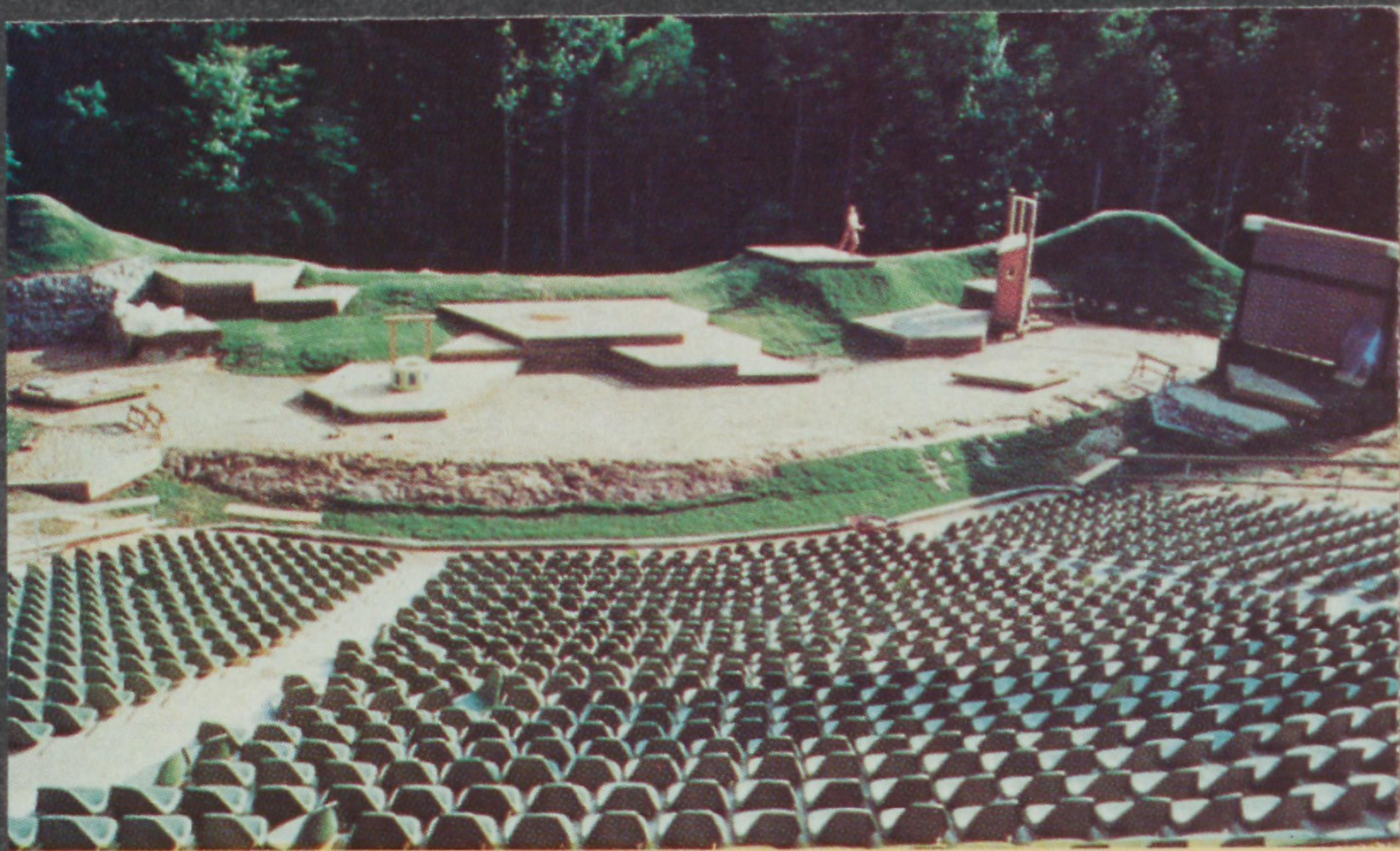

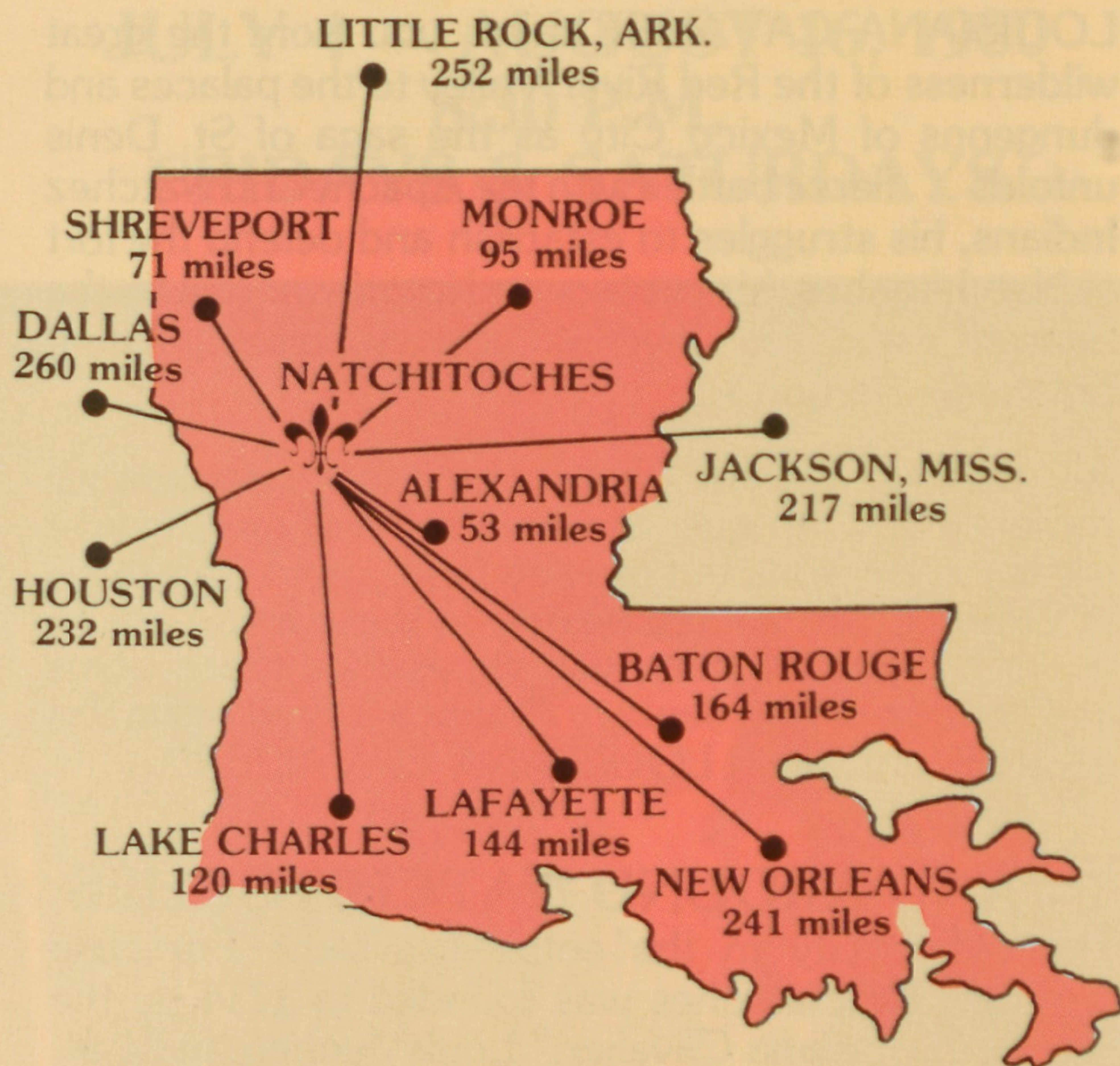

The Grand Ecore Amphitheatre, located near the legendary "great bluff," is home for "Louisiana Cavalier." Located just four miles north of Natchitoches off La.
