## HUMAN SACRIFICES.

MODERN RELIGIOUS FANATICS WHO BELIEVE IN THEM.

Many Precious Souls in the Old World, Particularly in Russia, Whose Members are being sacrificed to the Salvation may be Attained.

This human sacrifice has been made since the nineteenth century, and has been practiced by the Christians, too. It is brought out by the American Journal of Sociology in a striking article. The Conventioneers, a sect existing in Paris about 1750, were wont to crucify members of their order, in emulation of the crucifixion of the Saviour. In order to save the souls of her fellow believers, in 1822 the leader of a Pietistic sect in Switzerland, after having dispatched her sister, who gave her life as a means of saving the souls of her relatives, was crucified by her followers at her own command in order that she might die again after three days and restore to life the sister she had slain. In 1855 two mothers, adherents of "Holy Men," slew their sick children, believing them to be victims of demoniacal possession. In 1872 a Hungarian noble, belonging to the "Nazarenes," killed his son as an offering for his own sin after the fashion of Abraham. In 1878 the Countess, Russia, one of the "Schismatic" sects, crucified herself by prayer and fasting and succeeded in curing the circumstances of the case would permit.

In 1880 in the government of Perm, Russia, a peasant killed his child as an offering for sin and buried the body in an earthen jar. The local government of Vladimir, another peasant killed both his children in due Abrahamian sacrifice, and the bodies were buried under the father's knife the devout mother elaborated the service by reading and reciting the scriptures. In 1882 a Russian noble, belonging to the second chapter of Genesis. In 1884 in the government of Tambov, Russia, a peasant crucified his son in order to save his soul and a sister in order to satisfy this highly imperative condition.

It is a part of the creed of the "Wanderers," a Russian sect that anti-Christ rules in high places and that accordingly good men must have recourse to the most drastic means to free of any sort. In conformity with this belief a man murdered in various parts of Russia 25 men, women and children, including his own wife and babies, in order to free them from the danger of being taken to the sufferings of the continuing contact of the government census taker. This occurred in 1887.

The "Deniers," another quite interesting Russian sect, believe that evil spirits all earthly goods and that in 1825 60 of these men, strong in the faith, after having murdered their wives and children, returned themselves to be crucified to die, one by one by their leaders.

The sects, who believe in a widespread and infernal evil in Russia, in obedience to the behests of their "spirits" are in the habit of indulging in human sacrifices, including to feast, erotic dances and other kind prodigious as an extremely efficacious method of keeping the hand of fate from off their immortal souls. So from the folk tales of the East and the "Muckers" of Kensington and the occurrence of the black mass in Paris are a few further examples of the use of a ritual of violence, coupled with a peculiar use of the most common and side some behavior, to promote the eternal welfare of the soul.

MAKING FERTILIZER AT HOME.

I was talking yesterday with ex-State Senator Fabus A. Whitaker, of Wake county, about the price of fertilizers and their consumption. He said that the farmers in his section were buying less commercial fertilizers than heretofore and were saving from \$2 to \$4 per ton by making their own fertilizer.

"We can make better fertilizer than we can buy," said Mr. Whitaker. "I have never seen a better fertilizer than can be made by putting on 1,000 pounds of acid phosphate, 500 pounds of cotton seed meal and 200 pounds of neat salt. It is better than the guano you buy in my section we will our phosphate when the price reaches 15 cents and then lay out phosphate, kainit or neat salt. If we cannot get 15 cents for our cotton seed we do not sell them." —News Observer.
