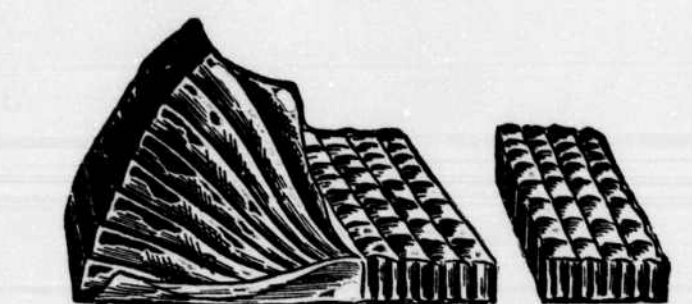

Happenings in North Carolina

Raleigh fair next week and Weldon fair the week after.

A Carr club in Monroe started with 150 members.

The ministers of Charlotte passed strong resolutions against the location of a \$300,000 brewery in that city.

The University of North Carolina has ordered work to begin at once on a new dormitory. It will be a three-story brick building, with granite trimmings and slate roof. It is to cost \$18,000.

Emma Brooks, a colored woman on the farm of Lam Lawrence, locked her 1-year old child in the house and went off. The house caught fire and the little one was burned to death.—Tarboro Southener.

Policeman J. P. Scott killed D. K. McIver, at Sanford, on Tuesday. McIver had cut one policeman and was going for Scott with a knife when the officer shot him.

A High Point doctor amputated a negro's arm. The man told the doctor to make such disposition as he pleased of the arm and the latter sent it north and had the skin tanned and made into pocket books.

Cotton Mill Trouble.

Charlotte, N. C., October 17.—The cotton mill trouble in Alabama county has reached an acute stage. Hundreds of men, women and children are idle as the result of notices posted by the mill owners some days ago notifying all operatives who would not withdraw from the Textile Union to consider themselves discharged after the 15th.

Very few if any of the operatives abandoned the union, and as the mill men remained firm, a majority of the mills in the county are either idle or running with greatly reduced forces. Instead of supplying the union, the order of the mill owners seems to have had the effect of strengthening it, numbers of new members having been received since the notices were posted.

Both the operatives and their late employers are firm and determined to carry their points. As yet no disorders have been reported.

If the difference is not soon adjusted or employment secured elsewhere, many of the operatives will suffer for the necessities of life. A majority of them are homeless and with practically no means. The Textile Union is taking steps to provide shelter and food for the needy.

A Revolution in Politics.

At the regular weekly meeting of the Simmons Club last night, Mr. James D. Johnson, president of the Highland Park Democratic Club, made a motion that the club adjourn to hear the speech of Senator Jeter C. Pritchard, and this motion was unanimously carried.

Thereupon Mr. F. S. Williams, president of the club, Mr. J. J. Thompson, the secretary, and the twenty-four other members who were present, walked over to the court house and patiently listened to Republican doctrine as expounded by the Senator from the west.

It never occurred to President Williams or to the other officials of the club that they had done anything extraordinary in adjourning their club that it might become part of the audience of a Republican senator, and the strongest Republican in the State, afterwards, in explanation, Mr. Williams said he considered the adjournment a proper courtesy. It was remembered too, that week before last Mr. Augustus H. Price of Salisbury, one of the Republican State electors at large had postponed his speech in Charlotte because it would conflict with the speech delivered by Chairman F. M. Simmons.

The action of the Simmons Club caused a good deal of comment last night, and most of the talk was altogether complimentary. Among other things, it was said that the spirit of toleration and liberality in politics is spreading in the city of Charlotte, at least. Ten years ago, five years ago, two years ago, the condition of last night would not have admitted the compromise effected. The democratic forces would have stayed in camp, and Mr. Pritchard would have preached to his own crowd.

But now, while the Democrats and Republicans continue to fight under the same old flag, they have discarded venom and bitterness and narrow-mindedness, and whether a speaker talk anti-imperialism or McKinley property, if he be able and fair, he will be heard, without prejudice, for the sake of the tale he brings.—Charlotte Observer.

John McDonald, a Kansas journalist who is touring Scotland, says in a letter to one of the papers of the Sunflower State that he recently went into a store in a little Highland town and inspected the goods displayed for sale, finding among them the following American products: Corn flour, canned peaches, canned pears, rolled oats, macaroni, cheese, ham, sausage, apples, forks, hoes, axes, hammers, saws, joiners' tools, braces and bits. "This partial list of things used in a Scotch mountain village," says Mr. McDonald, "will give some idea of the immense trade between the United States and Great Britain."

OUR RALEIGH LETTER

The State Fair Now in Progress. Big Success.

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 23, 1900. This is "Fair week," the annual

greatest of the year in Raleigh and judging by all the indications up to this hour—the morning of the second day of the Fair—the event promises to surpass any of like character in many years.

THE COTTON MILL "LOCK-OUT." The trouble between the cotton mill owners and their operatives in Alamance county, which, by reason of the "lock-out," has now resulted in the enforced idleness of some two or three thousands of working men and women, is causing much comment and no little speculation over the probable result.

