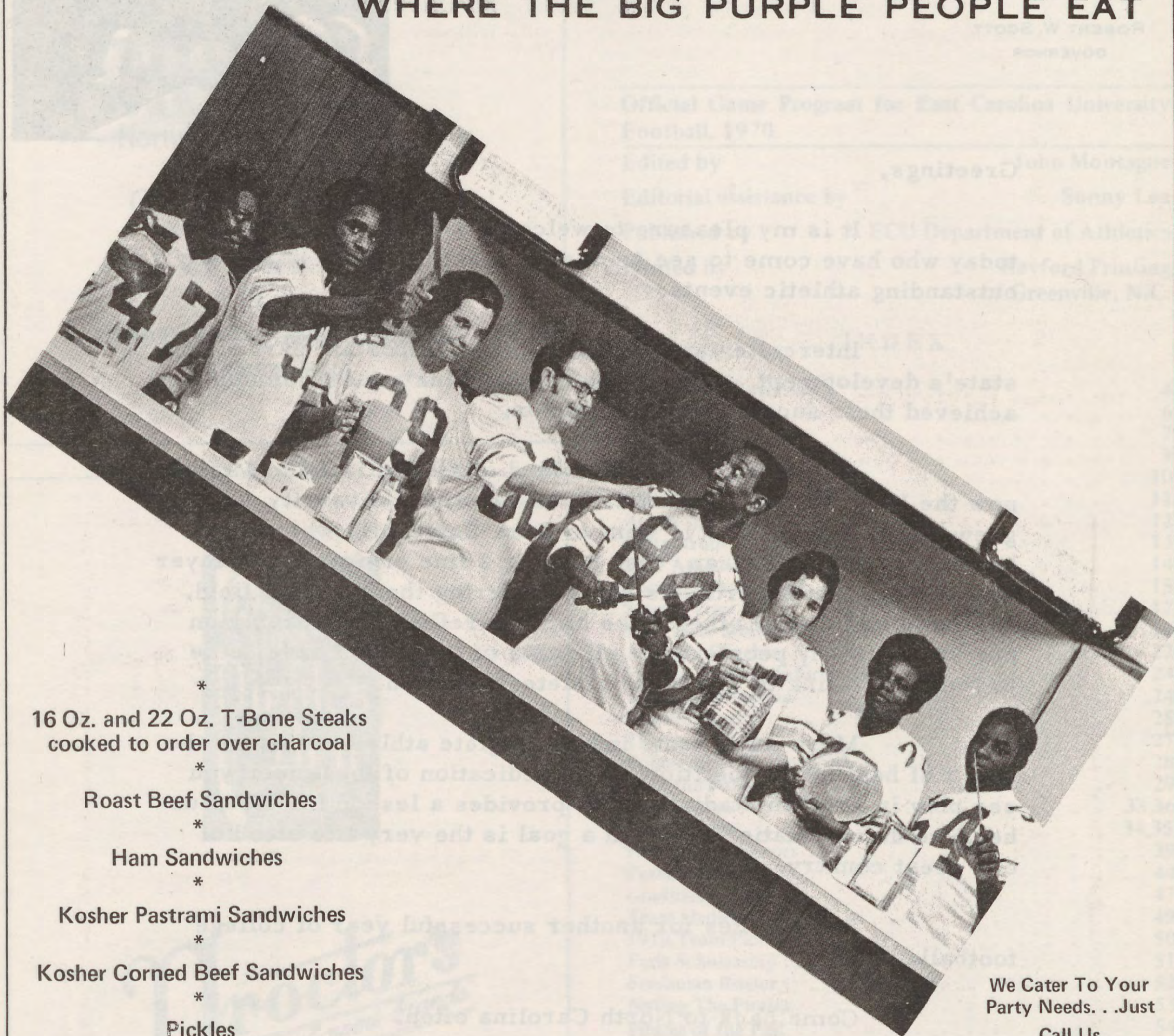

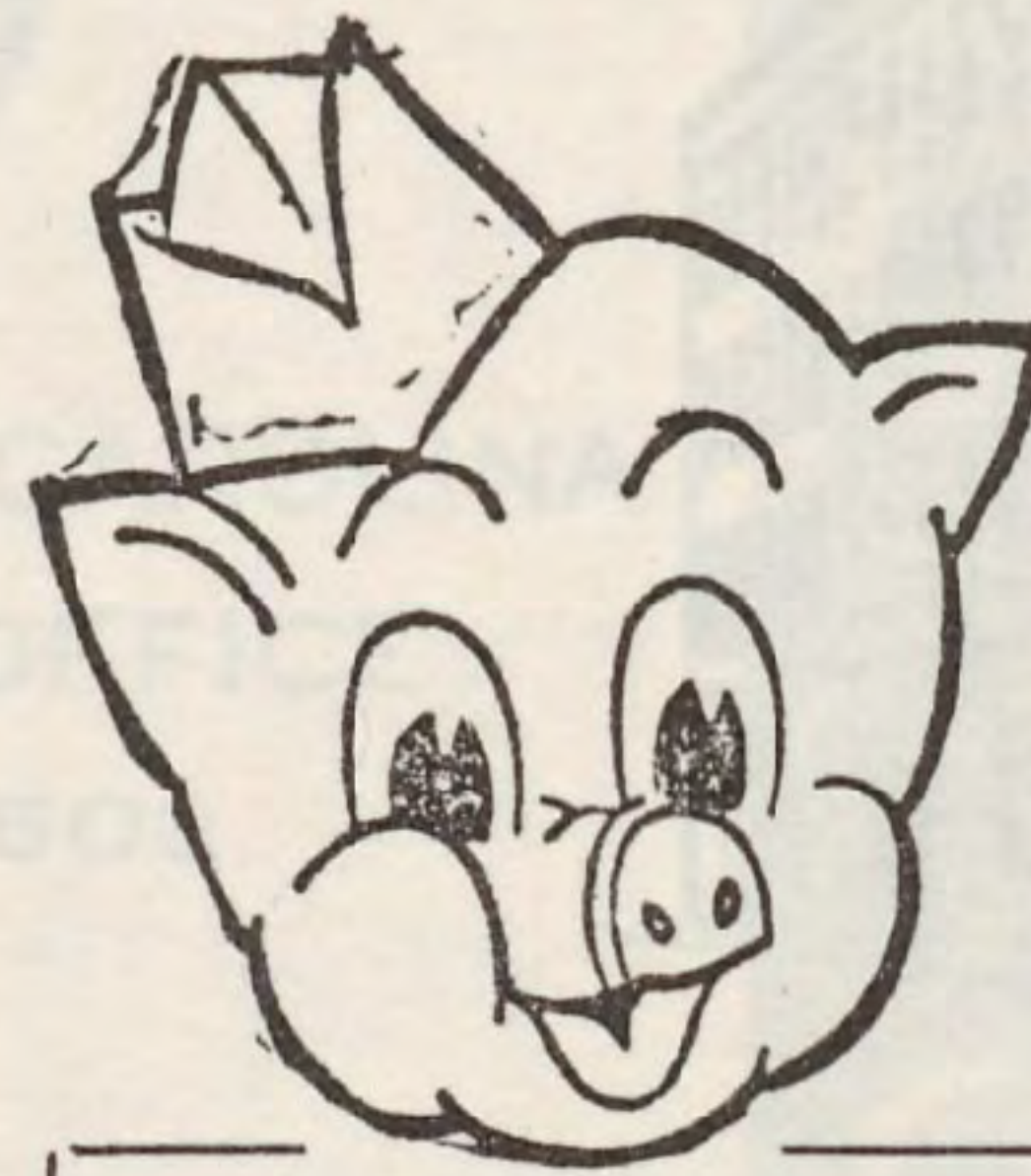

The Pirates Club

In line with the "new look" in football, East Carolina University has consolidated all of its athletic booster groups into one, cohesive organization - The Pirates Club. Its purpose is to raise funds, through contribution from the alumni, friends and students, to support the entire athletic program which includes 13 intercollegiate sports -- football, basketball, baseball, swimming, wrestling, tennis, outdoor and indoor track, cross country, soccer, golf, lacrosse and crew. The University needs substantial assistance from friends and alumni to develop a complete and wholesome program. The Pirates Club is a division of the ECU Education Foundation, Inc. Accurate records are kept and audited annually. Funds are budgeted to each individual sport by the Athletic Director and Athletic Council. Basic membership is \$100 annually. However, there is no maximum or minimum that an individual may give in support of the program. Pirates Club contributions are tax deductible. Club members enjoy many benefits such as priority in season ticket purchases, special parking at home games, use of Century Building, complimentary brochures and a monthly newsletter [weekly during football and basketball seasons], theater-type seats in Ficklen Stadium and cushion seats in Minges and the satisfaction of a working relationship with an imaginative, growing major college athletic program.

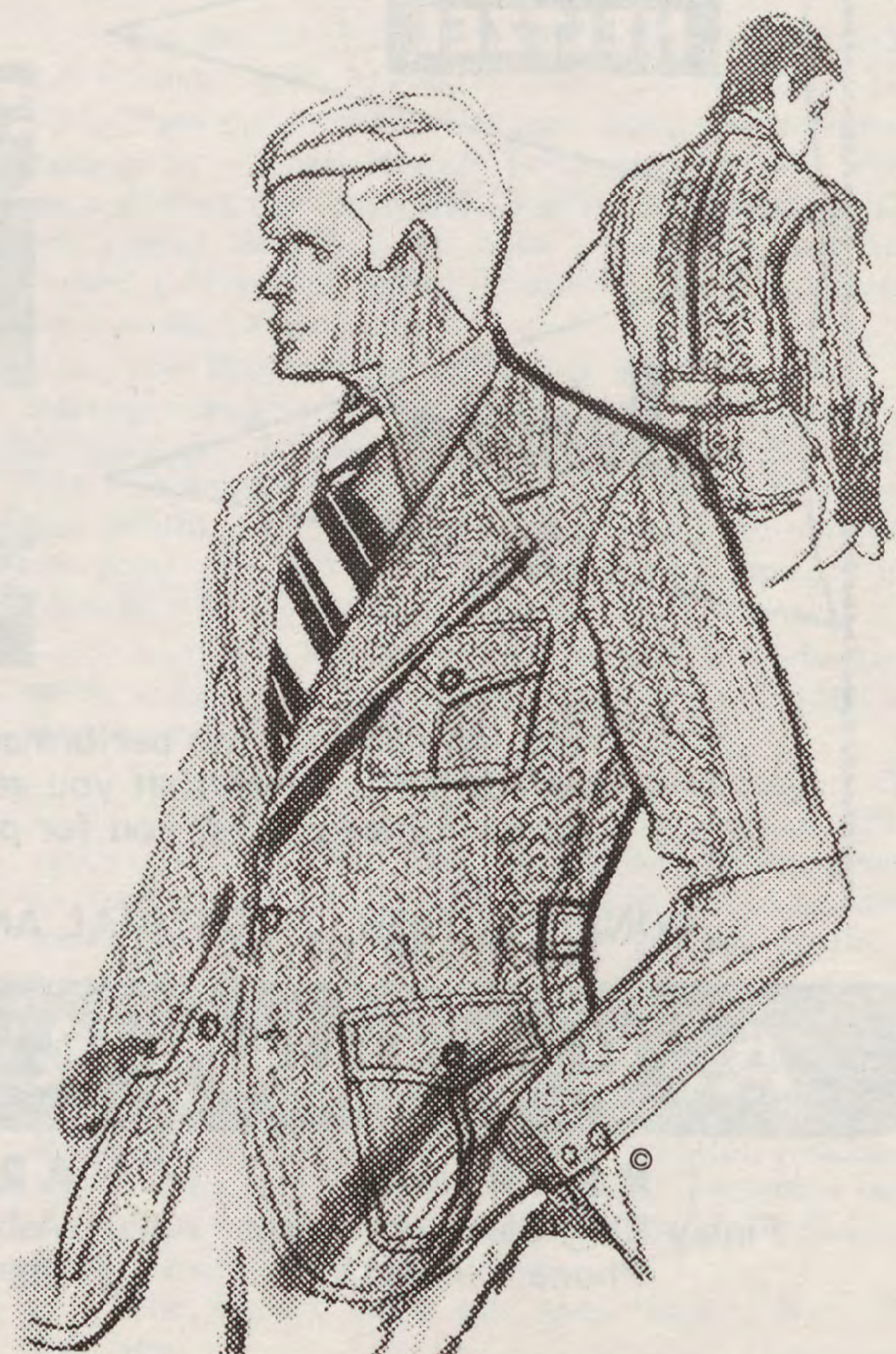

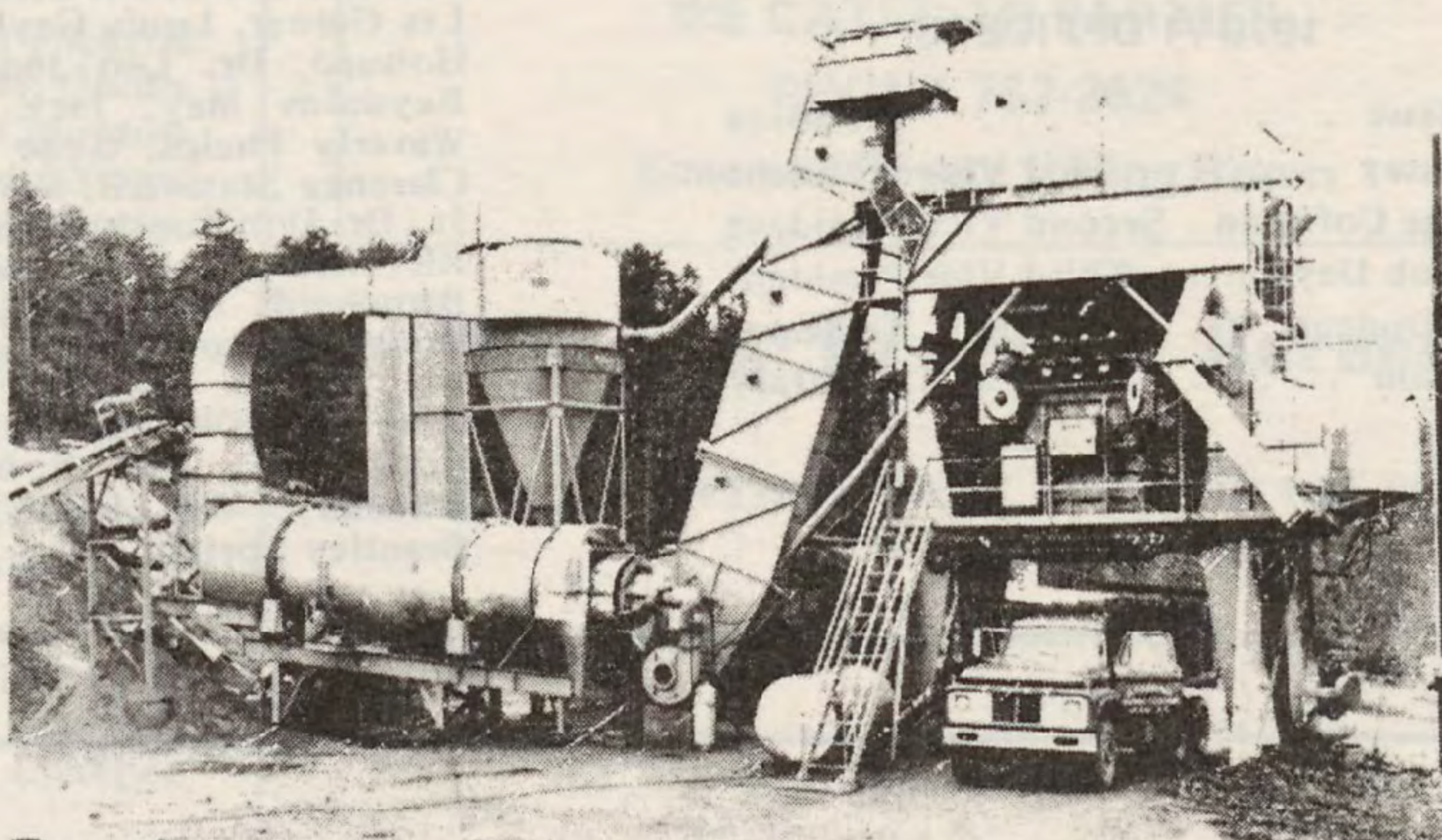

After giving highly regarded West Virginia a big scare last Saturday, East Carolina is shooting for a victory today as the Pirates take on another team from the Mountaineer state - Marshall University.

