School Boards Get Election Plans

The Pitt and Greenville school boards were scheduled to consider a revised method of election for the consolidated Pitt County Board of Education at separate meetings today.

Officials said details of the revision had not been finalized this morning but that they included two alternatives — electing the board totally by district or by a combination at-large/district voting. Based on the proposed changes, one of these two options would be selected in late 1986. Currently, board members are elected at-large.

The changes were scheduled for review at noon and mid-afternoon meetings by the two boards.

A consolidated Pitt County board will govern the school

system created when Pitt and Greenville schools merge July 1.

The existing boards also were set to review a written agreement by a local civil rights group to back the election plan changes. The group, the Concerned Citizens for Justice, objects to the current at-large method of electing the consolidated board, saying it is discriminatory. Details of that agreement also had not been finalized early today.

Eddie West, superintendent of Pitt and Greenville schools, said the boards were to meet today "for the purpose of receiving an anticipated final legal briefing" from school board lawyer Mike Crowell. After the briefing, the "boards may be ready to consider action to resolve the legal impediments related to consolidation," he said.

The changes, if approved by local boards, will go to the N.C. Legislature for consideration during the session that starts Thursday. The changes will amend current merger legislation, which drew objections from civil rights advocates.

The U.S. Justice Department and the Concerned Citizens for Justice rejected the current merger plan, saying the at-large method of electing the school board discriminates against blacks.

The Civil Rights Act of 1965 requires Justice Department approval when changes in election methods dealing with the board's structure are made. In a review of the consolidated board's structure in May, the Justice Department ruled the election method discriminatory.

In January 1985 the Concerned Citizens objected to the lack of black representation on the consolidated board —

only one member was black — and asked the Justice Department to investigate alleged discrimination and illegal board operation.

In an attempt to improve black representation, three additional black members were appointed to the consolidated board in July 1985. The Concerned Citizens filed a lawsuit against the consolidated board in December 1985, asking that it not operate until the Justice Department approved the board structure. In May 1986 the Justice Department rejected the board's structure and method of election.

After lawyers for the two school boards met with members of the civil rights group Tuesday in an effort to reach an agreement, the boards discussed the proposed changes in separate executive sessions late Tuesday, then scheduled the meetings today.

Zoning Panel Backs Medical District Plan

The Greenville Zoning and Planning Commission recommended approval of the proposed expansion of the Pitt-Greenville Medical District after hearing requests and comments from citizens at a public hearing Tuesday night.

The commission recommended nine zoning changes and two use clarifications in the 1,800-acre medical park proposal designed to provide health services for eastern North Carolina. The plan was submitted by the Medical District Land Use Study Committee in December 1985.

The committee was asked by the City Council to provide an analysis of the medical district, identify current zoning and identify permitted uses in those zones, according to Bobby Roberson, director of planning and community development.

"The committee was also asked to determine which uses are objective and determine what uses are missing that are desirable in a medical district," Roberson said. "The committee was also asked to analyze a thoroughfare plan."

In alterations to the proposal, the

commissioners approved a request by Quadrangle Properties that about one-half acre of their property located on Memorial Drive, south of Fifth Street, be changed from MD-2 to MD-6.

The MD-2 zoning allows only med-

ical arts development, while MD-6 permits highway commercial construction.

The board also approved two requests by Emily Moye Hadley to have tracts reclassified.

Break-Ins Prompt Special Meeting

A series of recent break-ins on Arlington Boulevard resulted in a meeting Tuesday between several Arlington area merchants and city officials to discuss what could be done to reduce thefts in the area.

City Manager Gail Meeks said she, along with Police Chief Ted Holmes, police Captains Nelson Staton and R.M. Nichols and Mayor Leslie Garner, met with representatives of Great Southern Finance, Fickling Insurance Associates, Clark-Branch Realtors and Annie's Brides Beautiful.

"They expressed concern about the break-ins ... wanted to know if there was anything the city could do ... if there was anything they could do. They offered their support to the city in whatever way possible to help resolve the problem," Mrs. Meeks said. "I thought it was a very beneficial meeting."

According to Mrs. Meeks, "by all of us working together, I hope we can reduce the number of break-ins."

Reagan Stumps In N.C. For Broyhill's Campaign

President Reagan today criticized advocates of defense cuts, saying they should "tell it to the Marines," and campaigned in Greensboro for tax revision and his views on fair trade.

"To all of those who say we must

always cut defense first, that America can't afford a strong military, I have just one thing to say: Tell it to the Marines," Reagan told about 200 graduates who have completed an 11-week training course at Parris Island Marine Recruit Depot near Beaufort, S.C.

In an address later in Greensboro for a fund-raising event for Rep. James T. Broyhill, R-N.C., who is

running for the Senate, Reagan lauded Broyhill as a supporter of his plan to overhaul the federal tax code.

Turning to trade, however, he conceded that he and the GOP senatorial nominee may not always see eye to eye.

"I know there have been pains and strains here, pockets of industry that have not only not recovered but have gotten worse in some respects," the president said.

"There have been plant closings, and there have been farmers who've had it rough. We're not unaware of this back in Washington — we are totally aware of it, and part of the reason is Broyhill."

"We may not always see things eye to eye but we have the same desire — to make life better for the people of

Batch Of Social Security Checks Turn Up Missing

A large number of Social Security checks, possibly as many as 1,000, were not received nor delivered Tuesday by the Greenville Post Office.

Sonny Lancaster, supervisor of mails for the Greenville Post office, said it was apparent Monday while postal workers were processing Social Security checks to go out Tuesday that a large number of checks, possibly two trays holding

about 500 checks each, were not present. He said he believed then that the missing checks would come by Tuesday morning.

They did not and have not come in today, he said.

He said the Rocky Mount and Raleigh post office centers are checking to see what might have happened.

In the meantime, the Greenville Social Security Office is being deluged with calls — about 250 Tuesday, about 30 by 10 a.m. today.

"We want everyone who should have received a check and did not to call us as soon as possible," Fred W. Lilley, district Social Security office manager, said. He said calling will be better than writing or visiting the Social Security office, but that callers will probably have to cope with busy telephone lines. The telephone number is 758-7656.

Martin Wins Senate Runoff

Incumbent Sen. Robert L. Martin of Bethel defeated Jeanne Fenner of Wilson, for the Democratic nomination to the 6th Senate District seat in Tuesday's primary runoff election.

Unofficial returns gave Martin a 525-vote victory over Mrs. Fenner, who called for the runoff after trailing Martin by 460 votes in the May 6 primary. The total vote was 5,174 for Martin and 4,649 for Mrs. Fenner.

The six Pitt County precincts (Arthur, Belvoir, Bethel, Farmville, Falkland and Fountain) in the 6th District gave Martin 1,507 votes to Mrs. Fenner's 169, while the two

Martin County precincts (Robersonville Township) in the district voted 247 for Martin and 90 for Mrs. Fenner.

The 17 Edgecombe County precincts in the district voted 1,770 for Martin and 1,779 for Mrs. Fenner, while the 19 precincts in Mrs. Fenner's home county of Wilson (17 of the precincts are in Wilson Township) gave her 2,611 votes to Martin's 1,650.

In the May primary, Martin carried Pitt and Martin by large margins, while Mrs. Fenner carried Wilson and Edgecombe counties. Her biggest margin of victory was in Edgecombe County.

A former Pitt County commissioner and a retired Seaboard Coastline Railroad supervisor, Martin is completing his first term as a state senator.

Mrs. Fenner, who completed two terms as a member of the state House in 1984, was making her first bid for the Senate.

"I'm pleased with the excellent vote I received in the runoff," Martin said this morning. "It has been an honor to represent all the people in the 6th district in the Senate, and I look forward to continuing my work ... of improving education for our school children, protecting our family

farms and improving economic development in Eastern North Carolina."

According to Martin, "receiving the vote of the people is one of the highest honors one can receive in our society. I look forward to upholding the trust the people have placed in me and to bring a solid business-like approach to state government."

"I feel proud and honored," he said.

Efforts to reach Mrs. Fenner this morning were unsuccessful.

Martin has no Republican opposition in the November general election.

Foreign Service Isn't Easy For Couples In Different Countries

WASHINGTON — Like many professional couples, Jane A. Coon and her husband, Carleton S. Coon, have to balance the demands of their careers against the needs of their marriage. But their task became unusually difficult in 1981 when Mrs. Coon was appointed ambassador to Bangladesh and her husband became ambassador to Nepal.

For three years, the two ambassadors held their long-distance marriage together by flying often between Dhaka and Katmandu to visit. Despite the separation, Mrs. Coon, who is now the dean at the Foreign Service Institute, and her husband, who is retired, say the arrangement was worth it for their careers.

But for a growing number of spouses who both work for the Foreign Service, officially known as tandem couples, the choice is not easy.

There were 308 tandem couples in the Foreign Service in 1985, representing 8 percent of the Foreign Service work force and a 6 percent increase over 1984. Most couples are posted together, but when it is impossible to find posts suitable to the expertise and career levels of both spouses, the couple must choose between separation, leave without pay for one spouse, refusing promotion or quitting the Foreign Service.

"We cannot give them automatic priority because they are tandems," said Herman J. Cohen, deputy assistant secretary in the personnel office of the Foreign Service. "They still have to compete in open bidding against other people for their posts, and sometimes we have to force them to go where they are most needed."

One of the most difficult tasks for the Foreign Service is finding posts for couples in which spouses have the same speciality — a "cone" in State Department parlance — such as consular or economic affairs. Rules against nepotism prohibit spouses from supervising one another, with few exceptions.

The latest survey of tandem couples in the State Department showed that 233 were assigned together, 25 were separated by assignments to different posts and in 14 cases one spouse had taken leave without pay so as to remain together and hope that their next assignments would allow them tandem postings. There

are no figures on how many divorce, resign from the service or refuse promotions to solve their posting problems.

The problems of assigning married couples to overseas posts becomes more acute the longer they stay in the Foreign Service. Nearly half of the tandem couples couples are now mid-career officers who will soon be eligible for senior positions, increasing the likelihood that promotions will require them to supervise a spouse. The number of job slots available also diminishes as diplomats climb the promotion ladder.

"The future gets cloudier as you both rise through the ranks," said Barbara F. Hughes, who served with her husband, Morris, for three years in Moscow, is now back in Washington, as he is, and is not looking forward to the day when they are given separate assignments. "You have to turn down promotions and try for two good careers, rather than one great one. But if they post us together, they will have two Foreign Service officers dedicated for a lifetime."

Most couples say staying together is more important than staying in the Foreign Service. One couple, asking that their names not be used, said they would probably quit the Foreign Service given their choices when he becomes eligible for a post in which he would have to supervise his wife. Neither will take leave without pay, and neither wants to be separated from the other or their three children.

"It is a waste of talent and resources to train us for so many years and then make us choose between marriage and careers," he said. "If they don't show more flexibility, a lot of qualified people will leave and the entire service will be in gridlock."

He said the Foreign Service should allow more couples to work for one another. Four couples currently have such arrangements.

"We have been very flexible up to this point," Cohen said. "But if the number of tandem couples grows to more than 25 percent of the Foreign Service, we will have a hard time."

Julia A. Moore, who served with her husband, Harry C. Blaney, for three years in Belgium, says tandem couples sometimes run into resentment abroad from couples in which only one spouse holds a diplomatic assignment. Most nations forbid spouses of diplomats to work for private companies.

"Many wives of other officers were resentful because they were not allowed to hold a job, while I was working," Mrs. Moore said. "As more women enter the work force, it is going to be harder to fill overseas posts unless both spouses work for the Foreign Service." She and her husband are now on assignments in Washington.

Tandem couples are the only Foreign Service employees who can take leave without pay in order to remain together; a Foreign Service officer married to a non-government employee, for example, cannot take such a leave if ordered overseas and his wife chooses not to go along.

But taking leave without pay reduces the family income and can damage the career of the spouse who delays an assignment, said Blaney and Moore, who expect to be slated for overseas assignments again next year and probably to be forced to choose which of them will take leave without pay.

Kids Need To Know Death Is Fact Of Life

DEAR ABBY: My mother has a terminal illness and does not have much longer to live. I am struggling to find the answer to this question and I hope you can help me. (Perhaps a reader who has had to deal with it can be of help.) Should I let my 3-year-old son attend the funeral when the time comes? He is very close to his grandma. He spends a lot of time with her now because I go there daily to help out any way I can. He has trouble understanding why Grandma doesn't respond when he gives her hugs and kisses — and now she doesn't "know" him.

Should I take him to her funeral to say goodbye, or should I protect him from the pain? — A MOTHER'S LOVE

DEAR MOTHER'S LOVE: Let your son attend his grandma's funeral and explain that her life on earth has ended. Children need to know that all life ends in death — it's a fact of life. If they know the truth, they will not fear it. Give your son a chance to bid a final farewell to Grandma; it will make her death easier for him to accept.

DEAR ABBY: At what age should a sister and brother cease sleeping together? Our son is a little more than five years older than his sister, who is well-developed for her age. She says she becomes frightened during the night so she goes into her brother's bedroom and crawls into bed with him. (She sometimes stays all night.)

I've noticed a much closer bond between these two than with the other children in the family. I am concerned. My husband says he sees nothing wrong in this and becomes angry when I mention it.

I need advice. — CONCERNED MOTHER, COLUMBUS, GA.

DEAR CONCERNED: You do not say how old these children are, but a well-developed girl of any age should not be sleeping with her older brother.

If you suspect you have reason to be concerned, you should be. Quit speculating, and initiate some candid conversations with your daughter and your son, too. My mail tells me that there is far more "experimen-

ting" among preteen siblings than most parents realize.

DEAR ABBY: This is for "Henry from Freeport," who was astonished at how little most Americans knew about the Bahamas. Do you want to hear a better one?

A few years ago, while visiting some relatives in Napa Valley, Calif., I placed a long-distance telephone call to my husband in Newark, Del., and the operator asked me if Delaware was in the United States — or was it a foreign country! Unsaid

When a legislative panel endorsed putting a \$250,000 cap on damages awarded for pain and suffering by malpractice victims it was making a big decision with few facts to support its action.

"The only ones that will gain on this bill will be ... the insurance companies," says Sen. Jim Johnson of Cabarrus County. He claims the court record "just does not back up these humongous damages we keep hearing about."

Presumably he had in mind a recent Wake County damage suit seeking more than \$30 million.

Johnson reminds that not one person from the insurance industry came before the commission and said "if you make these changes, your rates will come down."

There was also a warning from Attorney General Lacy Thornburg who said legal limits on damages courts can award aren't needed. Maybe he was saying the courts may receive heavily inflated damage claims but actually award lesser amounts. It was something else that was left unsaid.

The lawmakers should have had facts before acting; not uncertain claims.

The Raleigh Times recently observed it is only legal fiction that most damage suits are strictly private disputes with no public interest involved. "The trial lawyer who begs for thumping punitive damages as an 'example' to scare a whole industry ignores that example's upward pressure on prices paid by every customer of the firm that is successfully sued."

Insurance industry critics complain those firms say a flood of litigation has cost them money, but refuse to open their books to validate the claim.

The attorney general sees a public need for the industry to provide facts on a very clouded picture; so, the proposed legislation would require insurance companies to inform the commissioner of their earnings and losses in North Carolina, changes in the premium base resulting from rating exposure trends, the percentage by which the companies seek to raise rates, investment income from loss reserves and unearned premium reserves, and other information specifically requested by the commissioner.

