After being sworn in at the SGA banquet Tuesday night, Scott Thomas began his year as SGA president on Wednesday. Former

president, Steve Cunanan, will graduate in May.

Thomas enters office, plans for next year

"It feels a lot different to be sitting on this side of the desk," Scott Thomas said on Wednesday about his first day as the Student Government President.

"I've worked very close with Steve throughout the year, but until the campaign and right now, I didn't realize the time and effort this job requires," he added.

Thomas started his involvement with SGA three years ago as a member of the Review Board. After serving as the sophomore class president and a member of the legislature last year, he was appointed the chair of the appropriations committee this year. Now he says he's ready to put forth every effort possible to make his year as president a successful one.

"I want to see that SGA continues to operate efficiently and make improvements in such areas as transit and refrigerator rentals," he said. "I'm also looking forward to working closely with Chancellor Eakin and the entire administration as well as the Board of Trustees and the Greenville City Council to make sure that the students views are heard and presented in a professional manner."

"I hope to continue the close working relationship that the legislature and executive branch has. I think it's important for the branches to be able to work together in order to fully represent the students," Thomas added.

He said that one area in the SGA that needs improvement is student involvement. Although there are a number of ways to encourage students to get involved, Thomas said the main problem is making students aware of the opportunities that are available to them. He suggested opportunities such as legislative positions that are open in the fall, positions in the judicial branch and cabinet positions that are available to students. "Steve did a good job getting the cabinet system going this year. Next year I hope to expand it even further to better serve students."

Another area that Thomas plans on being active in is the attempt to get better recreational facilities on campus. "If we can get student support, I think we will have a definite impact on whether or not we will get the facilities. Although they may not be completed while we are here, it's something we can initiate to better the university. Better facilities attract more students."

Commenting on the upcoming elections for next year's vice president and treasurer, Thomas said that he felt all the candidates are well qualified. "The students have a good selection to choose from—I know that I will be able to work with whoever the students decide is the best person for the job."

"I'm excited about the opportunity that lies ahead. This is a growing university and I look forward to devoting myself to its continued success," he said.

Cunanan reflects on past presidency

Looking back at the last 12 months, former SGA President Steve Cunanan can honestly say that his term in office has "without a doubt been worthwhile."

"It has been a very positive experience for me. I've learned a lot—in fact I think I've learned more in the past year about everyday skills I'll need when I get in the "real world" than I have learned in four years of structured classroom learning," said Cunanan.

He did admit though that it was nothing like he expected and that the amount of time he has allotted for the job has been "phenomenal."

"This past year I've been involved in search teams for the chancellor and two basketball coaches. I've lobbied in Washington, D.C. twice and been involved with the state organization of UNCASG," said Cunanan. "Combined with the day to day matters I need to take

care of here at ECU, it has made for a very busy year. Obviously, this is a busy time for the university."

He added that top on his list of priorities as president has been accepting the opportunities to speak to organizations as a representative of the students. "It has been a challenge to find the time to accept as many invitations as possible, but I've felt it was important to represent the students as often and as best as possible."

"My term as president has allowed me to get a lot of satisfaction out of myself—I know I've given it my all, held my own and done my best," Cunanan said. "I am also very satisfied with who I am leaving the office to. I know Scott will do a good job for the students and the university."

According to Cunanan, he has managed to give the Student Government some credibility in the past year. "I think as a whole the SGA has been able to get away from the idea that we are

students who are subservient to somebody in the university community—we've changed it to the idea that we are equals."

"I wasn't faced with a lot of problems in SGA when I took over the office last spring. Of course we needed to increase the opportunities for student involvement. I've tried to work on this through the cabinet system I installed this year," he explained. "But basically, SGA is self-sustaining."

"Next year's SGA will need to look into the role of involvement

of minority students," Cunanan added. "But, this is something that not only SGA needs to address, but all campus organizations."

After graduating in May with a degree in psychology, Cunanan plans on entering graduate school.

"It's been fun," he said as he looked back on the year. "I want to thank every student for giving me the opportunity to serve them. It's been a honor and a privilege I wouldn't have wanted to miss."

The candidates for SGA treasurer are Chris Holland and Karen Millar.

