NOTED SURGEON SECURES MANY GAME TROPHIES

Dr. T. Bakes of Czechoslovakia Returns From Cassiar

GRIZZLIES SHOT

Visitor Plans Hunting Trip Into East Kootenay Region

Concluding six weeks' of game hunting and research work in Cassiar district of Northern British Columbia for his national museum, Dr. T. Bakes, noted scientist of Czechoslovakia, returned to Vancouver Sunday with over a score of magnificent trophies. Besides the grizzlies, two moose, and three caribou, one with an antler spread of 55 inches and three other types of mountain goat fell to Dr. Bakes' rifle.

All Dr. Bakes' trophies will be packed immediately for shipment to the museum at Brno capital of Moravia, Czechoslovakia. Several of the heads will be mounted in Vancouver prior to shipment there. Pictures secured by Dr. Bakes as well as filling in the notes-books with scientific data and collecting mineral samples and British Columbia to his credit, many already in the request of the world's great museums.

A surgeon of wide reputation, Dr. Bakes, at the request of the Dominion government, was permitted to proceed immediately afterwards with a special hunting expedition to the East Kootenay where his special physicians supplied him with the necessary equipment for the trip. Dr. Bakes will return to his home in Brno, Czechoslovakia, in November.

Dr. Bakes' expedition early in the month of August, 1927, was a most successful one. He secured a grizzly bear, a moose, a caribou, and two men. His hunting expedition was a most successful one.
