Pitt Board Agrees Election Changes Needed

The Pitt County Board of Commissioners Tuesday, at a meeting with representatives of the local chapter of the National Association of Colored People, agreed to move toward restructuring the county's method of electing commissioners to ensure black representation on the board by the 1988 elections.

Tuesday's meeting with the NAACP representatives resulted

from a letter from Pitt NAACP President D.D. Garrett and Secretary Brenda Weathington late last year which asked the board to appoint blacks to 30 percent of the board's membership by May of this year and make changes in district lines to guarantee blacks will be elected as commissioners in future elections.

At Tuesday's meeting Garrett, who said "our concern ... we hope is the concern of all of Pitt County," again

outlined the NAACP requests.

"We ask the County Commissioners if they will appoint (enough blacks to make up) 30 percent of the board ... (and) draw lines or districts whereby we could guarantee the election of black people. We think the time is right to have black representation on the board no later than May 1986," Garrett said.

But County Attorney W.H. Watson and Robert Joyce, a representative of the Institute of Government at

Chapel Hill, said changes in the composition of the board and in the method of election would take time.

Appointing blacks to the board "could not be done legally" Watson said, "simply for the reason (the board) was created by the Legislature" and any changes would require General Assembly action.

Watson explained that, while candidates for the board must live in the district they represent, commissioners are elected "at large" (voted

on countywide). Four of the county's five districts are represented by one commissioner, while the Greenville district has two seats on the board.

Any change, Watson said, "would require legislative change and preclearance from the (U.S.) Justice Department."

Watson said the "one-man, one-vote" rule doesn't apply to the present commissioner districts because board members are "elected at large from the entire county."

Joyce explained that "state law provides that a Board (of County Commissioners) can be set up in a number of ways," including: "strictly at-large" representation and voting; "residence districts with countywide vote" (which Pitt now has); "strictly districts" where a candidate would run from and be elected by voters only from the district, or "a combination of

Contractors Set For New School

The Pitt County Board of Education Tuesday rewarded contracts for the Pitt County elementary school being built in the Winterville area.

The contracts originally were let by the Consolidated Board of Education but were rescinded when the board voted in January to cease operation until federal preclearance for the board's structure is received. All contracts previously approved by the Consolidated Board had to be reapproved by the Pitt County Board of Education so that construction of the new school could proceed.

The contractors and the amount of the contracts are Thompson and Little Inc., kitchen and equipment construction, \$127,634; Kipco Piping Inc., plumbing construction, \$122,275; J.H. Hudson Construction Co., general construction, \$2,117,300; Pitt Electric Inc., electrical construction, \$172,200, and Pitt Mechanical Contractors Inc., heating and air conditioning construction, \$295,360.

The board also approved a resolution providing relief for J.M. Thompson Co. of any contractual responsibility regarding its bid for the general construction of the new elementary school. The board authorized the return of the company's bid bond. Because of mix-ups in bid specifications, the company's low bid, which was the one originally approved for the school, was not eligible for acceptance.

A financial update provided to the members showed that a total of \$23,157 was received by the schools during February as a result of fines and forfeitures in the county courts.

The amount of money originally budgeted for the month by the schools was \$15,833. Revenues from the courts since July 1985 exceeds the figure originally budgeted by \$57,645.

The board discussed six classes in the Pitt County school system that have more students enrolled than the state Board of Education allows. The board approved the submission of this information to the state board, as required. The local board must see that the class sizes be brought within the guidelines within 60 days.

The classes, which have one or two excess students, are located at G.R. Whitfield School, Ayden-Grifton High School, D.H. Conley High School and Grifton Elementary School.

A certificate of appreciation honoring the Board of Education was presented to Chairman Mark W. Owens Jr. by Beverly Peaden, president of the Pitt County chapter of the North Carolina Association of Educators.

Personnel recommendations were discussed and approved by the board.

The board was presented with information about a performance evaluation for school superintendents provided by the State Department of Public Instruction. Local boards of education are not required to use this document as an evaluative tool but may if they choose.

The board was presented a community schools monthly report listing the schools and the use of facilities and participation. Superintendent Edwin L. West told the board the Chicod Elementary School, which was used by the Community Schools for a total of 146 hours, has shown a significant increase in use.

South Greenville Seeks Trip Funds

A citywide drive began Tuesday in a last-minute effort to raise funds for a trip to Tidewater Virginia by 128 fifth graders in South Greenville School.

Kurt Fickling, president of South Greenville PTA, said the fund drive was arranged after state officials reported a promised grant for the trip had never been made. "This is a one-time fund-raiser effort locally. There is simply no time left now to seek funds for this spring's planned trip from other sources," Fickling said.

Fickling said Mary Everette has volunteered to head the fund-raiser, and "the city school office is being most helpful and supportive of the proposed fund-raising effort."

"We're hoping to get a number of businesses or people to underwrite the \$102 cost per child, or to contribute any amount they can afford," Fickling said.

School officials "have set up an account and are taking on total accountability responsibility," Fickling said. "Contributions are to be made payable to Greenville City Schools, to be noted for 'Tidewater Trip' and are to be sent to: Naomi Edwards, Finance Department, Greenville City Schools, 1717 W. Fifth St., Greenville."

Fickling said "I and others who have tried to get support from the State Department of Public Instruction have met a no-response attitude. I've talked to one or two officials, and Penny Laing did manage to talk once to Superintendent of Public Instruction Craig Phillips, but other than that those people will not even return our calls."

"I feel local school officials as are frustrated at the situation as we have been. One of the main concerns is the effect it would have on children if it is not possible to provide the trip for them. They have been geared all year to meet requirements to earn them the right for this trip."

Efforts are now being undertaken to seek assistance grants for the future, "but for now, there is no time to consider such sources if the children are to make the trip as planned this year."

The missing grant situation came to light in December when it was discovered that the 1986 increment of a reported \$50,000 foundation grant from Atlantic Richfield Co. of California was not carried on state funding records. An investigation was carried out, with the discovery that a state employee in charge of special grants had personally paid for last year's trip. The employee did this after initially reporting to the city school system the \$50,000 grant was forthcoming.

It has not yet been established whether or not Atlantic Richfield actually approved the \$50,000 grant.

Tobacco Support Vote Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farmers of flue-cured tobacco will be able to vote next week on whether to continue government quotas and price supports for the next three years, the Agriculture Department said Tuesday.

Quotas and price supports will remain in effect if approved by two-thirds or more of those voting. The mail referendum will be held March 10-13. In the last referendum held in 1982, 93.7 percent of the 112,314 voters favored continuing with controls and supports for the 1983, 1984 and 1985 crops.

Last Dec. 31, the department announced the 1986 flue-cured quota at 757 million pounds and the acreage allotment at 380,593 acres.

Undersecretary Daniel G. Amstutz said legislation is pending in Congress to lower the support price and the no-net-cost assessment. If the measure is not enacted before the opening of the market, 1986 flue-cured tobacco will be supported at \$1.717 per pound and assessed at 32 cents per pound, he said.

The assessment would cover projected losses for the 1986 crop as well as for the 1982-85 crops, Amstutz said.

Department officials announced last week that the 1986 burley tobacco marketing quota will be 525 million pounds, the same as last year. Burley producers will vote in a referendum on March 24-27 whether to have quotas on the next three crops.

In the last burley vote, producers gave a 97 percent approval to the quotas.

A budget bill containing legislation to revamp the tobacco program cleared a hurdle in the House Tuesday amid warnings from U.S. agriculture officials that without it, growers will pay higher assessments this year.

The House Rules Committee on Tuesday cleared the bill for House floor action under a rule that would prevent an attack on the tobacco provision separate from the bill. But a House Republican leader, angered at Democratic leaders over other issues, threatened a GOP rebellion that could postpone House action today.

Rep. William Gray III, D-Pa., Democratic chairman of the House Budget Committee, said it could be next week before the measure reaches the House floor. Rep. Trent Lott, R-Miss., House minority whip, accused the Democrats of a "very unseemly process."

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Farmville Board Agrees To Seek Museum Change

FARMVILLE — Farmville commissioners Tuesday night approved the May Commission's plan to seek court permission to use money willed by the late Tabitha May DeVisconti to tear down Miss DeVisconti's house at the corner of Main and Pine streets here and replace it with a building more suited for a historical museum.

"If you tear that house down and Miss Tabitha don't come back, then we can all know for sure there ain't no coming back," Town Commissioner Oliver Murphrey declared. He was the only commissioner present who did not agree to the plan.

Mayor Edna Earle Baker, who is also a member of the May Commission charged in Miss DeVisconti's will with creating a park of her yard in the 200 block of South Main Street and a museum of the house in which she lived, said the commission has tried since last April to find a way to restore the house or to use the original portion of the house as a museum. Bids were invited three times, she said, and no construction contractor would ever bid, although electric and

plumbing proposals were received. She said the commission has reached a unanimous opinion that repair or restoration of the house is not practical or feasible — that repair will be too expensive, that maintenance will be continuous and expensive, and that, even if repaired and opened, the house is not suitable for museum or public use.

The board gave its approval for the May Commission to pursue a legal process called Cy Pres (Latin for "as near as possible"). If approval is given by the courts, the commission will continue with plans for a museum to showcase the history of the Farmville area, Mrs. Baker said. She said she believes that having the history preserved was Miss DeVisconti's intent and that the museum will serve as a monument to her just as her house would have been, had it been suitable.

Following public hearings in which there was no discussion, approval was given for several amendments to the town's zoning ordinance and for amending the extraterritorial limits

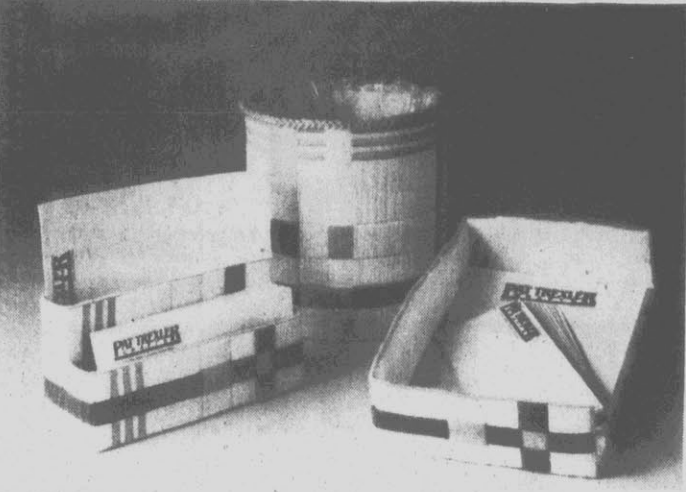
of the town. The extraterritorial amendment would extend the planning jurisdiction of the town eastward to include the area east of the new Eastern Loop Road and the area around the new interchange of U.S. 264 Bypass.

Joe Joyner of the Farmville Area Chamber of Commerce presented plans for a Spring Jubilee clean-up, fix-up, paint-up week in April, the board endorsed the idea and Mayor Baker appointed board member John Turner Walston to serve as the town's representative to the committee planning the event.

Approval was given for the placement of a sign at the corner of Main and Belcher Street on the Walter B. Jones Town Commons which will designate the block-sized park as the W.B.J. Town Commons. The cost of the sign was \$1,671.

Allocations were approved for building a new well for the town, a water line loop from Horton's Corner to Joyner's Crossroads and, if

If you have ever visited a church furnished with exquisite needlepoint paraments, I am sure you have wished your own church could launch a project that would allow members to contribute their needlepoint skills for beautification.

Few people have the knowledge of liturgical design or the expertise to bring such a project to fulfillment. But there is a new book available now that covers this subject so completely that any church with a few good needlepointers in the congregation could enjoy the fruits of their loving labor. The book is "Church Paraments in Needlework" by William R. and Mabel S. Doser.

I am fortunate enough to have Bill and Mabel Doser as personal friends and I am delighted to be able to share with you information about this book and a little background on how they came to be interested in ecclesiastical needlepoint.

A few years ago, as a United Methodist minister in western North Carolina, Bill served as pastor of three widely separated churches. As they regularly drove the route from one church to another, Mabel stitched her current needlepoint project. One day, seeing how much relaxation

and satisfaction Mabel got from this work, Bill decided to try his hand at it.

He gained so much enjoyment from this pastime — and found that it gave him so much time for reflection as he stitched — that soon Mabel was doing the driving while Bill did the needlepointing.

Soon after winning an award at an American Needlepoint Guild International Exhibition in Monaco for a set of four clergy stoles he designed and executed for himself, Bill received numerous requests for help in designing ecclesiastical projects around the country. To make a long story short, he retired as a minister and now devotes his time to Doser Designs, a company specializing in custom-designed ecclesiastical art for needlepoint and cross stitch.

The 177 pages of "Church Paraments in Needlework" are packed with all the aids that a lay committee would need to initiate and complete a lasting gift to the church of their choice. Bill and Mabel start with suggestions on setting up such a committee, gaining permission for the project, selection of designs and materials, and go from there to basics of good needlepoint, charts of dozens of liturgical symbols, appropriate colors for the various liturgical uses and seasons, specific measurements of various paraments and complete instructions for blocking and finishing.

You might also want a copy of the Dosers' earlier book, "Clergy Stoles." As both are self-published books, you may order either directly from Doser Designs, 605 S. Poplar St., Lincoln, N.C., 28092. (Wholesale information is available to book or needlework store from the same address.)

Vietnam Veterans Fighting Public Image

DEAR ABBY: I am writing in reference to your column signed "Anna in Hillsboro, Ore.," whose father was denied treatment at the VA hospital because he was first admitted to a civilian hospital. While the advice you gave her—"Get the book, 'Viet Vet Survival Guide,' and learn what your rights are"—was good, I am highly incensed by your comment, "Realizing that the average Vietnam veteran did not get past high school, the authors use plain language and short sentences."

Where and how did you come by such ridiculous information? As if we do not have enough falsehoods to overcome, we now have been classified as practically illiterate!

I quote from Facts and Fiction, taken from the National Vietnam Veterans Review (Nov. 1982):

FICTION: High school dropouts formed the largest proportion of U.S. forces in Vietnam.

FACT: 79 percent of those who served in Vietnam had a high school education or better when they entered the military service.

FACT: This was the best-educated army America has ever fielded. For comparison, 63 percent of Korean War vets, and only 45 percent of WWII vets, had completed high school upon separation from the military.

I think you owe the Vietnam veterans an apology. We've had enough bum raps over the years without your undeserved putdown.

DEAR VETERAN: The "ridiculous information" ("the average Vietnam veteran did not get past high school") is one of the myths about the Vietnam War still deeply ingrained in the minds of the American public over a decade after the last combat troops left the war zone.

I was not aware that I was perpetuating a false stereotype. Therefore, I offer my sincere apologies to anyone I might have offended.

DEAR ABBY: I am feeling torn. It has taken a long time for me to adjust after suffering a nervous breakdown. During my time of adjustment, I was blessed with a wonderful psychologist who helped me to find my way again. During the time she treated me, we developed a special kind of friendship. I have not seen her for three months when we agreed that I no longer needed therapy.

I am now being baptized for the first time in my life in the Catholic Church. My priest tells me that I need a sponsor or a "godmother." I would like to ask my former therapist to be my godmother, but I don't

want her to feel obligated. I am wondering if maybe it would be too much to ask of her.

This is very important to me. Should I ask her?

DEAR UNSURE: Ask her only if you feel reasonably certain that she will accept without hesitation. Some therapists, as a matter of policy, do not "socialize" with patients or former patients, so if you ask her and she declines, do not feel personally rejected.

DEAR ABBY: It's easy to find out if a gift was not received. Mail a postcard saying, "I am sending you a gift. You should receive it in a few days, a week, or whatever."

You may not hear if it is received, but you will surely hear if it isn't.

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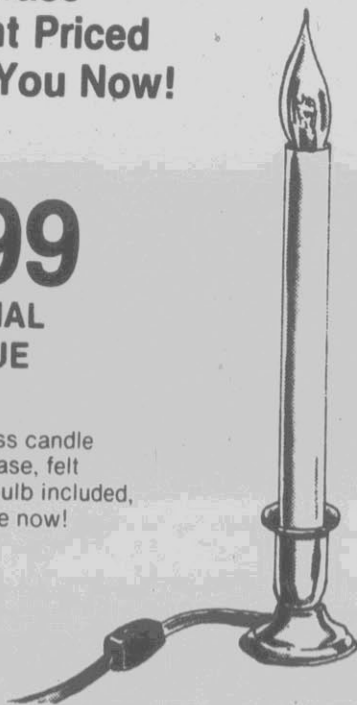


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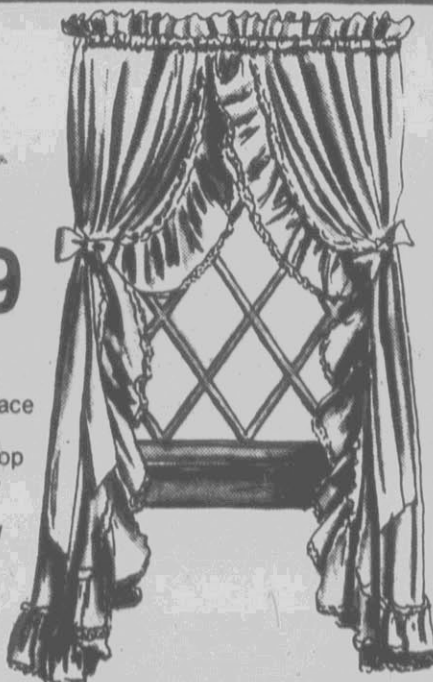


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Editorials

Leadership

If one looks back, the short saga of revolution in the Philippine Republic was a trying time for the United States as well as the Filipino people. When the dust settled, Washington could smile and Filipinos could exult.

The happy circumstances were achieved without blatant U.S. intervention; without an irreparable factional rift among citizens of the Pacific nation, and without reverting to the savagry and mindless destruction often accompanying a public upheaval. Those were not only American goals, but were largely shared by the rebel forces, as well.

Hundreds of thousands of faceless and nameless heroes contributed to the outcome. Multitudes of "Cory" Aquino's supporters took to the streets in their demand Ferdinand Marcos relinquish his reelection claim and accept their verdict of guilt in a massively fraudulent election process.

The scales tilted when two of the highest ranking officers in the defense establishment joined the revolutionary forces and urged others in the armed forces to join them. An unbelievably large number of men whose lives had been guided by the traditions of military discipline made the most difficult decision in their lives, risking their honor and their lives at a time when the balance of power could go either way.

