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Clues Sought To Cause Of Shuttle Blast

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Ships retrieved some of shattered Challenger's wreckage from the sea today as investigators sought clues to a "national tragedy" that killed five men and two women and dealt a severe setback to America's space program.

An investigation team held its first meeting today to start the long inquiry into why the \$1.2 billion space

shuttle, seemingly on a perfect course, suddenly blew apart 74 seconds after liftoff Tuesday, raining fiery debris into the Atlantic Ocean.

Some experts who studied television tapes of the disaster said they thought the problem centered in the external fuel tank, containing more than a half-million gallons of liquid hydrogen and oxygen to power the orbiter aloft.

The deaths were the first in flight after 55 successful U.S. man-in-space

flights, including 24 previous shuttle missions. The first "common citizen" chosen for a space trip, New Hampshire schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe, was one of the victims.

Eight ships, including four Coast Guard cutters, searched throughout the night over the 50-by-100-mile rectangle where Challenger's wreckage fell. Seven planes and helicopters resumed their hunt at daylight.

Lt. Joe Kyle of the Coast Guard, which is coordinating the search,

said several small pieces of wreckage drifted ashore in the Cape Canaveral area overnight. He asked residents who find anything that might be a part of the shuttle to turn it in to the Coast Guard.

He said the large amount of small debris indicated Challenger suffered severe explosive damage.

Another Coast Guard officer, Lt. Cmdr. James Simpson, reported "there is debris all over the place." He said the largest piece recovered

was about 10 feet long and 2 feet wide but he did not know what part of the shuttle it came from.

Simpson said NASA cautioned that because of the shuttle's fuel some of the pieces could be chemically hazardous and requested that searchers seek advice from agency officials before picking up any object.

The search area is between 50 and 130 miles southeast of Cape Canaveral, the water between 70 and 200 feet deep. Although the explosion

occurred 10 miles high and 8 miles southeast of the launch pad, the shuttle's nearly 2,000 mph momentum propelled the wreckage much farther out over water.

The debris will be examined in a hangar at nearby Patrick Air Force Base.

The investigation could take months, just as it did after America's only other space program tragedy, the

Pitt Students Missed Launch By Two Days

The explosion of the space shuttle Challenger has touched the citizens of eastern North Carolina, as well as people throughout the United States.

Whether they saw the launch in person or whether they watched the television coverage of the tragedy, local citizens were shocked and saddened by the deaths of the six astronauts and the first private citizen in space, Christa McAuliffe.

School students especially were saddened because the shuttle carried with it Mrs. McAuliffe, a 37-year-old New Hampshire teacher.

Members of the Super Grit Band, which is based in Greenville, witnessed the explosion Tuesday morning in Florida.

"We were sitting directly across the river from the pad, probably about five miles from it, as close as they would let any civilians get," said band member Clyde Mattocks in a telephone interview from Florida Tuesday night. "There were thousands of people lined up along the shore."

"This is the first launch I had ever seen in person. When the shuttle went up it was really bright, brighter than it looks on television, and it went up faster than I thought it would. I was surprised at how long it took for the sound to get across the water to us; it probably took 30 seconds."

"The shuttle had been up about a minute and it was still in plain sight when there was a fireball and a huge cloud of white flames."

"At first I thought it was a booster rocket separating or something like that, but it seemed too early for that stage of the flight," Mattocks said. "The locals who had seen lots of launches realized immediately that something was wrong."

"The whole area was engulfed in a huge white cloud, which obscured the fireball. The cloud was between us and the shuttle," he recalled. "There were pieces of debris going every which-way."

Lyng Heads USDA

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan today named Richard E. Lyng, once the No. 2 official in the Agriculture Department, to succeed John Block as head of the agency.

Reagan, introducing Lyng at a brief Oval Office ceremony, said the nation's farmers "are going to have a sound and solid friend in Dick Lyng" as they work to overcome the economic problems that continue to plague the farm belt.

Acknowledging that "we have a farm problem," the president said Lyng, in implementing the new farm bill adopted last month, "will help get farming more into the market economy and rectify some of the things that have been wrong" with federal farm programs.

Lyng, 67, served as California secretary of agriculture from 1967 to 1969, during Reagan's tenure as governor and in 1980 headed the Reagan-Bush campaign effort among farmers and ranchers. He had served four years as an assistant secretary of agriculture under President Nixon, and Reagan brought him back to Washington as deputy secretary.

Lyng left the administration a year ago to become a private consultant. With the announcement three weeks ago that Block planned to resign and return to farming, speculation immediately centered on Lyng as his most likely successor.

With Lyng standing next to him in front of a roaring fire in the Oval Office, Reagan told reporters, "I have every confidence the farmers are going to have a sound and solid friend in Secretary of Agriculture Dick Lyng."

Asked why he didn't chose "a working farmer" for the post, Reagan said Lyng "has been a pretty hard-working farmer most of his life."

The new secretary-designate, who faces Senate confirmation proceedings, has spent most of the last two decades involved in agricultural marketing.

Griffith Enters Race

Ed Griffith, a former East Carolina University professor and Green Beret colonel, filed today as a candidate for the Republican nomination for the 9th District seat in the state Senate.

The 9th District consists of most of Pitt, Martin and Beaufort counties.

Griffith, who is seeking the seat now held by Democrat Tom Taft, said his candidacy "will be based on the need in North Carolina for good government." He noted that North Carolina is the only state in the nation in which the governor does not have veto power.

"Because of the lack of gubernatorial veto, there never has been a true balance of power between the executive and the legislative branches of government in this state," he said.

He criticized what he called "Senator Taft's efforts to undercut the people's voting rights in North Carolina." He said Taft helped sponsor a bill to eliminate presidential primary elections in this state. "When legislators try to take away

Council Rejects Lease For Mart

The fate of the proposed Pitt-Greenville farmers market is back in the hands of the county, area chamber of commerce members said this morning after hearing that the City Council Tuesday declined to grant the county a long-term lease on property under consideration for the market.

Gene Brown of the Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Business Committee said in an interview today that committee members were hoping municipal officials would agree to a 20-year lease with payments of \$1 a year for the property on West 14th Street. However, the Council's decision to offer the property for sale at its appraised

The candidate also said he supports consolidation of the Pitt County and Greenville schools and "financially would support it as a county commissioner."

Brown, a native of Kannapolis, holds a bachelor's degree in science from North Carolina Central University and a master's degree in

health administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He is a member of the University City Kiwanis, Elks Lodge, Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity and Sycamore

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Fast Draw Makes Her The Champion

MORGAN HILL, Calif. (AP) — In a duel with Carol Cozzitorto, an Old West gunslinger would be left dead in the dirt.

With her .45-caliber Ruger riding in a special holster, Mrs. Cozzitorto can clear leather and fire in .031 seconds — a skill that has made her women's fast-draw champion of the world.

Experts estimate her draw is twice as fast as the desperadoes of old.

Mrs. Cozzitorto, a member of the Bounty Hunters fast-draw club in Morgan Hill, won her title recently in Pismo Beach, Calif. The club belongs to the World Fast Draw Association, which also has members in England, Canada, Saudi Arabia, France, Australia and South Africa.

In fast draw, shooters stand poised, hands a fraction of an inch from the butt of a .45-caliber or .357-caliber single action revolver. They draw when a light flashes, firing wax bullets at silhouettes at 15 feet and black powder blanks at balloons 8 feet away. The impact stops a timer.

The winner compiles the lowest total time for a series of shots.

Fast-draw experts say they can fire faster than the old-timers because parts of their weapons have been modified to work more smoothly and because they use special holsters.

Mrs. Cozzitorto has been practicing since she came home one day eight years ago to find her husband and some friends shooting holes in a recreation room wall with wax bullets.

"I tried it and began to hit the target right away," she said. "I was hooked."

Since then, her overall performance at meets, including winning the U.S. national title in Deming, N.M., this year, has made her the top women's gunslinger in northern California four times.

"They kid my husband about my speed, but there's no rivalry. He's definitely faster," she said.

Gene Cozzitorto, who owns a construction company, is a charter member of the Bounty Hunters, which was founded in 1976. He has been an officer in the world association for seven years.

Mrs. Cozzitorto, who also is an artist, says she likes the challenge of

fast draw.
"I keep wanting to get faster and faster," she said.
Mrs. Cozzitorto, who takes part in about half a dozen matches each year, starts practicing about a month before each meet. During the final two weeks, she is shooting three times a week, three hours a session.

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Pat's Pointers

"Lightning" is a appropriate name for this quick-knit designer sweater. By using one strand of acrylic knitting worsted with another strand of a fluffy brushed acrylic and wool blend, an average knitter can make it in less than a week with time to spare for embroidering the design in duplicate stitch following the easy-to-follow graph charts. More experienced knitters who do not need step-by-step instructions might prefer knitting in the design using Fair Isle techniques.

The stunning pullover has the look of a fine boutique sweater with the clever lightning design worked in a sparkling fashion yarn. Directions are written for small (6-10), medium

(12-14) and large (16-18) with finished measurements of 44, 46 and 48 inches, respectively.

Duplicate stitch is a fascinating technique that enables you to create mosaics, geometrics, Fair Isle-type patterns, flowers, birds or almost any design you can imagine on a stockinette stitch background. And the stitch is worked in such a way that you can scarcely tell that the design was not knitted in.

When you are working with the duplicate stitch, you are actually "embroidering" a design onto a finished knitted item. You will work from a graph chart that is marked with symbols. Each symbol will represent one duplicate stitch to be worked in the color represented by that symbol.

With a multicolored design, there may be many different symbols used. A design such as the lightning streak on today's featured sweater, where only one color is used, is best for the beginner.

As in following all graph charts, whether they are for knitting,

crocheting, needlepoint or cross-stitch, the design must be properly centered. Most charts will use arrows to denote the vertical and horizontal design centers of the chart.

You must, however, find the centers on your garment or fabric. In the case of a sweater, fold the sweater in half lengthwise and run a basting thread down the center front to give you the vertical center. If necessary, fold it in half in the other direction to give you the horizontal center.

With a strand of yarn approximately 18 inches long, thread a large-eyed tapestry needle and bring the needle through to the front from the wrong side, leaving about 4 inches of yarn to weave into the wrong side later.

Step 1: To stitch, bring the threaded needle up from the wrong side at the base of a knitted stitch. Then, pass the needle under both strands of the stitch above.

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Cooking Is Fun

Red hair, blue eyes, freckles and a slight figure—that was Billie Burke. She was born in 1885 in

Washington, D.C. By the time she was in her early 20s she had starred on Broadway and became "the toast of New York." Later she made many movies. You may have seen her as the Good Witch in "The Wizard of

Oz," shown annually on television.

Recently I came across a recipe for bran muffins which Billie Burke contributed to a long out-of-print cookbook. It calls for a "secret" ingredient: flax seed. Once upon a time flax seed was bought in drug stores for kitchen use. When I needed it for testing the bran-muffin recipe, I found it sold in bulk in my nearby health food store.

Although Billie Burke was described as "vivacious, vague and extravagant," her bran muffins are nutritious and the recipe is economical and exact. Only the method needed updating.

BRAN MUFFINS A LA BILLIE BURKE

- 1 cup ready-to-eat whole bran cereal
 - 1 cup milk
 - 1 tablespoon molasses
 - 1 tablespoon flax seed (available at health food stores)
 - 1/2 cup golden raisins
 - 1 large egg
 - 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
 - 1/2 cup whole wheat flour, spooned and leveled
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/8 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 tablespoon firmly packed dark brown sugar
- In a small bowl stir together bran, milk, molasses, flax seed and raisins.

In another small bowl beat egg and oil until blended.

In a medium bowl stir together whole wheat flour, baking powder, soda and brown sugar. Add bran and egg mixtures to flour mixture and stir until flour mixture is moistened. Fill greased muffin-pan cups (each 1-3rd cup capacity) 2-3rds full. Bake in a preheated 400-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—about 15 minutes. Loosen edges and remove; serve hot or reheat.

Makes 12 small muffins.

Talk Will Center On Tax Increase

Dangers

We may have forgotten the inherent dangers of space flight but Tuesday's traumatic explosion of shuttle Challenger brought them back into focus.

The secret of past success has been the quality of excellence required by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in its flight crews, the hardware they fly and the servicing of the most intricate piece of flying machinery ever assembled.

Luck had no part in the scheme of things. The smallest "glitch" could (and did) halt the countdown to launch with just seconds to go.

Challenger alone saw five delays in its launching process this last time around before it slowly lifted off to a fiery finale. We do not recall a launch in the previous 55 shuttle missions that did not include at least one "hold" in the countdown.

It was to be expected that NASA would require every conceivable painstaking effort to determine what went wrong yesterday before resuming the shuttle flights.

The grief, the shock, the horror of death claiming seven very brave people was shared by uncounted millions who watched Challenger explode. More millions were numbed on later learning of the disaster. There is no reason to think it cannot happen again.

Yet, we suspect few believed it would end exploration and utilization of the frontier in space. A claim has been staked ... and those who have died in the process would count their sacrifices in vain if we stopped now.

Those who have given the final measure of their lives to a great drama are relatively few. They are:

- 1967 - Virgil (Gus) Grissom, Edward H. White and Roger B. Chafee; Vladimir Komarov;
- 1971 - Georgi Dobrovolsky, Vladislav Volkov, Viktor Patsayev;
- 1986 - Francis Scobee, Michael J. Smith, Judith Resnick, Ronald E. McNair, Ellison S. Onizuka, Gregory B. Jarvis and Christa McAuliffe.

Decision

The U.S. Congress may not always prove out to be world champions but in the supersonic jetliner field they proved better than others. Collectively they said "no" to the Concorde or U.S. versions of the craft; and saved themselves headaches they could do without.

France and Great Britain became involved with the Concorde and after producing a limited edition fleet of them applied brakes. As one U.S. aerospace analyst puts it, the economics of the Concorde were plain wrong.

Just about the only thing right about the aircraft was that it could fly twice the speed of sound.

Other than that, the jetliner could carry too few paying passengers; consumed 44,000 pounds of fuel an hour; was so noisy its pilots had to throttle down when flying over populated areas because the noise level was fearsome. Worst of all, it was a money-loser.

Last week marked the 10th anniversary of Concorde's first commercial flight and there will not be many more. Too few people really needed the Concorde and the necessarily high price of fares further limited the market.

Time and accrued mileage will reduce the already small fleet to museum pieces.

'Bigger Is Better' May Not Work

WASHINGTON — Commerce Secretary and rodeo cowboy Malcolm Baldrige has learned the meaning of "zaibatsu." It is the Japanese concept of industrial conglomerate. Baldrige believes the U.S. needs Japanese style zaibatsu of its own to survive in the international marketplace, and he's leading a Reagan administration charge to rewrite U.S. anti-trust law with that in mind.

But a Reagan-backed package of reform legislation, which is about to be forwarded to Congress, has met with mixed reviews within the administration itself. Some people fear, in fact, that a liberalization of anti-trust law will merely benefit company stockholders at the expense of American workers and consumers. And it's uncertain whether a "bigger is better" approach will make U.S. companies necessarily more competitive internationally.

It is true that, for a vast and in-

creasing number of products, the world is America's marketplace. We often buy our cars, silicon chips and clothing at prices determined on the basis of producer costs in Seoul and Sao Paolo. Many of these producers belong to behemoth corporate families with names like Mitsubishi and Hechst AG; they enjoy virtual monopoly power at home and huge economic advantages (generally promoted by the home government) overseas.

Approximately 70 percent of U.S. firms must contend with foreign competitors. Baldrige argues that American companies most threatened by this competition need the freedom to marshal their economic power collectively.

For nearly a hundred years, of course, the law hasn't looked kindly on industrial combinations that might hinder domestic competition. But the administration, which has challenged only 26 of the 10,000 merger applications it's received in the last five years, thinks traditional anti-trust doctrine is outdated. "It's time for the law to be brought into the 20th century before we begin the 21st," Douglas Ginsburg, assistant attorney general for the Justice Department's Anti-Trust Division, said recently.

What Baldrige, Ginsburg and Co. propose to do is encourage mergers as an alternative to protectionist measures such as tariffs and import quotas, which some people say tend to raise domestic prices. A merger

half-cent sales tax increase with the proceeds being dedicated to school construction. That would raise \$176 million annually and make a major dent in the estimated \$2.2 billion in school construction needs the state now faces, says Craig Phillips, superintendent of public instruction.

But Royall said after the committee's latest meeting he doesn't think the Legislature "would want to put all of it (the \$176 million) on one need ... We might have to amend it to give something to the highways."

Royall's bill did not advance during the 1985 session. But it can be considered during the 1986 short

budget session because it is an appropriations bill. Royall's standing as the most powerful member of the Senate won't hurt his chances to get it considered, either.

It is generally conceded that the Legislature will have to find some way to help the Highway Fund this year and a motor fuels tax increase of three cents is the most widely discussed solution. That would raise slightly more than \$100 million.

