

**Shadduck Endorses Amendment 1**

Dear Advocate:

"Amendment No. 1 relates to the power of the probate judges. It is a good amendment and should be adopted. The only reason it has not been adopted is because our constitution provides that there must be a majority of the votes cast in favor of the amendment in order to amend the constitution.

"In the last election there were 1,460,326 votes cast. Of these, 646,608 voted YES, and 443,005 voted NO; as can be seen, 370,713 of those voting, voted neither Yes nor No on the amendment. It would be a step in the right direction to vote Yes on this amendment"

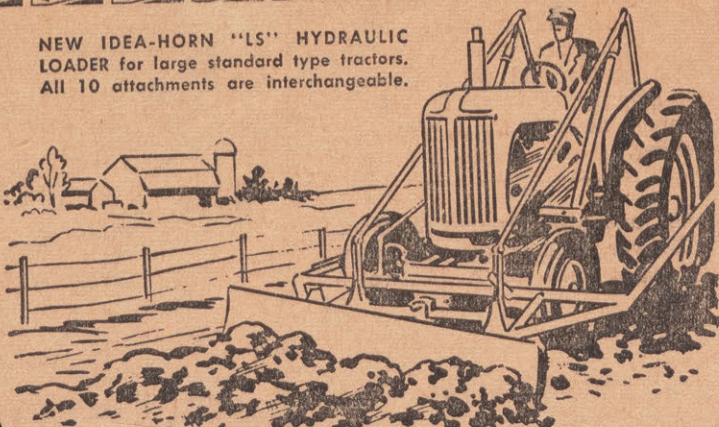
