Supreme Court Axes Anti-Abortion Rule

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court, issuing another ringing reaffirmation of its 1973 decision legalizing abortion, today struck down Pennsylvania regulations that would make abortions more difficult to obtain.

By a 5-4 vote, the court said the Pennsylvania regulations impermissibly interfere with women's constitutional right to end their pregnancies.

The Reagan administration had urged the justices to use the case to overturn their landmark decision legalizing abortion, a bold move even

pro-life forces believed had little chance of succeeding.

The 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in 1984 struck down various provisions of Pennsylvania's 1982 abortion control law.

Those provisions would have required:

—That doctors obtain the "informed consent" of women seeking abortions after telling them about "detrimental physical and psychological effects which are not accurately foreseeable" and about medical assistance benefits available for prenatal care and childbirth. The consent could be given only after a 24-hour waiting period.

—That doctors file various reports for the public record about each abortion they perform.

—That doctors performing third-trimester abortions, which are rare, use procedures least risky to a fetus capable of surviving outside the womb.

—That two doctors be present to perform third-trimester abortions. The law did not specifically provide an exception for emergencies.

Today, the Supreme Court agreed with the 3rd Circuit court that the provisions cannot pass constitutional muster.

"States are not free, under the guise of protecting maternal health

or potential life, to intimidate women into continuing pregnancies," Justice Harry A. Blackmun wrote for the court.

Blackmun, author of the 1973 decision legalizing abortion, added that the Pennsylvania regulations "wholly subordinate constitutional privacy interests and concerns with maternal health in an effort to deter a woman from making a decision that, with her physician, is hers to make."

Blackmun noted that the national debate over abortion has been bitter, and that the abortion issue "raises moral and spiritual questions over which honorable persons can disagree sincerely and profoundly."

"But those disagreements did not then and do not now relieve us of our duty to apply the Constitution faithfully," Blackmun said. "Few decisions are more personal and intimate, more properly private or more basic to individual dignity and autonomy than a woman's decision — with the guidance of her physician and within the limits specified in (the court's 1973 ruling) — whether to end her pregnancy."

"A woman's right to make that choice freely is fundamental," Blackmun said.

Joining Blackmun were Justices William J. Brennan, Thurgood Mar-

shall, Lewis F. Powell and John Paul Stevens.

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justices Byron R. White, William H. Rehnquist and Sandra Day O'Connor dissented.

The court in 1983 strongly reaffirmed its ruling of a decade before as it struck down several state laws and local regulations that made abortions more difficult to obtain.

In that 1983 ruling, the court declared unconstitutional regulations requiring that:

—All abortions for women more than three months pregnant be per-

Sign Ordinance Receives Support Of Zoning Panel

The Greenville Planning and Zoning Commission has recommended the City Council adopt the proposed sign ordinance designed to restrict the location and size of signs to be constructed within city limits.

The board also unanimously voted at a public hearing Tuesday night to recommend that the City Council place a moratorium on all sign permits until the sign ordinance is ratified.

Bobby Roberson, director of Planning and Community Development, said the moratorium was requested to prevent companies from applying for signs which will be non-conforming under the proposed guidelines and to stress the urgency of passage to the council.

Board members heard comments from the business community, sign industry, citizens and representatives from the environmental advisory commission and the appearance commission before recommending

alterations in the proposed ordinance.

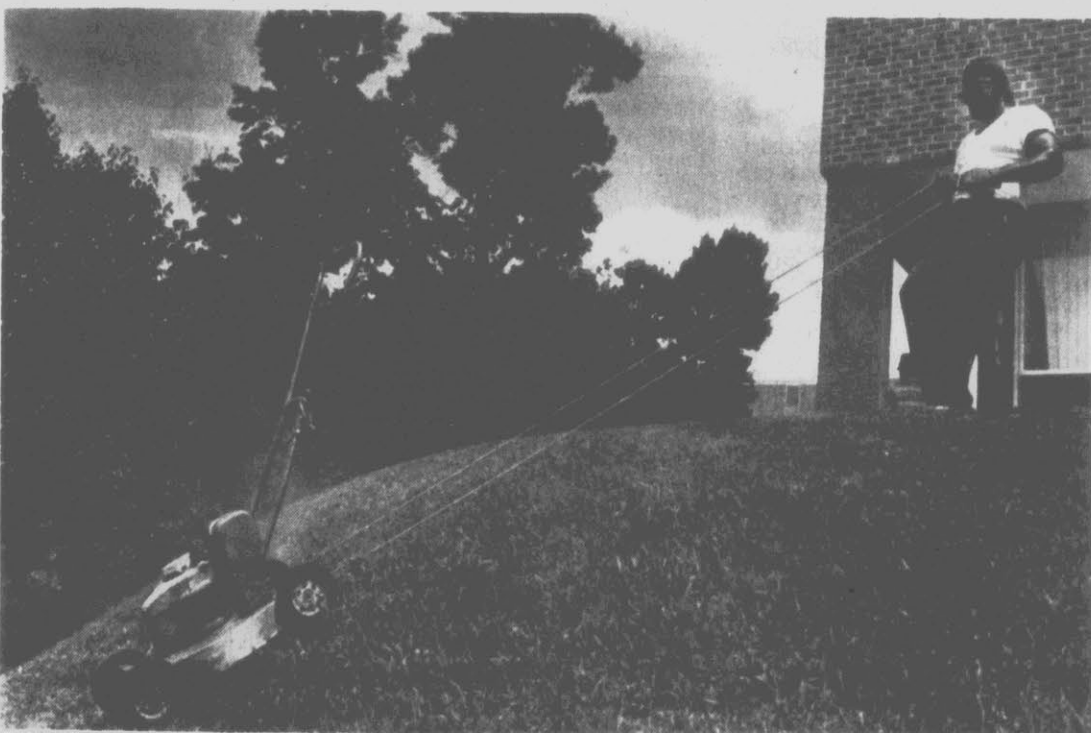
The commission amended the on-premise section of the ordinance to allow one 5-foot free-standing sign or one 25-foot free-standing sign with a 10-foot setback per establishment. Signs in the proposed medical district will retain a 15-foot maximum height requirement, according to Roberson.

Originally, all free-standing signs were subject to the 15-foot height regulation.

The board reduced the period of time in which non-conforming temporary signs are amortized from one year to six months.

Board members also amended the ordinance to permit storeowners a 10-year period to phase out non-conforming fixed signs. In the original proposal, non-conforming signs were to be lost through attrition as businesses changed, according to Roberson.

Baby Jesse Given Heart

LOMA LINDA, Calif. (AP) — Baby Jesse, the 17-day-old boy initially rejected as a heart transplant candidate, was in critical but stable condition today after receiving the heart of a brain-dead Michigan infant whose parents heard of his plight on television.

Jesse Dean Sepulveda received the heart of Frank Edward Clemenshaw IV, who was born the same day Jesse was, during a four-hour operation late Tuesday at Loma Linda University Medical Center.

Dr. Leonard Bailey, head of the transplant team, said Jesse's blood pressure was good and he was producing adequate quantities of urine. For two weeks, the period in which rejection is most likely, hospital staff will monitor the baby round-the-clock, watching for buildup of toxins in the kidneys and liver — an indication of his body rejecting the transplanted heart, Bailey said.

A spokesman for the boy's family said today on ABC's "Good Morning, America" that the family was "rejoicing in having Jesse have a second chance to live."

"And of course our prayers are still with them and the family is praying that his recovery may be speedy and he'll be strong through that recovery," said lawyer Harry Scolinos, who represents the boy's paternal grandparents.

The grandparents were made Baby Jesse's legal guardians after Loma Linda rejected him as a transplant candidate for fear his young, unmarried parents would not be able to give him the proper post-operative care. The hospital's initial decision was denounced by right-to-life groups as discrimination.

Describing the family's reaction to the transplant, Scolinos said: "It's just amazing how strong this family is. A week ago they're making plans to bury their son, and today they're waiting by the hospital to see how their son is doing in recovering from a transplant."

GUC Board Urges Prompt Licensing Of Harris Plant

In a show of support for the Shearon Harris nuclear power plant in southern Wake County, members of the Greenville Utilities Commission Tuesday night adopted a resolution calling for the "prompt licensing and operation of the Harris plant."

The plant, nearing completion, is scheduled to begin commercial production of electricity by the end of the year. But a number of groups and individuals are campaigning to prevent its licensing by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

The North Carolina Eastern Municipal Power Agency — Greenville's wholesale supplier of electric power — has a 16.17 percent ownership share of the Harris plant, being built by Carolina Power & Light Co. Because the GUC has a 16.13 percent membership share in the power agency, Greenville Utilities has a 2.6 percent indirect ownership in the nuclear plant.

Malcolm Green, GUC's general

manager, told GUC board members that if the opening of the plant is delayed, "the interest charges and replacement power costs are estimated to be \$2 million a day. The commission's share of this excess delay cost would be \$54,000 a day," Green said.

The resolution supporting the timely opening of the Harris plant points out that construction "has been closely reviewed by federal and state regulatory agencies ... those agencies will continue to monitor its operation closely to ensure the safety of the public (and GUC) has confidence in the regulatory process and Carolina Power & Light Company's ability to operate the Harris plant in a manner that will protect the health and safety of the people ..."

Minor changes in utility regulations were given approval at the meeting.

One change will increase the cost differential between underground and overhead electric service to mobile home parks by \$25 (from its

present \$100 to \$125) for each space.

A second change will require customers to pay the cost of installing and removing temporary poles on construction sites, with a minimum charge of \$150.

Other changes will increase the present \$300 charge for 4-inch sewer taps to \$320; increase the present \$220 charge for 7.5-inch water taps to \$300; increase the present \$400 charge for 1-inch water taps to \$420; increase the present \$1,250 charge for 2-inch water taps to \$1,500 and add two new tap charges to reflect the present cost of installing the service for sprinkler systems — \$600 for a 1-inch sprinkler service and \$2,250 for a 2-inch sprinkler service tap.

In other business, the board approved the bad-debt write-off for fiscal 1984-1985 which totals \$134,222 or .23 percent of total billings for the year, and approved contracts for the purchase of seven capacitor banks from Rigby Electric Supply Co. at a cost of \$17,185 and seven switching control sets from Mill-Power Supply Co. at a cost of \$11,497.

Crossroads: A Fight Over Shacks

CROSSROADS, South Africa (AP) — It was a battle without glory between two nervous, ragged armies fighting shack-to-shack with clubs, sling shots and machetes for control of a black squatter camp already half burned to the ground.

When the fighting ended Tuesday afternoon, after at least 17 deaths, the prize for the winning side was a chance to burn down the shacks that still stood.

The clash, witnessed at close range by about 15 reporters caught in the thick of the combat, was the second explosion of violence in less than a month between conservative vigilantes and militant "comrades" in Crossroads, a sprawling shantytown 12 miles east of Cape Town that the government has been trying to bulldoze for years.

The conflict is rooted in disputes between young anti-apartheid militants and the older, more conservative vigilantes, accused by the militants of cooperating with the government in order to remain in Crossroads.

Vigilantes are loyal to Johnson Ngxobongwana, head of the committee that has controlled the camp since it was founded in 1975. Younger activists in outlying sections have challenged the

committee in recent months, accusing it of corruption.

Reporters watched the battle develop from positions near the militants.

Tuesday's battlefield was "KTC," a section named after a local store. As in the previous clashes, the vigilantes carried the day, routing their more numerous rivals when police fired tear gas and birdshot at the militants.

The only firearms I saw among the militants were a pair of homemade revolvers. One frantic young man dashed through the ranks yelling, "Where is a machine gun? We need a machine gun."

Knots of men, wrapped in blankets and carrying clubs or iron bars, talked of fighting while huddled beside fires as a cold, chilly dawn broke.

Later, as squatters whose homes were burned down Monday searched through the ashes for debris worth saving, men with loudspeakers told women and children to leave the area because a battle was imminent.

The militants took positions among the burned-out shacks along a low, sandy ridge where vigilantes had struck on Monday. More than 1,000 of them formed an irregular line along the ridge,

some taking cover behind slabs of corrugated metal.

There was no sign of fear when the first groups of vigilantes, distinguished by white arm bands, appeared on the streets below the ridge. One band of militants sent several dozen vigilantes fleeing with a brief charge down the hill, hurling stones and brandishing clubs.

But as more vigilantes moved in, a standoff developed, with rocks thrown from long distances and occasional gunfire.

Armored police and army vehicles prowled through the area where the vigilantes had assembled, and overhead a police helicopter circled, apparently radioing information to officers on the ground about where the combatants were positioned.

The militants became increasingly unnerved as the standoff progressed, sometimes scurrying off the ridge at the sound of a gunshot before being urged back to the top by some of their colleagues.

The standoff ended when a convoy of armored police vehicles lumbered through the shacks behind the ridge. Officers fired tear gas and birdshot as the militants found themselves confronted on two sides, and the ridge suddenly emptied as the defenders and reporters fled.

Milk Before Bedtime Helps Sleep Process

There are tryptophan pills on the market, sold in sold health food stores and advertised as sleep aids. However, Duke University sleep researchers recommend the following, in addition to drinking milk shortly before bedtime:

- Observe regular hours of going to bed and getting up
- Exercise regularly
- Stay away from caffeine and alcohol before bedtime
- Avoid the use of sleeping pills, except when prescribed by a doctor, and then only for a few nights at a time.

The Age Of Weekend Weddings: They Seem To Last Forever

NEW YORK — Here comes the bride all dressed in white. Here comes the bride again dressed in Nikes. And again in a bathing suit, in jeans, a cocktail dress, a life preserver for white-water rafting. This is the age of the weekend wedding, the wedding that lasts longer than some marriages.

Besides the traditional ceremony and reception, these three-day celebrations typically include a series of dinners, brunches, barbecues and sports events. When they aren't throwing rice, wedding guests may be swinging tennis racquets, water-skiing or running bases in a Brides vs. Grooms softball game.

Golf was the game when a New York couple — Deborah Ambrose, a free-lance art director, and David Wismer, a vice president of the Doyle Dane Bernbach advertising agency — were married in Pinehurst, N.C.

The bride's parents live on the grounds of the Pinehurst Country Club, which has six golf courses. This allowed the bride and her attendants to tee off on the wedding morning without being glimpsed by the groom and his attendants as they played on another course.

"It's bad luck to see the groom before the ceremony," said the bride, who later changed from shorts and a T-shirt to a wedding dress of white moire taffeta with a 9-foot train.

Like the bridal dress itself, the current weekend wedding vogue reflects "something old" — as old as 16th-century Europe, historians say — as well as "something new."

One new thing is that hotels and resorts are offering low weekend rates and other inducements to the bridal couple and their far-flung guests. "The weekend wedding is a definite trend," said Sean Handerman, a spokesman for Marriott Hotels and Resorts. "As hotels get smarter and lower their weekend rates, people are saying, 'Why not?' It's the same thing that's happening with the airlines."

Another new thing is that brides are no longer so young and blushing. A quarter of a century ago the average bride was 19.8 years old. Today she is 23.2, and her groom is 25.5.

"We know they're sleeping together and probably living together, so the wedding night is not the focal point of these weddings," said Barbara Tober, editor in chief of Bride's magazine. "The focal point is the joining together of two families, an intensive experience that may be

teamed up with an anniversary, a birthday party or other family celebration."

For divorced parents, the weekend wedding gives everyone a chance to entertain. "The bride's father and his new wife can give the reception, and the bride's mother and her new husband can do the brunch the next day," Tober said. "If the groom's parents are divorced that may mean two more parties."

Some traditionalists frown on all these parties and on bridal couples who do not disappear after the cake is cut, but hang around and even show up the next day for an encore. One who cannot bear to look upon their faces, however happy, is Judith Martin, author of "Miss Manners' Guide to Excruciatingly Correct Behavior."

"This must be discouraged," she said, "no matter how long they have lived together and how short a time they have off from work."

Yet historians say this is hardly a new wrinkle in weddings. "This sounds very much like what we call the 'big wedding,' which was prevalent in 16th-, 17th- and 18th-century England and in Colonial America," said John R. Gillis, a Rutgers University professor and an authority on European social change.

Gillis, who describes such weddings in his scholarly book "For Better, for Worse: British Marriages, 1600 to the Present," said there were days and days of dancing, feasting and sporting events such as wrestling, but no honeymoons. Honeymoons were not invented until the Victorians came along.

"These weddings," he said, "served lots of purposes — exchanging gossip, mending fences and starting new fights. Weddings were famous for fights. People drank too much."

Fights were not mentioned in talks with young couples around the country whose weddings went on all weekend. But other parallels emerged between weddings old and new on such matters as who plans the wedding and who pays.

Parents played no part in the so-called "big weddings" of old, which were planned by the couple and paid for by the guests. As Gillis tells it, "The bride would sit at the feast with a bowl on her lap, and people would drop in pennies or gifts before taking a place at the table."

Parents have it harder now, of course, especially the bride's parents, who traditionally pay the wedding bills. The average cost of a formal wedding is \$6,000, and a big-

Dear Pat: Since I talked with you last summer, my life has taken another interesting turn and I wanted to catch you up on it and request some input from your readers.

How long have you been knitting and how did you get started? Describe any knitting projects that were for charitable purposes. Describe the most bizarre knitted object you have ever seen. What is the most unusual place or circumstance where you have seen someone knit?

Describe any knitting crazes in which you were involved, such as boucle dresses in the '30s, argyles in the '40s, ribbon knit dresses and suits in the '50s and HUGE needle knits in the '60s.

Why do you think more women than men knit? Do you know any knitting men who have unusual stories who would be willing to be interviewed?

Do you have access to any diaries, letters, journals or notebooks that describe or detail knitting projects?

If you were involved in knitting for soldiers during wartime, comment on those experiences. Describe any group knitting projects in which you have been involved, such as knitting clubs, guilds, camps, etc.

Many families have patterns that have been handed down from generation to generation. Any help for me here in finding such unpublished patterns?

Finally, please feel free to add any comments or anecdotes of your own. And, dear readers, please mail

Recreation

A feasibility study done for the Greenville Recreation and Parks Department shows that the city can operate the Eastern Carolina Vocational Center sports-auditorium facility successfully from a financial point of view.

The study was presented to the commission and city officials at a meeting last week. The facility includes an indoor pool, weight room and auditorium complex. It was closed by ECVC officials April 30 because, they said, it was too expensive for the center to operate.

The Charlotte firm of Cole, Deimler and Associates estimated expenses, potential sources of revenue and possible methods of creating public interest in the facility. It suggested user fees and corporate membership fees as a way to provide the needed revenue to operate the complex.

The study estimated about \$65,000 in corporate memberships the first year, \$63,000 in family and individual memberships, an annual contribution of \$10,000 from ECVC, which together with other miscellaneous fees, would give total income of \$140,000.

Expenses were estimated at \$129,000.

The study cautioned that the success of the project would depend on promotional efforts. There was also a legal question of whether the city could further contract for operation by a private firm since federal, state and local funds were used in construction (ECVC has proposed leasing the facility to the city for \$1 annually).

The study's estimates of revenues for operation of the ECVC facility by the city could turn out to be optimistic. Yet we won't know until we try. It is a fact that we have a prime recreational complex now closed up and unused. The city should take the lead in reopening it for use by area citizens. It should be done, however, within the concept of vigorously promoting the facility and making it pay for its operation from revenues rather than tax funds.

True Value

The Social Security program is praised and maligned, probed and discussed to the point where few know how they really feel about it.

Some wonder if it will even be here in the 21st century, considering the rising demands on its resources.

To find out whether it is valued by those who receive checks from the Social Security Administration one only has to take notice of a month when the checks are late.

It happened in Greenville this month. Some 1,000 Social Security checks did not arrive in the mail on the usual day. The local office was deluged with calls and there was a huge sigh of relief when the 1,000 checks finally did show up last Thursday.

No doubt some recipients don't need the money they receive from Social Security to meet their basic living expenses. Obviously an overwhelming number do, and for some the delay of even a few days can make a difference in meeting the bills for the necessities of life.

