# Utilities Giving Up CATV Franchise

Utilities commissioners Tuesday night approved a resolution giving up the franchise it held for operation of a Cable Antenna Television System in the city.

"Certain private agencies have approached the City of Greenville with proposals for the implementation of such a system and it is the considered judgment of the Greenville Utilities Commission that the exclusive franchise granted to the Greenville Utilities Commission should be rescinded in order to permit other interested parties or agencies to make such proposals as may be found feasible for the operation" of the system.

The action opens the way for private concerns to seek the CATV franchise and Director Charles Horne said a public hearing is expected to be held April 8 by the City Council.

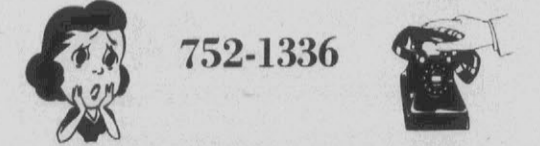
# Renegades Are Posing Threat

# Guilty Plea By Three Youths In Robbery-Murder

Three teenagers, charged in connection with a robbery and

shooting near Falkland January 10, pled guilty in Pitt County Superior Court yesterday.

William Michael Garris, 16; Dalton Earl Price, 16 and Ricky Carlton Shadding, 15, were arrested by officers after Joe Robert Edwards, 71, was robbed and shot to death at his store three miles West of Falkland.

Garris, charged with murder, armed robbery and conspiracy to commit armed robbery, pled guilty yesterday to second degree murder and armed robbery. Judge Robert Rouse sentenced him to life imprisonment on each of the two counts.

Price and Shadding, both of whom had been charged with armed robbery, conspiracy to commit armed robbery and accessory after the fact of murder entered pleas of guilty to being accessories after the fact of murder and were handed 10-year prison terms by Judge Rouse.

The robbery-murder was discovered about 12:20 p.m. The three youths were taken into custody about 6 p.m. by agents of the State Bureau of Investigation and Pitt County Sheriff's deputies; Garris at his home in the edge of Wayne County near Stantonsburg and Price and Shadding at the home of one of the youths in Stantonsburg.

Discovery of the robbery-murder touched off a massive search which included highway patrolmen from several counties, SBI officers, State ABC officers, agents from the Department of Corrections and local police, as well as a State Highway Patrol helicopter and a private airplane flown by members of the Pitt Sheriff's Department.

# Laotian Escapes

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A Laotian officer has flown a light observation aircraft into Thailand in the second airborne escape from Communist Indochina this week, the Thai Interior Ministry said today.

The ministry said Lt. Sunthorn Mongkamsee of the Lao air force landed his U.S.-made 119 "Birdog" Tuesday at an air base in Sakon Nakhon, 340 miles northeast of Bangkok.

He escaped from the Mekong River town of Savannakhet, about 60 miles from Sakon Nakhon, and reportedly told Thai officials he could not tolerate living under Communist rule.

On Monday, a South Vietnamese pilot stole a helicopter and flew his wife, four children and a mechanic to Thailand.

Details of the Laotian officer's escape were not known. The ministry said Sunthorn was a pilot of the former Royal Lao Air Force but continued to fly after the Pathet Lao takeover.

The ministry said Sunthorn would be charged with illegal entry into Thailand and was under interrogation. The aircraft, numbered 7343 and presumably among those given to the former government by the United States, was kept at Udorn air base in the northeast, the ministry said.

# Meeting Of Cities

Representatives of 16 northeastern North Carolina cities are meeting in Greenville today to discuss forming an organization to furnish them wholesale electric power.

An official of North Carolina Electricities, Fred Mills, said the proposed North Carolina Municipal Power Agency No. 2 would negotiate with Virginia Electric and Power Co. for the purchase of one of its generating units. The agency would use the unit to supply the 16 cities which operate their own electric distribution systems with power to meet peak demands.

Mills said preliminary discussions between Vepco and Electricities had been under way for some time. He expressed an interest in continuing the talks.

## National Journal Publishes Report

Church attendance during the formative years is the most influential factor in whether a young couple marries or cohabits in adulthood, according to a recent study conducted by Dr. Mel Markowski of the East Carolina University School of Home Economics and Drs. James Croake and James Keller of Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

An abstract of the research appears in the current Journal of Humanics, a national publication.

According to the study, neither the marital status of parents, the perceived level of parents' marital happiness, nor the parents' political ideology

serves to distinguish between couples likely to cohabit or couples likely to marry.

The one distinguishing variable indicated in church attendance. Young adults with backgrounds of attending church regularly with their families are more likely to marry than cohabit, and significantly more likely to be church attenders in their young adult lives, says the report.

Dr. Markowski is assistant to the dean in the ECU School of Home Economics and teaches in the Department of Child Development and Family Relations. He has degrees from East Tennessee State and Florida State Universities.

## Single-Pot Has Merits

The catchall cookbook has been a favorite for ages, since the days when desert nomads simmered the results of the day's hunt over a brushwood fire while they swapped tall tales.

One-pot cookery not only saves time and effort, it also saves money as housewives are finding in these days of ever escalating food costs.

When I was a kid my mother called it stew and usually threw in leftovers of the week. But today the one-pot dish has acquired a lot of fancy names, from the French specialty called navarin, which usually means a delectable concoction of mutton, onions, turnips and potatoes, to the classic ratatouille that turns a batch of vegetables into a culinary symphony, and the bouillabaisse, the pungent fish stew of the Mediterranean.

The casserole is a popular method of one-pot cooking which involves baking food slowly in a heavy dish with a tight-fitting lid like the famed coq au vin or spicy creole of beef.

As most cooks know, the cheaper cuts of meat are preferable to the choicer ones when they stew them because they retain their flavor and texture better than the more tender cuts. Coq au vin, for instance, was traditionally made with a rooster in the old days and it usually took several hours of simmering in wine to make it edible. An even longer session over the stove was needed to cook beef ragout back when our forefathers had to make do with the stringy Texas longhorns that were butchered after they had been herded over miles of trailways.

Today meat is generally more tender and it is just as well, since most housewives have other interests in addition to cooking and want meals that do not require too much watch-

ing — meals that can be frozen and served again if there are leftovers.

Casseroles and the like are ideal if you are entertaining. They can be cooked ahead of time, put in the refrigerator and then reheated while you are serving cocktails.

Here is an example of one-pot cooking, known as creole beef casserole.

2 tablespoons corn oil  
½ cup chopped green pepper  
½ onion chopped  
1 pound ground round of beef (or chuck)  
1 can (1 pound 3 ounces) tomatoes  
½ cup dark corn syrup  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon chili powder  
½ teaspoon pepper  
1 bay leaf  
2 tablespoons corn starch  
3 cups cooked rice  
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Heat oil in skillet over medium heat. Add onion and green pepper, saute, stirring occasionally, till tender. Add beef, browning lightly. Drain ¼ cup tomato liquid and reserve. Add tomatoes and remaining tomato liquid, corn syrup, salt, chili powder, pepper and bay leaf to beef mixture. Bring to boil, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Mix corn starch with reserved ¼ cup tomato liquid. Stir into mixture in skillet. Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Arrange alternate layers of rice, meat mixture and shredded cheese in large baking dish. Bake in 350-degree oven for half hour. Serves 6. Good with a robust red Burgundy.

FARMVILLE — The N. C. Federation of Women's Club District 15 Arts Festival was held here Saturday at the United Methodist Church.

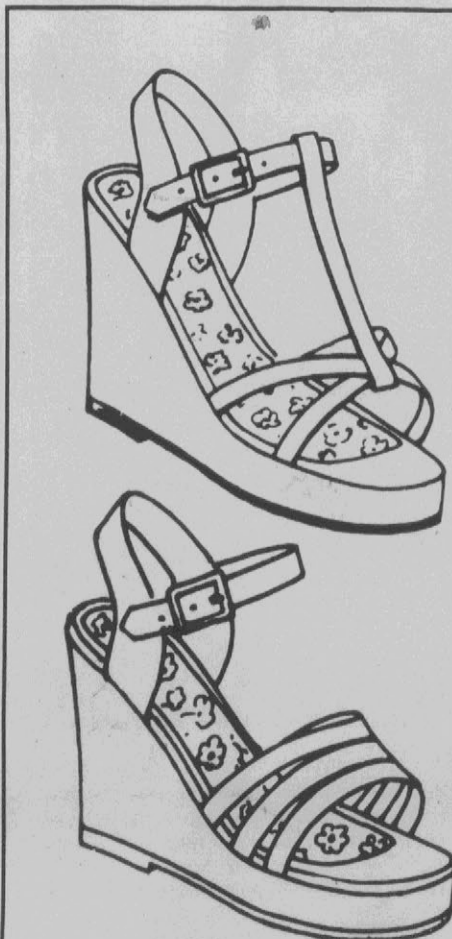

### Honey How Sweet It Is

Anyone who cooks often likes a new, simple, culinary idea. So here's one. Try honey. It's versatile, healthy and a real treat.

If you're not familiar with the product, here are some facts that will help when buying honey.

As a rule, the lightest-colored honeys are the mildest. More than half the honey produced in this country is the light-colored, mild-flavored Clover or Alfalfa honey.

Distinctively flavored honeys come from citrus blossoms, wild sage, cultivated buckwheat, horsemint, basswood and the tulip tree. A good deal of the honey on the market is a blend of different flavors and types.

Honey is sold either in extracted form or in the comb. Extracted honey is separated from the comb and sold in liquid or crystallized form. Crystallized honey may be called "creamed," "candied," "fondant," or "spread." It has a fine texture, spreads easily and doesn't drip.

Comb honey is sold as section-comb, and chunk. Section comb honey is sold in the frame. In contrast, cut-comb honey is taken out of the frames, cut into pieces and each piece is wrapped separately.

The third style — chunk honey — is packed in a jar or other container and has pieces of

comb combined with liquid honey.

By the way — there are government grade standards for honey. The top grade of extracted honey is U.S. Grade A or U.S. Fancy. The top grade of comb honey is U.S. Fancy.

### Buying Pickles

When you shop for pickles, there seems to be an endless variety to choose from. But pickle-shopping isn't all that hard — if you keep these things in mind.

The dill pickle comes in three variations: genuine dills which are prepared by a long process of natural fermentation — processed dills which start out in a brine of salt and water and are finished later in a dill solution — and the quickly fermented, cucumber-dill "overnight" pickle.

Some dill pickles are "kosher" or "kosher-style." This means they are highly spiced with onion and garlic.

After the dill pickle, comes the sour pickle. It's fermented in a salt brine, and finished in a solution of vinegar and spices. Some relishes and piccaililli are made from sour pickles.

The third basic kind of cucumber pickle is the sweet. These start out as sour pickles from which the vinegar has been drained. Then they are put into spicy liquors and aged, until they reach the desired degree of sweetness.

When buying pickles, check the label. This should help you decide whether or not the flavorings are the ones you like.

And keep in mind that pickle prices vary from item to item and from brand to brand. The reason — some types are more costly to make than others. Small whole cucumbers, long processing, and costly spices or other ingredients — can up the price.

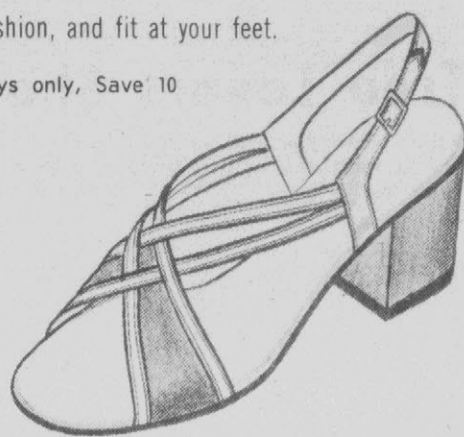

# Food Stamp Role Watched

RALEIGH — County governments across North Carolina have been alerted by state officials that local efforts to reach potential food stamp clients are being monitored.

The North Carolina Hunger Coalition, a group formed two years ago following a conference at Chapel Hill, has sent a report form and letter to people across the state asking for information about local outreach programs.

The state Division of Social Services, following up on that action, has sent a letter to county directors of social services presenting factual proof that the private anti-hunger coalition is setting up "listening posts" throughout the state to find out what counties are or are not doing to meet federal requirements for outreach programs.

Full Program  
Outreach goes beyond simple efforts to inform the public, and the questionnaire

mailed from Charlotte to local community action agencies, League of Women Voters Leadership, church people, and members of the anti-hunger coalition gets into those areas.