Later, tens of thousands of civilians stood between them and a force of armored vehicles and armed soldiers sent by Marcos loyalists to seize and/or punish the defectors. In that moment of truth the threatening unit could not or would not fire into the defenseless multitude of citizens and left the scene. The tide had turned.

For its part, Washington let Marcos know it would help him leave the country and provide a haven of security for him and his family if there was no bloodshed. In any event, he had to go.

He went. President Aquino's first step was to move toward reconciliation between her followers and those of the humiliated Marcos, even to the extent of including some Marcos supporters in overnment. The latter represent a risk to the Aquino leadership because they are holdovers of the old regime where-in thought-patterns and personal alliances developed over a period of years with Marcos and his fellow looters may linger. Certainly their presence will offend many people.

That is only one of the handicaps besetting the new government. Others include widespread poverty (for which there is no quick-fix), the presence of inept or crooked officials who flourished in the lower echelons of government, pending cases of torture and killings likened to the ordeal of Argentina under the rule of its generals and, finally, an anticipation of the saying that if things can go wrong, they will go wrong.

Problems? Dangers? Booby-traps? President Aquino faces them all and has not quailed. The soft-spoken lady has thus far shown a strong will and fearless facade. She'll need it all.

The Filipino people have a leadership that mirrors their own ideals and qualities of raw courage.

Comeback

Hold on to your hats, paw. The moonshiners are making a comeback.

Celebrated in song and film, the distillers of illegal whiskey are as much a part of American folklore as the cowboy.

In North Carolina they flourished from the mountains to the coast, helped on back in the 1920s by the nation's experiment with prohibition.

The moonshiners were finally done in by spiraling costs and effective law enforcement. Now, however, the Associated Press reports their comeback in Kentucky. There it is reported that eight stills were destroyed by state Alcohol Beverage Council agents last year. An officer says the bootleggers are making a comeback because state law enforcers are seeing diminishing federal support. He cited cuts in the number of agents with the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

The moonshiner might have had folk appeal, but the human grief he caused is well documented. With all of society's current problems, we should do what we can to see that the bootlegger never gets established again.

Luck Falls Reagan's Way

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rise of Philippine President Corazon Aquino was an improbable turn of events that represents yet another example of how things seem to go President Reagan's way. It's enough to make his hard luck predecessor envious.

Whether by luck or design, Reagan has demonstrated an unusual ability to escape foreign policy disasters. Compared with Jimmy Carter, Reagan has had remarkably little go wrong from his first inaugural — the hostages in Iran were released 20 minutes after his swearing-in — right up to Ferdinand Marcos' ouster.

Only 16 months ago, a peaceful political evolution in the Philippines

seemed highly unlikely. Reagan himself said in his 1984 presidential campaign debate with Walter Mondale that the only alternative to Marcos was "throwing (the Philippines) to the wolves and then facing the communist power in the Pacific."

Authoritarian strongmen almost always are able to arrange elections to their liking, but in Marcos' case his attempts at ballot box fraud led to his departure and his replacement by an avowedly democratic successor — all with a minimum of bloodshed. Among the losers, besides Marcos, is the Marxist New People's Army, at least for now.

Instead of being thrown to the

wolves, as Reagan had said, the Philippines was thrown to Corazon Aquino.

Reagan's darkest day in his five years as president quite possibly occurred on Oct. 23, 1983, when 241 U.S. Marines were killed by terrorists in Beirut.

There were recriminations about whether the Marines had been left in an exposed position but, within 48 hours, that issue took a back seat to the events in the Caribbean. The ouster of Grenada's Marxist government by a U.S.-led invasion force is viewed by Reagan as his principal foreign policy achievement. As his

visit there last week suggested, Reagan continues to be the toast of the island.

Three months after the tragedy in Beirut, Reagan's Lebanon policy collapsed altogether when he gave up on his effort to mediate a political settlement and ordered home the remaining U.S. military forces there.

But the sting of that defeat was softened considerably when the world's attention shifted the same week to Moscow, where President Yuri Andropov died. Doubts about the wisdom of Reagan's policy toward Lebanon yielded to curiosity about Andropov's successor, Konstantin Chernenko.

As a State Department official wryly observed at the time, Andropov's death was not untimely.

While Reagan has been able to avoid the kind of setbacks that plagued Carter during his last two years in office, he has few outright foreign policy victories.

The Middle East remains stalemated, and progress toward a regional settlement in southern Africa has been painfully slow. Arms control agreements with the Soviets continue to be elusive. And Nicaragua's leftist government has been a far more intractable foe than the administration had anticipated.

By contrast, within the first two years of his presidency, Carter could boast the Camp David agreement, the Panama Canal treaties and the breakthrough in relations with China.

Carter's last two years, however, were a different story. It was a period dominated by the Iran hostage crisis, the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, the emergence of Marxist or Marxist-leaning regimes in three Caribbean Basin countries, escalating warfare in El Salvador and attacks on American embassies in Libya and Pakistan.

Carter's defenders have said that if the first and last two years of his presidency had been inverted, the results of the 1980 election might have been different. He carried six states.

Reagan's backers insist that more than luck is involved in his capacity to avoid calamity. And shortly after Marcos agreed to step down, Reagan was receiving plaudits from all sides for his role. Even Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., joined in the praise.

But, as Secretary of State George Shultz has acknowledged, the United States had far less to do with the outcome than the Filipinos themselves.

Probation Vs. Prison

RALEIGH — A pilot corrections program begun several years ago appears almost certain to be expanded statewide as a way of saving the state a bundle of money and easing prison overcrowding.

The powerful Joint Governmental Operations Committee of the Legislature voted last month to endorse the expansion of intense probation. That endorsement came after State Auditor Ed Renfrow and the administration of Gov. Jim Martin had concluded that intense probation is a good idea.

Intense probation is significantly different from other forms of probation. A probationer is put on tight restrictions and he's bird-dogged by both his probation officer and a state surveillance officer. The threat of active time hangs over his head if he doesn't comply with the restrictions placed on him.

Intensive probation works because the probation officer has a much

smaller caseload. The average probation officer in North Carolina has 119 cases to handle. With intensive probation, a two-man team has 25 people to watch.

While other probationers may only see their officer once a week, or more likely, once or twice a month, a probationer in the intensive program sees his officer several times a week.

Small caseloads and frequent contacts cost the state six times as much as does regular probation. But it saves the state a lot of money when compared to sending a person to prison. And the people put on intensive probation are those judges would otherwise put behind bars.

Consider that each cell in a new state prison costs \$57,000 to build and that, considering all costs, the average inmate costs \$11,500 to lock up for a year. On the other hand, an intensive probation team needs only a small amount of equipment and a

car and can operate at an average cost of \$2,814 a year for each probationer.

The auditor estimated that each of the state's current eight intensive probation teams is saving the state \$220,000 a year. The auditor proposes to expand the eight two-man team program to 38 two-man and six three-man teams. After paying these additional employees, the state would still save \$8.8 million a year.

Just as important, the expansion would reduce the need for bed space by 990 inmates, corrections officials estimate.

When Sen. Ken Royall, D-Durham, heard those figures he quite naturally asked, "Why stop at 990?" Scott Harvey, deputy correction secretary, said later that after 990 the efficiency of the program would be reduced. His department has determined that there will about that many probationers who can be effectively handled by this program. Expand beyond 990, given current knowledge about intensive probation, and the correction department might be putting people on the street who would be dangerous.

Stephanie Bass, executive director of the N.C. Center on Crime and Punishment, said the efficiency of intensive probation can also be undermined if people who don't need that much supervision are placed in the program. "If you don't concentrate on that otherwise prison bound felon, you won't end up effecting the rate of commitments to prison and you won't save any money."

Intensive parole has also been tried in North Carolina, but it didn't work as well, the state auditor's report said. Intensive parole would allow the state to move people out of prison early, but the auditor's report said that the numbers of parolees available at the time the program was tried did not justify in economic terms the creation of an intensive parole team.

In The Spotlight

WASHINGTON — When word got out earlier this month that college student John Zaccaro Jr. had been arrested in Vermont on drug-related charges, one's first impulse may have been to imagine how his famous mother, former Rep. Geraldine Ferraro, took the news.

Some people might have simply chafed up the arrest as one more public embarrassment for a family that has known bittersweet notoriety since Ms. Ferraro was named the Democrats' vice presidential nominee in 1984. Relatively few people probably placed themselves in the young Zaccaro's shoes first and imagined him wondering, "How did I ever get into this mess?"

It's safe to say that had Zaccaro been just another undergraduate at Middlebury College, publicity about his arrest would have probably gone no farther than the neighboring New England counties. But the 21-year-old New York native had both the blessing and curse of being born to a politically ambitious parent.

If the infant mortality rate is a measure of a country's overall health, the family has traditionally been one prism through which Americans judge their elected leaders. Ironically, we've tended to lionize those politicians who leave public office to, as it is often said, spend more time with spouse and children.

Unfortunately, the emphasis has usually been on what kids can do for a politician, not what public life does for — or to — political kids. Some of them thrive in the spotlight. Many, however, either shy from it or prove adversely affected.

Our current president and first lady are two rarities in that their

children have remained, with the exception of GOP apparatchik Maureen Reagan, very much in the background.

But Patti Davis and Ronald Reagan Jr., the first couple's contributions to the baby boom, recently reminded the world of their existence: Patti with the pending publication of an autobiographical novel, and young Ron with his appearance in briefs on "Saturday Night Live."

It was only natural to suspect that neither writing nor acting talent had assured them their opportunities. But what was more striking about this case was the irreverent, if not spiteful, message in the young Reagan's performances. Although fleet-footed Ron Jr.'s re-enactment of a scene from "Risky Business" probably endeared him to millions of viewers, it no doubt had his father's political advisers standing on their heads. And Patti's book leaves little to question about her deep-seated resentment for mother Nancy, the archetypal political spouse.

Other political children have surely benefitted overall from parental notoriety. Actress Eleanor Mondale is called to mind, as is Jack Ford, for whom life in the White House was akin to "Fantasy Island."

This isn't to suggest that the charges filed against John Zaccaro can or even should be attributed to weakness in the face of family fame. According to press reports, in fact, police suspect that Zaccaro began to distribute drugs to student consumers before his mother's name even joined the vice presidential rumor mill.

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Man Wounded In RFK Assassination Disputes Report Sirhan Acted Alone

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sirhan Sirhan, convicted of the 1968 assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, says a summary of police files kept secret for 17 years supports what he always claimed: "I killed the senator and acted alone."

However, Paul Schrade, who was wounded in the head by a bullet as Kennedy was shot down in the Ambassador Hotel kitchen, disputed the conclusions in the summary released Tuesday. Schrade said he may file suit under public records disclosure laws to force release of the full 50,000 pages of files.

"You act as if you own these records," Schrade, who was not seriously wounded, told the Los Angeles Police Commission. "You don't. The public does." He believes there was another gunman besides Sirhan.

The summary written in 1969 and released Tuesday concluded that Sirhan was a lone assassin and that there was no evidence of conspiracy or another gunman. It said Sirhan premeditated the June 5, 1968, murder of Kennedy, who had just won the California Democratic presidential primary.

"The report says that I killed the senator and acted alone," Sirhan told the Los Angeles Times in a telephone interview. "That is true, and I have already admitted that."

"Beyond that, it is impossible to comment on any points without seeing the full report."

Sirhan pleaded innocent under

California's "diminished capacity" provision, but a jury convicted him April 17, 1969, of first-degree murder and recommended a death sentence. In 1972, the state Supreme Court overturned the state's death penalty provision and reduced his sentence to life in prison.

In connection with Sirhan's trial, the report Tuesday said police filmed a reenactment of the crime five months after it occurred and confirmed that Schrade had been hit by a bullet that passed through Kennedy's coat.

Schrade claimed that was physically impossible.

The commission recommended that Mayor Tom Bradley appoint a

separate committee to handle the editing of the 50,000 pages and to set a timetable for their release. Schrade said if that doesn't occur quickly, he will sue.

He and others have sought for years to have the information made public. Commissioners decided to release the summary Tuesday as a result of those demands, officials said.

Sirhan, who is serving his sentence at Meadad Prison, said recently he doesn't remember shooting Kennedy and blamed his amnesia on alcohol, saying he drank several cocktails that night — the first time he had ever imbibed.

The summary says investigators reported that Sirhan was not under the influence of drugs or alcohol and was sane when he shot Kennedy.

Sirhan, who has been turned down for parole eight times by the California Parole Board, has another hearing scheduled March 27.

The three-volume summary, which was heavily censored to protect privacy rights of individuals, mentioned no suspect other than Sirhan by name.

It noted in an introduction that the Los Angeles Police Department was under enormous pressure to solve the crime.

"The department's reputation quite literally was on the line, and we were being watched by most Americans to see if we could perform the job which law enforcement in America is charged with doing," the summary said.

"It was obvious, that history would look upon the results of our in-

vestigation to ascertain if we had exhausted all possible means to uncover the complete truth about the event," it said.

The summary focused on the formation of a special police task force and its investigations of well-publicized conspiracy theories, including involvement of a "girl in the polka-dot dress" and tips that Sirhan was allied with various political groups. Dozens of people were given lie detector tests and all conspiracy reports eventually were discredited, the summary showed.

"Particularly close scrutiny was given to the many conspiracy leads, regardless of their surface implausibility or the apparent publicity-seeking nature of the informant," it said.

In the case of a report that a girl in a polka-dot dress ran from the hotel shouting, "We shot him," investigators concluded that a man who said he saw her had concocted the whole story, the summary said.

The summary recalled a probe of possible links between Sirhan and Arabic groups, communists, Cubans and right-wing extremists; the involvement of Sirhan with the mystical theories of the Rosicrucian Society and the Sirhan family's hard-luck history as Palestinian immigrants.

The summary also detailed dozens of leads police followed, but which turned out to be false.

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Meese Supports Proposal To Require Drug Testing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Giving drug tests to all applicants for federal jobs is reasonable and constitutional, and the Justice Department will consider drug testing for some employees on the government payroll, Attorney General Edwin Meese said.

At a news conference Tuesday with Judge Irving R. Kaufman, chairman of a presidential commission that is recommending "suitable drug testing programs" for federal employees and federal contractors, Meese was asked whether he considered drug testing as a condition for employment an unreasonable search that violates constitutional rights.

"By definition it's not an unreasonable search," Meese said. "It's

something a person consents to for the privilege of applying for the employment."

The recommendation by the President's Commission on Organized Crime ran into immediate opposition when it was announced Monday.

"If a prize were created for the most idiotic recommendation of a presidential commission, the recommendation of the President's Commission on Organized Crime that all federal workers be subject to drug tests would surely be the winner," Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., chairman of the House civil service subcommittee, said in a letter to President Reagan.

Schroeder said the commission

"should have stayed within its charter rather than proposing policies to demoralize the work force."

In its report, the commission said the only way to win the war on drugs is to supplement law enforcement efforts in intercepting narcotics shipments with efforts to reduce the demand. Drug testing in the government and private sector would be one approach, the commission said.

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Postal Rates Going Up For Charities, Newspapers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Postal rates for newspapers and charities will increase Sunday for the second time this year in what one critic calls a political move "to squeeze another \$100 million out of the non-profit community."

"This administration, while they talk about non-profits being a replacement for government, are, in fact, now taking steps to foreclose the principal fund-raising means for most organizations," George E. Miller, president of the non-profit Mailers Federation, said of Tuesday's action by the board of governors of the Postal Service.

"It seems to be a move that is motivated by something other than

an economic motive to squeeze another \$100 million dollars out of the non-profit community," he said.

Joseph Lorfano, a spokesman for the American Newspaper Publishers Association, said many publishers of smaller newspapers believe the increase hurts them disproportionately.

"Sharing fairly the impact of budget reductions should not lead us to these unfortunately large postage increases," he said.

Tax dollars make up the difference between normal postage rates and cheaper preferred rates ordered by Congress for items such as church bulletins, charitable appeals, news-

papers delivered in the county where they are published, farm and classroom publications and books mailed between libraries.

Robert Hoobing, a spokesman for the Postal Service, said under the law the postal service must increase the preferred rates if Congress reduces the subsidy.

"Legally, we can't just wink and say 'O.K. guys. We'll find another way to do this,' because what would happen is some other class of mail would have to foot part of the bill," Hoobing said.

The rate increases range from averages of 2 percent to 20 percent for particular types of non-profit and newspaper mail. They follow Jan. 1

increases ranging from 23 percent to 41 percent. First-class and other non-subsidized rates will not change.

The second rise is designed to make up for the \$72 million difference between the subsidy the postal service had expected to receive and what Congress actually appropriated on Dec. 19. It also takes into account \$32 million in cuts, effective March 1, required by the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law.

The board, in setting the Jan. 1 rates, assumed a tax subsidy of \$820 million as passed by Congress Dec. 3. However, after a veto by President Reagan, Congress appropriated \$748 million, which was further reduced to \$716 million by Gramm-Rudman.

The new rates, effective from Sunday through the end of the fiscal year on Sept. 30, could change again late this year if the Reagan administration succeeds in trimming or eliminating all subsidies to mailers.

On another matter, John R. McKean, chairman of the governors, said the board would seek a change in regulations to permit private firms to collect overseas mail within the United States and remain it outside the country.

While international remailing services are technically banned under rules securing the Postal Service's monopoly, McKean said consumers benefit because many of the firms provide the service at a better price.

"That tells us something important about the way we are now doing our job in this area. The monopoly was not intended to protect us from hav-

ing to face up to our own shortcomings," McKean said.

The rule changes, if approved by

the governors, would take effect later this year after publication in the Federal Register.

Navy Eases Ship Rules For Women

WASHINGTON (AP) — Aware of "the willingness and ability of pregnant women to continue to serve," the Navy plans to relax its policy governing ship assignments for pregnant female sailors and officers.

Under the new policy, women will be allowed to remain on board up to their 20th week of pregnancy, assuming they are cleared by a medical officer, Lt. Stephen Pietropaoli, a Navy spokesman, said Tuesday.

That will mark a significant about-face for the Navy, which currently requires that women abandon sea duty as soon as their pregnancy is confirmed.

The new policy will be distributed to fleet commanders within the next month or so, the spokesman said.

"The change has been approved by the Navy surgeon general and recognizes the willingness and ability of pregnant women to continue to serve," Pietropaoli said.

"It will also help reduce the vacancies created by early transfers under the original policy" and thus improve readiness, he said.