If the legislators don't know what they're doing, they'd do well to leave it alone.

Concert

The idea of a benefit concert for Chernobyl's victims is not so startling in itself but we must confess some surprise the project was a concept with Soviet origins.

On the whole it is a logical step. Western stars have minted millions of dollars for varied causes.

Some of the most popular Soviet pop and rock music performers were lined up to make music in a Moscow concert to raise money for the disaster fund. They had an indoor stadium which seats about 25,000 people and they expected to raise more than \$140,000 from ticket sales.

Their concert was recorded and videotaped for sales that will add to gate receipts. (They might even find a market on these shores.)

It's no secret the pop and rock music field is alive and active on the other side of the Iron Curtain but somehow the picture of earnest young Russians involved in a state-approved rock music event runs counter to images of their cultural discipline.

We hope they strike it rich.

Legislature Gets New Computer

RALEIGH — Legislators taking part in budget subcommittee meetings last week got their first look at the General Assembly's new \$3 million computer system.

Computer terminals were up and working in all five subcommittee rooms where legislators were doing preliminary work on adjustments to the fiscal 1987 budget. The terminals connected the committee rooms to

the state's departmental accounting system. That kind of access should permit legislators to get almost instantaneous answers to questions about state spending. In previous sessions, those answers could take days to be relayed back to the committees.

The Legislature has had computers for years. There is a computer in the library which tracks the movement

of bills, and staff has had access to computers for fiscal analysis, bill writing and word processing. Introduction of computers into committee rooms, however, marks the first step in a process that could equip each legislator with his own computer.

Glenn Newkirk, head of the recently created legislative computer division, says the assembly could choose to pursue a number of options regarding individual computers.

Legislators could be equipped with computer terminals in their offices, Newkirk said, an option that would cost only a couple hundred dollars for each legislator. Or, on the other extreme, legislators could be equipped with individual micro-computers and letter quality printers, and have those systems tied into the state system. That option, he said, would cost as much as \$10,000 per office.

Newkirk said he is also going to suggest another option. Let legislators buy their own computers and printers. The state would run a cable into the legislator's office and Newkirk would help legislators choose a compatible computer. This way, legislators could buy as much computer power as they choose, and they could use the computer for anything they wanted.

The assembly will soon have a computer improvement which the public should appreciate. Beginning with the 1987 session, anyone will be able to call a special number in Raleigh and, using a touch tone tele-

phone, check on the status of any bill before the legislature. Using a voice synthesizer, the computer would tell you, for example, that a Senate Bill 27 has passed the Senate and is before the House Local Government II Committee.

Politicians always like to help each other out, especially when they can cross party lines to do so. Take, for example, the telephone call Rep. Theresa Esposito, R-Forsyth, got from an irate Winston-Salem homeowner.

"She told me she was very upset that a pipe was being run through her backyard," Mrs. Esposito said. After calming the woman down, Mrs. Esposito tried to explain to her that she needed to talk with city officials, not a state legislator.

"She said, 'Well, I just called Steve Neal's office and they told me to call you,'" Mrs. Esposito said. Neal is the local congressman and a Democrat.

Mrs. Esposito said, "Wait til I see Steve. I'm going to tell him, 'Thanks a lot.'"

Sen. Henson Barnes, D-Wayne, tried to explain to reporters why his colleague, Rep. Charles Woodard, D-Wayne, is already talking about running for the House again, only days after losing a bid for renomination.

"Politics gets in your blood so thick that only two things will get it out — two straight losses and embalming fluid."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The politics of the Senate's decision to enter the age of television was this simple: for seven years members of the House with an inclination to run against senators have gained the edge on local news coverage.

That's what Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., was talking about when he referred to the Senate as the "invisible half of Congress." The Senate minority leader said that "today,

many Americans think their Congress consists only of the House of Representatives."

In the competitive business that is politics, it did not serve senators' interests to have the voters back home watching local congressmen on the House floor while the Senate chamber remained off limits to television.

The curmudgeons who continue to predict dire consequences from the

"intrusive eye of television" seem most concerned about people who will watch the gavel-to-gavel coverage on cable systems served by C-SPAN, the Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network. But proponents of televising the Senate sensed the more important audience was the millions of people who watch local news shows.

What will happen to that hallowed Senate institution, the filibuster?

With cameras watching will senators no longer dare try to talk legislation to death? Don't bet on it.

Television might even restore the filibuster to its earlier form, when senators truly talked for hours and kept the chamber in session around the clock. Those were the days when filibusters offered the kind of drama that insomniacs could sink their teeth into.

Filibusters today are only pale versions of the battles of the 1960s and before. They are too gentlemanly. They operate on agreements to adjourn for the day and pick up when senators can return, rested and bright-eyed for the next session.

Will viewers slumped in front of their sets become appalled by the frequent quorum calls, the Senate's version of timeouts? Unlike the timeouts in basketball, quorum calls can last for several minutes and occasionally for hours and there is no limit on the number.

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., a supporter of televising the Senate, pointed out that people will have to understand "sometimes it seems like nothing is happening on the Senate floor and, in fact, nothing is happening."

Yet, for all of that, the Senate is an institution with its own peculiar fascination. It is an arena in which operate 100 colossal egos trying to satisfy driving ambition. It can be an addictive show.

But what tipped the balance to television was not the cable audience and what they might or might not see.

The key was what Stephen Hess of the Brookings Institution calls "the growth industry" in the news business, local television news.

Hess has spent years studying news coverage of the government and his latest book focused on the Senate.

He predicts that when senators vote next month on whether to continue televising their sessions "the vote will overwhelmingly be to make it permanent."

The issue is not gavel-to-gavel coverage, he said, it's the availability of snippets of floor debate for the local news shows.

Reagan Makes His Decision

WASHINGTON — The wonder of President Reagan's overdue decision to renounce the unratified, expired SALT II treaty is that it was made outside the strategic planning vacuum that has marred and then killed other administration undertakings.

The decision that the United States no longer feels bound by SALT II ceilings, barring an unlikely Soviet conversion to rectitude, was personally considered longer, harder and with greater imagination by Ronald Reagan than perhaps any decision of his administration. Unlike such non-starters as the 1982 Mideast "peace plan," the SALT II decision was not made in a vacuum.

Thus, even though Secretary of State George Shultz, a Reagan insider with big clout, and the highly regarded arms control adviser, Ambassador Paul Nitze, fought to prevent it, this is one Reagan decision the president will insist on keeping intact.

What elevated the case of SALT II above the strategic vacuum in which other administration policies have been born, then quickly snuffed out for lack of sustenance, was the way the decision was made. If former national security adviser Robert McFarlane had still been holding forth at his desk near the Oval Office, it might not have been made at all.

McFarlane was an arms control adherent, within limits. He had a certain congeniality with Shultz on

this issue that was not matched on some others. But McFarlane's successor, Adm. John Poindexter, has no arms control background and no commitment one way or the other. He is a highly pragmatic devotee of a hardball U.S. policy when it comes to dealing with the Soviets.

So it was only natural that when serious communications were sent to President Reagan from astute Senate critics of SALT II, Poindexter fulfilled the role he has laid out for himself as McFarlane's successor: not a policy man but a highly efficient paper processor who does not consider it his job to censure the president's reading. "He shuffled the hard-line stuff right onto the president's desk," an administration official told us.

That opened the Oval Office door to one of the most prolific information campaigns ever mounted by Senate Reaganites and pro-defense Democrats. They offered in detail a strong strategic foundation to fit Reagan's emotional reaction against SALT II. They provided compelling evidence covering all important SALT II points as to why the U.S. should no longer abide by the treaty.

The result was to give Reagan the intellectual muscle he needed to match his gut instincts. It warned of the probable future results of Soviet non-compliance with SALT II. It alerted Reagan to such collateral issues as the credibility of American

diplomacy if, after his repeated threats to withdraw from the treaty, he ordered compliance continued a third time. The first was the 1981 "no undercut" decision; the second was last summer's decision to cut up the Sam Rayburn, a Poseidon submarine, to stay under the SALT II ceiling.

Major elements of this Senate campaign by Republicans James McClure, Pete Wilson, Dan Quayle, Orrin Hatch and Democrat Ernest (Fritz) Hollings have been widely reported, but not all. The Hollings role, for example, was critical in bringing both Attorney General Edwin Meese and White House chief of staff Donald T. Regan into the action, playing blocking roles against Shultz's counterattack.

Hollings was prepared to sue in federal court to forbid compliance with SALT II on the constitutional grounds that an unratified treaty has no legal standing. Hatch was planning a hearing on the same issue before his Senate Constitution Subcommittee. Meese warned Regan that an unwinnable constitutional battle with Reaganites over arms control could devastate the president and his party. All this fit Reagan's own convictions.

Left hanging is the 1986 summit, which Reagan would like to host after the November elections. If Gorbachev cancels, it would be an abrupt reversal that would hurt not Reagan but the Soviet leader. He pronounced the Geneva summit a success and pinned his U.S. policy to negotiations, not confrontation. A regret now to Reagan would make his earlier posture look naive. It would also torpedo his unprecedented reunion-of-families concession, pushed so hard by the U.S.

But Reagan has scored points on Gorbachev with his reduction of Soviet personnel at the U.N., his attack on Soviet ally Libya, the presence of Navy snoopers close to Soviet Black Sea shores and the inevitable exploitation of Chernobyl.

The president would like a summit, but his new arms control strategy and the broader view he is shaping — with help from his Senate allies — of the U.S.-Soviet strategic struggle are not for sentiment.

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Pat's Pointers

Dear Pat: I know how to make a "yarnover" in knitting, but for the life of me, I can't figure out how to do it in crocheting. Can you help? — Jo S.

Dear Jo: If you have crocheted at all, you have probably been making yarnovers without realizing it. In knitting, this is a separate procedure, but in crocheting, it refers to wrapping the yarn once around the hook before working the next step. For example, when you wrap the yarn around the hook before starting a double crochet, you are making a yarnover.

Dear Pat: I am a beginner in crochet and am having trouble with my decreases, especially when I have to space them. I would like to know if you decrease the same in crochet as you do in knitting. — Leona E., Youngstown, Ohio

Dear Leona: Simple crochet decreases are similar to knit ones in that you work two stitches together. The method of doing so is quite different, however. To decrease, you may be told something like this: "dc in each of next 2 sts, holding back last lps of each st, you and thru all loops." It's no wonder that many beginners don't know what to do.

Unabbreviated, this means: "Work a double crochet in each of the next two stitches, holding back the last loops of each stitch. Next, yarnover and pull the hook through all the loops on the hook." Still confused? If so, read on.

To do the above, work a double crochet to the point where you have two loops on the hook. Leaving these two loops on the hook, work a double crochet in the next stitch to the point where you have a total of three loops on the hook. Then, wrap the yarn around the hook (yarnover) and draw this yarn through all the loops on the hook at once. You will now have one stitch where you previously had two.

This same decrease can be worked with single, half-double or triple crochet stitches. Just remember to always work to the point just before you are to yarnover and pull through the loops for the last time in any stitch, then work the next stitch, pulling the hook through all loops on the hook for the final step.

To decrease at the beginning of a row, you will sometimes be told to slip-stitch across a certain number of stitches. At the end of a row, you might be told to simply leave some stitches unworked and turn the work before reaching the row's end. If you are not given specific instructions for decreasing, as is usually done with involved pattern stitches, you will be safe in using the methods described above.

To decrease "evenly spaced across the row," you would work just as you do in knitting. With a small number of decreases — say four — you can visually mark off the row in fourths. With a large number of decreases, it is usually better to divide the total

The market will also be open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m., and Fridays from 1-7 p.m.

Ms. Whitehurst was hired as manager of the market Monday at the Pitt County Board of Commissioners meeting.

The Greenville native has worked

at the farmers' market for five years selling produce.

Her responsibilities will now include coordinating the sellers' meeting at the site, as well as supervising general activities.

Future plans for the market may also include selling fresh seafood, she said. But for now, customers can choose from a fresh array of collards, salads, cabbage, turnips, onions, garden peas, string beans and broccoli, Ms. Whitehurst said.

"I hope the new building (which is scheduled to be completed by July 21) will bring more people to the market. It'll also be much cooler for the sellers to be under a shelter," she said.

Vending machines and restrooms will also be included in the building, Ms. Whitehurst said.

The cost of selling produce at the market is \$2 a day, she said.

Farmville Cuts Charges For Water, Sewer Service

FARMVILLE — Farmville commissioners Tuesday night adopted a new water-sewer costs and rates schedule which would decrease fees to both residential and commercial users.

The adjustment in rate will mean an approximate savings of \$5.87 a year for the average residential customer, they said.

A public hearing was held to set the assessment on improvements to South Pitt Street from Prince Road. There was no comment from the public. The only property owners involved, Dalton L. Cannon and Jesse J. Brady, were not present, but had earlier indicated their willingness to each be assessed one-third of the cost of the improvements. The cost was \$3,972.34, nearly \$100 less than had been estimated.

It was announced that an auction of town surplus property will be held Saturday at 9:30 a.m. at the athletic

field on Horne Avenue. June 14 will be a rain date.

A public hearing was set for July 1 on the rezoning of a section of town bordered by Church Street on the south, Walnut Street on the east, May Boulevard on the west and the city limits on the north. Ninety percent of the zoning changes proposed are from light industrial to various classifications of residential.

A public hearing was also set for July 1 on amending Section 21.5.1 of the zoning ordinance to lengthen the time of discontinuance of use for a nonconforming property from 6 to 18 months.

Based on a unanimous recommendation from the planning board, the board accepted the final plan of the subdivision to be called North Ridge a few hundred feet west of Joyner Crossroads (the intersection of N.C. 121 and State Road 1200) on the south side of State Road 1200. The subdivision is being developed by Alex Allen III and David Stowe.

The board approved the mayor's reappointment of Eloise Caraway to the library board for a term to expire June 30, 1989.

A workshop meeting on the town budget was set for June 18.

Methodists Oppose Nuke Test

DURHAM (AP) — A resolution calling for the United States to stop testing nuclear weapons and seeking a test ban with the Soviet Union has been passed by the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The test ban resolution passed during the denomination's conference at Duke University Tuesday said the Soviets declared their own moratorium on underground nuclear tests last August.

If the president does not agree to a testing ban, money for such tests should be cut off, the resolution said.

"There are more Christians in the Soviet Union than there are members of the Communist Party," said Mark Wehington of Roanoke Rapids, a supporter of the test ban resolution. "We are in effect aiming our nuclear weapons at fellow Christians."

Wehington said the issue should unite people rather than divide them. "A nuclear war cannot ever be won and must never be fought," he said.

But Rod Tripp of Southern Pines opposed the resolution, saying it was unnecessary.

"The word of the Almighty tells me how the world will end, and when it does, He will be in control," Tripp said.

Tripp told the body that God would not permit the world to be destroyed by nuclear weapons — at least not yet.

He read from the Matthew 24:6: "And you will hear of wars and rumors of wars; see that you are not alarmed; for this must take place, but the end is not yet."

Tripp also read the 14th verse of the same chapter.

"And this gospel of the kingdom will be preached throughout the whole world, as a testimony to all nations; and then the end will come."

