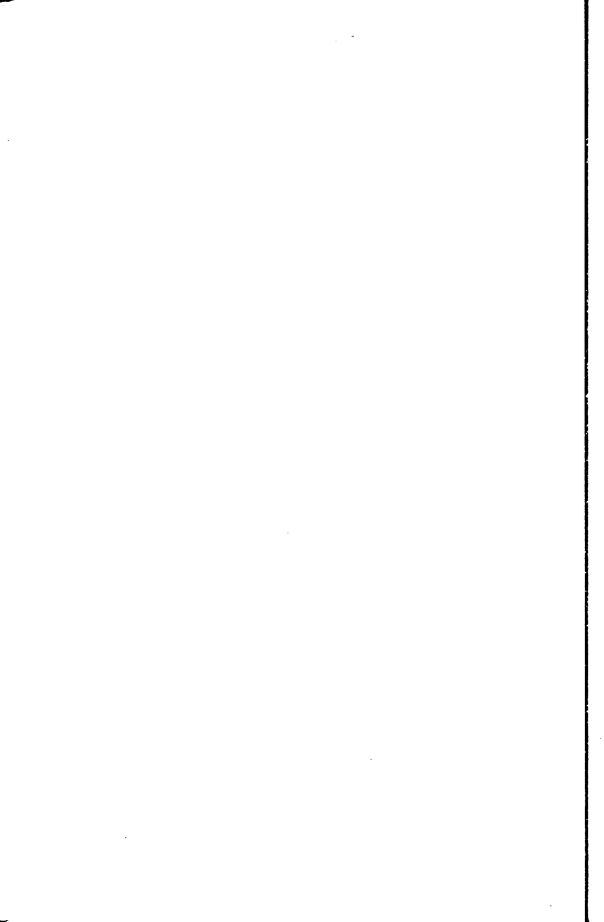

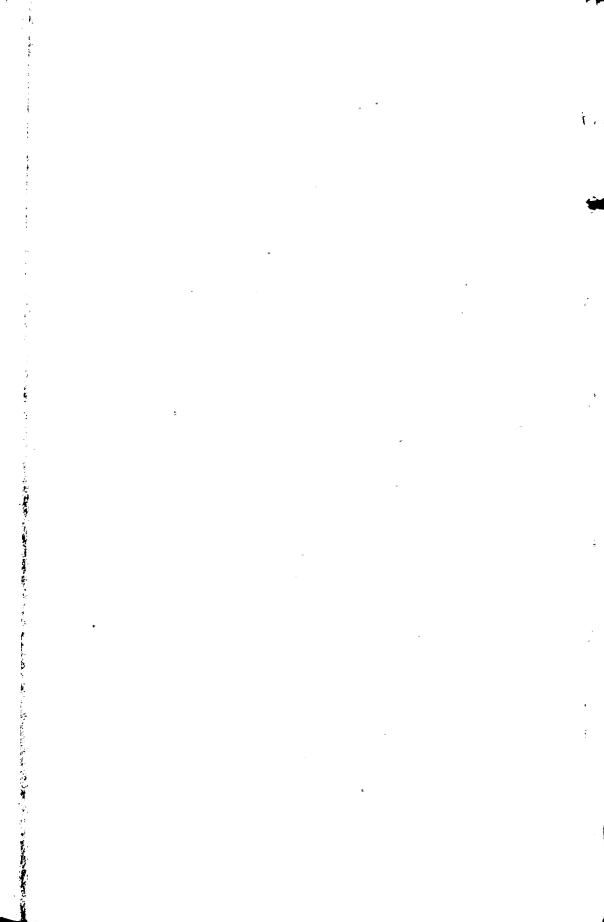

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this association shall be the Student Self-Government Association of the East Carolina Teachers College.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization shall be to develop self control; to direct matters concerning college life, not reserved to the jurisdiction of the faculty; to encourage right ideals and promote a sense of personal responsibility in the students of the college; to keep in sympathetic touch and to co-operate with the student government movement.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

(Amendment to the Constitution of Student Self-Government Organization)

Section 1.

All students of the college shall be members of this association.