Social Security will have to survive in some form even into the next century if we are to avoid severe hardship for many of our elderly. That means the program can't be loaded down with new expenses that future generations will not be able to afford.

Making Sense Out Of The Game

RALEIGH — Ever watched one of those obscure foreign sports on ESPN and feel a sense of accomplishment as you began to understand the rules and strategies? Hang around the Legislative Building long enough and you'll experience the same sensation.

Like any sport, the legislative process has its official rules, its unofficial rules and its strategies. Put them together and, to the uninitiated,

it can appear to be almost totally illogical.

Lobbyist Steve Morrisette of the N.C. Hospital Association is considered one of the hardest working, most astute lobbyists in Raleigh. During the recent convention of the N.C. Child Advocacy Institute, Morrisette laid out a few of the rules of effective lobbying.

A lobbyist, be he a professional working for a trade association or a

volunteer seeking money for the local orchestra, must be credible. That means two things. He must first know what he is talking about and then must be willing to tell the legislator the whole truth.

The legislator will want to know, for example, how much the orchestra needs, how the money will be spent, and what kind of opposition faces the proposal. The lobbyist must be ready and willing to answer those questions. If unable to give an accurate answer, the lobbyist should refrain from answering and promise to get back to the legislator later, Morrisette said.

Once the lobbyist is prepared to be credible, he must begin to steer the bill through the assembly along the path of least resistance.

"Referral of your bill to committee is crucial in a lobbying effort," Morrisette said. "The speaker and the lieutenant governor have that power and your first job is to see that your bill gets to a committee that will possibly give it a favorable report."

Picking a committee means "doing spadework with committee members," he said. That is, after finding out who is on every committee that your bill could possibly be sent to, start calling on those legislators. Talk to them about the bill and keep score. You obviously want your bill going to the committee with the most favorably disposed legislators.

Even given a favorable committee,

Spy Case Causes A Rift

WASHINGTON — The disturbing factor in the Reagan administration's split over the Pollard spy case is that it cannot be bridged by smooth-sounding statements, a concern that almost produced a telephone appeal to FBI Director William Webster from State Department legal counsel Abraham Sofaer last week.

Sofaer was aghast at Webster's careful, on-the-record remark to The New York Times that Israel had been "selective" in its cooperation with U.S. efforts to get to the bottom of Israeli espionage. At the last moment, officials told us, Sofaer decided his phone call to Judge Webster might be misunderstood if it got out.

On Monday, the smooth-sounding statement was put out by the State Department alleging administration harmony.

A call from shrewd ex-judge Sofaer would have changed nothing in the Justice Department or the FBI, illustrating the incurable split between diplomats and prosecutors even over questioning Israeli Gen. Aviem Sella. As of today, Secretary of State George Shultz holds high cards because the administration wants no damage done to the intimacy it has built in U.S.-Israeli relations. But Justice's success in extracting Jonathan Jay Pollard's confession has given prosecutors new muscle.

The question whether Air Force

Gen. Sella, allegedly Pollard's first case officer here, should or should not be questioned on his own role in Pollard's espionage for Israel delineates the stark divergence in practice and psychology between State and Justice.

The State Department view is that Sella should be encouraged to answer questions but that Israel cannot be held accountable if he declines the honor or tells nothing. That is because the Israeli government's claim to have been ignorant of the espionage has not been officially disproved and the diplomats at State want very much to believe it.

The law-enforcement establishment, disagreeing, views questioning

of Sella as dubious; he would probably add nothing to the extensive file of information obtained from Pollard's plea-bargaining. Theoretically, the recently-promoted Air Force general could be charged in the case, but extradition of Israeli citizens to the U.S. is in most cases impossible.

Justice Department officials have insisted ever since Pollard's June 4 guilty plea that Prime Minister Peres never has delivered on his pledge to investigate his own government's role in the case. If he had, Sella's alleged role as Pollard's first case officer would have been uncovered by Israel and not, as it was, by Justice Department investigators. With that backdrop, what these hard-headed investigators see in Israel is stonewalling.

The State Department claimed that Attorney General Edwin Meese personally collaborated on the department's statement last Monday, drafted with the help of White House aides, but Justice officials denied that. He did agree with its finding that "successful prosecution" of Pollard was made possible by Israel's cooperation. But he also has agreed privately that Judge Webster correctly defined Israel's cooperation as "selective."

The suspicion of Israel's overall conduct by counter-intelligence officials, as contrasted to the diplomats' desire not to find evidence of Israeli government complicity, was fed by one vagrant document. Found in the telltale suitcase that Pollard's wife was unable to get rid of, this document was described in the indictment as a letter to Pollard's alleged second handler, Yossi Yagur. It dealt with "missile systems designed or manufactured by various non-communist countries, which might be available for sale to Iran."

U.S. investigators recently uncovered an alleged multimillion-dollar "private" sale of U.S. arms to Iran and arrested as one of the dealers an Israeli identified by the U.S. Customs Service as a retired army general.

Costa Ricans Tour Eastern N.C.

In the short space of 10 days, a contingent of Costa Ricans are seeing as much of eastern North Carolina as the average local resident will see in several years. The 10 arrived in Greenville last Thursday night and are visiting agricultural, forest, fishing and tourist sites on daily travels that will include places as distant as Corolla on the Outer Banks.

Their host and guide is Dr. Vincent (Vince) Bellis, a professor of biology at East Carolina University. The visit is part of a People-to-People Exchange between coastal communities in eastern North Carolina and the Talamanca Canton of Costa Rica. The proposal for the exchange was submitted jointly by Bellis and Paula Palmer of Puerto Viejo de Limon in Costa Rica. (Ms. Palmer, an author-teacher, will be the featured speaker in a workshop at Willis Building form 12:30 to 5 p.m. Monday.)

The exchange project is being funded by the U.S. Department of State with financial assistance from the North Carolina Chapter of the Sierra Club and the North Carolina Coastal Federation. U.S. Rep. Walter B. Jones Sr. has been an advocate of the exchange program since its initial proposal.

Costa Rica's Canton of Talamanca has long been an isolated area of that Central American country. It is only in the last decade that a road connected the sparsely populated canton with the rest of the country.

Talamanca, geographically the largest canton in Costa Rica, has a population of only 8,500. Most live in places known by community names rather than in towns or villages. The largest village, Chauta, counts only about 600 residents.

The Talamanca are comprised of Indian communities in the moun-

tains and along the area's major rivers, a few Latinos, and a population majority consisting of black families of Afro-Caribbean origins living in the coastal area. Many Talamanca speak both Spanish and English.

A brief look at the 10 individuals and the communities they represent on the visit here reveal a cross-section of farmers, fishermen, technicians and cultural workers in their homeland. They are:

•Gandoca Community — Ismael Rojas, active in his community council and in projects such as the new Wildlife Refuge. He is also a well-and-pump technician.

•Manzanillo Community — Cousins George Hansel and Ruben Ansell. Hansel is a leader in the community council, a member of the culture committee and a farmer who cultivates cacao and coconuts. Ansell is a fisherman and farmer, active in community affairs and is considered a "natural leader" in Manzanillo.

•Puerto Viejo Community — Octavio (Tallo) Smith is a fisherman and farmer, a traditional man in the terms of black culture. Rolando (Pino) Hansell, one of the younger members of the group, is a student at the community's high school. He has studied construction using bamboo and likes sports, fishing, hunting and dancing. The second representative from Puerto Viejo, Roy Myrie, owns a local bar. He coaches the local women's softball team and plays baseball for the Limon team. Myrie is interested in tourism.

•Cahuita Community — Edith Brown is a member of the Coopetalamanca board and has started an English speaking school in Cahuita. She organizes traditional black culture activities. William Mullings is a recent graduate of Limon's technical high school where he studied carpentry and masonry

and is a newly elected vice-president of the community council. Danilo Acosta represents the Culture Committee. He is a professor at the high school in charge of the cultural magazine project and is known as a dedicated educator.

One other Talamanca, whose name was not available, comes from the Gandoca Community.

After getting settled with host families in Greenville on their arrival last Thursday night, the 10 have been keeping a fast-paced schedule seeing places and talking to people in varied fields of activities in the eastern part of the state.

Last Friday, they visited Croatan National Forest south of New Bern and met with district forest Ranger Paul Bullard, who talked to them about the multiple-use concept of forest land applicable to the large national forest area. They also toured the forest to get a first hand look at timber, pulpwood, wildlife and water management, recreation and national heritage protection. They spent Friday night in the fishing village of Swansboro.

On Saturday, the group visited the Duke Marine Laboratory at Beaufort and attended a meeting of the N.C. Coastal Federation. Time was allocated, too, for a walking tour of historic Beaufort.

Sunday morning they assembled at Hadnot Farms in Carteret County, then journeyed on to Stump Sound. There they met with fishermen and farmers for a picnic and for discussion of the effects intensive beach development has on water quality in oyster beds.

At the beginning of this week, on Monday, it was on the headquarters of Cape Lookout National Seashore, where they met with seashore officials. The main topic of discussion dealt with national park policies and practices. Part of the time was given to visiting fishing villages between Harker's Island and Cedar Island.

Tuesday's itinerary included a morning visit to the Open Ground Farms, a corporate farm specializing in the production of young beef cattle. At noon, they took the ferry across Neuse River to Minnesott

Beach and then toured the facilities of Texas Gulf Phosphate at Aurora.

Today brings them to Beaufort County for a morning meeting in Washington, N.C., with John Crew of the N.C. Division of Coastal Management. The afternoon schedule was to include meetings with Randy House of the N.C. State University Eel Culture Laboratory near Aurora and with Etles Henriess of Carolina Seafood Co. Today's activities were to conclude in a ferry ride across the Pamlico River to Bayview to spend the night there.

The Costa Rican visitors face a busy traveling schedule for the final two days of touring. On Thursday they are to visit Mattamuskeet National Wildlife Refuge before going to Nags Head for a tour of such Outer Banks sites as Jockey's Ridge, Nags Head Woods and the seldom-visited village of Corolla in the Currituck County area of the Outer Banks. Plans are to spend the night in Manteo.

city affair may range from \$10,000 to \$15,000. With weekend weddings, however, the groom's parents typically pay for other parties along with family members and friends.

The couple also chips in. Two graphic designers, Karen Trittip and David Freedman, played luncheon hosts at a New York restaurant last fall after playing softball in Central Park with some of their 85 wedding guests.

It was Brides vs. Grooms, with both fathers pitching and both mothers cheering from the bench. The bride, who attached white flowers and a veil to her red baseball cap, headed a lineup that included a sister, an aunt, an uncle, cousins, co-workers and friends. Batting for the groom, whose T-shirt bore a white boutonniere, were his family and friends. The Grooms won, 15-11.

The couple was presented with a trophy. A yellow softball was passed around and solemnly signed. And then the guests, who had traveled from such places as Dayton, Ohio, and Alamo, Calif., set off for lunch and a sightseeing tour.

Bachelor parties — his and hers — are part of the weekend wedding, although the activities are likely to be more rigorous than merely raising a beer mug. "Barb's taking her group golfing while my group and I go biking," said Kevin Owen, whose marriage to Barbara Bostick is to be held in Aspen, Colo., over the Fourth of July weekend. Owen, the sales manager of a resort association, said he did not know precisely how many of the 100 guests would be horseback riding in the Rockies or white-water rafting. He added, however, that most guests are signing up for both exotic events as well as more mundane ones, such as a trip to town for disco dancing after the fireworks display.

"People are flying in from California, North Carolina, Atlanta, Ohio, Michigan — all over," he said. "If they're spending all that time and money, we want them to have some neat things to do."

As for the bridal couple, Owen echoed the view of many: "You want a chance to visit with people you're meeting for the first time and people you haven't seen for years. You don't want to stand in a reception line, shake hands and then blow town."

Not all weekend weddings start out that way. Gunnar Knapp, a University of Alaska economics professor,

and Alice Tower, a schoolteacher, were thinking smaller when they sent out invitations to their wedding last July in Anchorage. They were expecting only a handful of acceptances from "outside," which is how Alaskans refer to the rest of the world.

"We're coming!" cried 50 people from outside, many of them college friends of the groom, a Harvard University alumnus, or of the bride, a graduate of Middlebury College.

Thus, like many other grooms, Knapp became a wedding travel agent. He met incoming planes, rented cars and set up a "wedding village" in a mountainside condominium complex. He created a "Great Wedding Handbook," complete with maps, local lore and salmon fishing tips. He and his mother-in-law wrote an operetta with some help from Gilbert and Sullivan. It was based on the couple's courtship and performed at the one of a profusion of parties.

There was no honeymoon. There was, in fact, no moon — only the midnight sun of mid-July as guests danced and sang and rarely slept.

Nobody hurried home because there was an even longer wedding the next week when Mrs. Knapp's brother, Steve Tower, married Janice Tanaka. "For a week before and a week after the wedding they and 15 friends from Dartmouth drove around in a van, fishing, canoeing and river rafting," Knapp said. "But that's another story — the two-week wedding on wheels."

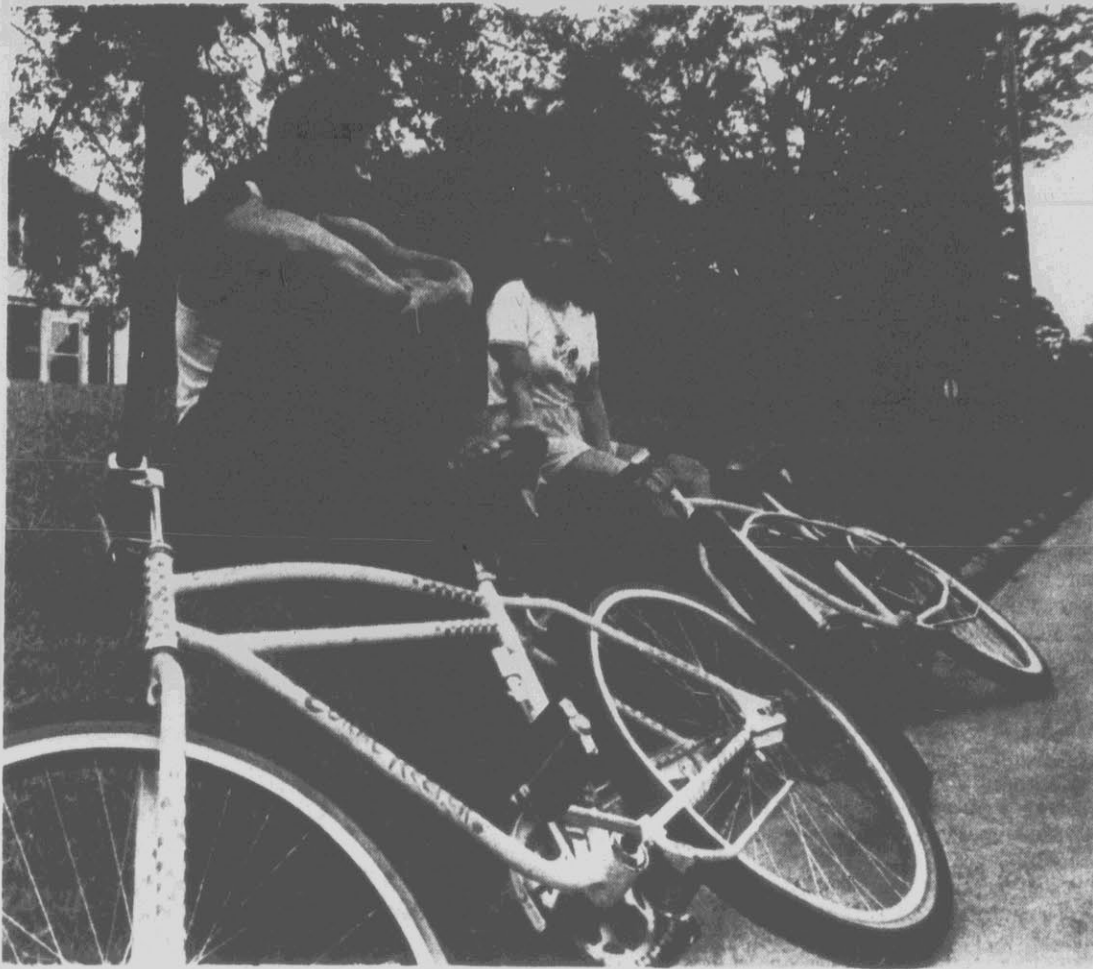

Council Agenda

Two rezoning requests by S.A. Paramore Jr. head the list of items to be addressed Thursday in regular session of the Greenville City Council.

Up for consideration is a request to rezone 12.3 acres located off the western right-of-way of the 14th Street extension, north of Windy Ridge from residential/agricultural to high-density residential and a request to rezone a 13.1-acre tract located east of Tucker Estates subdivision from residential/agricultural to single-family medium density residential.

Council members will also consider requests by Harry S. Bateman to rezone about 11 acres located on east of Eastbrook Apartments from residential/agricultural to office and institutional and rezone a 22.7-acre tract east of Eastwood subdivision from residential/agricultural to medium density residential.

The council will consider a request by the city of Greenville to zone 211.5 acres on SR 1534, east of Greenville to unoffensive industry. The property is currently being used as a wastewater treatment plant by Greenville Utilities Commission.

Council member will also discuss a resolution fixing the date of a public hearing on the proposed annexation of the land.

The board will also consider appointments to boards and commissions, a resolution stating the council's intent to adopt a new method of election and scheduling a public hearing for July 7, resolutions for sale and development and disposal parcels, and a resolution authorizing the sale of property by quitclaim deed.

Other matters to be addressed include three right-of-way encroachments, a request to restrict parking on the western side of Clark Street, a resolution declaring certain vehicles and equipment surplus to the city's need and authorizing sale at public auction, tax releases, a request by the Greenville Jaycees to hold a fireworks display on July 4, a mosquito control grant and an amendment to the Manual of Fees to increase the charges for opening and closing graves in city cemeteries.

Grants Requested

RALEIGH — For the fifth consecutive year, requests for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for community revitalization projects far exceed the amount of money available.

In applications submitted to the N.C. Department of Natural Resources and Community Development (NRCD), 133 local governments, including Pitt County, have asked for a total of \$68 million. Less than a third of that amount, \$22.2 million, is available for the projects. The available funds are a portion of North Carolina's \$31 million CDBG allocation for fiscal year 1986.

Projects may include rehabilitation, water, sewer, street and drainage improvements and demolition and clearance of dilapidated structures. All projects must primarily benefit low and moderate income persons.

Three project requests submitted by Pitt County officials amount to a total of \$1,475,675. The three projects are: Pitt County at large, \$600,000; the village of Simpson, \$275,675, and the town of Winterville, \$600,000.

Martin's Highway Package Stalls As Legislature Mulls Tax Issues

RALEIGH (AP) — A Republican lawmaker is offering to act as a mediator between Gov. Jim Martin and Democratic legislative leaders to get talks on a Highway Funding package off dead center.

Senate Minority Leader Bill Redman, R-Iredell, chief Senate sponsor of Martin's \$210 million "Roads to the Future" program, also said Tuesday he was exploring the possibility of suggesting a sales tax increase to resolve a squabble over Martin's proposed budgetary transfers.

Meanwhile, it appeared likely that legislative committees would divide the Martin plan into at least two bills, despite the governor's plea that they be debated and voted on as a single package.

Redman said in an interview that he would seek a meeting today with Democratic leaders and offer to take a compromise proposal to Martin if the Democrats would make one.

"The cards are on the table and somebody's got to open," Redman

said. "I need somebody to give me an offer."

Jordan agreed that little progress had been made, despite a "beneficial" half-hour telephone conversation between him and Martin on Tuesday.

The Republican governor continues to seek a shift of the highway patrol and driver education programs from the Highway Fund to the General Fund at a cost of \$98.5 million per year. Democratic leaders oppose that, saying it would deprive the General Fund of money for education.

Redman said boosting the state sales tax by half a cent might hold the answer to the transfer squabble.

The increase would raise about \$180 million, half of which could be earmarked for the General Fund to cover the highway patrol and driver education, Redman said. The remaining \$90 million could be devoted to schools, water and sewer projects or other programs, he said.