Tripp said after the meeting that many parts of the world have yet to hear the word of God.

"Until the world has heard it," he said, "the world will not end."

A more comprehensive resolution

that urges rapid reductions in nuclear arsenals and opposes President Reagan's Star Wars initiative was put off until Thursday.

That resolution calls for support of an eight-page bishops' report called "Defense of Creation: The Nuclear Crisis and a Just Peace."

The report's recommendations include urging both the United States and the Soviet Union to promise not to strike first in a nuclear confrontation.

Commissioners recommended Ms. Hadley's property with frontage on West Fifth Street near N.C. 43 be rezoned from MD-3 to MD-6 and about 10 acres located on N.C. 43, adjacent to Moye Boulevard, be changed from MD-1 to MD-2.

The MD-3 zoning allows for office and industry, and MD-1 permits only health care construction.

Commissioners recommended that property owned by Bryant Kittrell on N.C. 43, adjacent to Senior Village, be changed from MD-3 to MD-5. The MD-5 zoning allows high-density residential development.

The board recommended three zoning changes to property owned by Taft & Taft. Commissioners approved changing two tracts of land in the medical park complex from MD-3 to MD-5 and about 15 acres on the corner of Stantonsburg and Allen roads from MD-3 to MD-4.

The MD-4 zoning permits shopping center development.

The board recommended changing about 2.5 acres owned by Mel Joyner from MD-5 to MD-3, and approximately 20 acres owned by Hilda Upton from MD-2 to MD-7.

The board also approved a request by Bill Taylor, owner of ABC Moving & Storage, to make moving and storage a permitted use in the MD-6 zoning classification. Under the original plan, a special use permit would have been required to build similar warehouses.

Commissioners recommended that special use permits to build car washes be allowed in MD-6 zoned areas.

Landowners who object to the proposed changes included in the medical district plan now may go before

the City Council to protest the action, Roberson said. The council has the final approval on the plan.

Some local officials who spoke at the meeting supported the efforts of the commission and the land use study commission.

"I support the concept of the medical study area and urge the commission to recommend to the council that its integrity be maintained," said Dr. William E. Laupus, dean of ECU School of Medicine. "We believe that the core of this area in and around the medical center needs the preservation of appropriate zoning and planning."

Laupus said the medical district will have strong impact on the community.

"This plan will ultimately benefit Greenville and Pitt County by bringing all of these activities to the area, making it possible to recruit businesses," he said. "We're looking for the types of industry that will provide the buildings and support groups needed in the general area."

Robert Adams, executive director of the Medical Foundation of East Carolina University, said school and hospital officials need to know what is going to happen to the land in the medical district.

"We need, in order to do any strategic planning whatsoever, a plan that won't change at every drop of the hat," Adams said. "It is needed in order for the health services to become totally comprehensive and regionalized for our entire area of state."

"In order for that area to become a medical campus where all health professions have room and space, we need to know what is going to happen there."

ECU Chancellor John Howell said the plan will not be pleasing to all the landowners involved, but he stressed the importance of the medical district.

our country and the people of this region. That's why we will continue to press for that level playing field through fair trade actions in every area," Reagan said.

The president is battling against protectionist legislation in Congress that has strong support in North Carolina and other areas hard hit by competition from abroad.

On the tax issue, Reagan said Broyhill "supports true tax reform — reform that makes the tax code similar and fair for all Americans while preserving incentives for businesses to create new jobs."

Broyhill is the Republican nominee to succeed GOP Sen. John East, who decided against seeking re-election for health reasons. His Democratic opponent is Terry Sanford, a former governor and university president.

In his speech to the Marine graduates, Reagan said "America didn't become great because we took the easy road."

Reagan has proposed a defense budget of \$320 billion, but the House has trimmed it to \$285 billion and the Senate to \$301 billion. The two versions are awaiting action by a House-Senate conference committee. "Sometimes I'd like to take some of those people in Washington who

are always trying to cut defense spending and bring them here to Parris Island — or to Fort Jackson, Orlando, or Lackland," Reagan said. "And I'd tell them, these are the soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines who are putting their lives on the line to keep America free," he said.

"If we ever must send our young servicemen in harm's way, then it's our moral duty to give them absolutely the best equipment and support that American can muster."

"I promise that I will fight as hard as I know how to make sure you get the support you deserve," the president said.

Reporters accompanying the president were advised to wear insect repellent for his visit to the mosquito-plagued marsh where Marine Corps recruits clamber over obstacles called the Monkey Bridge, the A Frame and the Slide for Life.

The obstacles — arrangements of logs, ropes and cables averaging as much as 35 feet high — are part of a 12-obstacle "Confidence Course" at the recruit depot.

Reagan, who frequently pays tribute to members of the armed forces in his public remarks, lunched with troops at Ft. Myer, Va., on May 17 and laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery on May 26, the Memorial Day holiday.

Ala., has confirmed that all checks for Pitt County residents — about 13,000 — were written and went out in the mails. All the missing checks seem to be those sent to the Greenville ZIP code, no other in the county, he said.

He said Social Security policy calls for three working days to be given the postal service to find missent checks. If they are not received by Friday, action will be taken to get the checks reprinted.

"We hope this isn't going to be necessary," he said, "because it's starting over and there will be no records in the Treasury Department to go by. We'll have to submit a list based on the phone calls we receive and it will all take time — possibly from two to three weeks."

"We know this much of a time lag will work hardship on a lot of people who depend on their Social Security to live. We're just hoping against hope that the checks are going to show up in the mails very soon."

Lilley said he was hopeful because it was reported Tuesday that the Goldsboro and Henderson post of-

ices were also missing sizeable numbers of checks and theirs showed up today.

Enrollment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Enrollment at the nation's four-year public colleges and universities held steady in 1985, with more part-time and fewer full-time students on the campuses, an association reported.

The American Association of State Colleges and Universities said its survey also turned up an unexpected 3 percent increase in the number of first-time, full-time freshman at the public campuses.

"No change in society, even if the change is for the better, comes without some trauma to its separate members," Howell said.

"I support the development of the ECU medical park because such a facility will afford more and better opportunities in ongoing research and make skills and services available."

Meanwhile, Terry Shank of the League of Women Voters said her group supports the proposal.

"We support the city in its planning effort," she said. "With the ownership of property comes the responsibility of stewardship especially when it deals with public, economic and social issues."

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Broyhill Race Pins Hope On Reagan Visit

Strategists for Jim Broyhill say they think it's good politics to associate Broyhill's candidacy with President Reagan, who was making his first campaign appearance for the Republican U.S. Senate candidate today.

The strategists say Reagan's popularity remains high in North Carolina despite the president's strict free-trade policy.

Broyhill, a 24-year congressional veteran, has proclaimed the Senate race a referendum on Reagan's

presidency. He says North Carolinians face a choice between a senator who would support the president's program and one who would not.

Reagan was the star attraction at a \$500 per person luncheon in Greensboro — an important event for Broyhill, who has pinned his hopes of defeating Democrat Terry Sanford on his staunch support of the president.

"The president's coming this early in the campaign shows how important it is to him that Jim Broyhill wins this Senate race," said Doug Haynes, communications director

for the Broyhill campaign. Sanford, a former governor, says the election cannot be cast in those terms. "A referendum?" he asked rhetorically on the campaign trail last week. "You mean if I win, he (Reagan) is going to step down?"

"I believe the people of North Carolina want a U.S. senator who is going to stand up for the people of North Carolina," Sanford added. "I really don't think they want a go-along senator."

Broyhill denies trying to ride Reagan's coattails when he is not on the ballot, but says voters must real-

ize that giving Democrats control of the Senate would seriously impede continuation of the "Reagan revolution."

Strategists say the president's appearance would further the process of reconciliation within the state GOP in the aftermath of the bitter primary battle between Broyhill and David Funderburk, former U.S. ambassador to Romania.

Although the general election campaign has barely gotten under way and many voters' thoughts are elsewhere, Reagan's visit comes none too early, Haynes and other

Broyhill partisans said. Additionally, it is hoped that the event will inspire Broyhill supporters to contribute early and often.

"This is really designed more as a fund-raiser than revving up the troops," said Chris Shields, communications director of the state GOP. He and Haynes said they hoped Reagan would return at least once this fall, when the campaign hits full stride.

The GOP holds a slim 53-47 majority in the Senate, but 22 GOP seats are up for election this year, while only 12 Democratic seats are open. In North Carolina, Republican Sen. John East is not seeking re-election because of poor health.

Reagan, who received 61 percent of the North Carolina vote en route to landslide re-election in 1984, angered the state's textile interests and congressional delegation last year by vetoing a bill that would have reduc-

ed the flow of textile and shoe imports from the Far East.

Forestry Service Curbs Peat Mining

RALEIGH (AP) — After hearing from conservationists, federal forestry officials have reworked their long-range management plan for the Croatan and Uwharrie national forests.

In the final plan issued Tuesday, officials banned peat mining in the federally owned parts of the Croatan National Forest in coastal Craven, Jones and Carteret counties and limited how often longleaf pine trees may be cut to provide more homes for rare red-cockaded woodpeckers.

In the Uwharrie National Forest in the southeastern Piedmont, which contains many private holdings, the U.S. Forest Service said it planned to increase its land purchases from about 150 acres per year to about 1,000 acres.

Criticism of an earlier draft of the plan played a role in the changes, officials said.

The forest service received 303 letters commenting on the draft, said Robert S. Cunningham, director of planning and environmental coordination for the national forests in North Carolina.

"It appeared we were able to respond to most of all the letters we had. We're very pleased about it," he said in a telephone interview from Asheville.

Robert B. Smythe of Chapel Hill, the conservation chairman of the North Carolina chapter of the Sierra Club, agreed.

"It represents a very positive response by the forest service to overwhelming expressions of public desire for a change in management for these forests," Smythe said. "They didn't do everything we asked for, but we are not unreasonable."

Sentence

CHARLOTTE (AP) — U.S. District Judge Robert Potter has refused to reduce the maximum 30-year sentence he gave a convicted bank robber last July, saying he would have given the man more time if it was allowed.

"If the maximum had been more than 30 years, I'd have given it," Potter said in refusing a request to reduce the sentence of Emery Edward Bell. "I have without a doubt never seen a case as bad."

During the Feb. 8, 1985, robbery of a bank, Bell shot and wounded a 17-year-old customer in both legs and the right hand.

"Here's a perfectly innocent child — who couldn't even graduate from her class — shot by this fellow," Potter said. "I have no sympathy whatever."

3 Out Of 5 Blacks Fail Teachers Exam

RALEIGH (AP) — Three of every five black college students who took the National Teachers Examination in North Carolina last fall failed a key portion and thus did not win certification to teach.

The high failure rate among blacks on the professional skills test — 60.7 percent — compared with 9.4 percent for whites. Overall, 21.9 percent failed.

Almost a fifth of the students who failed statewide attended one of the five predominantly black campuses of the University of North Carolina system. Results from the October 1985 testing were provided by the Department of Public Instruction at the request of The News and Observer of Raleigh.

The test is offered three times annually, and the October results are the most recent available.

Several private colleges that are predominantly black had even higher failure rates in programs that have dwindled to only a handful of students. At St. Augustine's College, all five students who took the test failed; at Shaw University, four of five failed.

"They're horrifying scores," said Carl J. Dolce, dean of education at North Carolina State University. "They're distressing because individuals who have devoted their time and money to preparing to become teachers will not be able to pursue their chosen occupation."

In addition to the high failure rates among blacks, test results showed that six UNC campuses had worse scores than the 20 percent failure level set by the General Administra-

tion. The scores also showed that the UNC system's five predominantly black campuses — Elizabeth City State, Fayetteville State, North Carolina A&T, N.C. Central and Winston-Salem State — were among the top 10 institutions in North Carolina with the lowest mean scores.

Phone Revenge

GRETNA, La. (AP) — A woman charged with harassing her ex-boyfriend by telephoning him 377 times and hanging up has been accused of 48 more counts, authorities said.

Michelle Alexie, 18, is accused of calling her ex-boyfriend at his job and hanging up, over and over again, said an investigator for the Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Department.

Authorities said she called her former boyfriend to vent her anger after he jilted her. The calls averaged 13 a minute on a telephone not equipped with speed-dialing, they said.

Ms. Alexie was unavailable for comment — her telephone has been disconnected.

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Grenade

CREEDMOOR (AP) — About 750 people were evacuated from South Granville High School after a military-style smoke grenade set off dense, white non-toxic smoke through the building's hallways and classrooms, authorities say.

Seventeen students and a teacher were taken to area hospitals after the incident, which occurred about noon Tuesday. All but one of the injured had been released from hospitals Tuesday afternoon, according to authorities.

One student was admitted to Granville County Hospital for observation, a hospital spokesman said. The injured complained of sore throats, nausea and other symptoms of smoke inhalation.
An investigation was under way.

Probation

RALEIGH (AP) — A Raleigh man whose conviction and life sentence on a charge that he raped his 3-year-old daughter were overturned last year by the state Supreme Court has been placed on probation.

In exchange for his freedom, Francis V. Fearing gave up his parental rights permanently and agreed not to see or communicate with his daughter for at least five years.

Fearing was released after Wake County Superior Court Judge Anthony Brannon imposed the sentence that was part of a plea bargain struck last month.

Fearing has been in prison since he was convicted Sept. 28, 1984, in Wake County Superior Court of first-degree rape, incest and taking indecent liberties with his daughter in 1983, when she was 3.

Brannon found the child too young to testify, based on an agreement between the prosecutor and Fearing's trial attorneys. Brannon did allow a doctor, nurses and social worker to testify that they had heard the girl say her father assaulted her.

Groundbreaking

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Twenty years after the University of North Carolina started asking for the building, school officials broke ground for the \$16.3 million center for the School of Public Health.

The Public Health and Environmental Sciences Center, scheduled for completion in December 1988, will replace numerous small buildings and trailers.

The 120,000-square-foot center will double the school's classroom, laboratory and office space. The General Assembly approved funds for

Sea Turtles

RALEIGH (AP) — The remains of eight sea turtles that may have drowned in shrimp fishermen's nets have washed up on the beaches of Bogue Banks near Morehead City, officials say.

The Marine Resources Center has found the carcasses of seven loggerhead turtles and one leatherback turtle on nearby beaches since April 21, Tim H. Handsel, the center's aquarium coordinator, said Tuesday. "Anytime you start getting multiple casualties in sea turtles, it would be unusual," Handsel said.

"We think they ... are accidentally getting caught in (shrimp) nets," Handsel said. "They can't escape the net, and then panic and they end up drowning. Trawlers, when they're out there dragging, can sometimes keep their nets down for up to two hours. Sea turtles are like land turtles, they have to breathe air. They can only stay down about two minutes."

Workers Killed

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Two Charlotte men died early today when they apparently were overcome by fumes while using a caustic solution to clean the inside of a tanker truck, officials said.

The workers, identified as Clyde Hendershot, 23, of Belmont and Richard B. Enfinger, 18, of Gastonia, were cleaning a tanker that contained a latex resin. They were working at the Central Transport Co. in Charlotte.

Medical officials said the bodies were found by another worker about 2 a.m.

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Yelena Bonner Rejoining Husband In Soviet Exile

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet dissident Yelena Bonner said farewell to friends in Moscow at the end of a six-month respite from internal exile and boarded a train for Gorky to be reunited in isolation with her husband, Andrei D. Sakharov.