Section 2.

There shall be a fee of \$5.00 per term, payable by every student at registration to the Student Self-Government Association. This fee shall cover all publications and entertainments.

Section 3.

Funds thus collected shall be appropriated by a budget committee, which shall be composed of five students and two faculty advisors constituted as follows:

The president of the Student Government shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee.

The president of the Student Government Association shall appoint each year within one week after she assumes the duties as president, four members of the Student Government, at least one of whom shall be a day student, who shall serve on the committee for the rest of the year and for all the ensuing year.

The president of the Student Government Association shall at the same time each year appoint one member of the faculty who shall serve as an advisory member for a period of two years.

Section 4.

The budget committee shall meet within two weeks after the opening of the fall term each year and appropriate on the percentage basis the money to be derived from the students' fees for the ensuing year; the funds shall then be paid over by the Student Self-Government Association, as collected, to the different organizations that are to receive such appropriations.

Section 5.

The appropriations made by the budget committee shall be subject to review by the President of the College.

Section 6.

All money collected under this section of the constitution shall be appropriated for the purpose of entertainment and publications. Funds thus appropriated shall be administered by the committee elected or appointed, by the organi-

zations sharing these funds.

Section 7.

The budget committee shall have power to grant to college organizations special permission to give entertainments for which they may charge admission.

Section 8.

The President of the Student Government Association shall appoint, in January, three students and one faculty member to serve on the entertainment committee. The faculty member appointed shall select two other faculty members to assist her.

ARTICLE IV—MEETINGS

Section 1.

There shall be three regular meetings of the Student Self-Government Association each year: one as soon as possible after the beginning of the first term in order to read and explain the constitution and by-laws; the second meeting, soon after the beginning of the second term; the third meeting, not later than the first Wednesday in the third term.

Section 2.

Special meetings of the Association may be called by the president upon her own motion and must be called by her upon the written request of twenty-five members. The object of these meetings shall be stated in writing when the request is made.

Section 3.

All members must attend all meetings except when excused by the president or when in the infirmary.

Section 4.

There shall be a regular mass-meeting seat assigned at the first mass-meeting held in the fall term.

Section 5.

There shall be a special course of training in student government for the new girls during the first four weeks in each term. Attendance at these meetings is compulsory. A knowledge of the handbook is required in order to drop this training.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS

Section 1.

The officers of this organization shall be the president, elected from the incoming senior or senior normal class; the vice-president, from the incoming senior or senior normal class; secretary, from the incoming junior class; treasurer, from the incoming sophomore class; chairman of the campus committee and house presidents and vice-house-presidents from the incoming senior, junior, sophomore, and senior normal classes. (The president must be chosen from among those who have served on the Council.)

Section 2.

Officers of the Student Government Association shall be nominated at a mass-meeting at

least two weeks before election day and shall be approved by the Advisory Board of the Association at least one week before election.

Section 3.

(a) These officers shall be elected by the Australian ballot on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of the spring term, to go on duty four weeks after the election.

(b) The president shall be elected by a two-thirds majority. The others shall be elected by a simple majority vote.

(c) Vacancies shall be filled within one week by special election.

Section 4.

(a) The duties of the president shall be to call and preside over all meetings of the Student Self-Government Association; to summon before her at her discretion any member of the association.

(b) The duties of the vice-president shall be to act in the absence of the president.

(c) The duties of the secretary shall be to record the proceedings of all the meetings of the Association and of the Student Council; to post all official notices; to submit to the Dean of Women the lists of members, officers, committees, and other bodies appointed by the Association.

(d) The duties of the treasurer shall be to keep a strict and permanent account of all receipts and expenditures, to collect fines, and to present a report at the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5.

One class representative from each class shall be elected by her class within six weeks after the opening of the college in the fall, and shall immediately go on duty.

Section 6.

There shall be a House of Representatives composed of vice-house-president and one member elected from each outstanding organization other than classes. The body shall meet with the regular Council at the first regular meeting in each month, and shall be called in on any special case when the president deems it necessary.

ARTICLE VI—LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative powers of this Association shall be vested in the Association as a whole.