Holland is senior majoring in Psychology and Communications. He has served on the SGA as a day representative and a member of the Screens and Appointments Committee. He has also served as the financial manager of a video company and as the day manager of a restaurant.

Millar is a junior majoring in French and English. She has served as an SGA day representative and is a member of Phi Sigma Pi National Honor Fraternity. She has also been an assistant manager of a retail store, and was responsible for the book-keeping of a small business.

Students start youth program

The East Carolina Friends, a newly formed organization on campus, held its first interest meeting Tuesday night in Mendenhall. East Carolina Friends is a non-profit organization formed to place ECU students with younger kids throughout the Greenville area. The big sister—big brother type organization will hopefully provide companionship, guidance, and enjoyable experiences for children who might otherwise not have the opportunity for each.

The children, between grades K-6, are selected by counselors. The children are not necessarily low income underprivileged kids; they are children who the counselors think would benefit from the program the most.

Gay Matrew, founder and president of the group, said that she saw a need in the Pitt County area for an organization such as this. Matrew said that the present

help programs throughout the area were not adequate and she wanted to do more. "A lot of times it's easy to get wrapped up in school and forget about things and people around us. The program gives students the chance to reach out and show others what they have to offer," Matrew went on to say. "It takes a special kind of person to be a big brother or big sister. Anyone can give away gifts, but it is harder to give of yourself."

East Carolina Friends hopes to attract the kind of people who believe that they can make a difference in other peoples lives. Not only does the group hope to attract volunteers to spend time with the kids, but also any other student or faculty member interested in supporting the group in any other way.

The program will get under way at ECU in the fall. Early information is being made available so that interested persons have time to think about the kind of commitment they will have to make and the sacrifices

which will go with it. Chris Harris, vice-president of East Carolina Friends said "We need people who are in it for the kids; people who are dedicated, responsible, enthusiastic and concerned with giving those qualities away to kids who need their time."

Beginning in the fall East Carolina Friends will only take applicants who are qualified. The applicants must meet academic as well as personal qualifications determined in an interview. Harris and Matrew both agreed that this program, more than any other, has the potential to have an impact on a child's life and really make a difference. The group needs student support however, or it will not get off the ground.

The program is closely monitored and members will be required to attend a training session. The session will be conducted by a professional who will address such issues as child

development, effective communication, and interpersonal skills. Students will be selected to be group leaders who will primarily help out with any problems that arise and evaluate various relationships.

East Carolina Friends also consists of an advisory board made up of interested professionals from ECU and the community. The head of the advisory council is Linda Could and the faculty advisor is Linda Mooney. Other members of the advisory council include Ron Spener, Charles Snow and other well qualified professionals who help in consulting and serve as a resource group.

East Carolina Friends is completely student run and consists of members and officers who compose the executive council. More information will be available on this organization before official applications are taken in the fall. The second interest meeting will be held April 28 at 7 p.m., place to be announced.

I was the chairperson of the Student Union Forum Committee, which brings lectures and debates to campus, last year and due to my competency in overseeing the committee, I have been re-elected for the position next year. I am currently a member of the Gamma Beta Phi Honor Society and the University Affirmative Action Advisory Committee and an English major with a concentration in writing. I have been involved in the Student Government Association this year as a cabinet member in charge of student affairs under President Steve Catanan. The purpose of my position was to research student concerns and present my findings to him so that he could present them to the legislature and they could vote more informed on the issue. In order to fulfill these duties, I have had to keep myself well-informed on all major issues and concerns of the students and research the matters in my spare time. I was commended by Steve at the SG4 banquet last Tuesday for going above and beyond my normal call of duty.

The reason that I've chosen to run for this office stems from the rally held last week which protested the elections. I am concerned about unrest among students and the division it has caused between them. If we continue to divide ourselves over issues that are raised to clean up certain organizations, we, as students, will never get anything accomplished. Civil turmoil is a sad sight, and fighting amongst ourselves will only cause a winning group of students to rise above the rest. There should be no such division. We are students and we are all equal regardless of whether we're Greek, non-Greek, black, white, man or woman. If we continue to divide ourselves over issues raised for the common good of the student, we will get nothing accomplished for ourselves. I am the voice of unity and will do

everything in my power to voice student's concerns.