Mrs. Bonner, 63, told Western reporters before she left Moscow late Tuesday that she was very tired, but felt much better after undergoing heart surgery and receiving treat-

ment for glaucoma in the West.

She said she was "very happy to be going back to my husband," who has been living in forced exile in Gorky, 250 miles east of Moscow, since 1980.

Sakharov, a renowned physicist who helped develop the Soviet hydrogen bomb, won the 1975 Nobel Peace Prize for his human rights activities and was sent to Gorky for speaking out against the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan in

December 1979.

Mrs. Bonner said she expected Sakharov to meet her at the Gorky train station if he was granted permission by the KGB secret police. She was to arrive early today on an overnight train, but there was no confirmation of her arrival from Gorky, which is closed to Westerners.

Among the five friends who saw Mrs. Bonner off at the Moscow train

station were Robert Arsenault of Washington and Richard Sobol of Cambridge, Mass., who traveled with her from the United States and had hoped to accompany her to Gorky. Soviet authorities refused to allow them to travel to Gorky.

Arsenault said although "it was very sad, she's extremely strong ... and she feels good about going to her husband."

Mrs. Bonner said she and her

children, who live in Newton, Mass., had agreed that the children would place a telephone call to Gorky on the first Monday of each month.

The 65-year-old Sakharov and Mrs. Bonner do not have a telephone in Gorky, and they must go to a post office to receive international calls.

Mrs. Bonner said she hopes to be back in Moscow by June 15 to collect some baggage she sent as cargo from the West. "I want to see my husband

and to rest a bit. If I'm not back here by the 15th (of June), then they haven't let me come."

Soviet authorities confined Mrs. Bonner to Gorky in August 1984 after she was convicted of anti-Soviet slander. Before being restricted to Gorky, she traveled to Moscow once a month, buying supplies and maintaining links to the outside world by meeting with foreigners and diplomats.

North Pitt Teacher Gets Langston Award For Work In Cultural Arts

Jim Shallow, chairman of the vocational department at North Pitt High School, was presented the Bonnie Langston Award at the final scheduled meeting of the existing Pitt County Board of Education Tuesday.

The award, in memory of the late Ms. Langston, a teacher at A.G. Cox Grammar School, is presented each year to a teacher who provides the greatest support to the cultural arts teachers and program in the schools while serving in the capacity of a regular teacher.

Shallow was cited for his support of North Pitt's cultural arts program, including constructing a stage set on rollers, assembling art displays, decorating for proms and arranging for donations to the program.

A plaque was presented to Shallow and one was given to North Pitt Principal Josh Potter for display in the school.

Teacher Ruby Jackson expressed several concerns to the board on behalf of the staff of D.H. Conley High School. She said the faculty was interested in receiving an agenda in advance of the meeting, was concerned about specific budget cuts and was interested in suggestions on how teachers could help the board. She said faculty members wanted to know if the board could schedule meetings so that teachers could attend.

Board Chairman Mark W. Owens Jr. told Ms. Jackson that the staff at Conley would receive the board's written answers to the questions.

The meeting was the last scheduled monthly session of the board before merger of the Pitt County and Greenville school systems is completed. A joint board would serve the consolidated school system.

The board approved a school fee schedule to be implemented systemwide for the 1986-87 school year. The distribution of instructional fees, which include a \$7 fee for all elementary school students and a \$6 fee for all high school students, will be left to the determination of each principal. The intent of the money collected is to insure appropriate support of all program areas.

A \$1 fee will be charged for certain high school classes, and funds provided by the school system from current expense will supplement the student fees. The supplement will be determined by the number of students enrolled in the course.

A \$1 yearly fee will be charged for the following classes: science course with a laboratory, vocational courses, club fees, distributive education, industrial arts, art, workbooks, band or strings instrument and newspaper. A fee of \$1 a semester will be charged for typing, and a student will pay \$1.50 a year for the use of a lock in physical education

or shop. A student parking sticker will cost \$10 a year.

An account auditing contract submitted by Michael V. Joyner of Joyner and Hatcher CPAs was accepted by the board. According to the contract, the audit will cost the school system \$13,700 and it will be completed by Oct. 31 of this year. The contract will cover auditing requirements for the period beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986. The same firm performed the school systems' last audit.

After reviewing bank service bids presented by six independent banks, the board voted to accept a contract with Wachovia Bank for bank accounts for the Pitt County and Greenville City schools.

A "state of the schools" report was presented in the form of a slide presentation. The report was narrated by Superintendent Edwin L. West Jr.

Personnel recommendations relative to employment and resignations were approved by the board.

The board approved the disposal of paper copies of Pitt County School records from 1960-1980 which have been microfilmed and indexed.

The schools earned \$26,190 in fines and forfeitures for the month of May. This figure received in \$10,357 above the amount projected to be earned for the month.

Informational items presented to the board included an evaluation report on exceptional children and academically gifted children and a

monthly report on the use of the schools systems' facilities.

The board went into executive session to discuss a legal matter, but no action was taken.

A reception in honor of the board members was held following the meeting. Each member of the board was presented with a plaque.

Daily Reflector staff writer Mary Schulken was presented a plaque for her seven years of service covering the board as a reporter.

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Farm Fresh Joins In Grocery Merger

HAMPTON ROADS, Va. (AP) — Farm Fresh Inc. and Open Air Markets Inc., the two major grocery chains in Hampton Roads, have announced plans to merge in an exchange of stock valued at about \$43 million.

Farm Fresh would exchange eight-tenths of a share of its stock for each of the 3.6 million outstanding shares of Open Air stock, according to a merger agreement signed Monday by the two Norfolk-based companies.

The signing concludes negotiations

that were first acknowledged by the two companies in early April.

"Together the companies will be better able to serve the customers than either would alone," Farm Fresh President Eugene Walters and Joseph A. Vita Jr., president of Open Air, said in a joint statement.

The companies said that if the transaction is completed, they would continue to operate under both the Farm Fresh and Open Air names.

Farm Fresh operates 39 stores, including six in the Richmond area and 10 in North Carolina. All of Open Air's 23 supermarkets and 49 convenience stores are in Hampton Roads.

The transaction is subject to approval to stockholders of both companies. The companies said the merger could take place by the end of September.

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Celts Spell Relief W-a-l-t-o-n

HOUSTON (AP) — Last season when Boston center Robert Parish got tired, he often had to ignore his fatigue and continue playing. But this season Coach K.C. Jones learned that relief is spelled B-I-L-L-W-A-L-T-O-N.

Parish hit 10 of 15 shots, scored 22 points and contained Ralph Sampson in the second half to put the Celtics in position to win Game Four Tuesday

night in their NBA playoff against the Houston Rockets.

But it took a relief performance by Walton in the final three minutes and a crucial three-point basket by Larry Bird to preserve a 106-103 Boston victory.

Walton's performance allowed the Celtics to take a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series. They can win their

16th NBA title with a victory in The Summit Thursday night.

But Parish isn't the only tired Celtics player ready for vacation time — and forward Kevin McHale likes Boston's position.

"Three-one is a good place to be," McHale said. "Everyone knows how close we are, and we don't want to extend it any more than necessary.

That would give us a chance to go on vacation."

After a tight struggle throughout the fourth quarter, Bird took a feed from Walton and sank a three-point basket with 2:27 to play that broke a 101-101 tie and gave the Celtics the lead for good.

With 1:40 to go, Walton's tip-in made it 106-103. Neither team scored the rest of the way.

Having Walton to come on in relief of Parish was a key strategy move for Jones in the closing minutes, and Parish agreed with the decision.

"I ran out of gas with two minutes left, everyone could see that, I don't think I could have done it," Parish said. "It was time for me to surface. I was almost invisible in Game 3."

Walton played poorly at the start of the game and said he was surprised that he got a second chance.

"I was out of sync and Sampson had a hot hand in the first half," Walton said. "I was surprised that K.C. put me back in the game."

"But at that point, nothing that has happened in your life to that point matters. You just have to go out and give it all you've got."

Despite Walton's poor early performance, Jones said he had no hesitation about returning Walton to the lineup.

"He knows where the offensive boards are and he did exactly what was expected of him," Jones said. "Robert had played a tough game and I saw that he was dragging a little. It was a matter of getting a fresh body into the game."

The Rockets led 64-63 at the half, but trailed 86-85 going into the fourth period.

Dennis Johnson, who scored 22 points, hit a pair of free throws with 3:07 to play to erase Houston's final lead and set the stage for Bird's go-ahead three-pointer.

"You need to take the three-pointer in that situation," Bird said. "It gives us the extra point and means they have to have two possessions."

Bird scored 21 points for Boston. Sampson led the Rockets with 25 points, but had just four in the second half.

Despite the frustrating loss, Houston Coach Bill Fitch doesn't think all hope is gone. He's been in this must-win situation before — when his 1981 Boston Celtics recovered from a 3-1 deficit to Philadelphia in the Eastern Conference finals en route to the NBA title.

"I look at this ring and remember that were were down 3-1 and came back to win it," Fitch said. "If this was a club of 34-year-old players with gray hair, I'd say they don't have a chance."

"But these guys are just starting to grow. Boston will have to play another game just like this somewhere along the way if they are going to win the championship."

Seminoles Win Battle Of Florida

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Florida State pitcher Richie Lewis told Miami players on Omaha television that he was going to go right after them when the two teams met at the NCAA College World Series.

The two teams had split six regular-season games and labeled Tuesday's game as the Florida state championship.

The right-hander FSU Coach Mike Martin calls "the little man" struck out 10 and scattered 11 hits to pick up his eighth complete game in the 7-2 FSU triumph in the winners bracket semifinal.

Lewis, who stands 5-foot-10, led the nation with an average of 14.9 strikeouts in nine innings this season.

The hard-throwing sophomore, 13-2, sent defending national champion Miami into tonight's elimination round against second-ranked Louisiana State, 55-13, at 7:10 p.m. CDT. That game follows No. 4 Oklahoma State, 55-14, against sixth-ranked Loyola Marymount, 50-14.

Florida State, the nation's top-ranked team with a 59-11 record, will meet No. 5 Arizona, 47-18, at 7:10 p.m. Thursday in the winners bracket final. The winner of that contest earns a spot in the CWS championship game Saturday or Sunday.

In a pregame interview, Lewis said he was pumped up, ready to take the game to Miami. He then backed up his talk, striking out six Hurricanes in the final three innings.

"Really the whole thing was Lewis," Miami coach Ron Fraser said following the game. "He was the whole ball game. We had them on the ropes a few times but he came back and struck us out."

Lewis said he felt strong. "I could go nine more," he said. "I have had no luck against these guys (Miami). By hook or by crook they beat me. I've thrown some of the best ball of my life against them but never won."

Lewis was involved in one loss and two no-decisions in three appearances against Miami during the season.

He and Miami reliever Dan Davies, the loser at 9-2, were stumping hitters for both teams until Florida State came up with a five-run seventh inning.

A hit batsman, single by Barry Blackwell and a bunt by Greg Clayborne that left Miami without a play loaded the bases for the Seminoles. Jose Marzan singled in one run, Paul Sorrento's fly out brought in another and Luis Alicea's single scored a third to chase Davies.

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Sutton, Saberhagen Snap Back

Bret Saberhagen and Don Sutton, separated by 19 years in age, feel they are narrowing the gap on the inconsistent pitching that has tarnish-

ed what they expected to be special seasons.

Sutton, 41, earned his 298th career victory Tuesday night as the California Angels beat the New York Yankees, 4-2.

"I can't focus on that (300 victories) and I can't concern myself about it because if the best I can be is a .500 pitcher when I win 300, it's kind of a disappointment," Sutton said. Only 18 pitchers in major-league

history have won 300 or more games, the last being Phil Niekro.

Sutton is 3-5 this season and carries a lofty 6.32 earned run average.

"I felt very good going out there with the stuff I had. But I'd been deceived before," Sutton said.

While Sutton's age made his pitching ability suspect for 1986, Saberhagen was coming off a season in which he won the American League Cy Young Award at the age of 21, as well as a world championship with Kansas City.

Saberhagen snapped a personal three-game losing streak Tuesday night as the Royals defeated the Milwaukee Brewers, 4-1.

In his last five starts, Saberhagen had an 0-3 record, allowing 37 hits and nine walks in 33 innings.

"I haven't made any different adjustments (recently)," Saberhagen said. "I haven't been ailing at all. I've been going out there with a little bit better feeling."

"This was one of his better performances of the year," Kansas City pitching coach Gary Blaylock said. "He hasn't pitched badly; he hasn't pitched great either."

Elsewhere in the AL, it was Toronto 6, Minnesota 5; Texas 4, Chicago 1; Baltimore 4, Seattle 2; Boston 3, Cleveland 1; and Oakland 6, Detroit 2.

Angels 4, Yankees 2

Bob Boone hit a three-run homer in the seventh inning — his first at Anaheim Stadium in nearly two years — in support of Sutton.

Sutton allowed six hits, walked two and fanned five over eight innings. Terry Forster pitched the ninth inning for his second save.

Boone's homer was his first since July 14, 1984.

Bobby Grich hit a solo homer for the Angels and Mike Pagliarulo added his 12th for the Yankees.

Royals 4, Brewers 1

Steve Balboni hit a solo homer and a run-scoring double to help Saberhagen get back on track at Milwaukee.

Saberhagen won his first game since May 2, striking out five.

"His stuff has been all right," Royals Manager Dick Howser said. "His numbers aren't that far off from last year. He's not doing that bad."

Balboni's last six hits have been for extra bases — four homers and two doubles.

A's 6, Tigers 4

Dave Kingman hit his 16th career grand slam to tie Babe Ruth and Hank Aaron for fifth place on the all-time slam list as Oakland sent visiting Detroit to its fifth straight defeat.

"That makes you feel like you're 20. It's powerful stuff," Simmons said after connecting for a pinch-hit grand slam that rallied the Atlanta Braves past the Pittsburgh Pirates 8-5.

Mathews pitched eight shutout innings before needing last-out relief help as the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Houston Astros 3-1.

"I wasn't nervous, just excited and anticipating getting to pitch," said Mathews, recalled from the minors last Friday.

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Usher: Study Set NFL's Strategy

NEW YORK (AP) — United States Football League Commissioner Harry Usher told a federal jury that the problems of the fledgling league stem from a study made and presented by a professor at Harvard Business School.

Usher's reference to the study, presented in February 1984 to a group of NFL officials by professor Michael Porter, was made under cross-examination by NFL attorney Frank Rothman during Tuesday's session of the USFL's \$1.5 billion antitrust suit against the NFL.

"What happened," Usher said in reply to a question by Rothman on why the USFL had moved teams from NFL cities, "is that once competition was really realized as to players salaries by the NFL ... it went up to Harvard and got exactly the strategy of what to do and that strategy has been followed, namely interrupt the flow of television moneys so that we cannot compete. It was a brilliant move, a brilliant strategy and it worked."

"The net result is we are dying. ... We have been pushed and shoved by the NFL and by the networks into this situation because of NFL pressure and there is nothing we can do except to survive in a marketplace where we hope the revenues from the gate will be sufficient to entertain it."

Usher was followed to the witness stand by Jim Spence, the former senior vice president of ABC sports and a man whom Usher described as "like a glacier" in his dealings with the USFL.