Although women are banned from serving in any combat role with the military services, the vast majority of job specialties within the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps have been open to women for some years.

Family Farm Goes Off At Auction For \$45,000

DODGEVILLE, Wis. (AP) — A couple sobbed as they watched the 310-acre farm that had been in their family for more than 80 years sold at a foreclosure auction in five minutes Tuesday, saying it was "like we've lost one of our best friends."

Sue and Ken Massey, whose letter about the family's plight brought the farm crisis home to millions when it was read last fall at the nationally televised FarmAid concert, stood with their five children during the sale on the steps of the Iowa County Sheriff's office.

Raphael Peterson, a feed supplier who said the Masseys owed him

about \$65,000, was the successful bidder for the Hollandale egg farm. His \$45,000 bid topped a \$41,965 offer from the Farmers Savings Bank of Mineral Point, the only other bidder.

"I'm feeling a tremendous void," said Mrs. Massey, 29. "There's an emptiness like we've lost one of our best friends. Hopefully, we'll have some weeks of well-deserved healing."

Massey, whose family owned the farm more than 80 years, said the ordeal had strained family bonds, but that love and communication had held them together.

"I've been so low, it's been terri-

ble," said Massey, 34, choking back sobs. "I just want to say to all the farmers who have considered suicide: you've got to make it. You've got to stay with your family."

Massey, who farmed the land, said he also was happy with his job as a farm laborer at a state agriculture experiment station in Arlington. Mrs. Massey is a part-time secretary at a veterinary clinic.

Peterson said he would consider an arrangement allowing the Masseys to continue living on the farm, but Mrs. Massey said staying there would be painful.

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Air Force Collects Bids On \$35 Million Fighters

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force is collecting first-round bids on a new Stealth fighter that it hopes will rule the skies by the mid-1990s.

Seven of the nation's biggest aerospace contractors are trying to show the Air Force they can build 750 Advanced Tactical Fighters for an estimated \$35 million apiece, and financial documents supporting their bids were to be submitted today.

The Air Force intends the plane to replace the F-15, a medium-range dog fighter that first flew in 1972. It also may replace the F-16 for hitting ground targets, and the Navy is watching to see whether the new fighter can take the place of the F-14s it uses to protect ships at sea.

The ATF will be designed to knock out enemy fighters and airborne warning and control systems (AWACS), clearing the air for other U.S. fighters, bombers, transports and reconnaissance craft, and protecting ground forces, said Col. Albert C. Piccirillo, director of the Air Force program to develop the new fighter.

"The mission is air superiority,"

said Piccirillo, interviewed by telephone Tuesday in his office at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base near Dayton, Ohio. "It is going to fly supersonic, very high, very fast, very far."

The plane, still on the drawing board, will be made largely of composite materials and will use an array of new technology, ranging from so-called Stealth devices to hide it from enemy radar, to engines that can fly efficiently at nearly twice the speed of sound at 50,000 feet above

sea level. Most fighters now cruise more efficiently at subsonic speeds, pouring on fuel to break through the sound barrier for limited periods of combat. The speed of sound is about 660 mph at 30,000 above sea level.

The Air Force wants a plane that has twice the combat range of the F-15 and can turn in half the space. The F-15 loses maneuverability in supersonic flight and needs an 8,000-foot runway and a large maintenance crew. Those are three drawbacks the ATF will be designed to counter.

Waldheim Denies Allegations He Concealed Ties To Nazis

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The World Jewish Congress has accused Kurt Waldheim of concealing a Nazi past that included membership in Adolf Hitler's storm troops, but the former U.N. secretary-general denied the allegations Tuesday.

Waldheim, who is campaigning for the Austrian presidency, said in a television interview the charges were an attempt by opponents to hurt his chances of winning. He is considered a front-runner in the May 4 election.

The Jewish Congress said Waldheim had covered up a past including membership in the Nazi Student Union and the S.A., or Sturmabteilung, Hitler's brown-shirted security troops.

The congress also said he served on the staff of Gen. Alexander Loehr, an Austrian in Hitler's army who is linked by historians to the deportation of thousands of Jews and atrocities against Balkan partisans during World War II.

The Soviet Union and other communist East European countries consider Loehr one of the war's greatest perpetrators of atrocities on the Balkan front.

"As I've said several times already, it's not true," the 67-year-old Waldheim asserted in his interview with state-run television.

"I was never a member of one of these organizations," he said of the alleged S.A. and student union activities.

Waldheim's spokesman, Gerold Christian, acknowledged on the telephone that Waldheim was attached to Loehr's group as a first lieutenant during part of World War II. But he told the AP that Waldheim served as a translator behind the lines, and that Waldheim had spent part of his service time in Vienna on leave to complete law studies.

"This whole campaign is aimed at embarrassing (Waldheim) and is obviously paid for," Christian said, without specifying who he thought was responsible.

Waldheim himself did not deny serving with Loehr, who was executed by Yugoslavia in 1947 for war crimes, but asserted in the television interview that allegations associating him with Balkan atrocities are "also untrue."

Nazi-hunter Simon Wiesenthal, head of Vienna's Jewish documentation center, told the AP there was nothing to incriminate Waldheim, to his knowledge. Evidence of a Nazi past would have led to a Soviet veto of his appointment as secretary-general, he said.

However, Edgar M. Bronfman, president of the World Jewish Congress, said Tuesday Waldheim had engaged in "one of the most elaborate deceptions of our time."

Waldheim was U.N. secretary-general between 1972-1982. His appointment would have been inconceivable "had the facts been

known," said Bronfman, according to a congress statement.

But Waldheim said his background was carefully examined and found without fault even before his U.N. appointment, during the post-war years.

"There is clearly a campaign in process, a slander campaign," he said. "Things are being dug up that were verified 40 years ago as untrue."

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Mavretic Says He Will Push Anti-Tax Bill

RALEIGH (AP) — State Rep. Joe Mavretic says he's not giving up his battle to eliminate property taxes in North Carolina, despite critics who he claims are putting their narrow interests above the common good.

"The bill is alive and well, and it's going to get a whole lot stronger," Mavretic, D-Edgecombe, said in a news conference Tuesday. "It's not going to go away, so forget that."

He said a report by the Institute of Government at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill that questions the constitutionality of his proposal may actually strengthen his case.

The 200-page report released last week said that wealthy homeowners living in cities and people at or below

the poverty level would be the biggest winners under the Mavretic plan, while renters would come up short.

Last year, the legislator's plan was passed by the House Finance Committee, but got bogged down on the House floor. It was returned to the committee, and another panel was established to study between sessions the issues that the proposal raises.

Mavretic said he planned to activate the bill during the June short session if he had enough votes. If not, he will reintroduce it in 1987.

The measure would:

- Repeal of all property taxes, the primary funding source for county and city governments.
- Abolition of all local sales taxes. The statewide sales tax would be raised from 3 percent to 8 percent,

with the revenues from 5 percent of the tax funding local government operations and programs. The local portion of the tax would be constitutionally guaranteed.

— Half the revenue generated by the corporate income tax, which now goes entirely to the state, would be shared with local governments.

Mavretic has estimated that under his bill, 92 of the state's 100 counties would raise more tax revenue than under the current system, while eight would lose money. The institute study predicted that 90 counties would gain and 10 would lose.

Counties that lose could impose additional local taxes on land sales and income to compensate.

According to the Institute of Government report, the constitutional problem with the Mavretic bill is that

it would jeopardize local governments' ability to repay money borrowed through bond sales.

Mavretic said tax experts on the legislative staff had assured him that a simple drafting change would solve the problem.

Meanwhile, he said, the report supports his plan's philosophical underpinnings: that the property tax guarantees inequities between rural and urban areas; that the tax is difficult to administer; and that it is the "most inefficient" of the state's major taxes.

Mavretic, who has stumped for his plan across the state since the 1985 Legislature adjourned, said the "special interests" fighting him eventually would be drowned out by approving taxpayers.

"There's one group of people you haven't heard from yet, and that's the people that pay the bills," he said.

He said many people who originally had laughed at his plan and called it "a flaky idea" were coming to him and asking about possible compromises.

Mavretic charged that the N.C. League of Municipalities opposed the bill primarily because it favored "home rule," or the authority for cities to impose any taxes they want.

He noted that the league last week backed the half-cent local-option sales tax increase endorsed by a legislative study committee, and that Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt unsuccessfully urged the panel to recommend that local governments be permitted to choose from a "menu" of optional taxes to fit their revenue needs.

Mavretic said he would not support any increase in local sales taxes unless coupled with property tax

relief.

The report also "put to bed" allegations that his plan would make the state's tax system more regressive, he said. Mavretic said the study showed that an income tax rebate included in the bill would shield people at or below the poverty line from detrimental effects of a higher sales tax.

Medal Awarded

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — Saying she's not bitter about the space shuttle explosion that killed her husband, Jane Smith accepted an award at a ceremony where her astronaut-husband, Mike Smith, had been scheduled to speak.

"We miss him terribly," said Mrs. Smith, who has three children. "We just try to press on. He's still a great part of our lives and always will be. But you have to be persistent. I still have to be a mother, and the children still have to go to school. We look to the future with the script Mike gave us."

Wearing gold pilot's wings Tuesday, Mrs. Smith accepted the gold medallion of the Winston-Salem Rotary Club. Smith, a Rotarian himself and a native of Beaufort, was the pilot of the Challenger, which exploded shortly after takeoff Jan. 28.

"On behalf of him and with great pride, I accept this award," Mrs. Smith said. "Thank you so much for today."

Agriculture Nominee Receives Friendly Reception By Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard E. Lyng, President Reagan's nominee for secretary of agriculture, appears headed for easy confirmation after a friendly hearing at which senators already were requesting aid for their farm constituents.

Although Lyng's name still must be sent to the full Senate for approval — a move expected within the next week — members of the Senate Agriculture Committee chaired by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., were already referring to him as "Mr. Secretary" in their questioning at Tuesday's hearing.

Lyng told the committee his highest priority as secretary would be restoring foreign markets for U.S. farm goods. He said the new farm law signed by Reagan in December provides the lower price-support levels and export subsidies needed to

restore American competitiveness.

From a high of \$43.8 billion in 1981, agricultural exports have slumped to a projected \$28 billion this year.

Referring to what he called "the impossible economic condition of agriculture," Lyng promised times on the farm will improve.

"Let me say that things are going to get better. They are going to get better just when some people will think it's time to give up," he said.

A longtime Reagan friend, Lyng was state agriculture director in California when Reagan was governor and worked in Reagan's presidential campaigns. He was an assistant secretary of agriculture in the Nixon administration and deputy secretary under John Block until a year ago, when he left to start his own private consulting firm with other USDA officials.

Block announced his resignation Jan. 7, and Reagan announced his intention to nominate Lyng three weeks later.

The hottest topic at the confirmation hearing was credit. Spring lending season is gearing up with farmers seeking operating loans in order to buy seed, fuel and fertilizer to plant this year's crop.

"Farmers are deciding whether to plant or not, whether to go under, whether to liquidate," said Sen. Thad Cochran, R-Miss. "It's a tough choice," and one made tougher, he said, by the Farmers Home Administration's unreasonable eligibility requirements.

"There has been a problem each of the last few years, and I presume it will be a problem this year," Lyng said. "I will do what is possible to see to it there are adequate operating

funds." But he added that with budgetary constraints, it would not be possible to take care of all farmers needing loans.

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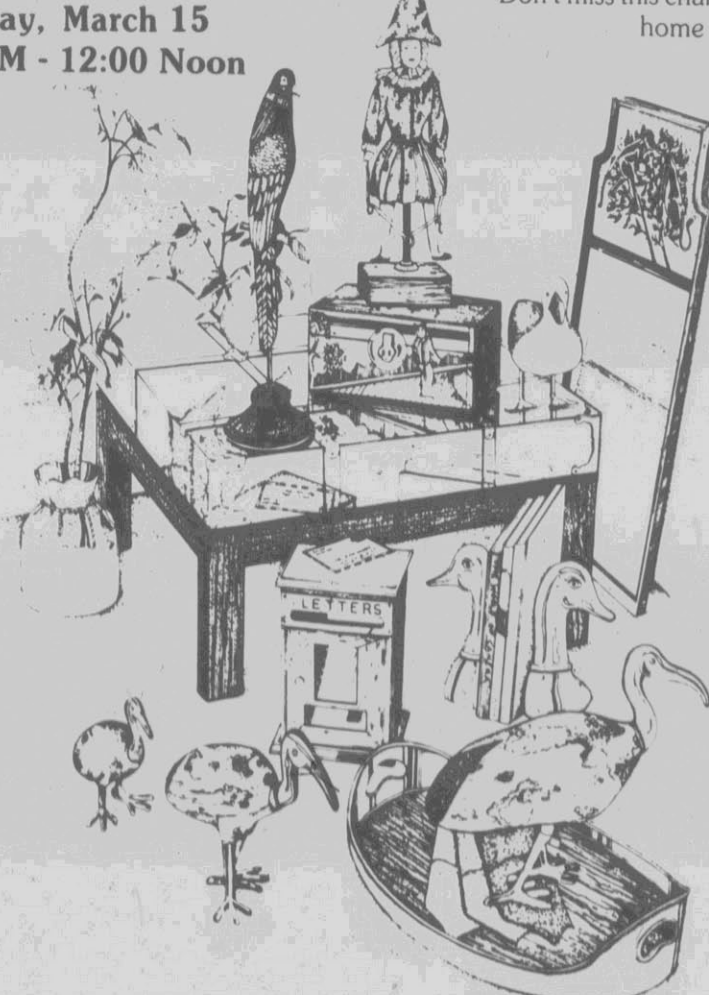
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
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
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
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


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Legislator Wants Judge To Resign

SPRUCE PINE, N.C. (AP) — State Sen. R.P. "Bo" Thomas has called for the resignation of District Court Judge Alexander Lyerly who says he "doesn't owe a dime" of the \$17,000 in child support his ex-wife says he failed to pay.

Thomas, D-Henderson, said Lyerly "has disgraced the bench."

He called for the state Judicial Standards Commission to recommend Lyerly's removal from the bench to the N.C. Supreme Court and said Gov. Jim Martin, who appointed Lyerly, should remove him from the Governor's Commission on Child Victimization.

"If the Judicial Standards Commission doesn't have the guts to do

something about it, if I get re-elected, we will take a look at the commission which has not been too courageous in the past," Thomas said.

"If he remains on the bench he can throw the book at me, but he still needs to resign."

But Burnsville attorney Dennis Howell, who read a statement from Lyerly during a news conference Tuesday, said the judge "has no reason" to resign.

Howell called the \$17,000 figure "ridiculous," and said he had seen "a stack of canceled checks about six inches high" that Margaret Coco Lyerly had received and cashed to support the couple's 15-year-old son.

The Texas attorney general's of-

ice has charged Lyerly with being some \$17,000 behind in support payments in a complaint filed by Mrs. Lyerly, who now lives in Corpus Christi.

The 29-member child victimization commission, chaired by Martin's wife, Dottie, works toward prevention of child abuse, kidnapping, sexual abuse and exploitation.

For four years, until December 1984, Alexander Keir Lyerly lived with his father in Banner Elk and was scheduled to return to North Carolina after Christmas that year,

according to Lyerly's statement. But Mrs. Lyerly called the judge after her son's arrival in Texas "and told him that she had no intention of returning Keir to North Carolina, as she had previously promised to do," the statement read.

Lyerly agreed to make monthly child support payments when he and his wife divorced in 1974, Mrs. Lyerly said last week.

"I don't mean to be vindictive about this ...," she said. "This is not my first choice in the way to handle this. But it's rather put us in a bind. I'm receiving nothing at this point."

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Insurance

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — Lloyd's of London has agreed to back a self-insurance pool for North Carolina cities and towns, but the plan needs support from about six large cities and 100 smaller towns, the pool's director says.

Harvey Mathias, the director of Risk Management Services for the North Carolina League of Municipalities, said he and other officials think they'll have the minimum number of cities signed up by mid-April. Coverage would begin July 1.

A town would then have two weeks to buy into the plan by sending a one-time fee of 5 percent of the annual premium to cover administrative costs. The premium would be due by July 10, 10 days after the new fiscal year begins.

The initial fee goes up to 10 percent after April 15, 15 percent after June 30, 20 percent after Sept. 30, and 25 percent beginning next year.

If a town chooses not to sign up after learning how much its annual premium will cost, it loses no money, Mathias said.

The league's pool will provide money to cover claims of up to \$500,000. A claim of up to \$5 million would be covered by the additional reinsurance.

Chief Of Staff

RALEIGH (AP) — Lt. Col. Alfred Tobin of Cary has been named chief of staff of the North Carolina Army National Guard, says Maj. Gen. Charles Scott, the guard's adjutant general.

Tobin assumes full responsibilities as chief executive officer of the guard on March 17, Scott said. The North Carolina Army National Guard includes more than 12,000 soldiers assigned to 135 units in 101 towns and cities across the state.

A veteran of 26 years of military experience, Tobin has been in the guard since 1971.

Appeal Denied

RALEIGH (AP) — Two North Carolina women who were each fined \$500 for altering their 1983 federal income tax returns to protest military spending have lost an appeal to the

U.S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals

The Internal Revenue Service said in a news release that the federal appeals court on Jan. 21 upheld the ruling of U.S. District Court Judge Hiram Ward of Greensboro.

Ward ruled that Elizabeth McKee of Browns Summit and Deborah Gibbs of Chapel Hill should each pay a \$500 penalty for filing frivolous returns.

Ms. McKee claimed a "foreign war tax credit" on her return and requested that the money be spent on social services, the IRS said. Ms. Gibbs also claimed a tax credit and said she would deposit the credited amount in a "Conscience and Military Tax Campaign Escrow Account," the IRS said.

Officer Sued

CHARLOTTE (AP) — A 27-year-old Liberty woman who says a Charlotte police officer sexually molested her three years ago has sued the officer and the City of Charlotte for \$1.1 million.

The former officer, Bobby Ravon Smith, was convicted of assaulting the woman in 1983, fined and given a suspended sentence. But a jury found him innocent of second-degree attempted rape and second-degree sexual offense.

He resigned from the Charlotte Police Department after the police chief recommended he be fired.

During his 1983 trial, Smith denied the charges, saying he went to the woman's room and frisked her for a weapon but never molested her. The lawsuit was filed Monday.

