**James Madison University's newspaper faces legal dispute**

According to Frank D. LoMonte, executive director of Student Press Law Center, a state prosecutor and at least seven uniformed police officers showed up last week at the newsroom of James Madison University's school paper, The Breeze.

Under threat of confiscating all of the newsroom's computers, the officers forced the student editor to turn over more than 900 images they had obtained. The photos were taken at a street party that turned into a brawl.

The SPLC has agreed to provide volunteer legal representation for the students. Yesterday, they presented their case in front of a judge to argue that the search and seizure was unlawful and the images should be returned to The Breeze.

LoMonte describes the event as a "heavy-handed overreaching."

LoMonte said the action violated the federal Privacy Protection Act. It states, "It shall be unlawful for a government officer or employee, in connection with the investigation or prosecution of a criminal offense, to search for or seize any work product materials possessed by a person reasonably believed to have a purpose to disseminate to the public

# Students protest human trafficking

On Thursday, April 22, approximately 15 ECU students and faculty gathered on College Hill to march in the Walk to Stop Human Trafficking. The march was organized through the collaboration of Pam Strickland, who is one of the creators of the Eastern North Carolina Stop Human Trafficking Now organization, and Kiya Bolds, the administrative coordinator for the Department of Campus Living.

Participants marched from College Hill to the Science and Technology building, shouting, "Stop human trafficking," along the way. According to Kiya Bolds, who arranged for the event to be held on ECU's campus, she became aware of the need for recognition about this issue at ECU after meeting Pam Strickland at the service-learning fair. "It's something that's mostly underrepresented and it's one of the concerns that we have," stated Bolds, "It's time to start talking about those things."

Since the service-learning fair, Bold has been trying to raise awareness about the issue, which ultimately resulted in the organization of the campus march. When asked about the response from students, Bold stated, "It's two-fold, a combination of people saying, 'What is human trafficking?' and people just having that 'Oh my gosh, that really happens?'

moment."

Before the march began, Strickland gave a speech encouraging ECU students to raise awareness about human trafficking. "It happens right here in the U.S., right here in North Carolina, and, I'm sad to say, right here in Pitt County," said Strickland.

Strickland also praised the ECU students who were in attendance at the event. "We're just so excited to see students spend time on something other than themselves," she said.

The Delta Sigma Theta sorority, who had several members who participated in the event, donated a generous \$300 to the Stop Human Trafficking Now organization. Yolonda Hodges, a senior majoring in family and community services and the president of Delta Sigma Theta, explained that their sorority heard Pam Strickland speak at an event and were touched by the message.

When asked why her sorority chose to support this particular cause, Hodges stated, "If we don't support, who will? You never know who this person is who has to go through this."

Another student in attendance at the event was Victoria Carter. She marched with a sign that read, "It should not hurt to be a child." Carter, a sophomore majoring in business and communication, said she too heard about the organization after hearing Pam Strickland speak at a meeting.

"It's the sexual aspect of children being raped. It's a horrible thing. I've had some personal issues with it," said Carter when asked why she decided to volunteer.

After the marchers reached the Science and Technology building, they gathered in one of the classrooms to watch a showing of the documentary "Playground," a movie that documents the lives of those who have been involved in domestic minor sex trafficking.

Before the showing of the film, Strickland discussed the recent reform of the laws involving minors and sex trafficking. "One of the big changes in the law is that if a minor is in the sex trafficking industry, they are a victim and are no longer treated like a criminal," explained Strickland.

Because the film also focused on children who had been forced into sex trafficking by their own parents for money, Strickland explained that the laws concerning these circumstances had also recently been changed in the United States. "Before, parents were charged with child abuse instead of sex trafficking."

Strickland said the amount of human trafficking in North Carolina alone is something to be alarmed about, citing the case of Shaniya Davis, a 5-year-old girl from Fayetteville, whose mother

## Playboy names ECU top 10 party school in nation

Playboy magazine released the fifth edition of a list of what it considers to be the top 10 party schools in the nation. This year, ECU made the list at number five.

Playboy last published a list in May 2009. While ECU did not make the list last year, it has made its way back into the top 10.

According to The Daily Reflector, this is the fifth time in Playboy's 57-year history that the magazine has released such a list.

