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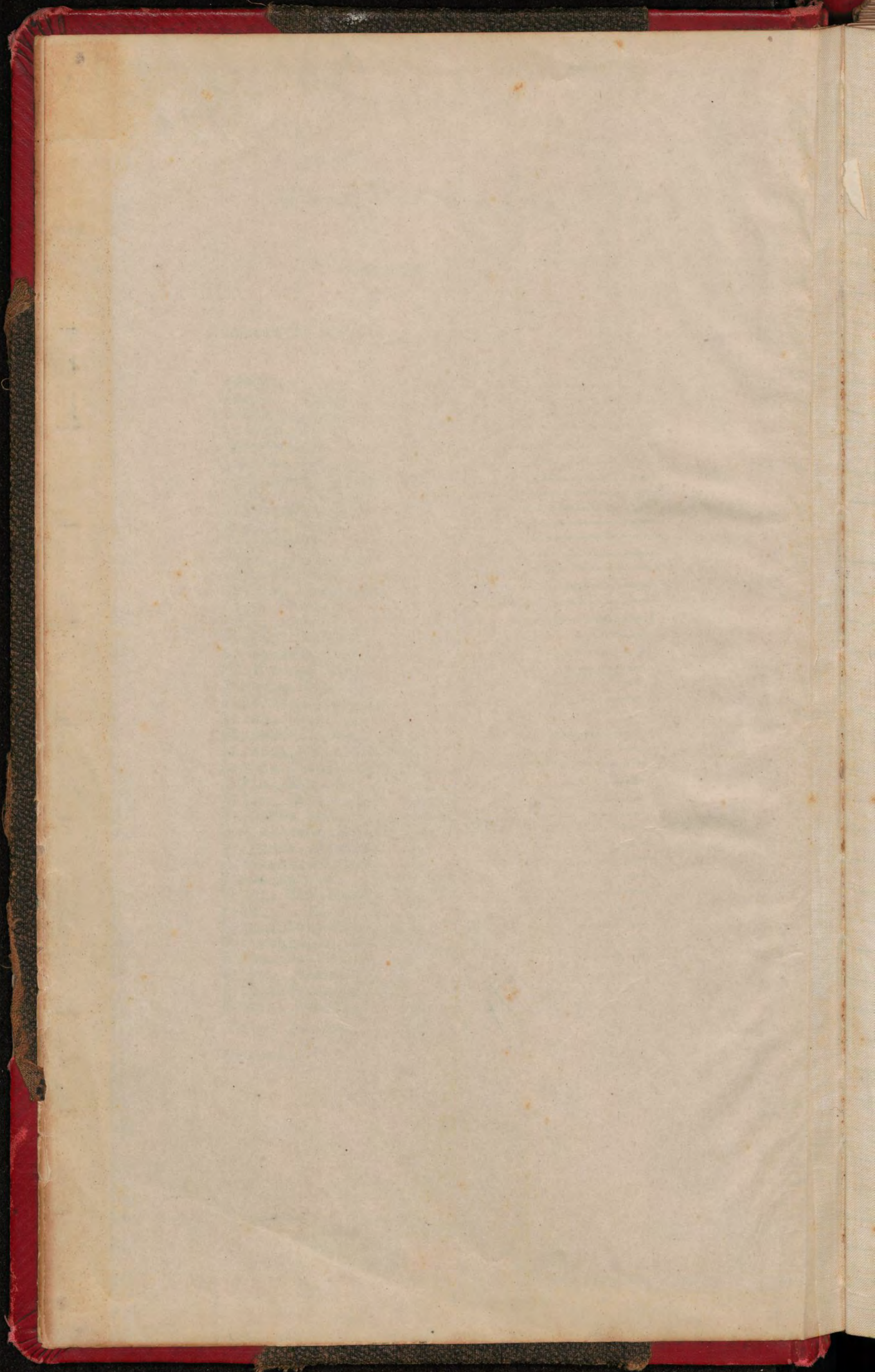
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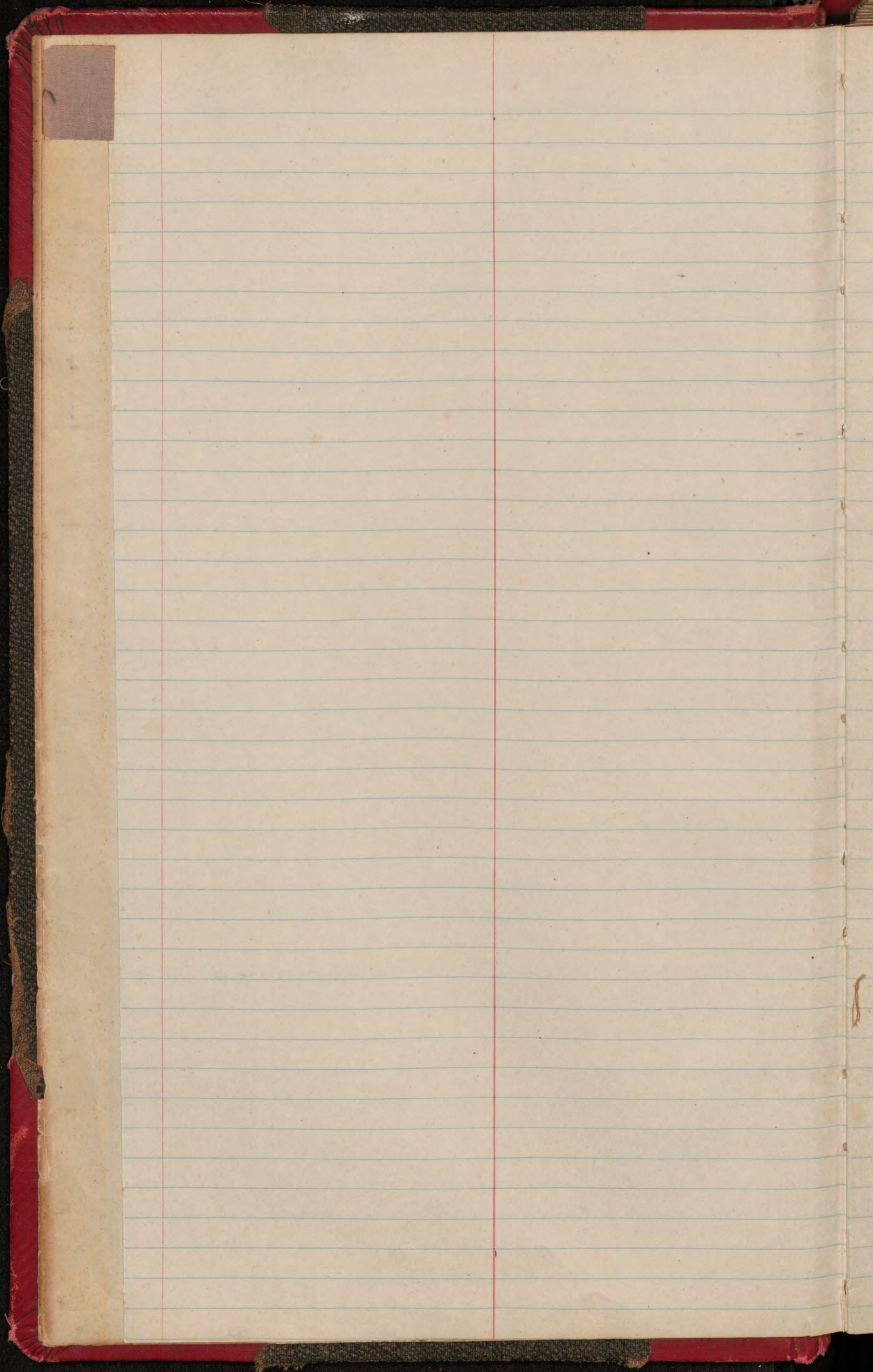

Faculty Meeting

Oct. 2, 1917

The meeting was called to order by Pres. Wright with all members of the Faculty present.

