The Citadel heads into today's game with three straight big wins against Vanderbilt, Appalachian State and Western Carolina, bringing the Bulldogs record to 3 and 2 for the season.

In last week's game against Western Carolina, quarterback Tim Russell ran for two third quarter touchdowns to give the Bulldogs a 21-19 Win.

An interesting fact about The Citadel and second year head coach Art Baker, is that Coach Baker seems to have molded the offense to resemble the one he used at Furman. Defensively, Baker has not changed the Citadel look, which has proven to give East Carolina problems in years past.

Coming off an open date this past weekend, the Pirates have had a chance to rest up both physically and mentally. "It also gives us a chance to go back and stress the basics and fundamentals and brush up on techniques that we neglect from week to week when we play every Saturday," Coach Dye added.

Coach Dye feels that the offensive unit may be operating at its best ever. This fact can be reinforced by the Pirates current standing among the Southern Independents and the NCAA. East Carolina in its five games to date, have averaged 414.0 yards per game, two better than Virginia Tech, which is second among the 13 schools that make up the Southern Independents. Nationally, East Carolina ranks 13th offensively behind national leader Alabama (493.7 yards).

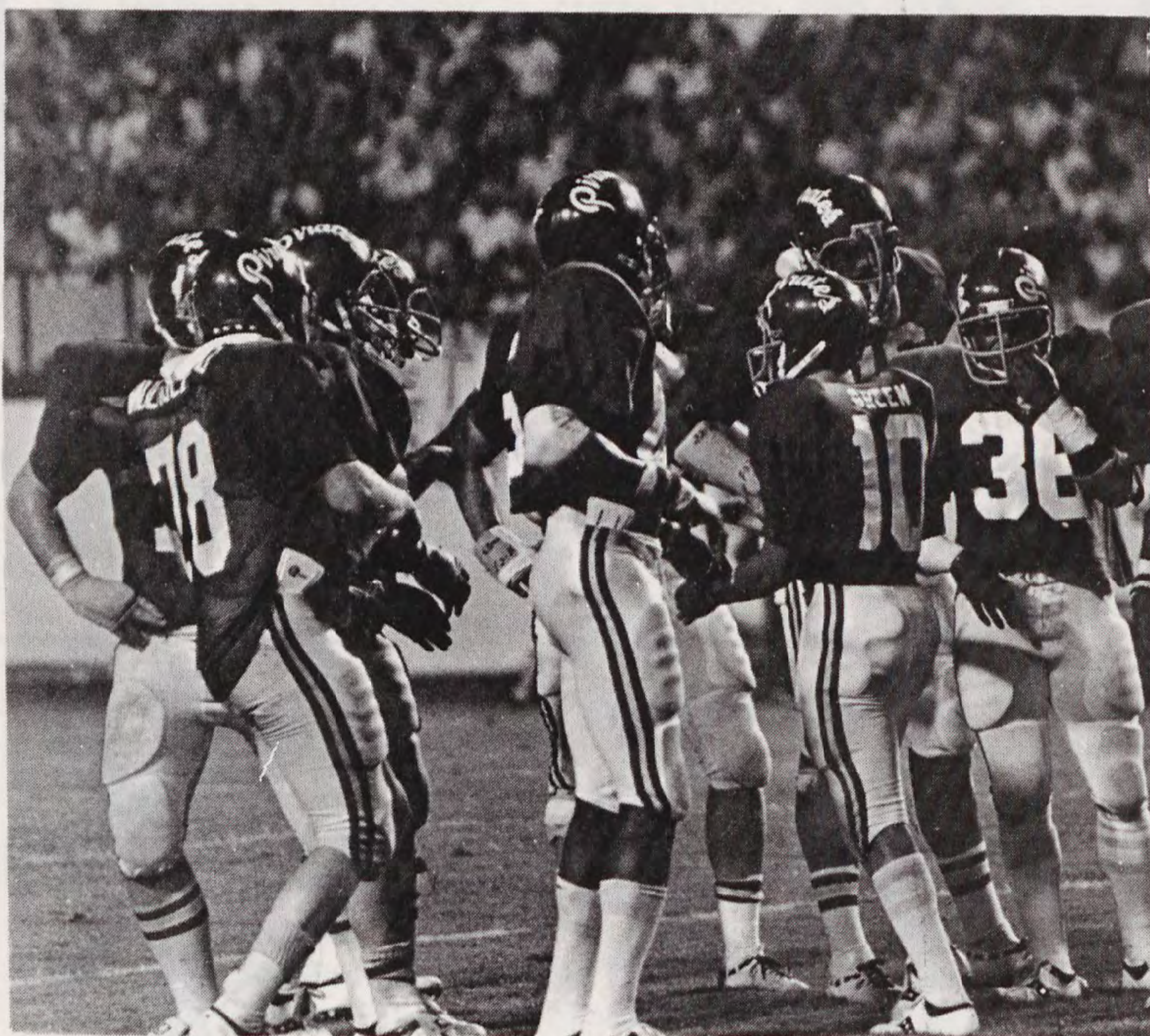
The Pirates also lead the Southern group in rushing offense with 304.2 yards a game. Virginia Tech is again second with 283.5 yards. Nationally, the Pirates rank sixth behind the leader Alabama (404.7 yards).

The time off this past weekend will also give the Pirates a chance to recover from some injuries, although three players will more than likely miss today's game. Noah Clark, defensive tackle, was injured in practice the week before the VMI game. He along with Joe Godette, hurt against N.C. State, are expected to miss today's contest.

Defensive end Brian McDaniel was injured in the VMI game and will miss the rest of the season following surgery.

At halftime of today's game, we will recognize our 1979 East Carolina Sports Hall of Fame inductees. This year's inductees are Dr. Ray Martinez, former ECU swimming coach; Carlton Barnes, Former ECU Baseball standout; Lex Ridenhour, Sr., former ECU all sport great; and Ike Riddick, former ECU Basketball standout.

Congratulations to these former athletes for their contributions to East Carolina Athletics.



ECU OFFENSIVE UNIT

Another outstanding athlete to be recognized at today's game is East Carolina track All-America Otis Melvin. The slender 200-meter performer from Fayetteville competed in the World University Games in Mexico City last month. "I really feel I can run with anybody now," Otis said recently. "I really get fired up when I'm running against great competition. That's when I know I'll be at my best."

Melvin was named the outstanding runner in the Pitt Invitational after winning the 100 and 200 meters. In the Mexico City Games, Melvin won his first trial heat and was the only American in the final. He was running for a medal when he pulled a muscle in his leg with 30 yards to go.