Redman stressed that his consideration of that and other options

was "just exploratory" and that he had not tried to sell Martin or other lawmakers on the idea. He said he would want to sound out business and industry leaders before endorsing the tax increase himself.

Later, Jordan told reporters he and Martin had made "no measurable progress" in their phone conversation, but agreed to "keep the dialogue going."

Jordan said he told Martin he agreed with Ramsey's assessment that Martin's program should be divided into at least two bills.

Under legislative rules, matters dealing with the state budget — such as the proposed transfers in Martin's package — must be considered by appropriations committees, while the section proposing a 2 3/4 cents-per-gallon gasoline tax increase would be handled by finance committees.

Martin seemed receptive to dividing the bill if assured that the transfers would be voted on prior to the gasoline tax increase, Jordan said.

"That would at least let those Republicans who say they are not going to vote for a tax unless they get a transfer ... have prior knowledge" about the fate of the transfers before facing a tax vote, Jordan said.

He added, however, that he did not know whether he could guarantee the votes would take place in that order.

Jordan said he did not think dividing the bill hurt the Martin program's chances for enactment. "Certainly it's not the intent to ... divide and conquer," Jordan said.

Redman said GOP legislators were maintaining their tough stance against costing for any tax increase without the budgetary transfers, which Democratic leaders oppose as a raid on the General Fund, which goes primarily to education.

"My people (Republican senators) know that if (the Legislature) votes down budget transfers, they're free to do what they want" when the gas tax comes up for a vote, Redman said. If that happens, he said he would vote against the higher tax, while Martin "will probably have a press conference."

Democrats said they were surprised when Martin did not bring up the highway issue during a breakfast meeting Tuesday at the Executive Mansion.

"We opened with a prayer, ate and left," House Speaker Liston Ramsey

said. "Nobody talked about any bill in my presence."
Republicans said the steak-and-eggs breakfast was a social occasion designed to welcome the lawmakers back to Raleigh. "The opportunity just did not present itself to bring it up," Redman said.

Art Linkletter, Mary Lou Retton, and Maj. Gen. Stuart E. Barstat, chief of chaplains for the U.S. Air Force.



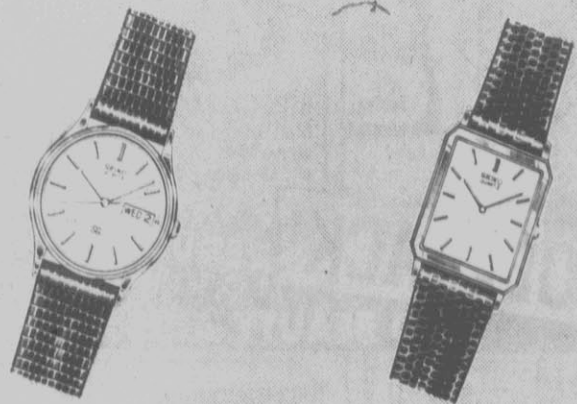

Employment Officials Say Summer Offers Sufficient Temporary Jobs

Officials say job prospects look good this summer in North Carolina, especially for vacationing students who are willing to sweat a lot or flip a plethora of hamburgers for a few months.

"We find this year we've got plenty of jobs, and every year we have plenty of youths," said Ralph Nevils, supervisor of summer youth employment for the state Employment Security Commission. "The problem is matching up the youths to the jobs."

"We know a great many of them want a job as a lifeguard, but for most, that's not feasible," he said. "If you're interested in making money, you just have to go where the jobs are."

The jobs are mostly in fast-food restaurants, parks, plant nurseries, farms, factories, construction sites, moving companies and ground

maintenance crews, he said. "All the fast-foods are begging people to come to work," said Nevils. "Fast-food companies usually work at a fast pace with low pay, and they have trouble filling the jobs." Some restaurants are offering \$3.50 an hour to start instead of the usual \$3.35, he said.

Jobs involving heavy labor, especially farmwork, are also plentiful, he said.

"We placed 10,000 people in summer youth jobs last year, and we hope to place 11,000 or 11,500 this year," said Nevils. "Some college loans are not as plentiful now as they have been, so we expect to see a lot more high school seniors and college students in the job market trying to get money for college."

Urban areas and the vacation areas along the coast and in the mountains are likely to have the most jobs, he said. Inner-city areas and rural areas will have the fewest.

"They'll have the hardest time in rural areas if they won't take farm work," he said. "It's dirty, hot and sweaty."

Job prospects in Henderson County should be better this summer than last year, said manager John Murdock of the ESC office in Hendersonville.

"This time last year, we had some layoffs from major manufacturers," he said. "Some of those have been called back to work... and there have been no new layoffs. Manufacturing is still probably the slowest part of the economy."

Jobs in the service sector, however, are plentiful, said Murdock.

The same is true in Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck and Dare counties, where the unemployment rate usually declines dramatically during the summer tourist season, said manager Michele Scott of the ESC office in Elizabeth City.

"We could use more jobs, but at the

same time, we think we're going to hit a balance there," she said.

Guilford County has plenty of job openings in fast-food restaurants, light industrial work and construction, said Greensboro ESC manager Thomas Reynolds.

"Laborers are getting \$5 per hour and working seven days a week," he said. "They can make a lot of money if they're willing to do the work and work overtime."

Some factories are increasing production now in preparation for winter and Christmas sales, providing even more jobs, he said.

"It looks just about as good as it has the past few summers - if you're over 18," said Warren Laird, placement supervisor in the Greensboro ESC office. He said people under 18 may be limited to fast-food jobs, mowing lawns and other lower-paying jobs because many companies are not insured for workers their age.

School Bus Wreck Injures 15

FRANKLIN, N.C. (AP) — A Macon County school bus hit a ditch and flipped over, seriously hurting one child, and slightly injuring 14 others, as the accident piled some students in the center of the vehicle and forced them to escape through the windshield, officials say.

Greg Raby, 11, was taken to Angel Community Hospital after the accident Tuesday and was later transferred to Memorial Mission Hospital in Asheville. A spokesman for Angel Hospital said he was listed in serious condition.

Most of the students were from Cullasaja Elementary School. One was from Franklin High School and another from Macon Middle School.

Julie Elliott, 11, a student at Cullasaja, said she felt the bus leave the right side of the road and the driver called out "hold on." She said she held on and the bus crossed the road and tumbled over.

When the bus flipped, Miss Elliott said she hit the ceiling and then felt

the bus hit the tree. She said she was the first one out and she climbed out the broken windshield and ran to a house under construction. She told the workers the bus had wrecked and for them to call an ambulance.

"I thought I was in a nightmare or something," she said.

Chad Elliott, 7, said all the students made their way out through the windshield except for two that were hurt and were in the rear of the bus. Macon County Emergency Management Service and Franklin Fire Department members removed them from the bus.

Highway Patrol Trooper C.D. Jenkins said the bus was driven by Richard Todd Duvall, 18, who graduated from Franklin High School Sunday.

Jenkins said the bus ran off the right shoulder of a city road and into a ditch shortly after 2 p.m. The bus then came back across the road and ran off the shoulder on the left side of the road, overturned once in a

cleared field and came to rest on its wheels, wedged against a tree, Jenkins said.

Chris Schlenker, 11, said the first he knew that an accident was about to happen was when the bus swerved and then turned "real sharp."

"I closed my eyes and when I

opened them I was in another seat. My back and knee were hurting. I saw everybody getting out the front window and they all got together and waited for the ambulance. He (Duvall) had us all in a group keeping us out of the road," Schlenker said.

Piedmont Airliner Blows Tire, Lands

CHARLOTTE (AP) — A Piedmont Airlines jet carrying 123 people landed safely at the airport near

Greensboro after one of two nose tires blew out during takeoff at Charlotte-Douglas International Airport, officials said.

The plane landed at 5:08 p.m. Tuesday, said John Cobbs, an air traffic controller.

"There were no problems at all," Cobbs said. "He (the pilot) turned off the runway and taxied off the runway."

Claudette McCullough, an administrative assistant at Piedmont, said the Boeing 737-200 jet was on its way to Minneapolis with 118 passengers and five crew members. She said the plane was ordered to land at Winston-Salem-Greensboro-High Point Regional Airport because the field was in its flight path.

No Charge

VENTURA, Calif. (AP) — Jan-Michael Vincent, star of television's "Airwolf," will not be charged with drunken driving because there's is not sufficient proof he was under the influence of alcohol, a prosecutor says.

Vincent's blood-alcohol level was 0.08 percent when he was arrested May 15 in Moorpark, 30 miles northwest of downtown Los Angeles, said Deputy District Attorney Robert Irmas on Tuesday. The legal limit is 0.10 percent.

However, the level still showed Vincent had been drinking within six hours of driving, a violation of probation from a 1983 drunken driving case, Los Angeles County district attorney's spokesman Al Albergate has said.

Mavretic Seeking Public Vote On Eliminating Property Taxes

RALEIGH (AP) — Rep. Joe Mavretic, whose bill to trade property taxes for sales taxes faltered in the House last year, is taking a page from nuclear waste foes to draw attention to the issue.

Mavretic, D-Edgecombe, filed legislation Tuesday to set up a non-binding referendum on whether to make North Carolina the first state to repeal all local property taxes in favor of an 8-cent sales tax.

A non-binding referendum on whether North Carolina should host a high-level radioactive waste repository got a resounding "no" vote in May.

"This is part and parcel of a long-range strategy to change the revenue system for local government in the state," Mavretic said, adding that the proposed referendum, coming on the heels of the May referendum about the repository, raises the question of when the people should be consulted about issues.

Under the legislation, voters would be asked whether an 8-percent sales tax would be preferable to property taxes. The referendum also would ask whether to constitutionally require that half of all corporate income taxes be distributed to local governments on a per capita basis.

"If it's worth \$10,000 finding out whether everybody wants to have a nuclear waste dump in Buncombe or Wake County, we can do the same thing here," Mavretic said. Although the legislature would not have to heed the results, "This will provide some factual information for decision makers in '87."

Mavretic last year pushed a bill that would make similar changes. The measure passed the House Finance Committee, but Mavretic had it returned to the panel from the House floor because he lacked the votes to get it through.

"Property taxes have a history of failing to provide the revenues needed by most local governments in the state," he said. "And by most, I mean 90 percent. And it's not just based on population. Of the 10 largest counties, five would gain with the combination of sales and use taxes instead of property taxes."

Under the bill the 5 percentage point increase in sales taxes would be distributed to local governments. Cities and counties also would share half the revenue generated by the corporate income tax.

Mavretic said he was not certain a vote would go in his favor, unlike the nuclear referendum, in which over 90 percent of those voting opposed the location of a high-level nuclear waste repository in North Carolina.

Asked whether the referendum was likely to pass in the short session, Mavretic said, "I think with an election coming up in November, we will probably have a pretty good turnout, so it's a good time to do it."

In other legislative action:

North Carolina would join 48 states that allow the impaneling of investigative grand juries in drug trafficking cases under a bill before the House Judiciary IV Committee.

Under the legislation, passed by the Senate last year, a district attorney could file a petition seeking a grand jury. If the state attorney general joins in the petition, it would go before a three-judge panel appointed by the chief justice of the state Supreme Court.

"We all know that drug trafficking has reached a level in North Carolina

that something must be done to try to bring this to a stop," said Sen. Tony Rand, D-Cumberland, the bill's sponsor.

The bill would allow prosecutors to enter the grand jury room for the first time to interrogate witnesses.

District Attorney Mike Easley said the law would speed up the investigation process to help prosecute big-time drug dealers before they have a chance to flee.

Rand said only North Carolina and Connecticut lack the authority to impanel investigative grand juries in drug trafficking cases.

State Bureau of Investigation Director Robert Morgan said he and Attorney General Lacy Thornburg support the measure.

Morgan said since the chief justice would appoint the three-judge panel to decide whether a grand jury should be impaneled, that would rule out the possibility of "judge shopping" by prosecutors.

The law would go into effect Oct. 1, but would automatically die Oct. 1, 1988, unless the Legislature decides to continue it.

Rep. Paul Pulley, D-Durham, the committee's chairman, said he expected the panel to give the bill a favorable report Thursday.

Legislation to set up mandatory income withholding for parents who are overdue in child-support payments was sent to a House subcommittee after nearly an hour of debate.

The bill, introduced by Sen. Helen Marvin, D-Gaston, and passed by the Senate last year, would require withholding only in cases involving Aid to Families with Dependent Children. But it would allow withholding in other cases as well.

The mandatory withholding would kick in when a parent was at least one month behind in payments. No more than 50 percent of the parent's disposable income could be withheld, and that amount only in the case of a parent who is not supporting a spouse or more than one dependent child.

While parts of the bill are required by federal law, debate centered around areas not mandated.

Sam Johnson, a lobbyist representing employers, said he had 19 technical changes he would like to make when the bill goes to the House Judiciary III subcommittee. And Edith Marsh, another representative of industry, said her clients would support only legislation to track the federal requirements.

Rep. Annie Kennedy, D-Forsyth, filed one of two bills suggested by a study commission on legislative ethics.

The bill would limit gifts, loans, discounts or services given to legislators or employees of the General Assembly to \$25 per year per lobbyist.

The bill would not apply to political contributions; food or beverages for immediate consumption; lodging and transportation within the state; admission to state-sponsored industries, facilities or events or to collegiate athletic events; commercially reasonable transactions; honoraria of less than \$200 per event for speaking or participating in a panel or seminar; or reasonable expenses for admission, food, travel, lodging in connection with such speeches or participation.

"I think that it's time we looked at our conduct," Ms. Kennedy said. "This is more of an effort to establish some rules and regulations that would be helpful. Many of the legislators have expressed interest in what would be appropriate and what would not be appropriate."

She said Sen. Marshall Rauch, D-Gaston, would sponsor a measure to restrict lobbying by spouses of lawmakers or partners in businesses owned by legislators.

The House Rules Committee unanimously approved a resolution honoring the firefighters who battled a blaze in Pender County that consumed more than 73,000 acres this spring.

The resolution was sent to the House, where action was expected later this week.

ELLERBE, N.C. (AP) — A Richmond County man who died of wounds he received in the April 5th bombing of a West Berlin discotheque decided to make a career of the Army when he joined nine years ago, his relatives say.

"At Christmas, when he was home, he talked about it," said Sgt. James E. Goin's aunt, Tessie Mae Brown of Ellerbe. "He said he loved the Army good."

In late April, Goin, 26, was given the Purple Heart, awarded to wounded U.S. servicemen. He died in a West Berlin hospital Saturday. He

had been in critical condition since the bombing and both legs had been amputated, a military spokesman said.

Goin's funeral will be held this Saturday with burial next week in Arlington National Cemetery, a funeral director said Tuesday.

Chester McLendon, the Ellerbe funeral director handling arrangements, said the service for Goin was scheduled for 2 p.m. at St. Luke's Free Will Baptist Church north of Ellerbe.

Textiles

RALEIGH (AP) — Textile com-

panies must continue their aggressive drives to modernize their plants to ensure their survival, says former Gov. Jim Hunt, whose "Strategy for Victory" is designed to strengthen the U.S. industry.

"There are those of us who believe we can't become a doggone service economy and survive," Hunt told about 35 textile officials and educators attending a conference on "Innovation and Entrepreneurship in Textiles and Apparel" at North Carolina State University Tuesday.

State officials said evidence of possible patient neglect or abuse and possible Medicaid fraud found in their investigations of Century Care had been referred to the attorney general's office.

Sheriff Probe

CHARLOTTE (AP) — The State Bureau of Investigation will probe allegations that inmates at Mecklenburg County's satellite jail worked at a Myrtle Beach motel owned by Sheriff C.W. Kidd, SBI director Robert Morgan says.

The SBI will also investigate allegations that Kidd allowed former Charlotte lawyer and convicted embezzler Francis Clarkson Jr. to fly to Myrtle Beach while in a work-release program. Department of Correction policy forbids prisoners from leaving the state.

Kidd, who was elected in 1982, said Tuesday he was "absolutely dumbfounded" by the "bad publicity."

Scientists Say 'Greenhouse Effect' Already Causing Earth To Warm

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists are warning Congress that the long-theorized, life-threatening overheating of the Earth from man-made air pollution is now a frightening reality.

"The fact that the greenhouse effect is real is proven," said James Hansen, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Goddard Institute for Space Studies.

"Global warming is inevitable — it's only a question of magnitude and time," said Robert Watson, director of NASA's upper atmospheric program. "We can expect significant changes in climate in the next few decades."

Hansen, Watson and other scientists delivered their somber assessments Tuesday as the Senate Environment subcommittee on environmental pollution opened two

days of hearings on the greenhouse effect.

Backed by recent findings of severe ozone layer depletion in the atmosphere over Antarctica, they reiterated scientific predictions that the warming threatens the globe with floods, drought and more skin cancer by the middle of the 21st century.

And for Sherwood Rowland, a chemistry professor at the University of California, the picture further down the road is even bleaker. "If you have the greenhouse effect going on indefinitely, then you have a temperature rise that will extinct human life" in 500 to 1,000 years.

The greenhouse effect is a shorthand term for global warming caused by chemicals such as chlorofluorocarbons, carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxide accumulating in the atmosphere and trapping heat. The pollutants also destroy the ozone layer, which helps protect humans from the cancer-causing ultraviolet rays of the sun.

Under the greenhouse scenario, the Earth gets baked. Rich farmlands

turn into deserts. Forests wilt and die. Coastal areas are inundated by oceans swollen by melted polar and glacial ice.

Hansen predicted that global temperatures should be nearly 2 degrees higher in 20 years, "which is about the warmest the earth has been in the last 100,000 years."

The pace of atmospheric destruction is increasing steadily and rapidly, said Rowland, who in 1974 published pioneering research on chlorofluorocarbons — gases used as refrigerants and aerosol-can propellants. This led the United States to ban their use in spray cans, but it continues elsewhere.

"There is now compelling observational evidence that the chemical composition of the atmosphere is changing at a rapid rate on a global scale," Watson said.

The scientists, calling for curbs on air pollution, said a recently completed five-year study in Antarctica provides an ominous signal to the world. During the period, there was an ozone loss over the South Pole of

from 30 percent to 50 percent, they said.

Rowland said the finding proved "the remarkable correlation between this depletion in the Antarctic ozone and the rapid growth in the atmospheric concentrations of chlorofluoromethanes, and the connection is inescapable."

"We now have a hole in the ozone layer which will last for a century or more, even if the entire world were to stop further emissions of chlorofluorocarbons today — which is, of course, impossible," Rowland said.

The "hole" Rowland referred to is not literally present year-round, but appears every October. The scientists said they did not know why extreme signs of ozone depletion are first appearing in Antarctica.

Hansen said the average U.S. temperature has risen from 1 to 2 degrees since 1958 and is predicted to increase an additional 3 or 4 degrees sometime between 2010 and 2020.

He said that with an expected doubling of atmospheric carbon

dioxide by 2040, the number of days each year with temperatures over 80 degrees would rise from 35 to 85 in Washington, D.C., and Omaha, Neb.

Stephen Leatherman of the University of Maryland said that in the last 100 years the sea level has risen about one foot.

Instruments Blamed For Scare

HELSINKI, Finland (AP) — Finland's Bureau of Nuclear Radiation Safety today said faulty instruments probably were responsible for a mysteriously high radiation reading at a coastal monitoring station near the Soviet Union.

"The most likely explanation for the peak measurements at Kotka is at the moment a fault in the measuring devices," a five-paragraph government statement said.

On Tuesday, officials said the measuring instruments were not to blame for Monday's six hours of unusually high recordings of radioactivity. For 10 seconds the readings were even higher than those recorded after the Chernobyl nuclear accident in the Soviet Ukraine.

"The other slight increases detected in the Kotka area on June 9 may have been caused by local weather conditions and changes in normal background radiation," it said.

"If later analysis gives cause, the Bureau of Nuclear Radiation Safety will advise about the situation immediately," it said.

