U.S. Plans 'Retaliation' Against Libya

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. intelligence has learned that Libya's Moammar Khadafy is encouraging his embassies to guide new terrorist attacks against the United States and Reagan administration officials have agreed there must be retaliation, a senior official says.

The official, speaking Tuesday — following recent attacks in Europe that prompted today's expulsion of two Libyan embassy officials from West Germany — said the target and timing of U.S. retaliation has yet to be determined.

The official said that in the past the

administration has been split by a dispute between the State and Defense departments, with Secretary of State George P. Shultz more willing than Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger to launch retaliatory raids, even if innocent lives were put at risk.

"This time there's a meeting of the minds," said the official, who is familiar with the thinking of top government officials and who spoke on condition he not be identified.

He said there has been no decision to go ahead with an attack.

The official would not say which Libyan embassies are involved in sponsoring new operations.

He added that administration officials are still trying to gather proof that Khadafy or some identifiable terrorist group was responsible for the strikes.

Six people, five of them Americans, were killed in the latest terrorist incidents: a West Berlin nightclub attack and an explosion aboard an airliner approaching Athens.

West Germany today ordered two Libyan diplomats to leave the country based on evidence emerging from the weekend bombing of the nightclub, said a Foreign Ministry spokesman in Bonn.

Spokesman Juergen Chrobog said

Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher told the West German Cabinet today that he had asked the diplomats to leave.

He said the activities of the two diplomats were not in keeping with "proper diplomatic custom," but refused to elaborate.

The State Department had no comment on West Germany's action, spokeswoman Sondra McCarthy said today.

Reagan discussed international terrorism with departing Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin Tuesday, and Reagan's top spokesman revealed that "a substantial amount of information" is flowing in from

investigations of the latest attacks.

But deputy press secretary Larry Speakes stressed to reporters that "we are not prepared to draw any public conclusions" fixing blame for the explosion aboard a TWA jetliner and the bombing of a West Berlin nightclub frequented by American servicemen.

Shultz, appearing before White House reporters following Reagan's meeting with Dobrynin, was asked whether terrorism, and specifically Libya, had been discussed.

"The problems around the world in different regions were among the things that were talked about and specifically problems connected with

Libya were discussed," Shultz replied.

Asked to elaborate, Shultz said, "I could, but I won't."

Earlier, White House spokesman Edward Djerejian said the United States is seeking "the possible closing of more Libyan Peoples' Bureaus known to be the source of terrorist planning and activity."

Other officials have reported mounting evidence that Libya was involved in last Saturday's bombing of the West Berlin nightclub jammed with American GIs.

Speakes denied a report in The

Khadafy Boasts Libyans 'Ready'

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy said today he and his top commanders have completed military plans to challenge the United States. He renewed his threats against American military and civilian targets worldwide.

"We have just finished making military plans for confrontation in response to the latest American threats to us," Khadafy told reporters who had been called to his heavily guarded bunker in the Libyan capital.

He spoke in Arabic and his remarks were translated by an official government interpreter.

"It is axiomatic that America will be defeated militarily," Khadafy said. "It is axiomatic that if aggression is staged against us, then we shall escalate the violence against American targets, civilian and non-civilian, throughout the world."

About 10 reporters were invited to

Khadafy's news conference, his first since U.S. and Libyan forces clashed in the disputed Gulf of Sidra last month.

Khadafy, dressed in a green military uniform with a black beret, answered questions for about 20 minutes.

Khadafy implicitly confirmed reports that Libya suffered casualties in the fighting.

"Casualties are not important to us. What is important to us is that the line of death was baptized with Libyan and U.S. blood," he said.

On Tuesday, Libya's armed forces commander was quoted as saying U.S. forces killed 56 people in the fighting. Al-Shaab, an Egyptian weekly newspaper, quoted Brig. Abu Bakr Younis as saying 56 people "were martyred" in the March 24-25 clashes.

Khadafy claims his forces shot down as many as six American pilots.

Blast Possible In Crash

NEW YORK (AP) — An official of the International Air Line Pilots Association said today there are indications that sabotage caused the crash last month of a Mexicana Airline Boeing 727 that killed 166 people in Mexico.

Thomas Ashwood, a vice president of the group meeting in London this week to consider calling a pilots' boycott of countries linked to terrorism, said the clues were reported to his organization by Mexican pilots.

"Indications are very strong that the airplane was brought down as the result of an explosion and probably on board the aircraft. These are the early indications, I would stress, but they seem to be fairly possible," Ashwood told CBS News.

The indications include evidence that the plane's cargo doors were blown off, he said.

On Monday, sources in Washington close to the crash investigation said the possibility of a bomb had not been ruled out. The sources, who demanded anonymity, said investigators have determined that there was a fire toward the rear of the plane before it crashed.

On Friday in Beirut, a typewritten statement signed by the Arab Revolutionary Brigades and the Egyptian Revolutionaries claimed responsibility for the crash.

The note, in Arabic, said the plane was sabotaged in a suicide mission to retaliate for U.S. action against Libya. The note, which could not be verified, did not say how the Mexicana crash occurred.

CAN I BENEFIT BOTH?

Your Hotline item about there being no cost to willing one's body for organ and tissue donations brought up another question I've had in my mind a while. If I wish to donate my organs and tissues for donation, would there be enough of my body left to leave to the school of medicine for medical research or instruction of medical students? If there has to be a choice, I prefer to leave it for donation of organs and tissues, but I'd be glad to do both if that's feasible. O.D.

Jean Folston of the Carolina Organ Procurement Agency in Greenville said yes, indeed, you may leave your body for both purposes. COPA and the anatomy department of the ECU School of Medicine would be glad to cooperate. Even if your heart, lungs, portions of skin and bone, etc., are used to extend life and alleviate suffering through transplant there will still be portions of your body that can be used for medical school research. For information, contact COPA, 757-2319.

To ensure that your wishes are carried out, you should fill out a uniform donor form obtainable from COPA, have indication of your willingness put on your driver's license if you wish, and include an item for your will, the form for which is obtainable from the department of anatomy of the medical school. More important than all of these, however, is the need to inform several members of your family of your wishes, so there will be no doubt or confusion at the time of your death.

Relatives Sue Over Nursing Center

A class action civil suit filed Tuesday by relatives of two residents of the University Nursing Center asks that the court force state officials to enforce state and federal regulations at the facility and asks that the nursing center be placed in receivership until "conditions, treatment and patient care" are improved.

The suit, filed by Frank House for his sister, Addie Moyer, and Carolyn F. James, for her sister, Agnes Fullilove, names as defendants the University Nursing Center, Hillhaven Inc. (which manages the facility), Kyle W. Dilda (administrator at the nursing home), as

well as state Human Resources Secretary Phillip J. Kirk Jr. and Division of Facility Services Director I.O. Wilkerson Jr.

The complaint, which asks for declaratory and injunctive relief "concerning conditions, treatment and patient care at University Nursing Center," says "Plaintiffs contend that the conditions, treatment and patient care do not meet the standards established by the North Carolina Health Care Facility Licensure Act" established by the rules for licensing nursing homes adopted by the N.C. Medical Care Commission.

The complaint also contends that the conditions, treatment and patient

care "do not meet the standards established by federal Medicaid and Medicare regulations and that the nursing home is not in compliance with the contractual assurances made as a condition of being certified to receive Medicaid and Medicare payments."

Citing a number of surveys by facility services representatives over the past several years and a number of "deficiencies" listed in the survey reports, the complaint contends that state officials "have failed to fulfill their obligations under state and federal laws to assure that state and federal laws and regulations are complied with."

That alleged failure, the suit

charges, has resulted in "a system in which deficiencies are cited, perhaps temporarily corrected, and then more deficiencies allowed to reoccur year after year because the underlying causes of poor management and lack of concern for patient care and patients rights are not corrected."

Citing "failures to follow physicians orders for treatment (and) failure to follow proper infection control procedures," the suit says Pitt County death certificates indicate "infections" were involved in the deaths of 11 residents of the nursing home in 1985 and in eight deaths in 1984.

Load Management Savings Reported By GUC's Staff

Operations of the Greenville Utilities Commission's load management system saved \$121,955 in billing charges in March board members were told Tuesday night.

Roger Jones, superintendent of GUC's electric system, reported that \$76,520 was saved through operations of load management switches on domestic water heaters between 7 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. on March 5 coincident with the monthly Carolina Power & Light Co. peak, while another \$42,784 was saved through

voltage adjustments during the same period.

Other savings included \$1,523 through operations of a generator at GUC's water plant and another \$1,164 through operations of a generator at Procter & Gamble Paper Products.

Since January 1985, load management operations have resulted in billing reductions totaling \$1.79 million.

The water plant and Procter & Gamble receive a credit of 50 percent of the savings they generate on their utility bill. Customers who have load management switches installed on

domestic water heaters and central air conditioning units receive a credit of up to \$10 a month on their utility bills during the four Summer months for their participation.

GUC General Manager Malcolm Green said that for the first time since the load management program began several years ago, the utilities has "more switches on hand than applications." He said at the end of March, there were 886 switches for water heaters and air conditioners in stock, while there were applications

Her Size Is A Plus For Agency

NEW YORK (AP) — Working as a store detective after receiving a degree in criminal justice, Pat Swift wandered around Bloomingdale's looking for shoplifters. What she found was a new career as a model and owner of a large-size-model agency.

Swift, who prefers the designation large-size to heavy — "heavy's kind of an ugly word" — at 5 foot 8 weighs 185 pounds and wears a size 18. She readily gives her measurements — 42-32-44 — but is much more reluctant to reveal her age, despite the fact that it's a nicely rounded 30.

"I started my agency when I was 22," she explains. "For me to be 30 almost says to me that I'm finished."

But the model who opened her own business, Plus Models, when other agencies told her to go home and lose 65 pounds, seems to be just getting started. She's been so successful that she has added petites and regular models, as well as large-size men, to her roster.

It all began when the University of South Florida graduate was approached in the New York department store where she worked by a representative of a women's sportswear company, who asked if she would pose for an ad.

She went to St. Thomas and did the shot, then got other jobs. But when she couldn't find an agency to take her on, she recruited other women in her size range and went into business for herself. Soon her models, who now number 60, were much in demand.

"We're the agency of the future," says Swift, a vivacious brunette. "Body types are changing. The emaciated Twiggy type is not around any more; people want more curves, a more solid body, even in a size 8."

The biggest change, she notes, is that the larger woman can now dress fashionably, in the latest styles and fabrics, instead of being confined to her former wardrobe of polyesters and overblouses.

"Basically, she can wear everything, and the top designers are making clothes for her," Swift says. "More and more stores are featuring departments for the larger woman. They've found out that the large-size woman has money to spend."

"The woman going back to work has to compete, and the first place she has to compete is on the dress level. The large-size woman has started working. She has money, she wants clothes. They (manufacturers and designers) are going to supply the demand."

Her models, too, can compete on the same level now as their smaller counterparts, she notes, some making as much as \$150,000 to \$200,000 a year. Swift no longer models regularly, but does do special promotions. She also commentates fashion shows and travels extensively, especially in Europe, looking for new models.

With the help of a "supportive family," Swift first started on diets at age 9, when she was in the third grade and sensitive about being called "Fat Pat." She admits it took her a long time to finally accept herself.

"But if something is done to you 20 to 25 years, it's not repaired so fast through dress, makeup or photography," she says. "Even the most beautiful women have hangups about themselves. Life is hard when

you feel bad about yourself but once you accept the way you are, whether you're a size 4 or 42, it's easier."

"It's not only large-size women who have trouble accepting themselves," she adds. "It's terrible what advertising has done to us. Few people realize when they look at the pictures in fashion magazines that those people are so air-brushed (retouched) and nobody is that perfect."

Swift says that she diets every day, "just like anyone else," to keep her weight down, works out and lifts weights. "Diets are good, they give you a sense of discipline for your life. But go see a doctor before you start, exercise and try to eat good food," she advises.

"I don't tell anyone lose or don't lose. If you want to lose weight it's cool; I think it will make life easier. But you must live for today and if today your size is 20 or 42, you have to deal with who you are today."

And today, Swift says, "I'm happy, my clothes fit, I treat myself like a size 8."

Pat's Pointers

Irish fisherman knits, long famous for chasing winter's chill, can now be a spring-through-fall favorite, thanks to a new and exciting cottonlike acrylic yarn. The sculptured cottonlike patterns, while faithfully retaining the traditional Irish look, are simpler than most Aran Isle designs. Knit this striking vest now to enjoy during the mild weather months, then make another for winter out of wool or acrylic knitting worsted-weight yarn. The pattern calls for a gauge of five stitches per inch in stockinette stitch. Directions are for small (8-10), medium (12-14) and large (16-18).

Time has almost stood still in a group of peaceful Irish islands just off the coast of Galway Bay where the people still earn their livelihood cultivating the rocky soil, fishing and raising cattle. Life is not easy or affluent, but the people, for the most part, are a happy lot, at peace with the world and themselves.

The women — and some of the men — are great knitters, working in various patterns according to the whim of the moment. Amazingly, they work even the most intricate designs without written directions. In typical Irish fashion, most are unconcerned if an occasional cable is crossed in the wrong place or some other minor mistake shows in their knitting. Their joy comes from the pleasure of knitting and of knowing that their loved ones are comfortable clothed.

Interestingly enough, the more intricate the pattern is, the less likelihood there is that you will find mistakes in the work.

Symbolism plays a large role in the lives of most Irishmen and this is true in their knitting as well. While different writers have given various interpretations to the symbolic meanings, these are some of the most commonly seen.

The cables represent the fishermen's rope and are wishes for safety and good luck. The diamond design is a wish for success, wealth and treasure for the wearer, while the moss stitch takes its name from carrageen moss, an edible seaweed that is an important source of nourishment. It is a symbol of gratitude for this "gift from the sea."

The vest shown today features cables and moss-filled diamonds, so if you make it for a gift, it would be a nice touch to let the wearer know what wonderful wishes go with it.

Among other favorite pattern stitch symbols is the Trinity stitch, where three stitches are knit in one and thus symbolize the Holy Trinity and the emblem of God-given life and being.

Single zigzag stitches depict the winding cliff paths along the rocky shores and the similar winding

In writing this column, I feel a link with my own Irish ancestry and send with it an Irish wish for all the truly good and meaningful things in life for each of you.

Priorities

How does it feel to bail out the ocean with a water jug? It has never been done, so nobody knows.

Nevertheless, leaders of the Legislature must feel as if they are about to learn as they face the volume of business proposed for a short session scheduled for June 5.

The short sessions began in the 1970s as a way to adjust the unpredictable budgets during the second year of the biennium. When legislators gather, however, additional business is bound to result and gradually the work load has grown. This year the Legislature will receive a large load of proposals from the governor who was new in office when the Legislature last met.

Thus this summer the General Assembly may tackle:

- A 20-point education plan.
- A 10-year \$157 million program to deal with prison overcrowding.
- A program for improving highway construction revenues.
- Extensive budget adjustments including pay raises for teachers and state employees.

Then there are 87 studies which have been authorized and may result in bills, the insurance crisis and 173 bills passed by one house or the other still awaiting final approval.

It is clear to everyone that all that cannot be done in one month.

That means some priorities will have to be set by the Legislative leaders and only the most pressing business will be considered. Foremost will be the budget adjustments, the original reasons for the short sessions. After that bills should be taken up according to clear priorities as to their needs.

Go For It

The University of North Carolina's Task Force on Teacher Preparation has been hearing and reading arguments on extending the teacher education program before they enter the classroom.

One of the key questions is that of raising requirements from four years to five or six years of college work. Others wonder if lengthening the teacher preparation period would discourage students from entering the field at a time when a major teacher shortage is imminent.

The Council of Education Associations has endorsed the longer preparation.

A spokesman for the Education Forum, a group of business leaders and educators, asserts there never will be a good time to make the profession more rigorous, and if North Carolina delays adopting a six-year program it will be 10 more years before anyone seriously looks at it.

As interested observers we'd venture that upgrading qualifications for getting a teaching post has already been determined in our best interests; so let's go for it. It is attainable. It is something of value to the state at large as well as to individual teachers. We could start at the undergraduate level. It would require additional state funding, but we should see results in a relatively short time.

Gantt Offers 'Menu' For Taxes

RALEIGH — When Rep. Joe Mavretic, D-Edgecombe, proposed his wide-ranging tax reform package last year, he justified it on the grounds that in many counties the property tax does not provide enough revenue for local governments.

Ironically, Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt has been saying the same thing to the Legislative Study Commission on Local Government Finance. Ironic, that is, because

under Mavretic's plan, Charlotte and Mecklenburg County would have been the biggest losers. Mavretic's plan would have repealed the property tax, increased the sales tax to 8 percent, and then distributed that money back to the counties in a way that would have drained millions of dollars from Gantt's neighborhood.

In the past several months, Gantt has laid out a package of tax measures which he and the N.C.

League of Municipalities much prefer to the Mavretic plan. Although they've gotten very little support from the commission, it is a good bet that these are the new taxes North Carolinians will be hearing about over the next several years.

