Philippine Voting Has President In A Bind

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is walking a tightrope between opposing sides in the Philippine presidential election, saying he is disturbed by reports of voting fraud and violence but mindful of U.S. strategic interest in maintaining its military bases on the islands.

In a written statement after hearing his observers report on the irregularities they had witnessed in the still-undecided race, Reagan said, "It is a disturbing fact that the election has been flawed by reports of fraud, which we take seriously, and by violence."

But he said, "We need to remind ourselves that this is a Philippine election, not an American election." And he told a news conference Tuesday night, "One can't minimize the importance" of U.S. Navy and Air Force bases on the Pacific islands.

"I don't know of any that's more important than the bases on the Philippines," Reagan told reporters in a nationally broadcast news conference.

He noted that his administration won't take sides in the bitterly contested race between incumbent President Ferdinand Marcos and challenger Corason Aquino.

"We're neutral, and we then hope to have the same relationship with the people of the Philippines that we've had all these years," Reagan said.

He suggested the fraud and violence could have been committed by both sides and said the observers he sent to monitor the election last week "didn't have any hard evidence beyond that general appearance" of wrongdoing.

The U.S. delegation and other observers accused the Marcos forces of vote-buying, intimidation and violence. And one of the U.S. observers, Sen. John F. Kerry, D-Mass., charged the White House "either totally ignored or dismissed out of hand" the observers' efforts to monitor the election.

"There is hard evidence of fraud in this election and the only question is whether or not the total resources of the U.S. government will be brought to bear in an attempt to reverse the trend that we and the American people have been witnessing in the election process in the Philippines," the senator said.

Reagan said he would send veteran diplomatic troubleshooter Philip Habib to Manila to "help nurture the hopes and possibilities of democracy."

White House officials have concluded privately that Marcos, who controls the National Assembly that will declare the winner, will emerge victorious. Efforts already are under way to persuade Mrs. Aquino not to take her campaign into the streets, as she has promised, and Reagan has pledged to try to nurture the "strong two-party system" he said emerged from the election campaign.

On other matters at the news conference, Reagan, when asked about the release earlier in the day of Soviet dissident Anatoly Shcharansky, said he "talked at great length about human rights" with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev at their summit last November.

Reagan said he thought there had been an increase in such emigrations since then, and added, "I hope that this is a beginning sign of what's going to take place."

GUC Load Management Program Netted Savings

The Greenville Utilities Commission's load management program produced a net saving of more than \$173,800 during the month of January.

A report to the board of commissioners Tuesday night showed the net billing reduction of \$173,826 included \$89,311 saved through the operation of load management switches on domestic water heaters, and \$80,784 through voltage adjustments during the time of Carolina Power & Light Company's monthly peak — between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m. on Jan. 28.

An additional \$2,726 was saved by the GUC water plant operating on its own emergency generators during the time of the peak, while \$1,005 was saved by Procter & Gamble Paper Products Co. using a generator at the company's plant during the time of the CP&L peak.

The utilities has, for several months, operated a pilot load reduction program at the water plant by

operating emergency generators to shave system load demands during peak hours. In turn, the water plant has received credit for half the savings — in January \$1,363 — on its next month's bill.

Procter & Gamble, at its own request, was added to the pilot project in January, and will receive credit for half the \$1,005 savings on its February bill.

Customers with load management switches on water heaters and central air conditioning units receive up to \$10 credit on their bills during the summer months for participating in the program.

Commission members approved a plan to grant pro-rated benefits — sick leave, vacation leave and holiday pay — to part-time employees. The City of Greenville has a similar plan.

Under the utilities plan, part time employees working less than 20 hours a week would receive no benefits, while those working between 20 and 30 hours a week would receive

benefits at half the rate earned by full-time regular workers. Part-timers working 30 but less than 40 hours a week would receive benefits at three-fourths the rate of those working full-time. Temporary seasonal workers would receive no benefits under the plan.

The cost of providing benefits to part-time workers is estimated at between \$750 and \$1,000 a year. At present, there are five part-time positions. One of them would not qualify for benefits, while one position would qualify for three-quarter benefits. The other three would qualify for half-benefits.

In other business contracts were awarded to low bidders for: 15,000 feet of cable to Rigby Electric Supply Co. for \$15,090; 40,000 feet of cable to Eastern Electric Supply Inc. for \$17,160; 50 padmount transformers from National Transformer Sales for \$48,700; 100 conventional transformers from Scott-Parish Electric Supp-

New Vet Center Is Dedicated

Local officials, area veterans, and members of the Veteran's Administration gathered Tuesday at the Greenville Vet Center for the dedication and grand opening of the building, which will serve the 30,000 veterans in eastern North Carolina.

Harold McMillion, team leader of the center, conducted the ceremonies attended by about 80 people.

"As you can see, we are in full operation here," McMillion said. "And we're very proud of our facilities."

The center, which opened a few weeks ago, is designed to help Vietnam veterans in readjustment counseling.

The Vet Center Program was established by Congress in 1979 to acknowledge a need for counseling services for Vietnam veterans and

their families.

Although the Vet Center's primary mission is to serve Vietnam Veterans, other veterans are eligible for services.

Rep. Walter B. Jones, D-N.C., said the Vet Center represents a calling for the needs of the veterans.

"This is a most auspicious and important occasion in the lives of these veterans," Jones said. "The Vietnam veterans are the forgotten men of past conflicts."

Alfred E. Miller, Jr., assistant director of the North Carolina Division of Veteran's Affairs, applauded the efforts of the 192 vet centers across the country.

"The centers provide a much needed service," Miller said. "They are unique, unduplicated and worthwhile."

Other veteran group officials were

represented in support of the new facility.

"The program has come a long, long way from the storefront operations which were successful in bringing the veterans the help they needed," said Al Carr, Veteran's Administration Region II director. "This is marked by the professionalism of the staffs and the facilities that are reflective of our commitment to the veterans."

"It shows we're improving the services to the Vietnam era veterans who served their country so well," he said.

"This facility has been a long time coming," said Husher Harris, regional manager of the Region II Readjustment Counseling Services.

Harris said it is important for the people of Greenville to make the most of the center.

"Anyone who knows a veteran is asked to encourage them to visit the facility," he said. "We have been very well-received in Greenville."

Greenville Mayor Leslie Garner also welcomed the new facility.

"We are very excited about having the center here, and the City of Greenville will make all veterans from surrounding area welcome, Garner said. "It is our ambition to help all those who come here in need of help."

The Vet Center staff is available for crisis intervention, community in-service training on post-traumatic stress disorders and issues pertaining to the veterans' military experiences.

The Greenville Vet Center is the fourth in North Carolina. The other three are located in Fayetteville, Charlotte and Greensboro.

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Pat's Pointers

Brighten your winter days by knitting this easy cotton vest with this '86 look — deep armholes and neckline, and a loose, easy fit. The deep armholes are designed to wear comfortably over the ne' big-sleeve blouses.

You achieve the fashionable Intarsia design on this sweater by working the simple duplicate stitch after the knitting is finished. The Intarsia Cruise Topper is made from 100 percent cotton in knitting worsted weight with a gauge of four stitches per inch. Directions are for small (38), medium (40), large (42) and extra-large (44). The figures in parentheses refer to finished measurements (in inches) at the bustline.

True "Intarsia" is a technique most often found in extremely expensive Scottish cashmeres. Intarsia sweaters are knit in separate parts in geometric motifs, usually diamonds or triangles. Each color section is knit in such a way that the edges will fit perfectly to another color section. These pieces are then woven together so they appear to have been knit into the design.

Leave it to good old Yankee ingenuity, though, to come up with a much simpler and equally effective way to achieve the same look. By using the duplicate stitch, even a rank beginner can knit Intarsia-type designs with the greatest of ease. I discussed the duplicate stitch at length in my column a couple weeks ago, but in case you missed that column or failed to clip and save the instructions, the leaflet for the Intarsia Topper featured today has full, easy-to-follow directions for doing this stitch.

Dear Pat. Could you explain the "SSK" decrease so a beginning knitter could do it? — Frances M., Wheaton, Ill.

Perhaps before explaining the method, it would be useful to tell you why you need to know more than one decrease method. While increases usually have very little slant, most decreases slant either right or left. Whenever pairs of decreases are used, as either side of a skirt dart or at either side of a raglan line, the correct slant is very important. For example, when working on any section of a raglan sleeve garment, the decreases at the right edge should

slant from right to left and those at the left edge should slant in the opposite direction.

For the most commonly used decrease, you simply knit two stitches together. This is fine for the left edge as it slants from left to right. Most often for the right edge, you will be instructed to work as follows: Slip 1 stitch, knit 1 stitch, pass the slip stitch over the knit stitch (abbreviated as PSSO), or you might be told to SSK. Either of these last two slant from right to left.

To work the SSK, slip 2 stitches, one at a time, from the left to the right needle. It is important that you slip them knitwise; that is, insert the right needle tip into the first stitch on the left needle as if you were going to knit that stitch, but slip it to the right needle instead. Do the same with the second stitch.

Then, insert the tip of the left needle into the front of these two slipped stitches. You will notice that your needles are now in the proper knitting position and, at this point, you knit the two stitches together.

Stephanie Roselle, designer of the Intarsia Cruise Topper, uses another technique to make life easier — and happier — for most knitters. Ribbings that have to be decreased at either side of a V-neck often are troublesome for the average knitter. So place of this, Stephanie uses the new-look overlap.

The overlap is worked back and forth instead of in rounds, and, with no decreasing, it is a snap to do. Again, directions are included on today's leaflet, so I won't repeat them here. "Try it — you'll like it!"

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Toys Talk And Transform At Toy Fair

NEW YORK (AP) — If toy manufacturers have their way, it's going to be a very noisy Christmas. Toys that sit silently on the shelves are out. This year, they moo, giggle, jabber, scream and talk back.

"The hottest area of toys in 1986 will be in electronics; the marriage of traditional toys with state-of-the-art semiconductor technology," said Paul Valentine, toy industry analyst for Standard & Poor's.

He's not the only one excited by talking toys. Manufacturers displaying their wares at the Toy Fair are dreaming of a green Christmas.

The industry's largest trade show opened Monday with more than 950 manufacturers introducing 3,000 new products. For the next 10 days, 14,000 buyers trying to predict next year's craze will put in their orders.

Valentine predicts a 10 percent to 15 percent growth for '86 in the \$12 billion toy industry, largely from the revolution in electronics.

Not only are the newest toys talking, even an old stand-by like Etch-A-Sketch has gone high-tech. The Ohio Art Company is introducing a new version that can store and animate the pictures children draw on the portable screen.

To prevent kids from getting bored — and to build on the success of Transformers action figures — manufacturers are making toys that more than meet the eye. For girls, Lewis Galoob Toys Inc. introduces

Purse Pals, handbags that turn into cuddly pets, and Sweet Secrets, radios, watches and clocks that really work but also turn into tiny gymnasiums, beauty salons and dolls.

Tonka's new Rock Lords look like boulders, but with a few twists they turn into good guy and bad guy action figures.

Thousands of children are likely to get the gift of gab this year. Teddy Ruxpin gave birth to the electronic plush category when he took the stores by storm last Christmas with a mouth and nose that moved in sync when he talked.

"This year, everyone's competing with Teddy Ruxpin and some are outdoing it," said Rick Anguilla, editor of Toy and Hobby World.

Animal Toys Inc. has a line of six barnyard animals that start to moo, oink, baah, bark and squeak with the sound of a clap.

Jibber Jabber, the \$30 stuffed monkey from Galoob responds to light, motion and sound. Dim the lights and his eyes light up; swing him by the tail and he screams; talk to him and he jabbars back.

For children tired of simply talking to their toys, now there's Galoob's SmartyBear at about \$120. The voice-activated bear comes with interactive video tapes and decoder. Just plug the tape into a VCR, attach SmartyBear to its Smart Box, and it talks along with an animated counterpart on the tape. Unplug it and it'll answer any question you ask with hundreds of random responses.

"Need an answer," it asks, anxious to show off.

The developers claim these toys use simple microchips and won't have the mechanical problems that stymied Teddy Ruxpin because of faulty tape recorders. But Valentine says, "We've yet to see whether they can withstand the abuse of children."

Some children still like toys without microchips, and their parents are bound to like the smaller pricetags. Youngsters can cuddle up with a newborn Pound Puppy, which costs \$6.99. And for those who love cats, Pound Pur-r-ries, the feline version of the popular mutt debuts for less than \$20.

The Cabbage Patch phenomenon continues with Coleco's latest: Cabbage Patch astronauts, circus char-

acters and kids with combable hair. Furskins, the country bears from Moody Hollow, go mass market this year.

The classic toys most parents remember are still around — fairy tale books, plush pets that don't do anything but look cute and educational toys. But at Toy Fair, as well as on Christmas morning, it's often the glitz, gimmicks and gab that get the raves.

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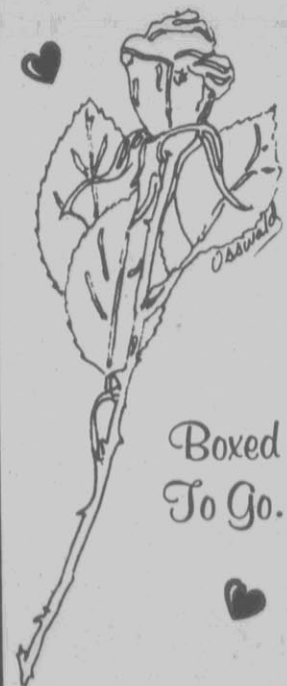

No Repeal

Seventeen states and the District of Columbia now have mandatory seat belt laws and in a number of them opponents are working for repeal. The "mandatory" aspect galls them; they object to what they call government interference.

