I have intended for the last several days sending the bal. rent on yr place for 1893. I have sent you in Cks & vouchers saying they is \$110⁰⁰ & saying send \$10 for 4. Which with 5% comes on \$120, the amt total of rent, will make that sum. The vineyard was a complete let this yr as you know. I made a few (3 I think) shipments & if I had not paid for the baskets the previous yr wd have been put in for them. This was about the case with all the vineyards in this vicinity. I had not intended to make the chge for corns, but times get so hard & beside that I felt sure it was agreed to you. What is the part of the Vineyard to be grubbed up worth to cultivate? I will leave that part in the way of the scupper nony vine & the "Boss" is to have his garden

in that part between the stable lot and the
garden. If you say so I will take that bit of
the vineyard to be grubbed up & cultivate my-
self for corn on the collection &c for 1894.

On acc of the large quantity of mud & wire
grass I suppose it wd not pay to put
it in anything but corn this yr any how.
