NORTH CAROLINA'S GREAT STATE FAIR

WILL BE A RECORD BREAKER.

Many Interesting Attractions Have Been Secured.

Much interest is being shown over the entire state with the approach of the great state fair dates, which will be October 17, 18, 19, 20, as the fair this year promises to surpass all former events. With the many exhibits and the amusement attractions along with the many free attractions and other features, the fair promises to be of unusual interest to every true North Carolinian.

Mr. Geo. C. Hall, of Raleigh, was in the city today in the interest of the fair and was very enthusiastic in his remarks about this great week. "The fair this year," said Mr. Hall, "will eclipse all former occasions in many respects." Continuing he said, "Nothing has been left undone this year in looking some of the largest exhibits and attractions. The coming of Hon. Judson Harmon, who will speak at the fair grounds on Wednesday, will be a big event, no doubt, but what a record-breaking crowd will be at the fair on that day."

The state fair has closed a contract with the Glenn H. Curtiss company for aeroplane flights at the grounds every day at the fair.

A contract has also been completed for the exhibition on the fair grounds of California Frank's Wild West shows, the biggest and best aggregation of the kind on the road.

The Great Calvert, known the country over as a peer among high wire specialists, has also been engaged. He has been seen before at the fair, and he more than made good.

The miraculous painting, "In the Shadow of the Cross," will be on exhibit for the first time in the South.

A great free attraction will be the Osaia Troup of Japs. These little fellows will perform many interesting acrobatic stunts.

The foot ball game to be played Thursday between the mighty A. and M. team and Bucknell will be another great feature.

It is expected that this will be the banner year in the history of the great state fair and that the attendance will break all records, as only a few of the many attractions and features have been mentioned in this article.

HOOKWORM DISPENSARIES.

Selma Ellis, a Columbus County Boy, Takes a New Lease on Life.

Selma Ellis, a Columbus county boy, sixteen years old, who lives near Fair Bluff, was brought in the state and county dispensary July 25th on a stretcher. He was unable to sit up or walk. He had been in declining health for six years, unable to work or to go to school. He weighed only sixty pounds and had an enormous ulcer on his left leg.

A microscopic examination verified the belief that he was a victim of the severest type of hookworm infection. Treatment was begun by Dr. Prigden, but as he had to move his hospital, Dr. C. W. Stiles, scientific secretary of the hookworm commission, was prevailed to complete the treatment at the Marine hospital in Wilmington.

Selma made a splendid recovery, can walk or run, and is now at his home in good health. He gained 19 pounds, now weighing 79 pounds, and the quality of his blood has increased from 14 per cent to 60 per cent of normal. He is an enthusiastic worker in the hookworm crusade, but is only one of the thousands who are finding restored health and pleasure as a result of the campaign.

Seventeen of the eastern counties of the state have provided for these dispensaries.

MR. R. C. WHITE DEAD.

Passed Away Saturday Night in Kingston Hospital.

Mr. Richard Claudius White, aged 27 years, and youngest son of C. S. C. A. White, died about midnight Saturday night in the hospital in Kingston, where he was taken a few weeks ago for treatment. The remains were brought home on the Atlantic Coast Line train Sunday morning, and today were consigned to earth again.

The death of this young man is so sad. But recently he was the picture of health—strong, robust and with every promise of life and every surrounding to make life pleasant. But the latter part of July he was stricken with pneumonia, and complications following this, he lingered and fought through several weeks of intense suffering only to be overcome at last by the monster, death.

In the summer of 1910, he married Miss Clara Pugh, of New Bern, and to the young wife and infant daughter his death is saddest of all.

Griffith, of Kingston, was held at 11 o'clock this morning at the residence of Mrs. Lula Fleming, sister of the deceased, the interment following in Cherry Hill cemetery. 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BULLETIN ISSUED ON COTTON DISEASE

IMPORTANT TO COTTON FARMERS

Disease Carried From Season to Season on Seed of Infected bolls.

The North Carolina agricultural experiment station has issued the following bulletin with regard to a serious cotton disease:

There is a disease of cotton which is yearly attracting increased attention throughout the cotton belt. It is known as cotton anthracnose.

