

Warrenton Jan^y 15th 1870

Dear Ell

I have waited so long
for a letter. I concluded I would not
wait any longer but write to see what
had become of you all. I am not
feeling very well. Ellen has been
very unwell but up and much better
she was sorry that she could not get
to see you intended spending a week
with you but left sooner than she
expected. Had a very nice time.

How did you spend your Christmas
It rained so I could not get out. I had
a very interesting book so I ^{spent} the time
in reading. I think Maena has been
up once since you left. I thought
her arrangements was to spend her time
in Warrenton. I think she is
entirely out of that notion.

I think she would be much more comfortable but every one to their own liking. Brother Whit and Mr. Clements have rented the home place she will spend her time there and at brother Whits and Henry Williams. I think she ought to have some better home. I heard she was sick some time ago I reckon it was from riding in the cold and changing her room. Hannie Green and Alice will leave this morning for Jounes. If nothing prevents Ric and myself will try and pay you a visit when the weather gets pleasant. How are the children getting on. Tell little Elias I may carry little Ric to see him. How is Sarah getting on. Tell Elias I was glad to hear that he made a good Cotton Crop. I think we shall send Ellen to the College next session I think it will be better for her. I miss you so much wish it was time for you

to come up. I do not think there is any way of getting you to stay all the time of course would not be so subject but cant you come up ^{earlier} little

Cousin Marys first payment was made for her land five thousand dollars which she paid for the College. she is not well. I think exposes herself too much. I see Cousin Lucy very often she desired to be remembered to you when I wrote. Fanny has a whooping cough. Ric spent the day with us last Sunday. She was looking very well. Julia she is in Petersburg staying with Ellen Horwood. I expect she is having a nice time. One of those large trees ^{in your yard} blown down across the street. Calvin wanted to cut it out for the use of it but Mr. P said there would be several cords so would try and have it cut up and put away. Warrinton is very dull so I will close. all ^{to} and love to you. Elias and the children write soon and believe me as ever your fond sister