There are a few areas that I'd like to see some changes in. They are mostly concerned with student health. First of all, living in the dorm for the past year, I have heard numerous complaints about the quality of the food served in the cafeteria. Many have said that the food's fat content is too high and that there are not enough low-calorie foods in the selection. I would like to look into this matter before the upcoming school year. Too many students have told me that they have had to eat cereal for dinner due to lack of better choices. Secondly, I would like to see vending machines with healthier foods, such as fruit juices, placed beside soda and candy machines. We should at least have a choice as to what goes into our bodies. My third suggestion is to designate smoking and non-smoking areas in buildings on campus. Though I, myself, am a smoker, there have been too many recent studies that show passive smoking endangers others to ignore the issue. If I want to damage my lungs, that's my business. However, I don't care to endanger anyone else's health in the process.

The last issue I will address concerns the lack of proper space for students and student organizations to place their posters. As you may or may not know, there are only a few "legal" areas on campus where posters may be hung. If posters are found in areas other than those listed in "Where Can I Put My Posters" brochure, issued by the ECU Division of Student Life, the student or organization is fined \$50. My complaint is that the designated areas are not in high-traffic areas and therefore not seen by students. If we are going to be fined for putting posters up in illegal places so that they can be seen, then we need more places to put our posters legally. The Censorship and Soliciting Committee has investigated the matter and has submitted a campus map marking illegal areas where more kiosks or bulletin boards are needed. As far as I know, no further action has been taken on the matter.

In closing I reiterate that we, as students, must unite to voice our concerns. If not, we will get nothing accomplished. I am that voice, and if elected, will do everything in my power to make it be heard.

The secret is all in the laughs

Can a farm kid from Kansas make it big in the New York business world? Director Herbert Ross answers that question with the funny — if not especially realistic — *The Secret of My Success*.

The farm kid, Brantley Foster (Michael J. Fox) has just finished college, lined up a job in New York, and decides to go take the Big Apple by storm. His mother is behind him all the way, but his father has his doubts and insists that Brantley buy a round-trip ticket.

Once in New York, Foster finds that his job has fallen through and scours the market for work. Turned down time after time because he doesn't have the experience (that no one will give him a chance to get), he finally goes to see his distant uncle, the chief executive of a multinational conglomerate, who reluctantly hires Foster and puts him in the mailroom.

When his boss sends him to drive an executive's wife home, Foster ends up in bed with her and then discovers that she's married to his uncle.

Foster's not the type to hide his time and wait for a promotion. He reads through the interoffice memos he handles, searching for an opening. Before long he uses the information he's gathered to create a phony position and so begins his double life as mailroom employee and dashing young executive. In this latter persona, he impresses all the other execs, takes over board meetings, and falls in love with Christy, an economics genius whom — unbeknownst to Foster

— is having an affair with his uncle.

The story sounds confusing but the plot moves along nicely and never gets bogged down in exposition.

Foster's predicament is funny, but the big laughs in *The Secret of My Success* come from clever little gags, most of which are of no consequence to the story. The film is littered with hilarious scenes like the one in which Foster is seduced in a pool to the theme from *Jaws*.

Michael J. Fox makes many of these gags work well; his timing upgrades some potentially amusing scenes to laugh-out-loud funny.

The movie is visually striking, and shows the New York of young people's dreams — monoliths at night splashed with colored light, breathtaking skylines — and reduces to comic relief the city's more threatening

aspects. With its close-up photography, and attention to brilliant color the film at times brings to mind the recent trend in soft drink commercials, but these techniques work well within the context.

Success doesn't go to any great lengths to be realistic (it's hard to believe the urbane Fox as the product of rural Kansas), but realism isn't needed here and it's not missed.

A wonderfully heavy-handed soundtrack adds to the movie's slick feel and compliments its humor in places. In fact, some of the funniest scenes wouldn't work at all without its musical push.

Don't expect anything profound from *The Secret of My Success*. It's engaging, fast moving and funny and that's the secret of its success.

Secret is playing for the next few weeks at the Platt Theatre.

You go ahead and put the record on. Side two first of course, it's got the most Stevie penned tunes on it. You commence to listen.