Efforts should be made to reach bed-ridden and elderly where they live; those unable to read should be contacted at home; registration points and stamp-issuing outlets should be located convenient to users and not isolated at a point hard to reach for those who lack transportation; and information should be made regularly available to correct wrong information about who is eligible, the coalition mailout suggests.

John Kerr, head of the state food assistance program, feels the monitoring activity is an indication of renewal by anti-hunger forces of lawsuits against governments which fail to measure up to federal standards. The Food Research and Action Center

in North Carolina, by state action to beef up outreach, won a court stay in the suit. But Kerr says reports during October, 1975, showed a "dismal effort on the part of the majority of the 100 counties to carry out the federal and court-directed mandates. By failing to conduct even minimal outreach, counties are courting lawsuits from the Food Research and Action Center."

Further legal action is not only possible but probable because of inertia, Kerr said in an article recently circulated to county commissioners by the publication of the N. C. Association of County Commissioners.

Take Action  
In that article, Kerr warns that court action is both

costly and likely to result in adverse actions affecting the government and citizens. "It would behoove all those who share the responsibilities of local administration to take a hard look into local activities and to take prompt and aggressive remedial action if warranted."

Kerr finds the monitoring activity by the hunger coalition an "ominous indication of perhaps things to come."

North Carolina currently has approximately 480,000 individuals receiving food stamps at a monthly cost of \$17.8 million; the federal government provides \$11.2 million of that while clients pay a portion to make up the remainder.

The coalition monitoring program is being conducted by Mrs. Kathryn Waller of Charlotte, and results are expected to be channeled into local efforts to correct any problems, and to the national action committee.

# A 1776 Opera Slated

WASHINGTON (AP) — An important colonial opera published in 1767 but suppressed, presumably because of its caustic social satire, will be given its world premiere this Bicentennial year.

Andrew Barton's "The Disappointment, or the Force of Credulity," is a ballad comic opera and it included the first published lyrics of "Yankee Doodle" and the first role in America drama depicting a black character.

The production at the Library of Congress Oct. 29-30 will be directed by Edward Berkeley and performed by instrumentalists and singers from the University of Rochester's Eastman School of Music.

Reconstruction of the opera's 22 ballads and lyrics was done by Jerauld Graue, chairman of the Eastman musicology department. The ballads were arranged by Samuel Adler of the Eastman School for a 13-piece instrumental ensemble.

After two performances here, the company will embark on an East Coast tour, library officials said today. Members of the cast and the tour schedule will be announced later.

The library said historians are in general agreement that "The Disappointment" is an important work not only because it holds a pioneering position in American theater but as an outstanding piece of comic drama. It is regarded by scholars as comparable to "The Beggar's Opera" and the operettas of Gilbert and Sullivan.

Andrew Barton, possibly a pen name, has not been identified, although Graue has established the existence of at least two Bartons living in Philadelphia in 1767.

Robert Freeman, director of the Eastman School, and Edward Waters of the Library of Congress agree it is extremely strange that the work has never been produced.

The premiere was scheduled at Philadelphia in 1769. The acclaimed American Company of Comedians began rehearsals but did not perform it. The Pennsylvania Gazette recorded at the time that events and characters in the opera were too obviously reflective of contemporary events and people, making it "unfit for the stage." The opera's theme of social satire was said to be a biting commentary on social classes of the day.

WASHINGTON—What happens when a presidential candidate becomes a non-candidate after being defeated in the early primaries.

I ran into one sitting on a park bench in Lafayette Square the other day, gazing across the street at the White House.

He was all alone, and I

hated to break into his reverie.

"It's a nice house," I said, trying to think of something to say.

"We could have made it nicer. My wife was going to redecorate the entire second floor," he replied. "We were going to have great parties and dances, and I was going to order new uniforms for the White House guards. I had a lot of plans for the place."

"It must be tough to be a presidential candidate one day and nobody the next," I said. "What do you miss the most?"

"My Secret Service detail. They were a great bunch of guys. They drove me anywhere I wanted to go. I never had any trouble getting a hotel room or on an airplane. You can't imagine how it feels driving down the main street of a town with six men running alongside your car. They searched every place I was going to appear, and they watched my house day and night. It was the only time I really felt safe in Washington."

"I guess once you drop out of the race, there is no danger to your life any more."

"That's what you think. How about all the people who contributed to my campaign and saw their money go down the drain? I need the Secret Service now more than I did during the primaries. There are a lot of people mad at me because I didn't do better."

"I forgot about them."

"I also miss the press. People think presidential candidates don't like the press, but they're wrong. Those cameras and lights and fellows poised with their notebooks really gives you a sense of power. Ever since I dropped out, not one person has asked me where I stand on abortion. Do you want to know where I stand on abortion?"

"Not particularly," I said. "I'm more curious as to what you thought happened to you in New Hampshire and Massachusetts?"

"My campaign staff did a lousy job; I didn't have

Extensive references were made to the numerous letters, petitions, phone calls and personal visits which Council members had received on the issue. Almost every statement upholding the law was accepted without question, while every effort was made to discredit those in opposition to the law.

In objecting to the petition calling for repeal of the law, Mr. Howard indicated that many of the signatures appeared Chinese to him. I would like to remind Councilman Howard that there are many Chinese residents in Greenville who happen to be just as much citizens as he.

Mr. Cox stated that after looking over the more than 4,000 signatures on the same petition, he concluded that only about one third of the names were valid in that the rest were either forged or belong to shoppers who only shop in Greenville but live elsewhere. This would bring the number of valid signatures more in line with those supporting the continuation of the blue law whose place of residence was not questioned.

In rejecting Mrs. McGrath's motion to have a referendum on the issue, the BLUE LAW was likened to the 55 MPH speed limit, and it was implied that the voters are not capable of making the decision in their own best interest.

In closing, I would like to say that I feel no amendment to the existing law can clarify the present situation where businesses are both half open and half closed. Either allow businesses to open completely on Sunday or don't allow them to open at all.

# Humphrey Boosts Jackson

WASHINGTON — Fresh from his Massachusetts triumph, Sen. M. Jackson campaigned in the Florida primary windup armed with a powerful new weapon to attract the large and largely uncommitted black vote: a remarkable, ringing endorsement on tape of his civil rights record by none other than Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey.

Approval by Humphrey of Jackson's use of the tribute, a tape recording of Humphrey's effusive introduction of Jackson at a political dinner last May 13, came before the Massachusetts primary at a time Jimmy Carter seemed to be building irresistible momentum.

Thus, the question arises whether Humphrey would have been so quick to approve Jackson's use of his encomium if he could have foreseen Jackson's Massachusetts victory, its damaging impact on Carter and its transformation of Jackson himself from

primary loser into a major contender for the nomination.

A non-candidate, Humphrey is nevertheless first choice among Democratic possibilities for his party's nomination, and might emerge as standard-bearer from a deadlocked convention.

Some leading party operatives, however, contend Humphrey has given and continues to give Jackson a helping hand quite apart from a desire to stop Carter and contrive a deadlock at Madison Square Garden. Whatever the motive, what he had to say about old friend Scoop Jackson last May, beamed from black radio stations all over Florida, may give Jackson a thick slice of the black primary vote — roughly 15 per cent of the total — despite his controversial campaign against forced racial busing.

"Scoop Jackson was standing in the front ranks of those who were fighting for even the most limited" civil rights victories in the late 1940s and early 1950s,

Humphrey said; "fighting to abolish the polltax, fighting to abolish segregated hospitals built with federal funds, to create a civil rights division of the Department of Justice."

"This good man," Humphrey said, fought for civil rights "when the going was hard, when it was not popular."

With no liberals competing in the Florida Democratic primary, the black vote has been somnolent and generally disinterested. Carter, aided by Rep. Mary Singleton, a black state legislator from Duval County, attracted some support, but no real enthusiasm. This, the endorsement by Humphrey, the most popular national Democrat among black voters everywhere, might accomplish two things: make it impossible for Carter to beat George Wallace, and give Jackson, whose half-baked, pre-Massachusetts Florida campaign guaranteed his coming in a low third, a more respectable showing, possibly over 20 per cent of the vote.

A footnote: Humphrey's approval of Jackson's use of the fulsome Humphrey praise in a Democratic primary campaign followed by six weeks Carter's gracious public reference to Humphrey's "reputation as a loser." Humphrey was not

amused.

Ford Bandwagonitis  
A series of intimate White House soirees arranged without any publicity by Rogers Morton, President Ford's top political aide, is raising questions among Republicans backing Ronald Reagan whether Mr. Ford will seek retribution after — and if — he wins the Republican presidential nomination.

Invitations to Morton's carefully staged soirees with the President in the Blue Room are limited to pro-Ford and fence-sitting Republicans. No reaganites wanted, thank you.

The first tea-and-cocktail tete-a-tete came last Tuesday evening (March 2). Pro-Ford Sens. William Brock and Howard Baker of Tennessee, Charles Mathias and J. Glen Beall of Maryland and about a dozen pro-Ford members of the House from those states and Florida, North Carolina and Virginia sat in the elegant splendor of the Blue Room talking presidential politics with Mr. Ford and Morton.

Not present were pro-Reagan Sens. Jesse Helms of North Carolina and William Scott of Virginia. But Florida Rep. Richard Kelly, a fence-sitter until he announced for Mr. Ford a couple of days after the session in the Blue Room, was present.

# Home Ownership Still A Need

NEW YORK (AP) — Home ownership, said Philip C. Smaby, is a principle that made America great. He feels that freedom, independence and owning a piece of property are all facets of the same aspiration.

Now in this bicentennial year, many Americans who sought to fulfill the dream find they cannot afford the down payment or the monthly installments required. The average new house is priced beyond the average person's means.

Do we abandon the goal? No, said Smaby, who is the new president of the National Association of Realtors; we return instead to another trait found in the forefathers, to basics and simplicity. "People will demand such houses be built," said Smaby, president also of Bermet-Smaby Realty of Minneapolis. "I feel they are willing to give up the amenities for a plot with a basic house."

That house would contain two bedrooms and one bath. It would be similar to those built immediately after World War II, he said, a house of 900 to 1,100 square feet with an expansion attic for another bedroom as financial ability improves.

Conceding that the price of land, labor, money and materials have contributed to the sharp rise in the cost of new housing, Smaby notes that another reason was the enlarging of houses to 2,000 square feet and five bedrooms.

As a result, the cost of the typical new, single-family home is around \$40,000 today, while the median income is around \$13,000. Only a small percentage of Americans, therefore, can afford the house they want.

What Smaby says is not new, but it is a hard lesson to accept, many builders went bankrupt rather than cut back, and many potential buyers continued to rent rather than lower the level of their dreams.

Some also sought out older homes, which Smaby estimates often sell for \$5,000 less. While new home sales fell in January to the lowest level in six months, the existing home market remained very strong.

The attitude is somewhat comparable to that which exists in the automobile market, in which full-size used cars in good condition command premium prices, while sales of some new compacts are dragging. The situation in both markets is sometimes said to be evidence of a reluctance to face reality, and it is probably true that it is a condition also that cannot continue. The supply isn't there.

Smaby believes that builders, sellers and buyers are all about it accept the reality and cut back.

"Realtors have been saying this for a long time," said Smaby. Now, he said, "I feel builders sense it." And he continued, "People are demanding that such a house be built."

Some builders, in fact, already have cut many thousands of dollars off their product without, they say, compromising quality construction standards.

The cutbacks generally involve reducing the lot size and the size of the house too, leaving the attic unfinished, reducing the detailing, eliminating garages and even carports, using less glamorous kitchen fixtures and the like.