Minutes of the meeting of June 4th read and approved. At the request of the Pres. the minutes of the Summer Term were read for the information of the Faculty of the regular session.

Pres. Wright on behalf of the School and Faculty extended a cordial welcome to the new members of the Faculty: namely, Misses Wilson in the Department of Science, Wooten in the Department of English and Meade in the Music Department. He also announced the resignations of Miss Sherman, and Miss Waitt, ^{Miss Shrum} and stated that Miss Fahrenstock is absent at present on account of ill health and Mr. Meadows is at the Officers Reserve Training Camp at Fort Oglethorpe having volunteered for service in the army.

Latin
discontinued

Pres. Wright announced that on account of the resignation of Miss Waitt the Executive Committee had voted to cut out Latin for the present. Those students who had Latin last year or only one year must be given credit for the one year in Latin.

Com. on Faculty membership in Lit Societies.

The Chair called for the report of the Committee appointed last Spring to report at the first regular Faculty meeting this fall on the relation of Faculty members to the Literary Societies. The Com. reported progress and asked that the time be extended until next Tuesday night, which was granted.

Pres. Wright asked that the Faculty take under consideration this year the advisability of eliminating from our Courses of Study the "F" or One Year Course for Rural School Teachers in so far as that course applies to the work of the regular session, fall, winter & spring terms.

The President asked that the Faculty report next Tuesday night on any students who may not be properly classified.

Miss Davis called attention to the records of Miss

Sadie Speight and Pres. Wright asked the Departments of English, History and Mathematics give him a written report on her work of last year early tomorrow.

Pres. Wright spoke to the Faculty from the following notes:

President's
notes.

"Let your work reach down into touch with the educational advancement of each of these students. Each student here is very precious to some one, and sacrificing parents are anxious - you have no idea, how anxious - for the best possible advancement of each one.

We must give to each of these students the best there is in us. The nation, the state and the school need now as never before united action. There is no place in America for the slacker, for the citizen who is not willing and anxious to give to his daily task the best there is in him. I have a right to expect this of you this year and I know I shall have it.

Joyner
School

The new thing in our life this year is the Joyner School, a three-teacher country school which we hope to make a model of its type, and expect to use for observation and practice purposes. I shall need your help in the development of this school."

There being no further business the Faculty adjourned to meet next Tuesday night at 7:45.

Oct. 9, 1917

Faculty Meeting.

Meeting called to order by Pres. Wright with all members present except Miss Whiteside and Mr. Underwood, excused. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Chair asked the members of the Faculty who have Miss Nannie Turnage of the F Class to give him a report on her work by the last of this week.

Pres. Wright requested each member of the Faculty to make out and hand in the class rolls on next Thursday and, beginning then, to hand to Miss Ross daily reports of attendance.

The Chair announced that Dr. North, State High School Inspector of Maryland will speak in the school auditorium next Monday night. The Chair announced also that the Joyner School will open next Monday.

The President called for the report of the Committee to report on Faculty Membership in the Literary Societies. The report was read as follows:

The Committee to determine the relationship of the Faculty members to the Literary Societies has the following recommendations to offer:

1. That society membership of faculty and officers be honorary and optional.
2. That the membership when once determined be permanent.
3. That this membership be determined as student membership is now determined:

Except that if any of the present faculty have marked preference for one society or the other they may be given their choice in this first division

4. That members of the faculty and officers desiring society membership give their names to this committee and the details of arranging the membership be referred to this committee and the intersociety committee working in cooperation.

The above recommendations are made after taking into consideration recommendations from members of the faculty, and in co-operation with the inter-society committee.

Faculty Meeting.

Meeting called to order by Pres. Wright with all members present except Miss Hill who is out of town and excused.

Pres. Wright announced that on next Saturday the Pitt County Teachers Association will hold its first general meeting for the year in the High School Auditorium. He also announced that on Dec. 5 to 10 ^{N.C.} The Methodist Conference will be in session in our town and that he has asked that they send a preacher over each day to conduct the Chapel exercises for us. Pres. Wright further announced that on Dec. 15th the Boys' and Girls' ^{Agricultural} Clubs of Pitt County will hold a meeting in Greenville and that they will be given a Dinner in the school dining-room on that day at which time they will be addressed by Gov. F. W. Bicket.

Pres. Wright submitted to the faculty the correspondence of Miss Urna Britt of Enfield N.C. who is asking on what conditions she may secure the school's diploma. The Pres. appointed a committee consisting of Mr. Austin, Miss Graham and Miss Lewis to take Miss Britt's re-

quest under consideration and report some course of action that will be just to both Miss Britt and the school.

The Chair announced that Dr. Abbie Virginia Holmes will be here Nov. 18 to 20 under the management of the National Y. W. C. A. and deliver three lectures to the students.

Faculty Meeting 8:45 p.m.

The Faculty was called to order by Pres. Wright with all members present except Mr. Underwood and Miss Muffly (sick) both excused. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Com. to report on Miss Urena Britt's request reported progress and asked for further time which was granted.

Geometry ✓

The question of C class students taking Geometry was taken up. It was moved by Miss Lewis and seconded that the students now taking Geometry be acted upon individually by the Faculty to determine whether they shall be allowed to continue Geometry or not. Carried.

After an investigation of each student's record and discussions of same the following named students were permitted to continue the study of Geometry this year.

Feb. 5, 1918
Faculty meeting.

Faculty called to order by Pres. Wright with all members present except Miss Muffly who is sick and excused.

President Wright announced the resignation of Miss Martha Armstrong in charge of Domestic Science and stated that the school had secured the services of Mrs. R. L. Carr of Greenville for the remainder of this school year.

Pres. Wright presented the case of Miss Alice Blake who was conditioned in her Latin work last year. It was moved by Miss Davis and seconded by Miss Graham that Miss Blake's conditions in Latin be removed, since the school is not giving Latin this year. The motion carried.

By request of the Senior Class the coming Commencement has been changed to a schedule covering only two days. The usual religious and spiritual side of the Commencement has not been curtailed but every other feature has been reduced to the minimum. The request of the class grew out of the present world war situation and our part in it.