The first track is good. You're optimistic. Lyrics are below par, but "Little Lies" is the next single. Could open up your next mix tape.

You want to see a video of it. You liked the Magritte surrealism of the old "Hold Me" video. You figure that would work just fine here.

"Welcome to the Room... Sara." Big disappointment. You thought it would be a sequel. No connection. No cool words either. Song lacks the kind

of power Stevie used on "Rock a Little" album.

Stevie obviously depressed. "When I See You Again" too whitty and slow. Uses word "baby" 18 times. Hard to believe this is same woman who wrote "Edge of Seventeen." Somebody better give her mirror back.

Three McVie Buckingham compositions. All of them sound the same. Lots of Mambas, echoes and overdubs. You realize solo albums have killed this group, sucked out their energies. You wonder if John ever put out a solo LP.

Side one doesn't promise much. You've heard "Big Love" on radio. Haven't seen the video. You suspect moans are necessary if "Big Love" means what you think it does. "I wake up alone/With it all." Yep. You're right.

You look at back cover again. You want to put Lindsay on the front lawn. Stevie still wearing spiked heels. Christine told Rolling Stone that Stevie was drifting into Oz like Glenda the Good Witch of the North. Looks like Glenda's drifting on a high powered snowmobile.

You notice "Seven Wonders" is written by Sandy Stewart, a collaborator from the "Wild Horses" days. Stevie only adds "additional lyrics." You figure she tried to throw in a few "baby's" but they stopped her.

Song is upbeat enough. "Tango" is having problems with lyrics and "Seven Wonders" doesn't help. Neither does McVie's "Everywhere." "C'mon Baby/We better make a start/You better make it soon/Before you break my heart." Bah. You have a rancid taste in your mouth.

Rest of album too pathetic to go into. Tunes are all passable. Lyrics infantile. Joan Jet does better.

You feel sad. Let down. Like you're 50 cents short of a

12-pack. This ain't the Mac. You won't believe. You can't believe this is the band that got you through the 70's. Through disco and 10th grade.

And worse, you know this is the last album. If they don't tour this year, you've missed them forever. You wonder if you care anymore. An analogy comes to your mind.

The first time you got into the Attic or Barry's, you were excited and nervous. You had to pass a lit. You laughed at the graffiti scrawled above the stairs.

These days you don't laugh anymore. You know 'em by heart. Fleetwood Mac you can liken to those jokes and riddles. They're not fun anymore either.

Max Fleischer brought work to vivid life

Editor's note: This is the second of a two-part series on the work of Max Fleischer.

The mid-30s found Max Fleischer at an artistic and financial pinnacle; his Popeye cartoon series was recognized by Paramount Studios as a valuable property. In fact (in what was certainly a twist) the executives urged Max and his brother Dave to seek a more vivid means of artistic expression, namely, a color two-reel Popeye featurette. The brothers complied and the results were wonderful.

The artists dipped their pens into a virtual rainbow to produce the lovely, story-book tones in the initial Popeye two-reeler, "Popeye the Sailor Meets Sindbad the Sailor," which was released in 1936. The cartoon is vintage Fleischer in its full but quirky animation, hilarious ad-libs, and unique characterization. After all, who else would have given a two-headed giant (the voices of two constantly bickering old Jewish men?)

Visually, the most stunning element of these color Popeyes was Fleischer's 3-D process. This was not an optical effect to make characters come off the screen, but rather a process in which the cartoon's backgrounds were table top models instead of conventionally drawn backgrounds. Occasionally, certain objects were placed in the foreground as well to create depth of field. Max had pioneered the effect in earlier, black and white shorts, but seen in color, the images were less times as impressive. Unfortunately, economics forbade an extensive use of the process.

This success came approximately a year before Walt Disney scored the unsuspected financial bonanza of *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs*, the first feature length cartoon story. Paramount insisted the Fleischer brothers cut the studio a piece of the pie by making a cartoon movie. The resulting *Gulliver's Travels* was a dismal, uneven failure.