ARTICLE VII—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Section 1.

The executive powers of this Association shall be vested in the Student Council, composed of the officers of the Association, one representative from each of the classes, and the president of the Young Women's Christian Association.

Section 2.

It shall be the duty of this Council to enforce the rules of the Association and to consider the business of that body. This Council shall have the power to remove members serving on the committees when deemed necessary.

Section 3.

The Council shall have the right to appoint

proctors at the beginning of each term for the various halls of the respective dormitories. These proctors together with their house presidents and vice-house-presidents shall constitute the house committee.

Section 4.

(a) No conditioned student is eligible for election to membership to the Student Council.

(b) A council member who fails in one subject must resign immediately.

(c) All council members shall take this pledge: "I promise that I will not repeat one word that is said or reveal anything that happens in these council meetings, and that I will faithfully perform the duties of my office."

(d) The Council, according to its discretion, shall punish those students who break this pledge.

ARTICLE VIII—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

Section 1.

The judicial powers of this Association shall be vested in the Student Council. This Council may call before it and reprimand any member of the Association and exercise the power to withdraw privileges.

Section 2.

In order that the standards of this college may be raised and upheld by the students, the Council hereby declares it will recommend the expulsion of a student for any one of the following acts, or any other as serious: stealing, cheating in any form; lying to the Council;

night riding; smoking and drinking intoxicating liquors.

ARTICLE IX--AMENDMENTS

Section 1.

There shall be an advisory board composed of the President of the College, the Dean of Women, and three members of the faculty appointed by the President of the College for a period of three years. The President of the College shall be chairman.

Section 2.

The Advisory Board, with the Student Council, shall constitute the School Council.

Section 3.

The School Council shall hold at least one meeting each term.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS

An amendment may be proposed by any fifteen members of the Association, by any member of the Advisory Board, or by the Student Council. A proposed amendment must be approved by the School Council, after which it shall be posted at least one week before it is presented to the Association. An amendment shall become a part of the constitution when adopted by a two-thirds vote of the Association.

BY-LAWS

Section 1.

There shall be a Union Pay Day appointed after all organizations are formed at which time all dues for each organization must be paid.

Section 2. *Order of Business.*

1. Meeting called to order by the president.
2. Attendance taken by the marshals.
3. College songs, and others, if desired.
4. Reading of the minutes by the secretary.
5. Report from the Student Council.
6. Report of the treasurer.
7. Report of the committees.
8. Unfinished business.
9. New business.
10. Adjournment.

Section 3. *House Committees and Duties.*

- (1)—The duties of the house committees shall be:
- (a) To uphold ideals of student government and to enforce its regulations.
 - (b) To report to the Student Council violation of regulations
 - (c) To hold regular meetings.
- (2)—The duties of the house-president shall be:
- (a) To preside over all meetings of her house and her house committee.
 - (b) To call before her at her discretion any member residing in her house.
 - (c) To give to all students living

in her house permissions which violate no dormitory regulation.

- (3)—The duties of the proctors shall be:
- (a) To keep order in their section.
 - (b) To give to the members of their section such information as the house president may ask.
 - (c) To appoint sub-proctors in her section to assist her when necessary.

Section 4. Committees.

- (1)—Social.

The social committee shall have charge of all social functions of the Association. There shall be an annual social every fall for the new students.

- (2)—Point System Committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to keep a record of the honors and number of points held by each student during her college career.

The maximum number of points a student may hold in one year is ten.

- (3)—Campus Committee.

There shall be a campus committee composed of two sub-committees: an interior committee and an exterior committee.

The business of the interior committee shall be to look after the conduct of the students while in the Administration Building and in the Dining Room and to have charge of all stage properties and costumes.

The business of the exterior committee shall be to look after the appearance of the campus and the behavior of the students while on the campus.

The campus committee, as a whole, shall make posters for the Association drives and campaigns and in other ways be a publicity department for the Student Self-Government Association.

Girls needing medicine must get it before

7:30 P. M. In case of emergency girls may go to the infirmary at any hour.

A sick student may not be visited by anyone in the college except her roommate, once each day, and then only with the permission of the nurse in charge.

