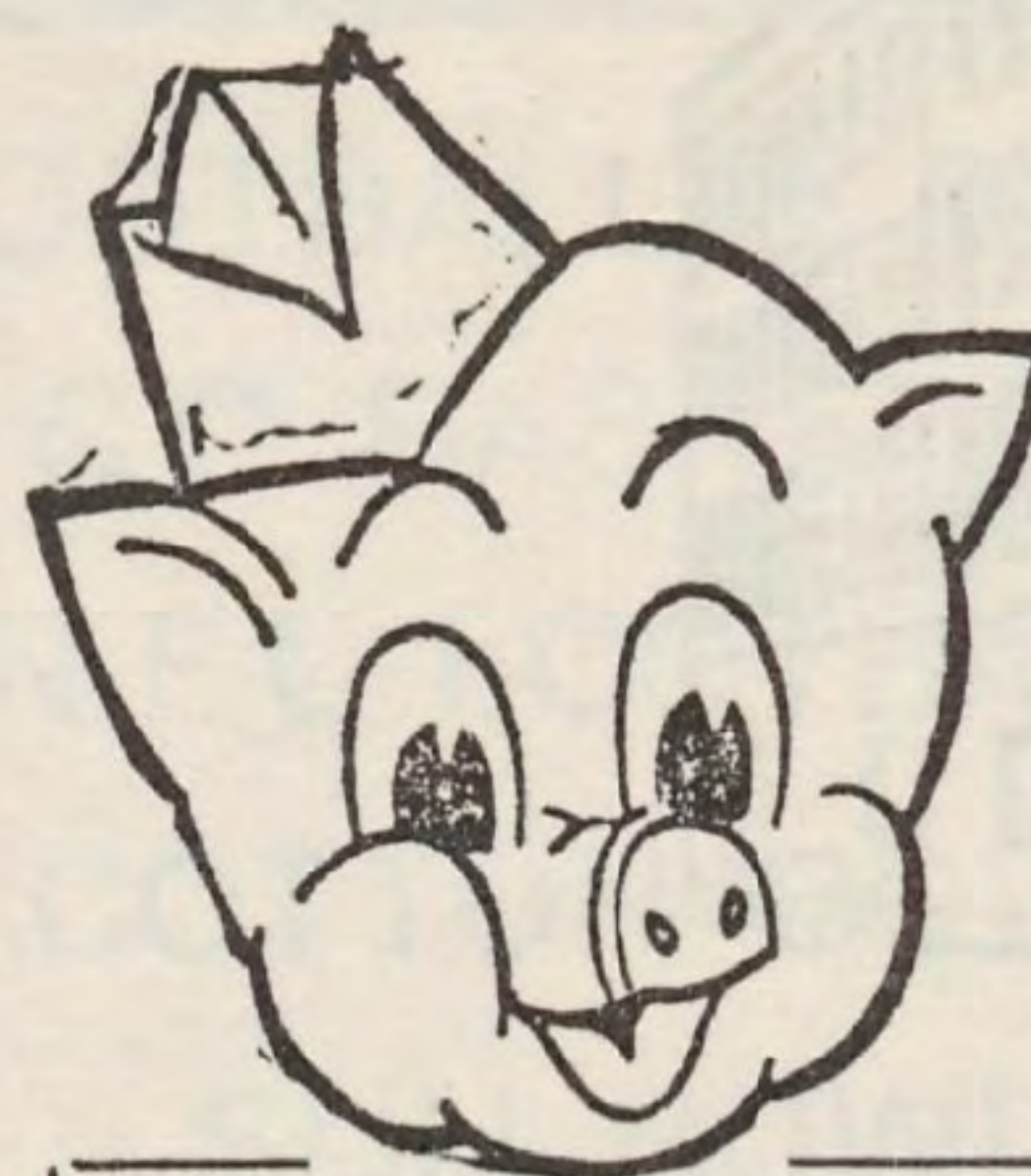

In line with the "new look" in football, East Carolina University has consolidated all of its athletic booster groups into one, cohesive organization - The Pirates Club. Its purpose is to raise funds, through contribution from the alumni, friends and students, to support the entire athletic program which includes 13 intercollegiate sports -- football, basketball, baseball, swimming, wrestling, tennis, outdoor and indoor track, cross country, soccer, golf, lacrosse and crew. The University needs substantial assistance from friends and alumni to develop a complete and wholesome program. The Pirates Club is a division of the ECU Education Foundation, Inc. Accurate records are kept and audited annually. Funds are budgeted to each individual sport by the Athletic Director and Athletic Council. Basic membership is \$100 annually. However, there is no maximum or minimum that an individual may give in support of the program. Pirates Club contributions are tax deductible. Club members enjoy many benefits such as priority in season ticket purchases, special parking at home games, use of Century Building, complimentary brochures and a monthly newsletter [weekly during football and basketball seasons], theater-type seats in Ficklen Stadium and cushion seats in Minges and the satisfaction of a working relationship with an imaginative, growing major college athletic program.

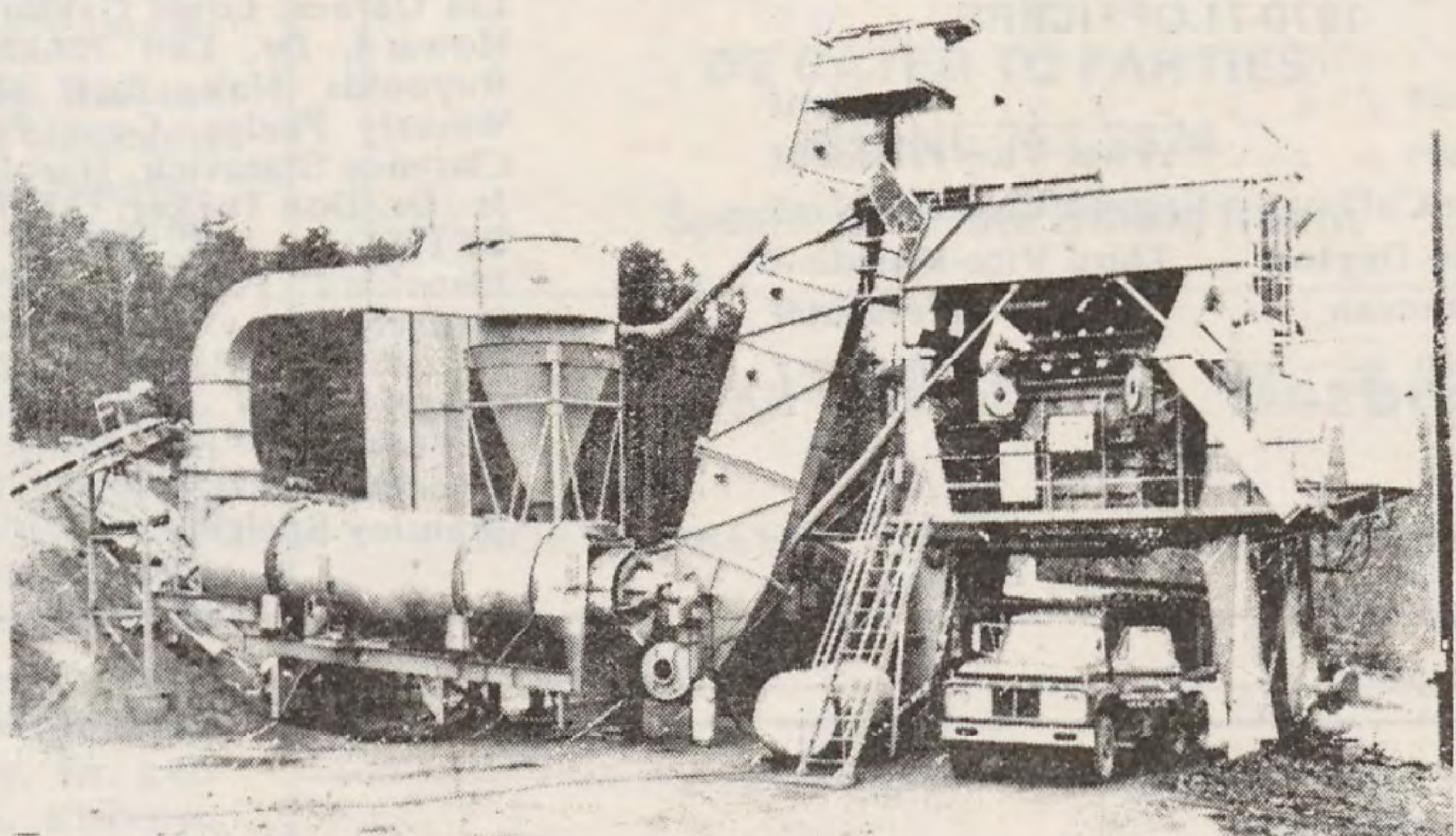

As the quipster said, Toledo may be a nice place to visit, but we wouldn't want to spend the whole season there.

Ficklen Stadium, the field a lush green under the white lights, is a welcome sight for the Pirates — and a sight they won't see often this autumn. Only four of East Carolina's 11 games will be played in the friendly confines this season. Obviously, if the home team has the advantage, ECU does not enjoy that advantage often enough this fall. However, things will get better in 1971 when six games will be played before the home folks.

Tonight's game with East Tennessee State University marks the home debut of young Head Coach Mike McGee [about whom there's more on page 18] and his fine staff of assistants — Jerry McGee, Carl Reese, Henry Trevathan, Sonny Randle and Al Ferguson. The Pirates' all-new staff is pictured on the cover of this issue of the Purple Pride 70 football magazine.

Tonight's Halftime

The East Carolina University Marching Pirates will open their 1970 season with a special drill routine to the popular Malaguena of Ernesto Lecuona and Capriccio Espagnol by Rimsky-Korsakov. Also featured in the performance will be the sensational twirling abilities of Miss Mary Dannehl and the premier performance of the twenty-one member Marching Pirates Color Guard Unit. As a conclusion to the show the band will present a concert performance of the powerful Great Gate of Kiev, from Pictures at an Exhibition by Rimsky-Korsakov.

The one hundred eighty member unit is under the direction of Harold A. Jones and John D. Savage with Jeanne Bluford commanding the color guard unit and Fred Cameron serving as drum major.

It's a game McGee and ECU want badly — for a number of reasons, most of them obvious.