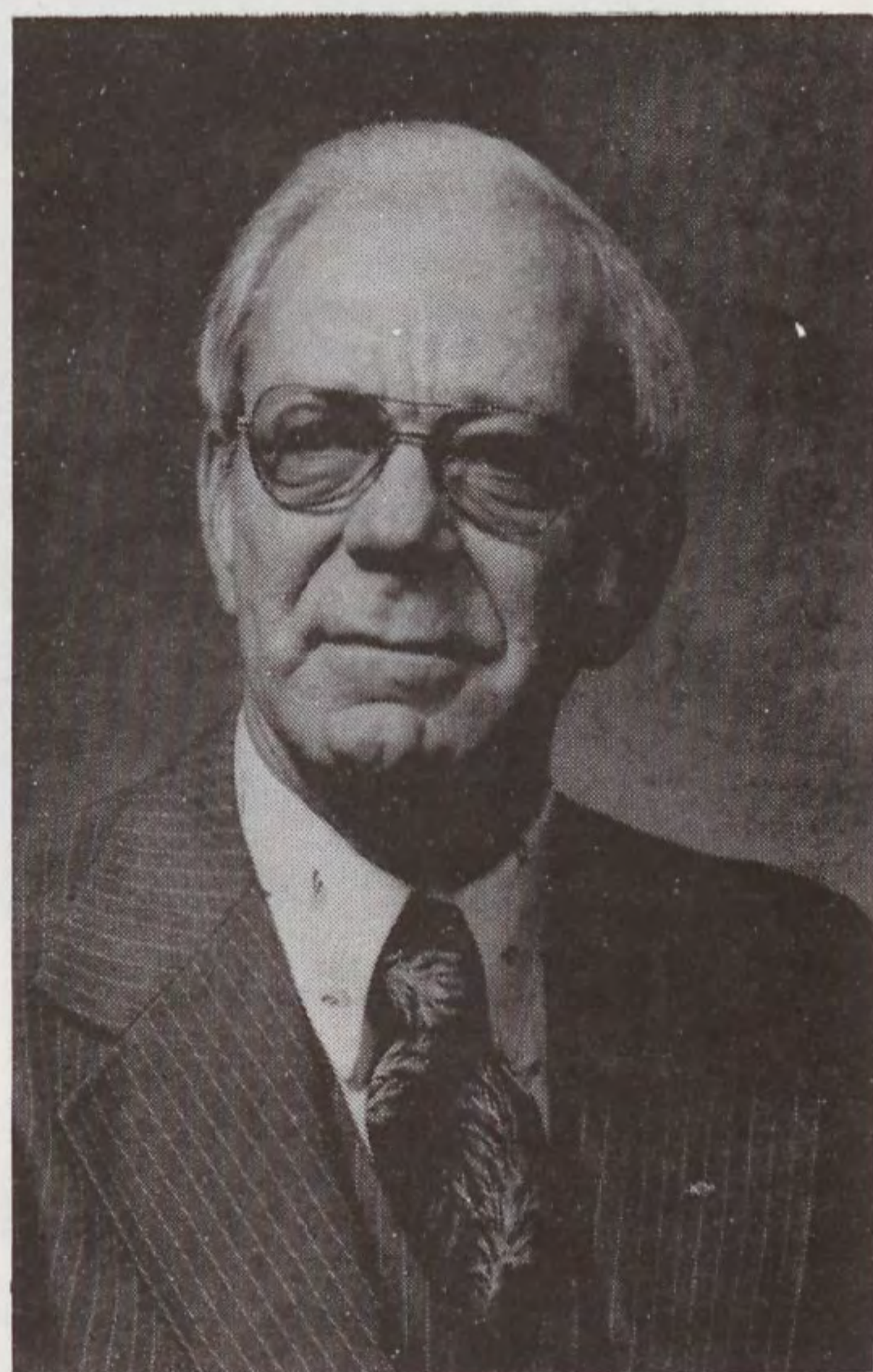

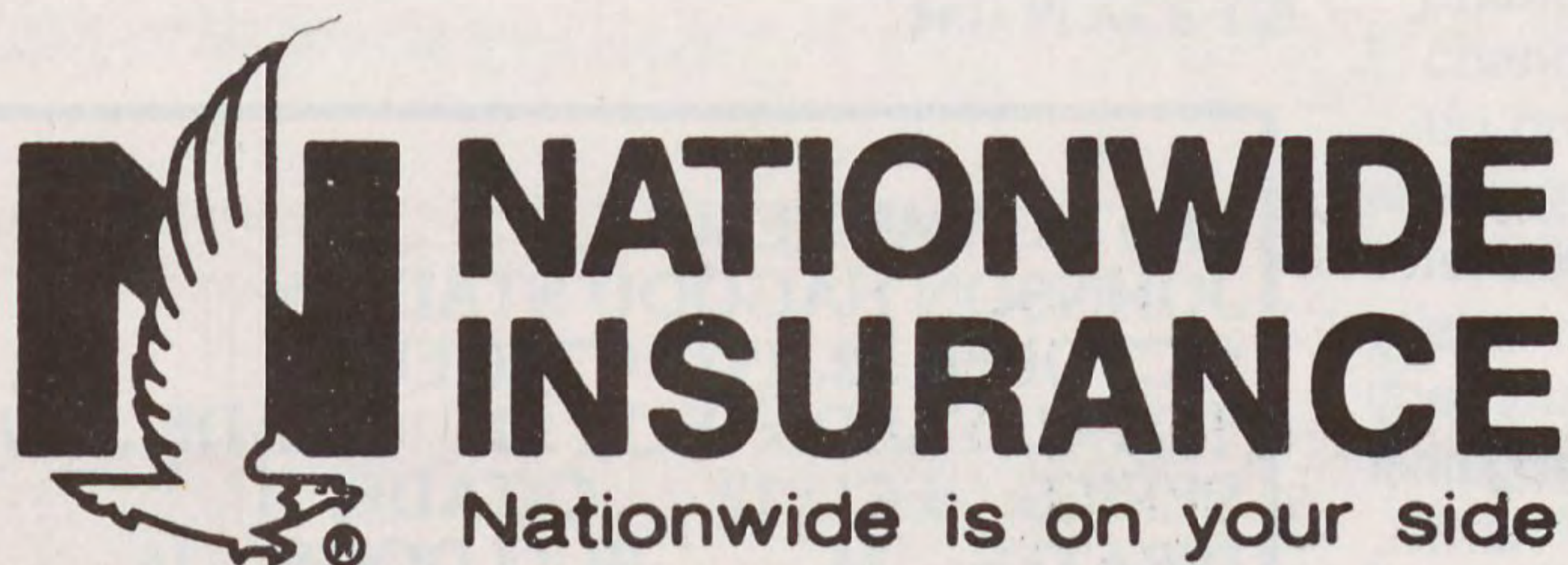

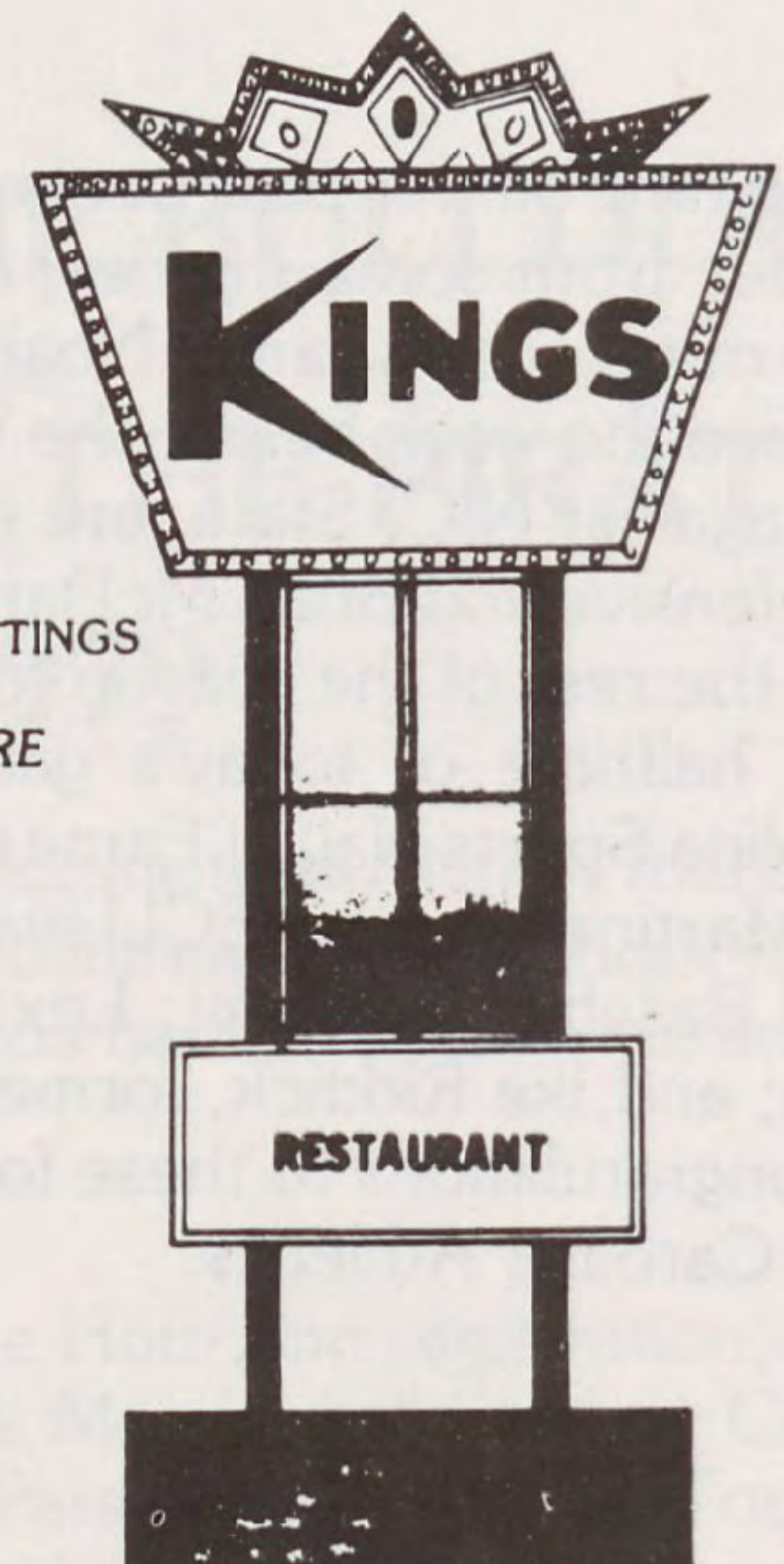

# william c. friday

President William C. Friday, President of the 16-member University of North Carolina system, was born in Virginia on July 13, 1920, but spent his boyhood in Dallas, North Carolina, where he was a debater, played baseball and wrote sports for the Gastonia Gazette.

After one year at Wake Forest College, he transferred to North Carolina State University and was graduated in textile engineering in 1941. He was an outstanding student and served afterwards as Assistant to the Dean of Students at N.C. State.

He was a Naval officer in World War II. After the war he entered the Law School at the University in Chapel Hill, and was graduated in 1948. He accepted a position as Assistant Dean of Students at UNC at Chapel Hill and in 1951 was appointed administrative assistant to Gordon Gray, president of the University.

Later, he was given the title, Secretary of the University. When Mr. Gray resigned the presidency in 1955 and when his temporary successor, J. Harris Purks, also resigned, Mr. Friday was named Acting President.

He was named President of the University in 1956. Mr. Friday has served on numerous national educational boards and commissions. He was a member of the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education, 1967-1973. He served as chairman of the President's Task Force on Education, 1966-67, and as chairman of the executive committee, President's Commission on White House Fellows, 1965-68.