Gantt's proposal includes six taxes which he wants the General Assembly to authorize as local options. It would be up to county commissioners to actually implement the taxes. Gantt's idea is to provide commissioners with a "large menu" of taxes from which they could choose to create a tax program with the "right mix" for their area. For example, a hotel room tax would do little good for remote counties with no tourism. But that tax would be helpful to counties with major highways.

The commission had already approved a half-cent sales tax increase and a new hotel occupancy tax when Gantt started working through his list.

He won approval on an increase in the local auto license tag that many cities require. A city can now charge up to \$5. Gantt wants cities to have the authority to charge as much as \$20 a year. He estimates that the full \$15 increase would mean an additional \$3.6 million for his city.

In the 1985 session, the General Assembly authorized the counties of Dare and Currituck to levy a 1 percent real estate transfer tax. Gantt recommends that all counties have that authority.

That tax is vehemently opposed by real estate agents and could be expected to be very unpopular among homeowners. In 1985 it passed because legislators felt that outside developers would pay the tax in the two fast developing tourist counties. But legislators on the commission did not like the idea of applying this tax in places where it would primarily apply to the sale of principal residences.

Two of Gantt's taxes would piggyback with the income tax. He proposes that either a payroll tax or supplemental income tax be authorized. A payroll tax would raise about 50 percent more revenue than an income tax. Both are aimed at providing a city like Charlotte with some tax revenues from people who use city services during the day and then commute out of the town at night.

Gantt has been trying for several years to have a local option gasoline tax approved for Mecklenburg County. In other states, this tax is common. He's also proposing a sales tax of two percent for services. This would effect fees, for example, from plumbers, lawyers and accountants.

The commission refused to be rushed into any endorsement of these taxes without a full hearing. But they did not kill any of them. That's an indication that legislators will look at these taxes as they try to solve the financial problems which local governments face.

Arms Talks Produced Little To Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — Twenty-three years after the United States and the Soviet Union banned nuclear tests in the atmosphere, outer space and under water, they reserve the right to keep testing underground.

The superpowers pledged in 1963 to make every reasonable effort to expand that year's partial ban into a comprehensive one. In 1974 they agreed to limit their blasts to 150 kilotons — more than 11 times the force of the U.S. atom bomb that devastated Hiroshima in World War II, and ample room to test old weapons and develop new ones.

In 1976, they signed a parallel treaty to place the same limit on blasts carried out for such non-military purposes as changing the course of rivers. It was considered significant at the time that the accord also established the principle of on-site inspection.

The Soviets have always been reluctant to admit foreigners to their test sites. The concession to the Ford administration seemed a breakthrough on the touchy verification issue.

Extending the principle to other arms control agreements already on the books and permitting U.S. observers to be present at Soviet sites with advanced technology could answer many questions raised about Soviet compliance.

These questions have multiplied during the Reagan administration to the point that some advisers to the president have recommended he allow the U.S. missile total to exceed the limits of the 1979 Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty when a new Trident nuclear submarine begins sea trials in May.

The point would be to show the Russians that observing arms con-

trol agreements cannot be a one-way street.

Reagan has invited the Soviets to the U.S. test site in Nevada, but since that might imply acquiescence in renewed testing Moscow has not responded.

A fifth round of arms control negotiations is due to begin in Geneva on May 8. So far, the talks have not produced any agreement on offensive or defensive nuclear weapons.

The last major accord was signed by President Carter and Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev in Vienna in 1979. Talks, also involving Britain, on a total test ban were recessed in November 1980 and have not been resumed. Initially, U.S. reluctance to discuss the issue further was attributed to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan in December 1979.

But in the Reagan years the issue

of verification has taken precedence. Allegations that the Soviets have flouted the 1974 treaty and other accords make it virtually impossible politically to consider entering a comprehensive test ban agreement with Moscow.

The Soviets, meanwhile, have refused to tighten verification procedures in the threshold treaty until it is ratified by the Senate.

Brent Scowcroft, who was President Ford's national security adviser, suggested in an interview last week that a way out of the impasse would be to try to get the treaty ratified and then negotiate the verification issue.

"There's little threat" to U.S. security in that approach, he said.

Then, Scowcroft said, the United States could withdraw from the treaty if it could not get the Soviets to agree to anti-cheating measures after ratification.

Administration officials defend testing as necessary to ensure that U.S. nuclear weapons remain safe and reliable. James T. Hackett, a former U.S. arms control official now with Heritage Foundation, a private research group, cites the deterioration of a number of U.S. warheads during a moratorium 25 years ago.

He said the W-52 tactical ballistic missile warhead, for example, had become inoperable and had to be replaced. "It's like recalling a car with faulty brakes," he said.

Other analysts disagree. Paul Warnke, the chief U.S. negotiator in the Carter administration, said stockpiles can be inspected for corrosion without conducting nuclear blasts. Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, said safety checks can be made without testing.

"Since 1981," Warnke said, "the Reagan administration has made it clear they have no interest in a comprehensive test ban."

Administration Unified For Summit

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George Shultz's rebuke of Mikhail Gorbachev for trying to undermine President Reagan by propaganda and to maneuver him onto the defensive before the forthcoming summit shows a unified pre-summit administration that in similar circumstances last fall was deeply divided.

Shultz's knuckle-rapping, delivered on his way back from Europe, was not ordered by the Oval Office. Shultz had been coming to a slow boil over incessant Soviet charges against the Reagan administration. He made that clear to a White House insider recently, noting that the Kremlin's resort to public scolding of the U.S. might hurt the Soviets, but it would not hurt Ronald Reagan.

Shultz's message, revealing a

mood so different from the quarrels that undermined administration unity before last November's Geneva summit, was: Watch it, comrades, because you're the ones who want the summit; we can take it or leave it.

That posture mirrors Reagan's own attitude and almost surely is in stark contrast with Gorbachev's. Compared to his sensational pre-summit 1985 successes, Gorbachev's 1986 has been a disappointment.

It also expresses a public attitude that gives the administration the field position it needs in the subtle game of super-power summitry. While Gorbachev casts doubt on a 1986 summit with his propaganda campaign for pre-summit concessions from Reagan — on a nuclear test ban, for example — Shultz elevates Reagan far above publicity stunts. Nuclear test bans and other

tough issues, he tells Gorbachev, are matters for the summit, not before the summit.

Last fall, when Shultz feared then national security adviser Robert McFarlane as a threat to his own dominance as much as he feared the Pentagon hawks on his right, the administration was in disarray. McFarlane even implied that an embarrassing arms control letter had been leaked on the eve of the summit to "sabotage" Reagan's first meeting with Gorbachev.

The replacement of McFarlane by non-ideological but hard-line John Poindexter, a Navy vice admiral, partly explains the consensus within the Reagan high command. Given the right by White House Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan to reject the appointment of Poindexter last winter, Shultz told Regan he wanted the admiral. So did Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger. Thus the hawkish, hard-nosed admiral, a man of few words (and none at all for the press) has been a unifying force.

But the larger explanation for unity in the high command is the non-credibility of Gorbachev's campaign. Not one private word to President Reagan has come from Gorbachev or his foreign office on the bizarre, publicity floated proposal for a European summit to sign a non-existent test-ban treaty.

"The Soviets are blocked in the White House," a high official said about Gorbachev's maneuver, and are trying to "go around Reagan with an emotional anti-nuke appeal" to liberals in Congress and to Western Europe.

Tucked into Moscow's rapid-fire proposals for pre-emptive U.S. concessions as a price for the 1986 sum-

mit is the absurd line that Reagan wants the summit only to lull the rest of the world while the Reagan Doctrine gathers momentum.

White House insiders quietly scoff at the dubiousness of such rhetoric. The real test of Moscow's appraisal of U.S.-Soviet bilateral relations today is not propaganda from apparatchiks like Georgy Arbatov. It is day-to-day actions in the real world. A taste of the true Soviet mood on these relations was given to USIA Director Charles Z. Wick on his recent trip to Moscow.

One of the most conspicuous old-time Reagan intimates working in this administration, Wick was hotly courted. The U.S.-Soviet decision to reopen commercial flights on April 29, terminated after the Soviets shot down KAL Flight 007, was nailed down during his visit. Other Soviet moves like the release of Anatoly Shcharansky, though not even marginal compared to the need, do not portray Gorbachev as weighing political odds for pulling the plug on the 1986 summit.

To the contrary, they seem to portray a new leader still under minor pressure from antagonistic party operatives disappointed in his selection as boss and under chastisement for letting Reagan take his measure at Geneva last year.

Far more than a credible threat to call off the 1986 summit, the static from Moscow comes from these political components of the youthful Gorbachev era, coupled with run-of-the-mill Soviet addiction to propaganda. If Reagan and Shultz remain constant, the 1986 summit, whether July or December, will start with the U.S. well in front.

Soviet Union Re-Enters Oil Scene, Futures Prices Skid

NEW YORK (AP) — Word that the Soviet Union is back in the oil market after suspending sales over the winter has dampened the price climb that followed the shutdown of Norway's strikebound North Sea oil rigs.

On the New York Mercantile Exchange, contracts for May delivery of West Texas Intermediate, the main U.S. crude grade, plunged nearly \$2 on Tuesday to close at \$12.47 a barrel, down from Monday's \$14.33.

Sunday's strike by caterers who serve the rigs took about 900,000 barrels off the market. Traders reacted by driving the price of May contracts up by \$1.59 a barrel over Friday's close.

Then Tuesday, it was reported that the Soviet Union had agreed to sell its Urals export blend crude oil to some European contract holders at net-back, or product-related prices, finally abandoning fixed-price sales.

The oil had been held off the market because of high drilling costs and winter demand within the Soviet Union and its Eastern European allies.

European oil industry sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the Soviet Union has begun shipping

under its new pricing formula for April delivery. The formula was negotiated in March.

In addition to a few contracts for April delivery, one or two shipments of Urals are being offered on the spot market this month, they said.

Peter Beutel, an analyst at Rudolf Wolff Futures Inc., said a second factor in Tuesday's decline was that prices had "been up five days in a row, and some of the bear traders decided to come in and test the mettle of the market."

"They found there just wasn't anything beneath it," he said.

Mike O'Himmel, an analyst at the Shearson Lehman Brothers Inc. securities firm, said the market's failure to break through the \$14.50 level — after four runs at it in the last seven weeks — added to the selling momentum.

In addition, he said, the "anticlimactic finish" of Vice President George Bush's visit to Saudi Arabia was a letdown to the market, which had been hoping that some move to cut production would result from his meetings with Saudi officials.

In Houston, meanwhile, oil exploration and pipeline company Tenneco Inc. said Tuesday that the slump in petroleum prices was forcing it to lay off about 700 employees at corporate headquarters and several subsidiaries.

Eastwood Scores Big Victory

CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, Calif. (AP) — Clint Eastwood, hero of detective films and spaghetti westerns, proved to be as big a draw at the polling place as the box office as voters turned out in record numbers to make him mayor.

Smiling broadly, Eastwood said the triumph "ranks solidly" with his successes as a director and star. "It's a hit movie at the moment," he said.

"It's surprising and yet it's not surprising," the star of 40 movies and one election said in his victory speech Tuesday night. "I knew there was a lot of dissatisfaction."

"I think the great turnout of the voters and the wide margin by which we won are very important."

According to complete but unofficial results, Eastwood had 2,166 votes, or 72.2 percent, to 799 votes, or 26.6 percent, for two-time incumbent Charlotte Townsend. Two other candidates had a total of 37 votes, or 1.2 percent.

Business was brisk at all four polling places in the 1-square-mile village, with 72.5 percent of the 4,142 registered voters turning out. City clerk Jeanne Brehmer said that in five years in office, turnout hasn't topped 30 percent.

"It was a fantastic, enthusiastic turnout," said official poll watcher Louis LaBarbera. "A lot of young people voted and a lot of the retired people. Some had trouble getting

here, in wheelchairs and all, but they came."

Townsend conceded less than 90 minutes after the polls closed, saying, "This whole campaign has been totally out of focus and so abnormal."

Eastwood, 55, takes over the 200-a-month, two-year job on April 15.

A resident of this tourist village for 14 years, he complained during the campaign about waste in a \$6 million budget, too many consultants and lawyers and about rudeness on the part of the planning commission and city council, which vetoed his plans to build a small office complex.

He also attacked the "negativity" of Townsend, a 61-year-old former librarian who heads the five-member city council.

Eastwood was painted by Townsend as a "pawn to developers," but he claimed he had no interest in letting Carmel turn glitzy.

Carmel's charm as one of the jewels of the California coast has been its casual, understated elegance. No street lights, no neon, no billboards.

Fine art, gourmet food and expensive clothing are featured in the many small shops, which attract up to 50,000 tourists on weekends. But the town is, by law, devoted to the interests of residents.

The preamble to its 1929 zoning law reads:

"The City of Carmel-by-the-Sea is hereby determined to be primarily, essentially and predominantly a res-

idential city wherein business and commerce have in the past, are now and are proposed to be in the future subordinated to its residential character."

Carmel was incorporated on Halloween 1916.

Eastwood said before the election that he didn't feel his tough-guy im-

age hurt him with his neighbors. "People here are intelligent enough. They realize that's my profession, that it's just a role I'm playing," he said.

House Plans Showdown Vote On Gun Controls

WASHINGTON (AP) — The gun lobby's 18-year campaign to ease federal firearms controls is set for a crucial vote, as House members face "a test of courage" on an issue that may decide their political futures.

Two rival bills — one supported by police and handgun control groups, the other by sportsmen and gun dealer organizations — are pitted against each other today in what amounts to the survival of the fittest.

Both measures will be on the House floor simultaneously, giving each side the chance to sabotage the other's bill with unfriendly amendments.

Caught in the uncomfortable

crossfire are lawmakers who are not staunch supporters of either side and who are likely to be portrayed to voters as either anti-sportsmen or as foes of law enforcement.

A vote is expected tonight or Thursday.

"Members are wavering, they feel the pressure," said Rep. William J. Hughes, D-N.J., sponsor of the bill endorsed by police and gun control groups. "They never had to decide between the National Rifle Association and the police before. It's going to be a test of courage. There's going to be a penalty either way."

Wayne LaPierre, chief lobbyist of the 3.1 million-member NRA, said

the need to ease restrictions for the "law-abiding" gun owner and dealer is so important to sportsmen that there will be political consequences.

"You support the people who support you," LaPierre said, urging support for the bill sponsored by Rep. Harold L. Volkmer, D-Mo. "That's the way American politics is these days. It's often necessary to do that."

According to figures released by Handgun Control Inc. and not disputed by LaPierre, the NRA's Political Victory Fund spent \$541,674 in 1983-84 and \$98,288 so far in 1985-86 on behalf of the 218 House members who signed a discharge petition that assured that Volkmer's Senate-passed measure reached the House floor.

Superpowers Set To Map Plans For Second Summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union are ready to start planning for a second summit even though the high hopes engendered by the first such meeting have given way to an extended period of mutual recrimination.

The Reagan administration began suggesting to the Soviets four months ago that planning begin for a second summit but it was not until Tuesday that Moscow indicated a willingness to go along. The administration expressed frustration that it took so long to reach agreement on what they regarded as a relatively simple procedural matter.

The breakthrough occurred during a White House meeting Tuesday between President Reagan and outgoing Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin. Secretary of State George Shultz said Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze will come to Washington in mid-May to discuss summit preparations.

U.S. officials have said Reagan is reluctant to agree to a summit between August and the first week of November because of vacation plans and the fall congressional election campaign.

While not ruling out a post-election summit, the officials said they believe a summit before August is possible despite the relatively short time the two sides would have for planning after Shevardnadze's visit. The Soviets have indicated a preference that the summit be held toward the end of the year.

On substantive issues, with some exceptions, superpower relations generally have been poor, notwithstanding Reagan's promise of a "fresh start" almost five months ago after his initial encounter with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev in Geneva.

As an example, Moscow protested vigorously the U.S. decision a month ago to order the Soviets to reduce their personnel at the United Nations

from 275 to 170. The administration claimed the Soviets have been engaging in spy activities.

The Soviets also were upset when, in mid-March, U.S. warships entered Soviet territorial waters on a mission Moscow called "provocative" but which Washington said was justified under the "right of innocent passage."

At the Geneva arms control talks, there has been no movement in efforts to control intercontinental ballistic missiles, and the Soviets

remain adamantly opposed to Reagan's call for a new Strategic Defense Initiative, informally known as "Star Wars."

Some progress has been made in negotiations on reducing intermediate range forces in Europe but the two sides are far apart on the issue of underground nuclear testing.

The Soviets have imposed a ban on such testing and invited the United States to join in.

Mortgage Funds Gone

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ginnie Mae officials say they will ask Congress to extend the agency's \$65.3 billion authority to guarantee mortgage-backed securities that was exhausted by the rush of homeowners to refinance mortgages at lower interest rates.

The 1986 fiscal year authority to guarantee securities backed by mortgages insured by the Veterans Administration and Federal Housing Administration was exhausted on Friday, said Lou Gasper, Ginnie Mae's executive vice president.

