THE AMENDMENT.

Full Text of the Measure as Amended.

An Act Supplementing to an Act Entitled "An Act to Amend the Constitution of North Carolina," ratified on February 21st, 1898, the same being Chapter Two Hundred and Eighteen of the Public Law of 1898.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 218, Public Laws of 1899, entitled "An Act to amend the Constitution of North Carolina," be amended, so that article 6 of the Constitution of North Carolina be, and the same is hereby amended, and in lieu thereof shall be substituted the following article of said Constitution as an entire and indivisible plan of suffrage:

ARTICLE VI.

SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY TO OFFICE.

Section 1. Every male person born in the United States, and every male person who has been naturalized, and who is at least twenty-one years of age, and possessing the qualifications set out in this article, shall be entitled to vote at any election by the people in the State, except as herein otherwise provided.

Sec. 2. He shall have resided in the State of North Carolina for two years, in the county six months, and in the precinct, ward or other election district in which he offers to vote, four months next preceding the election; provided, that removal of a person from one precinct, ward or other election district to another in the same county, shall not operate to deprive any person of the right to vote in the precinct, ward or other election district from which he has removed, until four months after such removal. No person who has been convicted, or who has confessed his guilt to an open court upon indictment for any crime which is punishable by imprisonment in the State prison, shall be permitted to vote, unless the said person shall be first restored to citizenship in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 3. Every person offering to vote shall be at the time a legally registered voter as herein prescribed, and in the manner hereinafter provided by law, and the General Assembly of North Carolina shall enact general registration laws to carry into effect the provisions of this article.

Sec. 4. Every person presenting himself for registration shall be able to read and write any section of the constitution in the English language; and, before he shall be entitled to vote, he shall have paid on or before the first day of May, of the year in which he proposes to vote, his poll tax for the previous year as prescribed by Article 5, Section 1, of the Constitution. But no male person, who was, on January 1st 1867 or at any time prior thereto, entitled to vote under the laws of any State in the United States wherein he then resided, and no lineal descendant of any such person shall be denied the right to register and vote at any election in this State by reason of his failure to possess the educational qualifications herein described: provided, he shall have registered in accordance with the terms of this section prior to December 1, 1908.

The General Assembly shall provide for the registration of all persons entitled to vote without the educational qualifications herein prescribed, and shall, on or before November 1st, 1908, provide for the making of a permanent record of each registration, and all persons so registered, shall forever thereafter have the right to vote in all elections by the people in this State, unless disqualified under Section 2 of this article: provided, such person shall have paid his poll tax as above required.

Sec. 5. That this Amendment to the Constitution be presented and adopted as one indivisible plan for the regulation of the suffrage, with the intent and purpose to connect the different parts, and to make them so dependent upon each other, that the whole shall stand or fall together.

Sec. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot, and all

elections by the General Assembly shall be viva voce.

Sec. 7. Every voter in North Carolina, except as in this article disqualified, shall be eligible to the office of the office he shall take and subscribe the following oath: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and maintain the constitution and laws of the United States, and the constitution and laws of North Carolina not inconsistent therewith, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of my office as God shall help me."

Sec. 8. The following classes of persons shall be disqualified for office: First, all persons who shall deny the being of Almighty God; Second, all persons who shall have been convicted or confessed their guilt on indictment pending, and whether sentenced or not, under any law of this State, or any other crime for which the punishment may be imprisonment in the penitentiary, since becoming citizens of the United States, or corruption and malpractice in office, unless such person shall be restored to the rights of citizenship in a manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 9. That this Amendment to the Constitution, shall go into effect on the first day of July, 1900, if a majority of the votes cast at the next general election shall be cast in favor of this suffrage amendment.

Sec. 10. If this Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted at the next general election to the qualified voters of the State, in the same manner and under the same rules and regulations as is provided in the law regulating general elections in this State, and at said elections those persons desiring to vote for such Amendment shall cast their votes on a separate ballot, written or printed ballot with the words "For Suffrage Amendment" thereon; and those with a contrary opinion shall cast a written or printed ballot with the words "Against Suffrage Amendment" thereon.

Sec. 11. The votes cast at said election shall be compared, compared, returned and canvassed, and the result announced and declared under the same rules and regulations, and in the same manner as the vote for Governor, and if a majority of the votes cast are in favor of the said Amendment, it shall be the duty of the Governor of the State, upon being notified of the result of said election, to certify the said Amendment, under the seal of the State, who shall enroll the said Amendment so certified among the permanent records of his office.

Sec. 12. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

ELECTION PRECINCT

Voting Places for the August Election.

In accordance with Chapter 507, Laws 1890, the county Board of Elections, for Pitt county, at a meeting held on the 7th day of May 1900, divided the county into election precincts and designated the polling places as follows:

HEAVER DAM TOWNSHIP.

Heaver Dam Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place at May's Chapel.

BELOYR TOWNSHIP.

Beloyr Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place at Parker's School House near Gun Swamp Church.

BETHEL TOWNSHIP.

Bethel Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place at the Town of Bethel.

CAROLINA TOWNSHIP.

Carolina Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place at Stokes on the W. & W. R. R.

CHOCOWIN TOWNSHIP.

Chocowin Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place at Black Jack.

CONTINENZA TOWNSHIP.

Continenza Township is hereby divided into two election precincts:

Precinct No. 1.—All that part of the Township lying west and south of the following line to wit: Commencing at the Beaver Dam Township line on the old Plank Road, near Warren's Chapel, and running with the public road leading by Warren's Chapel to the old Frank Tucker homestead, thence with the public road leading to the Greenville and Beaufort road near Lorenzo McLanahan's; thence with the Greenville and Beaufort road a northernly course to the branch

FALKLAND TOWNSHIP.