This is the last game Coach Mike McGee's men will play before the home folks this season.

It is a day full of festivities, billed as Legislature Day, High School Day and Parachute Day all rolled into one. A team of four jumpers from a Fort Bragg Parachute Club will perform before today's game and following the game there will be a Purple-Gold Basketball Game at 5 p.m. in Minges Coliseum and a Purple-Gold Swimming Meet at 4:30 p.m. in Minges Natatorium. Many state legislators and government officials plus a large number of high school groups have been invited to Ficklen Stadium today.

McGee's Pirates put on quite a show themselves last Saturday in a 28-14 loss to West Virginia, which came into the contest favored by as much as 40 points. John Casazza fired touchdown passes of 33 yards to Carl Gordon and 66 yards to Billy Wallace and, for a while in the second half, it looked like the Pirate quarterback might engineer the biggest upset in the school's history.

However, the Mountaineers' own passing attack prevailed. ECU actually outgained West Virginia's famed rushing offense - 146 yards to 92 yards - and this was what forced the visitors to the air. Tailback Les Strayhorn, having one of his best games, gained 89 of those 146 yards and fullback Wallace added 61. Tackle Mike Kopp was credited with opening one big hole after another in the left side of the line.

Meanwhile, the Pirate defense was being led by tackle Rich Peeler, cornerback George Whitley and deep backs Mike Mills and Tom Pulley. It all but stopped the West Virginia ground game which had been averaging 260.7 yards per game. Later the Mountaineers isolated receivers on Pirate linebackers and moved through the air.

"I was real pleased with the way our men fought," said McGee after the loss, the Pirates' eighth in nine games this season. "In many ways this was our best performance of the season."

Safety Mills, a senior from Statesville, was honored for his great defensive performance by being named "Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Week." He is the third Pirate to receive the award this season, Whitley and Peeler having earned it earlier this fall.

Marshall, located in Huntington, W. Va., brings a 3-5 record to Greenville. However, three of those losses were by a total of 11 points and could have easily been victories which would have made the Thundering Herd's record 8-2. Coach Rick Tolley's club defeated Kent State 20-17 last weekend, snapping a four-game losing streak. Earlier victories came against Morehead State 17-7 and Xavier 31-14. The losses were to Toledo 52-3, Miami of Ohio 19-12, Louisville 16-14, Western Michigan 34-3 and Bowling Green 26-24.

"Marshall is an exciting team to watch," said ECU aide Al Ferguson, who scouted the Herd's win over Kent State. "They try something new every game on offense. . . their quarterback scrambles a lot and they run a lot of deep pass patterns. They also have an excellent running back in Joe Hood (No. 33)."

Ted Shoebridge (No. 14), a classic drop-back passer, started the season as the No. 1 quarterback, but has a bad shoulder and has played very little recently. Taking over has been scrambler Bob Harris (No. 12), who loves to run.

When Harris joins with halfbacks Hood and Art Harris (No. 22), in the backfield, the Herd possesses a potent ground attack. Against Kent State, Marshall rushed for 232 yards - the first time the Herd has been over the 200 mark since 1965. Although Art Harris has been Marshall's top ball carrier, it is the speedster Hood who impresses ECU coaches the most.

"He scored 172 points his senior year in high school in Tuscaloosa, Ala.," said Ferguson. "He is a cross between those speedy West Texas backs and Jim Braxton of West Virginia."

Leading the Thundering Herd defense are cornerback Larry Sanders (No. 40) and tackle Tom Brown (No. 65).

Then there's the Herd's most dangerous weapon in a close game - kicker Marcelo Lajterman (No. 23), who has booted seven field goals and 13 of 14 extra points this year. His longest field goal has been a 42-yarder, but he just missed a 56-yarder against Louisville. He's also averaging 38.8 yards as a punter.

The Pirates will have a few more changes in their starting lineup as injuries continue to take their toll, particularly on defense. Linebackers Monty Kiernan and Terry Johnson both were hurt in the West Virginia game, but should play. However, tackle Tim Tyler may be out for good with a knee injury and will be replaced in the front four by tackle Chuck Zadnik.

Also, Wes Rothrock, who worked at linebacker last week, is back at defensive end, replacing Jim Gudger as the starter on the quick side.

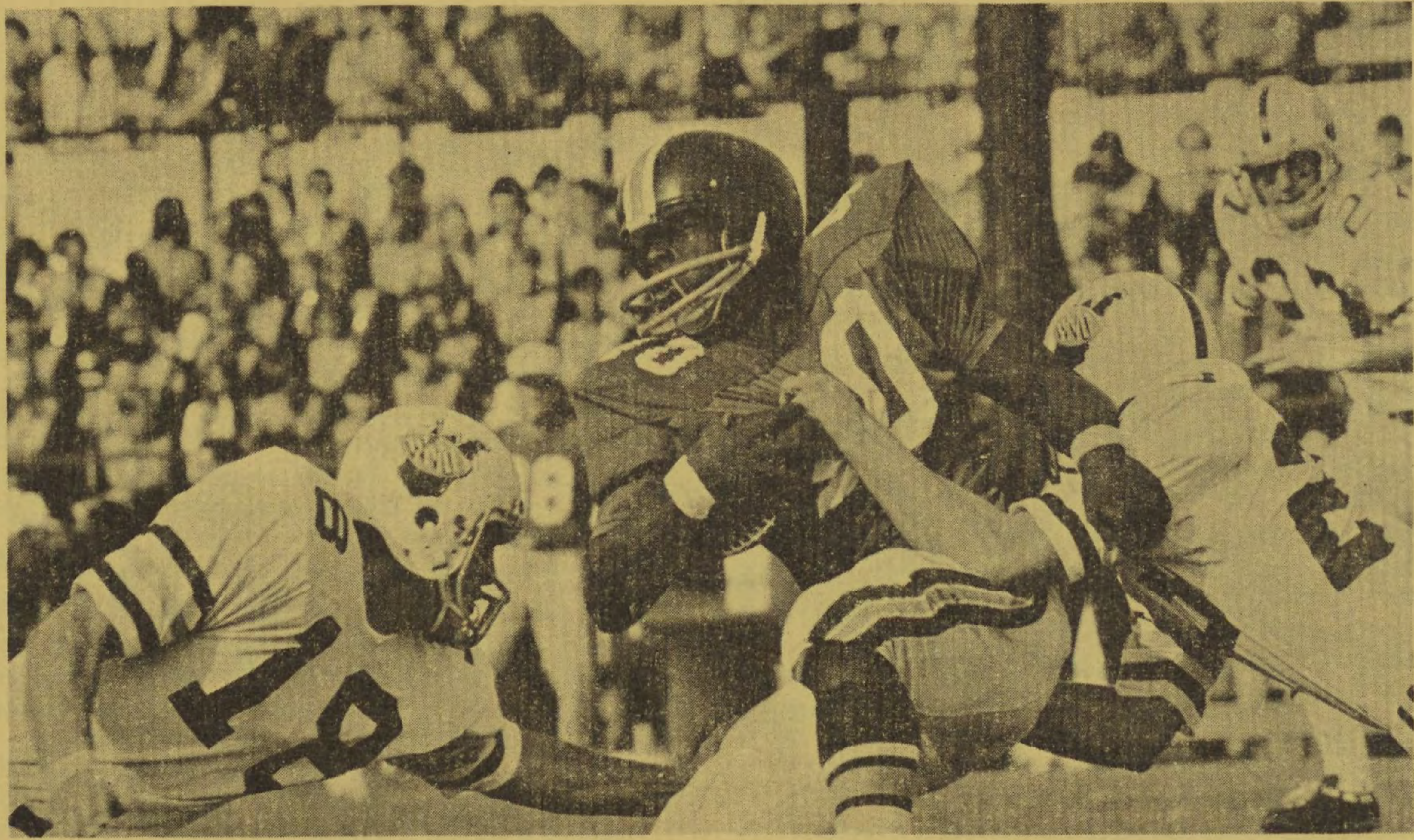
The offense remains in fairly good shape. Guard David Callahan was shaken up last Saturday but will play against Marshall. The starting backfield is the same with Casazza at quarterback, Wallace and Strayhorn at running-backs and Carl Gordon and Dick Corrada at the wide receiver spots.

Making their final home appearance for the Pirates will be seniors Steve Davis (offensive guard and co-captain), Corrada, Dwight Flanagan (flanker), Rothrock, Gudger, Mike McGuirk (defensive end), Butch Britton (linebacker), Mills, Pulley, and Whitley (co-captain). Two other seniors, Gerald Wrenn (cornerback) and Tyler (defensive tackle), will be on the sidelines due to injuries.

The Pirates close out their season Nov. 28 at Davidson.

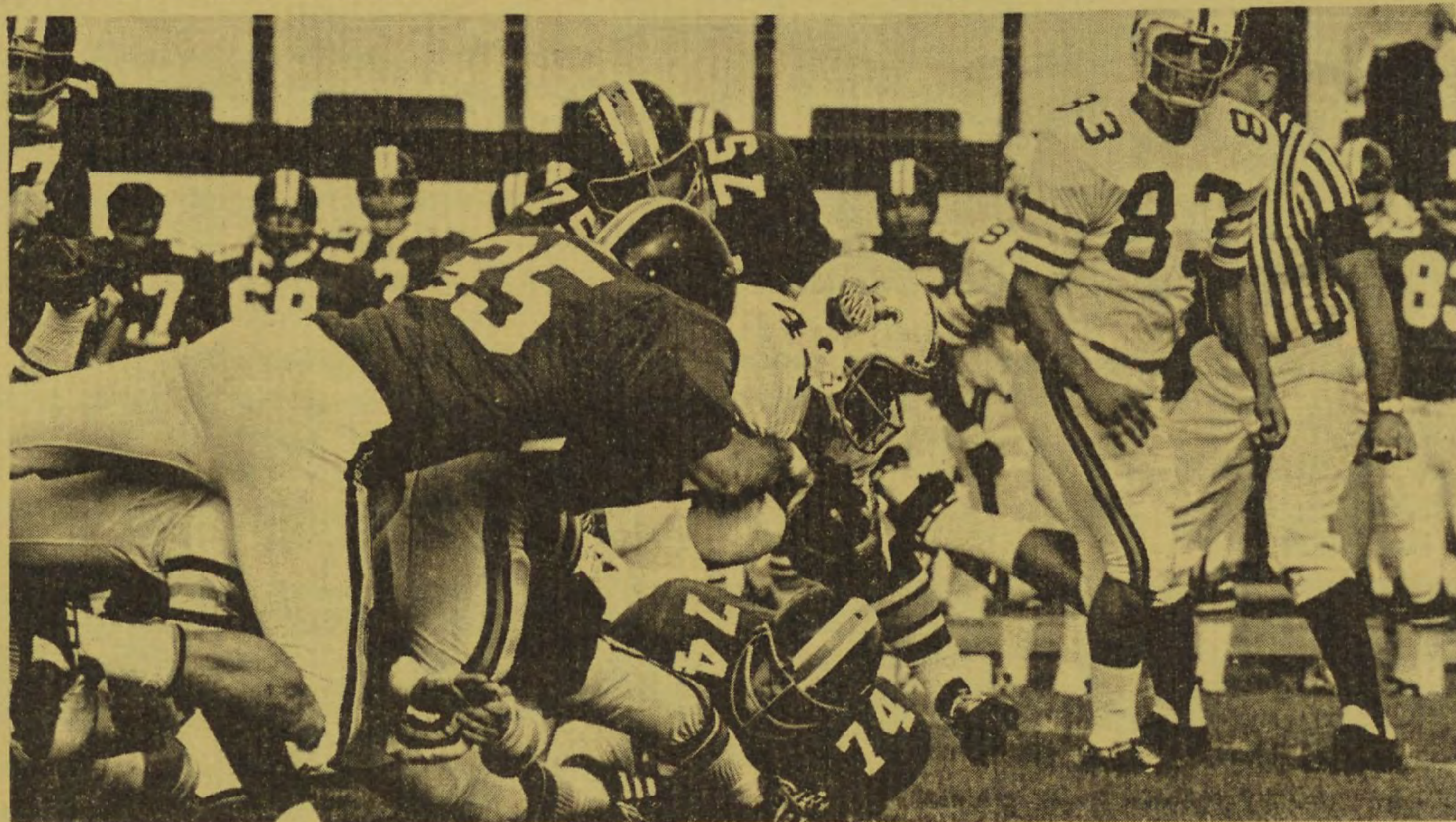

East Carolina Sports Network

Jim Woods, "the Voice of the Pirates" for the past three years, will be at the microphone for the play-by-play of all 11 East Carolina University football games again this fall.