Pres. Wright announced that Mr. Underwood, County Supt. of Pitt, has offered to pay the Rail Road fare of any of our Faculty who will visit any of the Pitt County schools in which any of our graduates or former students are teaching. He then called on Mr. Underwood to explain why he makes the offer: viz. to help the county schools and to enable this school to follow up the work of our graduates.

The Committee to report on the request of Miss Urna Britt of Enfield submitted the following report which was adopted by vote of the faculty:

With reference to Miss Urna Britt who wishes to secure the diploma of this school and desires to know what will be required of her to obtain it, — the committee to whom this matter was referred

President Wright spoke to the Faculty from the following notes:

Today the world sees the necessity for preparation and for the willingness to conform cheerfully and rigidly to the letter as well as the spirit of the law. I wish to ask if any member of our Faculty is requiring of his classes more work at any time than the students can do in forty-five minutes, i. e. forty-five minutes of preparation per recitation? If so you are doing a positive sin. The law of the school limits the amount of time you can demand. It is not a question of whether you can reach your mentally preconceived standard of efficiency. There is only so much time allotted to you for a given subject, and you, the Faculty, did the allotting. If you feel that you must have more time get your reasons together for next year. But first sit down and have a thorough self-examining. See if the trouble is not with you instead of with the Faculty regulations. It may be that you are not willing to drop some of those non-essentials. If so you are still fondling some of the dead bones of educational tradition when you should be feeding the growing bones of educational life. In every subject there are only a few really im-

portant things. The others are interesting episodes, and I will admit they are pleasant to know. Do not forget we are trying to make school teachers not scholars.

Are you looking at the open periods the students have and are longing and thirsting to appropriate some of this time to your subject? Do you see how very much better they could spend this time under your direction than they do spend it as free time? This too is against the law that you made. "I missed my classes and so and so." Well were they to blame or were you the cause? Why should they have to make up your deficiencies?

Again, was your last recitation a model so the students could take it as an example to copy? If they are told how to conduct a recitation but do not constantly see recitations conducted correctly the theory is useless. Each recitation should be a laboratory exercise. Remember we are a faculty of experts. If you are not then you and I are deceived as to your ability; for we want only experts in our school. Do you ever let a recitation fail to be a model? If so it would have been better had you turned that period over to study. Let every lesson be so conducted that the students may take it as a pattern. As we do so will many of them do and not as we say do.

May we keep constantly in mind this one thing: Every thing we do in this school should help these students to become efficient teachers. Even the acquisition of new facts, i. e. learning the content matter should be done with the student's teaching it in view. The subject may be new to the student but let her master the facts so well that she can be teacher of these facts. This means let her master them not as student but as teacher. It does not mean getting them from the view-point only of reciting them. It means much more than that. In fact it is a different thing. It is more and better.

It is the best kind of teaching. It is the best kind of study. It is the finest type of school work, but it takes the master hand in its execution. There is more thinking, less reading, less clatter and show, less dead learning and more live knowledge. It will reduce the facts of any subject to the minimum and we would be surprised how small the minimum is. It gives us the working tools and they are few. It makes a teacher if not a scholar and the Teacher is our product.

Mar. 12, 1918

Again she is asking for Society membership and, by lot, she would become a member of the Poe Society as the other Society had the last member. Moved and seconded that the student in question be denied the privilege of joining the Poe Society.
 Carried unanimously.

President Wright stated that the Teachers in the Joyner School are asking for help from the faculty of this school and he offered to take as many as his car would carry out there next Thursday afternoon.

The President also stated that in compliance with a request of the State Board of Examiners and Institute Conductors this school is this year going to give a series of four Teachers Institutes of two weeks duration each in connection with our regular Summer Term.

Pres. Wright read the Departmental Requirements for admission to the several classes in the Training School as prepared by the Departments:

"A" Class or First Year Academic.

English - Completion of the first year of a four-year State High School, or work equivalent thereto.

Mathematics - The satisfactory completion of a year's work in a High School of Class A, B or C, or its equivalent.

History - The completion of the first year's work in an accredited High School or its equivalent.

Science - No requirements.

Drawing - " "

Instrumental Music - No requirements

Public School Music - No data.

"B" Class or Second Year Academic

English— Completion of the second year of a four-year State High School, or work equivalent thereto.

Mathematics— The satisfactory completion of "Algebra to Quadratics"

History— The completion of our "A" class work, or the completion of two years' work in an accredited high school or its equivalent.

Science— No requirements

Drawing— " "

Instrumental Music— No requirements

Public School Music— No data.

"C" Class or First Year Professional.

English— Completion of a four-year State High School, or work equivalent thereto.

Mathematics— Completion of a four-year State High School or work equivalent thereto: Algebra through Quadratics: Two Books of Plane Geometry.

History— The completion of our A & B class work, or the completion of a four-year accredited high school work or its equivalent.

Pedagogy— Completion of the Academic course offered by this school, or of a four-year State High School course or its equivalent, not including foreign languages.

Science— No requirements

Drawing— " "

Instrumental Music— No requirements

Public School Music— No data.

"D" Class or Second Year Professional

English— Completion of our junior year or work equivalent thereto.

Mathematics— Completion of the work of a four-year State High School plus the work offered during the junior year at this school, or work equivalent thereto.

History— The completion of our "C" Class work or its equivalent.

Pedagogy— Completion of courses 1, 2, 3, 4, & 7.

Science— No requirements.

Drawing - Completion of our junior year or work equivalent thereto, viz: to have studied the subject matter of grades 1-5 inclusive, and method of Teaching same.

Instrumental Music - Completion of one year's work in this school or its equivalent.

Public School Music - no data.

Note: "No data" on Public School Music is due to the fact that Miss Muffly was sick and absent at the time this information was asked for.

After a discussion of needed changes in our catalogue it was moved and seconded that our present "F" Course or the One Year Course for Rural School Teachers be offered only during the Summer Term, and that the course be printed in the catalogue as it was originally planned and is now printed in the 1918 Summer Term Bulletin. Motion carried.

Faculty Meeting

Mar. 26, 1918

Carried.

Moved by Miss Jenkins and seconded that any student who fails in any subject during her last term

shall forfeit the seal. Motion carried.

The question of adjusting the school schedule to the revised time (running the clocks up one hour as authorized by Congress):

It was moved by Mr. Wilson and seconded by Miss Graham that the schedule remain as it is (first period beginning at 8:35 by the new time) and try it out.

Social Activities Report 1917-1918

The Committee met and elected Miss Lewis, Chairman and Miss Armstrong, Secretary, and agreed to meet weekly on Saturday the fourth period.

The Committee approved the plans of class organization drafted by the Com. of 1914-15 with corrections of Com. of 1916-17.

It was decided that the policy already in use relating to other organizations should be adhered to.

As there were so few requests for dates the Com., at a later meeting, decided to have call meetings as needed.

The Com. had the misfortune to lose the Secretary, Miss Armstrong, the first of February. As no one was appointed to take her place, Miss Maupin became Secretary for the remainder of the term.

The following dates were granted: Dec-10 for Annual Christmas Musical. This date was recalled later. A request came from "F" class for Saturday evening Feb. 16 for an entertainment. The Com. explained to them that this evening belonged to the classes and did not come under the jurisdiction of the Social Activities Committee.

