### MRS. ADAMS FILES SUIT FOR DIVORCE

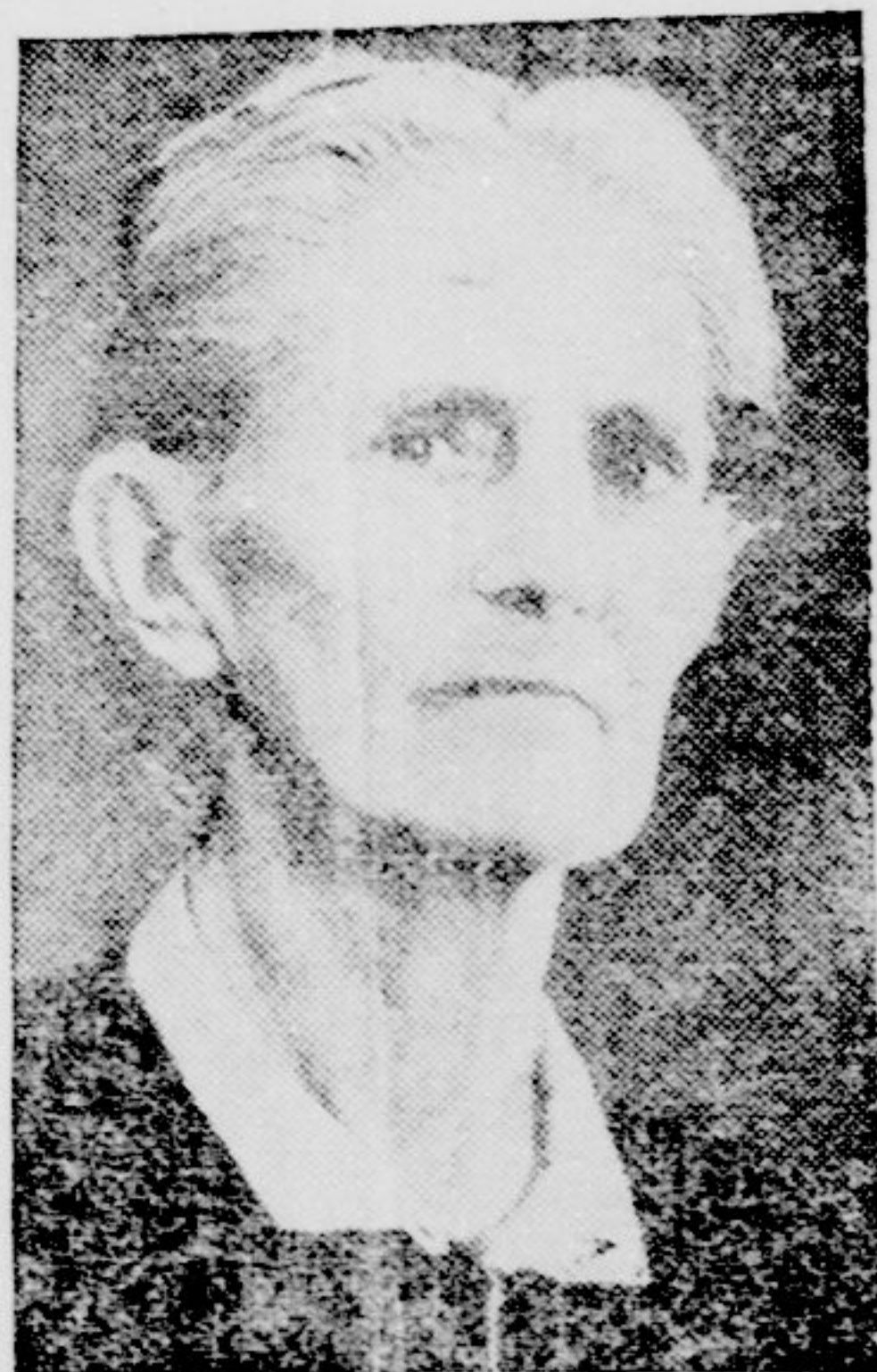
#### Public Sentiment With Mrs. Adams

### President Shipped For Night Riding

#### MISS MURCHISON CAUGHT RIDING WITH UNCLE EASTER SUNDAY EVENING

Miss Margaret Murchison, incoming president of the Student Government Association was shipped without a hearing before the council for riding with her uncle Sunday night, March 27. The re-election will take place the evening of April 16.

Miss Murchison was one of the most popular girls on the campus with the co-eds and Greenville boys. She had an unusual record here. Until this time, she had made it a rule to be re-elected only once each term and then for some minor offence as smoking.

Miss Murchison has held quite a few prominent and notorious offices here. She was elected president of the Student Government Association for next year, by virtue of the fact that she has been instrumental in reporting and restricting more girls than any other member of the student body.