After the Veterans Administration lowered the rate of VA-backed mortgages from 10 percent to 9.5 percent last month, "there was a tremendous volume of refinancings through FHA and VA loans," said Warren Lasko, executive vice president of the Mortgage Bankers Association. FHA rates are generally tied to VA rates.

The Office of Management and Budget is expected to ask Congress to extend Ginnie Mae's commitment authority by at least \$20 billion, Gasper said.

The exhaustion of Ginnie Mae's commitment authority "does not af-

fect the existing securities and the lenders who have already gotten authority to issue can go ahead and use that authority," he added.

But Ginnie Mae, a federally chartered corporation known formally as the Government National Mortgage Association, will not be able to guarantee any new security issues until Congress extends the commitment authority, he said.

New Plastic Guns Might Evade Detection

WASHINGTON (AP) — Plastic guns that a congressman said are "tailor-made for terrorism" could be manufactured with existing technology and evade standard airport metal detectors, according to a new report.

The guns, made of modern super-reinforced plastics, would have only a few metal parts, such as small springs, the government's Office of Technology Assessment said in a report Tuesday.

The technology office noted that there is not yet known to be any fully

plastic weapon and that the government was researching better detection devices because of recent changes in air safety threats.

The report was released by Rep. Robert Mrazek, D-N.Y., who has proposed a ban on the manufacture or importation of any firearm undetectable by standard airport security equipment.

Mrazek's amendment, co-sponsored by Rep. Ted Weiss and Rep. Charles E. Schumer, both Democrats of New York, is scheduled for consideration by the House today when it

takes up revisions to the 1968 Federal Gun Control Act.

"These are designer weapons — tailor-made for terrorism," Schumer said. He said the report "shows that the time to stop the proliferation of plastic guns is now, before they become the mainstay of violence and terrorism."

Jim Baker, deputy director of government affairs at the National Rifle Association, said the organization opposed the amendment and believes hearings should be held on the issue of plastic weapons.

"Currently, a fully plastic firearm

is a purely hypothetical thing," Baker said. "We think better people manning the security devices and better machines is what is needed, and not going off on a tangent."

OTA, which researches technical and scientific subjects for Congress, said today's advanced plastics and fiber-reinforced plastic composites are strong, lightweight, resistant to corrosion and relatively easy to manufacture, making them "an attractive material for handguns."

Doctor Who Treated Reagan Under Investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The doctor who led the surgical team that operated on President Reagan after he was shot in 1981 is under investigation in the death of a patient last month, a hospital spokeswoman said.

George Washington University Hospital spokeswoman Irene Haske said Tuesday night that Dr. Benjamin Aaron, the head of cardiothoracic surgery at the hospital, had been placed on administrative leave

pending the outcome of the probe. Haske refused to provide any other information about the investigation or the incident that prompted it.

But The Washington Post, quoting unnamed sources, reported in Wednesday's editions that Aaron is the subject of both internal hospital and criminal investigations in connection with the death of a woman who was taken off life-support systems and injected with a medication sometimes used to stop the heart.

Mary Fisk, 66, died at the hospital on March 20, three days after she underwent emergency bypass surgery performed by Aaron. Ms. Fisk had been suffering from severe chronic cardiovascular disease.

The nationally renowned surgeon was credited along with his colleagues with saving the president's life following the March 30, 1981, attempt on his life.

Sources told the Post that Ms. Fisk had been removed from a respirator with the permission of her family.

Civilian saves 1.14 billion

With an estimated \$1.14 billion in savings over the next 10 years, management initiatives started by an Armament Division employee have earned him Air Force recognition.

J. Reginald Lewis, assistant deputy for manufacturing, will receive the Air Force award for the Outstanding Civilian in Production, Manufacturing, or Quality Assurance during ceremonies April 10 and 11 in Washington D.C.

Lewis' enthusiastic leadership in accomplishing the Office of Joint Chiefs of Staff Precision Guided Munitions (PGM) Production Base Analysis (PBA) and the Air Force Armament Sector PBA, has made a substantial contribution to the future enhancement of the Defense Industrial Base.

In the past year he served as the Air Force representative of the OJCS working group, as well as the armament sector chairman for the Air Force PBA. These analyses were unique in that it was the first time that consideration was directed at peacetime surge and mobilization requirements of all the services and the resultant impact of these demands on prime and key subcontractors.

Lewis was primarily responsible for developing a single data base for both analyses, thus eliminating duplication. His ability to see the "big picture" was a tremendous asset in analyzing the needs of data and developing specific corrective actions.

As the assistant deputy for manufacturing he is responsible for managing all productivity

related programs within the Armament Division, including Industrial Modernization Incentives Programs (IMIP).

To address Congressional concerns about defense over-pricing, Lewis identified many existing deficiencies within the defense industrial base for armament programs and implemented industrial modernization programs to help resolve these production base deficiencies.

Lewis' efforts in the Technology Modernization Program at Hughes Aircraft Company, Tucson, Ariz., has helped reduce the costs for the Advanced Medium Range Air-to-Air Missile. He reallocated his manufacturing resources to ensure that the AMRAAM technology modernization program received priority attention designed to improve productivity at Hughes' Tucson plant, AMRAAM sub-contractors, and Hughes affiliates. Projected savings resulting from Lewis' management efforts for the AMRAAM program alone are approximately \$515 million.

Recognizing the potential plant-wide benefits of an IMIP at the Tucson plant, Lewis initiated the first Tri-Service IMIP at Tucson, which is projected to generate a \$141 million savings over the next five years. The major programs to receive benefits include the AMRAAM, Maverick (USAF), TOW (Army), and Phoenix (Navy).

Lewis also started an IMIP program with the PGM sub-contractors to modernize this

critical segment of the defense industrial base. The PGM subcontractor IMIP is the first of its kind within the Department of Defense. This program will benefit up to 22 defense programs with a conservative savings estimate of \$500 million.

Working with the Missile Systems Division of Rockwell International Lewis identified modernization opportunities resulting in a projected savings of \$77 million. This will positively influence the production of the Air Force's GBU-15 and AGM-130 and the Army's HELLFIRE programs.

Lewis was invited by the Office of the Secretary of Defense to attend the North American Defense Industrial Base Workshop which was held in Ottawa, Canada in November 1985. Additionally, he is active in the local community with the Kiwanis and the local junior high school.

Mr. Lewis is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Mathew Lewis and a graduate of C. M. Eppes High School. He and his wife, Alice are both graduates of A & T State University, Greensboro, N. C. They have 3 sons, Randy, Mark and Kevin.

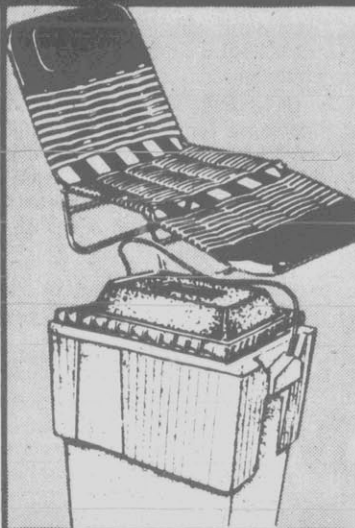

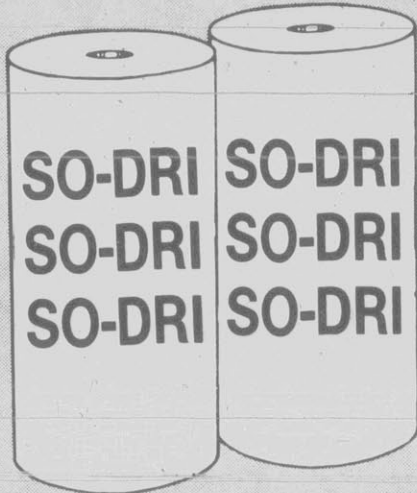

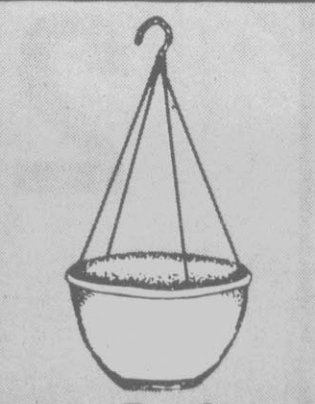

West Germany Expels Libyan Diplomats

BONN, West Germany (AP) — West Germany today ordered two Libyan diplomats to leave the country because of evidence emerging from the inquiry into the bombing of a West Berlin nightclub, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said.

A U.S. Army sergeant and a Turkish woman died in the blast at the La Belle discotheque and 230 people were injured, including 63 Americans.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Juergen Chrobog said Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher told the West German Cabinet today that he has asked the two diplomats, who were not identified, to leave.

Chrobog said the two diplomats' actions were not in keeping with "proper diplomatic custom," but refused to elaborate. He did not say whether the Libyans have left West Germany.

Genscher based his action on evi-

dence emerging from the investigation of Saturday's nightclub bombing, Chrobog said.

The move to expel the diplomats was the first indication Chancellor Helmut Kohl's government suspected Libyan involvement in the attack.

A Libyan spokesman could not be reached for comment. There was no answer at the Libyan embassy in Bonn.

Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafi threatened terrorist attacks on American targets worldwide after the clashes in the Gulf of Sidra two weeks ago between his forces and the U.S. 6th Fleet. American officials have indicated they believed Libya was behind the disco bombing.

In Washington, the State Department had no comment on West Germany's decision to expel the Libyan diplomats, said spokeswoman Sondra McCarthy.

Chrobog spoke to The Associated Press after today's regularly scheduled Cabinet meeting, in which government ministers examined measures that might be taken against the Libyan embassy in Bonn as a result of the nightclub bombing.

Communist East Germany today condemned the bombing. The official news agency ADN said the East Germans expressed "horror and indignation" at the attack.

A spokesman for the East German Foreign Ministry said it was wrong "to try to bring the GDR (East Germany) into any connection with this criminal act," the news agency report said.

"Such acts should not be misused to poison the international atmosphere," the unidentified spokesman was quoted as saying.

His statement appeared to be a reaction to reports that a Libyan diplomat in East Berlin was suspected

of involvement in the nightclub bombing.

A West Berlin Interior Ministry official Tuesday confirmed the report by the Bild newspaper that said Elamin Abdullah Elamin, 47, was "urgently suspected" of organizing the bombing.

Bild said the diplomat previously was stationed at the Libyan embassy in Bonn.

"This report is correct," said the West Berlin official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. He refused to elaborate.

Dieter Piete, deputy chairman of the police commission, said police did not suspect the Libyan diplomat had placed the bomb in the nightclub, "but as to whether he is suspected as an organizer or had any other link, I will not say no."

A woman who answered the telephone at the Libyan embassy in East

Berlin — which Libya calls the Peoples' Bureau — refused to discuss the bombing, saying only: "We don't wish to comment on any problems of any kind."

The Allied military command in West Berlin issued a statement saying it had reviewed security arrangements of the Western sectors in depth and concluded that "exceptional measures should be taken to reinforce them in coordination with the Berlin authorities."

West German officials have said it was unlikely that the Bonn government would join the U.S. economic sanctions against Libya which were imposed after the Dec. 27 terrorist attacks at the Rome and Vienna airports.

The chief of staff in the chancellery, Wolfgang Schaeuble, said the government feels economic sanctions are "inefficient."

After Italy, West Germany is Libya's biggest trading partner, and 1,500 Germans live in the North African nation.

West German government officials said Tuesday they had stepped up surveillance of the Libyan embassy in the West German capital and tightened border controls after the bomb attack.

West German security authorities have conducted periodic surveillance of the embassy because of violent clashes between Libyan nationals living in West Germany.

French Teacher Missing

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A French teacher at a school in Moslem west Beirut disappeared today and was feared kidnapped, a French Embassy spokesman said.

The man was identified as Michel Brian, a teacher at the College Protestant Francais.

Embassy sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said gunmen kidnapped Brian as he walked from his apartment in west Beirut's Hamra commercial district to the school in Koraitem neighborhood about five blocks away.

But Saab would not confirm that Brian had been kidnapped. He said the school had reported to the embassy that Brian failed to show up for work today, and that the embassy was "making all the necessary contacts to investigate his fate."

Eight other Frenchmen are missing in Beirut, and a Lebanese-born French physician has been negotiating with Shiite Moslem radicals for the release of at least some of them.

The French Embassy sources said the embassy reported Brian's disappearance to the Lebanese Information Ministry and asked for government intervention to help free him.

Friends at the Information Ministry's press center said Brian had told them he would go to the center to make a telephone call Tuesday evening, but did not come.

Sally Dirgham, superintendent of the College Protestant Francais, told reporters she has been instructed by the French Embassy not to provide any information about Brian's disappearance.

Brian has been a teacher at the school since 1980.

Frenchman Pours Money Into Searches For POWS

CARLSBAD, Calif. (AP) — French businessman Pierre O'Reilly rejects comparisons to Hollywood's "Rambo" but says he is serious about rescuing U.S. servicemen from Laotian captivity and is willing to use force if necessary.

Within the past six months, O'Reilly said, he and three Vietnam veterans led by a former Green Beret have staged two unsuccessful secret missions to Southeast Asia. They recently left on a third attempt, which O'Reilly says will be his final one.

He said his efforts have cost him \$30,000.

"I've always had very deep, affectionate feelings toward America, and I wanted to do something to serve this country. I grasped the opportunity," said O'Reilly in an interview before his latest mission.

The earlier attempts took the group to Thailand and into Vietnam-backed Laos, where they negotiated with Free Laotian guerrillas who claim to know the whereabouts of missing American prisoners of war, O'Reilly said.

He said that although he was losing confidence in the ability of his men to carry out the mission, he remained committed to the goal and to private efforts to accomplish it.

"Governments are just big monsters with very little humanitarian feelings. They count dollars, they count francs," he said. "To me, the human being goes first." O'Reilly said he has been successful in several

U.S. business ventures since 1980, including high-tech medical equipment and office furniture. He said he has spent tax-free profits he earned under his investor's visa on the Laos missions.

O'Reilly's raiders consist of three Boston men who hope to gain the freedom of colleagues who didn't come home after the war.

It was on a business trip to Thailand about a year ago that he met Vincent Arnone, a former Green Beret. The two talked and Arnone told his story of being so close, yet so far from his goal. O'Reilly, impressed but skeptical, later traveled to Boston to check out Arnone and his buddies.

"When I saw these people living very conservatively, I was convinced they weren't in this for the money," he said. He began writing checks to help Arnone and his group get to Laos and pay Free Laotian guerrillas to help.

One mission failed last September. Another failed in January. Both times, O'Reilly said he went only as far as Thailand.

"I'm no adventurer," he said. "I think it's more part of an adventure for the other guys. I think they want to live again their years of war."

A French newspaper earlier this year characterized O'Reilly as one of a group of "Rambo" raiders whose goal was to blast its way in and out of a Laotian compound where POWs were being held.

Panel Says End Rebels' Support

WASHINGTON (AP) — A panel of 60 Western Hemisphere opinion leaders called on the United States today to end its support for Nicaraguan rebels and also urged the Sandinista government to renounce subversion and reduce its Soviet bloc military ties.

A report issued by Inter-American Dialogue, a group of citizens from the United States, Canada, Latin America and the Caribbean, said the present course of both the Reagan administration and Nicaragua "could produce U.S. military intervention."

In calling for an end to U.S. aid to the Contra rebels fighting the leftist Sandinista government, the report said present American policy offers no solution to the security problems posed by Nicaragua and "obstructs progress toward a negotiated settlement that could protect all of Central America."

However, the report said Nicaragua must renounce subversion in El Salvador and elsewhere. It also recommended that Nicaragua order the withdrawal of Soviet and Cuban military personnel and restrict arms acquisitions from those countries.

The co-chairmen of the Inter-American Dialogue are Galo Plaza, a former president of Ecuador and former secretary general of the Organization of American States; and Sol Linowitz, a former U.S. ambassador to the OAS.

Participants also include several former U.S. cabinet officers, including Cyrus R. Vance, Edmund Muskie, Elliott Richardson and Robert McNamara; and former presidents Nicolas Ardito Barletta of Panama, Osvaldo Hurtado of Ecuador and Daniel Oduber of Costa Rica.

Social Services OKs Budget

A proposed budget for fiscal year 1986-87 was approved by the board of the Pitt County Department of Social Services at a call meeting Tuesday.

Two budget figures were discussed by the board, one total budget including federal appropriations, and a budget which will be presented to the Pitt County Board of Commissioners for its approval.

As projected by the state, the proposed budget for the Pitt County department is \$30,116,003, including

federally backed programs. A budget of only \$5,605,652 — the amount to be run through county books — will be presented to the Pitt commissioners.

"The county has responsibility for appropriating funds to support the budget," said department Director Edward Garrison. "Some of the program funds, such as Medicaid, Aid to Families with Dependent Children and supplemental assistance to adults, are mandated. The county is required to appropriate in those areas."

The total budgeted funds for the

county department for the 1985-86 fiscal year was \$27,878,287. The total presented to the commissioners last year was \$5,289,006.