First, the memory of last Saturday night's 35-2 loss to the powerful Toledo Rockets is still fresh. Despite the lop-sided score and the awareness of UT's superior manpower, the Pirates felt it was a game they could have won if they had avoided the disastrous first quarter mistakes. The team came away feeling it was a much better football team than the score showed — and the Pirates are anxious to prove their point tonight. But they will have to do it against a tough East Tennessee team. . . a team that — like Toledo — was undefeated in 1969. The 0-1 record could just as easily become 0-2 as 1-1.

Secondly, any new coach likes to win the first one before the home folks and McGee is no exception. The man has been a tough competitor all his football life at Elizabeth City High, at Duke University, with the St. Louis Cardinals of the NFL and as an assistant at Duke, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Thirdly, East Carolina has never defeated East Tennessee in football. There was a 6-6 tie in the initial meeting between the two schools back in 1954. Since then the Buccaneers from the Ohio Valley Conference have won three straight — 34-20 in 1955, 17-7 in 1968 and 7-0 in the Pirates' opener last fall.

Tonight's assignment is not an easy one. East Tennessee, coached by John Robert Bell, was 10-0-1 last fall, including a 34-14 breeze over Terry Bradshaw and Louisiana Tech in the Grantland Rice Bowl. Bell feels he may have an even better team this year. The Buccaneers boast an extremely tricky offense — the triple option, although they may try to cross up the Pirates by not employing it tonight. No matter what ploy they try, the key man is senior quarterback Larry Graham, a starter since his freshman year at the Johnson City, Tenn., school. He's a smooth operator. So keep your eye on No. 16.

If East Tennessee's offense doesn't get you, there's a good chance the defense will. Especially if you put the ball in the air. The Buccaneer secondary intercepted 37 passes last autumn, 11 of the steals by Little All-American cornerback Bill Casey. He'll be back there tonight, wearing No. 10. Watch him.

The home team has some horses, too. Sophomore Les Strayhorn [No. 40] galloped for 110 yards in 17 carries in his varsity debut last Saturday. He'll be at tailback and next to him is fullback Billy Wallace [No. 33], a hard runner and even tougher blocker. Quarterback John Casazza, a transfer from Chowan, did some brilliant passing last week against a very hard Toledo rush. No. 11 hit on 13 of 28 for 137 yards.

Another Pirate to keep your eye on is split end Carl Gordon [No. 89]. At 6-5, he's the tallest man on the team. He caught five passes against Toledo last week, two of them of the circus variety.

Up front, McGee believes guards Steve Davis [No. 65] and Mike Kopp [No. 66] can be as ferocious blockers as anybody. And on defense there's cornerback George Whitley [No. 20] who swiped two passes last week, tackle Rich Peeler [No. 71], end Wes Rothrock [No. 32] and strong safety Tom Pulley [No. 25]. All four sparkled against Toledo.

Any way you look at it, this Parents Night battle should be a good one. The Pirates are glad to be back in Ficklen Stadium and hope you come back on October 17 for the big Homecoming Day game with Southern Illinois.

East Carolina Sports Network

Jim Woods, "the Voice of the Pirates" for the past three years, will be at the microphone for the play-by-play of all 11 East Carolina University football games again this fall.

Joining Woods on the network this season will be former East Carolina star tailback Neal Hughes, who will handle the color commentary. Hughes' knowledge of the game and his close association with many Pirate players and coaches make him a big addition to the broadcasts.

WNCT in Greenville will be the originating station for the East Carolina Sports Network. It will use both its AM and FM facilities to bring five ECU night games and six afternoon contests into homes all across Eastern North Carolina.

Other stations on the network include WRMT in Rocky Mount and WGTM in Wilson. WOBR in Wanchese will air all Pirate day games, while selected games will be carried by WGAI in Elizabeth City, WFAI in Fayetteville, and WEEB in Southern Pines WKVO in Havelock and WCDJ in Edenton.

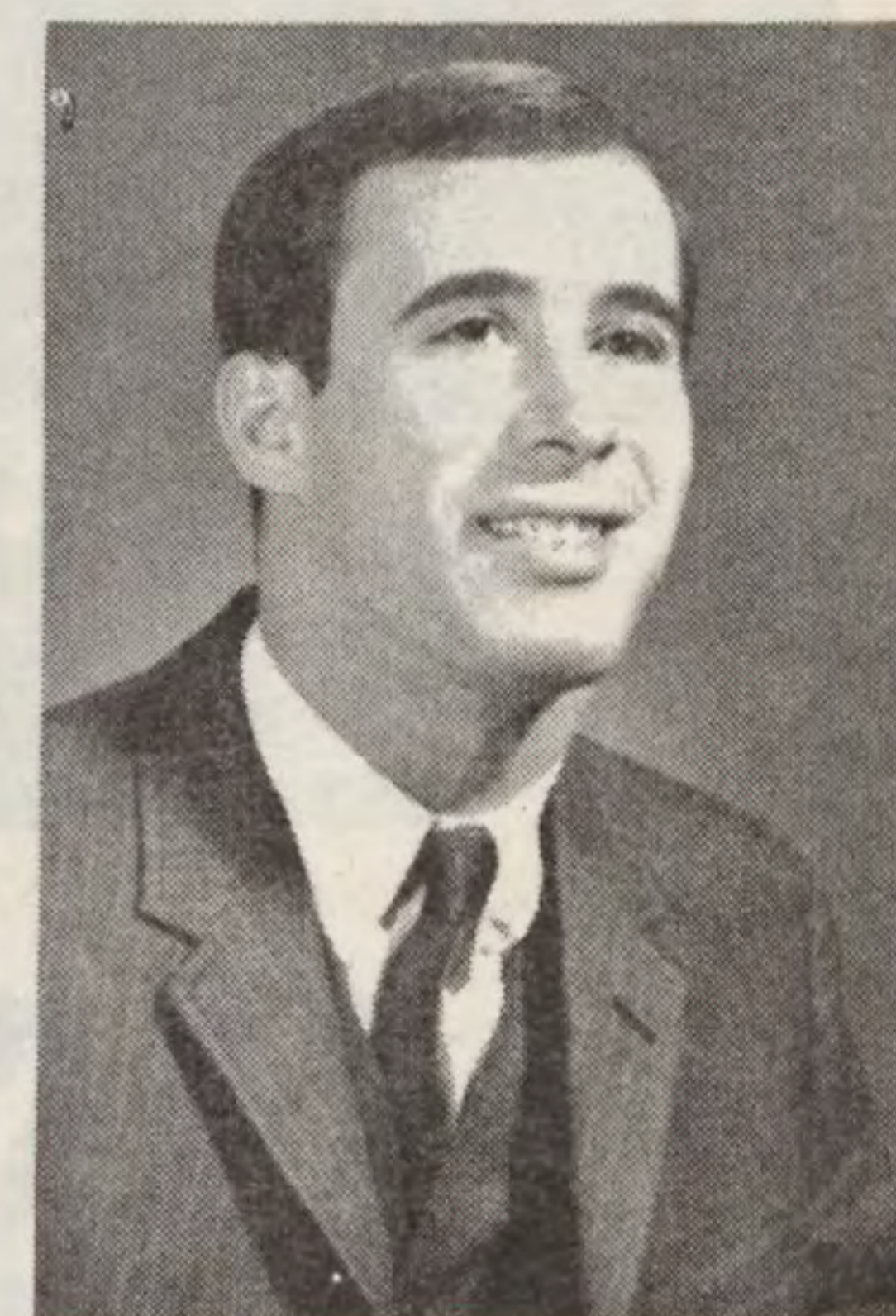
Prior to each game this fall Pirate fans can hear the 15-minute Mike McGee Pre-Game Show and Woods also will host a post-game wrap-up show with ECU coaches as his guests.

Woods, a 15-year veteran in sportscasting, is one of the most respected men in the business. The New Jersey native has twice been named Tar Heel Sportscaster of the Year by the Associated Press. His nightly sports show over WNCT-TV is watched by thousands of Eastern North Carolina sports fans.

Woods will also handle the play-by-play for all East Carolina basketball games this season for the fourth straight year.

EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

Founded in 1907 as East Carolina Teachers Training School, ECU has grown from an enrollment of 123 in 1909 to 9,997 in 1970. Students come from 97 different counties in North Carolina, 40 states and 15 foreign countries. Coeds outnumber the male students 5,094 to 4,703.

ECU leads the South in the preparation of teachers. In 1920 the school was authorized to offer four-year teacher education degrees and to grant the bachelor of arts degree. A year later by an act of the General Assembly, the school name was changed to East Carolina Teachers College. The president at this time was Dr. Robert H. Wright, who headed East Carolina from the date of the first class in 1909 until his death in 1934. Under his leadership the school had grown to an enrollment of over 1,000 and was now offering a masters of arts degree.

During the period from 1934 to 1960 the school continued to grow, though not as spectacularly in terms of enrollment. A curriculum leading to a bachelor of science degree was authorized in 1941 as the college expanded to meet needs for occupations other than teaching. By 1951 undergraduate majors were offered in 17 areas and graduate programs in 10 areas. It was in that year that an act of the General Assembly changed the name to East Carolina College.

It was also during this period that intercollegiate athletics found a place in the East Carolina way of life. The first football team was fielded in 1932 under Coach Kenneth Beatty, though Pirate fans would just as soon forget that inaugural season since the team lost all five games and didn't score a point.

A major turning point for East Carolina came in 1960 when Dr. Leo W. Jenkins was inaugurated as the school's sixth president. Under the guiding hand of this dynamic man, East Carolina College became East Carolina University [in 1967] and enrollment more than doubled in a 10-year period.

Today undergraduate majors are offered in 26 fields and graduate programs in 21 areas. Besides the College of Arts and Sciences and the Graduate School, there are seven professional schools: Allied Health Professions, Art, Business, Education, Home Economics, Music and Nursing.

The face of the University is always changing. Twenty years ago there were 17 buildings on a 98-acre campus with a total physical plant value of \$5 million. Today there are 52 buildings, 300 acres and a valuation in excess of \$44 million.

The athletic complex alone takes up 79 acres. It consists of Minges Natatorium and Coliseum, Scales Field House, Ficklen Stadium, the Century Club Building, University Field, an all-weather track and all-weather tennis courts. Eleven intercollegiate sports have ECU varsity teams - football, basketball, baseball, cross country, soccer, wrestling, indoor track, swimming, golf, tennis, outdoor track, crew and lacrosse. The golf team plays on the Greenville Country Club course and the crew rows on the Tar River which flows through the middle of Greenville.