In May, 1971, Mr. Friday succeeded President Nathan Pusey of Harvard University as head of the prestigious Association of American Universities, comprised of the top 48 institutions of higher learning in the United States and Canada.

In November, 1970, he was elected chairman of the board of trustees of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. A director of the John and Mary R. Markle Foundation, he also is a member of the Urban Coalition Education Task Force. Mr. Friday is a former vice chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board and served as chairman of the board of directors of the American Council on Education. He is a member of the board of directors of the Public Broadcasting Service. He also is a member of the board of governors of the Center for Creative Leadership.

In 1976, at the request of the Democratic nominee for President, Jimmy Carter, Mr. Friday served as chairman of a task force on education to provide advice on the overriding educational issues in the country. In 1978, he was elected a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

He is married to the former Ida Willa Howell of Lumberton and they have three daughters, Frances, Mary and Elizabeth.

On July 1, 1978, Dr. Thomas B. Brewer became the seventh Chief Executive in the 72 year history of East Carolina University.

Prior to becoming Chancellor of ECU, Dr. Brewer served as Vice Chancellor and Dean of Texas Christian University. His career also includes administrative and teaching positions at the University of Toledo, Iowa State University, The University of Kentucky, North Texas State University and Southwest Texas State University.

An economic historian, with major emphasis in American Business and Transportation, Dr. Brewer holds the Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania. His Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts Degrees were earned from the University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. Brewer's professional and scholarly works have been widely published in leading educational business journals. He has written several articles, book reviews and papers, and is co-author of a history of the Missouri Pacific Railway Company. He is General Editor of the Railroads of America series being published by the University of North Carolina Press.

Chancellor Brewer's wide-ranging civic and community activities in Pitt County and eastern North Carolina include membership on the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, Chairman of the Pitt County United Way, and a member of the Board of Directors of the East Carolina Council for Boy Scouts. Dr. Brewer also serves as a member of the North Carolina Committee for Humanities.

He and his wife Betty were born in Fort Worth, Texas. Mrs. Brewer is also very involved in numerous community service activities. They have two children, Diane, a graduate student at the University of Texas at Austin; and Tom, Jr., a junior at Rose High School.

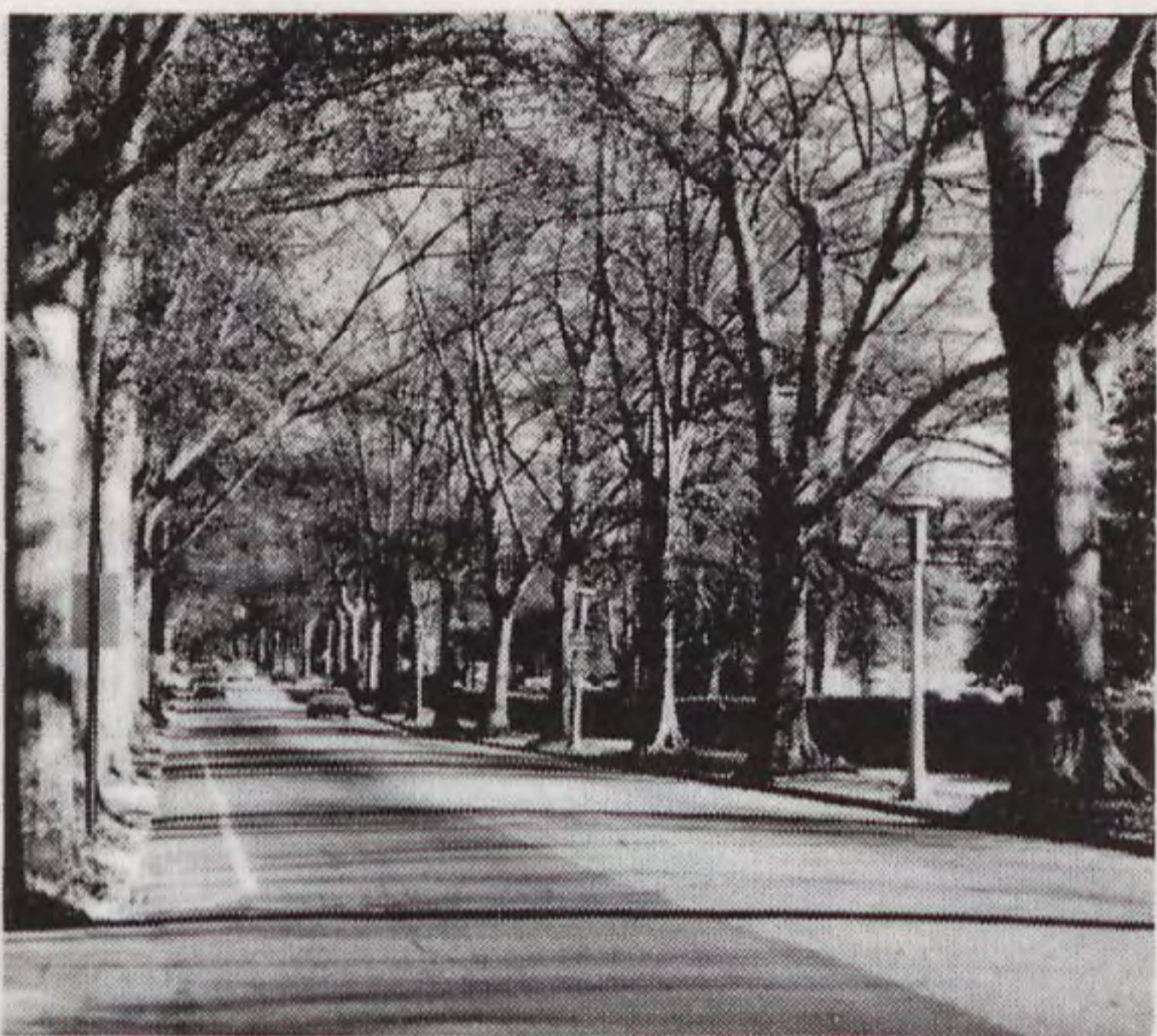
ECU stresses and is proud of excellence in teaching and research, in its outreach and service programs, and in its athletic teams.

Following its motto, *SERVIRE: To Serve*, ECU has become one of the South's most rapidly developing institutions of higher learning.

Its development has occurred in giant steps - in the heart of a region described 25 years ago as a "sleeping giant," just then being stirred awoken. Then during the last two decades, ECU experienced spectacular growth, mushrooming from a student enrollment of approximately 1,600 in 1957 to 12,452 today.

ECU was given university status by an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina in 1967 and four years later became a constituent campus of the consolidated University of North Carolina.

Today, ECU has 18 academic departments in its College of Arts and Sciences, nine professional schools including North Carolina's newest school of medicine, the General College, the Graduate School, the Division of Continuing

Education with three off-campus centers, its three technical institute programs and the on-campus University College.

Undergraduate degrees are offered in 105 bachelor's degree programs along with 72 minor program concentrations. The ECU Graduate School offers 73 master's degree program areas.

ECU's physical growth is in itself a continuing wonder. The original campus site - on which the first six buildings were constructed in 1908 - has expanded to a 411-acre campus with nearly 90 buildings. The campus physical plant is valued at nearly \$100 million and is constantly being improved and beautified.

A large, modern medical school campus is being constructed on a site several miles from the main campus in Greenville.

ECU's athletic complex includes a newly enlarged stadium, expanded from 20,000 to 35,000 seats. Its press box and lighting are among the finest facilities in the South.

# bill cain

Cain was appointed as athletic director Nov. 1, 1975, just a week following the death of Clarence Stasavich, after serving as assistant AD since 1972. His East Carolina tenure began as an athlete.

He served as captain of the 1959 football squad, the same year he was named to the all-Carolinas Conference team for the second straight season. He was named to the league's all-rookie team in 1955, made the all-Army group in 1956 while playing for Ft. Meade, Md., and then returned for his final two years of collegiate action.

He served as athletic director, head football and track coach at Suffolk, Va. HS from 1960 through 1965, winning two conference championships and earning coach of the year honors as well.