1. There must be quiet in the dormitories from 7:30 P. M. to 6:30 A. M.
2. Quiet must be observed in the library at all times.
3. There shall be reasonable quiet in the dormitories and Administration Building at all times.
4. Students must stay in their rooms when they do not attend Church and Sunday School Sunday mornings and Y. W. C. A. services Sunday evenings.
5. Study hour shall extend from 7:30 P. M. to 10:25 P. M., during which time students shall stay in their own rooms unless permitted to study elsewhere.
6. Five minutes after the ringing of the meal bell, students must be in their places in the dining room.
7. Students must go immediately to their own dormitories at the 10:00 o'clock light signal.
8. Students, after shopping, calling, etc., must return to the campus by the dinner hour (5:55 P. M.)

II SOCIAL

1. Calling hours are from 3:30 to 5:45 P. M. on week days; from 4:00 to 5:45 P. M. on Sundays; from 8:00 to 10:15 P. M. in the evenings.

2. Students who expect company, relatives, or friends, on Sunday must file their own names and room numbers, and the names of the persons who are to come. These must be filed not later than 1:45 P. M. Saturday.

3. When a student wishes to go calling, she must file her own name and room number and the name and address of the person upon whom she wishes to call. This request must be in the office of the Dean of Women not later than 1:45 P. M. on the day she wishes to call. If she hears nothing further from the Dean of Women, it is understood that the request is granted.

4. After public entertainments students may converse with guests, but must bid them good-night before leaving the building in which the entertainment has been given.

5. Students must not dine at restaurants or go to any office or to the railroad station without special permission from the Dean of Women.

6. Students may speak to young men on the street, but may not carry on an extended conversation with them, nor walk with them.

7. Students must wear hats when calling or shopping.

8. On leaving or returning to the campus, students must register.

9. Students must have a special permission sent directly to the President of the College from their parents for each out-of-town privilege.

10. Week-end permits must be filed by 10:30 A. M. Saturday.

11. No student may go calling and shopping on the same permission unless it is her shopping day. Students who wish to go calling must return directly to the college unless permitted to do otherwise.

12. No student is to go home or make any out-of-town visits two week-ends in succession without special permission from the Dean of Women. No student is to leave the college within the first three weeks after the opening of the fall term unless given special permission by the Dean of Women.

13. A student must not leave the college for week-end visits until thirty minutes before her train or bus time, and must return within thirty minutes after her train or bus arrives in Greenville, unless she is specially permitted by the college to do otherwise.

III CURRICULA

The maximum number of credits a student may take in one quarter is 18.

Students are expected to continue through the quarter in the courses in which they register. However, courses may be dropped within the first four weeks of the quarter provided such changes are approved by the teachers whose courses are concerned, the student's advisor, and the registrar's office. If a student registers for and pursues a course for four or more weeks after registration, discontinuance of such a course will be considered as a fail-

ure in fixing the next quarter's program of work.

Students cannot enter courses later than the third week of the quarter and get credit for such courses.

Students may drop courses from their programs and take other courses instead provided such changes are made before the beginning of the third week of the quarter and approved by the registrar's office.

If a student makes one or more 5's, he shall be required to take three hours of work less than he carried during the quarter the 5's were made.

No student who has failed in 50 per cent of his work shall be permitted to register the next quarter except by recommendation from his teachers to the credits committee and with approval of the president.

No student will be given credit for the removal of a "C" unless a written permission from the instructor is filed with the credits committee at the beginning of the term during which the condition is to be removed.

Any student who misses 25 per cent of her class work in any subject will not get credit for the term's work, let the cause be whatsoever it may.

A student who misses 25 per cent of recitations in any three-credit subject for any month of four weeks (for any cause whatsoever) shall stand a written examination on that subject for that month before getting a grade in that subject.

A student will be allowed three unexcused absences per month of four weeks.

MISCELLANEOUS

1. Students must not use the telephone without permission.

2. Students who do not take music are not allowed in the practice rooms during school hours nor allowed to use the pianos at any time. They may, however, use the pianos in the recreation hall and gymnasium after school hours.