Half of the total proposed budget is comprised of Medicaid funds, which have not been cut for the fiscal year, Garrison said. Medicaid is expected to cost \$15,025,051 during the fiscal year.

Cuts will take place in child welfare, foster care and Chore services, among other services provided by the department, Garrison said.

for 718 switches on hand.

A total of 82 load management switches were installed during March, resulting in a total of 7,616 switches in service on water heaters and 7,757 switches installed on central air conditioning units at the end of the month.

Commissioner E.A. Warren, treasurer of the North Carolina Eastern Municipal Power Agency — GUC's wholesale power supplier — reported that the NCEMPA completed a restructuring of original bonds by issuing \$746.2 million in refunding bonds on April 4 at 7.8 percent. The sale replaced bonds issued in December 1982 and March 1984 which carried interest rates of 11 to 11 1/4 percent, resulting in a present value debt service reduction of \$68.32 million and a gross debt service reduction of \$181.98 million over the life of the bonds.

The power agency refunding began a year ago — replacing bonds sold in 1982 and 1984 with interest rates ranging from 10.5 percent to 13 3/4 percent with bonds carrying a maximum of 10.3 percent interest. The present value debt service reduction of the entire refunding program amounts to \$217.58 million, while the gross debt service savings totals \$524.03 million.

Green, a power agency alternate

commissioner, said Greenville's share of the savings is 16 percent — \$34.81 million in present day dollars and \$83.84 million in gross savings over the life of the bonds.

The revenue from the bond issues has been used by NCEMPA to purchase ownership interests in CP&L generating capacity.

Museum Of Art To Begin Renovation This Month

Contracts for major renovation of the Greenville Museum of Art located at 802 Evans St. have been awarded to Bill Clark Construction Co. and to Aesthetic Signs Inc.

The scheduled renovation has been made possible following a capital/endowment campaign during the fall and winter of 1985-86 to raise money for the project and to start an operating endowment fund for the museum.

A total of \$183,425 has been pledged from local and regional supporters, says G. Henry Leslie, campaign chairman. The eventual goal is \$250,000.

More than 100 GMA volunteers along with the GMA Board of Trustees, museum staff, and a representative of Woodburn Associates, a professional fund-raising counsel, operated the campaign, which was the first major fund-raising effort in the museum's history.

Renovation will begin this month and is scheduled in two major phases beginning with the museum exterior. This phase will include major work on the building, paving the front parking lot, installation of area lighting, and landscaping of the grounds.

Other improvements will include appropriate signs for the outdoor sculpture, installation of a professional telephone system, vitrines for fragile collection objects, floor repair and floor finishing on the ground floor.

The second phase will be initiated at the end of 1986 with concentration on the interior of the museum. Interior work will cover painting, carpeting of the stairs and second floor galleries, kitchen and bathroom renovation, upstairs gallery lighting and renovation of the children's gallery.

Collection storage modernization and window treatments will comprise the final phase of the project.

Future plans for the museum centers around converting the Carriage House into an Education Department. This would permit renovation of the current studio/classroom space as a program and meeting space with slide and film equipment.

Yvonne Deyton, president of the museum's board of trustees, said "ideally it is hoped that the museum will be able to expand the facility within the next ten years using the museum property facing 8th and Washington streets. But this dream will depend on many circumstances, not the least being increased financial support of the Greenville Museum of Art."

Mary Anne Pennington, the museum director, says "the museum will continue to operate its regular schedule of exhibitions and programs throughout the entire renovation process. If the museum must close, it will be short-term only to permit such projects as finishing the floors. During the interior work phase it is

probable that specific areas will be closed to the public but the staff will strive to limit interruptions in the normal schedule."

The Greenville Museum of Art is housed in a former private residence built by the Ed Flanagan family in 1901. It was later occupied by Rosamund Wagoner and her husband, T.I. Wagoner.

The building was purchased for the museum site in December 1959 and opened to the public in May 1960. During its 26 years of occupancy, the architectural integrity of the building, which is something of a landmark in the area, has been maintained.

Gastonia Pair Held In Doctor's Death

CHARLOTTE (AP) — A Gastonia couple has been arrested in California and charged with the February slaying of a Lincoln doctor, authorities said.

Rebecca Wooten Herdman, 33, and Tony Eugene Herdman, 28, are each charged with murder and conspiracy to murder. They were arrested Monday in Los Angeles.

Late Tuesday, the Herdmans were in the Los Angeles County Jail without bond.

The Herdmans have been at large since Dr. Isak Kohener's body was found Feb. 24. Kohener, a native of

Istanbul, Turkey, worked at a Charlotte medical clinic. He was stabbed to death in his Lincoln home.

In March, Lincoln police issued warrants for the Herdmans' arrests following interviews with dozens of Kohener's acquaintances. Police said Kohener, 45, met Rebecca Herdman about two weeks before his death.

Curtis Ray May, 28, an alleged accomplice in the slaying, was arrested March 18 at a Gaston County trailer park. He is charged with murder.

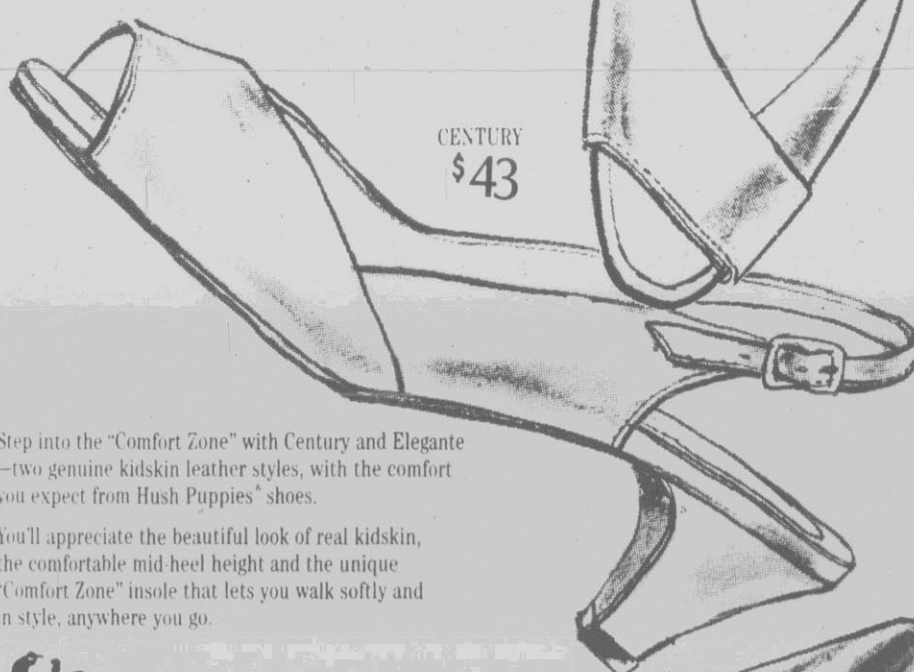

Fishermen, Environmentalists Eye Water Pollution

Commercial fishermen and state environmentalists say they are concerned about the impact industry, specifically phosphate mining, is having on water quality and North Carolina's commercial fishing business.

Fishermen voiced their views at the first South Creek Soundoff, a meeting of fishermen, environmentalists and industry officials held last week in Aurora.

"Local water quality is unable to support commercial (fish) species that are afflicted with various fish diseases and sores," according to Willy Phillips, a commercial fisherman from Bath. Many fish have sores that are apparently coming about because the fish are in duress from poor water quality," Phillips said at the soundoff.

Phillips said most fishermen believe that "over the years the state

has compromised water quality for other industries, at our expense, and we have had to bear the brunt with decreased catches and a less viable fishery."

Phillips referred specifically to alleged excessive discharge from TexasGulf, a phosphate mining industry in Beaufort County. He said that commercial fishermen need to organize and put pressure on the state to enact "tougher legislation and enforce existing legislation."

The state should revise "generous discharge permits of TexasGulf, which allows them to discharge three tons of raw phosphate into the (Pamlico) river each day. It's a very sloppy permit in the minds of fishermen," Phillips said.

Phillips was one of over 100 persons who attended the Soundoff, organized by the Pamlico-Tar River Foundation, a Washington, N.C.-based group interested in the water quality of those two rivers and their watersheds.

According to Dr. Jonathan Phillips, executive director of the PTRF, the purpose of the soundoff was for representatives of commercial fishing and conservation groups to get input from local people on major problems and issues of the fishing industry. The meeting was also set to discuss possible solutions.

Attending the meeting were representatives from the Conservation Council of North Carolina, Coastal Federation, Sierra Club, Clean Water Fund, Fisherman's Fund, Coastal Resources Commission, Texas Gulf, Carteret County Watermen's Association and the Pamlico-Tar River Foundation. Representatives of TexasGulf also attended.

"A lot of us in conservation groups have good intentions and expertise in dealing with these matters, but aren't a substitute for local knowledge — people who are on the water every day — in determining what the problems are and how to go about

solving them," Dr. Phillips said.

Rand Carpenter, spokesman for TexasGulf, told participants the event was "a good day for everybody concerned."

"All of us were able to express our views," he said. "We (TexasGulf) want to do our share to be darned sure that we're responding to the concerns of the fishermen and others who are here today, and to avoid another incident such as the recent one in South Creek."

Carpenter said TexasGulf wanted "the absolute minimal impact on the environment. I wish that you and I and everybody else here today were perfect and could do things in an absolutely perfect manner, but it just doesn't work out that way," he said.

Evan Wilson of the N.C. Fisherman's Fund said organizing fishermen is the most important thing that can be done now along the coast. "It's eventually going to boil down to the economic clout that the various

industries have — whether it be phosphate or peat mining or the development of tourism — versus the commercial fisherman."

Wilson said North Carolinians need to evaluate what our commercial fishermen are worth. "The fishery is worth a lot more than anybody gives it credit for," he said.

Wilson said the state should avoid

what he called a "boom and bust cycle" with fishing. "Fisheries tends to be a winter occupation and tourism a summer occupation. If the situation comes to having tourists coming in the summer and nothing happening in the winter, there will be an annual boom and bust cycle that taxes resources and local government, creating all kinds of unhealthy results."

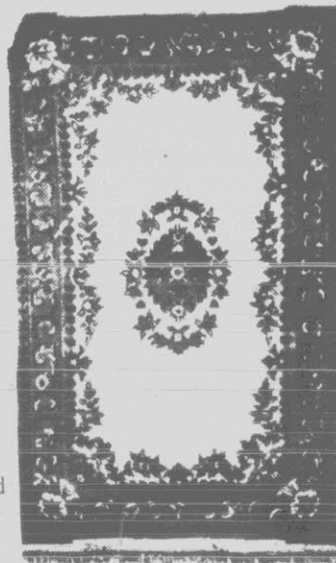

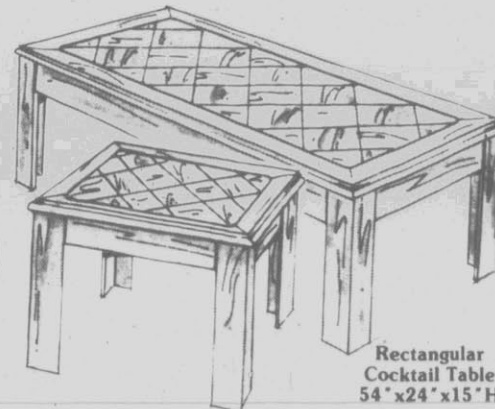

Southern Presidential Primary Nears Reality

WASHINGTON (AP) — The South is claiming victory in its drive to give the region more clout in choosing presidential nominees with a Southern regional primary in 1988.

Seven Southern states will hold primaries on March 8, 1988, and several more are considering such a move in what Southern political leaders hope will focus attention on a region that some say has gone largely ignored in presidential politics.

"We got a Southern primary," Texas state Sen. John Traeger, Southern Legislative Conference chairman and a strong proponent of the regional primary, said Tuesday. "Everybody says, our time has come, people in the South should have a stronger voice, and we think we will."

"It's no longer a question of will we. It's an accomplished fact," another supporter, Oklahoma Gov. George Nigh, said.

Already on the books for March 8 presidential preference primaries are Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Missouri and Tennessee.

In Maryland and Mississippi, bills await the governors' signatures to convert to primaries on the second Tuesday in March. If they sign, that would bring to nine the number of Southern states planning to hold primaries on the same day.

Politicians in half a dozen other Southern states have embraced the idea, so the count could climb higher before 1988.

In Virginia, Gov. Gerald Baliles returned legislation to the assembly and recommended the state begin the process of choosing its delegates on Saturday, March 12. It needs only minor adjustments.

"Super Tuesday" primaries are expected to win approval in Louisiana, where the legislature convenes this month, and in North Carolina, where lawmakers meet briefly in June.

Traeger said candidates will have to talk about issues

of interest to the South, such as agriculture and immigration, "instead of giving us that flag, motherhood and country speech. That ain't gonna cut it anymore."

He said in the past candidates focused too much attention on New Hampshire, with its first-in-the-nation primary, and Iowa, with its early caucuses.

"The people who won in New Hampshire said 'we're the winner, get on the band wagon.' We don't think they'll be stomping around in the snow in New Hampshire for three or four votes if a third (of the delegates) are up here," he said.

In Arkansas and Texas, the idea has wide support but neither state legislature meets until next year. Texas likely would shift its caucuses to Saturday, March 12.

In South Carolina, the date of the primary is decided by state party chairmen. Republicans say they aren't interested; Democrats say they may switch their caucuses to March 12.

Only West Virginia has rejected the idea outright. The SLC's executive director, Charlie Williams, said he expected the state to reconsider next year.

"With Maryland and Virginia (approving it), West Virginia will want to join," he said.

All told, 16 Southern states may hold primaries or caucuses the second week of March in 1988, if the SLC's predictions prove correct. About one-third of the pledged delegates needed for nomination will be chosen in those 16 states.

Democratic National Committee spokesman Terry Michael said it was too early to tell how strongly a 16-state Southern voting bloc would affect the primary process. "Those people who predict the sky is falling must have a crystal ball," he said. "Nobody really knows the precise consequences."

Said Williams, "This is new. You can't predict how this will work. We can always fine-tune it as we go along. This proposal, this reality, is a vast improvement over the way campaigns have been conducted in the past."

Two states outside the South, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, also have scheduled primaries March 8.

Undercover Agents Seize 700 Pounds Of Cocaine

ROANOKE, Va. (AP) — Nine people were arrested after undercover agents posing as smugglers helped transport a cache of Bolivian cocaine so large that the agents had to hold boxes of it on their laps during the flight, officials said.

Authorities said they seized 700 pounds of cocaine and \$1.3 million after the smugglers hired an undercover drug agent to fly the shipment to Roanoke.

The cocaine shipment had an estimated street value of \$158 million, the federal Drug Enforcement Administration said Monday. The agency called the bust the largest of its kind in the mid-Atlantic region.

Gerardo Caballero, whose father-in-law is believed by DEA and Bolivian authorities to be the largest cocaine trafficker in Bolivia, was arrested Saturday along with Luis Tang Fortaleche, a Panamanian, when they arrived in Roanoke in a DEA undercover airplane, the agency said in a news release.

Two days earlier, another undercover DEA plane was used to bring in the cocaine from Panama.

Six Floridians and a New Yorker were arrested Monday, and all are being held without bond on charges of conspiracy to import and distribute cocaine, said Robert J. O'Leary, a DEA special agent. The seven were arrested when they came to Virginia to pick up the cocaine or otherwise assist in the smuggling plot, authorities said.

O'Leary said the cache flown in last Thursday was so large that agents had to hold boxes of cocaine on their laps during the flight.

"It's just boxes and boxes of stuff," he said. "It took a van to transport it down here. It was just huge."

DEA agents were given \$1.25 million as partial payment for the transportation before the cocaine arrived in the United States and seized an additional \$95,000 from five of the people who were arrested Monday, officials said.

CP&L May Reduce Rates

RALEIGH (AP) — Carolina Power & Light Co. officials, citing improved performance by the utility's nuclear plants, say they plan to seek an adjustment in rates next month.

"We do not have an estimate at this point, except that it will likely be a decrease," CP&L spokesman Wayne Ennis said Tuesday in a telephone interview.

The improved nuclear performance meant CP&L had to spend less for alternative sources of fuel.

CP&L will propose the reduction

under a state law that requires the North Carolina Utilities Commission to review the level of fuel costs in electric rates once a year, as well as in every general rate case. If the company does not have a general rate case pending, or if a decision in a pending rate case will not be issued within 12 months of the commission's last order, a separate fuel hearing is required by law.

CP&L does not have a general rate case pending.

Any reduction in rates approved by the commission would take effect in September. But any reduction probably would provide only temporary relief to CP&L customers.

Company officials have said they plan to seek a general rate increase late this summer to cover the cost of the company's \$3.6 billion Shearon Harris Nuclear Plant.

The plant, scheduled to begin commercial operation late this year, is expected to require a revenue increase of 20 percent to 25 percent.