They're dead wrong. The automobile is something Americans find difficult to live without as well as difficult to live with. Our cars have been equipped with seat belts for a number of years. The public has been advised those belts do save lives and they really do reduce the number of severely injured people.

Even with the mandatory seat belt law in North Carolina it is surprising to see how many motorists ignore the simple precaution. Too many times we read accounts of a traffic fatality that include an observation the victim was not buckled up.

We sometimes wonder how many people would not be alive today if immunization against varied childhood diseases had not been required. Some of those assailing the seat-belt law might not be around if vaccinations and other "shots" were not mandatory.

The indignant would-be repealers of seat belt laws are not doing themselves or their neighbors any favor.

It was established years ago that driving a motor vehicle was not a right, but a privilege. We have laws that establish who can and who cannot drive; other laws that spell out how they will drive, and even a law that bars unsafe vehicles from the roads.

Legislators would be well advised to give little weight to repeal petitions. Their arguments carry less weight than the paper they're written on.

Bad Timing

The Federal Aviation Administration is one of those agencies facing budget cuts at a time when its ability to function satisfactorily is the key to safer air travel.

Inspections of air carriers are part of the FAA's responsibilities. The number of aircraft being put into service is growing; capabilities of the FAA are not growing to meet the resulting need.

A House subcommittee has been told the agency is ill-equipped to oversee closer inspections of charter airline craft ... a measure being considered in the wake of a December crash by a troop-ferrying flight that killed 248 members of the Army's 101st Airborne Division on their way home from the Mideast.

Charter flights remain an option of choice for moving military personnel, but safety questions are high in the minds of all. There are alternatives.

For instance, military inspectors might check out aircraft of charter lines in movement of armed forces people.

Troops might be transported via regular military aircraft; or, they could be flown by Air National Guard and Reserve planes. Either way would be valuable training duty for the flight crews and a way of keeping their aircraft in a state of readiness.

Still, the need for reliable FAA inspection of civilian airplanes is a necessity for the bulk of America's public that depends on them. Air travel could be a dangerous way to go if the FAA cannot fulfill its job.

To the editor: "Hard choices" is the altruistic label the administration gives its budget. "Bad choices" is the kindest label that seems accurate.

Expenditures for human capital are cut. And social capital already accumulated is put on the block to lower the rate of increasing debt.

But reducing the deficit seems to have low priority. The contras are losing in Nicaragua? "Hard choices" budgeting would find millions for them. The arms race is loading a wealthy nation with debt and forcing otherwise comfortable nations to live like poor ones. Let's stop building this suicidal nuclear stuff while he has the inclination and power to cooperate. In this case, what's good for Soviets is good for Americans.

GOP List Of Candidates Falls Short

RALEIGH — The state Republican Party increased significantly the number of state House seats it will contest in the 1986 election, as compared to the number it contested in 1984. But the GOP still left enough seats open to virtually assure that the Democrats will continue to control both the state House and Senate in the 1987 General Assembly.

According to unofficial listings of candidates tabulated by the principal clerks of the respective houses, the GOP will not contest 31 of the 120 House seats and 11 of the 50 Senate

seats. The Democrats, on the other hand, are conceding only three House seats and two Senate seats to the minority party.

The GOP is contesting several more Senate seats than in 1984. In the House, the GOP is contesting about two dozen more seats than in 1984.

Possibly the most embarrassing failure for the Republicans was the party's failure to find a candidate in the two-member 52nd district. There, the two Democratic incumbents have no opposition either in their primary or general election. One is House

Speaker Liston Ramsey. Republican Party officials, including Gov. Jim Martin and chairman Bob Bradshaw, had boasted in 1985 that they planned to run a strong candidate against Ramsey.

The Democrats lost 15 House and six Senate seats in 1984. Several of the deposed Democrats are running to win back their seats.

Mary Jarrel of High Point, Bob Slaughter of Albemarle, Jim Black of Charlotte, Sam Beam of Cherryville, R.J. Childress of Winston-Salem, and Gus Economos and Louise Brennan.

both of Charlotte, are all Democrats trying to win back lost House seats.

In addition, Jeanne Fenner of Greensboro, both Democrats who lost House seats in 1984, are trying for Senate seats. Craig Lawing of Charlotte, who was Senate president pro tem, is trying to take back the seat he lost to Sen. Jim McDuffie in 1984.

Only three sitting House members are trying to move over the Senate. That's a smaller than usual number. They are Reps. Ray Sparrow, D-Wake, J.F. Richardson, D-Mecklenburg, and Austin Allran, R-Catawba.

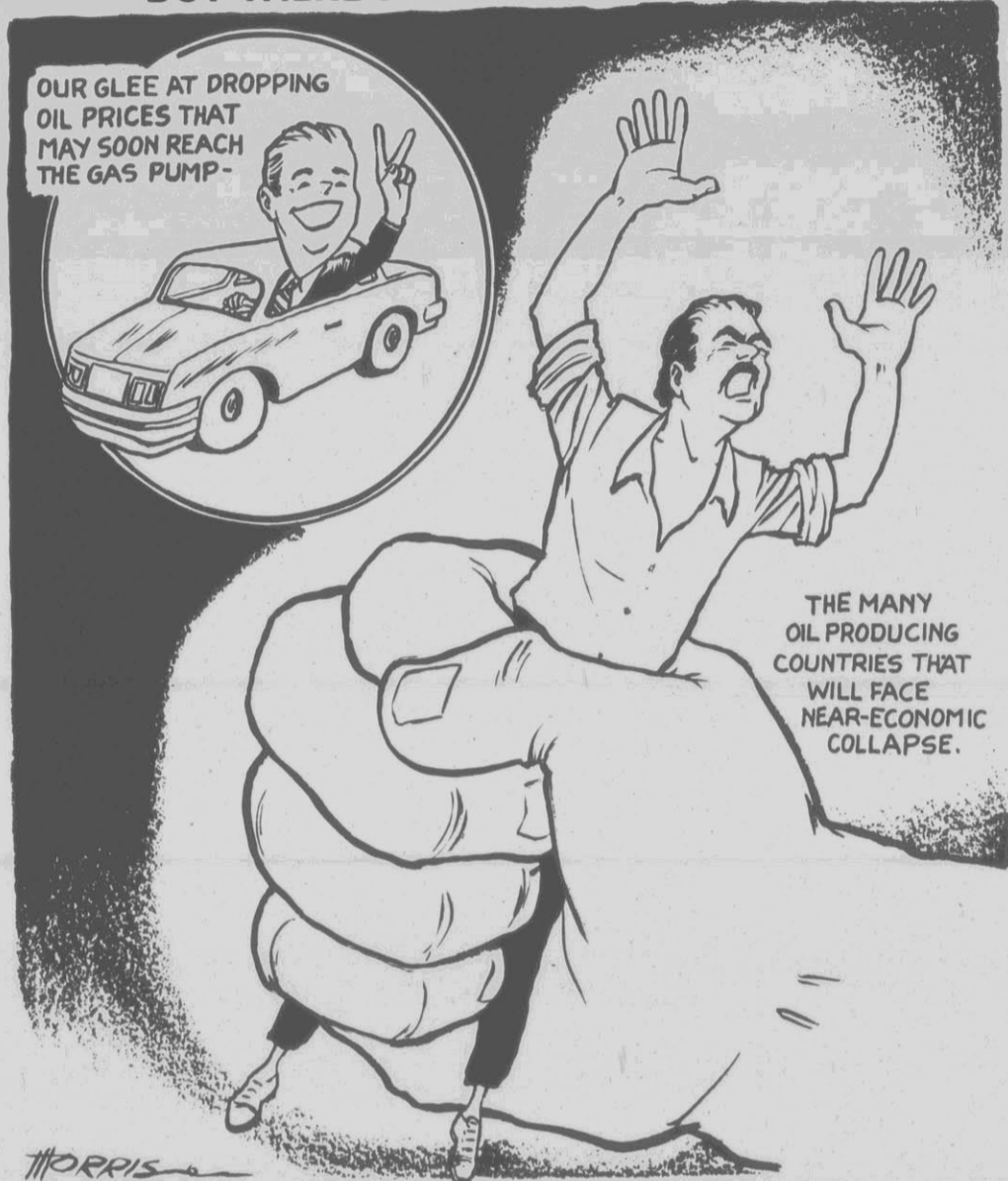
The Senate roster finds some other interesting political characters. Dallas Tucker, who served on the Senate sergeant-at-arms staff in 1985, is running for the Senate this year from Wake County. So is former state personnel chief Harold Webb. Frank Jordan, who surprised everyone by leading the ticket in the 1984 Republican primary for lieutenant governor, is running from Richmond County. George Marion, who was the flashiest dressing senator for years, is trying to win back the Surry County seat he lost in the 1984 Democratic primary.

Then there is Cary Allred who voluntarily left the Senate in 1984 to run for the Alamance County Board of Commissioners. He knew he couldn't beat John Jordan that year. But Jordan had to resign after he was convicted of a fraud charge. Now Allred is willing to give up his commissioners' post to run for the Senate again.

In House races, there are several interesting Democratic candidates. Ed Bowen of Harrells is trying to take back a seat he lost after his name was misspelled on Democratic primary ballots in 1984. George Breece, twice a candidate for secretary of state, and Joe Raynor, a former state senator, are both running for House seats from Cumberland County. Former N.C. Secretary of Cultural Resources Sara Hodgkins is running for a seat from Moore County.

An official list of candidates will be published this month by the Secretary of State's office.

Powers Of Delegation

WASHINGTON — Ed Meese had a rhetorical question: "What business do we have here in Washington, fixing a speed limit for the highways of Montana?" His answer, plainly, was "none at all."

The attorney general was absorbed with what he termed "one of the bedrock principles" of American government — the principle of federalism. He had just returned from a two-day conference on the age-old topic. His juices were flowing. He was talking in words and phrases that echoed the constitutional debates of 200 years ago.

The doctrine of federalism teaches

us, in the language of the 10th Amendment, that "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people."

The language tells us that unlike the states, in theory which are sovereign, the national government has no inherent powers. It has only those powers, vast as they are, that are delegated to it by the Constitution. The states, except where specifically prohibited, have all the rest. In the beginning, it was supposed that the national powers would be relatively few — the waging of war, the coinage of money, the regulation of interstate commerce, the granting of patents, and so on. It was a concept of great appeal to the states of 1787.

The doctrine of federalism reached its peak in the ratification debates of 1788. Since then it has been downhill all the way. In a series of decisions early in the 1800s, John Marshall knocked most of the props from under the commerce clause. The Civil War bloodily settled the notion of state sovereignty: If a state that voluntarily had entered the Union could not freely withdraw from that Union, what significant powers remained? The parts had become prisoners of the whole. In the century that followed Appomattox, the states steadily were reduced to mere administrative functionaries — impotent eunuchs in the federal harem.

Meese dreams of changing all that. In a recent speech to the Conservative Political Action Conference, he warned against reviving "some old-fashioned notion of states' rights."

"Rather," he said, "we must seek to generate a belief in states' responsibilities and confidence in the states' ability to govern. In the end, the objective is not simply less government overall, but less government at the national level. The happy result will be better government at the state and local levels, levels where the government is closer to the people. By being closer to the people, those governments are far more likely to be accountable and responsive to the people. And that is what popular government is all about."

Twenty years ago, during the reign of Lyndon Johnson, I would have thought it impossible to see a day when there would be "less government at the national level." The federal bureaucracy was extending its grasp in a dozen new directions.

Congress was imposing new formulas on civil rights and voting rights. The Supreme Court was rewriting old rules of state and local autonomy. The states and localities were told they could not fix even the retirement age of a game warden or the wages of a municipal bus driver, save in accordance with federal decrees.

I am not so pessimistic now. Two circumstances may have generated just the opportunity Meese is seeking. For one thing, the federal government is broke. To the demand of states for "revenue sharing," the answer today is that Congress has no revenue to share. Whether by scalpel or by meat-ax, federal deficits must be trimmed. The day of federal subsidies for sewerage, water plants, libraries, local symphonies, law enforcement, a hundred other desirable programs — that day is ending.

For a second factor, it becomes increasingly evident that the state governments, as a group, are governing more responsibly than the national government. The most interesting political activity these days is often not in the national capital, but in the state capitals. The tendency is to look at Congress with contempt, and to the statehouses — many of them, anyhow — with respect. The spirit of the 10th Amendment, enfeebled and impoverished, may not be dead after all.

"Pride goeth before destruction and a haughty spirit before a fall."

Like most great truths, this is partly correct and partly incorrect, for there is many a proud person who never has a great fall. Sometimes the haughty go through life, their heads thrown up, their chests stuck out, their conversation blatant, banal and bombastic. But frequently pride is masked. The deferential chap who often claims that he is nothing at all and his achievements beneath notice may be the biggest egotist in the community.

There are many things of which we should be proud — our family, our country, our religion and our truly valid achievement. But justified pride is one thing, and unjustified another. One is like mushrooms and the other is like toadstools — one wholesome and the other poisonous.

So be proud, but be sure your pride is beneficial to others.

Regarding this week's change of government in Haiti, the president said the only U.S. involvement in the downfall of President-for-Life Jean Claude Duvalier was in "providing an airplane" to fly him into exile in France.

He said Duvalier did not seek advice about his departure, and the United States offered none. U.S. officials have acknowledged, however, that they were involved in intensive consultations with Duvalier and the new regime to help smooth the way for a bloodless transfer of power.

Reagan sidestepped a question of whether the United States would resume aid to Haiti, suspended because of human rights abuses under the Duvalier regime.

"We hope we can be of help" in restoration of democracy under the new ruling junta, he said.

The president warmly praised Vice President George Bush, who is preparing a bid for the 1988 GOP presidential nomination, saying Bush has been "heart and soul in support of everything that we're trying to do, and I am convinced of his sincerity."

