## Black Leaders Dislike Local Closing Policy For Birthday

Although Jan. 15 is Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday and many of his admirers are celebrating today, an equal number say they are waiting until Jan. 20 — the official federal holiday honoring King.

Federal offices in Greenville will be closed Monday, but city and county offices will be open. Both city and county employees have been told that they may take the day off if they wish, but that it will be considered a vacation day — a policy which has local black leaders upset.

Several black leaders, including Bennie Roundtree, who heads the local chapter of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, an organization which King founded, have expressed disappointment that the city and county governments did not observe King's birthday as a holiday this year. They have requested that county officials seriously consider observing the holiday next year.

Roundtree said this morning that city officials told him they did not have enough time this year to make a decision on the matter. He also said the SCLC may call for a garbage collector's strike against the city of Greenville to try and change officials' minds. SCLC support of a strike will be requested at a spring SCLC conference in Greenville, Roundtree said.

If at least one-third of the garbage collectors agree to take part in the strike, the local SCLC group will support it, he added. "We can't do a half-way job," he said, "so we have to make sure everyone involved is really dedicated."

A proclamation by Mayor Les Garner acknowledges King's "tireless efforts to bring about civil rights for all" and declares Jan. 20 as Martin Luther King Jr. Day in Greenville.

A community-wide rally in celebration of Dr. King's life is planned tonight at Sycamore Hill Baptist Church, sponsored by the local chapter SCLC. The celebration will begin with a Poor People's Feast, open to the public free of charge. "What we call soul food will be served."

## Deficit Expected To Soar In 1986

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional and administration budget officials said today the federal deficit for fiscal 1986 will exceed a staggering \$220 billion and trigger the first round of government-wide spending cuts under the new Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law.

In separate projections required under the new law, the White House Office of Management and Budget predicted a deficit of \$220.1 billion while the Congressional Budget Office said that this year's red ink would amount to \$220.9 billion.

Last fiscal year's deficit was \$212 billion.

The two agencies, outlining spending cuts totaling \$11.7 billion that would be required March 1 under terms of the law, enumerated staff and service cutbacks that will be

needed in thousands of federal agencies and programs.

In all, across-the-board cuts of 4.3 percent will be needed in domestic programs and 4.9 percent for the military, the budget agencies said.

The extent of the cuts had been disclosed earlier by White House.

The projected deficit for the year, which began Oct. 1, will far surpass the 1985 deficit despite spending cuts approved last year by Congress.

Under the law, automatic spending cuts are triggered if the estimated deficit, as projected by the two budget offices, exceeds the Gramm-Rudman deficit target for 1985 of \$172 billion by at least \$20 billion.

In this case, the average of the two estimates — \$220.5 billion — was \$48.5 billion over the target, meaning

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## Firm Eyes Local Tract For New Plant Location

Standard Register Company of Dayton, Ohio, has taken an option on a site in Pitt County, near Greenville, "for the proposed construction of a business forms production plant," according to company president John Darragh.

Darragh said the selected site of approximately 46 acres is located at the western right-of-way on N.C. 11 north of Greenville, adjacent to the Station House fire station. It is at the intersection of the soon-to-be-built U.S. 284 bypass and U.S. 13-N.C. 11.

No further details of the company's plans were available today from Standard Register officials. But a notice of public hearing on the proposed issuance of bonds by the Pitt County Industrial Facilities and Pollution Control Financing Authority indicates Standard Register plans to build a 90,000 square foot building to be used in the manufacture of custom continuous business forms.

According to the hearing notice, the building and equipment are expected to cost \$9.5 million and the company is expected to employ about 84 people initially.

Bruce Beasley, chairman of Pitt County Development Commission said "today's announcement is the culmination of 18 months of an intense site selection process conducted by the company which covered several communities and states throughout the southeast. We are delighted that a company of the caliber of Standard Register has chosen Pitt County as the site for their new plant," he added.

Beasley also said "we are indebted to the Pitt County Board of Commissioners, the N.C. Department of

Commerce, Greenville Industries Inc, Randy Doub, our highway commissioner, and the many volunteers who made the commitments we needed to bring us to this point. However, a lot remains to be done," Beasley emphasized.

Bruce Strickland, chairman of the board of county commissioners said "the board was glad to have had the opportunity to assist the development commission in securing the project for Greenville and Pitt Coun-

## Blount Withdraws

RALEIGH — Marvin Blount Jr., of Greenville, withdrew as a candidate for the Democratic nomination to the U.S. Senate today and said he would support former Gov. Terry Sanford's bid for election to the seat now held by Republican Sen. John East.

Blount appeared with Sanford at an 11 a.m. press conference at state Democratic headquarters to make the announcement.

"I'm proud to call Terry Sanford a friend, and I'm endorsing him for the U.S. Senate," Blount said.

Blount called for unity in the Democratic party and said "I want to participate in that unity."

He said "North Carolina must have a voice in Washington to fight for the state's fair share," and suggested that Sanford would be a good voice for the state and "will put North Carolina interests first."

"Sanford has a proven record of accomplishments. Education, economic development, better roads are milestones of his legacy."

Blount said "the bottom line is I'm proud to be a Democrat and proud to be part of a winning team," by supporting Sanford.

## GUC Approves Local Projects

Greenville Utilities Commission members gave tentative approval Tuesday to four water projects and five sewer projects totaling \$1.62 million which will be partially funded by the city's allocation of state water and sewer grant funds.

The city's allocation of state funds includes a total of \$261,880 for water systems and \$486,352 for sewer systems for fiscal years 1985-86 and 1986-87. However, in order to receive state assistance, the projects must be under contract by Dec. 31 of this year.

Water projects included on the list include: replacing old cast iron water mains around the system at a

total cost of \$82,000 (\$41,060 local and \$40,940 state); installing 450 feet of main along Clark Street that will connect a main in Tenth Street to a main in 11th Street; \$30,000 (\$15,000 local and \$15,000 state); replacing deteriorated two-inch mains and extend dead end mains around the system — 4,250 feet, \$150,000 (\$75,000 local and \$75,000 state); and installing 9,050 feet of 12-inch main along Greenville Boulevard N.E., \$265,000 (\$134,060 local and \$130,940 state).

Sewer projects given tentative approval include: replacing sewer main in Eighth Street from Cotanche to Evans Streets, \$40,000 (\$20,000 state and \$20,000 local); replacing outfall along Seaboard System Railroad between Fourth and Fifth

Streets, and in W. Fifth Street from the railroad to Elizabeth Street, \$120,000 (\$60,000 state and \$60,000 local); replacing and rehabilitating sewer systems in older portions of Greenville, \$465,000 (\$233,648 local and \$231,352 state); eliminating Lynndale area sewer problems, \$225,000 (\$112,500 local and \$112,500 state); extending sewer along Secondary Road 1708, SR 1700 and SR 1702 and make minor changes to the existing Fork Swamp sewage pump station, \$250,000 (\$187,500 local and \$62,500 state).

In addition to the projects given tentative approval Tuesday, the commission hopes to receive a portion of the county's allocation of state funds to help finance other projects.

Commission members also approved a proposal from McGladrey Hendrickson & Pullen to conduct the audit for fiscal year 1985-86, ending a disagreement with the city council over the question of having a single auditor for the city and commission.

The accounting firm's proposal totaled \$21,000, and in approving the proposal, the commission agreed to pay \$21,600, with the City of Greenville paying \$8,400.

Commissioner Fred Robbins said "as a commissioner, in the spirit of cooperation, I'm willing to vote on this. But as a taxpayer..."

Commissioner Andy Warren, before voting against the proposal, said

In 1972, Moye joined the Pitt County Sheriff's Department and later became a criminal investigator and

shift supervisor. He served as a Pitt County Sheriff's deputy for 14 years.

"I am committed to progressive law enforcement for the citizens of Pitt County," Moye said in announcing his candidacy.

## Cancellation Is Clarified

The cancellation of Monday's consolidated Pitt County Board of Education meeting was not a permanent halt of the board's actions, according to school board attorney Richard Schwartz.

The board's monthly meeting was called off, school officials said, on advice of attorneys, in light of a recent lawsuit filed against board members by a local minority rights group.

Schwartz, a Raleigh attorney who is handling the case for the board, said today he did not recommend a permanent cessation of board action but suggested a halt "just until I can

meet with the board." He said he expects to meet with consolidated board members in a call meeting by Friday or early next week.

The complaint, filed Dec. 18 in U.S. Eastern District Court in New Bern by the Concerned Citizens for Justice, a local minority group, alleges the board is operating illegally because three minority members appointed to the board in June 1985 are in violation of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Attorneys for the consolidated board asked for and were granted a 20-day extension for response to the suit. Schwartz said the halt of board

action was "neither a permanent cancellation or a cancellation until the board's response is made."

The suit asks that a three-judge court hear the complaint and grant an injunction to prevent the consolidated board from operating. In addition, the complaint requests the court void all action, contracts or policies approved by the consolidated board and that the school board pay the group's legal fees.

The consolidated school board will govern the unified school system created by the scheduled merger of Greenville and Pitt County schools in July, 1986.

## Annual Fairs Introduce Sources Of Capital

Venture capital clubs aren't the only places you can make contacts that might lead to the money or other help you need to launch your business or move it along. A wide variety of organizations sponsor annual or bi-annual fairs to introduce businesses to sources of capital.

Typically, a fair lasts one or two days, during which about a dozen businesses are given 10 to 15 minutes each to make a presentation of their business plans to professional venture capitalists and individual investors, as well as investment bankers, representatives of large corporations, lawyers and accountants. After the presentations, representatives of the business meet with potential investors, sometimes in small groups.

Fairs tend to concentrate on businesses based in their region. Although businesses in any stage of development can usually apply to be presenters, some sponsoring organizations prefer companies that are beyond the start-up point.

Most will consider businesses in any kind of industry but often prefer companies in high technology, such as computer software and the biomedical field.

Investors generally pay around \$200 or more to attend. Fees for presenting companies can range from a few hundred dollars to \$1,500, although sometimes they are not charged at all. Some fairs help companies frame their presentations.

Here is a sampling of fairs scheduled for 1986. Most have not set exact dates and costs. Write for details well in advance of the date or season indicated because screening of business plans begins several months before the fair.

To locate a fair near you if your area is not on the list, contact the chamber of commerce, a local or regional development authority, or the business administration department of local colleges and universities.

Here's a special way to frame your favorite photos, floral prints or needlework projects; with easy, quickly stitched Florentine frames in two sizes. Give yourself a stitchery lesson with the instructions for making these elegant frames on plastic canvas with Persian yarns.

These frames are worked in a form of needlepoint variously known as Florentine or Bargello with mitered corners, four corners or mirror images. By any name, though it is one of the most fascinating types of needlework, and surprisingly easy to learn.

By working the frames on plastic canvas, there is no additional time or money involved in "finishing." The one-step frames require no glass. Once the stitching is done, overcast all of the raw edges. Just as quickly as that you are ready to hang and admire your frames. They are perfect for a striking grouping or they can be used as mats inside a larger frame. The smaller frame is designed to fit around a 3-by-5-inch picture, and the larger frame is designed to hold a 5-by-7-inch picture. Once you have learned the

stitch pattern, you can make frames or mats of almost any size.

Actually, it is a very ancient needle art, steeped in history and called by various names. You may have heard it referred to as Flame Stitch, Bargello, Hungarian Point or some other title. Any of these terms can be used to identify the long, straight stitches that characterize this type of canvas work or needlepoint.

There are various legends about the origins of Bargello stitchery. It is said that it was originated in the 15th or 16th century by prisoners in the

dark and dank Bargello prison in Florence, Italy, which is now a great museum.

Another story concerns a Hungarian princess, who brought a trousseau of exotically embroidered garments with her to Italy when she married the son of a noble Florentine family. That, it is said, is the origin of Hungarian Point.

Whether these myths have any foundation in fact or not, you can create beautiful designs with florentine work. The stitches can be worked vertically or horizontally, distinguishing this type of stitchery from the other needlepoint stitches, which are usually worked diagonally.

The Florentine stitches follow a definite geometric pattern. Usually, the first row requires careful counting but all following rows just below or above the starting row are worked in identically the same manner, eliminating further coun-

ting. Each stitch is usually worked over four or more canvas threads, making for quick work. Although the stitches themselves are perfectly straight, you can achieve illusions of curves, peaks and a variety of other shapes with the different patterns available.

These descriptions may convince you that this is an advanced needlepoint technique. Nothing could be further from the truth. I have found that beginners find Florentine stitches the easiest needlepoint stitch family to learn.

To achieve the "four-way" or mitered-corner effect, you simply follow the charted design along one side of the canvas, turn the canvas a quarter turn, and repeat the same design along the next side. Repeat this last step until all four sides are completed.

## Robust Stilton Cheese Goes Well After Dinner

More and more Americans are adopting a delightful English custom — serving port wine and cheese at the end of dinner. A favorite cheese at such a time is the pungent Stilton, one of Britain's finest.

Robust cheeses such as Stilton have long been a favorite accompaniment to the full-bodied port.

In recent years, British wine buffs have been staging cheese and wine tastings for friends and neighbors. Some also serve apples, pears and grapes with the port, but cheese alone is enough for me.

Port should be served at room temperature, says wine producer

David Sandeman. I have had it served chilled, which somewhat dulled the taste of the wine.

"Always serve port in glasses large enough for swirling," adds Sandeman. "Tiny glasses don't allow you to properly savor the aroma to its fullest."

At such tastings you can use several cheeses, but always serve the mildest first, leaving the most flavorful for the end of the sampling.

Be sure to take the cheese out of the refrigerator about an hour ahead of time, to bring out its full flavor.

My favorite cheese for such events is blue Stilton, with its crumbly texture.

Stilton is also served with sherry and other wines or by itself at the end of the meal. It also goes well in pastries such as this Stilton and sun-dried tomato tart in Henry Lambert's "Pasta & Cheese" book, which I recently reviewed.

3 extra-large eggs  
1 cup heavy cream  
1 1/2 tablespoons port wine  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 cup crumbled Stilton cheese  
Enough dough to provide crust for four 5-inch pies

8 sun-dried tomatoes, dried with paper towels and cut into julienne strips

On lightly floured board, roll dough to a thickness of 1/8-inch. Gently lay an inverted tart pan, with removable bottom, on the dough and cut circle one inch larger than the tart pan, thus allowing enough dough to fold up for the sides. Repeat with the other pans. Line pans with dough, gently pressing it against edges and sides. Trim off excess dough and chill pans for 15 minutes. Preheat oven to 350 degrees and bake shells until done. Combine eggs, cream, wine and pepper and whisk well. Reserve. Spread crumbled Stilton over baked pastry shells, then pour in batter and arrange tomato strips over top in decorative design. Bake the tarts in oven preheated to 375 degrees for 20-30 minutes, until the custard is set. Remove tarts, let cool 5 minutes and serve.

## Let's Interface

Do you get a snack out of the ice box and go to the beauty parlor to get your hair fixed? How about putting on galoshes to go out in the rain and opening the trunk of your car?

If you admit to doing these things, you've dated yourself. More likely, you grab a bite from the refrigerator, get your hair styled at a salon, pull on boots and throw your groceries in the hatchback. Times change quickly, but words change even more rapidly.

According to a North Carolina State University linguistics professor, words and expressions used by people for years — from ice box to undertaker — are fading into antiquity because of technology. Computers are the main culprit, said the researcher. Just as the automobile wiped out many terms relating to hitching a horse, computerization has erased or changed a number of phrases that were the norm only recently.

A few years ago, a processor was a new tool for the kitchen. Now it's a tool for information. "Main frame" likely conjured up images of a car skeleton — or the structure of a house. Today, it's another computer term. Interfacing, of course, was a sewing word. Now it refers to a computer function — or a romantic relationship.