License Revoked

The state Mortuary Science Board voted unanimously Tuesday to revoke the license of former University of North Carolina mortician Lester Sandlin, saying he acted fraudulently when he used his job to create business for his professional mortuary business in Durham.

Sandlin has maintained that he is the manager of the business, but board members said Sandlin is the owner.

Sandlin pleaded no contest in April 1985 to 77 counts of using his job at UNC for his own profit. He was found guilty by a Superior Court judge, fined and given a suspended sentence.

Sandlin, 43, of Durham, had been responsible for obtaining and disposing of human cadavers donated to UNC for medical research and teaching. He was fired in August 1984 following his indictment on charges of embezzling cadavers from the school.

Lobby Backs Tax Increase For Roads

RALEIGH (AP) — The state's largest business lobby says more money is needed for the highway system and if it takes higher taxes — so be it.

In a resolution passed by North Carolina Citizens for Business and Industry that was released Tuesday, the group called on Gov. Jim Martin and General Assembly "to take appropriate action in the 1986 session to provide a higher level of user funding, including additional taxes if appropriate, for highway maintenance and construction."

The main form of "user funding" for highway projects is the gasoline tax. Motorists now pay 12.5 cents a gallon in state tax at the pump. Each additional penny increase raises about \$36 million.

Last month, Martin's Transportation Task Force recommended that

Martin come up with a package of money-raising measures to add at least \$200 million into the state's highway program.

Martin told the task force he would review his options and announce his program on April 17.

Tar Heel Republicans Caution Voters That Supremacists Running On Ticket

RALEIGH (AP) — White Patriot Party leader Glenn Miller, who is running for the GOP Senate nomination, says he's not bothered by the Republican Party's disavowal of him and his allies.

"It would bother me if they accepted us," said Miller, who ran for governor as a Democrat in 1984. "We understand there is no difference between the Republican and Democratic parties. Both are satisfied to accept the demise of the white race in this country."

On Tuesday, Republican officials said four Republican candidates for the Legislature belong to Miller's white supremacist group, formerly the Confederate Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Fearing that unsuspecting voters might hand their party's nomination to one or more of the White Patriot Party members, Republican leaders are urging the GOP electorate to beware.

"We don't want to get caught unaware like the Democrats did in Illinois," said Chris Shields, com-

munications director for the state GOP. Two followers of right-wing extremist Lyndon LaRouche won the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor and secretary of state in last month's Illinois Democratic primary.

Miller of Angier is running against Rep. Jim Broyhill and former Romanian ambassador David Funderburk for the GOP nomination.

One of the four White Patriot Party members seeking legislative seats is unopposed for the Republican nomination. He is Jesse M. Radford of Knightdale, who will face state Sen. Jim Speed, D-Franklin, in the general election.

The others, Shields and Miller said, are:

— Cecil Cox of Onslow County, a candidate for the three-seat 4th House District. Three other Republicans are running for the seats: Robert Grady, of Jacksonville; Fred Holt, of Richlands; and Cliff Tilghman of Beaufort.

— Robert Stoner of Fayetteville, running in the three-seat 18th House District. Other Republican can-

didates are Stanley Bullard, of Hope Mills; Jim Harris, of Fayetteville; and Robert Inman of Fayetteville.

— Stephen S. Miller of Fayetteville, running in the two-seat 12th Senate District. Other Republican contenders include Barry D. Bullard, Paul F. Callahan, and Richard Suehr, all of Fayetteville.

Stephen Miller, no relation to Glenn Miller, ran unsuccessfully for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor in 1984. Cox confirmed in a telephone interview he is a member of the White Patriot Party. Stoner could not be reached, but Cox and Radford said he was a White Patriot Party member.

Republican leaders in Onslow and Carteret counties have issued a letter warning voters of Cox's affiliation, Shields said.

The Cumberland County GOP's executive council unanimously passed a resolution disassociating the party from Stoner and Miller, said county chairman Lee Hedgecoe. "We expect to knock them out in the primary," Hedgecoe said.

The district in which Radford is running includes Franklin, Vance and part of Wake counties.

Larry Norman, chairman of the Franklin County GOP, said Radford's chances of unseating Speed were so remote that he felt it unnecessary to issue a formal denunciation of the white-supremacist Republican nominee.

Norman said he challenged Speed in 1984 and got only about 30 percent of the vote in the predominantly Democratic district. "If the Democrats wouldn't support a moderate Republican, I fail to see them supporting a fringe Republican," he said.

Radford received a formal request from Andy Frazier, executive director of the state GOP, not to attend the party's "Victory Conference" for legislative candidates last month.

Radford said after he inquired about the conference, Frazier sent him a letter saying the get-together was a "privilege" that could be denied to "any candidate (whose) beliefs are counter to the principles of the Republican Party."

"I feel they are denying me my rights," Radford said, adding that the North Carolina Civil Liberties Union had investigated the matter.

George Gardner, executive director of the NCCLU, said he had considered the Republican action "pretty bad" when he learned about it.

"Perhaps I was sobered a bit by the news from Illinois," Gardner said. He said a political party was "well within its rights to eschew association" with candidates who espouse "race-hatred or superiority."

No Democratic candidates are members of the White Patriot Party, according to state Democratic spokeswoman Ann Hubbard.

Senator Recovering

DURHAM (AP) — Spinal surgery performed on Sen. Paula Hawkins, R-Fla., should eliminate 70 percent of the pain that has plagued her during her re-election campaign, a Duke University Medical Center surgeon says.

In a five-hour operation Tuesday at Duke, surgeons replaced two damaged spinal disks in her neck with pieces of bone grafted from her hip. They also removed two bone spurs in the area that had been pressing on a nerve.

"Everything went superbly," her orthopedic surgeon, Dr. J. Leonard Goldner, said at a press conference. "She's glad it's done."

Goldner said Mrs. Hawkins would probably be out of bed in three to four days and out of the hospital in a couple of weeks. She would wear a neck support for about four months, he said.

Hazing Investigation

GREENSBORO (AP) — A North Carolina A&T State University fraternity under investigation for a hazing incident two weeks ago, that left eight students injured, was suspended in 1984 for similar hazing activities, fraternity officials say.

Omega Psi Phi was suspended for "something similar to what we have now," said Leon Bavridge, district representative for the fraternity's national chapter.

Bavridge said he could not recall specifics of the hazing. The president of the fraternity's local graduate chapter, John Patterson, said he also couldn't remember what happened.

A&T officials are investigating charges that a 20-year-old student who was the "Dean of Education" for the Omega pledge class beat seven pledges in the head with a block of wood March 27 and, in a separate incident three days earlier, lit one pledge's beard on fire.

Steven Jones of Greensboro was taken into custody Tuesday and was released on \$5,000 bond.

Four Injured In Crash

MINT HILL, N.C. (AP) — Four people were injured Tuesday when their light plane hit a fence and crashed on takeoff from a private airstrip in Mecklenburg County, authorities said.

Witnesses said the Cessna 172 aircraft flipped onto its back and broke into several pieces in a plowed field at the end of the Wilgrove Airport's paved runway. The crash occurred about 11 a.m.

The injured were taken to a Charlotte-area hospital for treatment. Larry D. Wright, 42, of Charlotte, was being held at a Charlotte-area hospital Tuesday night for observation. The others were treated and released, authorities said.

Teen-Ager Attacked

BOILING SPRINGS, N.C. (AP) — A 15-year-old Cleveland County girl remained unconscious in critical condition with a fractured skull Monday after being beaten while walking near Gardner-Webb College.

"This will make people realize there is no safe haven, whether you are in New York City or Boiling Springs, N.C.," said Barry Hartis, a vice president at Gardner-Webb.

Sherry Lynn Washburn, 15, disappeared early Friday night while walking alone near the college, in a part of town she walked regularly on her way to jog around a track at the college stadium.

Miss Washburn was found Sunday, beaten and unconscious, next to a Crest High School football field about five miles east of town.

Grandmother Indicted

RALEIGH (AP) — A Wake County woman has been indicted on a charge of involuntary manslaughter in the death of her grandson, who died last month after being struck by a train.

Craig David Taylor, 2, was in the care of his grandmother, Elsie A. Taylor, 48, of Zebulon, when he was hit by a Southern Railway Co. freight train near Zebulon March 18.

Mrs. Taylor was charged with involuntary manslaughter the next day when the boy died of head injuries. She has been free on \$5,000 bond.

Wake County sheriff's officers say Mrs. Taylor and the boy had been lying on the railroad tracks just before the incident.

The child's mother has sued the railroad company and alleged that the grandmother and child had been walking near the tracks. The suit contends that the child began running, then tripped on a "protruding wooden cross tie" and fell.

Union Firm Sued

CHARLOTTE (AP) — The U.S. Department of Labor has sued a Union County masonry construction firm, alleging that it engaged in oppressive child labor.

But the leader of the church in which company owners are active said the alleged violations involve students in a church-sponsored vocational training program.

The lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Charlotte alleges that McGee Brothers Co. Inc. has repeatedly and willfully violated the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938. The violations allegedly date to April 1983.

"If they've issued any papers, they've issued them to the wrong people," said J.R. Purser, elder and minister of the Shiloh True Light Church of Christ in Mint Hill. "This is just part of a church program that's been in place for 17 years."

The suit contends that the construction company has failed to pay workers minimum hourly wages and has failed to adequately compensate employees who work more than 40 hours a week.

Professor Urges End For Tobacco

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — With production costs increasing, jobs in the industry decreasing and demand for cigarettes in the United States stagnating, a University of North Carolina professor is calling for an end to tobacco production.

Dr. Nancy Milio of the UNC School of Nursing said phasing out tobacco production would adversely affect thousands of people in the industry. "But with proper research, policymakers could find ways to protect these people by developing alternative jobs and crops," she said.

Ms. Milio, who recently prepared a report for the World Health Organization called "Health Policy and the Emerging Tobacco Reality," said the best way to end smoking would be by halting promotion of America's tobacco industry, which she says poses serious problems to both the nation's health and its economy.

Thirty percent of all personal health-care spending goes toward smoking-related diseases, Ms. Milio

said in a prepared statement Tuesday.

"More than two-thirds of this amount is attributable to lost earnings from illness and death," she said.

Ms. Milio said the government should handle the tobacco industry "just like any other industry that is shrinking or dying."


"You help others develop new crops that provide a similar return and can be grown in the same soil, with the same machinery," she said.

Tomatoes, flowers and strawberries are among the alternatives Ms. Milio says have been proposed in recent studies.

While marketing new crops might be difficult at first, she said, "without government support, a marketing system for tobacco wouldn't exist either."

Ms. Milio said cigarette makers are importing foreign tobacco and selling cigarettes overseas, sparking an increase in smoking in underdeveloped countries.

School Forum Suggests Teacher Incentives

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina's efforts to recruit and keep qualified teachers would be bolstered by tuition grants, scholarships and relocation incentives under a proposal unveiled Tuesday.

"I believe the steps we take in recruiting new teachers and retaining bright, talented teachers in the classrooms in the next five years will determine the true quality of education for coming decades and beyond," Lt. Gov. Bob Jordan said of a 10-point program proposed by the Public School Forum of North Carolina.

"North Carolina cannot afford to lose thousands of teachers from the classroom because of attrition, retirement, career frustrations and lack of incentives," Jordan added. "I would say that even if it took cutting in other areas that we would stay behind this. ... It's going to get serious consideration."

John Dornan, forum vice president, said 56 percent fewer college students are choosing teaching as a career now than in 1976 while the demand for new teachers under the state's commitment to the Basic Education Plan will rise to 12,000 by 1992. He said 6,000 teachers are now eli-

gible for retirement and another 2,000 are qualified for early retirement.

In addition, the most talented teachers are usually the first to leave, many because they can earn far more in the private sector, Dornan said.

"The problem of teacher shortage is going to be probably more acute than most of us realize today," said Rep. Bobby Etheridge, D-Harnett, chairman of the House Base Budget Appropriations Committee.

The plan, costing an estimated \$12.8 million a year after a three-year, \$23 million phase-in would:

- Give scholarships to students in areas like science and math.
- Subsidize the retraining of teacher aids to areas in high demand.
- Offer \$3,000 incentives to former teachers who re-enter the field or to out-of-state teachers who relocate.
- "We as a state are doing very little recruiting beyond our own borders," Dornan said.
- Provide tuition grants of \$1,000 a year to teachers willing to be retrained in areas of high need.
- Create a teacher scholarship program in which participants could pay off up to \$5,000 a year by teaching in the state for four years.

— Establish one teacher in every high school to encourage students to enter teaching. "We feel strongly that if we don't go into the high schools and make a marketing effort ... this will all come to naught," Dornan said.

— Establish an office of teacher recruiting.

— Create a commission to administer the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Program.

— Work to involve business in strengthening schools and help to retain teachers. Examples would include summer employment for teachers who need added income and jobs for the spouses of teachers who relocate, Dornan said.

— Involve all state education associations in recruitment and retention efforts.

Despite a packed calendar for the short session of the General Assembly that includes budgetary items, insurance law changes and possible tax increases to offset federal losses and dwindling highway funds, lawmakers said they would find time to back the program.

"I think that the public feels that education is the area in our state that needs more improvement than any other area in our state," said Rep. Billy Watkins, D-Granville, chairman of the House Expansion Budget Committee.

"The proposals that the forum has come up with will help us a great deal and may solve our problems in coming years."

"We've got to sell and we've got to do a better job in marketing education," said Etheridge. "If it works, North Carolina, in my opinion, will have the best educational system of any state in the nation."

George Khady, a member of the Business Committee on Education and representing Gov. Jim Martin, said the governor would subscribe to the proposals 100 percent.

"This problem certainly deserves continued close examination," he said.

Dornan said the proposals would be an important first step in solving the teacher crisis, but he said more steps would be needed to keep teachers in the classroom after the first few years.

"This could be throwing good money after bad if we don't address things like salary and job conditions," he said, noting that some teachers must work six years to make \$20,000 a year.

Jordan said the investment would be about 1 percent of the annual payroll for public school teachers, a figure comparable to what private industry spends on recruiting.

Transplant Child Has Brain Tumor

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Sherrill Daniels says her family needs "bunches and bunches of prayers" for her 4-year-old son who got a new chance at life last year with a liver transplant but now has an inoperable brain tumor.

"They have worked before and they will work again," Mrs. Daniels said Tuesday.

North Carolina Memorial Hospital doctors found the tumor after Brandon Daniels suffered a seizure Saturday night, Mrs. Daniels said.

"It is unreal, unbelievable," she said. "Brandon was doing so good. Nobody suspected this. The tumor was discovered by accident."

The Wayne County boy has been undergoing chemotherapy in Chapel Hill since undergoing liver transplant surgery in Minneapolis last October.

His parents had taken him for treatments last week, but heart scans indicated Brandon's system could no longer take chemotherapy.

Mrs. Daniels said her son had a slight temperature and appeared listless, so doctors admitted him to check for a virus. After the seizure, a brain scan showed the tumor.

"We couldn't believe it," she said. "The scans taken several weeks ago showed nothing."

"We have not given up, there's no way we will do that," Mrs. Daniels said. "Doctors in Minneapolis and Chapel Hill are talking back and forth. There could be a breakthrough any day."

She said doctors had scheduled radiation treatments to shrink the tumor and reduce the swelling.

"How can we not do it? As long as it will make Brandon feel better and maybe give us a few extra days, we have to try it," Mrs. Daniels said. "We might get lucky again."

Brandon became ill with what appeared to be a virus on Labor Day 1983. When he did not respond to treatment, he was referred to N.C. Memorial Hospital, where tests showed he was suffering from a fast-growing liver tumor.

Doctors removed 70 percent of his liver and he was on chemotherapy for more than a year.

Giant N.C. Rock Becomes Bookstand In Cemetery

HIGH POINT (AP) — At first, Dolan Everhart was reluctant to sell the large rock sitting in a field on his Davidson County farm, but he had a change of heart when he found out why realtor Taylor Simpson wanted it.

That was 30 years ago. Today the giant rock holds a bronze Bible at Floral Garden Park Cemetery in High Point.

In the early 1950s, Everhart saw two men measuring a large rock in his field. Both were dressed in suits and obviously out of place on the farm south of Thomasville.

"I just watched and wondered 'what in the fireation are you up to now,'" he recalled. The next day the two men returned and measured some more before one of the men introduced himself as Simpson, a High Point realtor and manager of Floral Garden Park Cemetery, who died in 1974.

"He asked if I would be interested

in selling that rock," said Everhart, 81. "I said no. Then he said 'I've got to have that rock.'"

"I said, 'Just what in the world do you want with that rock?'"

Simpson explained that he had a large bronze Bible he planned for a new part of the cemetery. He said he had searched over three counties for the perfect rock.

Everhart told Simpson he still didn't want to sell the rock, but added: "if that's what you're wanting it for, I'll give it to you. But what I want to know is how you're going to get it. That's a solid rock."

Simpson scoffed and said he knew the difference between a rock and a boulder, Everhart recalled with a laugh.

"That's no boulder," Everhart told Simpson. "There's a Chinaman walking on the bottom of that rock."