Joining Woods on the network this season will be former East Carolina star tailback Neal Hughes, who will handle the color commentary. Hughes' knowledge of the game and his close association with many Pirate players and coaches make him a big addition to the broadcasts.

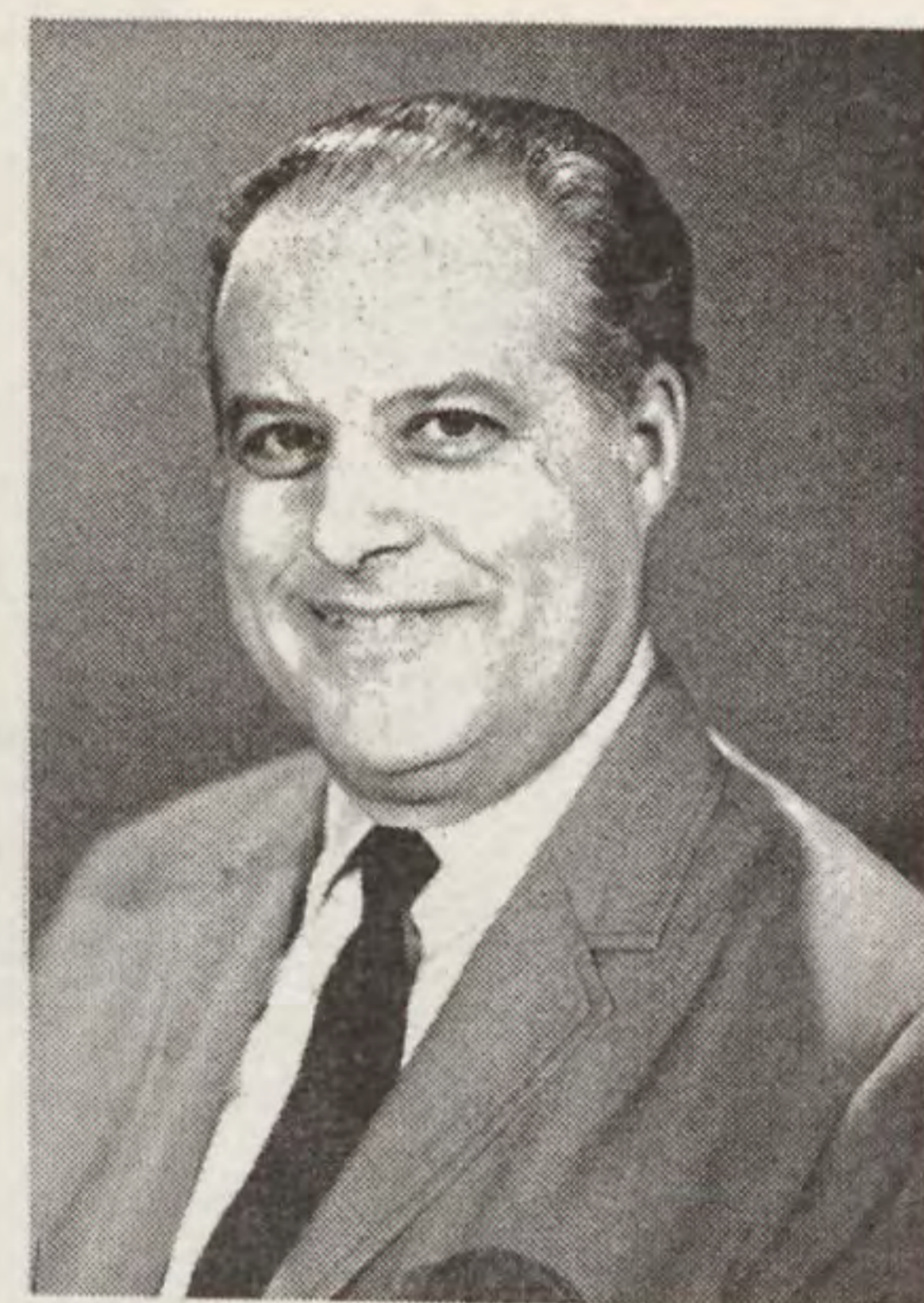
WNCT in Greenville will be the originating station for the East Carolina Sports Network. It will use both its AM and FM facilities to bring five ECU night games and six afternoon contests into homes all across Eastern North Carolina.

Other stations on the network include WRMT in Rocky Mount and WGTM in Wilson. WOBR in Wanchese will air all Pirate day games, while selected games will be carried by WGAI in Elizabeth City, WFAI in Fayetteville, and WEEB in Southern Pines WKVO in Havelock and WCDJ in Edenton.

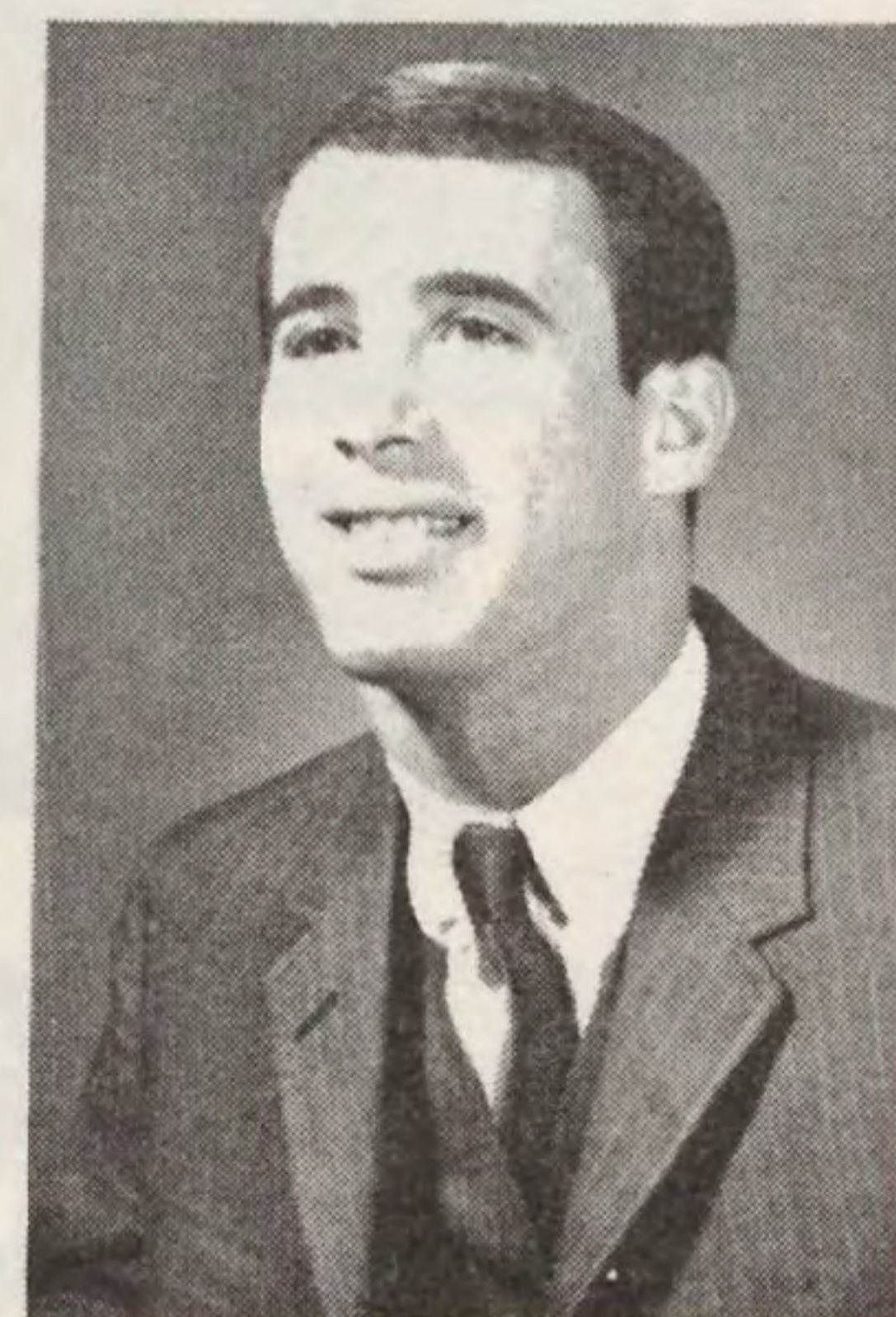
Prior to each game this fall Pirate fans can hear the 15-minute Mike McGee Pre-Game Show and Woods also will host a post-game wrap-up show with ECU coaches as his guests.

Woods, a 15-year veteran in sportscasting, is one of the most respected men in the business. The New Jersey native has twice been named Tar Heel Sportscaster of the Year by the Associated Press. His nightly sports show over WNCT-TV is watched by thousands of Eastern North Carolina sports fans.

Woods will also handle the play-by-play for all East Carolina basketball games this season for the fourth straight year.

EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

Founded in 1907 as East Carolina Teachers Training School, ECU has grown from an enrollment of 123 in 1909 to 9,997 in 1970. Students come from 97 different counties in North Carolina, 40 states and 15 foreign countries. Coeds outnumber the male students 5,094 to 4,703.

ECU leads the South in the preparation of teachers. In 1920 the school was authorized to offer four-year teacher education degrees and to grant the bachelor of arts degree. A year later by an act of the General Assembly, the school name was changed to East Carolina Teachers College. The president at this time was Dr. Robert H. Wright, who headed East Carolina from the date of the first class in 1909 until his death in 1934. Under his leadership the school had grown to an enrollment of over 1,000 and was now offering a masters of arts degree.

During the period from 1934 to 1960 the school continued to grow, though not as spectacularly in terms of enrollment. A curriculum leading to a bachelor of science degree was authorized in 1941 as the college expanded to meet needs for occupations other than teaching. By 1951 undergraduate majors were offered in 17 areas and graduate programs in 10 areas. It was in that year that an act of the General Assembly changed the name to East Carolina College.

It was also during this period that intercollegiate athletics found a place in the East Carolina way of life. The first football team was fielded in 1932 under Coach Kenneth Beatty, though Pirate fans would just as soon forget that inaugural season since the team lost all five games and didn't score a point.

A major turning point for East Carolina came in 1960 when Dr. Leo W. Jenkins was inaugurated as the school's sixth president. Under the guiding hand of this dynamic man, East Carolina College became East Carolina University [in 1967] and enrollment more than doubled in a 10-year period.

Today undergraduate majors are offered in 26 fields and graduate programs in 21 areas. Besides the College of Arts and Sciences and the Graduate School, there are seven professional schools: Allied Health Professions, Art, Business, Education, Home Economics, Music and Nursing.

The face of the University is always changing. Twenty years ago there were 17 buildings on a 98-acre campus with a total physical plant value of \$5 million. Today there are 52 buildings, 300 acres and a valuation in excess of \$44 million.

The athletic complex alone takes up 79 acres. It consists of Minges Natatorium and Coliseum, Scales Field House, Ficklen Stadium, the Century Club Building, University Field, an all-weather track and all-weather tennis courts. Eleven intercollegiate sports have ECU varsity teams – football, basketball, baseball, cross country, soccer, wrestling, indoor track, swimming, golf, tennis, outdoor track, crew and lacrosse. The golf team plays on the Greenville Country Club course and the crew rows on the Tar River which flows through the middle of Greenville.

Greenville itself is a town of 30,000, located approximately halfway between Raleigh [the state capital] and the Atlantic Ocean. The beautiful coastal plains of Eastern North Carolina represent some of the richest, unspoiled farming country you will find anywhere in the United States. Pitt County, of which Greenville is the county seat, leads the nation in the production of leaf tobacco. However, the presence of East Carolina University has made Greenville something of a cosmopolitan cultural center in the heart of this agricultural area.