A statement she made two days before vacation began placed Miss Murchison under suspicion. The Dean took it upon herself to send two detectives to keep the student under constant surveillance. On the first three nights, the young lady was home by eight o'clock and her callers left at nine-thirty. However, Sunday night, Easter, she played a trick upon the two watchers. At eight-thirty, she slipped from her home, jumped in a car at the corner, and rode away. The detective who was off duty accidentally saw her riding with her uncle about an hour later. He at once sent a telegram to the Dean, who related it to the college President. He, in turn, at once notified Miss Murchison that she need not return. She begged that her case might be put before the Student Council, but the request was denied.

In five minutes the police were in the campus and hundreds of girls watched the president as he was led from the building by the armed policemen. He offered no resistance however, and waved a feeble farewell as he rode away.

There were only seventy-five gallons of whisky found in the office at the time, but it is thought that the illegal sale has been going on for quite a while. Dr. ReBarker, Dr. Meadows and Dr. Frank were seen staggering from the building last week, but they explained it by saying they had been almost overcome by heat. Only three days ago Miss Peterson had to be carried from the office on a stretcher--she had been taken ill suddenly. It is rumored that any of the faculty members who have been buying from Mr. Wright and no charges will be made against them. Miss Bowen and Miss Wadlington have been undergoing continual grilling by officers. The janitor had seen them carrying mysterious packages (Continued on Page 4)

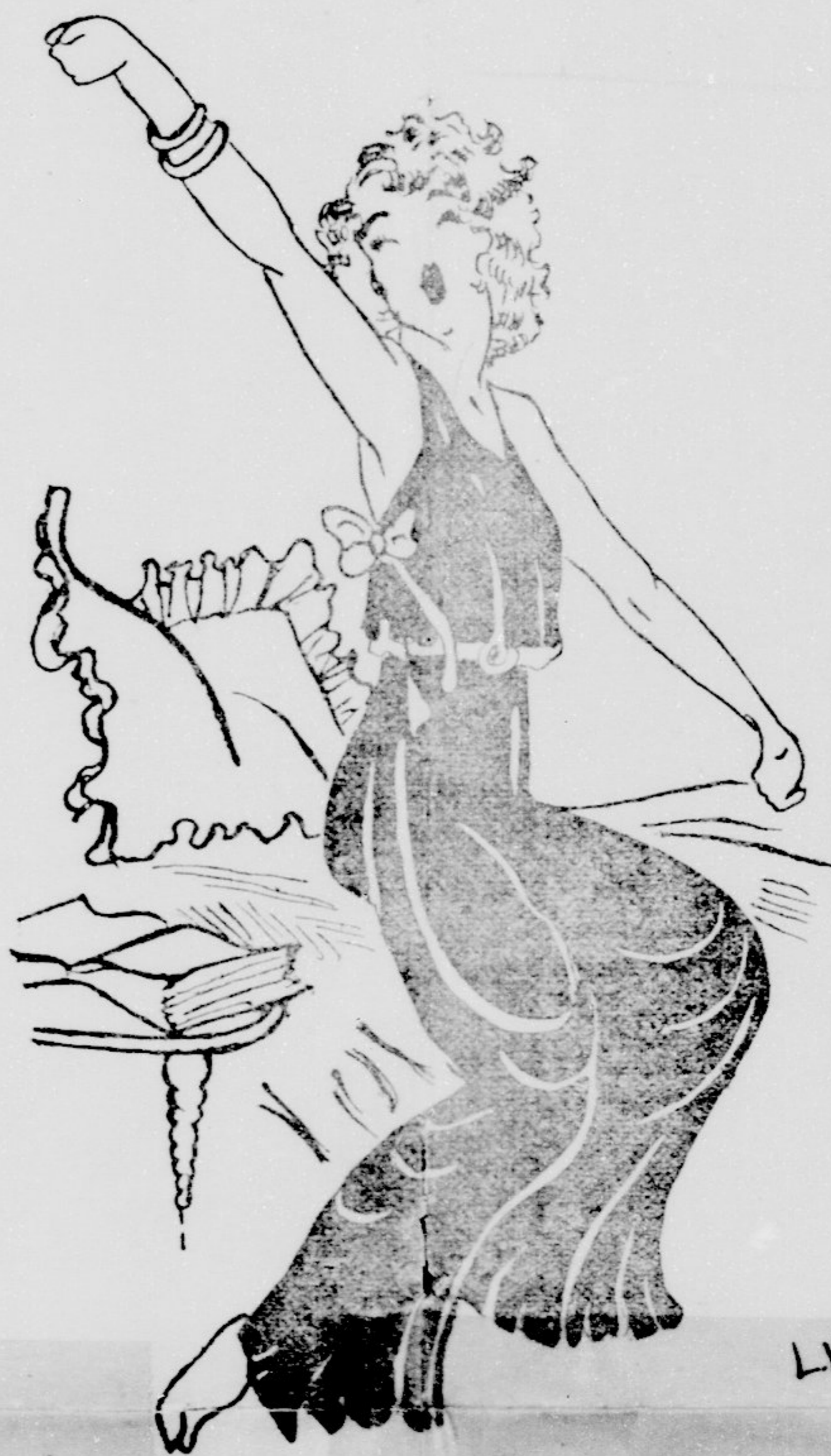