Insisting he had not decided what action to take on proposals within the administration for changes in affirmative action policy, Reagan said he is "trying to correct" a system that makes it easy for the bureaucracy to enforce racial quotas, rather than pursue specified numerical goals and timetables.

He also made a pitch for his 1987 budget, and took note of critics who say it is "DOA — dead on arrival." He said those critics only want a tax increase to reduce deficits — and said any such increase would be "VOA — vetoed on arrival."

Reagan ruled out any action by his administration to limit what has been called "merger mania" in the corporate world.

Asked if he plans to propose any limits on corporate mergers, which his questioner suggested are getting out of hand, Reagan said existing law "offers us all the protection we need. ... I don't believe that there's any threat or danger of monopoly control here in our land at all, and I don't think there will be."

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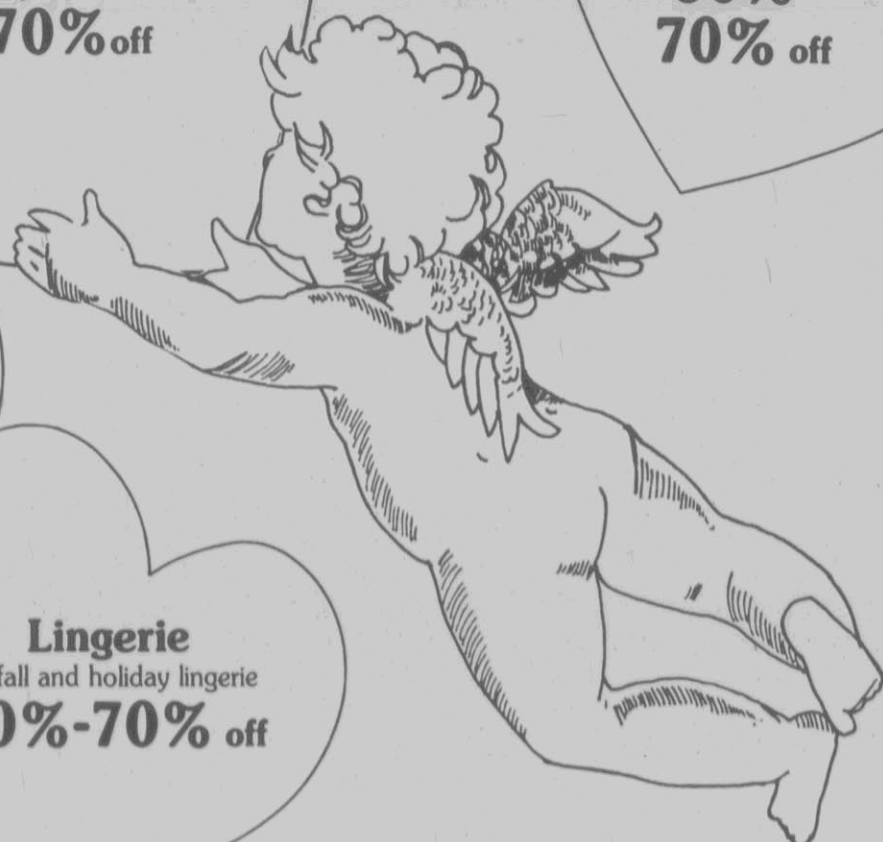
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President Claims Trade Protectionism Is The Top Threat To U.S. Agriculture

ST. LOUIS (AP) — President Reagan, campaigning for a Republican Senate hopeful, today decried trade protectionism as the No. 1 threat to agriculture and said import fees would raise prices for all Americans while inviting retaliation.

Rather than relying on import restraints, the president said, a healthier world market for American agricultural exports would provide the best answer to the farmers' woes.

Reagan, speaking at a fund-raiser for former Missouri Gov. Christopher Bond, also decried the "crowd of big spenders and big taxers" he said is waiting to reverse his administration's budgetary restraint.

As for farmers, Reagan told his audience that, when the double-digit inflation rates of the last decade came down, farmers "were left holding the bag. The bag was full of grain and the price of grain had gone down."

Now, he said, the most effective thing to help farmers get back on their feet would be to fight protectionist moves in Congress.

"Protectionist measures would only raise the prices of what farmers, and all of us, buy and would likely result in retaliatory trade barriers against our farm products overseas," Reagan said.

"Rather than erect trade barriers of our own," he went on, "let's go to work dismantling those obstacles in other countries. That way, everyone is better off."

In an apparent reference to the Democratic Senate hopeful, Lt. Gov. Harriett Woods, Reagan blamed "the liberal dream" for causing "our country's economic nightmare."

"This election will determine whether or not our country keeps moving forward with economic growth, expanding opportunity for all ... or slips back into the morass of tax, tax, spend, spend," Reagan said. "The bad old days of runaway inflation, economic decline and national despair are long gone, but the crowd of big spenders and big taxers who created that mess are still lurking in the wings."

The president, heading west for a three-day California vacation, stopped in St. Louis for the \$500-a-plate fund-raiser.

Bond, who served two terms as governor, announced Sunday he will seek the Republican nomination for the Senate seat held by Thomas Eagleton, who is retiring after three terms.

Reagan was to praise Bond as a man with a proven record of leadership, and one of the GOP's top candidates. Before his address, Reagan planned to meet major Bond backers at a \$5,000 per couple reception set up by the GOP state committee.

Both events were to be held in the historic and ornate Union Station, renovated from a decaying train station into one of the city's major shopping attractions in 1985.

Jeffrey P. Ledbetter, finance director for the GOP state committee, said party officials hoped to raise at least \$500,000 from both events.

Bond, who finished his second term as governor last year, was encouraged to seek Eagleton's seat by the Republican Senatorial Committee.

In 1986, Republicans must defend 22 Senate seats, while 12 Democratic seats are at stake. To recapture control of the Senate from their present 53-47 minority position, Democrats need to gain four seats.

Bond has said that a race against Mrs. Woods would pit his conservative philosophy, particularly on fiscal matters, against the lieutenant governor's more liberal beliefs.

Ms. Woods appeared on national

television last week as part of the Democratic Party's response to Reagan's State of the Union address. Like Reagan, Bond has argued that

the way to reduce the deficit is to cut spending rather than raising taxes. The former governor has praised Reagan for reviving the nation's

economy, but has also noted that the sagging agricultural economy and the foreign trade deficit have hampered the economic recovery.

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How They Voted

HOUSE
COMMITTEE FUNDING — By a vote of 146 for and 255 against, the House refused to force House committees to recommend the specific programs cuts necessary to achieve the \$11.7 billion savings that the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings budget-reduction law requires by March 1.

The vote occurred during debate on a measure (H Res 368) funding House committees during calendar 1986 that later was approved.

Under Gramm-Rudman-Hollings, if Congress and the president fail to agree on cuts needed to meet the law's series of austerity deadlines, the cuts are imposed automatically on an across-the-board percentage basis through a process called "sequestering."

Congress apparently will let the first round of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings cut due on March 1, be inflicted automatically. Had this motion succeeded, House committees, at least, would have had to take responsibility for the \$11.7 billion in fiscal 1986 cuts.

A major criticism of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings is that its automatic trigger frees lawmakers of having to answer to the public for their budget decisions.

Sponsor Robert Walker, R-Pa., said House members were sent to Washington to legislate, not "to sit on our duffs and wait for 'sequester' orders to go into effect."

Opponent Leon Panetta, D-Calif., said the committees already have their hands full preparing for the second round of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings cuts, which will take effect soon after fiscal 1987 begins next Oct. 1.

Members voting yes wanted to force committee recommendations on the first round of cuts under the new deficit-reduction law.

North Carolina congressmen voting yes were: William Cobey, R-4; Howard Coble, R-6; Alex McMillan, R-9; James Broyhill, R-10; and Bill Hendon, R-11.

Voting no were Walter Jones, D-1; Tim Valentine, D-2; Charles Whitley, D-3; Stephen Neal, D-5; Charles Rose, D-7; and W.G. Hefner, D-8.

AMUSEMENT PARKS — By a vote of 179 for and 198 against, the House rejected an amendment to sidetrack tougher federal regulation of amusement park rides.

This occurred during debate on a bill (HR 3456) extending the life of the Consumer Product Safety Commission, which was later passed and sent to the Senate.

The vote left intact a proposal empowering the commission to inspect rides at fixed sites such as Disneyland, in cases where state regulation is inadequate or a malfunctioning ride has caused injury or death. Presently the commission only can regulate rides in traveling carnivals.

The defeated amendment called for creating a commission to study the issue.

Members voting no supported federal inspections of fixed-site amusement park rides.

Members voting yes were Cobey, Coble, McMillan, Broyhill and Hendon.

Voting no were Jones, Valentine, Whitley, Neal and Rose. Hefner did not vote.

RECESS — By a vote of 208 for and 179 against, the House adopted a resolution (S Con Res 107) in favor of the House and Senate taking a Presidents' Day recess between Feb. 8-18.

The Senate also approved the measure and the recess, which lawmakers like to call a "district work period," took effect.

Members voting yes favored the 10-day recess: Jones, Valentine, Whitley, Rose and Hefner.

Voting no were Cobey, Coble,

McMillan, Broyhill and Hendon.

SENATE

TO SELL CONRAIL — By a vote of 54 for and 39 against, the Senate passed a bill to sell the government's 85 percent share of Conrail, the federally-run rail freight agency, to Norfolk Southern Corp. for \$1.2 billion.

This was a victory for the Administration, and a defeat for Conrail's management, private railroads such as the Chessie system that would compete with the merged railroad, and Midwestern shipping interests and lawmakers.

Conrail, formed in 1976 out of the ruins of Penn Central, has been profitable since 1982. Still, Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole said the federal government should get out of the rail freight business.

The bill (S 638) was sent to the House, where opposition to Norfolk Southern is stiffer than in the Senate. The leading rival offer is a \$1.4 billion tender from a group led by Morgan

Stanley & Co., the New York investment house.

Supporter Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., said of the transaction: "It is a good price. It is a good deal for the government. It is a good deal for Norfolk Southern. There is really no antitrust problem here at this particular time."

Opponent Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, said the government "will

not gain one cent from Norfolk Southern in return for Conrail," because the \$1.2 billion sale price would be substantially offset by factors such as tax credits and the loss to the government of dividends and interest that Conrail was to start paying in 1988.

Senators John East and Jesse Helms voted yes, and favored selling

Conrail to the Norfolk Southern railroad.

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The Right Stuff

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says Vice President George Bush is his kind of Republican.

Asked at his news conference Tuesday night if Bush had been politically consistent over the years, Reagan responded that Bush has been "part and parcel" and the "heart and soul" of all administration policy.

Bush often has been criticized for changing his views after he accepted Reagan's offer to become the vice presidential candidate in 1980. Earlier in that campaign, when they were battling each other for the presidential nomination, Bush and Reagan differed sharply on economic policy and issues such as abortion and the Equal Rights Amendment.

"Can you tell us an issue or two on which he has had a significant impact on your thinking?" Reagan then was asked.

"Oh ... he is ... oh, I can't," began the president, searching for a response. Then he went on to say, "I have to tell you that he is a part of every decision, he is a part of the policy making here just as the other members of the Cabinet. He and I both sit in with the Cabinet and he is part and parcel of all of the policy here in the administration."

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Contractors' Work Is Ok, Says NASA Spokesman

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA is satisfied with quality-control and safety procedures of private contractors who process space shuttles for launch, a top space agency official said in discounting reports of sloppy performance.

Lockheed Space Operations Co., the prime processing contractor, is generally performing satisfactorily, Tom Utsman, deputy director of the Kennedy Space Center, said Tuesday. "They've done an excellent job in improving their operation ... there's always room for improvement."

A series of 1985 shuttle processing

accidents, personnel problems and low-performance ratings were attributed to careless management by Lockheed and a subcontractor, Morton-Thiokol Inc., which manufactures and assembles the solid rocket boosters that help power the shuttle into space.

Lockheed won the \$2 billion, 6-year shuttle processing contract in 1983.

The boosters used on Challenger received the usual "tender loving care," because anything other than strict adherence to requirements would have been immediately evident to NASA inspectors, Utsman told reporters.

The right booster is suspected of having ruptured shortly after Challenger's liftoff Jan. 28, causing the fiery explosion which destroyed the spacecraft and killed its seven-member crew.

Utsman, who was director of shuttle management and operations until August, would not speculate on possible causes, but he defended testing, safety and quality-control procedures at Kennedy Space Center.

Among the possible blast causes

being examined is damage or improper handling of the rockets at the vehicle assembly building, while the shuttle was transferred to the launch site on its mobile platform, or at the pad itself.

The booster segments are closely inspected during and after assembly, Utsman said, and the joints are pressure-checked to ensure that their seals and surfaces are not damaged.

The assembly system has not changed since the first shuttle, he said. "We do verify all the critical steps in the process of stacking... We

do look at it continually as part of an overall review."

As to concerns about possible deterioration of the seals between the booster segments, Utsman said he didn't know of any changes in their handling. Asked whether space center employers were overworked, he said: "I don't feel there was a fa-

tigue factor with our work out here... We're not running a sweat factory."

Challenger was the first shuttle to be launched from pad 39B, which was used during the Apollo program and then extensively modified. The previous 24 shuttle missions were launched from pad 39A.

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Salt Content Steady

WASHINGTON (AP) — Few manufacturers have lowered the salt content of their processed foods despite consumer concern over the link between sodium and high blood pressure, a consumer group charged today.

In fact, said the Center for Science in the Public Interest, some processed foods checked last year actually had higher salt levels.

Of 185 commonly eaten lines of processed foods monitored by the group, only 17 had less salt in 1985 than was the case the year before, the group said.

Sodium is the ingredient in table salt that has been associated with high blood pressure.