Falkland Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place in the town of Falkland.

FARMVILLE TOWNSHIP.

Farmville Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place in the town of Farmville.

GREENVILLE TOWNSHIP.

Greenville Township is hereby divided into two election precincts:

Precinct No. 1.—All that part of the township lying north of the river, together with that part of the town of Greenville lying between Tar River and the following line, to wit: Commencing at the Court House in Greenville, forming the eastern boundary of said town, and running up said street to Third street, thence a westerly course with Third street to Pitt street, thence a southerly course with Pitt street to Dickinson street, thence a southerly course to the western boundary of said town, thence a northerly course with said boundary line to Tar River, and thence a southerly course to the Court House in Greenville.

Precinct No. 2.—All the remainder of said township shall constitute Precinct No. 2, with the polling place at Five Points in the town of Greenville.

FACTOUS TOWNSHIP.

Factous Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place in the village of Factous.

SWIFT CREEK TOWNSHIP.

Swift Creek Township is hereby divided into two election precincts as follows:

Precinct No. 1: All that part of the township lying south of Swift Creek shall constitute Precinct No. 1, with the polling place at Centre-viz:

Precinct No. 2: All that part of the township lying north of Swift Creek shall constitute Precinct No. 2, with the polling place at the public school house near I. S. Stokes.

HEAVER DAM TOWNSHIP.

Heaver Dam Township shall constitute one election precinct with the polling place at May's Chapel.

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Continenza Township is hereby divided into two election precincts:

Precinct No. 1.—All that part of the Township lying west and south of the following line to wit: Commencing at the Beaver Dam Township line on the old Plank Road, near Warren's Chapel, and running with the public road leading by Warren's Chapel to the old Frank Tucker homestead, thence with the public road leading to the Greenville and Beaufort road near Lorenzo McLanahan's; thence with the Greenville and Beaufort road a northernly course to the branch

Man With Two Wives.

A census enumerator has found a man in Newark living happily with two wives and two sets of children.

The chief clerk in the county prosecutor's office said today that the case had been brought to the attention of the county prosecutor, but what action that official proposed to take the clerk refused to say.

He has had three children by his second wife. The man told the enumerator that he got along amicably with his two wives by dividing his pay between them every Saturday night.—Newark, N. J., Dispatch.

Among the States that will surely cast their electoral vote for the Democratic ticket this year is Indiana. A Practical Education at the A. & M. College.

Would Let Hill Nominate Bryan.

We have received a little hand book of the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts, of Raleigh, N. C., and we are glad to see that this institution is devoting itself zealously to technical education and manual training. Our State needs well educated men in all lines of engineering, especially mechanical and electrical engineering, and also in cotton manufacturing. For the development of our natural resources, we need also thousands of skilled workmen, expert carpenters, wood turners, blacksmiths, machinists, mechanics, mill workers, boiler-tenders, electricians and dynamo-tenders. The A. & M. College trains such men for such work, and if they possess talent, educates them for all technical professions.

The College last year enrolled 202 students, of whom many paid their own expenses by labor at odd times. Students who do not labor may attend the College at a total expense, including clothing and books, in fact very little, for about half by securing free scholarship and obtaining work at the College.

Entrance examinations will be held in the county court-house Saturday, July 28th, at 10 o'clock A. M. in the office of the County Superintendent of Public Instruction. Any boy may obtain a copy of the little hand-book, with full information about the College and the examinations, by applying to President Geo. T. Winston, Raleigh, N. C.

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The Record Against Cade.

The spectacle of Bayles Bayle, otherwise and more familiarly known as Ex-Rev. Decey Bayles going about the State slandering the church to which he belongs illustrates the trend of Fusionism. No man can become a Fusion politician and hold his job without lending himself to the defamations of the State and degrading misrepresentation. But Decey Bayles always was an Artisans Ward wad say "an amosin' cuss," not to say an original one. He is not content to misrepresent the Association and traduce the white people—that's what all Fusion orators do—and Decey Bayles could not stand to be merely conventional. And so he pitches in and creates a diversion by slandering the Baptist Church. That's his way of getting himself talked about and going to the front as a Fusion leader.

The Baptist Church, led in its educational policy by Dr. Chas. E. Taylor, the learned president of Wake Forest College, has been earnestly and consistently in favor of better public schools. This fact is so well known that no proof is necessary. We could fill this paper with extracts from its speeches and printed articles of its leaders, urging better public schools, but one resolution adopted by the Baptist State convention is enough to thoroughly refute Cade's slander.—At the Baptist State convention, which met in Greenville, December 28th, 1900, inclusive, 1898, this resolution was adopted:

"Resolving our right of petition, we, the Baptist State convention, respectfully memorialize the Legislature soon to assemble to appropriate every available dollar of public money, however small the amount may be, to the improvement of our public schools, and that the policy of progress in this direction be set up and maintained until the report of the Legislature be received from our State, and until the 600,000 boys and girls whose hope for enlightenment is in the public schools are afforded an opportunity to receive the primary instruction necessary to fit them for the duties of citizenship."

And in the Legislature that followed, it was a Baptist farmer, Moderator of his Association, John B. Holman, who introduced in the House the bill to appropriate \$100,000 to the public schools, it was a Baptist lawyer, Senator Stephen McIntyre, who introduced a similar bill in the Senate. This bill passed both Houses without a dissenting vote proving that not only the Baptists but all the legislators of all churches and outside of any church are earnestly in favor of better schools. The next Legislature, led by Governor Aycock, a distinguished Baptist, will take even further steps to improve the public school system until every county neighborhood, as well as every town and village, has an excellent public school.
