ARBITRATION NOT NEEDED

There is a rumor to the effect that Germany desires to go into a court of arbitration to settle the demand upon that country by the United States. We are only asking for the rights due to a neutral, and the belligerents across the seas, who seem to feel that she can destroy American lives and American property without due preparation, is laboring under a false delusion and is sleeping the sleep of the dead. The United States, guided by the master hand of Wilson, has asked, honorably, from the German government, that they guarantee a cessation of the submarine war on neutral ships carrying lives.

Germany, it occurs to us, would get lost and shipwrecked in the philosophy of one of Shakespeare's fools, in view of the fact that she presents such nonsensical excuses for the rash acts she has committed in violation of international law.

Prince Bismarck, who engineered the Franco-Prussian war of 1870, would never have resorted to the extremes that the present William has in order to further his conquests.

To what extremes this monarch is prepared to go no one can say. To show the haughtiness of William, it is said, that recently he declared that he was the voice of God. How much damage the great German army and navy will accomplish before this blood thirsty fanatic is silenced, cannot be guessed. But one thing is a fact, no arbitration is necessary. There is nothing that is not perfectly plain, existing between the United States and Germany.

The whole nation awaits the reply the Germans will make to the American note.

THE YELLOW PERIL

Japan and China are closely linked in their respect, and in habits to a very noticeable extent. The only contrast that can be drawn from the two races of yellow people, comes from the fact that the Japs have made a good deal more noticeable progress and have overshadowed with a certain certain of civilization that is to be ignored by the white and entered progressive nations of the world. Japan has made demands upon China which cannot be conceded to. Though we have no direct interest with either the Jap or the Chinese, we should be awake to what will be the consequences if the Japs get too much world power. Even today they are looking with envious eyes at our island possessions, and once the Japs become recognized as world leaders, they are liable to take claim of our hands while we sit idly by and watch.

The argument that there will be nothing like this on account of the peaceable attitude of the two countries will not work. No one dreamed of the present war coming in the form which it did.

GIVE THE KIDS A CHANCE

Greenville, with its magnificent courthouse its beautiful postoffice and many other attractive things which seem to make the city beautiful, is without a playground for the children. It seems that no one has ever given this important part of the city's necessities a single thought. As was pointed out in the Reflector several months ago, a city without a playground for the children, is like a ship at sea without a compass. It is high time that the parents and the city officials give this thing a thought, and arrange a suitable place for the youngsters to while away the hours in innocent amusement.

New York's accident statistics, before the playground idea became a reality, was largely composed of deaths and violent injuries to children. Since the many playgrounds have been constructed the casualties have fallen off until an accident is a rare thing, even in such a city as New York.

Some vacant lot here in Greenville can be fitted with appliances to afford the children amusement, it is very small cost, and it will have a tendency to keep them off the city streets where they are constantly in danger of being run down by vehicles.

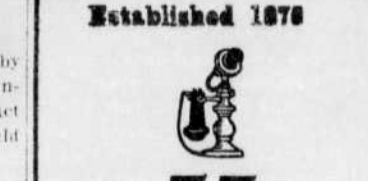