A Food and Drug Administration request that the food industry voluntarily reduce salt in foods "has accomplished next to nothing. Most products are as salty as they were two years ago," said Bonnie Liebman, nutrition director for the non-profit consumer group.

In 1985, the center's annual Sodium Index was enlarged to cover 185 product lines. Of 116 lines that can be followed over two years, Liebman said, 29 percent had lower sodium levels in 1985, while salt increased in 26 percent of the foods.

Even after two years, "the number of companies that have cut the salt — and the size of the cuts — are still

minimal," said Liebman.

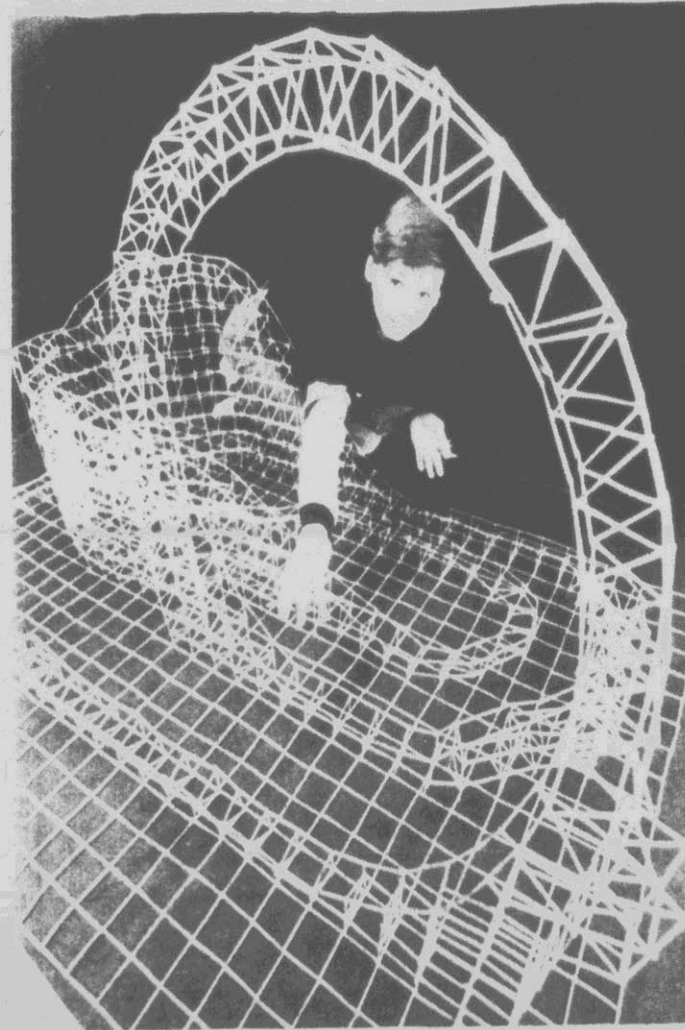
The group said it is asking the FDA to set limits on the amount of salt in processed foods, but officials at the FDA say they have not yet received the request.

Foods which the consumer group said showed a reduction in salt content from 1984 to 1985 were:

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Reagan Hopes Release Good Sign

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says he hopes the Soviet release of dissident Anatoly Shcharansky "is a beginning" of increased emigration by those who want to leave the Soviet Union.

Reagan said Tuesday he "talked at great length about the matter of human rights" with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev at last November's superpower summit.

The president told a nationally televised news conference he is aware of thousands of other people who want to leave the Soviet Union, and said, "All we can do is hope that this is a beginning, a sign for what is going to continue to take place."

Shcharansky was released in Berlin early Tuesday during an East-West prisoner swap involving five people accused of spying for the Soviet bloc and four accused Western spies.

Prior to the presidential news conference, Reagan spoke by telephone

with Shcharansky, telling the 38-year-old mathematician he was "delighted" by the release.

In the eight-minute telephone call made after Shcharansky reached Israel, Reagan also spoke with his wife, Avital, and Israeli Prime Minister Shimon Peres, according to a White House statement.

During the call, Reagan "commended his courage and fortitude as symbols of the human will for freedom" and said Shcharansky's "long years of imprisonment had been painful for all who care about human rights," the statement said.

The president promised to "continue his own efforts and those of the government to support human rights in the Soviet Union and elsewhere," the statement said.

In his news conference, Reagan also said he had "no way of judging how valid" was the Soviet argument for refusing to release another dissident, Andrei Sakharov.

The Soviets say they cannot free Sakharov because he helped them

develop thermonuclear weapons and he knows too many state secrets.

Asked if that was a legitimate reason for holding Sakharov, Reagan said, "It is an argument they have used for a number of people, people who have, in their estimation, been close to some things that they feel are secrets for their own security. ... I have no way of judging how valid that is."

Shcharansky was arrested in 1977 and sentenced to 13 years in prison on charges of treason and spying for the CIA. He has denied the allegations.

Bernard Kalb, a State Department spokesman, also said Shcharansky was innocent of the charges.

"Two presidents, President Carter and President Reagan, have stated publicly that Anatoly Shcharansky was not an agent of the U.S. gov-

ernment," Kalb told reporters.

"It was clear in 1978 that the Soviets arrested Shcharansky for his activism as a highly effective member of the Moscow Helsinki monitoring group and a proponent of freedom of emigration," Kalb said.

"We do not consider this to be a spy case," Kalb added. "As a matter of fact, we consider Shcharansky's release to be an additional, separate benefit to a package arrangement which otherwise deals with intelligence matters."

"We would have preferred that the Soviets simply release Shcharansky. It was clear, however, that the Soviet authorities were not responding to the numerous appeals on Shcharansky's behalf by his family, governments and private organizations around the world," Kalb said.

Modern Log Cabin Would Amaze Abe

LINCOLN CITY, Ind. (AP) — When it came time to build a log cabin in Abraham Lincoln's day, a man simply pointed a finger at a wooded spot that looked nice and started chopping.

If Lincoln were alive today, he might be amazed by what it takes to build a modern log cabin, as evidenced by what's happening at the Lincoln State Park in this southeastern Indiana community, the area where the 16th president of the United States lived from age 7 to 21.

An artist's rendering in park manager Steve Lemen's office shows several log cabins at the head of a giant outdoor amphitheater, expected to be complete by May 1987. Dramatic productions of Lincoln's life will be the main event in the theater each summer.

The log cabins will be used as restrooms, concession stands and ticket offices. Architects' blueprints show precisely where the cabins will be built so crowd control can be most effectively maintained.

Before any site planning could begin, funding had to be approved. State legislators in suits and high heels toured the muddy site before appropriating \$3.5 million to the project, Lemen said.

"Archeological crews came through to make sure there was nothing there," said Ted Tapp, the park's assistant property manager.

Studies were done to evaluate whether there would be sufficient tourist appeal for a theater. Tapp said, "They're expecting a big draw, because Lincoln's a popular figure around here."

The Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial is across the road from the park. Also, a nearby theme park drew 275,000 people last summer.

"It always intrigues me the number of people who have a knowledge of Lincoln," Lemen said. "We see people come from all over the country to see where Lincoln lived in Indiana."

The Lincoln Boyhood Drama Association has enlisted the help of

playwright Billy Edd Wheeler. It also has started a campaign to raise \$600,000 to produce the show, said Aubrey Freeman, the association's coordinating manager.

Construction on the theater and surrounding cabins is scheduled to begin this spring.

Surveyors selected seven potential building sites within the park, Lemen said, "and established criteria to evaluate things like the sounds from the road and nearby railroad, the availability of utilities, and parking."

"After each site was evaluated that way, all the information was plugged into a computer and that's how we came up with the final site."

"They had a drilling rig in here to drill to the strata for 20 feet below the earth. They want to check if the ground can handle the structures."

The small trees that will be cleared from the area will not be used to construct the new cabins — specially treated logs will be brought in instead, Tapp said.

The park service also must make improvements to the roads leading into the theater area before the opening, Lemen said. "About an hour before the drama starts, we'll have some 500 cars coming in, so we have to expand our entrance."

At this point, the only signs of impending construction are fluorescent strips taped in various spots to mark the surveyed area where the log cabins will be built.

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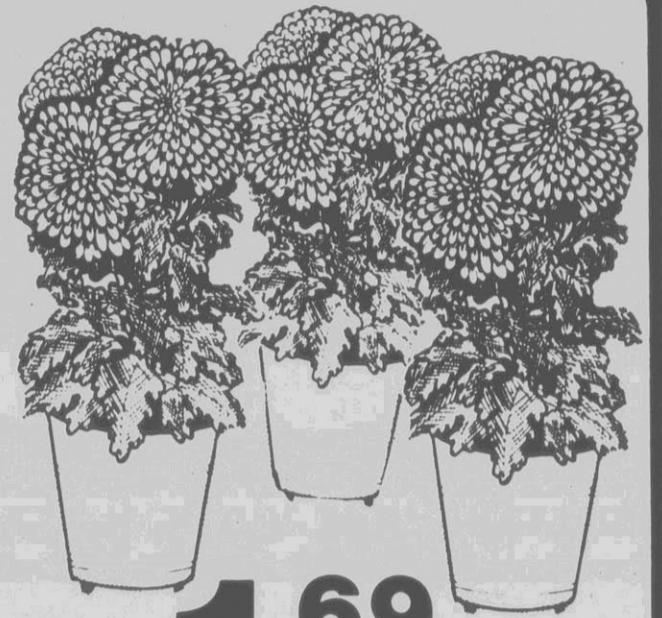
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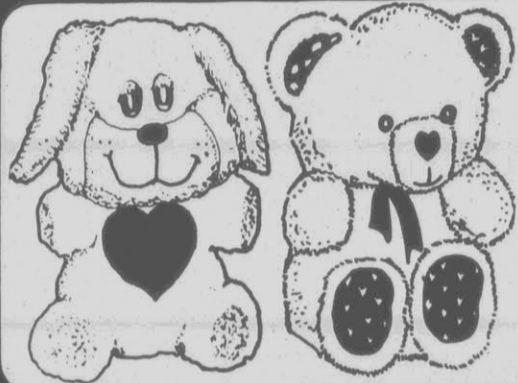
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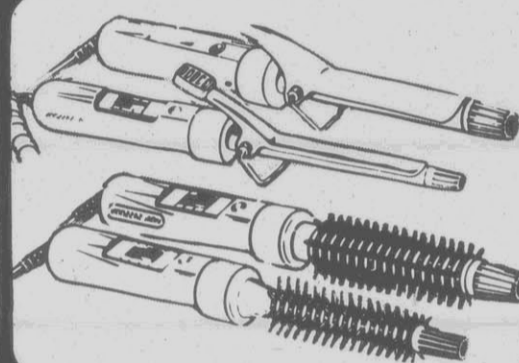
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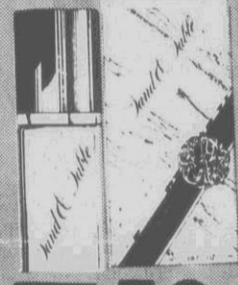
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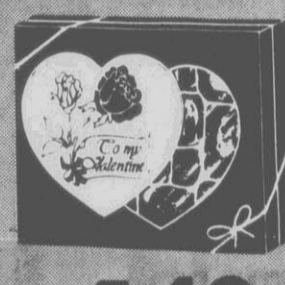
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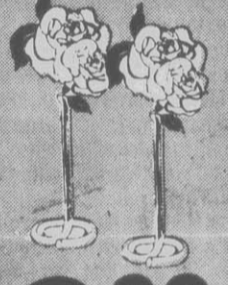
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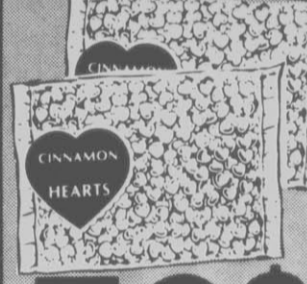
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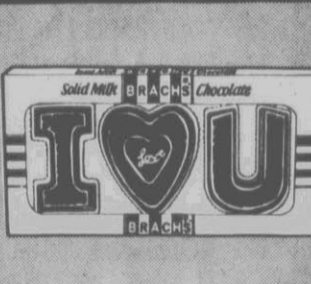
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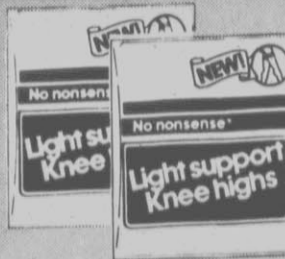
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Oberlin Will Celebrate Aluminum Anniversary

Steel was the key to Carnegie-Mellon's good fortune. At Vassar, it was beer. And a few years ago, Coca-Cola made things go much better at Emory University.

This month, Oberlin College will be singing the praises of aluminum — the metal that helped turn this small Ohio school into one of the nation's wealthiest liberal arts colleges.

A century ago, in February 1886, a 22-year-old Oberlin-trained chemist named Charles Martin Hall solved a mystery that had baffled scientists for years — how to separate aluminum ore from bauxite cheaply enough to make the metal commercially useful.

Under the guidance of Oberlin chemistry professor Frank Fanning Jewett, Hall discovered that electricity was the key to producing economical aluminum. The process launched an entire new industry, and Hall went on to make a fortune as a founder of the giant Aluminum Co. of America — ALCOA.

In gratitude to the school that nurtured him as a young chemist, Hall left Oberlin \$16 million after his death in 1914. The school now calculates that nearly half its hefty \$161.7 million endowment can be traced to the Hall bequest.

Aluminum also meant eventual prosperity to Berea College in Kentucky. Hall bequeathed some \$5 million to that school where his sister taught. A science classroom building on campus still bears Hall's name.

Oberlin this month will commemorate Hall's achievement with a series of events including a demonstration of the experiment that led to Hall's process.