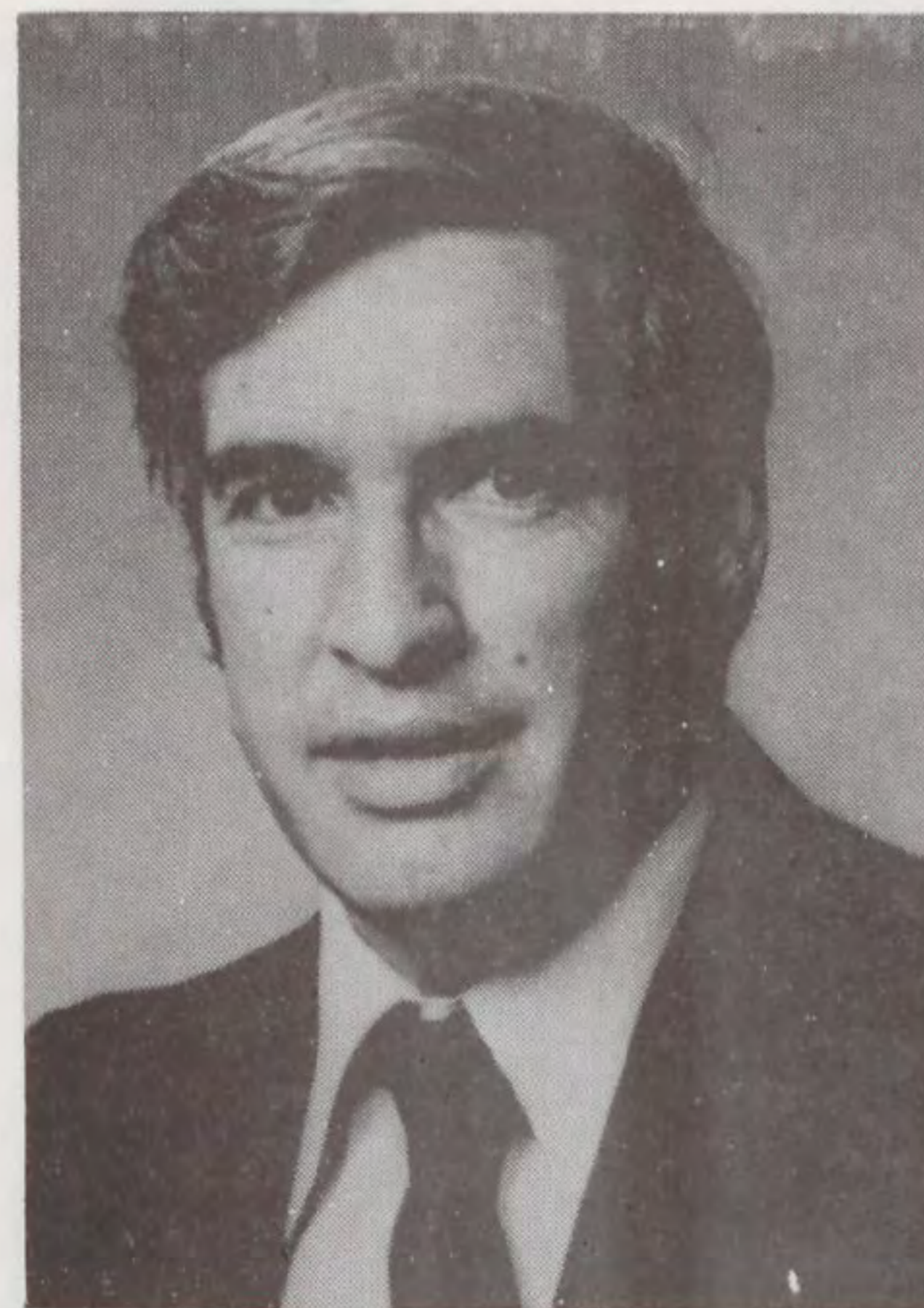
He shifted to Albemarle HS from 1965 through 1968 where he again served as athletic director, football and track coach, collecting one league crown and coach of the year honors again.

Cain returned to his alma mater as head freshman coach for the 1968 season, became athletic business manager and head of the Pirate Club the following year, and assistant athletic director in 1972. He also coached the Pirate golf teams in 1974 and 1975, gaining the runnerup spot in the Southern Conference tournament both years.

# pat dye

Success comes naturally to East Carolina coach Pat Dye. He has enjoyed the sweet savor of victory and achievement through his football career, both as a player and as a coach. So it should come as no surprise that he has spurred his fifth Pirate team to an 9-3 record and his first bowl championship as a head coach.

The success which comes naturally is a result of hard work and dedication, another thing which is no surprise to those who really know the drive that this former Georgia All-American and Alabama assistant has beating within his heart.

His Pirate teams have been 7-4, 8-3, 9-2, 8-3, and 9-3 in five seasons, an impressive form chart for almost any school, but Dye is continuously striving for a better record, a bigger bounty each year for East Carolina.

His personal tenacity for the game is reflected in his players, a dedicated group that fought from a 4-3 record in mid-season to an 8-3 mark and the Independence Bowl. It would have been easy to be average, but Dye is not average and his team could not be either.

In short, Pat Dye is a winner and a worker, not a dreamer.

As a player, he lettered three years in football and two years in track at Richmond Academy, Augusta, GA. Later at the University of Georgia, Pat lettered three years in football (1958-60) and served as alternate co-captain with Fran Tarkenton. Also while at Georgia, Coach Dye earned such honors as All-American in 1960, Most Valuable Lineman in Southeastern Conference in 1960, Academic All-America in 1959 and 1960, and played in the Blue-Gray Classic, Senior Bowl, and Coaches All-America game. Pat has recently been named to Georgia's all-time team.

Coach Dye played two years with the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League as outside linebacker.

While serving in the Army, Dye was named All-Army for two years in 1963 and 1964, voted player of the year for all armed forces in 1964 and received the "Timmy Award" from the Washington, D.C. Touchdown Club.

As an assistant coach for nine seasons (1965-1973) at Alabama under legendary Bear Bryant, he was an integral part of Coach Bryant's staff in charge of linebackers and recruiting. Dye coached four All-America linebackers, helped Alabama to 3 national titles, 3 unbeaten seasons, and 5 SEC titles.

His record is dotted with championships and outstanding achievements, a true reflection of his personal dedication to the game he loves so much.

Over the last five years the Pirates have established themselves nationally in both offensive and defensive statistics. This year the Pirates finished second in the nation in both total defense and pass defense. During Dye's rein, the Pirate's defensive unit has produced such All Americans

as Danny Kepley, Jimmy Bolding, Cary Godette, Harold Randolph, and Zack Valentine. The Pirates wishbone offense is ranked in the top 10 nationally in rushing offense during this period, and averaging over 270 yards per game total offense. The offensive unit has produced such stars as Mike Weaver, Kenny Strayhorn, Wayne Bolt, Terry Gallaher, and Eddie Hicks. These players along with others have made East Carolina the nation's 14th winningest team over the past five years.

"The wishbone does as much for our defense as it does for our offense, believe it or not," Dye said of the formation he first encountered in the 1970 Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl when Alabama played Oklahoma.

"To be a successful team you must be able to run the football and I don't think there can be any doubt that the wishbone is the best running formation. Everyone on the offense must be a complete football player, able to block and run and be physically tough."

"Teams win playing tough, physical defense, too, and working against the wishbone as we do all spring makes our defense work hard."

"The wishbone is a more difficult offense than most to coach, but at the same time I think it's more fun to coach, too. We have been running it for several years now and are beginning to get more sophisticated with it. We can mix in other things effectively now, but make no mistake the wishbone is our bread and butter."

Pat is married to the former Sue Ward of Augusta, GA. with four children, sons Pat, Jr. 16, and Brett 12; daughters Missy 15, and Wanda 8.

Dye looks for a challenge every day and reaches for any opportunity to improve East Carolina football, something he achieves with regularity. As good as his record is, he strives daily to face the challenge of meeting and beating the best teams, playing regularly on television and receiving a bowl invitation.

For Pat Dye and the Pirates there is no substitute for winning - he loves it, works hard for it, and thrives on it.