Greenville itself is a town of 30,000, located approximately halfway between Raleigh [the state capital] and the Atlantic Ocean. The beautiful coastal plains of Eastern North Carolina represent some of the richest, unspoiled farming country you will find anywhere in the United States. Pitt County, of which Greenville is the county seat, leads the nation in the production of leaf tobacco. However, the presence of East Carolina University has made Greenville something of a cosmopolitan cultural center in the heart of this agricultural area.

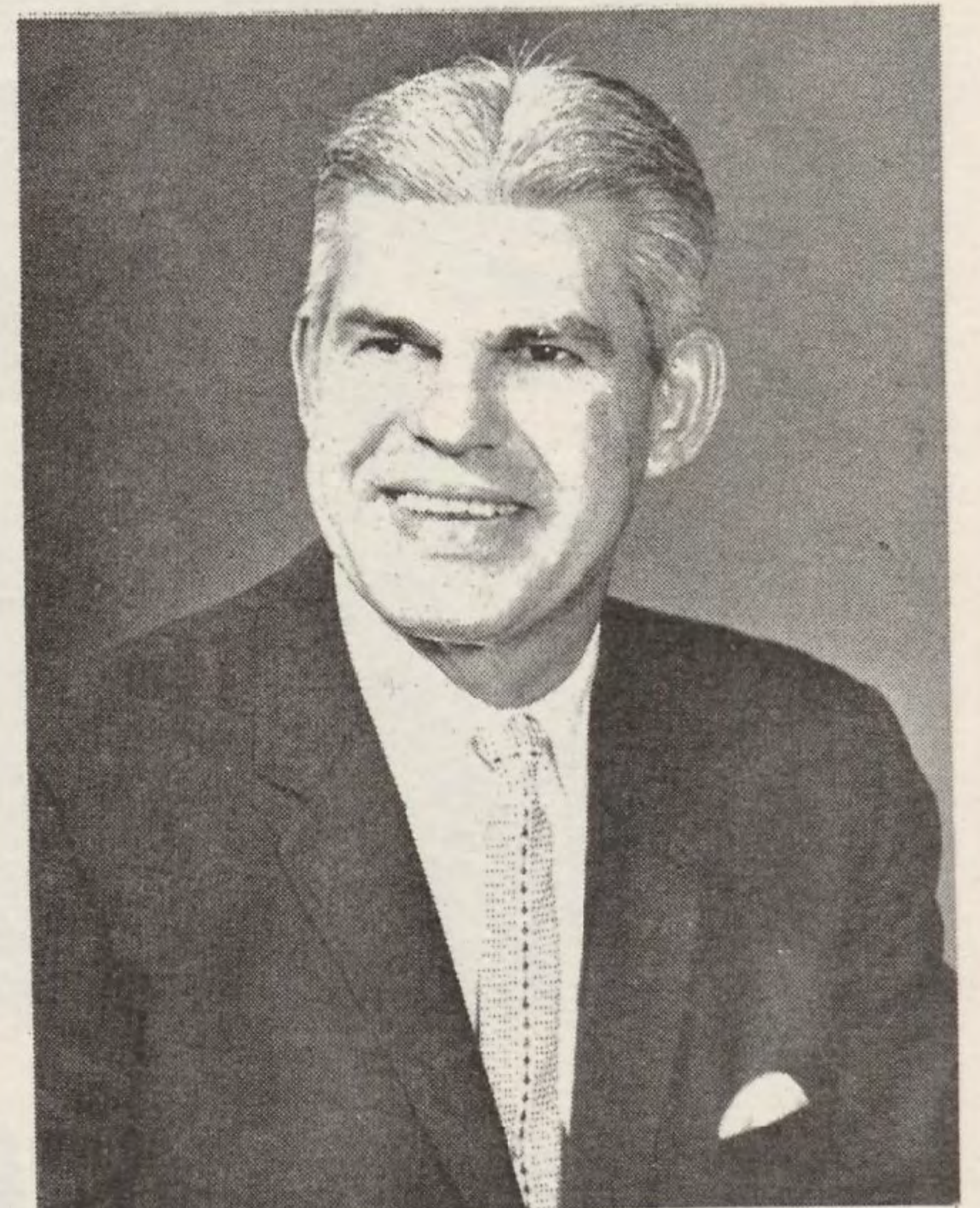

A Boyhood Dream Comes True

John Casazza will be fulfilling his boyhood dream this autumn each time East Carolina University takes to the gridiron.

The chunky redhead from Madison Township, N.J., used to spend hours at a time dreaming about the day he would quarterback a major college football team.

Last season at Chowan Junior College in Murfreesboro, N.C., Casazza broke nearly every passing record. He did everything a quarterback has to do to have a great year still there was something missing. It was only junior college football—not major college football. Casazza was quarterbacking against teams like Potomac State in the mountains of West Virginia.

The fall of 1970 brings a big change in the life of John Casazza.

This season he again will quarterback against a team in the mountains of West Virginia. Only this time the name of the school is different. It's West Virginia University. A football team that lost only to Penn State last year and went on to beat Atlantic Coast Conference champion South Carolina in the Peach Bowl. A team that is supposed to be even better this fall.

That's a big jump for Casazza, but the 5-11, 190-pounder thrives on challenges.

He faced his first challenge last Saturday night when the Pirates opened their season on the road against a tough University of Toledo team.

Last season Toledo was 11-0, was ranked 20th in the nation by the Associated Press and was the country's best defensive team. The Rockets beat a good Davidson team, to the tune of 56-33, in the Tangerine Bowl last December.

Casazza, a big fan of Joe Namath, realizes the challenge facing him this season, but he looks at 1970 with optimism.

"If I can do well against the teams on our schedule, I ought to be able to do well against just about anybody," says Casazza. "I know teams like West Virginia and N.C. State are tough but I'm looking forward to the challenge of trying to beat them."

When new head coach Mike McGee took over at East Carolina last winter the first thing he did was start looking for a good junior college quarterback. He found Casazza at Chowan, only 70 miles away.

In 1969 East Carolina had been the last major college team in the nation still using the single wing. But when McGee succeeded Clarence Stasavich, he announced the Pirates would run from a pro set formation.

The personable young coach promised to upgrade East Carolina's passing game when he took the head coaching job. To do this he needed a good quarterback and some good, speedy ends. McGee got Casazza to handle his quarterbacking duties and named former NFL star Sonny Randle as an assistant coach to work specifically with the ends and flankers.

Randle would do just fine with pass catchers, in the eyes of McGee, because he was an All-Pro split end with the St. Louis Cardinals just a few years ago.

Casazza was quick to admit that the transition from the single wing to the pro set was not as hard on him as it was on most of the players on the ECU squad.

"I didn't have to change because all I had ever played was the T," said Casazza. "All I had to do was learn the plays but the rest of the players had to learn a whole new system."

Casazza, who made All-District at Chowan, has no regrets about transferring to East Carolina.

"I wanted to transfer from junior college to a school where I would have a chance to play right away," he said. "Here I've got that chance. With the transition I had a better opportunity to come right out and start."

The schedule at East Carolina is the toughest in the history of the school. But, Casazza enjoys the challenge. After all, last year, he had very few challenges.

"Last year I never dreamed I would be playing teams like N.C. State, West Virginia, West Texas State and Toledo this year," he said.

For that reason alone the autumn of 1970 is a boyhood dream come true for John Casazza.

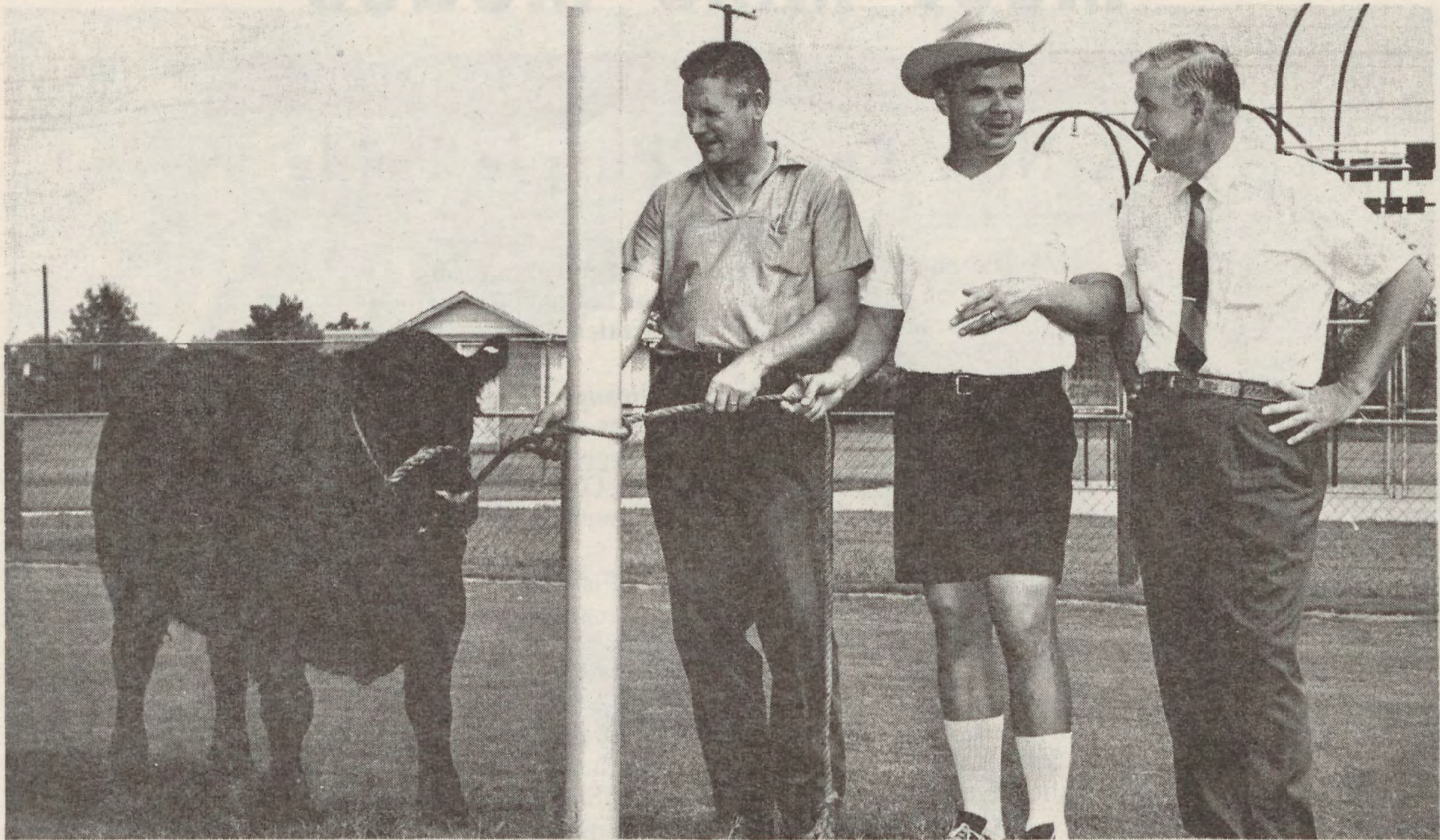

Meet Mike McGee

A New Era Of Purple Pride

The entire East Carolina football program took on a youthful look last December with the hiring of 31-year-old Michael Burnette McGee to be the Pirates' 11th head football coach since 1932.