The next day, Simpson sent four men with picks and shovels to remove the rock. Everhart watched

with growing amusement. "The more and the further down they dug, the bigger the rock got," he said.

Undaunted, Simpson sent another man who used dynamite to break the rock. "And sure enough, that did cut it off," Everhart said. Only there remained the problem of how to get the rock to High Point.

It took two bulldozers to finally get the rock onto a low-bed trailer and then an old-fashioned steam shovel had to be called to the cemetery to turn the trailer over and get the rock off.

Keeping his word, Simpson sent a crew back to Everhart's farm to repair the damage to his field, Everhart said, pointing out the rocky hillside from where the Floral Gardens rock was taken. Everhart and his wife, Grace, occasionally visit the cemetery to admire Simpson's persistence.

"From then on as long as he lived we were good friends ... after he found out it wasn't a boulder," Everhart said with a chuckle.

Robinson Accepts UNC System Post

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Jay Robinson says he was recruited away from his job as Charlotte-Mecklenburg school superintendent to become an official with the University of North Carolina system because of his past success in working with the Legislature.

"Getting to see up close the way a democracy operates is fascinating to me," said Robinson, 57, who resigned Tuesday. "I've enjoyed working with the Legislature in the public schools and will enjoy working with them in higher education."

In his nine years as superintendent, Robinson built a national reputation as an advocate of successful desegregation and quality academics.

He will become a vice president for public affairs for the 16-campus UNC system under C.D. Spangler Jr. of Charlotte, who became president March 1.

Robinson said he would begin the \$100,000-a-year job June 1 in Chapel Hill.

He said he was first offered the job about three weeks ago, and accepted the post last Thursday.

"I've had some good offers for other superintendentcies and in private businesses, but nothing that halfway appealed to me like this job," he said. "I've been a fan and a believer in the UNC system for many years."

Mop-up continued Tuesday on a fire on River Road in Columbus County, which burned 400 acres before it was contained April 2.

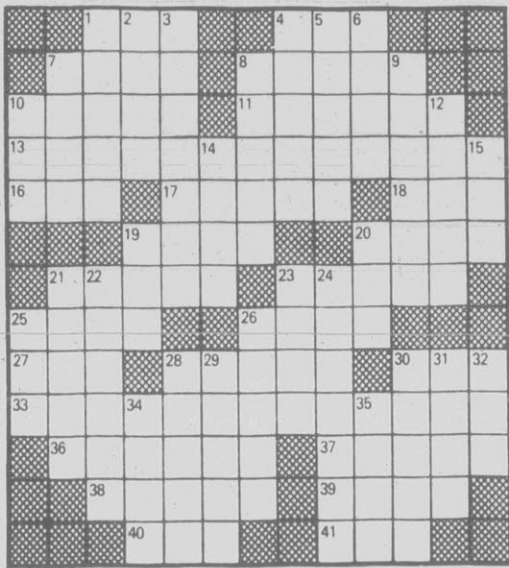

Furniture Industry Is 'Pretty Sound' As Market Opens

Prodded by declining interest rates and burgeoning housing resales, the furniture industry looks "pretty sound" as the spring Southern Furniture Market opens Thursday in High Point, analysts say.

"Business is pretty sound. There's a good demand for bedroom furniture and slightly weaker demand in other areas," said Wallace W. Epperson Jr., vice president and furniture analyst for Wheat First Securities of Richmond, Va. "We think industry sales will be up 10 or 11 percent this year (over) about \$11 billion in 1985."

The market, which runs through April 18, is the largest furniture market in the world. Held each April and October in showrooms stretching from Hickory to Burlington, the market attracts some 43,500 buyers, furniture factory executives, manufacturers' sales representatives, interior designers and reporters.

The 1,521 exhibitors display their latest creations in 120 buildings totaling about 5 million square feet — half of that space at the Southern Furniture Market Center in High Point. Officials say the market attracts about 85 percent of the furniture buying powers in this country and buyers from more than 50 foreign countries.

Epperson said housing resales were expected to be 3.5 million this year, up from about 3.1 million in 1985.

Resales are more important for the furniture industry than housing starts because more money is left over for furniture purchases, he said. In 1984, the average home seller took out \$38,000 from the sale of the house, applied two-thirds of that to the next house and spent the rest on furniture and installment debt repayments.

Bedroom furniture sales are stronger now because when people move, they tend to add bedrooms, said Epperson.

"The import question from the Far East continues to grow," he said, however. Those imports are primarily in dining room furniture and occasional tables and little else, he said. "But the gain in Far Eastern imports may be offset by the decline in European imports ... primarily because the dollar has weakened and made their products more expensive."

By the end of 1985, imports accounted for 21 percent of all furniture sales in this country in terms of

dollars and 24 percent in terms of units, Epperson said. This year "might end up being a year of low net gains in imports," he said.

Employment in the U.S. furniture industry should continue to rise this year, Epperson predicted. About 345,000 Americans — 85,000 of them in North Carolina — work in furniture, up from 285,000 U.S. furniture workers in 1982.

Rick Bartine, executive director of the Furniture Factories Marketing Association of the South, which sponsors the market, said some buyers are still being cautious for fear of overstocking.

But Epperson said this shouldn't be a problem because inventories have been lean since December.

New orders in February were 12 percent above January and 20 percent over February 1985, according to Seidman & Seidman of New York. Shipments in January and February were about \$2.1 billion, about 11 percent over the same period last year.

Each market has an economic impact of \$77 million on North Carolina.

'Set Aside' For Minority Firms

State Would See Little Effect If Program Falls

RALEIGH (AP) — If Congress and the president side with the Commission on Civil Rights on freezing or dropping set-aside programs, there'd be little impact in North Carolina because the state sought minority contractors even before the federal government required it, a state official says.

"I don't think it would drastically affect us," said J.O. Murphy, an assistant state highway engineer who handles contracts and maintenance with the state Department of Transportation. "It would affect the way we do business slightly, but before (the 1982 Congressional mandate) we had our own minority business enterprise program."

A draft report disclosed Tuesday by the commission called the set-aside programs largely ineffective and increasingly corrupt.

Later this week, the commission is expected to consider whether to push for a freeze on the programs, which reserve specific percentages of federal funds or work for businesses owned by minorities and women.

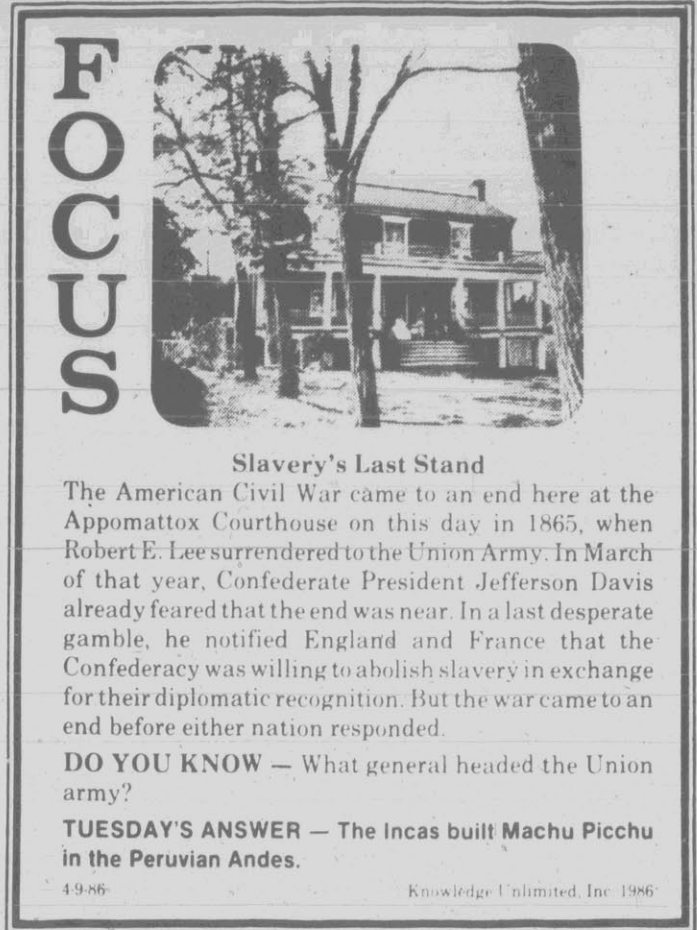
In North Carolina, minority and female business leaders have benefited from a federal law passed in 1982 that essentially encouraged states to reserve 10 percent of all federally aided highway work for minority companies or risk a cut in federal funds.

Companies that benefited often

U.N. Interested In Site Listed For Waste Dump

RALEIGH (AP) — The state has a new weapon in its arsenal against the U.S. Department of Energy's consideration of a western North Carolina site for a high-level nuclear waste dump.

The Elk River Complex, a 105-square-mile area containing parts of Buncombe, Haywood and Madison counties, also is under consideration by the United Nations as an internationally recognized environmental preserve, Natural Resources and Community Development Secretary Tommy Rhodes said Tuesday.

"We think this is going to be the straw that breaks the camel's back," he said. "With this, they're not only taking the state on ... they're taking the entire world community on."

An NRCD probe concluded Tuesday that the designation of the site as a "biosphere reserve" would enhance the already strong case

against including it on DOE's list of 12 finalists in seven states for long-term storage of tons of nuclear waste, Rhodes said.

Biosphere reserves are areas, usually containing a national park or forest, designated for conservation and educational projects designed to preserve animal and plant species for future generations, Rhodes said. There are 225 such preserves in 62 countries, he said.

"In addition to that, there are some proposed sites. And one has the Elk River complex in the middle of it," Rhodes said. "And that lends a lot of strength to our arguments" against locating the nuclear waste dump there, he said.

Biosphere reserves are not off-limits to development, but the proposed high-level nuclear waste repository definitely would not be acceptable there, he said.

Rhodes said he did not know when U.N. officials would make a final decision on the proposed preserve.

"I don't know exactly how fast that system operates," he said. "But (the consideration itself) is a tremendous boost. (Federal officials) will not only have to deal with us, but with the Department of the Interior, the State Department, and the world community. I'm not sure they'll want to deal with that. I think they'll throw in the towel."

The Southern Appalachian Biosphere Reserve, which contains the Elk River Complex and the nearby Great Smoky Mountains National Park, is being considered for restoration of the nearly extinct American chestnut and river otter.

Rhodes said in an interview that NRCD had realized the significance of the biosphere reserve proposal only after receiving a memorandum

Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market staged a broad advance today, extending Tuesday's rally amid talk of new downward pressure on interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials climbed 17.84 to 1,787.60 in the first hour of trading.

Gainers outnumbered losers by nearly 4 to 1 among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Stock prices began their latest rally Tuesday with a lift from new declines in oil prices.

Today, the market drew further impetus from reports that the United States is working toward a possible new round of discount-rate reductions among leading industrialized countries.

A Japanese newspaper said the Bank of Japan has tentatively decided to lower its discount rate by half a percentage point, to 3.5 percent.

In the U.S. credit markets, prices of long-term government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, rose about \$10 for every \$1,000 in face value this morning.

Among actively traded blue chips, American Express rose 1/4 to 67; General Mills 1/2 to 73 1/2; General Motors 3/8 to 83 3/8, and K mart 1/2 to 45 1/2.

Johnson & Johnson gained 3/8 to 58 3/4. The company announced plans to sell its diagnostic imaging business to General Electric, and to buy back as many as 10 million shares of its stock in the open market.

J.P. Morgan, which reported higher first-quarter earnings, added 1/4 to 77 1/4.

At 10 a.m., the NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks was up 1.10 at 135.83. The American Stock Exchange market value index rose 1.07 to 268.57.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average jumped 34.25 points to 1,769.76.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 4 to 1 on the NYSE. Big Board volume totaled 146.29 million shares, against 129.76 million in the previous session.

The suit also charges that the nursing home staff is "inadequately trained" and that "often" there is "not enough staff members on duty" to properly care for patients.

Saying "unless the substandard conditions, treatment and patient care ... are enjoined and the nursing home placed in receivership until it is brought to a level of operation enabling it to comply with state and federal standards," the suit stated inadequate care will continue. "Receivership is needed because violations ... have continued for more than seven years and will continue without new administration," the suit charges.

For relief, the suit asked the court to enter injunctions requiring the defendants to comply with state and federal regulations, and asks that both state officials and nursing home owners and operators submit "plans for fulfilling of their responsibility" to the court.

Minister's Offer To Resign May Defuse Israeli Spat

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's popular finance minister offered to resign today, a move that could resolve a government crisis triggered by Prime Minister Shimon Peres' demand he be fired because of critical remarks he made about Peres.

But Israel Army radio reported that Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir, leader of the Likud bloc, objected to Finance Minister Yitzhak Modai's resignation.

Likud and Peres' Labor Party are partners in an uneasy coalition government. Peres' demand that Modai quit has threatened the future of the government.

"This is a moment of truth. The interest of the state is of prime importance over all other interests," said Modai. "If Peres wants it, I will return to him the finance portfolio."

Modai spoke at a news conference that came two days after Peres demanded his dismissal. The prime minister was angered over several critical remarks Modai made in weekend newspaper interviews.

The demand set off a government crisis when Shamir said he could not agree to firing Modai. Shamir said unless Peres accepted a compromise, the wobbly Labor-Likud coalition government would fall.

Modai did not say when he would submit his resignation, but said he would act according to government regulations. Those regulations call for Modai to submit a letter of resignation to the Cabinet secretary. His resignation would take effect 48 hours later.

The army radio said Likud activists had appealed to Modai to reconsider. Modai also did not mention the names of any possible successor but said whoever replaced him should be a member of the Likud bloc.

Israeli newspapers have mentioned several possible successors, including Industry and Trade Minister Ariel Sharon and Housing Minister David Levy, both of the Likud bloc. Peres also could take over the portfolio himself until a new minister is chosen.

Following Modai's news conference, Labor Energy Minister Moshe Shahal said if Modai resigned the government crisis would be resolved.

Peres, at a national convention of his left-leaning Labor Party on Tuesday night, said Modai had "broken all the rules" by criticizing the prime minister and opposing government policy.

Modai accused Peres of having no understanding of economics and said he did not deserve any credit for the recovery program that has slashed Israel's inflation from 445 percent to a projected 25 percent annually.

Washington Post that Ambassador Richard Burt, the U.S. envoy to West Germany, was rebuked by the president's national security adviser, John Poindexter, for saying on television Monday that there were "very clear indications that there was Libyan involvement" in the nightclub bombing that killed an Army sergeant and a Turkish woman.

In another development, Attorney General Edwin Meese told the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, a pro-Israel lobbying group, that the U.S. government is adopting a wide array of measures to combat terrorism.

These include expanding the efforts of the criminal division in the Justice Department to prosecute terrorist activities against U.S. citizens both inside and outside the United States.

He also said the FBI is sending agents overseas to "many European countries" to investigate terrorist incidents "wherever they occur."

Meese said the victims and perpetrators of terrorism in 1984 came from 60 countries.

Trade Pact

PEKING (AP) — China and neighboring Mongolia, a Soviet ally, have signed their first long-term trade agreement, the official Xinhua news agency reported.

The agreement, covering 1986-90, was signed in Peking. China will export silk, fruit and light industrial products, while importing Mongolian timber, leather and deer horns, the report said. The value of the pact was not disclosed.

Voyager 2 Taking Collision Course At Neptune's Ring

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Voyager 2 spacecraft, flying toward a 1989 encounter with Neptune, could be destroyed in a collision with boulders or pebbles orbiting the planet if its route isn't changed, scientists say.

But the researchers prefer to stick with Voyager's planned trajectory because it would take the probe near Triton, a moon of Neptune which apparently has organic sludge, methane ice and possibly lakes of liquid nitrogen.

"It's very possible we will just decide to take our chances," deputy Voyager project scientist Ellis Miner said Tuesday at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Scientists have been aware of the potential collision problem for more than a year. It was revealed publicly Tuesday by Fred Scarf, a TRW Inc. physicist and Voyager science team member, during a luncheon with reporters at the company's Redondo Beach offices.

"There is something circling around Neptune that we had not planned for in our initial considerations of trajectory for Voyager 2," Miner said later.

He said evidence accumulating since late 1983 suggests that in addition to two known moons — Triton and Nereid — Neptune is orbited by three "arcs," or thin, incomplete rings different from the complete

rings of dust, pebbles or boulders circling Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus.

Scientists still aren't sure the arcs exist. But if they do, Voyager's planned course goes directly through the region where they appear to be, Miner said. Collisions with anything larger than a pebble one-third of an inch wide would severely damage or destroy the spacecraft, he said.

Miner said Voyager scientists and engineers must decide by mid-1988 whether to change the trajectory orders they plan to transmit to Voyager then, roughly a year before the probe's scheduled Neptune-Triton flyby Aug. 24, 1989.

Scientists prefer the planned trajectory because it would take the probe within 5,100 miles of Triton's surface and within 800 miles of Neptune's upper atmosphere, Miner said. An alternate course would increase those distances to about 11,000 miles and 1,500 miles, respectively.

To keep both options open, engineers sent Voyager orders in

February that put it on a course about halfway between the two, Miner said.

