yogurt. "It's literally growing every day," she said.

Nutritionally, frozen yogurt is rich in calcium and has protein, like ice cream, but has less fat and cholesterol, so dietitians may recommend it for those on a low-fat regimen. Moreover, people who have trouble digesting milk sugar in ice cream and ice milk may be able to eat the cultured products.

But don't fool yourself — or let a package fool you — into thinking that all commercial frozen yogurt is a dietetic treat.

True, a number of frozen yogurts are relatively low in fat and calories, especially compared to ice cream, said Bonnie Liebman, nutrition director of the Center for Science in the Public Interest, a Washington nutrition advocacy group. "The calorie savings is not as great as the fat savings, but generally speaking, frozen yogurts have fewer calories because they have less fat," she said. "The difference is pretty dramatic if you compare a premium ice cream — such as Haagen Dazs, Ben & Jerry's or Frusen Gladje — against frozen yogurt. If you switch from premium ice cream to frozen yogurt, you're getting half the fat."

Ms. Liebman said that the difference is less dramatic if your usual brand is an ordinary ice cream with half the fat of those

upscale treats. But frozen yogurt (and ice milk) also has less saturated fat and cholesterol than ice cream.

"Of course," Ms. Liebman added, "you can ruin the low-fat and low-calorie benefits by dumping on the chocolate sauce and nuts and sprinkles and Oreos cookies."

No frozen yogurt contains the same fat and calories as ice cream, but some frozen yogurts and ice milks are on a par, as the Center for Science in the Public Interest learned when rating frozen desserts for an article in the June Nutrition Action Healthletter.

For instance, Light N'Lively ice milk and Mulberry Street frozen yogurt have the same average amount of fat — 5 grams, or about 1 teaspoon, per ¾-cup serving — although the yogurt has 140 calories per serving vs. 170 for the ice milk (Five grams was the highest amount of fat in any yogurt the agency examined). And one of the TCBY frozen yogurt products weighed in at 190 calories per serving, while Jerseymaid ice milk had 145 calories; both contained about the same amount of fat — 3 grams.

But, Ms. Liebman said, "if you look carefully (at frozen yogurt labels) you could get zero fat rather than 5 grams." Colombo Lite Frozen Yogurt has no fat and only 140 calories per ¾-cup serving, for example.

You can't buy a non-fat ice milk because government standards say a product must contain a minimum amount of butterfat — between 2 percent and 7 percent by weight — to be legally called ice milk. Ice cream manufacturers have petitioned the Food and Drug Administration to create a standards category for low-fat ice cream, containing 7 percent to 10 percent fat. Currently, some of these products are labeled "frozen dairy desserts."

Meanwhile, the International Ice Cream Association has asked the FDA to set definitions of frozen regular, low-fat and non-fat yogurts, with fat content ranging from no less than 3.25 percent to less than 0.5 percent.

There could be a decision on those petitions later this year or early next year. Meanwhile, when you read labels or ask clerks, be sure to note the serving size of the product in relation to its fat or calories. The numbers may sound low but are for a 3-ounce serving; do you eat that little? Ms. Liebman said her comparisons were based on a 6-ounce or ¾-cup serving because that is closer to the government's measure of an average serving.

Here lies the beauty of making your own frozen yogurt at home. You control portion sizes and the fat and sugar content by using low-fat or non-fat yogurt, flavorings and sweeteners (including artificial sweeteners) to taste. Any ice-cream freezer can make frozen yogurt. Check your machine's instruction booklet for recipes and ideas. You can also make frozen yogurt in the freezer compartment of your refrigerator, although the texture may be somewhat grainier this way.

Freeze the yogurt mixture in shallow metal trays with the freezer set at the coldest temperature. When a hard border about an inch wide has formed around the edge, scrape out the contents of the tray and beat thoroughly with a hand-held elec-

A good dining room was also important, with breakfast considered the most necessary meal.

It's fairly easy to create a country-inn type menu at home. Spring Vegetable Timbales, for instance could provide a focal point for a romantic brunch. A mixture of carrots, peas, onions, eggs and chicken with rice soup mix is baked in celery-leaf lined custard cups. Serve on a bed of lettuce with salad, hot rolls and orange juice...or champagne.

Another brunch option, Skillet Sausage 'n' Cheese Potato Pancakes, is an easy-to-prepare, one-dish meal. The "pancakes" are assembled in three layers: potatoes on the bottom, Swiss cheese and sausage in the middle, and an egg and milk mixture on top. Serve with fresh fruit and individual French brioche from your favorite bakery.