But Royall says he doesn't think the Legislature will raise motor fuels taxes beyond the 12.75 cents at which they currently stand. "I think we'd be more apt to take part of that half-

cent than putting on an additional gasoline tax," he said, referring to his proposed sales tax increase.

That's not going to be enough to rescue the Highway Fund and build many new schools, however. So Royall has been throwing out an idea he picked up in Texas. He has mentioned at several meetings lately that Texas increased its vehicle registration fee to \$60 this year.

North Carolina currently charges \$20 for an automobile registration. Tripling that fee — and raising all other vehicles' registration fees by a similar \$40 — would bring in \$176 million a year. That, coincidentally, is just as much as the Fiscal Research Division estimates that a half-cent sales tax increase will yield.

Asked if that wasn't a huge increase in registration fees, Royall said, "If you can afford an automobile today, you can afford 60 more dollars." But he was quick to point out that this is just an idea, it's nothing he's proposing now. He also questions whether the legislature would ever triple the registration fee in one year. Doubling it to \$40 might be all they'd go for, he said. Still, that would raise \$88 million.

Royall may have a lot of clout in the Legislature, but he's failed to get his way on tax matters before. He, remember, was the author of the gasoline tax rebate plan that was shot down during the 1981 session. The fact that his half-cent increase proposal didn't move in 1985 proves that individual power has its limits.

Yet the fact that Royall is talking about raising taxes or fees is a pretty good indication that in the 1986 session legislators will be confronted with serious efforts to raise state revenues.

To the editor:

I was startled to read that two anti-choice groups had asked President Reagan to consider amnesty for people who had bombed abortion clinics. They said that, after all, they had only hurt buildings, not people, and these bombers were really nice people otherwise.

I remember that, in the late 1960s, we had a conservative president, just like now. That one and his supporters on the right reacted a little differently to take-overs and bombings of buildings then. In the late 1960s, it was students protesting the Vietnam War, and that made them subject to intense scrutiny, mass arrests and extended jail terms, no matter that they didn't hurt anybody, and no matter that they were otherwise really nice people.

Amazing how perspective changes when it is your own group doing the demonstrating! And what is truly amazing is that this sentiment is coming from the right, the conservatives, the same folks who thought that the neutron bomb was such a great idea because it only killed people, but didn't damage the infrastructure and real estate. So they only damaged some buildings? And not people? So they don't deserve to languish in jail for their crimes?

Lots of people who commit crimes are nice people in other parts of their lives, but they still get punished for their crimes. For the American justice system to work, it must not make exceptions based on ideology. After all, bombing a building is bombing a building, and it's no different when it's done by Abu Nidal's henchmen or righteous anti-choice gangs. Besides, it could be argued that a lot of people have been hurt emotionally or financially by those clinic bombings; harassment, threats to life, buckets of blood thrown onto doorways, and other forms of physical and mental intimidation could be injurious to well-meaning but troubled pregnant women, as well as the people who worked in and near the clinics.

The bombings themselves are bad enough, but to suggest amnesty for the bombers because they're nice people who just hurt buildings is insulting to law-abiding people, and even to not-so-law-abiding people who have served time for their crimes of destroying property in such "trivial" ways as smashing out school windows. There should be no amnesty for bombers and trashers and harassers of any stripe.

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"When we saw a parachute (which was attached to one of the solid fuel tanks), there was a lot of hope for about five minutes. We were all hoping that it was an escape capsule, but then we realized that there wasn't an escape capsule."

"A big pall was cast over the whole crowd and every one was silent. It has stayed that way here in Florida all day, as I guess it has all over the United States," Mattocks said.

"At first I thought I had seen something spectacular when the shuttle went up, and then I realized that I had just seen seven people get killed."

"We were comparing it to seeing the explosion of the Hindenburg," Mattocks commented. (The Hindenburg was a German dirigible that exploded on May 6, 1937, when hydrogen was ignited and it was destroyed by fire. Thirty-five passengers were killed on the blimp, the first air ship to make trans-Atlantic flights.) "It is equal to the Hindenburg in space terms. The explosion of the dirigible was the end of lighter-than-air travel."

"I think this tragedy will slow down the space program," Mattocks stated. "There will have to be investigations into what happened, but I don't know if they will ever know what caused the explosion."

"I felt an extra twinge because somebody (astronaut Mike Smith) from Beaufort was on it. That's our immediate area," Mattocks said.

"I saw a piece of history, but it is something I wouldn't have chosen to see. Now I want to see them do it right," Mattocks said.

Students from A.G. Cox Grammar School in Winterville toured the NASA facilities in Florida on Sunday and had hoped to see the launch, their principal said, but missed it when the launch was delayed until Tuesday.

Glenn Strickland, principal of Cox School, said the "students saw the shuttle on the launch pad and they were hoping to see it lift off. The students were also interested in the launch because of the first teacher in space."

"Most of the students were very saddened by what took place, especially those students who saw the shuttle itself and those who knew that the co-pilot was from Beaufort."

"Their reaction has been very good," he said. "They aren't too depressed today. But they compared it to the assassination of John Kennedy, because they had heard their parents talk about that."

"I felt the same shock when I heard of the shuttle exploding as I did when I heard that Kennedy was assassinated in 1963," Strickland commented. "It was a very sad moment."

Janie Manning, principal at Bethel Elementary School, said, "We had a group of students watching the launch in the library. The main reaction I noticed was the dismay on their faces."

"It was unbelievable, the shock when you are all excited and you have applauded because it has taken off, and then the thing explodes," Mrs. Manning said. "It was total shock."

"Some of the children in the group didn't want to leave to go to lunch. They wanted to sit and watch the coverage. There was a lot of discussion among them as to whether there could be survivors from such a type of explosion."

"We observed a moment of silence within our school in grades 4-8," the principal said. "In K-3, the teachers talked with the children about what had happened."

"Word got around school pretty quickly yesterday about the explosion," said D.H. Conley Principal Ike Baldree. "The reaction of the students was pretty much the same: it was hard to believe that it had happened."

"This morning there have been teachers and students passing around little black ribbons for those who would like to wear them in memory of those who died, and we observed a moment of silence this morning during homeroom in honor of those who perished"

Ron Braxton, a science teacher at D.H. Conley, applied for the teacher in space program. He said that despite the tragedy of the shuttle explosion, he would still like to be a teacher in space.

"Of course we all are saddened, speaking on behalf of all teachers in America, that our representative was killed," Braxton said. "We felt that Christa McAuliffe was a great spokesman for our profession."

"My reaction is a great deal of sadness, and many people are still in mourning for the tragedy," he said.

"I hope that something positive will come from this," Braxton commented. "When an individual gives up life for a cause, many times it will cause the public to react and be more conscious of a great work that was attempted. I hope that we can return to the level of enthusiasm and great anticipation that were felt for this event. I hope the work and the great cause that they died for will continue, because it is very important that we will have space exploration and continue the dreams and aspirations," Braxton said.

"If they would open the applications again, I would be more than happy to apply again," the science teacher said. "I know that the officials at NASA do every thing they can about safety as they possibly can. Over 11,000 teachers applied, and I'm sure it was difficult to pick the right teacher. I am proud that President Reagan wanted a teacher, a person who educates America's youth, to be the first citizen in space."

value, he added, "puts the ball in the county's court."

"If the county decides not to purchase the land, we'll have to look at other options like the county home (the site originally dedicated for the farmers market) or any other property that would be available in the city," Brown said.

Now in operation for over a decade, the chamber's Agri-Business Committee is composed of area businessmen and farmers who have been working for some time to establish a permanent farmers market.

Initially, the committee had earmarked county home property near Bell's Fork for the market, but decided to pursue the more central 14th Street site when it became apparent that county home property wasn't appropriate, Brown said. The county and Agri-Business members were looking to the city for assistance in the form of a long-term lease, he added, because the committee has no funds with which to

purchase land for the proposed farmers market.

launch pad fire that killed three Apollo astronauts 19 years ago this week. The Soviets have lost four cosmonauts in flight.

The Apollo fire, in a test, grounded astronauts for 21 months, and Tuesday's explosion is expected to halt space shuttle flights for many months. Jesse Moore, director of NASA's shuttle program, said a shuttle will not fly again until the cause of the accident is pinpointed and corrections made.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration had planned a record 15 shuttle flights this year, and Challenger was on the second. The ship, making its 10th flight, had been the workhorse of a four-ship fleet.

Killed along with McAuliffe were commander Francis R. Scobee, 46; pilot Michael J. Smith, 40; Judith A. Resnik, 36; Ronald E. McNair, 35; Ellison S. Onizuka, 39, and Gregory B. Jarvis, 41.

Scobee; Miss Resnik, America's second woman in space; McNair, the nation's second black astronaut, and Onizuka, a Japanese-American, were making their second shuttle flights. Jarvis, an employee of Hughes Aircraft, was on the trip to conduct fluid dynamics tests developed by his company.

"We mourn seven heroes," a somber President Reagan told the nation. Moore called it "a national tragedy."

Reagan delayed for one week his State of the Union speech, which had been scheduled for Tuesday night, and ordered American flags to be flown at half staff through Monday on public buildings and military installations.

At the president's request, Vice President George Bush flew to Cape Canaveral to offer condolences to the families of the astronauts, who watched in horror as Challenger was transformed into a raging fireball.

There was no immediate explanation for the accident.

Mission Control reported there had been no indication of any problem with the shuttle's three main, liquid-powered engines, its twin solid-fuel rocket boosters or any other system. Officials said the shuttle just suddenly blew apart and that radio

data ceased at 74 seconds.

The absence of any concrete radio information could hamper the investigation, especially if no large parts of the destroyed shuttle can be recovered. In the case of the Apollo fire, the spacecraft was on the ground, and the evidence was there to examine.

"Data from all the shuttle instrumentation, photographs, launch pad systems, hardware, cargo, ground support systems, and even notes made by any member of the launch team and flight ops (operations) team are being impounded," said shuttle director Moore.

He named an interim investigation team headed by Kennedy Space Center director Richard Smith, and said NASA acting administrator William R. Graham would soon name a formal review board.

The explosion occurred as Scobee was throttling the main engines back to maximum thrust after dropping them to 65 percent to reduce forces of gravity on the ship. It took place just after the spaceship drove through an area where wind and other atmospheric forces exert maximum pressure on its outside.

"Roger, go at throttle up," reported Smith as the thrust increased. Those were the last words from the spacecraft.

The major blast came from the large external fuel tank, which lifted off with 526,000 gallons of volatile liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen propellant. As the fireball spread terrifyingly across a clear sky, the two solid-fuel rockets broke loose and continued flying crazily, apparently under full thrust, before they crashed into the ocean.

John Osborn, professor of aeronautics and astronautics at Purdue University and a rocket expert for 35 years, speculated on what might have happened after he viewed slow motion video tape of the explosion.

"After the explosion, I see a normal exhaust pattern and an intact (solid) booster; I see a central cloud and two contrails," he said. "This indicates there's no problem with the solids."

"They showed this thing in slow motion and I see a red flash near the

location of one of the bulkheads in the liquid tank. My only conclusion is that something apparently happened to the liquid oxygen and liquid hydrogen, probably the liquid hydrogen because it's aft and it will burn in any proportion."

He cautioned that he was only speculating based on what he could see.

"We will not speculate as to the specific cause of the explosion based on that footage," said Moore. The investigators will take a "careful review" of all data "before we can reach any conclusions," he said.

"There were no signs of abnormalities on the screens" as flight controllers monitored Challenger's liftoff and ascent, officials said.

"We have a report from the flight dynamics officer that the vehicle has exploded. Flight director confirms that," NASA's Steve Nesbitt said seconds after the eruption.

Reagan, in an Oval Office address after he postponed his State of the Union message, reaffirmed his commitment to the shuttle program and said, "The future doesn't belong to the fainthearted, it belongs to the brave."

"We will continue our quest in space. There will be more shuttle flights and more shuttle crews and, yes, more volunteers, more civilians, more teachers in space."

"Nothing ends here." NASA delayed its announcement that there appeared to be no survivors for more than four hours until it had conducted search-and-rescue

efforts. Even before Moore's statement, it seemed impossible anyone could survive such a cataclysmic explosion.

"I regret that I have to report that based on very preliminary searches of the ocean where the Challenger impacted this morning, these searches have not revealed any evidence that the crew of Challenger survived," Moore told a midafternoon news conference.

New Hampshire schoolchildren were drawn to this launch because of the presence of McAuliffe, 37, who had been a social studies teacher at Concord High School and who had won her seat on the shuttle in competition with 11,146 other teachers.

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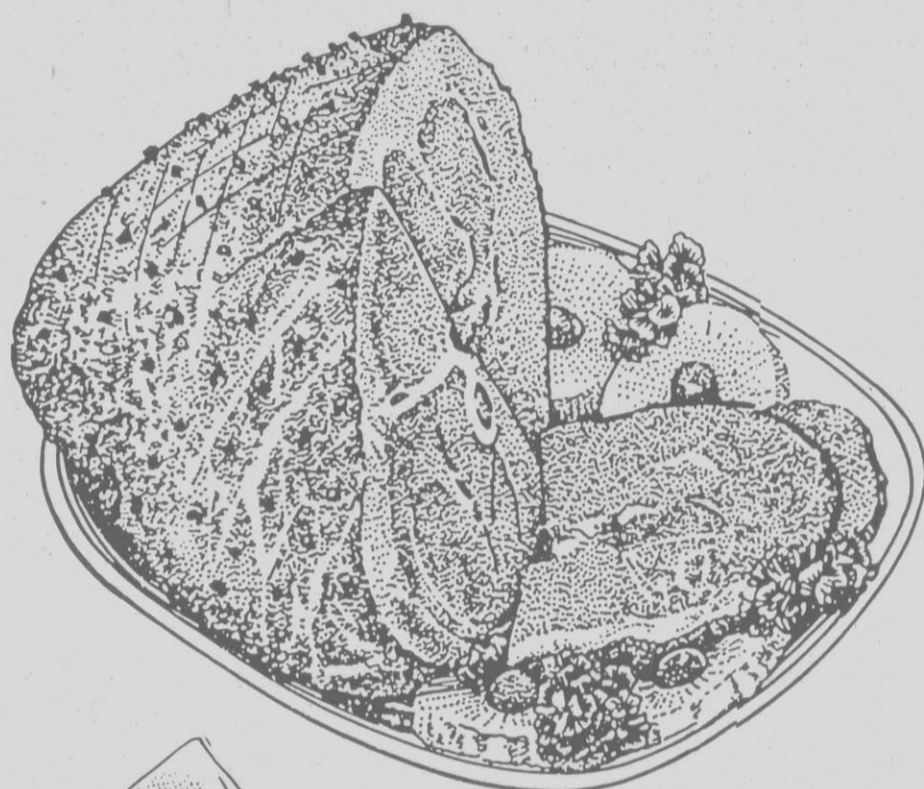
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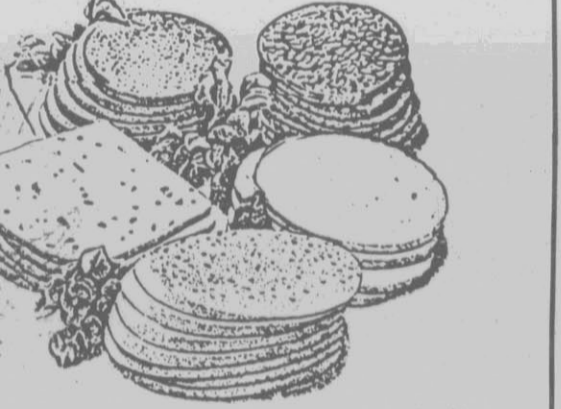
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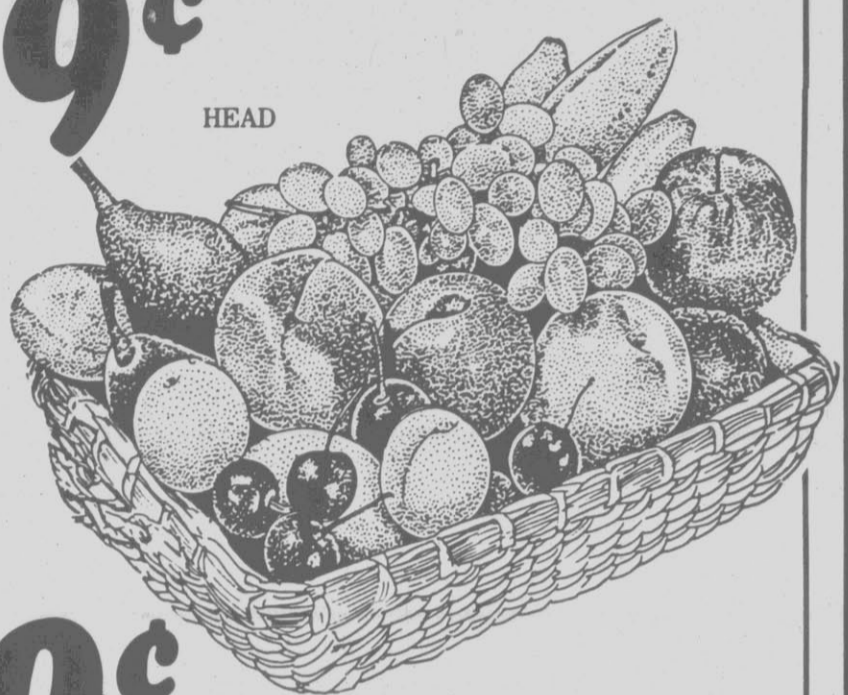
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Dinosaur-Era Fossil Site Found In Nova Scotia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists have made the largest fossil find in North America, uncovering more than 100,000 bone pieces of animals 200 million years old at a site in Nova Scotia, the National Geographic Society announced today.