Seat Belts

RALEIGH (AP) — Requiring seat belts in school buses could jeopardize students rather than protect them, a High Point bus manufacturer has told a parent-citizen group studying seat belts and other safety issues.

"Lap belts increase the chance of head injuries," C. Morris Adams, a vice president of Thomas Built Buses Inc., told the group, School Bus Safety.

In crash tests last year in the United States and Canada, the force of impact concentrated in the head area of dummies belted in school buses as students would be, Adams said.

City Attorney Says 'Nose Count' Necessary In Election Proposals

The process for creating districts under the city's proposal to substitute a combination ward/at-large election system for Greenville's current at-large method of election is "purely a nose-counting exercise," according to City Attorney Mac Carley.

Nose counting is necessary, McCarley told city residents Tuesday, to determine how Greenville's minority population can be best represented through a new system of election.

"This is a race conscious issue, too," he said, "because ... the legal rules involved in setting up districts require that minority districts have 60 percent minority citizens in them. So, the only way to accurately draw the boundaries is to use the best available racial population statistics."

Statistics used to draft election system proposals now up for review were drawn from 1980 census block data and from city-conducted population counts of areas annexed since 1980. Three proposals based on that data including 6-0-1, 5-1-1 and 4-2-1 plans are being brought to the public's attention this week at a series of neighborhood information sessions.

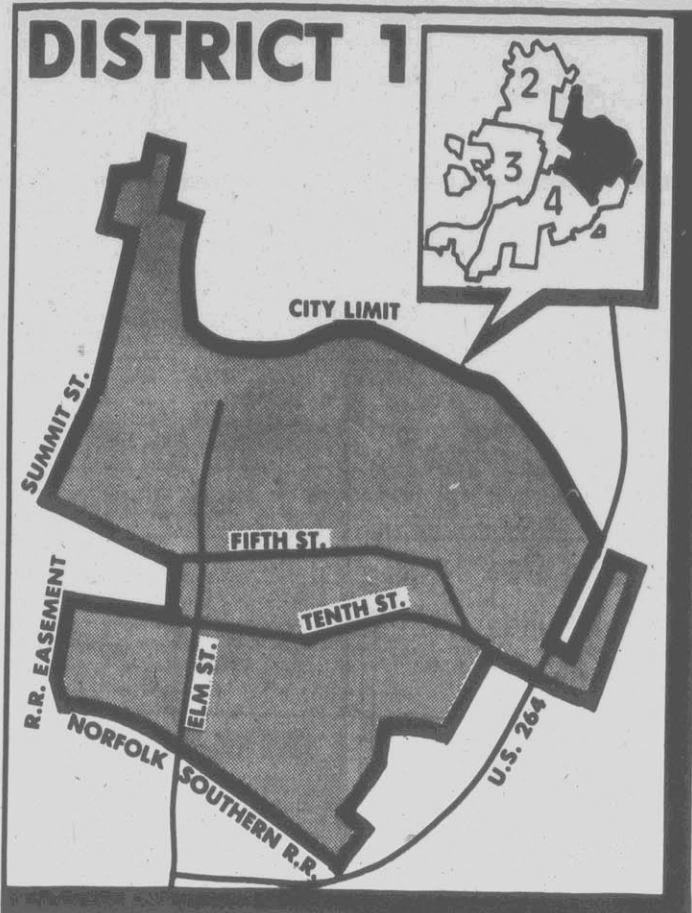
The 4-2-1 election plan provides for four single-seat districts within the city and at-large election of two council members and the mayor. Similarly, alternative plans for changing the city's method of election — 5-1-1 and 6-0-1 — provide for five district seats, one at-large representative, an at-large mayor and six district seats, no at-large candidates and at-large election of the mayor, respectively.

The 4-2-1 plan is favored by the City Council, which must approve any change in method of election before a proposal is forwarded to the U.S. Justice Department for final consideration.

Tuesday's meeting, the second of four neighborhood information sessions scheduled this week, was held at Wahl Coates School and attended by residents of District 1 — one of four districts proposed in the council-favored 4-2-1 plan.

District 1 encompasses the Tar River Neighborhood, College Court and Rock Springs — areas located in east Greenville — and is one of two majority white districts proposed in the 4-2-1 system (Districts 1 and 4 on map).

According to McCarley, some op-

position to the favored 4-2-1 plan has been voiced by members of the black community, who contend that the plan is not "safe" enough.

Under the 4-2-1 plan, there are two black majority districts of 60 percent or more black population (Districts 2 and 3 on map). However, District 2, which includes property north of West Fifth Street, could be handicapped, black opponents say, because it includes a number of college students of voting age who could adversely affect chances to elect a minority candidate.

Approximately half of East Carolina University's dormitory population was included in District 2, McCarley said, to bring the minority population figures in line with legal requirements.

After students were included in the district to bring up total population figures, student numbers were factored out, because students and residents of other institutions such as military bases and prisons, traditionally

have rarely exercised their right to vote. Such manipulation of figures, McCarley said, is acceptable under the law and is often used to enhance minority chances for representation. If manipulation works to the detriment of minorities, it is not allowed by the Justice Department.

Black residents favoring the 4-2-1 plan say it may be more of a gamble for blacks than the safer 5-1-1 and 6-0-1 systems, but under the 4-2-1 plan, they say minorities will have a greater voice in filling city positions.

Additionally, proponents say the 4-2-1 plan offers the best alternative to ensure that the whole of the city is represented. Under a straight district system, representatives would be inclined to vote for the advancement of their district, it has been argued. A district/at-large system where there is only one council member elected at large would reportedly promote the same type of situation as well as isolate the single at-large member.

Under the 4-2-1 plan, residents would be able to vote for a representative from their district, two at-large council members and the mayor. In the 5-1-1 plan, residents could elect three representatives, and under the 6-0-1 plan, residents would have a voice in election of only two officials, the one from their district and the mayor, who does not have a vote.

The 5-1-1 and 6-0-1 plans are considered safer by some, because no students are included in majority black districts. But the 6-0-1 plan presents some problems, because it "packs" blacks into districts, a situation McCarley said the Justice Department does not like to see.

Packing blacks into districts (or drawing boundary lines so that the majority of a city's black population is included in several districts) is not favored by federal officials, as it dilutes minority population in majority white districts. However, some proponents have said the 6-0-1 plan does present the surest alternative for election of black council members.

The 5-1-1 plan would probably be the most easily accepted by the Justice Department if a community consensus is not reached on 4-2-1 and 6-0-1 plans, McCarley said, because it neither packs nor cracks (divides neighborhoods to their detriment). Community consensus and solid support of the black community will be needed for passage of either the 4-2-1 or 6-0-1 plans.

According to McCarley, the city is looking at a change in its method of election for three reasons — to ensure minority representation, to allow orderly growth of the city through annexation and to avoid the kind of "costly and racially divisive fights" that other surrounding communities like Rocky Mount, have experienced when changes in method of election have been mandated by the U.S. Justice Department.

"Greenville cannot grow under its current method of election," he said, "because we would be limited in number of white citizens we could annex without seriously diluting the existing minority voting strength."

Additional district meetings scheduled this week include District 2, 7:30 p.m., Wednesday at Mount Calvary Free Will Baptist Church, and District 4, 7:30 p.m. Thursday at Aycock School.

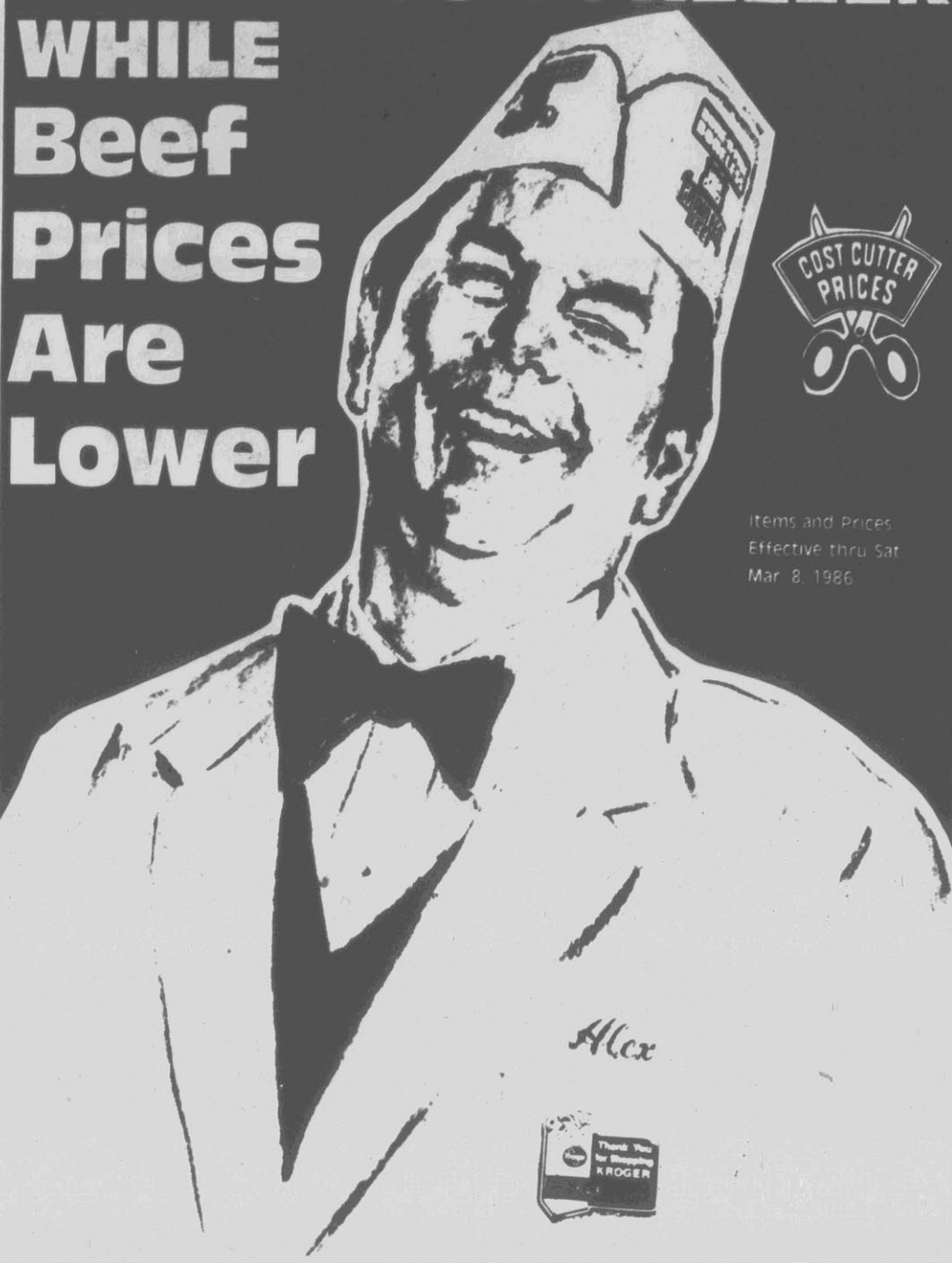

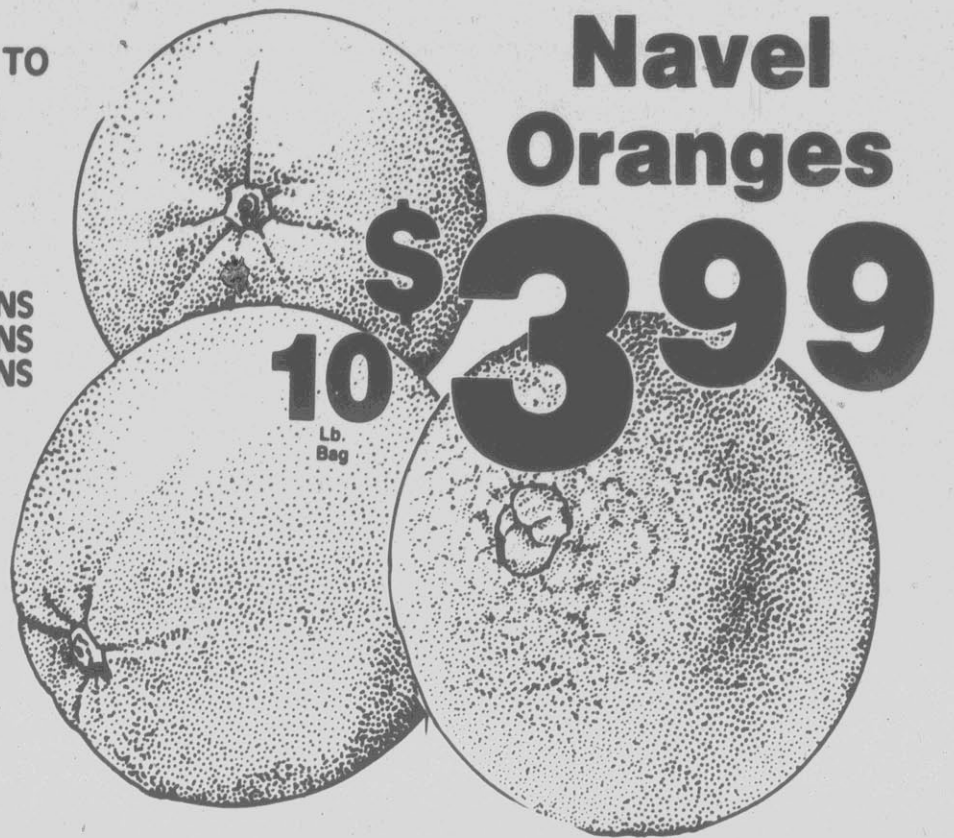

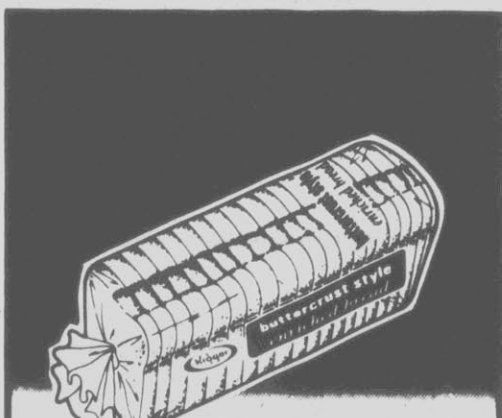

In today's economic news, the government reported a 0.4 percent rise in factory orders and a 4.4 percent increase in single-family home sales during January.

Computer and technology stocks were broadly lower. International Business Machines dropped 2 3/4 to 147 3/4; Digital Equipment 1 1/2 to 161; Honeywell 1 1/4 to 73 3/4; Burroughs 1 1/4 to 63 3/4, and Data General 7/8 to 38 1/2.

Southern Co. led the active list, down 1/8 at 22 7/8. A block of 957,100 shares of the stock traded at 22 3/4.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks lost 39 to 129.36. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was off .74 at 257.42.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average dropped 10.25 to 1,686.42.

Advancing issues outpaced declines by nearly 10 to 7 on the NYSE. Big Board volume totaled 174.51 million shares, against 142.67 million in the previous session.

districts and at-large" candidates and voting.

"There are several ways under state law (and) advantages and disadvantages" to each, Joyce said, adding that "a request that is sometimes made by minority groups" is for the establishment of a district where there is a "minority concentration (so it is) more likely to put minority representatives on the board."

Joyce emphasized that "any kind of change has to be approved by the Justice Department," and suggested that, because of the "one-man, one-vote" rule, districts "have to be, as nearly as you can make them, the same size."

Joyce said "the first question is, 'Do you want to go to districts?'" (Then) "How are you going to draw them?" It's a complicated, difficult problem.

Commissioner Kelly Barnhill, who presided at the session, questioned whether the May deadline for appointment of blacks to the board was "realistic."

Responding, Joyce said "that would be very difficult. It's a very time-consuming process to draw lines. Once districts are drawn, you've got to get Justice Department approval. That takes 60 days minimum." Joyce also suggested that any change would require action by the General Assembly, which does not meet until June, or a vote of the people.

"I would hate for this May 1 date to become a snag. We're all sincere in our efforts to negotiate some solution (but) the May 1 date is not a realistic possibility," Barnhill said.

"What would be the possibility ... (of) a resolution requesting that blacks be appointed at this point in time being presented to the Legislature for approval," Garrett asked.

"We'd still have to go to the Legislature and the Justice Department," Barnhill said.

"What is going on in Greenville and Pitt County is the unrest. We are here

Abandoned Barrels Found

AYDEN — Officials are investigating a number of 55-gallon drums found in an area off N.C. 102 near Venter's Crossroads west of Ayden to see if they contain hazardous materials.

Representatives of the Department of Human Services's solid and hazardous waste branch visited the site Tuesday and said further study is needed to determine what types of materials the drums contain and if it is hazardous.

Some of the barrels may have been at the site for as long as five years, one spokesman, who estimated that there are 1,000 or more barrels there, said.

Pardons

RALEIGH (AP) — Gov. Jim Martin's pardon of 11 more vote-sellers should end a long-running dispute between state and federal officials over the state's prosecution of federal witnesses in the FBI's probe of vote fraud in Clay County, Martin's legal counsel says.

"It (the state prosecution) impeded the investigation and prosecution of federal vote fraud cases," said Sam Wilson, the governor's legal counsel.

Martin's action, announced Tuesday, follows his pardon of 15 Clay County residents last October and brings the number of pardons in the state-federal controversy to 26.

Two others among the 29 convicted vote-sellers were not pardoned because of previous criminal records, while a third defendant has not asked for one.

to stop the unrest, to correct this kind of ill ... no black representation," Garrett said.

"We would prefer the County Commissioners set the wheels in motion, rather than go through a legal battle. We want us to do it here locally," Garrett continued. "We don't want to study our proposal to death. What we're asking you to do is to put in place what action needs to be done to work toward the solution of the situation that now exists."

Clarence Moore of Simpson, another NAACP representative, said "we should be able to agree to do something. You're white. We're black. You know a lot of things are that way, (but) let's get it together."

"I think we have identified the problem," Gaston Monk, another NAACP spokesman, said. "Something has to be done. I feel there are many qualified blacks who can do the job. I'd like to see you do something positive."

"What we are asking you to do," Garrett said, "is give us some indication that the Pitt County Board of Commissioners is going to address, in the most positive manner, the request we have brought to you."

"What ever action you need (from the General Assembly and the Justice Department) all can be done to have the law changed and districts drawn for filing for the 1988 election," Joyce said. He said districts could be drawn then, legislation presented to the General Assembly in 1987 and have Justice Department clearance in 1987.