The school is also holding a contest for Oberlin-area residents to build a wide variety of objects — from replicas of Oberlin landmarks to Rube Goldberg-type devices — as long as 90 percent of the surface area is aluminum. Winners will get trophies made of aluminum nuggets.

Oberlin's jubilation over its "aluminum anniversary" serves as a reminder of the sometimes surprising sources of wealth that many other colleges and universities have tapped over the years.

Steel, of course, was behind what is now prestigious, prosperous Carnegie-Mellon University. In 1900, steel magnate Andrew Carnegie spent \$2 million to found the school's ancestor, "Carnegie Technical Schools" in Pittsburgh.

In 1886, a Philadelphia hat manufacturer who made what came to be known as "the hat that won the West" decided to rescue a small, three-year-old Florida college from financial ruin by providing a million-dollar endowment.

Grateful trustees renamed the college after its benefactor, John B. Stetson. Today, Stetson University, a Baptist-affiliated liberal arts university with about 2,000 undergraduates, survives as Florida's oldest private institution of higher learning.

A beer baron created Vassar College 125 years ago. Matthew Vassar, a Poughkeepsie, N.Y., brewer, spent half his fortune, \$408,000, to found one of the nation's first women's liberal arts colleges. It went coed in 1968.

The college, Vassar wrote at the time of its founding, "would be a monument more lasting than the pyramids, the pride and glory of Poughkeepsie, an honor to the state, and a blessing to the world..."

Another beverage, Coca-Cola, gave a giant lift to Emory University.

Robert Woodruff, president of Coca-Cola Co. from 1923 to 1955, had attended Oxford College, in Oxford, Ga., which eventually relocated to Atlanta and became Emory.

Over the years, Woodruff donated more than \$110 million to Emory. In 1979, he gave the school control of a fund consisting of an additional \$105 million in Coca-Cola stock. The money enabled Emory to establish merit scholarships, attract top professors, and move to the front ranks of higher education. Its endowment of \$528 million ranks 12th among U.S. colleges and universities.

A millionaire's desire to help heal the breach between north and south after the Civil War led to the founding in 1873 of Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn. Railroad and shipping tycoon Cornelius Vanderbilt, then 79 and lacking any formal schooling, had amassed one of the world's great fortunes. A northerner who had never been to Nashville, Vanderbilt spent \$1 million to found the university at a time when others favored punishing the South.

Vanderbilt's descendants later donated more than \$60 million to the school, and the university's endowment has now reached \$340 million.

Another railroad tycoon, Leland Stanford, founded Stanford University in California in 1885 as a memorial

to his only son who died at age 16 of typhoid. The correct name of the school remains The Leland Stanford, Jr., University.

Stanford donated his farm as the site for the university, paid for the school's original buildings, worth about \$5 million, and donated another \$21 million toward the endowment.

Peter Cooper made millions manufacturing glue, railroad ties and wrought iron beams, and from shrewd real estate investments. Like Vanderbilt, he had no formal schooling. In May 1858, he founded Cooper Union, a unique college in downtown Manhattan with an endowment so generous that to this day bright, artistically-minded students still attend tuition-free.

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Von Bulow Says 'No'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Claus von Bulow says he is not taking seriously a "Draft von Bulow for Senator" federal campaign filing and has no intention of running for office in New York or any other state.

"I am not an American subject," von Bulow said in a telephone interview from his New York City apartment Tuesday. "I am a Danish citizen and always have been."

A document filed with the Federal Election Commission and made available this week stated there was a "Draft von Bulow for Senator" organization in New York which listed its chairman as R. Grayson and treasurer as Nina Mule.

The document was filed on June 17, 1985, seven days after a jury in Providence, R.I., found von Bulow innocent of two counts of attempting to murder his heiress wife by injecting her with insulin. The verdict came in a retrial after the Rhode Island Supreme Court reversed his 1982 convictions.

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Billig Gets Little Help, Even From Witnesses

WASHINGTON (AP) — Even witnesses for the defense in the military court-martial of Dr. Donald Billig are favoring the prosecution by suggesting the Navy surgeon was in over his head while performing heart operations.

Billig takes the stand in his own defense today in an effort to counter government charges that he was an incompetent and weak-sighted surgeon who was responsible for the deaths of five patients at Bethesda Naval Hospital.

Billig, former head of heart surgery at the Navy's premier hospital, planned to describe his version of events in the five heart surgery cases in which the patients died in the operating room or soon after leaving it, defense attorney Denver Graham said Tuesday.

By taking the stand, however, Billig opens himself to grilling by government attorneys, including questions about testimony that he had virtually no vision in one eye.

Billig is charged with five counts of involuntary manslaughter in the deaths of the five heart patients. He also faces 24 counts of dereliction of duty.

On Tuesday, anesthesiologist Dr. Theodore Heyneker testified for the defense as Billig's attorneys sought to show that the patients who died were high-risk cases. He controlled anesthesia during many operations with Billig, including some for which Billig is charged.

But Heyneker, a lieutenant commander, served to underscore a point of the prosecution — that Billig performed surgery for which he was not competent.

Under cross-examination, assistant prosecutor Lt. Cmdr. Joseph G. VanWinkle asked Heyneker, "Was it your opinion, was the accused pushed beyond his capabilities in coronary cases?"

Heyneker: "Yes."
Q: "Was he a victim of the Peter Principle?"
A: "Yes."

His "Peter Principle" reference was to a common, humorous observation that people tend to be promoted until they reach their level of incompetence.

VanWinkle then asked if Billig tended to lift the heart without warning in surgery at times that would do damage by denying oxygen to the organ. "Yes," Heyneker answered.

Heyneker said one of the patients, Gunner's Mate Joe Estep, was a high-risk case whose surgery was performed in acceptable time. The government charges his death five days after surgery was due to poor surgical procedures.

An operation on retired Army Maj. William F. Grubb went "exceptionally well," Heyneker said, adding that he reacted with disbelief when Grubb died a few hours after surgery. He said Billig's reaction was appropriate when problems arose in surgery.

But he said on cross-examination that Billig refused to give him post-operative notes after the death, first contending it would violate privacy laws by revealing the dead patient's Social Security number. Billig relented, he said, but "when the doctor under me went to get them, they couldn't be found."

Also testifying was Dr. William P. Baker, former chief heart specialist at Bethesda. He said he was not made aware of concerns other doctors had about Billig until he left that hospital.

He acknowledged some other military hospitals had stopped referring patients to Bethesda for heart surgery by mid-1984, but said he didn't know why.

VanWinkle asked Baker if he would have been comfortable referring cases to Billig had he known Billig had "lied about his eyes," been fired from his last two jobs and been the object of complaints or warnings by four other surgeons. "No," the defense witness said.

Writer Dies

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Science fiction writer Frank Herbert, whose galactic epic "Dune" sold more than 12 million copies worldwide after being rejected by 20 publishers, has died at the age of 65.

Herbert died Tuesday at University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics, said nursing supervisor Mary Lang. The cause of death was not immediately available, she said.

World oil prices continued to weaken on Tuesday, helping push interest rates lower in the credit markets and improving the outlook for future inflation. But many stock prices were depressed by profit taking, analysts said.

Mesa Petroleum led the list of most actively traded stocks on the New York Stock Exchange, rising 1/8 to 2 3/4 as 1.85 million shares changed hands in the first 30 minutes of trading, including a 1.35 million share block at 2 1/2. Mesa Petroleum is part of Mesa Limited Partnership, the T. Boone Pickens Jr.-controlled firm which has announced an offer to acquire KN Energy, a Colorado natural gas company.

Johnson & Johnson rose 3/8 to 51 in active trading. The stock fell 1 1/8 Tuesday session on news that a Westchester County, N.Y., woman died of cyanide poisoning after taking the company's Extra Strength Tylenol capsules, but authorities later said they believed the death was an isolated incident.

In the first 30 minutes of trading, advancing issues outnumbered decliners by about 6-5 on the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume was 17.87 million shares.

The NYSE's composite index rose 0.01 to 124.54. The market value index on the American Stock Exchange was 0.33 higher to 244.01.

Duke Runs Past Stetson, 85-66

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Wholesale substitutions were a part of Coach Mike Krzyzewski's game plan when his second-ranked Duke Blue Devils met Stetson, and he was prepared to accept the consequences. The strategy kept the outmanned Hatters in the game for a while Tuesday night. But in the end, Krzyzewski got everything he wanted out of the nonconference college basketball outing — a convincing 85-66 victory and plenty of playing time for his reserves. "Sometimes when a coach makes changes like I did, he takes some of the momentum away from his team," said Krzyzewski, who did just that after his starters built a nine-point lead early in the first half. "I knew that going in," Krzyzewski added, "and Stetson took advantage of it." Led by Randy Anderson, the Hatters cut their deficit to 24-23 before Krzyzewski's first unit returned with 8:23 left and used a 12-2 burst to send Duke on its way to a comfortable 42-30 halftime advantage. The Blue Devils turned up the level of intensity, especially on defense, at the start of the second half, building a 21-point lead that allowed Krzyzewski to turn to his bench again. "Mike's decision to use his bench as much as he did was a factor and I

appreciated that," said Hatters Coach Glenn Wilkes, who started three freshmen. "We were a lot more relaxed than I thought we'd be," Wilkes added. "We didn't play cautiously, although we were the underdog. That was encouraging." Johnny Dawkins scored 18 points and Mark Alarie added 17 to lead four Duke players in double figures. Alarie also grabbed 10 rebounds, while Jay Bilas and David Henderson scored 14 and 12 points, respectively. Defensively, the Blue Devils held the Hatters to 40.2 percent shooting from the field — well below the 50 to 55 percent range Wilkes felt his team would need to have a chance. Duke also had 13 steals, including several the Blue Devils turned into easy baskets before an Ocean Center crowd of 5,387. The victory boosted Duke's record to 23-2 and came on the heels of Sunday's 75-59 Atlantic Coast Conference victory over Georgia Tech. The Blue Devils showed no signs of a letdown. "I'm always concerned about performance," Krzyzewski said. "I was a little worried about our physical condition coming in, but mentally we've been ready to play every game. "I told them it's us against us," he added. "We set some pretty high standards last week against (ACC rivals) Virginia and Georgia Tech. I told them we needed to play up to those standards, not just try to go out and win a game." Anderson, a 6-6 freshman, led Stetson with 16 points, 12 of them in the first half. BETHEL — North Pitt's Panthers did what they had to do at the free throw line in the final period — hitting 15 of 23 — to outlast Pamlico County, 65-55. The win allowed the Panthers to climb out of the Eastern Plains Conference cellar and doom the Hurricanes to that lowly position. North Pitt's girls, who have already captured the regular season EPC title, had little trouble in rolling onward toward next week's tournament with a 72-25 romp. North Pitt's boys upped their record to 2-9 in league play and 6-15 overall with the victory. Pamlico falls to 1-10 and 6-12. With each team having one game left to play, Pamlico can at best tie the Panthers for sixth place in the seven-team league — but since North Pitt won both games between the two, the Panthers will take the higher seed in the tournament pairings. North Pitt's girls, meanwhile, climb to 11-0 in league play and 19-3 overall. Pamlico's girls drop to 0-11, 2-16.

Pamlico's boys jumped out to an early lead in the game, only to see the Panthers come back late in the quarter to tie it up, then move ahead for good just past the midpoint of the second period.

While Pamlico dominated the boards early in the game, North Pitt came back and eventually held a 40-38 advantage. The Panthers were also helped by having six fewer turnovers than did the Hurricanes.

"We were gambling a little on the off side and they were getting some cheap rebounds early," Coach Cobby Deans said. "But I thought we did a real good job rebounding after the first quarter."

"We thought that we could run with them in the first period, but then we slowed it down some and got more patient and that brought us through. Our shot selection in the first period wasn't that bad, we just hurried them a little." The Panthers made only 3 of 14 in that period, but made good on 18 of 33 after that.

After North Pitt scored the first basket of the game, Pamlico came back with four straight, three of them by Vaughn Jones, to take an 8-2 lead. But the Panthers rallied, hitting the final six points of the period to tie it up at 8-8.

Greg Whitaker made a free throw to open the second period for a 9-8 lead, but Phillippe Jones scored on a jumper for the Hurricanes to return the lead to them. Two free throws by Derrick Mullins and a fast break layup by Maurice Jones put North Pitt into a 13-10 lead, but Phillippe Jones and Vaughn Jones both scored to return the lead to the 'Canes, 14-13. Jones then hit for North Pitt, with 3:14 showing, to put the Panthers back ahead, 15-14, and then never trailed again.

Mullins added a basket off a rebound and after one more basket by Pamlico, North Pitt ran off eight straight points to end the period, taking a 25-16 lead into the dressing room.

Pamlico early cut the lead back to four, 26-22, but after matching points for a couple of minutes, North Pitt broke loose with six straight, all but one by Jones, to take a 36-26 lead with 2:36 showing. Pamlico managed to cut that back to eight, 40-32, before

the period ended at that score.

North Pitt then scored seven in a row, finishing up with a slam dunk by Jones, to take a 47-32 lead with 6:03 left.

Pamlico got a free throw and Jones hit again to run the lead to its highest mark, 16 at 49-33.

The Hurricanes tried to fight back at the foul line after that, as a total of 23 fouls were whistled in the period, 13 of them against the 'Canes. The Panthers kept cashing in, while Pamlico made just nine of 17.

"We shouldn't have been fouling in the final period," Deans said. "There was no reason for that."

Mullins led the North Pitt scoring with 21 points while Jones had 17 and Olinka Little had 10. Deon Gibbs and Vaughn Jones led Pamlico with 14 each while Prince Miller had 10.

The Panthers played without regular Ashley Sheppard. "They think he might have a bone chip in his ankle. They're supposed to find out for sure

Friday. So I don't know what his status is going to be," Deans said.