Changing words have not only influenced life, they've altered death. What used to be an undertaker is now a funeral director.

We like these new words and meanings and think that watching words is a good way to track changing times. Our only concern is that the older words might completely vanish. Antiques, such as furniture or clothes, represent concrete artifacts of past times — and words do too. Antiques, however, are often preserved, refinished. Words disappear, along with the folkways they typify.

What can we do about this occurrence? Well, we intend to slip in an "ice box" and "beauty parlor" once in a while. In addition, we are going to use galoshes — not boots — at least once a week. And although we interface with computers, we intend to pay attention to romance — and call it amour.

## Colds With Us

One might visualize the thousands of people who suffer head colds any given week, suffering with hopes raised by discoveries ... with clinical evidence, too... that an interferon-based spray may control the symptoms.

All together, the American victims spend \$556 million each year on over-the-counter cold treatments and continue to suffer the subtle torment and misery.

What made the report move comforting was that the research had been conducted by two groups half a world apart, and both emerged with similar data.

The doctors were pleased by evidence the spray appeared to prevent spread of one specific "cold" virus (the term covers a number of variations) from one person to another within a household.

The bad news is that research is not complete and evidence the medication seems to work only against one type of cold virus puts another damper on elusive hopes. It looks like there's no end to those sniffings, sneezings, coughs and body cavities rattling with pills and sloshing with liquid medication for a long time to come.

## Nuclear Disarmament March Set

LOS ANGELES — During the early days of the first Nixon administration, four serious young veterans of Gene McCarthy's presidential campaign — David Hawk, Dave Mixner, Sam Brown and Marge Tabankin — met in Washington, D.C., to plan a national strike against America's involvement in Vietnam. The idea was for workers and students to strike one day the first month, two days the second, and so on, until

public officials withdrew all U.S. troops from Vietnam.

For many peace activists, the idea seemed futile and impractical, even during the middle of a controversial war. Besides, some liberal politicians even felt President Nixon deserved a chance in June of 1969 to end the war his own way. But the organizers of the Vietnam Moratorium Committee disagreed. In their opinion, too many young Americans

were losing their lives.

Historians have since reported that the Vietnam Moratorium Committee-sponsored demonstrations of Oct. 15 and Nov. 14-15 of 1969 forced the Nixon administration to reassess its policy in Indochina. With that success in mind, one of the principal Moratorium organizers, David Mixner, is at it again. Mixner has organized the peace movement's version of the Olympic torch parade, which could impact deeply on politicians and citizens alike.

On March 1, between 3,500 and 5,000 individuals will leave their families and friends to begin a nine-month march for nuclear disarmament from Los Angeles through the Mojave Desert, over Colorado's 12,000-foot Loveland Pass, and across the Great Plains to Washington, D.C. To varying degrees, the march will touch 65 million people; nearly one-third of all Americans, in fact, live along the planned route.

For Mixner, "The Great Peace March" is the most ambitious feat of a long career in professional organizing. A staff of 86 people is furiously nailing down last-minute marchers, contributors, campsites and supplies. After a month-long training session, the marchers will set off from the Los Angeles Coliseum to the cheers of, planners hope, 100,000 supporters.

The key to every successful extravaganza of this kind is its stash of money and celebrities. Paul

deinstitutionalization has been a "dismal failure."

Deinstitutionalization is the move away from the prolonged hospitalization of these patients. Instead, they are to be stabilized at an institution and then treated as out-patients, using an array of new drugs. North Carolina state hospitals now house only about one-third of the 10,000 patients who were being treated full-time before deinstitutionalization.

In an interview after their meeting with Martin and Kirk, the three said

they are not opposed to the theory of deinstitutionalization but to the way it has been put into practice in North Carolina.

"Theoretically, (patients) were to get local help with their medicine," Mrs. Carter, the mother of a mentally ill son, said. "In practice, when they got back to their communities, there was nothing there, no help."

"Chronically mentally ill people are rejectors of care," Mrs. Carter said. They often don't believe they

have a mental illness. So they stop taking their medicine because they often feel they don't need it or because it often carries unpleasant side effects.

Deinstitutionalization might work very well, the three said, if when the patient was released from the hospital, a network of support was available back in his community. That was how the system was supposed to work. It hasn't, they say.

The state has made such a push to get people out of hospitals, they claim, that people who need hospitalization often have trouble gaining admittance. The result, they say, has been a series of serious violent crimes committed by mentally ill people. "The mentally ill are being turned into criminals because they can't get the care they need," Mrs. Carter said.

Baggett says the state needs to provide a "continuum of care." The health of these patients often fluctuates. At times they need less treatment than at other times. They should be able to move along a "continuum of care" correspondingly as their health improves or deteriorates.

Martin, in an interview, said he wants Kirk to meet with members of the alliance to see what can be done with existing resources to improve the situation. People who are ill should not be having trouble gaining admission to state hospitals, Martin said.

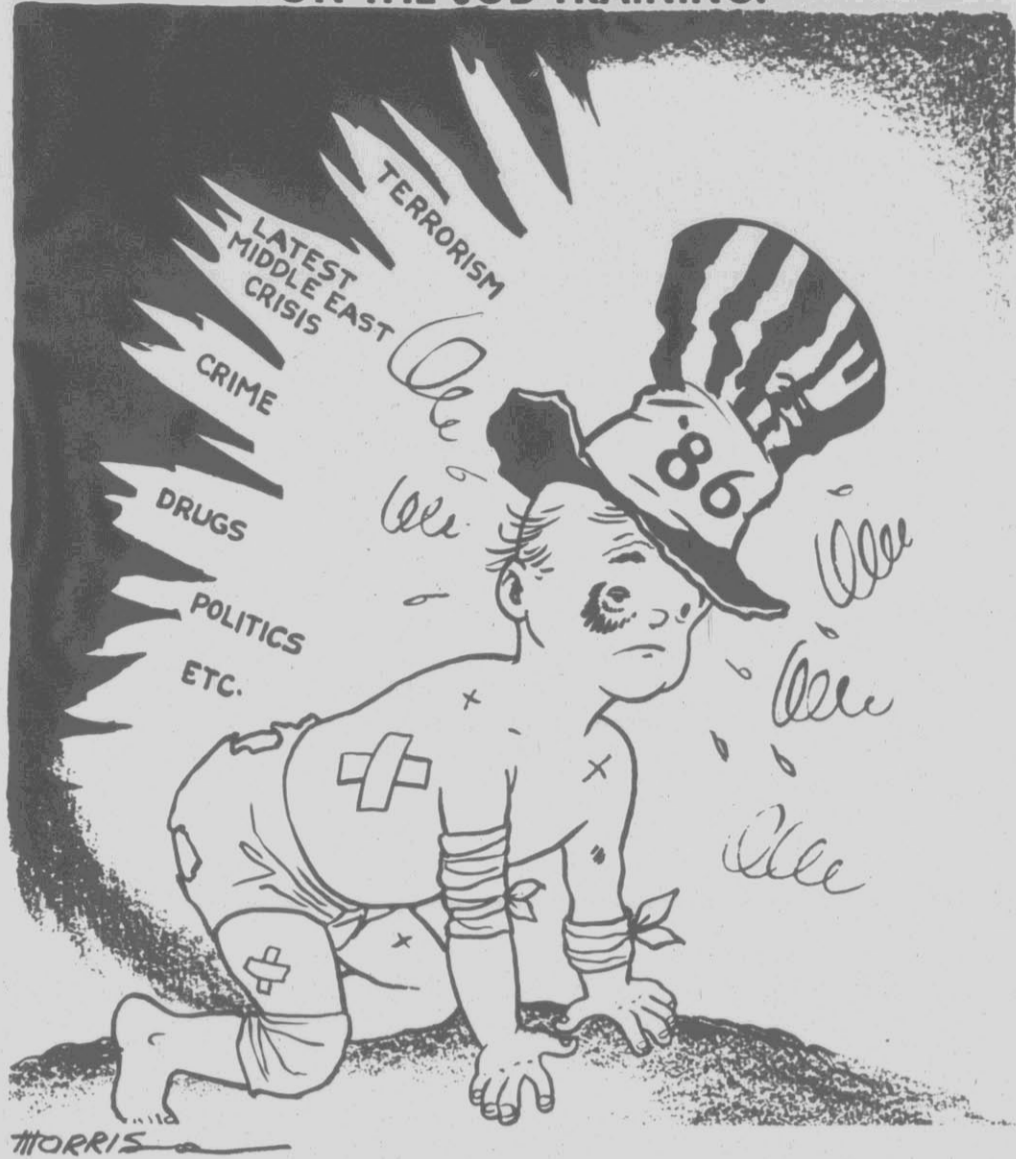
Kirk said he agreed "with 80 percent of what they're saying ... but they tend to be a little hard on the system. They emphasize our shortcomings." Both Kirk and Martin said further meetings are planned.

Martin said some of the alliance's specific proposals for more facilities would need a great deal of study. Using the alliance's numbers, as many as 40,000 North Carolinians could be in need of continuous care. That, said Martin, "could cost enormous amounts of money."

The alliance contends that by deinstitutionalizing, the state has shirked its responsibility to the mentally ill, pushing them out into communities not prepared to handle them properly.

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## DPI's Handling Of Funds Probed

RALEIGH (AP) — The state Department of Public Instruction's handling of a \$50,000 grant allocated for a trip by Greenville elementary students to Tidewater Virginia is being examined by the state auditor's office, an education official says.

Last week, South Greenville Elementary School fifth-graders were told that their spring field trip to Williamsburg and other parts of Tidewater Virginia had been canceled. Officials in the Department of Public Instruction learned several months ago that there was no money for the trip.

Since then, they have ordered an audit of records from here to California and the reassignment of a department employee who had helped secure a \$50,000 grant to fund a total of three yearly trips to Virginia for students at the Greenville school.

The Department of Public Instruction began looking into the matter two or three months ago when it learned of the slow payments and that the second and third year's trips had been canceled because there was no more money, said L. Reeves McGlohon, associate state superintendent.

"As we began to look into the matter, it was obvious that the individual who was our employee had done some things that were at least questionable in terms of handling the entire matter," McGlohon said in a telephone interview Tuesday. "We took the information to the state auditor and requested ... an immediate investigation."

McGlohon identified the employee as Thelma C. Lennon, the agency's grants coordinator. Mrs. Lennon, who has worked for the department for 23 years, has been assigned other duties pending the completion of the audit, he said.

Mrs. Lennon declined to answer questions about the grant. "I just have no comment to make on the situation at this time," she said in an interview.

## Cautious Optimism

PARIS (AP) — Foreign Minister Roland Dumas said hopes of freeing four Frenchmen kidnapped in Lebanon have increased since new, unspecified initiatives were made toward contacts in Lebanon, Syria and Iran.

Dumas said Tuesday on radio RTL that France has not directly contacted the captors, who claim to be members of a fundamentalist Shiite Moslem group called Islamic Jihad, or Islamic Holy War.

Islamic Jihad, which is believed to have close ties to Iran, also has claimed it kidnapped six Americans missing in Beirut.

Last Friday, the captors released a message accusing France of "procrastination" in negotiations and said the health of one hostage had become "life threatening."

It was the second time a French hostage was said to be in ill health, and the references are thought to be about Marcel Carton, a 62-year-old diplomat with a heart condition.

Dumas said Tuesday, however, that "initiatives" toward Lebanon, Syria and Iran had been made, leading to a "period of hope because discussions have intensified." A French delegation visited Iran on Jan. 3-7, and Dumas said its report was being studied.

He said the four French hostages were being held in Lebanon's Bekaa Valley, which is under Syrian control, "but the captors move the hostages around."

Dumas also said the captors' demands concern "financial contentions" and "demands involving people."

Earlier, unofficial reports said the kidnappers wanted settlement of a \$1

billion loan made to France in 1975 by the late shah of Iran and the release of five men jailed here in connection with the 1980 attempted assassination of Shahpour Bakhtiar, the last prime minister under the shah and leader of an exile faction.

The five were convicted of killing a policeman and a bystander in the assassination attempt, and four are serving life sentences.

Iran's Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi made the loan to France's Atomic Energy Commissariat four years before the fundamentalist revolution of Shiite patriarch Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini drove him into exile in 1979. In return for the loan, Iran was awarded participation in Eurodif, the European factory for Uranium Enrichment, from which it has withdrawn.

Another reported demand, not mentioned by Dumas, is an end to French arms sales to Iraq, which is at war with Iran. Iraq has attacked shipping in the Persian Gulf with Super Etendard fighters and Exocet missiles bought from France.

In addition to Carton, the French hostages are Marcel Fontaine, embassy vice consul; Michel Seurat, a Middle East researcher; and Jean-Paul Kauffmann, a journalist.

Terry Waite, a lay emissary of the archbishop of Canterbury, has been trying since last year to negotiate the release of the American captives.



# Gas Dealers Form Safety Program

Natural gas dealers in Pitt County have banded together in what they say is an effort to insure safe and efficient energy systems for local residential customers.

A Gas Appliance System (GAS) Check program which will provide examinations of residents' gas systems — either free or for a fee — will be implemented by Pitt County gas dealers beginning in spring, 1986.

At a meeting Tuesday, representatives of the 11 gas companies who belong to the Pitt County LP Gas Association discussed the GAS Check program, which is supported by the North Carolina LP Gas Association and the national association of natural gas dealers.

"The program is a joint effort between the manufacturers of gas equipment and the local retailers," said Pitt County LP Gas Association

President Jim Dupree of Blount Petroleum in Bethel. "The aim of the program is to make sure the customer's system is functioning properly and operating safely."

According to Ed Congleton of S and C Gas Company in Stokes, secretary of the Pitt County organization, the gas distributor will contact the gas customers, either by telephone call or through a flyer in the gas bill, and schedule a time to perform the GAS Check.

"The technician will check the whole system, from the gas tank to each appliance," Congleton said. The procedure will include checking pressure, leaks, operations and lines. "It is a general overall check to make sure that everything is in good operating order," Congleton said.

"During the GAS check, the servicing technician will take the customer out to the gas tank and show the customer how to cut off the gas,

what gas smells like and what to do if they smell gas in the house," Congleton said.

"The dealers will start the GAS Check system this spring, and will try to check 20 percent of the company's customers each year. The check will take anywhere from one to two hours to perform at each home," Congleton said. "The program is an ongoing thing, it will never stop, but it will take five years to have all the customers in Pitt County checked."

"It is going to be up to a company policy whether they want to charge for the service or not," Congleton said.

Implementing the program is not based on the assumption that customers' gas systems are faulty, Congleton said, but on the desire to insure safety. "We are not saying that everybody has a problem with their gas system," Congleton said. "We want to check everyone's system and

make sure there is no problem; if there is a problem, we can see that it is fixed to make sure the system is all that should be."

Dupree said the association "encourages the users of gas to cooperate with their local gas company. If they will go on and request a check, it will help the retailers because we know they want it done."

"We are willing to take the time and spend our money to make sure our customers are getting the best price for their dollar," Dupree said.

# Libyan Intercept Incident Prompts U.S. Reaction

WASHINGTON (AP) — A second American aircraft carrier was expected to move into the Mediterranean Sea today, two days after Libyan jets intercepted a Navy surveillance plane in international airspace and briefly shadowed it.

Although the Libyan fighters — two Soviet-made MiG-25s — made no threatening moves toward the Navy plane, two U.S. F-18 jet fighters were scrambled from the carrier Coral Sea to intercede if necessary.

Monday's incident, disclosed by administration sources Tuesday, was described as the first direct contact between U.S. and Libyan forces in the wake of increased U.S.-Libyan tensions over the Dec. 27 terrorist attack on Rome and Vienna airports.