The monitoring station at Kotka is on Finland's southeastern coast only about 60 miles from the coast of Soviet Estonia.

A 10-second peak Monday night showed a reading of 1.8 milliroentgen per hour, four times greater than any recorded in Finland after the Chernobyl nuclear power station accident.

Other stations near Kotka also recorded higher levels of radiation but none as high as the reading at Kotka.

The mysterious reading touched off alerts at nuclear power stations in both Finland and Sweden, where checks showed only normal levels of radiation. No public safety warnings were issued.

Finnish officials said Tuesday that radiation would have had to be more than 10 times higher than that indicated by the Kotka peak reading before public precautions were called for.

Monitoring stations in neighboring Sweden reported no unusual readings during the Finnish incident and officials in Stockholm today indicated support for the Helsinki explanation.

"We have good relations with the radiation authorities in Finland and believe what they say," said Hans Edvall, a department head at Sweden's National Radiation Protection Institute.

Edvall said in a telephone interview that weather factors such as rains, bringing lingering airborne radiation down to the ground, had at times caused changes in background radiation in Sweden as well.

The Finnish statement said military aircraft sent up after the reading had collected four air dust samples Tuesday and that inspection of the samples showed no radioactive elements that were not already there from the Chernobyl accident.

It said a measuring vehicle was at work in eastern Finland, close to the Soviet border, and it too had not found anything new in air or ground checks.

The Kotka readings had dropped back to 0.03 milliroentgen, which officials said was close to normal, less than 24 hours after the sudden peak.

Finland and Sweden were the first two western countries to report the discovery of radioactivity that the Soviet Union later said was a result of the April 26 accident at Chernobyl.

New Baptist Leader Says More 'Love' Needed

ATLANTA (AP) — More love and fewer liberals is what the Southern Baptist Convention needs, a Memphis, Tenn., preacher suggested after being swept by fundamentalists to the presidency of the nation's largest Protestant denomination.

The Rev. Adrian Rogers said Tuesday night he hopes his term as president, marking the eighth straight year fundamentalists have held the post, will bring a lessening of political feuding among the 14.5 million Southern Baptists.

However, he showed no sign of softening efforts of the denomination's most conservative wing to cleanse Baptist seminaries and other agencies of teachers or other employees who don't share their view that every word in the Bible is historically and scientifically true.

"We're not trying to tell any pro-

fessor what he must believe or any denominational employee what he must believe — that is between him and God," Rogers said at a news conference.

"But we are saying that those who work for us and those who have their salaries paid by us ought to reflect what the great majority of us say we want taught" as spelled out in a Baptist statement of faith, he said.

"Old-line Southern Baptist conservatives are taking back the convention," the Rev. Ned L. Mathews, a conservative pastor from Gastonia, N.C., said. "The election today of Rogers is on the borderline of being a mandate."

Rogers, 54, who was also president in 1979, won this year by 54 percent to 46 percent over the Rev. W. Winfred Moore of Amarillo, Texas, in voting by about 40,000 church messengers crammed into the Georgia World Congress Center.

Moderates supporting Moore say Rogers and recent predecessors have won because of superior political organizing that gives them convention influence far beyond their support in the denomination's more than 30,000 churches.

However, Rogers said he felt Baptists holding his literalist view are not a minority or even a mere 54-46 percent majority, but actually make up 90 percent of the denomination.

Asked how that reading of support would affect his appointments, he said, "I don't think that we need to say that liberalism, classic liberalism or Southern Baptist liberalism needs to be reflected" in appointments to groups that in turn control seminaries and multimillion-dollar mission agencies.

He had previously said the denomination's seminaries were infected with "liberal theology," which he defined Tuesday night as doubts about the literal accuracy of various biblical accounts.

very much in line with the prevailing conservative sentiment.

"In the past decade or less, the liberalism that seemed triumphant has been thrown on the defensive," Rogers said. "So many of the proud liberal myths about man's self-sufficiency, government's omniscience and our ability to do everything without God have shriveled up and look as though the next great wind should blow them away."

"But we cannot become complacent," Rogers said, declaring that he was counting on believers such as the Baptists to help him on such matters as fighting abortion and bringing back public school prayer.

One messenger, the Rev. Bob Setzer of Middleburg, Va., complained from the convention floor that reading the message just after the vote deciding the hotly contested presidential contest was "ill-timed and hostile."

The convention's outgoing president, the Rev. Charles Stanley of Atlanta, said it was appropriate to read such a greeting, a comment that won loud applause.

Moore, 66, himself a Bible-quoting

pastor of a big Texas church, championed what he said was the denomination's traditional tolerance of individual churches' views of just what the Bible means.

Asked at his own news conference about Rogers' 90 percent contention, Moore said, "I agree with his figures, but I think he has them reversed — 90 percent of Baptists in the mainstream are ready to accept diversity" within reasonable bounds.

He said that if the group now clearly in the ascendancy should draw the circle of allowable beliefs ever more tightly many Baptists would simply leave, "and it grieves me. Some have left already, and I regret it."

Rogers is pastor of Bellevue Baptist Church in Memphis, one of the

nation's largest churches with more than 11,000 members.

Born in West Palm Beach, Fla., he received a bachelor of arts degree from one Baptist school, Stetson University in DeLand, Fla., and a master's degree from another, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

He said he will try during his presidential term to "create a climate of love and truth, fairness and openness."

In other votes, the convention elected the Rev. Jack Stanton, director of the Institute of Evangelism at Southwest Baptist University in Missouri, as first vice president and the Rev. Ray Roberts of Asheville, N.C., as second vice president.

Moments after his victory was announced, the crowd was read a message from President Reagan

Winter Wheat Crop Smallest In 8 Years

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farmers are harvesting the smallest winter wheat crop in eight years, but it's still big enough to weigh heavily on market prices.

According to the Agriculture Department's latest forecast, winter wheat output this year will be about 1.58 billion bushels, down 14 percent from last year's harvest and 1 percent less than indicated a month ago.

According to USDA records, that would be the smallest winter wheat harvest since 1.22 billion bushels were produced in 1978.

In a related supply-and-demand report issued Tuesday, department analysts projected total U.S. wheat output this year at about 2.15 billion bushels, including the winter and spring crops. That would be the smallest production since 1979, when 2.13 billion bushels were harvested.

Despite the prospective cutback in 1986 production, which has been warmly received by grower organizations and government policymakers, the U.S. wheat supply remains huge and a burden on market prices.

The supply-and-demand projections showed wheat prices at the farm in 1986-87 may average \$2.25 to \$2.50 per bushel, down from \$3.16 last season. One reason will be the lower government supports authorized by Congress in last year's farm law.

For example, price support loan rates for 1986-crop wheat were lowered to \$2.40 per bushel from \$3.30 for the 1985 harvest. The lower supports are intended to make U.S. crops more attractive to foreign buyers and thus boost exports, a prime source of income for American farmers.

The latest wheat figures were released as USDA prepared to hold a non-binding poll among wheat farmers next week on whether they would favor mandatory acreage controls to head off rising surpluses and help boost market prices.

Administration officials have op-

posed mandatory controls in favor of voluntary, market-oriented programs provided by the new law. However, the law also required USDA to conduct the poll, scheduled to begin June 18.

Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng has urged wheat producers to reject the concept of mandatory controls. He said this would require idling at least half of the nation's wheat acreage to boost market prices to the level advocated by many supporters — 25 percent above costs of production, or around \$4.15 per bushel.

Lyng said such mandatory curbs would have "a chilling effect on wheat exports" and make U.S. grain uncompetitive in the world market.

But David L. Senter, national director of the American Agriculture Movement, advocated a strong "yes" vote in support of mandatory controls. He said farmers need supply management so they can "produce what's needed and stop this idiotic overproduction."

The farm price of wheat has had little impact on food prices in recent years. Used primarily as a bread grain, there is less than a nickel's worth of wheat in a 1 pound loaf of bread.

Eight People Hurt In Racial Fight

CLEVELAND (AP) — Racial tension between the only black family in a neighborhood and their white neighbors erupted into gunfire after three months of harassment, and eight people were wounded, authorities said.

The injured, all white, were taken to three hospitals Tuesday night after a man fired four blasts from a shotgun, said police Lt. Robert L. Bolton. A 24-year-old man from a Cleveland suburb who had been visiting the family was arrested about a mile away, Bolton said.

The family, actually two adult women, a teen-age girl and a small child, were escorted by police out of the westside neighborhood, and

Bolton said, "We're trying to find them a safe place to stay."

The family had moved to the neighborhood about three months ago as part of a public housing program run by the Cleveland Metropolitan Housing Authority, which owns the house, officials said.

"I was aware of a lot of tensions," said City Councilman Jay Westbrook. "I had calls at my office from both the family and neighbors."

The family had complained of harassment, said Pat Purdy, a community relations officer in the mayor's office. The side of their white, two-story frame house was spray-painted about six weeks ago with "KKK."



Long Delay May Deplete Astronauts' Corps

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Astronauts may get more power in the wake of the Rogers commission report on the Challenger disaster, but several are likely to resign because of the long wait before shuttle flights resume, says one member of the corps.

The astronaut, who spoke on condition that he not be identified, made his comments Tuesday, the day Owen K. Garriott, 55, the nation's most experienced current space traveler, resigned saying he would rather become a private consultant than endure another long wait before flying in space.

Garriott, who was selected as a

scientist-astronaut in 1965, spent 59 days aboard Skylab in 1973, and nine days in 1983 on the shuttle's first spacelab mission. He spent a total of 1,650 hours in space, more than any of the other active astronauts.

He said he was leaving because the shuttle has been grounded as a result of the Jan. 28 Challenger accident and he expects a three-to-four year wait before he could fly in space again.

"I don't know exactly how long it will be, but it will be at least a year and a half before the first flight, and another year or two beyond that before we're flying a science mission," Garriott said Tuesday.

Three senior military pilot astronauts, Richard Truly, Thomas

Mattingly and Robert Overmeyer, have left the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in recent months, though Truly returned to take a management job after the Challenger accident.

With Garriott's resignation, chief astronaut John Young is the most experienced space traveler. He has spent 811 hours in space on six missions.

The source astronaut said others are also planning to quit because they don't expect to fly for years.

"When they look into the future and realize they'll not be flying for three or four years, they start looking around for a career move," he said.

The astronaut said colleagues are happy about a commission recommendation that more astronauts be given jobs in NASA management.

"It was recognized that a lot of astronauts have not had the opportunity to move up in the management structure because it has been closed to them," he said. "This will force the issue."

Garriott agreed that astronauts felt their chances for promotion in NASA were rare.

"The opportunities are limited for people who want to move beyond their role in the astronaut office," he said. "For those who want a position in management, I'm sure that's an irritant."

The source astronaut said the Rogers commission recommendation that the Flight Crew Operations Directorate be elevated in the NASA management structure also will give astronauts a stronger voice in decisions.

"This would effectively put the astronaut office operating at the level it did during the Apollo days," he added.

The source said that in recent years astronauts have had little power to effect change in the shuttle design and flight operations.

Memos by Young critical of NASA management were leaked during the Challenger investigation, and several of the points he made were incor-

porated in the Rogers commission report.

These include recommendations that no landings at the Kennedy Space Center be planned without further testing of landing systems, and that the shuttle's tires, brakes and nosewheel steering systems be improved.

"Young's memos were in response to the frustration of not being listened to," said the source. "The astronauts didn't have the clout that they used to have."

Garriott was scheduled to fly on another science mission in August, but the flight was canceled after the

Challenger accident.

He said he was also disappointed that the U.S. has allowed the Soviets to get ahead in development of a permanent space station. The Russians recently orbited a space station called the Mir, but a U.S. space station is not scheduled before 1994.

How Long Will Toughness Last?

WASHINGTON (AP) — As the space program moves on to future ventures, the test of the impact of the Challenger disaster and the Rogers commission study will come through most clearly in the relationship between NASA and Congress.

When Congress got its first chance Tuesday to question commission members about the Jan. 28 explosion, members of the House and Senate fell all over themselves criticizing their own past performance as watchdogs of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

"Congress has been too shy in finding fault with NASA," said Rep. Robert Roe, D-N.J., chairman of the House Committee on Science and Technology.

"Too cozy," was how Rep. Manuel Lujan of New Mexico, ranking Republican on the committee, described the relationship.

William P. Rogers, the former secretary of state who headed the four-month investigation of the explosion that destroyed the shuttle and killed its crew of seven, agreed.

"I think Congress shares some of the responsibility," he told the House committee. "I think now that your oversight job will be better."

What a difference a few months has made. The question is whether the new attitude will prevail or whether Congress will eventually lapse into its former approach of viewing the space program as un-critically as possible.

The old approach was best symbolized by the shuttle flights made by Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, and Rep. Bill Nelson, D-Fla.

As chairman of the Senate Appropriations subcommittee that had jurisdiction over NASA's budget, Garn liked to joke with agency officials that he'd be more willing to consider their funding requests if they sent him into space.

He got his wish. When the announcement was made in 1984, Garn, a veteran military pilot, said, "I'm still pinching myself."

Nelson got his chance a year later. The Florida congressman represents the district that includes Cape Canaveral. He also is a member of the Science and Technology committee that oversees the program.

Is there to be a new era of no more free rides for members of Congress and none for NASA either?

"Everybody should take off the gloves," said Rep. James Traficant Jr., D-Ohio.

"With all of this going wrong, how come we didn't have a hint of it?" asked Rep. Robert S. Walker, R-Pa.

The answer to Walker's question may be as simple as the fact that Congress didn't want to know.

To the public and the politicians, the space program was born as a great national effort to beat the Soviets in a race to the moon. It was American technology and enterprise at its best — at least that was what the nation wanted to believe.

It began with the daring of the nation's best pilots testing the unknown.

When John Glenn became the first American to orbit Earth, he was treated unlike any American hero since Charles Lindbergh completed his solo flight across the Atlantic.

America won the race to the moon and then NASA entered the era of the shuttle, space vehicles that could go into orbit and return to earth to land like traditional planes.

Almost without anyone giving it

much thought, the program moved from heroism to flights the public was led to believe were nearly as routine as the shuttles between Washington and New York.

Congress accepted that view enthusiastically, two of its members taking flights.

Now, the lawmakers claim they are ready to get tough. They've suddenly discovered that there were people within the space program who were warning about safety. Warnings went unheeded about the design of the solid rocket booster that the Rogers commission blamed for the Challenger accident.

Perhaps in the new era of the space program, dissenters will take their complaints to Capitol Hill, and Congress may find itself playing a greater role in the management of the program than it ever thought possible.

Reagan Will Meet Press

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan will hold a nationally broadcast White House news conference tonight.

The half-hour question-and-answer session with reporters will take place at 8 p.m. EDT in the East Room, according to spokesman Larry Speakes.

It will be Reagan's first formal meeting with reporters at the White House since April 9 and the 36th of his presidency. The president held a somewhat abbreviated news conference at the conclusion of the economic summit in Tokyo on May 7.

Gadhafi Reappears, Says U.S. Planning Invasion

Libyan leader Col. Moammar Gadhafi today made his first public appearance since he escaped a U.S. air raid on Tripoli April 15, and warned his nation that Washington is planning to invade Libya, the Libyan news agency JANA reported.

He spoke at an all-night rally held in Darna, a coastal Mediterranean city in northeast Libya, in "Liberation from American Imperialism" ceremonies marking the 16th anniversary of the Libyan takeover of the U.S. Air Force Wheelus base near Tripoli. It was once the major Amer-

ican air base in the central Mediterranean.

Gadhafi apparently returned to his Azizia barracks in Tripoli last week, following a long and unexplained absence.

His return was unannounced, without the usual television coverage or the slogan-chanting crowds of supporters. There was no mention of it by the official JANA news agency, nor any announcement of where or when today's main ceremonies were planned.

But some diplomats were officially notified that the "guide of the revolu-

tion" was back in the fortified Azizia barracks, which was attacked by U.S. jets in April. U.S. warplanes also attacked Benghazi, Libya's second city.

JANA quoted Gadhafi as declaring Darna and the Libyan coastline "a military zone. ... Where the mountains shall turn into volcanos that erupt if the Americans try to approach."

"No American soldier will ever set foot on Libya soil. We shall defeat the Americans," JANA, monitored in Nicosia, Cyprus, quoted Gadhafi as saying.

But he warned that the American air strikes on Tripoli and Benghazi will be repeated.

"America is seeking to occupy Darna, because it believes this city is isolated and strategically important," he declared.

"I warn you again that the aggression could be repeated as long as American imperialism exists and is plotting to occupy the southern Mediterranean area where our country is located," he said.

"Therefore, we must prepare barns in which we shall put all these American sheep and slaughter them," he was quoted as saying.

Libyan state radio and JANA reported that similar anniversary rallies were held in all other major Libyan cities. The radio quoted the demonstrators as chanting "damned is America," and "No to peace, no to surrender."

Less than 24 hours before today's ceremonies, there was no indication where Gadhafi would deliver the speech promised by Libyan officials

when they invited Western reporters, scores of whom were expelled after the April 15 U.S. air attack on Libya.

Gadhafi appeared on television three times in the days following the air raid, denouncing the United States and pledging to "stike back at imperialism," but this was his first public appearance since then.

Western reporters returning to Libya noted an unusual calm in Tripoli, which many Arab, Western and non-aligned diplomats attributed to the delayed shock effect of the American raids.

The violent anti-American hate slogans have almost disappeared from the streets of the capital city of 1 million people.

It's Gadhafi

The Associated Press and most of the newspapers in the United States are now spelling the name of the Libyan leader as Moammar Gadhafi, marking a change from the Moammar Khadafy used since he came to power in 1969.

The spelling change is the result of a letter from the colonel to second graders at a St. Paul, Minn., school in which his name was typed in English, using the Gadhafi version. It was the first known instance of a spelling preference by the colonel.

Some confusion still reigns, however. The Libyan mission to the United Nations spells the name "Qadhafi;" the English-language version of the official Libyan news agency Jana spells it "Gadhafi."

Time Bombs Blast Sri Lankan Buses

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Time bombs today blew up two crowded buses in the eastern provincial capital of Trincomalee, killing more than 70 people, the government's Joint Operations Command said.

A spokesman for the joint command said the buses "were blown to bits." He spoke on condition he not be identified.

One of the buses was headed for Colombo, 160 miles southwest of Trincomalee, and one was headed for Kantalai, about 19 miles south of Trincomalee, when the bombs exploded.

The joint command said more than 70 people were killed, but an official at the government-owned Ceylon Transport Board, which operated the buses, said the toll could be higher.

Hits Abound For Carter, Brett

In Kansas City, Detroit, Chicago and Milwaukee, it was raining. For George Brett and Joe Carter, it was raining basehits.

Brett and Carter both went 5-for-5 in victories Tuesday night, an evening dominated by downpours in the American League. Four games were held up at the start by showers.

After a rain delay of almost two hours, Brett recorded his five-hit game and led Kansas City over Seattle 9-5. Brett hit a double and four singles, scored three runs and drove in one as Kansas City broke the Mariners' seven-game winning streak at Royals Stadium, dating back to Sept. 9, 1984.

"It's good to get a win any time, but I guess we ought to be especially happy with this one," Royals Manager Dick Howser said.

Carter, who misplayed a grounder at first base that helped Oakland score three unearned runs in the first inning, drove in four runs with two doubles and three singles as the Cleveland Indians downed the A's 8-7.

"I said, 'Well, I've got to get three

hits and knock in three runs just to get even,'" Carter said.

Carter doubled home the tying run with one out in the ninth inning and scored the game-winner on a single by Mel Hall. Carter's first five-hit game — which came one day after the end of his 21-game hitting streak, the longest in the major leagues this season — sent Oakland to its seventh straight loss.

In other AL games, Boston got past Toronto 4-3 in 10 innings, New York beat Detroit 6-3, Milwaukee stopped Baltimore 6-3, Texas outslugged Minnesota 14-10 and Chicago defeated California 7-3.

Oakland took a 6-0 lead after two innings in Cleveland before the Indians began their comeback. Carter's third run-scoring single of the game tied it 6-6 in the seventh.