This Elizabeth City native is already one of the most respected, most dynamic young coaches in college football today. Otto Graham, for one, is so impressed with McGee that he asked Mike to help coach the College All-Stars in their game against the Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs in Chicago this summer.

Coaching the All-Stars in Soldiers Field was a nostalgic experience for McGee. For just 10 years ago he captained the 1960 Stars against the Baltimore Colts. Considered by many as the greatest Duke lineman of all time, McGee had capped a brilliant three-year career as a Blue Devil in the fall of 1959 by winning consensus first team All-America honors at offensive guard and receiving the Outland Trophy as the best college lineman in the United States.

Today that Outland plaque hangs above the fire place in the McGee home in Brook Valley, a popular new subdivision of Greenville. Mike bought the home because he wants to feel settled in Greenville. Having been raised in Eastern North Carolina, he loves this part of the state. He also believes in East Carolina University and its future as a major power in college football. He is dedicated to this goal, but he knows it won't be reached overnight.

McGee didn't become the capable football coach he is overnight, either.

Following his graduation from Duke in 1960 with a B.A. in business administration, Mike played three seasons for the St. Louis Cardinals in the NFL. His rookie season [1960] he was voted the Cardinal's most valuable rookie and finished third in NFL voting for Rookie of the Year. Unfortunately, a neck injury cut short Mike's very promising pro career in 1962.

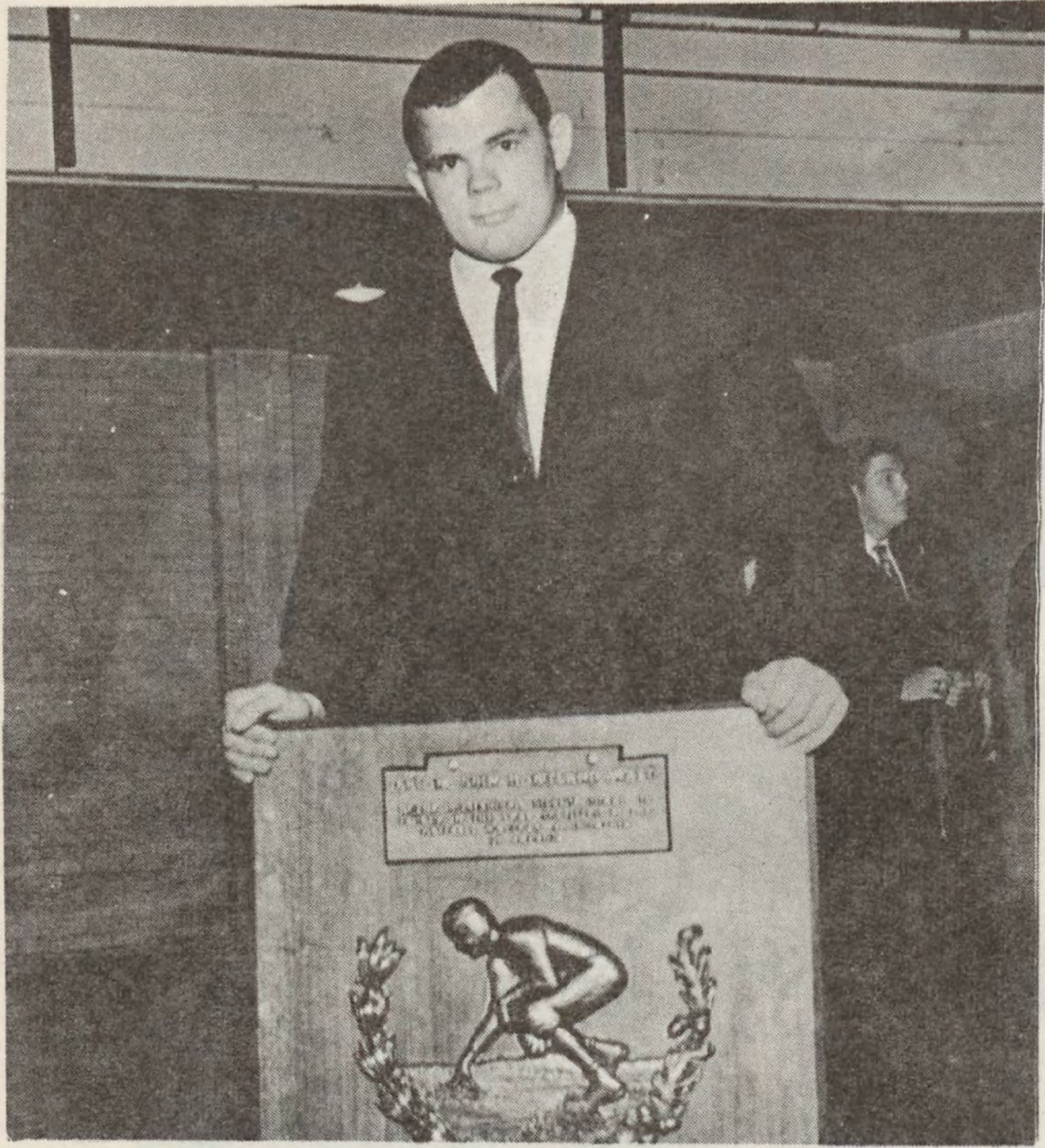
McGee returned to his alma mater in 1963, joining Bill Murray's staff as offensive line coach. At the same time he enrolled in graduate school at the University of North Carolina and received his Masters in education in 1965.

After working under Murray for three seasons [1963-65], McGee moved to the University of Wisconsin where he coached the offensive line under Head Coach Milt Bruhn in 1966. The following season Murray Warmath convinced Mike to come to the University of Minnesota. So Mike spent the next three years in Minneapolis, coaching the Gophers' offensive line. In 1967 Minnesota won the Big Ten title.

Under these three men – Murray, Bruhn and Warmath – McGee gained experience that will be invaluable to him as a head coach. With these seven years of preparation under his belt, not to mention 10 years of playing at Elizabeth City High, Duke and in the NFL, Mike was ready last December when ECU reached out to pick him as the successor to Clarence Stasavich.

Building the Pirates into a big winner is a challenge for Mike McGee. But this man thrives on challenges. Being successful is largely a matter of pride, says McGee. At East Carolina McGee calls it "Purple Pride."