The United States has accused Libya of supporting the terrorist group that conducted those attacks.

As a result of those tensions and increased activity by Soviet naval ships, the aircraft carrier Saratoga and an accompanying group of smaller warships was ordered away from a routine deployment in the Indian Ocean last week and into the Mediterranean to join the carrier Coral Sea.

The Coral Sea, from which the E-3A electronic surveillance plane had been dispatched, was reported in the Ionian Sea, southeast of Italy and due north of Libya. The Saratoga arrived at the southern entrance of the Suez Canal late Tuesday night en route to the Mediterranean, according to Suez City shipping sources who asked not to be identified.

Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger, although providing no details, confirmed the incident involving the Libyan fighters Tuesday evening. He said he found nothing remarkable about the affair because Libyan planes had patrolled in the general area before.

"Libyan planes have been up in that area. This is a little farther north than they've been before, but I don't think there's anything unusual about it," Weinberger said.

The administration sources also sought to downplay the incident, noting the Libyan MiGs had turned back toward home before the F-A-18s arrived on the scene. One source agreed, however, the MiGs had appeared unexpectedly and moved unusually close to the surveillance plane — "within 200 feet."

In other developments, Pentagon officials stepped up their war of words against Libya and the Soviet Union, with spokesman Robert B. Sims branding the introduction of SA-5 surface-to-air missiles in Libya "a significant and dangerous escalation in the Soviet-Libyan arms relationship."

Sims also said the Soviet Union had increased its surveillance of U.S. ships and aircraft in the Mediterranean region in what appeared to be "an integrated effort to obtain detailed information about our fleet operations and provide it to the Libyans."

The Soviets have 26 ships in the Mediterranean, Sims said, including six warships and a variety of intelligence-gathering vessels. The flagship of that Soviet fleet currently is in Tripoli, Libya, he added.

Sims said he was not prepared to suggest the Soviet surveillance was in any way illegal.

"I'm just saying that the amount of military equipment provided to Libya and the surveillance of our movements, put together, suggest some degree of danger for our forces," he said, adding the Soviet support could help the Libyans if they decided to attack U.S. forces.

Other Pentagon sources, meanwhile, said the United States was itself stepping up surveillance in the region. One official explained there were some indications additional Soviet naval ships might be heading toward the Mediterranean from the Black Sea.

The sources, who agreed to discuss the military situation only if not identified, stressed that no orders had been given to the carriers to prepare for a retaliatory military strike against Libya.

# No Strike Talks

NEW BEDFORD, Mass. (AP) — Talks to end the 20-day-old strike of fishermen tying up this rich fishing port will not resume before Friday, said an attorney for fishing boat owners who broke off bargaining without explanation.

"We had some communications difficulties," attorney David Barnett said late Tuesday, after vessel operators stalked out of contract negotiations. "It was just not appropriate to continue any further."

He said he expected no meetings with the fishermen until after he met Thursday night with his clients.

"I'm sure there will be other sessions," said Barnett. "None is scheduled."

An hour after talks began on Tuesday, the negotiators of the Seafood Producers Association, representing the owners, asked striking members of the Seafarers International Union to leave the room so they could caucus, said Jack Caffey, vice president of the union.

"We were standing outside, standing by waiting to be called in, and all we saw was a mass exodus going out of the room," Caffey said. "They didn't say one word."

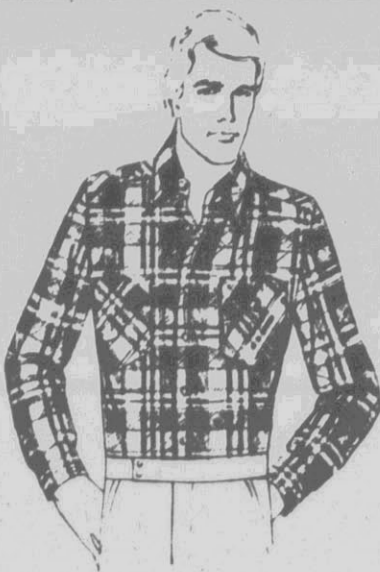
Federal mediator Austin Skinner said he was disappointed, but would try to get the parties together again. Earlier in the day, union members had expressed optimism that the strike might be close to resolution.

Boat owners agreed on Monday to let union accountants review their financial records. Union port agent Joseph Piva said relations between the fishermen and boat owners were "a little less hostile."

New Bedford fishermen went on strike Dec. 27 in a dispute with boat owners on how to divide profits from the catch and other issues. The walkout has tied up this major seaport south of Boston, the most profitable port in the nation in 1984.

About 30 boats carrying non-union crews have left port since the strike began. The union represents crews on about a third of the 250-boat fleet.

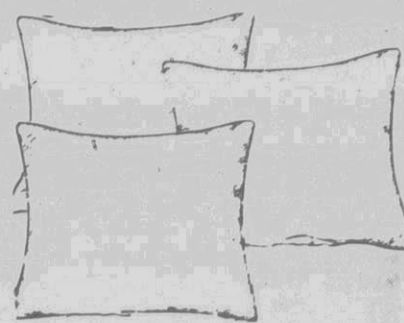

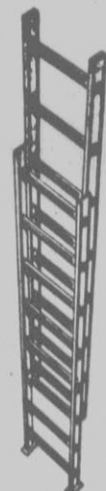
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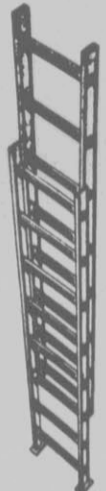
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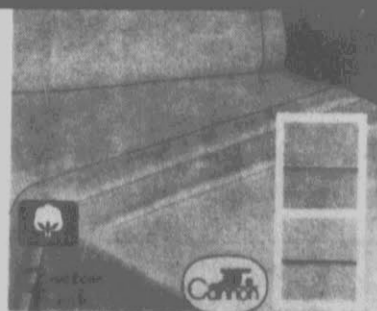


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# Para-Military Force Surround Facilities

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Foreign residents of Lesotho, a black kingdom surrounded by South Africa, said today that about 150 para-military police surrounded the main government buildings and ordered bureaucrats to leave.

The activity aroused some suspicions of a coup attempt in the country that accused the white-led government of South Africa on Tuesday of imposing a blockade and seeking to strangle it economically.

However, the government radio continued with routine news and diplomats said the capital, Maseru, appeared calm.

"We can confirm there are members of the Lesotho para-military force around the government complex," British High Commissioner Peter Rosling told The Associated Press by telephone. "I cannot say what they are for. The numbers there are much larger than usual."

"This could be a coup, a move against a coup or simply a bomb

scare," said one resident. South Africa said Tuesday that Lesotho had agreed to set up a joint security committee to control guerrillas fighting for black rule in South Africa. The Foreign Affairs Ministry said today it has proposed that the new committee, consisting of eight representatives from each side, meet in Pretoria "within the next few days."

Lesotho, which claims only to harbor political refugees, not guerrillas, did not confirm the report.

However, Lesotho's information minister, Desmond Sixishe, told reporters today, "Lesotho will be standing by its obligations to the refugees, there will be no action against them." He spoke before the police surrounded the government buildings.

On Tuesday, the assistant U.S. secretary of state for African affairs, Chester A. Crocker, left South Africa after talks with government officials. He rejected harsher economic sanctions against the white-led government, saying racial reforms cannot take place while South Africa's economy is in trouble.

Asked whether the United States would yield to demands from anti-apartheid activists for tougher measures against South Africa, Crocker said the United States does not "seek to wage economic war on this country and its people."

"We don't think reform can take place in a climate of economic decline," he said.

Last September, President Reagan banned most loans to South Africa's government as well as computer exports that could be used to enforce apartheid and sales of nuclear technology. He also banned imports of Kruggerands, South Africa's gold coin.

Crocker declined to say whether he felt more optimistic about his mission of pressing South Africa on racial reforms and independence for the mineral-rich neighboring territory of South-West Africa, also known as Namibia. The value of South Africa's currency, the rand, has fallen sharply during the last 16 months of racial unrest, in which more than 1,000 are estimated to have died. South Africa also is seeking to renegotiate its foreign debt of nearly \$24 billion.

South Africa's foreign minister, R.F. Botha, said Tuesday that Lesotho had sent a telex message agreeing to set up a joint security committee to control black guerrillas who are fighting the South African government.

Lesotho had resisted such demands from South Africa for the past seven months.

Lesotho, which is economically dependent on South Africa, com-

plained Tuesday that its neighbor had imposed a blockade at the border, and that fuel, medical and some food supplies were nearly gone.

South Africa tightened its border controls with Lesotho on Jan. 1, saying the African National Congress guerrillas, which are fighting for black rule in South Africa, were planning to strike from bases in Lesotho.

Vehicles were backed up today for a half-mile at border crossing points as South African officials pulled apart containers, saying they were searching for terrorist weapons. The state-run Lesotho Radio said dozens of trucks with perishables gave up trying to get through about a week ago.

"We are a hostage country," Lesotho's Sixishe said today. "I wish South Africa would pick on someone its own size."

He said South Africa was punishing Lesotho for having diplomatic links with communist countries.

Relations between South Africa and Lesotho deteriorated after a Dec. 20 commando raid on Maseru in which nine people died, including six ANC members. South Africa denied Lesotho's accusations that its soldiers were involved in the raid.

Meanwhile in South Africa, black youths stoned vehicles or set fire to buildings overnight in seven centers, including the white town of Stutterheim in the Cape province, police reported.

A black policeman opened fire on attackers at his home in Pretoria's Mamelodi township, wounding two youths, police said.

## Hecklers Ready For Ted Kennedy

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Supporters of the military government planned demonstrations today when Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, who has denounced Chile's human rights record, arrives for talks with opposition leaders.

Francisco Hernandez, director of the state radio network, said after a Cabinet meeting Tuesday that pro-government groups were instructed to refrain from violence but were being allowed to hold street protests against the Massachusetts Democrat.

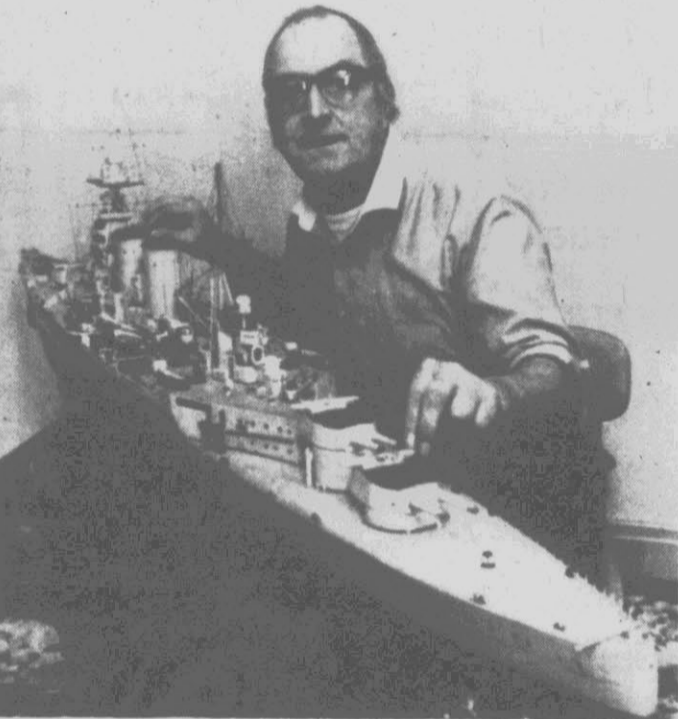
Hernandez said he had ordered 400 life preservers inscribed with the word "Chappaquiddick" for hecklers to wear.

The Avanzada Nacional party said in a statement published by local newspapers that Kennedy's criticism of Chile's human rights record was "morally disqualified by the sordid Chappaquiddick episode."

The reference was to the 1969 accident on Massachusetts' Chappaquiddick Island, in which Kennedy's car plunged from a bridge into a pond, killing passenger Mary Jo Kopechne.

Kennedy, who is touring South America, has visited the civilian presidents of Brazil, Uruguay and Argentina and plans to go to Peru in a demonstration of support for the emergence of those countries from military rule.

In Chile, Kennedy is scheduled to meet with opposition politicians, labor leaders, student activists, businessmen and victims of police action. He plans to endorse efforts by moderate civilian groups to restore elected government.

# Average 1986 Seen For Retailers

NEW YORK (AP) — Another so-so year for the nation's big retailers is expected for 1986.

Consumer buying — which represents two-thirds of the gross national product — powered the economic expansion of the past few years, but slowed in 1985 and should slow even more this year, the experts say.

Although Americans' confidence remains high, their needs pretty much have been sated, analysts say. Sales also have been dampened by extraordinary consumer debt and

and low savings, many economists believe.

The slowdown in buying held the increase in sales for all types of retail concerns to 6.3 percent last year, compared with a 10.5 percent rise in 1984, the Commerce Department reported Tuesday.

The lackluster buying is expected to hit hardest again at the companies that target lower- and middle-income consumers. That includes Sears, Roebuck & Co., the largest chain, and K mart Corp., the second largest.

Retailers that cater to more affluent customers are expected to do better.

"I think 1986 should be a good year in retailing, certainly not spectacular," said Allen Sinai, chief economist for the investment firm Shearson Lehman American Express Inc.

Walter Loeb, an analyst with Morgan Stanley & Co., said he expected sluggish sales during the first half of the retailers' fiscal year, which begins with February. "It will be only in the second half that we will see some new excitement," he said.

For the biggest retailers, the analysts generally expected sales increases of 3 percent to 4 percent in 1986, after adjusting for inflation. That would be about the same as 1985, and down from rises of 6 percent in 1983 and 7 percent 1984.

Much of the slowdown in spending comes from farmers and manufacturing employees, who have been hurt by imports and the weakened position of unions, said Bernard Sosnick, a retail analyst with L.F. Rothschild, Unterberg, Towbin.

The purchasing power of Americans who rely on interest income, such as retired people, also has been

reduced by the drop in interest rates, he said.

In addition, consumers as a whole have run up a huge debt load — \$536.03 billion as of the end of November — and the experts say the delinquency rate on debt repayment has been rising.

Optimists contend the debt comes not from consumers overextending themselves, but from the fact that there is a growing number of 30- to 40-year-olds who are buying houses and raising children.

Sales also could be hurt if the decline in the value of the dollar brings higher prices for imported merchandise.

The low rate of inflation in recent years has helped retailers' profits, partly because operating expenses increased at a slower rate. But low inflation also has meant retailers have had to sell more merchandise to

and inventories will be kept very tightly controlled, because retailers, sensing the consumers' mood, have cut back on everything except fashion and apparel items, Loeb said.

The retailing environment will remain highly competitive this year,

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## Court Hears From Shield Claimants

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — About 20,000 letters have been sent to U.S. Bankruptcy Court in the first nine days of a campaign to publicize the deadline for filing claims against the manufacturer of the Dalkon Shield intrauterine device.

The mail is pouring in despite a charge by some claimants Tuesday that the A.H. Robins Co.'s advertising campaign is too narrow and should be expanded beyond major U.S. markets.

Most of the mail has come from people who say they were or might have been injured by using the Dalkon Shield, said court clerk Michael M. Sheppard.

Some letters allege injuries from use of other IUDs, and others are being placed in a "weirdo" file, he said.

The court had received about 1,000 pieces of mail before last week, and court employees were braced to receive many more when the national advertising campaign began Jan. 6, Sheppard said.

The post cards and letters alleging Dalkon-related injuries are being filed in conjunction with a court-ordered advertising campaign in the United States and a public relations campaign abroad.