The fossils, representing the crucial period in history when dinosaurs emerged to become masters of the Earth, were discovered on the shores of the Bay of Fundy north of the coast of Maine.

Geologist Paul E. Olsen of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Geological Observatory and biologist Neil H. Shubin of Harvard University led the field work that made the discovery last summer.

"Bones were sticking out all over

the place. They were everywhere," Shubin said of the site, located on the north shore of the bay near rural Parrsboro.

Some of the more significant finds so far are 12 skulls and jaws of Trithelodonts, the reptiles that are closest evolutionally to mammals. They are the first found in North America and represent the largest single collection of these rare fossils in the world, the scientists said.

Other skulls, teeth, jaws and bones unearthed at the site along the water's edge belong to dinosaurs, ancient crocodiles, lizards, sharks and primitive fish.

The work, supported by the National Geographic and done in cooperation with the Nova Scotia Museum in Halifax, resulted in the researchers trucking three tons of rocks

from the Canadian site to their laboratories for further examination.

Only a small portion of these rocks have been examined in detail, they said, and new specimens are uncovered every day.

The fossils were found in a rock formation known to geologists as the Newark Supergroup, the remains of an ancient, deep rift which stretches from Nova Scotia to South Carolina. About 200 million years ago, scientists say, this rift valley was close to the Earth's equator.

The sedimentary rocks of the formation, which is between 225 million and 175 million years old, had not been considered a good source of fossils and essentially were ignored for this purpose, the scientists said.

The discovery should spark more exploration along this formation, they added.

The fossils represent life in the boundary between the Triassic period, which began 240 million years ago, and the Jurassic, which began 200 million years ago.

Reptiles were the dominant land creatures during the Triassic, and the earliest dinosaurs appeared toward the end of that period. By the beginning of the Jurassic, dinosaurs proliferated and dominated the Earth until they vanished 65 million years ago.

The scientists said the new findings point to a catastrophic extinction right at the Triassic-Jurassic boundary — such as an asteroid impacting

the Earth — that wiped out more than 40 percent of the land and lake animals of that time.

They said they hoped the abundance of new fossils from that period

would help clarify such evolutionary mysteries as where mammals came from and whether present-day crocodiles are true descendants of the ancient ones.

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Governor Suggests New Tuition Plan

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Gov. James Blanchard is proposing a program that would guarantee tuition at Michigan's public colleges and universities for students whose parents donate money to a state-managed investment plan.

State Treasurer Robert A. Bowman on Tuesday gave the details of the program, which Blanchard was to include in a televised preview tonight of his State of the State speech.

"For many Michigan families, providing for their child's education in an uncertain market is a top priority," Bowman said. "This program, a guaranteed tuition program, is a way with parents' own money — not a handout — to have the state assume inflation problems and financial risk."

The program, tentatively called Michigan BEST — or Baccalaureate Education System Trust — probably will be tax exempt, administration officials said.

It would allow parents of children up to age 18 to donate a specified amount of money to the state, which would then invest the money.

On reaching college age, the child would be issued a state certificate for four years' tuition at any public four-year college or university in Michigan, regardless of the current cost of tuition.

"We think that a (tuition) guarantee can put the focus of education where it belongs, on course work, curriculum and professors, and not

on whether we can afford it," Bowman said.

The state would assume the responsibility of investing the money and the risk should the rate of return fall short of expectations. If the child doesn't attend a state school, the investment — including interest but minus administrative costs — would be returned.

How much parents contribute would depend on a child's age, the rate of return on the investment and the inflation rate at the time they enrolled in the program. The older the child, the larger the payments would be.

While the program's details must be worked out, the Blanchard administration is optimistic it can be implemented this year pending legislative approval.

The program has drawn favorable reviews from accounting experts, lawyers and university officials, administration officials said.

Blanchard, who will formally deliver his State of the State speech Thursday, added that paying off Michigan's debts and rebuilding neglected institutions has given the state "a springboard" for the future.

"We think that Michigan's comeback gives us a foundation for the future that we would not otherwise have had," the governor said.

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Hispanic Influence Growing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Hispanic population of the United States is growing nearly five times faster than the general public, with one of every 14 Americans now of Spanish background, a new Census Bureau study discloses.

Between 1980 and 1985 the nation's Hispanic population jumped almost 16 percent to 16.9 million people, the bureau reported on Tuesday. During the same period the U.S. population overall grew by only 3.3 percent.

"This sizeable increase was the result of high fertility and the resulting large natural increase and of substantial immigration to the United States from Mexico, Cuba and other Spanish-speaking countries of Central and South America," the bureau reported, promising a more detailed report later.

Hispanics constituted one in every 13.8 people, or 7.2 percent of the national population, which stood at 234 million in March 1985. In 1980 Hispanics constituted 6.4 percent.

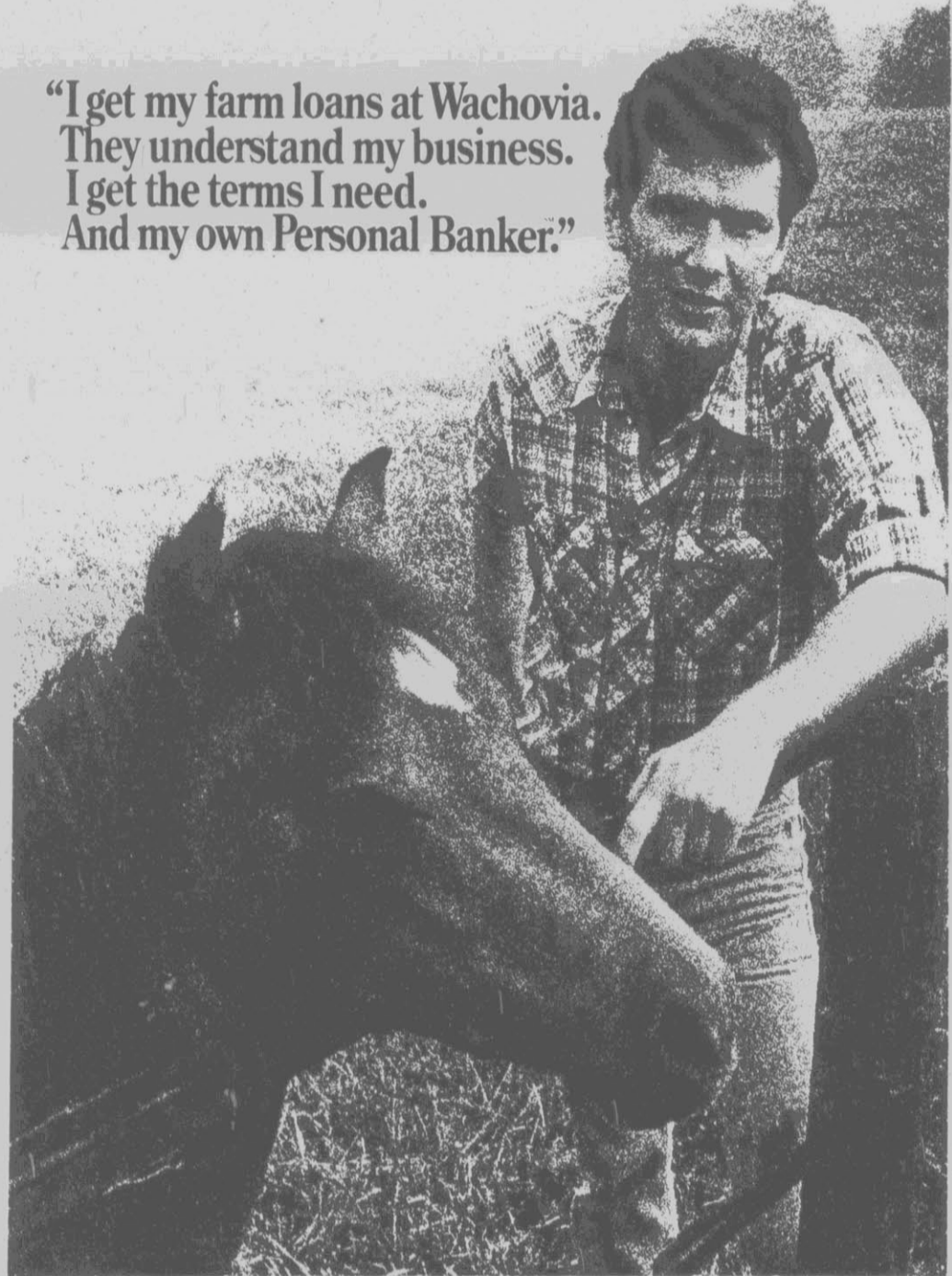
The study found that Hispanics tended to be younger, less educated, members of larger families and more likely to be living in poverty than Americans in general.

However, the statisticians also observed sharp variations within the Hispanic community itself. Cubans, for example, tended to be statistically more like other U.S. residents than Mexicans, Puerto Ricans, Central and South Americans and other Hispanics.

While earlier studies have emphasized that Hispanics are concentrated in a few states rather than distributed across the nation, the new report did not break down their numbers by state or region.

Overall, Mexicans were the nation's largest Hispanic group with 10.3 million counted, far ahead of second-place Puerto Ricans, with 2.6 million. There were 1.7 million Central and South Americans, 1.4 million "other" Hispanics and 1 million Cubans.

Both the Hispanic and general populations aged between 1980 and 1985, although the Spanish-origin group remained considerably younger. That was due to the large number of children, resulting from the higher fertility levels among Hispanics.



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Christa's Death Brings Tragedy Home

Until now, it was always somebody else — a president, a senator, a civil rights leader, a soldier.

Now, suddenly, in the long procession of shock and tragedy visible in our living rooms, it was one of us. We knew her by name, Christa, because she was one of us, as ordinary as a schoolteacher.

So when Christa McAuliffe and the six crew members died in that flaming hell it was no wonder that across the land Americans reacted first with disbelief, then tears, as if learning of a death in the family, because in a sense that is just what it was.

"It was this generation's

equivalent of 'Where were you when President Kennedy was killed?'" said a high school teacher in Schaumburg, Ill. "They will always remember hearing this awful news."

When the application of Sharon Christa McAuliffe, 37, wife, mother, social studies teacher at Concord (N.H.) High School, was chosen from 11,145 other applications, she told her students that she hoped her flight would show children that if they dared to dream their dreams could come true.

"I want students to understand the special perspective of space and relate it to them," she had written in her application. Nothing grand. A

teacher proposing to do a teacher's job. She aimed to keep a diary and do a little schoolteaching from space.

A Concord neighbor, Alison Curling, was one of the first to hear that Christa had been chosen. It was last July, and the town was having a sidewalk sale. Ms. Curling ran down Main Street spreading the news. She said she felt like Paul Revere. Soon the whole street was cheering — and soon, also, was all of America.

So Christa McAuliffe became America's teacher, carrying with her everyone's own best dreams, and that made her death and the death of her colleagues more personal and cruel.

Seeing it happen made it more so.

At the Alice Bell School in Knoxville, Tenn., teacher Lynette Young watched the launch with her 23 fourth-graders. They saw it lift off, they saw it explode. Then they saw their teacher shaking convulsively. "They're dead. They're dead," the teacher said. The children stared at her in awe.

In Scottsdale, Ariz., teacher Janet Ryan brought three television sets to class so all her eighth graders at Cocopah School would have a good view. Some, in their eagerness, wore NASA patches. Suddenly their excitement turned to horror and when the truth registered they ran to their teacher and in confusion and sorrow hugged her and wept with her.

"I'm glad it wasn't you, Mrs. Ryan," they said.

Six others died. All, of course, left loved ones and no one's grief can be measured by another, but it was the presence of an ordinary person with the right stuff that made this manned space mission different from any of

the other 55.

In Washington, when the U.S. House of Representatives heard the news its chaplain delivered a prayer and the House adjourned.

In Columbia, S.C., when the state's General Assembly heard the news its chaplain delivered a prayer and the Assembly adjourned.

In Concord, N.H., Edward Shumaker, a friend of the McAuliffes and colleague of Christa's husband, Steven — both are lawyers — was trying a case in federal court. When he heard the news, he broke down, and court adjourned.

Yes, all will remember what they were doing the day space shuttle Challenger exploded but perhaps none will remember more vividly than those who were there, heard the roar and felt the ground tremble and watched the little bird attached to the big rockets rise up — and die.

Christa McAuliffe's husband was there, and their two children, Scott, 9, and Caroline, 6, and Ed and Grace Corrigan, Christa's parents, and a whole gang of Scott's classmates who waved banners that said "Go Christa."

Mr. and Mrs. Corrigan stood watching, proudly, arm-in-arm.

When the explosion lit the TV screens, and the sky, the assembled watchers cheered, thinking it was the scheduled separation of the shuttle from the boosters. Almost immediately it became clear it was not. A voice said so on a loudspeaker but the Corrigan's did not comprehend this, or would not.

A NASA official approached them and said, "The vehicle has exploded."

"The vehicle has exploded?" Mrs.

Corrigan said.
The official nodded, and led them

away. A sorrowing nation wept with them.

Teacher Candidates Still Want Space

Many who competed to become the first teacher in space expressed shock and sorrow over the shuttle explosion that claimed the life of colleague Christa McAuliffe, but insisted they would willingly follow her into space.

"At this moment, I could have been dead," said a stunned Steve Warren, a ninth grade English teacher at Austin High School in Austin, Texas.

"I don't think any of the 11,000 teachers that applied didn't think once or twice about the risk involved, but you need to take some adventure, take a chance sometime," he said Tuesday after the shuttle carrying Ms. McAuliffe and six astronauts exploded shortly after liftoff.

"A little piece of all of us died," said William Allen Barwick, a physics teacher at Woodrow Wilson High School in Washington, D.C., who was one of 120 semi-finalists from across

the country vying for a place on the ill-fated flight of Challenger.

"We knew the possibility of death. We were all aware. But it's crazy, I'm sure that if there were a back-up mission lifting off tomorrow we would all be there," he said.

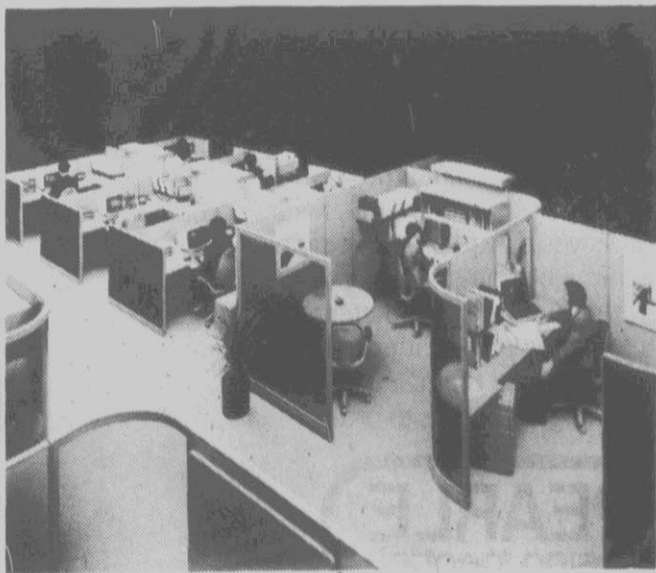
"If they told me there was another one going up tomorrow and I could be on it, I would volunteer in a minute," said Sophie Clifford of Erwin High School at Birmingham, Ala., one of that state's two finalists in the Teacher in Space program.

"I would go," said a tearful Beth Greenway, an English teacher at Parkview High School in Little Rock, Ark. "I'd go. I'd go."

"I suppose if in the building of this country we stopped every time there was a tragedy, we would not be the country we are today," she said.

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Israeli Jets Attack Guerrilla Camps

SIDON, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli jets swooped out of the sky at daybreak today to attack the camps of three Syrian-backed Palestinian guerrilla groups on the edge of Sidon. Hospital sources reported one man was killed and six others were injured.

Low-flying warplanes rocketed the bases in two passes 10 minutes apart. They flattened a two-story building used as a guerrilla center and badly damaged two others, Israeli military sources said.

It was the first such raid of the year. There were 13 Israeli air attacks on Palestinian targets in Lebanon last year, the most recent on Oct. 27.