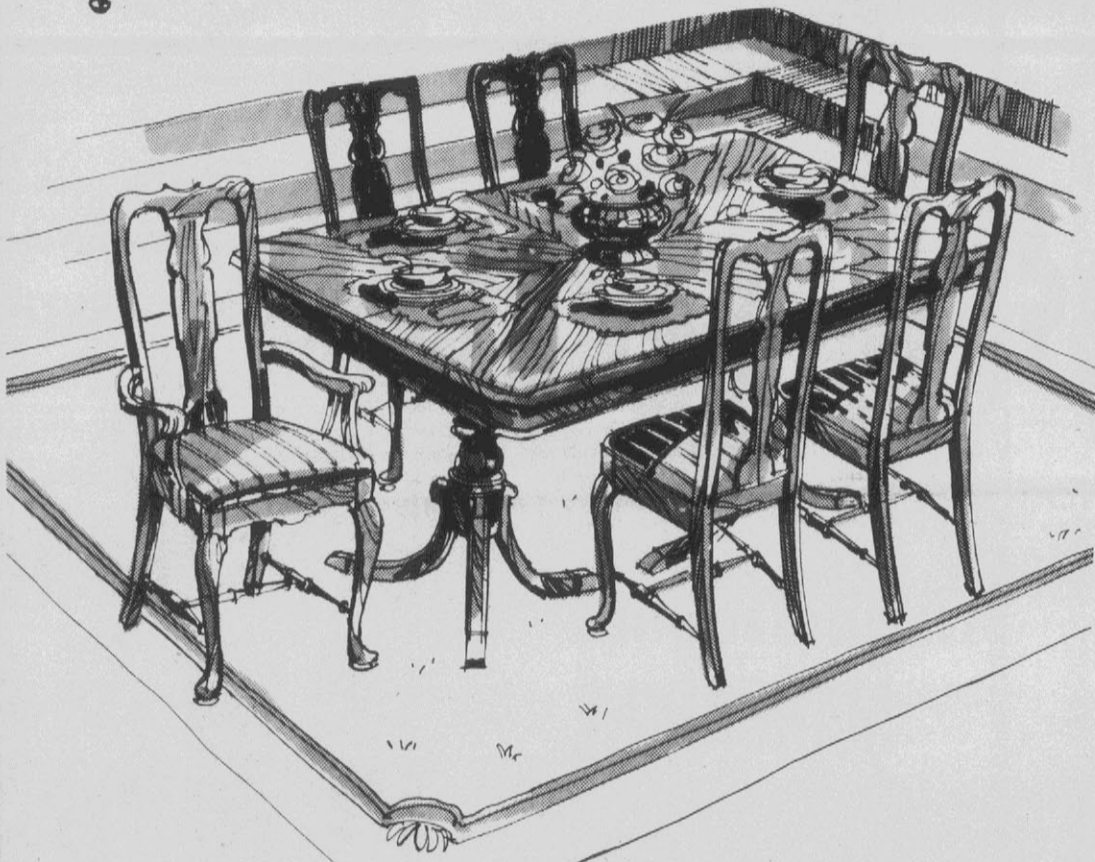

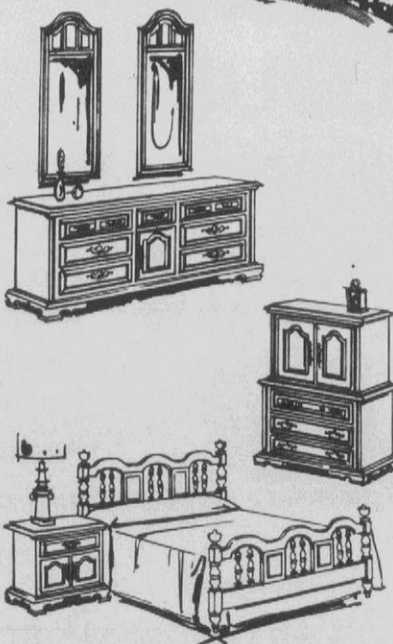

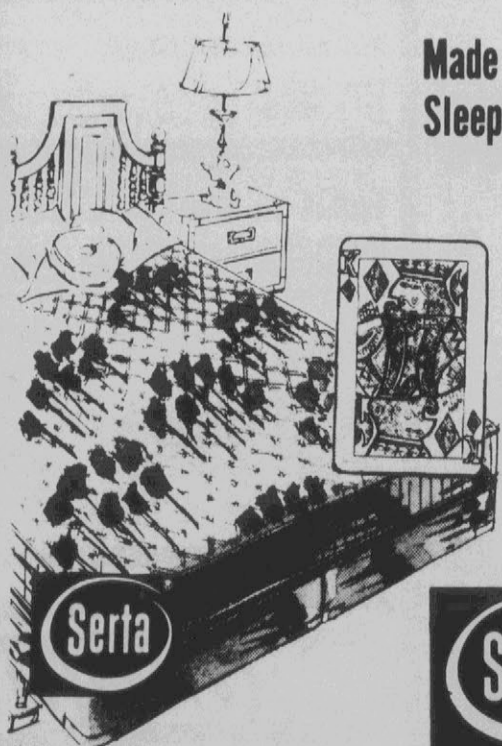

# Nixon's Version Contradicting Kissinger View

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard M. Nixon reportedly claims he did not personally select persons who were the objects of wiretaps early in his presidency, a statement that apparently contradicts the views of Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger.

According to published reports, the former president says in a deposition that he approved an over-all wiretap program in 1969 but left the specific targets to Kissinger, then Nixon's security adviser. The deposition was to be filed in court today.

Nixon's position would appear to conflict with Kissinger's sworn statement that "while his (Nixon's) authorization was in general terms and not limited to specific individuals, my understanding was that he then directed surveillance of Morton Halperin and certain others."

Halperin, a one-time national security aide who was one of 17 persons wiretapped, is suing the former president, Kissinger and others for damages that could exceed \$3 million.

Nixon gave the deposition — a question and answer session under oath — at his home in San Clemente, Calif., on Jan. 16 in connection with the Halperin suit. Nixon had sought to avoid giving the deposition but was ordered to participate by U.S. District Judge John Lewis Smith Jr.

Four days before Nixon testified, Kissinger said in a sworn statement that when he walked into an Oval Office meeting already in progress on April 25, 1969, Nixon was discussing leaks of sensitive information with FBI director J. Edgar Hoover and Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell.

"I was told that the President had decided to go back to the previous practice of using wiretaps as the most effective means of discovering leaks," Kissinger said.

He added he was asked to supply the names of key individuals who had access to information that had been leaked and "I was assured that the wiretap program envisioned was entirely lawful..."

Kissinger said Hoover assured Nixon that wiretapping in similar situations had been a common practice in previous

Invited but regretting was Rep. Marjorie Holt of Maryland, a Reagan-leaning fence-sitter who explained to the White House she could not attend because the House was staying in session late that evening.

At that meeting, Kissinger said, Hoover identified four persons as security risks, including Halperin.  
"It was my understanding that President Nixon directed surveillance of the persons then suggested by Director Hoover," he said.

The wiretaps were placed for varying lengths of time on telephones of the 17 persons, including four newsmen, White House aides and Pentagon officials.

Halperin contends the taps were illegal and that the tap on his telephone continued long after he left government service because the Nixon administration sought to collect information for political purposes. His suit names present and former government officials, the current FBI director and the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Co.

enough money; the people weren't interested in my plans for nuclear energy; the weather was lousy so my constituents didn't turn out; I couldn't get on the good TV shows, and my car broke down in Worcester. But I'm not blaming anyone."

"It takes a big man not to blame anyone for his defeat."  
"I thought the press was wrong to play up my labor support. They never did give the correct version of my stand on busing, and the Catholics, Jews and Protestants never gave me the help I needed in their neighborhoods. The blacks and women were conned by my opponents, and the senior citizens misunderstood my Social Security reforms. Outside of that, I think I ran the best campaign of anyone in the race."

"It sounds that way to me," I said. "What now? Have you given up your presidential ambitions?"

"No, I haven't. As I see it, Jimmy Carter, Scoop Jackson and Mo Udall are all going to come to the convention thinking they can trade off enough delegates to win it. But George Wallace is going to stalemate them. Hubert Humphrey will then make himself available, but Carter, Jackson and Udall will be so angry that they worked their tails off, they will refuse to give it to Humphrey. So they'll look for a compromise candidate."  
"That only leaves Fred Harris and Milton Shapp," I said.

"And me. I'll offer Carter the Vice Presidency, make Jackson secretary of state, Udall secretary of defense and Mayor Daley attorney general."

"What about George Wallace?"  
"He can be ambassador to the United Nations."

"It's a heckuva game plan, if you can swing it."  
The defeated candidate looked across at the White House once more. "How would you like to be my press secretary?"

"Wow, would I! What do I have to do?"  
"Just tell me which bus I take back to Bethesda."

**Gun Works  
Patronized**

UNION CITY, Tenn. (AP) —  
When Turner Kirkland started  
his antique gun business, he op-  
erated out of the trunk of his  
car. Today, the operation is a  
\$2 million-a-year business with  
a combined showroom-museum-  
warehouse that draws collec-  
tors from all over.

Scattered around the show-  
room and filed away in bins in  
the warehouse are things like  
brand-new parts for antique  
rifles and pistols, kits for  
muzzle-loading firearms, repro-  
ductions of Civil War uniforms  
and a show case containing a  
huge muzzle-loader used by  
Kirkland to kill an elephant  
during an African safari.

Despite its size, the Dixie  
Gun Works is conducted with a  
combination of down home hos-  
pitality and frankness, making  
it hard to walk out of the place  
without buying something like a  
small cannon (\$125) or a leath-  
er hunting pouch (\$14).

"Now here's a man who  
drove all the way down here  
from Illinois," Kirkland says,  
"He wants to swap his pistols  
for these two rifles, and I be-  
lieve we'll be able to strike a  
bargain... We'll take his pistols  
and mark 'em up a little bit  
and sell them to make a profit  
and he'll have the rifles he  
needs for his collection."

The price tags on the rifles  
total more than \$700.

Kirkland loves to swap guns,  
but he's willing to sell for cash.  
And he'll swap or sell in person  
or by mail.

An hour or two with the 550-  
page catalog he publishes each  
year is almost as good as a vis-  
it with Kirkland in person.

Above a picture of a \$16  
Davy Crocket hunting pouch is  
this legend:

"It has been carefully repro-  
duced from dimensions taken  
from an authentic original...  
The manufacturer has installed  
a modern flap closure that is  
incorrect for this high-quality  
pouch. This closure should be  
removed and a horn button in-  
stalled in its place..."

The catalog says the horn  
button will be sent without  
charge so proper modifications  
can be made.

Another section assures cus-

tomers of the authenticity of In-  
dian tomahawk reproductions,  
but warns that the head may  
fly off unless the purchaser  
soaks the weapon in water to  
swell the handle.

Kirkland's customers are  
mostly folks who like to do  
things the way they used to be  
done.

"It's nostalgia," he says.  
"The old-time way — the hard  
way. Anybody can take a 30-  
ought-6 and get a deer, but how  
many can bring home game  
with a muzzle-loader and black  
powder?"

Twenty years ago Kirkland  
forsaw the growth of the an-  
tique firearms hobby and de-  
cided to design his own Ken-  
tucky rifle. He contracted with  
a Belgium company to produce  
kits which could, with a little  
work, be turned into operable  
firearms.

The Dixie Kentucky Rifle, a  
reproduction of the rifle carried  
by Daniel Boone and other  
mountain men, sold then for  
\$79.50. Today the kit appears in  
Kirkland's catalog at \$179.95.

For the avid collector, there  
are dozens of similar kits that  
will produce a .50-caliber  
Hawken rifle, a Minuteman  
flint rifle or even a faithful re-  
production of a blunderbuss or  
a dueling pistol.

**Workshop Is  
Big Yarn-User**

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) —  
A popular art workshop for  
children here uses enough yarn  
in a year to link the Empire  
State Building to the Washing-  
ton Monument.

The kids in the Crown Center

# Patty's Attorney And Expert Witness Wage Verbal Fight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — For an entire day, Patricia Hearst's attorney and a government witness waged a verbal battle that was a virtual stand-off — and left the defendant all but lost in the war of words.

Miss Hearst, on trial for a terrorist bank robbery, heard her name mentioned fewer than a half-dozen times Tuesday, prompting U.S. District Court Judge Oliver J. Carter to sigh at one point, "We're losing sight of the Hearst trial."

Her attorney, F. Lee Bailey, and psychiatric expert Dr. Joel Fort traded thinly veiled insults

and lengthy questions and answers tinged with sarcasm on matters dealing with Fort's attitudes and qualifications.

Bailey was expected to complete his cross-examination of Fort today, and U.S. Atty. James L. Browning Jr. planned further questions as he tries to prove Miss Hearst was a convert to terrorism and thus took part in the bank robbery willingly. Miss Hearst says she participated only in fear of her life.

During the course of one argument outside the presence of the jury, the defense counsel conceded that Fort's testimony suggesting his client willingly

became a terrorist was the most damaging yet.

Alluding to the jurors, he said, "If they accept his opinion, that's the end of the case."

Twice on Tuesday, the judge mildly prodded Bailey to wrap up the interrogation. When he once reminded Bailey that he had said he would finish by the end of the day, the attorney replied, "I'm trying to get to it but I'm getting some very long answers."