Mar. 4, was given to the Sidney Lanier Society to present a play to the Por Society and Faculty. April 22 was given to the Senior Class to present the play "As You Like It," also the use of Auditorium for practice during study hour April 6-22, and for dress rehearsal on the evening of April 20th.

Faculty Meeting, Oct. 1, 1918

The faculty was called to order with all members present. Minutes of the meeting of May 30, 1918, read and approved. Minutes of the 1918 Summer Term read.

President Wright again calls attention of the faculty to the N. E. A. membership campaign for new members and expressed the wish that the Training School Faculty may be 100% strong in the N. E. A. membership.

Pres. Wright announced that since the last faculty meeting the Board had accepted the resignation of Miss Mylitta M. Morris who for four years had been critic teacher in the second grade of the Model School. Miss Morris resigned her work here to accept work in the State Normal School at Mount Pleasant, Mich.

The President introduced the following new teachers and declared the faculty "at ease" for a few minutes so that all might become acquainted.

New members of the faculty: Misses Lida Taylor, Nellie Wyman, Louise Goggin and Mrs. Virgie Lee Anniller ⁱⁿ the Model School; Miss S. Elizabeth Davis for Mr. Meadows' work in English; Miss Carrie G. Scobry in Domestic Science, Miss Hannah H. Fahnestock back after a years absence,

and Mr. H. G. Swanson Superintendent of Greenville Public Schools who is a regular member of this faculty by virtue of special arrangement between the Greenville City School Board and the Training School Board.

After a few minutes of social intercourse the faculty was called to order for the transaction of business.

President Wright spoke to the faculty from the following notes:

The stress of the awful times in which we live is making itself felt upon us and makes it almost impossible to foretell what to expect. It is impossible to plan accurately for the school work before hand but the necessary adjustments will be made as rapidly as possible.

We owe it to ourselves and to others to help keep the ship on even keel this year. Already I see magnificent evidences that you are working along those lines.

Our Model School is so we can use it to its fullest capacity. I would like for the Model School faculty and the Training School faculty — those who work together here as a separate unit in our faculty — would work out the very best student-teacher training scheme and present it to me, and later to be presented to the faculty. We are now in position for the development of the best possible type of student-teacher training in America. With a town graded school as our Model School, and the town Superintendent as a member of our faculty, and a rural school as our Model School and the County Superintendent as a member of our faculty — all well trained people in these two schools and exceptionally strong and well trained Superintendents filled with the spirit of cooperation — if we do not turn out the job it is our own fault. At least I have brought together the type and the organization to do the work.

That is our biggest job for this year. To do it means that we, in this faculty, must get into vital touch with the town and the county school systems and must keep in vital touch with

them. I want all who can to work some with the town schools through Mr. Swanson and with the Joyner School and other county schools through Mr. Underwood.

County Supt. Underwood stated that he should be glad to have any members of the faculty follow up the work of the graduates of this school in any of the county schools and he proposed to carry as many as his automobile will accommodate at any time that he may be visiting the schools. He stated that it would probably be especially helpful to the faculty of this school to visit the Arthur school which is a consolidated township school.

City Supt. Swanson extended to the faculty a most cordial invitation to visit the city schools at any time they may have opportunity.

There being no further business the faculty was adjourned subject to call.

President Wright stated that the epidemic of La Grippe is about over and said "I wish to thank you individually and collectively for the splendid services you rendered during the two weeks while we were going through this terrible epidemic of La Grippe. We have had about 150 cases and so far there have been no serious complications. This splendid record has been made in part, at least, by your willing, cheerful and untiring efforts in feeding and nursing the sick ones."

This was said by the President apropos of the fact that when the epidemic of La Grippe demanded their services the ^{the lady members} faculty organized by forming groups, each with a chairman, and so divided the work so that half were on duty by day and half by night caring for the patients in a most efficient way for two weeks. As many of the well students as were called upon most cheerfully rendered every possible service.

Pres. Wright further stated: "This epidemic has, of necessity very seriously broken into the work of the fall term and we must make the necessary revisions and adjustments of our work. We will

hardly be able to do as much work this fall as we would have accomplished had we not had the epidemic of La Grippe."

The President requested that the following communication be spread upon the minutes:

To The Faculty:

We the well and ^{the} convalescent patients wish to thank each member of the faculty for their kind attention and the many things you did for us while we were battling with the "Flu". We know it is impossible to thank you. We consider ourselves very fortunate in having you for our nurses, and we just want you to know that we do appreciate your faithfulness, and remember we are always ready and willing to help you in any thing. It was very unfortunate that the beginning of our school had to be broken up in this way but we are going to make this the very best school year we have ever had at the Training School.

The Chair read a communication from Mrs. Pearle Brown Tyson in which she stated that she had lost her diploma, and asked the school to grant her another.

On motion made and seconded Mrs. Pearle Brown Tyson was ^{granted, by} unanimous vote, another diploma.

The case of Miss Gladys Howell was presented to the faculty. Miss Howell was a member of the Sidney Lanier Literary Society. Anonymous letters were written to the Pres. & Secretary of the Society asking for the resignation of the Secretary of the Society. An investigating committee was appointed by the Society and the committee, after a thorough investigation ^{and comparison} of the handwriting of all the students in school and all other available information, reported that all the available evidence implicated Miss Howell and that it was their belief and judgment that Miss Gladys Howell wrote the anonymous letters.

Acting upon this report the Sidney Lanier Society by a large majority vote expelled Miss Howell from membership in the Society.

This matter was brought to the attention of the Faculty. After a full and thorough discussion from various viewpoints it was moved by Miss Comfort and seconded by Miss Lewis that Miss Howell be asked to withdraw from the school until she is cleared from suspicion.

Further discussion of this motion followed. It was the consensus of opinion of the faculty that to pass this motion was about equivalent to expulsion. This view of it together with the fact that two other anonymous letters, one to Miss Howell and the other to President Wright, written after the action of the Society expelling Miss Howell and written in an effort to exonerate Miss Howell, and, in the judgment of Pres. Wright and the members of the faculty who examined them, were not written by the same party who wrote the anonymous letters to the officers of the Society: This view of the question caused Miss Lewis to withdraw her second to the motion, whereupon the motion

was seconded by Miss Muffly.

The motion was put and lost by a large majority.

It was then moved by Mr. Wilson and seconded by Mr. Underwood that the faculty approve the action of the Sidney Lanier Literary Society in the expulsion of Miss Gladys Howell.

offered to the critic teachers. There should be informal conferences between the critic teachers and the non-critic teachers. Non-critic teachers should visit the class rooms of the Model School often, and teachers at the Model School should visit the classes of the non-critic teachers equally as often. In this way teachers can be mutually helpful to one another. It is unwise to correct a student teacher while she is teaching unless it is found to be absolutely necessary. Such criticism often does more harm than good.

In October 1919 this Committee met for organization with Miss Maupin acting as Chairman. Miss Wilson was asked to serve as secretary for the year. It was decided to hold meetings at 11⁴⁵ Saturday morning whenever requests for dates were to be acted upon.