The rankings are determined by Playboy's editorial staff, which gets input from campus representatives, models, photographers, online voters and student readers.

The Playboy Web site writes of ECU, "ECU, your reputation does not precede you. But you boasted about your prowess ('You can't spell parties without Pirates!'), so we had to come check out the scene. Well, we have news for the rest of the country: Greenville, North Carolina is a happening city. And the administration even provides drunk-bus shuttles from downtown to campus."

Bethany Mason, a senior business management major, said of the ranking, "I'm not really a part of the party scene. So I definitely find myself siding with the students who believe that maybe their degree will be devalued because of this."

Mason explained that she was torn, though, over the results and added, "I do, though, believe there are plenty of schools that party and still have very qualified programs and degrees."

Mason's sister, Stephanie Mason, a junior business major, said, "Honestly, I never really thought about our reputation. I'm not necessarily embarrassed by these results, but I'm not excited."

Jason Faulkner, teaching instructor from the English Department, is an alumnus from both the undergraduate and graduate school at ECU. He explained that his reaction to the party school rank was two-sided.

Faulkner said, "First off, I don't know of a school that's not a party school. I think any time you are talking about what schools party, it's kind of like asking what sin is less evil. The fact of the matter is, all schools party. I don't know one that is strictly studying."

He jokingly added, "I have friends that go to Boston University and they swear the kids at Harvard party harder than anywhere else."

Faulkner went on to address the long-term negatives of being labeled a party school.

"A reputation can be perpetrated by one thought. I think as far as looking at it from the students' perspective and hearing them talk in class, it's the situation where they're saying, 'Yeah, we made the

## New Student Government elect hosts open discussion

Last Wednesday evening at the Science and Technology Building, open debates were held for candidates running for positions within the SGA. The event was sponsored through a partnership made up of the SGA and the new East Carolina Association of Forensics (ECAAF). The debate was originally structured as an open forum along with a debate for several senatorial offices, class officer positions and SGA executive positions. Unfortunately, due to many no-shows and many uncontested seats, including all four executive seats, the debate was more of a meet and greet for the ECU students to introduce them to their senators and SGA executives for the upcoming year.

Indeed, the only actual debate that occurred was for Senior Class officer between Daniel Thorton and Natasha Knack. Regardless, many issues were presented and talked about by the candidates through the course of the forum. The questions and topics for the evening were conceived and written by ECAAF during one of their weekly meetings. This was the first event sponsored by the group, which formed soon after the beginning of the semester and held tryouts shortly afterward.

Thomas Duffy, a sophomore political science major, presides over the group as president. He wanted the new student-run organization to take a big role in the debate.

"We want to work as an equal partner with SGA. SGA wants to work with us and we want to work with SGA. [This debate] is going to be a team effort," said Duffy.

ECAAF took on the roll of a separate third part in the debate. No ECAAF members actively participated in the debate as debaters. They wrote up the questions, created the debate format and, according to Duffy, "Made sure there is integrity in the debate process."

Debate, though, was scarcely found in the evening's proceedings. As previously mentioned, there was only one contested seat, and it was for a specific class officer position. This particular election season has been described as unusual and bizarre by some. This year's election ran uncontested.

Despite that, many pressing issues were fielded by the participants, especially the officers-to-be. The topics that came up most frequently, though, pertained to transportation, campus safety and the senator shortage. The matter of the Pirate Express was brought up, which Vice-President-elect Josh Martinkovic fielded, reassuring those present that "Pirate Express isn't going anywhere." President-elect Tremayne Smith also chimed in, acknowledging a need for more safety precautions around the campus, but also mentioned that responsibility fell upon the students, especially during the hours after the buses stop running.

# Riverwalk annual block party canceled

The 5th Annual Riverwalk Block Party was canceled this year due to a failure to obtain the necessary permits for all outdoor events that occur in the city of Greenville. The Riverwalk Block Party was created four years ago and has continued to grow in popularity. This year, the event was estimated to have approximately 5,600 people in attendance and six bands were scheduled to perform.

Bradley Brown, a senior at ECU, has helped organize the event since it began. According to Brown, the permits were submitted for approval on March 29.

After a week and a half with no response regarding the permits, Brown called the police department to follow up. Brown and two others on his planning committee were informed at that time that a meeting on April 14th to discuss the event would require their presence.