"We thought they'd come after the operations in Rome and Vienna," said a young Palestinian standing near the ruins of one building. He was referring to the Dec. 27 terrorist attacks on Rome and Vienna airports that left 20 people dead, including

five Americans and four Palestinian terrorists.

Israel officials had promised retaliation for the terrorist attacks. "When the planes hit the first building, everybody just ran away. We knew what was happening," the unidentified youth said.

Clouds of black smoke billowed from the orange and lemon groves at the bases outside Sidon's teeming Ein el-Hilweh camp, home to 26,000 Palestinian refugees. Sidon, provincial capital of south Lebanon, is 25 miles south of Beirut.

The raids came two days after a Jerusalem pizza parlor was bombed. Responsibility for that attack was claimed by Fatah-Uprising, a breakaway faction of Palestine Liberation Organization Chairman Yasser Arafat's Fatah group.

Guerrilla commanders said two of the bases hit today were run by Fatah-Uprising, led by Saeed Mousa.

He is better known as Abu Mousa.

The third base belonged to the small Syrian-backed Palestinian Liberation Front, according to the guerrilla commanders who spoke on condition of anonymity. All three groups are closely allied with Syria and opposed to Arafat.

Military sources in Tel Aviv, however, said only one of the bombed bases belonged to the Abu Mousa faction.

The sources, who also spoke on condition they not be identified, said the other two were operated by George Habash's Marxist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine and Ahmed Jibril's PFLP-General Command faction.

Hospital sources said that one man was known dead in the attack and that six others were injured. Except for one wounded Lebanese, the casualties were said to be all Palestinians from the Ein el-Hilweh camp, the largest Palestinian refugee camp in

Lebanon.

On Monday the Israeli northern military commander, Maj. Gen. Ori Orr, told Israel television that Palestinian guerrillas were re-establishing bases near Ein el-Hilweh.

Israel withdrew the bulk of its soldiers from southern Lebanon last June, ending a three-year occupation.

Israel radio said the raid was authorized by the inner security Cabinet. The inner Cabinet of Israel's top government ministers was headed at that meeting by Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir of the right-wing Likud bloc because Prime Minister Shimon Peres of the Labor Party is on a European tour.

The selection of a coastal target for the raid suggested that Israel sought to avoid Syria's Soviet-supplied anti-aircraft missiles deployed on the Syrian-Lebanese border.

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Peres Ends 9-Day Tour In Berlin

BERLIN (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Shimon Peres wound up his nine-day European tour today in the divided German city of Berlin, where Adolf Hitler plotted the annihilation of millions of European Jews.

Peres' itinerary included a visit to West Berlin's Jewish community, the largest in Germany with 6,300 members. Before Hitler came to power in 1933, Berlin had 170,000 Jewish citizens, many of whom perished in the Holocaust.

The Israeli leader was met at Berlin's Tegel Airport by Mayor Eberhard Diepgen and West Berlin Jewish Community leader Heinz Galinski. Peres then was taken on a brief driving tour of the city, where 4,000 policemen have been assigned to guard him.

Late Tuesday, about 550 demonstrators marched from Wittenbergplatz to Adenauerplatz in West Berlin to protest Israeli Middle East policy toward Palestinians. Police said most of the demonstrators were leftists from the city's Alternative List Party and Palestinians in West Berlin.

Police reported no incidents, but protestors carried such signs as, "Attention For The Victims Of German Fascism Cannot Be An Alibi For Not Calling Genocide Genocide."

Peres' one-day trip includes a talk with West Berlin students at the Reichstag, the former Parliament building beside the Berlin Wall.

Making progress toward peace in the Middle East has been a major theme of Peres' tour, which also included stops in the Netherlands and Britain.

Hussein has proposed an international peace conference on the Middle East to be followed by talks be-

tween a joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegation and Israel. However, Israel opposes participation in the talks by the Palestine Liberation Organization, which refuses to recognize Israel's right to exist.

Peres will address 21 West Berlin students who attend the Freiherr

vom Stein School, which made newspaper headlines in 1981 after students yelled anti-Semitic epithets at one of their classmates.

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Florida Farmers Sprinkle Crops To Fend Off Cold

MIAMI (AP) — Florida farmers were flooding fields and sprinkling crops to protect them from another round of unusually cold weather. Although not as severe as expected, Tuesday's cold has been blamed for at least two deaths and scattered power outages. It also chased tourists from beaches and transients into the state's few shelters, and produced sightings of rare Florida snowflakes in the Jacksonville area. At 5 a.m. today, temperatures dropped to 30 degrees in Tallahassee and 29 in Daytona Beach. In Orlando, it was 34 and in Miami, 40. Forecasters predicted another

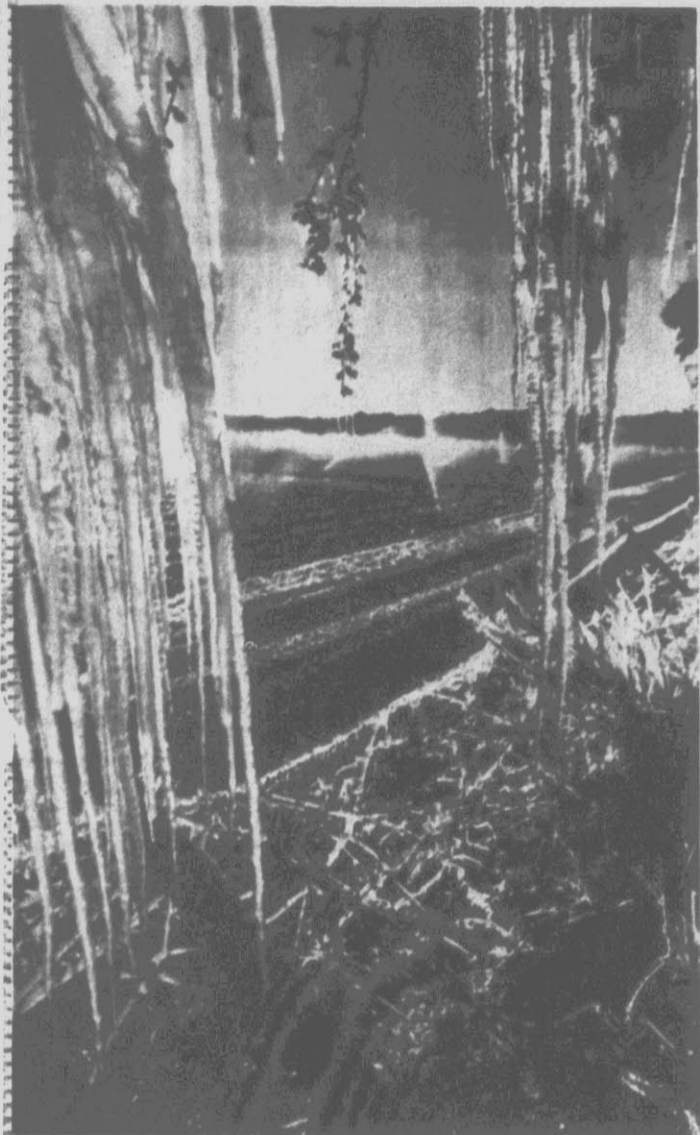
hard freeze for north and central Florida, but only frost for south Florida and the state's agricultural southwest. "It'll be a little bit warmer" than Tuesday, and "it'll start to warm up over the next few days," said National Weather Service forecaster Tony Fow. Some growers of beans, broccoli, cauliflower and other vegetables were picking their crops prematurely, rather than risk having them ruined. Joe Rapisargo of Florida City said he was ready to torch stacks of old tires around his 230 acres of vegetables, and he and other growers were irrigating fields in hopes that

the water would retain heat to keep the ground warm at night. "It's really a judgment call," said Bob Epling, a Homestead banker touring fields. "Lots of times (the water) creates bacteria hazards. It can be as much of a problem as a freeze." Ms. Fow said that by this afternoon, the worst should be past. "It's going to moderate very rapidly. We're already getting east winds. The east winds blow off the ocean and warm things up pretty fast," she said. "It's still going to be chilly" after today, "but we're not going to have a damaging freeze," she said. Citrus growers, hit by two killer freezes the last two winters, expressed relief Tuesday. "We did better than we anticipated," said Dick Whalley, a spokesman for Florida Citrus Mutual, the state's big grower cooperative in Lakeland. "We know we'll have some fruit damage. The degree we won't know for awhile. But it certainly won't be the magnitude of the freezes the last two years. Overall, we did pretty good."

In Jacksonville, police said a man died of hypothermia after being found in an unheated home late Monday as temperatures plunged to a record low of 16 degrees. A 3-year-old Fort Pierce girl was killed in Palm Beach County when an Interstate 95 sign blew off its supports

and smashed into a car her mother was driving. Her mother suffered minor injuries, authorities said. Last January, a five-day freeze swept through Florida wiping out 20 percent of the citrus crop and severely damaging 25 percent. The freeze

also destroyed two-thirds of the state's vegetable crop and one-third of its pasture land. The Christmas 1983 freeze destroyed more than 100,000 acres of citrus, while the 1985 freeze destroyed another 80,000 acres.

Kate Smith Goes Home

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Singer Kate Smith, famous for her rendition of "God Bless America," has been released from the hospital where she underwent surgery earlier this month to amputate her right leg. "She's getting along well and is in splendid spirits," said Miss Smith's sister, Helena Smith Steene. She said Miss Smith had been in good condition for the past few days and was released from Raleigh Community Hospital on Tuesday afternoon. Miss Smith, 78, was admitted to the hospital Jan. 11 with circulation problems stemming from diabetes. The next day, her leg was amputated above the knee. "She made a steady recovery from the operation," Mrs. Steene said. "They were really very wonderful to her at the hospital, but there's no place like home." Miss Smith, who lives in Raleigh, became one of the nation's most popular radio entertainers in 1931. That year, she helped write the lyrics to her theme song, "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain." She is best known for "God Bless America," to which composer Irving Berlin gave her rights in 1938 after it had sat on the shelf for 20 years.

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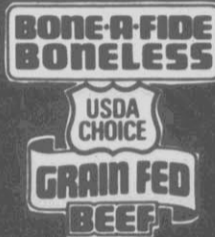
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1 small onion, sliced
1/2 rib celery, cut in three pieces
1 small carrot, cut in three pieces
1/2 teaspoon dried leaf thyme
Salt and pepper to taste

5 tablespoons butter, divided
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
3 cups cornbread stuffing mix
3 tablespoons minced parsley
3 tablespoons flour

Rinse giblets and place all but liver in medium saucepan along with three cups cold water, onion, celery, carrot and thyme. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer partially covered 30 minutes. Add liver and simmer 15 minutes. Salt and pepper to taste. Strain, discarding vegetables and separately reserving broth and giblets. Preheat oven to 375°. Heat four tablespoons butter in medium skillet and sauté chopped onion and celery five minutes. Add to stuffing mix along with parsley and 1/2 to 3/4 cup reserved giblet broth to make a moist but not wet stuffing.

Rinse chicken and pat dry. Lightly salt and pepper skin, body and neck cavities and lightly stuff both cavities. Any extra stuffing can be baked along with chicken during last 30 minutes of roasting. Truss chicken and place breast side up on rack in roasting pan. Rub with remaining one tablespoon butter. Roast for 2 to 2 1/2 hours until timer pops up. Remove from oven and let stand about 15 minutes while making the gravy.

Pour off all but four tablespoons pan drippings. Heat and stir in the flour. Cook, stirring over medium heat about three minutes until flour is lightly browned. Slowly stir in two cups of the reserved giblet broth until smooth. Add diced reserved giblets. Simmer, stirring often, for 5 to 7 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Serves 6 to 8. Approximate time: 3 1/2 hours.

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4 tablespoons butter, divided
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/2 teaspoon EACH dried sage, thyme and marjoram leaves (or substitute with one teaspoon poultry seasoning)

Salt and pepper to taste
2 teaspoons minced parsley
1 egg, beaten
2 1/2 cups day-old white bread, torn in small pieces
2 tablespoons unseasoned bread crumbs
1/2 cup chicken stock

Preheat oven to 400°. In medium skillet sauté onion and celery in three tablespoons butter for about five minutes until softened. Stir in sage, thyme, marjoram, salt, pepper and parsley. Add to bread pieces along with egg and toss to combine well. Form stuffing into balls, one for each fillet. Lightly salt and pepper fillets, then place a stuffing ball in center of each. Roll up loosely. Do not try to completely enclose stuffing. Chicken should adhere to stuffing and to itself without skewers. Place chicken rolls, smoothest side up close together in well-buttered baking dish. Sprinkle tops with breadcrumbs and dot fillets equally with remaining one tablespoon butter. Pour stock around rolls. Bake, uncovered, 15 to 18 minutes until cooked through. Serve with pan juices spooned over. Serves 4. Approximate time: 25 to 30 minutes.

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CHICKEN "POPS"

1 package of Holly Farms® Time Trimmer Nuggets
1 cup pancake and waffle mix
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 egg, beaten
1 tablespoon vegetable oil
vegetable oil for deep-frying
sweet and sour sauce or honey to serve

Place pancake mix, salt, pepper, egg, 1 teaspoon vegetable oil, and 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons water in mixing bowl. Beat with wire whisk until batter is smooth. Refrigerate 15 to 20 minutes. 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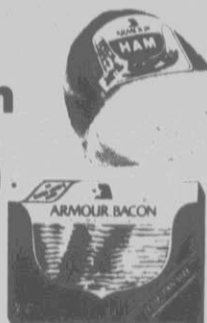
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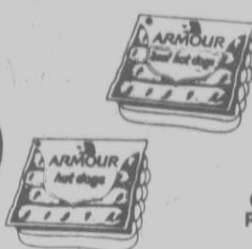
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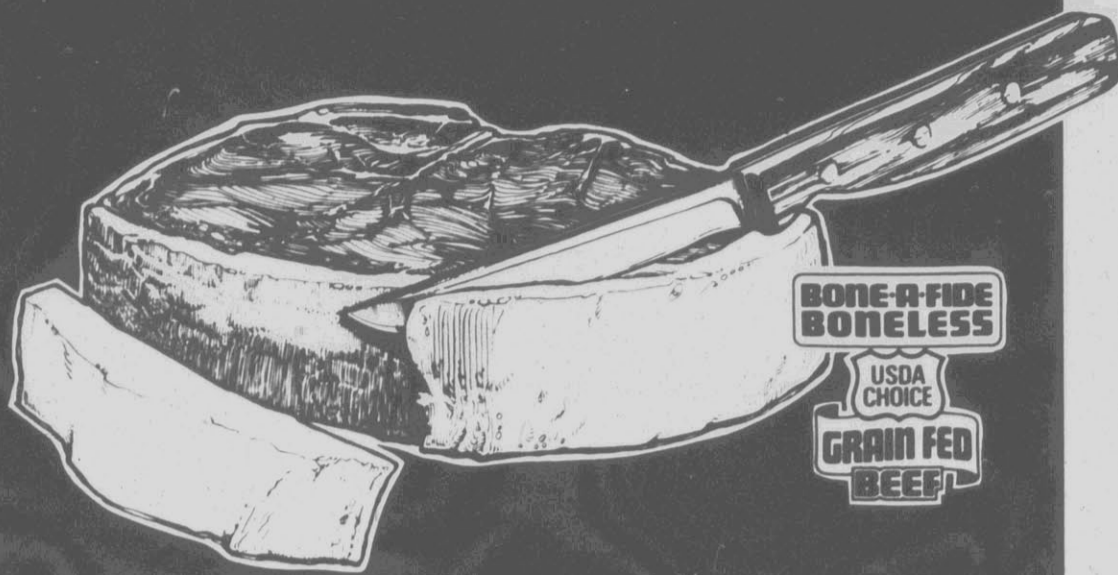
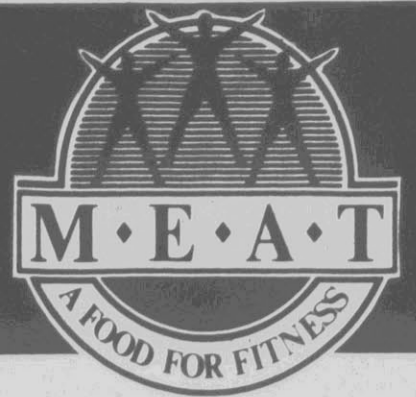
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Hunt's Last Quarter Rips Rose

Anthony Barnes scored 12 of his 29 points in the final period as he led Wilson Hunt High School to an 82-69 Big East basketball victory over Rose High School last night.

Rose's girls, however, held off a Hunt rally in the final quarter to upset the first place Lady Warriors, 50-43, behind 23 points from Chris Holec.

The Rampants, who had seen the boys' game bounce back and fourth between the two teams saw the Warriors begin to pull away early in the final quarter on eight of ten field goals from the field and 16 of 22 shots at the foul line.