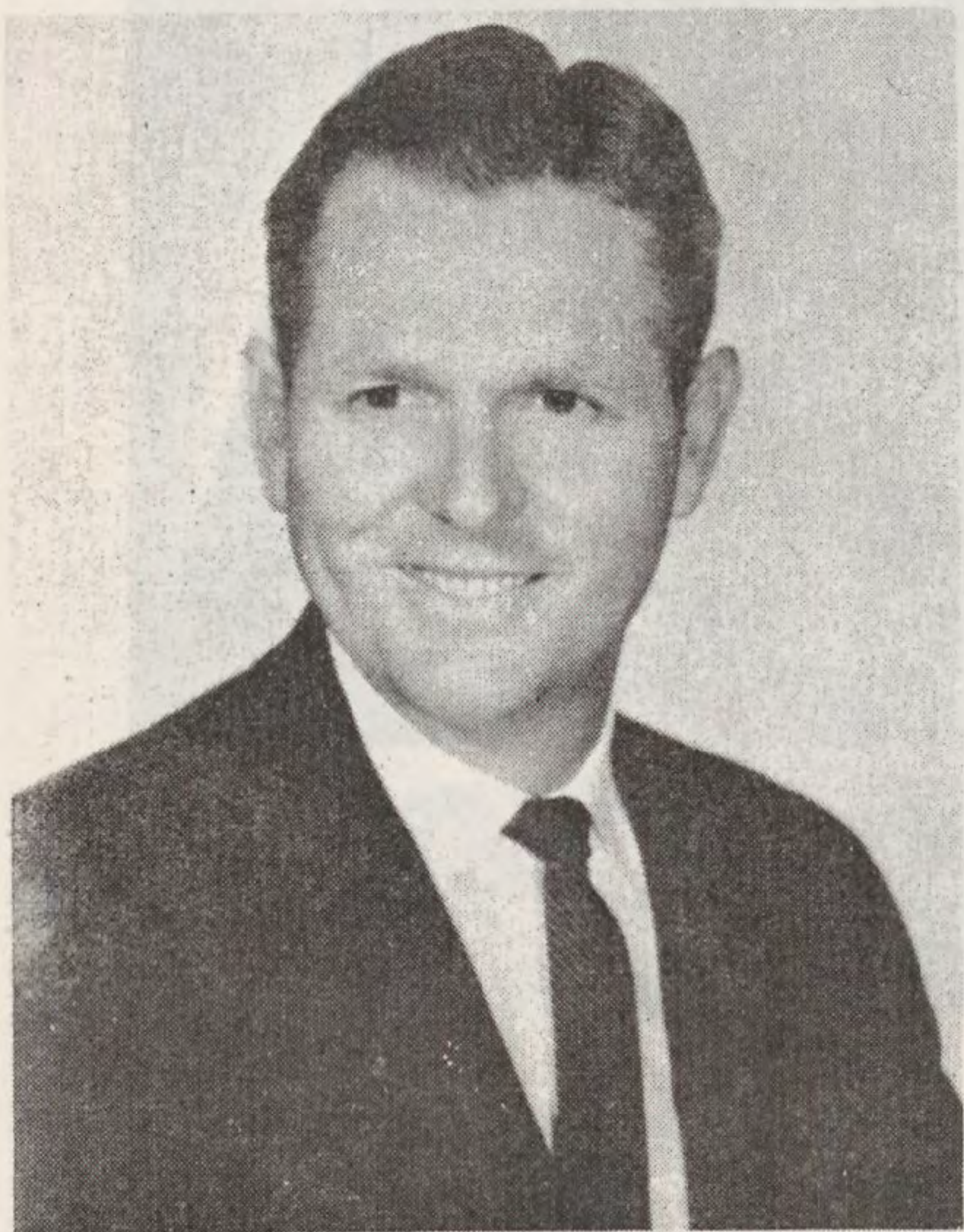

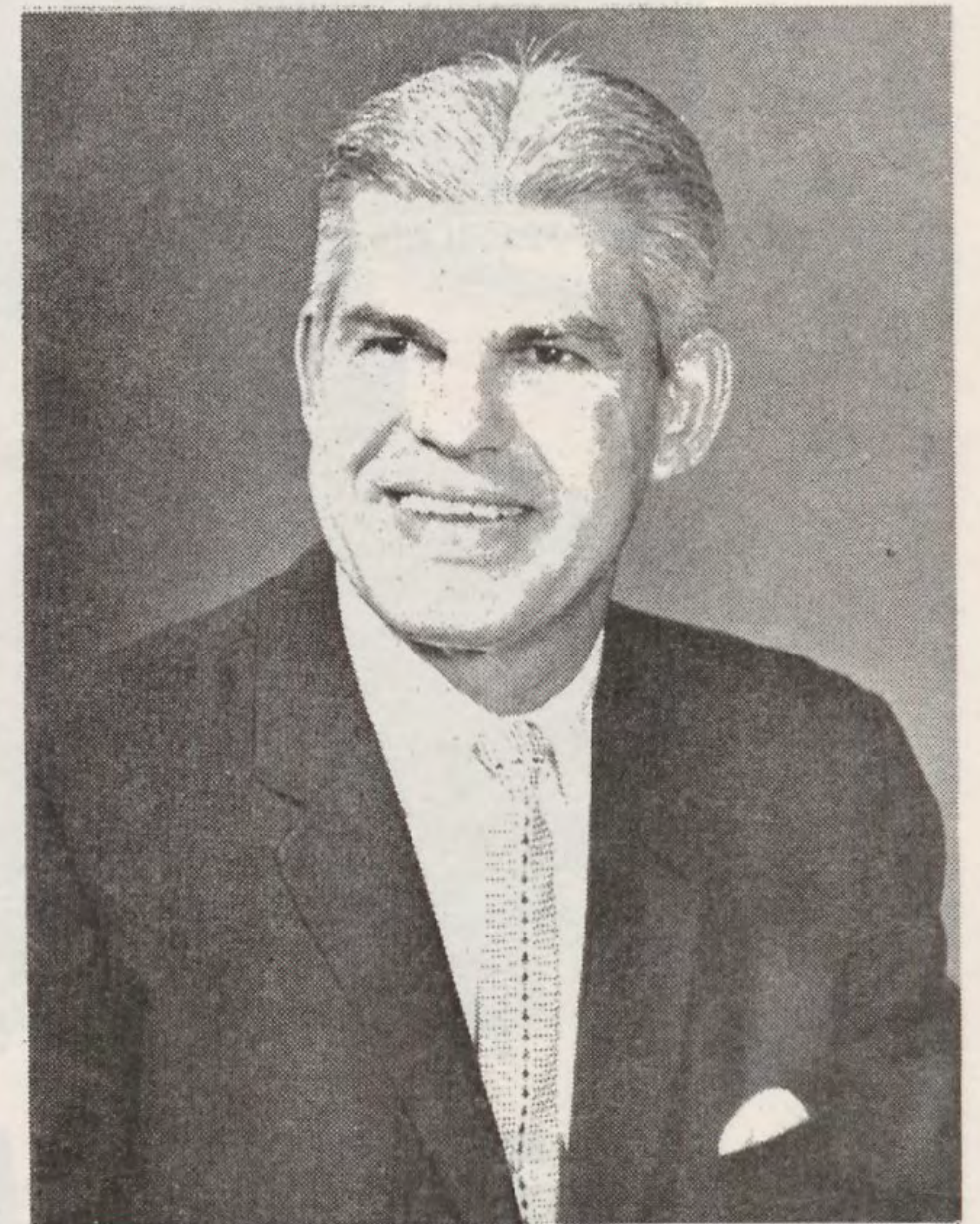

'Gramps' Tears Up The Record Book

When East Carolina University's starting flanker Dick Corrada was a little boy, he always dreamed about being a great pass receiver.

He idolized such pro greats as Raymond Berry of the Baltimore Colts and Sonny Randle of the St. Louis Cardinals.

When he got to high school, he showed his hometown fans a thing or two about catching passes. At Meadowbrook High School in Richmond, Va., Corrada set all sorts of school and city records before coming south to East Carolina.

As a split end, Corrada set city prep records for most pass receptions in a career with 99, most pass receptions in a single season (65) in his senior year, most yards in a single season with 1,060, and most pass receptions in a single game with twelve.

But, Corrada had a second love--baseball. That's why he came to East Carolina. He wanted to play both football and baseball. Nearly every other school that contacted him wanted Dick to play either one, but not both.

"I like the school and I wanted to play both sports," said Corrada. "I knew at East Carolina I would be able to play both sports."

As a high schooler, Corrada started three seasons in football and all four seasons in baseball and won seven letters.

At East Carolina, he went both ways on the freshman football team and started at shortstop that spring on the Pirate baseball team. He has been a starter during his whole career in both sports at East Carolina.

East Carolina experienced a football coaching change last winter that saw Mike McGee step in, succeeding Clarence Stasavich. Corrada was very excited when he heard McGee had named to his staff none other than Sonny Randle, who would coach the receivers.

"When I was a kid I used to dream about being able to catch the ball like him," the red-headed Richmond native said.

But because of baseball, Corrada didn't start working under Randle until fall practice. He stepped in and won the starting flanker position in an entirely new offense before the season started.

"Corrada offset missing spring practice in one week because he learns so quickly," said Randle. "Once you show him how to do something you know you won't have to show him again."

During the summer months, Corrada stayed in shape playing baseball in the Cape Cod semi-pro league in Massachusetts.

"I reported to football practice in probably the best shape I had ever been in," he said. "We played baseball every night so I had to stay in shape."

This week really means something special to Corrada. It will be his last football game in Ficklen Stadium.

Corrada had the best game of his career last month in ECU's Homecoming Game against Southern Illinois, catching 14 passes for 169 yards and vaulting the likeable redhead up among the national leaders in pass catching.

Both the 14 catches and 169 yards were ECU single game records. And Corrada has written his name into the record book three more times since then. Going into today's game with Marshall he has 44 catches this year for 469 yards -- both ECU single season records. With two games to go, he also holds the Pirate career record for most passes caught with 77 catches -- and has a good chance to break the career pass receiving yardage record, now held by Dave Bumgarner with 1,023 yards. At present Dick has 863 yards in his three seasons of play.

All this, and his nickname is "Gramps."

The monicker gives you the impression Corrada is no speed demon, which he isn't. Randle gave him the tag because Dick "runs like an old man." But Corrada's great hands, his perfection on running pass patterns and his knack of always getting in the open somehow more than offset his lack of burning speed.

With split end Carl Gordon hampered somewhat by a knee injury, Corrada has had to take the bulk of the receiving load himself. But, he feels with Gordon in the lineup, the two complement each other.

"Carl is a real fine deep receiver," said Corrada. "I usually run the shorter patterns. With both of us in the lineup, no team can afford to double-cover either of us."

Gordon, called "Stork" by Randle because the junior split end is 6-5, was injured in the N.C. State game and didn't dress for Southern Illinois. He has caught 28 passes for 392 yards this year, though playing sporadically since the State game.

Corrada, a physical education major, aspires to be a coach. Right now he's making at least one assistant coach very happy.

"He is the type of young man who makes coaching a real pleasure," said Randle, also a Virginia native. "He has the great hands and the knack of getting open. I just wish we had 30 or 40 more just like him."



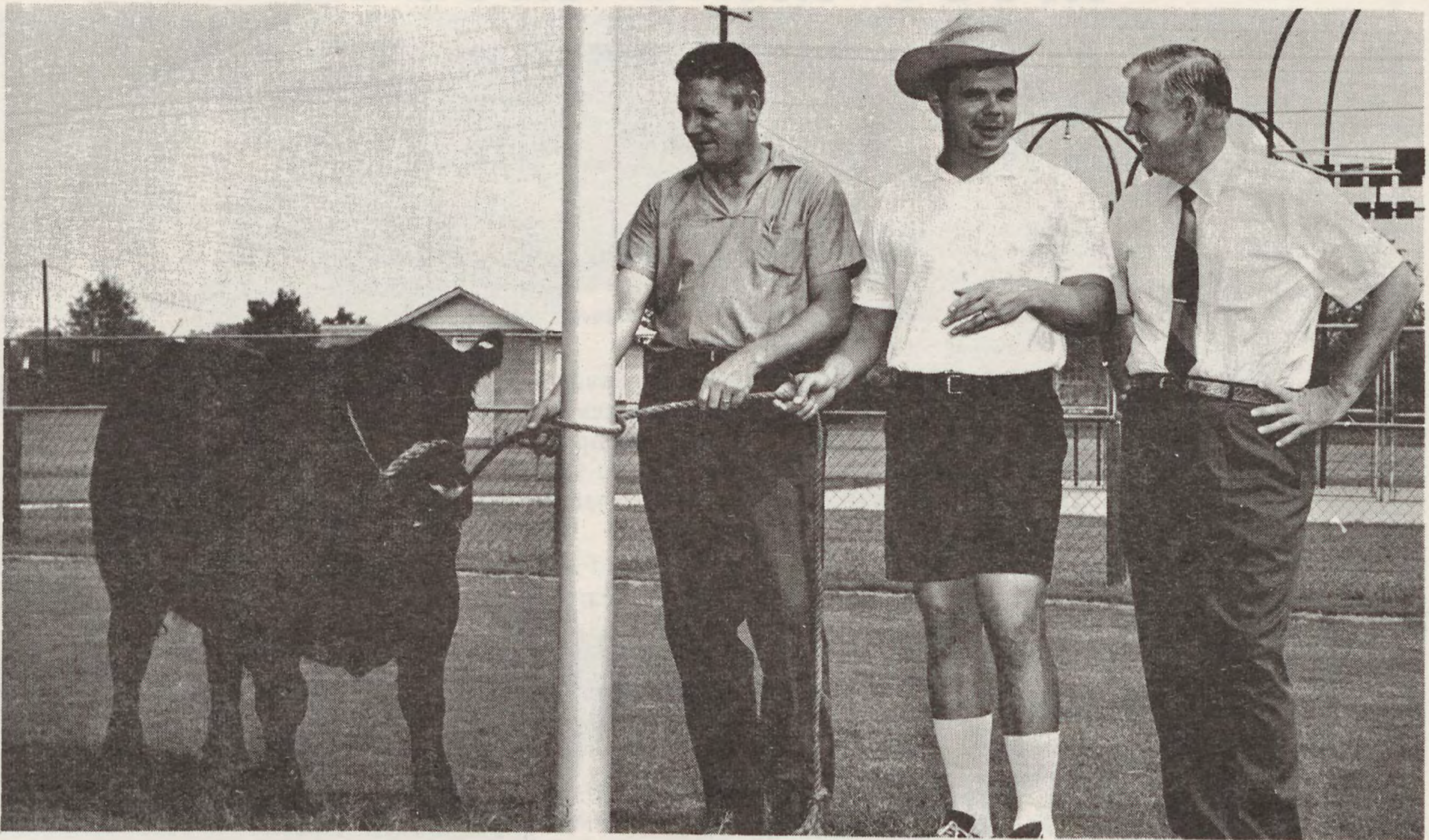

Meet Mike McGee

A New Era Of Purple Pride

The entire East Carolina football program took on a youthful look last December with the hiring of 31-year-old Michael Burnette McGee to be the Pirates' 11th head football coach since 1932.

This Elizabeth City native is already one of the most respected, most dynamic young coaches in college football today. Otto Graham, for one, is so impressed with McGee that he asked Mike to help coach the College All-Stars in their game against the Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs in Chicago this summer.

Coaching the All-Stars in Soldiers Field was a nostalgic experience for McGee. For just 10 years ago he captained the 1960 Stars against the Baltimore Colts. Considered by many as the greatest Duke lineman of all time, McGee had capped a brilliant three-year career as a Blue Devil in the fall of 1959 by winning consensus first team All-America honors at offensive guard and receiving the Outland Trophy as the best college lineman in the United States.

Today that Outland plaque hangs above the fire place in the McGee home in Brook Valley, a popular new subdivision of Greenville. Mike bought the home because he wants to feel settled in Greenville. Having been raised in Eastern North Carolina, he loves this part of the state. He also believes in East Carolina University and its future as a major power in college football. He is dedicated to this goal, but he knows it won't be reached overnight.

McGee didn't become the capable football coach he is overnight, either.

Following his graduation from Duke in 1960 with a B.A. in business administration, Mike played three seasons for the St. Louis Cardinals in the NFL. His rookie season [1960] he was voted the Cardinal's most valuable rookie and finished third in NFL voting for Rookie of the Year. Unfortunately, a neck injury cut short Mike's very promising pro career in 1962.

