Notes regarding Bulletin of the Johns Hopkins Hospital, Nos. 178, 184, and 204.

178 - Dr. Gath: The Kit-Kat Poet is one of Cushing's earliest excursions into general literature. Under the stimulation of William Osler, Cushing had been hot in the pursuit of the physician-poet.

184 - Surgery of the Blood Vessels and its Application to the Changes of Circulation and Transplantation of Organs, a presentation by A. Carrel before the Hopkins Hospital Medical Society (p. 236-237). Though Carrel is misspelled in the article, it is Alexis Carrel. He closes the presentation with "The question of the transplantation of organs in man is a very serious one and difficult, for will the transplanted organ remain and function normally after a long period of time? Another difficulty would be that of finding organs suitable for transplantation into man. A process of immunization would ~~be~~ no doubt be necessary before organs of animals would be suitable for transplantation into man. Organs from a person killed by accident would no doubt be suitable. In closing I wish to say that this work is still very incomplete as it has been carried out under not the best circumstances. I hope others will continue with the research."

Carrel had just been in this country about a year at this time and was still in Chicago (pre-Rockefeller period).

204 - On the Relation of the Parathyroid to Calcium Metabolism and the Nature of Tetany by MacCallum and Voegtlin is the classic article which first described the relation of the calcium level of the blood to tetany.