## BOBBY WALLACE

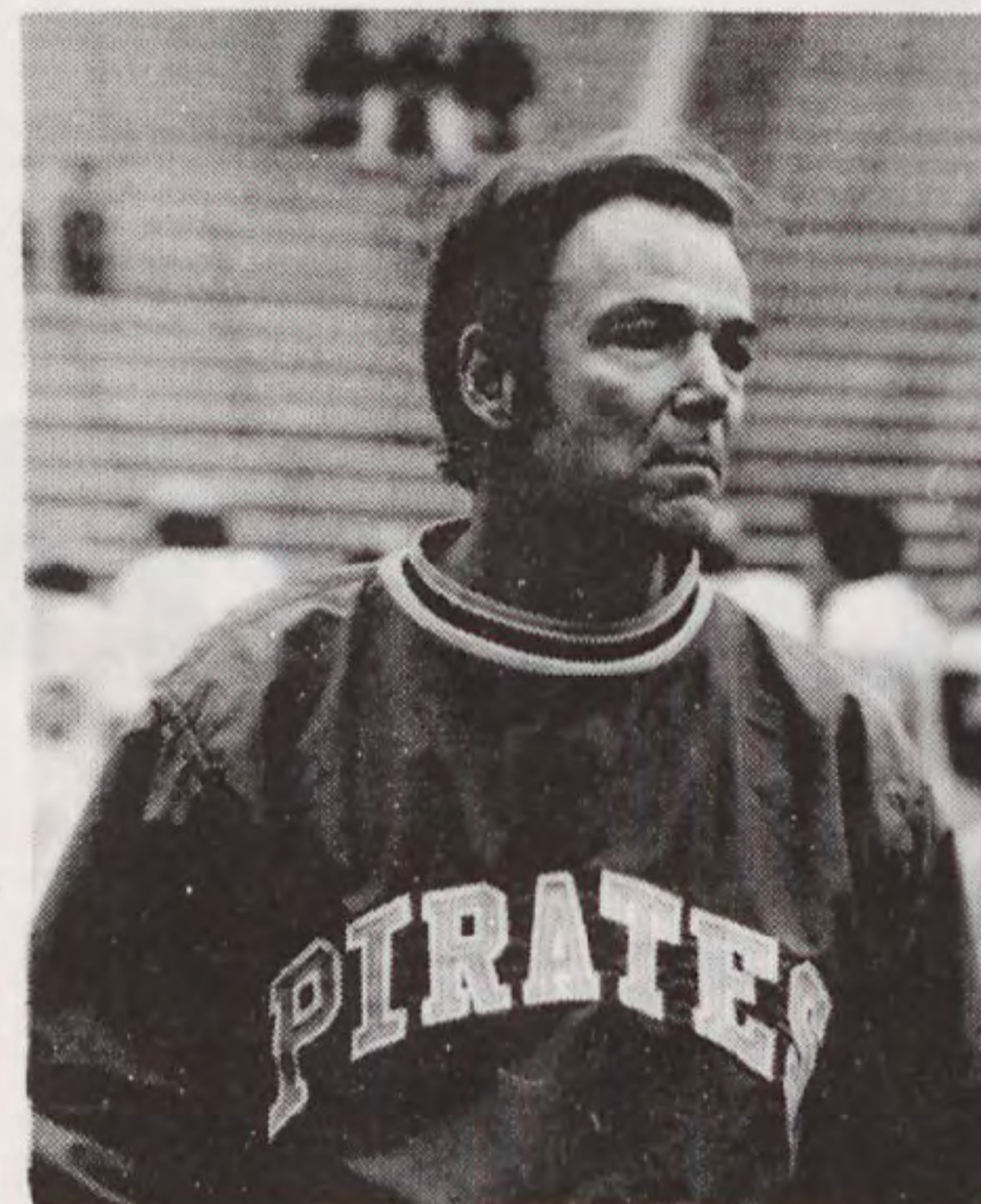

# flags of fear

Almost every Pirate captain had his own distinctive flag. The flags were meant to strike mortal terror in the hearts of the Pirate's intended victims and also to flatter the vanity of the captain and his crew. No one knows the origin of the term "Jolly Roger". It may have originated from the French term *joli rouge* (pretty red). The "skull and crossbones" design was most often used in flag designs. When at a distance from their victim the Pirates would usually fly "false colors", but once they were within cannonshot, up would go their own dreaded Pirate colors.

Women's basketball is on the upswing nationally and ECU is planning to be a part of it.

The men's basketball program has a whole new look this season. Coach Dave Odom begins his first year at the Pirate helm. A Goldsboro native, Dave comes to ECU from Wake Forest University where he served as an associate coach for three seasons.

An outstanding athlete at Goldsboro HS, Dave played three years of football, basketball, and baseball, serving as

George, a 1975 graduate of South Carolina where he played under Frank McGuire, joins East Carolina from North Carolina A & T State. An assistant with the Aggies the past two seasons, he previously served as a graduate assistant at Appalachian State.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., he attended All Hallows High School where he gained all-city honors in basketball. At South Carolina he lettered two seasons and was an honor roll student.

## WOULD YOU RECOGNIZE A PIRATE SHIP?

A Privateer was a war ship that was owned privately by persons licensed by a government to cruise and raid against the enemy in wartime. Privateers were allowed to sell their booty (treasures) and keep a large percentage of the proceeds.

A Brigantine was a vessel most used by the most adventurous pirates. The "brig" was a two-masted, square-rigged ship.

Man of War, usually frigates, were warships of a recognized navy, outfitted for active fighting.

Merchantmen or trading vessels were used to carry goods and passengers.

## PIRATE RULES OF CONDUCT

Signed by the crew of Capt. John Phillip's ship "Revenge".

1. Every man will obey all rules. Disobedience will be harshly rewarded.
2. Any member of the crew attempting to run away, or keep a secret from the other members, will be marooned on a desert island with only a bottle of water.
3. Any member of the crew stealing from another member of the crew or gambling beyond his ability to pay, will be either marooned or shot, depending on the good mercy of the captain.
4. Any member of the crew striking another will receive "Moses' Law" (40 Lashes minus one).
5. Any member of the crew who snaps a pistol, smokes an uncovered pipe or carries an unprotected candle below decks will receive 30 lashes.
6. Any member of the crew not keeping his weapon clean and ready, or who neglects to perform his shipboard duties, will forfeit his share of any loot acquired.
7. Any member of the crew subject to the first six rules shall also be subject to any other punishment thought fit by the captain and his shipmates.

## "A PLACE WHICH RECEIVES PIRATES, RUNAWAYS AND ILLEGAL TRADERS"

This was the way North Carolina was described in a report to England by Edmund Randolph in 1700.

## WALKING THE PLANK

The most famous saying in Pirate terms may have been mostly heresay, at least no records were kept to bear them out. If a pirate wished to dispose of a victim it was much easier to simply chuck him over the side without ceremony.

## MAROONED

Marooned on a desert isle, a condemned man awaited death with only a bottle of water. This form of punishment was a reality and dreaded by many a sailor. Sometimes at the mercy of the captain, the condemned man was given one shot to be used at his discretion.

## THE "WEAKER" SEX

Piracy was not only a man's game. Many captains took their wives to sea with them. Some women also served as crew members, such as Anne Bonny and Mary Read.

## THE FIERCEST PIRATE OF THEM ALL

Not actually born in the colony, Edward Teach is thought to be North Carolina's own pirate. Known as Blackbeard and sailing the "Queen Anne's Revenge," he was a tall well built man with a bushy black beard which he would plait into little pigtales before going into battle. In the belt around his waist, Blackbeard would carry pistols, daggers and a cutlass. Across his chest he wore a bandolier in which he would place six primed pistols ready to fire.

## HENRY EVERY

Every was one of the most famous Pirates. In 1695 Every was considered a hero to every unemployed seaman in England and in the Colonies.

## EDWARD ENGLAND

Driven from the Caribbean in 1718 by the British Navy, England took root in African waters. A good natured person, which led to his downfall, England was removed after freeing a captured victim. He died a beggar.

## STEDE BONNET

Bonnet was a retired army major who was clean shaven and wore a gentleman powdered wig. In 1718, Blackbeard tricked Bonnet and ousted him from his ship.

## CHARLES VANE

In 1718, Vane was voted out of his captaincy for cowardice by his crew after retreating from a more heavily armed ship. He was later caught and hung.

## JOHN RACKAM

Wearing bright cotton clothing, Rackam was known as Calico Jack. He replaced Charles Vane as captain on Vane's ship in his conquest of the West Indies. He was captured in 1720. Rackam had a great romance with Lady Pirate Anne Bonny.

## BARTHOLOMEW ROBERTS

Roberts became one of the greatest pirates of his day because of his splendid seamanship. He began his career in 1720 for no other reason than a change of pace.

## HOWELL DAVIS

Davis often posed as a merchant or pirate hunter to help size up his victims. Before his death in 1720, Davis was considered among the most cunning pirates of this day.