Present at the April 14th meeting, in addition to Brown and the two other committee members, were a lieutenant from the police department, the head of the ALE in Greenville and a member of the judicial board for ECU. Explanations and discussion during the meeting left Brown feeling that some comments were meant to intimidate those on the planning

committee. "They stepped over the line," stated Brown. After the meeting, Brown received a written explanation outlining the denial of the permits.

Greenville Police Chief Anderson signed the explanation that outlined the following reasons for denial of the two permits. The explanation stated that the temporary street closure permit was denied due to lack of available parking and poor egress to the area. The explanation stated, "During the 2009 event, numerous ABC violations were reported by residents in adjacent areas,

there was damage to property of individuals within the event area, as well as the surrounding neighborhood." No plans were available to show available parking had been addressed or that there would be access to the area if needed.

In order to receive approval for the amplified outdoor sound permit, an event may not last more than four hours, there must be a clean-up plan and the number of people who attend may not exceed the number of people stated on the permit application. Although the application stated there would be an estimated 500 people attending,

the police department gathered information from social networking sites, which estimated 5,600 people were planning to attend.

Brown was informed that in order to maintain safety for those in attendance, there needed to be one police officer for every 50 people in attendance. This would require additional manpower by the local department. Plans for this year's event also stated that the event was to last 12 hours, which exceeded the four hours usually granted for street closings or amplified sound events. Additionally, the explanation stated, "The projected size and scope of

the event presents a clear threat to the safety and welfare of those in attendance."

According to Brown, there has never been a problem and the police officers' attendance at the event was "only precautionary." No one in the police department was able to comment on the April 14th meeting and permit denial at this time. Brown said, "I took all the possible steps I could to make the party as legitimate as possible."

list!" but you're not thinking of the long-term aspect. Once you get that stigma, it's hard to remove."

Faulkner explained that in a real-world interview situation, a student from ECU may be at a disadvantage against a traditionally academic school if the interviewer has seen the results.

Faulkner's last concern, he voiced, was of Playboy's research methods.

"I don't place a whole lot of value in these surveys," he said, "Playboy didn't have representatives go to this school. Did they go

to the parties or any of the bars? I tend to question Playboy's research methods. But it's one of most widely read magazines in U.S. I do, though, question its validity. I think there is a huge negative stigma that goes along with that. But I do think everyone can admit that all schools are party schools. Any 18 to 22 year olds with free time on their weekends are going to do things college kids do."

The list of schools, from first place to 10th, is as follows: University of Texas at Austin, West Virginia University, University of Wisconsin-Madison, University of

Miami, East Carolina University, Arizona State University, Rollins College, University of California-Santa Barbara, Plymouth State University and University of Iowa.

The controversial rankings are available on newsstands today.

Faulkner quoted a common phrase and added, "It takes a lifetime to build a reputation and a second to destroy it. You are now being judged by this reputation."

Despite the fact that there was a noticeable lack of participation in SGA this year, the candidates were united in the belief that their message and the message of SGA as a whole needed to be brought to the attention of the student body.

"Contested or not, students need to know the angle their student leaders are coming from," said Smith. "Students need to see it from us and hear it from us. This debate was the perfect medium for that to happen."

"I chose to participate in the debate because I wanted people to know and have confidence in me as the new treasurer," said Treasurer-elect Justin Davis. "It is well known that we were uncontested; however, I will say with overwhelming conviction that I prepared and treated this election as if I were contested."

The issue that really hit home for the candidates, though, was the

lack of senators and interest in SGA as a whole. Secretary-elect Kristina Dorschy cited that the SGA Web site only had about 80 hits and all the candidates made some mention of the lack of participation this year. All the officers-elect had their ideas as to how they were going to help reignite interest in SGA. Dortschy says that she'll use her position as secretary to keep people informed on what the SGA is doing.

"We plan to keep the Senate organized by keeping minutes and looking at SGA as a whole," said Dorschy. "I plan to keep our Web site up-to-date, posting minutes from the senate and exec meetings and also help build a relationship from SGA to organization and SGA to students."

Martinkovic, who will preside over the senate, believes that there needs to be a more proactive approach, especially with a new

class of freshmen coming to ECU in the autumn.