Obviously impatient at times, the attorney snapped at Fort once, "Can't you answer a question without delivering a lecture, doctor, or do you insist on it?"

Fort replied that lengthy answers were frequently necessary because Bailey was distorting his views.

"Your way of phrasing questions is based on your own lectures on how to destroy a witness you do not like," argued Fort.

Bailey repeatedly attempted to portray Fort as unqualified to declare, as he did Monday, that Miss Hearst was a dedicated member of the Symbionese Liberation Army when it robbed the Hibernia Bank in April 1974.

Fort had said that Miss Hearst, kidnaped by the SLA two months earlier, found an excitement in the underground that she had never known and embraced it vigorously.

He testified Tuesday that he received a "death threat last week. The threat was if I testified for the U.S. government, I'd be killed."

Bailey asked, "Where did the threat come from?"

"I wish I knew," Fort replied. "Do you know anything about it, Mr. Bailey?"

That comment was stricken from the court record at Bailey's request.

# CB Slang Dictionary Is By 'Sugar Britches'

NEW YORK (AP) — A road-weary trucker's drawl comes crackling through the lonely night, across the long highway: "How about that Sugar Britches? You got the Georgia Nightcrawler looking for that sweet thing."

A fetching, gum-chewing voice answers back over the citizens' band radio: "You got the Sugar Britches here. Come on, good buddy."

Typical opening of a CB confab with the Sugar Britches, the name — or "handle" — of Lanie Dills, 34, a Nashville, Tenn., businesswoman who wrote the first CB dictionary.

Her "CB Slang Language Dictionary" is coming out in revision this week with more than 1,000 terms.

She bought a CB radio last June to help her avoid getting speeding tickets. "I had a bad case of mike fright at first," Lanie says. "I wanted to be able to talk with truckers, know the lingo and not get laughed off the airwaves," she said in an interview here.

She searched without success for a dictionary of colorful CB terms, then decided to write her own.

Lanie bought CB radios for her friends and asked them to report on terms used around Helena, Mont., Boston, Santa

Ana, Calif., Roswell, N.M., Dallas and St. Louis. She covered the Southeast in her travels.

A few of her findings: There are at least 84 references to police and police stations, including Kojak, Pink Panther, Sneaky Snake and the universal Smokey. There are at least nine words for speeding ticket, including feeding the bears and spreading the greens.

She also found six words for prostitute, including free ride, dress for sale and pavement princess; 21 words for woman or wife, including warden, super skirt and sweet thing; four words for coffee, including cup of mud, black water and 30-weight.

Beer might be barley pop in the Northwest, Colorado Kool-aid in the West, honey in the Southeast and 40-weight in the Southwest.

Compiling the dictionary has made the Sugar Britches something of a CB celebrity. She is sought out on the airwaves and welcomed in truck stops, pizza parlors and other haunts of CB

denizens like "Hot Lips" and the "Tennessee Ridge Runner."

A good handle, like "Sugar Britches," is hard to come by and jealously guarded, says Lanie, who used to be called Cherokee, Miss Canonball and the Nashville Wild Child.

She was dubbed "Sugar Britches" out of the blue by a trucker who chatted with her one

night and concluded by saying: "Okay, Sugar Britches. Catch you on the flip-flop (return trip)."

"When I heard it, I knew that was my handle," says Lanie.

She is one of the estimated 11 million CB operators. The Federal Communications Commission received about 415,000 CB applications last December.

"CB provides a personal communications link that people didn't have before," Lanie says. "It helps people to help each other without a total body commitment of actually wrenching a knife from somebody's hand."

"It's a club anybody can join. All you have to do is learn the language. There's a lot of camaraderie."

CB also enables operators to assume a different personality. "It's like being on stage," she says. "You can name yourself and create your own image. You don't need to brush your teeth or comb your hair or put on a new suit."

Sometimes being the Sugar Britches means getting asked for dates, like: "How 'bout it, Sugar Britches? How 'bout peeling off at this exit 202 for some mud?"

Most understand a "no thanks."

CB wives tell Lanie that their professional husbands — doctors, lawyers, businessmen — try to assume truckers' jargon and a twang or a drawl. They choose handles like the Irish

Bootlegger, Ohio Knucklehead and Country Bumpkin.

## Will Intensify Drive To Curtail Funds For IRA

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — Prime Minister Liam Cosgrave will intensify his government's campaign to curb the flow of money from Irish-Americans that he claims bankrolls Irish Republican Army guerrillas, government officials said today.

Cosgrave, a major opponent of the IRA, will launch his high-powered attack on the guerrillas by addressing the U.S. Congress next Wednesday at the start of a six-day visit to the United States.

He will also meet with President Ford to spell out the IRA threat in Ireland and the urgent need for U.S. efforts to crack down on guerrilla fundraisers and gunrunners operating in America.

Later during his trip, his first to the United States as prime minister, he will address Irish-American organizations.

It is these organizations, the British government claims, that have provided much of an esti-

mated \$1.5 million that has been used by the IRA's Provisional wing to buy weapons and explosives since 1971.

The IRA is fighting to end British rule in Northern Ireland and unite that Protestant-dominated province with the mainly Roman Catholic Irish Republic. However, it also aims eventually to topple the Dublin government.

Irish and British government ministers have urged Irish-Americans to stop giving money to organizations that claim to be collecting for relief work in war-torn Northern Ireland. Both administrations claim the bulk of the funds go to the IRA.

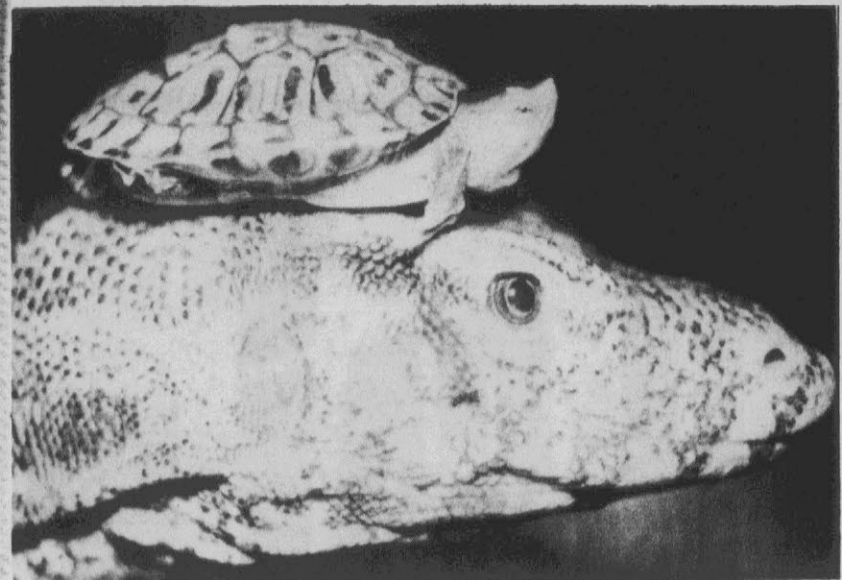
The British army claims that 85 per cent of the weapons it has captured in Northern Ireland are either U.S.-made or supplied by sympathizers in the United States.

British officials believe Cosgrave's personal appeal to Irish-Americans will carry considerable weight. But some

Irish officials concede Cosgrave could put his popularity at risk by attacking the IRA at a time of high Irish emotionalism during the St. Patrick's Day celebrations in the United States.

However, there are signs that the recent anti-IRA propaganda campaign waged in the United States by both Britain and Ireland may be paying off. The New York-based Irish Northern Aid Committee, which both governments charge is the main IRA fundraiser in America, has claimed its collections have fallen in the last six months.

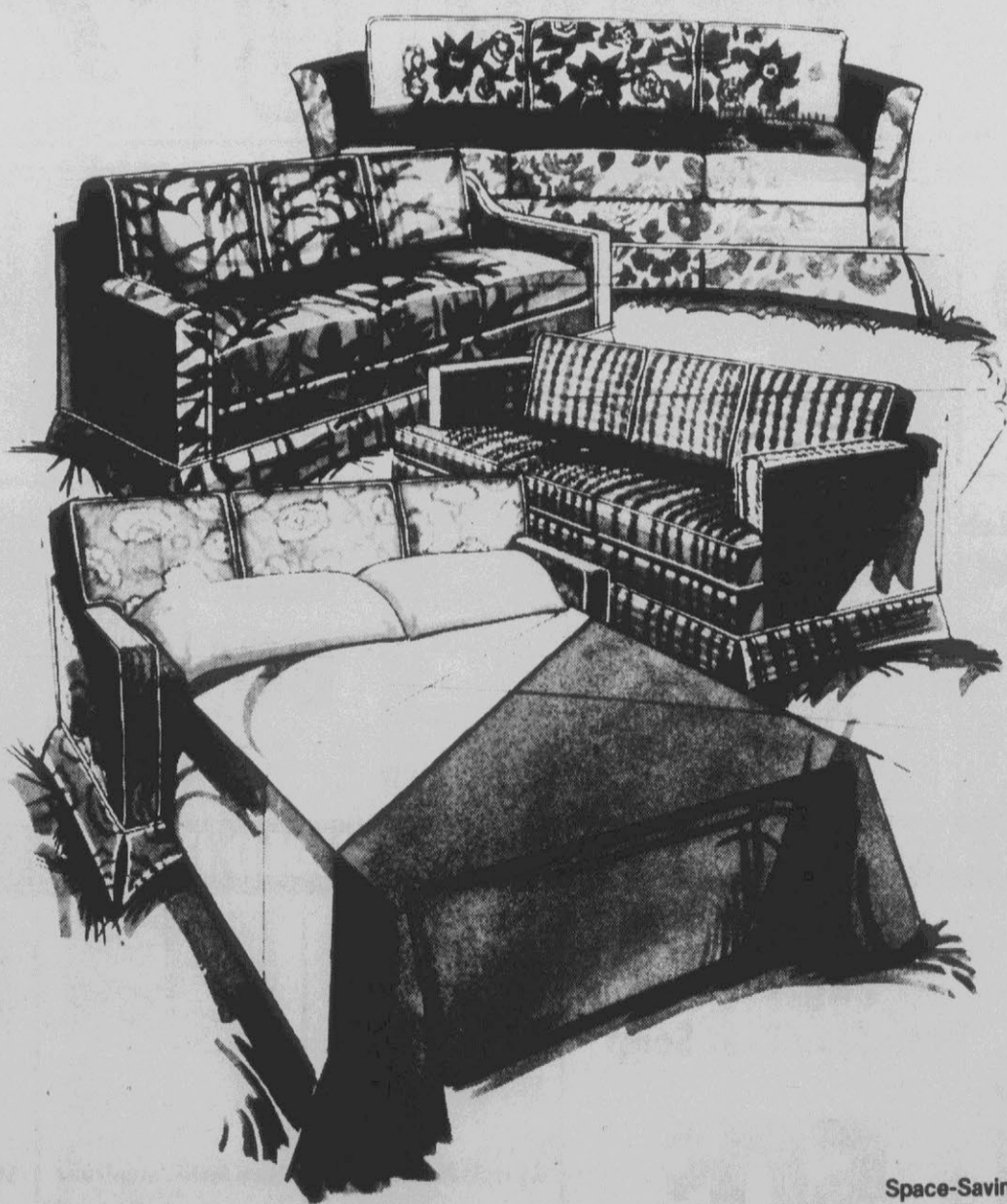

# How N.C. Representatives And Senators Voted

**By ROLL CALL REPORT**  
**WASHINGTON**—Here's how area Members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes Feb. 26 through March 3.

**House**  
**BLACK LUNG**—Passed, 210 for and 183 against, a bill (HR 10760) liberalizing "black lung" disease benefits for coal miners with long service. Also, it would gradually shift the cost of the benefits from the federal government to coal operators, who would pay into a new U.S. Treasury trust fund to finance disability payments. The bill

was sent to the Senate. The measure provides automatic payments to all miners who by June 30, 1971 had spent 25 years mining hard coal or 30 years mining soft coal. Other miners must prove affliction by the disease to receive payments.

Supporters said that most miners who have spent 25-30 years in mines before 1971 have black lung (pneumoconiosis), and that making them prove disability to receive benefits causes needless delay and expense. Rep. Ken Hechler (D-W. Va.) said that requiring coal

operators whose mines have caused black lung to pay more into the trust fund will generate "pressure to bring those dust levels down to protect miners."