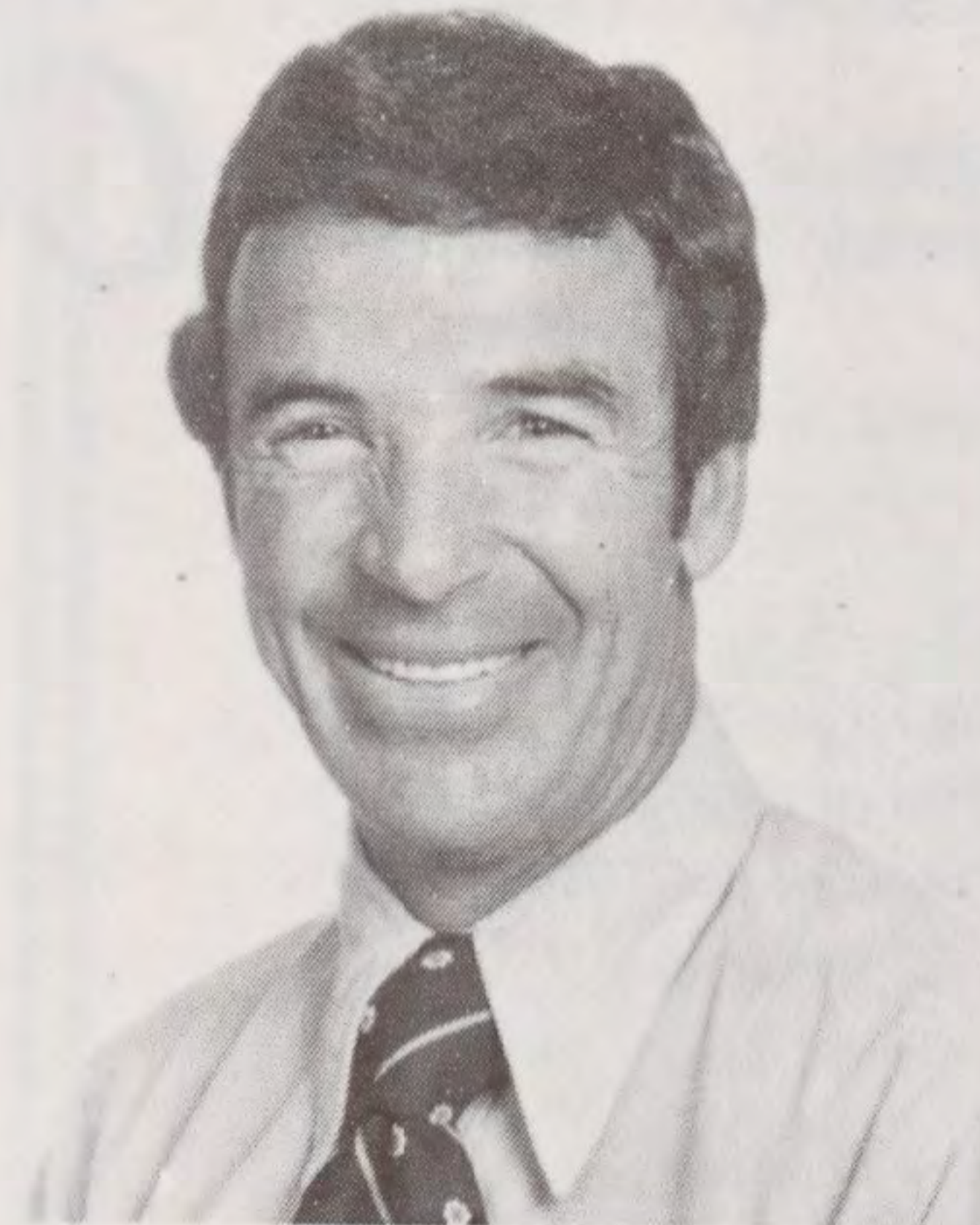

Mark Slawson, Flanker ended last season with 14 receptions for 300 yards.

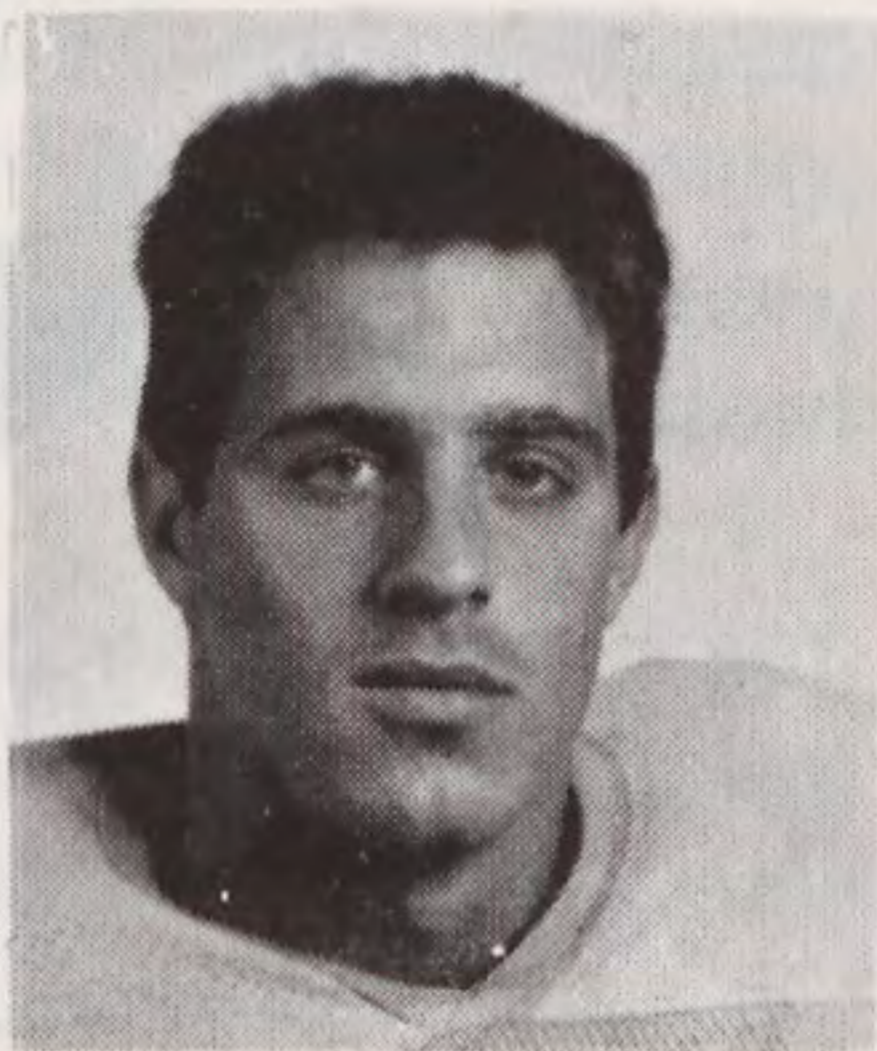

# sports medicine

One of the most important parts of East Carolina's rise in athletic prominence has been its Sports Medicine Division, headed by Rod Compton, Director; Dr. James Bowman, Team Physician; Jim Keating and Liz White, Assistant Directors.

Compton is in his tenth year as Director of the program, while Dr. Bowman, in his ninth season, heads up a list of more than a dozen fine community-based professionals who lend valuable time to the program.

A Sports Medicine Curriculum has been added to the Health and Physical Education Department at East Carolina with Bowman, three associate team physicians from the campus infirmary, a team dentist and ten medical consultants in specialized fields all teaching in addition to Compton, Keating and White.

The "Sports Paramedics", as Compton refers to this staff, are in attendance at every athletic event that ECU is involved in, whether at home or on the road. As Compton describes his program, "The East Carolina Sports Medicine Division specializes in the best prevention, immediate treatment and rehabilitation of injuries possible."

Prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation are the three main objectives of the Sports Medicine Division. Prevention of injuries is the main goal at East Carolina. As evidence of the Sports Medicine preventative practices, the 1976 Pirate football team had no injuries requiring surgery and the 1977 squad had only one knee injury requiring surgery.

When injuries do occur, Compton's staff gives quick on the spot treatment to make certain the injury does not become more serious.

The rehabilitation process of the Sports Medicine Division is near perfect, with players coming back off of injuries several games ahead of players from other schools.

The Sports Medicine Staff operates from an ultramodern center adjacent to Ficklen Stadium in addition to immediate treatment in Scales Fieldhouse and Minges Coliseum.

ECU's Sports Medicine Program is the only undergraduate athletic training program approved by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) in eastern North Carolina and one of only two in the state. Compton, Keating and White are all Certified Athletic Trainers, as designated by the NATA.

# why pirates!

The pirate, a symbol of East Carolina University and its athletics teams, was adopted from the legend and lore of coastal North Carolina and was a natural choice for a nickname when intercollegiate athletics began at the school in the 1930's.

Pirates, fierce and colorful, were prominent in North Carolina's colonial period. The state's Outer Banks which jut far out into the Atlantic were ideal hideouts for these legendary gangsters of the high seas. Many had homes and families in the small villages along the coast.

Edward Teach, best known as "Blackbeard" was a resident of Eastern North Carolina. He had a house at Ocracoke on the Outer Banks and an inland home at Bath on the Pamlico River.

East Carolina University's interest in pirates and sea lore began in 1934. That year, the *Tecoan*, the yearbook for what was then East Carolina Teachers College, carried pirates as its theme. The pages were filled with paintings and sketches of patched-eye figures, tall ships and buried treasure. The book referred to the tales of the infamous "Teachy the Pirate" often told by natives in the nearby historic town of Bath.

The men's varsity team, at the time, was known as "The Teachers" a lackluster band of athletes who had won only two football games in three seasons of existence. But the student body interest in pirates quickly resulted in changing the name of the team to capture the romantic appeal of the early sea adventurers. The change brought so much enthusiasm that in the following year, 1935, the Pirate football team had a much better season, winning three of its six games.

Prior to the introduction of athletics for men, the ECTC Athletic Association, comprising women athletes in basketball, tennis, baseball and archery were content with the more classical nicknames. A 1930-31 Handbook for ECTC listed the two teams that made up the Athletic Association as the Olympians and the Athenians. Their colors were purple and gold (the same as today's colors) and the mascot was a wildcat.

Other uses of the pirate theme began in the 1940's with a literary magazine named "Pieces of Eight." The name, however, was later changed to "Rebel."

The college yearbook became the "Buccaneer" in the 1950's and the pirate symbol, the face of a bearded, patched-eye character with a crossed bone emblem on his hat was added to the school seal in the mid 1960's.

