CONVICT BRANTLEY ESCAPES.

Weldon, May 6th.—Edward Spivey, a guard at the Halifax State farm, was put in charge of a squad of nine convicts. Among the number was Brantley, who helped to murder the Anora merchant, Mr. Bonner, a few years ago. Brantley killed the guard for a check of tobacco to him, but in stead of picking up the weed, Brantley sprang upon the guard, took his gun, and escaped, with four others, Joe Jordan, white, serving a life sentence, stood still and refused to follow Brantley. The negroes also refused to go. One of the escaped convicts was captured last evening. Brantley is still at large. It is expected that the original design of the Federal authorities will be carried out. The dead heroes lie in peace, their graves are marked and identified, and in Havana elaborate preparations have been made for beautifying the congested ground where they sleep their last sleep. There let them lie undisturbed until the last trump shall sound. Philadelphia Record.

 Jim Crow Cars.
 Nearly half the crew of the battleship Iowa, at San Francisco, Cal., are suffering from malaria. The corporation commission so decided yesterday, and had Clerk Brown serve notice to that effect on all the principal railroads of the State. This notice orders them, by June 1st, to provide separate but equal accommodations for the white and colored races on all passenger trains except vestibule or through express trains that do not stop at all stations and are not used ordinarily for traveling from station to station. Following are the systems including their branches—to which the order applies:
 Atlantic Coast Line—All passenger trains with the exception of Nos. 23 and 78 (Florida special).
 Southern—All passenger trains except those on the Mariposa branch.
 Seaboard Air Line—All passenger trains except Nos. 402 and 403 (Atlanta special).
 Norfolk & Western—All passenger trains.
 Norfolk & Southern—All passenger trains.
 South Carolina & Georgia—All passenger trains.
 Norfolk & Southern (steamboats)—Steuers Neuse and Newbern.
 The Michigan Senate passed an income tax bill, which provides for a tax of one-fourth of 1 per cent on all incomes of \$1,000 and upwards. Originally the bill applied only to persons, but an amendment makes it apply to all corporations within the State. It is estimated that if the bill passes the House and receives the Governor's signature it will yield fully \$8,000,000 annually.

THE WORK OF THE LIFE SAVING SERVICE.
 The recently issued report of the Superintendent of the United States Life Saving Service during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1898, is a most interesting document. The total number of disasters during the year to which all descriptions within the field of service of the stations was 2,672, and the vessels had a total value of a little more than \$7,000,000. The value of property saved was \$6,588,355, and the total value of property lost was less than \$800,000. There were 3,987 persons involved in these disasters, and a total number lost was 22. The number of vessels which were "wrecked off" after having been stranded, placed out of dangerous places and assisted by the station crew was 577. The number of vessels running into danger and "warned off" by the signals of the patrols was 230. These statistics cover the life saving service over the entire Atlantic, Pacific and Lake coasts.