It is most easily recognized when on the boll, where it forms ulcer-like spots, which, as they age, become pink in the centers. The spot may enlarge so as to affect the whole boll. The diseased part of the boll usually falls to open and often the contents are scattered from various sections of the state are being received almost daily at the experiment station concerning the disease. It has also been especially severe in Alabama and Georgia during recent years, so severe in the latter state that the legislature has made a large special appropriation for its investigation.

Although the disease is seen and recognized more prominently in the bolls, it also occurs on the leaves and stems. Cotton growers should know that this disease is carried from season to season on the seed, and that seed from a sick boll, even though very slightly diseased, may raise a diseased plant, and this in turn may spread the disease to the whole crop of the next season. There is no satisfactory treatment, and the one point to be remembered is that seed from diseased fields is likely to carry the disease, in fact, almost sure to do so. Even seed from clean fields which has passed through a gin in which diseased cotton has been ginned is dangerous. It is of utmost importance for the grower to be sure that his cotton seed does not come from a field or from a region where this disease prevails.

Paramele Industrial Institute. The Paramele Industrial Institute, for the training and betterment of the colored youth, will begin Wednesday, October 11th. It will be remembered that this is a work that President W. C. Chance founded just a short while ago, and he is laboring earnestly to raise the members of his race to a higher plane. Prof. Chance has just returned from an extended trip through the North where he has had success in his effort to interest well disposed persons. He feels sure that he will be able to begin building very soon.

JAIL IS SECURE

The Reflector's Article Friday Was Misleading

A COMPLETE AND SAFE PRISON

Constructed on Modern Lines And Provided With Every Convenience—No Possibility of Prisoners Cutting Out—Still the Corridor Windows Need a Guard.

The article in The Reflector Friday in regard to the attempt of prisoners to cut out of the new jail was in some respects misleading and calculated to make a wrong impression, as facts found later have proven. The information that came to us, and on which the article was based, had no wrong intention on the part of the informant, but the manner of expressing it, that "some prisoners came near cutting out of jail," created the impression that the occurrence was of more consequence than it really was. The two incorrect statements in the article were that the attempt of the prisoners was nearly successful, and that the fastenings of a cell had been cut nearly in two.

The editor, in company with Messrs. J. L. Wooten and J. C. Moore, two of the building committee, and Sheriff S. L. Dudley went through the jail this morning to make a complete investigation. The fact is true as stated that flies had been handed through the window to prisoners by parties on the outside. (And the main purpose of the previous article was that such as this might be prevented by the placing of a wall or proper protection so that persons outside could not communicate with prisoners). It was also found that the prisoners had used these files, but it was on the fastenings to the outside window of the exercising corridor and not on the cell. It was also found that the cutting of the prisoners had done was insignificant, not exceeding a sixteenth of an inch, and they had worn out two files on this much cutting in several hours' work. As it would require cutting through many inches of the hardest kind of steel to get out of the jail, which would require weeks of cutting and tools almost without number, the impossibility of making any escape by this means is clearly shown.

The jail is constructed of material that is practically impregnable to any kind of tool, and the arrangement of the cells is such as will keep the prisoners in absolute safety. It is only when the prisoners are in the exercising corridor, which they are permitted to use in the day time that they can even get near an outside window. There are peep holes through which the officer can, unobserved by the prisoners, see all the cells and corridors and note just what the prisoners are doing at any time.

There is also an automatic arrangement by which the cells can be opened or closed and locked without the officer coming in contact with the prisoners or even going in the apartment they occupy.

All of the cells have perfect sanitary arrangement with convenient lavatories and baths. It does not look like any jail could be more perfect. At the same time the Reflector still holds the opinion that means should be provided to prevent any outside communication with the prisoners. It does not appear that a wall around the jail is needed, but the windows of the exercising corridors should have some means to prevent access to them by persons outside.

Training School Y. W. C. A.

Rev. C. M. Rock, pastor of Greenville Baptist Church, conducted the Sunday evening services of the Y. W. C. A. He made a helpful talk on the purpose of organized Christian work.

He gave three reasons why the individual should enter into such work: first, for the sake of self; second, for the sake of others; third for the glory of God. Spiritual development should come first. This passes out beyond self, drawing in others. He said the Y. W. C. A. had been of distinct benefit to Greenville. He closed by giving a few practical suggestions for effective work.