Saturday, October 4th Hon. F. C. Harding delivered an address celebrating the tenth anniversary of the opening of the Training School.

On the evening of October 6th Mr. George Howard Superintendent of Edgecombe County Schools gave an illustrated lecture on "Consolidated Schools". This lecture was repeated at the Conference of High School Teachers several weeks later.

Miss Mead asked that December 8th be reserved for a recital by the piano department. The request was granted.

Thursday November 27 was granted the Poe Literary Society for presenting a play: "Six Who Pass While the Sceptils Boil".

On Saturday November 29th Mr. E. H. Norman, President of the Baltimore Business College addressed the school. His subject was "The Teacher's Opportunity and Responsibility". The play "Six Who Pass While the Sceptils Boil" was repeated.

On January 12 and 13th the Band of the Cadet Corps of the State College of Agriculture and Engineering paid a visit to the school and gave a concert on the evening of January 12th.

On Monday evening, January 19th, Mr. Edgar C. Raine presided at the Training School a "Prologue of Alaska" illustrated by two hundred colored views.

should be able to show to others that our actions are right. Failure means tragedy this year. This must be our best year, the eyes of the ^{state} world are upon us and we cannot afford to fail. The building of more normal schools in our state will depend largely upon the success of this school which is the only real normal school now in the state. Our school needs more publicity. People should know what we are actually doing.

The scheme of education in N.C. is now being pushed forward more rapidly than ever before in the history of the state. In this forward movement we must be the leaders. This means we must save to the profession every student we get. The teacher is to be the saviour of our civilization. This is the noblest task given to man during this critical period in the world's history. Money is insignificant in comparison with the work that is before us; we must save the people. Our specific task is with this student body. We must give these students the highest ideals that can be given. We must work with the students and save every one of them; their failure is our failure.

We must solve the problems of those students who come from non-accredited high schools.

1- Note on Electives.

The death of Prof. C. W. Wilson, on the evening of February 1, comes as a shock not only to the college and community in which he worked but to the whole state. His continuous service with this institution since its foundation has caused all to think of him as an inseparable part of it. As secretary to the Board of Trustees, he was a link between the Board and the Faculty, and as chairman of the Appointment Committee he was a link between the College and the children this school is striving to help.

His ability as an executor was shown in many ways, but chiefly as Director of the Summer School. He knew how to direct others - whether teachers or students - through careful leadership. He never asked others to do what he was unwilling to do himself.

As a teacher he literally gave himself to his classes. He was an indefatigable ^{and scrupulously painstaking} worker, a good student, and a conscientious critic. His friendly, sympathetic, unprejudiced criticism won many friends in the class room. He was not afraid of theories, but he cared for no theory that could not be made practical. His application of the golden rule in teaching gave him a hold on his students that few teachers are privileged to claim.

One of the chief factors in his success as a man, in whatever he undertook, was cooperation. His associates in his profession were always glad to work with him singly, in committees, or in large organizations because of his fair-mindedness, and willingness to study a problem from all view-points. He never permitted his better judgment to be influenced by his personal feelings. In a broad way he associated himself with many organizations in order that he might have the opportunity of working with others for the good of his fellow men.

His high ideals manifested themselves in every phase of his life; in his unselfish devotion to duty; in his passionate love for the children of North Carolina; in his religious convictions, which were bound by no particular creed, sect, or denomination, but were as broad and as inclusive as the spirit and principles of christianity; and his deep abiding love for home and family. There was in his life a love for all mankind. He had the human touch which made him a brother to everybody. Comparative strangers came to him for advice and those who knew him best advised with him as with a father.

He will be sorely missed by the students whom he had taught; by his colleagues with whom he had labored so earnestly to promote right ideals of living; by his family who had enjoyed and highly prized, for so long, his loving Christian companionship; and by the state that loses one of its best and noblest teachers and citizens. It is good to know that the ideals for which he stood will live forever.



Pres. Wright introduced and welcomed to the Faculty Miss Mary Louise Burton of the Piano Dept., Miss Carrie Belle Vaughan of the English Dept., Miss Leone Reeves of the Home Economics Dept. and Miss Dora Coates 2nd grade critic teacher.

Pres. Wright spoke to the Faculty as follows: We are starting a new year and under the most favorable conditions we have begun any year. We have been graded by the State Dept. as an "A" grade college, and we are the only N. C. member of the American Assn. of Teachers Colleges. We shall probably eliminate the academic classes after this year.

There is a danger that confronts us as we go into this four-year college course — the danger of following other college traditions. We should have the collegue idea — the spirit of cooperation with the students. We are here to train teachers and not to turn out scholars. We should never forget the purpose of the institution.

This year we must rework and reorganize our course of study and we must be very definite in outlining our courses. We must consider the sequence of subjects and we must also consider the administrative side.

We must do the best we can during this period of transition; in a few years our work will be better adjusted. At our next faculty meeting we should work out a regulation stating the requirements for classification in the college. We must consider qualitative

as well as quantitative work.

We can succeed thru team work only as the load we have to carry is heavy. We can carry the load easily if we cooperate.

The Faculty met in the Dining Hall of the Rotary Club Building. After dinner was served President Wright called the Faculty to order.

An invitation by Mr. Jackson to attend the picture "Hollywood" on Oct. 1 was unanimously accepted by the Faculty.

Messrs. Rose, Supt of Greenville City Schools, and Fitzgerald, Supt of Pitt County Schools, stated that they would do everything possible to help Teachers College Faculty with any projects undertaken, and that they would call on members of the faculty for help from time to time.

Pres. Wright gave a cordial welcome to all members of the Faculty. He stated that this should be the best year in the history of the college. He spoke of the wonderful opportunity lying out before us. The heartiest relationship exists between us and the city and county educational systems. We are not bound by traditions; we are not crystallized. We are eager for new ideas from the new members of our faculty. We need cooperation if we are to succeed. We must pull together if we are to have good citizenship. We must believe in our work. We can make this the greatest college in America if we strive to make it so.

An effort is being made to stop the rapid progress we are making in education. We must send back to the counties of this state teachers who are well-trained that the people will demand such teachers for their children. The problem is so big that no teacher can afford to let any petty trouble come in the way. We must give our entire soul in the support of

faculty decisions. Our girls are prepared to enter college according to the standards in our state; we must take these girls where they are, rather than where we may think they ought to be and bend on that standard.

It must be left for the President to do the administrative work of the college; only one can do that work and difficulty will follow when others undertake it. All administrative problems should be brought to the President!

Our course of study is not perfect but we shall use it and make of it the best course possible.

In whatever we undertake as a Faculty the spirit of comradeship should prevail! New members were told to ask older members of the Faculty in regard to the regulations of the college.

All teachers were asked to look at the registration cards of students and to see that the Bursar's stamp is on the cards before the students are admitted to class.

The faculty was called to order by President Wright. All members were present, except Miss Bomar and the Model School faculty. President Wright stated that the purpose of the meeting was to act on two cases of discipline. She then read the following communication from the Student Government Association:

1. Mary Helen Burden: Went riding Sunday P. M. during quiet hour with young man without permission (fall term). Went to ride again Saturday night, Jan. 14 with young man without permission. She also told falsehoods to student council. Plead guilty to all her charges to the school council. (The school council recommends by unanimous vote that she be expelled from college.)