Dave Kingman, who hit a two-run double off Phil Niekro in the first inning, hit his 13th homer of the season with two outs in the top of the ninth to put the A's ahead 7-6.

But the Indians rallied again in the bottom of the ninth. Tony Bernazard singled with one out off Jose Rijo, 2-4, and Carter followed with an RBI single that made it 7-7. After Andre

Thornton walked, Hall hit a line drive that fell in front of diving center fielder Stan Javier for the game-winning hit.

"I like to atone for my errors, and today I got a chance to do it," Carter said.

Royals 9, Mariners 5
Brett combined with Jorge Orta, who drove in three runs with two doubles and a pair of singles, to highlight an 18-hit attack that carried Kansas City over Seattle.

The Royals scored three runs in the third inning and took the lead for good at 5-4. Rudy Law and Orta had RBI singles and Steve Balboni hit a sacrifice fly.

Reliever Steve Farr, 4-1, took over in the fifth with the bases loaded and two outs and struck out Danny Tartabull. Farr worked 4 1-3 innings, giving up three hits while striking out five and walking none.

Milt Wilcox, 0-8, took the loss in relief.

Red Sox 4, Blue Jays 3

Mike Stenhouse drew a bases-loaded walk from Toronto reliever Mark Eichhorn in the top of the 10th inning, nudging Boston past the Blue Jays.

With two outs and runners on first and third, Toronto elected to intentionally walk pinch-hitter Wade Boggs, who leads the majors with a .389 average. Stenhouse then walked on a 3-2 pitch, forcing home the tiebreaking run.

"He's (Boggs) leading the world in hitting," Blue Jays Manager Jimmy Williams said, defending the decision to bypass Boggs.

The visiting Red Sox broke a three-game losing streak. Reliever Bob Stanley, 3-2, pitched Boston out

of a bases-loaded jam with two outs in the ninth, getting George Bell to ground out.

Boston had tied the score 3-3 in the fifth on consecutive home runs by Jim Rice and Don Baylor.

Yankees 6, Tigers 3
Don Mattingly's homer keyed a four-run fourth inning and Mike Easler hit a pair of RBI doubles that led New York over Detroit.

The loss, which came after a 52-minute delay, was the Tigers' ninth defeat in 11 games.

Mattingly, who had homered twice at Tiger Stadium on Monday night, had three hits.

Joe Niekro, 7-3, gave up five hits in 6 2-3 innings. Dave Righetti got the final two outs for his 13th save.

Pat Sheridan hit a solo homer for Detroit before Mattingly's 11th home run tied it against Wall Terrell, 6-4.

Brewers 6, Orioles 3

Rookie Bill Wegman pitched a six-hitter and Ernest Riles hit a two-run homer as Milwaukee beat Baltimore for its fourth straight victory.

Wegman, 2-5, struck out six and walked none in his second straight triumph.

The Brewers scored four runs in the first inning against Scott McGregor, 5-5. Cecil Cooper and Rob Deer hit RBI doubles and Dale Sveum added a run-scoring double.

Baltimore Manager Earl Weaver was ejected for the first time this season in the fifth inning after arguing with home plate umpire Rocky Roe. Weaver was protesting balls-and-strikes calls with Riles at the plate, and moments after Weaver

He will begin his duties at ECU on June 30.

North Korea May Get 2 Events

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — Olympic officials said today that "considerable progress" had been made toward agreement on placing at least two full events in North Korea as part of the 1988 Summer Games awarded to Seoul.

International Olympic Committee president Juan Antonio Samaranch said that, under the IOC plan, table tennis and archery tournaments would be held in the North.

In addition, he said, the proposal contains plans to hold part of the cycling and soccer tournaments as

well as cultural programs in North Korea.

But Samaranch told a press conference that the opening and closing ceremonies would be held in Seoul, "because the Games were awarded to Seoul."

"These proposals are made by the IOC," Samaranch said. "We await the response of the two sides."

North and South Korea completed a series of meetings with the IOC today, the third session since the North demanded last year that it co-host the Games.

Samaranch said that the proposal would be reviewed by the two sides who must tell the IOC by June 30th if they are willing to accept it in principle.

If the response is yes, he said, a fourth meeting will be held to work on "all problems which might be contemplated." He specifically mentioned television coverage.

But Samaranch said that the fourth meeting, which would probably be called in July, would definitely be the last.

"We are very, very close," he said.

"This is the final proposal by the IOC. If it is accepted, we go farther. If not, I am sorry but this is the end."

Earlier today, officials of North and South Korea said that movement had been made toward an agreement.

The final-day schedule was expanded late Tuesday to include separate meetings with south and north, amid signs that North Korea was looking for changes to a proposal presented by Samaranch at the start of the two-day session.

Reports had the North Koreans asking for six events to be held in their country, rather than the four included in the Samaranch plan.

That package, sources have said, included all or part of the schedules in archery, cycling, soccer and table tennis.

High-ranking officials of the International Table Tennis Federation were in Lausanne Tuesday, although not taking direct part in the opening discussions.

It was not known what events North Korea might seek to add.

Asked to comment on the first-day talks, Chung Guk Chin, vice president of the North Korean Olympic Committee, replied: "No progress."

But another member of the delegation, asked the same question, responded by spreading his thumb and index finger wide apart, then bringing them slightly closer together.

Chong-Ha Kim, president of the South Korean Olympic Committee, declined to comment on the first-day talks.

The IOC said it would have no comment until Samaranch's news conference.

Originally, North Korea had demanded that all sports be divided equally between north and south. The 1988 Games will have more than 230 events.

If its position was not met, it threatened to lead a boycott by other Communist-bloc countries of the Games. The last three Summer Games have been hit by political boycotts.

Samaranch said two months ago that this meeting would amount to a deadline for an agreement, because time is running out in planning for the Seoul Games.

Last weekend, however, he said that an agreement in principle was the goal, with a fourth meeting later to fill in details. Any agreement would have to be ratified by the full IOC in October, he said.

In an interview on French television Sunday, Samaranch said that to get any events North Korea would have to agree to open its borders to about 25,000 members of the "Olympic family" — athletes, officials, fans and journalists.

Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, hosted the World Table Tennis Championships in 1979, but access to the northern half of the divided peninsula generally is very tight, especially for Westerners.

There is precedence for holding events outside the nation declared the host by the IOC, although the reason for the only previous case was more practical than political.

Equestrian events in the 1956 Games were held in Stockholm, Sweden, even though Melbourne, Australia, was the host city for the Olympics. The move was made because of Australia's strict quarantine laws for horses entering the country.

Duncan Dash Leads Dodgers

Cincinnati relief pitcher John Franco saw the Dodgers' Mariano Duncan dash home from second base with the winning run on a ground ball. And then saw red.

Duncan's daring ninth-inning baserunning gave Los Angeles a 1-0 victory and the Reds cause for protest Tuesday night.

Duncan led off the bottom of the ninth with a single and advanced to second on a sacrifice. Enos Cabell was intentionally walked by Franco and Bill Madlock followed with a hard grounder to third baseman Buddy Bell.

What followed was a page right out of the Maury Wills' playbook.

Bell threw to second for the force on Cabell and when Madlock was called safe at first by umpire Terry Tata on a bang-bang play, Duncan kept coming, never breaking a stride.

First baseman Tony Perez, surprised by Duncan's dare, winged home a throw to catcher Bo Diaz. On came Duncan and the call from veteran umpire Harry Wendelstedt: Safe!

"I don't mind losing, but it was a

bad call," an angry Franco said. "There were two bad calls on one play. Duncan was out by three feet."

"I think the guy at first base (Madlock) was out, too," Perez said.

When the dust had cleared, Franco, Diaz, Manager Pete Rose and several Reds charged Wendelstedt to argue as the Dodgers celebrated.

"I was right on top of the plate," Wendelstedt said. "I called it the way I felt it was. I thought the runner's feet got to the plate before their man tagged him. So I called him safe. That's all you can do."

"I think I was safe," Duncan said. "He tagged me right here (pointing to his upper chest) and my foot was on the plate."

Elsewhere in the National League it was, New York 8, Philadelphia 4 in 11 innings; Montreal 4, St. Louis 2; Pittsburgh 6, Chicago 4; Houston 12, San Diego 1; and San Francisco 3, Atlanta 0.

The Reds' Chris Welsh retired the first 13 batters before Mike Marshall grounded a one-out single through the hole between third and short in the fifth inning.

Cincinnati couldn't generate much offense either against Rick Honeycutt. The Dodgers' left-hander allowed five hits over the first eight

innings but was helped by double plays in the first three innings.

"I thought the man (Duncan) was out," said Rose. "I know the throw beat him and that Bo was on top of the plate."

"Harry's a real good umpire, but I can't convince myself the guy was safe. If he was, my pitcher's not going to react that way, my catcher's not going to react that way and my second baseman is not going to react that way."

Mets 8, Phillies 4

Tim Teufel hit his first major-league grand slam with one out in the 11th inning to lift the Mets.

With the scored tied 4-4, Teufel, hitting for Wally Backman, hit a 2-0 pitch from reliever Tom Hume over the left-field fence. The Phillies used a five-man infield and two outfielders in an effort to cut down the winning run, but Teufel made sure nobody on the field would have a chance.

"It was a great feeling," Teufel said. "It couldn't have happened at a better time. Last night I had a chance to come through but I didn't. Tonight I reversed it and did the job."

Gary Carter drove in the Mets' first four runs with his ninth and 10th homers of the season and an RBI single.

Expos 4, Cardinals 2

Tim Wallach drove in three runs with a double and a sacrifice fly and Jay Tibbs combined with two relievers on a five-hitter to drop the defending NL champions 16 games behind first-place New York in the NL East.

St. Louis for the 32nd time in 54 games scored fewer than four runs, a statistic that left Manager Whitey Herzog admittedly perplexed.

"We've got a chance," Herzog said when asked if the Cards are headed toward setting some type of record for futility. "We're just not a good baseball team. I don't know if we're not thinking, or what."

NFL Ready To Take Turn In USFL Anti-Trust Suit

NEW YORK (AP) — Jurors in the United States Football League's \$3.5-million antitrust suit against the National Football League could hear testimony that will show the USFL had a master plan to force a merger, according to a published report.

USA Today in today's editions printed excerpts from what it said were USFL memos the NFL would use to prove the four-year-old league's motives for moving to the fall and establishing franchises in non-NFL cities. The newspaper did not say how it obtained the memos.

"Clearly, if there is to be a merger, the USFL must be present in logical markets for NFL expansion," the newspaper quoted Oakland owner Ted Taube as saying in a confidential memo to former USFL Commissioner Chet Simmons on Aug. 2, 1984.

"We're starting to look for merger cities," Chicago owner Eddie Einhorn was quoted as saying at a league meeting Aug. 22, 1984. "Let's be honest about it. We're getting out of certain cities ..."

Abandoning giant TV markets in cities such as Chicago, Philadelphia and Houston, the USFL operated in 1985 in non-NFL cities such as Jacksonville and Orlando, Fla., Baltimore, Oakland, Calif., and Tempe, Ariz. At the end of the season, Los Angeles was dropped.

The USFL, which played during the spring in its first three years, plans to play this year in the traditional fall season. The league does not have a lucrative network television contract, and is charging in its suit that the NFL pressured the networks not to televise USFL games. In its spring seasons the USFL had been on ABC.

The newspaper said a decision by U.S. District Court Judge Peter K. Leisure to permit the NFL to rebut USFL charges that the new league was forced to establish teams in smaller cities could lead to the introduction of letters detailing the USFL's plans. Leisure would have to rule on admissibility of any evidence.

The newspaper also printed an excerpt from what it said was a radio interview last November between an unidentified station and Charles Givens, part owner of the Orlando Renegades.

"But, you see, the real thing going on in the USFL that people don't understand is the merger possibilities with the NFL," it quoted Givens as saying. "For a few hundred thousand dollars of your own investment, not much money for any of the USFL owners, you can take a chance on an instant net worth of \$70 million if you merge with the NFL ... that's what it's about, even though the USFL won't tell you that."

The newspaper quoted New Jersey Generals owner Donald Trump as saying in the May 1984 that existence of the USFL hurt the NFL "very badly ... in terms of the salaries." It said Trump, in a letter to other owners earlier that year, predicted a merger in the 18 months between USFL seasons.

After no trial Monday and limited testimony Tuesday because of the il-

ness of Harvey Myerson, the USFL's lead attorney, USFL Commissioner Harry Usher is expected to return to the witness stand today to be cross-examined by NFL lawyers about his league's shifting of franchises. Usher is expected to be followed by Roone Arledge, president of ABC News and Sports.

MacKenzie Takes Lead

WAKE FOREST (AP) — Greensboro's Ed Adams fired an even-par 72 Tuesday in the 16-18 age division to take the first round lead in the 33rd annual North State Junior Golf Championship at the Wake Forest Country Club.

Adams edged Charlotte's Jim Johnson, who carded a 74 on the par-72, 7,048-yard course.

The best round of the day was turned in by 15-year-old Steve Osley of Burlington, who fired a 3-under-par 69 to take the lead in the 14-15 age group.

Seth Marshburn of Apex shot a 27 for six holes to take the 9-and-under lead, while Greenville's Will MacKenzie shot a 40 for nine holes to take the 10-11 age group lead.

Both sides were kept busy Tuesday denying a report in the Orlando Sentinel that Leisure had urged them to reach a settlement.

There was no evidence to indicate there was anything to the report, which said the settlement would include six USFL teams being merged into the NFL.

The only testimony Tuesday came from New Jersey Generals' running back Herschel Walker, who acknowledged that he was paid \$3.25 million over three years in his initial contract with the Generals. Under cross-examination by NFL attorney Robert Fiske, Walker denied knowing that before he signed his contract the USFL had put a salary cap of \$1.8 million per team.

The Sentinel report said the NFL would pay \$20 million to present and former USFL teams and would receive a \$50 million franchise fee from each of the six teams absorbed into the NFL.

It quoted an unidentified USFL owner and a "ranking league official" confirming that Leisure, who had urged both sides to settle the case before the trial started, had told NFL lawyers they were losing and should seek a settlement.

A call to Leisure's chambers were answered by a recording device saying he was not receiving calls.

Berger Takes Bowling Title

Bruce Berger of Greenville recently took top honors in the 1986 North Carolina State Trapshooting competition's handicap division.

Berger scored 95 points out of a possible 100 in shots from 21½ yards back.

To win the trophy, he outshot approximately 180 challengers of both sexes, aged 10 to over 90.

Berger also won the gold medal in the event in the State Games of North Carolina sponsored by North Carolina Amateur Sports. The two events were held together as a part of the summer-long Olympic type games being held in the state this year.

Berger was also the first winner of the Hunter H. Galloway Jr. Challenge Trophy, a rotating award that must be won three times by the same person to retire it.

Berger began his trapshooting competition at age 12 and won the High Junior award at the Minnesota State Trap Shoot in 1966. After a break of 13 years, he resumed shooting in 1979.

He is a qualified Youth Trapshooting Instructor through the Amateur Trapshooting Association, and a qualified Hunting Safety Instructor and a member of the Pitt County Wildlife Club.

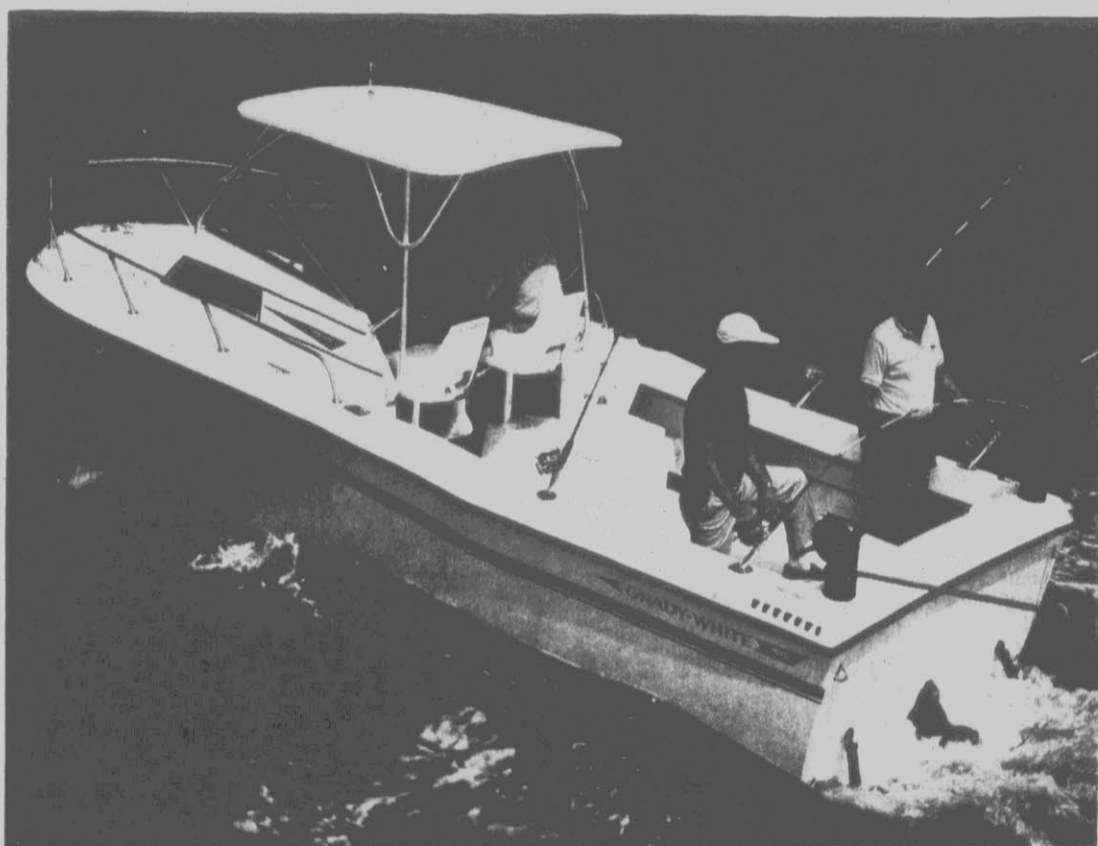

"There are no blind opening leads; just deaf opening leaders," wrote the bridge scribe. This hand bears eloquent testimony to his observation.

Since North-South can make a slam in either minor suit, the auction could hardly be described as a thing of beauty. Perhaps South could have been a little more enterprising at his third turn. However, minor-suit slams are notoriously difficult to bid, especially at duplicate, and when this hand was played in a pair tournament, the popular contract was three no trump, usually making three overtricks.

At one table, however, West had paid due attention to the auction. North's spade bid showed a feature, not length—had he had a genuine spade suit he would have introduced it at the one-level. And South seemed to have been waiting to hear about a spade stopper for no trump purposes; certainly his jump to three no trump indicated he was not worried about clubs.

Therefore, West decided that he would lead a spade, and he found the killing card: the ten! No matter what declarer elected to do, he had no way to prevent the defenders from scoring four spade tricks and the ace of clubs.

Note that, if declarer guesses the position, he can make the contract with any other spade lead. If West leads the king, declarer can win the ace and force out the ace of clubs—the jack of spades is safe from attack. And if West chooses the low spade declarer can come to two tricks in the suit simply by playing low.