3. There shall be no reading, writing, or talking during the chapel exercises.

4. Gasoline and benzine are not to be used in the dormitories.

5. Students must not use electric irons, chafing dishes, or sterno outfits. Curling irons must not be used in the dormitories which are not fireproof.

GENERAL PRIVILEGES

1. Students may occasionally go driving on any afternoon except Sunday with chaperons approved by the Dean of Women. Students may go to ride with parents and near relatives on Sunday afternoon. (Any student whose conduct, while she is driving, is unsatisfactory will have her driving privileges recalled. Any student driving during the day without permission will be subject to penalties imposed by the Student Council.)

2. Students may spend Sunday in town with relatives with permission from the Dean of Women.

3. Students may go to the picture show once

a week. The picture must be approved by the Dean of Women.

4. Students may spend Saturday and Sunday nights with friends in the dormitory with permission from the house-president, provided there are not more than three in the room.

5. Students may go walking in groups of five, provided they sign up and do not go to town. The streets which may be used are Student on to the river, the part of Fifth Street which leads toward Washington and Charles Street.

6. Students may have their mothers, sisters and girl friends visit in their rooms during calling hours, but not later than 9:30 P. M. This applies to the student body as a whole and not to girls who have company in the parlor.

7. Students may be permitted to see near relatives at any time except in class or during study hour.

8. Friends coming to see students for just a few minutes are not required to go to the parlors, but may talk with them in front of the building for ten minutes.

9. Lady friends and relatives may be entertained in the parlors of Dormitory A.

10. Students may leave the campus with a brother, twenty-one years or older, or sister, eighteen years or older, without a chaperone.

11. Students may ride from town to the campus with girl friends.

12. If girls wish to go hiking or play tennis or baseball, they may leave the dormitory

before 6:30 A. M.

CLASS PRIVILEGES

In addition to the general privileges, the following are according to classes:

First-Year Normal and Freshman Class

1. Students may go shopping Monday and Friday afternoons.

2. Students may go calling twice a month.

3. Students may have company twice a month, on Saturdays and Sundays.

4. Students may spend two week-ends each term out of town with permission mailed directly from parents to the President of the College.

5. One month before commencement, students may have for one week the privileges granted to the second-year normal and sophomore classes.

Senior Normal Class and Sophomores

1. Students may go down town any afternoon except Saturday and Sunday.

2. Students may go calling once a week.

3. Students may have company one night each week.

4. Students may spend three week-ends each term out of town, with permission mailed directly from the parents to the President of the College.

5. Students may study in the class rooms at night with permission from the Dean of Women.

6. Students may occasionally take meals in town with relatives with permission from the Dean of Women.

7. All third-term Senior Normal students who have not been restricted are allowed junior privileges during the spring term.

8. Other senior normal students and the sophomores are allowed junior privileges during the last month of the spring term.

Junior Class

1. Students have all the aforementioned privileges.

2. Students may use the Study Hall at night.

3. Students in groups of twos may sign up and walk off the campus in the vicinity of the college except during school hours.

4. Students may have three dates during one week-end, once each term, provided the friend comes from a distance.

5. Students may get permission from the Student Government Association president occasionally to go to the cafe.

6. Students may go down town any afternoon after 12:30, provided it does not interfere with school work.

7. At the discretion of the Dean of Women, juniors may on week days occasionally ride with friends when properly chaperoned. Juniors may ride on Sunday afternoon if they are properly chaperoned and have the approval of the Dean of Women and the parents.

8. Juniors are allowed senior privileges during the spring quarter.

Senior Class

1. Students have all the aforementioned privileges.

2. Students may go to the theatre or to

church with brothers by filing their names.

3. Students may go to church or to the theatre with a gentleman, provided there are two girls in the group and they return immediately after the show or church. The shows must be approved.

4. Students may go to the picture show two afternoons or evenings each week provided they go in groups of twos. They must be back on the campus within thirty minutes after the first evening show is over. In no case must they be out later than ten o'clock.