For North Pitt's girls, it was a walk-through.

Paced by 31 points from Regina Cox, playing in her final home game, North Pitt never trailed. The entire lineup played, as Coach Randy Avery mixed his players throughout the contest.

"It was a fitting way for Cox to end her home career," Avery said afterwards. "She's a hard-working player who has had to work against some tough people. Thirty-one is her career high."

"It was just a good game for us. I was a little worried about us being flat after winning the title. I wanted us to play at the same pace. If we had won and played flat, I would have been disappointed."

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Academies Can Still Recruit

Like every other football coach, Fisher DeBerry of the Air Force Academy will spend today "holding my breath."

Today is national signing day, the first day a high school senior can officially sign a football grant-in-aid binding him to the school of his choice.

According to NCAA rules, head coaches, DeBerry included, may not venture off campus to sign a prospect and the service academies must abide by the limit of 95 visits a year by recruits. But there's one major difference: DeBerry, along with his counterparts at Army and Navy, does not have to honor a letter of intent a prospect signs with an Oklahoma, a Michigan, a Penn State.

Just like those schools, Air Force brought in a bunch of prospective recruits last weekend, although DeBerry pushed everything back one day to accept a Coach of the Year award from the Walter Camp Football Foundation.

Come Thursday, he'll be "back on the road again. I'll go see some young men because there's going to be some kids across the country who are not going to make up their minds until a week later, or until the weekend, or until maybe they've had another visit, although most of them will have made that decision by Wednesday (today)."

"Then there'll be some guys out there that we are competing very heavily with with Army and Navy, as well as the Ivy League schools. Those are the kids that we really spend a lot of time with from now to the end of February (March and April are non-recruiting months)."

But just because a recruit signs elsewhere doesn't mean he has heard the last of a service academy. All's fair in love and war, and recruiting sometimes means war.

"We're allowed to be in touch with them again as long as contact has been made prior to national signing day," DeBerry points out. "If a young man has committed himself to another school and we have never contacted him before national signing day, then it's against NCAA rules for us to contact him."

"But if we have contacted him before national signing day and we knew that he had a real strong feeling for the academy and we were one of his final choices, yeah, we might go back and ask him, 'Would you still consider the academy? Is there any additional information we can get you? Is it all right if we stay in touch?'"

"What happens a lot of times is that young men — particularly heavily recruited young men — feel a lot of pressure the few days before national signing day. We might not be able to tell him anything definitely so he might go ahead and elect to accept a grant-in-aid (elsewhere)."

"But we encourage every young man that we talk with to assure everybody recruiting him that he is genuinely interested in the academy and, should he be appointed to the academy after the signing date, there might be a possibility that he would to the academy. We just think that's being honest and fair."

"At the academies, a hotshot football player can't get a scholarship merely at the coach's whim. In fact, there are no athletic grants as such because every student must be "appointed" by his senator or congressman — the process begins as a high school junior — and technically everyone is on scholarship since cadets are considered to be on active duty and receive one-half of a second lieutenant's salary (roughly \$440 a month from which they must purchase uniforms and other necessities)."

An appointment itself isn't enough. Each applicant must be approved by a review board, which includes academy staff officers, the superintendent and the registrar.

"There are a lot of guys we're recruiting who are being recruited by a lot of the other Division I schools," DeBerry says. "We have got to really hustle to get young men appointed to the academy prior to national signing date (most of the Falcons' 90 or so recruits already are, but they have until May 1 to decide, there's no way of telling how many will accept and 25 percent also have been accepted by Army and Navy). If we can get the appointment paper in their hand, that's just like them signing a grant-in-aid. Every freshman that we're recruiting against a Division I civilian school, we would like to have that young man approved and appointed before the national signing date."

"But if a young man signs our appointment — no, that does not bind him to the academy. He can still sign a civilian grant-in-aid. If a young man signs a grant-in-aid with a civilian university, he can still come to the academy at a later date if he so chooses as long as he has started his processing and his paper flow prior to the national signing date.

"They (civilian schools) are going to recruit against us just like we recruit against them. We've had some young men who have decided to accept the appointment and have told us so, and then other schools still have a grant-in-aid available and try to recruit them."

"We have some young men accept the appointment and then, for some reason or another, in early summer they decide maybe it's not the school for them. Basic cadet training is a transition, an adjustment time, a difficult time. We don't lose a lot of people, but there's always that possibility and some young men get a misconception about the academy and think it's like that the whole year around."

"It's not. The academy is not really any different than any other school once the academic year starts. They're so involved in their academics and it takes so much time that the only difference basically is the wearing of the uniform."

"We're at such a disadvantage because the schools that we play, we've got to certainly go out and recruit the same athletes hopefully that Notre Dame and UCLA and people like that are recruiting. We're not naive enough to believe that we're going to beat them a lot of times because we're really at a disadvantage when you consider a young man doesn't have the opportunity to play professional football."

"And I think that's a basic goal and aspiration of a lot of 17- and 18- and 19-year-olds, particularly when they see the money that's available to them in professional football. There's a little difference in assuring a guy that you're going to be a second lieutenant when you graduate and make \$18,000, \$19,000, \$20,000 a year and be a rookie in the NFL and make \$100,000, or whatever."

"All we can assure our young men is that if they graduate, they're going to have a job, and it's going to be in their major field of study, and they've got an opportunity to serve their country and they've got an opportunity to do something for other people."

"A lot of people that we recruit against make it sound like they're going off to Siberia or Alcatraz. It's not like that at all."

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Waltrip Wants Daytona Victory

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Daytona is not Darrell Waltrip's favorite place to race, but he still wants to win there.

Waltrip has conquered just about every other racetrack he has been on. But Daytona's 2.5-mile tri-oval has been his nemesis.

"It's been so frustrating that he'll jump at just about any omen that might mean things are changing."

"Maybe we've gotten off to such a bad start that things have to get better," Waltrip said Tuesday during a rain delay in preparations for Sunday's Daytona 500. "It would be hard for things to get worse."

The defending Winston Cup champion finished dead last in Sunday's rich Busch Clash, then, after numerous changes on the new same Chevrolet Monte Carlo SS that he drove in the Clash, Waltrip managed only the 25th best qualifying speed in the opening round of time trials.

The team changed to an older Monte Carlo, updated with 1986 sheet metal and the new sloping rear window, and Waltrip managed to move up to 22nd fastest with a lap of 200.316 mph.

"We had only three laps of practice in that car and qualified over 200," explained Waltrip, who drives for Junior Johnson along with Neil Bonnett. "We tested with the other car down here over the winter and had three days of practice since we got back here and couldn't do anything."

"We'd take an engine and put it in Neil's and it would go 203. But we'd put it in mine and the best I could do was 198. That car just has a design flaw in it somewhere."

But that just seems to be the way things go for him at Daytona, where he has won four qualifying races, a Busch Clash and a late model sportsman race, but never has been able to take either the Daytona 500 or the Firecracker 400 in July.

"Daytona is not, I repeat, is not my favorite place to race. But I'd love to win here."

"I was leading this race in 1984 at the white flag (the start of the last lap), but Cale (Yarborough) went right past me, then Dale Earnhardt got by me just before the finish."

"Heck, I was just so pleased to still be running up front that close to the end that I didn't even think about trying to block anybody."

"It's an accomplishment for me to be competitive here," he continued. "I finished third last year and I was a lap down and never was in the hunt. I just hung in. There was nothing for me to be proud of."

But Waltrip said that he doesn't want Daytona to become some kind of psychological roadblock.

"I try to keep things in perspective and I really am not upset about what's happened so far," he noted. "Nothing that's happened so far is significant. It's really only what happens in the 500 that counts."

The final round of time trials to determine the starting lineups for Thursday's 7-Eleven Twin 125-mile qualifying races is scheduled today.

Bill Elliott won the pole position and Geoff Bodine the starting spot on the outside of the front row in the opening round of qualifying on Monday.

The qualifying races will fill positions three through 30 and the rest of the 40-car field will be made up of other cars posting fast times in the three days of time trials.

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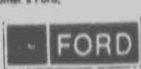
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Drug Inspectors Said Ready To Conduct Tests

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina drug inspectors are ready "at a moment's notice" to test drugs for cyanide, says Robert L. Gordon, director of the state Food and Drug Division of the state Agriculture Department. State drug inspectors were poised to conduct such tests Tuesday as New York investigators probed the cyanide poisoning of a Yonkers, N.Y., woman who swallowed Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules.

But authorities later said the death of Diane Elsroth probably was an isolated incident and is being investigated as a homicide. "We are dealing with a case of murder," Westchester County Executive Andrew O'Rourke said at a news conference. No one has been charged in the slaying of Miss Elsroth, who died Saturday at her boyfriend's home after taking Tylenol from a newly opened bottle there. Despite Tuesday's announcement,

manufacturer Johnson & Johnson said it planned to review how the batch containing the capsules Miss Elsroth took was manufactured. Gordon said the state's 20 food and drug inspectors around the state were on alert in case any tainted medication is found or suspected. "We've geared up our lab and have already developed a methodology to test for cyanide," he said before the announcement. "We're on a holding pattern. We think, along with the FDA and Johnson & Johnson that this

is an isolated incident and we're extremely hopeful that it is." Gordon said laboratory technicians can test an entire bottle for cyanide by putting an indicator strip into the bottle. If the strip changes color — indicating cyanide gas, he said, each capsule in the bottle would be examined. He advised consumers to avoid taking any medication if the tamper-proof seal on the bottle has been broken. He said consumers should take any suspect medications

to the store they bought it from. "If there's any doubt, don't use the product," said Gordon, who led the

1982 effort to search for tainted Tylenol in North Carolina after seven people died in the Chicago area.

Plans Noted For A New Va. Plant

HOPEWELL, Va. (AP) — A North Carolina-based company plans to build an \$80 million coal-fired cogeneration plant here to produce steam for sale to Allied-Signal Inc. and electricity for Virginia Power. Cogentrix of Virginia Inc. hopes to obtain environmental permits in

time to to break ground on the plant in June and begin operating in late 1987, William Campbell, project manager, said Tuesday. The 110-megawatt plant would be across Virginia 10 from Allied's fiber plant in Hopewell, on acreage leased from Allied.

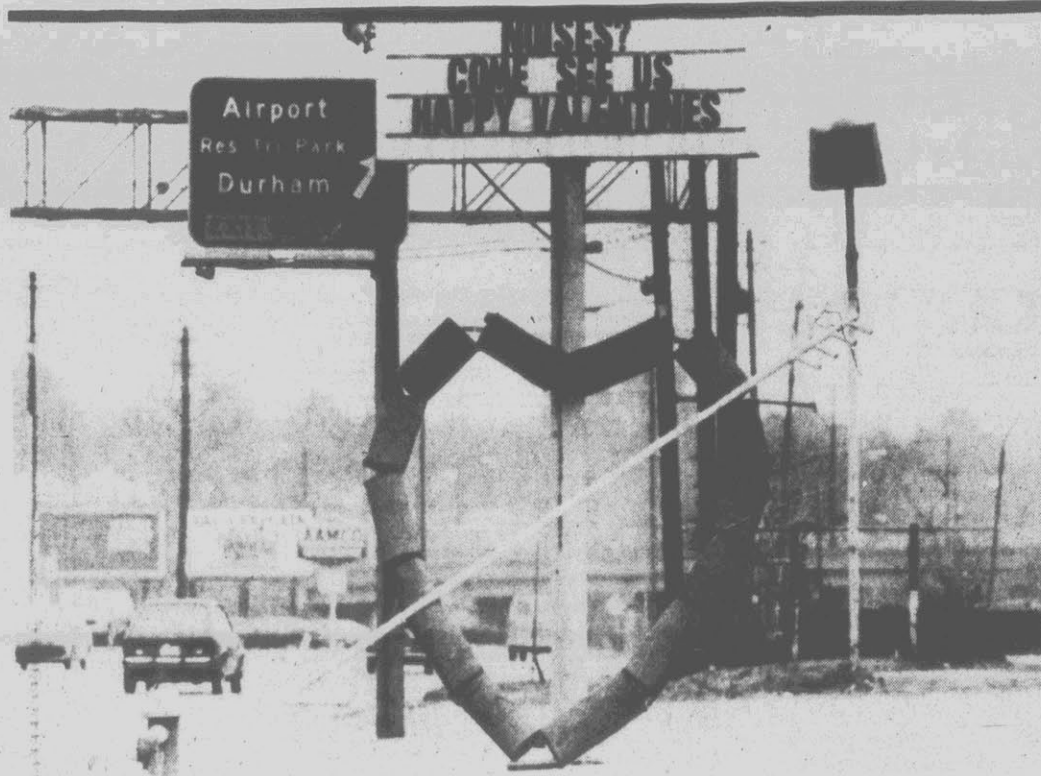
"The long-term commitment of Cogentrix to provide energy at a reasonable cost will improve our ability to control manufacturing costs," Allied plant manager Frank L. Piguet said.

Allied uses 55 million cubic feet of gas a day, making it the East Coast's largest gas consumer. The cogeneration station would cut consumption by 15 percent to 17 percent, Piguet said. Allied's power station, which burns natural gas and oil, would be shut down, Piguet said. Its 24 employees probably would be given jobs in other sections of Allied's plant or with Cogentrix, he said.

Cogentrix, which has its headquarters in Charlotte, N.C., is seeking an operating permit from the state Air Pollution Control Board, said R.L. Beasley, the board's assistant regional director.

The company will attempt to show through computer models that emissions from the plant wouldn't harm the air quality over a broad region, Beasley said.

The permit process, which could take several months, will include a public hearing in Hopewell, Beasley said.