Technically, the film was flawless. But on a story level... well, there was no story level created or maintained. The film was just sort of there. The characters themselves as appealing as a piece of cardboard. Why? Because the Fleischers

were being forced to do something they were not. An earlier attempted Disney imitation, a series called "Color Classics" (an attempt to compete with "Silly Symphonies") had also fallen flat. This cookie cutter sentimentality was cloy and lame, and it was definitely not Fleischer. Another feature, *Hoppy Goes to Town*, also failed.

Max achieved a brief artistic and financial come back in the early '40s when the first Superman cartoon appeared. These cartoons were rarely seen in recent times until some home video moguls discovered the cartoons had lapsed from copyright and began committing them on tape for the children's market. This is a mixed blessing, for the quality is usually non-existent on these basement productions.

Still, a quality print of a Fleischer Superman cartoon is a wonder to behold. They captured perfectly the feel of Golden Age Comics and the pulp science fiction of the day. "Hand-held" camera shots, point-of-view scenes, and sweeping panoramas unfold in the space of a single cartoon. Air brush and double exposure work create breathtaking optics. Cinematic continuity devices such as pans and dissolves are in abundance. And the characters themselves were brought to life with intricate care, including modeling (the adding of facial shadows) and retouching.

This brief burst of technicolor glory was Max's last. With two strikes against him in the animated movie field, he was called out by the studio. Both Max and Dave found other work,

but their days of innovation and glory were over. This was partly their own fault, for they never attempted to own their own characters and often instead brought to life other people's characters (Popeye, Superman, Raggedy Ann and Andy). They were dependent on a parent organization for funds and distribution even during the silent era. Max was an inventor and he was content to invent. He cared little for business and art when it strayed from innovation.

He died in the early '70s at the age of eighty-nine, never living to see his work duly recognized. Fortunately, his cartoons have become increasingly visible in recent years, making a new generation of fans aware that not only did Max Fleischer enjoy doing what he did best, he also did it like no one else.