SPRING VEGETABLES TIMBALES

- 6 celery leaves
- 1 pouch dry chicken with rice soup and recipe mix
- 1 cup water
- ½ cup finely chopped celery
- ½ cup shredded carrot
- ½ cup frozen peas, thawed
- 2 green onions, sliced
- 3 eggs
- 1½ cups half-and-half
- Generous dash ground red pepper

Grease six 6-ounce custard cups and place one celery leaf in the bottom of each. Set aside. In two-quart saucepan over high heat, heat soup mix, water, celery, carrot, peas and green onions to boiling. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer five minutes. Cool. In a large bowl, beat eggs, half-and-half and pepper until well blended. Stir in soup mixture. Pour into prepared custard cups. Set custard cups in shallow baking pan; place on oven rack. Pour hot water around cups to reach halfway up the sides of cups. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Let stand five minutes. Unmold onto serving plate. Serve on lettuce if desired. Makes six servings.

SKILLET SAUSAGE 'N' CHEESE POTATO PANCAKE

- ½ lb. bulk pork sausage
- 3 cups peeled, sliced potatoes

- 2 slices Swiss cheese (2 oz.)
- 5 eggs
- ½ cup milk
- 1 pouch dry onion soup mix

Stirring to separate meat, cook sausage until browned in 10-inch, nonstick skillet over medium heat. Remove to paper towels to drain. Spoon off all but one tablespoon of the drippings. In skillet over low heat, in hot drippings, stir potatoes. Cover; simmer 10 minutes. With spatula, carefully turn potatoes. Cover and cook eight minutes or until golden brown. Arrange potatoes in even layer in skillet. Top with sausage and cheese. In a large bowl, beat eggs, milk and soup mix together until well blended. Gradually pour into skillet. Cover. Over medium heat, cook 10 minutes or until eggs are set and potatoes are tender. Remove from heat. Let stand, covered, three minutes. Loosen edge with spatula and invert into serving plate. Cut into wedges. Makes six servings.

BAKED MONTE CRISTO SANDWICHES

- 4 slices Swiss cheese (4 oz.)
- 4 oz. sliced cooked turkey
- 8 slices firm white bread
- 3 eggs
- ½ cup milk
- 1 pouch onion soup mix
- 3 tbsps. butter or margarine
- Dijon Dipping Sauce (recipe follows)

To prepare sandwiches, place on slice of cheese and one ounce of turkey on each of the four bread slices. Top with remaining bread slices. In pie plate, beat eggs, milk and soup mix until well blended. Preheat oven to 450°. Dip each sandwich into egg mixture, spooning onion pieces onto bread, making sure all egg mixture is used. Place butter in 15-by-10-inch jelly-roll pan; place in oven for about three minutes to melt butter. Arrange sandwiches in pan. Bake five minutes. Turn sandwiches; bake five minutes more or until golden brown. Serve with Dijon Dipping Sauce. Makes four servings.

Dijon Dipping Sauce:

- ½ cup sour cream
- 2 tbsps. milk
- 1 tbsp. Dijon-style mustard

In a small bowl, stir together all ingredients. Cover; refrigerate until serving time. Makes ¾ cup.

Lower Cholesterol By Making Changes In Your Diet

Dear Readers: Last month the Department of Family Medicine cooperated with the Pitt County Agricultural Extension Service to conduct a cholesterol screening and dietary assessment in Bethel. We asked 200 people who had their diet analyzed if they could select five changes in their diet to improve health that they could try from the following list:

- Change to skim milk
- Change to a low fat milk
- Change from butter to margarine
- Change from hard margarine to a soft (tub) margarine

- Use less fat spreads (butter, margarine)
- Use vegetable oil in cooking instead of "Crisco type shortenings" or lard when possible
- Use a low fat cheese instead of regular cheese
- Use fewer gravies and sauces that are made with fat drippings
- Eat sausage, bacon and luncheon meats less often
- Remove skin from chicken before eating
- Trim and remove fat from meats before eating
- Cook meats so fat drips away from meat during cooking

- Eat smaller portions of meat
- Use less butter, lard or meat drippings to season vegetables
- Eat fewer sweet pastries like doughnuts, fried pies
- Cut down on salty snack foods like crackers and potato chips
- Eat more foods with a dietary fiber (i.e., oatmeal, fruits, vegetables)