Anniversary

'NBC Nightly News' Gets Undisputed First Placed

NEW YORK (AP) — When is a win not a win? When Nielsen says so.
On Tuesday, the A.C. Nielsen Co. said it was revising the once-historic "NBC Nightly News" ratings victory that supposedly snapped the string of first-place finishes by the "CBS Evening News" at 212 weeks.
A second set of ratings figures produced an inaccuracy for the week of May 26-30, Nielsen said, so it downgraded NBC's performance by one-tenth of a point, creating a tie with "CBS Evening News."
When Nielsen had first awarded the victory to "Nightly News" June 3, NBC executives ordered champagne for anchor Tom Brokaw and his staff to celebrate NBC's first news victory in nearly five years.
Nielsen had assumed that WMAR-TV, NBC's Baltimore affiliate, had carried "Nightly News" on May 29, when, in fact, it had shown local news in the normal network news slot after a Baltimore Orioles

baseball game had intruded into local news time.
"I hate to be the reason we didn't beat them," said Arnie Kleiner, president and general manager of WMAR. "We're committed to news when we run over in a ballgame, and we always extend local news by a half hour. Local news is more important to our local audience than the network news is. It's important for us to serve our community."
Kleiner called it "a journalistic decision" and said the fact that WMAR gets commercial revenues from local news, not network news, "wasn't even part of the decision. It never came into play."
As a result, CBS' string of consecutive No. 1 ratings got a one-week extension, but it finally ended, at least so Nielsen says, Tuesday when its figures for the week of June 2-6 also were revealed, producing a victory for "NBC Nightly News."
Last week, "Nightly News" had a 10.4 rating. Dan Rather's "CBS Evening News" had a 10.1. ABC's "World News Tonight," with Peter Jennings, averaged a 10.0.
The fact that a victory can turn into a tie because of a fractional adjustment illustrates the extreme competitiveness of the network newscasts.
Four-tenths of a point separated the three newscasts last week, the smallest margin since April 1982. Another reflection of the close competition was that "Nightly News" was in third place just one week before its first-place tie and victory.
"The four-tenths of a point is within Nielsen's statistical sampling error," said Marvin Mord, ABC's vice president of marketing and research services. "The fact is that there is no consistent leader anymore."
In another unusual ratings event, NBC's "Family Ties" edged its running mate, "The Cosby Show," for the first time, leading the network to a prime-time ratings victory as well last week.
Led by its Thursday comedies, including a first-ever No. 1 ranking for "Family Ties," NBC averaged a 13.0 prime-time rating to CBS' 12.6 and ABC's 11.1. (Each ratings point

equals 859,000 homes with television.)
"Family Ties" benefited all season from the lead-in of the No. 1 "Cosby Show," but it finally beat the master with a 24.2 rating to a 24.0. Network researchers said summer daylight keeps many viewers outdoors during 8 p.m. EDT programs.
The rest of last week's Top 10 included NBC's "Night Court" in third, followed by CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," CBS' movie "The Rosemary Clooney Story," ABC's "Growing Pains," NBC's "The Golden Girls," ABC's "Who's the Boss?," NBC's "All Is Forgiven" and the fifth game of the NBA playoffs on CBS.
CBS officials said the "NBC Nightly News" victory last week was a fluke, blaming the "CBS Evening News" slippage on two prime-time National Basketball Association broadcasts that caused pre-emptions or time shifts for CBS' newscast in 20 West Coast markets.
"The two basketball games explain it all," said David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research. He projected that without the pre-emptions and time shifts "Evening News" would have won by three-tenths of a ratings point.
The NBA playoffs concluded Sunday with Boston's victory over Houston, and no other variable is expected to affect the national newscasts this week.
"This week is the one we'll be watching," said Poltrack.
"If CBS does not win, they'll be in for a long summer," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.
"Anyone can win any week now," said Mord.
For the first five months of 1986, ratings for both "NBC Nightly News" and "World News Tonight" increased 8 percent over the same period in 1985, while ratings for "CBS Evening News" were down 2 percent.

Pavarotti Concert Set Tonight On PBS

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Italian tenor Luciano Pavarotti says seeing himself on television with younger singers is a stark reminder that his own career in opera and in concert began a quarter century ago.
"I am older," he said as he began to discuss the young graduates of The Opera Company of Philadelphia-Luciano Pavarotti International Voice Competition who appear with him in a series of taped television specials. The first is "A Pavarotti Salute to Youth" concert performance of the Verdi Requiem tonight on public television.
"I am also bigger," he said with a laugh as he spread his arms in front of a girth surpassed only by a voice and the charisma powerful enough to produce an audience response dubbed "Pavarotti pandemonium" by critics.

Maazel agreed to do it," Pavarotti said.
It wasn't just a matter of making the sports arena sound like a concert hall or church, it was also important to achieve a blend that would withstand television's demanding eyes and ears.
"We knew we had the electronics for the audience there and we had shown we could do a one-person concert," Pavarotti said, noting that last year he became the first classical singer ever to appear at the Spectrum. "But we had to have someone like maestro Maazel to do the Verdi Requiem."
Maazel, former music director of the Cleveland Orchestra and a veteran of 6,000 concerts and 500 opera performances, was in top form as he guided the company through chorus and solo parts. He even added some special touches, such as a trumpet trio high up in a balcony as effective on television as it was for the audience.

Giuseppe Verdi wrote the requiem, his only masterwork not intended for the stage, to honor the memory of his friend, the Italian poet, patriot and author Alessandro Manzoni. The work premiered May 22, 1874, at the Church of San Marco in Milan.
For the performance, Philadelphia's 17,000-seat Spectrum, home to the Philadelphia Flyers hockey team and the 76ers basketball team, was transformed into a cathedral-like concert hall.
The soloists included Pavarotti at tenor, American soprano Susan Dunn, Hungarian mezzo-soprano Ildiko Komlosi and bass Paata Burchuladze, a member of the Georgian Opera in Tbilisi, U.S.S.R. A 350-voice chorus, an orchestra and conductor Lorin Maazel completed the production.
"I can tell you I was very scared of this performance until maestro

The tenor part was hardly a starring one. But Pavarotti said that's why the Verdi Requiem was selected.
"I wanted people to hear these young singers as they performed what is absolutely the most difficult music to do," he said.
The competition winners selected for the three other solo parts had to have the potential to handle the demanding music without the benefit of scenery or cast to gloss over mistakes, Pavarotti said.
"So, we picked winners who were a little more into the profession than others," he said. "Then, all we could do was hope."
Especially impressive was the closing, which featured the chorus and Miss Dunn, whose finish reverberated throughout the arena

and brought the audience thundering to its feet.
"Her voice is really a divine instrument," said Pavarotti.
Not overlooked by the critics was Pavarotti's performance. "The audience hung on Pavarotti's every note," said one.

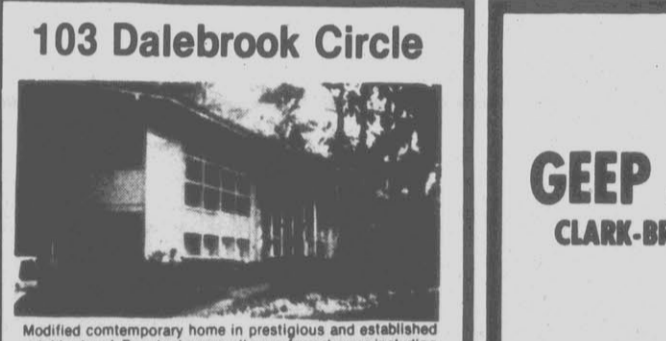

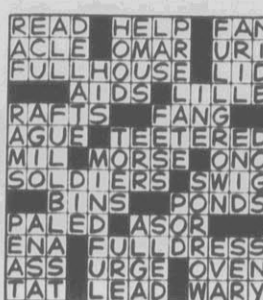

FHA Shuts Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Housing Administration's sixth shutdown in nine months is having little immediate impact on home sales, but industry experts warn it could be troublesome unless Congress acts quickly to put FHA back in business.

"We've been out of business for a month" since last October 1, Silvio DeBartolomeis, FHA's acting administrator, said Tuesday. "Congress has given us a vacation and they didn't even know it."

Since last fall, Congress has granted FHA a series of short extensions of its statutory authority, at times using the legislation as a vehicle to which other bills are attached.

FHA's authority was suspended for 11 days last December and 10 days in March before Congress enacted extension bills.

The latest shutdown came last Thursday.

Congressman Says Transmission Unsafe

WASHINGTON (AP) — An audit shows the government "falsely reassured" people about the safety of millions of 1970 to 1979 cars from Ford Motor Co. that allegedly can slip from park to reverse, the head of a House panel on consumer protection said.

"Let's stop playing games and face the fact that people are still dying because of the Ford transmission defect," said Rep. Tim Wirth, D-Colo., who ordered the report by the General Accounting Office. "These cars should be off the road as soon as possible."

The GAO report, released Tuesday, said the cars' alleged tendency to switch gears may be linked to the deaths of 162 people in the first 4½ years after the government's decision not to seek a recall.

Under a December 1980 agreement, the Department of Transportation closed its defect investigation and the automaker agreed to send warning labels about proper parking procedures to 22 million owners of automatic transmission Fords.

In comments included at the back of the auditors' report, Helen Petrauskas, Ford's vice president for environmental and safety engineering, said the company had made an extensive investigation of the alleged problem and was "completely satisfied that the vehicles in question do not contain any safety-related defect that would account for the reports of unexpected movement of driverless vehicles."

The GAO, Congress' investigative arm, said it found the fatality rate for all 1970-79 Ford vehicles to be 4.5 times greater than that for cars from General Motors Corp., 3.2 times greater than for Chrysler Corp. and 2.5 times greater than for American Motors Corp.

Ford says it believes its fatality figures are higher than those for other automakers because of extensive publicity about the transmission case and better reporting efforts on accidents involving the alleged defect. It maintains that similar problems occur on all automatic transmission cars.

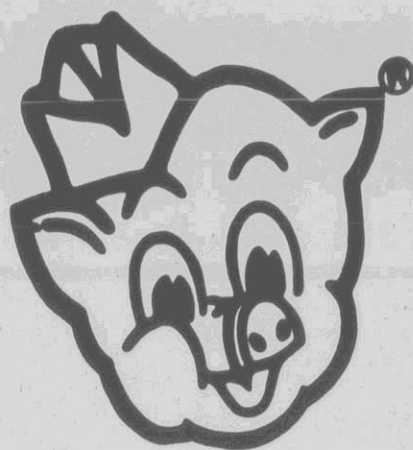

Oklahoma Community Is World Neighbor

KINGFISHER, Okla. (AP) — You'll pardon the people of Kingfisher if they smile proudly when they hear a farmer in Indonesia has enjoyed a good crop, or a child in West Africa has reached another birthday in good health.

They're only being neighborly.

Kingfisher, a town of about 5,000 located 40 miles northwest of Oklahoma City, is where a preacher's dream 35 years ago was transformed into World Neighbors, a development agency that has improved the lives of millions of people in Africa, Asia and Latin America.

The philosophy behind World Neighbors' more than 250 programs is simple: to help people in underdeveloped countries become more self-sufficient by giving a helping hand, not a handout.

In Haiti, World Neighbors is working with Mennonite Economic Development Associates to organize more than 1,000 farmers in isolated rural areas into seven cooperatives that market their cacao in the United States.

In Chad, World Neighbors is working with a French organization to develop settlements for refugee families in exchange for their commitment to build shelters, dig wells and plant vegetable gardens. The French group estimates that 500,000 to 1 million families may be affected.

World Neighbors, with headquarters in Oklahoma City, describes itself as an interdenominational group rooted in the Judeo-Christian heritage. The organization says it tries to save lives, not souls.

In its most recent financial report, World Neighbors stressed that no government funds were used or accepted. The organization's financial report for the year ending June 30, 1985, showed that World Neighbors spent about 70 percent of the \$2.7 million it raised the previous year for its overseas programs.

World Neighbors traces its origins to a sermon, preached over the radio, by the Rev. John Peters, a Methodist minister who was a chaplain during World War II in the Philippines.

Peters talked about the poverty he had seen overseas, saying he believed that other people had the same goals as people in Oklahoma — to provide a living for themselves and their families.

Peters, now 79 and living in retirement in Colorado, said in a recent interview that he had no idea what shape or form the organization he had proposed might take.

Within a few days of the broadcast, local businessmen began calling Peters and offered to contribute money to help people help themselves.

Some in Kingfisher recall the first meeting in their town, attended by Peters and a dozen or so local residents.

"I grew up in a grocery store where my father kept up 300 tenant farmers through the years," said Virginia Shutler, host of that first World Neighbors meeting in Kingfisher. "When the crash came ... I saw the death of their dignity."

"To take a person's dignity is almost worse than taking their life," she said.

Harold Hubbard, 79, who also attended that first meeting, said he was attracted because the new organization, first known as World Associates, wasn't an ordinary charity.

"When you helped somebody, you put something in their lap. This didn't seem to be that type of deal,"

Part IV: The Lights Come On The Way Greenville Was

Was that the way Greenville was — "Ankle deep in sand, not enough water to put out a brush heap fire, and only a few smoky lamps for street lights?"

Was The Daily Reflector accurate in accusing townspeople of "dragging along half a century behind everywhere else?"

Did the town have "more old foggism than any town its size in the state?"

That was what Dave Whichard's editorial of Aug. 15, 1900, said.

Well, J.L. Livers had to admit there was some truth to the editor's strong words. The only lights were oil lamps, and they did smoke up. The water supply was from cisterns, surface wells or the town pump. And the sewer system was, for lack of a better description, a series of open pits in backyards — some located only a few feet from wells for drinking water.

No wonder the Sanborn Map Co. said the water supply was "not good."

No wonder typhoid fever and malaria were common diseases.

But Greenville was on the verge of a new era. Community interest in acquiring electric lights, a water system and sewer service was increasing.

This interest culminated in action the night of Dec. 13 when a large crowd gathered at the Pitt County Courthouse to discuss internal improvements and a graded school. Mayor J.G. Moye was elected to chair the meeting, and Editor Whichard was elected secretary.

After hearing from lawyers, politicians and educators, the group approved Col. I.A. Sugg's motion to ask the Legislature to allow a tax levy for a school as well as authorize bond elections for a graded school and internal improvements including lights, water, sewer system and streets.

Then Harry Skinner moved that cost of improvements be limited to \$75,000.

On the whole, the crowd went along with the suggestions, though not everyone thought public money should be used to support schools.

Later, Livers heard one merchant say he didn't see any need for electric lights. The merchant said he would give everyone oil

lamps free, provided people bought their lantern fuel from him.

Meanwhile, E.B. Ficklen, one of those who attended the courthouse meeting, was so sure electricity was forthcoming that when he built his new home on West Fifth Street in 1901 he had it wired for electricity.

By spring 1903, those in favor of progress had overcome the obstacles of time, conservatism and legislative maneuvering, and the Board of Aldermen set Tuesday, April 7, as the date for a vote on a \$75,000 bond issue. Sixty-five thousand dollars of that amount was for internal improvements including lights, a water system and a sewer system. The remaining \$10,000 was to finance construction of a graded (public) school.

Out of 243 registered voter, 187 cast ballots for internal improvements, and 11 voted against.

As for the school bonds, 180 people voted for, while 14 voted against.

But before the new water system was completed, fire during the early hours of July 2, 1903, leveled \$75,000 worth of tobacco warehouses, prize houses, stemmeries, factories, shops, a meat market and a number of houses in the Dickinson Avenue area.

Livers read the Reflector report: "The fire was the most spectacular one ever seen here. All the buildings were built of highly inflammable material and were very dry. A breeze from the South carried the smoke and sparks high in the heavens, illuminating the country for miles."

"The fire department was utterly hopeless, on account of lack of water, equipment and training. The fire simply burned until it reached an open space and then died out. A strong wind would have swept the fire over everything in its path."

Editorially, the newspaper lambasted those who had opposed a city-run fire department and water system: "Enough property has been

destroyed by fire in this town to pay for the finest water works and fire department in the country. Yet some of our wise men have said we cannot afford a fire department and have fought every protection and improvement suggested. These people who have opposed a system of water works are responsible for the ruin and desolation spread around us today. It were better had they never been born."

The Reflector also pointed out that so many fires had occurred in Greenville that the town had a bad name among insurance companies.

At first, Livers thought the editor was too harsh in his criticism. Then he remembered a series of fires beginning with the one in 1896 that burned 23 buildings downtown. In 1899, 25 businesses in the two-block downtown area burned. Then, in 1901, while school was in session, Masonic Hall School for Girls burned. Teachers and students escaped with their books, but the building burned to the ground because a pump for the steam engine broke.

Liver decided the editor had a point.

By the next fall, work was well under way on town improvements. The newspaper said if all the idlers who stopped to watch workmen digging and laying pipes for the water and sewer system "would take a shovel and throw dirt, the work would move along faster."

Livers chuckled. The peppery editor was at it again. Whichard might be small in stature, but he used words in a big way.

Finally, almost two years after voters had approved the bond issue, at 7:30 the evening of March 20, 1905, a switch at the light plant was turned on, and for a one-hour trial period electric lights burned in downtown Greenville. People on the streets celebrated by shouting.

The town had light, but only at night, leading some to label them "nighttime lights."

But progress continued. Livers was well informed about lights and water because he now was superintendent of the new works. In May, he told aldermen that the town had 30 water

customers and 800 houses with lights with orders for 200 additional lights.

In June, somebody asked the town board to consider letting the electric plant operate from 11 a.m. to 1 a.m. so that people could use electric fans and motors part of the day, but the aldermen decided the light plant would operate only at night.

In August, Superintendent Livers counted 48 water consumers and 81 light customers.

The summer of 1906 rolled around, and again people dreamed of being able to use electric fans during the day. At last, in August, 15 months after the lights initially were turned on, the dynamo for day current arrived.

One sentence in James Tyson's Sept. 5 minutes for the Water and Light Commission is the only known notice of the 24-hour-a-day electric service: "The Dynamo for the day current had been put in and was running very well."

In the beginning, bills for electricity depended on how many light bulbs a customer had. The average was five bulbs per house, though Livers heard that some people carried a bulb from room to room to save money.

Later, billing was 10 cents per kilowatt hour. Early bills often combined a man's home and business.

The Daily Reflector's first electric bill in May 1905 was 48 cents; in June, it increased to 84 cents for 11 kilowatt hours. By July 1906, the bill was \$6, probably due to the addition of a motorized press that ran at night until electricity was on 24 hours a day.

Availability of electricity not only meant that people had lights and could use fans to cool homes and shops in summer, but also enabled them to consider purchasing new inventions such as electric irons, ranges and laundry stoves.

Its significance was obvious, also, in the waiving of a town ordinance prohibiting people from riding bicycles on sidewalks. In June 1907, the town board gave Livers permission to ride his bicycle on sidewalks so that he could "get to the work around town quicker."

The night the lights came on in Greenville meant a new job for J.L. Livers. Lamplighter Henry Duff's job was eliminated, along with the outdated oil lamps.

he said. "We weren't just going to feed and clothe everybody. We were going to help them decide what to do."

"We had certain principles we tried not to ever deviate from," Peters recalled. "One was to let the initiative work from the bottom up. The other was to not violate the dignity of the people we worked with."

Emmanuel Vieth, a retired Kingfisher banker who is now chairman of World Neighbors' trustees, said World Neighbors took root in Kingfisher because "... in a farming community ... they know what it is to be a neighbor. We don't just give to World Neighbors, we are a world neighbor."

The town holds three food drives a year to help its neighbors in Kingfisher County, where nearly 30 percent of farm loans are delinquent.

In the past 12 months, Kingfisher County has seen one of its banks fail, and five of the county's largest businesses have closed their doors.

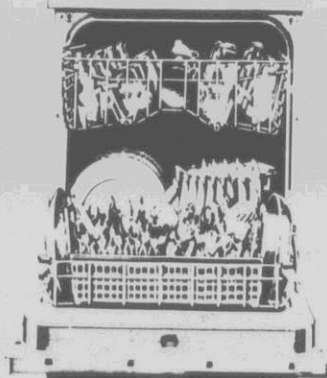
This year, despite hard times, World Neighbors officials say they expect Kingfisher residents will contribute about \$55,000. Over the years, Kingfisher people have given more than \$500,000.

World Neighbors has several other chapters, including one in Pasadena, Calif., and a recently organized chapter in metropolitan Oklahoma City.

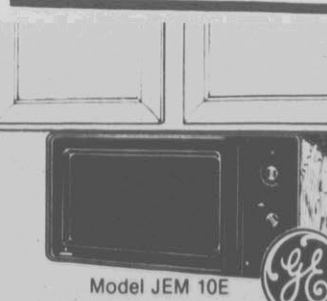

Some Experts Optimistic AIDS Vaccine Ahead

BOSTON (AP) — A vaccine to stop the AIDS epidemic might be ready within four years if research advances smoothly. But many uncertainties lie ahead, and some experts still wonder whether an AIDS vaccine is even possible.