2. Ida Bennett: Had permit to spend the week end in Winston, but did not leave the college until Sunday Oct. 23 - and spent the day riding around with young men. Spent quiet hour riding with young men another Sunday during the fall term. Rode with young man Saturday night Jan. 14 without permission. Told falsehoods to the student council. Plead guilty to all charges to the school council. (The school council unanimously recommends that she be expelled from college.)

Statements in Parenthesis omitted - B. W.

President Wright stated that both young ladies against whom charges were made would be permitted to appear before the faculty to make any statements they wanted to make. Then, President Wright made a few statements concerning the girls' past records in this school. Both had fair records. Then, he explained for the new members of the faculty the method of expelling students from the college. The Student Council recommends expulsion to the School Council, and the school Council recommends ^{expulsion} to the faculty. The Board of Trustees has conferred the right of expulsion on the faculty only. In the cases of Miss Mary Helen Burden and Miss Ida Bennett, the Student Council had unanimously recommended expulsion to the School Council, which in turn had unanimously recommended expulsion to the faculty.

Both young ladies appeared before the faculty. Each plead guilty to all charges, but each asked for another chance.

After the young ladies had withdrawn from the room, Mr. Austin moved that the Miss Mary Helen Burden and Miss Ida Bennett be permanently withdrawn from East Carolina Teachers College. The motion was seconded by Dr. Adams.

After a brief discussion, the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

My father seems very anxious that I return to E. C. T. C. rather than go to another college. I shall certainly appreciate it if you will ask the faculty if they will agree to accept me. And I will appreciate their consideration very much.

I shall have a faculty meeting within the next three weeks and put this matter before them. I shall let you know what action is taken. I think I shall read your letter to the faculty. I do not know what to tell you because I really have not

the slightest idea what action they will take.
I shall write you again as soon as I can.

3. All Credits offered by Correspondence must be for work done in Colleges of equal rank with East Carolina Teachers College.

Mr. McGinnis moved the adoption of this Recommendation. Mr. Haynes seconded the motion. The motion Carried.

4. No student in residence shall be allowed Credit for Correspondence work unless the Course when registered for be approved by her department Advisor, and unless the total hours do not exceed the student's quota for the quarter.

Mr. Day moved the adoption of this Recommendation. Mr. Adams seconded the motion. The motion Carried.

The President asked Miss Fannie Joyner Davis to serve as chairman of the Commencement Committee and empowered her to select others to work with her.

Then, he called to the attention of the faculty the importance of making all reports concerning records of the students to the office in writing, giving names and dates. He also requested teachers to never charge a student's

be given out.

Records, ^{on office record card} but to leave that work entirely to the office. Then, he requested members of the faculty to refrain from giving out grades to the students, either examination grades or final grades. Finally, he requested the faculty members to be prepared to discuss the recent experiments on examinations at the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned to meet Wednesday, March 28, 7:30 P. M., in room 111 Administration Building.

The meeting was called to order by President Wright. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

President Wright then submitted a request of Joseph B. Burden requesting the admission of his sister to the Summer Quarter of 1928. His sister, Helen Burden, had been requested by the faculty on January 20, 1928, to permanently withdraw from school. Mr. Deal moved that Miss Burden be admitted on Probation to the Summer quarter of 1928. Mr. Haller seconded the motion. The motion carried. President Wright recognized Mr. Gray, who took up the unfinished business of regulations in regard to giving credit for work done ^{by} ~~for~~ correspondence. Mr. M. L. Wright moved that this recommendation be tabled. Mr. McGinnis seconded the motion. The motion was defeated.

Dr. Adams moved that this recommendation be rejected. Mr. M. L. Wright seconded the motion. The motion was defeated.

Mr. Hallan moved the adoption of the recommendation. Miss Townsend seconded the motion. The motion carried.

President Wright made a brief statement about the budget system under which the college is operated. He explained the necessity of faculty members making requisitions for all services and supplies. He exhibited duplicate copies of the required requisition and showed how to use them.

Then, the President took up the question of allotting money from the library funds to the various departments. The departments submitted requests that totaled more than the available funds. The President stated that he would make the allotment to the various departments in the near future.

President Wright then discussed the problem of getting out term reports

more rapidly. He asked the Faculty to suggest how soon after examinations the final grades could be turned into the office. After some informal discussion, it was agreed to set the period at 48 hours for the examinations at the close of this quarter.

Then, the matter of removing the grade of "C" from student's records was taken up. This has caused much trouble in the past due to imperfect records and the absence of the teachers who gave the grades. It was ~~suggested~~^{directed} that a full record of the grade, the reasons for giving it, the period which it was to remain a "C" and the suggested method for removing it be written on a full page of college stationery and filed in the office over the signature of the instructor for each individual grade of "C".

The motion of the Faculty to the next experiment in giving final examinations was called for. After considerable discussion, it was agreed that the experiment showed enough good points to justify another trial, perhaps for the fall quarter of 1928.

Mr. Austin was recognized. He asked the members of the Faculty to fill out and return the blanks sent to them for information concerning the prospective teachers, who are seeking employment through his office.

This memorandum deals with the case of Misses Pattie Bunn and Plum Johnson. They had permits to spend the weekend of October 27th, Miss Bunn at home, Miss Johnson with her sister at Rocky Mount.

Mr. George M. Johnson, father of Miss Plum Johnson, told me last night that the note dated October 21, 1928 was a forgery and I was informed by Mr. S. E. Bunn over the phone last night that Miss Mildred Johnson, sister of Miss Plum Johnson, says that Miss Plum Johnson did not go to Rocky Mount for the weekend. Mr. Bunn also told me that Miss Bunn did not go home.

I am submitting herewith the report of the Student Government Association and the report of Miss Annie L. Morton, Dean of Women. I am not at all sure that the statements in these reports are correct.

The truth of it is that these young women went away from college under the assumption that they would spend the weekend one of them at home, the other with her sister and they spent the time we know not where.

Pattie Bunn and Plum Johnson had permits from home to spend the weekend of October 27th out of town. Pattie was to leave at 12:30 Saturday for her home in Zebulon. Plum was to leave at 12:30 to visit her sister at Rocky Mount. Pattie was to have returned at 10:45 Tuesday morning, Plum at 8:30 Tuesday morning.

They left the college at 2 P. M. Saturday, meeting Mr. Emory Campbell from Washington at Mr. Charles Horne's Drug Store, staying around town until 4 P. M. Saturday, and leaving with Mr. Campbell at that time.

They arrived at Zebulon about 7 P. M. where they left Pattie. Mr. Campbell and Miss Johnson then went to Rocky Mount arriving at 9:30 P. M.

Pattie left Zebulon Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock with Mr. Vesta Brantley and returned to college Sunday at 8:30 P. M. Plum left Rocky Mount about 6:30 P. M. and returned to college about 9 o'clock. Neither signed in at my office.