From a 50-50 tie just over a minute into the period, Hunt scored the next eight points to take a 58-50 lead. Two free throws by Kevin Hines started it and Barnes added a jumper. Junior Harris followed with another jumper after a missed Rose free throw, and Hines finished off the string with a basket from underneath with 5:02 showing.

Rose finally broke the string, but Barnes and Reggie McRae both scored to open up a ten-point gap, 62-52.

Rose struggled back to within six at 68-62 with 2:24 left, but a dunk by Harris started another Hunt string of 11 straight points that opened the lead to 79-62 with 1:10 to go, virtually ending it.

The end of the contest, however, was nothing like the first three period had been. Hunt had never led by more than three, while Rose garnered as much as a seven point lead in the second period.

Rose gained the early lead in the

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Maryland Wins First As Deacs Fall Alone In Cellar

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — In the battle to decide the cellar dweller in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Wake Forest surrendered with hardly a whimper.

Both the Demon Deacons and Maryland were winless in league play before the Terps hit 34 of 46 shots from the floor and romped 77-55 Tuesday night.

Although Maryland Coach Lefty Driesell insisted afterward that it wasn't a "must" victory, he didn't convince his listeners.

After all, the Terps were 0-6 in the ACC, their worst start in 17 years under Driesell. With five straight losses, they already had tied the longest losing streak in Driesell's 31 years of coaching on the high school and college level.

But the Terps had no trouble from the outset as the Demon Deacons helped bury themselves with 24 percent shooting in first half, and went down to their eighth straight setback and a 0-9 ACC record.

"It was necessary to get our confidence back," Driesell said, while noting that three of Maryland's six losses in seven previous games were to top-ranked North Carolina, No. 3 Georgia Tech and No. 5 Duke by a total of 11 points.

Len Bias, the ACC's leading scorer, topped Maryland with 21 points. Freshman John Johnson had 15, Jeff Baxter added 14, and Keith Gatlin was credited with 11 assists.

The Terps, now 11-8 overall, took a 34-17 halftime lead and extended it to 54-28 with 12:31 remaining.

Wake, behind the second-half shooting of Mark Cline and Rod Watson, trimmed that 26-point deficit to 68-53 before Driesell called time out and restored order.

"We didn't play with a lot of emotion and enthusiasm in the first half," said Wake Coach Bob Staak. "We did not defend very well, and for some reason we were stagnant offensively."

Staak reasoned that consecutive losses to N.C. State, Virginia and Clemson, by a total of 11 points, may have affected the Deacons much the same way Maryland was affected by its narrow losses to top-ranked teams.

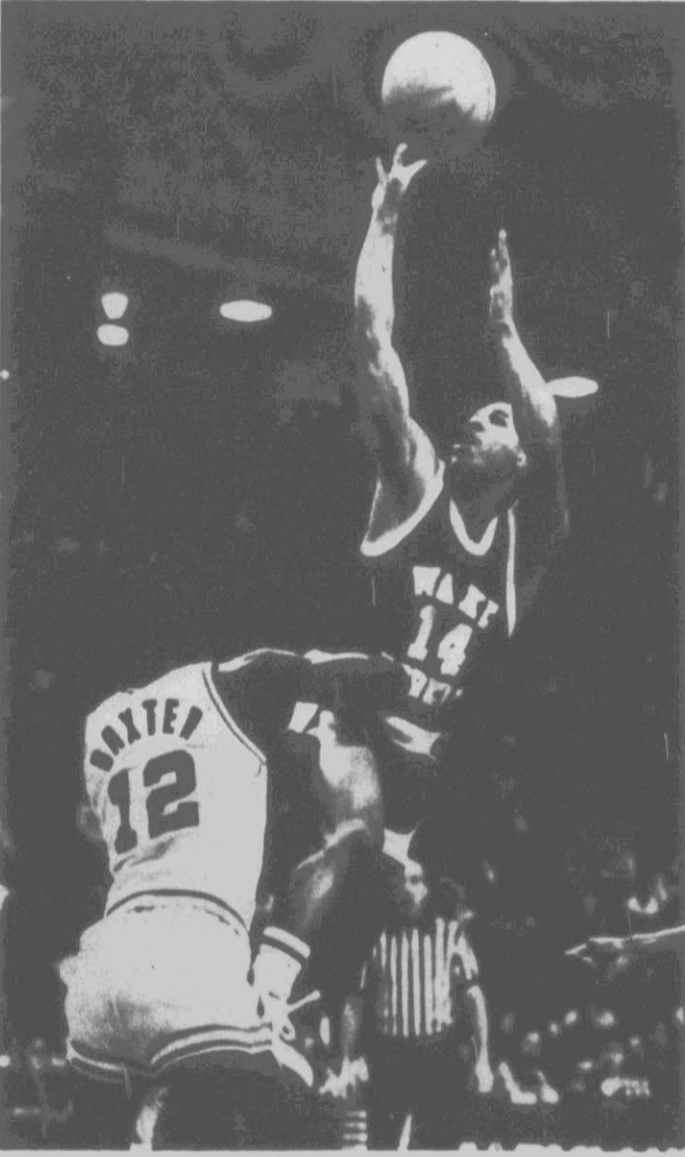

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Reliable Kareem Does The Job

Los Angeles Lakers Coach Pat Riley tried something new when all he needed was old reliable Kareem Abdul-Jabbar.

Riley, stung by the team's first three-game losing streak in more than a year, started Mike McGee at guard in place of Byron Scott, then watched the 38-year-old Abdul-Jabbar hit 13 of 17 shots from the field and score 32 points Tuesday night in a 125-115 NBA victory over the Milwaukee Bucks.

"This was an important game for us... breaking the losing streak," Abdul-Jabbar said. "Any time you have the opportunity to turn things around, it is important to play your best."

McGee scored 14 points on 6-for-9 shooting in his rare start, while Scott was 11 for 15 for 23 points. Abdul-Jabbar said the starting lineup, already curtailed by a knee injury to Earvin "Magic" Johnson, is of no consequence to him.

"When we don't start the same players it doesn't have much of an effect on me," Abdul-Jabbar said. "I know what my job is and I do it no matter who else is playing. I play the same game night in and night out."

In other National Basketball Association games, it was New York 118, Chicago 111; Atlanta 123, Indiana 92; Houston 116, Cleveland 109; Phoenix 136, Portland 130; New Jersey 117, Golden State 113; Sacramento 125, Denver 120; and Philadelphia 106, Seattle 99.

"Mike gives us a different game than Byron," Riley said in explaining the lineup change. "He plays more aggressive with more fire. He's been

playing well defensively and his shot has been falling. I don't have any problem with starting him."

Several other Lakers besides Abdul-Jabbar believed the team's desire to break the losing streak was a bigger factor than the revamped lineup.

"We're not strangers," said James Worthy, who had 16 points and a career-high nine assists. "We practice together every day and it's nice when everyone contributes."

"It's not a promotion by any means, just a change that was needed," McGee added. "This part of the season you're going to have dry spots no matter what players are on your team. Sometimes a team just needs a spark."

The Lakers led 60-48 at halftime, but the Bucks cut the deficit to five points midway through the third quarter before a 29-16 spurt gave Los Angeles a 102-84 margin with 9:52 left in the game.

Milwaukee, which got 24 points from Paul Pressey and 20 from Sidney Moncrief, trimmed the margin to 110-102 before a three-point basket by Michael Cooper clinched the outcome. Cooper, starting in place of Johnson, had 18 points and 11 assists.

"We expected the Lakers to come out and establish a winning attitude from the start," Moncrief said. "Anytime a championship team loses three in a row you expect them to come out and play harder. I'd rather play them after they won four straight."

Rockets 116, Cavaliers 109
Allen Leavell scored nine of his 13 points in the fourth quarter to lift

Houston over Cleveland, which got a season-high 39 points from Roy Hinson.

The lead changed hands eight times in the first 4½ minutes of the fourth quarter before consecutive baskets by Ralph Sampson and Leavell gave the Rockets the lead to stay at 96-93 with 7:05 left. They coasted to victory after extending the margin to 108-99 with three minutes to go.

Akeem Olajuwon led Houston with 21 points and 12 rebounds.

76ers 106, SuperSonics 109
Philadelphia scored 14 straight points down the stretch to break open a close game at Seattle.

The 76ers, winners of 10 of their last 12 games, led only 92-91 with 4:32 left before their 14-0 spurt. The Sonics went 4:20 without a field goal before Danny Young hit a three-pointer.

Moses Malone led Philadelphia in scoring with 22 points, while Charles Barkley had 18 points and a career-high 21 rebounds for the second straight game. Jack Sikma had 21 points and Xavier McDaniel 20 for Seattle.

Suns 136, Trail Blazers 130
Walter Davis scored 33 points and defused a late Portland rally with four straight points down the stretch as Phoenix snapped a five-game winning streak.

Davis scored 14 points in the fourth quarter, but 11 points from Terry Porter and 10 by Kiki Vandeweghe cut a 102-90 Suns lead to 124-123 9½ minutes into the final period. Davis then hit two free throws with 2:13 left and then had a steal and layup 11 seconds later to put Phoenix back in

control.

Walker Happy About Hall

CANTON, Ohio (AP) — It was an era of versatility and helmets without face-guards, and Detroit Lions halfback Doak Walker never dreamed of getting into the National Football League Hall of Fame.

He had good reason. "It didn't even exist then," Walker said.

But on Tuesday, it was announced that Walker and four other players had been elected to the Hall. Joining Walker in enshrinement next summer will be halfback Paul Hornung, quarterback Fran Tarkenton, and defensive standouts Ken Houston and Willie Lanier.

Walker, who played six seasons with the Detroit Lions in the 1950s, made the initial list of candidates as a nominee of the Old-Timers Committee, which studied players with qualifications dating back primarily before 1961. The hall did not come into existence until 1963.

"I think it's one of the nicest things that's happened to me," said Walker, who had 1,520 yards rushing and 2,539 yards receiving in his career.

Walker learned of his election when he got on the plane in New Orleans to return from the Super Bowl.

"Who gets on the plane is the sports publicity director for the Hall of Fame that was going to Honolulu," Walker said from his home in Denver. "He told me."

"I was fortunate to play on three divisional championships and two world championships," Walker said. "We had a great team. I think the first one that we won was one of the greatest thrills not only for myself but for the whole ballclub. That's what we had started the season for, to win the championship. When we won it, I don't think we came down out of the air for a couple of years after that."

Hornung was elected in his last year of eligibility. His one-year suspension in 1963 for betting on his own team had been blamed for keeping him from the Hall until now.

"I've been very optimistic in the past, and I've learned not to be too optimistic," Hornung said. "This year, it seemed, everybody was telling me that I had an excellent opportunity. I was getting closer. It seems like there was more calls from the media this year, so where there's a little smoke there's fire."

"In December, I was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Now in January, it tops it off with the professional Hall of Fame. I couldn't be happier," said Hornung, who went to Notre Dame.

The selection committee is made up of one media representative from each NFL city plus a 29th member from the Pro Football Writers

Association. To be elected, a player must receive support from about 82 percent of those voting. Rules call for the election of four to seven new members to the hall each year.

Hornung became the 10th member of the 1961 Green Bay Packers to be inducted into the hall. A Heisman Trophy winner at Notre Dame, he was a two-time NFL MVP. From 1959 through 1961, while playing for Green Bay Coach Vince Lombardi, he led the NFL in scoring for three consecutive seasons.

Tarkenton became the first player with any significant playing time with the Minnesota Vikings to gain entry into the hall. He also played for the New York Giants. In the '70s, he led the Vikings to three Super Bowl appearances, but never managed to take them to victory.

Over his 18-season career, he amassed NFL career-record passing totals of 6,467 attempts and 3,686 completions for 47,003 yards and 342 touchdowns.

Houston, a defensive back for the Houston Oilers and Washington Redskins, became the eight defensive back from the modern era and the fifth safety to win induction. In 14 seasons, he garnered 49 interceptions and established an NFL record by running nine back for touchdowns.

Lanier was the second Kansas City

Chiefs player — after Bobby Bell — to make it to the hall and the eighth linebacker from the modern era. In 11 seasons, he intercepted 27 passes for 440 yards and two touchdowns.

"I'm happy to be there," Houston said upon learning he had been picked in his first year of eligibility. "It's something you don't really think about, really, because you always think it will be something that will happen after you are dead, really."

"It's fantastic," said Lanier, adding that his election gave him a "very rewarding and refreshing feeling. ... The thing I noticed this morning, there was great elation at being called to be told that I was one of the five, but then after talking to a few people I went through a little down period."

"The period was just then one of reflecting on all the people that have been involved with it, all of those that you want to be here when this occurred. My mother passed (away) a couple of years ago and it would be great if she were here to share in this."

Len Dawson, the Most Valuable Player in Super Bowl IV while quarterbacking the Kansas City Chiefs, and Don Maynard, a star receiver for the New York Jets, failed to make the final cut after being among the seven finalists.

Tony Collins Among Pats Said To Have Used Drugs

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) — Raymond Berry threatened to quit as head coach of the New England Patriots before the National Football League team's players voted to submit voluntarily to drug testing, according to General Manager Patrick Sullivan.

"He told me before he spoke with the team, and he told them at the end of his remarks that he would not go through another season having to face the drug issues he had this year," Sullivan told the Boston Globe in an interview published today.

The Globe also said the players knew the decision would spark controversy and perhaps even a lawsuit from the National Football League players union.

It also reported Sullivan had confirmed the names of six players who allegedly admitted to Berry they had used illegal drugs. The newspaper

identified the six as Irving Fryar, Tony Collins, Stephen Starring, Roland James, Raymond Clayborn and Kenneth Sims.

Fryar and Clayborn, both in Honolulu to prepare for the Pro Bowl, immediately denied the allegation.

"The guys are taking steps toward getting the team cleaned up," Fryar said. "I was one of the guys who voted for it. I'm drug-free baby. Test me today if you want."

"My name shouldn't be involved in this mess," said Clayborn. "I'll take a urinalysis for anyone. My name should not be involved in this."

The Globe said it had obtained a list of players allegedly involved, but none of the others had been tested nor had they admitted to Berry the existence of any drug problem.

When confronted with the Globe's list, Sullivan said he would not deny the accuracy of the report.

"Raymond told the team you had the names and the fact that in many cases they were the same facts he had," Sullivan said. "The players involved took the risk in the first place, and we never told them they had any guarantee that you would not use their names."

At a news conference Tuesday, guard Ron Wooten said the team decided to defy the players union, which opposes drug testing without a collective bargaining agreement, and endorse a program because "we knew Coach Berry felt strongly about it."

Gene Upshaw, executive director of the NFL Players Association said that the union will oppose the Patriots' action.

"I have no choice on this," Upshaw said from Honolulu. "I have to tell the players. The Patriots didn't have the authority to establish a drug-testing program."

Ryan To Be Announced As Eagles Head Coach

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Buddy Ryan, the coach of the vaunted defense of the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears, is the new head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles. Ryan, to be introduced today at a noon news conference, was signed late Tuesday according to team owner Norman Braman and General Manager Harry Gamble. Braman, reached by phone at his Miami home, told The Associated Press early today that "I can confirm that we've signed Ryan." Gamble said he negotiated most of the day Tuesday with Ryan before the 51-year-old coach signed a five-year contract, ending a search that began Dec. 16 when Marion Campbell was fired. In the following weeks, there were reports that Braman strongly favored David Shula, the 26-year-old son of Miami Dolphins Coach Don Shula, followed by reports that Jim Mora, coach of the United States Football League Baltimore Stars, had agreed to coach the Eagles of the National Football League. Mora became the coach of the New Orleans Saints on Tuesday. Ryan has been an assistant coach in the NFL for 18 years, the last eight with the Bears. In his tenure with Chicago, the Bears were among the top 10 defensive teams six times. The Bears this season led the NFL in total defense, capping their success by smothering the New England Patriots in a record setting 46-10 Super Bowl triumph. Braman's selection of the gruff defensive coach contrasted with his earlier statements that he wanted an innovative offensive coach - namely Shula, coach of the Dolphins' receivers. But young Shula balked at a five-year option after a five-year contract expired. Braman dumped him. Then, the owner turned to Mora, who had directed the Philadelphia Stars, later Baltimore, to championships in two of the three USFL seasons. Mora was offered the job and a contract negotiated. But an unexplained disagreement developed, and Mora on Tuesday took the Saints' job. The Bears, meanwhile, posted a pair of playoff shutouts bringing Ryan to Braman's attention. The Eagles talked to Ryan and agreed to wait until after the Super Bowl to complete negotiations that would make Ryan the 17th coach in the Eagles' 53-year history. Ryan has been given much of the credit for the Bears' 18-1 record and NFL title. After the Super Bowl rout of New England, the Bears carried Ryan off on their shoulders. Chicago linebacker Mike Singletary said Ryan's chance to become a head coach was a good opportunity. "At the same time I don't want him to go because I'm afraid it would spoil the chemistry we have going here," he said. "I guess that sounds selfish, but that's how I feel. That's how we all feel." Chicago head coach Mike Ditka said, "what Buddy Ryan has done with the defense and his use of personnel, has been outstanding." Before his eight years with the Bears, Ryan coached eight years the New York Jets and two with the Minnesota Vikings. Ryan, who has gained recognition as one of the more innovative minds in football, handles the linebackers in addition his duties as coordinator. He uses multiple alignments and coverages. His popular "46" defense is a 5-1-5 set named after it's original middleman, former safety Doug Plank, who wore uniform No. 46. The 46 forces offensive linemen into one-on-one blocking and opens up avenues for blitzing. Ryan, a native of Frederick, Okla., was a four-year letterman at Oklahoma State from 1952-55 as an offensive guard before beginning his coaching career as a defensive coordinator at the University of Buffalo from 1961-65.