5. Students may go up town at any time during the day except at class periods.

6. Students may entertain a woman friend in the dormitory one night during commencement.

7. Students may go to the cafeteria for lunch or dinner, except on Sunday, returning in time for study hour.

8. Students may study in one another's room during study hour with reasonable quiet.

9. With permission from the Dean of Women, seniors may, on week days, ride at any time during the day. With the approval of the Dean of Women and the parents, seniors may drive on Sunday afternoons.

The Library Rules

The purpose of the library is to give the best service possible to all who wish to use it. To do this, there must be a spirit of co-operation among the borrowers, and a willingness to abide by the rules of the library. The library is for the the use of all, and the students are placed on their honor in regard to the use of the books, magazines, etc. It is also requested that the students take care in the use of the building, books, magazines, etc. In order to make the best of the library, the following rules have been adopted:

The books in the reference room, as encyclopedias, dictionaries, yearbooks, etc., are not to be taken from the library, and are to be used in that room as much as possible. The magazines, both back files and current issues, are to be used in the library.

The books on the reserve shelf, which are books used by classes for special work, are to be used in the room during the day, but may be taken out when the library closes at night, and over the week-end. They must be returned by 9:00 in the morning.

The books, not on the reserve shelf, may be taken for one or two weeks according to the demand for the books. Most books of fiction are issued for one week, but may be renewed unless there is a demand for the books.

The books on the reserve shelf which are not

returned by 9:00 in the morning will be subject to a fine of 5 cents an hour, for the first five hours they are out of the library. The books not on the reserve desk will be subject to a fine of two cents a day for each day they are kept overtime.

All books must be returned and all fines paid before the end of each school term, or the grades of the student will be withheld until the fines are paid. All lost books must be paid for. Any student who cuts, tears, or otherwise mutilates a magazine will be held responsible for the price of the magazine.

It is expected that order be observed in the library at all times.

The College Supply Store

The college supply store carries all kinds of school supplies including college stationery college stickers, pennants, and pillow tops. All supplies are sold at minimum prices for the benefit of the college girls.

Post Office Regulations

The college post office is under the supervision of the college and not the national government. Mail is brought to the college three times a day—before breakfast, before lunch, and about 3:30 P. M. Special deliveries are carried to the dormitories. The college handles in outgoing packages only parcel post. It does not handle insured or registered mail. That is handled directly by the Greenville U. S. Post Office.

The college has a local service within the college post office so that students and faculty

members may communicate with each other readily by this means.

Post office boxes are assigned to students at the beginning of the year, or whenever they matriculate, free of charge. More than one student is assigned to a box, owing to the large number of students in school.

Stamps and post cards may be purchased at the P. O. at delivery hours.

CONSTITUTION

THE YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

—of—

EAST CAROLINA TEACHERS COLLEGE

Article I—Name

This organization shall be called the Young Women's Christian Association of East Carolina Teachers College.

Article II—Purpose

The Young Women's Christian Association of East Carolina Teachers College, a member of the Young Women's Christian Association of the United States of America, and a participant in the World's Student Christian

Federation, declares its purpose to be:

We the members of the Young Women's Christian Association of East Carolina Teachers College, unite in the desire to realize full and creating life through a growing knowledge of God.

We determine to have a part in making this life possible for all people.

In this task, we seek to understand Jesus and to follow him.

Article III—Membership

Sec. 1. Any woman of the institution may be a member of the Association provided she makes the following declaration: I wish to enter the fellowship of the Young Women's Christian Association and will endeavor to uphold the purpose in my own life.

Sec. 2. Anyone who contributes to the funds of the Association an amount not less than the regular membership dues may be enrolled as an honorary member of the Association, and shall be entitled to such privileges as the constitution may deem desirable.

Sec. 3. The membership fee shall be one dollar per annum.

Sec. A member may be received from, or transferred to, any other Association affiliated with the Young Women's Christian Association of the United States of America which makes provision for such transfer and whose membership fee is not less than \$1.00 per year. Such membership shall be considered valid until the expiration of the original membership.

Article IV—Officers

Sec. 1. The officers shall be the President, Vice-President, Under-graduate Representative Secretary, and Treasurer. They shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the Association in March, and shall assume their duties of their respective offices immediately after the report of the examination has been received. The new and retiring councils shall in a joint session outline the policies for the work for the coming year.