"We must first start with the Orientation sessions and engage the new freshman class that will one day be the faces running for SGA office," said Martinkovic. "When we get back in the fall, we must also reinvigorate the students returning from last year."

The evening could be described as a tale of two student organizations. Members of the SGA might see this as a telling sign that changes must be made in order for interest in student government to rise again. ECAF, though, could claim the event as a bold, though small, first step in their very young life.

"We're just taking baby steps right now," said Duffy.

was arrested for forcing Davis into prostitution.

Strickland stated that she feels most compelled to focus on the preventive methods of sex trafficking. "The Domestic Women's Violence shelter costs \$150,000 a year to run. That same \$150,000, if you put it on the prevention side, could keep girls out of it to begin with," said Strickland.

The Eastern North Carolina



Student Health Insurance Plan

### ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS - By Start of Fall 2010

**Undergraduate Students must be:**

- in degree seeking programs
- enrolled in 6 or more credit hours on main campus

**Graduate Students must be:**

- in degree seeking programs
- enrolled in 1 or more credit hours on main campus

**How to Waive Out:**

To effectively waive out, students must simply provide policy information from a current, valid health insurance carrier through a secure online system. Once it has been verified, all charges will be waived.

1. Gather your insurance information, open a web browser and type [www.studentinsurance.com](http://www.studentinsurance.com) in the address bar. With the Pearce & Pearce student insurance website displayed, select the UNC system logo.
2. Select ECU to navigate to the secure (https:) website for ECU students.
3. Choose "Waive On-Line" and follow the instructions.

When students register for classes, they will simply verify their insurance policy information using the online verification page. Waivers for each academic year need to be completed online by the last day of registration for each semester. In most cases, the verification process takes 1 - 2 weeks.

**How to Enroll:**

For students without coverage from an existing health plan, you will be automatically enrolled into the health policy adopted by East Carolina University. The Student Health Insurance Plan works in partnership with the University Health Fee to provide seamless health care at a reasonable cost to students. The University Health Fee covers provider charges at the Student Health Services (SHS), while the Student Health Insurance Plan helps cover other charges such as lab, x-ray, pharmaceuticals and referrals to community specialists when needed.

## Towing is legalized blackmail

I was hanging out at my friend's apartment complex (hereafter referred to as "The Jerks") the other night. I'm not going to say exactly what was going on, but there was a little cookie-baking, some movie-watching and before you know it, a little night-spending.

The next morning when I was rushing down the stairs to make it to my 8 a.m. class, not only were there a lot of empty parking spaces, but there also happened to be an empty parking space right where my car had been the night before. Given the fact that I fell asleep around 2 a.m. and woke up around 7 a.m., that left a 5-hour time span for the tow-truck driver to perform his dirty deed. Different organizations put on events and marches to promote their cause and bring forth understanding to people who were unaware of it. The ECU College Libertarians have faced this dilemma, especially when organizing the Million Marijuana March. They waited a few weeks for approval for their \$50 marching permit before being contacted. The march was rejected, because the streets on campus would be "unable to be blocked." Hasn't there been traffic before for other marches through campus? The group requested a copy of the written denial of the march. Instead, an e-mail was received that stated to find another route. Marching permit through campus: denied with no official explanation.

Many organizations set up tables in front of Wright Place,

since it is a great fundraising location. The ECU College Libertarians conducted a "Get Baked Sale," with a variety of baked goods like any standard bake sale. Whenever a donation was given, a poster or hemp jewelry was given to the supporter. The table was also informative by discussing and providing data about marijuana prohibitions and the North Carolina Medical Marijuana bill. The organization was contacted about a \$30 solicitation of funds permit, because the organization is considered "uncharitable." There was also the threat of a \$500 ticket if found "soliciting" on campus. Solicitation of funds permit denied.

Chelsea Burdette, one of the creators of the event at ECU, brought up a coincidental point that "GPD approved our march permit, ECUPD did not. ECUPD approved our fundraising, GPD did not." Freedom from government intervention: denied on two fronts.

An expected noise issue has been brought up involving the march. The College Libertarians organization was required to present a \$750 rental fee for Town Commons, a public park. They were also told that if the amount of people in attendance exceeded the estimated number, the event would instantly be shut down. The threat of making too much noise in a public place during an exam day is unspeakable. Why would anyone want to present this threat? This march should aspire to be as lulling as an athletic event. Constitutional right to assemble: denied via opinionated red-tape.

