My Dear Governor

The middle of June is past and you have not yet made your appearance in Washington. When shall we look for you? I have much to talk with you about. I had hoped to go to one-head Saturday and meet you there but owing to the illness of Mrs. Fair, I will not be able to go. She is still in bed in the hands of a trained nurse, with the doctor coming to see her twice a day and all Company excluded. This will probably continue for a week longer. We are much pleased with the doctor in attendance and I hope she will be greatly benefited by him.

It looks now like we might get the Tariff Bill through the Senate in the next ten days and then get away from here by the first of Aug.

I gave The Post Master General
a regular sitting a few days ago and
tried to get a place for our friend
Baranov. He tells me the Post Office
inspectors were put under the Civil
Service by Harrison and that he now
only has the appointments of Chiefs of
Divisions and they are all filled. I find
it hard work to get anybody appointed
to anything.