- Eat less food (fewer calories)
- Eat less fried food

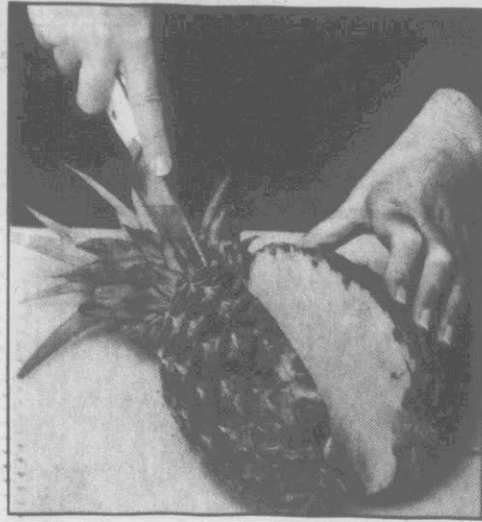

If you participated in either of these events, you'll be getting a let-

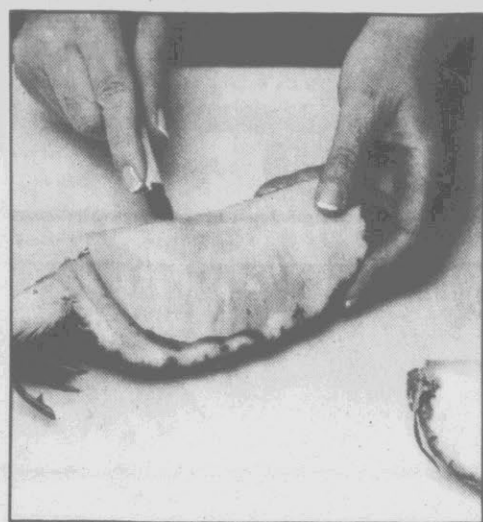

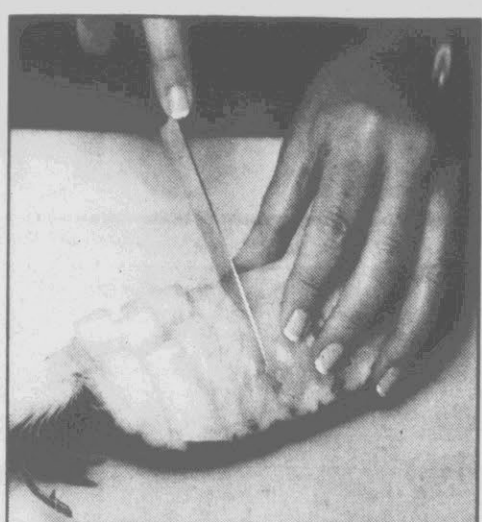

How To Prepare Fresh Pineapple

Basics

When choosing a fresh pineapple, select fruit that is plump and firm with fresh green leaves in the crown. The pineapple should have a sweet aroma, and no mold or soft spots.

Shell color is not a good sign of maturity — some pineapple varieties remain green even when they are fully ripe. And forget pulling leaves out of the crown; ease of extraction is not an indication of either ripeness or quality.

Once a pineapple is harvested

from the plant, it will not ripen any further. It will change color, get soft and the leaves will fall out, but these are signs of old age, not ripeness. The fruit should be used as soon as possible after purchase but may be wrapped in plastic and refrigerated three to five days.

There are numerous ways to prepare fresh pineapple. The following method is an easy way of cutting chunks, spears and wedges.

Step 1. Using a long, sharp knife, cut the pineapple in half lengthwise from the bottom through the crown. Repeat, cutting pineapple into quarters.

Step 2. Trim the strip of hard core from the top of each quarter. Then cut the fruit away from the shell. A curved pineapple knife is ideal for this step but a sturdy grapefruit knife or standard serrated knife may be used.

Step 3. Cut the fruit into chunks, wedges or spears. Remove the fruit or use the shell as a serving container.

A reminder: Fresh pineapple contains the enzyme bromelin, which breaks down protein. Used in marinades it helps tenderize meats, but it also prevents gelatin from setting. The enzyme is destroyed by cooking, so canned pineapple may be used in gelatin salads and desserts.

Try Various Types Of Oriental Noodles

Today, many varieties of Oriental noodles are manufactured in the United States and are available in fresh and dry forms. However, some noodles, particularly rice and mung bean noodles, are imported from Thailand, China, Japan and Korea, giving the buyer an opportunity to test the various types.

Rice-based noodles, generally called "rice sticks," are probably the most common and come in a variety of shapes, sizes, colors and thicknesses. But there also are noodles made from wheat, buckwheat, mung bean, egg and even green tea, with credit given to China as the inspiration for all noodles (mein).

Noodles may be found wrapped like folded ribbons or packaged like stick spaghetti in various widths and in flat or round shapes. They may be opaque and white — as are those that puff to several times their volume when fried for use in Chinese chicken salad — or thin like vermicelli for adding to stir-fried chow mein dishes. Cellophane noodles — somewhat transparent, translucent noodles made from mung beans — are prized in soups and stir-fry dishes.

Japanese noodles also come in numerous colors, shapes and sizes, from white wheat to gray buckwheat or green tea.

Imported varieties of Thai rice sticks ("sen mee") used in stir-fried

dishes and soups, as well as the famous "mee krob," which requires deep frying, generally are soaked before using. "Gwaytio" noodles, the wide fresh noodles used as the first meal of a Thai day, are commercially available as pancakes in vacuum packets.