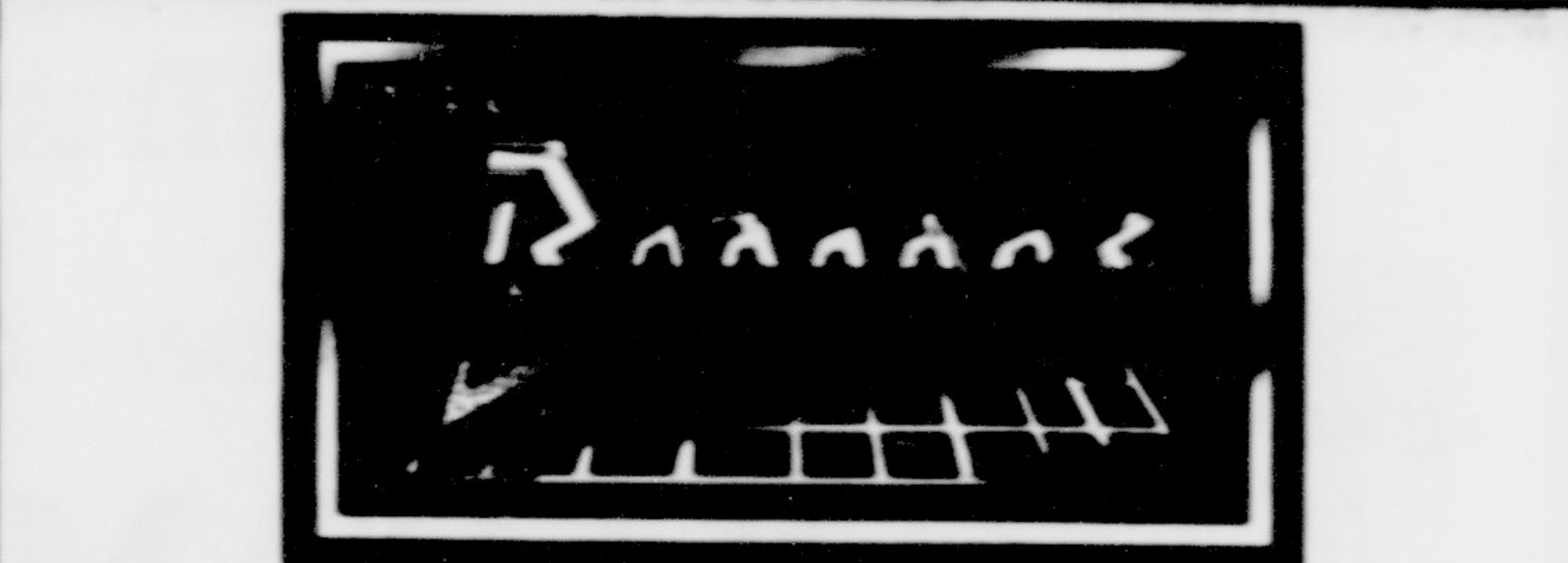

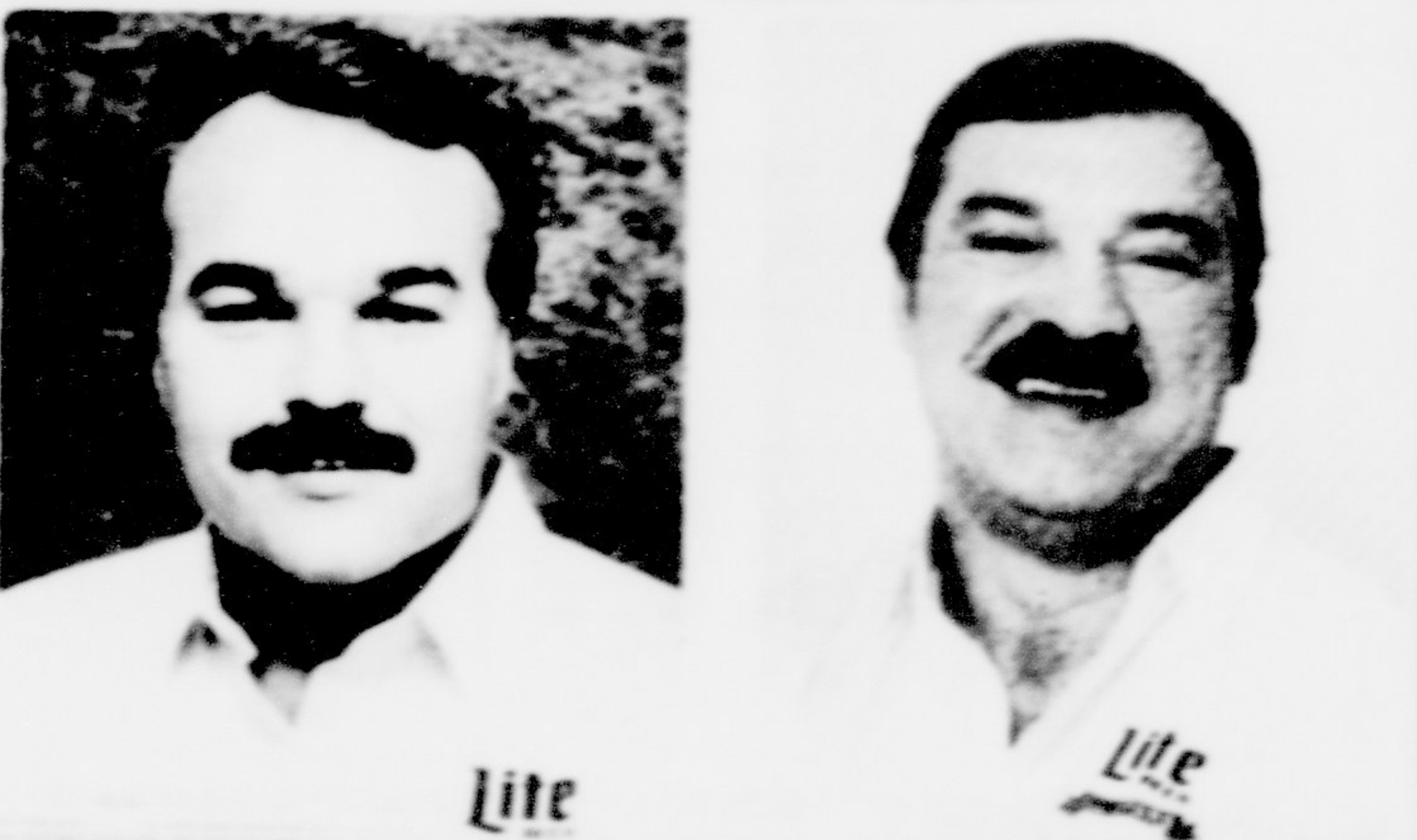

Conrath Bulls Into Pigskin Pigout — If there was one thing National Football League defensive players didn't may gush during the 1970's it was the sight of Larry Conrath running at them.

