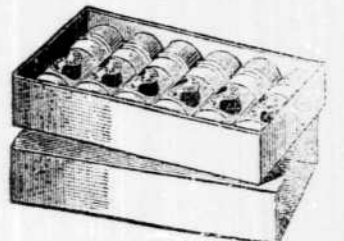

LOCAL NOTES AND TOBACCO JOTTINGS.

The property of the Greenville Warehouse Co. will be rented the 1st day of May. Bids will be entertained for the property as a whole or separately.

We have a letter from a gentleman living in Virginia who expects to move to Greenville between now and August to live. He wants to rent a good dwelling for his family. Greenville will need several more dwelling houses next fall.

A few days ago a young tobacco man that has been watching Greenville for the past two years remarked in our presence that there would be fifteen good buyers located in Greenville next year. We asked him how he knew it and he only shook his head and said that he would guarantee there would be buyers enough to take all the tobacco that the warehouse people can get here.

Prospects for brilliant success have never been more encouraging for any tobacco market than they are at present for Greenville, and the most encouraging features in this connection is the fact that the foundation of the market has been placed on firm and solid ground. Its great advantages as a tobacco centre have never been magnified to the world as have some others and hence those that have come to Greenville in quest of bright tobacco instead of being deceived and misled as to its advantages have become fixedly impressed with Greenville as the brightest tobacco market in the east.

Encouragement, money and the hand of co-operation should be extended by every citizen in Greenville and see that the little ripple that struck it a few weeks ago shall result in a solid reality. We refer to the establishment of an electric light plant. No town in North Carolina is more in need of electric lights and water works than Greenville. No town in North Carolina has a brighter future than Greenville and the people of Greenville are loyal and have pride enough to keep abreast with the spirit of the times as evidenced by other towns wherever necessity calls it, and no town in North Carolina can better afford to have these improvements, which will add so much to its lasting and material prosperity, than Greenville.

Capt. F. M. Pace and Mr. Will Andrews, of Wilson, came down Monday and spent the day in Greenville. These gentlemen are viewing the Greenville market with an eye to locating here. While it has been openly stated that some of us were opposed to Capt. Pace coming to Greenville, the statement is absolutely ungrounded. There is no one who is more anxious to see Greenville prosper, especially as a tobacco market, than this writer and we believe that our past record since we have been connected with the market in both our public and private dealings has proven such to be the case. Yes, Capt. Pace, come to Greenville and we extend you a most hearty welcome and predict for you more success and satisfaction in your business in Greenville than any town you have ever struck in all your wide experience with tobacco markets.

A letter from a friend in the Western section of Virginia asks what is the extent of the damage done plants in Eastern North Carolina by the cold weather. He says plants up there are seriously damaged and in some places literally destroyed. This will of course make a late crop and necessarily a dark one and the price of dark and common tobacco may be expected to be lower next year than it has ever been before although it seems that the price now is full below what it cost to cultivate the crop saying nothing about the fertilizers, curing and grading. Yet the prospect now of future prices on this particular grade of tobacco is exceedingly gloomy. For three years past a super abundance of these tobaccos have been grown and as France and Russia are large customers of American common tobacco and are already over supplied, the future price of common tobacco will necessarily be very low. Farmers in Eastern North Carolina should make a special effort this year to grow as little common tobacco as possible, for unless prospects brighten it will not pay to haul such grades to market while the bright grades will command good prices.

There are a great many new beginners in tobacco culture in

Eastern North Carolina this year. The high prices obtained last year by a great many in different sections has caused numbers who never planted any before to try some this year. Tobacco farming like everything else in which success and money is made must be begun, conducted and ended right, otherwise tobacco growing for profit is a dismal failure. And a failure in tobacco farming is just a little worse than almost any other crop that can be grown, because it costs more to get prepared to handle it than any other crop after which however a tobacco crop can be grown and harvested as cheap, if not cheaper, than a cotton crop. To make a successful tobacco farmer one needs to be active, attentive and systematic. Care and judgment should be exercised from the time the plant bed is started till the time it is graded and ready for market. A ship-shod farmer will never make a success at tobacco farming and the sooner this is learned by every man in Eastern North Carolina who ever expects to grow tobacco the better it will be for the farming profession. We have in Eastern North Carolina the best lands for the growth and development of bright tobacco of any other section in the Union and if we will farm on a systematic and intensive system bright tobacco farming can be made a success.