"If this has to be resolved in the courts, it will take longer," Joyce suggested. "The difficulty is, even where everybody agrees on a goal, there's still a lot of work to be done."

"We're willing to do anything it takes to do it," Bruce Strickland, chairman of the board said.

"The first thing I see is go to the Institute of Government for help ... how to go about work on the district plan," Barnhill said.

"We're willing to help you find a qualified consultant to do the statistical analysis and to draw the lines," Joyce said.

"We're aware that it's got to go through some changes. What we do not want is the dragging of feet. We want to move forward," Garrett said.

"You are a good bunch of fellows," Monk told the commissioners. "You have represented us well. But we want to represent ourselves."

"I'd like to hear one of you summarize what has gone on here today," Garrett said.

"We've pretty well agreed that this board doesn't have the authority to appoint," Barnhill said. "We have to address the (district) lines so minorities can be elected. We'll request Mr. Joyce to help us in this process ... have as a goal to have the process done no earlier or later than the election in 1988."

After the meeting with the NAACP representatives, Joyce told commissioners he would begin a search for qualified consultants.

In other action Tuesday, the board decided it had no interest in acquiring the Agnes Fullilove School property on Chestnut Street from the Greenville Board of Education. But commissioners agreed to ask school officials to take no action on disposing of the old city school office property on West Fifth Street until the Greenville City Council has had an opportunity to consider the acquisition of the site.

The city plans to build a new fire-rescue station on land adjoining the Fifth Street school property and has expressed interest in the past in acquiring the site.

BETHEL — With three ticks left on the clock, North Pitt's Keisha Pilgreen sank two free throws to ice the Section I 2-A Championship for the Pant-HERS, who came from behind to defeat C.B. Aycock, 50-49, Tuesday night at the North Pitt Gym.

In the boys' championship game, four Ayden-Grifton players reached double figures as the Chargers downed South Lenoir, 67-47. Marvin Smith led the Chargers with 17 points, while Doug Anderson chipped in 13. Danny West added 12 and Hilton Ellison poured in 11.

The Pant-HERS, who trailed the Lady Falcons, 30-21, with 3:20 left in the third quarter and 34-29 entering the fourth quarter, outscored C.B. Aycock, 21-15 in the final frame to secure the win.

Pilgreen, who scored eight points in the fourth quarter, stepped to the charity stripe with North Pitt leading 48-47 with three seconds left to play.

After Pilgreen swished both free throws, C.B. Aycock's Connie Lancaster, who was fouled as the buzzer went off, sank two free throws with no time remaining to make the final score 50-49.

Regina Cox led the Pant-HERS with 16 points and four blocked shots. Keisha Pilgreen chipped in 13, and Gwen Pilgreen added 10. C.B. Aycock's Kelly Malpass led all

scorers with 29 points.

North Pitt Coach Randy Avery said he was happy to get out of the game with a hard-fought victory.

"C.B. Aycock was a very well-prepared team. They were much better prepared for us than we were for them," Avery said. "We had such a difficult time against them. I take my hat off to them. They did a super job against us."

From the outset, C.B. Aycock took the play to the Pant-HERS.

C.B. Aycock came out of the locker room hot, outscoring North Pitt 10-2 in the first 4:44 of the second half, and took a 30-21 lead on two fouls shots by Malpass with 3:16 left in the third quarter. During the stretch, Malpass scored seven points.

After both teams sank buckets, Gwen Pilgreen and Climmie Harris each scored to make it 32-27.

Malpass and Cox traded hoops before the period ended to make the score 34-29 with one quarter left to play.

North Pitt struck quickly in the fourth quarter as baskets by Keisha Pilgreen and Cox pulled the Pant-HERS to within one at 34-33 with 7:09 remaining.

Malpass responded with a bucket of her own, but Keisha Pilgreen nailed a 12-foot jumper to keep the Pant-HERS within one at 36-35 with 6:41 left.

VIRGINIA BEACH (AP) — J.R. Reid, the Kempsville High School basketball player regarded by most scouts as the nation's top prospect, says he will attend North Carolina.

Reid, 17, whose final five included North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, UCLA and Iowa, was not expected to make up his mind until early April. However, after two days of talks with his father, Reid made his decision Tuesday.

The 6-foot-10 Reid announced his decision to attend North Carolina after Kempsville's 58-46 Eastern Region playoff victory over Maury Tuesday.

"They've got a great program, a lot of great players and their communications program is one of the tops in the country," Reid said. He said education was his most important priority in choosing a school.

"There's no sense in prolonging it," Herman Reid, J.R. Reid's father, said Tuesday night. "I told him a decision has to be made, either now or next month."

"I wanted him to get it over with. It was a tough decision for him. It came down primarily to Carolina and Virginia," Herman Reid said. He said North Carolina's 22,000-seat arena was a strong incentive.

"He's been fair with everyone. They were all great programs, but J.R. can't go to all of them."

"It's like having five girlfriends and you marry one. The other four are going to be disappointed," Herman Reid said.

A first-team All-Tidewater and All-Group AAA selection as a sophomore and junior, the 240-pound Reid also won area player of the year honors both seasons.

Last year, Reid was selected a first-team High school All-American by Parade magazine and was the only junior on the squad.

As a sophomore, he averaged 20.5 points and 12.8 rebounds a game and hit 59 percent from the field. Last season, Reid averaged 23 points and 14 rebounds a game, hitting 64 percent of his shots. This season Reid is averaging 24.6 points and 14 rebounds, hitting 67 percent from the field.

FAIRFAX, Va. (AP) — After going nearly a quarter of a century without making the NCAA basketball tournament, Navy used its usual one-two punch to qualify for the playoffs for a second straight year.

Center David Robinson scored 26 points and forward Vernon Butler added 24 Tuesday night as the 18th-ranked Midshipmen beat George Mason 72-61 to capture the Colonial

Athletic Association tournament title and qualify as one of 64 teams to vie for the NCAA championship.

While Robinson and Butler hardly needed any help, George Mason Coach Joe Harrington said any amount of assistance probably wouldn't have benefited his squad.

"I don't think we could have beaten Navy if we had the Army, Air Force and Marines," said Harrington, who saw his team's seven-game winning

streak come to an end. Navy beat George Mason three times this season by an average of 13 points.

"Robinson and Butler played inside about as well as they can play," said Navy Coach Paul Evans.

In addition to getting superb play from Robinson, the tournament's most valuable player, and Butler, the school's all-time leading scorer, Navy also played with an above-normal intensity level.

"Before the game I harped on that," said Evans. "I told them that even the Celtics have to play with emotion."

Navy, which has won 13 straight and 20 of 21, improved to 27-4 despite making only 24 of 41 free throws.

"That's one thing we really have to work on," said Robinson, who hit only 10 of 18 from the line. "I should know, I'm the main culprit."

Navy converted only 63 of 114 foul shots during the tournament.

The Patriots, who got 17 points from Kenny Sanders and 14 from Ricky Wilson, were called for 37 fouls and fell to 19-11.

Robinson scored five points as Navy went on an 11-4 run early in the second half to increase a 3-point lead to 53-43 with 10:41 remaining.

During the spree, Butler and Patriot center Mike Dufrene became involved in a shoving match with 14:22 to play, and although both benches emptied, no punches were thrown and no fouls were called.

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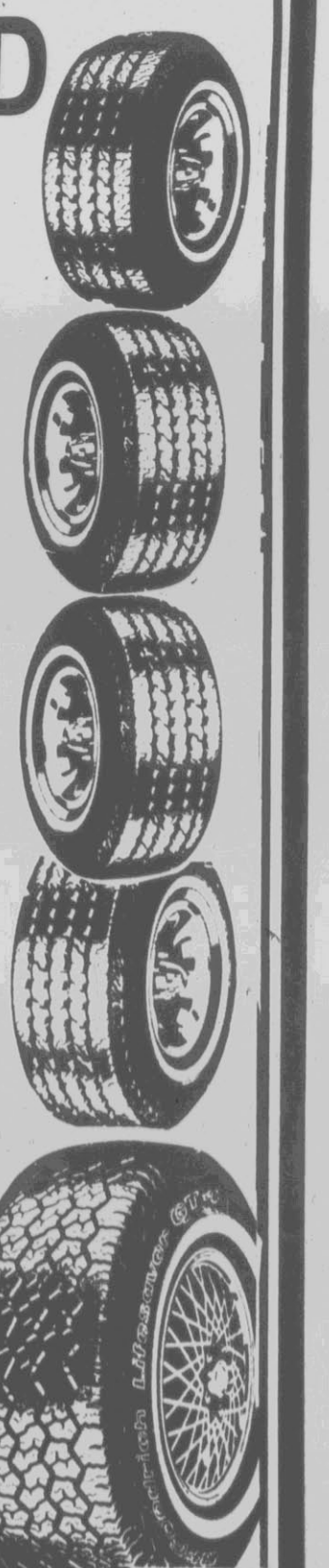
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Minnesota Ready For NBA Team

NEW YORK (AP) — Minnesota is ready to return to the National Basketball Association, says George Mikan, who starred for the Minneapolis Lakers before they moved to Los Angeles 26 years ago.

Mikan and Minnesota Gov. Rudy Perpich were present when two Minneapolis-St. Paul businessmen gave the league a \$100,000 check Tuesday as a down payment on a possible expansion franchise.

One thing the Twin Cities can offer now that it didn't when he played, said Mikan, is a home for the team.

"We have three very suitable places — the Met Center in Bloomington, which seats 17,000 (where the National Hockey League's North Stars play); the arena in St. Paul, which seats 16,500, and the Metrodome, which is patterned after the Silverdome in Pontiac, Mich., where you can seat 35,000."

When he played, he said, "There was only one arena in town that sat 8,500, The Auditorium. When March came along, and we had playoffs, they put trade shows in there, auto shows, sports shows, and there was no room for us.

"We had to take our games to the armory or to St. Paul or any college that would take us.

"The fans who supported us through the season couldn't buy a seat for the playoffs. That was tragic."

Mikan also said that in a two-year study, he found "a whole new area of fans and more acceptability of players" throughout the state. "One of the big issues before was black players. Now, they don't care if you're green, purple or whatever as long as you can play," he said.

"The enthusiasm of younger people, those between 20-45 or 50, is fan-

tastic. The older guys, those who said 'We'll never go, well, when it's the place to go, they'll be there.'"

While Minnesota may be ready for the NBA, Commissioner David Stern said the league is not quite ready for Minnesota or any other new team right now.

Stern, who accepted the check and a preliminary application, said the Minnesotans have a strong case, but it is not likely the league will expand before the 1987-88 season, and, if then, probably by only one franchise.

The Minnesota group, headed by health and racquet club operators

Marv Wolfenson and Harvey Ratner, joined Miami, Fla., and Santa Ana, Calif., as franchise-hopefuls that have presented preliminary applications and the \$100,000 earnest money. Stern said the league also had received expansion interest from Charlotte, N.C.; Toronto; St. Louis; Orlando, Fla.; San Diego, and Kansas City.

Perpich said the Minnesota group would begin a ticket-selling campaign.

"There will be an all-out effort in the corporate community and also

with the public to show there is support for the NBA in the Twin Cities and Minnesota. If the support is there, and they really want a team, that's the way to let the NBA Board of Governors know it's for real," said the governor.

Mikan, 61, was not fazed by the competition. Still an imposing figure at 6-foot-10, he spoke with the enthusiasm he had gained as head of a commission appointed by Perpich two years ago to study the feasibility of bringing back pro basketball.

"We hope we will be No. 1," said Mikan, who played on five NBA championship teams in his seven years with the Minneapolis Lakers from 1948 through 1956, with one year out for an abbreviated retirement.

Stern said he was impressed by the "solid group of businessmen who know their community and know how to run a franchise. They clearly have

the support of governor, which is very important. And our sense is they have the support of business community, as well. All of which makes for a very strong application."

Stern agreed that the Minnesota group "seemed to have an abundance of very suitable arenas, which is also in their favor."

While the commissioner dashed hopes for any immediate or multiple expansion, he said: "That doesn't mean there wouldn't be expansion of additional numbers down the road. It just means that when things start to go well, you have to remember where you came from. All this interest in NBA franchises is relatively new-found, and I don't think we should let it turn our heads from our first obligation, which is to the existing teams and existing communities."

"Expansion is our second priority," Stern said.

Bias Selected As Player Of Year

RALEIGH (AP) — Maryland senior forward Len Bias, defending Atlantic Coast Conference scoring champion and catalyst for a late-season Terrapin surge, was named today as the league's top player by The Associated Press.

Bias was chosen on five of the seven ballots cast by sportswriters throughout the ACC region. North Carolina's Brad Daugherty received the other two votes. He earned the most points of anyone on the AP's all-ACC team released earlier this week.

The 6-foot-8, 195-pounder whose hometown of Landover is just minutes from the College Park campus, is on the verge of his second straight league scoring title. Entering the ACC tournament, Bias leads the league with a 23.1 scoring average, three points better than Daugherty.

Bias also leads in free throw accuracy at 86.1 percent, ranks eighth in field goal accuracy at 55.4 and is sixth in rebounding at 6.6 per game.

During the late-season surge that lifted Maryland from just above .500 into contention for an NCAA bid, it was Bias that guided the way. He hit 32 consecutive free throws to set a Maryland single-season record. In scoring 22 points against Virginia in the regular-season finale last Saturday, Bias is within seven points of surpassing Albert King's record of 2,058 points.

Bias put on his best shows during his meetings with teams from Tobacco Road. In a loss to Duke at Durham, he scored 41 points, including 25 in the second half. The effort was the first 40-point effort by an ACC player in a league game since N.C. State's Hawkeye Whitney did it against Clemson in 1979.

In a split in the series with North Carolina, Bias totaled 55 points. That includes 35 points in an overtime victory over the then-top-ranked Tar Heels in Chapel Hill last month. He added 37 points

Against Georgia Tech, he scored a total of 56 points in two games.

"I'd like to give the player of the year award to a player on the team that finishes first or second in the country and I'm biased toward (Mark) Price," Yellow Jacket coach Bobby Cremins said. "But, yes, I am going to vote for Len Bias as player of the year."

Georgia Tech's John Salley echoed his coach's sentiments after he battled with Bias inside.

"Bias is the best player in the country," Salley said. "He plays harder than anyone every game. He never lets down."

After the victory over North Carolina, Maryland coach Lefty Driesell was spouting superlatives.

"If Lenny Bias isn't the player of the world, I don't know who is," Driesell said. "He had 35, but I thought he had 95."

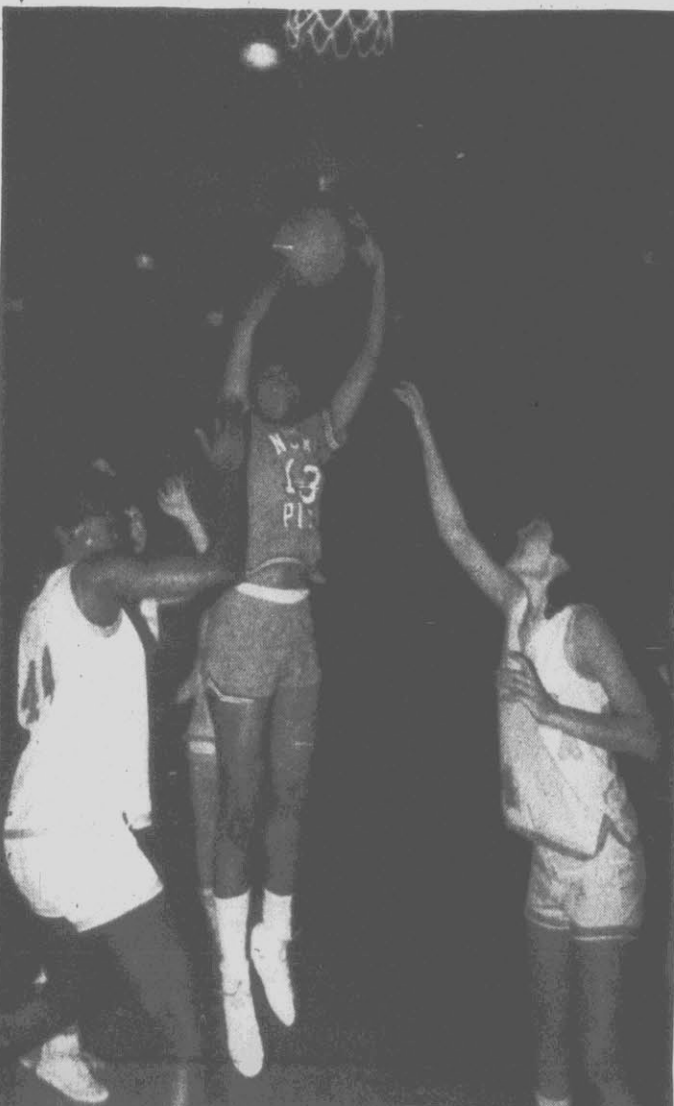

Andujar Silent On Drug Penalty

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Oakland A's pitcher Joaquin Andujar spent most of his first day with his new team avoiding reporters who were wondering if he will fight a conditional one-year suspension for alleged drug use.

"I know the answer, but I can't tell you," Andujar said Tuesday after reporting 10 days late to the A's spring training camp. "My agent and general manager are going to say something about it this week. I'm waiting for them. I'll do whatever they say."

"I want to get over everything. That way I can relax my mind and pitch and give a good year to Oakland's fans and club. When the bell rings, I'll be there and give 100 percent. That's one thing I can promise you right now."

Andujar, implicated in last year's drug trials in Pittsburgh, was one of seven major leaguers conditionally suspended last Friday for one year by baseball Commissioner Peter Ueberroth.

Andujar will have his suspension lifted if he agrees to pay \$115,000 of his \$1.15 million base salary this year to a hometown rehabilitation facility, performs community service work and submits to drug testing for the rest of his career.

But whether he complies with the conditions or files a grievance with the Players' Association, Andujar still will miss part of the 1986 season because of another Ueberroth suspension.

The fiery 33-year-old right-hander was fined \$500 and suspended without pay for 10 days after bumping umpire Don Denkinger in the seventh game of the 1985 World Series.

Andujar argued two close pitches

in the fifth inning and was ejected from the game, which his St. Louis Cardinals eventually lost 11-0 to the world champion Kansas City Royals.

Ironically, Denkinger is scheduled to umpire one of the A's first Cactus League exhibition games in Phoenix this weekend.