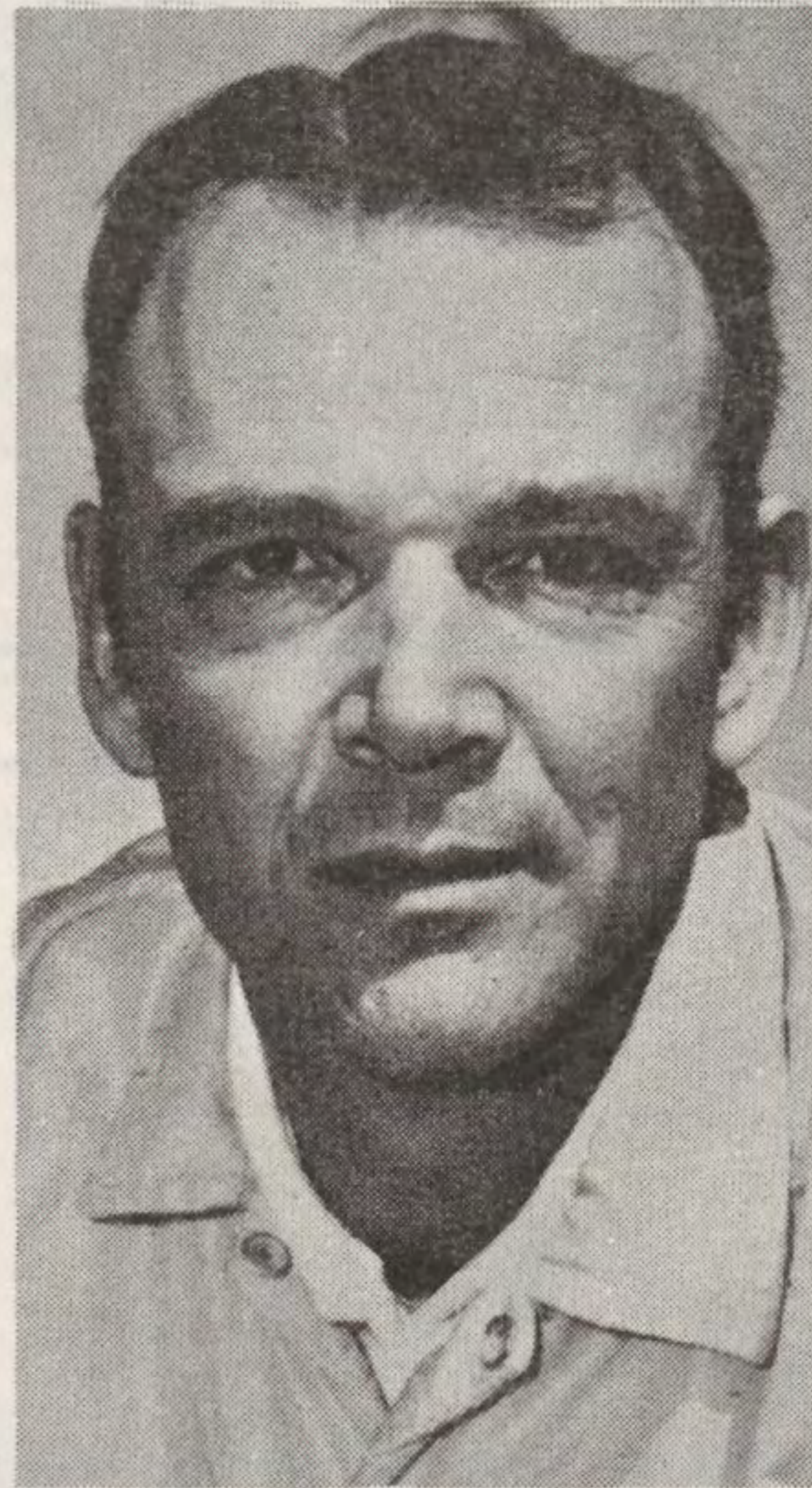

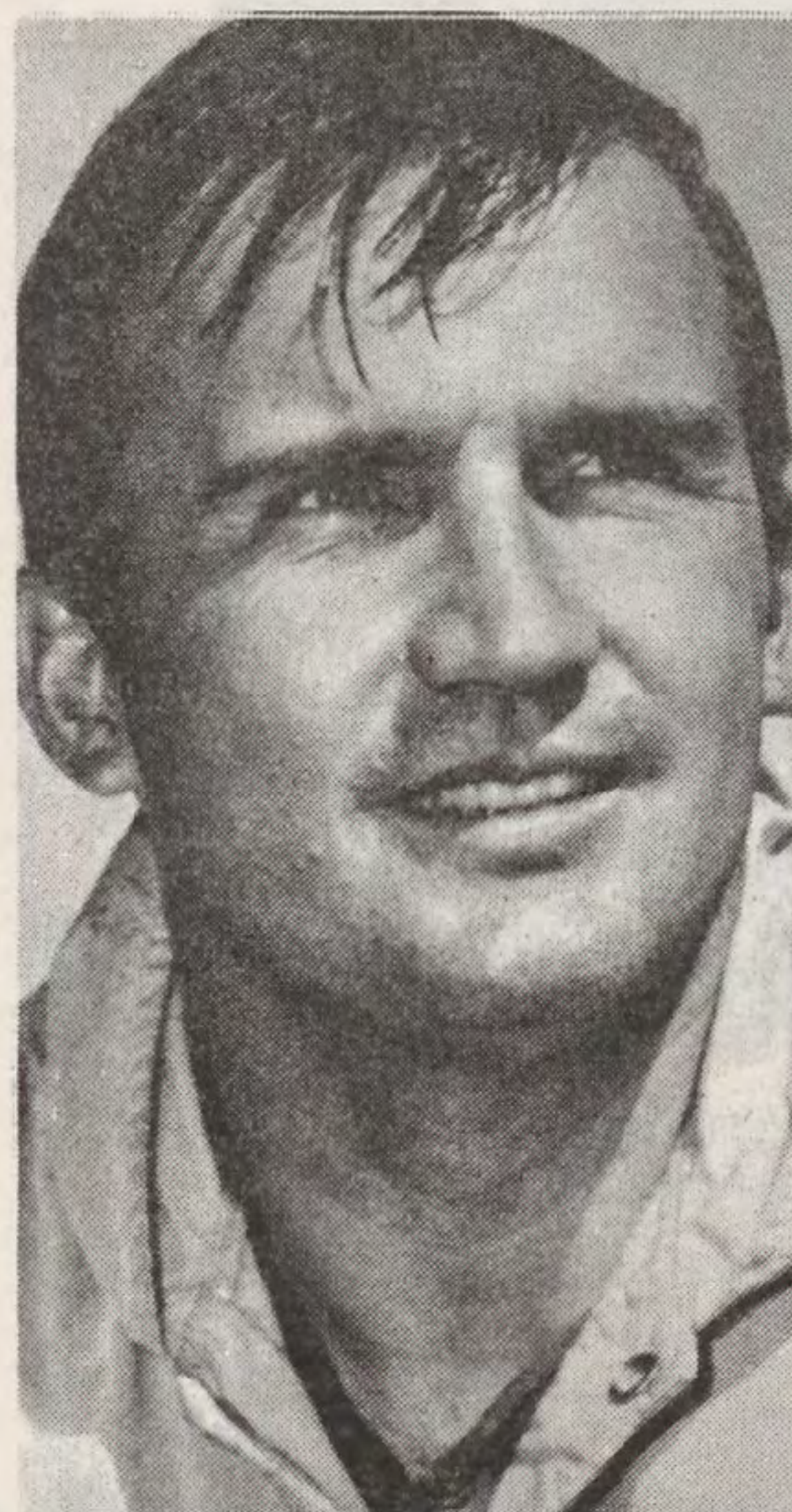

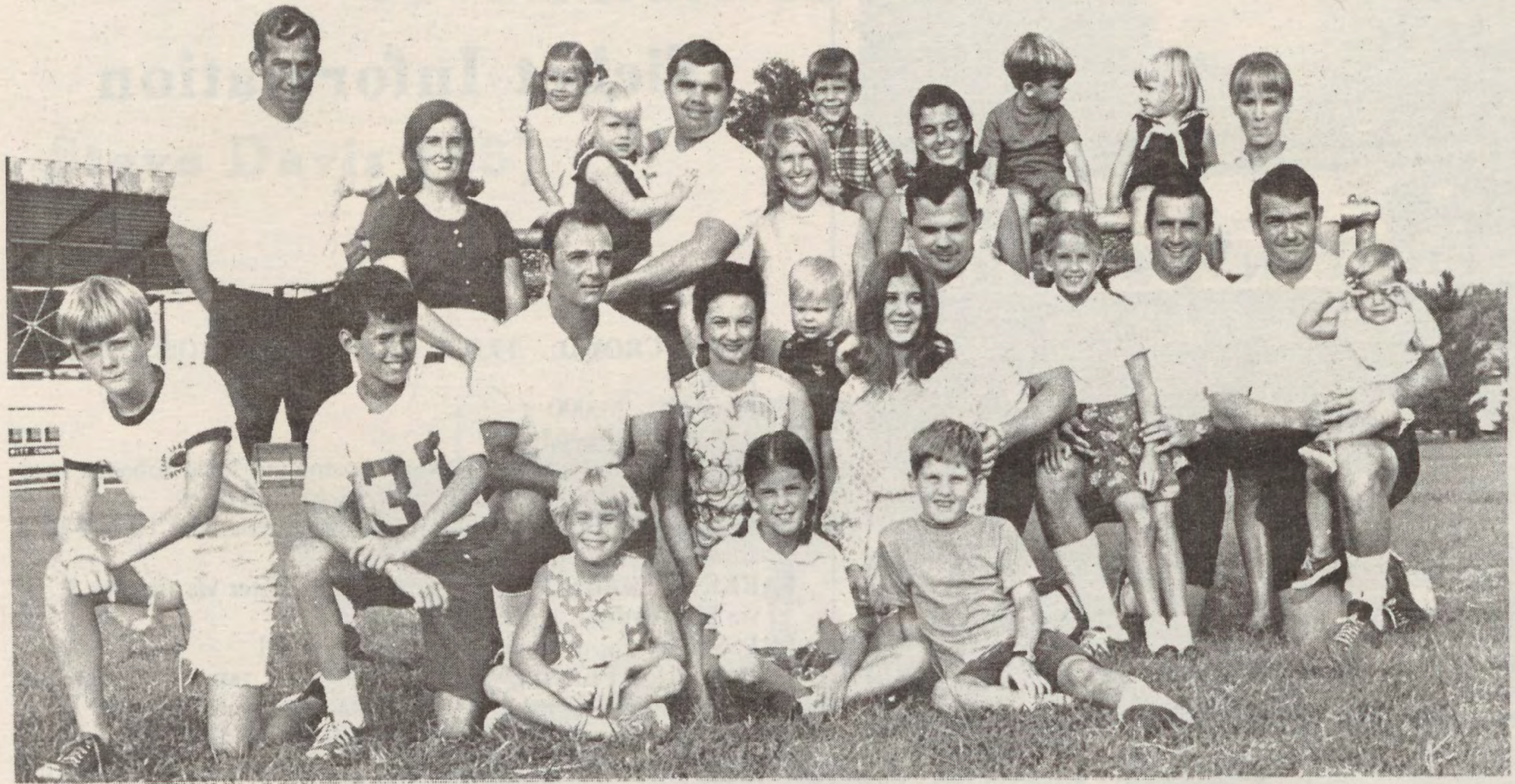

Say "77" to a veteran football fan, and he'll immediately think of a "Galloping Ghost"—the spectacular Red Grange—weaving his way through a gridiron strewn with would-be tacklers as he headed for another Illinois touchdown.

Mention "98" and he'll recall the breath-taking, reversal-of-the-field gyrations of Tommy Harmon's magnificent feats at Michigan.

Bring up "44" and . . . Well, think "forty-four" and Syracuse's All-America ball-carriers—Jimmy Brown, the late Ernie Davis and Floyd Little—all pass in review. . . . An eye-popping montage that produced a seemingly never-ending series of heroics for Orange fans.

These three superstars, who compressed their collegiate ball-lugging into one decade (from the mid-fifties to the mid-sixties), carried the same Orange jersey into action. But they also formed a unique, chain-reaction recruiting club—Jim got Ernie to follow his footsteps, and likewise Ernie inspired Floyd to attend Syracuse. All this added up to bringing off a 1,000 to 1 cleat parade for Coach Ben

Schwartzwalder. It's likely that any mentor would call himself lucky if he trotted out one of these brilliant running backs. But three? Why, all three under one tent is a recruiter's pipe-dream.

2,000 Yards Each

The veteran Syracuse skipper likes nothing better than reminiscing about his famed "44" triumvirate, each of whom rushed for more than 2,000 yards under his care and feeding.

"It's amazing how each improved on the other's records while at Syracuse," recalled Ben, "though the rules were different, too. You see, Jim played both ways and Ernie played some defense, but Floyd, though he would have been a fine defensive back, only played offense.

"Each was great in his own right.