Hopkinsville. — Continued reports are still coming in of plants being destroyed during the cold weather in the latter part of March. A great many have reason, but the weather continues cold and unseasonable for growth of any vegetation. White frost this morning. The planting of crop will necessarily be late.

W. P. Dobson & Co., of Rockford, N. C. will open their tobacco factory May 1st.

The Durham grand jury got after saloon keepers and other dealers for selling cigarettes to minors.

Statesville has nine tobacco factories, and two more would be started at once if suitable building could be secured.

The total number of farms in Virginia is 127,200; total acreage of farms, 19,104,951; value of lands, fencing and building, \$254,490,600; value of farm products, \$42,244,458.

George Watts, of Durham, member of the firm of W. Duke, Sons & Co., donates \$1,000 for the building of a hospital at Barium Springs, Iredell county. Work will begin at once.

Mr. M. W. Rice, of the firm of N. T. Robertson & Co., leaf dealers of Danville, presented the Daily Register with a twin leaf of tobacco. The two leaves are well developed and grown from one stem.

The report of the secretary of the Lynchburg Tobacco Association shows the sales of tobacco from October 1st to April 1st to be 13,196,200 pounds, a falling off of 1,895,900 compared with the same time for 1893.

Mr. John Meadows, of Oxford, N. C., says: "Three fourths of the good tobaccos, wrappers and cutters, have been sold—almost everything in the way of fine wrappers and cutters. I think the estimate is that from 60 to 70 per cent. of the crop has been sold in the Oxford district."

An Elkin, N. C., telegram of the 5th inst., says that three of W. H. Reeves & Son's tobacco operatives at Roaring, Wilkes County, drank a lot of peach flavoring and two of them were in a dying condition when the telegram was sent. They thought it was peach brandy they were drinking. The men have since died.

The Manufacturers' Record in its weekly review of the business situation of the South, says: "The total liabilities of the failures in the whole country for the first three months of 1894, were \$10,000,000 more than for the first quarter of 1893, but in the South there was a decrease of \$77,000, indicating the steady financial improvement in the South ahead of the rest of the country."

The Durham Bull Smoking Tobacco factory is not only receiving large orders, and increasing its working force, but very decided improvements are being made in the business office of the factory. Col. J. S. Carr, president of the company, has contracted with R. I. Rogers, the Durham marble dealer, for a handsome marble tile floor, and the work is now going on, and when it is completed, and the carpenters and decorators got through with their work, we venture to say there will not be a finer or handsomer suite of business rooms in the State, and, we may add, the South.—Durham Sun.

Under the head of "Do Hogs Pay?" the Richmond, Ky., Register quotes Mr. Fountain Rice, a Madison county farmer, as saying that from the produce of nine red sows last year he sold \$1,565 worth of hogs, killed meat for a family of fourteen persons, gave away four hogs and has 150 hogs and pigs still left.

The Kentucky Commissioner of Agriculture in his report says: "A correspondent in Gormantown writes: Tobacco plants and fruit all killed; re-sowing our tobacco beds. The reports vary as to tobacco beds, although there are a great many similar to the one above. Where the beds were well protected there were a great many saved."

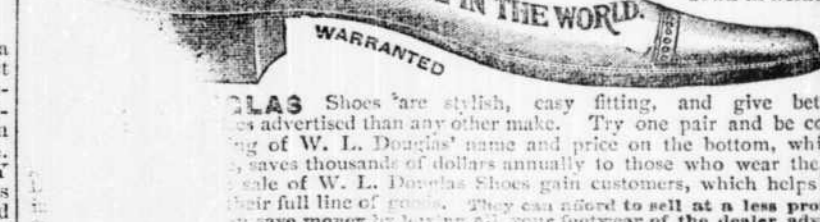