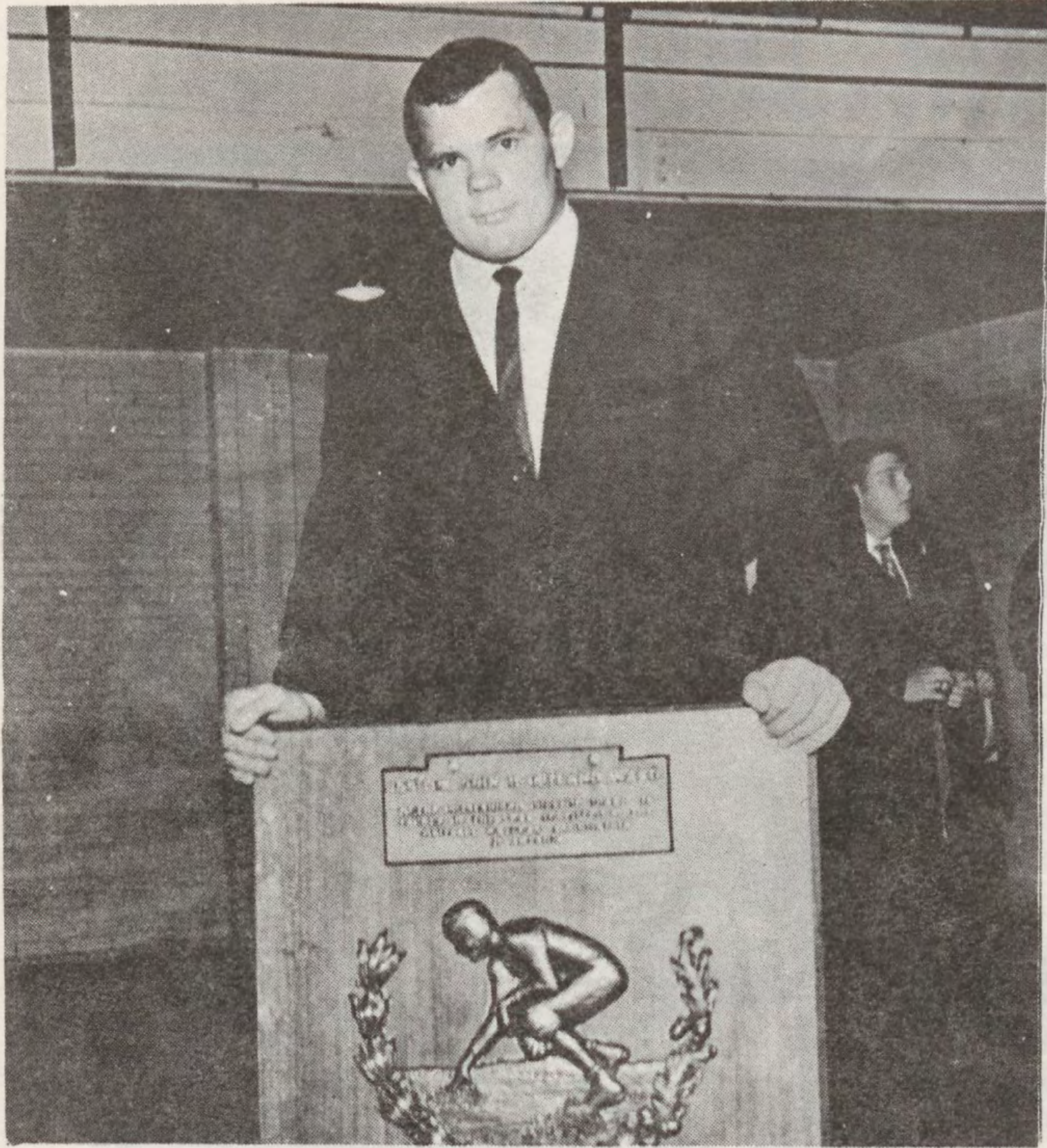
McGee returned to his alma mater in 1963, joining Bill Murray's staff as offensive line coach. At the same time he enrolled in graduate school at the University of North Carolina and received his Masters in education in 1965.

After working under Murray for three seasons [1963-65], McGee moved to the University of Wisconsin where he coached the offensive line under Head Coach Milt Bruhn in 1966. The following season Murray Warmath convinced Mike to come to the University of Minnesota. So Mike spent the next three years in Minneapolis, coaching the Gophers' offensive line. In 1967 Minnesota won the Big Ten title.

Under these three men -- Murray, Bruhn and Warmath -- McGee gained experience that will be invaluable to him as a head coach. With these seven years of preparation under his belt, not to mention 10 years of playing at Elizabeth City High, Duke and in the NFL, Mike was ready last December when ECU reached out to pick him as the successor to Clarence Stasavich.

Building the Pirates into a big winner is a challenge for Mike McGee. But this man thrives on challenges. Being successful is largely a matter of pride, says McGee. At East Carolina McGee calls it "Purple Pride."

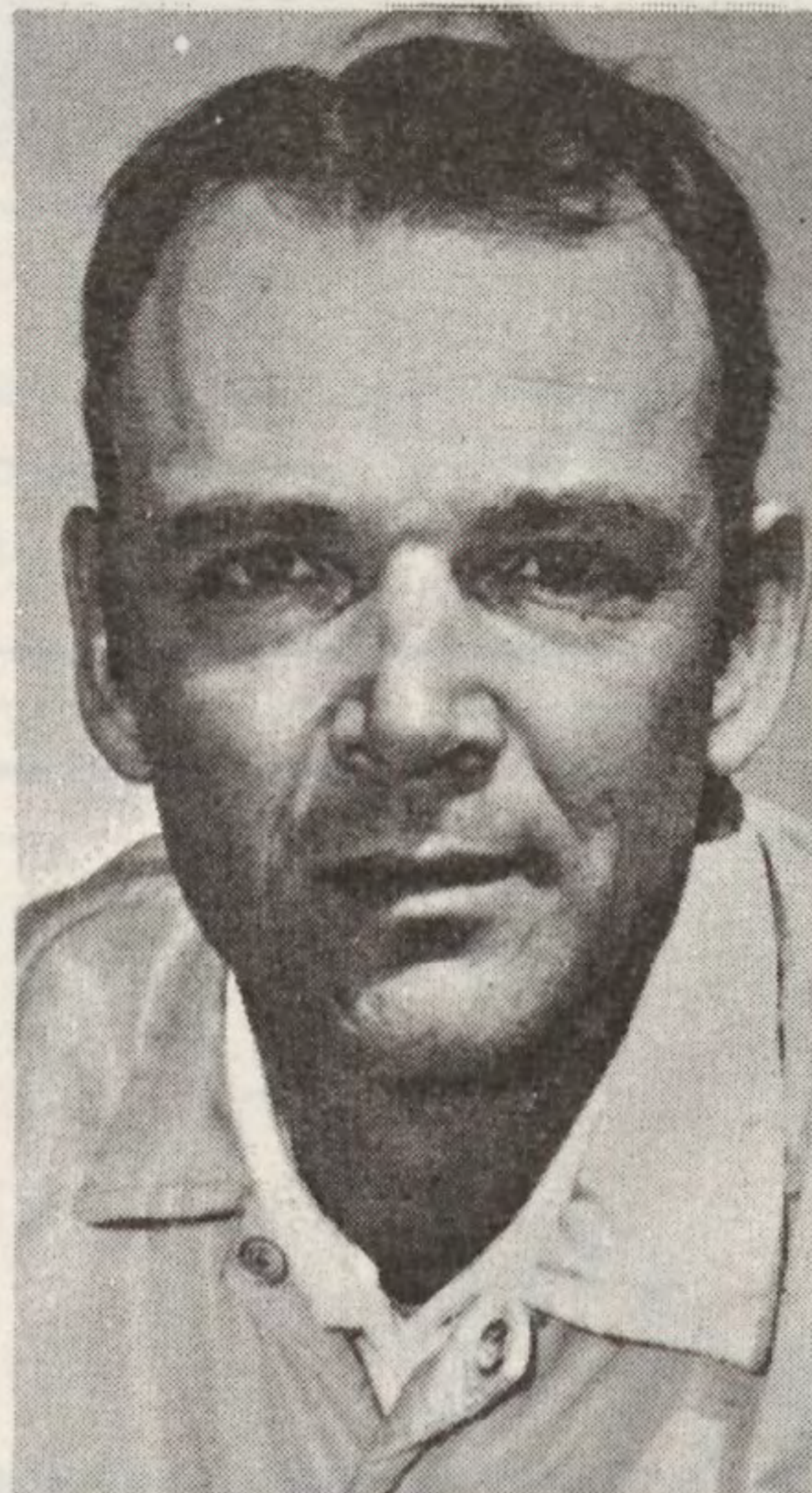

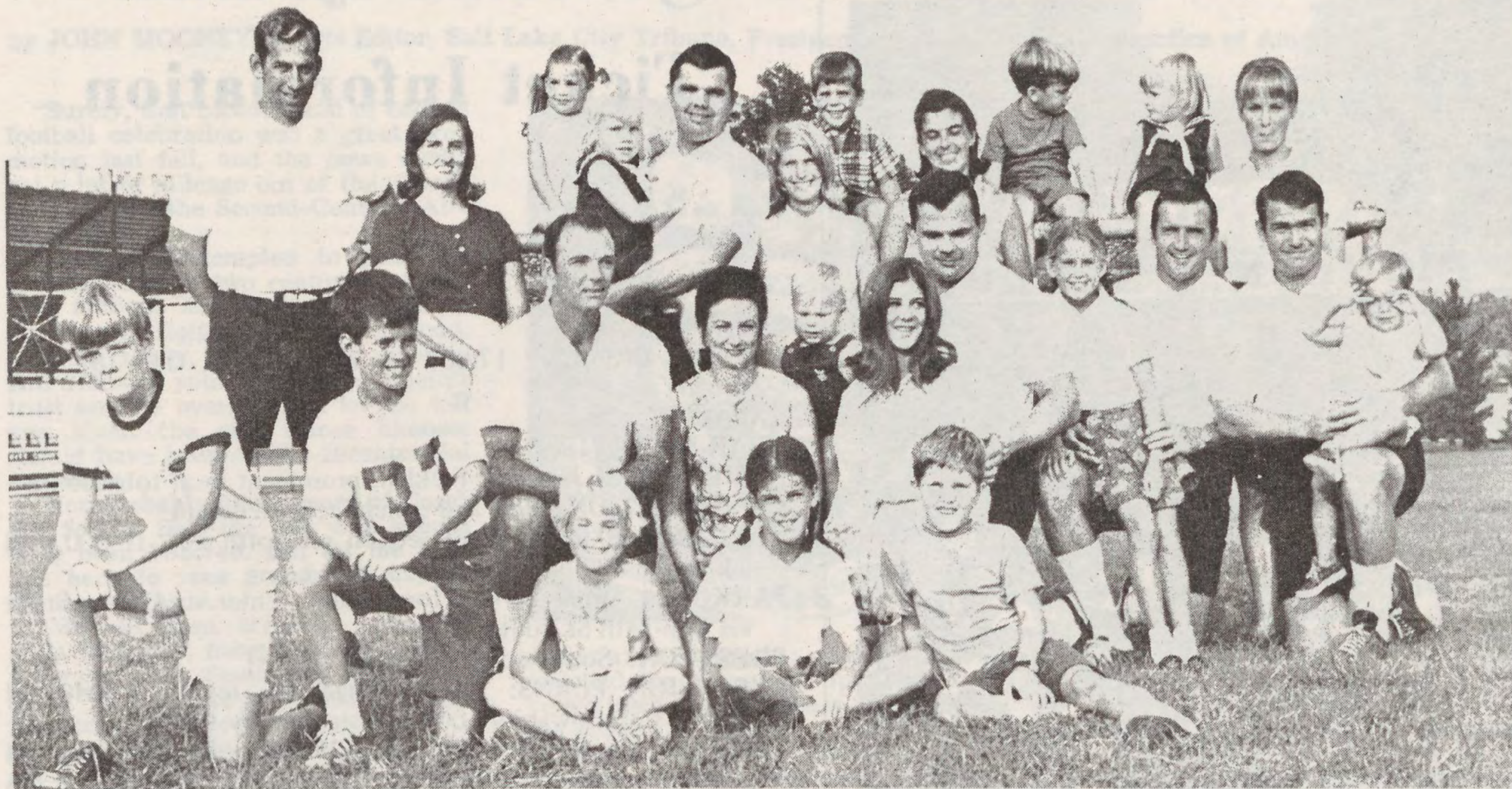

The Story of College Football—Circa 2070

"Surely, that bicentennial of college football celebration was a great promotion last fall, and the news media got a lot of mileage out of the Third-50-Year and the Second-Century All-Time teams.

"One guy attempted to pick the greatest stars of two centuries of college football and chose a couple of guys named Heffelfinger and Nagurski.

"Now, sonny, you're a cub reporter and I know your generation doesn't trust anyone over 65, but let me tell you about the guy whose likeness should have been on the Bicentennial medallion.

"You probably never heard of Coach Joe Smith. He's the guy who should have been honored. But let me take you back to your grandpop's day to show you why . . ."

"Medical men credited improved diets, vitamins, hormones and weight programs with developing super humans. Why, by the year 2000, the All-America offensive guards stood 6-11 and weighed 300 pounds and they could run the 40 in 4.2 seconds.

"Players grew so big there was agitation to widen and lengthen the football field, which was getting as congested as the area under the basket in the ancient game of basketball.

Field Goals Outlawed

"The field goal, which is mentioned frequently in the first 100 years of football, had been voted out. Kickers were booting them from one goal line to the other, so there was a rule passed outlawing the field goal attempt.

"The whole kicking game went out of football at the turn of the century. The shattering crash of those huge linemen mashing each other on the punts and kickoffs had become so devastating the kicks were outlawed to cut down on the carnage.

"You never saw a football coach in those days, except on the television programs. They had left the sidelines and retreated to their command headquarters deep in the bowels of the stadium."

"You couldn't believe these rooms. Coaches were surrounded by closed circuit TV sets, instant replay cameras and micro-wave transmitters beamed to each player on the field and the bench.

"Each coach had a broadcast band, aimed at the players under his command. The defensive coaches had their sets tuned to the front four, the linebackers and the deep backs.

"Across the room the offensive assistants had their head sets beamed to the quarterback, the wide receivers, the interior linemen and the running backs.

Computers Everywhere

"Computers were everywhere in this room. The instant replay was geared to one computer which could break down a play offensively and defensively in micro-seconds.

"Players did not call offensive and



defensive signals; their coaches watched the computers' monitors and yelled instructions to the individuals as the action developed.

"There even was a special counter-intelligence unit in the stadium I visited. There, coaches and computers worked to break the code used by the rival coaches to convey instructions.

"Some coaches, who put winning ahead of ethics, were said to use their facilities to jam the wave lengths of the opponents, and more than one game allegedly was won when the defensive back lost contact with his instructor, when his wave length went dead or was jammed.

"It was the opening game of the 2025 season that Coach Joe Smith revolutionized, yea, saved college football."

"Historians of the First 100 Years can speak of the game's innovators—Rockne, Zuppke, Warner, Shaughnessy, Faurot, Yost—and Stagg—but on this afternoon Smith stood two feet higher than any coach in history.

"Actually, it all started when Coach Smith, in scanning some old rules and regulations, discovered the rules committee had outlawed the use of all instant replays and electronic devices as coaching aids back in the latter years of football's first century.