"I'm waiting to see him to apologize to him because I was a little hard on him and I knew I did wrong," Andujar said. "The thing started when I called (Cardinals catcher) Darrell Porter to ask if the pitches were inside or outside or low or high. The umpire thought I was talking to him. He's human. I'm human. Everybody can make a mistake. That's baseball."

Andujar, who had records of 20-14 and 21-12 the past two seasons for St. Louis, was traded to Oakland last Dec. 12 for A's catcher Mike Heath and pitcher Tim Conroy in a surprise deal.

"Baseball is just like the Army. They send you somewhere whether you like it or not," said Andujar, who arrived here late due to visa problems in the Dominican Republic.

The surprise team in the NBA this season pulled within three games of Philadelphia in the Eastern Conference standings as Wilkins scored 32 points and Glenn Rivers set a team record with 21 assists Tuesday night in a 128-121 victory over the 76ers.

Rivers has seen limited playing and practice time recently due to a foot injury.

"Yesterday was the first time I had practiced and that was the turnaround for me," said Rivers, who eclipsed the team assist record held by Lenny Wilkens, who had 19 in 1968, and Walt Hazzard, who matched that total in 1969.

The Hawks also got a big supporting performance from guard Randy Wittman, who was 12-for-15 from the field and scored 24 points, and Kevin Willis, who had 20 points.

"I guess it's needless to say I was feeling right," Wittman said.

Elsewhere in the NBA, it was New York 119, Washington 83; Detroit 120, New Jersey 103; Boston 106, Chicago 94; Denver 128, Houston 115; Los Angeles Clippers 106, Cleveland 101; Golden State 129, San Antonio 126 in overtime; Sacramento 94, Utah 92; Portland 102, Indiana 99.

Philadelphia Coach Matt Guokas and forward Julius Erving are impressed with the Hawks, who are 3-0 against the 76ers this season and meet them again in Philadelphia tonight.

"The Hawks show potential to go farther," Erving said. "They have a superstar player in Dominique as the cornerstone and a lot of big guys to do the dirty work."

"They got penetration and that resulted in layups," Guokas added. "They got second shots and that resulted in layups. That combination can get you in trouble. They are having an outstanding year."

Moses Malone scored 35 points for the 76ers and Charles Barkley added 24 points and 16 rebounds after going scoreless in the first quarter.

"I really couldn't get going in the first half," Barkley said. "I didn't get frustrated, just disappointed in myself."

The Hawks had 9-2, 8-2 and 9-2 runs in the second half to lead by as many as 19 points. With 3:05 to play, the 76ers cut the margin to eight with a 6-0 run that included two baskets by Bobby Jones.

But the Hawks scored the next five points to lead 120-107 with 1:13 to play. Two late three-point goals by Barkley helped make the final score closer.

Celtics 106, Bulls 94

Kevin McHale scored 23 points as Boston won its sixth straight game by outscoring Chicago 29-16 in the third quarter.

Robert Parish had 14 of his 18 points in the third period for the Celtics, who trailed 56-52 early in the quarter, but finished it ahead 81-68.

The Bulls, who were led by Charles Oakley with 22 points, trailed by 13 points in the second quarter, but battled back to tie it 52-52 at halftime.

Nuggets 128, Rockets 115

Denver pulled within one game of first-place Houston in the Midwest Division as Alex English scored 25 points and Bill Hanzlik and Calvin Natt 21 each.

Crum Looks For Top Seed If Wins

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Louisville coach Denny Crum said he thinks his 11th-ranked Cardinals have a chance for a No. 1 or No. 2 seed in the NCAA post-season tournament if they can win the Metro Conference tournament.

"If we can win these next two games, we will have won 15 of our last 16 games against one of the toughest schedules in the nation," said Crum, whose Cardinals will receive a first-round bye in the tournament if they win by virtue of their regular season conference title.

"Some losses don't distract the fact that we survived it and we won the conference championship."

The winner of the tournament, which begins Friday in Louisville, receives the league's automatic berth in the NCAA. The NCAA tournament's pairings and seedings will be announced Sunday, after the final game of the Metro tournament.

Memphis State coach Dana Kirk said Saturday's 70-69 loss to Louisville in a game that decided the regular season conference champion may have cost his 10th-ranked Tigers a top seed in a regional.

"I felt if we would have won, we would have been one of the top four seeds in the country. We had been in the top 5 for several weeks. That was what was at stake for us," Kirk said. Now, the Tigers play in the Metro tournament will determine their NCAA seeding and what regional they are placed in.

"We have a berth locked up. It's just where we go and how high we are

seeded," Kirk said.

Louisville's 24-7 record isn't as sparkling as Memphis State's 24-4, but Crum said the NCAA selection committee considers more important things.

"Their considerations are how many games you've won, who you've played, where you played them and how you did lately. That's the four things I think they consider more than any other factor," Crum said.

And Louisville passes the test highly in each category, he said. "I've seen over the years a real concerted effort on the committee's part to really weigh heavily the difficulty of the schedule. We could schedule 20 victories a year and play Podunk U. a whole bunch of times and end up winning 28 or 29 games on a pretty regular basis, but I don't think that will help our team be the best that it can be."

"I'm more concerned about how our team does in the tournament and not what its record is getting there."

Crum said a No. 1 seed isn't out of the question in his opinion if the Cardinals win the conference tournament.

"You would have a hard time not giving Duke and Kansas a No. 1 selection. From that point on, there's a whole bunch of us in the same category. That doesn't mean we have the same won-loss record, but when you consider difficulty of schedule and all other factors."

You say you want your college basketball conference tournaments to be tight? You want close games decided at the wire? You want excitement with every tick of the clock?

For your heart-stopping enjoyment, we present the Missouri Valley Conference tourney.

Ninth-ranked Bradley and host Tulsa escaped with one-point victories in the MVC semifinals Tuesday night to set up tonight's championship matchup. The Braves raised their record to 31-1 — best in the nation — including 22 consecutive wins,

as Hersey Hawkins made a layup with five seconds remaining for a 65-64 decision over Illinois State.

Tulsa, 22-8, got 27 points from sophomore guard Tracy Moore, including two key free throws with 17 seconds remaining.

With seven seconds left, Drake's Michael Morgan was fouled while going up for a layup, but missed both free throws. A rebound shot by Drake's Melvin Mathis ended the game's scoring.

No. 19 Navy moved into the NCAA tournament with a 72-61 triumph over George Mason for the Colonial Athletic Association championship. David Robinson scored 26 points and Vernon Butler added 24 for the Midshipmen, who have won 12 straight games and 20 out their last 21 for a 27-4 mark, setting a school record for victories.

The Patriots were called for 16 fouls in the first half, and the partisan Mason crowd was assessed a technical foul for delay of game when someone threw a streamer onto the court. Pro Issue Is Debated

ROME (AP) — The heads of 23 international sports federations will begin debating several issues today in what shapes up as an East-West clash over professionalism among Olympic athletes.

"It is a clash between the Western concept of professionalism and the Eastern idea of amateurism, which is a state-run professionalism," according to an authoritative source. "A majority of sports circles want the Olympics to call together the best possible competitors in every sport."

Eligibility was the main topic on the agenda for the various federations, all of which are part of the Association of Summer Olympics International Federations.

"The Eastern bloc is against an opening to pros because it would weaken their position in the Games. Their people are all amateurs on paper, but they are true pros in reality," said the source, who requested anonymity.

Italy's Primo Nebiolo, who also is president of the International Amateur Athletics Federation, told a news conference on Monday that ASOIF had named a special commission on eligibility with the aim of producing a new eligibility rule acceptable to all.

"The Socialist countries are not too amenable to an opening of the Olympics to professionals. It is a tough nut to crack, but we are working on this and we hope to come up with a solution acceptable to all," Nebiolo said.

Several Eastern federations in ASOIF were expected to oppose a new, innovative formula on eligibility.

The main technical issue is that soccer has always tried to limit the participation in the Olympics to protect its World Cup tournament. The rules set by soccer exclude from the Games all the competitors who have taken part in the World Cup or in its qualification round, but it allows other high-paid pros to be on the Olympic teams.

Holloway Expects To End Pro Career With Toronto

TORONTO (AP) — Quarterback Condredge Holloway, with a new multi-year contract in his pocket, anticipates finishing his professional football career with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League.

Details of the contract were not divulged, although Holloway acknowledged, with a smile and a laugh, that \$450,000 a year was "in the ballpark ... but not that rich."

The 32-year-old native of Huntsville, Ala., also indicated the contract runs four years.

"I've got the attitude that it's taken them (opposition players) 11 years to catch me this one time, maybe I can get through another four more," said the Schenley Award winner as the CFL's outstanding player in 1982 when he tossed a career-high 31 touchdown passes.

"It was quarterbacks being caught with the ball last year that led to a dismal season for the Argos.

Backup Ricky Turner suffered a severely sprained ankle in the last preseason game, and when Holloway went down with a damaged left knee in the fourth game of the regular season, Toronto had to struggle through nine games with inexperienced personnel operating its run-and-shoot offense.

Holloway was not able to return until almost three months later, closing out the season with two victories. By then, it was too late for the Argos to make the East playoffs.

"Either you get the ball away quickly or you get hit," Holloway said. "The young guys would think that instead of making a mistake, I'll hold onto the ball. You get canned

that way."

The veteran now wears a brace on his left knee, even for off-season conditional sports such as basketball and squash.

"I'm getting used to wearing a brace," he said. "I don't have any (swelling and aching), but then again I'm not getting hit by 250-pound linemen either."

He said he has no worries about the brace, or his knee, lasting a full season.

"I think the question was answered when I came back against Calgary (last season)," Holloway said. "I got hit by a guy, a rookie I think, and he actually bent my brace.

"I felt a little twinge and decided right then, why worry about it? People are going to shoot for it, anyway. After that, I started to run a little bit and I just felt more confident."

Coach Bob O'Billovich, though, would like to keep Holloway's scrambles to a minimum next season.

"He's going to be a little more selective in running the football," O'Billovich declared. "As a coaching staff, we're going to try to do some things so that, hopefully, he won't have to run the football all that much.

"He's our No. 1 quarterback, though, and it's going to be hard to try and structure him in that regard. He'll have to use better judgement. Some of that running a quarterback does is really instinctive, but we don't want our quarterback to be our top rusher."

Holloway, who starred in college at the University of Tennessee, said his three months on the sidelines taught him coaching was not his forte.

"You talk about frustration. I was pulling my hair out," he said. "Because I could see, when you understand what's going on (and) you've got younger kids that really don't understand, defenses were doing silly things to us last year.

"They weren't even covering people last year. Our young guys were so infatuated with being under the center, they didn't even see it. They (opposing defenses) did some things they wouldn't even dare do to a veteran guy."

Holloway spent the first six years in the CFL with the Ottawa Rough Riders and the last five with Toronto. In those five years, he has passed for 14,389 yards and 84 touchdowns, both club records.

When his career ends, Holloway said, he wants to make Toronto his home. But, before then, he has a goal or two.

"Three Grey Cups, that would be good," he said, referring to the CFL's Super Bowl.

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Researcher Says Mao Borrowed Some Poems

PEKING (AP) — The reputation of Chairman Mao Tse-tung, already officially condemned for his ideological errors, has been tarnished further by the claim that he never wrote some of the poems published under his name. Hailed in his lifetime for classical-style poetry written in the style of Tang and Sung Dynasty melodies, Mao probably knew about the bogus poems but did nothing to correct the injustice, says the researcher who disclosed the scandal.

"In my opinion, Mao was likely informed. But he made no response," Jin Shan, a literature researcher at the Academy of Social Sciences in Peking, told The Associated Press in an interview.

The plagiarized poems were memorized by millions of people during the 1966-76 "Great Proletarian Cultural Revolution," when Mao's personality cult was at its height and his works were required reading.

"As a young zealot, I also quoted some of these poems in the big-character posters I wrote," Jin said.

Nine of the verses in the "Unpublished Poems of Chairman Mao," which appeared during the Cultural

Revolution, were written by Chen Mingyuan, a young researcher at the Chinese Academy of Sciences, Jin said.

Several other poems in the collection also were not Mao's.

Chen, an amateur poet originally from Shanghai, brought the matter to the attention of Premier Chou En-lai, who praised the young poet for trying to clear up the situation.

But Mao's wife, Jiang Qing, and her followers "harassed, beat and finally jailed" Chen, according to Jin. His article on the subject appeared in the Nanjing journal Weekend (Zhou Mo) and in this week's issue of the English-language Peking Review.

"The false verdict against Chen lasted 12 years," Jin said, although he was only jailed for a short time.

Mao died in September 1976, Jiang Qing and her followers were arrested a month later, and Chen officially was exonerated in 1978.

Now 43, he works at the Science Academy's acoustic research institute and still writes poems as a hobby. "But they're not published," Jin said.

Chen discovered the plagiarism when he was given a copy of Mao's "unpublished poems" and saw some of his own work.

He had distributed unsigned poems in the classical style to friends and they reached the wrong hands, Jin said.

"As soon as the Cultural Revolution broke out, various organizations, motivated by Mao worship, vied with each other to publish Mao's works without authorization," Jin said.

"People regarded Mao's output as the pinnacle of literature," he said.

The researcher said he is confident that Mao's most famous poems, written before the 1949 communist takeover, are genuine. He said Mao's prose also has been carefully scrutinized.

Not everyone fawned on Mao. Deng Tuo, former editor-in-chief of the party newspaper People's Daily, became an early fatality of the Cultural Revolution after he published thinly veiled satires criticizing Mao's policies and "pretentious" writing.

Although Mao's poems are no longer for sale in Chinese bookstores, Jin praised some of the late chairman's work, especially "Snow," in which he compares himself to great Ch'in and Han Dynasty emperors "all past and gone."

"For men of vision
We must seek among the present

generation."

The deification of Mao was reversed abruptly when Deng Xiaoping came to power in 1978, dismantling Mao's communes and set China on a course of open-door, market-oriented reform.

Although Mao's giant portrait still hangs on Tiananmen gate, a landmark 1981 resolution on Communist Party history blasted his "grave leftist errors," confusing right and wrong.

According to the current party line, Mao's errors began with the 1957 anti-rightist campaign to silence his critics. His 1958 "Great Leap Forward" into collectivization resulted in a famine that claimed up to 20 million lives.

Every sector of society and the economy was thrown into turmoil by the Cultural Revolution unleashed by Mao in which millions perished or were subjected to persecution.

Aware that millions of peasants and workers find it hard to simply discard their allegiance to a former god-like leader, Deng's regime lauds "Mao Tse-tung thought" while criticizing his errors in later life.

Chen Yun, 81, a member of the Politburo Standing Committee was

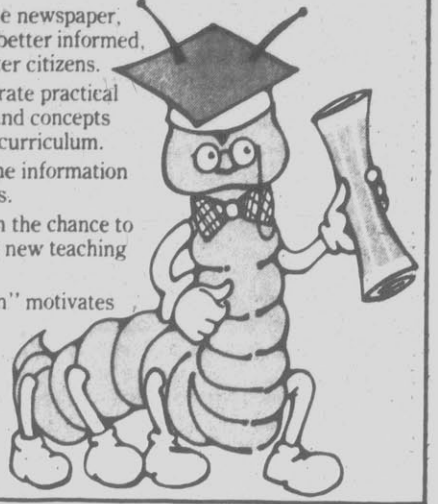
quoted by the Hong Kong newspaper Ming Pao in 1979 as making this judgment on Mao's career:

"Had Chairman Mao died in 1956, there would have been no doubt that he was a great leader of the Chinese

people. Had he died in 1966, his meritorious achievements would have been somewhat tarnished but his overall record still very good. Since he actually died in 1976, there is nothing we can do about it."

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Stockholm's police commissioner said Prime Minister Olof Palme's assassin was a professional hit man, and denied that the man got away because authorities reacted too slowly.

Commissioner Hans Holmer told a television interviewer Tuesday about the assassination of Palme:

"If you have a global perspective on this, there are professional murderers who are hired by terrorist organizations or hired by others or sometimes work alone."

He said that based on the bullets used and the close-range from which the gunman fired, "I have come to the conclusion that this man is a professional in the underworld."

Palme, 59, was shot last Friday night as he and his wife Lisbet, 55, walked home from a movie along a downtown Stockholm street. No bodyguards were with them.

Dr. Birger Schantz, a professor at the Swedish Defense Research Agency, was quoted by the newspaper Dagens Nyheter as saying that the path of the bullet indicated the killer was a professional who knew where to hit his victim.

Schantz, a specialist on bullet wounds, said the bullet pierced a vertebra, Palme's main artery and windpipe, and exited through his chest. He said Palme died instantly.

At a news conference earlier, Holmer said Palme's killer apparently had an accomplice. He said a taxi driver saw the killer get into the passenger side of a waiting car, which then sped away.

Holmer denied Stockholm newspaper charges that an alert about the killing was delayed for several minutes at police headquarters, and said police were at the site two to three minutes after patrol cars received the alert.

He said the taxi driver who alerted police to the shooting called them at 11:23 p.m. (5:23 p.m. EST), and police computers showed the alarm going out to patrol cars that same minute.

"We had 14 cars taking part in the hunt immediately after the alert," Holmer said, adding that "we have in this respect been as fast as it is reasonable to demand."

Critics also had asserted that police had not adequately closed routes out of the city.

But Holmer said "it would not have been realistically feasible with such a vague description of the killer" to check people leaving the city, "and we had so many other options to consider."

Stockholm police also had been criticized for appealing through the press Sunday for help in identifying the murder bullet. The next day it

was discovered such a bullet could be bought in Stockholm's leading sporting goods store.

"I asked you for help," Holmer said in defense of his Sunday appeal. "And the next day you blame us for not knowing."

Police say Palme, who was in his fourth term as prime minister, was killed by a .357-caliber Magnum revolver, one of the most powerful handguns available.

The commissioner said investigators had received 4,000 tips about the case and questioned 600 people.

Swedish television announced plans for a funeral cortege winding from Stockholm's landmark City Hall, where Palme's funeral will be held March 15, past the downtown intersection where he was shot.

Foreign guests expected at the funeral, according to today's newspapers, include Prime Ministers Rajiv Gandhi of India and Robert Mugabe of Zimbabwe, Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega and a representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Police have said they were told of several claims of responsibility for the murder made by callers claiming to represent West Germany's terrorist Red Army Faction or the Holger Meins Commando, an offshoot of the Red Army Faction.