Spence, who will be followed by CBS Sports president Neal Pilson, testified that he advised the USFL against signing Herschel Walker, although that answer was stricken following an objection by USFL counsel Harvey Myerson.

But the main focus of the day was on Usher, who continued to emphasize his contention that the NFL had followed the recommendations of the Porter study to the letter, particularly in putting pressure on the television networks. One of the suit's demands is for a court order that the

NFL be barred from one of the three major networks.

It was a contention from which Rothman could not shake him on Tuesday.

Several times during his cross-examination, Rothman asked Usher if he could link certain complaints to the NFL. Each time, Usher replied that in the context of events, he could draw "inferences."

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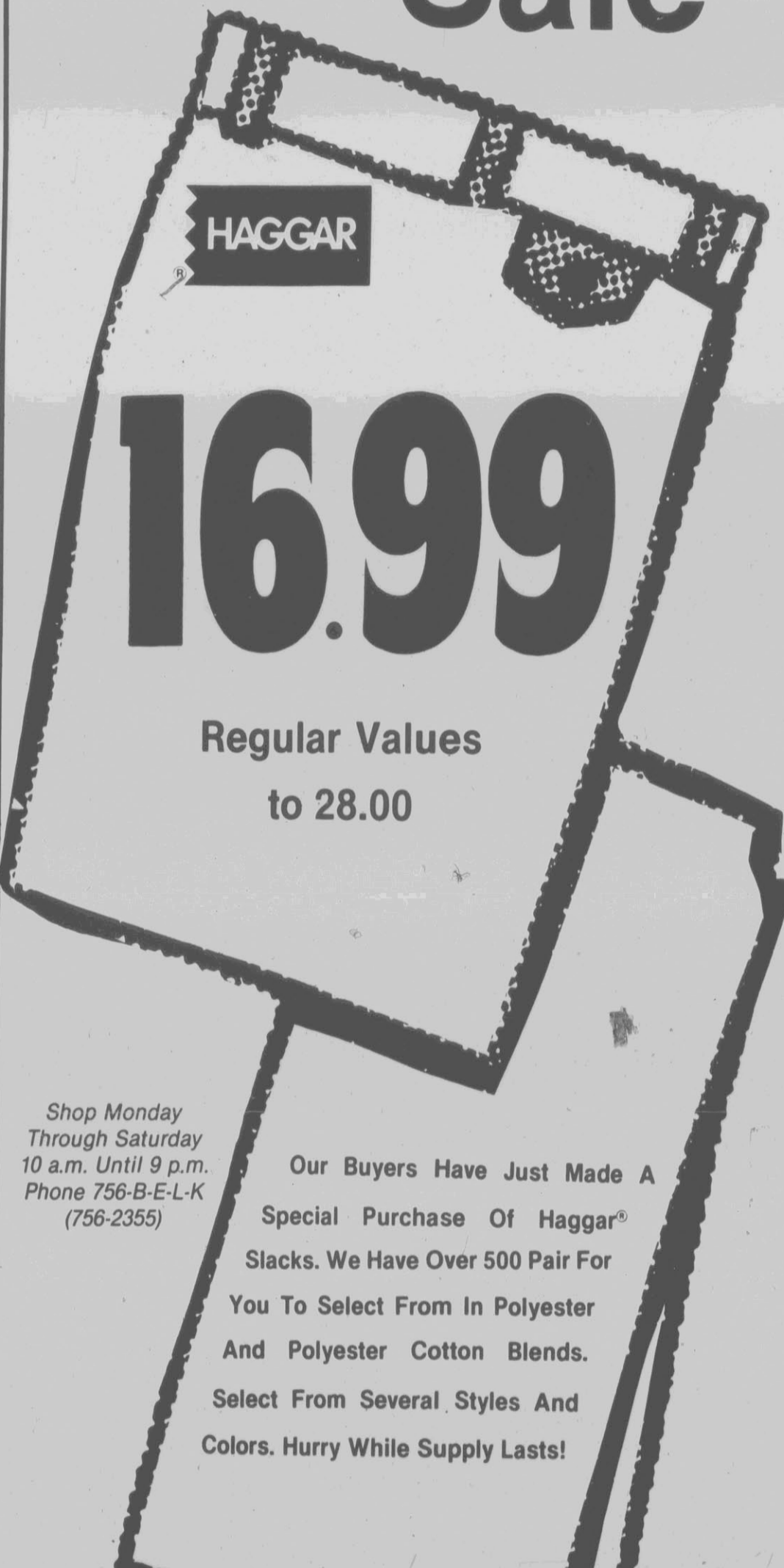

At 39, Grandmother Of Five Adds A New Title: Doctor Of Medicine

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — At 16, Alison K. Walker had an alcoholic husband, two toddlers and an eighth-grade education. Now, at 39, she's a single mother of three, a grandmother of five and, as of Thursday, a doctor of medicine.

A former welfare recipient, she depended on the emotional support of her family, especially her mother, and \$125,000 in student loans to get her through medical school.

"I don't feel like a doctor. It's sort of anti-climatic," Ms. Walker said. "But considering where I came from, it was something I had to do."

When she graduates Thursday from Hahnemann University School of Medicine, Ms. Walker will complete a journey from the impoverished Pittsburgh neighborhood where she was raised.

"I take it all in stride. It's not that big a deal," she said recently. "A lot more people could do it, especially women, especially minorities."

"I know what it's like to be hungry and not to have a place to live. But I also know the American dream. Look at me. Here I am."

"A lot of people, when things happen to them, they give up. When I see an obstacle, I go around or over or underneath. The strength has to be there and it grows stronger with each new obstacle."

For the four years she spent at medical school, Ms. Walker was separated from her youngest child, Monica, now 9. The girl lived in Pittsburgh with Ms. Walker's mother, Audrey Smith. Ms. Walker's other children, Thomas, 24, and Eugenia, 23, are married and live out of state.

"How could I start medical school with a five-year-old?" said Ms.

Walker. "My mother supported me and took care of Monica. But the separation was very, very hard."

Monica plans on moving permanently to Philadelphia later this month. Meanwhile, her mother is preparing for a one-year residency in psychiatry at Hahnemann that will allow them both to spend more time together.

After that, Ms. Walker is mulling an offer to join the office of a family practitioner in Philadelphia.

She says she didn't harbor a life-long ambition to be a physician, just to be somebody. "Nothing really sparked my interest. I just wanted to see if I could do it," she said.

Pregnant at 14, she quit school to marry the father of her baby. A second child soon followed, and within two years, a divorce. Her husband's alcoholism prompted her to return to her parents.

Her first job was in a book bindery. It lasted five years, and then she was laid off.

With no education and no skills, she panicked.

"What was I going to do? I couldn't do anything. I didn't have very much to offer," she said. She studied for and received a high school equivalency certificate, then earned an associate degree from Community College of Pittsburgh.

She spent five years as a child care worker at St. Francis Hospital in Pittsburgh, and then decided it was time for something more.

After a year as a nursing major at Carlow College in Pittsburgh, she switched to premed. The decision was based mostly on something her younger brother said to her the day he graduated from Temple University Medical School.

"He told me, 'You know, Alison, you could be a doctor. I did it, you could do it.'"

Romance Novel Can Help Reader Cope In Real Life

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Romance novels in which beautiful, headstrong women win the undying love of powerful yet sensitive men can help the women who read them cope with changing female roles, a researcher says.

"In many ways you can see that romance reading is a tacit protest against the demands and costs of their jobs" as wives and mothers, said Janice Radway, a literary critic at the University of Pennsylvania who studied the attitudes of romance novel fans and read some herself.

"I was very impressed with the women," Radway said. "I felt they were dealing with issues I've dealt with as a feminist. I just think it doesn't go far enough."

"We need to know what gives the readers hope, makes them happy and gives them pleasure and satisfaction."

More than a third of the 42 romance readers Radway interviewed said they read five to nine romance novels a week, with one reader describing the habit as a kind of harmless alternative to drugs or drinking, she said Tuesday at the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Romance novels make up more than 40 percent of paperback book sales in the United States, said Radway.

She said she was somewhat surprised to find that reading romances was not a reaffirmation of traditional values but a kind of subversive activity, even though the novels seem to affirm male domination and the traditional sex roles in marriage.

"Romance reading had become a ritual that was increasingly important to their sense of well-being," Radway said. "They see the book as a barrier or screen that they can temporarily set up between themselves and their families."

She asked the women she interviewed to recommend the romance novels they liked best, and then read 20 of them.

The books follow a very clear pattern: The heroine is cut off from her family and forced to make her way alone in the world. She is invariably independent, strong, beautiful and intelligent, but "completely unaware of her effect on men," Radway said.

She meets a handsome, successful, powerful man who is always gentle beneath his masculine exterior. He comes to realize he needs her. In a dramatic climax he rescues her from some danger and expresses his love.

The readers interpret this transformation from dominant male to one who can be sensitive to a

woman's feelings "as the woman's triumph," Radway said.

The books help women realize that a strong, independent woman can also express emotion, she said. "A lot of women assume that to be a feminist you can't have interpersonal relationships."

The romance readers were different from the group of women who watch daytime soap operas, she said. Scholars studying soap operas have found that they are about suffering, and romance readers don't want to read about suffering.

Comic Duo Shifts Act To Videos

LOS ANGELES (AP) — People laughed when Ron Stevens and Joy Grdnic got together in St. Louis 11 years ago. They're still laughing.

The husband-and-wife team currently has the most widely syndicated comedy act in radio, and they're now moving into television. Their comedy vignettes for All Star Radio are used daily by disc jockeys on more than 300 radio stations.

The pieces, generally about 90 seconds long, include song parodies, spoofs on commercials, gags and funny phone calls.

"Everybody on radio plays the same music, so what makes the difference is what happens between the music," said Miss Grdnic. "Everybody's excited about comedy."

The couple, who came to Los Angeles seven years ago, has also turned out two comedy albums and written scripts for "WKRP in Cincinnati" and "Facts of Life." They previously marketed comedy to the NBC Radio Network, but decided there was more money in selling it directly to the stations.

Their newest move is into television.

"There seems to be a trend in television now to buy segments from the outside," said Stevens. "For music video shows and whatever variety shows are out there. This has done for us what music video has done for rock bands. We've sold pieces ranging from 30 seconds to three minutes to Nickelodeon and Showtime pay channels. We sold five pieces to 'TV's Bloopers & Practical Jokes.'"

"What's exciting is that with the way the home video market's taking off the distributors are looking for original productions. They used to turn to the comedy clubs. Three companies asked us to do one-hour videos. But we turned them down because we wanted to produce the video ourselves."

The couple met when they were

both working for radio station KSHE in St. Louis. "Joy was doing the morning drive show and I was doing the afternoon drive show," said Stevens. "We were married for like four years without seeing each other. Everyone said it wouldn't last. They said you can't be in the same business and stay married. But it's been 11 years."

Stevens, who also was program director at the station, said, "I wouldn't have hired her. She went around me and got the job. I thought having a woman disc jockey on a rock station would be a novelty that wouldn't last."

His wife said, "I was only 17 and I thought it would be fun." They emphasize that radio comedy is a specialized field. "You can't just get a standup comic to come in and do his material," said Miss Grdnic. "It really has to be adapted to radio."

"Most comics are brought up on stage, which is great for 'The Tonight Show,'" Stevens said. "But our background is the radio studio. We approach a piece of humor in a different way. The music videos have changed the pace of television, for instance. Kids have shorter attention

spans. They want the punch line instantly."

Miss Grdnic said they write their material for a projected life of five years. "We can't do topical material," she said. "We do a lot of things about human relations, man vs. machines. And you have to keep it clean. Radio is cleaner than television. We sell to a lot of stations in the Bible Belt."

NBC News Bumps Rather From Top

NEW YORK (AP) — After 212 consecutive weeks in first place, a bouncing ball and a spinning wheel have conspired to knock "CBS Evening News" off its orbit atop the dinner-time news ratings.

Last week's figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed that "NBC Nightly News," with Tom Brokaw, averaged a 10.0 rating and won the news competition for the first time since the week of Sept. 28, 1981, when John Chancellor, now the "Nightly News" commentator, was the broadcast's anchor.

"CBS Evening News," with Dan Rather, averaged a 9.9 rating and ABC's "World News Tonight," with Peter Jennings, had a 9.2.

"Ratings don't last. Good journalism does," Dan Rather said Tuesday, his first day as the second-rated anchor in four years. The last time CBS lost was to "World News Tonight" in April 1982, when Jennings was part of a three-anchor format that included Max Robinson and the late Frank Reynolds.

Nielsen doesn't measure quality, only TV households, and some factors that affect ratings have nothing to do with news content.

Take "The Wheel of Fortune." In Cleveland, where "CBS Evening News" once dominated, the broadcast has slipped in the ratings because it now competes with the popular "Wheel of Fortune" game show. David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, said 10 percent of CBS' slippage to NBC is attributable to the Cleveland market's loss alone.

"The Wheel of Fortune" demonstrates that everything you say about quality TV can be diminished by one broadcast," said Howard Stringer, executive vice president of CBS News.

With the vagaries of local news lead-ins and game-show competitors contributing to a tightening network news race, weekly variables are more likely to shake up the rankings. The week before "Nightly News" was first, it was last.

"When the ratings get that close, things like basketball can cause flukes," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

Network researchers said the pro basketball playoff finals contributed to CBS' decline in news. The second game of the Boston-Houston series was shown in prime time Thursday, preempting the "Evening News" in seven West Coast markets and changing its time in 15 others.

Poltrack said the "Evening News" had beaten "Nightly News" by 10 percent on Thursdays this year, but lost by 11 percent last Thursday. With a normal Thursday, "Evening News" would have won by two-tenths of a ratings point, Poltrack said.

The researchers expect more fluctuations this summer because lower viewing levels generally reduce ratings margins anyway. This week, CBS has two prime-time basketball games.

To toast the news victory, NBC executives sent champagne to the "Nightly News" staff Tuesday.

"But we're not running around pounding our chests," said Timothy J. Russert, an NBC News vice president. "This is a marathon, not a sprint."

"The whole ratings picture is erratic," said Ann Morfogen, CBS News' director of communications.

"This week doesn't negate what happened the past 212 weeks."

NBC was a double winner last week, also finishing in its accustomed first place in prime-time ratings for the week of May 26-June 1.

NBC had a 14.5 rating, with "The Cosby Show," its other Thursday night comedies and Bob Hope's special taking the first five ratings positions. CBS averaged an 11.8 rating and ABC had an 11.7. A ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

"The Cosby Show" had a 26.7 rating, followed by "Family Ties," "Bob Hope's High-Flying Birthday," "Cheers," "All Is Forgiven," NBC's "You Are the Jury," ABC's "Growing Pains," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," ABC's "Calendar Girl Murders" and ABC's "Moonlighting."

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Senate Approves Student Aid Package

WASHINGTON (AP) — Expressing support for an end to court-ordered school busing in desegregation cases, the Senate has voted to authorize higher education student loans and grants for the next five years.

The non-binding procedural vote on Sen. Jesse Helms' proposal to curb the power of federal judges to order school busing came Tuesday evening before the Senate voted 93-1 to pass the higher education bill.

The higher education bill authorizes \$6.5 billion for Pell Grants, direct and guaranteed student loans and other federal programs in the 1987 fiscal year to help financially needy students attend college and graduate school.

