

Camp Jackson, S.C.
May 26, 1918,

Dear Maud:

I'll be working this morning will write to you. I never have worked very much on Sunday but while I am in the Army have to do most anything. Am not really working much but have to stay here in the office. You know I have been moved. Am doing office work now. Believe me I like it much better than I do the dull field. I suppose I'm getting on as well as I could expect. My work is general office work and is not hard. It is right confining but being confined is not as bad as being exposed at the battle front.

I was glad to get your letter last week. Seemed almost like I was talking to you. I was glad to know all were well. Expect it looks like to Ed & he is not doing much farming as it has rained so much. The weather here has been mighty pretty. Don't think they have had too much rain.

See! the new boys are coming in here now. My office is right near where they come in. Ten thousand is supposed to come here and it looks like more than that has already come and they have just got started. They come in all times of night and day. The boys from Pitt Co. are supposed to get here late this evening. Am anxious to see them.

But that will be a sick crowd. Well, I have had mine and I expect to see some get theirs. Another train load is pulling in right now. I never have seen anything like it.

Tell Ed & Geo will pay him what I owe him when I go home. Keep a record of it.

Must close now, as it is time for dinner. Can't miss it.

Much love to all the family. I would like to be with you all today but can't tell when that time will come.