"Coach Smith checked quietly and found the rules had not been relaxed. Here was a football 'blue law' which hadn't been enforced in 50 years, but it still was on the books.

Individual Initiative

"Smith worked all spring stressing individual initiative in offensive and defensive drills. He gave the entire offensive burden to the quarterback and the defense to the unit captain.

"All electronic gadgets were banned from practice. The coaching staff moved back to the sidelines."

"Just before the opening toss for goals, Smith pulled out his old rule book and his opponent was shorn of his electronic gadgets and his Black Room deep in the stadium. With no coaching help, the rival players were in a shambles and Coach Smith won easily.

"Rival coaches were quick to demand a change in the rules."

"Some called Coach Smith 'anti-quoted' and a 'nit-picker' who did not have the best interest of the game at heart. The Football Coaches Association issued a White Paper to its members and the press corps, warning that the public would never accept such an inferior, non-electronic product.

"The ruling made in the 1960's had to stick, sonny, and you know what happened before the Rules Committee could meet to change the rules?

"The next Saturday, football fans by the millions, who had become accustomed to watching the game at home on TV, suddenly wanted to be a part of the action. The college football stadia around the country were jammed to watch this 'new philosophy' of football.

"The long run and the touchdown bomb, almost unheard of in the highly scientific game of electronic gadgets, became popular.

"The scrambling quarterback, who could turn a busted play into a thrilling gain, the fine running back who broke loose because of his desire and second effort, the defensive ace who dared try something different, became the new heroes.

"Suddenly, college football was a fun game again, sonny."

"A lot of rival coaches used some fancy names to describe the changing game, and mostly, Coach Joe Smith kinda faded from the scene and the glory.

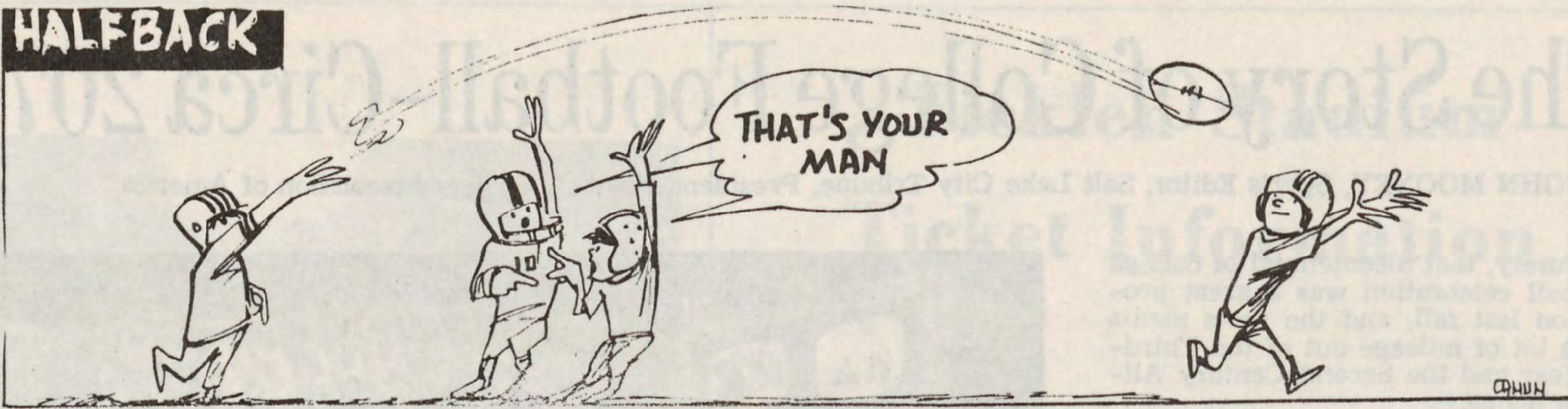
"But I remember (I was just a cub reporter like you, in those days) the quote Coach Smith gave us after that BIG GAME:

"'All I did was give the game back to the boys,' he said. 'And they liked it and so did I. It was fun and I'm glad to see the fans agreed.'"

"And that, sonny, is why you and I are here this afternoon watching college football, along with millions of fans across the nation.

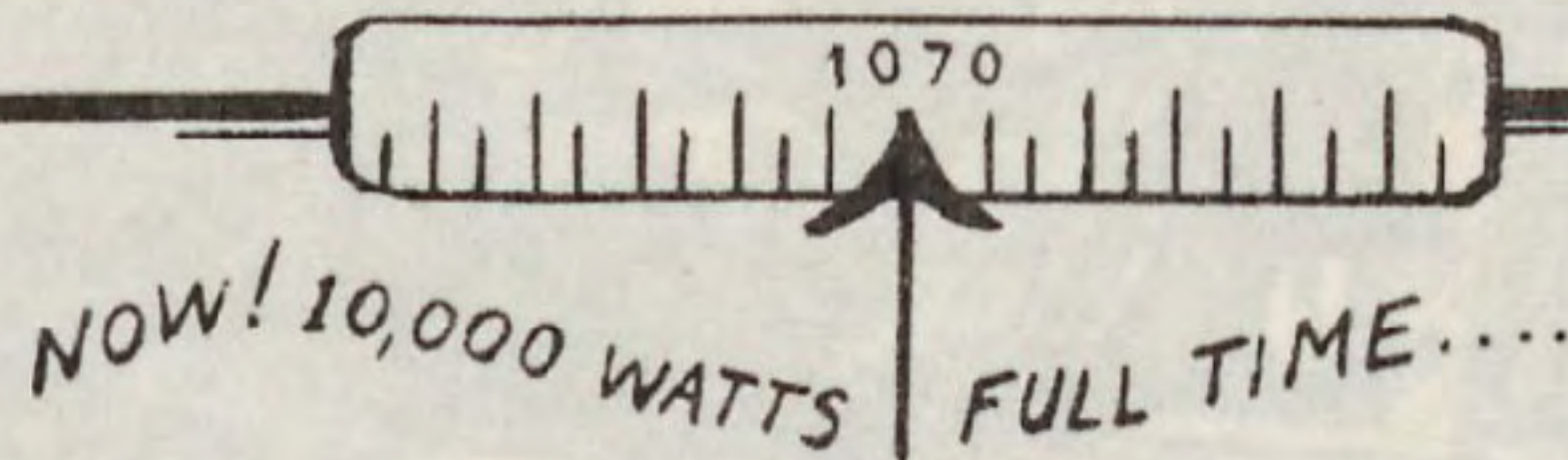
"It's the greatest game in the world, but except for Coach Joe Smith, they would have killed it."

A BIG DAY FOR STAS

To East Carolina University Athletic Director Clarence Stasavich, December 4, 1970, will be one of the most memorable days of his career.

On that day in Charlotte, three North Carolinians are to be inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. "Stas" will be one of them.

At a time when records are being set and considered so important to schools, it should perk up the feathers on the Pirates' parrot to know that "Stas" has set a "first" for East Carolina University. He will be the first from ECU to be inducted into the state's Hall of Fame.

It's not unusual for outstanding athletes to turn to coaching after their playing years are over. "Stas" was no exception, but the success he has enjoyed in the coaching ranks separates him from the crowd.

"Stas" first came to Greenville in 1962, as the Pirates' head football coach. A year later he assumed the dual role of athletic director and football coach. Last December he relinquished his football duties to devote full time to the ever-expanding job of directing an athletic program at a major university.

A virtual legend in his own time in the western part of the state, Stasavich built a small college football powerhouse at Lenoir Rhyne in Hickory, where he coached from 1946 to 1961. His Lenoir Rhyne teams won nine Carolinas Conference titles and in 1960 claimed the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics national title.

His string of successes continued when he came east to Greenville in 1962. Three of his East Carolina teams in succession posted 9-1 records and won bowl games [1963-64-65]. In the second year his Pirates were members of the Southern Conference [1966], ECU shared the conference title. His overall record at East Carolina was 50-25-1. His eight years as head coach marked the most successful period in the school's 38-year gridiron history.

When you add this record at East Carolina to his Lenoir Rhyne accomplishments, you come up with a remarkable lifetime record of 170 wins, 64 losses and 8 ties as a college head coach. At the time he retired last December, there were only two other active coaches with more victories than Stasavich - Paul [Bear] Bryant of Alabama and Johnny Vaught of Ole Miss.

A member of the Helms Hall of Fame, Stasavich has been honored as National Coach of the Year twice [1959 and 1964] and District Coach of the Year five times.

Born February 9, 1913 at Georgetown, Ill., Stasavich graduated from Georgetown Township High School in 1931. In September of that year he came to North Carolina for the first time - as an undergraduate at Lenoir Rhyne. He earned an A.B. degree in science there in 1935 and added his M.A. at the University of North Carolina in 1946. He was on the Honor Roll as a senior at Lenoir Rhyne and was named to the Mu Sigma Epsilon honor society.



In addition to distinguishing himself as a student, Stasavich blazed the trail of glory on the athletic field, playing four years of football, four years of basketball, two years of tennis and one year of baseball for Lenoir Rhyne. An offensive end, fullback and defensive tackle in his football career, "Stas" won All-Conference honors three years. He achieved the same distinction as a basketball player. Twice, in 1934 and 1935, he was named to the Charlotte Observer's Flaming Five, an annual recognition of the top five all-around athletes in North and South Carolina.

His first venture into coaching came in 1935 at Campbell College in Buies Creek where he was football line coach, head basketball coach and assistant baseball coach. After three years at Campbell, "Stas" returned to his alma mater in 1938 as football line coach, assistant basketball coach and head tennis coach. His tennis teams won two conference championships.

World War II interrupted his coaching career in 1942. Stasavich entered the U.S. Navy and served with distinction in the European, Mediterranean and Pacific theaters as an LST commander.

After discharge from the service in 1946, he returned to Lenoir Rhyne - this time as head football coach and athletic director. It didn't take long for "Stas" to build his reputation as a winner. In 16 years as head coach at the Hickory School, Stasavich compiled a spectacular 120-37-7 record and won conference championships in 1951-52-55-56-57-58-59-60-61. Today he still looks back on the 1960 National Championship as his "biggest thrill in coaching."

The single wing was Stasavich's offense. In 1969 he was the last remaining advocate of this exciting formation in the major college ranks. He has authored numerous articles on football in general and the single wing in particular.

"Stas" is married to the former Helen Warlick of Hickory and they are the parents of three grown children - Rebecca Ann, Mary Helen and Walter Lewis.

AN OPEN LETTER TO YOUTH

...from an Olympic Athlete

(Cliff Cushman, a member of the 1960 U.S. Olympic team and a University of Kansas all-time track great, suffered a stunning disappointment at the 1964 U.S. Olympic Trials. Having finished second in the 400 meter hurdles in 1960 at Rome, he was a top candidate for a gold medal in 1964. But he hit and tripped over a hurdle in the Trials and fell to the track, eliminated from the competition and the Games. When messages of sympathy poured in, Cushman replied with a stirring open letter to the youth of his home town, Grand Forks, N. Dak. In the fall of 1966, Captain Cliff Cushman, USAF, was shot down over Viet Nam and is now listed as missing in action. EDITOR)

Don't feel sorry for me. I feel sorry for some of you!

You may have seen the U.S. Olympic Trials on television September 13. If so, you watched me hit the fifth hurdle, fall and lie on the track in an inglorious heap of skinned elbows, bruised hips, torn knees, and injured pride, unsuccessful in my attempt to make the Olympic team for the second time. In a split second all the many years of training, pain, sweat, blisters and agony of running were simply and irrevocably wiped out.

But I tried! I would much rather fail knowing I had put forth an honest effort than never to have tried at all.

This is not to say that everyone is capable of making the Olympic Team. However, each of you is capable of trying to make your own personal "Olympic Team," whether it be the high school football team, the glee club, the honor roll, or whatever your goal may be. Unless your reach exceeds your grasp, how can you be sure what you can attain? And don't you think there are things better than cigarettes, hot-rod cars, school dropouts, excessive make-up, and duck-tail grease-cuts?

Over 15 years ago I saw a star—first place in the Olympic Games. I literally started to run after it. In 1960 I came within three yards of grabbing it; this year I stumbled, fell and watched it recede four more years away. Certainly, I was very disappointed in falling flat on my face. However, there is nothing I can do about it now but get up, pick the cinders from my wounds, and take one more step followed by one more and one more, until the steps turn into miles and the miles into success.

I know I may never make it. The odds are against me but I have something in my favor—desire and faith. Romans 5:3-5 has always had an inspirational meaning to me in this regard. "... we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us..." At least I am going to try.

How About You?

How about you? Would a little extra effort on your part bring up your grade average? Would you have a better chance to make the football team if you stayed an extra 15 minutes after practice and worked on your blocking?

Let me tell you something about yourselves. You are taller and heavier than any past generation in this country. You are spending more money, enjoying more freedom, and driving more cars than ever before, yet many of you are very unhappy. Some of you have never known the satisfaction of doing your best in sports, the joy of excelling in class, the wonderful feeling of completing a job, any job, and looking back on it knowing that you have done your best.

I dare you to have your hair cut and not wilt under the comments of your so-called friends. I dare you to clean up your language. I dare you to honor your mother and father. I dare you to go to church without having to be compelled to go by your parents. I dare you to unselfishly help someone less fortunate than yourself and enjoy the wonderful feeling that goes with it.

I dare you to become physically fit. I dare you to read a book that is not required in school. I dare you to look up at the stars, not down at the mud, and set your sights on one of them that, up to now, you thought was unattainable. There is plenty of room at the top, but no room for anyone to sit down.

Who knows? You may be surprised at what you can achieve with sincere effort. So get up, pick the cinders out of your wounds and take one more step.

I dare you!