The operatives who decline to renounce their recently organized "unions" have been compelled to cease work in the mills and to vacate the dwellings used by them and I am told many will have to resort to tents in which to live and sleep some, it is stated already are doing so. This mode of life would seem to work a great hardship when cold weather sets in, and it is to be hoped some means of settling the trouble will soon be reached. The two newspapers at Graham and from Alamance now in Raleigh state that the sympathy of the local public is now with the operatives; that their right to form organizations for their own benefit and protection is one that ought not to be denied them. The organized mill owners do not accede to this, and therein rests the whole trouble.

SIXTYSEVEN THE ABSORBING SUBJECT. The advance guard of fair visitors are all talking about the senatorship and the primary. For although they take time to admire and discuss the exhibits, that does not prevent the discussion of the other subject, which is unquestionably the absorbing one at present from one end of North Carolina to the other. It is rather helping along the "discussion," and the names of Simmons, Carr and Waddell are heard on all hands.

I have found out already that the east appears to be overhitching for Simmons or Waddell, if the representatives of that section now here correctly or even fairly well indicate the general state of things east of Raleigh. Of course most men advocate Mr. Simmons, with Major Waddell coming second, in the proportion of about three to one. On an average, the fifth man in a crowd of easterners is an enthusiastic talker up of General Carr's candidacy, most of the Carr strength coming unquestionably from the Fifth congressional district.

Those of the Western Democrats who express their readiness to yield to the preference of the east, even if contrary to their own individual inclinations, are pursuing the proper course. Obviously and unquestionably the east ought to name the eastern Senator. If the west named him for her, then the west might find the east's memory at least long and troublesome in 1902 when it comes to the selection of Pritchard's successor.

But they very properly have their desire to do the right thing by the east on a higher plane than that, and eastern gentlemen tell me they accept it just as they would accord it to the west.

We hear somebody enquiring about Hon. Matt. W. Ransom. We believe that if the gallant old Senator were to come out in the present race he would sweep North Carolina like an avalanche.

TAKE THE BEST MAN

I want to make a motion to you readers, that in the consideration of the selection of a Senator to take the place of Butler, such personalities as have been the custom of some to engage in be entirely eliminated, and in casting our vote in the primary let us have consideration not of the personal charms and influence of the man for whom we vote, but for his fitness to be a Senator in the United States Congress from North Carolina.

Can we better elevate ourselves above these petty, spiteful contentions that this contest has brought about than by comparing the candidates with the high and responsible seats we want them to fill, positions which were once dignified and exalted by the magnificent Ransom and the intrepid Vance, whose glorious records of many years in Congress are enshrined in the hearts of all North Carolinians?

The contest seems to have narrowed practically to Ransom and Carr. Let us not oppose Mr. Ransom because, perchance, some over ardent admirer of Mr. Carr has inadvertently infringed on the ninth commandment, but rather let us stop and reason from our minds any prejudice that may have found lodgment there and draw our own conclusions from an unbiased mind and a patriotic heart. And, vice versa.

Mr. Simmons and Mr. Carr are both good men, but since only one of them can be elected, I am in favor of Mr. Simmons, not, however, solely because he so valiantly and successfully fought out the two last campaigns, but because he has better and higher accomplishments that will make them selves felt for the greater good and glory of North Carolina in the Senate of the United States. I am opposed to Mr. Carr for no better reason than that, from my point of view, at the present time, Mr. Simmons is the better man for the place.

GEN. J. S. CARR FOR SENATOR.

EASTERN REFLECTOR:

When the primary system was adopted by the Democratic State Convention in Raleigh last April, as a proper means of indicating the will of the Democratic voters of the State in regard to the election of a United States Senator to succeed the present incumbent, Major Butler, the people of Pitt county were presumed to be, with some few exceptions, practically solid for Gov. Jarvis, and when his announcement appeared as a candidate, the Democrats of Pitt county were ready to cast their ballots for him. Not one was more anxious for his election than this correspondent. I was for him, first, last and always, against the world, for Senator or for anything else he desires.

Gov. Jarvis has withdrawn from the Senatorial contest in a strong, manly communication which expresses sentiment worthy of its distinguished author and his presence must now turn to one of the three remaining candidates, to-wit Hon. F. M. Simmons, A. M. Waddell or Gen. Julian S. Carr.

One of the three gentlemen named will probably be North Carolina's next Democratic Senator. They are all Democrats, and North Carolina will be safe with her destiny resting in the hands of either and this communication is not intended to detract anything from the public or private character of either, Mr. Waddell or Mr. Simmons, but simply to advocate the candidacy of Gen. Julian S. Carr.

General Carr has been everlastingly to every interest of North Carolina. As a private citizen he has given his time, his talent and his money, to advance any interest, political, religious, educational, commercial or social, in North Carolina, where it has been shown to him to be necessary.

He cannot be said to be an office-seeker because of the money it will bring to him in the way of a salary. For he is financially above such a motive. He has said he wants to be Senator, he has said it in many places that is open, frank and manly. He believes he can do more for the good of North Carolina as a member of the United States Senate than he can as a private citizen.

He has always shown himself to be in line with the Democratic party on every issue—local or National, and if elected he will in the United States Senate stand first for North Carolina, and represent her interests in that body as a Democratic Statesman.

He is opposed to trusts—he has been fighting trusts—no man within the State has had a better chance to fight them than he, and make himself richer than he is that Gen. Carr. Yet he has said no—he has let that the trust power is an unjust one, and though he has had the opportunity he stood off with clean hands and said no.