Sec. 2. If any vacancy occurs in the list of officers, it shall be filled at the next regular meeting of the Association or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

Sec. 3. The President shall preside at all business meetings of the Association and of the Executive Council and shall be an *ex officio* member of the committees and sub-committees. She shall hold the committee chairmen responsible for the work of their respective committees, and for the development of efficiency on the part of committee members. On retiring from office, she shall present a written report covering her term of office in the Association. This report shall be placed in the file of the Association.

Sec. 4. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in her absence, and shall act as chairman of the membership department.

Sec. 5. The Secretary shall keep full minutes of all meetings and records of the Association, including a complete list of members,

the number and character of meetings and classes and shall aid the President in the correspondence.

Sec. 6. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Association under the direction of the Executive Council. She shall present to the council a monthly report and at the annual meeting, a general report covering the receipts and expenditures of the year. The Treasurer shall be chairman of the Finance Committee.

Sec. 7. The officers of the Association, with the committee chairmen shall constitute the executive council, and shall have general management of the affairs of the Association. The Executive Council shall meet weekly and shall have special meetings at the call of the President.

Article V—Committees

Sec. 1. Committee chairmen appointed by the President to serve one year, shall be as follows:

1. Membership Committee.
2. Finance Committee.
3. Publicity Committee.
4. Religious Education Committee.
5. Social Committee.
6. Social Service Committee.
7. World Fellowship Committee.

Sec. 2. Each Committee shall hold regular meetings for the consideration of its special part of the Association work.

Sec. 3. Duties of the committees shall be outlined as follows:

(1)—Membership Committee

The Membership Committee shall have charge of the special effort to reach new students at the beginning of the year, and shall throughout the school year aim to increase the membership of the Association.

(2)—Finance Committee

The Finance Committee, upon entering office, shall prepare a budget of estimated receipts and expenditures of the Association, providing for all departments for the year, including special objects, such as mission funds, conference delegate funds, and social work. The budget, having been approved by the Executive Council, shall be presented to the Association for endorsement. The Finance Committee shall see that the budget is adhered to by all committees, unless subsequent action of the Executive Council permits increase of expenditures. This committee shall also collect the membership fees.

(3)—Under-Graduate Representative

The Under-Graduate Representative and committee shall be the active link between the world and the local Association. At regular times during the year educational programs about present day problems may be presented to the Association in an interesting form. They shall also, as far as possible, keep in touch with other Associations in regard to successful methods of work, and thus gain and give inspiration.

(a).--Room Committee.

The Under-Graduate Representative shall appoint each month a committee whose special duties are the keeping of the Association room in order, the arrangement of the Association Hall for Sunday evening service, and the care of the Association Library.

(4)—Publicity Committee

The Publicity Committee shall make posters for the Y. W. C. A. meetings, keep the Y. W. C. A. Bulletin Board full of interesting and instructive material such as current events, pictures of interest, and the posters announcing the meetings, and keep in the Y. W. C. A. rest room (hut) the church papers of the different denominations. This Committee shall be free to order any material necessary for the carrying on its work following a discussion with the advisory member of the Committee. All important meetings and the Sunday evening vesper services shall be reported to the daily newspaper by one member of the committee.

(5)—Religious Education Committee

The Religious Education Committee shall arrange for the regular weekly meetings. The chairman of this committee shall see that the duties of the following committees are executed.

(a)—Bible Study Committee.

The Bible Study Committee shall seek

to enlist every student in one of the Bible classes, which this committee shall arrange. It shall also seek to encourage individual reading among the students.

(6)—Social Committee

The Social Committee shall aim to cultivate the social life as fundamental to the purpose of the Association. It shall have charge of social gatherings, setting high social standards and creating a wholesome atmosphere that shall permeate the student body.

(7)—Social Service Committee

The Social Service Committee shall have charge of the Y. W. C. A. flower garden and potted plants, both in the cultivation and disposal of all flowers and shall render service wherever and whenever opportunity offers. This committee shall also make a study of problems existing today, and at times when opportunity offers, present results of the study to the Association.

