that is what is being done now.

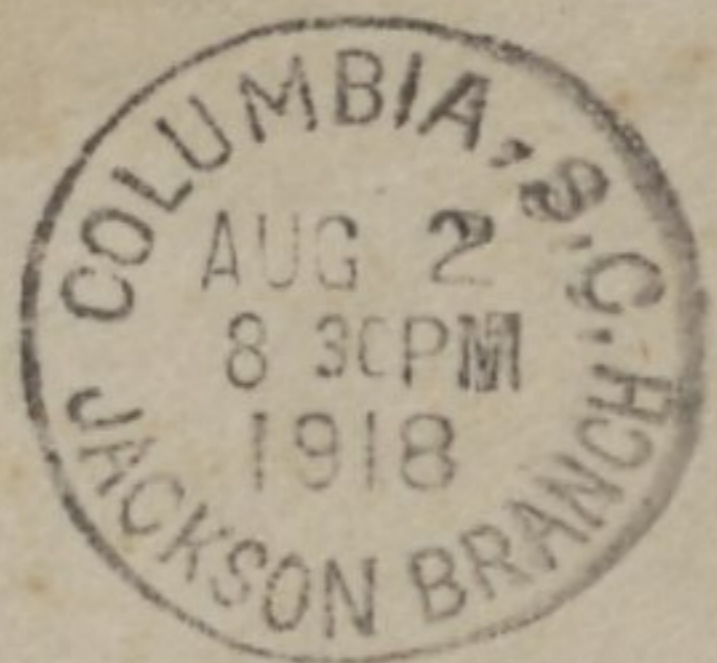
Tell Edd it looks like we will