Noodles also are a staple of Korean cuisine. Among the most popular are very thin white wheat or buckwheat noodles and thin transparent cellophane noodles. If Oriental noodles are not available for Korean cooking, substitute regular pasta noodles of varying sizes, from very thin vermicelli to fat macaroni.

Here is a description and suggested method of cooking for some of the Oriental noodles used in our recipes, commonly found in supermarkets and Oriental food stores.

Bean threads — Also called cellophane noodles or silver threads and are like rice sticks, but slightly thinner and translucent. Made from starchy liquid leached from pureed mung beans, the tough threads require soaking to soften. Soak in warm water 20 minutes, then cook in boiling water three minutes. Drain and rinse in cold water. Use in soups, stir-fry dishes or deep fried to add as toppings to salads and stir-fry dishes.

Rice sticks — Used throughout the Orient. Specific names for these noodles vary depending on their size and shape and place of origin. They can be used as you would spaghetti or spaghetti or cappellini (angel-hair pasta), cooking thin ones quick-

ly in boiling, salted water for three to four minutes, depending on the thickness of the pasta. The thicker varieties require longer cooking. Most always they are rinsed in cold water to remove excess starch before using.

Another variety of rice sticks, called "banh pho" in Vietnamese and "mei fun" in Chinese, are white, dry opaque noodles. The stringlike noodles are bundled in see-through packages and expand to double their volume when fried or cooked. They are used in Chinese chicken salad and soups and with barbecued meats. In Thai cuisine they are used to make "mee krob" — sweet, deep fried noodles. To use, soak in cold water 20 minutes. Cut, if necessary, and cook two to three minutes to use in soups and stir-fry dishes. Noodles can be crisp-fried by dropping them from the package into hot oil until they puff to several times their original volume. Use in salads or as crushed toppings for stir-fry dishes or salads.

Bon Mein ("bun" in Vietnamese) — Wheat flour egg noodles used like vermicelli in stir-fry or pan-fried chow mein and braised lo mein noodle dishes as well as soups.

Udon — Fat, white wheat noodles sold fresh (vacuum-packed) or dried. The most popular Japanese noodle, chiefly used for soups. Fresh noodles are now available vacuum-packed in most supermarket dairy counters. They may be prepared ahead ready to add to soups. Cook in boiling water until just tender and

rinse in cold water. Sprinkle with oil and cover with cloth until ready to add to soups. Avoid overcooking.

Kishimen — Flat fettuccine-type noodle, a variation of Japanese udon used in place of rice in sukiyaki dishes. Cook with other foods in broth or water until done, then lift out of cooking liquid and eat with dipping sauces or natural juices from stewed foods.

Soba — Thick or thin and caramel-colored from buckwheat flour. Eaten like udon, hot and wet, cold and slightly dry, or on ice for summer salads. Cook in boiling water one minute, then drain in colander and rinse in cold water. Place ice cubes over noodles if cold summer noodles are desired. Serve dipped in dipping sauce or soy sauce.

Somen — Thinnest Japanese noodle made from wheat flour and prepared like soba or rice sticks. Cook in boiling water one minute, then drain in colander and rinse in cold water. Cover noodles with damp cloth if not using immediately.

Spaghetti noodles — Egg noodles resembling Italian spaghetti used like spaghetti with sauces and other toppings. Cook as you would spaghetti, but avoid overcooking for best results. **Ramen** — Same as Chinese egg noodles (bon mein). Plunge into boiling broth to use as main ingredient in soup with or without desired toppings.

Farmers Of Parma Join To Protect Integrity Of Cheese

NEW YORK — Descriptions of the Parma region in Italy conjure up its sweet green meadows and hills, meandering rivers, clean air, and painterly, beflowered countryside.

And historic Parma reveals one harmonious scene after another. It's such a delight to stroll the ancient, narrow streets and discover its treasures: the glorious Pink Baptistery, the Cathedral, the wooden Farnese Theater, the Opera House. And Parma's food.

Restaurants, cafe-confectioneries (the Torino is a must), and salumerias are filled to the rafters with Parma's famed succulent hams and sausages, pastas, breads, tomatoes, cheeses and other specialties.

Parma's butter is deluxe. But the masterpiece of Parmesan gastronomy is grana, the incomparable formaggio Parmigiano-Reggiano or genuine Parmesan cheese.

Parmigiano-Reggiano can only be made in Parma and the delimited "zona tipica" — Bologna, Mantua and Modena, all provinces of Reggio-Emilia.

In and around Parma, about 1,200 small cheese-making firms have banded together into an official consortium that represents 60,000 dairy farmers. A prime goal of the consortium is to safeguard the established character and quality of Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese.

The Parma cheese consortium says that although cheeses made elsewhere are called Parmesan, they aren't the same. What makes the difference, the consortium says, is the "superior milk" from cows specially bred in a clean-air environment and fed only on grasses and fodder grown in very fertile soil.