The U.S. advertising campaign consists of 30-second announcements on television, quarter-page newspaper ads and one-page magazine ads.

The foreign campaign consists of news conferences in 16 cities and notification to medical and governmental authorities in the 80 countries in which the Dalkon Shield was distributed.

In a memorandum filed in Bankruptcy Court on Tuesday, a committee for Dalkon claimants contends that Robins' notification program "is inadequate in several respects."

The committee does not seek any specific action but says it might later ask U.S. District Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr. to order a supplemental notice.

Robins spokesman Roscoe E. L. Puckett Jr. on Tuesday questioned why the committee waited until now to criticize the notification program.

The committee contends that the ads should be expanded to include some women's magazines and more newspapers, and says more emphasis should be placed on the April 30 deadline for filing claims.

Robins' schedule to place newspaper ads in the 75 largest markets would have omitted ads in 13 states and would provide "only spotty coverage" in some other states, the memo says.

The memo also contends that the notice about filing claims should contain a list of injuries associated with Dalkon usage, because "women suffering these injuries may not have associated them with Shield use."

Past allegations have associated use of the shield with pelvic infections, sterility, uterine perforations and miscarriages. Robins has said the Dalkon Shield was no more likely to cause injury than any other IUD.

Robins sold the device from 1970 to 1974 in the United States and until mid-1975 in other countries.

The Richmond-based pharmaceutical company and its insurer had paid out nearly \$500 million in claims to more than 4,000 women when it filed for protection under Chapter 11 of federal bankruptcy statutes Aug. 21.

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# Faircloth To Pass Up Senate Bid

RALEIGH (AP) — D.M. "Lauch" Faircloth's decision not to run against former Gov. Terry Sanford for the U.S. Senate has relieved state Democratic leaders who hope to avoid a repeat of the bitter 1984 gubernatorial primary.

That primary so angered the runner-up, former Charlotte Mayor Eddie Knox, that he defected to the Republican Party. And the divided Democrats had one of their worst showings ever in the general election, losing races for president, governor and the Senate as well as seats in the U.S. House and General Assembly.

Newly elected state Democratic Chairman James Van Hecke said Faircloth's withdrawal showed "that he does care a lot about the ... party."

"I do think it will serve the best interest of the party not to have him going against the rest of the field," Van Hecke said.

He said he hoped Faircloth supporters quickly would get over any resentment they might feel toward Sanford. "They are good friends, and hopefully they will ... iron out any differences so we can progress on a positive note and keep the party united," Van Hecke said.

Faircloth did not endorse Sanford in a prepared statement issued Tuesday from his Clinton home. But in a telephone interview, he said he would consider doing so if his longtime political ally requested it.

The former state commerce secretary did affirm his support of the Democratic Party in ringing terms, urging textile employees and farmers to support the party's ticket and charging that Republicans had "turned their back" on those pillars of the North Carolina economy. "A leopard can't change its spots," he said.

"I feel what is most important now is that the Democratic Party wins," Faircloth said. "Should I enter the primary now and win — and I feel that would still be within reach — I still lose, because the Democratic Party can't win this time if it has a divisive primary."

Sanford said he was pleased with Faircloth's decision.

"I have not intended that this present race should be a confrontation between us," Sanford said in a statement. "His generosity and sportsmanship

are characteristic and I will continue to treasure my friendship with him."

Republican Sen. John East, who had the worst attendance record of any senator last year because of illness, is not seeking re-election. Seven Democrats and two Republicans are vying for his seat.

Faircloth, an unsuccessful candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in 1984, had spent over a month seeding the ground for a Senate candidacy after announcing last fall he would not run.

But he also made clear he had no desire to tangle with Sanford, with whom he has political ties dating to the 1950s.

Sanford declared his candidacy Saturday night, reversing his decision of last September not to run. He said he was answering the call of a cross-section of the party leadership disturbed that no Democrat with a statewide base of support was in the race.

His sudden move caught Faircloth off guard. In his statement, Faircloth acknowledged he had planned to announce his Senate candidacy Tuesday, his 58th birthday.

"I was ready to run and to win," Faircloth said. But he said Sanford's candidacy "cast a large shadow" over the prospects of either man's defeating the Republican nominee after battling each other in the primary.

Faircloth insisted in the interview he held no bitterness toward Sanford. "Life's too short to harbor that sort of thing," he said. "It only gives you wrinkles and stomach ulcers."

Faircloth said he felt he could have defeated Sanford because he had a 60-to-90-day head start in developing an organization, because his name recognition was comparable with Sanford's, and because he had been in government more recently than Sanford.

The other would-be Democratic nominees, none of whom has signaled an intention to withdraw in the aftermath of Sanford's entry, include former Superior Court judge Marvin Blount, of Greenville; Charlotte businessman William Belk; Mecklenburg County Commissioner Fountain Odum; Betty Wallace, a state education official from Raleigh; Katherine Harper, a Charlotte businesswoman; and Raleigh businessman Milton Croom.

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## Elections Probe Has Meant More Paperwork

MONROE, N.C. (AP) — A U.S. Justice Department investigation of North Carolina laws governing school board elections has caused more paperwork, but long-standing practices haven't been threatened, officials say.

The Justice Department is requiring information from North Carolina counties that are governed by the 1965 Voting Rights Act and have changed their method of electing school board members in the past 20 years.

Most state and local officials in North Carolina — when the Legislature made changes in school board elections — apparently overlooked a section of the Voting Rights Act that requires prior approval by the Justice Department.

For example, no one notified the Justice Department when a 1969 North Carolina law permitted non-partisan school board elections statewide, or a 1975 General Assembly act made elections partisan for the seven-member Union County Board of Education.

Union and 40 other Tar Heel counties, including Anson, Cleveland, Gaston and Scotland, are under the jurisdiction of the Voting Rights Act, designed to prevent weakening of minority voting strength. Apparently, only Onslow County has submitted a report in response to the federal investigation.

Last month, the state elections board sent a memorandum to county education boards and their attorneys, telling them to submit the information.

State Elections Director Alex Brock and Union County school board attorney Charles Humphries say the changes did not dilute voter strength and the Justice Department will not overturn the changes or delay elections.

"There's no great danger of the plan of salvation being upset," Brock said. "It's just that they now crave paper."

Nothing was done to dilute minority voter strength; therefore, it is a matter of sending paperwork to them to secure their approval, says Humphries, who will talk to the Union County school board about the request on Monday.

Democrat Willis Sturdivant, the only black elected to the Union County school board, won a two-year term in 1982 but lost in the Democratic primary in 1984.

Republicans, who had two members on the board when partisan elections began in 1975, did not regain a seat until Garland Sailors won in 1984.

Justice Department spokesman John Wilson said the department does not keep track of changes in laws and probably started this investigation on a tip.

"Probably somebody brought it to our attention," he said. "There are a number of states under the Voting Rights Act. There's no way we could check them all."

## Report Irks County Leaders

HAYESVILLE, N.C. (AP) — A task force on hunger report that lists Clay and Cherokee counties among 150 "hungry counties" in the nation is drawing fire from local residents and officials.

"It just makes me ill to read this," on Hayesville resident said Tuesday. "There are poor people here, but they're not starving and there's a difference."

Sheriff Tony Woody said many Clay County residents do fall into poverty income levels and "do have it hard, but if they're hungry, they haven't talked to the right agencies."

Some people affiliated with public agencies said transportation is sometimes a problem getting food to the elderly, but most residents said the study's findings don't accurately reflect the situation in the two western North Carolina counties.

The Harvard University School of Public Health and the Physicians Task Force on Hunger in America released findings Monday that named Clay and Cherokee as counties needing more government assistance

in the fight against hunger. The counties were ranked on highest rates of poverty and lowest rates of participation in the federal food stamp program.

Local officials said the study is nothing more than "statistical games," adding that they can't understand how the report can determine people are hungry on the basis of how many people did not apply for food stamps.

The study defined a "hunger county" as one in which more than 20 percent of the residents live below the federally defined poverty level — \$10,609 for a family of four — and where fewer than one-third of eligible residents actually receive food stamps.

If people are going hungry in Clay County, it is because they have not let their plight be known, said social services workers who disagreed with the report.

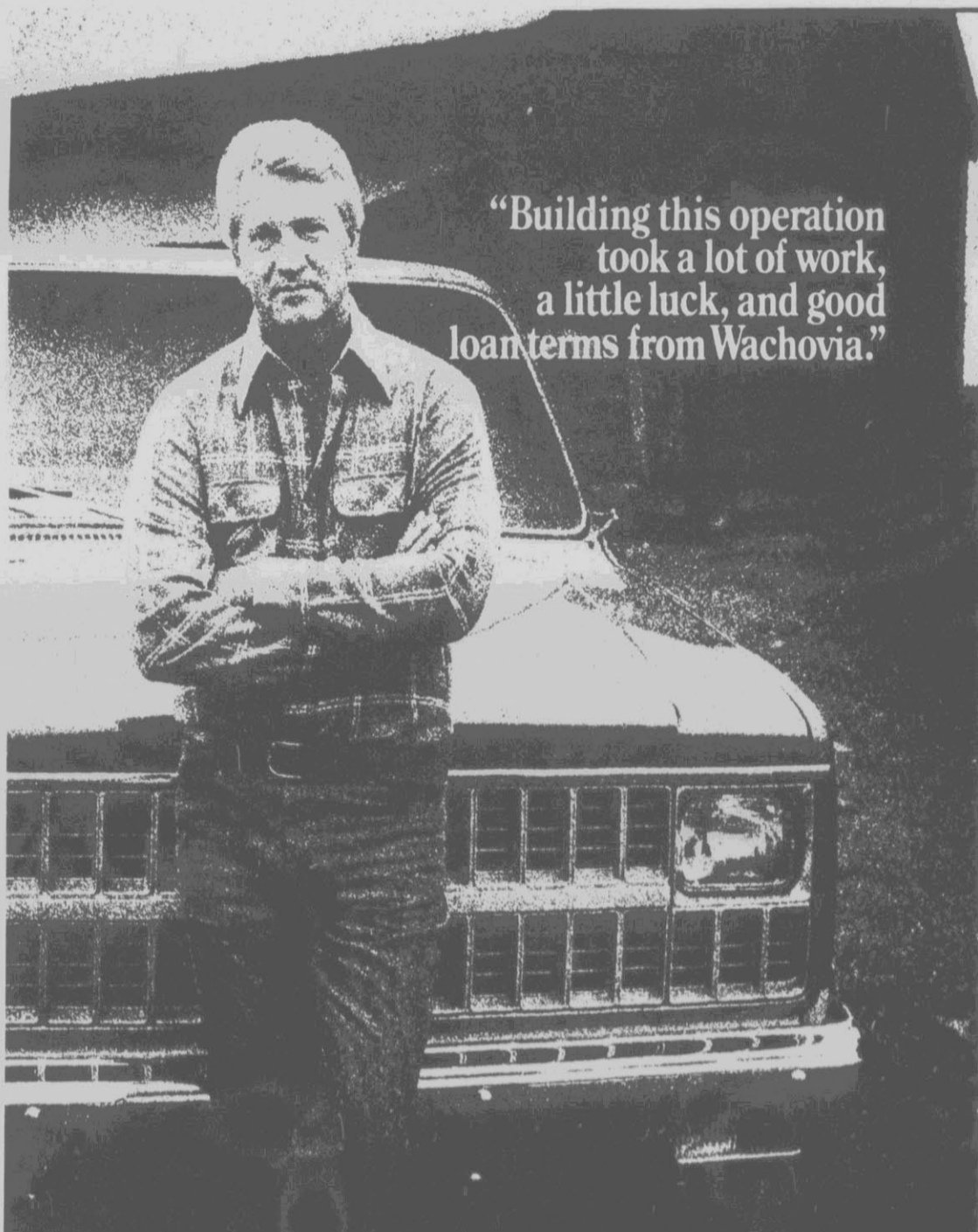
Clay County Social Services director Don Hunter said he was never contacted about the study and was not aware of hunger being a problem

in the county. At a nutritional site for the elderly, where 35 to 45 people eat a hot lunch five days a week, people said they have not been denied access to food stamps and have not encountered problems getting them.

Good Shepherd Home Health Agency, a 20-year-old non-profit corporation serves residents of Clay and Cherokee counties, bringing health services to homebound patients.

A study by Good Shepherd shows that more than 61 percent of the people over age 65 in Clay County have a transportation disadvantage, and that there is no public transportation system in Clay or Cherokee counties.

Gretchen Fink, a social worker for Good Shepherd, said the problem with hunger among the elderly is not just a food stamp problem but involves such things as some elderly people not eating properly when alone. Others may be humiliated by having to ask for assistance, she said.

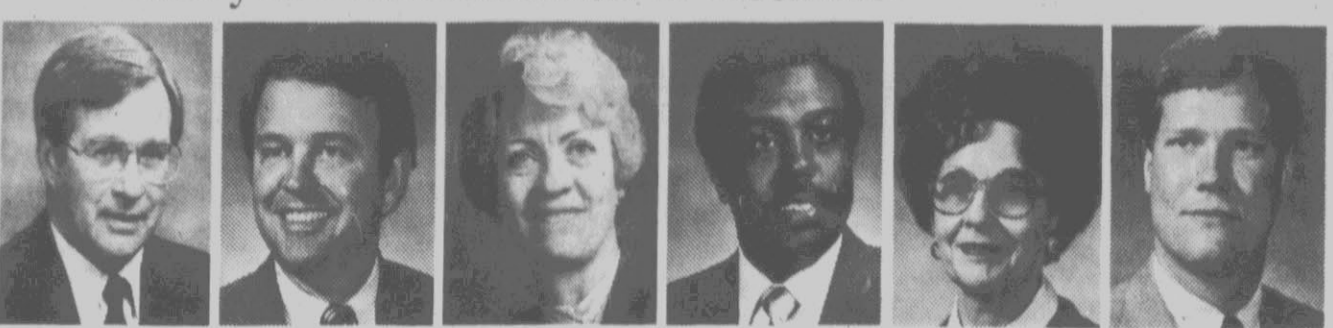


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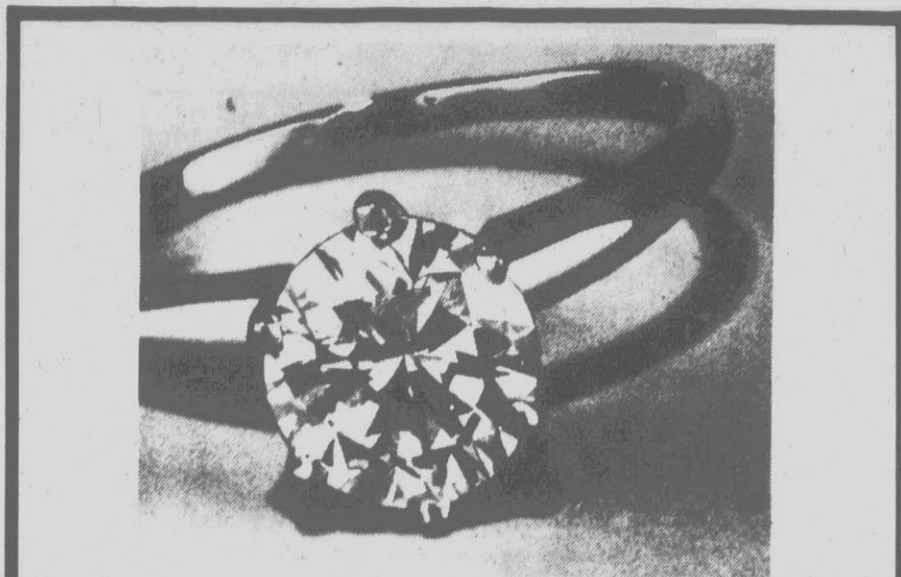
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# Sanford Not Broyhill's Concern

RALEIGH (AP) — Even if Terry Sanford were the clear leader in the U.S. Senate race, Rep. Jim Broyhill says he'd be too concerned with his own primary battle against GOP rival David Funderburk to plot strategy for dealing with the former governor.