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'Ain't Through Yet'

LYNCHBURG, Va. (AP) — Baptist evangelist James F. Aker, who celebrates his 115th birthday today, is convinced God wants him to preach again.

"It ain't through yet," said Aker, shaking his head. "If he didn't, I wouldn't be here."

Aker preached his last sermon in October at Friendly Chapel in Pilot Mountain, N.C., where Don Collins, the congregation's pastor, said at least 700 people came to hear Aker. About 340 people normally attend chapel services, Collins said.

"He is the kind of person that is excited in his preaching," Collins said. "He waves his hands and shouts."

Asked why the crowd was so large for Aker's sermon, Collins said: "I think because he's a God-called man, a God-anointed man and only God could have kept him alive all these years."

Aker hasn't preached since October because of a series of physical problems. He has lost the sight in one eye, the hearing in one ear, and has arthritis and a collapsed lung.



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Officials Contend Government Might Not Dispute Claims

FAYETTEVILLE (AP) — In the past, government officials have denied the possibility that Americans are still being held prisoner in Southeast Asia, but now they say the U.S. government doesn't necessarily dispute such claims.

"Although not relevant to the specific issue of accepting well-pledged facts as true, (the government's) official position as to the existence of live POWs is not necessarily at odds with plaintiff's allegations," government attorneys said in a footnote to a brief filed Monday in U.S. District Court in Fayetteville.

The brief supports government efforts to win dismissal of a lawsuit filed by retired Maj. Mark A. Smith and SFC Melvin C. McIntire. The former Green Berets are asking that the government be forced to take any action short of war to return living American POWs from Vietnam.

"I guess that's an admission they're there," said Mark Waple, an attorney for McIntire and Smith. "They've come a long way since the original ... remark (by Assistant

Defense Secretary Richard Armitage) that they don't exist." Saying the court is not the proper place to debate foreign policy, the government's brief concerns only its motion to have the suit dismissed. A hearing on the government's motion is scheduled Feb. 18 in federal court in Elizabeth City.

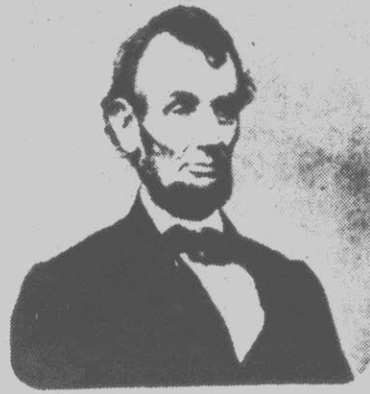
The government attorneys argued in the brief that evidence about possible POWs should not be presented until it has been decided whether the court has jurisdiction over the issue.

Government attorneys argue the issue of possible live POWs in Southeast Asia must be dismissed because it is a political, rather than judicial, question. They argue that Congress did not intend for private citizens to invoke the Hostage Act, the law cited by Smith and McIntire when they filed suit last September.

As of January, the U.S. government said 2,441 servicemen involved in the Vietnam War are still unaccounted for. It lists 700 missing in North Vietnam, 1,097 in South Vietnam, 556 in Laos, 82 in Cambodia and six in China. Of those, 916 are Air Force, 702 are Army, 490 are Navy, 290 are Marines, one is a Coast Guard member and 42 are civilians, according to Department of Defense officials.

Smith and McIntire, along with former military policeman Scott Barnes and Air Force National Security Agency staffer Jerry Mooney, testified on Jan. 28 at a hearing of the Senate Subcommittee on Veterans Affairs. Most of that hearing was closed to the public.

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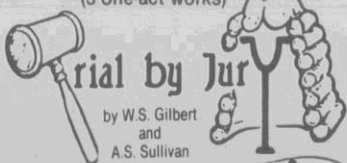

Even with the strength of "Sins," which ranked ninth and 14th for its final two parts, CBS trailed NBC through Saturday in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings for Feb. 3-9. But "Child's Cry" overwhelmed its rival movies, NBC's "Under Siege" and ABC's "Harem," and finished seventh for the week, keying CBS' second-best Sunday performance this season.

According to figures released Tuesday by Nielsen, CBS averaged an 18.3 rating for the week and ended

NBC's winning streak at three straight weeks. NBC, with "The Cosby Show" the runaway top program again, had a 17.7 ABC, with "Dynasty" its best-performing series in 15th place, averaged a 14.5.

Miss Collins and Miss Wagner, ABC's transplanted stars, were as close as ABC got to ratings success last week. "Because of ABC's low weekly ratings, CBS and NBC can never really have had weeks," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. "ABC always props us up."

After 20 weeks of the 30-week prime-time season, NBC holds a virtually insurmountable lead. NBC has averaged a 17.9 rating to CBS' 17.0 and ABC's 15.1.

Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director, noted that CBS' weekly average rating is one-tenth of a point better than last season's winning average. This season's difference is NBC's powerful performance, at the expense of ABC. For years, CBS has attracted an older, more rural audience, while ABC and NBC have competed for young-adult, urban viewers.

According to Jaffe, CBS would need to beat NBC by 1.8 ratings points each remaining week to win. CBS has won five times this season — to NBC's 13 weekly victories — but not once has CBS won by as many as 1.8 ratings points.

One national ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

Since CBS replaced "Crazy Like a Fox" and "Trapper John, M.D." with its Sunday movie in January, CBS has beaten NBC's Sunday movie three out of four times. "Under Siege," about terrorism in the United States, performed below NBC's expectations and finished 27th out of 62 shows. The first part of ABC's "Harem" miniseries ranked 29th.

Last week, "The Cosby Show" was forced into a repeat because its originally scheduled episode was broadcast the Sunday before as a lead-in to the start of "Peter the Great." But it didn't matter. Last week's "Cosby" rerun had a whopping 35.4 rating and 51 share — the percentage of sets in use that were tuned in.

NBC's "Family Ties" had a 32.4, followed by "Murder, She Wrote," with a 25.9, and "60 Minutes," with a 25.2. Next came NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "Highway to Heaven," "Child's Cry," CBS' "Dallas," Part 2 of "Sins," and NBC's "Night Court" and CBS' "Newhart," in a 10th-place tie.

"Sins" ended its three-night run with an average rating of 20.6, which placed it 38th among all miniseries and fourth this season. The four-part "Peter the Great" ranked 23rd, 26th and 30th for its three installments last week and finished with a 17.7 rat-

ing, placing it 56th among all miniseries and eighth this season, taking the bottom rung from this season's other historical epic, NBC's "Mussolini: The Untold Story."

"Sins" had a more appealing story than our miniseries did," said Jaffe.

CBS was the only network that sold advertising time for President Reagan's State of the Union speech last week. Since Nielsen only records ratings for programs with commercials, only CBS' follow-up programs were listed: its State of the Union summary ranked 21st and its State of the Union analysis was 45th.

In the evening news competition last week, the "CBS Evening News" was first with a 14.1 rating. "NBC Nightly News" averaged a 12.4 rating, ABC's "World News Tonight" had a 12.3.

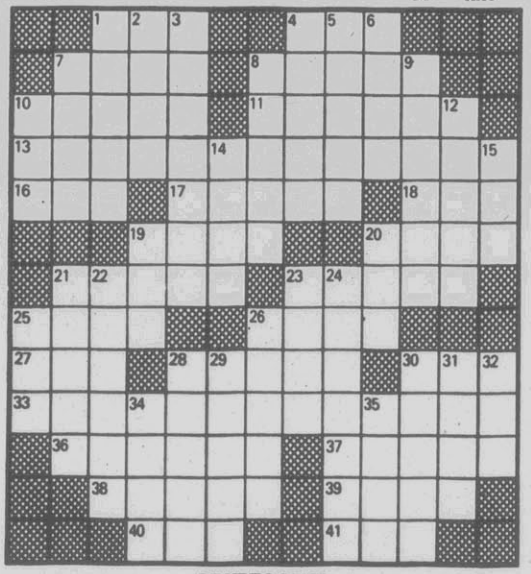

The right finesse is sometimes hard to find. At first it might seem this contract depends on finding either the queen of spades with West or the ace of clubs with East. However, you can improve on those chances.

Despite the fact he had no first-round control outside the trump suit, South felt his spade fit justified a jump rebid of his suit. When North could not cue-bid at his next turn, South decided four hearts was high enough.

Rather than break a suit for declarer, West opted for a trump lead. Declarer won and drew a second round, crossed to dummy with the king of spades and led the jack of diamonds, intending to discard a spade if East played low.

East covered, however, and declarer ruffed high. He crossed back to the table with the ace of spades and led the king of diamonds. When East could not cover, declarer discarded his remaining spade. West won but had no safe return. A diamond would yield a ruff-and-sluff; a club would limit declarer's losers in that suit to two; and a spade would set up a card in that suit for a club sluff, with a trump as entry.

Had East been able to cover the second diamond, declarer would again have ruffed high and then exited with his spade. If West had the queen after all, he would be end played. If East had the queen of spades and shifted to a club, declarer would cover the second round of clubs and still make his contract if either East had the ace or West had a doubleton ace. Try it.

Sled Event Has Started

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Montana's first experience with big-time dog sled racing has turned out to be a popular spectator sport in Helena, but the next few days promise to be lonely for 12 mushers and their dog teams.

The 12 teams in the Governor's Cup 500-Mile Sled Dog Race began solitary journeys west over the Continental Divide late Tuesday after a rousing sendoff from hundreds of Helenians in a ceremonial start from the Capitol.

The race, the longest sled event in the lower 48 states, is being touted as Montana's entry in the county's premier events: the 1,100-mile Iditarod in Alaska and the 400-mile John Beargrease Race in Minnesota.

"The mushing community is watching us really closely to see if we can pull this off," said race director Sheryl Motl of Helena before the race started. "Everybody is really excited about this."

A sparse snowpack forced the ceremonial start, with racers using old sled runners on pavement frequently bare or cinder-covered. After regrouping at the Federal Building a mile from the start, racers were trucked past the old mine ruins of Last Chance and Grizzly gulches to the start of a groomed trail.

The \$15,000 in prize money was put up by dogfood-maker Iams Co. Finishers are expected back in Helena Saturday or Sunday.

Jack Beckstrom, 33, of Kalispell, president of the sponsoring group, the Montana Mountain Mushers Club, suffered the only mishap. One of his dogs hit a signpost, broke out of his harness and ran off.

Other entrants were David Armstrong Jr., 65, and Linwood Fiedler, 32, both of Helena; Arleigh Jorgenson, 39, and John Patten, 42, both of Grand Marais, Minn.; Dan Zappa, 32, of Comstock, Wis.; Roland Westphal of Phelan, Calif.; Dr. Larry Brunzlik, 31, of Aniwa, Wis.; Brad Pozarnsky, 33, of Bottineau, N.D.; Bob Lugo, 46, of Milica, Minn.; Ray Gordon, 48, of Boulder, Wyo., and Ian Mackenzie, 30, of Bruce Mines, Ontario, Canada.

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Strength Of Characters Develops 'Color Purple'

A Reflector Review

If you follow movies, you can't avoid having heard about "The Color Purple." Filmed in North Carolina and nominated for 11 Academy Awards, it has received highest acclaim from national critics.

"The Color Purple" has arrived in Greenville (at the Buccaneer Theaters), and it is as good as everyone says. It is an outstanding movie, one probably different from what you would expect.

It takes place in the early 1900s and follows the life of a poor black girl, Celie, from teen-age to middle-age. Abused by her stepfather, Celie is married off to a vile, wretched man who needs someone to take care of his children.

Her greatest sorrow comes when Nettie, her sister and best friend, leaves to escape the men that surround her. But Celie is never shattered, never broken. With the help of a night club singer, she begins to come out of the shell.

"The Color Purple" succeeds because it moves from one excellent scene to another — there are no bad or unnecessary scenes. In the final analysis, however, it is the strong performances of actors portraying the characters that make this an exceptional movie.

There is Celie. Despite the odds against her, she manages to adjust to each plight, to keep her self-esteem and her subtle sense of humor. Celie is played by Whoopi Goldberg, who may well become the first black woman to win a best actress Oscar.

Her performance is surprisingly light while remaining dramatically effective. My favorite scene is when she calmly helps her husband dress for an evening out with another woman. It's a rare instance in which

she has control over him, and she loves it. Later, expressing her independence, she says "I'm black, I'm poor. I may even be ugly, but I'm here!"

There is Nettie. Despite her minor presence on screen, she is a major character. We feel her presence and think of her as often as Celie does.

There is Mister, Celie's husband. His tough, masculine facade refuses any display of tenderness. Thus, he is unable to cope as Celie gains her independence.

Harpo, Mister's son, beats his wife since it's something husbands traditionally do, and loses in the process. And Sofia, Harpo's strong-willed and strong-muscled woman, is played by Oprah Winfrey. Sofia appears unbreakable, but is broken. Finally, there's Shug — the singer, the star, played by Margaret Avery. She has the success and independence women dream about and uses her position to bring out the best in Celie.

Menno Meyjes' excellent screenplay was adapted from the Alice Walker novel. The photography is superb (North Carolina has never

looked better).

The fact Spielberg was not nominated for his direction has raised some controversy. Personally, I

find it hard to imagine this movie being so good, had it not been for the approach he used in directing the film.

The major strength in "The Color Purple" is that, although the story is one of struggle, it isn't heavy or depressing. And it's visually beautiful. "The Color Purple" is a must-see movie, one of the best.

Snow Puts Ohio Town On Map

CHARDON, Ohio (AP) — Highway signs at the edge of this village describe it as home to the maple sugar industry, but the people who live here know what really puts Chardon on the map: snow.

The hill that Chardon grew up on isn't high enough to see Lake Erie 15 miles to the north but villagers take pride in living in "the buckle on the snow belt."