Parmigiano-Reggiano's special character and superiority are due to certain other factors, the experts say, including the hand-making of the cheese according to an old for-

mula; the absence of any artificial additives; the completely natural method of maturation under the strictest of supervision and controls to produce flavor, texture and nutritional value.

Parma's cheese is high in calcium, phosphorus, other minerals and vitamins, and is easy to digest. Parma's cheese is entirely edible; the rind can be used in cooking.

Some 2-3 million wheels of cheese are produced annually. Each wheel weighs about 80 pounds and is worth about \$363 wholesale.

Parma's cheese-makers debate whether their cheese is best at 18 months or 2 years; some say 3 and 4 years. Cheese made in mid-summer is deeper-colored, a bit moister (due to cows feeding on fresh green grass), and has the edge over winter cheese, which is slightly lighter in color and flavor. But only slightly.

During the aging process, cheeses are constantly tested for possible imperfections of texture, and for aroma and degree of maturation. Only perfect cheeses, stamped with the identifying Parmigiano-Reggiano name, are sold.

Parmigiano-Reggiano doesn't deteriorate quickly. Wrap small portions in plastic wrap or foil and store in the refrigerator cheese tray. If you need pre-grated Parmesan, buy a wedge and have the clerk grate it for you; that way you'll know what you're getting.

There are about 450 calories in one-quarter pound of Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese.

Old Good Housekeeping Recipes Stir Memories

Conceivably there are billions of citizens on the planet who have never heard of elbow macaroni. And perhaps as many countless millions have never delved into ham baking, preferring their piggie tinned, sliced, barbecued or not at all.

I prefer both, together, prepared in a manner just as corny as the combination. They are simple, but that is no reason why they cannot become things of legend.

There is a story that goes along with these prejudices and the saga goes like this:

In early 1947, Good Housekeeping magazine revved up its busy test kitchens and produced another specimen of middle American goodies. On page 118 of the March issue, splang in the middle of an article called "There's Plenty of Cheese," they unveiled the formula for "Baked Macaroni Loaf de Luxe," accompanied by a full-color photo, something of a treat in that period of recipe publishing. It rated the title of deluxe only because it included chopped parsley and pimiento — two ingredients that were hardly household words in kitchens that scorned the fancy or the new-fangled. "Delightfully different is this golden-brown, molded macaroni-and-cheese loaf served with mushroom sauce," read the color photo's captioned hype.

In this instance, the caption did not lie. Baked mac caught on big just about the time the serve-them-a-buffet-supper movement got rolling after World War II, in my house and in thousands of others.

The green parsley and the red pimiento gave the dish a luxurious, party sort of look in the days when few American family cooks gave much priority to how food looked. Of course cheese macaronies had been served (more or less indifferently) for generations as a side dish. But the Good Housekeeping formula brought it into the big time, fast.

We had the Good Housekeeping type baked in deep earthenware crocks that fitted into bamboo stands for porch and patio parties. We had it done in huge round Pyrex casseroles (doubling the recipe for big dinners indoors). With its ham combination (see below) it made a great meal for guests and you would lather the slices of baked mac, or reheated grilled macaroni, with a mushroom cream sauce. For family affairs we just used big flat 14-by-9-inch glass pans for a loaf that was a snap to slice after cooling. We also did it in the conventional loaf pan method described below.

Then one day disaster struck. It was a sort of lifetime formula for making sure you read a recipe carefully.

My associate cook and I assembled the ingredients for a dinner party for 10. Then, while my back was turned, the first step — cooking the pasta — was completed by my partner. We forged ahead with the rest of the macaroni and I let my assistant take over the seasoning, assembly and stirring. Then, luckily before baking, I tasted the result. It was roarily salty and inedible.

Instead of putting 4 teaspoons of salt into the pasta water and then throwing the liquid away, 80 percent of the salt and an additional teaspoon had all been dumped into the prepared macaroni — 5 teaspoons in all.

What to do? There was only one way out. We had to throw out everything — or make four more complete recipes to thin out our inedible, salty batch. There was a riotous trip to the grocery store to get more supplies, including three more boxes of macaroni, two dozen eggs, three quarts of milk, 12 cups of grated cheese, etc.

It took every pot in the house to boil the pasta and hours to get this giant batch in the oven. We had to

bake it all immediately because of the egg content of the mix. And then the only solution to getting rid of it all was to throw another party, the week after the disaster, and saute the rest of the giant batch for lunches. I figure it fed in the vicinity of 35 or 40 people, with lots of calls for seconds.

In the original article, Good Housekeeping did not provide a recipe for mushroom sauce, but it was recommended as an escort for the macaroni. The mushroom sauce below is from the 1953 edition of the "Good Housekeeping Cookbook" and true to the era of the original master pasta recipe.