At a news conference Tuesday, Broyhill said he did not agree with political analysts who have touted Sanford as the Democratic front-runner against a field of six opponents, none with a statewide base of support.

"I am not going to make any judgments as to who's going to win that (Democratic) primary, because I think it's going to be a wide-open primary," Broyhill said.

To win, Broyhill said, the Republican nominee must accomplish the same things regardless of who emerges victorious from the Democratic primary: unite the state GOP behind him and draw significant support from Democrats, who outnumber Republicans more than 3-to-1 in North Carolina.

"The kind of Democrats that we're talking about are those who have supported Ronald Reagan in the past, who continue to support his policies, who continue to support what he is trying to do in Washington, and would not like to see the Senate ... leadership change hands," he said.

The news conference was called to announce creation of a "Students for Broyhill" organization, which already has chapters on some 20 college and university campuses, chairman David Balmer said.

The group hopes to deliver 8,000 votes for Broyhill by absentee ballot in the May 6 Republican primary, said Balmer, who engineered a similar effort on behalf of Gov. Jim Martin in the 1984 campaign.

Broyhill said he enjoyed significant support from students despite supporting the Reagan administration's proposed restrictions on government aid to students.

In addition to putting a cap on the amount students can receive, the ad-

ministration would impose tougher income qualifications and require more student "self-help," Broyhill said.

"I think these are reasonable limitations, and also that they will ... continue to provide a great deal of support for students, to enable them to go to college," he said.

Broyhill added that students to whom he had spoken understood the need for the limits as part of a wide-ranging effort to reduce the federal budget deficit, which he called "a time bomb" that could explode in the face of the younger generation.

About 20 leaders of the Broyhill campus organizations attended the news conference.

The Monday, a similar number of students — many from Duke University — filled the state Board of Elections office, where Sanford filed for the race. Sanford retired as Duke president last July.

Sanford and Broyhill claimed to have widespread support among young people. But Broyhill said he would not emphasize any particular age group, and said young people always had worked in his campaigns.

Broyhill reacted coolly to Sanford's promise Tuesday to try to hold down campaign costs and use as little television advertising as possible.

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## Replica Ready For Test

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A replica of what some claim to have been the world's first airplane in 1901 is about ready for a test flight, and those behind the project believe their model will fly.

Researcher William O'Dwyer of Fairfield said the plane is modeled after a plane developed by Gustave Whitehead. He said the test flight should prove that Whitehead, and not the Wright brothers, was actually the first to fly.

Andrew Kosch, also of Fairfield, who will pilot the model, said Monday that the Whitehead replica will be towed by a car in the vicinity of the Captain's Cove Seaport to air test it as a glider in a few weeks.

Kosch, who is a high school biology teacher in Stamford, pilots ultralight

planes as a hobby. Glider tests were conducted by Whitehead and other airplane inventors to make sure their crafts would fly before they added motors to make actual test flights.

Kosch said he is confident that the model will fly, because the model begins to lift off the ground in the slightest wind when its wings are unfolded.

As his own contribution to the city's 150th anniversary celebration this year, seaport developer Kaye Williams built a hangar at the seaport for the model, and has pledged to donate about \$10,000 for building it. Williams said Whitehead is an example of the geniuses who mae Bridgeport great.

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## Reports Link Nelson Plane Crash With Cocaine Fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — A fire ignited by "free-basing" cocaine may have caused the New Year's Eve plane crash that killed rock 'n' roll star Rick Nelson and six others, published reports said today.

Sources said preliminary reports indicate Nelson's body contained a measurable level of unmetabolized cocaine, which means the drug had not been absorbed into his system at the time of death, The Washington Post reported. But the sources said final laboratory reports are not available yet.

Rudy Kapustin, National Transportation Safety Board chief investigator, was quoted by the Dallas Morning News as confirming that the board was investigating the possibility of a drug-related fire.

However, Ira Furman, a NTSB spokesman, said: "The board has no evidence now to support that kind of speculation."

Furman also said in a telephone interview Tuesday night that the safety board does not have an autopsy report on the passengers from any source.

Free-basing requires mixing cocaine with flammable ether or ammonia. After the chemicals evaporate, the "free-base" cocaine is usually smoked in a glass pipe held over a steady flame.

Both the pilot and the copilot, who survived the crash, have told investigators they tried to land the plane after a fire started in the passenger cabin, the report said.

Propellants from aerosol cans, which are sometimes used to aid the free-basing process, were found in the plane's wreckage, the newspaper said. However, it said most of the cans were found in the plane's baggage area.

"It can be observed that given the number of people on board, if you attributed cans to hair spray or anti-perspirants, you can account for those cans," Furman said, confirming that most of the cans were found in the baggage area.

Furman stressed that, as the Post report said, there was no drug-related paraphernalia recovered at the scene.

The newspaper said preliminary tests indicated that neither the pilot nor the copilot had alcohol or drugs in his bloodstream. Similar reports have not been completed on the five band members who died in the crash, along with Nelson's fiancée, it said.

The Douglas DC-3 was carrying Nelson and his band from Guntersville, Ala., to a concert in Dallas.

Early in the investigation, a broken fuel line was suspected as a source of the fire, but it was later established that the line broke as the plane hit the ground, the Post said.

But Furman said problems involving the fuel line had not been dismissed as a possible cause.

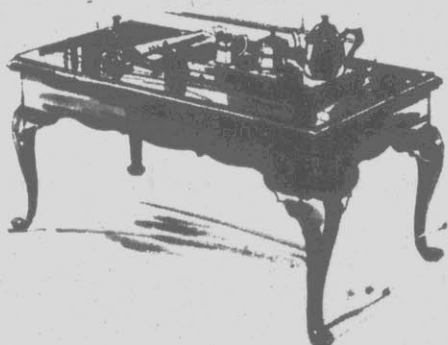
"The board certainly hasn't ruled anything out conclusively," he said. "We're looking at the possibility of fuel line rupture, heater involvement ... Some possibilities are now considered more remote now than in early stages, but nothing been ruled out."



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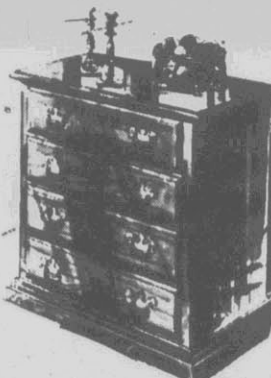


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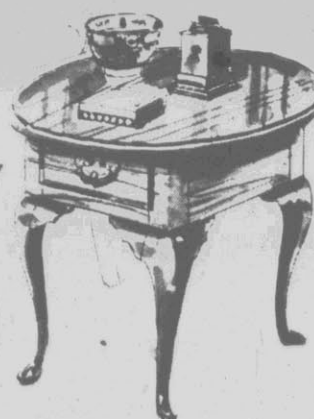
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## USS Olympia Involved In Legal Flap

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The USS Olympia, Admiral George Dewey's invincible flagship during the Spanish-American War, is under siege, about to be taken over by a man who won a lawsuit against its owners for the death of his son.

U.S. marshals were about to padlock the cruiser Friday to secure its contents for Robert Matthews' estate when a federal judge granted the Navy time to prepare a challenge. Legal papers were to be filed today.

The Navy gave the ship to the Cruiser Olympia Association in 1957 but wants it to remain intact as a national monument.

"The government is concerned that Admiral Dewey's flagship does not become converted into some discotheque or nightclub," said U.S. Attorney James Sheehan, representing the Navy.

The Olympia distinguished itself at the May 1, 1898 battle of Manila, in the Philippines, during which Dewey gave his fabled order: "You may fire when you are ready, Gridley."

A federal jury in June ordered the association to pay \$250,000 for negligence in the death of Matthews, 20, a deckhand who fell overboard and drowned in the Delaware River in 1983.

The association didn't have the insurance to pay the judgment, and U.S. District Judge Marvin Katz in September ordered the vessel attached to Matthews' estate.

The government contends the ship was given to the association under strict conditions that it remain a historical monument. Sheehan said the agreement allows the Navy to retake the vessel if it is used otherwise.

# Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market edged upward in quiet trading today, continuing the generally neutral trend of Tuesday's session.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials rose .34 to 1,519.38 in the first hour of trading.

Gainers took a 3-2 lead over losers in the early tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Southern Co. led the active list, up 1/4 at 22 3/4. A 734,000-share block of the stock traded at 22 1/4.

International Business Machines rose 1/2 to 149 3/4 in active trading. The company is expected to report higher fourth-quarter profits later this week.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks gained .17 to 119.38. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up .49 at 245.44.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average slipped 1.49 to 1,519.04.

Advances outpaced declines by about 3 to 2 on the NYSE. Big Board volume totaled 113.92 million shares, against 108.68 million in the previous session.

that the cuts will take place automatically March 1 unless Congress moves to block them or a federal court issues a stay.

A three-judge federal panel is weighing a constitutional challenge to the law by several members of Congress and a federal employees union. The case is expected to wind up before the Supreme Court before March 1.

For this year alone, Congress limited the overall impact of the budget cuts to \$20 billion for all of fiscal 1986. That works out to \$11.7 billion for the period of March 1-Oct. 1, that portion of the fiscal year affected by the required cuts.

The law says the cuts must be evenly divided between defense and domestic programs. However, a decision by President Reagan to shield all military personnel from any staff cutbacks resulted in the slightly higher percentage of cuts for the remainder of Pentagon programs.

The first round of spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law may force hiring freezes throughout the federal government, require layoffs in some agencies and result in thousands of individual program cuts, U.S. officials say.

That will be the net effect of a \$11.7 billion reduction in government spending, according to senior agency officials who spoke Tuesday on condition they not be named.

At that, the reductions will not approach those that will come in subsequent fiscal years, when the Gramm-Rudman act takes full effect.

Hiring freezes were expected to be instituted throughout the government, with layoffs likely at a number of agencies, according to several government officials who also spoke only on the condition of anonymity.

Labor Department spokesman David Demerest said, "We don't have a lot of flexibility from one program to another."

He said there would be some "picking and choosing" within specific programs, but that generally the percentage cuts were fixed and across-the-board.

An analysis by the House Education and Labor Committee said the March 1 cuts would result in a \$170 million cut in funds this year for the federal compensatory education program; a \$224.8 million cut in student aid; and a \$43.6 million cut in the federal vocational and adult education program.

Funds for the National Endowment for the Arts will be cut by \$7.7 million and by \$6.4 million for the National

# Lebo, Martin Spark Heels' Rally

North Carolina basketball coach Dean Smith usually has something up his sleeve. On Tuesday night he had something on his bench — freshman Jeff Lebo and veteran Warren Martin.

Lebo came off the sidelines early to score a career-high 18 points, while Martin helped out in a key rally as the top-ranked Tar Heels downed Maryland 71-67 in an Atlantic Coast Conference match.

In other action involving an ACC

team Tuesday night, Virginia took an 81-52 rout of Pennsylvania.

Lebo hit nine of 10 shots from the floor, hustled on defense and often kept North Carolina on its toes. Martin added eight points, including four crucial free throws and a blocked shot in the last six minutes.

But even after Lebo scored his ninth field goal in 10 tries, the unbeaten Tar Heels still trailed the Terrapins 62-59, and their 16-game winning streak was in jeopardy.

So, with 6:58 remaining, Smith

pulled Lebo, a 6-foot-2 guard and went with a line-up that featured Brad Daugherty and Martin, both 6-11, and 6-10 Joe Wolf.

"We did it for defense and rebounding," Smith said after Martin and Steve Hale scored four points apiece during an 8-0 streak.

Martin, back in action after missing three games with a broken finger, sank four free throws and Hale scored two field goals to put North Carolina ahead 69-65 with 2:31 left.

Martin also recorded one of his five

blocked shots when Len Bias, who led Maryland with 20 points, tried a baseline jumper which would have forced a 69-69 tie.

Maryland's Terry Long retrieved the tipped shot but Brad Daugherty, who scored 15 points for the Tar

Heels, stole the ball and was fouled with 21 seconds left.

North Carolina, 3-0 in the ACC, took

the ball out of bounds, and Kenny Smith scored a clinching dunk shot with 13 seconds to play. Smith also had 10 assists.

"Warren Martin gave us a big lift and Hale made the big shot," Smith said. "Everybody contributed defensively in the last six minutes. We got a couple of steals from our scramble defense."

The Terps, now 0-3 in the ACC, have come agonizingly close this month, previously lost by four points to third-ranked Duke and by a single point to No. 5 Georgia Tech.

Junior center Olden Polynice scored 20 points and grabbed 11 rebounds, and sophomore guard Mel Kennedy tallied 18 points as the Cavaliers, 11-4, downed Penn 81-52.

"We played about as well as we could," said Virginia coach Terry Holland. "Our guys off the bench played extremely well. That's why the final score was the way it was."

Nine Virginia players got into the scoring column, with Andrew Kennedy also finishing in double figures with 11.

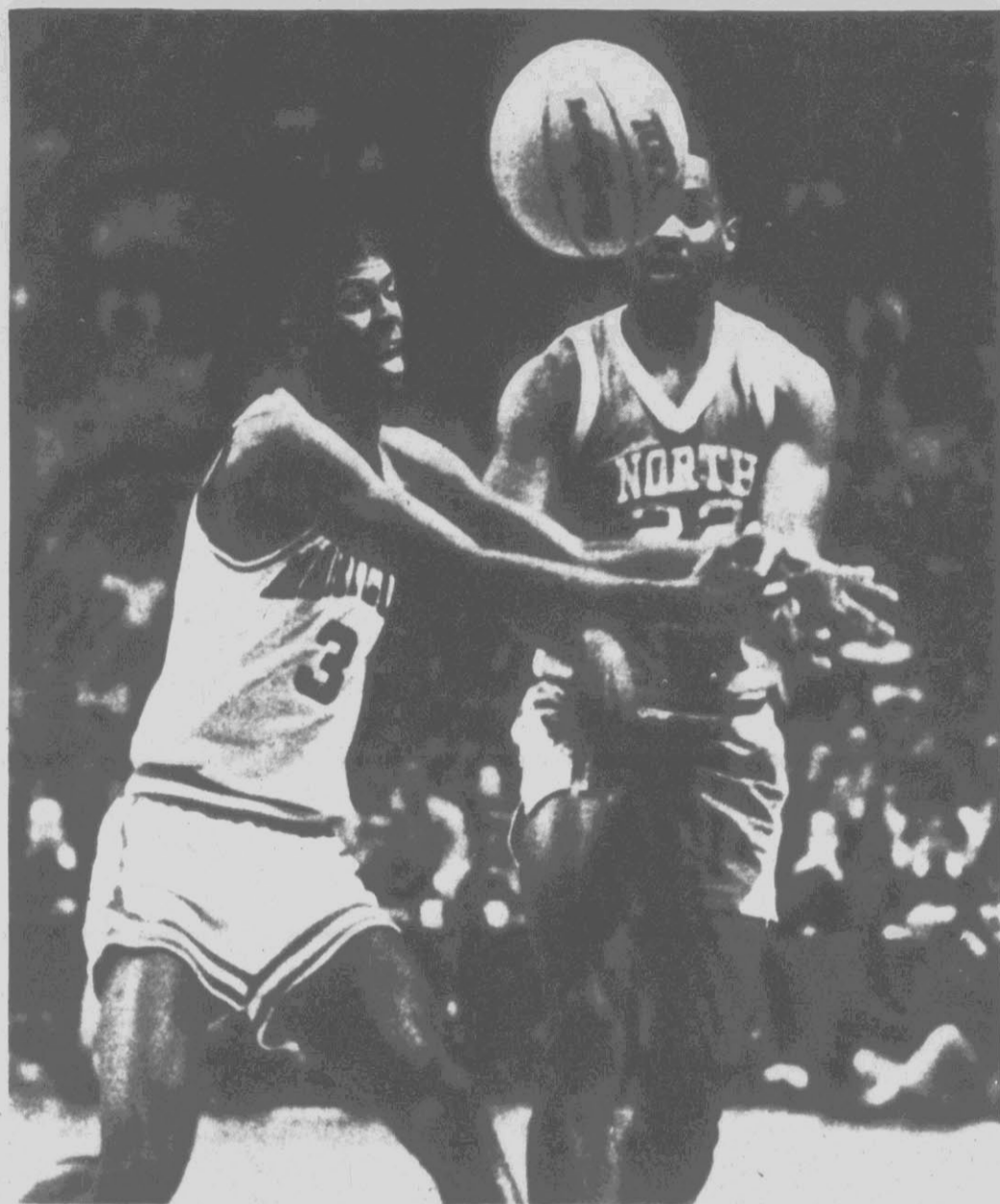

## Ex-Coach Didn't Know Of Payments To ECU Players

If East Carolina University football players did receive illegal funds under former Coach Ed Emory, the assistant coaches didn't know about it, one former coach said.

