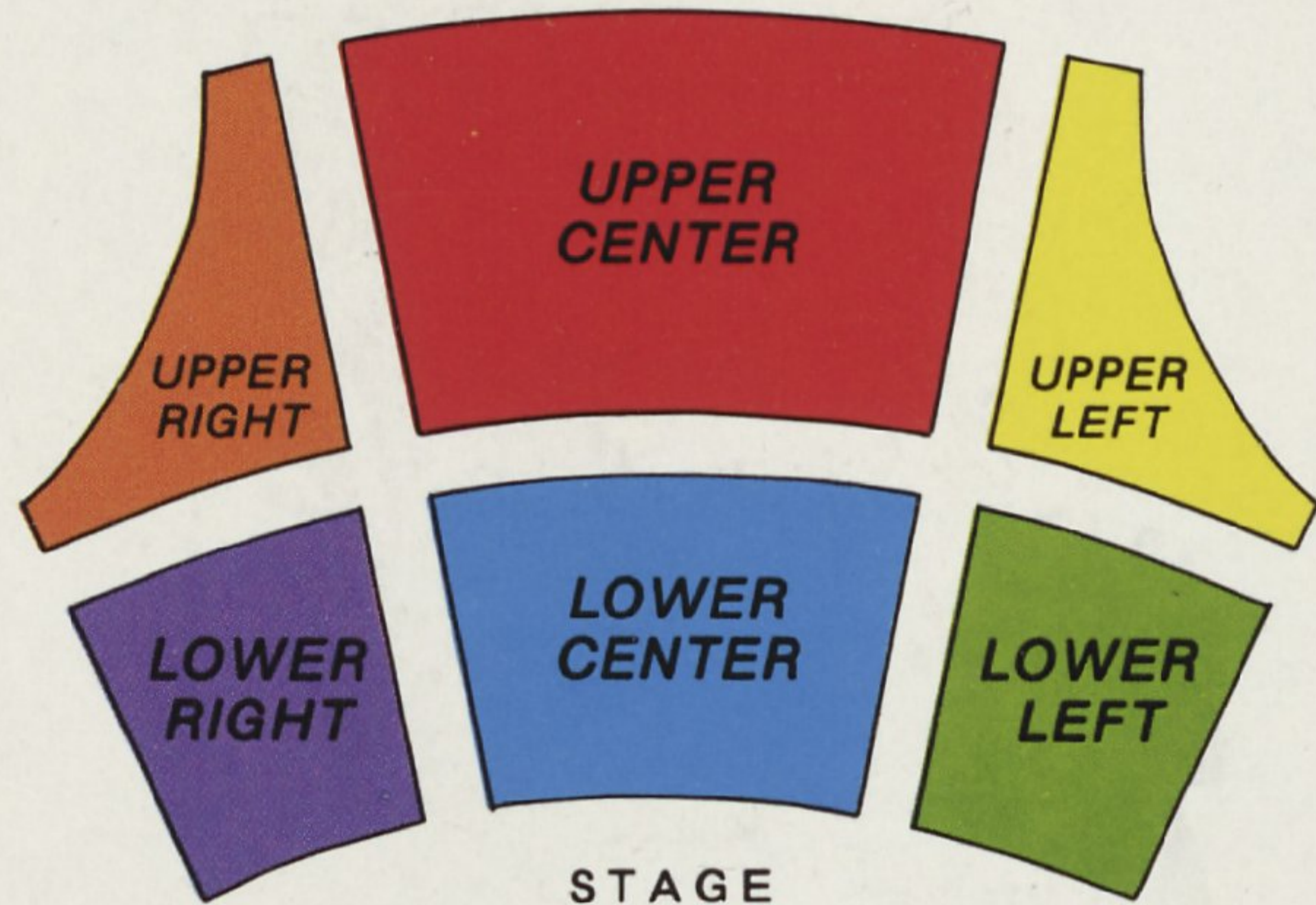

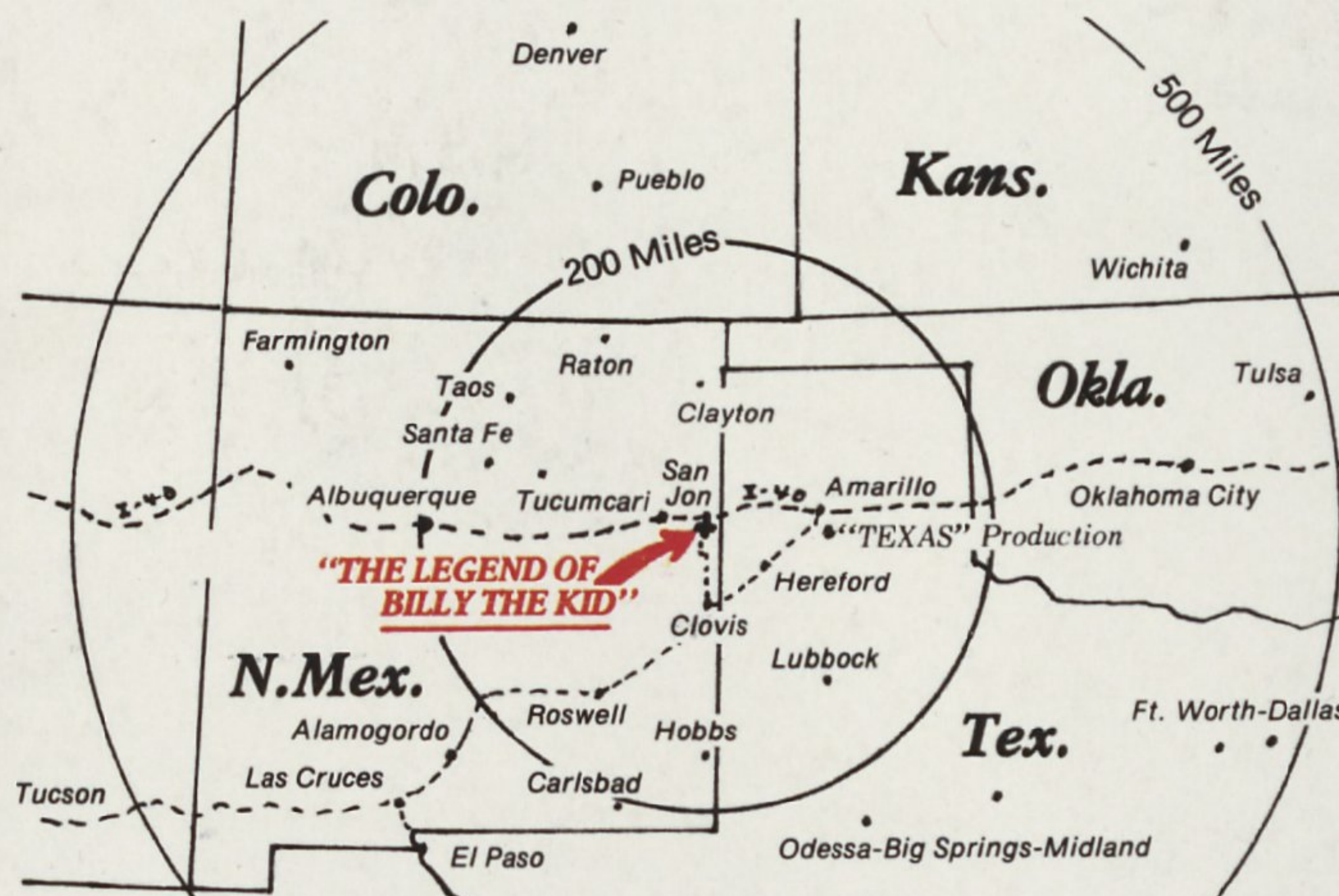

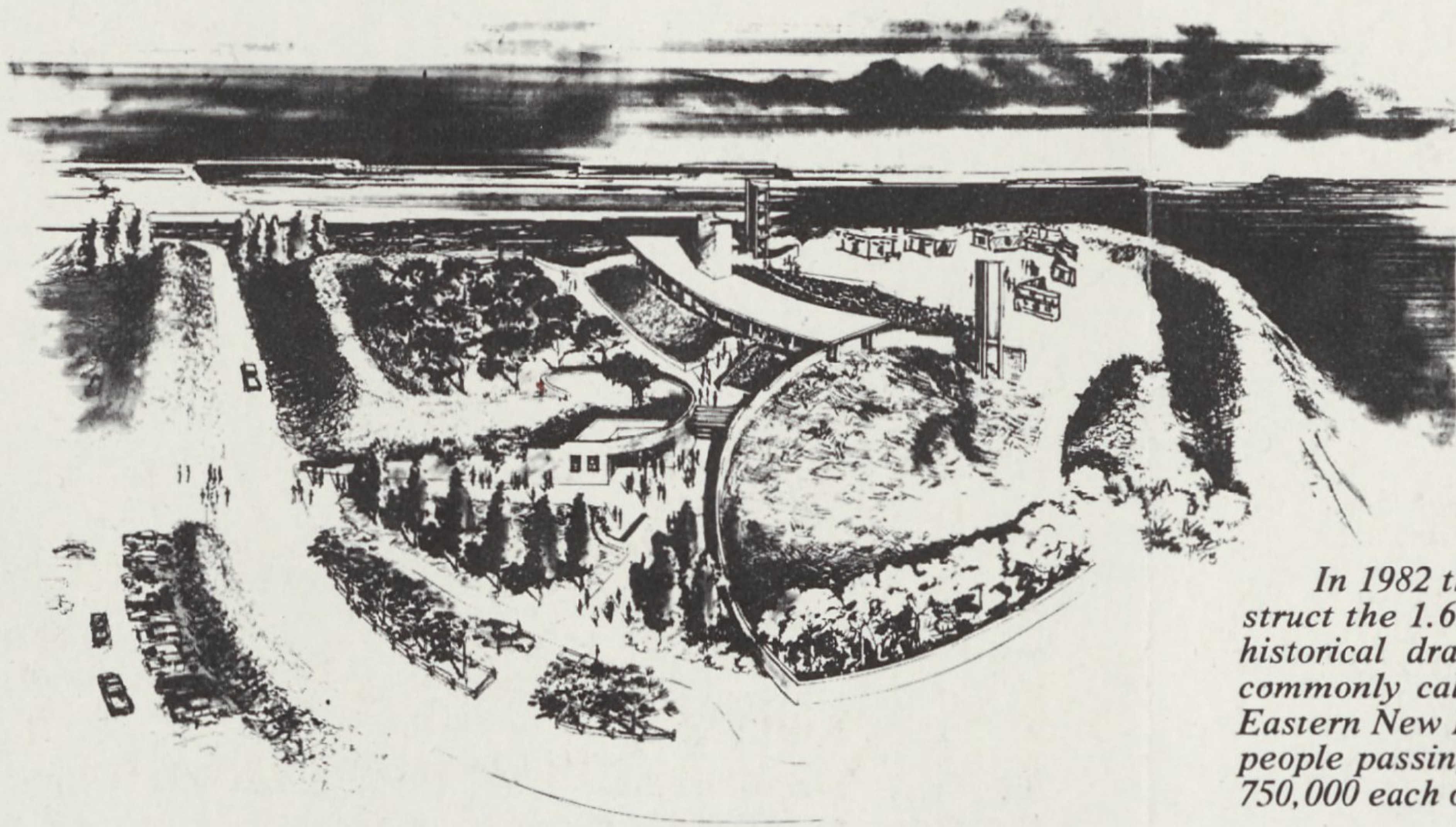