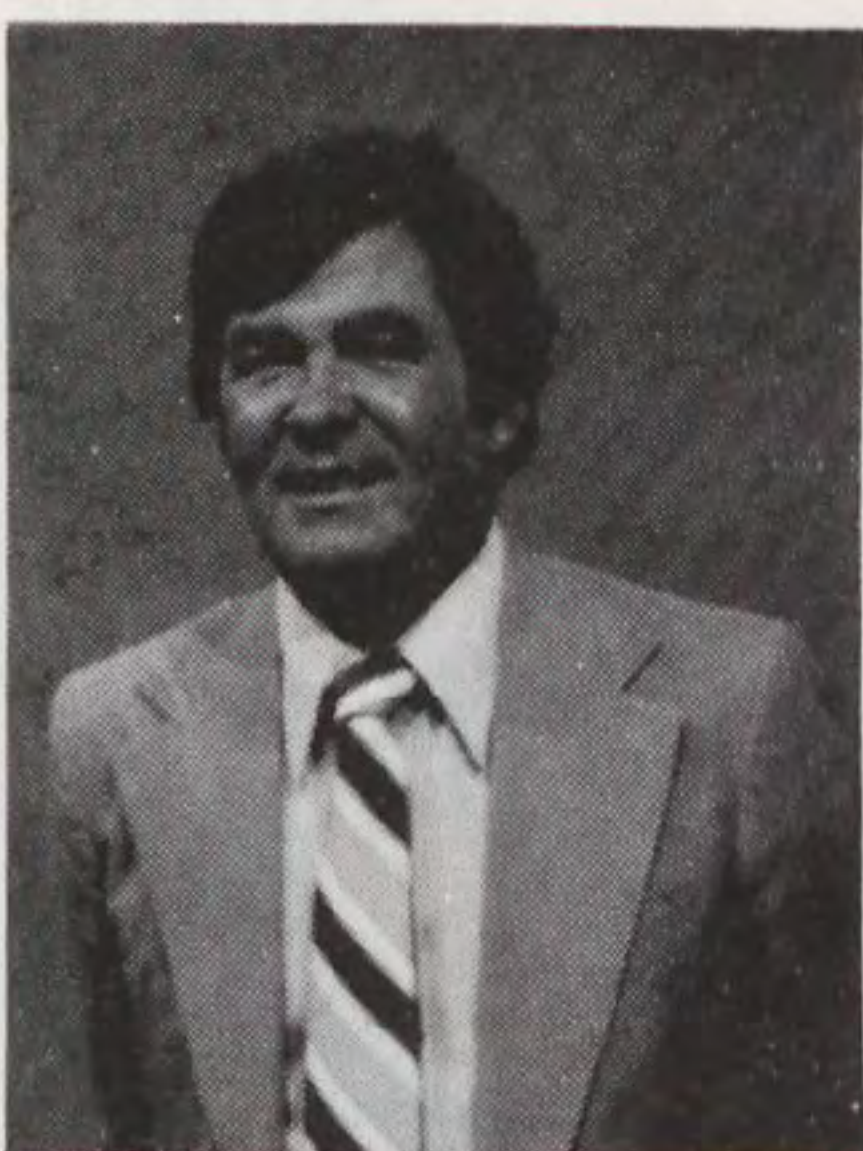
# pirate sports network

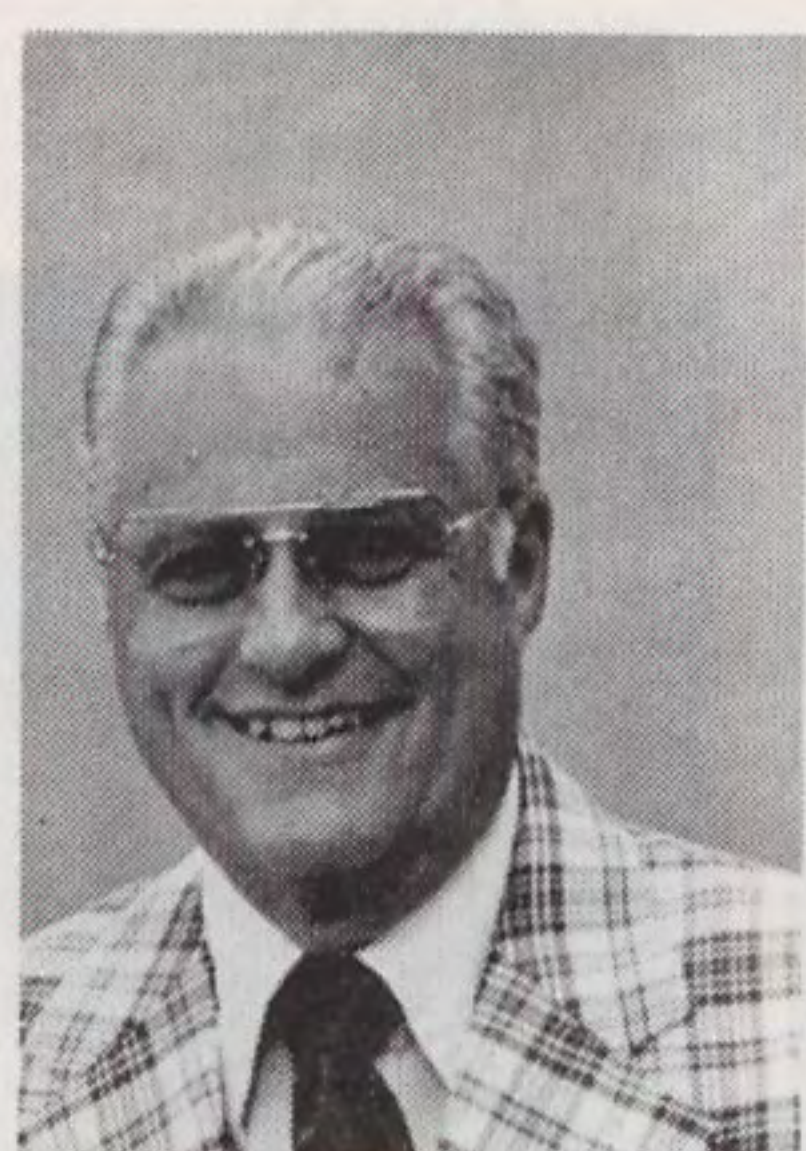

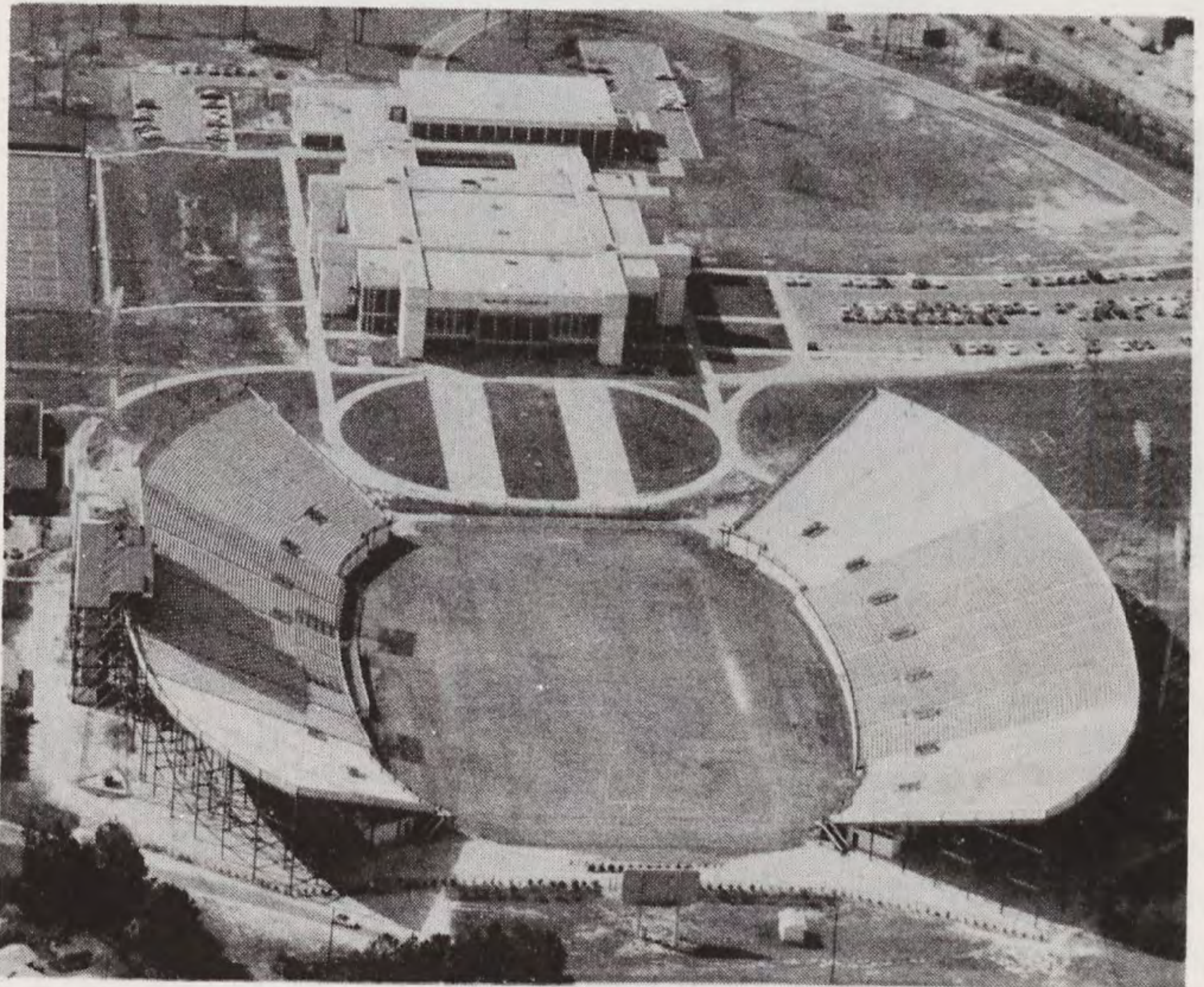
Ficklen Memorial Stadium was dedicated Sept. 21, 1963, the same day East Carolina defeated Wake Forest, 20-10.