Communist Congress Set To Consider Party Shakeup

MOSCOW (AP) — The 27th Communist Party Congress today approved the Soviet leadership's new five-year economic plan and a blueprint for doubling industrial output by the end of the century.

Congress delegates also prepared for a closed session in which they were to approve Communist Party General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev's shakeup of the party's powerful Central Committee.

Western diplomats and some Soviet sources have said the vote could produce the biggest shakeup ever in the committee. Results are not expected to be announced until Thursday.

At the last congress in 1981, 319 people were named to the committee. Western diplomatic records indicate that about half of them have retired, been demoted, or died since then.

The official news agency Tass said

the economic development program was approved at a morning session of the congress. All decisions by the 5,000 delegates are unanimous.

The economic program, outlined by Gorbachev and Premier Nikolai I. Ryzhkov in speeches to the congress, seeks to increase Soviet industrial labor productivity by 150 percent, increase production of consumer goods, and introduce modern technology throughout Soviet industry.

Few details have been revealed about how these goals will be met, but Gorbachev and Ryzhkov have made it clear that centralized planning and control will remain the focus of Soviet economic strategy.

Party spokesman Leonid M. Zamyatin said Tuesday that foreign guests would be excluded from the congress hall later for a closed session to elect the new Central Com-

mittee. As usual, Western reporters have been excluded throughout the congress, which started last week.

Under party rules, the congress is empowered to elect the members of the Central Committee. In practice, the party leadership chooses the committee membership and presents it to the congress for approval.

In previous congresses, the Central Committee vote has been followed by a full meeting, or plenum, of the newly elected committee members, who ratify the membership of the ruling Politburo and the committee's secretariat.

As usual before such events, rumors circulated in Moscow about possible changes in the leadership. Such rumors cannot be confirmed and often prove false, suggesting they were motivated by a desire either to discredit or promote a particular Politburo member.

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Retired Editor Is Collector Of 'The Sinister'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Count Dracula has taken a bite out of Forest J. Ackerman's bank account, and he's having trouble keeping the werewolf from the door.
That's because one man's nightmares are Ackerman's dreams.
For almost his entire life, the 69-year-old retired magazine editor has been putting his hands on any and all science fiction and horror memorabilia he could find and installing them in the museum he runs in his home.
Among the 300,000 pieces in his collection:
—The "Creature From the Black Lagoon" from the movie of the same name (1952);
—One of Bela Lugosi's three original capes from "Dracula" (1930);
—Lon Chaney Jr.'s make-up kit and hair from "King Kong" (1933);
—First editions, second editions, and more than 200 versions of Mary Shelley's 1818 novel, "Frankenstein" and as many of Bram Stoker's "Dracula" (1897);
—Life masks of Peter Lorre, Boris

Karloff and Chaney;
—An exact replica of the female Robotrix from Fritz Lang's 1926 classic, "Metropolis;" pieces of the Krell lab from "Forbidden Planet" (1956) and rare animation dinosaur models from "King Kong."
"I put together all the books about dinosaurs, about cavemen, about Atlantis, Lemuria and Mu — the three main lost continents — all books that have women in the title, all books about devils, ghosts, werewolves, zombies, anthologies of science fiction, fantasy and horror," Ackerman said recently.
Several pieces, such as the Martian war machine from "War of the Worlds" (1952) are on loan to the Smithsonian Institution as part of its "Yesterday's Tomorrows" exhibit.
The "Creature From The Black Lagoon," 1952's Man-Fish of the Year, was once on exhibit at the now-closed Hollywood Museum.
Ackerman said the Creature, one of his most valuable pieces, originally was swept up by a studio janitor after shooting was completed.
"It was casually thrown away and a janitor sweeping up the hands, legs

and feet thought, 'I bet my kid would like this,' so he takes the \$35,000 suit home to his little 10-year-old boy.
"So this kid is running around the neighborhood scaring everybody."
Later, the boy sold it to a friend down the street who eventually gave it to Ackerman.
Ackerman's collection is priceless, he says. But he admits financial problems in trying to keep it all together.
"If I could wave a magic wand, Steven Spielberg or George Lucas or some of these independently wealthy young people would step forward and say, 'Here's a blank check. Go build a

museum to your specifications,'" he said.
He charges no admission for visitors to the "Ackermansion" in the Hollywood Hills, where the huge collection fills one whole floor.
Ackerman, born and raised in Los Angeles, became hooked on the fantastic at age 9 when he bought the October 1926 issue of "Amazing Tales." He still has that magazine.
"This has permitted me to live a great deal in the future," he says of his collection. "I may not be around in 2001 but I've already been there."
But he says: "Space flight hasn't

developed quite as much as I would have hoped for. I hoped that by now we would be mining the moon, building cities on Mars and investigating Venus."
For 25 years, Ackerman edited Famous Monsters of Filmland, a magazine designed for the adolescent who wants to grow up to be the Wolf-Man. When he resigned three years ago, the magazine folded.
The congenial Ackerman has also appeared in films, including "The Time Travelers" (1964) as a technician in an android factory, and in a rock video.

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Prince's Status Rises

LONDON (AP) — Prince Andrew's photographs of Prince Henry, second son of Prince Charles and Princess Diana, marking the baby's first birthday last September, got the thumbs down from many professional photographers.
But 26-year-old Andrew's standing as a keen amateur photographer has risen steeply since then.
Buckingham Palace said Tuesday that pictures of Queen Elizabeth II taken by her second son have so pleased her that she's ordered them to be used as official portraits, and professional photographers who have seen them agree they're good.

CBS Introduces Two New Comedy Shows Tonight

NEW YORK (AP) — Today's lesson about television humor is the difference between jokes and comedy.

Conventional sitcoms regurgitate jokes — often lame and poor one-liners. The philosophy is the more the merrier, although the comic result usually is much less. And just in case the audience didn't get the jokes, the laugh track adds a mechanical Ed McMahon in a constant state of audio doubling over.

Good comedy, on the other hand, generally takes its time to get there. It can come from the quirks and personalities of the characters, such as the irreconcilable differences between Diane and Sam on "Cheers," or, in a unique case, the parenting monologues of Bill Cosby on "The Cosby Show."

Tonight, CBS introduces two programs — one, humorous; the other, a joke.

The funny one is an innovative slice-of-scholastic-life called "Fast Times," in which the humor, during casual conversations at the mall or at the hallway lockers, flows from the weird things kids do and say and the off-center way they view the world. It has no laugh track and is imaginatively unpredictable.

With "Fast Times," you believe some creative people gave serious thought to entertaining audiences without 30 minutes of dial-a-joke.

The other series is "Tough Cookies," which also tries to be different by putting a drama in a sitcom setting. But it ends up failing miserably because it does neither drama nor comedy well; its attempt at humor relies on deathly one-liners and the inevitable laugh track.

Robby Benson stars as Cliff Brady, a Chicago detective who solves crimes in the same neighborhood where he grew up. For his undercover contacts, Brady taps some old cronies, including an informant who hides in a dumpster.

Like most standard sitcoms, "Tough Cookies" has an assortment of zanies; here they hang out at a local pub. Lanie Kazan runs the eatery and Adam Arkin plays Cliff's friend the bookmaker.

While contemplating marrying a TV newscaster (Gail Edwards) on tonight's episode, Cliff brings her to this haunt so she can get to know "who I am and where I come from."

Need we say more. The youthful Benson, who looks more like he should be playing cops and robbers in the playground, smiles incessantly and wears his sincerity on his sleeve. The serious story and comic attempts clash and the sentimental stuff comes off as pure schmaltz.

"Fast Times," though, is engaging and interestingly paced, right from its opening sequence when some dialogue is heard over the establishing shot of Ridgmont High. In standard TV direction, the school building would have let viewers know the setting, then the scene would shift to the classroom for the opening dialogue.

Tonight, once inside the class, Mr. Hand (Ray Walston from "My Favorite Martian") is teaching history to the usual hormone-happy students, at least one of whom has his mind elsewhere. Ratner (Wally Ward) is daydreaming about the adorable Stacy (Courtney Thorne-Smith) across the aisle. The fantasy sequence gets inside Ratner and nicely sets up tonight's main story, which is about a shy boy chasing a demure girl.

After that classroom introduction, the show's theme song, performed by

the rock group Oingo Boingo, comes on, along with the clever animated opening that weaves an amusing tapestry of fast-food and other 1980s images.

"Fast Times" is based on characters created by Cameron Crowe, the journalist who posed as a high school student to gather material for a Rolling Stone story. The article became the basis for the 1982 movie "Fast Times at Ridgmont High." Crowe is the series' creative consultant.

The TV production remains true to the realistic spirit of the magazine article. These are stereotypical California characters, for sure, but they have a recognizable quality for teen-agers and even for adults who acknowledge having been younger once. There's affection, feeling and understanding for these adolescents who are alienated — but not aliens — here.

There's the good-natured surfer-skateboarder Spicoli (Dean Cameron), the greasy scam artist (Patrick Dempsey), the stuck-up beauty (Claudia Wells) and the handsome junior-executive type (James Nardini).

'Cosby Show' Spreads Its Magic Over Companion Sitcoms On NBC

NEW YORK (AP) — A successful 30-minute sitcom can rub off on the full hour of programming. A phenomenal comedy, such as "The Cosby Show," can spread its magic for all three hours of prime time.

"Cosby" has put a halo over the whole night," said John Sisk, senior vice president for the J. Walter Thompson ad agency.

Last week's ratings, which NBC won by one-tenth of a point over CBS, illustrated the audience draw of "The Cosby Show" in several ways.

According to A.C. Nielsen Co. fig-

ures released Tuesday, top-ranked "Cosby" and its three Thursday companion sitcoms all cracked the Top 10 last week.

"The Cosby Show" had a 39.0 rating, its series high, and the best performance for a series episode since the "Who Shot J.R.?" resolution program on "Dallas" recorded a 53.3 in 1980. The "Cosby" rating was the highest for a sitcom since "All in the Family" registered a 40.0 in 1972.

Last week, NBC used "Cosby" as a springboard for the debut of Jack Klugman's series, "You Again?," which received overwhelmingly poor reviews but, following "Cosby" on

the schedule, ranked second with a 34.6 rating.

"Cheers" was third on NBC's Thursday lineup and in last week's rankings with a series-high 26.0 rating. It was followed by No. 8 "Night Court" and No. 21 "Hill Street Blues." For the night, NBC averaged a 26.6 rating, better than ABC's and CBS' combined rating for the night.

To a lesser extent, NBC's Saturday comedies, keyed to No. 5 "Golden Girls" and a No. 14 ranking for the debut of Valerie Harper's new "Valerie" sitcom, performed in a similar way. NBC's average rating Saturday was 17.6, nearly the combined rating of ABC's and CBS' Saturday lineups.

Those two nights gave NBC its razor-thin Nielsen edge over CBS, which was the leader on Monday, Tuesday, Friday and Sunday last week. ABC won Wednesday, led by No. 14 "Dynasty," the network's only show in the Top 15.

For Feb. 24-March 2, NBC had an average prime-time rating of 17.4 to CBS' 17.3 and ABC's 13.5.

Last week's Top 10 had "The Cosby Show," "You Again?," "Cheers," Part 2 of CBS' "Blood and Orchids," "Golden Girls," CBS' "60 Minutes," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," "Night Court," CBS' movie, "Outrage," and CBS' "Dallas."

Season to date, NBC leads with a 17.9 rating to CBS' 17.0 and ABC's 15.1.

A national rating equals one percent of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.

The advantage of back-to-back comedies, when programmed against hourlong dramas, is that

many viewers won't tune in to the middle of a drama. That gives the second comedy, often an inferior show, a captive audience.

The history of prime time is filled with this "Piggyback Principle." This season, besides "You Again?," other examples are ABC's hit "Who's the Boss?" leading into "Growing Pains" and NBC's "Golden Girls" providing a big audience for "27."

Last week, there was another illustration of "The Cosby Show" phenomenon besides NBC's Thursday ratings. "Family Ties," "Cosby's" normal follow-up program and the No. 2 series for 1985-86, left its protected Thursday slot for a trial on Sunday. NBC is exploring ways to improve its Sunday schedule.

Up against a repeat of "Murder, She Wrote," "Family Ties" ranked 32nd with a 15.6 rating — half its typical Thursday rating.

In contrast, "The Cosby Show" once moved to Sunday — with better results. Last month, as a lead-in to "Peter the Great," "Cosby" ranked third for the week with a 27.6 rating, behind a Thursday night "Cosby" segment and "Family Ties."

"The Family Ties" special didn't work so well," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

CBS had its own lead-in advantage Sunday, when "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote" delivered large audiences for "Outrage." ABC's TV-movie competition, "Acceptable Risks," was 58th, while NBC's repeat of the feature film, "48 HRS.," was 13th.

Slow Beginning


OSHKOSH, Wis. (AP) — When "Star Trek" first was shown on television it was so unpopular, says creator Gene Roddenberry, that "my own father watched it, went out, walked up and down the street and apologized to all the neighbors."

But the show persevered and now is perennially popular in reruns 20 years after the starship Enterprise first boldly went where no man had gone before, Roddenberry said Tuesday.

"The thing that keeps 'Star Trek' from aging as fast as it might, (is that) 'Star Trek' is not about science and technology and space," he said. "'Star Trek,' like all drama, is about us, you and I, the human condition. The human condition doesn't age."

Roddenberry was in Oshkosh for a speech at the University of Wisconsin.

Crime Costs

A recent report by the President's Commission on Organized Crime makes clear that, over the years, inflation has dramatically altered the price of crime. For example, a nineteenth century New York street gang called the Whyos terrorized lower Manhattan. The Whyos even printed and openly distributed an itemized price list. 

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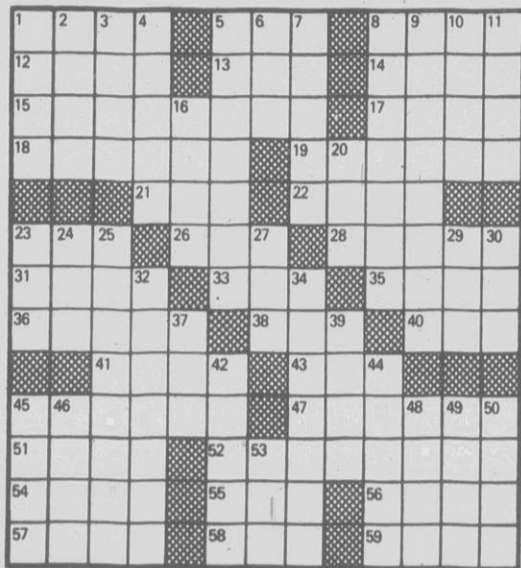

It is dangerous to double the opponents when you have length in partner's suit. Not even length in the enemy trump suit is enough to compensate.

Both East and West treated the auction in a cavalier fashion. We would prefer a four heart opening bid to one heart with the East hand, and would probably respond four hearts with the West hand. Certainly, once we had received heart support we would not sit for the double with the East holding.

Against four spades doubled, West led the jack of hearts. (Our choice would have been the ace of diamonds, hoping to get to partner's hand with a heart for a diamond ruff; that would not have worked, either.) Declarer ruffed the opening lead and, warned by the double that trumps were unlikely to break, he drew just one round of trumps before forcing out the ace of diamonds.

West continued with a heart to shorten declarer's trumps again. West now held trump control, but it did him no good. Declarer simply started to cash winning minor-suit cards until West ruffed. The heart return was ruffed in dummy, another trump was drawn and declarer simply continued with minor suit winners until West scored his second trump trick. But that was the third and last trick for the defense.

This hand was played in a team match. In the other room, North learned a lesson: When vulnerable opponents bid to the four-level with few high cards, don't rely on secondary honors to score tricks.

There, North chose to double four hearts after making a nebulous cue-bid of three hearts over West's two-heart raise. That ended the auction. However, declarer played carefully to hold his losers to the black aces. As a result, the winning team scored 790 points in the first room and 1,190 in the other, for a total pickup of 18 International Match Points.

Brady's Wife Wages Gun Control Drive

WASHINGTON (AP) — Five years after her family's life was shattered by bullets intended for President Reagan, Sarah Brady is waging a personal lobbying campaign for gun control.

Deliberately and calmly, Mrs. Brady, the wife of White House Press Secretary James Brady, set out last September to work against a hotly contested bill on Capitol Hill and, over time, educate the public about gun control.

Gun control was on Mrs. Brady's mind long before her husband was shot during the 1981 assassination attempt on President Reagan. Back in the 1970s, one of her girlfriends was shot to death with her own revolver in a lover's spat.

It is Mrs. Brady's situation, however, that makes Mrs. Brady's appeal so poignant. "Our happy lives were changed forever," she said in a fund-raising letter for Handgun Control Inc.

The Senate's passage of the so-called McClure-Volkmer bill, which would generally weaken the 1968 federal gun control law, "fucked my husband's suffering," she said. "And it mocked the survivors of those 20,000 handgun victims each year who were not as 'fortunate' as Jim was."

Brady, who has brain damage and wears a leg brace as a result of the shots fired by John W. Hinckley Jr.'s 22-caliber pistol on March 30, 1981, is not involved in his wife's lobbying.

"It's your show," he told her in refusing to be photographed during an interview at their house in Arlington, Va., a few miles from the Washington Hilton, where he and Reagan were shot.

Mrs. Brady's outspoken stand against the McClure-Volkmer bill, named after its chief sponsors, Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, and Rep. Harold Volkmer, D-Mo., puts her at odds with the Reagan administration's support of the measure.

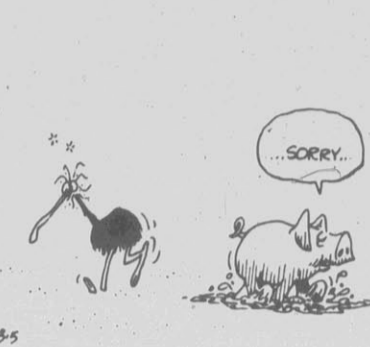

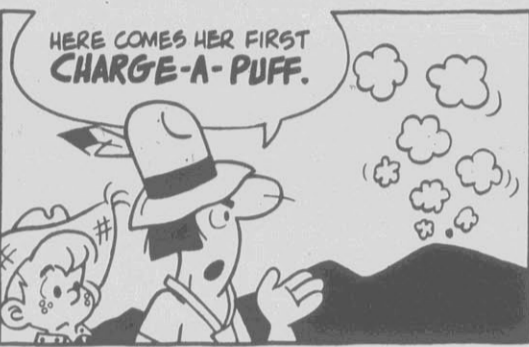

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Oil Prices Fall Below \$12 Mark

The major grades of oil from the United States and Britain have dropped below \$12 a barrel, reaching levels that analysts say could force some producers to shut down oil wells.