With the pasta, the family traditionally served "the ham what am." It was normally a Georgia or a North Carolina-type smoked country ham (not a Smithfield and not as expensive as one) that had been through the soaking and slow-bake ordeal that produces the perfect Dixie pig.

"If it isn't smoked, it isn't ham to me. And country ham is really the only ham what am," says Miriam Ungerer, who hails from South Carolina, who is wife of the distinguished author Wilfred Sheed in private life. Her newly published *Summertime Food* (Random House; \$19.95), is an authoritative roundup of ways to treat midsummer garden bounty and prepare such regional treats as shrimp perloo and Georgia peaches with white chocolate sauce. Ham what am a la Ungerer (see below) is the classic treatment of smoked, down-home type hams, as opposed to the lighter and less complex flavored supermarket varieties of cured (not smoked) hams or the sublime and overpowering Smithfields.

So there it is — its own tacky but irresistible self, a dinner formula that is the enemy of every diet since World War II. Conceivably it could make you flunk your metabolism test or your next blood pressure reading. It is likely, though, that if you spring it unannounced on your family or guests, it may be rated, as many good old boys and girls already have at buffets well south of the Potomac or east of the Pecos, "the best thang we ever had."

Note: Lovely accompaniments for this dinner dish are spiced, glazed apples, spiced apple rings or green tomato pickles served with yeast rolls and butter. Or all three. Enjoy.

Some comments on the recipe: This stellar recipe is beginning to show its age. "Fortified margarine" is a World War II shortage term indicating color additions. Butter will deliver more flavor — and more calories to say nothing of the cholesterol. Also, processed Cheddar is an out-of-date term. Many Cheddars today are naturally ripened affairs. A real nutty, buttery Wisconsin Cheddar, moist but sliceable, is nevertheless perfect for this dish. Avoid the crumbly, sweet New York variety here. You can also slice your leftovers for sauteing only half an inch thick. Also, I occasionally add about a half-teaspoon of dry mustard to the mix of the main recipe. I think it accents the cheese flavor.

BAKED MACARONI LOAF DE LUXE

- 1 1/2 cups uncooked elbow macaroni
- 3 qts. of boiling water
- 5 tps. of salt
- 3 cups of milk
- 1/2 cup of butter or fortified margarine
- 2 cups of soft bread crumbs
- 1/3 cup of chopped pimiento
- 3 cups of grated, processed American Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup minced parsley
- 1/4 cup minced onion
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 6 eggs, beaten

Cook macaroni in boiling water to which 4 teaspoons of salt have been added — about 9 minutes — or until macaroni is tender. Drain;

rinse with boiling water. Combine milk and butter; then scald. Pour over bread crumbs; then add all remaining ingredients except eggs. Next add eggs and macaroni, stirring until blended. Pour mixture into greased 10- by 5- by 3-inch oven glass loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven, 325° for 1 hour 10 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes; unmold and serve with mushroom sauce. Serves eight.

Note: Any leftover loaf is delicious after being chilled in the refrigerator, sliced 3/4-inch thick then sauteed in butter.

For a diet version of this dish, try boiling the mac in salt-free water and omit all salt with the mix. Use low-cal bread in preparing bread crumbs. Substitute mozzarella or Muenster cheese for the Cheddar. Use the least salty and lowest calorie margarine you can find. Cut back from standard milk to skim. And use only two whole eggs and four egg whites.

GOOD HOUSEKEEPING MUSHROOM SAUCE

- 2 tbsps. butter or margarine
- 1/2 lb. chopped mushrooms
- 3 tbsps. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- Speck pepper
- 2 cups milk or chicken broth
- Snipped parsley

In hot butter in saucepan, saute mushrooms, 3 to 4 minutes. Stir in flour, salt, pepper, then milk or broth; cook, stirring, until thickened. Add parsley. Serves eight.

MIRIAM UNGERER'S HAM WHAT AM

Scrub smoked country ham with a stiff brush under tepid running water. Get off all the pepper or mold or ashes and put the ham in a large roaster or a big plastic container. Cover it completely with cold water and let it soak 12 hours. Change the water and soak a further 12 hours. I have a deep sink in my greenhouse that I use for this purpose — or you might commandeere a bathtub overnight.

The beautiful copper boilers of the 19th century kitchen have become plant cachepots in country houses, and nothing has come along to replace them. However, you can make do with one of the old-fashioned, blue speckled graniteware roasters still sold in hardware and dime stores. Huge foil roasting pans can be found in similar stores. As they aren't very strong, buy two and place them one inside the other on a heavy baking sheet.

Put the ham in whatever vessel you've got, cover it with cold water, cover with foil if there is no top, and put it in a cold oven. Turn the thermostat to 325° and bake 4 hours for a whole ham, turning it once midway in the cooking. Pierce it with tines to be sure it is tender.