Cyclones Upset Kansas, 77-74

Iowa State Coach Johnny Orr was worried that his team might be suffering from the fallout of a bench-clearing brawl in its previous game. It soon became clear, however, that the only fight on his players' minds was the one they were in. Tuesday night, the Cyclones got some crucial free throws down the stretch from Jeff Hornacek and held off fourth-ranked Kansas 77-74 in a Big Eight Conference basketball game. The Cyclones, 13-6 and 4-2 in the conference, mixed some mayhem with basketball last Saturday in a 75-58 loss at Nebraska, and that was the cause of Orr's concern. "We did not practice well yesterday, and I was worried about the after-effects of last Saturday," Orr said. "But we didn't show any signs of that and came out and really did a good job." In other Top Twenty games, 11th-ranked Syracuse beat Boston College 80-55, and No. 18 Louisville defeated La Salle 72-60. The loss dropped Kansas to 19-3 and 4-1 in the Big Eight. Jayhawks Coach Larry Brown has yet to win in three trips to Ames, Iowa. Hornacek hit six free throws in the final minute of play after Kansas had cut a 10-point Iowa State lead to one point, 71-70. Jeff Grayer led Iowa State, which has won 13 in a row at home, with 19 points, and Danny Manning had 26 for the Jayhawks. No. 11 Syracuse 80, Boston Coll. 55 Wendell Alexis became the 27th Syracuse player to top 1,000 career points, scoring 21 to lead the Orangemen over Boston College in the Big East Conference. The victory was the 220th in the coaching career of Jim Boeheim.

The Southern Growth Policies Board study says there has been "substantial progress in reducing racial inequality in the economic life of the South." But now there appears to be "a reversal — toward increased economic inequality."
The economy and the

demographics of the South are dividing the races and "worsening the social problems created by unemployment, poverty and discrimination," the study says.
The trends are "likely to cause serious and detrimental effects on the economic advancement of the South as a whole," it concludes.
"We've come a long way, but we have not overcome," former Mississippi Gov. William F. Winter said Tuesday as officials from 12 Southern states got their first look at

the study.
"There's considerable sunshine in the so-called Sumbelt," SGPB Director Jesse L. White said, "but there's also considerable shade, which should give us pause for concern."
Between 1970 and 1980, 3.4 million whites and 200,000 blacks migrated to the South from other regions, swelling the region's labor supply and increasing black unemployment in the South from 8.8 percent to 18.1 percent.
"For blacks, the increase in com-

petition for jobs, combined with less aggressive equal opportunity program efforts, will mean high unemployment rates, underemployment and lower wages," the study predicts.
"The ability of blacks to compete successfully in the job market will also be diminished by the recent erosion of education gains made in the 1960s and early 1970s," it adds.
The study notes that financial aid available for black college students is declining and the majority of un-

dergraduate degrees obtained by blacks in the South are in fields where salaries are the lowest and unemployment the highest.
It also notes that nearly 50 percent of all minority children live in the South and that "without government support, these children are not likely to be adequately housed, fed, educated or provided with access to health care."
Scheduled reductions in federal spending on programs that would benefit these children "will present

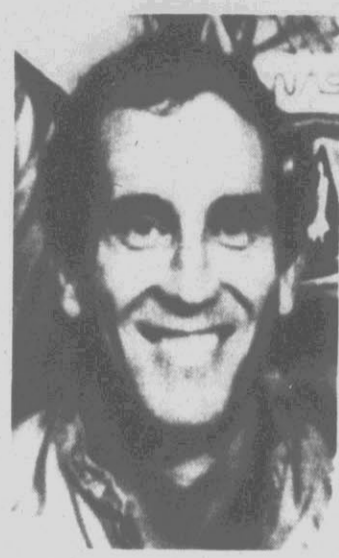
serious problems for the Southern states," the study says.
Winter, a member of the SGPB committee which produced the study, said the South has the "political leadership" to overcome its problems.
"We've got leaders of vision, of ability, of commitment," he said, "more than what we've seen coming out of Washington."
The SGPB is a public agency based in Washington and supported financially by 12 Southern states and Puerto Rico.

Astronaut's Death Shocks Family, Fans In Beaufort

Beaufort residents watched in "stunned silence" as the space shuttle Challenger turned into a fireball, killing hometown hero Mike Smith and six other crew members.
"It was terrible," said Beaufort Mayor Joyce Fulford, who watched Tuesday's launch on television at a bank where she works.
"Everybody's in sort of a state of shock. I'm sure the whole town will be in a state of mourning."
Kerry Smith, Mike Smith's sister-in-law, went to Florida last week to watch the shuttle's first scheduled launch. But she and her husband, Tony, who owns a nursery and landscaping business, returned to the North Carolina coast over the weekend after bad weather delayed the launch.
She was watching the launch on television when the shuttle exploded 10 miles above the ground.
"We're really in shock right now," she said after the explosion.
"Most everyone in Beaufort knew him or knew of him," said Ken Winley, the Carteret County administrator. He said people watching the lift-off in the courthouse sat in "stunned silence" as the shuttle exploded.
Smith, who was voted "most likely to succeed" by his 1963 graduating class at Beaufort High School, was carrying a small town flag given him by his brother, Pat, a spotter for a local fish processing company.
Mrs. Fulford said Smith, 40, plan-

ned to have the flag autographed by all seven members of the Challenger's crew and return it to the town.
"We were planning to have a big celebration for him," Mrs. Fulford said. "The high school class had asked that he be the speaker for their commencement exercises. Now, we will just try to contribute our time and efforts to the family."
Smith, the oldest of four children, grew up next to the runway at Beaufort-Morehead City Airport. He took his first flying lesson at age 15 and made his first solo flight on his 16th birthday. Bob Burrows, his flight instructor, was among 80 to 100 friends and relatives who went to Florida for the launch.
Pat Smith, also of Beaufort, said his brother "never wanted to do anything else. That's all he talked about as a kid."
"He used to read everything he could get his hands on about flying," he said. "He was very goal-oriented. He always seemed to know what he wanted to do and flying was it."
Mike Smith graduated from the Naval Academy in 1967, flew 198 missions in Vietnam and earned the Distinguished Flying Cross, three Air Medals and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star. In 1980 he was one of 19 candidates chose out of 3,500 candidates for the shuttle mission.
"He was aware of the danger, just as he was when he was a fighter pilot," his brother said. "But it was something he accepted as part of the job."

Tom Hewitt, who coached Smith in football, said Smith was always in love with flying.
"I can remember when we were playing Havelock at their field by the (Cherry Point Marine) air station," Hewitt said. "He would call time outs in the middle of the game, just to watch the jets taking off."
"This was a lifetime dream for him," said Curtis Lancaster, the principal of Beaufort Elementary School and another of Smith's football coaches. "I told somebody yesterday it looked like just a matter of time before Mike (a U.S. Navy commander) made captain and then admiral."
Lancaster said students at the elementary school were too young to have known Smith, himself the father of three children, but they had "heard adults talk about 'our Mike Smith.'"
"There are quite a few members of our staff that were classmates of Mike's or were a year or two behind him or in front of him," Lancaster said. "This is a pretty sad time in Beaufort."
Two Winston-Salem sisters spent the past four days in Cape Canaveral as guests of Smith awaiting the shuttle's departure.
"We couldn't believe it," said Louise Bryan, who decided to return home with her sister, Ann Griffen, after NASA officials scrapped Monday's launch. "When we left Florida they said it wouldn't go till Thursday — that there was only a remote possibility that it would go Tuesday."

"We just couldn't believe it."
Mrs. Bryan and Mrs. Griffen, whose husband Rick was a college roommate of Smith's, learned of the disaster after arriving home shortly before noon Tuesday.
"We've got buttons, T-shirts and children who want to be astronauts," Mrs. Griffen said. "But I doubt seriously if that will happen now. I don't want them to be, and I'm not sure they should."
The explosion came seconds after Smith had reported the engines running normally.
"Challenger, go at throttle up," Mission Control told Smith after his report.
"Roger, go at throttle up," Smith responded just before the shuttle exploded.
Within hours of the explosion, the Beaufort Rotary Club established the Mike Smith Memorial Fund, "in living memory of one of our own youth."
Gov. Jim Martin ordered state and U.S. flags to be flown at half-mast at all state facilities.
"He was just a real nice person and came from a lovely family," Mrs. Fulford said. "We're sympathetic with others, but when it's your own, you feel so much closer to it."

Sagging Tax Take Could Hit Budget

RALEIGH (AP) — A decline in North Carolina's tax revenues for the second straight month has prompted concern that a continued trend could mean a budget crunch when the Legislature convenes in June.
"It causes all of us a great deal of concern," said Sen. Anthony Rand, D-Cumberland, chairman of the Senate Base Budget Committee. "We believe the (revenue estimates) we based the budget on will hold up. But we are very concerned about the second year of the (1985-87) biennium and what this may say about the future."
State Revenue Secretary Helen Powers on Monday released figures showing the state General Fund collections fell short of expectations for the second consecutive month. Revenue last November increased by a sluggish 3.57 percent over revenue in November 1984.
Even worse were December figures, with last month's revenue only 1.94 percent higher than revenue from December 1984.
The 1985 figures were far below the pace of a 6.3 percent annual growth rate that the General Assembly projected when it adopted its 1985-86 budget last summer. The 6.3 percent growth rate is needed to balance this year's budget.
Gov. Jim Martin announced a state government hiring slowdown this

month and said it was needed because of expected federal spending cuts and the sluggish growth of state revenue. Martin also said he might not push for repeal of the intangibles tax this year because of the anticipated budget squeeze.
For the first six months of the fiscal year — July through December 1985 — state revenues have grown at an average annual rate of 8.3 percent, primarily because of strong growth in the early fall.
But legislative economist David Crotts said he thought that the recent decline in revenue growth was temporary and that tax collections would recover.
"I still expect collections to come in 8 percent over last year's collections," he said.
John Williams, a budget adviser for Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan, agreed.
"I think it will come in pretty much as estimated by the General Assembly last year," said Williams, who was former Gov. Jim Hunt's budget director. "It (the decline) wouldn't be alarming at this point."
C.C. Cameron, the governor's executive assistant for budget and management, said Tuesday that he was holding to the administration's projection of an 8.5 percent annual revenue growth for 1985-86.

Sanford Wants Ingram To Leave Senate Race

RALEIGH (AP) — Former Gov. Terry Sanford is taking all his U.S. Senate opponents seriously, including John Ingram, who has proven he can win a statewide race, Sanford's campaign manager says.
Sanford planned to seek Ingram's support and urge him not to enter the crowded Democratic field during a

luncheon today in Cary, where Ingram lives and practices law, Ingram said in a telephone interview Tuesday.
"I would assume he can generate a certain percentage of votes again," Sanford's campaign manager, Sam Poole, said about Ingram, who was elected insurance commissioner

three times. "It waters down everybody else's and makes the campaign more complex."
Sanford requested the luncheon meeting Monday, Ingram said, declining to say how he would respond if asked to support Sanford and bypass the race.
"Terry has made a point of talking to all the potential candidates," Poole said. "I'm not sure John is running, but I've heard he is."
Ingram declined to reveal his plans, saying only that he would issue a statement "at the appropriate time." The deadline for filing to enter the May primary is noon Monday.
He defeated Luther Hodges Jr. to win the 1978 Democratic Senate nomination but lost to Republican Sen. Jesse Helms in the general election. Ingram finished sixth in the race for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in 1984.
Meanwhile, two more Democrats announced plans to seek the seat held by Republican Sen. John East, who is not seeking re-election because of illness.

Scientists Study Weather On Coast

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Scientists say they are awaiting a "grand finale" of a winter storm that will help them determine how East Coast blizzards develop off the coast of North Carolina and how to forecast them better.
"What we're looking for to study now is one especially critical (low pressure system) that causes snow storms in major metropolitan areas like Washington and New York," said Greg Forbes, a forecaster for GALE — the Genesis of Atlantic Lows Experiment. "We're looking for a grand finale."
The \$10 million study has brought scientists from several universities to North Carolina and South Carolina to watch the storms develop and move up the coast from Jan. 15 to March 15, said Forbes, an associate professor of meteorology at Penn State University.
Speaking in a telephone interview from the National Weather Service station in Raleigh, where much of the data is collected, Forbes said the experiment is the most thorough ever for studying the formation of winter storms. Other major experiments have studied the birth of hurricanes and thunderstorms, he said.
More than 200 people are involved, including volunteers who send up weather balloons from a dozen sites around North Carolina and South Carolina, he said. Normally, balloons are sent up twice a day from Greensboro, Cape Hatteras and Charleston, S.C., but the experiment has called for balloons to go up as often as every hour and a half from other sites during some periods.
"They track them to find the temperature, the humidity, the pressure at various elevations and the locations of the balloons that enable us to measure the winds," said Forbes. "It's designed to give us

a full three-dimensional picture of the atmosphere on a much finer scale than has ever been seen before. We think we need that to understand how these winter storms behave."
GALE also has about 50 automatic surface stations to measure weather conditions between the permanent weather stations at airports. It has two ships and 10 airplanes to gather data as well.

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Drumming Is Way Of Life For East Carolina Student

He walks out of the East Carolina University student radio station, relieved that his weekly talk show is finished — this time, 30 minutes of interviewing television star Larry Linville of M*A*S*H fame.

A communications major by day and a disc jockey by night, he plays non-commercial music within the 7-mile radius of the campus radio station WZMB-FM. He also does something else that many male students would not think of doing.

He wears a skirt every weekend for three months of the year. Well, it's not actually a skirt but a kilt.

Jeff Chester, 20, of Morganton plays tenor drums for The Grandfather Mountain Highlanders band with 25 others from across three states. Drumming is no longer a

hobby to Chester, but a way of life. During the second week in July, a large gathering of Scottish descendants meet at Grandfather Mountain.

Chester's interest in the Highland Games began during his junior high school's "Dress Up Day." One of his friends came to school dressed in a tartan and carrying bagpipes, and Chester became interested in the music of his own Scottish heritage. Soon after, he learned to play the bagpipes but found another interest instead — drumming. His new hobby led him to join the band's drum corps.

"The drums were much more rhythmic than the pipes," Chester said. And from that day on, he and the corps played in competitions along the east coast. Their most recent accomplishment was winning a

best band award on the east coast over the holidays. Other triumphs include winning a pipe-band championship in Atlanta competition for two consecutive years.

The 25-member band is not playing at any games now, but Chester said the practicing never stops. "We may not get together every weekend and play, but I might write something and record it and send it to another member. They might do the same. It helps us to get better all the time. We also work, when we can, to help pay for our expenses."

The drum corps writes many tunes, Chester said, adding that the band's style is often used by other bands. "We notice other bands picking up our music at the competitions, and that's really important when it comes to setting standards," he said. "It's also good because it forces us to write new music; we'll never stagnate."

Ironically, the Scottish tradition of playing bagpipes is stronger in the United States and Canada than in Scotland. Chester said when he and a friend went to Scotland last summer, natives told them that the younger population was not interested in playing like they used to. "It used to be that the younger generation wanted to get involved with playing the pipes — sort of like Americans wanting to play little league baseball. But that's not the case now and I believe it's going to take a lot of work to get the young people involved in the music again."

More than 29,000 people attended last year's Highland Games at Grandfather Mountain, which Chester said is one of the largest events in America and the second largest in the world.

Chester said that besides playing in the band, he also teaches the drums to interested young people and he said he thinks he will be able to set standards for the newer players. "Teaching is a joy and an obligation," he said. "I feel I have to teach because someone cared enough to show me how to play the drums — and pipes, too. Hopefully, through teaching, I can set standards for drumming in the games."

Competition among the bands tends to be fierce, he said. Judges

rank each band and individual and then "grades" them in a 4,3,2,1 and open category. "Open" is the best, and Chester said third is good. There are no open bands in America and mostly "1" bands in Canada.