Voyager team members on Monday unanimously rejected a third possibility that would take the probe roughly 200,000 miles from Neptune, too far for good studies of the planet's magnetic field, he said.

Voyager 2 was launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla., in 1977, and explored Jupiter in 1979, Saturn in 1981 and Uranus in January. At Uranus, it discovered 10 tiny moons besides the five previously known, and two rings and 10 ring arcs in addition to the nine rings discovered earlier from Earth.

The Neptune-Triton flyby will cap the spacecraft's exploration of the outer solar system.

Researchers are particularly interested in a close look at Triton because it is the only third object in the solar system known to have nitrogen in its atmosphere, he said. The other two are Earth and Saturn's moon, Titan.

Mahler Hurls Braves To 6-0 Win

Give Rick Mahler the baseball on Opening Day — and then just get out of his way.
“I don't know what it is about opening night, maybe the pitchers

are ahead of the hitters,” the Atlanta pitcher said Tuesday night after he continued his string of Opening Day jems with a 6-0 victory over the Montreal Expos.

Three of Mahler's five career

shutouts have been pitched on Opening Day assignments.

“It's always great to start this season this way,” said Mahler, who also pitched a 6-0 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies last year.

Mahler's effort was a highlight on a

day of strong pitching performances in the National League.

Dave Dravecky hurled a three-hitter to lead San Diego over Los Angeles 1-0; John Tudor had a five-hitter as St. Louis stopped Chicago 2-1 and Dwight Gooden hurled a six-hitter to pace the New York Mets to a 4-2 decision over Pittsburgh. In the NL's other game, San Francisco defeated Houston 8-3.

The 32-year-old Mahler was Atlanta's ace last season with a 17-15 mark for a club that was fifth in the NL West with a 66-96 record. He usually is a fast starter, winning seven in a row at the start of last season and he pitched two straight shutouts to open the season in 1982.

“We've got a new attitude this year,” Mahler said. “Everything is positive.”

The Braves' runs came on a two-run homer by Dale Murphy in the seventh inning off loser Bryn Smith and a three-run sixth inning that included a pair of bloop singles by Rafael Ramirez and Ken Oberkfell, two walks, an error and a run-scoring passed ball. Terry Harper and Ozzie Virgil had RBI groundouts in the inning. Claudell Washington added a sacrifice fly in the eighth for the Braves' final run.

“It's always exciting on opening night, especially when you get off on the right foot,” said Murphy, who also had a double and a walk and scored twice.

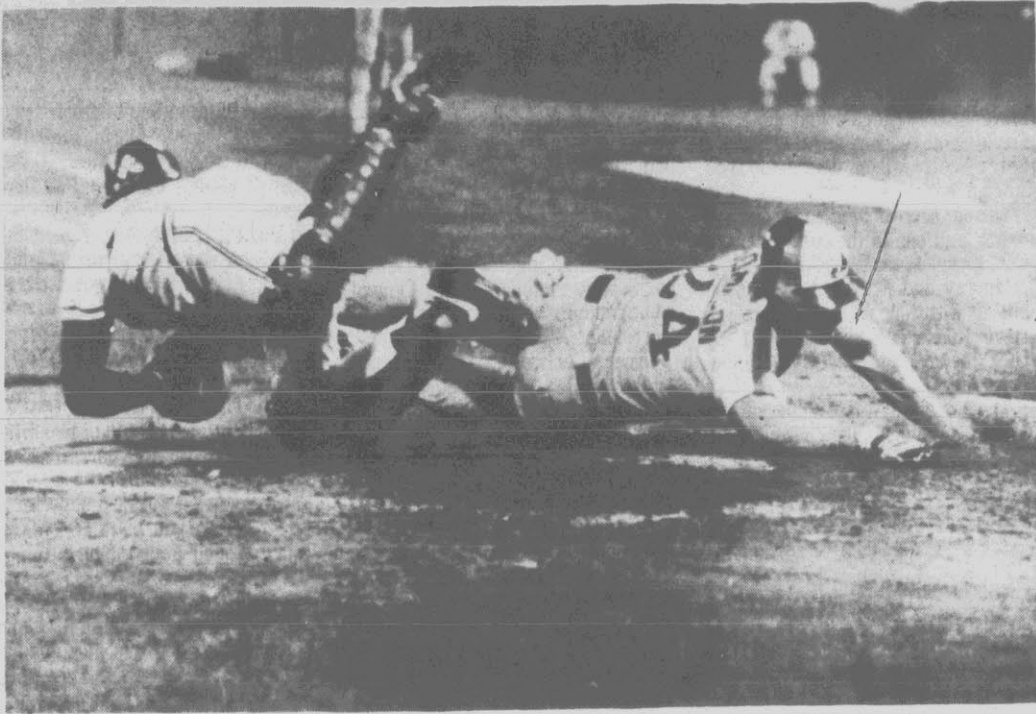

Ueberroth Predicts Drug Testing Agreement Soon

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Baseball Commissioner Peter Ueberroth predicts players and owners will reach a drug testing agreement this season, despite some players' initial disappointment with his proposed plan that bypasses their union.

“I believe baseball is going to be the first sport to be free of drugs,” Ueberroth said Tuesday. “The owners through their Players Relations Committee and the players are pretty much close together on this. I'm encouraged by the dialogue so far.”

“The players have had enough of it (the drug problem). I could sense this in spring training. I didn't talk to all 700 players, but I talked to a lot of

them and they're tired of being asked questions about it,” he said.

Ueberroth said, however, that “baseball will never be perfect” because society itself will never be free of drugs, especially “at a time when drug prices are going down and quality is going up.”

Ueberroth said his drug proposal, mailed to the players earlier this week, is almost the same as the Baltimore Orioles' plan adopted over the winter, which he said “is in effect and working.”

The plan would require four urine tests a year for detection of cocaine, marijuana, heroin and morphine. Results of the tests would not be made public and there would be no

penalties for players testing positive.

A player and a doctor would work privately to solve any detected drug problem before, Ueberroth said, “a player has to crawl off the field on his belly to some institution.”

“There are no penalties,” Ueberroth said. “But the law of the land has penalties and there is a commissioner of baseball.”

Ueberroth took disciplinary action earlier this year against 21 players who either testified or were mentioned in testimony during last summer's Pittsburgh federal court drug trials.

The commissioner said he attended the Pittsburgh Pirates' home opener Tuesday night to show that baseball, in the city where the trials were held, has turned the corner on correcting its drug problem.

He said he also wanted to show support for the Pirates' new public-private ownership coalition, which he called “the best example in all of baseball” of the way a city can save a troubled franchise.

“When I was here last fall ... I would have said that by this time, there would not be a major league baseball team in Pittsburgh and that a lot of lawyers would be making a lot of money arguing over the destiny of the franchise,” he said.

The Pirates, after losing 191 games and nearly \$15 million the past two seasons, recently were purchased by a group of 13 corporate and private investors, with the help of a \$20 million loan from the city of Pittsburgh.

The loan money is being raised through a bond issue approved unanimously last month by city council.

Ueberroth said officials of some of baseball's other financially troubled teams have been asked to “come here and talk with the owners about how they saved this franchise.”

Festival Is Growing

DURHAM (AP) — The U.S. Olympic Festival in July 1987 will put the Research Triangle on the map, says the secretary general of the United States Olympic Committee.

“The character of the festival has changed,” secretary general George Miller said at a press conference Tuesday. “It has grown in magnitude, in importance, in prestige and also in expense.”

“It is no longer a regional event,” he added. “Forty hours of live television (on ESPN) will go all over the nation. It will put the Research Triangle on the national map.”

Miller signed a contract Tuesday formalizing an agreement between the USOC and North Carolina Amateur Sports to conduct the festival.

Sheila Walker, director of sports festivals, praised the early preparations made by North Carolina Amateur Sports more than a year before the start of the 34-sport national competition.

“Preparations here are well in advance of previous festivals,” she said.

Miller outlined the factors he felt were necessary for a successful project in this area.

“First is people,” he said. “You begin with the organizing committee and the enthusiasm they bring. But that's just one aspect of it. There's no way the festival will be a success without full cooperation of the community.”

“Second is corporate support. You have to have financial resources. We've found that if the corporate structure is interested, community support follows. Without community, the games will not be a success.”

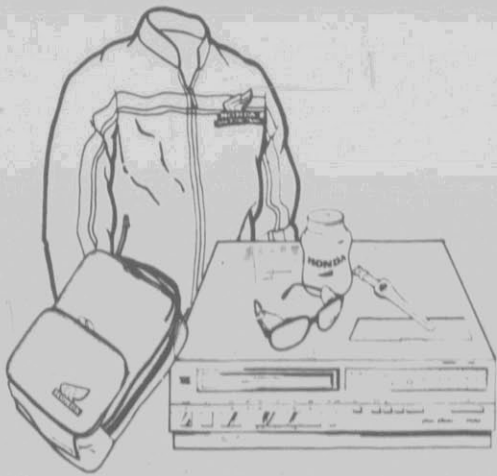

Pacers Upset Momentum Of Washington's Bullets

With three consecutive victories, the Washington Bullets had put themselves in a better playoff position. Then the Indiana Pacers, a team with nothing to gain but its pride, upset that momentum.

"This was a very disappointing effort," Washington Coach Kevin Loughery said after a 111-104 defeat Monday night that snapped the Pacers' nine-game losing streak. "They came out very aggressive offensively and we didn't execute very well on our end."

"This team has got to be tired of losing," the Pacers' Ron Anderson said. "Even though we didn't have anything to fight for, it's embarrassing to have lost nine in a row."

The loss dropped the Bullets into seventh place in the NBA's Eastern Conference, a half-game behind New Jersey, which must play the Boston Celtics in two of its final three games. The winner among the Nets and Washington plays injury-riddled Philadelphia in the first round of the playoffs, while the loser must face Central Division champion Milwaukee.

In other games, it was Philadelphia 116, Detroit 112; Atlanta 131, Chicago 118; Boston 126, Milwaukee 114; Houston 109; Seattle 105; Golden State 129, Dallas 115; and Los Angeles Lakers 120, Portland 114.

Loughery was upset over the play of his starters, who combined for only 38 points against the Pacers.

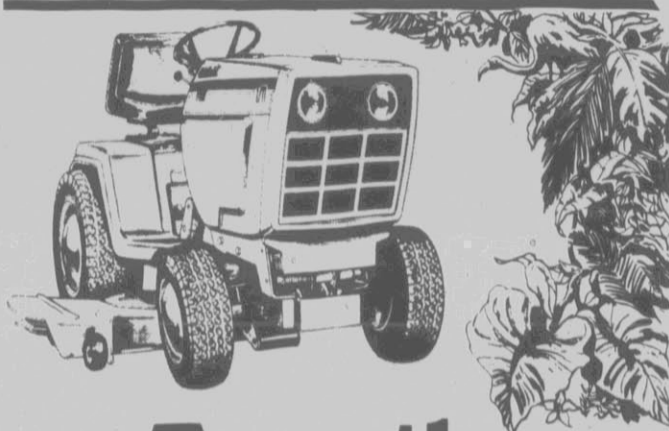
Houston then scored the first 10 points of the fourth quarter to pull ahead 86-69. Wiggins accounted for six of the 10 points.

Solo Sailor Due Friday

ST. GEORGE'S, Bermuda (AP) — Popcorn, a cheeseburger and a vodka- tonic await American sailer Dutch Morgan whose expected return this week will set a dramatic new record for solo round-the-world sailing.

Morgan, who set out Nov. 12 aboard his 60-foot sloop American Promise, should complete the 27,000 nautical mile circumnavigation sometime Friday after 140 days, smashing the current record of 292 days set in 1971 by Chay Blyth of Britain.

By Tuesday night, American Promise was reported less than 500 nautical miles south of the island.

Morgan, a 54-year-old sailor from

Portland, Maine will fire a flare to signal the end of his voyage when he passes St. David's Head on Bermuda's eastern tip.

Technically, Morgan completed his circumnavigation 699 miles off Bermuda when his outgoing and incoming paths crossed on Monday. In yachting jargon, Morgan had "tied his own knot."

But the voyage is not over officially until he crosses the finish line at St. David's.

Harborside pub manager David Hillier will rendezvous with the Promise offshore, because its motors are out of service, and tow it to St. George's harbor.

Voter information through a toll-free special telecommunications device in Raleigh, North Carolina, will soon be available to deaf voters. Information on how to contact the device will be available at your local board of elections by May 1, 1986.

NBC Moves Nearer To First Prime-Time Rating Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC received a double dose of good news from last week's ratings: a victory in prime time and a tie in dinnertime news.

With NBC just two weeks away from officially claiming its first outright triumph in the traditional 30-week prime-time season, the network placed five comedies in the Top 10 and scored a narrow victory for the week of March 31-April 6.

And the "NBC Nightly News" came as close to the "CBS Evening News" as it's been in four years, almost stopping CBS' consecutive winning streak. But, with the ratings tie, the "CBS Evening News" still can claim 205 straight first-place finishes.

A.C. Nielsen Co. figures, released Tuesday, showed that both Dan Rather's newscast on CBS and Tom Brokaw's broadcast on NBC averaged an 11.8 rating, while Peter Jennings' "World News Tonight" on ABC had a 10.9 rating.

The last time "NBC Nightly News" tied the "CBS Evening News" was a week in February 1982 when both broadcasts had a 13.4 rating.

The three regular anchors were on their newscasts last week, but network researchers said that the "CBS Evening News" rating probably was

deflated slightly because it was preempted on the West Coast by CBS' live broadcast of the NCAA basketball finals March 31.

Ratings for the "NBC Nightly News" have been steadily improving over the past year. For the same week in 1985, CBS averaged a 12.6 rating, NBC a 10.8 and ABC a 10.7.

"We've come up a little, they came back a little and, basically, we met in the middle," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, said some of the growth in the "NBC Nightly News" can be attributed to NBC's stronger showing in prime time and with the "Today" show this season. Some local newscasts leading into "Nightly News" also are doing better, Poltrack said.

In prime time, NBC almost was overtaken by CBS' blockbuster Sunday lineup that included the net-

work's three Top 10 programs: "Murder, She Wrote," "60 Minutes" and "Nobody's Child," the critically praised movie starring Marlo Thomas.

For the four hours of prime-time programming on Sunday, CBS averaged a 25.0 rating to ABC's 14.0 and NBC's 13.3. A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

Overall, NBC's "The Cosby Show" ranked first for the week with a 34.3 rating, NBC's "Family Ties" was second with a 31.8 rating and "Murder, She Wrote" and "Nobody's Child" tied for third with a 25.7. Next came NBC's "Cheers" and "60 Minutes," followed by ABC's "Who's the Boss?" NBC's "Night Court," ABC's "Perfect Strangers" and NBC's "Golden Girls."

CBS' broadcast of Louisville's victory over Duke in the NCAA basketball finals ranked 14th with a 20.7 rating, down from last year's record 23.3 when Georgetown was upset by Villanova.

Black South African Dancers Seek Asylum

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Five members of a black South African dance troupe have asked an immigration judge for political asylum here, saying they would be persecuted if they returned because of their opposition to apartheid.

U.S. immigration experts said asylum requests involving South Africa are rare.

The members of Uzulu Dance Theatre fear they could be punished for encouraging their American audiences to withdraw investments in companies doing business with South Africa.

"For a South African to tell Americans to divest in South Africa, that's treason in South Africa. You can be put to death for saying that," said Dingane Lelokoane, one of those seeking asylum.

The five entered the United States in 1980 under an entertainers' visa with the Ipi Ltombi dance troupe and have been in the country illegally since Ipi Ltombi went broke shortly after arriving, Lelokoane said.

Their attempts to get a new visa failed last year and resulted in Tuesday's deportation hearing. A hearing on the request was set for June 5, 1987, the first date available on the crowded immigration court calendar.

The State Department will be asked to make a recommendation on the asylum application, which will be opposed by an Immigration and Naturalization Service attorney.

"It's very difficult to establish a claim of political asylum," said Robert Bruce, a spokesman for the State Department's Africa bureau. Blacks have no political rights in South Africa, but the country's courts are fairly independent, he said. "It's a mixed bag, I guess."

Attorney Bill May, who is representing the five, said he is confident the immigration court will rule in his clients' favor regardless of the State Department's finding.

"There's a strong argument on the face of it for persecution on the basis of race in South Africa," he said. "But in addition to that, they have ... been associated with a number of anti-apartheid organizations, a number of political groups."

Exiled South African poet Dennis Brutus was granted political asylum by an immigration judge in Chicago

in September 1983. Brutus, 58, was an outspoken opponent of white-minority rule in South Africa and had argued that his life would be in danger from South African agents if he were deported to neighboring Zimbabwe, where he was born.

Nick Rizza, who evaluates political asylum claims for Amnesty International, said he was aware of only one other similar case, one involving an actor in New York. Rizza, who refused to disclose the man's name, said he believed asylum was also granted in that case.

CBS Hires Producer

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS has hired the woman who was in charge of ABC's "Good Morning America" when it gained early-morning ratings supremacy to take charge of third-rated "CBS Morning News."