Contacted at his present home, the former coach said he had heard rumors, but could not confirm that it ever happened. "Let's put it this way, I never saw money being exchanged. There were always rumors going around that it was going on. But I never recruited a player that was offered (money), not from me anyway. Whether something came from another source, I don't know."

The coach, who asked not to be identified, said that he had no direct evidence that any player under Emory ever received anything he shouldn't have gotten under NCAA rules, but that there were rumors.

The coach, however, did admit knowledge of some breeches of the rules when it came to recruiting. "Certain rules were stretched quite a bit, and some rules were interrupted to benefit our situation, maybe like sending out a graduate assistant (not allowed to recruit off-campus by the NCAA). I'm aware of several times this happened."

The coach said he really saw nothing good coming from the situation now. "The people who are going to be hurt are those who are at the university now. The players who might have gotten money are gone. The coaches who broke the rules are gone. If anyone is going to be hurt now, it would be Coach (Art) Baker and his assistants and players who are trying to bring the program back up. It's a disadvantage to them even to be talking it out in public. It's tough enough to compete on the recruiting trails without something like this hanging over your head."

Other schools use it against you."

The coach admitted that he was contacted by the university's attorneys and a staff member from the attorney general's office during the preparation of the defense by the university against Emory's suit which followed his firing in December of 1984.

"By the time they got to me they had more than they needed," the coach said. "They told me they had quite a bit of recruiting violations that they felt would be very strong and would help their case."

Reports surfaced yesterday that the NCAA had been informed by East Carolina of violations of NCAA rules which allegedly occurred during Emory's tenure. Emory has denied any violations from his current home in Memphis, Tenn.

Officials at the university have been silent on the matter, referring questions to either Chancellor John Howell or Director of Athletics Dr. Ken Karr, both currently in New Orleans for the NCAA Convention. Karr has said he will not comment on the situation, and a spokesman for Howell has said the same of the chancellor.

ECU attorney David Stevens said yesterday that Dr. Howell is preparing a report to the NCAA on the situation. An ECU official told The Daily Reflector early last year of the talks with the NCAA in a confidential conversation. He said at the time that the NCAA said it would take no action whatsoever until the settlement of the suit with Emory. The suit was settled late last year with Emory receiving virtually the same amount he was offered by the university in its original offer.

NCAA policy does not allow that organization to comment on any investigation or the possibility of one being held.

Errol Wooten scored 14 points in the final quarter as Rose High School sank its last nine shots at the basket and slipped past Kinston 79-77 last night.

Rose's girls also claimed a win, downing Kinston, 49-44.

The victory evened the Rampant Big East record at 2-2 on the season while Kinston falls to 0-4 in league play. It was only the third Rose victory over a Viking team in the past nine years.

For a while, it looked like it might come easy as Rose powered out to several early eight-point leads. But Kinston caught fire and used a strong rebounding game to get back into the game in the third period, taking as much as a four-point lead.

But Wooten came off the bench to spark Rose through the final period as they canned 12 of 16 shots from the floor to grab a four-point lead and hold on every time Kinston struck back.

"We played a great first period and a great last period," Coach Jim Brewington said. "We had a great game against Beddingfield the other night, and after playing them, I was afraid we might have a let-down going against the last place team in the league and I think we did to a certain extent. We let them hang in there too close.

"But Errol came in and got hot. He came in and bombed them and that took a lot of poise. We have to win this kind of game and then a few that we're not supposed to win to have a chance to get into the playoffs," Brewington said.

Brewington said that forward Melvin Jenkins was ill, but played anyway. "He wasn't himself, though, and it made a difference. We did force a lot of shots tonight, and we didn't rebound very well."

Rose was outrebounded 49-33, but made up for it with fine shooting from the field. Helped by the final period, Rose made 50.8 percent to Kinston's 41.7.

After an early 2-2 tie, Rose scored five straight points to take a 7-2 lead, then stretched that to 10-4 and on to 15-8 during the first period. The lead finally reached eight at 18-10 on a basket by Terry Warren with 1:53 left.

But Chris Bradshaw led a Kinston rally, scoring five straight points to cut the lead to 20-17 by the horn.

# Gooden Named AP's Athlete Of Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Dwight Gooden of the New York Mets, the youngest player ever to win baseball's Cy Young Award, today was named The Associated Press Male Athlete of the Year for 1985, capturing the 55-year-old award by a substantial margin over Chicago Bears running back Walter Payton.

Gooden, a 21-year-old right-hander who led the major leagues in victories, strikeouts and earned run average last season, received 53 votes in balloting by sports writers and broadcasters nationwide. A total of 221 votes were cast.

Payton was second with 39 votes,

followed by stock car driver Bill Elliott with 25, Cincinnati Reds player-manager Pete Rose with 23 and Los Angeles Lakers center Kareem Abdul-Jabbar with 20.

Last year's winner of the award, first presented in 1931 to baseball player Pepper Martin, was Carl Lewis, who won four gold medals in track and field at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics. Lewis also won the award in 1983.

Gooden was the first baseball player to win the award since 1979, when it was given to Willie Stargell of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"It's different from the Cy Young

because it includes all players from different sports in every event, and you pick the best one," said Gooden, who will be presented with the Athlete of the Year trophy Feb. 21 in his hometown of Tampa, Fla. "It's something I will always cherish."

Gooden was named the National League's Cy Young winner last Nov. 13, three days before turning 21, after a season in which he went 24-4 with 268 strikeouts and an earned run average of 1.53. He put together a string of 14 straight victories from May 30-Aug. 25, and he went 31 consecutive innings from Aug. 31-Sept. 21 without allowing a run.

On Aug. 25, he became the youngest pitcher in modern history to win 20 games, reaching the milestone at 20 years, 9 months, 9 days old, and he posted the highest winning percentage in the National League (.857) since Preacher Roe went 22-3 (.880)

for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1961.

Through two seasons in the major leagues, Gooden has a record of 41-13.

He also has been injury free, never missing a start. But he gave the Mets a scare last week, when he injured his right ankle by stepping on a sprinkler while running in the choppy outfield at Hillsborough High School in Tampa.

After spending a few days on crutches as a precautionary measure, Gooden resumed jogging Monday.

Soft-spoken and seldom given to hyperbole, Gooden rarely has tried to explain his own success. He has left that to others.

"It's a mixture of his maturity and his command," Mets Manager Davey Johnson said. "He studies the hitters. He's not just a thrower; he's a student of the game. He's learned the hitters, and he knows how to pitch

to them."

During the season, Mets catcher Gary Carter said Gooden had "more maturity than any 20-year-old I've ever seen. There aren't enough adjectives to describe him. Catching him is like sitting back in a rocking chair — he has such great command of all his pitches."

Gooden won the NL's Rookie of the Year award in 1984 and Jim Frey, manager of the Chicago Cubs, calls Gooden "a special kind of pitcher."

"You don't expect to score six or seven runs off him," Frey said. "You hope to keep the game low-scoring — get a walk, steal a base, put a hit or two together — and beat him 3-2... if you can."

Gooden also has proved to be an of-

fensive threat. He set a club record for pitchers with 21 hits last year, including one he said provided the highlight to his season.

His most memorable moment of 1985? "When I hit the home run," he said.

Gooden's first major league homer came Sept. 21 at Shea Stadium against Pittsburgh, a three-run shot in the first inning, and he finished the day with three hits and four runs batted in.

One of his biggest disappointments was that the Mets finished second in the National League East for the second straight season. The Mets won 98 games last year and finished second by three games to the St. Louis Cardinals.

# NCAA Passes Drug Rule, Fails On Booster Change

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Drugs are out, but boosters are still in. The NCAA voted Tuesday to slap penalties on athletes who test positive for drugs before or after post-season games, but failed to slam the door on boosters making on-campus contacts.

The anti-drug program which failed a year ago to reach the floor for a vote, partly because it didn't include cocaine and other "street drugs," was overwhelmingly passed this time around despite scattered complaints that its cost will be prohibitive and the NCAA has no business getting involved.

And "the potential for abuse" was cited several times as the reason for not extending the off-campus ban on booster contacts to the campus as well.

At the second day of its annual convention, the NCAA also voted:

- To reduce from eight to seven the number of sports needed to remain a Division I-A member.
- To delay for at least a year a proposal to allow five years of athletic eligibility instead of four.

To keep the Division I and Division III men's and women's indoor track championships.

To permit, "when circumstances clearly warrant," the restoration of eligibility of an athlete involved in "major" or "secondary" rules violations.

To limit to one game or tournament per year what a basketball team may play without it counting toward the maximum games allowed.

To approve a resolution calling for stronger federal legislation against gambling on college sports.

Walter Byers, executive director of the NCAA, said as the convention drew to a close that he felt its three major achievements were the anti-gambling resolution, the drug testing and Monday's approval of eligibility standards based on high school grade-point averages and SAT or ACT scores.

"In the domestic arena, the NCAA has taken a leadership role in dealing with a problem that is greater than most of us recognize," Byers said of drugs.

And in a specific reference to the use of steroids, Byers said, "Somebody had to step in and break the chain in high school to get scholarships to college and in the college area to get a professional contact."

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# Residents View Klan March As No Big Deal

PULASKI, Tenn. (AP) — Mitchell Birdsong Jr., who became the town's first black alderman two years ago, doesn't figure there will be much interest when the Ku Klux Klan returns to its birthplace Saturday.

"The only people who'll be out are going to be the people who are curious and want to get a glimpse of what they look like," said Birdsong, reflecting the opinion of many other Pulaski residents.

The Klan plans to march through the business area of this southern Tennessee town, where the Klan began 120 years ago, to protest the first national observance of Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday.

Although the parade has sparked some talk among townspeople, most of the interest has been generated by news reports, said Birdsong, the caretaker at the Giles County Courthouse. "I say let them march, as long as they get the heck out of here afterward," Birdsong said earlier this week.

The six-block march by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is set for two days before the official birthday observance for King, whose actual birthday is today. The civil rights

leader was slain in Memphis on April 4, 1968.

A man officials identified as Grand Wizard Stanley McCullom applied for the parade permit on Dec. 17. Alderman Hall Stewart objected, but City Attorney Jack Henry said the Klan had a right to march as long as members wore no hoods and did not litter or obstruct traffic.

City Recorder Bob Abernathy said McCullom lives in Tusculum, Ala., although initial news reports listed his home as Tuscaloosa. McCullom is not listed in telephone directories for either town and could not be reached for comment.

The afternoon parade is scheduled to begin just off the town square, in front of a modest brick building where the first Klan meeting took place in 1865.

The building, with a bronze plaque marking the event, now houses law offices and a barber shop operated by 81-year-old M.F. Eubank.

"I don't care what they do," he said. "I've got all I can do to take care of my own business, and I don't fool with nothing else. But I guess I'll have a grandstand seat."

Pulaski's 7,500 residents are quick to say that the Klan today is not the same group that began here on Dec.

24, 1865, to stop former slaves and northerners from seizing political power after the Civil War.

The first Ku Klux Klan, whose name stems from the Greek word for circle, was formed by community leaders as a social club. But it grew into a vigilante organization that used hooded robes and midnight rides to play on the fears and superstitions of blacks.

Grand Wizard Nathan Bedford Forrest, a former Confederate general, ordered the Klan disbanded in 1869 after the state passed an anti-Klan law.

In 1915, the Ku Klux Klan was revived in Georgia by ex-minister William J. Simmons, incorporating anti-Semitism and anti-Catholicism into its beliefs. The Klan had another resurgence in the 1960s when it was linked to attacks on blacks and civil rights workers in the South.

Saturday's Klan march won't be Pulaski's first. In 1965, the Klan rallied to celebrate its 100th anniversary, but townspeople paid little attention. A similar gathering in 1976 also drew scant interest except for a denunciation by the county historical society.

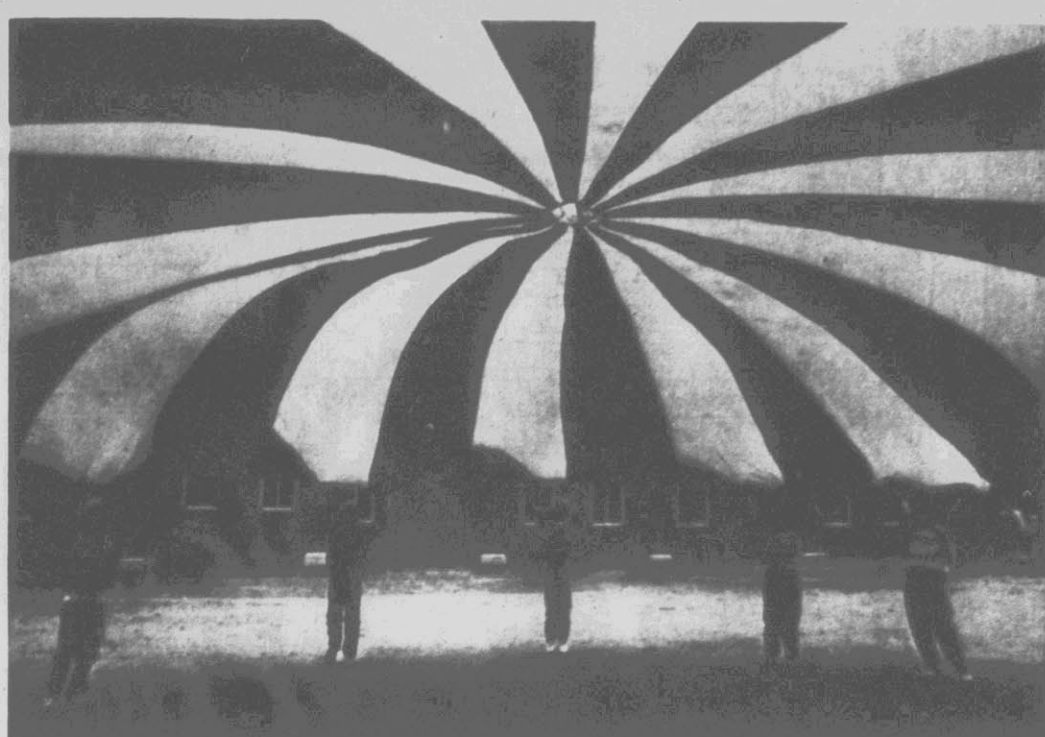
Stacey Aymett Garner, 61, a dentist and mayor of Pulaski for the past

21 years, says Saturday's march will probably be just as uneventful.