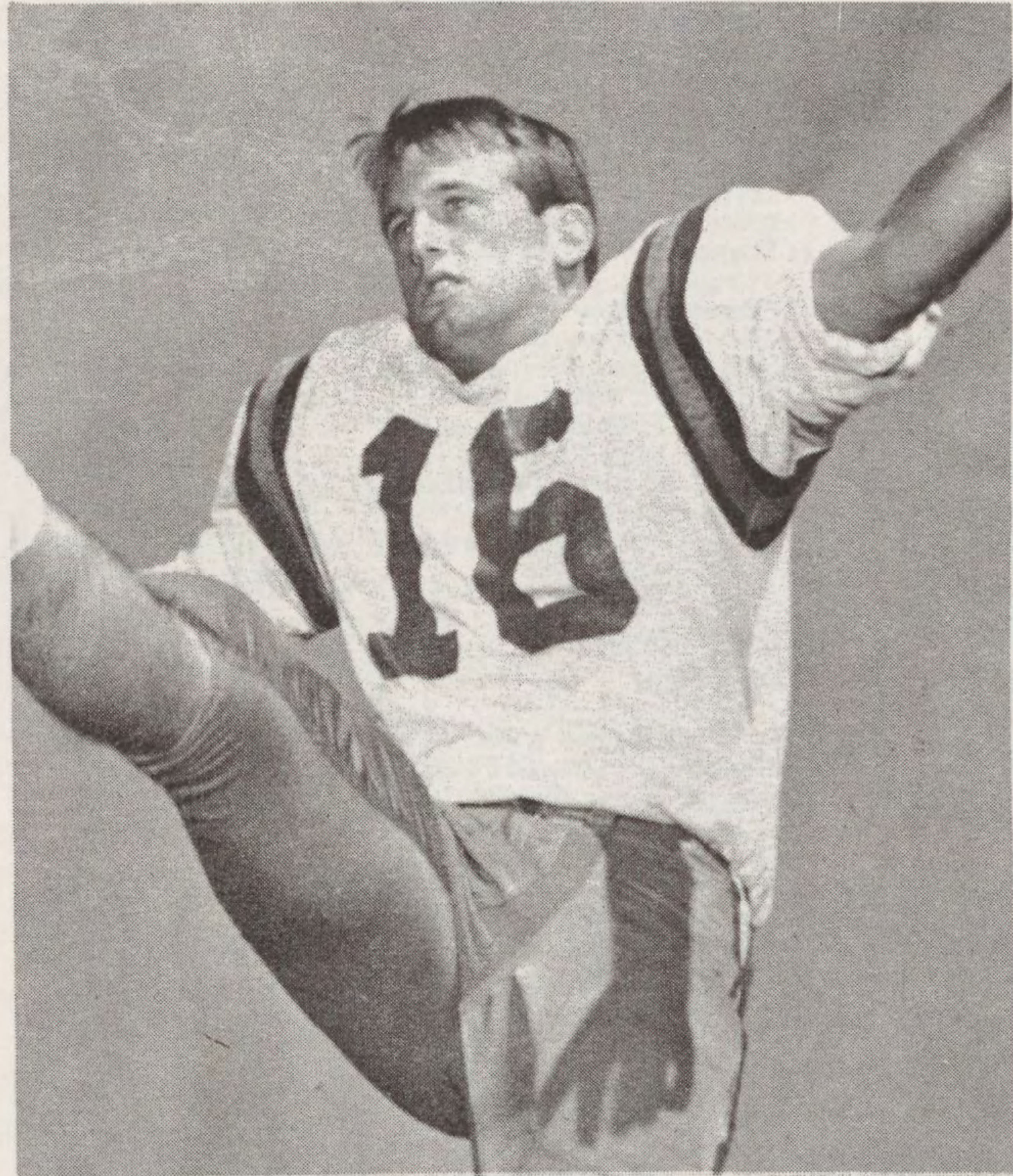
Robert Faris Football Scholarship

Noting The Players

EAST CAROLINA OFFENSIVELY

Pirates displayed one of their most balanced attacks last Saturday against tough West Virginia, running for 146 yards and passing for 197 yards. . Tailback Les Strayhorn is flashing that top form again after being bothered by a bad ankle since second game of season. Against West Virginia, the speedy soph gained 87 yards in 21 carries. . Flanker Dick Corrada, making his final home appearance this weekend, still needs 160 yards to break the career yards receiving record at ECU. The mark of 1,023 yards is held by Dave Bumgarner (1962-64). Corrada holds all other Pirate records for number of catches and yards receiving – single game, season and career. He caught only one pass for 16 yards last week, however. . There are no changes in the starting lineup offensively this week. Guard David Callahan was shaken up last week in the loss to West Virginia, but will play against Marshall. . Coach McGee was extremely pleased with the play of four players on offense last week – tackle Mike Kopp (“He opened up one big hole after another on the left side”), quarterback John Casazza (“Probably his best game”) and runningbacks Billy Wallace and Strayhorn. . Tony Maglione continues as one of top punters in Southern Conference with his 36.8 average per kick.

MARSHALL OFFENSIVELY

Thundering Herd's two quarterbacks are completely different in style. Bob Harris is a scrambler who loves to run. Ted Shoebridge, who shattered many school passing records last season but has been bothered by bad shoulder this year, is more the classic drop-back passer. Both men like to throw deep – and the favorite receivers are backs Art Harris and Joe Hood. . Hood grew up in Tuscaloosa, Ala., in Bear Bryant's shadow. He scored 172 points his senior year and is regarded as the Herd's most dangerous back by the ECU coaches. He's 6-1, 200 pounds and has great speed, balance and the knack of breaking loose for the long runs. . Against Kent State last week Marshall rushed for 232 yards, the first time the Herd has passed the 200 mark since 1965. . It all adds up to a balanced offense and placekicking specialist Marcelo Lajterman gives Marshall a real scoring punch anytime the Herd crosses the opponents' 40 yard-line. The soccer-style booter has kicked one 42-yard field goal this fall and just missed a 56-yarder. He's from Lyndhurst, N.J. and was a high school teammate of quarterback Shoebridge.

MARSHALL DEFENSIVELY

The two best defensive performers have been tackle Tom Brown and cornerback Larry Sanders. . The four leading tacklers on the team are all transfers from Ferrum, (Va.) Junior College. They are end Dave Griffith, linebacker Art Shannon, guard Jerry Stainbeck and tackle Brown. There are two other Ferrum products on the team – starting offensive guard Pat Norrell and No. 2 defensive end Tom Zborill. . Only comparative score for ECU and Marshall is the Toledo game for both teams. Pirates lost to Toledo by 35-2 count, Herd fell by 52-3 score. . Marshall has had trouble stopping its opponents this year, but there is no particular weak point. Team has been bothered by rushing attack in some games and by enemy's passing in other games.

EAST CAROLINA DEFENSIVELY

Safety Mike Mills, a senior from Statesville, is Southern Conference “Defensive Player of the Week” this week for his fine job against West Virginia. He made 11 primary tackles, had nine assists, broke up several passes and played a fine allround game. Although Mountaineers gained a lot of yards passing, it was not in Mills' zone. Mills had been bothered by knee injury most of this season and didn't really come around until Furman game, when he broke up what looked like a TD pass to preserve Pirates' 7-0 win in that one. . McGee also praised cornerbacks George Whitley and Tom Pulley and tackle Rich Peeler for their performance against West Virginia. . More injuries have hit the defense. Tackle Tim Tyler is probably out for last two games with knee problem. Linebackers Monty Kiernan and Terry Johnson were both hurt in West Virginia contest, but will play. . Dick Paddock, normally a deep back, will be used to back up middle linebacker Ralph Betesh this week. And Wes Rothrock, who backed up Betesh last Saturday, is back at his familiar starting job at end.



One of the real bright spots for the Pirates this season has been the play of split end Carl Gordon. The junior from Jacksonville, Fla., has caught 28 passes for 392 yards. Against West Virginia last week he caught a 33-yard TD pass.

PIRATES OF THE PAST



BILL CLINE (Class of '65)

When Bill Cline finished his East Carolina football career in 1964, he had left behind some big shoes to fill. The records he amassed as a single wing tailback were numerous. A native of Valdese, Cline still holds the career yardage record at EC, 3,833 for his three-years. His single game record of 257 also still stands, as well as his career passing mark of 2,425. Cline led the Bucs to two bowl victories including a come-from-behind 14-13 win over Massachusetts in the 1964 Tangerine Bowl, in which he was named the Outstanding Player. Cline was also the MVP winner for the school his senior year, as well as getting All-State and Little All-American honors. Following his college career, he played for two years with the Ottawa Rough Riders in the Canadian League, and now is in business with his brother, Doug, a former Clemson and Houston Oilers star, in Charlotte.



TED DAY (Class of '64)

A native of Washington, N.C., Ted Day was one of the chief reasons for the long gaining ability of Bill Cline. Day was one of the offensive guards on the Pirate line that made the holes and threw the blocks to spring Cline loose. He also played on two bowl teams prior to his graduation in 1964, and was also an All-Stater. He received an honorable mention on the Little All-American team. For two years, 1962 and 1963, he was named the outstanding blocker on the Pirate team. Following his college career, Day joined the faculty of Washington High School, where he now serves as an assistant football coach.



GEORGE WHEELER (Class of '70)

George Wheeler is familiar to most of the fans of the Pirates, having just finished his collegiate career in 1969. A native of Buena Vista, Va., Wheeler was a defensive guard for the Pirates in the closing days of the single-wing offense. He was a starter for all three of his varsity years. Twice he was named Southern Conference Lineman of the Week. He also was the winner of the Norm Swindell Leadership Award in 1968, and was named to the Southern Conference Defensive Team his senior year. He was the winner of the Lansche Outstanding Senior Award his senior year. Married to the former Brenda Huffman of Buena Vista, Wheeler is currently a graduate assistant with the Pirate coaching staff.

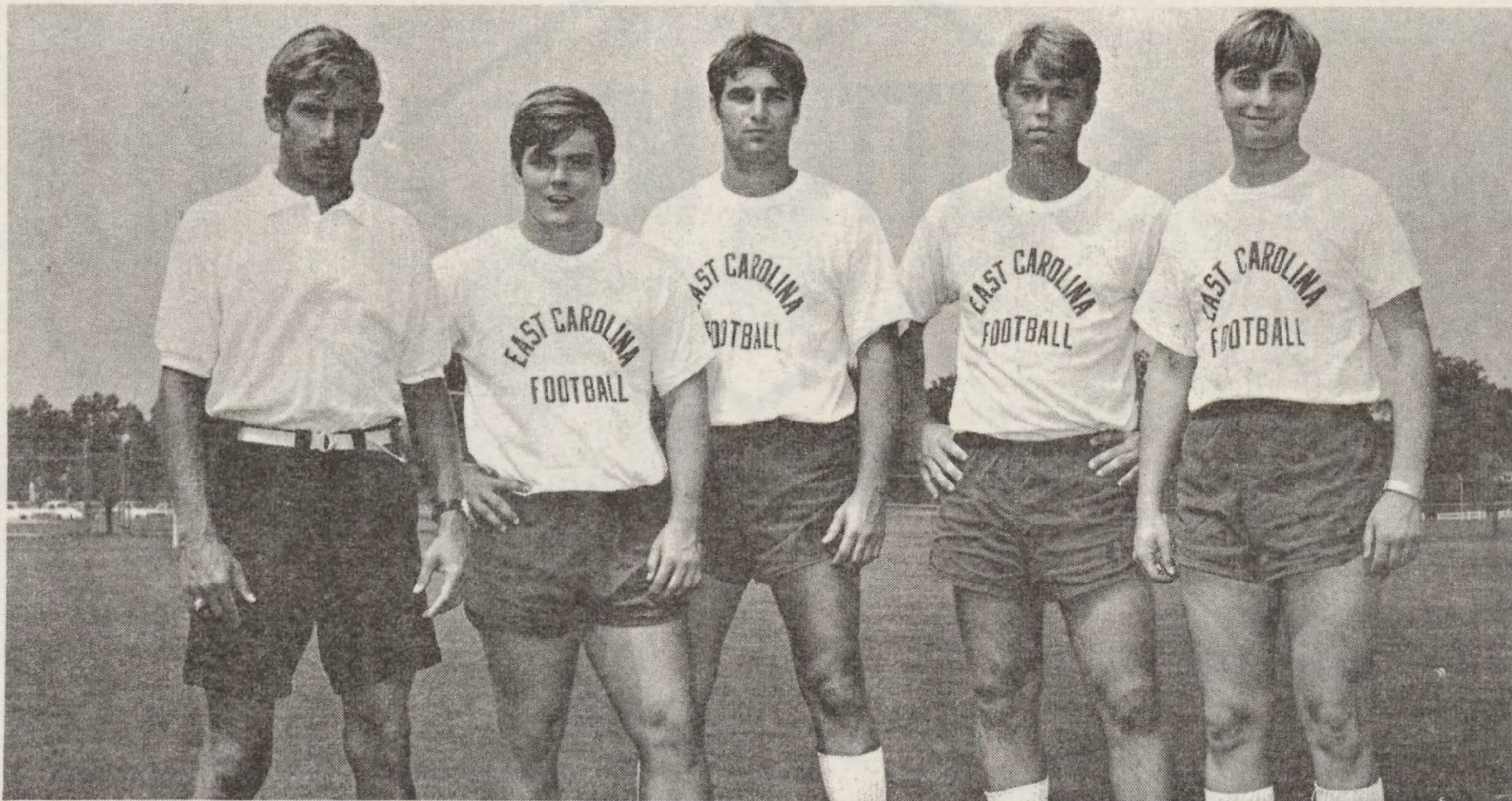

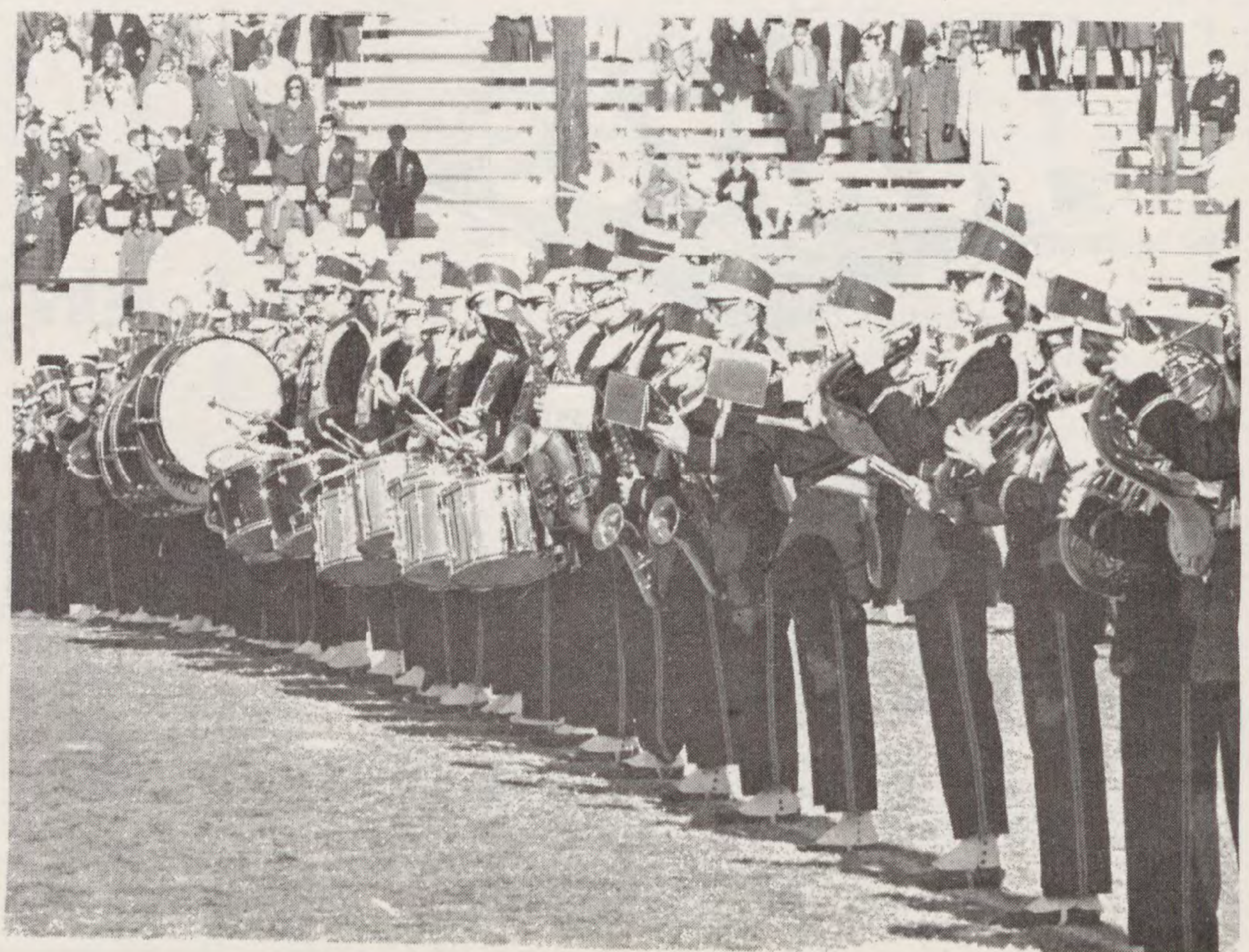

After giving highly regarded West Virginia a big scare last Saturday, East Carolina is shooting for a victory today as the Pirates take on another team from the Mountaineer state — Marshall University.