Remove the ham to the top of the stove and let it cool in its liquid (now called likker) to tepid. Remove the rind carefully and let the fat solidify. Pare the fat evenly — this is easier than soap carving — leaving about a half-inch layer. This helps to preserve the ham's freshness and moisture — a completely scalped ham will dry out. Wrap the ham in heavy foil and refrigerate it overnight.

Carving, not cooking, is the bete noir of country hams. Problems in the procedure are caused either by undercooking, undersoaking, removing the ham before it has cooled in its cooking liquid, or, maddeningly, overcooking until all the flavor and texture have been boiled away. So stick to the age-old traditional routine and let no one persuade you to "try something new" with a valuable, aged country ham. Even after you have successfully cooked, cooled and carved a ham, dryness is still to be guarded against. Cover the sliced ham with airtight plastic wrap until serving (or arranging) time.

Turkey-Noodle Casserole Is Low Fat All The Way

Look for the new wave of lower-fat dairy products in your supermarket's dairy case. They've won raves from our food editors and home economists in samplings in our Test Kitchen. These products taste great and cut fat and calories by about one-third. In this dish we used low-fat cream cheese, cottage cheese and yogurt to help us hit our target — no more than 30 percent of calories from fat.

TURKEY-NOODLE CASSEROLE

- 12 oz. ground raw turkey
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

- One 8-oz. can tomato sauce
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 of an 8-oz. package wide noodles
- 1/2 of an 8-oz. package low-fat cream cheese, cubed
- 1/2 cup low-fat cottage cheese
- 1/4 cup plain low-fat yogurt
- 1 1/2 tps. poppy seed

In a skillet cook turkey, onion and green pepper until meat is no longer pink and vegetables are tender. Drain off liquid. Stir in tomato sauce, salt and pepper.

Meanwhile, cook noodles according to package directions, except omit salt; drain. In a small mixing bowl combine cheeses, yogurt and poppy seed; toss cheese mixture with hot noodles.

Layer 1/3 of the noodle mixture in a

9- by 9- by 2-inch baking dish. Spoon meat mixture over noodles, leaving a 1- to 2-inch border of uncovered noodles. Layer remaining noodle mixture over meat mixture, leaving a 1- to 2-inch border.

Bake, covered, in a 375-degree F oven for 30 minutes. Uncover the casserole. Bake 10 to 15 minutes more or until casserole is heated through. Makes 4 servings.

Meatballs Take 15 Minutes

Savory cheese-and-beer sauced meatballs in just 15 minutes? Yes, it's possible when you cook both meatballs and sauce in your microwave. For fast shaping and for uniform meatballs, important for even cooking in the microwave, pat the meat mixture to a 6-inch square on waxed paper. Cut into 1-inch squares and shape into balls. Look for the tiny dumplings called spaetzle in the freezer case of your supermarket.

BEER-SAUCE MEATBALLS

1 beaten egg

- One 10 3/4-oz. can condensed Cheddar cheese soup
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs (1 and 1/3rd slices)
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 medium onion, thinly sliced and separated into rings
- 1/2 cup beer
- 1/2 tsp. dried oregano, crushed
- Dash pepper
- Hot cooked spaetzle, noodles or rice

In a small bowl combine egg and 1/4 cup of soup. Stir in bread crumbs and salt. Add ground beef. Mix well. Shape into 36 meatballs. Set aside.

Place onion rings in a 12- by 7 1/2- by 2-inch microwave-safe baking dish. Cover with waxed paper. Cook

on 100 percent power (high) 2 to 3 minutes or until onion is just tender. Arrange meatballs over onion. Cook, covered, on high 8 to 10 minutes or until no pink remains, rearranging twice. Drain.

Combine remaining soup, beer, oregano and pepper. Pour soup mixture over meatballs. Cook, covered, on high 5 to 8 minutes or until heated through, stirring twice. Serve over hot cooked spaetzle, noodles or rice. Makes 6 servings.

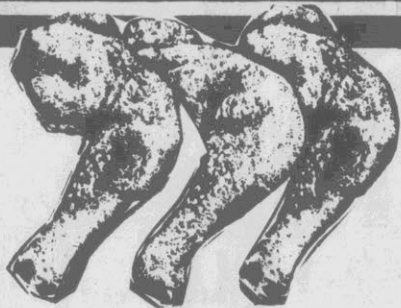

tric mixer to break up the frozen parts and incorporate air. Return to the tray and freeze. Beat the mixture again when it firms in 20-60 minutes. If the mixture freezes too hard between beatings, place in the refrigerator until softened. Repeat at least twice, then freeze until firm.

In some of the recipes that follow, gelatin or whipped egg whites added to the yogurt mixture help it freeze smoothly with fewer ice crystals. (In commercial yogurt products, vegetable gums are used to produce the smooth, creamy "mouthfeel" that ordinarily would be provided by fat in ice cream and ice milk). Egg whites also lighten the texture.

