AMONG THE KAFFIRS.

Brunting Seems to Be the Favorite Way of Expressing Sentiment.

The amount of greeting among ordinary Kaffirs is to say "I see you," to which answer comes back, "Yes." When a native passes a European in the uncivilized parts of the country, says Mr. Dudley Kidd in "The Essential Kaffir," he will frequently anticipate the white man's "I see you," and will start off with a loud "Yes."

Of all ways of expressing sentiment, grunting is the favorite, and the Kaffir grunts with great eloquence. His simple grunt can express a whole world of sentiment. After hearing natives express so much by grunting one cannot avoid thinking that pigs might learn to speak.

Kaffirs have many very expressive exclamations, such as "Yo!" when they wish to show contempt; "Hau!" when they show surprise; "Wow!" and many other similar utterances.

In visiting a chief it is rude to speak first. Accordingly, when we visited a Kaffir king, we sat in silence and pretended not to see him. At length he looked up at us and said, "I see you," and the ice was broken. We grunted approval of the sentiment and said the proper things. When the questions began to be a little too personal we told our native servant to fetch the blanket we had brought with us in order to open the chief's eyes.

When we gave the chief the blanket he looked at it and gave a grunt which was one of moderate and guarded approval. He felt the quality of the blanket with his fingers, placed it to his skin to see how warm it would be; he then showed it to his councilors and asked them bluntly what they supposed it had cost. When he was satisfied that it was better than any kept by local traders, he gave another grunt of approval which plainly said, "Thanks; I think that on the whole it is not bad; I have seen better, but it will do all the same."

Then he said in words, "Now my eyes are open and I can see you." In fun I began to chaff him and said, "Well, if you can see us now, will you tell us what you can see?"

Swift as light came the answer, "I shall know what I see when the night is cold and I wrap the blanket about my body."

A native never commits himself if he can possibly help it. After a little more desultory conversation the chief thought it was time to end the indaba, "to hem up the fringes of the talk with the thread made from the sinew of an ox," as their expressive phrase runs. So we hemmed it up.

Truth in Preference to Fiction

It may be noted in passing that Port Arthur is yet standing.

Beards must be growing unpopular when men go four or five times a day to get a shave.

Judge Parker expresses satisfaction at the state ticket nominated by the Democrats of New York.

The next document of importance is Judge Parker's letter of acceptance which is looked for Monday.

The Republican district attorney was a cheap looking man when the Populists did not bite at his bait.

Wonder what the grand jury will do for the folks who have been hunting squirrels in Pitt county contrary to law.

Charles W. Fairbanks, candidate for vice president on the Republican ticket, has had his say in a letter of acceptance.

Improvement is the order of the day with North Carolina newspapers. The Winston Journal has installed a new press and a type setting machine.

This is the time of year when the farmers get plenty of advice about holding their cotton. Perhaps the best thing to be told them is to sell their cotton when they please.

President Roosevelt has folded his tent at Oyster Bay and moved back to Washington. His next move will be to vacate the white house March 4th to make room for Judge Parker.

Since the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad has been leased all the preceding matters in the courts have been adjusted and withdrawn. Now let Mr. Howland push ahead with his improvements.

The Democratic state convention of New York nominated D. C. Herrick, of Albany, for governor. There were several factions in the convention but they settled their differences by all agreeing Herrick.

The Boston gentleman with a hyphenated name, Mr. W. B. Smith Whaley, who hustled for over a million dollars on assets of \$1,000, was a financial tightwad. Several Southern banks got caught in the ailure.

The national Populists shelve ex-Judge W. B. Robinson, of North Carolina, as a member of the national executive committee. The state Populists held him when he was speaking at the state convention. As a result of his publicity both of these efforts by Populists of his district, the people have nominated him for congress.

Every public utterance of Judge Parker raises him in the estimation of the people. His note requesting that the Democratic handbook contain no word that reflects upon the personal honor or integrity of President Roosevelt, was a manly utterance.

"If the Populist party gets tacked on to the tail end of the whiskey party we can't elect anything," is one of the chunks of ice thrown at District Attorney Skinner when he tried by abusing the Watts law to get the Populist convention to fuse with Republicans.

A Salisbury woman accumulated her savings for years and kept them hid in a coffee pot under the kitchen floor. When the amount saved had reached about a thousand dollars somebody stole the pot. There are good banks in Salisbury where the money could have been taken care of.

Nothing would please the Democrats of Pitt county better than for the Republicans, Populists and independents to all get together and bring out an opposition ticket. It will tend to solidify the true Democracy and bring out a full party vote. It will also show just where some men are and keep the party from being bothered with them in future.

The Republicans, too, are anxious to do something in the interest of the dear people, and have issued a call for a county convention on the first of October. Maybe they in conjunction with the Populist and the "people's" own candidate self-appointed to right his great wrongs, can bring out enough of the stay-at-home Democrats to show them how big a majority Pitt can bury the whole push under.

Judge Councilll does not look with much favor upon concealed weapon toters. One convicted before him of this violation may expect to pay the penalty. In speaking of offenses of this kind, the judge remarked that he expected if the doors of the court room were closed and strict search made of all who were inside, enough pistols would be found for an arsenal and enough razors to equip half a dozen barber shops.

Col. Harry Skinner, when speaking in the Populist convention, Thursday, trying to get fush with Republicans, said later in Pitt county are twice as high now under Democratic rule as when the feshionists were in control some years ago. The statement would remind the absent minded colonel that when the feshionists had control the people of Pitt county paid \$2 poll tax, while this year they pay \$1.02, with the same proportional difference in property tax.

THE COURT—JUDGE COUNCIL.

Council is a judge in the most eminent sense of the term. He is a real judge, and without show or ostentation presides with the high born dignity of justice.

Only criminal cases have been tried, but the love of good order, a proper regard for the law and the best moral sentiment in the community is predominant in his administration. Col. Sugg has gone to much expense and spent much time in preparing some facts and statistics regarding the cotton situation, the future of cotton growing and manufacturing in the South, and the general industrial progress and possibilities of the future of the Southern and Western people.

The colonel is enthused upon the subject of higher prices for Southern products, especially cotton, and what he would have said in the congress would have been of material interest to the cotton farmers and spinners and to every one who is interested in the great problems of the future of the industrial sections of the country. He is enthusiastic in his belief that the day of low price cotton is a thing of the past for many years to come, and predicts a glowing future for the cotton farmer. His many friends regret he could not attend this great meeting of representative farmers and business men.

Reunion of Non-Resident North Carolinians Postponed.

The board of managers of the North Carolina reunion have decided to postpone the second reunion of non-resident native North Carolinians until 1905. The chief reason for taking this step is that this is a political year, which would prevent the attendance of many prominent men who would otherwise be glad to attend. In 1905 the second reunion will occur, and the board of managers hopes by a conference with representatives of all sections of the state to arrange a program that will be of great benefit and pleasure both to resident and non-resident sons and daughters of North Carolina.

Mrs. Lowery's condition is serious, and it is thought that she will die. The shock may also result in the death of Mrs. Tilley. The only cause that can be attributed for the rash act is that he became angry with his wife because she sent her picture off to be enlarged and did not send his. He has been gruff and has had little to say for the past month. He left immediately after the shooting and had not been captured at last accounts.