The Senate bill cuts \$2.1 billion from the \$8.6 billion authorized in the current fiscal year and imposes an income eligibility standard for Pell Grants.

Senators voted 50-45 against tabling

ing the amendment by Helms, R-N.C., to prohibit federal judges from ordering students to ride 15 minutes or five miles past their neighborhood school as part of racial desegregation plans.

"For 15 years, we have had this folly imposed by the courts," Helms said. "For 15 years we have had the courts trying to be a school board. I say enough is enough, and 80 percent of the black parents in this country say the same thing."

Helms, who cast the only negative vote against the education bill, withdrew his amendment after receiving assurances from Republicans on the Judiciary Committee that a similar measure that is being blocked by opponents on the panel would be passed.

But Helms used the non-binding

vote to demonstrate support for the measure.

"The U.S. Senate has spoken once more on this issue," Helms said, recalling a 1962 vote to approve a similar measure, which later died in the House.

The education bill limits Pell Grants to students whose families have annual incomes of less than \$30,000 after taxes. An estimated 35,000 students would become ineligible to receive the grants if this provision became law.

The Senate also approved on a 60-34 vote an amendment by Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., to cut \$100 a year from proposed increases in maximum Pell Grants.

Under the amendment, Pell Grants would increase in five steps from the current \$2,100 to \$3,100 in 1991. The original language would have in-

creased the grants to \$3,200 over the same period.

Dole said he proposed the change in an effort to win Reagan administration approval of the bill, which must be reconciled with a different measure passed late last year by the House.

During the debate on school busing, Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., called Helms' amendment "a pernicious attempt to undermine basic constitutional rights" of citizens to win protection from courts.

"If you could move into an area of pending litigation and deprive the courts of litigation you would absolutely violate any concept of what is right and what is fair in our judicial system," said Sen. Charles Mathias, R-Md.

"The Congress created the inferior courts and the Congress can do any-

thing it wants to about the inferior courts, including abolishing them," Helms said.

"The courts are not competent to run the schools, but that is precisely what has happened," he added.

As part of the higher education bill, the Senate adopted language proposed by Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, to allow the sale of defaulted student loans to collection agencies, which are currently hired to seek repayment of unpaid obligations.

Gramm's amendment, which was passed on a voice vote, also would require the education secretary to attach up to 25 percent of the wages of federal employees who are in default of their student loans.

At one point several years ago, 35,000 federal employees owed \$47 million on defaulted student loans. Since then, the government has col-

lected about \$15 million, Gramm said.

The Gramm amendment also would require the government to withhold benefits to recipients who are in default. Exempted from this provision would be Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income and Medicaid.

Americans have defaulted on \$4.3 billion worth of direct or guaranteed student loans, Gramm said. Each year, the government pays \$1.3 billion in claims filed by lenders holding bad loans, said Sen. Robert Stafford, R-Vt.

The bill would raise the limits on direct student loans from the current \$1,500 to \$2,000 and require stricter eligibility standards. It would raise maximum guaranteed loans from the current \$2,500 to \$5,000 for undergraduates.

Sens. James Abner, R-S.D., Joseph Biden, D-Del., Bill Bradley, D-N.J., Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and David Pryor, D-Ark., did not vote.

Nancy Will See Royal Wedding

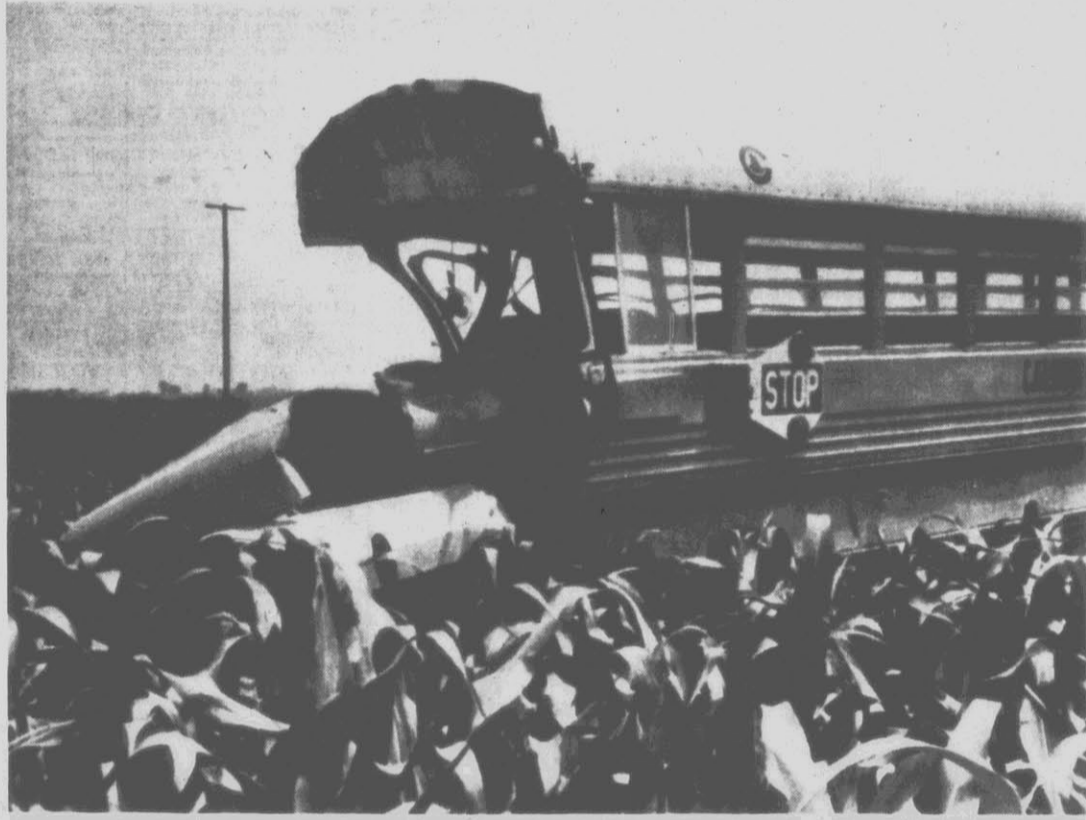
WASHINGTON (AP) — First Lady Nancy Reagan will attend the royal wedding of Britain's Prince Andrew and Sarah Ferguson in July, the White House announced today.

Elaine Crispin, Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, said the first lady had received a formal invitation as well as a handwritten note from the prince asking her to come to the July 23 event.

Although thousands of American tourists have stayed away from Britain due to the recent round of terrorist attacks in Europe, Mrs. Crispin said the first lady would not be deterred.

The press secretary said the first lady had not allowed the terrorism issue to interfere with her recent travels in Thailand and Malaysia and she did not intend to focus on such problems.

"She's just not going to dwell on it," Mrs. Crispin said.

Laxalt, Du Pont Join Maybe List For White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Paul Laxalt says he is thinking about running for president, but so far is "neither in nor out" of the 1988 GOP nomination. Former Republican Gov. Pierre S. du Pont IV of Delaware says he'll become a candidate in September if he thinks he can win.

In an interview, Laxalt, R-Nev., said "old Reaganauts" — close associates in Ronald Reagan's three campaigns for the presidency — have asked him to "keep my options open" for 1988.

"They're telling me that ... I can do the job and that the race is wide open," he said.

Du Pont, a former congressman who was Delaware's governor from 1977 to 1985, acknowledges he's not a national figure, but says that's an asset. "I'm in a wonderful position," he said Tuesday. "I'm unknown. I'm underrated, and there's nowhere to go but up."

Du Pont said he is forming the "Pete du Pont for President Committee" — using his nickname — and if it finds enough support and money to sustain his hopes he will announce his candidacy in September.

Du Pont and Laxalt are the latest entries, but the least known, in a field of undeclared candidates that includes Vice President George Bush, Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, evangelist Pat Robertson, former Sen. Howard Baker and Rep. Jack Kemp.

Laxalt, 63, said he will be more likely to seek the nomination if it becomes clear he can attract important political and financial support and if no other Republican has emerged whom he considers electable and strongly committed to carrying on President Reagan's political legacy.

"I'm staying loose. I'm neither in nor out," said Laxalt, regarded as Reagan's closest friend in Congress.

Laxalt, a former Nevada governor, also acknowledged that any chance he may have at the White House could be short-circuited by a negative outcome in the libel suit he has filed against a California newspaper chain.

Laxalt, who has announced he will not seek a third Senate term next year, said in an interview that before he assesses his presidential chances he will have to conclude his party service and phase out his Senate career.

But once that is done, the senator said he will launch "a total realistic appraisal of what the situation is in terms of an electable candidate."

Laxalt said that as of now, any sitting vice president, Bush included, "has to be deemed the front runner."

"The question is whether being vice president translates into support for the presidency, and I think at this point that's an open question," Laxalt said.

Nine States Fill Election Slots

Sen. James Abdnor survived a political shootout in the South Dakota Badlands while a moderate congressman from northern California outstripped conservative rivals from the southern part of the state to become the GOP nominee against Democratic Sen. Alan Cranston.

Rep. Ed Zschau, who spent \$3 million on the California primary campaign, finished on top of a 13-candidate field.

With 91 percent of the statewide vote counted, Zschau had 640,360 votes, or 36 percent, while television commentator Bruce Herschensohn had 523,393 votes, or 30 percent. Herschensohn conceded at 2:02 a.m. (PDT) and told Zschau: "Congratulations. Our job is to get behind you."

Los Angeles County Supervisor Mike Antonovich was third with 9 percent, Rep. Bobbi Fiedler had 7 percent and state Sen. Ed Davis had 7 percent. Eight other candidates split the remaining 13 percent.

As the votes were tallied from primaries in nine states Tuesday, the winners included Rep. Peter Rodino, D-N.J., chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, and Reuben Anderson, the first black to sit on the Mississippi Supreme Court.

Rodino defeated Newark Councilman Donald Payne, who argued it was time the district, which is nearly 60 percent black, had a black congressman.

Anderson easily turned back a challenge from arch conservative Richard Barrett.

The busiest primary day so far this election year set the field in two states — Alabama and South Dakota — where Democrats were most optimistic about unseating Republican senators.

Republicans name Cranston as the most vulnerable Democratic senator facing re-election.

Republican Gov. George Deukmejian of California and Democratic Mayor Tom Bradley of Los Angeles brushed aside token opposition to square off for a repeat of their 1982 contest, in which Deukmejian won the governorship on the strength of a strong write-in vote.

California voters also approved an initiative that would limit liability claims in multi-defendant lawsuits.

Other states choosing candidates for governor were Alabama, Iowa, New Mexico and South Dakota.

In other results: In Iowa, Gov. Terry Branstad and Sen. Charles Grassley, both Republicans, had no opposition for renomination. Former state Senate Majority Leader Lowell Jinkins won the Democratic nomination to challenge Branstad, who is regarded

as vulnerable because of discontent among economically pressed farmers. John Roehrick, a Des Moines lawyer, won the Democratic Senate nomination by easily defeating Juan Cortez, a follower of political extremist Lyndon LaRouche.

Actor Fred Grandy, who played Gopher Smith, the bumbling pursuer on TV's "The Love Boat," sailed past two opponents, despite being labeled a carpetbagger, to win the GOP congressional nomination in Iowa's 6th District.

The Democratic nomination went to Clayton Hodgson, longtime aide to retiring Rep. Berkeley Bedell.

In Montana, Sheriff Johnny France, who gained national attention when he single-handedly captured "mountain men" Don and Dan Nichols, was turned out by Madison County voters. Deputy Dick Noorlander defeated France in the GOP primary. No Democrats filed for the job.

France caught the Nichols, who had eluded authorities for months after they kidnapped a young Bozeman woman in 1984. Noorlander accused the sheriff of not spending enough time at his job.

In New Mexico, where Gov. Toney Anaya was barred by law from seeking a second term, Ray Powell, retired vice president of Sandia National Laboratories, won the Democratic gubernatorial nomination against two write-in candidates. Winning the GOP nomination was Garrey E. Caruthers, former assistant secretary of interior in the Reagan administration.

In South Dakota, state Rep. Lars Herseth won the Democratic nomination for governor, and lawyer George Mickelson had 35 percent to lead former Rep. Clint Roberts, who had 32 percent. Two other candidates trailed. A June 17 runoff would be held unless one candidate got at least 35 percent.

In a North Carolina runoff, former Shelby Mayor Lester D. Roark defeated former Belmont Mayor Jack L. Rhyme for the Democratic nomination for 10th District House seat being vacated by Rep. James Broyhill, who won the Republican nomination for U.S. Senate. Roark will face Republican nominee Cass Ballenger, a Hickory state senator.

Abdnor received 54 percent of the vote to fight off a challenge from Gov. William Janklow and now must face Democratic Rep. Tom Daschle in the general election in a state hit hard by the downturn in the farm economy.

Janklow had argued that he was challenging his former political ally because he didn't believe Abdnor could defeat Daschle.

In his victory speech, the South Dakota senator described the governor as "a formidable opponent."

"When the voters tell you it's time to quit, it's time to quit," Janklow said, adding that he had offered to help Abdnor in the general election.

In Alabama, Republican Sen. Jeremiah Denton was renominated over token opposition. Rep. Richard Shelby captured 52 percent of the vote against four opponents to win the Democratic Senate nomination.

In a gubernatorial primary shadowed by the retirement of Gov. George C. Wallace after nearly a quarter century as the dominant figure in Alabama politics, Lt. Gov. Bill Baxley and Attorney General Charles Graddick were forced into a June 24 runoff to determine the Democratic nominee.

Baxley received 36 percent of the vote and Graddick 30 percent to emerge from a five-candidate field.

Guy Hunt easily won the GOP primary, but the Democratic nominee will be heavily favored in a state which hasn't elected a Republican governor in 112 years.

Wallace, confined to a wheel chair since he was shot while campaigning for president in 1972, watched the returns in the governors mansion where he has lived for 17 of the past

23 years and said, "All things come to an end."

In neighboring Mississippi, Mike Espy was fighting to avoid a runoff in the race for the Democratic nomination for the House from the 2nd District. With only seven precincts left to count, Espy, a black attorney, was receiving just short of 50 percent of the vote against two white opponents, Pete Johnson who had 26 percent, and Hiram Eastland who had 24 percent.

If Espy's total failed to top 50 percent he would be forced into a June 24 runoff against Johnson.

The winner would face Republican Rep. Webb Franklin in the general election. Despite the fact the district is nearly 60 percent black, Franklin defeated black state Rep. Robert Clark in 1982 and 1984.

Mississippi Reps. Jamie Whitten and Wayne Dowdy easily defeated primary opponents.

Rodino, who became a national figure when he presided over the impeachment hearings against President Nixon in 1973, received 58 percent of the vote against 37 percent for Payne.

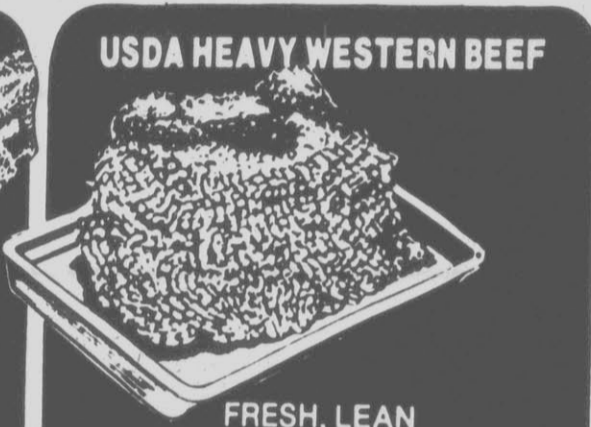

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Sausages For Today

Unsmoked, Uncured, Nitrite-Free ...