He also said he is working to become a judge — a very high honor to attain. The Eastern United States Pipeband Association is the parent organization and ruling body of Scottish games along the east coast and the group determines rules and membership criteria. Chester said he

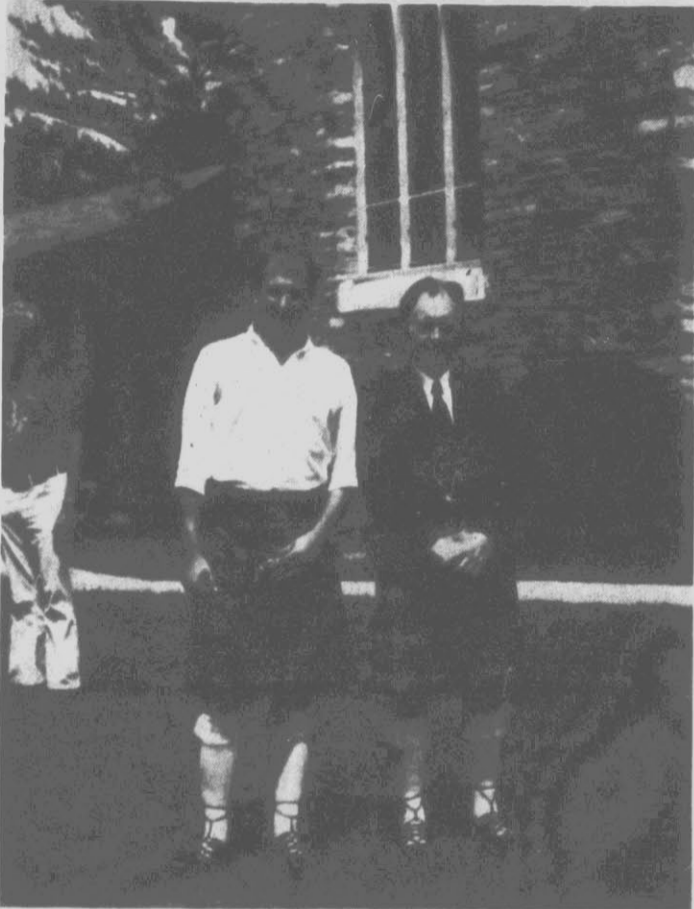
feels that becoming a judge will allow for reforms for tenor drummers.

The cost of outfitting each drum corps member is about \$3,000, Chester said, most of which comes from band sponsors. Each member's drum weighs about 10 pounds. Bagpipes, on the other hand, weigh about two pounds.

Despite the drawbacks of driving to the games every weekend, and having to wear a kilt — which Chester said can get very warm dur-

ing the summer months — each band member continues to work for the improvement and preservation of their Scottish heritage through music. The band plans to travel to Scotland this summer to compete in a games, and again, through the closeness of the band members, this part of Scottish heritage may be preserved.

Bears' Dominance Mars Bid For Record

NEW YORK (AP) — Millions of viewers tuned in to Super Bowl XX partly because the Chicago Bears were so good, but by the second half, some started to leave the broadcast because the Bears were too good.

Network researchers said that NBC's Super Bowl appeared headed for a record rating, but the Bears' domination caused some viewers to tune out, leaving the match-up the third highest-rated football game ever.

With a rating of 48.3, Chicago's 46-10 rout of the New England Patriots on Sunday ranked just behind the 49.1 rating achieved by San Francisco-Cincinnati in the 1982 Super Bowl and the 48.6 of Washington-Miami in 1983.

The huge ratings for the game and the post-game show Sunday night enabled NBC to easily win the week and pad its prime-time season margin over CBS, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

For the week of Jan. 20 to Super Sunday, NBC had eight of the Top 10 shows and averaged a 21.2 rating to CBS' 16.0 and ABC's 14.4.

NBC's post-game coverage had a 35.4 rating, which was big enough to nose out the usual leader, NBC's "The Cosby Show," for second. "Cosby" had a 33.6 rating. Next

came NBC's "Family Ties," ABC's "Dynasty," in fifth after several weeks out of the Top 10, NBC's "Miami Vice," NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "The Last Precinct," NBC's "Golden Girls" and CBS' "Murder, She Wrote."

The 18th week of the 30-week prime-time season raised NBC's leadership by three-tenths of a point, giving the network a 17.9 to CBS' 16.9 and ABC's 14.4.

For CBS to overtake NBC, CBS would have to beat NBC by an average of 1.5 points a week, and "that's unlikely," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

Because the country has more homes with televisions today than ever, Super Bowl XX's rating translates into a record for most households. Nielsen said 41.5 million homes watched part of the game, and NBC projected that out to 120 million viewers, which would also be a Super Bowl record. Only the final episode of "M-A-S-H" had more total viewers, NBC said.

The 48.3 rating places Super Bowl XX sixth in rating among the alltime most popular TV shows. A rating measure the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television. The 3-hour, 51-minute game broadcast had a 70 share of audience that had its sets on during the time period.

NBC Sports President Arthur Watson had hoped for the first 50 rating, and Super Bowl XX, boosted by celebrity William "The Refrigerator" Perry, the powerful Bears and a 63.2 rating in the city of Chicago, appeared headed for that status.

At 6 p.m. EST, 40 minutes into the game, the Super Bowl had a 49.8 rating. But, instead of building viewers as often happens in tight games, it fell to a 47 rating at 8 o'clock.

"Had the game remained competitive and had it sustained that rating, it clearly would have been the highest-rated Super Bowl," said Dave Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research.

Jaffe said the game was on target for a potential 50 rating.

"We're very pleased that the numbers held up, considering the score, and it wasn't even as close as the score indicated," Jaffe said. "Again, we see the tremendous draw of the Super Bowl. It's not so much a game as a national event."

NBC's debut of "The Last Precinct," a cop-show farce given the enviable position of following the Super Bowl, ranked eighth among 67 shows. NBC had promoted the program at least eight times during the 61-2 hours of pre-game, Super Bowl

Private Rites Scheduled For Actress Lilli Palmer

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress-author Lilli Palmer, who appeared in more than 50 movies or stage productions, including "The Counterfeit Traitor," "The Boys from Brazil" and Alfred Hitchcock's "Secret Agent," has died. She was 71.

Miss Palmer died Monday, said Forest Lawn spokesman Dick Fisher. The funeral will be private.

The cause of death was not released, but Victor Ross, Miss Palmer's brother-in-law, said he believed the actress suffered a heart attack.

She was hospitalized with cancer at Cedar-Sinai Medical Center from Jan. 3 until Thursday, when she was released, hospital spokesman Ron Wise said.

"Lilli was a gracious, lovely lady, a pleasure and a delight to work with, a trouper in every sense of that word," said Marvin J. Chomsky, producer and co-director of Miss Palmer's final television movie, "Peter the

Great."
"She held up under the extreme Russian cold and the rigors of shooting in the Soviet Union," he said.

The eight-hour NBC-TV miniseries, in which Miss Palmer plays Natalya, mother of Czar Peter the Great of Russia, will be broadcast Sunday through Wednesday.

Miss Palmer appeared in more than 50 movies or stage productions with stars like Rex Harrison, whom she once married, Fred Astaire, William Holden and Clark Gable. But she is perhaps best known in the United States for her appearances in Hitchcock's "Secret Agent" in 1936, "The Four Poster" in 1952, "The Counterfeit Traitor" in 1962 and "The Boys from Brazil" in 1978.

She and Harrison were also part of "Bell, Book and Candle," considered the biggest hit of the 1950 Broadway season.

Born in Posen, Germany, to a surgeon and an Austrian actress, Miss Palmer attended the Ilka Gurening dramatic school before her 1932 stage debut in Berlin at age 18.

After the Nazi takeover, she fled to Paris, where she changed her name from Maria Lilli Peiser and appeared in an operetta at the Moulin Rouge.

She made her screen debut in London in 1935. Her British films included "Secret Agent," "The Man with 1,000 Faces," "A Girl Must Live," "Thunder Rock," "The Gentle Sex," "English Without Tears," "Rake's Progress" and "Beware of Pity."

She was touring England when she met Harrison in November 1939. She was reportedly angry at him because his play was hurting hers at the box office.

Their relationship blossomed during World War II, and he proposed to

her by telephone from London to a Nottingham theater.

She is said to have replied, "Yes, but let me finish the play first."

The two were married in January 1943, and in 1944 had a son, Carey.

They were divorced in 1957, and Miss Palmer married Carlos Thompson, a writer and actor from Argentina, that year.

In addition to her autobiography, "Change Lobsters and Dance," Miss Palmer has written at least five novels, some of which were best sellers.

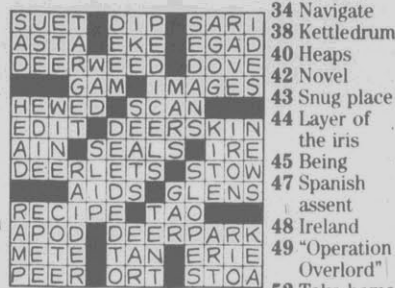

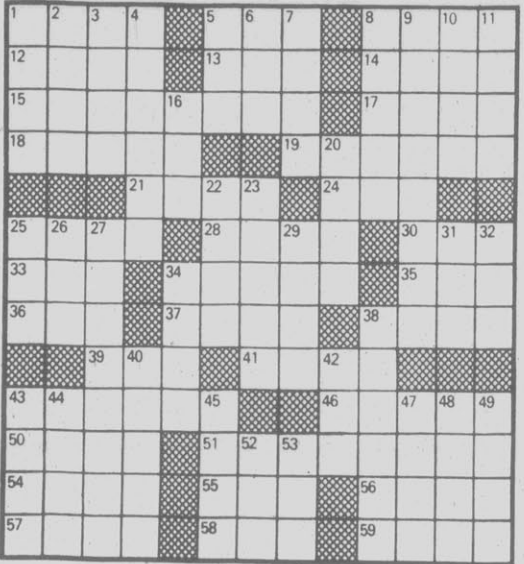

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AMC Rolls Out Last CJ Jeep Model

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — The end of the legendary Jeep after 46 years of production will cost at least 1,000 jobs here and has drawn bitter reactions from workers.

American Motors Corp. on Tuesday rolled out the last little Jeep CJ, the direct descendant of the rugged hero vehicle of World War II.

Workers watching the event booed AMC management and drowned out a scattering of applause.

They shouted "Jeep! Jeep!" "Toledo! Toledo!" and "It was born here!"

Worker Robert Nadonly, 46, placed a hand-lettered "Keep the Jeep" sign on the final vehicle and said the decision to kill it was a mistake.

"It's a money-maker, man," Nadonly said.

"Everybody's sad," Robert Brighton, 31, of Temperance, Mich., said of his fellow workers. "They think it's a mistake. They don't think they (AMC) have another vehicle in this class."

Even before the last Jeep was finished, workers were dismantling assembly equipment for shipment to Canada, where the replacement Jeep YJ will be built.

The YJ resembles the old Jeep but will be less spartan, with carpeting, plush seats and other car-like features.

It will have a softer ride, like the larger station wagon-type vehicles made here, the Jeep Cherokee and Wagoneer.

AMC spokesman Jerry Sloan said the YJ will be better suited for AMC's market. Many Jeep buyers aren't interested in rugged off-road use, he said, and others prefer small pickup trucks to Jeeps. AMC has built pickups for years and late last year began making a new line of compact pickups here.

The work force of 8600 will be cut by at least 1,000, Sloan said. The remaining workers will continue making the hot-selling Cherokees, Wagoneers, the Grand Wagoneer and pickups.

"I'm sorry for the young workers. They'll be out looking for jobs because of this," said Duane Betz, 58, a 38-year veteran of the Toledo plant.

"I think it stinks. This is what has kept this company alive," said Betz.

The first CJs were copies of the military Jeeps, minus wartime hardware like gun mounts. Over the years, the CJ got softer springs, bigger seats and stylish paint jobs. AMC's official view is that the YJ is a natural evolution.

Company sources said more than 100 lawsuits against AMC from CJ rollover accidents were still in court. From 1970 to the early 1980s, at least 187 cases were recorded by Fort Smith, Ark., lawyer E.C. Galbreath, who represented some plaintiffs. He cited 49 deaths, 24 instances of paraplegic or quadriplegic accidents and 100 other injuries.

The YJ, while having the same wheelbase as the CJ, is slightly wider. Production is scheduled to begin in spring.

Willys-Overland Co., the predecessor to AMC's Jeep Corp., produced more than 61 percent of the 587,649 World War II Jeeps. The remainder were made by Ford Motor Co. under license to Willys and had Willys engines, AMC said.

About 300,000 military Jeeps were produced after World War II, according to AMC estimates. The military began phasing out the Jeep in 1981 in favor of a larger truck-like vehicle called the HMMWV, or Hummer.

Civilian Jeep production has topped 1.58 million, AMC said, with 37,656 Jeep CJ sales in 1985, or 21 percent of all Jeep Corp. vehicles.

Jeep sold its AM General military division in 1983 to LTV Corp. of Dallas, which produces the Hummer. AM General also used to make the DJ, a stripped-down, two-wheel drive Jeep derivative for the U.S. Postal Service. LTV said the government has stopped ordering those.

Airman Arrested As Suspected Spy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Force and FBI agents arrested on espionage charges an enlisted man who worked as an administrative clerk with the Air Force unit that operates the nation's super-secret SR-71 spy planes.

The arrest of Airman 1st Class Bruce D. Ott occurred on Jan. 22 in Davis, Calif., but was not disclosed by the Air Force until Monday night.

A spokesman at Beale Air Force Base in northern California, where Ott was assigned, would say only that the 25-year-old Erie, Pa., man had been arrested "on suspicion of attempted unauthorized release of national defense information."

The spokesman, Capt. Joseph Saxton, refused to discuss any details of the case or say to which country Ott had attempted to pass information.

But a number of military and government sources who asked for anonymity said Ott had been singled out by federal investigators after making an attempt to pass secret information to the Soviet Union.

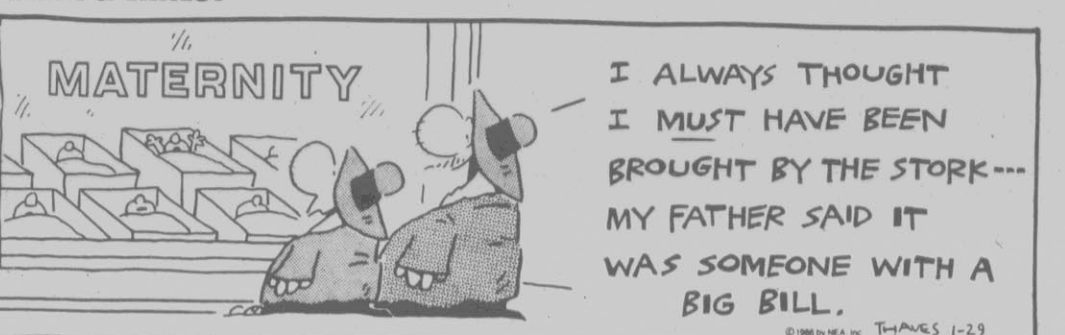

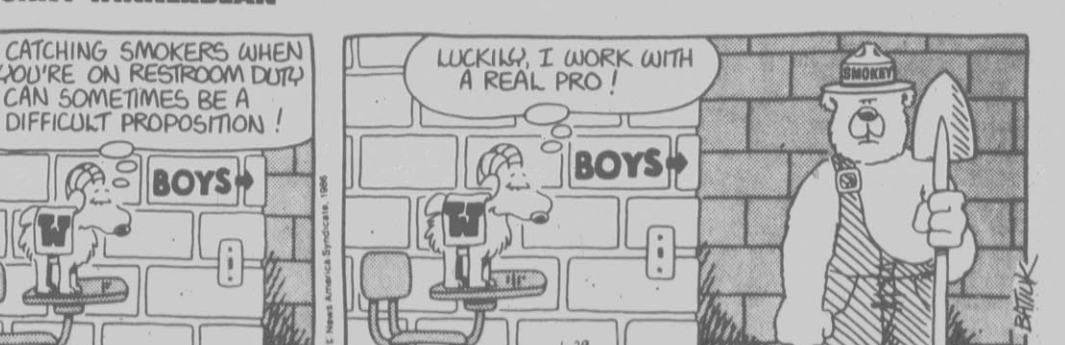

Rebel Takes Command In Uganda

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — Rebel commander Yoweri Museveni was sworn in as president of Uganda today, pledging to promote democracy and protect human rights in a country torn by 20 years of civil massacres and tribal fighting.

Museveni, a former defense minister whose five-year bush war led to the capture of Kampala last Saturday, took an oath of office from British-born Chief Justice Peter Allen to the cheers of thousands of onlookers.

"Nobody should think that what is happening today is a mere change of guard," Museveni told the crowd. "It is a fundamental change in the history of our country."

"Any group or person who threatens us should be smashed without mercy," he said. "The people of Uganda should die only of natural causes."

His priorities will be promoting democracy and protecting Ugandans against violations of human rights, he said.

Although there was no apparent legal justification for a formal inauguration, military ruler Gen. Tito Okello took a similar oath of office after he seized power in a coup last July 27.

An American diplomat in Nairobi said there will be no formal announcement from Washington recognizing Museveni as Uganda's new leader.