"The death of Ernie (of leukemia) was a tragedy. A real tragedy. Ernie was so good, you couldn't believe he was for real. A great football player and the greatest guy you'd ever meet. He had the same drive and looseness Jim had, and he was a great team man. What a great kid.

"Jim was a great, great athlete. An

Ben was asked, "if two of those great ones had shown up together?"

"Well," smiled Ben, "there's no rule that says you couldn't have 'em two at a time. Or all three at a time, for that matter. Wouldn't that have been something?"

Sleepy Friday Nights

"I'll tell you, if I had Jim and Ernie and Floyd all together, I'd sleep a lot better Friday nights. We'd have some fun. Gosh," he dreamed, "it sure would be a pleasure working out an offense for them."

"Imagine those three in the same backfield," mused a man who'd been known to frequent a racetrack. "I guess Ben would have to make 'em an entry—44 A . . . 44 B . . . and 44 C!"

What would be more fun for Ben Schwartzwalder would be a "44 D."

"That's what we could use," he suggested, "another Jim or Ernie or Floyd. We haven't had a tailback since Floyd graduated."

Dangling in the Syracuse equipment room this fall is the famed "No. 44" jersey. It yawns for another superstar. Like Jim Brown . . . the late Ernie Davis . . . and Floyd Little.

A successful, satisfying portable meal begins and ends with plenty of tasty food because outdoor appetites know no bounds. These suggestions can be quickly and easily made at home and they travel well in thermos jugs and insulated chests.

Deviled Chicken Legs

Deviled chicken legs are perfect eat-out-of-the-hand treats. Soften one-half cup butter or margarine and then blend in one tablespoon lemon juice, one tablespoon prepared yellow mustard, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon paprika and one-eighth teaspoon pepper. Spread on eight to ten chicken legs.

Place chicken legs, skin side up in a large shallow baking dish. Bake for 50 to 60 minutes in 375-degree oven until chicken is tender. Brush with sauce several times as chicken is baking. Allow one to two chicken legs per serving.

As a perfect accompaniment to the chicken recipe, try this baked bean picnic pot. Combine four pounds canned baked beans with tomato sauce, one envelope (one and one-half ounces) French's seasoning mix for Sloppy



PRE-GAME PARTY—Looking for an informal way to entertain friends before a game without resorting to a lot of work at home or stadium hot dogs? Try a tailgate picnic—it's an easy-to-fix and fun-to-eat type of meal and it will add extra enjoyment to that important college game.

Joes and one-half cup brown sugar in a two and one-half quart casserole or bean pot. Bake, uncovered, for one hour in 325-degree oven. Garnish top of beans with crisp bacon if desired. Recipe makes eight to ten servings and is delicious served hot or cold.

Tailgate Fondue

For a surprising outdoor appetizer, try this recipe for tailgate fondue.

While at home, rub an alcohol-heated chafing dish with one split clove of garlic and add one cup dry white wine. Toss one pound grated Swiss cheese with two teaspoons cornstarch and wrap in foil. Cut one-half loaf French bread into one-inch cubes and wrap in foil. Measure out four tablespoons kirsch or brandy and one dash freshly-ground black pepper and prepare to take along.

At the game, heat the wine in the chafing dish until bubbles begin to rise. Do not boil. Add the cornstarch-covered cheese, one handful at a time, to the heated wine. Cook over low heat until cheese is melted and smooth. Stir constantly with a wooden spoon. Stir in kirsch or brandy and sprinkle with ground black pepper.

Serve with bread cubes and fondue forks when smooth. Takes about 15 minutes to prepare, and will serve four to six as an appetizer.

If you're looking for a real surprise treat, try this recipe for pre-game warmup. Combine one can of green turtle soup and one can of concentrated pea soup. Beat until smooth. Heat until piping hot. Place in thermos. Serve in mugs topped with unsweetened

whipped cream. It is a perfect treat for that late-season game when the weather is getting nippy.

If you still prefer the old-fashioned idea of sandwiches for your pre-game picnic, why not vary the usual ingredients and spark you meal with open-faced Scandinavian sandwiches.

The whole trick is to use sour rye bread (pumpernickel makes a good substitute) cut in slices only an eighth of an inch thick and buttered evenly and thickly. The butter adds flavor and acts as a juice-proof seal.

The toppings can be as many and varied as your personal tastes, but here are a few Danish favorites. Try rye bread, lettuce, pickled herring with onion rings, and a sliver of tomato. Or, rye bread, lettuce, sliced hard-cooked eggs with tomatoes sprinkled with chives. Rye bread, lettuce, liver paste, sauteed mushrooms, and a strip of cooked bacon will delight everyone.

Other tasty selections include rye bread, roast beef, a gherkin and mustard pickles; rye bread, salami rounds, onion rings, and sprig of parsley; and rye bread, sliced boiled new potatoes with bacon, cocktail sausages, tomato slivers and sprinkles of chopped parsley.