Since 1946, when the Chardon water department began keeping records for the National Weather Service, the village has averaged just over 107 inches of snow per winter. Gayland Moore, record-keeper for the past 14 years, says the most recent 10-year average is about 112 inches per winter.

That's good enough, federal meteorologists say, for Chardon to rank No. 1 in Ohio for highest mean annual snowfall.

No one's saying Chardon's mean snowfall is the meanest anywhere. But it's right up there.

There's no snowfall ranking for all of the 8,000 cooperative weather stations, like Chardon's, around the nation, says Al Wallis of the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C.

But average snowfalls for the 280 major U.S. weather stations are ranked, and the top six read as follows: 1. Blue Canyon, Calif., 244.6 inches; 2. Marquette, Mich., 117.8 inches; 3. Sault St. Marie, Mich., 113.6 inches; 4. Caribou, Maine, 113.3 inches; 5. Syracuse, N.Y., 110 inches; and 6. Lander, Wyo., 106 inches.

Buffalo, N.Y., which gets a lot of bad publicity for its heavy snowfall, is ranked 10th with 92.2 inches, Wallis said.

Like many Great Lakes cities, Chardon gets dumped on because of what weather forecasters call the "lake effect." Cold winds pick up moisture as they cross Lake Erie from the west and north and release it inland as snow, especially at higher elevations.

Moore has other figures to prove Chardon's boast: "The maximum in the records was the winter of 1959-60 when we got 161.5 inches of snow. The most for any one 24-hour period was 15 inches during December 21, 1960, and in January 1978 we had 57.1 inches of snow with 13 inches of it coming on Jan. 27."

Among Ohio Highway Patrol troopers, the Chardon post is compared to an assignment in Siberia.

"It's a joke around the state; if you do something wrong they're going to send you to the snow belt with fur-

lined boots," said Sgt. Ronald Kreuter.

Describing snow-paralyzed interstate highways, Kreuter said he didn't appreciate the meaning of "lake effect" until he was transferred here from Zanesville in southern Ohio.

"You can go from dry roads to six inches and blinding snow and winds in a matter of a half hour," he said. "Sometimes you get so much snow you can't see but there's no snow in Cleveland," 40 miles away.

In Chardon, the U.S. Postal Service does not pretend to live up to its motto: "Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds."

Forget it, says Postmaster Joe Kluczo. When snow comes he thinks first about the lives of letter carriers. "I tell them if it's too bad, to bring the mail back," said Kluczo. The fact that they rarely do, he says is "a tribute to them."

Police Chief William Niehus sees the snow season as a time to worry about motorists' driving habits. In December, the village had 88 inches of snow and 34 accidents — compared to 20 last June.

Schools Superintendent Clyde Zonker says the snow season is when he feels the heat that goes with his job.

"It's the pressure of continually having to make the judgment of whether it's a safe day to bring kids to school," he said. "I never sleep well. I'm always up before the transportation people call at 5 a.m. I'm always checking the window (for snow)."

Latin Guerrillas Find Forces Dwindling

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Most of the guerrilla forces that ranged from one end of South America to the other in the 1960s have been crushed by superior military might or have become part of the political system of their countries.

But calls to arms and revolt still echo in the continent's countryside and fetid slums.

Guerrilla groups are active today only in Colombia and Peru, and to a lesser extent in Chile and Ecuador.

In Argentina, Uruguay and Brazil, 1960s urban guerrilla movements of radicalized middle-class students — inspired by Cuba's example — never mustered wide popular support and

were crushed, one by one, by military dictatorships.

In oil-rich Venezuela, Communist rebels fought on through the 1960s, but then put down their weapons and joined the fold of an elected government.

For many, the death of international revolutionary Ernesto "Che" Guevara, killed leading a failed peasant uprising in Bolivia in 1967, symbolized the futility of Latin American insurgencies.

Nevertheless, the fires of rebellion burn on in some countries.

In Colombia they are fed by a legacy of hate and violence that has taken 72,000 lives in the last two decades.

In Peru a strange, new kind of

guerrilla has smashed his way into the political stage, wanting nothing to do with fellow leftists and pledging to ignite a revolution "from the heights of the Andes to the four corners of the earth."

In Ecuador and Chile, small urban guerrilla groups also have appeared, harassing their adversaries with kidnappings and electric-power blackouts.

Peru's new president, Alan Garcia, predicts that unless South America's fledgling democracies resolve their crippling economic problems, guerrilla wars will flare once again across South America.

"Peru, with its subversive warfare in the Andes, is a mirror of what will happen to other countries in the future," he says.

In Peru the fanatical Maoist-inspired Sendero Luminoso (Shining Path) has expanded its six-year-old war from its base in Ayacucho, a dirt-poor province high in the Andes, to the shantytowns and crowded streets of Lima.

Car bombs and guerrilla-caused blackouts have become part of daily life in Lima, once the premier city of South America's west coast. Today its threadbare look reflects Peru's worst economic slide in history.

The shadowy Shining Path shuns cooperation with other radical

groups and has even bombed the Cuban and Chinese embassies in Lima because it considers their governments traitors to the Communist principles laid down by the late Chairman Mao Tse-tung of China.

Shining Path has gained a reputation for extremism and terror unmatched by any other rebel group in Latin America. A few days before Peru's presidential election in April, Shining Path guerrillas marched into a mountain village in the Ayacucho area and chopped off the fingers of three adults and two children to underscore their warning against voting.

But many peasants say they are just as terrified of Peru's armed forces, which were put in charge of the Ayacucho area in late 1982. Since then the death toll has risen 25 times, to more than 5,000, and campesinos have reported massacres by the army in isolated Indian hamlets in the windswept highlands.

The military pressure is believed to have reduced the Shining Path's militants from a peak of 3,000 in 1983 to 2,000 today, but it has not kept the rebels from spreading to other parts of the Andes or to Lima.

Garcia himself has said that an end to the violence won't come until Peru's peasants and slum dwellers see an improvement in their daily

lives.

Others believe there can be no hope for peace until the Shining Path's leader, Abimael Guzman, a 55-year-old former philosophy professor known as "Presidente Gonzalo" to his followers, is captured or killed.

Guzman has embraced Mao's strategy of waging a prolonged war in the countryside. After gaining control there, his mostly Indian guerrillas would attempt to strangle Peru's cities, whose white and mestizo residents have always looked down on the Andes people.

Since 1984, the Tupac Amaru Revolutionary Movement, a pro-Cuba urban terrorist group, also has operated in Lima. It has exploded car bombs, carried out machine-gun at-

tacks on the U.S. Embassy and cultivated a Robin Hood image, seizing supermarkets and urging shoppers to loot them. It hijacks milk

ECU Library Offers New Research Index

The East Carolina Manuscript Collection has published a 37-page index of a "significant body of materials" pertaining to Asia and the Pacific islands contained in its archives and available to scholarly researchers.

Acquisition policy of the collection over the past 20 years has emphasized the active solicitation of manuscript materials relating to North Carolina, military affairs, tobacco and missionary life abroad, according to director Donald R. Lennon.

In describing the guide to Asian history resources in the Manuscript Collection, Lennon said the North Carolina holdings include letters, diaries and photographs of private citizens who traveled or resided in China, Japan and the South Pacific.

"Papers of public officials, such as congressmen, contain reports on congressional studies and fact-finding missions to Korea, the Philippines and a variety of other locations.

"Secondly, the military collections contain a wealth of materials stretching from the 1890s into the 1970s and reflecting such diverse experiences as Navy life in the Asiatic Squadron, the administration of Guam, the battle for Guadalcanal, and the horrors of the Bataan death march, as well as those of Vietnam 30 years later," Lennon said.

Tobacco collections provide a third perspective for scholars, reflecting the international business communi-

ty in China between 1905 and 1950.

"Papers and oral reminiscences of tobaccoists and their families represent the view of businessmen who observed life and conditions in China, frequently over a period of decades," Lennon says.

Missionary papers represent missionaries sponsored by the Southern Baptist, Methodist, Episcopal and Presbyterian denominations. "These well-educated men and women devoted their lives to service far from home," Lennon said.

"Frequently they remained in their adopted land for 20 or 30 years, ministering to the medical, educational and spiritual needs of people in China, Japan, Korea, the Philippines and elsewhere throughout the Orient," he said.

The four types of collections "may appear to represent diverse collecting areas, but when drawn together, they complement each other and provide a relatively uniform account of life and change in a complex and most historic civilization," he said.

The Asian history resources index is a third in a series of guides. Earlier, the collection published guides to its military history and women's history resources.

Researchers should keep in mind that detailed narrative descriptions of each group of papers are available in the collection search room in Joyner Library, East Carolina University, Lennon said.

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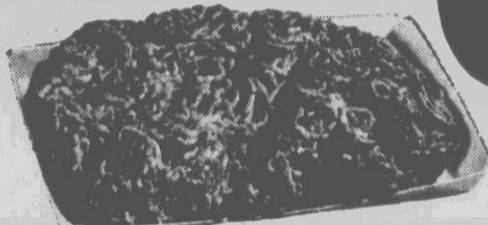

 trucks and gives the milk to the poor. Officials believe the group is small and made up mainly of middle-class young people and students.
 Some fear that continued guerrilla activities could undermine Peru's fragile democratic form of government installed in 1980 after 12 years of military rule. Former President Carlos Andres Perez was quoted as saying in an interview published in Caretas magazine that the guerrillas could "eventually justify a military rebellion on the pretext of defending the internal security of the country."
 In Colombia, the April 19 Movement (M-19) took over the Palace of Justice in Bogota in November, exposing that country's civilian government to a similar threat from its military establishment.
 If President Belisario Betancur of Colombia had made any attempt to negotiate with the guerrillas, the armed forces most likely would have overthrown him, according to political and diplomatic experts in Bogota.
 Instead, the army counterattacked and when the shooting was over 28 hours later, all 35 guerrillas and 60 hostages, including 11 Supreme Court justices, were dead. The building, on the historic Plaza Bolivar, was wrecked by flames and gunfire.
 The M-19 is one of a half dozen rebel groups in Colombia. It has said its intention is to force Betancur to submit to a public trial on charges of failing to help the poor.

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Peacekeepers Under Pressure To Leave

TIBNINE, Lebanon (AP) — Caught in ambushes, taken hostage and often pinned down by cross-fire, the United Nations peacekeepers in southern Lebanon are under pressure to leave.

But some Western analysts and local Lebanese leaders maintain that a U.N. retreat could bring the deadly civil war of Beirut to the volatile South. The battling militias, they say, will have no referee.

The soldiers of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon, UNIFIL, are victims of random violence and the targets of local militiamen who want to claim the territory the force holds. The attacks come from mainly the Shiite Moslem Amal militia and its rival in the south, the Israeli-

backed South Lebanon Army. A concerned Dutch government has already withdrawn its troops from the U.N. force, becoming the first country to cite safety considerations in quitting. Ireland has threatened to follow suit.

The future of the force was plunged into further doubt by a U.S. decision last month to slash \$18 million in contributions to UNIFIL, a quarter of its biannual funding. The United States said it was not convinced the force was useful.

Formed after a three-month Israeli incursion into southern Lebanon in 1978, the peacekeeping soldiers stood helplessly during a full-scale Israeli invasion in 1982.

Israel, which opposes the presence of UNIFIL, withdrew all but 1,000 of its troops from Lebanon last sum-

mer, ending a three-year occupation. The U.N. soldiers stayed, and in the last two months have come under fire an average of once a day, according to U.N. figures.

"Often, the soldiers are caught in cross-fire," said a senior U.N. official who could speak only on condition of anonymity. "But sometimes we are targeted by hotheads who won't put down their guns. And sometimes we feel Israel is encouraging its ally militiamen to attack us because Israel wants us to go."

The Irish battalion, headquartered in this Shiite Moslem town nine miles from the Israeli border, was caught in gunfire 16 times by mid-January, twice as often as it was the month before. One shell blew a watermelon-sized hole in a barracks housing sleeping soldiers.

The Norwegian and Finnish battalions also have clashed repeatedly with the South Lebanon Army, which held 21 Finnish soldiers hostage for eight days in June.

The other troops in the 5,800-member, nine-nation force, from Sweden, Italy, France, Fiji, Ghana and Nepal, also have not escaped the violence.

A soldier from Senegal and another from Nepal were killed in separate clashes with local gunmen last year, and another Nepalese soldier was killed by a South Lebanon Army tank shell on Jan. 25, bringing to 44 the number of U.N. military personnel killed in action since 1978.

Aharon Levan, a retired Israeli brigadier general who was liaison officer with UNIFIL until 1980, said the force is feeling the pressure.

"The Dutch withdrawal could well have been the beginning of the end for UNIFIL," Levan said in an interview. "If just one other European nation withdraws, the force will collapse."

Israeli military officers say the

U.N. force is ineffectual at best, and they have accused it of collaborating with anti-Israel guerrillas.

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin accused French UNIFIL soldiers last February of hampering Israeli operations in Lebanon.

In addition, the clashes between the Israeli-backed South Lebanon Army and UNIFIL have hurt Israel's relations with European countries.

But a Western diplomat contended in an interview that the U.N. force maintained an important balance of power in the region.

"Without UNIFIL, many Lebanese Christians will lose their lives. And Israel will have to bring more

soldiers into the South if it hopes to protect its border," the diplomat said, insisting on anonymity because of his diplomatic status.

The mayor of this village of 9,000 also said the region needs the U.N. force.

"We're hanging our hopes on UNIFIL," Abas Fawaz said in an interview in his home. "If they aren't here to stop the fighting between the militias, Tibnine may end up being like Beirut. We'll raise the money to keep them here, if we have to."

The Lebanese government in Beirut also wants UNIFIL to stay. It has called on the force to patrol all the way to the Israeli-Lebanese

border as its mandate dictates. Deployment to the border has been prevented by Israel.