"We go through no formal mechanism of recognition," said the diplomat. "We feel that none is necessary because we recognize countries and not individual governments."

The ceremony was held outdoors on the steps of Parliament four days after Museveni's National Resistance Army chased soldiers of the 6-month-old military government out of Kampala.

Since then the rebels have pushed east to the Kenyan border and captured the town of Masindi in western Uganda, leaving only the north out of its control.

Northern Uganda is home to many of the retreating soldiers. Members of northern tribes predominate in the army, while most of the rebels are from the south.

Church workers and relief officials in the north told of looting and sabotage in radio reports Tuesday. Evacuations of foreigners were being planned.

Staff members of the World Lutheran Federation in the northwestern town of Pakwach said by radio: "The situation is deteriorating. We have plenty of people in the bush with guns. Looting has reached a high scale. Troops have been pouring in."

UNICEF workers in Pakwach said soldiers looted one of its vehicles. A Church of Uganda worker in the northeastern town of Moroto said soldiers sacked the compounds of the World Food Program and the International Labor Organization.

Reports earlier Tuesday said three leaders of the ousted military government had surrendered to Museveni's rebels. Guerrilla officers who spoke in Kampala on condition of anonymity identified the three as Lt. Gen. Zed Maruru, the army chief of staff; Brig. Fred Okecho, and Col. Samuel Nanyumba.

All served on the 12-member military council that ruled Uganda after last July's coup.

In his speech, Museveni emphasized the need for religious and tribal unity in a country which historically has been torn by internal conflicts. Using a deteriorating highway as an example, he said, "If that road is bad, it is bad for everyone."

"Every part of Uganda is useful," he said. "Every person in Uganda is useful."

Museveni, in his early 40s, has said he will pursue a non-aligned foreign policy and promote a mixed economy of state-run and private enterprises.

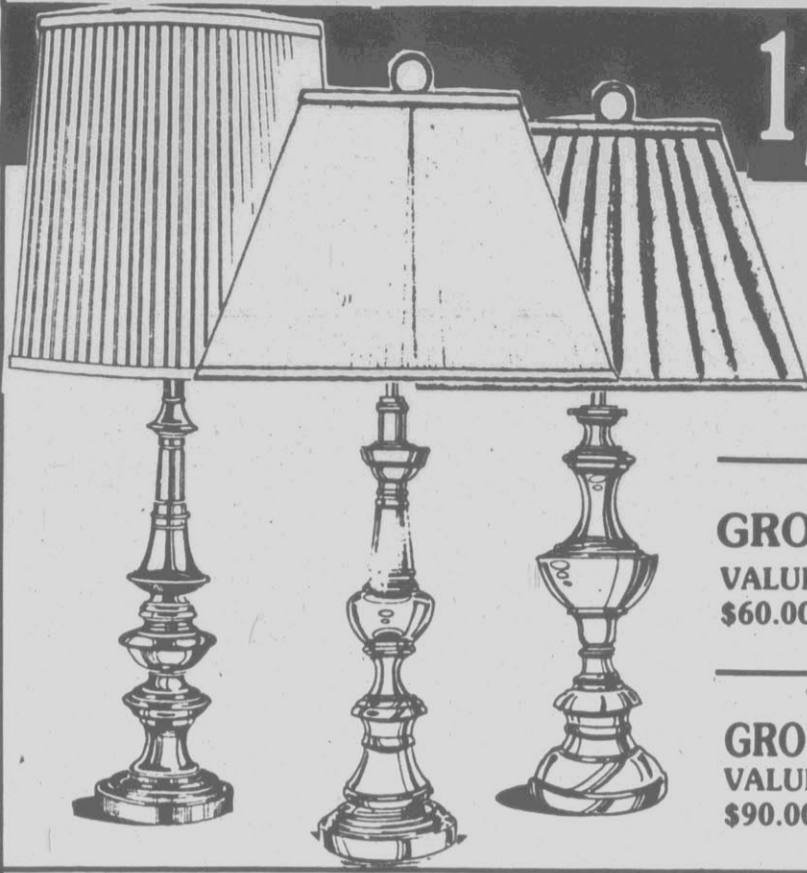
He has been credited by Western diplomats with creating a fighting force far better disciplined and organized than the routed government soldiers.

Kampala has been spared the widespread looting by soldiers that followed the coup last July that ended the 4½-year rule of civilian President Milton Obote.

The National Resistance Army and four smaller guerrilla groups began separate bush wars against the government in February 1981 following Obote's return to power in a December 1980 election that opponents said was rigged.

Museveni signed a peace agreement with the military government in December but then attacked, claiming the government could not control violence by its soldiers.

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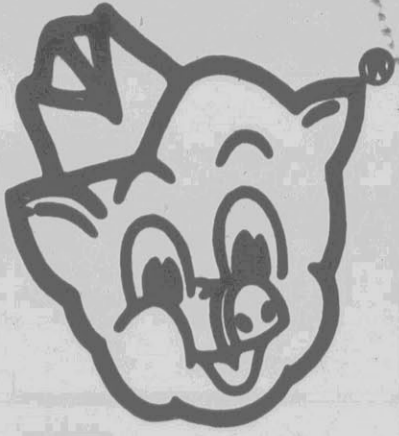

China Pigeons

PEKING (AP) — More than 1 million carrier pigeons are "crying piteously" for food in Shanghai because of a feed grain shortage, the official English-language China Daily reported.
 The paper said the pigeons, kept by 10,000 enthusiasts in China's largest industrial city, normally eat corn but supplies began running low in recent weeks. A black market in corn has developed to supply the pigeons with food, the paper reported.
 The government has banned pigeon-keeping except by members of the national Homing Pigeon Association, but many hobbyists continue keeping pigeons because they are much cheaper than larks and other more coveted species.





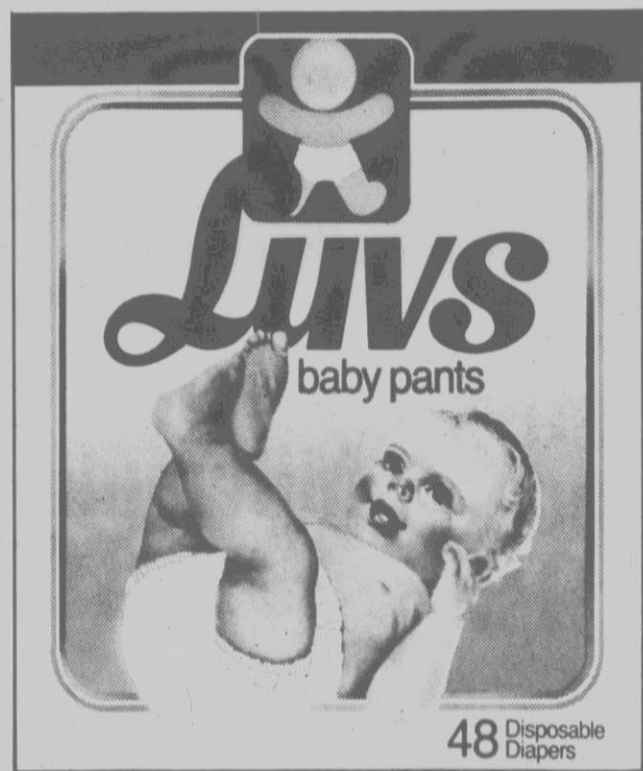

Study Shows Many Suffer Silent But Dangerous Heart Ailments

BOSTON (AP) — As many as 4 million Americans with no outward signs of heart disease endure frequent episodes of silent ischemia, a painless but dangerous condition that temporarily deprives the heart of blood, new research shows.

Studies conducted at a Boston hospital indicate that such modest mental exertion as carrying on a conversation can trigger these attacks, and the victims never know they are happening.

Ischemia occurs when the coronary arteries that feed the heart squeeze shut, starving the heart muscle of blood and oxygen. If this happens during exercise, the result may be the crushing chest pain known as angina.

But the new research found that three-quarters of the time, ischemia seems to be entirely painless.

"What we've come to know by looking at these patients out of hospital is that angina, the warning symptom of coronary disease, is a very gross underestimate of the ischemic disturbance that is going on in the heart muscle due to coronary narrowing," said Dr. Andrew P. Selwyn of Brigham and Women's Hospital.

Over time, he said, these recurring episodes can damage the heart or touch off a lethal heart attack.

Selwyn estimates that about 2 million Americans with angina also experience silent ischemia. But there are probably another 3 million or 4 million people with no angina or history of heart disease who have these episodes without knowing it.

Identifying and treating these people, he says, could save lives.

Selwyn, director of his hospital's cardiac catheterization lab, outlined his findings in an interview and at a conference sponsored by the American Heart Association last week in Sarasota, Fla.

The researchers observed the silent ischemia by hooking 300 people to portable electrocardiogram machines since 1977. The devices recorded their heart rhythms while they worked and went about their

daily lives.

The results show that 76 percent of all ischemia is painless. Ischemia accompanied by angina lasts one to three minutes, but silent ischemia may go on from four to 40 minutes.

More than three-quarters of ischemia is touched off by tasks that required mental arousal, such as interviews, conversations, driving, committee work or mathematics.

Selwyn said people who have one or

two angina attacks a week may also endure five or 10 bouts of silent ischemia each day.

Silent ischemia usually occurs among men, and it's most common among smokers and those with high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels, diabetes or a family history of heart disease. Selwyn estimates that about 5 percent of all men over age 45 who have two of these risk factors will also have silent ischemia.

"There is only one way in which coronary artery disease can damage the heart muscle, and that is by ischemia," Selwyn said. "When ischemia comes and goes over the years, it nibbles patches out of the myocardium (heart muscle) and can result in heart failure. If episodes of ischemia hit vital parts of the heart, or they just last too long, it can go on to complications like infarction (heart attack) and death."

Selwyn says the ischemia results

when hardening of the arteries is complicated by the body's production of hormones.

When people are put under mild stress, their bodies make adrenaline and other hormones that briefly tighten their arteries. In healthy people, this does no harm. But ischemia can occur when the arteries that feed the heart are already clogged with fatty deposits. Narrow blood vessels become even narrower.

In addition, research has shown that the fatty buildup interferes with the muscles in the artery walls that make them tighten and relax, so the arteries squeeze shut longer than they otherwise would.

Selwyn said the ischemia becomes more frequent just before a heart attack. He believes that people with this condition should be identified and treated with the same drugs that are given to angina victims.

No, we are not trying to push a new system; and no, South had not taken leave of her senses. This hand is from a team even in France which was won by the Omar Sharif squad. What had happened at the table was that South had opened one diamond out of turn. As a result, her call was cancelled and the bidding reverted to North, who was barred for the rest of the auction. So South bravely decided to try and salvage something from the mess and bid four hearts.

West would have liked to be able to get a look at dummy before committing himself to an opening lead. However, he had no ace, and he was reluctant to lead away from any of his honor cards; so he chose a club. Declarer made short work of the hand.

On the ace-king of clubs she discarded two diamonds from dummy. After cashing the ace of diamonds, she proceeded to cross-ruff the hand. A club was ruffed in dummy, a spade in the closed hand and a diamond on the table. Although East had a singleton diamond, he had no trump higher than the eight. So declarer was able to ruff two more spades in hand and two diamonds in dummy. She still had to make the king of trumps for a total of ten tricks—the three minor-suit winners and seven trumps on the cross-ruff.

Obviously, a trump lead would have defeated the contract one trick. In the other room, the contract was four spades. East led the queen of diamonds. Declarer won in dummy, took two diamond discards on the top clubs, came to hand with a club ruff and led the queen of trumps. West won and reverted to diamonds. Declarer ruffed low (ruffing high would not help). East overruffed and shifted to a heart. Then in with the ace of spades East returned another heart and declarer ended up losing three trump tricks and a heart-down one.

Army Officer Named 'Col. Fix' Smooths Way For Travelers

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — As a jet-lagged group of congressional VIPs leapfrogged across five Asian countries in nine days, the man who picked up the logistical pace was Col. Fix.

Lt. Col. Donald J. Fix, 41, was the official escort officer for the Department of Defense who traveled with the first Senate delegation to visit Vietnam since the end of the Indochina War.

The 26-member entourage, plus a 17-person Air Force crew, left

Washington, D.C., Jan. 13 aboard a C-135 military jetliner and returned Jan. 27 after stops in Hawaii, the Philippines, Thailand, Laos, Japan and Alaska.

For Fix, the trip meant juggling timetables, finding artificial sweetener for morning coffee, making sure legal documents were in order, haggling with the Vietnamese over the price of lunch, rousting tardy staff members out of bed in time for takeoff and avoiding a planeload of bruised political egos at journey's end.

Working with him on the "code" —

jargon for congressional delegation — trip was Lt. Col. Grayson F. Winterling. Fix and Winterling, 41, are staff officers in the Legislative Liaison office of the Secretary of the Army.

Both know how to give orders to sergeants and take orders from senators.

The two are 20-year Army veterans. Fix was a helicopter pilot and Winterling was with the 101st Airborne Division during the Vietnam War.

"We took about three weeks' worth of business and crammed it into a

week's worth of time," Fix said. "I made sure we arrived in a country in time for meetings, had the right number of seats on the plane, saw that there was transportation when we landed, and found out the dress code for the ambassador's dinner."

It was business suit and tie.

The delegation split up in Bangkok and Sens. Frank Murkowski, R-Alaska, and Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., and Reps. Bob McEwen, R-Ohio, and Michael Bilirakis, R-Florida, traveled to Hanoi with Fix. Winterling stayed behind in Thailand looking after congressional wives

and staffers who didn't get to Vietnam and Laos.

"Time is our most valuable commodity on these trips, and that's what we do for the congressmen — we save them time so they can spend more of it working instead of waiting around in airports and hotel lobbies and on buses.

"This is the best job I've ever had in the Army," said the former paratrooper, who's also served in Korea and Germany.

He said previous congressional trips during the past 4½ years have taken him around the world. One

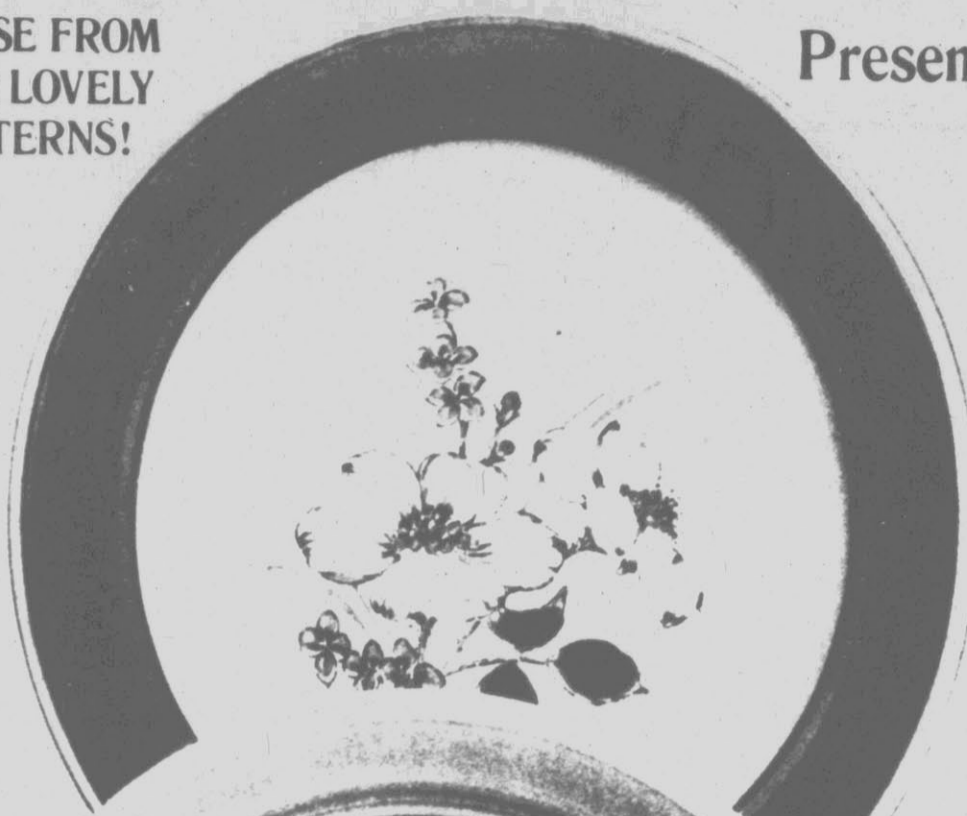
memorable journey led by Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, had him bouncing to 16 countries in 18 days.

Fix and Winterling got help from Lt. Col. Douglas M. Cummings, an Army doctor who did a brisk business in upset stomach remedies and sleeping pills for jet lag. Also helping were two Army sergeants, Edward Riddle and David L. Scarberry.

For nine days, Riddle and Scarberry hauled suitcases and bottled water and rode herd on a mounting pile of souvenir boxes from shopping trips.