(8)—World Fellowship Committee

The World Fellowship Committee shall provide for mission classes and arrange programs for the Missionary meeting, and seek to develop within the institution an intelligent knowledge and an interest in missions. This committee shall also have charge of collecting the World Fellowship Fund.

(9)—Music Committee

The Music Committee shall provide and arrange for all music for the various services.

Article VI—Meetings

Sec. There shall be an annual meeting of the Association in March for the presentation of the reports and the election of officers of the Association. At this time an annual report shall be prepared, which shall be forwarded to headquarters.

Sec. 2. There shall be a monthly meeting of the Association for social or business purposes.

Sec. 3. Special business meetings may be called by the President at the written request of twenty-five members.

Sec. 4. One fourth of the active members shall constitute a quorum.

Article VII—Advisory Committee

The Advisory Committee consists of seven members: President, Treasurer, and five other members to be elected by ballot from the honorary membership. Each of these shall serve for three years.

If any vacancy should occur the committee itself shall elect a member from the honorary membership to serve until the next election of officers.

Article VIII—Amendments

Notice of proposed amendments to this constitution shall be given at the previous regular meeting, and shall require for their adop-

tion a two-thirds majority vote of the entire membership of the Association, except this article and article II, section 2, which shall not be altered or repealed except by two-thirds vote of the Association for two consecutive years at its annual meeting.

The Athletic Association believes in the spirit of play for its own sake. It works for the promotion of physical activities among the student under leadership and environmental conditions that foster health, physical efficiency, and the development of good citizenship.

The Association had a membership of about one third of the student body, girls who are representative of the college. The members are divided into two groups, Olympians and Athenians. These compete against each other for honors in athletics and for points won by participation in hiking and in health habits, and by athletic stunts as specified in the school-point system.

Each girl who scores five hundred points during the school year is awarded a school monogram.

The intramural athletic contests of the college are sponsored by the Athletic Association. The contests consist of interclass basket ball, tennis tournaments, intersociety baseball, and field day activities. Loving cups are awarded by the Association on Thanksgiving Day to

the winning basket ball teams, and on field day to the winning group of the Athletic Association.

Rights to enter school athletics and to use the courts are reserved for members of the Association only. The membership fee is one dollar.

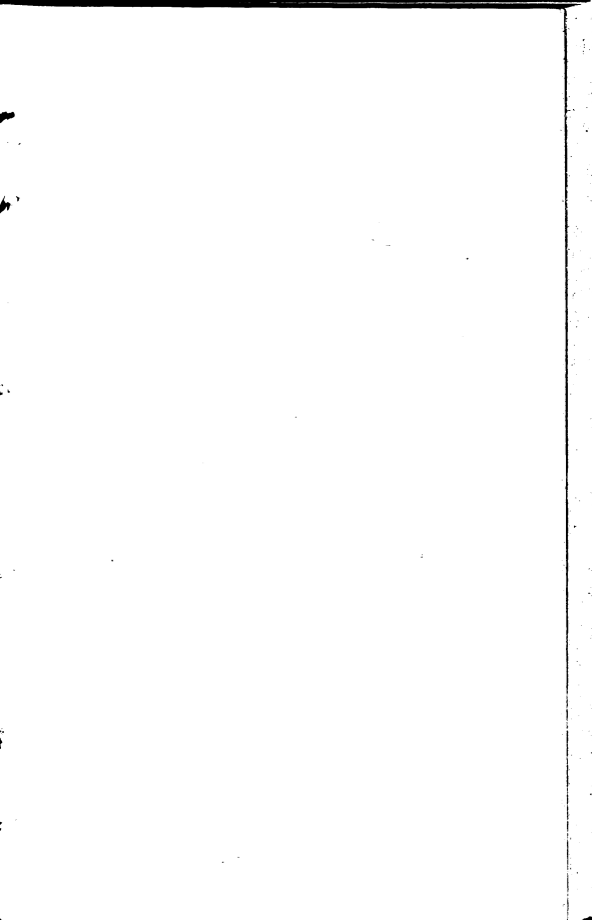