A major test is about to begin that could answer some of these questions.

Chimpanzees at several labs around the country will be given an experimental vaccine, then exposed to the AIDS virus to see if they are shielded from infection.

When the chimp studies are done, it could be possible to "have something ready to go into humans (for testing) in 1988," said Dr. George Galasso of the National Institutes of Health.

"And a couple of years after that, you could have a vaccine — if everything went like clockwork and everything worked."

Dr. Gerald Quinnan of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration says an experimental vaccine might be ready for human testing even sooner.

"I don't want to be overly optimistic," he said, "but I think looking somewhere around the end of this

calendar year as a target isn't totally out of the question."

Yet the AIDS virus is elusive because it changes form with ease and swiftness. The chimpanzee vaccine, one of several being considered, might not protect the animals from the immune system affliction.

"Maybe we'll get to a point and say, 'Whoops, we'll go back to the drawing board,'" Galasso said. "Eventually a vaccine is possible. There's no question in my mind. But, when is something else."

Galasso is associate director of the federal research institutes and chairman of a U.S. Public Health

Service committee on development of a vaccine against acquired immune deficiency syndrome, which has killed more than half of its roughly 20,000 U.S. victims. His optimism is not shared by all AIDS experts.

"It's not even clear it can be done," said Dr. William Haseltine of the Dana Farber Cancer Institute in Boston. "If it's going to be easy, we'll know it soon. If it's going to be difficult, all bets are off."

Added Dr. Shiu-Lok Hu, a vaccine researcher at Oncogen, a biotechnology company in Seattle: "We really cannot say for sure that a

vaccine is even possible. We know much more about influenza than AIDS virus. But there still is not a very good vaccine for influenza on the horizon."

Over the years, scientists have conquered other diseases by crafting vaccines from viruses. These viral vaccines don't cause human illness, but they trick the body's immune system into arming itself against a disease-causing germ.

The first and most successful of these vaccines was the vaccinia virus, which rid the world of smallpox. Vaccinia causes cowpox. But the human body mistakes it for

smallpox virus and produces antibodies against smallpox. If the real smallpox virus comes along later, the body is ready to kill it.

Some approaches, such as the original Salk vaccine against polio, use dead viruses to prime the immune systems this way. Others, like the Sabin polio virus, rely on live viruses that have been rendered harmless.

The key to all these vaccines are molecules known as antigens on the surface of the viruses. The body's immune system recognizes the shape of an antigen and produces antibodies that match that shape. Once it sees an antigen, it remembers. So if a virus carrying the antigen slips into the bloodstream again, the body attacks the germ and destroys it.

Because the AIDS virus is so dangerous, however, many experts doubt that a live or weakened version of the microbe will be used as a vaccine.

The best hope for a vaccine, Galasso said, is something known as a subunit vaccine. This is the protein that makes up the outer jacket, or envelope, of the virus. When the protein is injected into goats and other creatures, the animals produce antibodies. In test tubes, these antibodies neutralize the AIDS virus.

In the planned experiment, chimps will be inoculated with a pure dose of this protein. Later they'll receive the AIDS virus.

Dr. Dani Bolognesi of Duke University said the chimp studies would attempt to answer three questions:

— Will the vaccine protect the chimps from AIDS viruses that have identical envelope proteins?

— Will it work against viruses that have mutated to have somewhat different outer shells?

— And will it guard against viruses that are carried into the body within infected cells?

The first of Bolognesi's questions touches on a crucial uncertainty: Can antibodies defeat the AIDS virus? Victims of AIDS produce these antibodies in the course of their disease, but they still die. However, many more people are infected with the AIDS virus but have not gotten sick.

Some people may "have protective immunity," Bolognesi said.

Even if a vaccine protects against one version of the AIDS virus, experts can't be sure that it will disarm the germ's cousins. The AIDS virus mutates with amazing speed, shifting its antigens as it goes. However, some portions of the envelope stay the same through these changes.

No one knows whether these stable regions of the virus' coat will prompt the production of effective antibodies.

Scientists at the Southwest Foundation for Biomedical Research in San Antonio, Texas, have crafted artificial copies of the stable regions of the virus and injected these fragments into lab animals. The resulting antibodies are being checked in test tubes to see if they will neutralize the AIDS virus.

"The results look encouraging, but we don't have enough data to say yes or no," said Dr. Gordon Dreesman.

He said these scraps of proteins, known as peptides, might themselves serve as vaccines.

If the envelope protein works in chimps, scientists will turn to gene splicing to produce a vaccine in large quantities.

The envelope protein is one of a half dozen or so vaccine strategies under consideration.

Panther Kitten Wired For Sound

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Scientists are hoping a 55-pound bundle of fur known only as No. 10 will teach them enough about the habits of the Florida panther to help save the animal from extinction.

No. 10, as he is called by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, is the first panther kitten to wear a radio collar. For years, the device has been helping experts track the movement of adult panthers whose population is estimated to range from 20 to 50.

The collar has enabled experts to tell that the male panther is becoming less dependent on its mother. It probably has begun stalking small animals, learning the skills that could someday help it chase down a deer.

Experts also have learned that the nine-month-old panther is gaining an average of two-tenths of a pound daily.

Scientists say that at first, the kitten remained with its mother, who also is collared, at all times. Now it has started to lag behind, sometimes by as much as two miles.

"I think he is beginning to make some of his own kills," said Dave Maehr, a commission biologist. "He probably can't take down a deer yet, but he may be preying on small animals like armadillos or raccoons."

Biologists think the kitten will stay with its mother until she breeds again. But it is possible the kitten will be looking for its first mate at the same time.

"Right now, we don't know if he will just wander away or if the mother will drive him away or if a male panther will chase him away," Maehr said recently. "It could be a dangerous time for the kitten if he has to fight a full-grown male while he is still a juvenile."

The commission's panther trackers first discovered the paw prints of a kitten in December in the Fakahatchee Strand. They located it, tranquilized it and while it was unconscious a veterinarian wormed and vaccinated it. In May, the scientists refitted the kitten with a larger collar.

18th Century Ship Becomes Treasure Trove In Pacific

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — Divers are turning up hundreds of historical artifacts from the last voyage of Count Jean Francois de la Perouse, France's greatest ocean explorer who vanished with his ships in the South Pacific almost 200 years ago.

"We're finding some incredible things," said the Queensland Museum's curator of maritime archaeology, Ron Coleman, who recently led a two-week expedition to the site that is thought to date from 1788.

The French aristocrat's flagship Astrolabe and an accompanying frigate Boussole lie in deep water off the Solomon Islands in the Coral Sea.

"Both ships are of major scientific importance but we're still not sure which one is which," Coleman said. La Perouse is regarded by historians as the French counterpart of Capt. James Cook, the British explorer who sailed the Pacific around the same time and is credited with discovering Australia.

Coleman said King Louis XVI of France was envious of Cook's achievements and commissioned La Perouse, who had already made his reputation during the American Revolution, to sail to the Pacific for the glory of France.

La Perouse left Brest in 1785. His route took him south to Cape Horn, north along the west coast of South America to Alaska and southward again to China, Korea and the Philippines. He then zigzagged across the Pacific until he reached Australia.

"That's an incredible undertaking for those times," Coleman said in an interview. "It's one of the great voyages of discovery. Like Cook he charted shores and water depths. If you put their work side-by-side I think you would find La Perouse was just as important as Cook."

"It was quite amazingly well put together," he added. "There were a tremendous number of scientists on board. The idea was to fill gaps left by other explorers."

Coleman said teams from France and Vanuatu, formerly the New Hebrides, have been diving on the La Perouse wrecks for years.

"They salvaged bits and pieces but weren't methodical," he said. "Our expedition is the first to survey the wrecks properly and it has proved that by the amount of stuff we've brought up."

The artifacts include human bones, needles and Chinese ceramics as well as 25 bronze and silver medallions, Spanish pieces of eight and part of a shoe, said Coleman, who comes from Wichita, Kan.

He added that previous expeditions raised cannon and anchors but missed things that give archaeologists glimpses of social conditions of the past.

Exactly when the frigates vanished is not known. La Perouse reached Botany Bay on Australia's east coast in January 1788, six days after the First Fleet arrived from England with the first convict settlers of Australia.

He stayed several weeks to take on supplies and left.

In 1826, an English sandalwood trader, Peter Dillon, visited the Solomons, then known as the Santa Cruz group, and wondered why islanders possessed European-made items, such as a silver sword hilt.

Dillon learned that the ships sank during a cyclone near the island of Vanikoro and most of the 160 crewmen drowned. A few survivors built a longboat from washed up wreckage and left the islands. Their fate is not known.

Two others stayed behind but one died in 1823 and the other disappeared when tribal warfare broke out, according to Dillon's account.

Coleman said other relics recovered include glass beads and a spiked brass helmet, one of 52 items listed on the ship's manifest that probably were intended as gifts or items of barter for Pacific tribal chieftains.

The 15 divers from the Queensland Museum, Vanuatu and the French territory of New Caledonia also raised bits of scientific and navigational equipment, pewter plates, millstones to grind wheat, lead ingots for ballast, pulley blocks, earthenware and buttons.

"These small items tell us far more than anchors or cannon," said Coleman. "They tell us about the state of technology of the day and how people lived. Things like how sailors buttoned their pants — that's of tremendous historical social interest."

Coleman said the artifacts will be displayed for Australia's 1988 bicentennial. Most will then be returned to the Solomons, which claims ownership.

The human remains are being returned to France for ceremonial burial.

Plane Crash

FORT ST. JAMES, British Columbia (AP) — A float plane crashed on takeoff in remote central British Columbia, killing four Americans and a Canadian lodge owner on a fishing trip, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police said.

The Americans, all of Bremerton, Wash., were tentatively identified as Joseph Ralkowski, a former aerobics pilot; Andy Pendergast, 72; Rob Haddon, 50; and Haddon's father, Laurence, 81.

Also killed was fishing guide Steven Fritz Waibler, 61, who owned the lodge where the Americans were staying, police said.

Try Duckling For HolidayA Difference You May Like

So you're one of the millions of backyard barbecue buffs that has decided to invite a few friends over to celebrate July 4th. What do you grill? Chicken? Beef? Maybe pork?

How about something new and different, something that will make your holiday party a memorable occasion? How about grilled duckling?

Grilled duckling is as easy to prepare as the traditional favorites, but will make a meal that your friends will remember long after the Fourth. The possibilities and variations are endless, anything from spit roasted whole duckling to barbecued quarters.

Whichever method of preparation you choose, your meal can be nutritious as well as delicious. Some new breeds of duckling sold today have been bred and developed to obtain more breast meat and less fat.

SPIT ROASTED DUCKLING
For open barbecue rotisserie unit, arrange charcoal briquettes in a pile along the back wall and hood of unit; thoroughly ignite. Use an aluminum pan 12 x 18 x 2 deep or make a pan this size with heavy aluminum foil and place under a rotating spit so that the pan catches drippings of

duckling, thus avoiding flareup from briquettes.

Wash and prepare duckling. Insert rotisserie spit lengthwise through cavity, balancing duckling on spit; tighten holding prongs. Tie wings against breast. Tie legs together loosely, looping cord around tail. Attach spit to rotisserie. Roast duckling until brown and fork tender, about 30 minutes per pound.

While duckling is barbecuing, prepare orange sauce.

ORANGE SAUCE
3/4 cup orange marmalade

1 tsp. grated orange rind
1/2 cup orange juice
1/4 cup vinegar
1 tbs prepared mustard
2 tsp. cornstarch
1/4 tsp. salt
Combine ingredients in sauced-pan; mix well. Bring to boil, stirring constantly, and cook until thickened. Brush duckling with sauce several times during last 30 minutes of roasting. Serve remaining sauce with duck.

DUCKLING PARTS
For the direct heat method of cooking duckling parts, arrange 30 to 40 hot charcoal briquettes in a layer over the fire bowl of grill. Place grilling rack 5 to 6 inches above coals. Place duckling skin-side over the coals. (Baste duck with a non-sugar, non-tomatoe based mixture for best results. — Cover unit, leaving drafts opened.

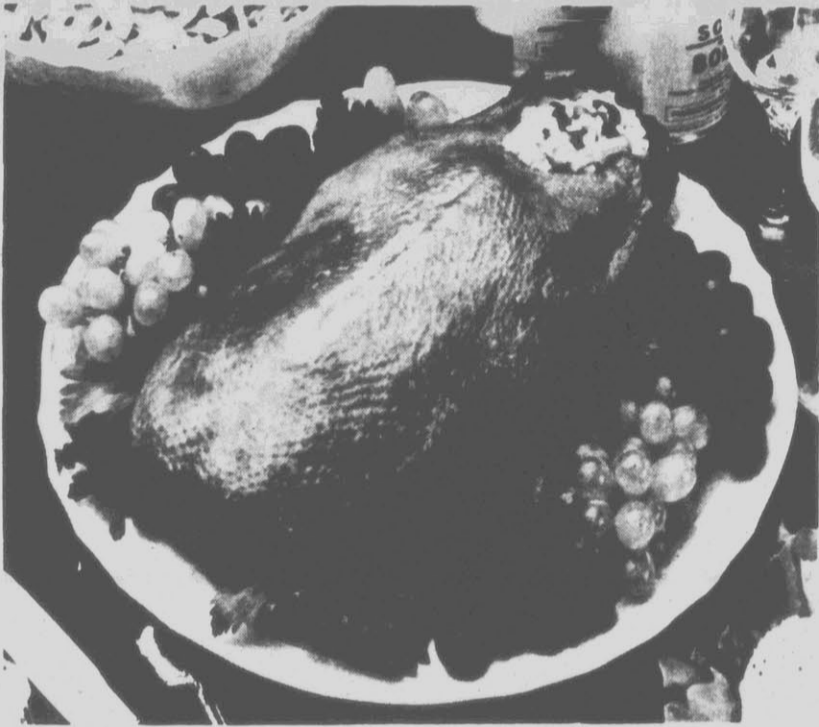
If grilling unit does not have a hood, make one from heavy foil. Baste duck each time parts are turned. Cook skin-side down for 30 minutes, turn thereafter every 14 minutes. Duckling is done when meat is fork tender.

Recommended cooking time: for whole breast, (bone in and deboned) 60-75 minutes; for halves and quarters, 60-90 minutes.

BASTING MIXTURE
3/4 cup white wine
1 cup oil
1/2 cup soy sauce
1 tsp. garlic sauce
Blend ingredients together well. Bottled Italian dressing, non creamy, also works nicely.

Drawing A Line On Tex-Mex Or Mexican Food Is Tough Chore

SAN ANTONIO — By common agreement, the best Tex-Mex food in the United States is found in San Antonio. But where the line is drawn between Mexican food and Tex-Mex is beyond a Northerner's comprehension.

Compounding the difficulty is the fact that Texans can't agree themselves on a definitive list of authentic Tex-Mex foods. It has been variously called "food from our parents who have been here for 100 years or more," "food cooked by people in Texas who didn't know how to cook Mexican food" or "poor people's food." It is probably all of those and more.

The list of Tex-Mex foods certainly includes tacos and enchiladas with red sauce, pinto beans, tamales with pork, chili con carne, chili con queso, chilies rellenos, nachos and chalupas. But does it also include grilled sweetbreads, mesquite-grilled steak, Texas hamburgers with refried beans, crushed tortilla chips and pico de gallo, a relish of green chilies, onions, tomatoes and cilantro?

No matter the length of the list, if you know where to go in San Antonio you can taste some of the best examples of a food that warms body and soul. Here it is eaten without regard to hot weather.

You will not find many tourists in places like Rosario's or El Mirador. These are restaurants with Formica-topped tables, paper napkins, the original overhead fans, walls painted in high-gloss enamel and bowls of either red or green salsa on the table, sometimes both. The first thing the waitress brings, before you order, is a bowl of freshly made saltless chips to dip in the salsa. After you have been in Texas for a while you learn that salsa is the ketchup of the Southwest: it's put on everything from cottage cheese to eggs. Don't eat them all: save room at Rosario's for a black-bean soup

that is rich without being thick, and quesadillas oozing with cheese.

At El Mirador try the red enchiladas. They make them red by adding red chili to the masa (corn flour). Or order the combination plate. After eating it you will know the difference between what passes for one in New York and the real thing. On a single plate you will be served a meat-stuffed corn-flour turnover, chicken enchilada and

green sauce, cheese enchilada with chili con carne, rice, refried beans and guacamole. Flour tortillas are served on the side.

The very best chips and salsa I tasted were served at the Liberty Bar, which is yuppie Texan rather than Tex-Mex. To my mind, chips and salsa are best with beer, but the owner of the Liberty Bar, Drew Allen, maintains they taste great with Chateaufeuf-du-Pape.

Tex-Mex is also described by those who live in San Antonio, such as Billie Bledsoe, a food writer and consultant, as the kind of food they serve at Tycoon Flats. Tycoon Flats looks like a truck stop, a rundown one at that. But the clientele would wear three-piece business suits in New York.

A very good version of the hamburger with crushed tortilla chips is served here. The standard lunch is a

margarita, the hamburger and nachos. These are not nachos made with Velveeta, says Kathy Coiner, wife of one of the owners. "We use real cheese and we don't put them in a microwave," she said, adding that the margaritas "cut the richness of the refried bean hamburgers."

Tex-Mex, according to many observers, includes mesquite-grilled steak, and one of the best places to savor it is at the Grey Moss Inn, a

200-year-old house in a lush green forest in the foothills of the Texas hill country. Though 40 minutes from downtown, the inn still has a San Antonio address.

Tex-Mex, Texan or Mexican, is what people call comfort food here. "You have to remember," one friend said, "that around here you can go to an event where people are wearing \$4,000 gowns and they'll serve nachos."

Cookbook Offers Chinese Recipes For Use By American Home Cooks

Ken Hom, star of an eight-part television series on Chinese cookery, has written a cookbook that includes many of the recipes and techniques he demonstrates on his show. The book is titled "Ken Hom's Chinese Cookery" and is published by Harper & Row.

A quality paperback, illustrated in color, it contains recipes practical for American cooks. His great knowledge of his subject, as well as his enthusiasm, enhance his work. Here, for example is his introduction to his recipe for Deep-Fried Green Beans: "The traditional recipe calls for long beans but I have found string beans equally suitable. The beans are deep-fried to transform their texture, but they should remain green and not be overcooked. After deep-frying, the beans are stir-fried in an array of spices to create a delectable dish."

KEN HOM'S DEEP-FRIED GREEN BEANS

- 2 cups oil
- 1 pound string beans, trimmed and cut into 5-inch pieces
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped garlic
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped gingerroot
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped scallions
- 4 dried red chilies
- 1 tablespoon bean sauce, available in Oriental food shops
- 1 tablespoon rice wine or dry sherry
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon water

Heat oil in a deep-fat fryer or large wok until it is fairly hot. When a single bean is dropped into the oil, it should bubble all over. Deep-fry half the beans until they are slightly wrinkled — about 3 to 4 minutes. Remove beans and drain. Deep-fry the second batch the same way.