Opponents said the bill would create for many miners a new pension system which is expensive to the government while demanding no proof of disability if length of employment is satisfied. Rep. Virginia Smith (R-Neb.) called the bill "a special interest handout worse, even, than the Lockheed loan bill of several years ago."

Rep. Charles Rose (D-7) voted "yea."

Reps. Walter Jones (D-1), L.H. Fountain (D-2), David Henderson (D-3), Stephen Neal (D-5), Richardson Preyer (D-6), W.G. Hefner (D-8), James Martin (R-9), James Broyhill (R-10), and Roy Taylor (D-11) voted "nay."

Rep. Ike Andrews (D-4) did

not vote.

**FOREIGN AID**—Passed, 240 for and 169 against, a bill (H Res 1068) authorizing \$4.8 billion in foreign military and economic aid for the current fiscal year. The measure was sent to conference with the Senate.

A majority of the funds—\$3 billion—would go to Israel and Egypt to help implement the Middle East peace accord. Other provisions of the bill increase control over arms sales, ban aid to nations violating human rights, and allow limited trade with North Vietnam.

Supporters said the bill authorizes funds vital to peace-keeping in the Middle East, while also bringing arms sales and gifts under closer scrutiny. "It is high time that we carefully evaluate hitherto indiscriminate U.S. contributions to burgeoning arms races scattered across the globe," said Rep. Charles

Whalen (R-Ohio).

Some opponents said the restrictive provisions of the bill are unwarranted congressional efforts to "hobble and hamstring" the Administration in foreign policy. Others agreed with Rep. Clement Zablocki (D-Wis.) that "this massive, unnecessary, warmongering military giveaway is far too excessive."

Preyer voted "yea."

Henderson, Jones, Andrews, Neal, Rose, Hefner, Martin, Broyhill and Taylor voted "nay."

Fountain did not vote.

**HOUSE RULES**—Adopted, 258 for and 107 against, a resolution (H Res 968) to amend the House rules to require that all bills, resolutions and reports be printed and made available to Members at least two hours before floor consideration. The requirement could be waived by

a majority vote of the House.

A supporter, Rep. John Burton (D-Calif.) called the resolution a "safeguard" against occasions when the legislative logjam causes ill-informed votes on measures not yet printed. "We ought to have the bill before us in print, not merely in the document room," he said.

An opponent, Rep. John Anderson (R-Ill.), said the House is already adequately protected by rules requiring documents to be printed, although such rules are often waived. Anderson said he feared that backers of a controversial bill could use the two-hour rule "to insure that Members will not have adequate time to study the report in advance," by withholding it from print until two hours before debate.

Jones, Fountain, Henderson, Andrews, Neal, Preyer, Hefner, Martin and Taylor voted "yea."

Broyhill voted "nay." Rose did not vote.

**Senate**  
**RAIL FUNDS**—Passed, 62 for and 23 against, a resolution (S Res 801) appropriating \$2.3 billion for the current fiscal year, for rail programs including the takeover of bankrupt Northeastern railroads by the new federal ConRail corporation. The measure was sent to conference with the House.

The resolution appropriates \$2 billion for the purchase by ConRail of the assets of seven bankrupt railroads, and most of the remaining funds will sub-

sidize Amtrak passenger service.

A supporter, Sen. Richard Schweiker (R-Pa.), said the measure is another step toward a "revitalized rail system" which will be self-supporting. Schweiker added: "It is time we stopped bailing out the bankrupts on a stop-gap basis and get on with the implementation of a long-term solution..."

No opponents spoke during floor debate.

Sen. Jesse Helms (R) voted "nay."

Sen. Robert Morgan (D) did not vote.

## Services Director Will Fight Charges

**WASHINGTON, N.C. (AP)**—Betty Agnew, Beaufort County's social services director, has promised to stay in office and fight charges of embezzlement and misapplication of public funds.

She was arrested Tuesday afternoon and posted \$3,000 bond. She was indicted Monday on charges of misapplying \$1,128.94 between March 16, 1971, and April 1, 1975; of converting to her own use some \$1,300 in county money; and of obtaining \$434.63 on Feb. 18, 1975, under false pretenses.

"I have not misused or misapplied any funds, and I do not owe any trust fund or any other agency or department one single penny," Mrs. Agnew said, promising to remain in office while the matter is pending before the courts.

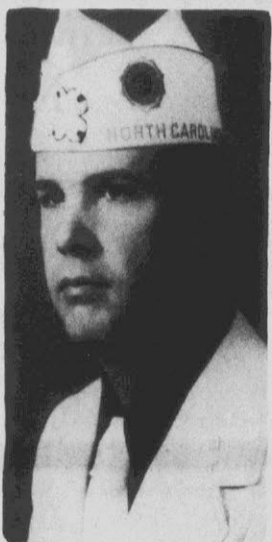
Mrs. Agnew charged that the indictments were forced by "local sources that have an axe to grind..." but she didn't provide further detail.

Two agents of the state Justice Department questioned her for several days recently, she said. The director said the county social services board and the county commission had each approved the transactions named in the indictments.

Any mistakes that might have occurred would be a result of poor bookkeeping because she lacks experience in keeping books and had received no bookkeeping assistance from the county or state, she said.

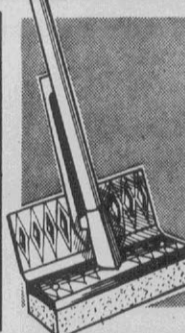

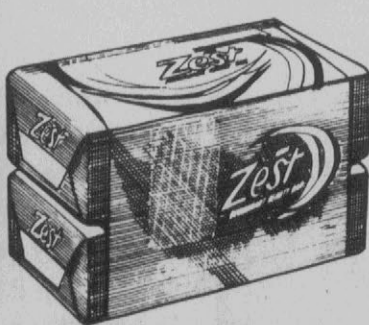

# Concorde Begins Legal Fights

NEW YORK (AP) — Legal challenges to the Concorde supersonic jet will postpone its debut at Kennedy International Airport months beyond the announced April 10 starting date, proponents of the fast but noisy plane say.

"Realistically, there's no bloody chance that we'll start on April 10," a source who works for Concorde's owners said Tuesday.

He estimated that resolution of legal issues might delay Concorde's arrival here until fall or early winter. And opponents of the foreign jet are hard at work to see that Concorde never lands in the United States.

Transportation Secretary William T. Coleman Jr. ruled Feb. 4 that Air France and British Airways could offer limited

flights by the 1,400-mile-an-hour plane into Kennedy and Dulles International Airport outside Washington.

Among the hurdles for the Concorde:

—A suit filed in U.S. District Court in Washington by three counties in Virginia and New York charging that the government should not allow the plane to land until it has set regulations on the maximum noise levels for supersonic planes.

—A suit filed by the Environmental Defense Fund and joined by 30 members of Congress and the State of New York asking for a review of Coleman's decision to allow the British and French-built plane to make four daily landings at Kennedy and two daily at Dulles.

—Resolution of the issue of whether the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey,

which operates Kennedy, has the right to review landing rights of individual aircraft. This question could also end up in court.

The Concorde dispute involves environmental considerations, U.S. relations with France and Great Britain and legal liability for any damage suits that might be brought as the result of the airplane's operation.

New York's legislature passed and Gov. Hugh Carey signed a bill that would bar the plane from Kennedy, but the New Jersey legislature would have to take similar action for the ban to have any effect. The airlines say they will sue if that happens.


Coleman said Tuesday at the National Press Club in Washington that the New York action might be unconstitutional because it is discriminatory and because it places an undue

burden on interstate and foreign commerce.

Briefs in the Environmental Defense Fund suit are not due until March 18, but lawyer John Hellegers said he would argue that the impact statement Coleman considered excluded certain considerations, that the noise impact was understated and that there were procedural

errors in the handling.

In the suit by the three counties, which are near or contain the two airports, the first issue to be decided is whether the federal District Court has jurisdiction or if the case should be in the Court of Appeals along with the EDF action. The judge said he hopes to decide that issue by the end of the week.

## Avers Slums Are Making Communists

MEXICO CITY, Mexico (AP) — In front of the cardboard and scrap wood shack, three men strummed guitars and sang the words of a song that has become popular in Mexico City's numerous squatter towns. "How sad my people are, living in houses of cardboard ... how happy live the dogs in the house of the exploiter," go the words. No one knows who wrote the song but many are singing it in the shantytowns that have sprung up on privately owned or government land. "They're fighting," said Francisco de la Cruz, a self-professed Marxist who is the leader of an organization he says is active in most of the 585 shantytowns or "lost cities" ringing the capital, as they do in many Latin American cities. "The insurrection of the poor people is knocking at the door," he said. "We can't wait for a government that serves capitalism to help us."

De la Cruz and some of his aides made it clear that they think communism is the only way Mexico's slum problem will be solved.

De la Cruz's organization, set up in brigades, has established learning centers for slum children who do not attend public schools. The children get heavy doses of Marxist doctrine. Tots there shoot clenched fists into the air and chant leftist slogans in unison.

Names of slum streets, which look more like narrow dirt alleyways, sometimes bear the names of prominent Communist leaders — Che Guevara, Ho Chi Minh, Fidel Castro and others.

Brigades of de la Cruz's leftists can always be found working in the slums. Some brigades teach, some run health clinics, some organize cleanup campaigns and others collect money for "the cause."

A de la Cruz assistant said the organization has steady contact with Chilean refugees living in Mexico. The refugees fled Chile in 1973 after a military coup toppled the regime of the late Marxist President Salvador Allende.

The de la Cruz operation also has contact with underground leftist leaders in Santiago, Chile, and in Guatemala, the assistant said.

Mexico has enjoyed a half century of political stability and the chance of anyone organizing a successive revolution in the near future is remote.

The government continues to try to cope with the problem of housing. But it can't keep up with the 3.7 per cent annual growth rate of the population, one of the highest in the world. The U.S. population growth rate has reached a virtual zero point.

The government says that in the last five years it has replaced 157 lost cities, where 10,000 persons lived, with government subsidized housing. In the 1960s a giant housing project in the capital provided homes for 100,000 families.

Despite this, the slums keep multiplying.

The shortage of housing was 4 million units, according to the 1970 census. A recent study indicated the shortage will rise to almost 9 million houses by 1980, more houses than Mexico presently has.

## Running For House Seat

Brown has been a Superior Court solicitor and chairman of the Haywood County Board of Elections.

The 17 counties in the western North Carolina district are Avery, Buncombe, Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, McDowell, Macon, Madison, Mitchell, Polk, Rutherford, Swain, Transylvania and Yancey.

# Closing Doors On Freshmen

RALEIGH (AP)—High school seniors who are applying to become part of the next freshman class at North Carolina State University are being told to not bother, there's no hope they'll get in.

The enrollment quota for next academic year is filled, said Admissions Director Anna P. Keller. The university has been putting qualified applicants on a waiting list since Feb. 16, she said, noting there is little hope that any of those on the list will be accepted.

The school's action is in compliance with enrollment limitations set by the university system's board of governors. Normally, the deadline for applying at the school is May 1.

Students who have been accepted have until Monday to notify the university that they will enroll, Mrs. Keller said. If enough people decide to decline invitations to attend the school, some of those on the waiting list may get in, she said.

University officials have set 2,500 freshmen as the proper size class for next year, Mrs. Keller said. Because some people will decide to go elsewhere, 3,000 persons have been

accepted for the class, but that large number accepted gives little hope to those on the waiting list, she said.

North Carolina State has an enrollment of 14,768 students this year. The board of governors ordered the school to hold the number of students between 14,860 and 14,960 next year. Officials say they hope to hit the middle of that range.

Overall, the 16-campus university system is overenrolled by 6.8 per cent with 92,451 students. The system only has a budget for an enrollment of 86,575 students.

## No Sign Of Undue Force

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP)—Two physicians say their autopsies on a Marine recruit have disclosed no evidence that excessive force was used by the three Charlotte policemen with whom he fought.

Dr. Dmitri Contostavios, an assistant medical examiner in Philadelphia, said, "I found evidence of a single, relatively minor blow to the head." He said such an injury would not normally cause death.

Contostavios performed an autopsy last Friday at the request of the family of the recruit, Kenneth M. Brown, 18, of Lawnside, N. J.

