TOBACCO MEN WILL FIGHT.

Warehouse Trust Will Fight.

Position in Durham. Waiting to See Which Way the Cat Jumps.

Durham, July 12.—The tobacco trust is still a subject for much discussion among the tobacco men in Durham.

Since the sudden visit of Mr. A. Woodard to this market and his attempt to "corner" the leaf trade here, all kinds of talk and speculation has been indulged in. The denial of the American Tobacco Company that it concerns has anything whatever, directly or indirectly to do with the warehouse trust movement, has caused a partial suspension of excitement in the leaf circles. Those who know say that a warehouse trust not supported by the American Company will have very little effect on the markets in this State or Virginia.

In case the trust were to get all of the warehouses in the city, two other houses would be erected at once and a determined fight, supported by the tobacco growers in this section, would be made by the trade here. Not only has the attempt to "corner" the trade here, but the farmers in this county are up in arms against the movement. Several well-to-do tobacco planters in the city today said that they were ready and willing to take stock in any anti-trust warehouse that might be started. A company has already been organized to meet the warehouse men as soon as the trust grows, which must be done with in next thirty days, as that is the limit of the options secured.

The Longshoremen's United Protective Association, of New York has nearly 1000 members. The dry goods clerks of New Haven get a half-holiday on Fridays during July and August. The cotton, carpet and hosiery mills of Lowell, Mass., are enjoying a season of noteworthy activity. In the farming districts of Russia it costs 28 cents to hire a horse for one day, and 31 cents to hire a man. The copper-mining industry of New South Wales promises to assume gigantic proportions in the near future. The clothiers of Lawrence, Mass., will join the closing movement and grant the Wednesday half-holiday to their clerks. The Phoenix Iron Works Company, of Hartford, Conn., has granted an increase of 25 cents per day to about sixty workmen. A successful firm of tea merchants in London is composed entirely of women. The breaders, fashers and packers are also women. About five acres of land in Astoria, N. Y., fronting on the East River, have been sold to capitalists, who will establish a big steel plant there. In 1898 Germany imported goods to the value of \$2,500,000. In 1899 the amount was nearly tripled. Russia provided 90 per cent of them. In nearly every street in Japan there is a public oven, where, for a small fee, housewives may have their dinners and supper cooked for them. St. Paul, Minn.'s new steel plant is valued at 20 cents per yard; cross back lathing, 5 cents per yard; up and down back lathing, 21 cents per yard. 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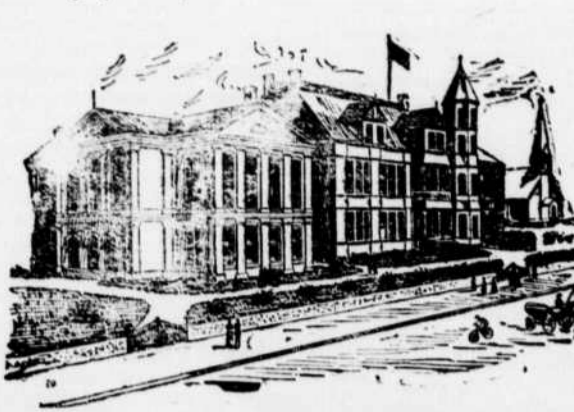