"I just expect the Klan to come in and have their little march and go on away and that will be it," he said.

The only worry, according to Johnny Phelps, a sociology teacher at Giles County High School, is what the association will do to the town's image.

"People are going to think we're the scum of the Earth, and actually we didn't have anything to do with it," said Phelps. "We'll never be able to live it down."

# Actress Donna Reed Dies Of Cancer At Age Of 64

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Actress Donna Reed was "a consummate professional" who "never expected anyone to look up to her," friends said of the all-American TV mom and Academy Award winner who died of cancer two weeks before her 65th birthday.

Her husband, retired Army Col. Grover Asmus, was at her side when she died Tuesday at their Beverly Hills home.

"It was probably just as well. We expected it. Her death was imminent. It was kind of rough," said Miss Reed's brother, Bill Mullenger, 58, a real estate agent in Denison, Iowa.

Doctors learned Miss Reed had pancreatic cancer several months ago, when she was hospitalized for ulcers, Mullenger said in a telephone interview. "I saw her at Thanksgiving. She was about like any normal person would be when they find out they have cancer — depressed.

"There was not much hope of remission or that it could be treated."

Funeral services were scheduled Friday at Beverly Hills Presbyterian Church. Burial will follow at Westwood Cemetery, said Pam Flynn, whose husband, Harry, was Miss Reed's publicist.

Miss Reed won an Oscar for best supporting actress in 1953 for her portrayal of Alma, a prostitute, in "From Here to Eternity," the tale of Army life on the eve of Pearl Harbor.

"I can remember in the beginning, when every guy who saw her on the screen had a crush on Donna, particularly myself," said Frank Sinatra, a co-star in "From Here to Eternity." "Donna was a lovely lady, gentle and kind."

Miss Reed's most memorable TV role was in "The Donna Reed Show," which began in 1958 and lasted eight seasons. She played housewife Donna Stone, married to a pediatrician

played by the late Carl Betz, raising two children played by Paul Peterson and Shelley Fabares, who was later replaced by Patty Peterson.

Her last TV role was in 1984, as matriarch of the Ewing clan on the prime-time soap opera "Dallas," a role created by Barbara Bel Geddes for six seasons.

Miss Bel Geddes, who left because of ill health, returned a year later and Miss Reed was fired. She filed a \$7.5 million suit in April against Lorimar Productions and CBS and, in August, accepted a \$1 million settlement.

Despite the bitterness of the dismissal, she was remembered fondly by "Dallas" colleagues.

"I am extremely saddened by her passing. My heart goes out to her family," said Larry Hagman, who played son J.R.

"Donna Reed was above all else a lady and a consummate professional," actress Victoria Principal said in a statement. "Her passing

away so early in her life is a real tragedy."

Jerry Lewis, who starred with her in "The Caddy" in 1953, said, "She was the classiest lady I ever worked with, and she will be sorely missed."

"The passing of Donna Reed means the loss of a great friend and a great actress," added Mickey Rooney, who appeared with her in numerous pictures, including the Andy Hardy series. "The life she left within us will glow from all of us she has left behind."

Her other film appearances included Frank Capra's classic "It's a Wonderful Life," a movie Mullenger said portrayed her more accurately than any other picture.

"I would have to say she probably accepted all people as well as anybody I know. She never looked down on anybody and never expected anyone to look up to her. You don't find that much anymore," he said.

She also appeared in "The Picture of Dorian Gray," "Green Dolphin Street," "The Last Time I Saw Paris" and "The Benny Goodman Story."

Born in Denison, Miss Reed began acting at MGM when she was 20, supporting herself as a dishwasher, librarian and secretary.

She graduated from the Thin Man, Dr. Gillespie and Andy Hardy movie series to become a star with "They Were Expendable" in 1945.

She was seen infrequently on television after "The Donna Reed Show."

"I just wouldn't do the junk I was offered," she once said. "I didn't like the way films were treating women. Most of the roles were extremely passive — women in jeopardy, poor stupid souls who couldn't help themselves."

# Teen Accused In Blow Gun Shootings

BRANDON, Fla. (AP) — A teenager has been accused of using a blow gun to randomly shoot 4 1/2-inch-long steel-tipped darts into seven people, ages 9 to 61, and police are trying to find out how he got the weapon.

Four people required emergency hospital treatment, but no one was seriously injured in the weekend attacks. Most of the victims were struck in the head, arms or shoulders, Detective David Gee said.

"We haven't recovered the one (blow gun) he had," Hillsborough Sheriff's spokesman Jack Espinosa said Tuesday. "I guess he hid it. He may have figured he was in trouble."

"We're going to check mail order houses and military equipment outlets where they might have hunting equipment."

"These things shoot steel darts 4 1/2 inches long. They're not a toy. They're meant to hit or wound. You buy a gun and you've got to have a license. But what have we got? We've got a 17-year-old accused of going around shooting people in the head."

The teen-ager, not identified because of his age, was arrested early Monday at his Brandon home. He was charged with three counts of aggravated assault and four of aggravated battery — the latter because in those cases, the skin was pierced, police said.

He was placed in the custody of the Department of Health and Rehabilitation Services and taken to a Tampa detention center, officials said.

# Claymation Technique Now Used In Movies, TV

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Rocks and snakes speak, pigs fly and hamburgers turn into chickens.  
And if that's hard to imagine, try Mark Twain chasing Halley's comet in a magical airship with Huck Finn, Tom Sawyer and Becky Thatcher.  
Those whimsical characters are made of colorful hunks of clay. They

come to life through Claymation, a stop-action animation technique developed by Will Vinton, a 38-year-old filmmaker who works out of his studio in a Portland warehouse.

Claymation has had a lot of use lately — in television commercials, in a John Fogarty music video and in last summer's movie, "Return to Oz."

The first feature-length movie done entirely in Claymation opened last week in seven major U.S. cities. "The Adventures of Mark Twain" is a fantasy about the American author's quest to intercept Halley's comet.

Vinton first gained publicity in 1975 when he and a former partner won an Academy Award for best animated short subject, "Closed Mondays," a Claymation classic that still can be seen at film festivals. He has received three Oscar nominations, more than any other producer of animated films.

Although he uses computers in the Claymation process, he describes the basic technique as "low key and low tech." "The word is mine, coming obviously from clay animation. But it's nothing new under the sun," Vinton said. "The technique that we use for clay animation has been around as long as film."

Television's first generation of children grew up watching the most famous animated clay character, Gumby. A stuffed Gumby doll stands on a bookshelf in Vinton's office. However, the character wasn't his inspiration for Claymation.

"In fact, I was one of the few, one of the very rare individuals who somehow missed Gumby my entire childhood," Vinton said in an interview.

"Probably my naive about things that had come before was a plus in that I didn't sense that there was any restriction to pursuing it and making the characters come to life."

In Claymation, the animator makes the clay characters "perform" by making slight changes in their minutely detailed expressions and bodies, which are filmed with a computer-assisted camera one frame at a time.

The process is slow; it typically takes 24 changes in a character to produce one second of film. "The

Adventures of Mark Twain" took 3½ years to make, and the resulting clay Twain, with veteran actor James Whitmore providing his voice, is remarkably lifelike.

Vinton's animators analyzed the expressions of Whitmore, who has played Twain on the stage, before animating the clay Twain.

"Clay really is a perfect substance for doing lip-synch or facial expressions," Vinton said. "It's completely malleable."

It also provides fantastic transformations. The evil Nome King in "Return to Oz," is a talking, animated mountain. His subjects are a collection of articulate rocks.

The movie, the first feature movie to mix Claymation with live action, bombed. But critics loved Vinton's rocks.

Vinton didn't plan a film career. He grew up in McMinnville, 38 miles southwest of Portland, and went to the University of California at Berkeley in the late 1960s to study physics.

After "two absolutely grueling years," he switched to architecture, which he saw as a compromise between his loves of science and art.

His father had an old 16mm camera, and Vinton persuaded him to send it to Berkeley for use in an architecture project that required a clay model. He went on to graduate with a degree in architecture, but by then he was hooked on celluloid and clay.

"As soon as I got the equipment, I started making little films. In those days you'd grab a camera and shoot a film and you'd be a filmmaker with a capital F," he said.

After college, Vinton worked for about five years in several odd jobs on commercials, industrial documentaries and live-action films, while experimenting with Claymation. It was "Closed Mondays" and the Academy Award it earned that got Claymation out of Vinton's basement.

# 'La Teleton' Opens Doors For Handicapped Citizens

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — It's prime time on Friday evening and most of Chile is absorbed by a powerful drama on television.

A child born without arms is abandoned by her unwed mother. "God forgive me," sobs the impoverished woman, turning her face from the camera, "but I would have been tormented all my life seeing her like that!"  
Next scene: The girl is 2. A couple in their 60s, who have raised her from infancy, bring the child to a clinic. A therapist puts her through daily exercises to prepare her for artificial limbs.

Then comes violin music and bad news. The adoring couple is too old

and too poor to adopt the child legally. They must give her up. Worse, the rehabilitation clinic is running out of money and might close.

This is not soap opera. This is Latin America's biggest telethon for disabled children. Inspired by Jerry Lewis' fund-raiser for muscular dystrophy research in the United States, "La Teleton" is the splashiest variety show, the most popular charity and the highest-rated TV special in Chile, taking over all four channels.

"La Teleton," which was broadcast one weekend last month, has inspired telethons for the handicapped in Colombia, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Panama, Paraguay and Peru.

But the touch of melodrama is what distinguishes the show from its U.S. model and makes it work in a Latin society, the producers say. Suddenly, the armless child and her modest guardians are on stage, live, with the telethon's mastermind and master of ceremonies, a big curly haired man known as Don Francisco.

With the fanfare of an 18-piece orchestra, he produces adoption papers. Rules have been bent to reward the old couple for caring. As they weep for joy, Don Francisco gets to the point.

"Chile has thousands of disabled kids who need rehabilitation!" he shouts. "Go to the bank now! Your donation can keep our clinics open and turn children's pain into smiles."

For the next 27 hours, the dynamic 45-year-old showman, whose real name is Mario Kreutzberger, pleaded and cajoled pesos from a country stuck in an economic slump. Rating surveys showed no fewer than 64 percent of all TV sets tuned in at any hour.

The results of the program, which has been held six times since 1978 and always raises more than the previous year's donations, demonstrate the growing reach and persuasive force of television in Chile.

Thanks to the telethon, Chile has four free clinics helping 15,000 children cope with birth defects, amputations and other crippling disabilities. The show is credited with helping the handicapped venture out of seclusion. More than half the clinics' patients are now in public schools.

The telethon has thrived on a major expansion of television. The military government for years allowed almost duty-free imports of sets, and today there are 3.2 million for Chile's 11 million people. In 1978 there were 1.2 million sets.

## Redford Work Tops Ratings

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Out of Africa," the Robert Redford-Meryl Streep romance from Universal, was the favorite movie of weekend movie-goers, grossing \$5.1 million to nudge "Rocky IV" from the top spot.

The latest installment in the Rocky saga came in at No. 2 over the weekend with \$5 million, boosting its seven-week total to \$108.5 million.

The adventure "Jewel of the Nile" held on to third place with \$4.3 million while the comedy "Spies Like Us" was steady in fourth with \$3.6 million.

Warner Bros. "The Color Purple" moved up from seventh to No. 5 on a gross of \$3.1 million, and \$2.8 million kept "White Nights" in the sixth position.

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# California Still Most Expensive House Site

WASHINGTON (AP) — California upheld its reputation of having the highest housing costs in the nation last year, with San Francisco ranking No. 1, and two other West Coast cities rated among the top five, according to a study released today.

Homes in the San Francisco metropolitan area sold last year for a median price of \$152,000, more than twice the national median price of \$75,000, the U.S. League of Savings Institutions reported. The median is the midpoint, with half the homes selling for more and half for less.

The league based its rankings of 46 metropolitan areas on information pulled from 16,300 conventional mortgage loans made by member associations.

After San Francisco, the most expensive area for home purchases was New York City with a median sales price of \$129,700, followed by Boston, \$126,000; Los Angeles, \$123,000; and Anaheim-Santa Ana-Garden Grove, Calif., with a median sales price last year of \$122,000.

At the other end of the scale, some of the cheapest housing was found in the Midwest, where a depressed economy has contributed to holding

down home costs.

The least expensive city among those surveyed was Pittsburgh, where the median price of a home was \$54,152, followed by Dayton, Ohio, \$54,750; Cincinnati, \$55,300; Bloomington-Normal, Ill., \$55,900, and Akron, Ohio, and Reading, Pa., both with median home prices last year of \$56,000.

The typical American buying a median-priced home of \$75,000 last year made a downpayment of \$14,000, representing just under 20 percent of the cost of the house, leaving a monthly mortgage payment of \$573.

To the mortgage payment was added \$75 for real estate taxes, \$100 for electricity and other utility costs and \$22 for insurance coverage for a total monthly median housing expense of \$770 last year, according to the league survey.

At the two extremes, the median monthly housing expense in San Francisco was \$1,370 compared with \$673 in Pittsburgh.

# Expert Says Operations Cause Too Many Strokes

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Doctors are performing a form of artery surgery far too often, and the operations designed to prevent strokes may be causing as many as 12,000 needless strokes and deaths each year, an expert says.

Although there's no evidence that this surgery, carotid endarterectomy, does any good, it is performed on more than 100,000 people each year at a total cost of to \$1 billion, Dr. Mark L. Dyken said Tuesday.

"There are too many procedures performed, in light of present knowledge, by too many surgeons in too many places with too high a stroke and death rate," he said.

Dyken, chief of neurology at Indiana University School of Medicine, presented his findings at a science writers seminar sponsored by the American Heart Association.

Dr. James T. Robertson, chairman of neurosurgery at the University of Tennessee School of Medicine, agreed with Dyken's concerns: "One surgical procedure has reached epidemic proportions in the United States of America."

Stroke, after heart attacks and cancer, is the third leading cause of death in the United States. In most strokes, one of the arteries that feed the brain becomes blocked, and brain tissue dies.

Some doctors believe that a major cause of strokes is clogging of the large carotid arteries that travel on each side of the neck. They reason that if the deposits are removed by carotid endarterectomy, the risk of stroke should diminish.

Dyken's survey shows that 15,000 of these operations were performed in 1970. By 1980, the number increased to 55,000, and by 1984 to 103,000.

In 1984, 2.8 percent of the patients died in the hospital, and he estimated that between one and five times this many suffered strokes as a result of the surgery.

"This means that in 1984, somewhere between 5.6 percent and 17 percent of all patients operated on either died or had a stroke," Dyken said.

He said that a Mayo Clinic study estimates that about 35,000 people in the United States could benefit from the surgery each year.

"This leaves us with approximately 70,000 people who were operated on," Dyken said. "If they didn't need the procedure, this means that between 3,800 and 12,000 deaths and strokes occurred because of the procedure."

He said that until doctors learn more about the potential benefits of the operation, they should limit surgery to patients who are suffering some symptoms because of their clogged carotid arteries.

Robertson said he believes that surgeons are becoming more selective about performing the surgery, but added, "The incredible problem with asymptomatic carotid surgery must be solved. It's indefensible at the present time."

Dyken estimated that hospitalization alone for the operation costs \$5,000 for each patient, and the total price of the surgery in the United States each year is between \$500 million and \$1 billion.

He recommended a study to find out whether anyone benefits from the surgery and, if so, how they can be identified before the operation.

# CBS Rides Sunday Night Movie Success To Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — You could go to a multi-screen theater complex and choose from a variety of films, or you could do the same thing by staying home on Sunday night.