In Charlotte, Dr. Hobart Wood, Mecklenburg County's medical examiner, agreed. He said he found no evidence that Brown had been repeatedly beaten. Brown, who had been on his way to the Marine Recruit Depot at Parris Island, S.C., got into a fight with police after he reportedly refused to go through a metal detector at Charlotte's Douglas Municipal Airport on Feb. 27. Wood said the only serious wound on Brown's body was a 1 1/2-inch cut on the back of the head. The physician said such a wound would cause "lots of bleeding, but you wouldn't think it would kill a healthy 18-year-old."

Both doctors said that in the absence of a more likely cause of death, they thought a concussion probably killed Brown.

Police said Brown pulled the pistol from one officer's holster and pulled the trigger, but the gun did not fire. Police said Brown was hit with a nightstick but they added that no more force than necessary was used to subdue the youth in a fight that lasted approximately 10 minutes.

Officers took Brown to Charlotte Memorial Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

The NAACP and the Charlotte Black Political Caucus have asked for public hearings to investigate the incident.

## Bateman Named To Fill Post In Johnston County

Kenneth (Ken) R. Bateman, a Pitt County Agricultural Extension Agency has been named an assistant agricultural extension agent for Johnston County. Bateman has been working in Pitt County as an assistant agent in tobacco and horticulture. He will assume his new duties April 1 to fill a vacancy created by the death of Cameron Garris of Smithfield in November.

Bateman has been with the Pitt County Agriculture Extension Agency since June 1974. He received a B.S. in agronomy from N.C. State University in 1972 and his master degree in crop production in 1974. He is married to the former Janice Flowers.

## 'Sunshine Boys' Set A Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Radio City Music Hall, a New York theater, said the film "The Sunshine Boys" made more money than any other film in its 43-year history.

It said 834,719 persons paid a total of \$3,164,929 over an 11-week engagement that ended in January. It said the previous high of \$3,096,635 was set in 1968 by "The Odd Couple" over a 14-week period.

# Maryland Lawmen Will Study Clues In Killings

COLUMBIA, N.C. (AP)—Two detectives from Montgomery County, Md., were expected today to visit the State Bureau of Investigation crime laboratory in Raleigh to review further evidence in the mass slaying of a family whose bodies were found in Tyrell County last week.

The officers, J. R. Sargent and Clem Orbin, spent Tuesday in the Columbia area with SBI agents and Sheriff Royce Rhodes, reconstructing the grisly discovery of a shallow grave in a wooded area several miles south of Columbia.

The bodies were those of the mother, wife and three children of Bradford Bishop Jr., 39, who is missing from his State Department job and from his fashionable Bethesda, Md., home.

While Bishop was being sought, SBI Director Haywood Starling said in Raleigh Tuesday night, "We do not know now whether to center the investigation around him as a suspect or a victim. That will be more the responsibility of the Montgomery County officers."

Lenny Wise, SBI assistant supervisor from Elizabeth City, was expected to accompany the Maryland officers to Raleigh today.

Wise said officers spent Tuesday going over the evidence turned up in Tyrell County, one of the state's most sparsely populated, situated in the northeast corner near the coast.

Authorities say they believe the five victims were killed in their Bethesda home and transported to Tyrell County in a station wagon which officers say they have not yet found.

## Panthers Struggle To 56-53 Victory

BETHEL — Things turned out as they were supposed to last night in the opening round of the District One, 3-A Playoffs, but North Pitt narrowly avoided an upset loss.

Washington's Pam Pack, the Northeastern Conference champion, waltzed to a victory over North Lenoir, 90-51. But the Panthers of North Pitt, the Eastern Carolina Conference

champs, had to struggle past Roanoke Rapids, 56-53.

Only Donnie Perkins' two free throws in the closing seconds provided the Panthers with the margin they needed. It had not been a typical night for Perkins, the leading scorer for the Panthers. He hit only 11 points, missing on a number of shots.

"We were lucky," Coach Cobby Deans said after the contest finally came to a happy ending for his team. "I'm very

disappointed in our play. I guess it was jitters. We didn't play any defense, and I hope it's going to be different from here on in."

Deans added that Perkins didn't play up to par. "He was somewhere else. But thank goodness he made those free throws. I appreciate that."

The overall shooting of the Panthers wasn't good. They hit 22 of 55 shots for 40 per cent. Roanoke Rapids put through 21 of 46 for a finer 45.7 per cent. The

real difference came at the line, where North Pitt hit 12 of 22, and Roanoke Rapids made just 11 of 16. The Panthers scored five of their final nine points at the stripe.

North Pitt went into the final period with a 47-40 lead, but the Yellow Jackets caught up in the first two minutes as the Panthers missed on four shots and had a few turnovers to go with it. Dave Butts hit two baskets around three free throws by his teammates to knot it at 47-47.

Jackie Best put the Panthers back out at the line, then Virgil Pilgreen added a basket. But buckets by Jimmy Pierce and Butts tied it again, 51-51. Again the two exchanged baskets to knot it at 53-53 with 2:17 left.

Kenneth Roberson hit the second of two free throws for a 54-53 lead with 2:00 to play, and after getting a rebound with about 1:45 to go, the Panthers stalled it until Jesse Harris was

fouled with 43 seconds left. But he missed both shots, and the Jackets got the ball. Pierce, however, was called for charging with 29 seconds left, and with 16 seconds remaining, Perkins was fouled by Butts, and hit both. Roanoke Rapids again turned it over, and that was the game.

The Jackets took the initial lead, but after trailing 4-2, the Panthers took command and built up an eight point lead in the first period, 15-7. Roanoke Rapids refused to wilt however, and as the Panther play got sloppy, the Jackets came back to cut the lead to 19-15 at the horn. They stayed close throughout the second frame, although they never caught up, and trailed 30-28 at the half.

Twice in the third period, the Jackets tied it up, at 32-32 and again at 36-36. Each time, they had the chance to push ahead, but each time, turnovers or poor shots cost them and the Panthers managed to regain the lead, moving out to a 47-40 lead to start the final period.

If anything saved the Panthers, it was their rebounding, where they held a 45-28 margin for the game. Both teams were bothered by turnovers, 26 for the Yellow Jackets and 23 by North Pitt.

Harris and Pilgreen led the Panther scoring with 14 each, while Roberson and Perkins each had 11. William Spain led the Jackets with 18, while Butts had 15.

For Washington, it was more like practice. The Pam Pack, recording its 21st victory without a loss, shot 48.6 per cent to North Lenoir's 39.2. They held a 51-33 rebounding edge and had only 13 turnovers to the Hawks' 23.

Before the first period was over, the contest was Washington hit the first two baskets, as Kenny Rogers and Carl Williams hit. Then, after two Hawk free throws, the Pack reeled off five more points for a 9-2 edge. They continued to pull away and by the time the first period was over, Washington was safely ahead, 21-8.

Things got no better in the second period, as the Pack built its lead on out to 25 points, that coming on the final shots of the period, and a 46-21 halftime edge.

During the third period, it reached 31 points, and held that

at 65-34, the score at the horn. It finally reached its apex at 43, 79-36, as both teams went to their bench.

## Welborn Hopes Matmen Can Do Job In NCAA

For the last five years, the East Carolina wrestling team has roared through the regular season with reckless abandon. The Pirate matmen have amassed 49 dual victories against only three losses and one tie, and have won a total of 18 tournaments including five consecutive Southern Conference Championships.

And they have been ranked as high as 13th in the nation as well as being recognized as the number one team in the South.

But what happens to the Pirates in the biggest collegiate tournament of the year - the NCAA Championships?

East Carolina head coach John Welborn really doesn't have any answers. But he would certainly like to find a solution to the problem when the NCAA Tournament opens Thursday at the University of Arizona in Tucson.

"Maybe we're just worn out by the end of the season," said Welborn, the Southern Conference Coach of the Year for the last five seasons. "But we've always had some outstanding individual talent in the nationals. It's just that there are so many great wrestlers out there. You've got to be at your peak to even hope of placing in the tournament."

Osman has a 22-7 record with two tournament championships to his credit while Thorp boasts a 24-6-1 record along with two tournament titles.

John Welborn would just love to see all six of his wrestlers place in the tournament. A top finish in the NCAA Championships would be the perfect end of yet another outstanding wrestling year at East Carolina.

Paul Osman (126), Tom Marriott (142), Phil Mueller (167) Ron Whitcomb (177), and Mike Radford (190) all qualified for the nationals by winning their weight class in the Southern Conference Championships. Paul Thorp was upset in the finals of the 150 weight class by William and Mary's Max Lorenzo, but received the conference "wild card" selection and will still make the trip.

Marriott, a senior from Herkimer, N.Y., will be making his fourth straight appearance in the nationals. Radford, who has enjoyed brilliant senior campaign, will be making his third appearance while Whitcomb and Thorp will be wrestling in their second NCAA Tournament.

Mueller, Whitcomb, and Radford have been virtually unstoppable this seasons and all three could get top seedings in

the tournament. They have amassed a 77-5 overall record including a 30-1 dual record along with ten tournament titles.

# Woody's Ramblin's

They call him "Wild Bill." He's really Bill Carson, the track coach at East Carolina, and he earned the nickname by his straight-forward, let-the-chips-fall attitude. Like a former East Carolina coach, he tells it like it is.

Yesterday, Carson was one of the guest speakers for the Greenville Sports Club, and his primary theme was that he's tired of being Number Two.

"Being a bridesmaid is getting to me," he said. "After this last indoor (Southern Conference) meet, someone called my kids losers. Well, that just isn't so. They are winners. Just because we haven't beaten William & Mary is no reason to call us losers."

Carson went on to say that he and basketball coach Dave Patton might feel like they were in the same boat. "They only called four fouls against Appalachian (in the playoff game with ECU). Well, they didn't call any at the track meet."

The coach said that at the recent meet, three of the top ECU runners were knocked down in one race, and no fouls were called. "Then later on, when our guy and two others were way out in front in a heat, and only three could qualify, our guy was disqualified for 'cutting in.' Then, to top it all off, the next day, another of our guys was knocked almost up in the stands, and no foul was called. Makes you wonder, doesn't it?"

Carson also added that the team had the added problem of an accident to prey on it. "After the first day's competition, we stopped for a burger and as we were leaving the restaurant, a kid on a motorcycle rammed the side of the bus and everyone thought he was dead at first. It was after 3:30 a.m. before we got away from the police station, and nearly 4 before we got into bed, with competition early that morning. That didn't help us either."

The coach added that during this year so far, he's beaten more Division I competition than any other ECU coach. "Our kids are not second class. We qualified five for the nationals. That's more than anyone else in the Southern, and more than most of the ACC teams. We've beaten about everybody we've run against except William & Mary."

The Indians remain as the thorn in Carson's side. "But," he pointed out, "my entire budget is equal to about two-thirds of their scholarship budget. My entire budget, now." He added that John Randolph of William & Mary is one of the best coaches in the country, too.

"Seems like every time I get close to him, he goes out and gets more money, and pulls away again," Carson said.

Carson does feel that if the team can remain healthy this spring, that the outdoor team will have a definite shot at beating the Indians.

Also speaking was George Williams, the Pirate baseball coach, who told the group that pro baseball was beginning to look at the collegiate game as the "new minor leagues."

"College baseball is improving rapidly," Williams said. "Already, professional baseball is starting to subsidize some of the summer leagues." The North Carolina Summer League will not receive any of this money however. Currently, the pros are only sponsoring the type of leagues that allow no more than two players from the same school on a team. "Our league requires that all players be a member of the team during the spring season," Williams said.

"But there is going to be more and more help from the majors as time goes by," he said.

As far as the Southern Conference race, Williams said that he hopes the Pirates will be in there battling for the title. "But we'll get a lot of competition from Furman, The Citadel, Richmond and Appalachian State." He added that should the Pirates win the title, they might have a shot at landing the Regional Playoffs in Greenville.

In comparing East Carolina to the ACC teams, Williams said he didn't have nearly the same budget to work with. "We try to use as many in-state kids as we can, and give them partial scholarships. The ACC for the most part has the national limit of 13 full scholarships."

"You'll see some fine college teams and players coming in here," he said. "For instance, Bob Ferris, who pitched most of the first game Sunday for Maryland, may be the best pitcher in the ACC, and he's a sure pro prospect. And our guy, Dean Reavis, did an outstanding job for us, going 12 innings in his first game of the year."

# Wider Gap Between Owners, Players

NEW YORK (AP) — Representatives of major league baseball's players and club owners, apparently further

apart than they've ever been in their current complex contract-negotiating sessions, meet again Thursday in Tampa, Fla., with the first order of business to heal the wounds of

Tuesday's meeting.