... All Kinds For Today's Tastes

They're back ... rich and earthy ... robust, unpretentious sausages.

Indeed, for some it is a delicious revival. For aficionados, however, sausages have always been around — to relish each time with renewed gusto.

The trend is for fresh homey sausages, a betrayal of the influence of country-style French charcuteries. Unsmoked, uncured, nitrite-free — these are the bywords for freshness.

Although pork is still favored by many, the contemporary fresh sausage now bursts with a variety of chopped meats — there is rabbit, veal, duck, chicken, lobster, shrimp, fish and crab.

The following recipes demonstrate the many ways sausages can be used.

BOUDIN BLANC AUX HERBES ST. GERMAIN

- 1-2 cups milk
- 1-4 cup whipping cream
- 1-2 bunch tarragon
- 1-2 bunch basil
- 1-2 bunch parsley
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 2 shallots
- 14 ounces lean veal, trimmed
- 14 ounces lean chicken meat, trimmed
- 14 ounces pork fatback or veal fat
- 1 pound ice cubes with a little cold water
- 1-4 tablespoons salt
- 3-4 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 1-8 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1-8 teaspoon ground mace or nutmeg
- Pork or sheep casings
- Butter

Bring milk and cream to boil. Add tarragon, basil, parsley, green onions and shallots. Let boil 1 minute. Drain. Chill herbs and cream mixture separately until cold, 30 minutes to 1 hour.

Grind veal, chicken meat and fat separately through fine grinding plate. Repeat to grind even more finely.

Place herbs in food processor or sausage chopper and finely grind. Add veal, chicken and a third of ice and water mixture. Grind until water is absorbed. Add salt, white pepper, allspice and mace. Add another third of ice and water and process until almost smooth. Add milk mixture and remaining ice and water. Process until emulsion is smooth, fine and creamy. Remove mixture and keep cold.

Place ground fat in processor and process until smooth and creamy. Slowly add meat mixture, processing until smooth and creamy (temperature should not exceed 55 degrees).

Slide wet casings onto stuffing horn or funnel tube. Tie knot in end. Feed in sausage meat, filling casing loosely. Pinch sausage at 5- to 6-inch lengths, then twist or twirl twice to make links.

Poach sausages in large kettle, covered with cheesecloth, 20 minutes for larger pork casings and 7 to 10 minutes for smaller sheep casings. Water temperature should be about 180 degrees. Transfer sausages from poaching water to ice cold water to cool quickly 5 to 12 minutes. (If not grilling immediately, store, covered, in refrigerator 4 to 5 days.)

Saute in small amount of butter until lightly golden. If desired, add small amount of wine to remaining drippings and pour over sausages upon serving. Serve with butter-sauteed onions and cooked potatoes, if desired. Makes about 20 pork-casing sausages or 40 sheep-casing sausages.

Note: Sheep casings will be finer and more tender than pork casings.

MICHEL RICHARD'S VEGETABLE SAUSAGE

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
 - 1-2 onion, chopped
 - 1-2 teaspoon finely chopped garlic
 - 1 small zucchini, chopped
 - 1-2 green pepper, chopped
 - 1-2 sweet red pepper, chopped
 - 1 teaspoon chopped cilantro
 - 1-2 cup chopped Italian parsley
 - 1 tablespoon chopped basil
 - 3-4 pound chicken breast
 - Salt, pepper
 - Basil-Tomato Vinaigrette
- Heat olive oil in skillet over medium heat. Saute onion and garlic until tender. Add zucchini, green and red peppers, cilantro, parsley and basil. Remove from heat. Chill to completely cool.
- Grind chicken in food processor. Add to cooled vegetables. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- Lay about 3 feet of plastic wrap flat on counter. Place meat mixture, in sausage form, onto plastic wrap about 3 inches from long edge. Leave about 4 inches margin on both ends.
- Take clear wrap closest to you and cover sausage neatly, rolling tightly into long sausage shape. Pull tightly on both ends while twisting like candy wrap. Tie each end with string, leaving about 2 1/2 inches space between sausage and string for air space. Pinch at 5- to 6-inch intervals, tying each with string to create 6 to 8 links.
- Drop in simmering water and poach 4 to 5 minutes. Plunge into cold water to cool. Remove plastic wrap and strings. Serve with Basil-Tomato Vinaigrette. Makes 3 to 4 servings.

MICHEL RICHARD'S LAMB SAUSAGE

- 1-2 pounds finely ground lamb (with 10 percent fat)
 - 1 small onion, grated
 - 2 cloves garlic, chopped
 - 1-3 cup chopped parsley
 - 2 tablespoons chopped cilantro
 - 7 mint leaves, finely chopped
 - Salt, pepper
 - 1 teaspoon ground cumin
 - Cilantro Sauce
- Combine ground lamb, onion, garlic, parsley, cilantro and mint in food processor. Process until well kneaded. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Allow to sit and ripen at least 1 hour.
- Lay about 3 feet of plastic wrap flat on counter. Place meat mixture, in sausage form, onto plastic wrap about 3 inches from long edge. Leave about 4 inches margin on both ends.
- Take clear wrap closest to you and cover sausage neatly, rolling tightly into long sausage shape. Pull tightly on both ends while twisting like candy wrap. Tie each end with string, leaving about 2 1/2 inches space between sausage and string for air space. Pinch at 5- to 6-inch intervals, tying each with string to create 6 links.
- Drop in simmering water and poach 6 to 10 minutes, turning halfway during poaching. Plunge into cold water to cool. Remove plastic wrap and strings. Saute in lightly oiled skillet until golden brown, stirring occasionally. Serve with Cilantro Sauce. Makes 6 sausages.

Basil-Tomato Vinaigrette

- 1 cup finely chopped tomato
 - 1-2 cup olive oil
 - 1-4 cup balsamic vinegar
 - 10 basil leaves, minced
 - 4 anchovies, minced
 - Salt, pepper
- Combine tomato with olive oil, vinegar, basil and anchovies. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes about 1 cup.

Cilantro Sauce

- 1-2 cup butter
 - 4 green onions, finely sliced
 - 6 mint leaves, minced
 - 1 tablespoon minced cilantro
 - 1-2 cup whipping cream
 - Salt, white pepper
 - 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
- Melt butter in saucepan over low heat. Add green onions, mint, cilantro and whipping cream. Cook until thickened, stirring frequently. Season to taste with salt and white pepper. Fold in parsley. Makes 6 servings.

HOTEL BEL-AIR'S PORK PEPPER SAUSAGE

- 2 tablespoons oil
 - 1 small onion, quartered
 - 2 to 3 shallots, chopped
 - 5 cloves garlic, chopped
 - 5 pounds pork butt, cut into cubes
 - 1 bunch thyme
 - 2 bay leaves
 - 1 large sweet red pepper, coarsely chopped
 - 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 teaspoons crushed dried red chiles
 - 1 bunch beet greens, cooked
 - 1 pound ice cubes
 - 1 1/2 pounds pork fatback, diced
 - Salt, freshly cracked black pepper
 - 1-4 hank lamb or pork casings, rinsed
- Heat oil in skillet over medium heat. Saute onion, shallots and garlic until tender. Place in freezer until ice cold.
- Combine onion mixture, pork cubes, thyme, bay leaves, sweet red pepper, dried chiles, beet greens and ice cubes in food processor or meat chopper. Grind finely. Place in freezer to prevent separation of fat.
- Mix in heavy-duty mixer with diced pork fat. Season to taste with salt and pepper. (Cook small piece to taste to adjust seasonings.)
- Slide 1 length of casing onto stuffing horn or funnel tube and tie knot in end. Pierce hole near end of casing for air to escape while stuffing. Feed in sausage meat, filling casing loosely.
- Pinch sausage at 5- to 6-inch length, then twist or twirl twice to make link. Repeat until entire casing is done, then tie or make knot in end. (To prevent becoming undone, tie each link with string.)
- Poach in water about 20 minutes, then saute in oiled skillet or grill over charcoal until golden brown. If desired, serve with garlic toast and hot pasta tossed with spinach, beet greens and sundried tomatoes. Makes 3 to 4 dozen lamb links or 2 dozen pork links.

HOTEL BEL-AIR'S RABBIT SAUSAGE

- 2 rabbits
- 2 tablespoons oil
- 1 small onion, quartered
- 2 to 3 shallots, chopped
- 5 cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 ounces prosciutto, chopped
- 1-2 bunch Italian parsley
- 1 bunch thyme
- 1-2 bunch tarragon
- 2 bay leaves, crushed
- 1 bunch sage
- 1-2 sweet red pepper
- 1 1/2 to 2 teaspoons crushed dried red chiles
- 1-2 bunch Swiss chard, cooked and cooled
- 1 pound ice cubes
- 1-2 pound pork fat, diced

Sardines Tasty Morsels To Go In Summer Salads

Because sardines offer protein, vitamins and minerals in worthwhile amounts, they are good to use for summer salads. Here, for example, is a way of teaming them with garden vegetables and cheese and adding a caper-flavored dressing.

- #### SARDINE SALAD WITH CAPER DRESSING
- Leaf lettuce
 - 2 cans (each 3 1/2 ounces) bristling sardines in oil, drained
 - 12 cherry tomatoes
 - 1 small red onion, sliced and separated into rings
 - 1 small cucumber, sliced
 - 4 ounces sliced Provolone cheese, cut into narrow strips
 - 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
 - Radishes
 - Caper Dressing, see recipe
- Line serving platter with lettuce. Arrange sardines, tomatoes, onion, cucumber and Provolone on lettuce. Sprinkle with Parmesan. Garnish with radishes. Serve with Caper Dressing.
- Caper Dressing: In an electric blender whirl together 3 tablespoons vegetable oil, 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar, 2 tablespoons water, 1 1/2 tablespoons drained capers, 2 teaspoons basil, 1 large clove garlic (thinly sliced) and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Whirl until not quite smooth — about 30 seconds. Makes about 1/2 cup.

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Banana Bread Gets New Zest When It Has Touch Of Allspice

Allspice Banana Bread features Jamaica's native spice. In Jamaica the bread is usually served at teatime.

Allspice berries grow on trees and have a flavor close to cloves, but with hints of cinnamon and nutmeg. The dry berries are available in whole or in ground form.

ALLSPICE BANANA BREAD

- 3/4 cup pecan halves
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 1/4 teaspoons ground allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 large (1 pound) ripe bananas, mashed (1 and 1/3rd cups)
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup raisins

Reserve 1/4 cup pecan halves for garnish. Coarsely chop remaining pecans.
Combine flour, baking powder, allspice and salt.
Cream butter and sugar; beat in egg and vanilla. Alternately, just until blended, beat in 1-3rd of the flour mixture with 1/2 of the bananas and milk, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Stir in chopped pecans and raisins.

Turn into a well-greased 9 by 5 by 3-inch loaf pan, smoothing the

top. Arrange reserved pecan halves on top.
Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in

the center comes out clean — 55 to 60 minutes. Let stand in pan for 5 minutes. Turn out on wire rack. Serve warm.

Spicy Dish Is Good Picnic Fare

As a lover of Italian food, I was intrigued recently by this recipe for sausage and kidney beans.

Italian cookery author Vicki Sebastiani came up with the spicy concoction, a good dish to serve at a picnic, or backyard cookout. She makes the dish ahead of time and keeps it in an insulated casserole until time to serve.

Featuring canned red beans, sausage and Zinfandel wine, this is a warm, filling dish which can be served well into the summer on cookouts.

Slow simmering is essential in preparing the dish. Mrs. Sebastiani says it helps the rich, spicy main flavor of the dish blend with the flavors of the other ingredients.

Gorgonzola cheese and spicy potato salad, along with crusty Italian or French bread, help round out the meat and bean mixture.

No Italian meal is complete without a casual fruity wine to go with the food. In this case Mrs. Sebastiani suggests Zinfandel.

Here is the recipe for the dish.

- 3 large onions, peeled
- 2 green peppers, cut into chunks
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1-3rd cup olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds Italian sausage, sweet or hot
- 2 28-ounce cans Italian whole tomatoes, drained
- 2 15-ounce cans kidney beans, drained
- 1 15-ounce can tomato sauce
- 2 cups Zinfandel wine
- 2 tablespoons freshly chopped oregano and basil, or 2 teaspoons of each, dried
- Salt to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper (you may want to omit pepper, if hot sausage is used)
- 1 1/2 cups freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Halve onions and slice thin. In large skillet, over medium-high heat, saute onions with pepper chunks and minced garlic in olive oil until light brown. Transfer to large kettle and set aside. Saute whole sausages in skins until lightly browned, about 2 or 3 minutes. Remove from skillet and slice into 1/4-inch pieces, removing skins if desired. Add sausage to kettle. Stir in tomatoes, kidney beans, tomato sauce, wine, herbs, salt and pepper. Simmer from 1 to 2 hours, until thickened. Stir in Parmesan cheese just before serving. Serves 8.

Picnics

Picnic season, the start of outdoor fun, has begun:

Barbecues in the backyard, moonlight suppers by the sea. Whatever the menu, the key ingredient is ease. No fuss. No muss.

Grilled steaks and burgers are traditional, but barbecued turkey legs are easy, too.

Corn, fried chicken, macaroni and potato salads are longtime picnic staples. But in the recipes below, the corn gets a new twist with a touch of marjoram; fried chicken is dolled up with a hint of tarragon. New life is injected into the potato salad with fresh mint and garden peas. The macaroni salad gets a facelift and added vitamins with raw vegetables.

Even a standard brownie recipe gets remodeled. The one offered below is sealed with a kiss and is from "Wild About Brownies" by Barbara Albright and Leslie Weiner (Barron's, 1985; paperback, \$5.95).

TERIYAKI STEAKS

- 1-2 cup salt-reduced soy sauce
 - 1-2 cup dry sherry
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1-4 teaspoon grated ginger
 - 1-4 teaspoon dry mustard
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - 4 strip steaks
1. Combine soy sauce, sherry, sugar, ginger, dry mustard and garlic, stirring to blend.
2. Place steaks in a plastic bag or glass dish; add marinade. Turn steaks to coat all sides and securely seal bag or cover dish. Marinate in refrigerator 4 to 6 hours and place in a well-chilled insulated bag if carrying to picnic site. Barbecue on arrival.
3. Place steaks on grill and broil at moderate temperature 20 to 30 minutes, depending on thickness of steaks and degree of doneness desired. Turn steaks occasionally. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

GRILLED STEAK WITH ONIONS AND MUSHROOMS

- 1 (4-pound) sirloin steak, about 2 inches thick
 - 2-3 cup olive oil
 - 1-3 cup red wine vinegar
 - salt and pepper to taste
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - 1 onion, chopped
 - 1-2 teaspoon oregano
 - 4 tablespoons butter
 - 2 large onions, sliced into rings
 - 1 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced
1. Trim steak of excess fat; score the edge at 1-inch intervals. Place in a shallow glass dish.
2. In a small bowl, mix oil, vinegar, salt, pepper, garlic, onion and oregano. Pour over steak, cover with plastic wrap and marinate a couple of hours.
3. Over a medium fire, grill steak 5 to 6 inches from heat, brushing several times with marinade. Cook 15 minutes on each side for rare, 20 minutes for medium and about 25 minutes for well-done.
4. While steak is grilling, melt butter in a large skillet and saute onion rings and mushrooms.
5. When steak has cooked, allow to sit for 10 minutes, then slice. Serve with sauteed onions and mushrooms. Makes 8 servings.

