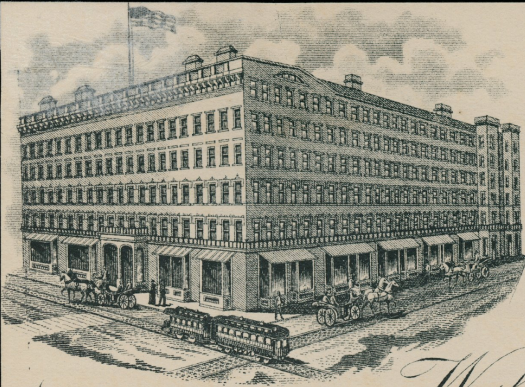

be with such peaceful aid.

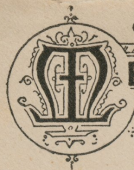