This is the last game Coach Mike McGee's men will play before the home folks this season.

It is a day full of festivities, billed as Legislature Day, High School Day and Parachute Day all rolled into one. A team of four jumpers from a Fort Bragg Parachute Club will perform before today's game and following the game there will be a Purple-Gold Basketball Game at 5 p.m. in Minges Coliseum and a Purple-Gold Swimming Meet at 4:30 p.m. in Minges Natatorium. Many state legislators and government officials plus a large number of high school groups have been invited to Ficklen Stadium today.

McGee's Pirates put on quite a show themselves last Saturday in a 28-14 loss to West Virginia, which came into the contest favored by as much as 40 points. John Casazza fired touchdown passes of 33 yards to Carl Gordon and 66 yards to Billy Wallace and, for a while in the second half, it looked like the Pirate quarterback might engineer the biggest upset in the school's history.

However, the Mountaineers' own passing attack prevailed. ECU actually outgained West Virginia's famed rushing offense — 146 yards to 92 yards — and this was what forced the visitors to the air. Tailback Les Strayhorn, having one of his best games, gained 89 of those 146 yards and fullback Wallace added 61. Tackle Mike Kopp was credited with opening one big hole after another in the left side of the line.

Meanwhile, the Pirate defense was being led by tackle Rich Peeler, cornerback George Whitley and deep backs Mike Mills and Tom Pulley. It all but stopped the West Virginia ground game which had been averaging 260.7 yards per game. Later the Mountaineers isolated receivers on Pirate linebackers and moved through the air.

"I was real pleased with the way our men fought," said McGee after the loss, the Pirates' eighth in nine games this season. "In many ways this was our best performance of the season."

Safety Mills, a senior from Statesville, was honored for his great defensive performance by being named "Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Week." He is the third Pirate to receive the award this season, Whitley and Peeler having earned it earlier this fall.

Marshall, located in Huntington, W. Va., brings a 3-5 record to Greenville. However, three of those losses were by a total of 11 points and could have easily been victories which would have made the Thundering Herd's record 8-2. Coach Rick Tolley's club defeated Kent State 20-17 last weekend, snapping a four-game losing streak. Earlier victories came against Morehead State 17-7 and Xavier 31-14. The losses were to Toledo 52-3, Miami of Ohio 19-12, Louisville 16-14, Western Michigan 34-3 and Bowling Green 26-24.

"Marshall is an exciting team to watch," said ECU aide Al Ferguson, who scouted the Herd's win over Kent State. "They try something new every game on offense... their quarterback scrambles a lot and they run a lot of deep pass patterns. They also have an excellent running back in Joe Hood (No. 33)."

Ted Shoebridge (No. 14), a classic drop-back passer, started the season as the No. 1 quarterback, but has a bad shoulder and has played very little recently. Taking over has been scrambler Bob Harris (No. 12), who loves to run.

When Harris joins with halfbacks Hood and Art Harris (No. 22), in the backfield, the Herd possesses a potent ground attack. Against Kent State, Marshall rushed for 232 yards — the first time the Herd has been over the 200 mark since 1965. Although Art Harris has been Marshall's top ball carrier, it is the speedster Hood who impresses ECU coaches the most.

"He scored 172 points his senior year in high school in Tuscaloosa, Ala.," said Ferguson. "He is a cross between those speedy West Texas backs and Jim Braxton of West Virginia."

Leading the Thundering Herd defense are cornerback Larry Sanders (No. 40) and tackle Tom Brown (No. 65).

Then there's the Herd's most dangerous weapon in a close game — kicker Marcelo Lajterman (No. 23), who has booted seven field goals and 13 of 14 extra points this year. His longest field goal has been a 42-yarder, but he just missed a 56-yarder against Louisville. He's also averaging 38.8 yards as a punter.

The Pirates will have a few more changes in their starting lineup as injuries continue to take their toll, particularly on defense. Linebackers Monty Kiernan and Terry Johnson both were hurt in the West Virginia game, but should play. However, tackle Tim Tyler may be out for good with a knee injury and will be replaced in the front four by tackle Chuck Zadnik.

Also, Wes Rothrock, who worked at linebacker last week, is back at defensive end, replacing Jim Gudger as the starter on the quick side.

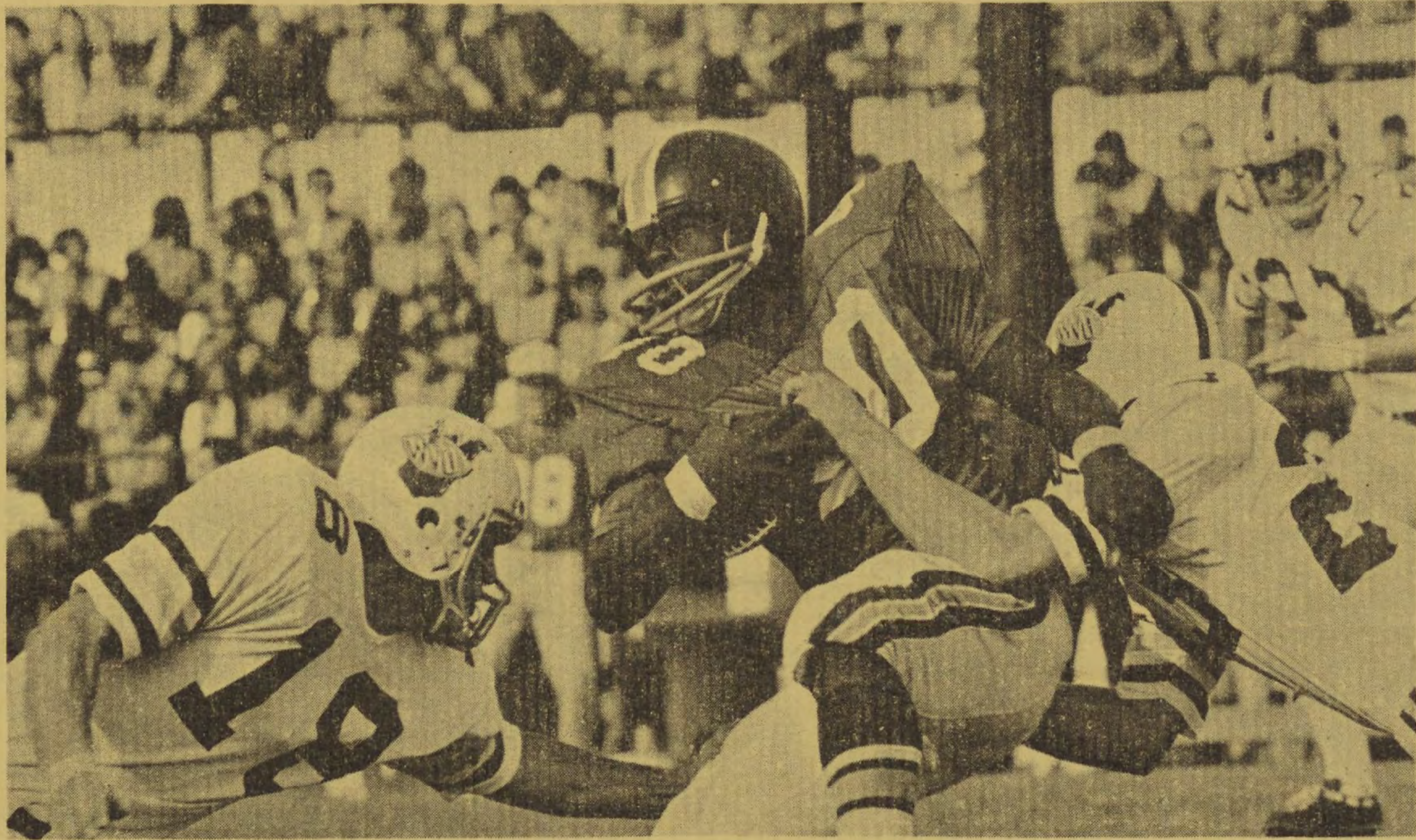
The offense remains in fairly good shape. Guard David Callahan was shaken up last Saturday but will play against Marshall. The starting backfield is the same with Casazza at quarterback, Wallace and Strayhorn at running-backs and Carl Gordon and Dick Corrada at the wide receiver spots.

Making their final home appearance for the Pirates will be seniors Steve Davis (offensive guard and co-captain), Corrada, Dwight Flanagan (flanker), Rothrock, Gudger, Mike McGuirk (defensive end), Butch Britton (linebacker), Mills, Pulley, and Whitley (co-captain). Two other seniors, Gerald Wrenn (cornerback) and Tyler (defensive tackle), will be on the sidelines due to injuries.

The Pirates close out their season Nov. 28 at Davidson.

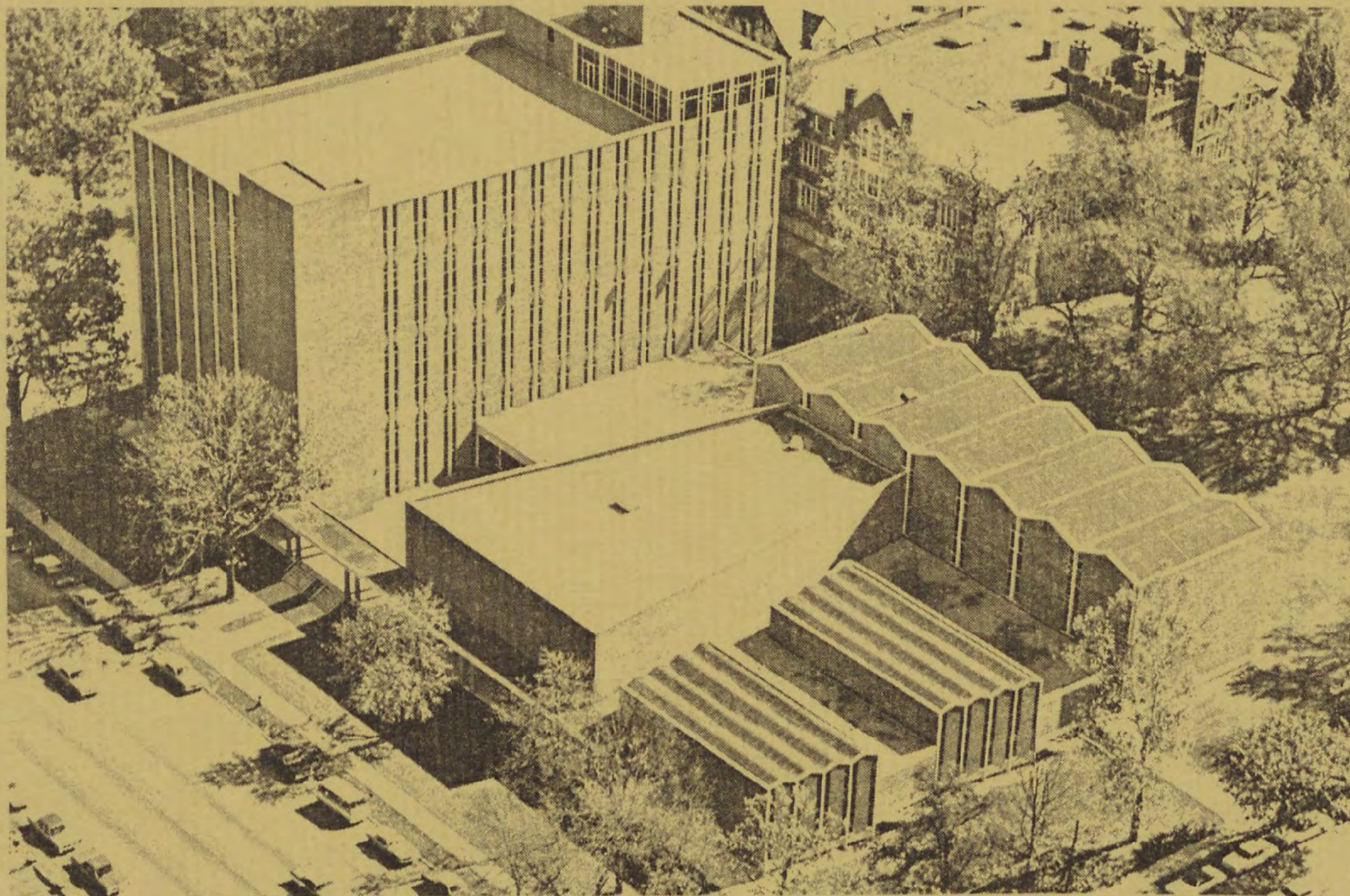