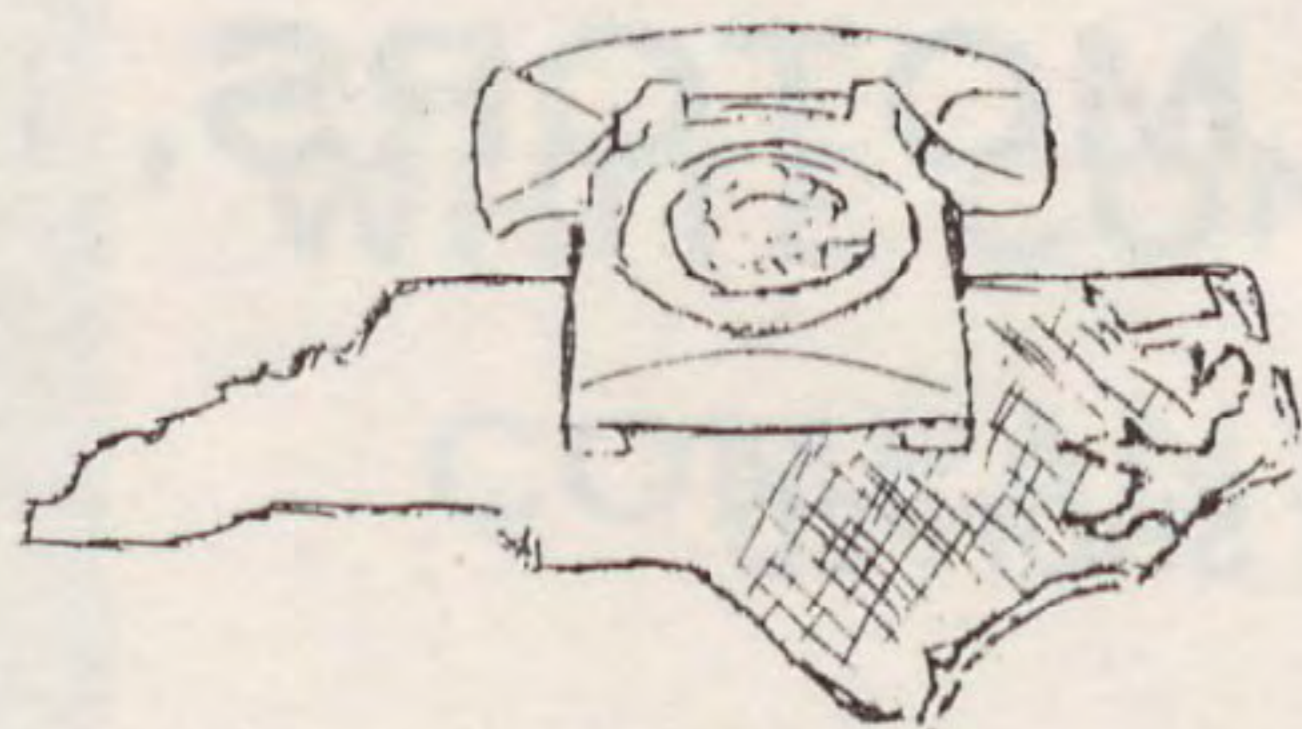

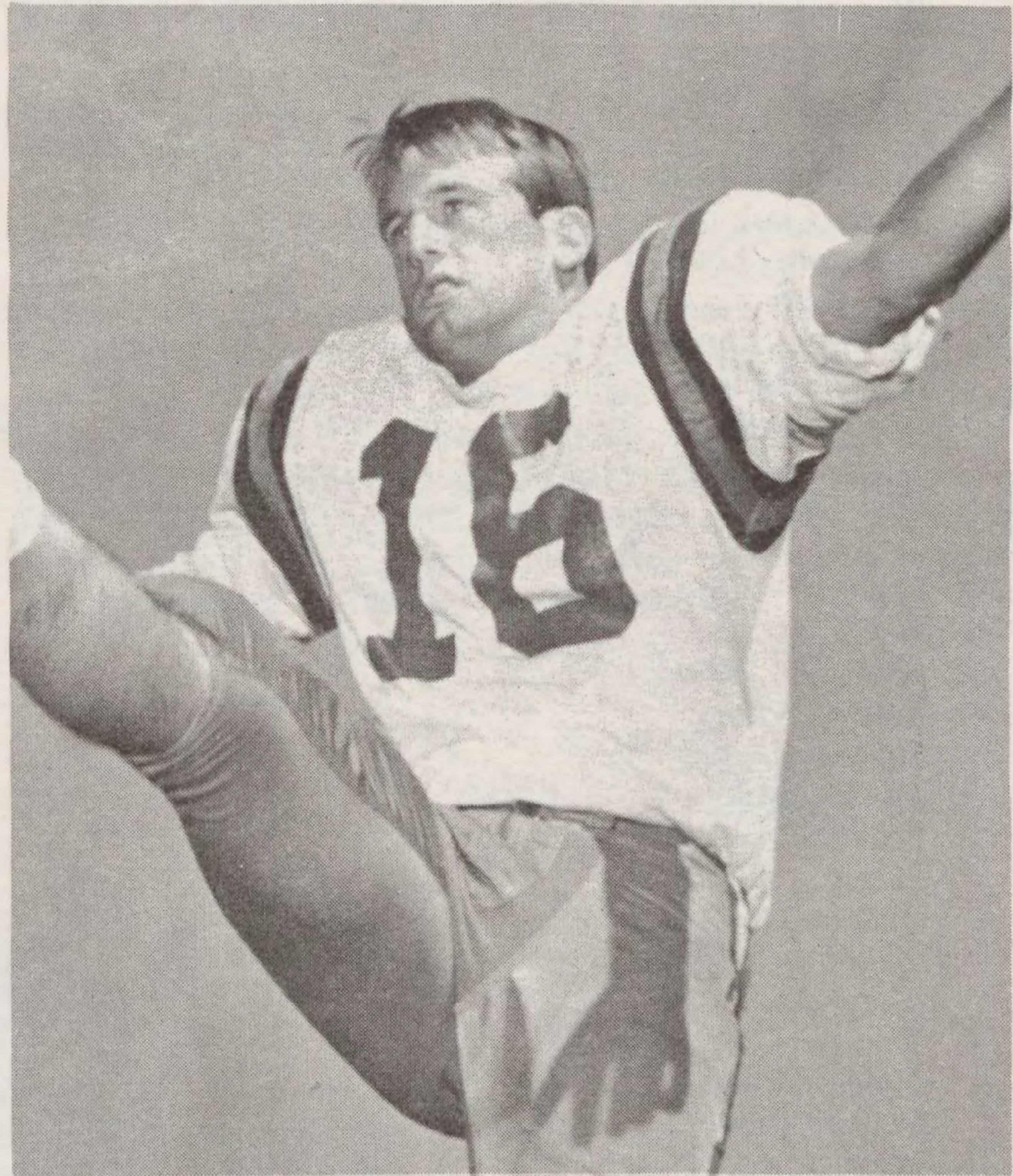
Robert Faris Football Scholarship

Noting The Players

EAST CAROLINA OFFENSIVELY

Split-end CARL GORDON continues to draw raves from all scouts who see him play with his pass catching ability. GORDON had five receptions against TOLEDO in ECU's season opener. He made two circus like catches at crucial times during the game. GORDON, a junior from Jacksonville, Fla., went to the same high school as former FLORIDA STATE great RON SELLERS. . . Tailback LES STRAYHORN was outstanding in the season opener against TOLEDO. He gained 110 yards on 17 carries. . . EAST CAROLINA will have closed practices all this week in preparation for EAST TENNESSEE. . . Quarterback JOHN CASAZZA passed for 137 yards against TOLEDO, completing 13 of 28.

EAST CAROLINA DEFENSIVELY

Linebacker RON KONRADY, a sophomore from Egg Harbor, N.J., was hurt on the very first play of the game against TOLEDO. He injured his knee and the doctors say he is out for the season and maybe for his career. He was the team's best linebacker during spring and fall drills. . . Cornerback GEORGE WHITLEY was outstanding against TOLEDO, intercepting two passes, making seven tackles and returning four kickoffs for 93 yards. . . Defensive end WES ROTHROCK led the defensive team in tackles with 12 against TOLEDO. . . Safety TOM PULLEY drew praise from defensive coach JERRY MCGEE for his hard tackling against TOLEDO. . . ECU defense got to TOLEDO quarterback CHUCK EALEY more than any team ever had. The Pirates also hit him for his first safety.

EAST TENNESSEE OFFENSIVELY

Starting offensive left guard JOHN ELROD used to be at defensive end for EAST CAROLINA. He transferred to EAST TENNESSEE after the 1968 season. . . Kicking is a big plus for the Buccaneers. Record-setting placekicker RON HARROLD returns. HARROLD set a conference record last season when he kicked seven field goals. He finished the season with 36 points. . . LARRY GRAHAM returns for his fourth year at quarterback. GRAHAM holds or shares every Buc passing record. He is a sure bet for post-season honors. . . Flanker JOHN RAUCH is the son of JOHN RAUCH, SR., the former ALL-AMERICAN quarterback at the UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA and now the coach of the BUFFALO BILLS. . . Co-Captain GREG CHESNUT returns at center. CHESNUT has played every position on the offensive line during his career and is called by his coaches as the best all-around lineman on team. Another sure bet for post-season honors. . . STEVE GRINDSTAFF [6-1, 235] is back at tackle for his last season. Agile and quick, GRINDSTAFF is a sure pro prospect. . . ED HARRIS [6-1, 220] is said to be best guard in the OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE. Because of his speed, quickness and blocking ability, HARRIS is a sure bet for the pros.

EAST TENNESSEE DEFENSIVELY

Defensive coach FRANKLIN BROOKS was recently named to the GEORGIA TECH FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME. BROOKS is said to be the best guard in GEORGIA TECH history. . . Defensive backfield nicknamed the "BANDITS" last season because of 37 interceptions. Only one man missing from that unit. The leader of the "BANDITS" is BILL CASEY. An ALL-AMERICAN last season. CASEY led the "BANDITS" with 11 interceptions. His coaches expect him to go in the first round of the pro draft. . . BUBBA TIMMS, a linebacker is another ALL-AMERICAN candidate. TIMMS has adequate size but he has a lot of speed and quickness and hits hard. TIMMS led the Bucs defensive charge against LOUISIANA TECH in the GRANTLAND RICE BOWL. He and his defensive teammates dropped TECH'S outstanding quarterback TERRY BRADSHAW 12 times for 143 yards in losses. The Bucs won the game 34-14. . . It has been 16 games since the Bucs lost a game. They had a 10 game win streak over two seasons before tying Murray State 10-10 in their homecoming game last fall.

PIRATES OF THE PAST



LEROY COBB ['67]

A strong tackle for the Pirates, this big fellow was a standout in two top seasons that saw the Pirates win two Tangerine Bowl championships. One year Cobb played on the offensive unit, then switched to defense the next season. The Greensboro native graduated in December of 1967. He then joined the Marine Corps and shortly afterwards was sent to duty in Vietnam. After five months of service, he was seriously wounded, and returned home with the Purple Heart. He is currently working on his Master's degree at East Carolina, and expects to graduate next spring. He is married to the former Karen Gruggel of Portsmouth, Va.

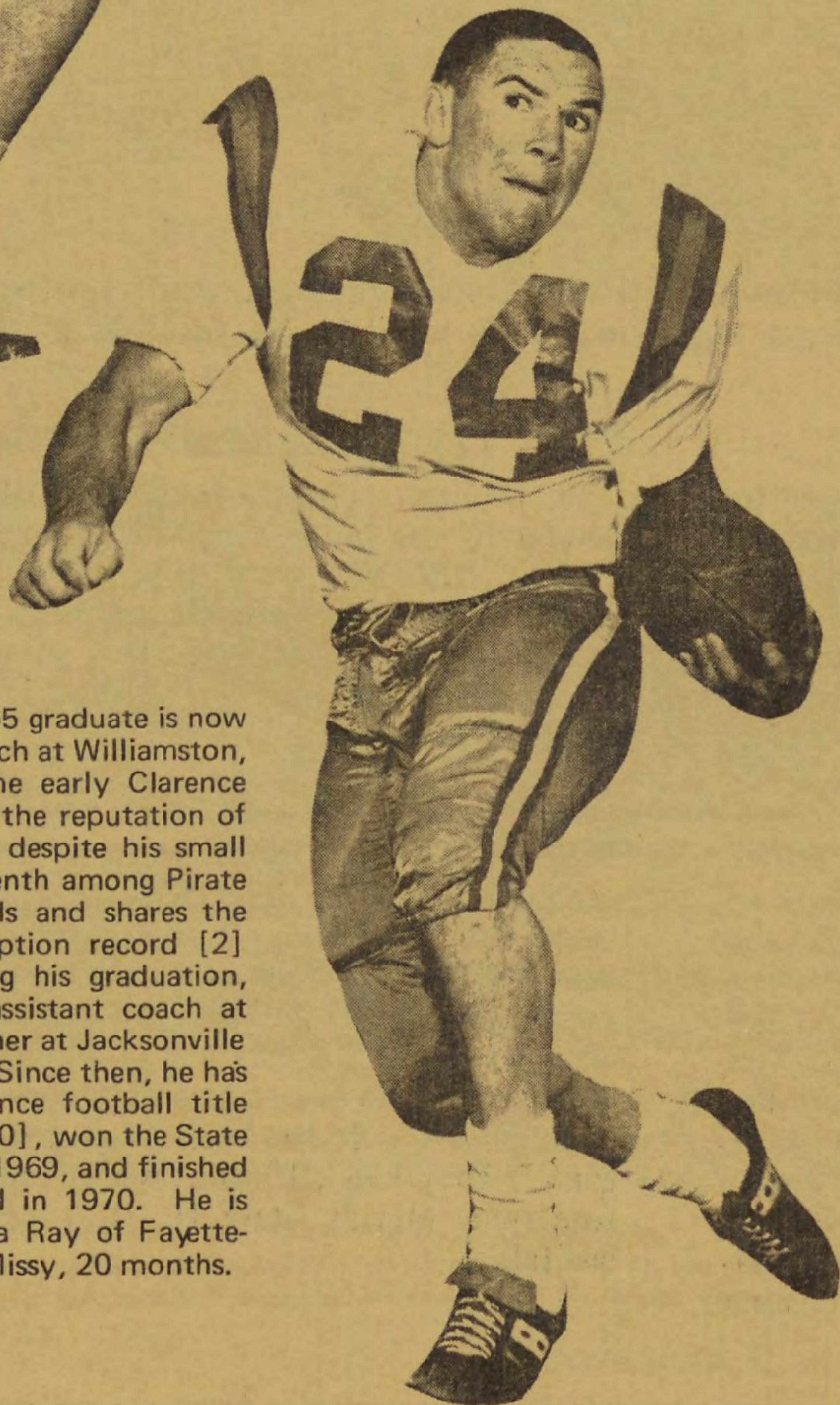


GEORGE RICHARDSON ['66]

A native of Chevy Chase, Md., this tailback starred in two Tangerine Bowl championships. He holds three Pirate Bowl records in passing; most attempts [17], most completions [9] and most touchdowns [1]. During the first bowl game, Richardson came off the bench to help lead the Pirates to an upset win over Massachusetts after regular fullback Dave Alexander was injured. The next year, Richardson switched to tailback and guided the Pirates to a win over Maine. He ranks fifth in passing yardage for the Pirates with 680 in 1965 and is fourth in pass completions with 53 in 1965. He is second in career passing yardage with 946 and second in completions with 76. A 1966 graduate, Richardson took commission as a first lieutenant in the Army through the ROTC program, and was discharged this spring as a captain. He currently works as a computer systems programmer for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington, D.C.