Among them were:

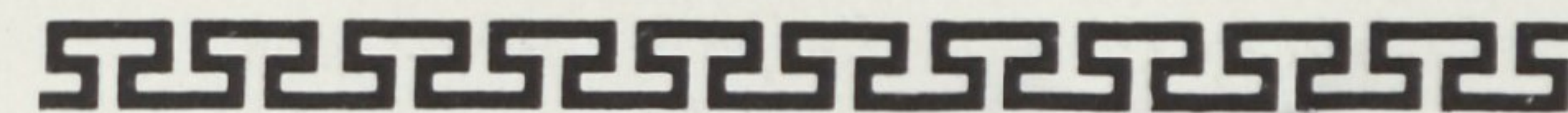
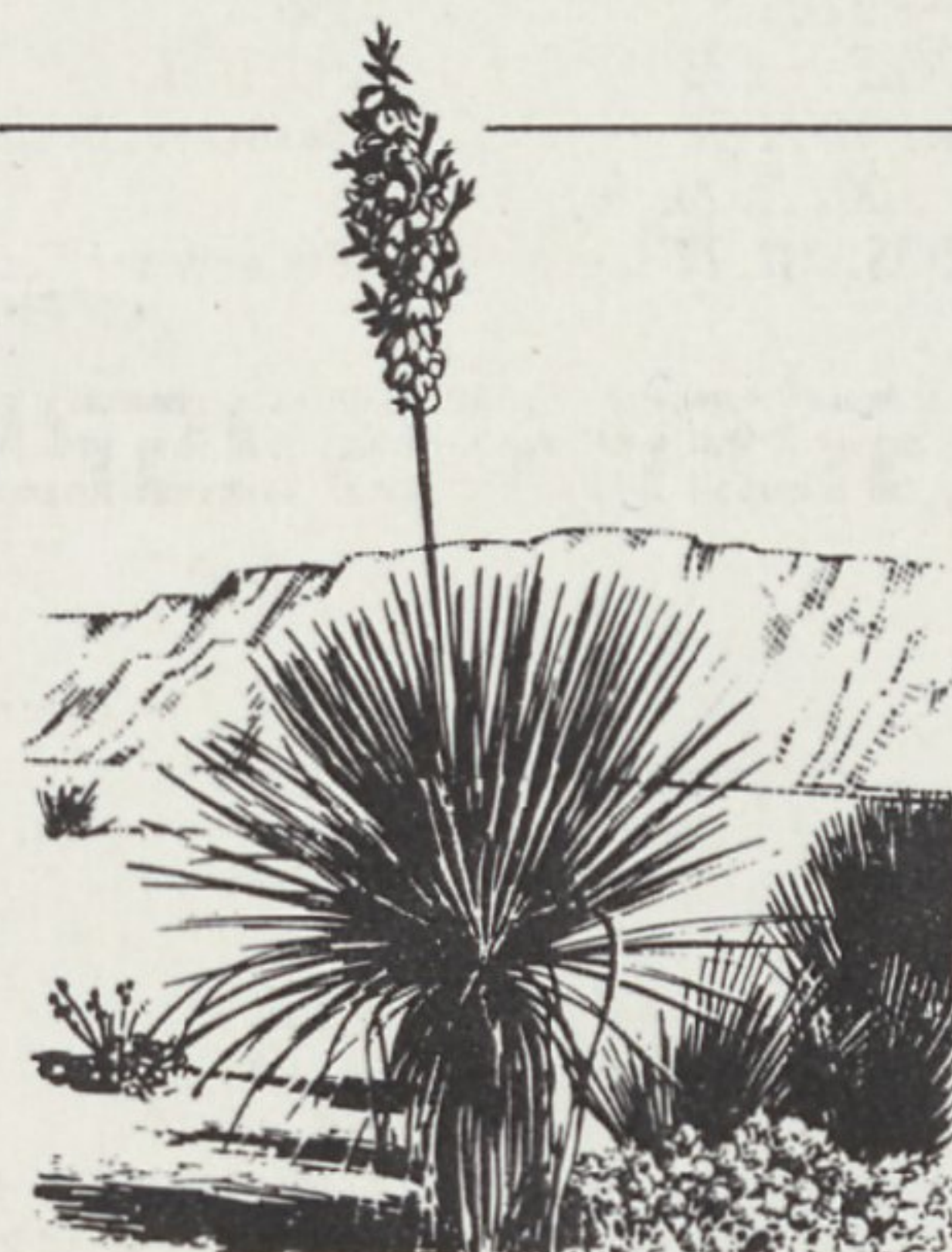
- SERAFIN MONTESINOS, noble village leader, descendant of an ancient Spanish family.*

(The five year average of people passing along I-40 at San Jon for June, July, and August, is 750,000 each of these months.) Come, and enjoy New Mexico!