## Fear and apathy in SGA election

Friday ECU formally announced its new Student Government Association executive council: Tremayne Smith, president; Josh Martinkovic, vice president; Justin Davis, treasurer; and Kristina Dortschy, secretary.

You may have noticed something different about the election this year, or you may not have noticed it at all. This is because, for the first time in SGA's 103-year history, a ticket ran unopposed.

While this fact may have been pleasing for the newly elected SGA officers, who will be sworn into office on May 2, this is not good news for the student body, which was cheated out of the chance to vote for their new SGA leaders because no one else wanted to run against Smith, Martinkovic, Davis and Dortschy.

The lack of opposition can be contributed to two things: fear and apathy.

Yes, this ticket was very intimidating. As SGA's current treasurer and chief of staff, Smith and Martinkovic have contributed in tackling many

projects with the SGA, which include the drafting of the new SGA constitution, the creation of four \$250 scholarships to be awarded by the SGA and working with the athletic department to organize the vote for naming the new student section in Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium.

However, it is hard to believe that with a student body of approximately 27,000, no one else felt that he or she could do just as good of a job. This leads one to believe that other members of SGA and the student body don't care about providing students with the opportunity to vote for their leaders. It could also be said that there was no point in running against the group, because one would be fated for failure, but apathy is apathy. No matter how you spin the story, only four students out of thousands had the motivation to run for SGA office.

And sure, while campaigning, Smith, Martinkovic, Davis and Dortschy could have chanted a grocery list of what has been accomplished by SGA this year in an attempt to dazzle

voters with past accomplishments, but the point of campaigning is for the candidates to make promises to their voters. But guess what: Because the ticket ran unopposed, no formal campaigning took place, so no campaign promises were made. Essentially, the new executive council of SGA can sit back and have a relaxing year of nothing, and no one has the right to get upset because no one felt the need to oppose them and require the ticket to make promises of what they will do for ECU.

Now, it would be extremely surprising for SGA's incoming executive council to do nothing; this is a group of students who have always had ECU's best interests in mind — but because they ran unopposed, it appears that no other student has the same level of love and devotion to ECU.

All we can do now is hope that the new SGA officers we handed positions to will serve ECU to the best of their abilities and that next year, more than four students step up to the plate to lead the ECU student body.

The event had a Facebook page, which was forced into a closed invite-only status to prevent unwelcome opposition snooping. The posted flyers, torn down; posts detailing the event on campus Internet discussion boards, deleted. Other organizations glare at the "suspicious" donation table set up on campus and complain about the organization "stealing the donors." Other organizations' support: denied.

Where are all of the freedom and nondiscrimination ideas that are supposed to exist? Just because not everyone agrees personally with a cause does not mean that there should be so many hurdles thrown to eliminate it. Everyone deserves to satisfy their passion to support a cause.



## Men's tennis closes out regular season

Elon used four singles wins, three coming in straight sets and the doubles point to post a 5-2 non-conference men's tennis victory over ECU Saturday afternoon at the Jimmy Powell Tennis Center.

Elon improved its mark to 8-13 while ECU dropped to 18-7.

The Phoenix built a lead and clinched the doubles point when the top-seeded tandem of Alberto Rojas and Chase Helpingstine posted an 8-4 victory over Jaroslav Horvath and Henrik Skalmerud. Philip Nemeč and Cody S-MacDowell followed with the 8-2 win over Massimo Mannino and Bryan Oakley at No. 2 to take a 1-0 advantage, but ECU took the final matchup. Stephen Whitwell and Stian Tvedt knocked off Thomas Darling and Clark Howell 8-4.

In singles play, Elon took four of the six matches, picking up victories at the No. 1, No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4 flights. Nemeč cruised past Horvath (2-6, 7-6, 6-3), Helpingstine defeated Whitwell (6-2, 6-3), Rojas dispatched Mannino (7-5, 6-2) and S-MacDowell turned back Skalmerud (6-2, 6-2).

John Schmitt overcame Darling (7-6, 5-7, 6-3) at No. 5 and Oakley cruised past Carlos Arboleda (6-1, 6-3) at No. 6 to account for ECU's tallies.

