- Note 1. Our Standing Seam Roofings are the simplest and easiest laid of their kind, and STEEL is the best material ever put into Roofing. V Crimp makes a good Roofing for Barns, sheds, warehouses, etc.; CORRUGATED is best adapted for SIDING; beaded and small corrugated are most used for ceilings.
- Note 2. Our STANDARD GAUGE roofings, as quoted on our price list, are guaranteed of the same weight and thickness as so-called No. 26 roofings furnished by some firms, unless No. 26 Birmingham Gauge is specifically mentioned.
- Note 3. Our Standard Gauge Roofing is No. 27 Birmingham or No. 26 American Gauge.
- Note 4. Where no sheathing boards are used, nothing lighter than No. 24 roofings should be used. The STANDARD GAUGE roofings ought always to be laid on sheathing boards; rough boards, close together, answer all purposes.
- Note 5. Where there is escaping steam or gases in a building, or where there is danger of "sweating" on the under side of a roof, a layer of felt paper over the sheathing, before putting on the metal, is always a necessary precaution.
- Note 6. When shipping goods to persons not rated by the mercantile agencies, or who have not furnished satisfactory references, we always ship to our own order, sending invoice, and then make draft through bank or express company, attaching the bill lading to the draft. These drafts are always made payable on arrival of goods.

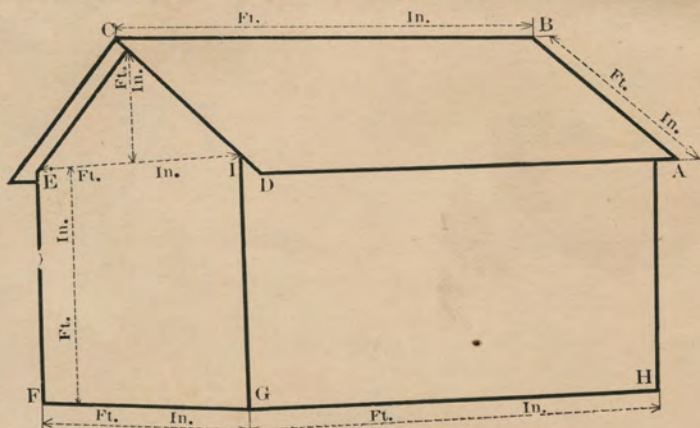
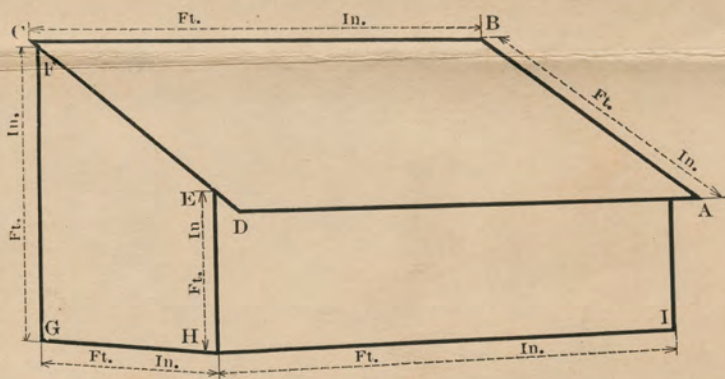



FIG. 2—FOR SHED ROOF.

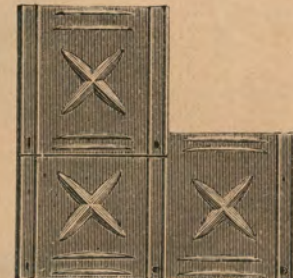