The owners took salvos from two different directions Tuesday. On one hand, Marvin Miller, the executive director of the players' association, leveled a blast at them, accusing them of issuing misinformation and trying to divide the players.

But the biggest blast of the day came from the relative calm of a courtroom in St. Louis where a three-judge Appeals Court ruled unanimously against the owners and affirmed the decision of arbitrator Peter Seitz, who granted free-agent status to pitchers Andy Messersmith and Dave McNally.

It effects only the two pitchers this year — but since no compromise between the players union and owners is forthcoming, it could mean every player without a multi-year contract could be a free agent by the start of the 1978 season.

It was the second court setback for the owners. They have only one more appeal — the U.S. Supreme Court.

The players' 24 player representatives, two league representatives, plus Miller and

players union counsel Dick Moss will be holding a meeting Thursday in Tampa.

They invited the owners to attend but the invitation was accepted instead by the owners' Player Relations Committee and John Gaherin, its chief negotiator.

The next official bargaining session is set for Friday in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Tuesday's three-hour session, the 26th thus far, ended in acrimony with Miller charging the owners with "negotiating over our heads." Their public relations campaign creates a lot of problems. We have to spend a lot of time correcting the misinformation that the owners put out."

Miller said he had uncovered an attempt by one club — he declined to identify it — to put out a phony survey of its players. He said the players were asked one question, then the players' answer to a different question was placed on a telegram.

Miller also said the recent public statements of several players was proof that the owners were conducting a "campaign of misinformation. We

can't spend our time continually putting out the fires ... I'm not complaining. I'm merely explaining the results of their action."

Miller said a major problem remaining was the owners' insistence that he retroactively strip his players of their rights won in the Seitz decision and now upheld by two federal courts.

The owners insist any basic agreement would retroactively cancel out the Seitz decision, which allows every player with a 1976 individual contract to become a free agent in 1977 if he doesn't sign for 1976 and in 1978 if he does sign in 1976 but refuses to sign for 1977.

Miller says taking away the players' free agent rights would open the union to potential damage suits. Two of his suggestions to end the retroactivity problem, he said, were again rejected by the owners.

In one, he would try to get as many players as he could to sign waivers of their rights won in the Seitz decision. Meanwhile, the players and owners would arrive at a collectively bargained change in the reserve system and a new collec-

tive agreement.

The owners would decide on what they consider a non-tolerable number of non-waiver players, then match that figure against Miller's number of waivers. "If the non-waivers are under the tolerable figure, we'd have an agreement," Miller said. "If not, all bets are off."

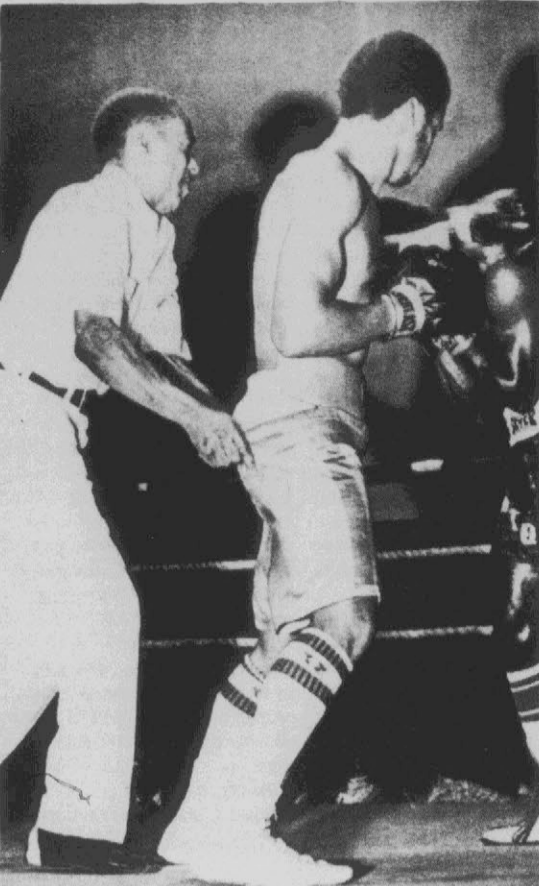
The second suggestion would be for Miller to get permission from his executive board to allow teams to approach players individually about inserting special covenants in their contracts. In those covenants, a player could promise not to play out his option for an individually agreed-upon number of years.

In the meantime, while appeals and negotiations go on, spring training camps remain closed on the owners' orders, exhibition games are being canceled and the start of the 1976 season is being threatened. The owners have said they won't open the camps until an agreement is reached or there is real progress towards reaching one.

Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, who could order the owners to open the camps and get activity under way, has thus far remained pretty much out of the picture.

"I continue to urge daily meetings between the two sides in an effort to get this thing solved. If they will really stick at it, I am confident they can get the job done," Kuhn said after Tuesday's bargaining session.

And when asked why he has maintained virtual silence, the commissioner said: "I think enough and maybe too much has been said publicly by everyone involved." He declined comment on the St. Louis court decision.

# Baseball Players May Get Unemployment Pay

NEW YORK (AP) — Can you imagine Johnny Bench, Fran Tarkenton, Bobby Orr and Rick Barry standing on line, waiting for their unemployment paychecks?

Don't laugh: it's possible. Because most of them are paid on a seasonal basis, professional athletes are technically eligible for unemployment benefits, according to an official of the Department of Labor.

Robert Seebol, associate regional administrator of the employment training administration, said that a player's income during the period he is paid by his team would not enter into the question of his eligibility for unemployment benefits.

Several Milwaukee Brewers players have been receiving benefits, according to Bud Selig, president of the baseball team.

"Normally, yes, they would

be eligible," said Seebol. "High earnings would not bar them from receiving benefits during the period when they are not employed."

The key to the whole matter is the period of paydays for pro athletes.

Most baseball players normally are paid twice a month starting from April 15 and running through the end of the season. They are not paid in the off-season. The same is true for football players, most of whom are paid over the 14-week schedule of the regular season from September until December.

There are, of course, exceptions. Some players choose to be paid on a 12-month basis to assure regular income all year long. They would not be eligible for unemployment benefits. But technically, said Seebol, when athletes are not receiving paychecks from their clubs, they are unemployed.

"Each case is taken individually," the Labor Department official said. "The claims examiner would look at the applicant's over-all salary. He would have to be available for suit-

able work and if he was not looking for work, they'd probably give him a hard time."

Seebol said the only way to prevent athletes from applying for benefits would be to have a specific statement written into the law dealing with maximum annual income levels.

Most major leaguers don't apply for benefits, according to one agent who handles basketball and hockey players. "But it's a very common practice for junior hockey players in Canada and many minor leaguers, who aren't making big salaries," Seebol said.

Seebol said high-paid actors sometimes show up on jobless lines. "Adolphe Menjou used to drive up to the regional office in Hollywood in a chauffeured limousine to pick up benefits. The amount he received probably didn't even cover the chauffeur's salary, but it was his right to get it as long as he met the criteria."

## Denies Right To Pull Plug

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — When Karen Quinlan became a household word, the dilemma facing her family became a topic for everyday household discussion:

How far should doctors go in using extraordinary means to sustain life? Is life on a respirator really life in any sense but a beating heart? When should a doctor pull the plug?

For many, thoughts of a lingering death led them to sign the "Living Will," a document asking a terminal patient's family and physician that the patient be allowed to die if there is no reasonable hope of recovery.

For others, the Living Will seemed a cold, calculated look at the problems of suffering and death.

The Catholic Hospital Association, based in St. Louis and representing more than 650 institutions nationwide, issued an alternative, the Christian Affirmation of Life, which the CHA believes puts reflections on life in a more proper perspective.

The Rev. Kevin D. O'Rourke, CHA director of Medical-Moral Affairs who prepared the document, says the Living Will is fine for forcing a look at the trauma of prolonged suffering and imminent death before a crisis situation arrives.

However, he said in an interview, the outlook presented by the Living Will does not consider the spiritual side of the dilemma and creates instead a "mercenary, cold and pagan atmosphere."

The Christian Affirmation of Life, he said, has a more humane outlook.

"I tried to build an appreciation for life," O'Rourke said. "I think the Living Will is discouraging and depressing. It makes you think all you have to worry about is getting rid of people."

"What I tried to do is help people care for each other, help each other die. I think that's important."

The affirmation issued by the CHA is a 10-paragraph document designed for reflection and meditation.

A person signing it affirms that "through death life is not taken away but merely changed" and declares that death is "a free human act which enables me to surrender this life and to be united with God for eternity."

O'Rourke said he worked on the document after meeting with hospital administrators dissatisfied with the legalistic viewpoint of the Living Will.

"We used interest in the Living Will as a stepping stone to wider questions," he said. "What is life all about? What is death all about? It transcends the Living Will, with some of the matter the same but the purpose entirely different."

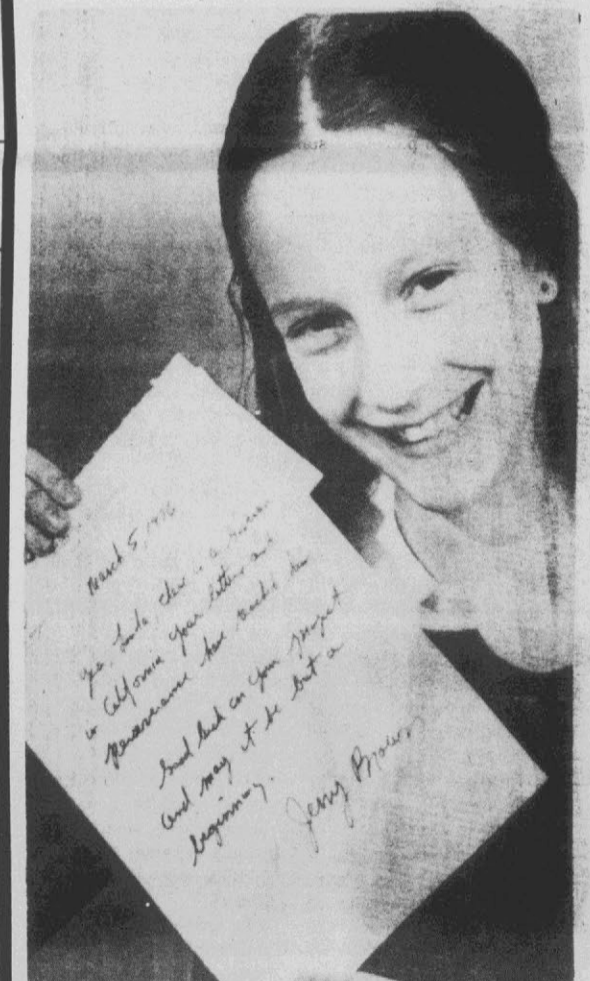
"Not everybody appreciates the nuances in the difference between our document and the Living Will. They say that the Catholic Hospital Association has its own Living Will, and that's not it at all."

O'Rourke said he opposes efforts to gain legal status for the Living Will and there are no plans to seek the force of law for the CHA document.

"The physician has to make the decision," he said. "It can't be made according to a lawbook or a textbook. It has to be based on his clinical judgment."

The medical decision must be left up to the doctor, but heavy weight must be given to the wishes of the family, O'Rourke said. He feels that such was not the case with the decision in the case of Karen Quinlan, lying just this side of death in a New Jersey hospital.

Since its adoption in 1974, O'Rourke said, about 500,000 copies of the Christian Affirmation of Life have been distributed.

## Anticrime Body Thwarts Crime In The Suburbs

 ROSWELL, Ga. (UPI) — A Citizens Band radio installed in your car on Monday probably will be stolen by Friday in Atlanta, according to police statistics there. If the theft occurs in this North Fulton County suburb, the recovery rate can be less than three hours.

"We've started something unique in Georgia," said J.M. Thorn, director of the Roswell Crime Prevention Bureau, "and I suppose one of the first in the nation: CB registration."

"We know this will work because we've already caught some guys with stolen CB's we had marked. There was one case recently where we had two boys in custody, and the CB returned to the owner, identifying him through our registration files, before he even knew it was gone."

Since 1970, Roswell's population has more than tripled as the upper middle class moved north to escape Atlanta's rising crime rate. Crime followed affluence. The statistical picture is common, but the response of a youthful police department is changing it.

Newly appointed Police Chief Terry Joyner, 29, returned from a seminar at the University of Louisville National Crime Institute with a plan to engrave the valuable personal belongings of the city's nearly 20,000 residents. He appointed Thorn, a 36-year-old patrolman, to head the project.