The Pirates will turn their attention to the Conference USA Championships, which will begin Thursday, April 22, in Tulsa, Okla.

## Baldwin-Tener leaves ECU for Georgia State

ECU head women's basketball coach, Sharon Baldwin-Tener, announced Friday that she has accepted the head coaching position at Georgia State University.

"Coach Baldwin-Tener has been a terrific coach and member of the ECU community," ECU Athletics Director Terry Holland stated. "We hate to see her leave but truly appreciate all she has done for our women's basketball team. She has built an excellent program here and will do a great job at Georgia State."

The squad's RPI rating has improved nearly 175 spots since her arrival in Greenville eight years ago. For the past two seasons, ECU also led Conference USA in attendance.

The Smyrna, Ga., native took ECU to new heights in 2009-2010, guiding the Lady Pirates to their first-ever WNIT bid after finishing the regular season with 20 wins and reaching the semifinals of the C-USA Tournament. ECU also earned its first-ever postseason victory by rallying from 18 points down with six minutes left to post an overtime victory at Drexel in the first round of the WNIT.

ECU ended up with 23 wins at the conclusion of the campaign, the second-most in a single season in school history.

# ECU drops UAB 6-5 on Wooten's walk-off single

Pirates have won six in a row since dropping opening series tilt to Memphis

Forced into the 12th inning with Alabama-Birmingham and the game knotted up at five, freshman John Wooten connected on a game-winning single to centerfield to drive in Kyle Roller, who rumbled home from second to give ECU a 6-5 walk-off victory.

The Pirates' three-game sweep over the Blazers (20-15, 5-6 C-USA) also included a 12-7 decision Saturday and a 6-3 win in Friday's opener.

In Sunday's thriller, ECU (24-12, 6-3 C-USA) was two-outs from being forced into a tie as officials made a pre-determined decision to not play a fresh inning past 1:45 p.m.

To start off the bottom of the frame, Roller was plunked on the head for a free base. Daniel Warzon then advanced Roller to second on a sacrifice bunt, setting up Wooten's clutch connection.

"I felt like I was seeing the ball pretty good today," Wooten said. "It was one of those days where I just wasn't getting hits when I needed to. I'm just glad I could pull through and contribute to help the team win."

As Wooten's single passed through the infield and Roller rounded third barreling home, it was hard to not compare the play with the Pirates' 2009 NCAA Regional win over South Carolina.

"I was going right through the stop sign," Roller said. "I was kind of reenacting the South Carolina game last year, so I just said, 'Keep trucking, big guy.'"

The contest began in a much different form as lefty Kevin Brandt retired the first 11 batters of the game, while at the plate the Pirates tacked on three one-run innings to take a 3-0 lead by the fourth.

Zach Wright opened up the scoring as he sailed a 2-2 pitch out of the yard in left in the bottom of the second. Roller followed with the second run as he belted a single off the right field

wall to score Trent Whitehead. Cam Freeman plated the third with an infield sacrifice.

In the top of the sixth, the Blazers unraveled the ECU lead as well as the shutout for Brandt as UAB scored four runs in the frame to jump ahead of the Pirates.

Blazer centerfielder Jamal Austin, who snapped the perfect game for Brandt in the fourth, pushed across the first run with an RBI single. Following Austin's score, Brandt walked John Frost to load the bases with no outs.

On the next two at-bats, the Blazers capitalized on two defensive errors as they scored three runs to take the lead.

The Pirates regained focus as Freeman made a one-man double play, snatching a high line drive, and stepping on second to put two away, Brandt stopped the bleeding as he fanned Michael Saway to end the inning.

"I think you go back to the inning where they (UAB) scored four, that could have been a disastrous inning," Godwin said.

"You got to give Kevin Brandt a lot of credit for pitching with poise and composure."

Despite giving up four runs, Brandt ended his tenure on the hill with six strikeouts in seven innings.

In the bottom of the sixth frame, catcher Jared Avchen stroked a solo homer to the Jungle parking lot to knot the tilt up at four, and ECU regained the lead in the seventh as Wooten strolled home from third on a passed ball.

UAB ultimately forced extras as Jonathan Merritt pushed across a lone ninth inning run with a grounder to second.