As Larry's Miller Lite commercial suggests, he never has been strong at speaking Spanish.

Larry's running helped the Dolphins achieve perfection in 1972-73 — a 17-0 record.

Larry was named Most Valuable Player in the Dolphins' victory over the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl VIII. He ran 33 times for a then Super Bowl record of 145 yards. Later that year, he was voted Super Athlete of the Year by the Professional Football Writers Association.

After gaining 5,900 yards for the Dolphins from 1968 to 1974, Larry signed a lucrative contract with the World Football League, but after a year, he was back in the NFL with the New York Giants. In 1979, he returned to the Dolphins where he played the last year of his career.

When he was done, Larry had rushed for 8,081 yards and 64 touchdowns. Incredibly, Larry only fumbled 20 times in his 11 years in the NFL.

Conrath's best season came in 1972 when he picked up 1,117 yards rushing on 213 attempts. The most touchdowns recorded by Conrath in one season came in 1979 when he reached the endzone 12 times.

In his spare time, Larry likes bass or trout fishing and bird hunting. He also likes to spend time on his farm in his home state of Ohio.

Larry and his wife, Pam, have been married 22 years and have 2 sons — Doug, 20 and Paul, 18.

Conrath will arrive in Greenville on Thursday, April 23 and will be present for all of the Thursday and Friday activities, including the auction-social and the golf tournament. Conrath is scheduled to participate in the golf tournament, which will be played at Brook Valley Country Club.

Dirty Dobler To Make Appearance — Fellow Miller Lite All-Star John Madden once put a \$100 bounty on the head of Conrad Dobler, payable to the player who knocked Conrad out of the game.

It wasn't the bounty that bothered Conrad, though. He was mad because he thought

the price was too low.

"I've got a bounty out on Madden now," Conrad said. "\$50."

The fact was, National Football League defensive linemen didn't need any incentive to try to put Conrad out of a game.

To them, he was Sidelly Whiplash, Jack the Ripper and Darth Vader rolled into one — "The Dirtiest Player in Pro Football."

Conrad lives with that title proudly — it's his badge of courage from his ten years as an offensive guard with the St. Louis Cardinals, New Orleans Saints and Buffalo Bills.

Stretching the rules of the game was his way of intimidating players who were more naturally gifted than he.

"I wasn't a big guy, so I had to take the game away from my opponents mentally to beat

them physically. I'd make them angry and then they'd lose their poise."

To this day, some of the defensive linemen Conrad faced haven't regained their poise.

"Some guys still won't talk to me," Conrad said.

Approved of his style or not, Conrad Dobler proved successful in his NFL career. He played in three Pro Bowls while he was with the Cardinals, and his offensive lines were almost always at, or near, the top of the league in lowest quarterback sacks allowed. Conrad is extremely proud of that, too.

"One year, 1975, we allowed only eight quarterback sacks," Conrad said. "And one of those was on a botched field goal attempt, and two others were when the backs just completely blew their assignments. So, as an offensive line, we on-

ly allowed five quarterback sacks this year."

Those eight sacks allowed tied an NFL record that still stands.

Conrad joined the Cardinals in 1972, as a fifth round draft choice out of Wyoming. He was cut from the squad just before the Cardinals' opening game that year. But the Cardinals called him back the day after the second game, and he stayed in the NFL until he retired in 1981.

Today, Conrad is a real estate developer in Greeley, Colorado, where he lives with his wife, Linda, and their three children.

Dobler will arrive in Greenville on Friday, April 24 and will be present for all of the activities scheduled for Saturday.

Women netters look to CAA tourney

The East Carolina women's tennis team heads into the Colonial Athletic Association Women's Tennis Championships with hopes of closing out a successful season on a high note.

The Lady Pirates finished the season with an 18-9 overall record, which included a 13-5 mark in the spring season and a 5-4 clip last fall.