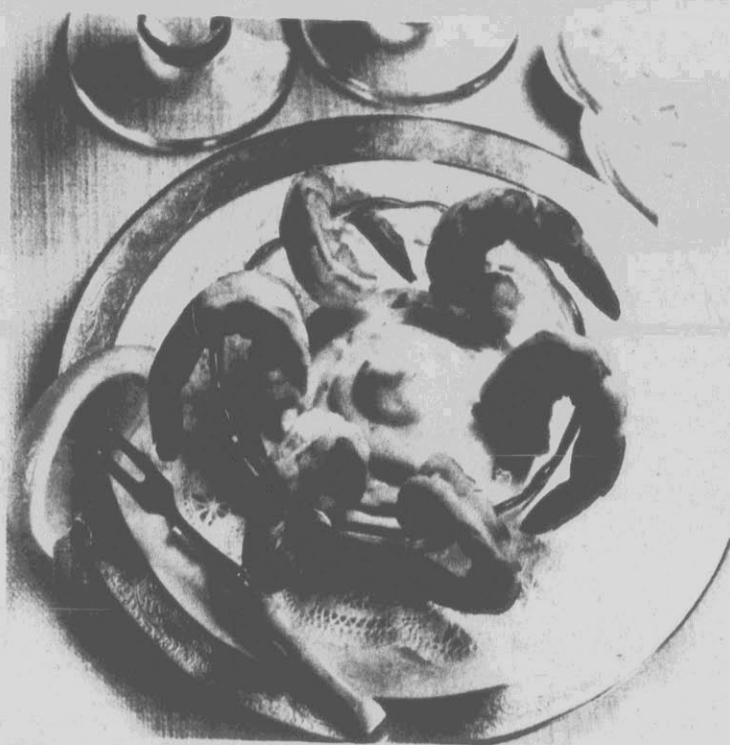
Transfer about 1 tablespoon of the oil in which you have cooked the beans to a clean wok or skillet. Add garlic, ginger and scallions and stir-fry quickly. Add chilies and stir-fry for about 30 seconds until they turn black. Remove chilies; add all the other ingredients. Stir-fry for a few seconds, and then add cooked, drained beans. Mix well until all the beans are thoroughly coated with the spicy mixture. Serve as soon as beans are heated through. Adapted from "Ken Hom's Chinese Cookery" by Ken Hom (Harper & Row.) - 2 pounds large shrimp, shelled
 - Juice of 5 or 6 lemons

 - 1-4 cup chopped cilantro
 - Salt, pepper
 - Cilantro sprigs

Mustard Gives 'Something Else' Taste To Meals

MEDITERRANEAN LAMB CHOPS

Whether serving friends an elegant meal or simple appetizers, most cooks want to create something different, delicious, yet simple to prepare.

There are a variety of tricks of the trade, but one of them is varying ingredient combinations so that whatever is served delivers an exceptional flavor, one not easily copied.

For example, mustard, especially Dijon mustard, is increasingly associated with gourmet cooking. It is easy to use, blends well with other flavors, can deliver a mild or strong flavor, and is appropriate with a variety of foods.

The recipes that follow are good examples. Shrimp Cocktail Dijonnaise is a spicy and elegant appetizer alternative, replacing the usual tomato cocktail sauce for shrimp.

As a main course, the Mediterranean Lamb Chops use a mustard stuffing to create an especially savory entree.

As another alternative, Dijon Herb Sauce can be prepared quickly in a blender and served with meats, including chicken, fish or veal.

- 1/2 pound ground pork
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup mushrooms, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup Grey Poupon Dijon Mustard
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon rosemary
- 1 cup fresh whole wheat bread crumbs
- 10 to 12 lamb chops, 1-inch thick, cut with pocket for stuffing
- 1/4 cup dry white wine

- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 2/3 cup salad oil
- 1/4 cup Grey Poupon Dijon Mustard
- 2 tablespoons Regina red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1/4 teaspoon tarragon, thyme or dill weed
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

People either love the earthy taste of the juicy shelled delights or they hesitate to tell polite company just what they think of the slimy snack.

But the boiled peanut, considered a Southern delicacy, is much more than a friendly point of culinary dispute to sociologist Graham Tomlinson.

For Tomlinson, it signifies the rural South in much the same way as symbols like the Confederate flag.

"If you look at it from a cultural level it is that. It is the Confederate flag," said Tomlinson, a professor of sociology at Baptist College near Charleston, who says the boiled peanut "is loaded with meaning."

Tomlinson has researched the unlikely subject and his findings will be published in the September issue of the journal *Mid-America Folklore*. His basic tenet, based on dozens of in-depth interviews, is that boiled peanuts signify other aspects of rural Southern culture.

Tomlinson interviewed peanut lovers, ranging from housewives and legal secretaries to ministers, firemen, a state senator and the wife of a gubernatorial candidate. He conducted 58 interviews and more than three-quarters of the people he talked to were born or reared in towns with populations of less than 1,000.

He concluded the boiled peanut signifies the rural South in a number of ways:

—Boiled peanuts are generally found in rural areas although they are becoming more common in Southern cities. They're seldom found in areas outside the South.

—The boiled peanut is in keeping with the excessively boiled vegetables central to the cuisine of the rural South.

—The boiled peanut is a plain snack food and reflects the pride in plainness characteristic of the rural South. Tomlinson noted that cooking them consists simply of putting peanuts in boiling water with salt. And he said he's never seen a written recipe for boiled peanuts.

—Many people have a hard time stopping when eating boiled peanuts. That lack of control, Tomlinson says, is also expressed in the rural Southern view of religion in which people "give themselves up to religion." He added "there's a general fatalism about life among rural Southerners. I see it as a result of the Civil War. They lost the war and since then you can never trust things like rationality and planning."

—There's a timelessness quality about the boiled peanut. Tomlinson said that most people couldn't remember specifically when they last ate them. That reflects the timelessness of life in the rural South where punctuality is not as important as in some other regions, he said.

Tomlinson, himself a native Southerner, said he started the research thinking that boiled peanuts were a food item that Southerners used to test non-Southerners — if you rejected the snack because you didn't like it, you would be rejected as an outsider.

But he found in his interviews that, while Southerners expressed disappointment that the boiled peanuts might be refused, they also felt it would be inhospitable to reject the person who did so.

However, unlike the Confederate flag, the boiled peanut doesn't have a conscious, symbolic meaning to the rural Southerners who eat them, Tomlinson said.

He conducted a number of his interviews at the South Carolina Peanut Party in Pelion, S.C., and "people thought it was the strangest thing I would be walking around asking questions with a tape recorder about boiled peanuts. It was such an obvious thing (to them) that everybody loved boiled peanuts."



Crab Can Become A Surprise

NEW YORK — One of the finest American foods is crab. Whether it be blue crab from the Chesapeake, Dungeness crab from the Pacific or stone crabs from the Florida coast, there is a sweetness and meatiness about the flesh that may be equaled but cannot be surpassed by crab found elsewhere in the world. Small wonder that crab cakes are one of this nation's gastronomic treasures.

The traditional recipe for crab cakes calls for putting crab meat in a bowl and adding mayonnaise and seasonings, including dry or prepared mustard, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco sauce, fresh or dried herbs or a commercially packaged mixture.

Recently I watched a colleague and friend, Georges Perrier, owner-chef of Le Bec-Fin restaurant in Philadelphia, demonstrate a new recipe for crab cakes. Using a food processor, he prepared a mousse-like combination of fresh shrimp, egg and cream. Then he gently blended in the lump crab meat.

The resulting mixture was shaped into patties and cooked in oil until golden brown on both sides. The

cakes were served with a parsley butter sauce. This made a delectable luncheon dish and might serve as a first course to a more complex meal. When I served it at home recently, I prepared as an accompaniment a platter of buttered spinach.

The crab mixture could be made at least two or three hours in advance and refrigerated until ready to cook. It might even be shaped into patties and wrapped in plastic wrap before chilling.

Georges Perrier's Crab Cakes With Shrimp

- 1 pound lump crab meat
- ¾ pound unshelled shrimp
- 1 whole egg
- ¾ cup heavy cream
- Salt to taste if desired
- Freshly ground pepper to taste
- ½ cup finely chopped green onions or scallions
- 1 tablespoon Dijon-style mustard
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- ¼ teaspoon Tabasco sauce
- ½ cup corn, peanut or vegetable oil, approximately
- Parsley butter (see recipe).

1. Pick over crab meat to remove

any cartilage or shell. Leave lumps as large as possible.

2. Shell and devein shrimp. Put shrimp in container of a food processor or electric blender and add the egg, cream, salt and pepper. Blend as finely as possible. Pour and scrape mixture into a mixing bowl.

3. Add crab meat, green onions, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and Tabasco sauce. Blend gently but thoroughly. Shape mixture into 10 equal-size cakes.

4. Heat about 2 teaspoons of the oil in a nonstick skillet and add 4 cakes at a time. Cook over moderate heat about 3 minutes on one side. When golden brown turn and cook about 3 minutes on the other side. Transfer cakes as they are cooked to a warm platter. Continue adding oil as necessary and cooking until all cakes are done. Serve hot with parsley butter spooned over.

Yield: 4 or 5 servings.

Parsley Butter

- 3 tablespoons finely chopped shallots
- 2 tablespoons sherry vinegar
- ¼ cup dry white wine
- one-third cup fish or chicken broth

- one-third cup heavy cream
- 3 tablespoons butter
- Salt to taste if desired
- Freshly ground pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon coarse mustard or Meaux mustard
- ¼ cup finely chopped parsley.
- 1. Combine shallots, vinegar and wine in a saucepan and bring to boil. Cook until reduced by half. Add broth and cream and bring to boil. Cook at a rolling boil about 45 seconds.
- 2. Swirl in butter. Add salt and pepper, and stir in mustard and parsley.
- Yield: About ¾ cup.

- Spinach With Butter
- Salt to taste if desired
- 1 pound fresh spinach, tough stems removed, rinsed and drained
- 2 tablespoons butter.

- 1. Bring about 2 inches of water to boil in a kettle. Add salt. Add spinach and stir until wilted. Cook about 3 minutes and drain. Run briefly under cold running water and drain. Squeeze to extract any excess liquid.
- 2. Heat butter in a skillet and add spinach. Cook, stirring, until piping hot throughout, 1 minute or less.
- Yield: 4 servings.

- 1½ to 2 cups chopped parsley
- 5 or 6 sprigs of fresh mint, chopped; or 2 tablespoons dried mint, crumbled
- 3 fat scallions, thinly sliced
- 2 ripe, red tomatoes, seeded and coarsely chopped
- ¼ cup extra-virgin olive oil
- Juice of ½ lemon, or more to taste
- Salt to taste.

- 1. Place the bulgur in a bowl and add water to cover to a depth of 1 inch. Soak for 20 to 30 minutes.
- 2. Line a colander with a clean dishcloth and drain the bulgur, squeezing it by hand to remove as much water as possible. You should have about 1½ cups soaked bulgur.
- 3. Place it in a salad bowl and add parsley, mint and scallions. Mix well and squeeze the grains with the other ingredients to flavor them well.
- 4. Add tomatoes and mix well. Add olive oil, juice of half a lemon and salt. Mix well and taste. The tabbouleh should have a good lemony flavor. Add more lemon juice if necessary.
- 5. Set aside, lightly covered, for at least 30 minutes. The tabbouleh may be made ahead of time and refrigerated, but it should be removed from the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before serving.
- Yield: 4 servings.

The recipe:

1/2 cup strawberry slices.

Layer pudding mixture, whipped topping mixture and strawberries in four parfait glasses or dessert dishes; repeat layers.

Use Summer As An Excuse To Experiment With Salads

NEW YORK — Warm weather is arriving in earnest, a good excuse to spend some time experimenting with salads. Though salads made with a variety of fresh, crisp greens, now flooding our markets, certainly should be a part of everyone's daily diet, salads made with grains have many advantages. They are more filling than plain green salads and can often form the basis for a light meal. Whole grains are complex carbohydrates and an excellent source of fiber. Another advantage is that grain salads can be made in advance — indeed, they benefit from a period of maceration to develop their flavors.

The cuisine of the Middle East has a rich tradition of grain salads. One of the most typical — some would say

it is the Lebanese national dish — is tabbouleh, a combination of bulgur wheat, finely minced parsley and chopped vegetables. Bulgur, called burghul in the Middle East, is wheat that has been briefly steamed, cracked and dried. It is widely available in supermarkets. In Middle Eastern shops, it often comes in several grades; the medium grade is best for tabbouleh. (Larger grades of bulgur can be lightly steamed and served in place of rice or pasta.)

Avoid the "instant" tabbouleh preparations available in many supermarkets; they are heavily salted to make up for the flat flavor of dehydrated vegetables. Since they must be soaked for 30 minutes, they save no time. Moreover, they are expensive — \$1.40 for seven ounces, as opposed to 50 or 60 cents a pound for bulgur.

Some tabbouleh recipes call for cooking the bulgur, steaming it lightly, before mixing the salad. This is a mistake — the bulgur should be soaked for 20 to 30 minutes to soften it, but steaming it will take away the delightfully nutty texture of the grain.

Heap the tabbouleh on an oval platter and surrounded with leaves of crisp romaine lettuce, which can be used to scoop it up. It is a delightful first course for a summer dinner party, but it can equally well serve as a light main course.

The following recipe can be adjusted as you wish, adding more tomatoes, chopped, seeded cucumber or very thinly sliced onions.

- Tabbouleh
- ½ cup medium grain bulgur wheat
- Water for soaking

But June is the month when problems often appear on tomato plants. It may be too late to save fruits already damaged, but a little troubleshooting now will ensure later harvests of blue-ribbon tomatoes. Here's how to make 1986 a vintage year, reports Better Homes and Gardens magazine.

You can avoid natural disasters in your tomato row by learning to identify and correct all of these common weather-related problems.

Blossom-end rot:
A scar or rotted area on the blossom-end of a tomato is the telltale sign of blossom-end rot. This ailment is caused by a dramatic

change in soil moisture, and often occurs when the weather turns from a cool, rainy period to a dry heat wave.

How to correct:
Plant tomatoes in well-drained soil.

• Mulch plants to keep soil moisture and temperature constant.

Blossom drop:
Tomato plants require a nightly temperature range of 55 to 75 degrees Fahrenheit to set fruit. Unseasonably cool or hot weather during the blooming phase can make blossoms fall off. Heavy winds may also damage flowers.

How correct:
Keep young plants warm on cool nights by covering them with cloches.

• Protect plants from wind.
• Sunscald:

Tomatoes require sunshine to ripen, but too much of a good thing can cause sunscald. This malady shows up as a white or yellow papery blister on the part of the tomato that is most exposed to the sun. Although natural foliage cover usually provides the necessary protection, plants damaged by disease or insects often have insufficient leaf cover.

How to correct:
Let plants sprawl on the ground so they'll shade themselves from full sun.

Fruit cracks:
Few things are more pleasing to the gardener's eye than an unblemished tomato, but a tomato with cracks is less appetizing. Found on the blossom-end of the fruit, cracks are often caused by a sudden change in weather.

Dessert Buffets 'Sweet To Give'

There's a new trend abroad in the land. Some party-givers are having Dessert Buffets. "Come after dinner," they tell their friends, "and sample several desserts."

When a young friend of mine recently gave just such a Dessert Buffet, she had these offerings: cheesecake; chocolate pound cake; crisp and buttery spice cookies; a bowl of strawberries, and ice cream.

Here's a recipe for a refreshing Lime Cheesecake.

LIME CHEESECAKE

(Processor Method)

- Graham cracker crumbs
- 1 cup small curd cottage cheese
- 8-ounce package cream cheese, cut into 8 equal pieces
- 1/4 cup butter, cut into 4 equal pats
- 2 large eggs
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 2 teaspoons grated lime rind
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 cup sour cream

Grease an 8-by-3-inch springform pan; dust with crumbs.

In a food processor, using metal blade, process cottage cheese for 45 seconds; scrape down sides of bowl as needed. Add cream cheese; process about 30 seconds or until creamy and smooth. Add butter; process about 30 seconds or until blended. Add eggs, sugar, cornstarch, lime rind and lime juice. Process about 15 seconds or until blended. Add sour cream; pulse 8 times or until smooth. Pour into prepared springform pan.

Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven until firm around the edge - 1 hour. Turn off oven control. Let cake stand in oven 1 hour. Remove and cool completely on a wire rack. Refrigerate several hours or overnight. Before serving, remove side of pan.

Makes 8 servings.

Season For Cool Salads Is At Hand

Salads are being eaten more and more the year round, but the season for these cool dishes is now at its peak.

The range is almost without limit, from chilled lettuce and greens, with cucumbers and radishes, to elaborate mixtures of meat or fish and vegetables, such as a Chef's Salad, which is a meal in itself.

A hot weather salad can be a very colorful dish with bright red tomatoes, green or black olives and white radish slices. Sliced hard-boiled eggs are also a welcome addition in such a summer mixture.

Lettuce, the mainstay of most salads, ranges from iceberg to loose-leafed Boston.

Garlic, for those who favor the taste, gives a lift to most salads. It took salads to lend class to the potato, when placed on a bed of lettuce dressed with anchovies, olives and pickles and served cold. Another favorite is German potato salad dressed with julienne strips of tongue or ham.

Salads are usually served with a clear dressing, such as Italian, in which the main ingredients are oil and vinegar.

Mayonnaise is also used of course, especially in cold potato or tuna fish salad.

There are also delicious hot salads, like German potato with Italian dressing and bacon strips, but this is not the season for them. However, this salad can also be served cold.

Here is a recipe for "beefy" potato salad, from a book on potato cookery that I published several years ago.

- 1 pound lean cooked beef, trimmed
- 3 tablespoons wine vinegar

- 2 tablespoons sherry wine
- 1 tablespoon ketchup
- 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 2 medium potatoes, peeled, cooked and cubed
- 1/4 cup raw mushrooms, sliced
- 1/4 cup dairy sour cream
- Lettuce leaves

Cut beef into 1/2-inch cubes. In large bowl, combine beef, vinegar, sherry, ketchup and mustard. Marinate in refrigerator for 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Add potatoes, mushrooms and sour cream. Toss gently. Chill and serve on lettuce leaves. Serves 2 to 3 people.

- CELERY PARMESAN
- 1 compact head celery
- 2 cups chicken broth
- Several sprigs parsley
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano
- 1 small garlic clove, halved
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup heavy cream
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- Salt to taste

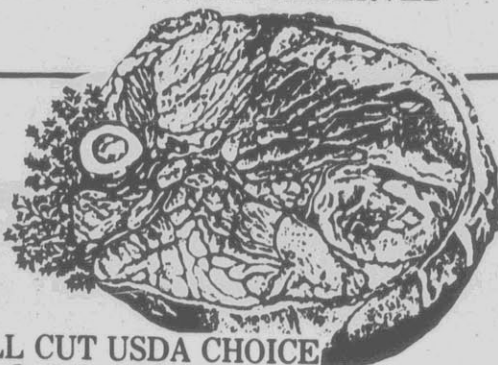
Cut off leafy tops of celery and trim root. Cut celery lengthwise into 6 wedges; rinse in cold water. In a large skillet bring broth to boiling point; add parsley, oregano, garlic and celery wedges. Cover and simmer until almost tender - 15 minutes. Drain; broth left may be used in soup. Place wedges in a baking dish (10 by 6-inch). Sprinkle with Parmesan. Mix cream, butter and salt; spoon over celery. Bake uncovered in a preheated 325-degree oven until celery is tender and thoroughly hot - 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Teatime

Jam cupcakes and tea:

- JAM CUPCAKES
- 1 cup stirred cake flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup apricot preserves

Put a fluted paper baking cup in each of 12 (each 1-3rd cup size) muffin-pan cups. Stir together flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Cream butter and sugar; beat in egg; stir in flour mixture and buttermilk just until flour mixture is moistened. Stir in apricot preserves. Spoon into baking cups - each will be about 1/2 full. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean - about 15 minutes.

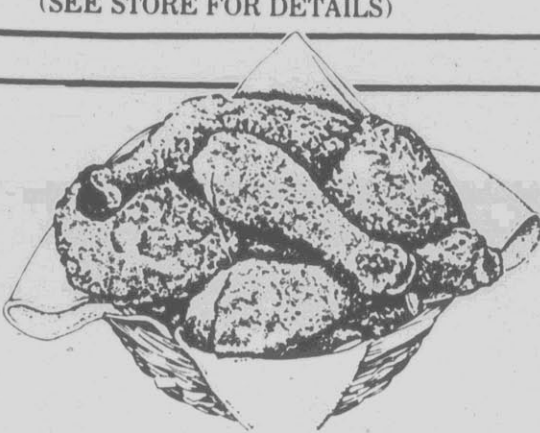