The main U.S. crude, West Texas Intermediate, slipped to \$11.63 a barrel at midmorning today in contracts for April delivery on the New York Mercantile Exchange after dropping to \$11.98 a barrel Tuesday. That's a plunge of 63.3 percent from the November high of \$31.70.

Oil ministers of six Persian Gulf nations scheduled a special meeting Saturday in Saudi Arabia to discuss the sharp fall in oil prices, the United Arab Emirates official news agency WAM reported today.

European traders said Tuesday that Brent oil for May delivery sold Tuesday for \$11.86 a barrel, down 64 cents from Monday and the lowest price since Britain first pumped oil from the North Sea in 1975. At the start of this year, Brent was trading for around \$26 a barrel.

In the United States, oil last sold for under \$12 a barrel in early 1978.

Outside the volatile trading of speculative commodity markets and one-time deals, more U.S. oil companies were cutting official prices for the major grade of domestic crude. Contract prices, which began the year between \$27 to \$29, now range from a low of \$14 a barrel for West Texas Intermediate quoted by Citgo Petroleum Corp. to a high of \$19.10 quoted by Shell Oil Co.

Economists at the investment firm Merrill Lynch & Co. said pressure for production cutbacks will increase as prices drop to about \$12 a barrel, making it uneconomical to operate low-volume oil wells, extract petroleum from Canadian oil sands or pump oil in remote arctic and off-shore areas.

The economists said in a weekly commentary that the only effective means of stopping the price slide would be a cutback in supplies.

Several members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries have been trying unsuccessfully to persuade colleagues in and out of the cartel to limit output to stabilize markets.

The drop in prices has improved the prospect of non-inflationary economic growth, which contributed to a sharp drop in interest rates in American credit markets to levels last seen in 1978.

But retail prices have not fallen as quickly for refined petroleum products, such as gasoline or heating oil.

"The full extent of price declines will not be passed along to consumers, and what is passed along will not come right away," the Merrill Lynch report said.

The economists said refiners will seek to improve profit margins by keeping some of the savings on crude oil. They also said refiners would not be able to immediately pass on lower oil prices because they have not used up more expensive oil that was purchased earlier. Typically, it takes about 60 days to run oil inventories through refineries.

Four More Prisoners Released

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corazon Aquino's government today brushed aside the objections of the military and freed four political detainees, including the founder of the Philippine Communist Party and an alleged guerrilla chief.

Mrs. Aquino's top military advisers had argued the four men should not be freed unconditionally.

The four were the last of an estimated 500 political prisoners held by the administration of deposed President Ferdinand E. Marcos who were ordered freed by the new government.

In other developments, a lawyer said today that two of the 26 people acquitted of conspiracy charges in the 1983 assassination of opposition leader Benigno Aquino now have admitted their involvement.

The attorney, Lupino Lazaro, said two of those cleared in Aquino's slaying have given sworn statements saying they were involved and implicating Marcos, Marcos' wife, Imelda, and four Cabinet ministers.

How To Measure For Insulation:



Measure the space between joists. In most cases it is 15" or 23" W. Insulation is available in both widths. To find out how much insulation you will need, follow this simple formula: Determine the length and width of your attic. Then just multiply the length by the width in order to find the total square feet. To account for space taken up by joists, multiply the total sq. ft. by .94 for 23" insulation or by .90 for 15" insulation. This gives you the total amount of insulation you need!

An Explanation Of R-Values:

All insulating materials are measured for effectiveness on the R-value scale, the resistance a material has to heat flow. Greater the R-value rating, the greater the insulating power. Ask Lowe's for the R-value factsheet.


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


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
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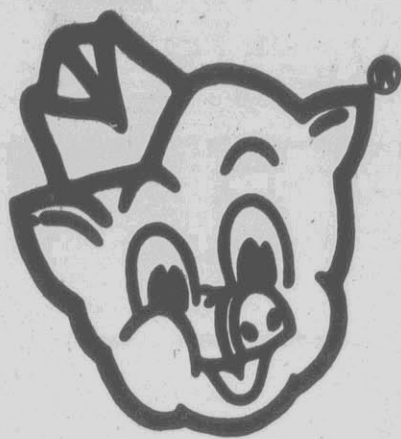
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Tar Heel Cities Developing Greenways

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Greenways and linear parks are springing up along creeks and rivers across North Carolina as cities try to turn what could have become open sewers into recreational attractions.

A linear park is a park shaped like a line — long and narrow — often built alongside a body of water.

"We're not just talking about flood control. We're talking about recreation, flood control, new blood in the city, improving the tax structure," said Charlotte architect Crutcher Ross, who wants to turn Charlotte's Sugar Creek into a store- and park-lined waterway much like the famed Paseo del Rio of San Antonio, Texas.

Raleigh, Greensboro, Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Wilmington and Asheville are among the other North Carolina cities with plans — some of them well under way — for putting parks, jogging paths and bike paths along city creeks and rivers. In many cases, the city acquires the land — which can't be used for building because of the

threat of flooding — through donations, purchases and the creative use of zoning laws.

"Back in the 70s, there was quite a bit of pollution going into (Sugar Creek)," Ross said. "They were talking about covering it up and making it an enclosed sewer."

But Ross began working with a city councilman inspired by San Antonio's waterway on a \$11.5 million project to improve Sugar Creek. While the creek was cleaned up to some extent, the project was discontinued in 1974.

"We did all the drawings to the point that we could have started construction," said Ross. "They're still in the engineering department in Charlotte. We're trying to revive it now, and we're getting a good response. The city at this time is more sophisticated, more susceptible to something like that."

The plans call for lakes along the creek deep enough for amphibious buses that could pick up passengers downtown, drive into the creek, roll around the dams and take people to stores and restaurants along the waterway.

"That would be great. That would be wonderful," said John Labs, the city's landscape engineer. But he said it might not work on relatively straight Sugar Creek as well as it has in San Antonio, where the river forms a loop that makes it easier to control the water.

Fayetteville has a similar plan for Cross Creek, said Robert Barefoot, assistant director of the city's parks and recreation department.

The master plan calls for an 8.5-mile linear park along the creek from Fort Bragg to Pope Park at the Cape Fear River. There would be a "riverwalk" downtown with shops and restaurants, but not as commercialized as San Antonio's, said Barefoot.

Small parks would appear along the streamway, offering boating, fishing, camping, cultural activities in an amphitheater, historic sites and field sports, he said.

The parks department hopes to put on the ballot soon a bond issue of at least \$15 million that would include money for the plan.

"We estimated we might get \$10 million in private money," said Barefoot. "If the private sector got excited, it could accelerate."

Asheville citizens have proposed an ambitious plan for the French Broad River waterfront, said Dr. Walter Boland, a UNC-Asheville sociologist, city councilman and chairman of the riverfront committee.

Tentative plans call for a three-mile stretch of linear park with passive and active recreation areas, band shells and perhaps an amphitheater, he said.

Some 55 acres of riverfront land has been offered in a lease arrangement, and the committee is applying for grants for planning and land acquisition.

"We're talking about something unfolding over the next three or four years," said Boland. "The waterfront has been a disaster for the last 75 years, so it's going to be hard to restore."

Because Asheville, already dependent on tourism, would benefit from the parkway system, Boland expects nearby industries to cooperate.

Wilmington has been developing parkland along the Cape Fear River since 1982, said Robert Murphrey, executive director of Downtown Area Revitalization Effort Inc.

The city now has a central park by the river, with fountains, a dock for the ferry to the U.S.S. North Carolina and a riverwalk extending five blocks south, he said. The next phase calls for extending the riverwalk five blocks north of the park.

The project, estimated at \$2 million when everything is done, is funded by federal, state and city money and is implemented by the city with the advice of DARE Inc., he said.

Raleigh has been working for 12 years to get developers and property owners to donate land along flood-prone Crabtree Creek, said Bob Mosher, senior planner with the city planning department.

The city now has 600 acres of park land along Crabtree, Walnut, Leadmine, Rocky Branch and Marsh creeks, with 10 miles of paved trails and 10 miles of unpaved trails, he said.

"Plans call for a lot more," said Mosher. "We want to have a continuous connection along our streams to allow someone to walk from north Raleigh to the central city — about a four-mile walk — or to bike."

Planners also want to protect the natural flora, fauna and geology, connect the trails to nearby lakes. Long-range plans call for about 200 miles of trails going all the way up to the Neuse River, he said.

Winston-Salem has a "pie in the sky" program to create a 20-mile network of linear parks along its creeks, but it will soon have a four-mile park along Salem Creek, said Sam McDonald, a planner with the city planning department.

The trail will from Winston-Salem State University through a large park to a shopping center, he said.

Winston-Salem also has a plan to build an eight-mile greenway along Muddy Creek and the city's northern beltway, said McDonald.

Greensboro already has about 15 miles of continuous linear park along various creeks and another 15 miles in bits and pieces, said John Beaman, the city's landscape architect.

"We have some gorgeous parks and the nicest bike trail of any city in North Carolina," he said.

The city is still acquiring flood-plain land to extend the system, he said.

'Hall Of Fame' To Honor Pioneers Of Appalachia

NORRIS, Tenn. (AP) — And the winners are ... Enoch Williams for ingenuity, Bit Rouse for fortitude and Edna Blue for neighborliness.

The categories may be unusual for an induction ceremony, but then this is no ordinary hall of fame. It's the Appalachian Hall of Fame, an idea of author John Rice Irwin, founder of the Museum of Appalachia.

Williams, Rouse and Blue are among dozens of people who have lived and worked in the southern Appalachian Mountains and are about to be inducted into Irwin's two-story Hall of Fame, under construction next to his museum on his East Tennessee farm where sheep and other livestock graze among the outdoor exhibits.

Irwin founded the Museum of Appalachia to preserve the tools, crafts and ways of Appalachian folk. The Hall of Fame is his attempt to preserve the traits that carved a different kind of life for the inland settlers as compared to the mercantile culture of their cousins left behind in port cities like Baltimore and Charleston.

"The purpose of the hall of fame is to recognize and honor the warm, unselfish and kind people who inhabited this territory. I want to identify and pay tribute to their noble characteristics," Irwin said.

"But I guess my ultimate purpose is to show the kids what kind of people settled these mountains. The greatest deterrent to their success is a lack of self-esteem. Maybe this will show them what kind of stock they come from," Irwin said.

Among the more notable inductees will be Alex Haley, the Tennessee-born writer whose novel "Roots" rekindled a national interest in ancestry, and Army Sgt. Alvin York, the much-decorated World War I hero who single-handedly captured an enemy platoon.

But the majority of the hall will be occupied by people who lived their entire lives in the small, mountain

community where they may have mastered a craft or refused to give up in the face of a personal catastrophe.

"I've already collected many of the tools and artifacts that were used to settle the southern Appalachians. Now I'm trying to recognize and honor the human traits that made it possible to tame this land and that left it so different from the rest of the world," said Irwin.

He plans to honor Enoch Houston Williams under the heading of ingenuity for crafting a telescope from a wrecked car. Williams took bits of broken headlights and ground them into telescope lenses.

Also due for induction is Bit Rouse, who lost his right arm in a farm accident and built himself a replacement so he could continue playing his beloved fiddle. Rouse wins the category of fortitude.

There will be a special entry for the 184 men who died in the Fraterville mine disaster of 1902 in Coal Creek, Tenn. The exhibit will include letters left by the dying miners as their air supply wore out.

"Oh God, for one more breath," wrote miner Henry Beech. "Ellen, remember me as long as you live. Goodbye darling," Beech wrote in the hours before his death.

The museum is expected to open in May next to Irwin's Museum of Appalachia, which is about 20 miles north of Knoxville.

The first round of inductees are being hand-picked by Irwin, but he's considering a nominating committee to "add an air of fairness to the project" and to keep it going in perpetuity.

Haley, a friend who lives nearby, "was a shoo-in for the literary category," said Irwin. "Alex symbolizes something of the pioneering spirit in a writer," Irwin said.

"But most of the other Hall of Famers will not be as recognizable. I'm going for human characteristics rather than accomplishments," he said.

Requirements for inclusion in the

Appalachian Hall of Fame are simple but stringent, as was the life in the mountainous wilderness that stretched from Kentucky and Virginia through the Carolinas and Tennessee into Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi.

"I'm considering lots of people right now, and I'm still adding categories," said Irwin. "I added one this morning for gun-makers. One particular gun, the Kentucky rifle, was essential to settling the southern Appalachians."

And one gun-maker turned Kentucky rifles into an art form — Hacker Martin of Appomatox, Va. "He used pieces of scrap metal to decorate his guns and they are one of the most artistic things you'll find made in this region," Irwin said.

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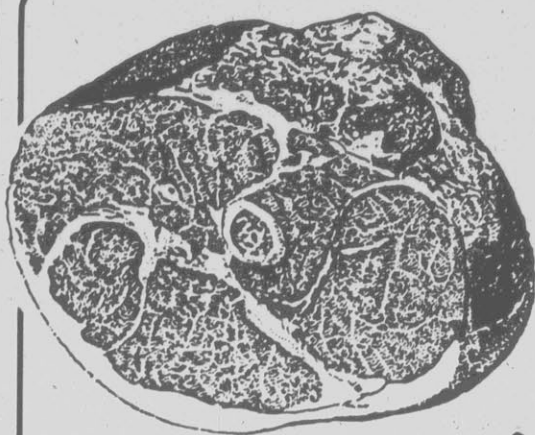
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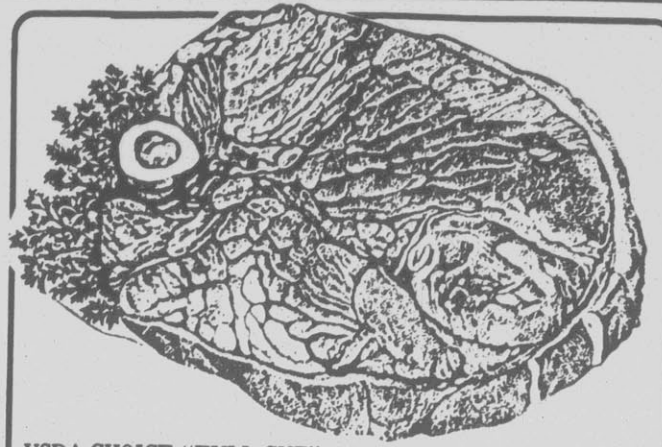
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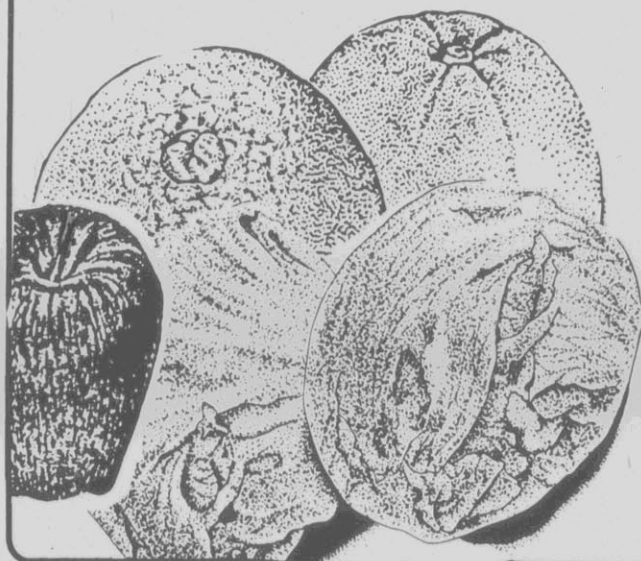

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Folklore Is Part Of State Capitol's History

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Rumor has it that an escape tunnel was constructed in the North Carolina Capitol, which would allow the governor to flee through an underground passage should the Yankees attack during the Civil War.

The tunnel wouldn't have done Gov. Zebulon Vance much good. It wasn't completed until the late 1880s, years after the War Between the States was over, and it led to a steam plant, which provided steam heat to the building. Now, Gov. Jim Martin would likely get lost in a sea of electric cables if he tried to escape.

Sam Townsend doesn't believe another old rumor that the chips in the Capitol steps were made by whiskey barrels rolling up and down the halls. But Townsend, the administrator of the state Capitol, will tell you that there was a bar at the Capitol back in 1866 and 1867. But the bar didn't last long. Raleigh citizens didn't think much of the idea.

It is Townsend's job to separate the Capitol folklore from the facts. He conducts tours of the Capitol, where 130,000 people visited last year, and he works to interpret what the building was like during its 146-year history.

But Townsend said the folklore has also become a part of history.

"The barrel story is a attention-getter," Townsend said. "It's a legend that can't be proved, but the existence of the legend is true."

While the chipped steps legend may not be true, the story of the bar is. Townsend had even planned to restore the second floor conference room that once housed what was known as the Third House, to go

along with the state House and Senate. But Gov. Jim Martin decided to move his offices to the building and needed that space.

"There was indeed a bar, according to fragmented records," said Raymond Beck, the Capitol historian. "It was said that more legislation was carried out in that room than in the other two chambers. It is said that votes were sold over a drink of

whiskey — or for a drink of whiskey."

Legend also has it that the first casualty of the Civil War in North Carolina happened at the Capitol — and Beck said it was an attack from the rear.

During a celebration of North Carolina's succession from the United States during the Civil War, Wiley Sauls was loading cannons on the

Capitol grounds for a 100-gun salute, Beck said. But Sauls accidentally popped a bulldog on the head with a ramrod.

"It was a sneak attack from the rear," Beck said of the dog's retaliation. "(Sauls) walked around with the bulldog dangling. Then he tapped him on the head, and it is said that the dog died. But Sauls was placed on a carriage, with a cloth sack cover-

ing his wound, which was bleeding."

Then there's the story of "Uncle Dan" Terry, who was in charge of the state Capitol and grounds during the administration of Populist Gov. D.L. Russell in 1896. Historians say Russell gave Terry permission to take stern measures with an employee who had fallen out of favor.

Beck said Terry was told by the governor to keep a railroad commis-

sioner out of the office. And Russell gave Terry a gun to punctuate his point.

"Russell told him, 'If you have to, shoot him,'" Beck said.

But Beck also said that Terry was provided at that time with a pardon from the governor, just in case. Terry was never forced to use the gun.
