Rules of School

Having employed E. L. Curl to teach
 School at Beech Spring in the County of
 Nash in School District No 13. We the Trustees
 of said School do constitute the following
 Rules as a guide or by laws by which the
 Teacher and Scholars are to be governed.
 It is the duty of the Teacher to attend strictly
 to the good morals of those who may be
 committed to his care, as well as to their
 Studies showing no partiality ^{to} any, he is to
 meet his School at one hour and a half by
 sun in the morning when the weather is
 favourable and dismiss it at one hour by
 sun in the evening, he may arrange

his recesses to suit his own convenience and
comfort of his scholars not allowing more
than one hour and a half in short days
and two hours in long days. he is to suffer
no profane language in school no gambling
tale bearing, or disputes of any kind, it
shall be his duty to treat his pupils with
kindness and respect ever keeping in mind
that this is his indispensable duty

The students are to obey the Teacher and
attend strictly to any bylaw he may
make for the advancement of their
studies. the Teacher has the right of
correction in all cases, if any student
shall neglect or refuse to comply with

rules or bylaws of said School it shall
be the duty of the Teacher to report such
Student to the Trustees and for them to
deal with such Student as their conduct
may deserve The large scholars are not
to provoke the small scholars to anger, the
male scholars must be polite to the females
they must not play together, the scholars
must tell no tales out of school tell no
lies call no ill names speak no bad
words climb trees nor wrestle, they must
not resort near the river, there is to be no
Smuff used in time of books no spitting
on the floor nor chewing of tobacco by the
small scholars in time of books

The girls are to keep the house swept and the boys are ^{to} keep good fires, they are not to leave the school house out of sight at any time without permission, they must not quarrel and fight nor tell tales on each other. They must not laugh and whisper in book time, they must keep their seats and sit still, they must not scribble in their books nor on their Copy books, they must not take any thing that does not belong to them either at school or abroad, any other bylaw may be imposed by the Teacher that will add to the good morals of said school.

We the Trustees enjoin the foregoing rules on the Teacher and Scholars.

It shall be the duty of the Trustees to visit the school when convenient and to instruct the Teacher in any mismanagement that does not comport with their good judgement, it is their duty to settle all matters of dispute that may arise between the Teacher and his scholars that cannot ^{be} settled otherwise they shall protect the Teacher in all matters and things pertaining to said school that they may deem right and just, if the Teacher should not manage the school agreeable to their wishes it shall be their duty to inform him of the same, and

not to expose him to the world,
the Teacher will hold the Trustees
bound at all times for instruction
and if they should neglect or refuse
to comply with the same he the said
Teacher will hold himself blameless
and the Trustees guilty, all of which
is most respectfully submitted
This the 1st day of February 1854