The dedication game was the culmination of a dream come true for the then East Carolina College and all of eastern North Carolina. The original plan was announced on Oct. 7, 1961, by Dr. Leo Jenkins, Chancellor of the College, at a meeting of the Society of Buccaneers.

Within a year, \$283,387 had been raised, although the goal had been only \$200,000. With the funds in hand, Ficklen Stadium was built.

The original stadium consisted of the permanent stands on the south side, a small press box and the old lighting system that was removed after the 1974 season. Total cost was \$300,000.

The north side permanent seating was constructed in 1968, increasing the stadium seating capacity to 20,000.

The stadium was named for the late James Skinner Ficklen, a Greenville resident, who distinguished himself as one of America's leading tobacconists. At the time of his death in 1955, Ficklen was President and Chairman of the Board of the E.B. Ficklen Tobacco Company of Greenville. He was a close friend of the College and established a financial aid foundation, the Ficklen Foundation, to aid students of the College.

The current lights are a combination of metallic and incandescent lights. There are 384 fixtures of 1500 watts each on the six 162-foot towers. The cost of the new system was \$450,000. Engineers say Ficklen is the best lighted stadium in the Southeast.

A fund drive for 2½ million dollars was begun in March of 1977 to expand the stadium to 35,000 seats. This expansion was completed prior to the 1978 season.

Also assisting in a more workable facility is a new three level press box and a 20' x 40' computerized scoreboard.

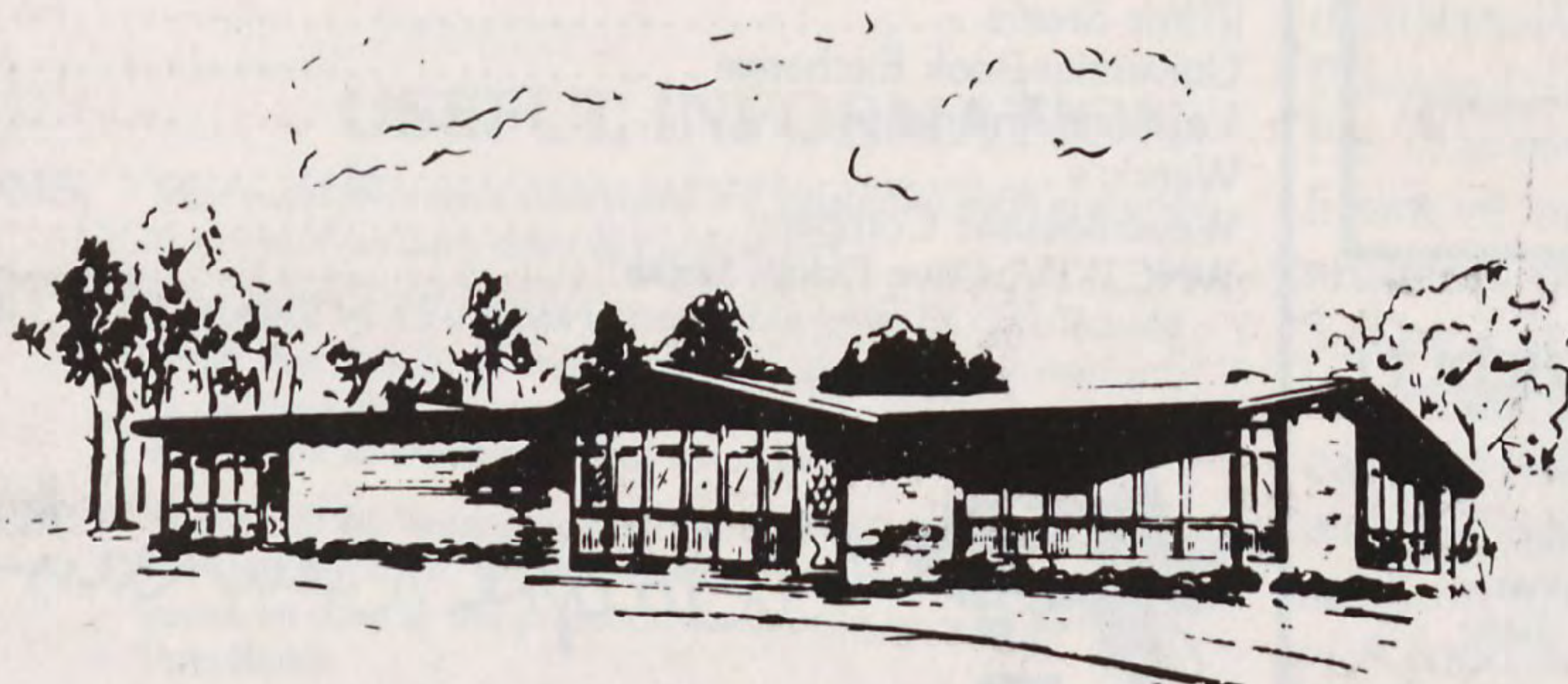

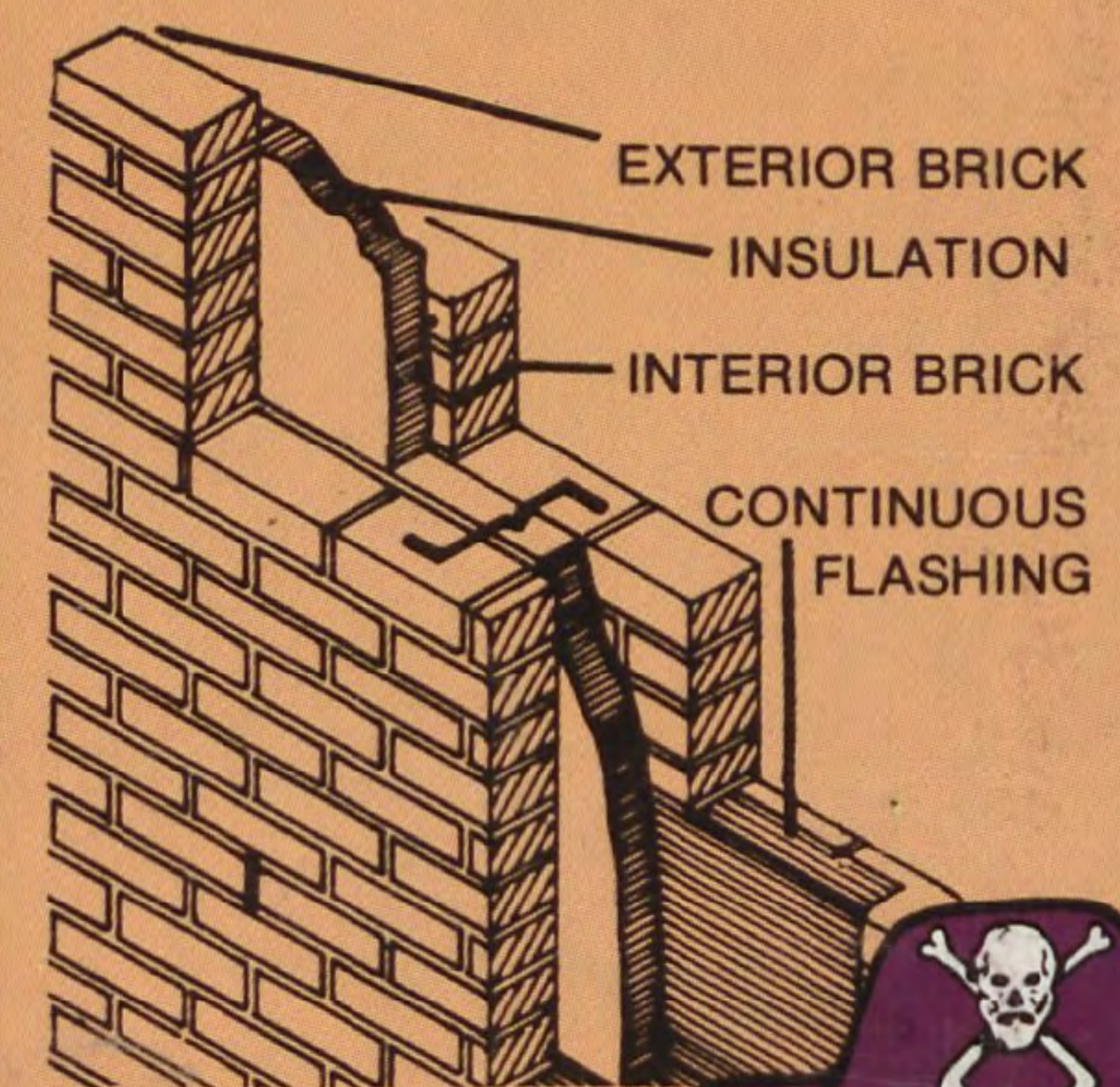