Starting next week, CBS joined ABC and NBC with Sunday movies, and CBS' comeback hopes for the 1985-86 prime-time season depend greatly on the No. 2 network receiving rave ratings for its films.

For the first time this season, CBS has captured consecutive victories in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, according to figures released Tuesday. The latest resulted from an especially strong Sunday night performance from its new lineup that now includes a movie. CBS already has films on Tuesday and Saturday.

Going into last Sunday, CBS trailed NBC by 2½ ratings points for the week of Jan. 6-12. Network researchers figured CBS would cut the margin to about a point, but "Rockabye," CBS' debut Sunday night movie, fooled them.

The film, starring Valerie Bertinelli as the mother of a kidnapped child, ranked fourth for the week with a 25.3 rating, the third best movie performance this season. Aided by the third-rated "Murder, She Wrote," which had its biggest audience ever, and No. 5 "60 Minutes," CBS averaged a 25.9 rating Sunday. Only the night ABC broadcast Game 7 of the World Series did better.

Last week, CBS had an average rating of 18.0, while NBC, led by another record performance from the No. 1 "Cosby Show," had a 17.9. ABC, with only "Who's the Boss?" in the Top 10, averaged a 14.0.

A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.

After 16 weeks of the 30-week

prime-time season, NBC leads with a 17.6 rating to CBS' 16.9 and ABC's 15.2.

"It was a very good start to their new strategy," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects, referring to replacing "Crazy Like A Fox" and "Trapper John, M.D." with movies. "The battle is really joined for the second half of the season."

"A lot of things fell into place, and the main thing was Sunday," said Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director. "We knew we would do well, but we did better than imagined in winning by almost 12 ratings points."

"Rockabye" benefited from the other networks' repeat films. Part 1 of NBC's "Fatal Vision" ranked 61st and ABC's theatrical film, "Diamonds Are Forever," was 41st out of 68 shows.

Jaffe noted that CBS, with "Murder, She Wrote," has the advantage of a stronger lead-in than NBC and, particularly, ABC, but that in future weeks the three networks will have greater parity in movie choices, generally competing with original made-for-TV movies. TV movies are better draws than theatrical films that experience viewer burnout from pay-cable exposure.

The battle lines are drawn clearly for next Sunday, when each network has a first-run TV movie: ABC's "Club Med," about exotic romance in a Mexican resort, CBS' "Passion Flower," about erotic romance in the Far East, and "Mafia Princess," about erratic life as the daughter of a Mafia kingpin.

Last week, "The Cosby Show" was the runaway audience leader again with a 36.9 rating, the highest regular series performance since a 1980 "Dallas" episode. NBC's "Family

Ties" was second, followed by "Murder, She Wrote" and "Rockabye." "60 Minutes" and NBC's "Cheers" tied for fifth and NBC's two Miami series, "Miami Vice" and "Golden Girls," tied for seventh. Then came ABC's "Who's the Boss?" and NBC's "Highway to Heaven."

CBS' "Dallas," last season's No. 2 show, was 11th and "Dynasty," the top-ranked show for 1984-85, fell to 17th, apparently hurt by NBC's new "Blacke's Magic," which had its first Wednesday broadcast and ranked 19th. The "Dynasty" spinoff, "The Colbys," dropped to 52nd, its worst outing.

"Crazy Like A Fox," replaced by the "CBS Sunday Night Movie," begins its Wednesday run against "Dynasty" and "Blacke's Magic" tonight. CBS' other major Wednesday hopeful, "Mary," ranked 43rd, one week after it had cracked the Top 20 when it opposed college football bowl games on ABC and NBC.

"We still would like to see better numbers from 'Mary,'" said Eisenberg. "(Tonight) will be the first normal night for all three networks, and we're interested in how 'Crazy Like A Fox' does against 'Blacke's Magic.' That's the key."

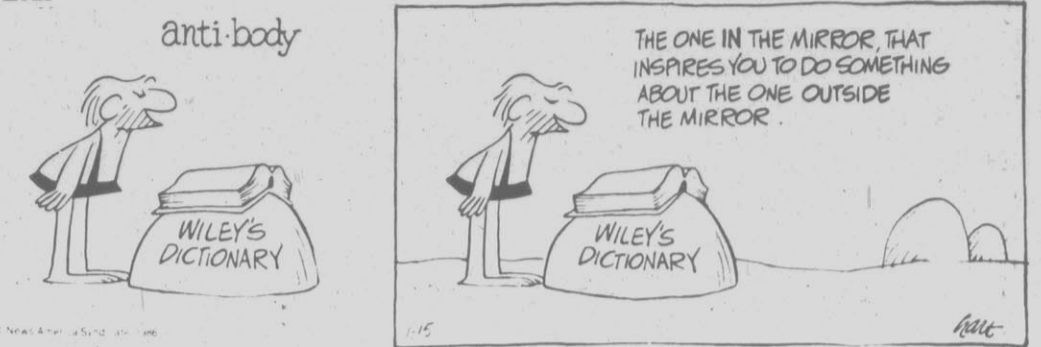

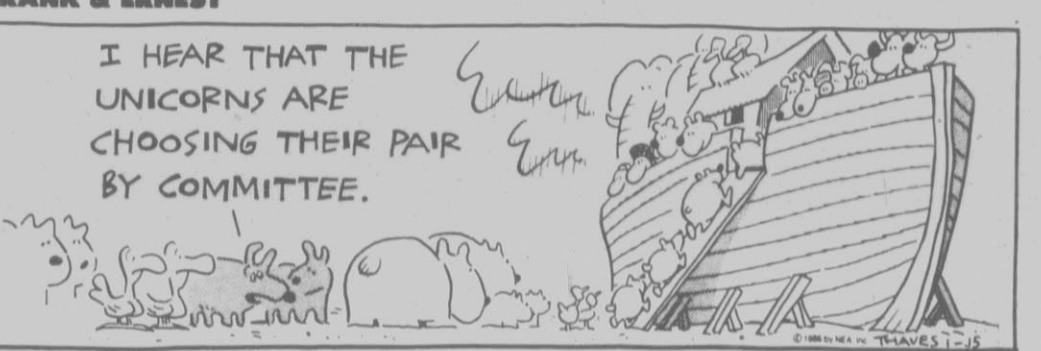

To guarantee that an elimination play will succeed in a trump contract, you need to draw all the opposing trumps and still have a trump left in both your hand and dummy. Sometimes you cannot achieve the ideal position, and have to rely on a partial elimination. Consider this hand.

Note North's raise to two hearts after West's takeout double. The best way to counter a takeout double is to make the bid that you would have, had there been no interference, except that you have a redouble available to show a good hand. North-South soon reached their sound four heart contract.

The defense started with three rounds of spades, declarer winning the third. If East has one of the missing diamond honors, declarer can land his contract by taking two finesses. However, if West has both high diamonds, a subtler technique is called for.

Since declarer has to ruff a club on the table to complete his elimination of the black suits, he cannot afford to draw three rounds of trumps—that would exhaust dummy's ruffers. So declarer must rely on a partial elimination. He can draw only two rounds of hearts and he must hope that East has the long trump.

After ruffing a club on the table, declarer should end up there once he has drawn two rounds of trumps. Now he leads the jack of diamonds. As the cards lie, West wins but is faced with a Hobson's choice. A diamond would be into declarer's combined tenace, and a black suit would allow declarer to ruff on the board while discarding a diamond from hand. No matter what West elects to do, the contract is assured—if declarer remembers to draw the last trump after he gains the lead.

## Armstrong Picks Deputy

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Herbert W. Armstrong, the ailing 93-year-old leader of the Worldwide Church of God, has named a deputy to succeed him if he dies.

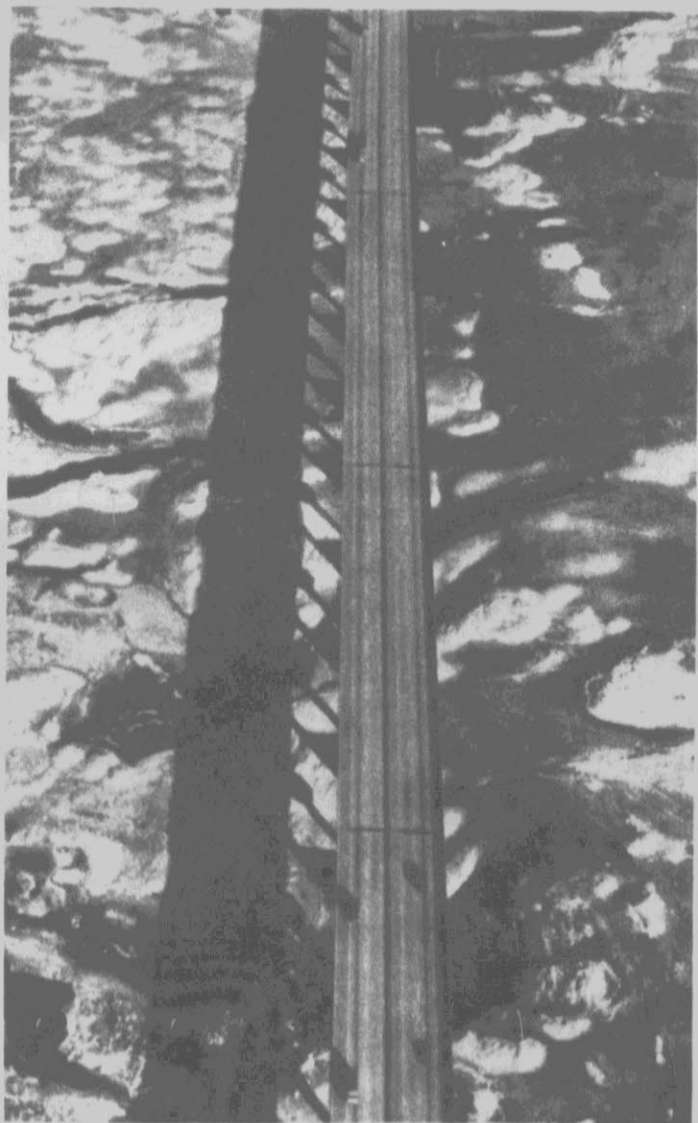
Armstrong named Joseph K. Tkach, 59, director of administration since 1980, as deputy pastor general of the church and its affiliated organizations, church attorney Ralph K. Helge said Tuesday in a statement.

Although the designation of Tkach was effective immediately, he would

assume the various offices and titles of church leader only if Armstrong dies, the statement said.

"I am in a very physically weakened state, enduring severe pain and with virtually no strength whatsoever," Armstrong wrote in a letter announcing his choice to church members.

The church is known largely for its television broadcasts, its magazine Plain Truth and its Ambassador College in Pasadena.

# Seniors Recall Halley's Comet

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — For most folks, this winter's return of Halley's Comet is a once-in-a-lifetime event. But for some, it will be the second time they've encountered the wandering cosmic snowball.

Those getting a second chance were children and young adults when Halley's last visited in 1910 — a time when many thought the comet meant the end of the world. A telling glimpse into what average folks thought about the comet at that time is provided by the Halley's Comet Oral History Search.

Students from the Charleston County School District are compiling a history of the comet from recollections of those who saw it 76 years ago. And articles about the project in newspapers and "Sky and Telescope" magazine have prompted dozens of letters from around the world.

"I remember it was almost sundown and the word got around that the sun and the comet were going to have a fight," recalled 81-year-old Nellie Copeland of Marysville, Tenn. "It was just before sundown when Halley's Comet went past the sun, which was real red and the tail of the comet was real wide and the sun seemed to tremble and shake."

In those days before television and radio, there was widespread concern the Earth would be incinerated as it moved through the comet's tail.

Amy Smith, 94, of Lancaster, Calif., wrote that she saw the comet when she was living in Toledo, Ohio.

"The newspapers had informed us that the earth would pass through the tail of the comet and many people thought that the whole earth would be consumed by fire at that time. The Secor Hotel in Toledo has been recently opened and was supposed to be fireproof so many people moved into the Secor hoping to be saved from the fire," she wrote.

Baby Paes Fontenelle, 81, of Fortaleza, Brazil, recalled being awakened to see the comet but "before it came, I spent bitter moments because everybody believed that the world would be destroyed."

Finding a clear, pollution-free spot to see the comet didn't present as much of a problem as it may to modern viewers.

Esther Fillingham, 84, of Pensacola, Fla., remembers riding to Vermilion, Ohio, in a surrey with a fringe on top to view the comet over Lake Erie.

But 78-year-old Lois Dulin of Charlotte, N.C., remembered her father carrying her to an intersection near her home.

"Danger from traffic was almost nil — the traffic in 1910 being asleep in their stalls," she wrote. "I remember seeing the carbon-lit streetlight, the

star-spangled sky and then Halley's Comet, and I with a grandstand seat — on my back, in a warm blanket in my father's arms."

Garry Devenpeck of Cooperstown, N.Y., recalled she was 9 and at the time was living in Amsterdam, a mill town on the banks of New York's Mohawk River.

"We could hardly keep mindful of our studies at school and we were wondering what we'd do if the tail touched the earth and we all burned up," she wrote.

She recalled folks from all over the city gathered on the highest hills around town with blankets, pillows and shawls. Some people used megaphones to shout information back and forth about the comet.

"We even wondered if our parents had all their valuables with them like gold coins they used to save and gold earrings and all their treasured keepsakes," she wrote.

"A question for us younger ones was the reason Halley's Comet got that name and we thought it was because our druggist Mr. John Halley had a pull with the comet's origin. We were going to go to the drug store the next day and ask him — that is if we weren't all burned up," Mrs. Davenpeck recalled.

Frank Robb of Rondebosch, South Africa, was 2 when Halley's made its last appearance. But he does remember being taken out on a balcony by his nurse to join the rest of his family in looking at the comet over Table Bar Harbour in Capetown.

"With luck, I'll see Halley's this time around," he wrote. "But I don't want to wait around for its appearances after that — one doesn't want to become addicted."

## Art Competition

- Deadline for submission is February 15.

The jury will select the winner on the basis of the appropriateness of the work for the site and for its

esthetic quality.

A prize of \$7,500 will be awarded. The commission will cover all expenses incurred in the completion and installation of the art work.

The younger Bourguiba, who is 58, heads the Bank for Economic Development of Tunisia.

## A New Dental Product

BOSTON (AP) — A liquid that eliminates most of the drilling and pain in fixing cavities is ready to be marketed here, says one of the two Tufts University dentists who developed the substance 15 years ago.

Caridex breaks down tooth decay so it can be rubbed off and scooped out without drilling.

"Until FDA approval (in 1984), we were just two lunatics," one of the discoverers, orthodontist Joseph H. Kronman, told The Boston Globe in an interview published today.

Kronman developed Caridex with Melvin Goldman, a specialist in root canal dentistry. Both are professors at Tufts University School of Dental Medicine.

Caridex won't eliminate the need for drilling but may reduce the amount of drilling on the average patient by 80 percent, Kronman said. The need for anesthesia may be

reduced by 85 to 90 percent, he said. "It's not magic," said Kronman. "It's an improvement."

The substance will be displayed this week at the Yankee Dental Congress in Boston, which is expected to attract 15,000 dentists and hygienists. Caridex salesmen will explain what the liquid will and won't do at a seminar in Boston next month, which dentists must attend before buying it.

The Food and Drug Administration approved Caridex in July 1984, and the American Dental Association gave it its seal of acceptance in November.

Some dentists remain skeptical of the liquid.

"I want to see the proof," Herbert Yolin, a Newton dentist and head of the speakers bureau of the Metropolitan District Dental Society, told The Globe. "I don't think the public should expect a panacea."