Closer Seth Simmons (2-1) squared off with UAB late reliever Nick Graffeo (2-2) as both pitchers hurled over three innings each.

Simmons added his second win remaining scoreless through sudden death, while Graffeo suffered the loss giving up Wooten's game winner.

Saturday, the Pirates clinched the conference series

12-7 with a strong performance by starter Seth Maness and an early offensive showcase.

ECU jumped on the ball early as it scored five first inning runs, Roller with two on a no-outs destroyed a three run bomb to far right field.

Devin Harris then plated Wright hitting a liner through short. Austin Homan brought in Harris chopping one through the right side for his first RBI single of the night.

Homan went on to rack up five runs-batted, a new career high for the junior.

"As a DH, that's what you want to come up and do," Homan said of his five RBI performance. "That's your sole job is to swing the bat and come up and get some hits."

The Blazers climbed back into the contest, scoring two runs in the third and two in the fourth, but the Pirates gained breathing room once again with a four-run fourth.

Both teams' defensive execution was a questionable issue as the two combined for eight

errors all together with ECU committing five.

Friday night, the Pirates bagged the opening contest 6-3 with another strong outing by right-hander Zach Woods.

Woods pitched 6 1/3 innings, surrendering two runs on six hits while recording seven strikeouts.

At the plate, second baseman Cam Freeman led the way with two RBI going 1-for-2.

It was a crucial weekend for ECU to earn its first conference sweep, but continued defensive lapses could possibly put too much pressure on pitching and hitting as the team heads to C-USA powerhouse Rice next weekend.

The Pirates will contend in two midweek matchups this week, first heading to Campbell on Tuesday and then hosting backyard rival N.C. State Wednesday at 6 p.m.

## ECU concludes spring practice in spirited scrimmage

This wasn't your ordinary Purple-Gold game.

Because of construction to the east end zone of Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium — where 7,000 students will sit come the regular season — ECU only used 70 yards of the field, and in most cases, most drives started at midfield.

Kickoffs (no hitting) opened each half and special teams still punted and kicked point after touchdown attempts; however, instead of teams being drafted on opposing teams and having a "true" intrasquad scrimmage, the offense, wearing purple tops,

squared off against the defense, who sported white tops.

Despite the nontraditional format of the spring game, 7,125 fans still turned out to see first-year head coach and ECU alum Ruffin McNeill's pass-heavy offense, which he brought from Texas Tech where he enjoyed 10 seasons on the coaching staff.

All in all, the scrimmage lasted a little over a 100 plays and featured four touchdowns by the Pirate offense in 22 possessions. The defense, on the other hand, enjoyed a productive day in grabbing two interceptions on efforts by junior Bradley Jacobs and senior Travis Simmons as well as creating heavy pressure

on the three quarterbacks utilized by the purple team.

While the Pirates looked inconsistent at times on both sides of the ball, multiple reporters claimed after the conclusion of the game that ECU looked much more impressive in its prior two scrimmages, both of which were closed to the public.

McNeill even offered his own explanation.

"I saw some guys trying a little too hard," McNeill said. "I've seen guys that have made catches all spring maybe try a little too hard today to make things happen. That is something that can be corrected."

ECU utilized three quar-

terbacks on the day, including sophomore walk-on Brad Wornick, who started the first two series of the contest and led the Pirates on two scoring drives as they finished the day 18-of-33 for 226 yards, two touchdowns and an interception. Redshirt freshman Rio Johnson completed 18-of-27 passes for 105 yards and a touchdown while sophomore Josh Jordan went 4-of-11 for 23 yards while throwing one pick.

Wornick connected with sophomore wideout Andrew Bodenheimer for a 16-yard touchdown and senior Javon Brumsey on a 48-yard strike. Rio Johnson also hooked up with

Bodenheimer on a 10-yard score while freshman running back Michael Dobson scored on an 11-yard rush.

"I feel [this season] is real important, especially my leadership," Williams said. "It's getting the guys going and pumped on the field and keep working hard and busting our butts every day."

McNeill stated after the game that no one has been slated as the starting signal caller for ECU's regular season as well as home opener against Tulsa on Sept. 5 and he expects the battle at the position to go well into the summer and fall practices.