Monday morning they went to town about 10 o'clock, went to one of the tobacco warehouses, borrowed a Chevrolet coupe from a Mr. Perkins, a friend of Miss Bunn, and drove to Washington, returning to college for lunch.

They went to town again in the afternoon returning to college in time for supper. Pattie went to supper. Plum did not. She spent supper hour in Pattie's room.

After supper they left the campus again by back driveway, went to town, met Mr. Campbell between Young's Store and the Norfolk and Southern railway station, rode to Kinston, returned to Greenville after 10 P. M., spent the night at the Proctor Hotel under assumed names. No baggage. Mr. Campbell registered for them and paid the bill at time of registering. They returned to campus before breakfast Tuesday morning.

Plum filed return slip at 8 A. M., Pattie at 9 A. M. They went to classes and were not surprised when called to Council. Told Council how they spent weekend.

Above statement made to me by Pattie Bunn and Plum Johnson in conference Wednesday morning. These girls have no previous restriction record.

These girls left college without permission Tuesday evening after dinner presumably for home.

Pattie Bunn and Plum Johnson were seen coming through the woods by the infirmary dressed up Tuesday A. M. about 7 o'clock. They were also seen coming through the administration building and going towards Cotten Hall by the way of the front campus.

Miss Johnson said that she spent the weekend at home and signed in Tuesday A. M. about 8:00 o'clock. She said that she spent Sunday night in the dormitory and also said that Pattie Bunn was in the dormitory Sunday night. Sarah Hinson, Pattie Bunn's roommate, was called to Council and said that Pattie Bunn was not in her room Sunday or Monday night. Miss Johnson said she came back from home Sunday night but did not stay in the college Monday during the day. Said she and Miss Bunn went to Washington and drove Emit Campbell's car alone. She said that she and Miss Bunn went down to the Model School Monday A. M. about 6:30 o'clock to deliver a message to a boy. She also said that Miss Bunn was in the dormitory Sunday night when she came in.

Miss Bunn said she spent the weekend at home and came in the dormitory Sunday night but signed in Tuesday A. M. She said that she went to Washington Monday before lunch on Mr. Perkins' car and went up town Monday night and returned at 10:00 o'clock. She said also that she and Miss Johnston went down through the Model School woods Tuesday A. M. to deliver a message to Emit Campbell. Then, Miss Bunn said she would tell the truth and said that she spent Monday night in the Proctor Hotel and registered as Mary Hall.

Miss Johnson came in and said she spent the night in the hotel with Miss Bunn.

The Meeting was called to order by Dr. L. R. Meadows, Director of the Summer School.

Two cases of discipline were submitted for faculty action. At the request of Dr. Meadows, Miss Armstrong presented the cases of Miss Lillian Walker and Miss Elizabeth Cromatic. Miss Armstrong herself had met the two young ladies down town in the evening several days ago and had warned them that they were violating the college regulations. On Monday, June 24, 1929, they were again in town in the evening without permission and in violation of regulations. On Tuesday evening, May 25, 1929, Miss Walker was again in town in the evening after she and Miss Cromatic had been given a second warning by Miss Armstrong on the preceding day. The record of Miss Cromatic had been good. The record of Miss Walker had not been good. Miss Walker had also shown a rather bad spirit toward Miss Armstrong and the college regulations. Miss Armstrong recommended suspension for the remainder of the quarter for Miss Walker and probation for the rest of the quarter for Miss Cromatic.

The young ladies appeared before the faculty. Each admitted leaving the campus in violation of regulations and each admitted knowing the regulations at the time of leaving the campus. Neither had any defense to offer.

It was moved by Dr. Adams and seconded by Mr. Hallan that Mrs. Lillian Walker be suspended for the remainder of the summer quarter of 1929.

Motion Carried Unanimously

It was moved by Miss Jenkins and seconded by Mr. Hallan that Miss Elizabeth Crohnartie be placed on probation for the remainder of the summer quarter of 1929.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

At the request of Dr. Meadows, Pres. Wright Cashie in and made a brief statement concerning salaries for next summer quarter, that is the summer quarter of 1930. The regular members of the faculty had been employed with the understanding that their respective summer salaries would be one fourth that of the regular school year. The budget for the next summer quarter will not permit that salary scale. President Wright, therefore, gave notice that salaries would have to be reduced next summer and stated that faculty members should act on that information in making their plans.

Dr. Meadows thanked the faculty members for their cooperation thus far and wished for each a pleasant summer.

Mr. Meadows, Director of the Summer School, presiding.
 24 members of the Summer School Faculty present.

Purpose of the meeting was to discuss two cases of discipline in which Miss Mary Lou Ward and Miss Ruby Smith were concerned.

Miss Morton, the Dean of Women, stated that the attitude and behavior of these two young ladies had been unsatisfactory and unbecoming for some time, mentioning specifically the following counts against them:

1. They appeared bare-legged or barefooted on the campus the previous week.
2. Miss Ward presented herself before guests in her room in an unseemly way when improperly clothed.
3. The girls took dishes and utensils from the dining hall, contrary to regulations, in order to carry food to their rooms.
4. Their conduct in the dining-hall has been unbecoming and exasperating.
5. They have shown a bad attitude in the college and a disregard for common courtesies that might be expected of persons preparing themselves for the teaching profession.
6. They broke a specific college regulation by going riding with a young gentleman without permission. They entered the car down town and after they came from riding left the car down town.

It was stated that Miss Smith has no previous student government record of offences, but that she withdrew from the dormitory last year to avoid having such offence recorded.

Miss Ward has on record three instances of offences against student government regulations.

Each of the young ladies is a Junior in the college.

Miss Ward was asked to appear before the faculty, which she did. Mr. Meadows inquired whether she had any statement to make to the faculty about her conduct or about her having gone riding without permission. She stated that she had none to make. She admitted that she had gone riding as charged. She then remarked ~~with an attitude of levity~~ that she was sorry for having broken the regulation.

Miss Smith was then called to appear before the faculty with similar inquiries and similar results.

It was moved by Mr. Henderson and seconded by Mr. McGinnis that both girls be put on probation for one month with the stipulation that if within that time they break another regulation of the college that they be sent home at once.

After some discussion in which the sentiment that this was not sufficient punishment, the motion was withdrawn.

A motion was made by Mr. Adams and seconded that the girls be required to withdraw from school at once, and that they be permitted to return at a later quarter only on probation. This motion was passed.

The Faculty was called together to consider a case of discipline involving Miss Martha Guard and Miss Beulah Boykin.

A telegram was received on August 1, by the Dean of Women, apparently coming from Miss Guard's parents at Poplar Branch, N. C., giving Miss Guard a general permit for week-ends. This permit was used on August 2 and 9th.

Miss Guard's father came to Greenville to see his daughter on Sunday, August 10th, but did not find her here, and stated that neither he nor his wife had authorized the telegram which had been received by the Dean of Women.

The girls were taken to Bailey by a Mr. Russell of Miller-Jones Shoe Store on Sunday afternoon. They came from Bailey to Wilson on Sunday night with a Mrs. Stiles with whom they staid until Monday morning when Mr. Russell returning from Greensboro picked them up and brought them to Greenville.