THREE BEAN SALAD

- 1-4 cup olive oil
- 3 tablespoons apple cider vinegar

- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 1-4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1-8 teaspoon celery seed
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 (15-ounce) can kidney beans, drained
- 1 (15-ounce) can chick peas, drained
- 1 (15-ounce) can green beans, drained
- 1 red pepper, diced
- 1 kirby cucumber, diced
- 1 tablespoon finely minced fresh parsley

1 Rinse all beans under cold water in a colander. Set aside to drain.
2. In a medium-size bowl, place oil, vinegar, onion, mustard, celery seed and salt and pepper and stir briskly to mix well.
3. Add beans, red pepper, cucumber and parsley to the dressing. Toss to coat well. Cover and refrigerate for several hours, or overnight before serving. Stir occasionally. Makes 6 servings.

TARRAGON FRIED CHICKEN

- 1-3 cup unsifted flour
 - 1 teaspoon paprika
 - 1 teaspoon dry mustard
 - salt and pepper to taste
 - 1-2 teaspoon dried tarragon leaves
 - 1 (2-1/2 to 3-1/2-pound) broiler-fryer chicken, cut in parts
 - 1 1/2 quarts corn oil
1. In a large plastic bag, measure flour, paprika, mustard, salt, pepper and tarragon leaves; close tightly and shake. Moisten chicken with water. Place chicken, 1 piece at a time, into plastic bag. Shake to coat thoroughly. Repeat with remaining chicken. Place chicken on wire rack on tray. Cover with plastic wrap.
2. Refrigerate for about 24 hours. Pour corn oil into a 5-quart Dutch oven or chicken fryer, filling no more than 1-3 full. Heat over medium-high heat to 375 degrees. Carefully add the chicken, a few pieces at a time.
3. Fry, turning once, 15 to 20 minutes or until fork-tender and golden brown. Drain on paper towels. Cover and refrigerate until well-chilled. Take to picnic in insulated

container. Makes 4 servings.

MACARONI SALAD

- 3 cups cooked elbow macaroni
 - 1 tablespoon each vinegar and water
 - 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
 - 4 tablespoons mayonnaise
 - 1-2 cup grated carrots
 - 1-2 cup sliced black olives
 - 1 red pepper, diced
 - 1-2 cup Chinese pea pods
1. Allow macaroni to cool. Place in a serving bowl. Whisk together vinegar and oil. Toss with macaroni. Chill for several hours. Add mayonnaise, mix well. Add grated carrots, black olives, red pepper and pea pods. Makes 4 servings.

The following recipe is from "The Silver Palate Good Times Cookbook" by Julee Rosso and Sheila Lukins (Workman publishing, 1984; paperback, \$11.95).

NEW POTATOES WITH PEAS AND MINT

- 20 small red new potatoes
 - 1-3 cup olive oil
 - 1-2 cup dry white wine
 - 2 cups shelled fresh peas
 - 2 cups creme fraiche (see standard cookbook for directions)
 - 1-2 cup chopped fresh mint leaves
 - 3 tablespoons snipped fresh chives
 - salt and freshly ground paprika to taste
1. Boil the potatoes in water to cover until tender but not mushy. Drain and cut into quarters, leaving skin on, while still hot.
2. Whisk the oil and wine together and drizzle over the hot potatoes in a large bowl. Stir to coat well. Let cool.
3. Add the peas to the salad and then the creme fraiche, mint and chives; toss gently to blend. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
4. Refrigerate for several hours before serving. Makes 6-8 servings.

The Recipe:

This spiced rice salad can become a meal in itself if chicken is substituted for the almonds. At sea or ashore, it is light and refreshing and only requires a quick trip through the express lane.

EXPRESS LANE: rice, ginger root, coriander seeds, lemon juice, shallots, olive oil, apricots and almonds or chicken.

SPICED RICE SALAD

(4 servings)
1 cup raw unprocessed rice
1 piece fresh ginger root
Salt and pepper to taste
1-2 teaspoon pounded coriander seeds

1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
1 shallot, thinly sliced
1-4 cup olive oil
1-2 cup chopped fresh apricots (or chopped dried apricots, soaked in water overnight and poached for a few minutes)

1-4 cup roasted almonds or 2 poached chicken breasts, cut into small pieces

Boil the rice with the ginger in salted water for about 15 minutes; drain thoroughly. Remove the ginger, and while the rice is still warm, season it with the black pepper, coriander, lemon juice and sliced shallots. Stir in enough olive oil to make the rice moist but not mushy, then add the apricots. Garnish with roasted almonds or mix in the chicken.

and chicken fat. Process until coarsely ground.

Add eggs, 1 at a time, and process until smooth. Add parsley, salt, pepper, coriander, thyme and allspice. Blend thoroughly. Refrigerate.

Dice 1 whole boneless chicken breast and enough turkey breast to make 1 cup. Fold into sausage mixture. Divide mixture into 4 portions.

Lay 1 1/2 feet of plastic wrap flat on counter. Place each meat portion, in sausage form (about 2 inches in diameter), onto plastic wrap, about 3 inches from long edge. Leave about 3 inches margin on both ends.

Take plastic wrap closest to you and cover sausage neatly, rolling tightly into long sausage. Pull tightly on both ends while twisting ends like candy wrap. Tie each end with string. Repeat with remaining mixture. Wrap each sausage with cheesecloth, tying ends with string.

Bring water or chicken stock in large roaster or poacher to boil. Reduce to simmer and place sausage in water. Poach 30 to 40 minutes or until completely cooked. Remove and cool, then refrigerate. Remove strings, cheesecloth and plastic wrap. Cut into thin slices and, if desired, serve with fresh tomato salsa, butter-sauteed onions and garlic toast. Makes 12 to 15 servings.

TUSCAN SAUSAGE

5 pounds pork butt, cubed
1-2 pound tomatoes
2 ounces mozzarella cheese
2 teaspoons minced garlic
2 tablespoons chopped basil leaves
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
2 teaspoons black pepper
2 teaspoons salt
9 feet pork casings, in 3-foot lengths, rinsed

Olive oil
Grind pork using medium plate. Chill. Peel tomatoes with sharp knife (do not parboil). Remove seeds and cut into 1/4-inch dice. Add to ground pork. Cut mozzarella into 1/4-inch dice and add to mixture.

Mix in garlic, basil, parsley, pepper and salt. Mix well. Stuff into wet casings and tie or twist at 4 1/2-inch intervals. Refrigerate overnight, covered, to allow flavors to blend. (May be stored in refrigerator, wrapped in wax or butcher paper, up to 4 days.)

Grill or saute in small amount of olive oil over medium heat 18 to 20 minutes, turning once to brown all around. Makes about 20 sausages, about 4 ounces each.

However, if you keep the toppings simple enough, you will be able to serve them just with a napkin. Here are some topping ideas:

Pumpernickel topped with goat cheese garnished with slices of black olives and sprinkled with freshly ground pepper.

Whole-wheat toast lightly smeared with soft blue cheese, topped with a

thin slice of roast beef and garnished with sliced radishes.

White toast lightly smeared with soft blue cheese, topped with slices of pear. (Be sure to sprinkle the pear slices with lemon juice so they won't turn brown.)

Whole-wheat toast sprinkled with oil and vinegar, topped with avocado slices. Squeeze lime juice over all and serve with a dash of hot sauce.

Whole-wheat toast smeared with

pureed raspberries and topped with slices of smoked chicken.

Whole-wheat toast lightly smeared with cayenne butter, topped with slices of chicken and garnished with chopped spiced pecans.

White toast topped with pesto and garnished with strips of roasted red pepper.

Whole-wheat toast dabbed with low-calorie mayonnaise and topped with tomato and cucumber slices and

shredded carrots. Garnish with alfalfa sprouts.

White toast smeared lightly with butter, topped with cucumber slices and garnished with salmon roe.

Create a salade nicoise sandwich by covering whole-wheat toast with about 1 tablespoon of canned, drained tuna and creating a mosaic on top with sliced green beans, sliced olives, chopped onion and sliced anchovy. Drizzle a teaspoon each of olive oil

and red wine vinegar all over.

Make a caesar-salad sandwich, with a crisp lettuce leaf, three slices of hard-cooked egg, slivers of anchovy, all piled high on toast that has been fried in garlic butter.

The ideas for smorrebrod are as numerous as the waves on the bay. Vary your selection and you will probably hit everyone's favorite ingredient. Serve the smorrebrod with simple salads such as the one that follows.



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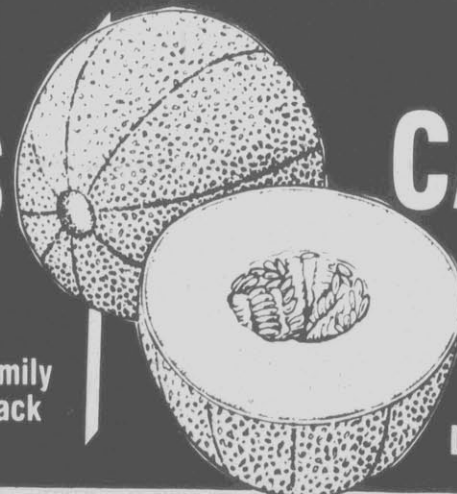


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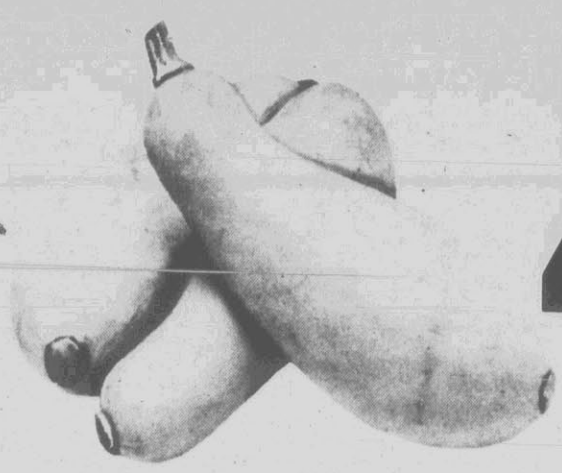
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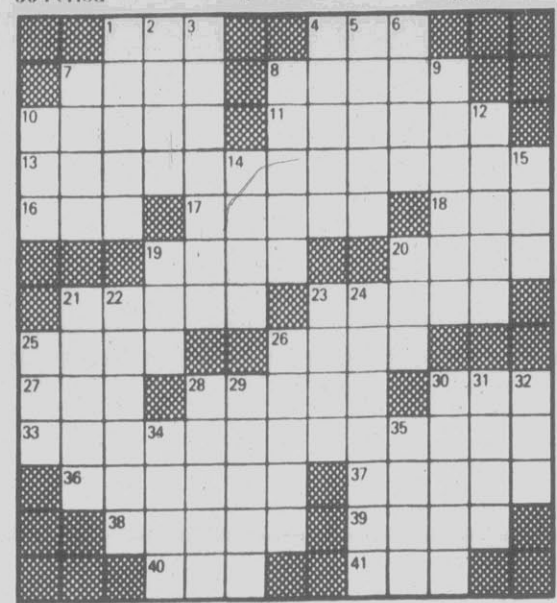

Take a cruise Down Under and you may get to play against Paul Marston, Australia's entry in Royal Viking Line's Player of the Year competition. A theorist who is a staunch believer in the new Strong Pass artificial systems, he is also a player of rare ability. Here is an example of his skill from the 1985 Australian National Open Teams Championship.

The bidding given is what might take place at a table where normal methods were being employed. Suffice it to say that Marston reached the same contract in his methods, where the only information available to the defenders was that South held at least 13 points and that North held a minimum of 11 with a six-card or longer club suit and no singleton.

Since the ten of hearts appeared in dummy, West's lead of the jack marked East with a six-card suit headed by the ace-king and probably the king of spades—West was unlikely to lead from a short suit if he held a possible entry in the king of spades. Therefore, declarer needed to develop two extra tricks without surrendering the lead. The only hope was an endplay.

East signalled on the jack of hearts and declarer won the queen. He crossed to the ace of diamonds and took a winning spade finesse. When he cashed the king-queen of diamonds he was interested to note that East stuffed a heart. Next came the jack of clubs, which forced West to cover, and the table's king won. A spade to the ace stripped East of his last safe exit card, and he was then presented with the lead in hearts.

The best East could do was to take his four heart tricks. Then he had to lead away from his ten of clubs into dummy's A-9 tenace to give declarer his contract.

Study Says L.A. Leads Job Growth

WASHINGTON (AP) — California and Massachusetts will lead the nation in new jobs through the turn of the next century, according to a private study that predicts that nearly half of all new jobs will be in just 30 metropolitan areas.

The National Planning Association said Tuesday that the Los Angeles metropolitan area will have the most new jobs between now and the year 2000, followed by the Boston metro area.

"The trends we are seeing are for continuing growth in the South and West ... but we are also starting to see a little larger growth in the northeastern, traditional industrial areas," said Carlton N. Strong of the Planning Association.

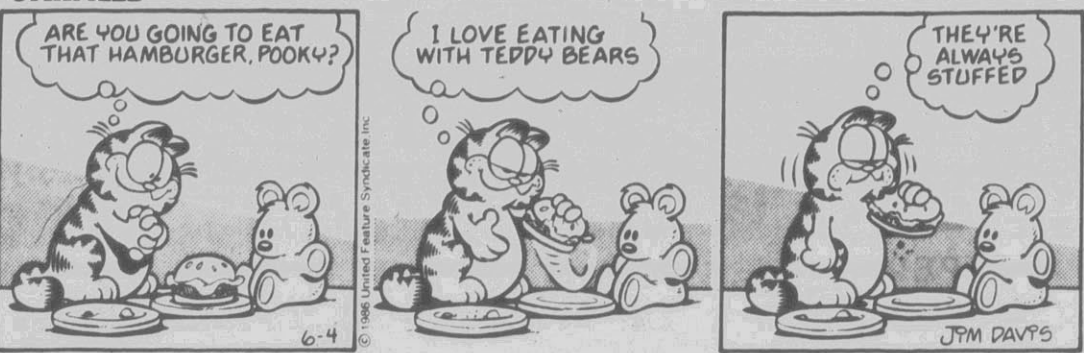
There are expected to be just over 26 million new jobs available for Americans by 2000, with more than 12 million of them occurring in 30 metropolitan areas, says the study by the Planning Association, an independent economic research group.

The anticipated job growth in Los Angeles parallels the overall growth of that region. A study by the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis projects that Los Angeles will become the nation's most populous metro area by 2000, surpassing New York.

That government study, released last December, also picked Los Angeles as the region with the greatest potential for job growth, followed by Houston and Boston.

The Planning Association study anticipates that Los Angeles will add just over a million new jobs for a total of 5.3 million in 2000.