Atlanta has had a similar program for the past year.

"As far as I know, none of those showing our Project ID stickers have been robbed, although we do know places on either side of our locations have been robbed, so it is a good deterrent," said Atlanta police Sgt. H.L. Johnson of THOR (Target Hardening Opportunity Reduction). "Our figures indicate a 14 per cent decrease in burglaries in Atlanta (during 1975), and we feel we had to have something to do with that."

Thorn said some residents of his quiet rural community did not believe a crime problem existed. The feeling was shared by affluent newcomers who

work in Atlanta, but who fled to the suburbs to escape crime. Recent increases in household insurance rates raised Roswell and other metropolitan area communities to the same rates charged in Atlanta.

"The insurance companies were getting killed," Thorn said. "They were really too slow to react to the increased population and crime out here." Thorn enlisted 15 high school students as teen-age volunteers to go door-to-door with electric engraving pens. This, incidentally, improved relations between the city's youth and the police.

"Our goal is to hit 100 per cent of our homes," he said. "I figure by May we will have completed the city."

Then signs will be posted in residential areas and at the entrances to the city to warn burglars that Roswell is prepared.

"Burglary has been our major crime problem," Joyner said when asked if Thorn's approach really can reduce the rate to zero. "I think he can do it."

"I intend to try things that just make horse sense," Thorn said.

"Crime is just a big game of roulette people play with themselves. There are very few pure burglaries, and in most cases I can show the victim where it was more of a giveaway. Most burglars are not the dummies we like to think they are. They watch for you to make a mistake, and then they capitalize on it."

Assistant City Administrator Joseph S. Brewster Jr., 27, said the city is pleased with Thorn's approach.

"We haven't had much of a crime problem in the past and believe it is better to stop it before it gets out of hand," Brewster said. "Jim is dedicated and enthusiastic. He has involved all areas of the community. My hat is off to anybody like Jim who can bring the youth, the blacks, the civic organizations and the police together in something positive."

Thorn says he will continue trying new and sometimes even more radical approaches.

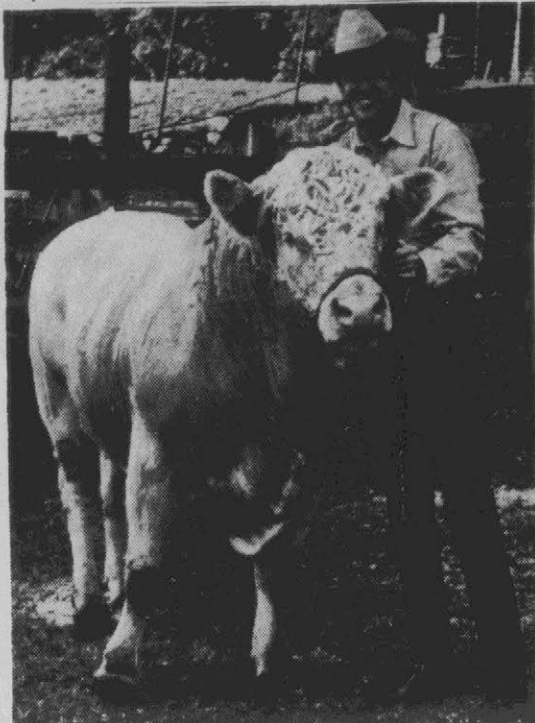

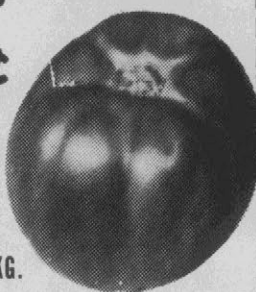

## Making Up For His Late Start

NEW YORK (AP) — Robert Newton Peck used to do a lot of his writing while riding on the train. He doesn't any more.

Now he sits in the comfort of his home and writes his books "usually with two kids climbing all over me and a cat in my lap."

Peck, who has written a number of books, among them the best-selling "A Day No Pigs Would Die" and his latest "Hang For Treason," explains with a smile, "I wrote an awful lot of stuff while commuting between Connecticut and New York City. While the other guys on the train were drinking, or sleeping, or reading, I was writing."

The children who climb about as he puts in his three to four hours a day writing in longhand at his Darien home are his 12-year-old son, Christopher Haven Peck — "Be sure to get his middle name in, that was papa's name" — and his 4-year-old daughter, Anne.

Peck, a relaxed, easy-talking man who wears what appears Western-style clothing — boots, wide-brimmed hat, fur-lined coat — but which he insists is "country," says his train-writing days came about as he rode to and from his job as a television commercial and ad jingle writer.

"But," says the 6-foot-4, 200-pounder, "I was able to retire from that about a year and a half ago."

Peck, who is 47, says he began writing when he was 10 but "I didn't begin serious book writing until I was in my 40s." Since "A Day No Pigs Would Die" was published in 1973, Peck has written another eight books which range from poetry to children's books to novels about early American history.

Many of them reflect his love of nature and of the land — he owns property in Vermont where he keeps large animals — while others, "Fawn" and "Hang For Treason," contain this deep interest as well as his preoccupation with the history of Fort Ticonderoga and its role in the American Revolution.

tion. Peck, who grew up on a Vermont farm, leaving when he was 17 to join the army and serve in World War II, says, "I grew up within cannon shot of Fort Ticonderoga. I know every catfish pond and every deer run in that area. Why, the mud of Fort Ti is still between my toes."

"You've got to write what you know about. I know farming, Vermont and Fort Ti, and that's what I write about."

In addition to writing books, Peck also likes to "get kids to read" and to teach creative writing.

"What I do," he says, "is show up at a school riding a horse and sitting in a Western saddle. That immediately gets the kids' attention. Then I start telling them about nature and about books and in this way I hope to get them interested in reading."

Peck says he recently finished teaching a creative writing course and plans to do it again this summer. "I call the course 'Pro-Creative Writing,'" he says with a grin. "A lot of creative writing courses are taught by people who cannot make a living at writing. This course is about how to make a living at it."

"I emphasize what I call 'Tell-Show.' If you tell a story no one wants to read it, but if you show a story that is what the people want. It's pig simple. An example of telling is: The farmer loved his horse very much. But if you show it, it would be: Bending over, he picked up her massive hoof and cradled it between his hands as though it were a child."

Peck doesn't care to talk about what he currently is working on, noting "I'm always writing a book." He added however, that he is putting the finishing touches on an operetta for children. "It's called 'The King of Kazoo,' and I wrote the book, the words and the music."

### Treated Royally In Rare Reunion

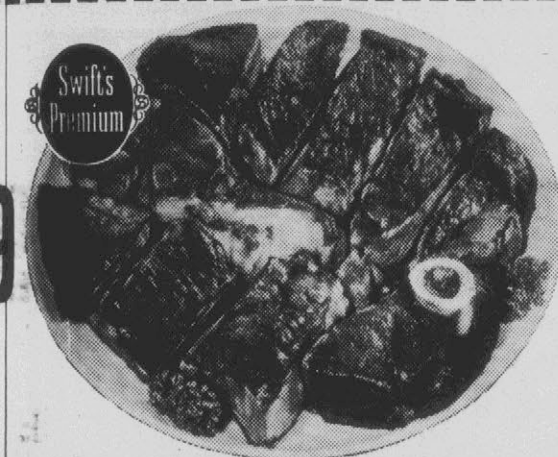
SPRINGFIELD, Ohio (AP) — Joe Peake is back, and he says he had the most glorious time he's ever had in his life.

Peake's sister lives in a nursing home in Llandudno.

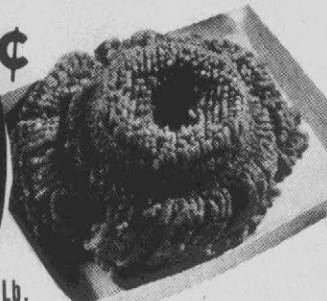

## Lavish Escort Is Barred By House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sending 24 congressmen, their spouses and staff to London to bring the only surviving copy of the Magna Carta to the United States for a Bicentennial exhibition is just too expensive, the House says.

In a lopsided 219 to 187 vote that angered legislative leaders, the House on Tuesday rejected a proposal by the British government for ceremonies to mark the loan of the document.

The Magna Carta first spelled out the rights of Englishmen under their government.

Furious House leaders immediately scheduled action by the House Rules Committee to force consideration of the resolution later this week, after an attempt to have the vote reversed on the spot was blocked.

The British Parliament had sent House Speaker Carl Albert a letter suggesting the large American delegation travel to London to take part in appropriate ceremonies before the document, which dates to 1215, is loaned for exhibition in the Capitol rotunda as part of the American Bicentennial celebration.

The Senate passed the resolution unanimously. But opponents in the House raised questions about sending such a large contingent at taxpayer expense in an election year.

They said it should be clear to England they were not rejecting the loan of the Magna Carta but only opposing the expense of sending 24 congressmen to pick it up.

But Albert was outraged, calling it a "sad, sad, sad day" when the Congress rejected the loan of the "grandfather of all the great historic charters of liberty." Albert declared the vote would be overturned "if you have to kill me in the process."

He attempted to get the

House to overturn its decision at once and "not make ourselves a laughing stock."

first trick and captured East's queen with the ace. The ten of clubs was run to East's king, and back came a heart. Declarer won, crossed to the jack of clubs and tried the diamond finesse. That lost to West's king, and the return of the eight of spades netted the defenders three tricks in that suit. Down one.

While declarer was most unlucky to find both minor suit kings offside, he overlooked a safety play that was by no means obvious, but that would have assured the contract. Consider if you will what would happen if declarer played a low spade from dummy at trick one and won with the ace.

Now South runs the ten of clubs to East's king. It doesn't help the defenders to play spades, so let's assume that East returns a heart. Declarer wins, crosses to dummy and takes the diamond finesse. When this loses the defenders can take two spade tricks, but that's all. The jack-ten-small in dummy serves as a second stopper.

It is an almost automatic reflex to split dummy's spade honors at trick one. But making an "automatic" play in haste often gives you time to repent at leisure.

# Environmental Center Helps

Leaders of community-sponsored youth groups who wish to plan environmental activities may find practical aid and guidance at East Carolina University's new Outdoor Biology Curriculum Strategies (OBIS) Resource Center.

Dr. Carolyn H. Hampton of the ECU Department of Science Education, director of the center, said the OBIS program is designed for leaders of the 10 to 15-years-old age group involved in Scouts, 4-H Clubs, recreation clubs, summer camps, after-school clubs and nature center groups.

The center will help leaders guide youth groups in observing and investigating processes of nature, plant and animal life forms, the physical environment, and the role played by human beings in the natural scheme, said Dr. Hampton.

"Such first-hand experience forms the basis for the understanding of ecological relationships necessary to developing public consciousness, which is required to support the sound management of our environment," she said.

"OBIS activities introduce basic concepts of ecology in ways which are exciting and enjoyable for youngsters, and are applicable in a wide variety of habitats—lawns, parks, woodlots, vacant lots, ponds, streams and beaches.

"Printed materials are being developed for leaders who may not have had training or experience in biology."

Dr. Hampton noted that the OBIS program was developed by environmental educators at the University of California at Berkeley and that establishment of Resource Centers, such as the one at ECU, is funded by the National Science Foundation.

The NSF selected Dr. Hampton to direct a center for the southeastern states on the basis of her record of leadership in the field of outdoor biology for community and school groups, and the fact that ECU has made "a commitment to outdoor biology" and regards OBIS as "supportive" to its own public programs.

OBIS activities are suitable for both large and small groups of young people, she said, and many projects are adaptable to individualized use. Although the project is not developing a school science curriculum, many of the materials and ideas in the OBIS program are suitable for use by school groups.

Youth group leaders interested in learning more about the OBIS program should write or telephone Dr. Hampton at the ECU Dept. of Science Education.

NEW YORK (AP) — No doubt because this is the last week for shows to be considered for Emmies this season, NBC has not one but two superb dramatic specials on tap tonight and Thursday. You'd be wise to catch both.

Tonight's opus is "The Entertainer," a remake-for-TV version of the bitter, powerful 1957 play and 1960 film by Britain's John Osborne. It stars Jack Lemmon as Archie Rice, a failed, second-rate vaudevillian.

Thursday's show is "Farewell to Manzanar," a retelling of one family's experiences during one of the saddest home-front stories of World War II — the forced internment of 110,000 West Coast residents of Japanese ancestry shortly after Japan's surprise attack at Pearl Harbor.