Formerly troubled running back and Greenville native Jonathan Williams seems to have tuned a page in his life and rushed five times for 45 yards and caught six passes for 11 yards in Saturday's tilt. The senior expects to take on a leadership role come the fall.

"Right now, I have a good grasp of it (the new offense)," Wornick said. "We've had 15 practices to work on it and we came out here today and I feel good about the offense."

Overall, the ECU offense passed the ball over twice as much as they passed it — 71 to 29 — while racking up 412 yards of total offense, of which 354 came on passing.

While McNeill stated that some parts of the spring have been a "challenge," he believes the team has made strides over the course of the 15 practices.

"We lost 28 really good football players (from last year)," McNeill said, "I'm excited about the guys that have stepped up and taken advantage of the opportunity."

# Softball sweep highlighted by Kee's 600th victory

Just minutes after John Wooten's walk-off single for ECU's baseball team, sophomore and Greenville native Suzanne Riggs performed a little late-game heroics of her own for the ECU softball team (28-4, 9-3 C-USA).

With the game tied 0-0 in the bottom of the seventh inning, Riggs hit a seeing eye single between third base and the shortstop to score Kauai Tom and finish the sweep of UTEP (26-17, 8-7 C-USA). The victory propelled ECU to the top of the Conference USA standings.

"I watched the at bat before mine and I had made my mind up to go in and swing at the first pitch, and it worked out," Riggs said.

Sunday's game was the second outstanding pitching duel of the weekend between Toni Paisley for the Pirates and Stacie Townsend for the Miners. Townsend held ECU scoreless until two outs in the final inning when she gave up the only run of the game. The Miners' ace also recorded 12 strikeouts while only walking two batters.

Nothing new as, once again, Toni Paisley dominated for ECU. Paisley tied for her career high in strikeouts with 15.

"I wanted to beat it," Paisley

said, referring to her strikeout high, "but I couldn't quite beat it. I am always stuck at 15."

The ace also commented on her third shutout of the week, which gave her ECU's all-time record for a career at 34.

"I had been following (the record) and I saw it before the weekend and I told myself I could get it over with," Paisley said. "And after (Saturday) I just wanted to come out and finish it."

In the nightcap of Saturday's doubled-header, Faith Sutton recorded her second complete game of the week and earned the victory. The sophomore struck out four Miners and allowed just one run in the contest. Sutton has gone all seven innings the past three contests after having just one seven-inning complete game in her first 14 starts.

UTEP drew first blood, scoring in the second inning, but ECU was quick to answer. Senior Nicole Jordan hit a two-run double that was followed by a pair of illegal pitches by UTEP to score Jordan and fellow senior Vanessa Moreno.

The early game was the first of the premier pitching match-ups between Townsend and Paisley.

"I would put Townsend right up there with Toni Paisley when it comes to competitiveness, and I don't

say that often," ECU Head Coach Tracey Kee said. To watch the best two pitchers in C-USA go head-to-head for 14 innings and neither of them back down is fun to watch, maybe a little stressful, but I can't say enough about Stacie Townsend."

In the opener, Paisley gave up just one hit, a double by Townsend, ironically enough, in the bottom of the seventh inning and secured the 1-0 victory. Paisley struck out 12 UTEP batters while Townsend struck out 10 ECU hitters.

The only run of the game came off of a Charina Summer single that brought Jordan across home plate. It was Summer's team-leading fourth game-winning RBI of the season.

The first win on Saturday also gave Coach Kee her 600th career win. Kee is one of only 45 active Division-I coaches to have 600 career wins. The reigning C-USA Coach-of-the-Year is in her 24th year as a Pirate after spending four as an outstanding player and six as an assistant before being named head coach in 1997.

The Pirates continue play Tuesday with a home double-header against UNC Wilmington. First pitch is scheduled for 3 p.m.

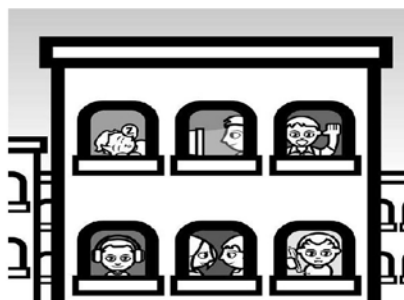