Some recipes below call for superfine sugar, also called dessert or bar sugar, which is made to dissolve quickly in cold liquids.

FAST FROZEN YOGURT

1 10-oz. package loose-pack frozen strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, peaches, apricots, cherries or other fruit (or about 1 1/4 cups fresh fruit, cleaned, sliced and frozen solid)

1 cup plain or vanilla yogurt
Superfine or confectioner's sugar, to taste
Lemon juice, to taste

About a half-hour before you plan to serve, place the yogurt and serving dishes in the freezer. Do not thaw the fruit.

Finely chop the fruit in the processor (You may wish to do this in batches in a small machine). Spoon yogurt over fruit and process just until mixed. Taste and add sugar or lemon juice as needed; remember that vanilla yogurt is sweetened. Serve at once in chilled dishes.

If desired, freeze the yogurt in a loaf pan, covered with plastic wrap. Remove from freezer about 10 minutes before serving or chop it into large chunks and process until smooth again. However, this dessert is better fresh or no more than a few hours old. Serves four to six.

Variation: Use frozen banana chunks, about 4 large or 8 small ripe bananas. Add freshly grated nutmeg and 2 teaspoons vanilla.

IRISH COFFEE FROZEN YOGURT

3 cups plain yogurt
1/2 cup superfine sugar
3 to 4 tbsps. freeze-dried coffee
2 tbsps. Irish whiskey

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Taste for sweetness and add more coffee or sugar if necessary. Chill thoroughly. Freeze according to ice-cream machine directions.
Note: The brand of coffee we used did not dissolve in the yogurt well and had to be thoroughly stirred; small bits still remained. Mixing the whiskey with the coffee before adding to the yogurt and sugar may solve this.
Makes about 1 quart.

PEACH DAIQUIRI FROZEN YOGURT

1 large peach, peeled and quartered
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup sugar
1 tsp. grated lime zest
1 tsp. lime juice
2 tbsps. dark rum
1 pint plain yogurt

Combine peach, corn syrup, sugar, lime zest, lime juice and rum in blender and process until smooth. Add yogurt and blend just until mixed. Chill thoroughly. Freeze according to ice-cream machine directions.
Makes about 1 1/2 pints.

FROZEN YOGURT POPS

1 pint strawberries
1 tsp. unflavored gelatin
2 tbsps. cold water
1/4 cup sugar
1 cup plain yogurt
2 tbsps. lemon juice

Place strawberries in food processor or blender and process to about 1/4 cups puree. Combine gelatin and water in saucepan and stir over low heat until dissolved. Add sugar and stir to dissolve. Remove from heat and set aside.

Combine yogurt, strawberry puree and lemon juice in small bowl. Thoroughly mix in warm gelatin mixture until smooth. Pour into pop stick or bar molds and freeze until firm. To remove pops from molds, run hot tap water around outside just until loosened. Makes 8 pops.

GRAPEFRUIT YOGURT ICE

2 large grapefruit
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 cup water
1 cup plain yogurt
8 oz. low-fat cream cheese, beaten

1 tbsp. finely chopped fresh mint

1 egg white
Grapefruit sections and mint leaves for garnish

Peel the grapefruit, divide into segments, and cut the flesh away from the membranes. Chop the flesh, reserving any juice.

In a heavy saucepan, dissolve the sugar in the water. Bring to a boil and boil until temperature

reaches 234 degrees. Set aside to cool.

Stir the grapefruit flesh and reserved juice into the syrup. Blend the yogurt and cheese together until smooth, then mix in the grapefruit mixture and mint.

Freeze the mixture until slushy. Mix well in a bowl.

Whip the egg white in a small bowl until stiff but not dry. Fold

into the grapefruit-yogurt mixture. Cover and return to the freezer (If you like, the dessert may be spooned into serving dishes now and frozen).

Transfer the dessert to the refrigerator 20 to 30 minutes before serving to soften. Decorate dishes with grapefruit segments and mint leaves. Makes about one quart.

PEAR-HAZELNUT YOGURT ICE
2 8 1/2-oz. cans of Bartlett pears in natural juice
2 tbsps. honey
1 tbsp. lemon juice
1 cup plain yogurt
1/4 cup chopped hazelnuts
Lemon balm leaves, for decoration

Drain the pears, reserving

juice. Chop the pears finely and set aside. Pour the juice into a saucepan. Add the honey and lemon juice and heat gently, stirring, until evenly mixed. Cool. Stir in the yogurt and chill for about 30 minutes.

Freeze mixture until slushy. Fold in the chopped pears and nuts. Continue freezing until firm. Serve decorated with lemon balm leaves. Makes about 1 pint.