It was moved by Miss Davis and seconded by Mr. Deal that both girls appear before the faculty to present their cases for questioning. Miss Boykin appeared before the faculty and Mr. Meadows told her the charge against her. She said she had a permit to go home but that Miss Guard did not have a permit.

Miss Guard did not appear before the faculty, but Miss Goodman the Dean of Women said she had admitted the telegram to be spurious.

It was moved by M. L. Wright and seconded by Mr. Deal that Miss Guard be suspended from the college for securing and using a spurious permit, and that she be not re-admitted without special permission from the administration of the college. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Picklesimer and seconded by M. L. Wright that Miss Boykin be reprimanded for complicity in the case by the Director of the summer school, and that she be placed on probation for the remainder of this quarter and during the next quarter she is enrolled in the college. The motion carried.

The question was raised as to whether classes should be held during the remainder of this quarter in the Austin building while repairs are being made to the front part of the building or in the local high school building.

The faculty voted to remain in the Austin building, and make such arrangements about rooms as seems most convenient.

The Registrar presented sheets on which the teachers were to report class grades and special failure lists for the summer quarter.

Mr. Meadows set 2:30, Thursday, August 21 for a faculty meeting to pass on graduating list for the summer quarter.

Faculty meeting, Room 111, 4²⁰ P. M., June 16, 1931.
Dr. Meadows, director of the Summer School, called the meeting to order.

Dr. Meadows made a statement concerning the picture shows for the summer quarter. He stated that instead of having a show each week in the auditorium of the Austin building arrangements had been made for all holders of season tickets to attend one show each week at the Capitol theater.

The faculty then considered the case of Miss Katherine Lemmond, charged with taking a dress that belonged to Miss Evelyn Caldwell. Miss Caldwell had been a guest at Commencement. While here Miss Caldwell lost a dress, of which a description was left with the authorities. The dress had been found by the search of women, Mrs. Blotton, in Miss Lemmond's room. Mrs. Blotton talked to Miss Caldwell over the telephone and obtained a detailed description of the dress, which left no doubt about it being the one sought for.

Dr. Meadows stated to the faculty that Miss Lemmond at first maintained that the dress found in her room was one that had had been sent to her by an Aunt, who lived in Birmingham; then, later admitted that she took Miss Caldwell's dress.

It was moved by Mr. Wright and seconded by Dr. Slay that Miss Lemmond be invited to appear before the faculty. Motion carried.

Miss Lemmond claimed that she intended to return the dress to Miss Caldwell. She also claimed that the dress had been left in her room by Miss Caldwell. She admitted that she had formerly maintained that the dress was her own and had been

given to her by her Aunt. She admitted that she carried the dress away with her during the vacation and that she and others had been wearing the dress.

Mrs. Blakton stated that she had recently caught Miss Lemmond in two falsehoods. It was also brought out that Miss Lemmond's student government record is very poor.

It was moved by Dr. Adams and seconded by Mr. Wright that Miss Lemmond be expelled. Motion carried.

There was some discussion about funds with which to pay Miss Lemmond's transportation home, since it was known that she had no money. Several offered to contribute. Dr. Meadows said that he would personally see that Miss Lemmond's transportation was paid.

Motion carried.

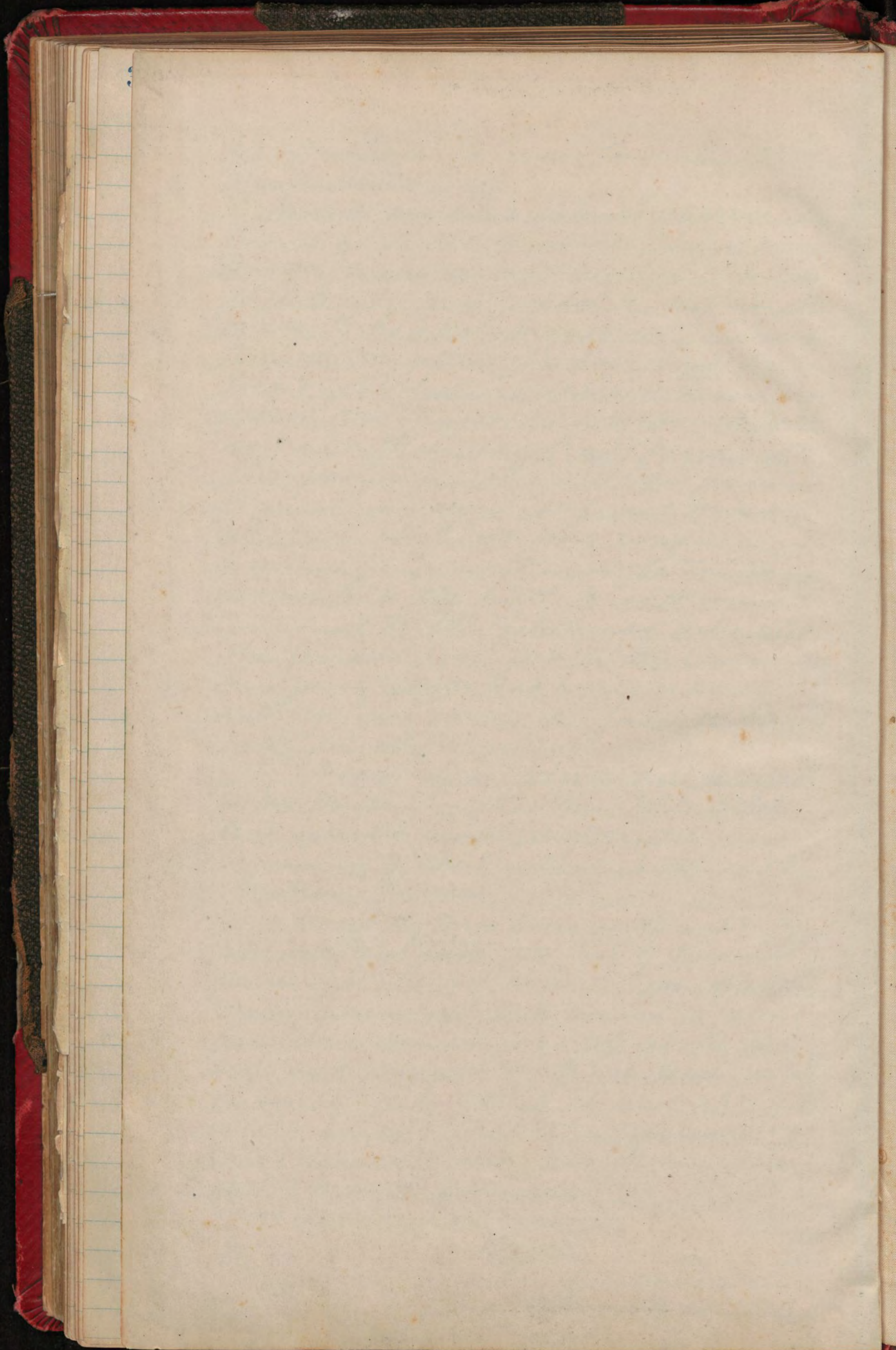