DINKY MILLS ['65]

A native of Ayden this 1965 graduate is now head football and baseball coach at Williamston, N.C. A wingback during the early Clarence Stasavich years, Mills gained the reputation of a hard-nosed football player despite his small size. He currently ranks seventh among Pirate pass receivers with 274 yards and shares the single game touchdown reception record [2] with two others. Following his graduation, Mills served a year as an assistant coach at Prince George, Va., and another at Jacksonville before going to Williamston. Since then, he has won one Albemarle Conference football title [22-10 record going into 1970], won the State 2-A baseball championship in 1969, and finished third in the state in baseball in 1970. He is married to the former Donna Ray of Fayetteville. They have a daughter, Missy, 20 months.

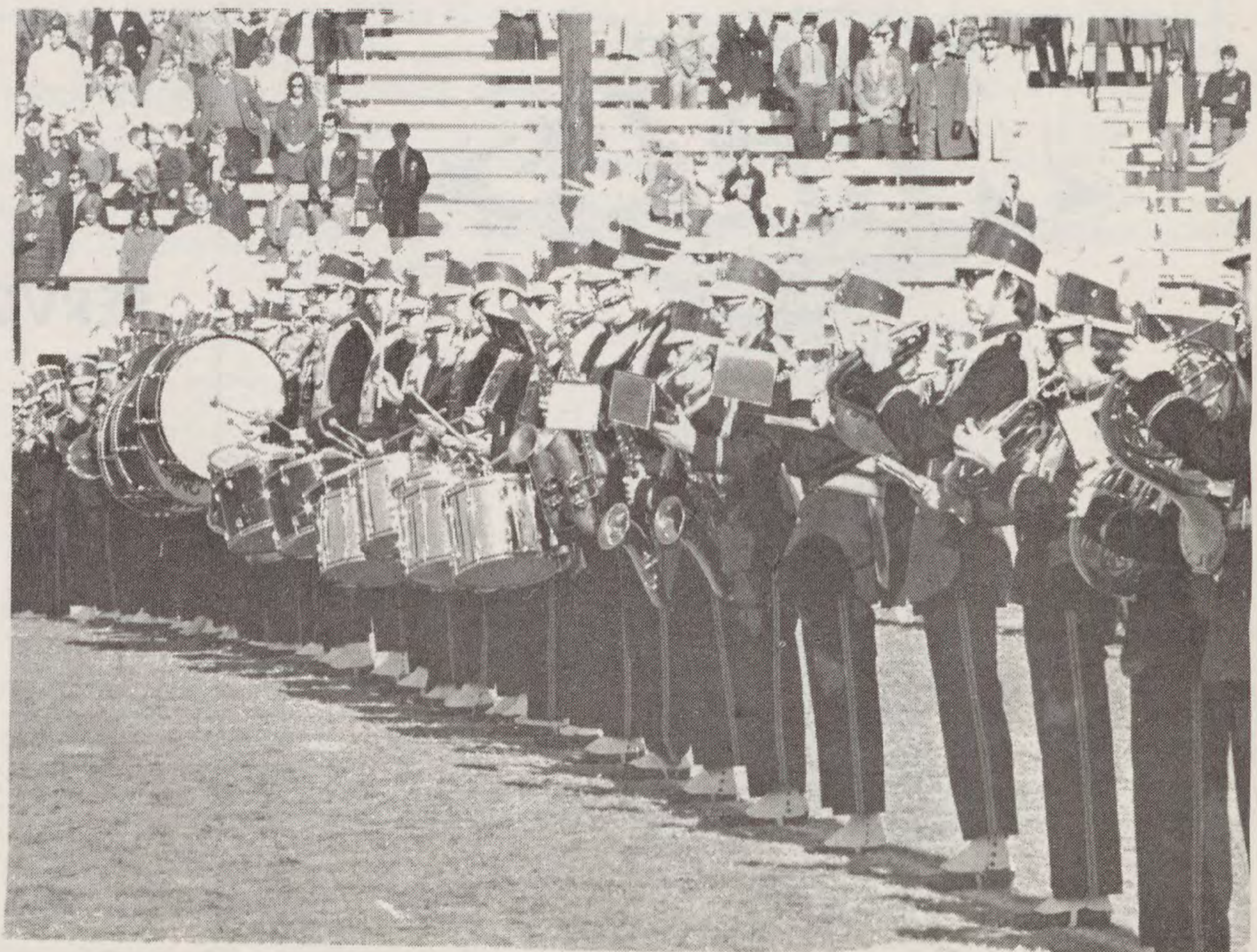

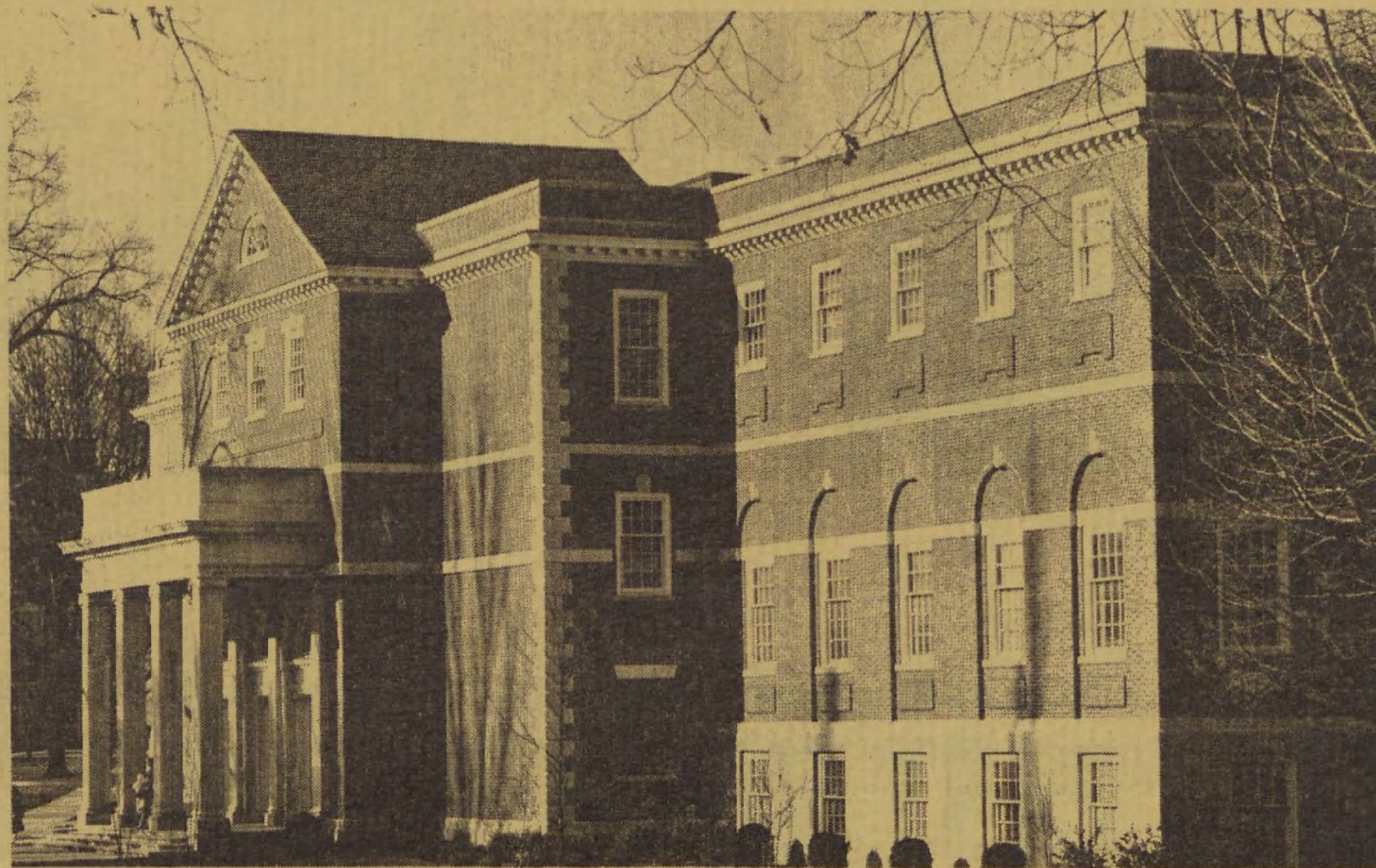

East Tennessee State University

In 59 years East Tennessee State University has grown from a two-year normal school to a multi-purpose university. In doing so it has passed through many stages of growth -- a two-year, three-year and four-year normal school program, State College and East Tennessee State University.

The growth of the Institution is seen in both its student body and faculty. From an enrollment of 236 in 1911, the University has a fall enrollment of 9,181 in 1969 and an annual enrollment of approximately 10,000 students. The faculty has grown from 20 to 441 full-time teachers in the 59 years.

In 1955, a reorganization plan was adopted which placed each academic department into one of four schools [later called colleges]: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration and Economics, Education and Health. The School of Graduate Studies and the School of Continuing Education do not have separate faculties but use the instructional personnel of the four colleges.

In May 1963, East Tennessee State College was elevated to East Tennessee State University.

The main campus has grown in 59 years from 120 acres and five buildings to 290 acres and 52 major buildings. In recent years, three centers have been established at Kingsport, Bristol and Greenville.

More than 2,000 different courses of study -- 300 of them new in the 1969-70 year -- are offered in East Tennessee State University. Under-graduate majors are offered in 60 areas including all of the pre-professional studies, medical technology, dental hygiene, health sciences, nursing, music, special education, social welfare, industrial education and physical education. Undergraduate minors include military science, library service and computer science.

ETSU offers 32 Master's programs - 24 Master of Arts degrees, six Master of Science degrees, the Master of Business Administration, and the Master of Arts in Teaching in Elementary Education.

The Master of Science degrees are provided in Biology, Chemistry, Health Sciences, Mathematics, Environmental Health and Physics.

The Master of Arts degrees are in Art, Business Education, City Management, Economics, English, Geography, Guidance and Counseling, History, Industrial Education, Industrial Technology, Philosophy, Physical Education, Political Science, Psychology, Reading, Science Education, Sociology, Special Education, General Education, Elementary Education, Secondary Education, Library Services, Educational Administration, and Instructional Communication.