Effective May 5, Susan Winston will become executive director of morning news planning for CBS.

The plan announced Tuesday calls for her to assess the strength and weaknesses of the "Morning News," then make a proposal on how to structure the program. When management accepts her plan, she will become executive producer of the broadcast.

The previous executive producer of the "CBS Morning News" was Johnathan Rodgers who last month became general manager of WBBM, the CBS-owned station in Chicago that is being boycotted by the black special interest group, Operation PUSH.

Winston joined "Good Morning America" as a producer in 1979 and became executive producer two years later, about the time that "Good Morning America" was overtaking NBC's "Today." She left the program in 1984 to work on ABC's Olympics coverage.

The "CBS Morning News," with co-anchors Forrest Sawyer and Maria Shriver, is a poor third in the ratings to "Today" and "Good Morning America."

Younger Americans Will Have Greater Burden For Elderly

WASHINGTON (AP) — America's next generation will have to shoulder less of a burden to support the country's retired people than young people in other nations will face, a pension consultant says.

But by the early 21st Century, there will be nearly a third fewer young Americans to support the country's

elderly population that there are today, the consultant said.

Consultant Giles C. Archibald, using United Nations figures, says that in 1980 there were 3.47 Americans between the ages of 20 and 60 for every one over the age of 60. Working with U.N. population predictions, Archibald says that in 2020 the proportion will be 2.51 to one.

That is, assuming that everyone over 60 will have retired, the burden of supporting each of them will rest on two-and-a-half younger people instead of the present three-and-a-half.

But in other countries, the burden would be on an even smaller number of the younger generation.

In Canada, the proportion would be 2.38 people aged 20 to 60 for every one over age 60, in Britain 2.19, in France 2.18, in West Germany 1.97 and in Japan only 1.96.

That is, fewer than two Japanese or West German people aged 20 to 60 would have to support each compatriot over 60.

"This changing ratio points to a

potential crisis," said Archibald, chief consultant on benefits at William M. Mercer-Meindinger Inc., which advises employers in 19 countries on relations with employees.

"It means that because European retirees usually obtain more than half their retirement income from government social security systems, the diminishing number of workers will increasingly have to pay greater percentages of their earnings into social security programs to support (a) greater number of retirees," he said in a statement.

"Or, government-provided retirement benefits will have to be reduced," he said.

Roy Lucas, an aide to the British Archibald, said in a telephone interview that this has already occurred in Japan.

same level as West German and Dutch workers.

Formerly the Japanese level was as high as in France, about 60 percent, Lucas added.

Social security pensions are relatively higher in other countries: 65 percent of final wages in Belgium, 75 percent in Italy and 97 percent in Spain.

According to Archibald's figures, an American employee earning the national average gets the equivalent of only 41 percent of it in a social security pension when he or she retires.

Archibald suggested that U.S. companies with subsidiaries in Europe may want to detach their pension plans from government social security systems "to protect them from the inevitable consequences of aging populations."

He calculates that a Japanese earning the national average wage will now get payments equivalent to about half his final salary from a social security pension, about the

The calculations do not take into account the possibility that more people may be working beyond the age of 60 in the future, especially in the United States and Japan.

Consumers Union Passes Half-Century Anniversary

MOUNT VERNON, N.Y. (AP) — Every nook and cranny at the headquarters of Consumers Union is crowded with washing machines, wood stoves, exercycles, mattresses, toasters and other products.

Wires and gauges are everywhere. And amid this clutter, engineers armed with the most sensitive testing equipment, as well as some Rube Goldberg-like devices, determine the "best buys" that have made CU and its Consumer Reports magazine famous over 50 years.

Sometimes the tools for testing products are unusual. Take the "thumper," used to test the durability of mattresses. Two bowling ball halves, meant to replicate buttocks, are attached to a piston that pummels them into mattresses to simulate years of wear.

And sometimes these serious-minded tests are fun as well.

On one recent cold afternoon, the odor of barbecued chicken filled the halls. Technicians were testing a dozen gas grills, so consumers would have the results before summer cookouts.

It is here, 20 minutes from New York City, where Consumer Reports magazine comes to life. First published in May 1936, the magazine has its highest subscription level ever: about 3.4 million people who wouldn't think of buying a car, a vacuum cleaner, a television, a heater or even tea or coffee without first reading what Consumer Reports has to say.

The March issue was fairly typical of what readers have come to expect. It featured comparative product reports on toothpastes, toaster ovens, IBM-compatible home computers, child safety gates, compact cars and innerspring mattresses. It also features articles on the Minolta Maxxum 35mm camera and on what to do if your tax return is audited.

The April issue is always CU's most popular. It is the annual automobile issue.

The formula — testing products for the benefit of consumers — has worked for half a century.

Consumer Reports magazine's first issue was published when breakfast cereal cost 9 cents a box and stockings were 50 cents. That issue reported on cereals, stockings, Alka-Seltzer, milk, soap and toothbrushes. In the depressed

economy of that year, few people needed the ratings for cars, refrigerators or other expensive goods that have since become the hallmark of the magazine's product testing reports.

Rhoda H. Karpatkin, executive director of Consumers Union, said the magazine's longevity is based in part on a simple but disturbing perception: many people do not trust businesses, advertising, government or advertising-backed media to provide them with the information they need to make educated buying choices.

Consumer Reports has no advertising and is not linked in any way to manufacturers. When Consumers Union buys products, it goes to the store and pays retail. The non-profit organization relies on subscriptions for most of its money.

"We want people to trust us, and we think many people do," Ms. Karpatkin said. "The reason they trust us is we don't take anything from business. We maintain an arm's length relationship with business. We're beholden only to consumers."

At its inception, the magazine strongly supported labor unions. The first issue contained an article titled "Consumers' Goods Makers Unfair To Labor" and included an "unfair list" for consumers who wanted to boycott the companies.

The pro-union stance was not odd considering the magazine was born of a bitter strike. The people who began Consumers Union had worked for Consumers' Research, an organization founded in 1927 to test products for the benefit of consumers and to publish results in a magazine.

When Consumers' Research fired three workers for trying to form a union, about 40 other workers walked out. When management became intransigent, the strikers decided to beat Consumers' Research at its own game.

The first issue of the new magazine sold 4,000 copies. Three years later, its circulation of 85,000 surpassed that of Consumers' Research.

"Our founders were very brilliant in conceptualizing the organization, what it would do," said Ms. Karpatkin. "Basically, our magazine is not so different from the one we had in our first 10 or 20 years."

In a recent interview at Consumer Union's headquarters, Ms. Karpatkin identified four areas where CU intends to increase its efforts:

travel, information for elderly consumers, education for children and attention to poor consumers.

CU recently began a monthly travel newsletter to help consumers sort out the confused travel marketplace sparked by airline deregulation and subsequent fare wars.

An aging population and new marketing schemes aimed at older consumers also opens new markets for Consumers Union, Ms. Karpatkin said. Consumer Reports Books is now offering titles such as "Housing Alternatives for Older Citizens," "The Heart Attack Handbook" and "Love, Sex and Aging."

Young consumers also need more buying information, Ms. Karpatkin said. Classrooms are filled with free educational materials provided by businesses, and "we have not succeeded in becoming a competitor with business in the educational materials area."

In 1977, Consumers Union introduced Penny Power, a bi-monthly consumer magazine for 8-to-14-year-olds. It rates products like fast food hamburgers, toys and jeans, and it teaches comparative shopping skills. The February-March issue had a story explaining why the coming of Halley's comet was not a good reason to buy a telescope.

Helping poor consumers is also in Consumers Union's future, Ms. Karpatkin said. "That was a major concern when our organization was founded. And it was a major concern for the consumer movement of the 1960s. And it sort of moved off the horizon," she said.

People who buy Consumer Reports are generally well-off, and the magazine does not reach poor people. But CU is planning a conference on poor consumers in November, as well as a book.

The results of CU's tests sometimes provokes challenges from unhappy manufacturers. Infrequently, they take CU to court, but no manufacturer has won a suit against the magazine's tests.

"I think our place in the world has changed," said Ms. Karpatkin. "Some manufacturers regard us as an adjunct to an orderly marketplace. And I think many manufacturers think that we help sell products. ... Many consumers think we help the system work better. That's one view of us. I think there are manufacturers who wish we would fall off the face of the Earth."

Archaeological Find Changes Chinese City

XIAN, China (AP) — This smoky industrial city is becoming a major tourist center — and even greater changes are in store — because of the exquisite Terracotta Army found in 1974 by peasants digging a well.

It was one of the great archaeological finds of modern times — an array of colorfully dressed, terracotta soldiers guarding the tomb of Emperor Qinshihuang, who unified scattered Chinese kingdoms into a single nation in 221 B.C. and died a year later.

About 210,000 foreign tourists last year visited three partly excavated pits at the site, putting a heavy strain on Xian's limited accommodations. By 1990 the foreign influx is expected to reach 600,000 in addition to millions of Chinese flocking in to see the life-size warriors.

A new airport is scheduled to be ready in 1988, and thousands more first-class hotel rooms are planned.

Archaeologists have resumed their work on the site, sharing Xian's wealth of history with tourism-minded

officials and peasants who have reaped a bonanza selling souvenirs.

The archaeological digging had been halted after discovery of the underground army so the three pits could be turned into a museum. As

one archaeologist explained, the discovery was "a world sensation."

The archaeologists acknowledge they may never in their lifetimes gaze into the emperor's crypt, which has been closed for more than 2000

years.

"We thought the pit (believed to be the site of the crypt) would take a week to excavate," said archaeologist Yuan Zhongyi in an interview. "Now it's been 12 years, and it may take one or two centuries."

Rushed digging, he added, would risk the loss of valuable historical data.

Yuan, 52, vice president of the Shaanxi Provincial Archaeology Association, was among the first summoned when the peasant well-diggers found the army.

About 700 warriors have been found so far, some painstakingly

reassembled in ranks and rows, eerily ready for battle. They guard the tomb, which is about two miles away.

"What we know are the three pits," Yuan says. "But there are 300 to 400 pit sites which have been found, or will be found. The entire necropolis is more than 50 square kilometers (20 square miles)."

At the center is the underground tomb of Qinshihuang, whose brief but historically significant reign included the construction of the Great Wall.

"We will do all the sites nearby the mausoleum first, then key satellite tombs will be excavated," Yuan said. "So far, we haven't discussed a date

for opening the main tomb."

Surveys, historical records and relics make Yuan and other archaeologists confident of the site of the tomb.

The terracotta warriors have yielded invaluable clues to the dress, weaponry, military organization and physical appearance of the era.

The emperor's tomb, when it is opened, could turn out to be the find of centuries.

Chinese records tell of a magnificent crypt, with running streams of mercury, maps showing the location of precious metals, and boobytraps to halt looters.

Scientific, Ethical Barriers May Block Brain Transplants

NEW YORK (AP) — Despite some temporary successes in Sweden for brain implants to help relieve symptoms in Parkinson's disease patients, scientific and ethical barriers prevent such experiments in the United States, a researcher says.

"I have no idea how long it would take" to overcome them, said William Freed, chief of the preclinical neurosciences section of the National Institute of Mental Health.

Freed was interviewed recently after Scandinavian researchers discussed ideas for getting longer-lasting results from their experimental procedure, under which four Parkinson's patients received transplants of gland tissue into their brains.

The Swedish transplants are the only reported human trials of brain-grafting for Parkinson's. Researchers discussed the experiments at a meeting on transplantations into the brain, sponsored by the New York Academy of Sciences.

Parkinson's disease, characterized by tremors and rigidity, afflicts an estimated 500,000 people in the United States. It results from a lack of a chemical called dopamine in a certain area of the brain. Brain cells use dopamine to communicate.

The disease can be controlled with treatments of a drug called L-dopa, but response to that drug can become sporadic after continued treatment.

In the Swedish research, grafts were planted in the brain from the patients' own adrenal glands, which lie near the kidney. The idea was that secretions from the adrenal cells would make up for the missing dopamine.

The first two transplants were done in 1982 and 1983, the last two in March 1985. The longest-lasting effect appeared in the last two patients, with one showing better response to L-dopa for about two months and the other showing improved balance for the same period of time, said Olle Lindvall of the University of Lund in Sweden.

"We regard the findings as promising," since they show some benefit and no harm, he said. But so far, he added, the transplants provide only "minor value to the patient."

Freed said such trials won't be taken up in the United States until researchers demonstrate in monkeys that such transplants help relieve symptoms. So far, researchers have shown survival of such grafts in monkeys but no effect on behavior, he said.

Investigators have shown also that transplanting monkey fetal brain tissue into brains of monkeys with a Parkinson's-like condition will help relieve symptoms, he said. Those preliminary results are exciting, but scientists have no precedent or consensus for the ethical issue of using human fetal tissue for similar experiments in humans, he said.

In discussing the Scandinavian work, Dr. Erik-Olof Backlund of the University of Bergen School of Medicine in Norway said researchers plan more human transplants, although no fifth patient has been scheduled yet.

A new twist will be using a substance called nerve growth factor to help the grafted tissue thrive in its new home, he said. Lars Olson of the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm said animal tests show adrenal tissue is stimulated by the substance.

For human transplants, a thin tube could be implanted in the brain to carry a small, steady flow of the substance to the graft sites for two to four weeks after the implant, he said.

Other possible strategies to get better results include suspending individual adrenal cells in a solution and using a fine needle to distribute them more evenly through the dopamine-deficient area of the brain, he said.

"Perhaps we transplanted too few cells to begin with," Lund said.

Researchers Identify Genes Used In Color

WASHINGTON (AP) — Taking a detailed look into the genetic factors affecting vision, researchers have identified the genes responsible for seeing in color and confirmed theories about sight dating back for centuries.

Using genetic engineering techniques, researchers at Stanford University Medical School identified and isolated the genes responsible for the three eye pigments that make color vision possible.

In reports published Friday in the journal Science, the scientists say their findings will aid research into color blindness as well as normal vision, and makes possible the first direct studies of color vision pigments.

In an accompanying article, Dr. David Botstein of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology called the work "elegant" research that resolves theories on vision with roots going back to scientists and philosophers of the 18th century.

"The new insight into color vision has come through the application of the modern methods of molecular genetics," said Botstein, a professor of genetics. "The work illuminates not only the physiology of color vision, but also basic mechanisms of evolution."

Botstein said the work confirms a number of theories on how people see colors and why certain defects can lead to color blindness.

Jeremy Nathans, the principal investigator, worked with David S. Hogness, Darcy Thomas and others at Stanford University in locating the correct pieces of genetic material that control pigment production on the chromosomes that pass genetic traits from generation to generation.

Chromosomes are bundles of DNA, deoxyribonucleic acid, the basic material of heredity.

Color pigments are proteins that lie in the cone-shaped cells of the eye. When struck by light, the proteins

trigger chemical chain reactions of enzymes that result in a color signal going to the brain.

These pigments are sensitive to red, green or blue colors, and combinations of these primary colors produce the array of hundreds of tints that people can see.

Nathans, a medical student and researcher, used pieces of similar DNA — called gene probes — to locate the genes responsible for the pigments and found that they all are related, some more closely than others.

The red and green pigment-producing genes were found to lie side-by-side on the same chromosome and to be almost identical chemically, the report said.

The blue gene was found on a different, distant chromosome and has a different chemical structure.

A fourth member of the pigment family, rhodopsin, came from a gene located on yet another chromosome, the researchers said. Rhodopsin is a protein located in the rod-shaped cells of the eye that is responsible for black-and-white night vision.

A comparison of the structure of these genes with those of other primates indicates that they have been evolving over time, the researchers said. Evidence indicates that the genes for the color and rod pigments diverged from a common ancestor gene after a major evolutionary split along primate lines some 30 million to 40 million years ago, they continued.

The researchers did further work to show that traditional color blindness, the missing ability to see green, resulted from missing or altered green pigment genes, they said.

These results confirmed long-standing theories about the origin of color blindness, a condition that affects 8 percent of white men and a half percent of white women, they said.

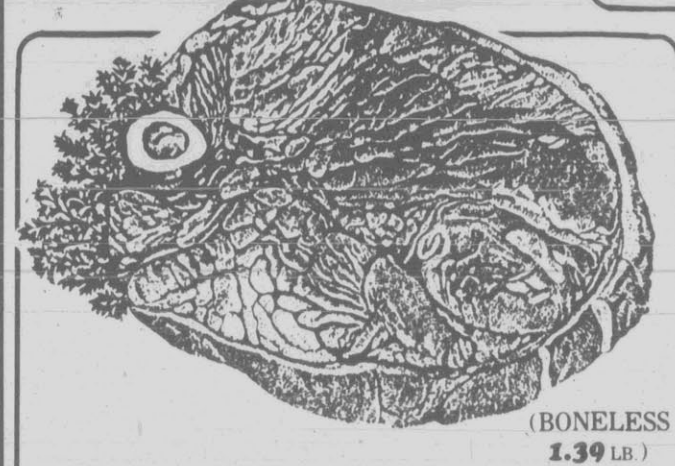
