SGA debate held

Candidates discuss plans for budget cuts, House of Rep., student safety and Redbox

SGA executive candidates debated on campus issues, their platforms and how to best represent the university student body at a debate yesterday evening at Mendenhall.

A major focus of the debate was how the SGA could keep their promises to students.

"We have to increase accountability and reliability," said Jake Srednicki, vice presidential candidate for Ticket 3. "Our platform's going to be the agenda for every meeting."

Micah Lockhart, presidential candidate of Ticket 1, said that if elected, his ticket would implement a promise

tracker that would track the progress of an initiative from start to finish.

"It'll work just like you would track a package on FedEx," said Lockhart.

Brooks Barrett, who is running independently for president, said that she would make sure she keeps her promises by making sure her platform is reasonable.

"All my platforms are completely tangible and completely relatable," said Barrett.

Ron Hinton, presidential candidate for Ticket 2, also wants to make sure his initiatives will go through

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Final vote Friday on student centers

Today the UNC Board of Governors will discuss whether plans to build two new student centers and a parking deck will move forward.

For the project to continue on track, the Board of Governors will need to approve the project, and if it is approved it will be handed to the General Assembly for approval.

If all goes as planned, construction will start in either fall of 2014 or spring 2015.

"The student center on the university's main campus will serve as the prime meeting space for students and will become the living room of campus," said Virginia Hardy, vice chancellor for Student Affairs.

"[The Student Center is] that place where ideas are generated and plans are developed and hopefully executed," said Hardy.

It will be a 210,000 square-foot facility and according to the UNC Board of Governors website, "will become the new home for the Ledonia Wright Cultural Center, a 250 seat multi-purpose black box auditorium, spaces for student government and student groups, multi-venue dining facilities, retail and service points and a dividable ballroom."

In conjunction with the student center, 700 parking spaces will be housed in the new parking garage. The construction will take up approximately 300 parking spaces, but 400 more will be gained. The parking garage will be available for use through permits, meters and even hours when students can use it free of charge.

The 68,000 square-foot Health Sciences Campus student services

facility will be a territory where students from different health care professions can come together and learn from each other.

According to the Board of Governors website, students will be able access a new recreation center, Student Health Services branch, various-sized meeting spaces, a lounge area, convenience store complete with an ATM and a small food-court.

Students will see that \$128.8 million in student fees will support the projects.

Student fees are not wholly funding these projects. Campus Dining, Dowdy Student Stores, Ledonia Wright Cultural Center, the university's Parking and Transportation office, Student Health Services and the Student Recreation combined are all contributing \$27.5 million, as stated by the Board of Governors website.

The project will cost much more with \$128.8 million in student fees also funding the project.

"We are quite excited about this particular project because it is probably the largest student project that we've done on this campus and it is very important and very significant," said Hardy.

In 1974, Mendenhall Student Center was completed to serve 11,000 students. Within forty years, the student body has grown by over 145 percent and a health sciences campus has been developed with a population of over 3,000 students, according to the UNC Board of Governors website.

"When you double your sizes but not double your space, it's tough," said Tim Schwan, SGA president.

There were many forms of entertainment, including the African Students Organization performing a dance, jazz musicians, a F.A.M.E. modeling demonstration and a BSU trivia wheel.

BSU member Jamitress Bowden helped create the trivia questions for their game.

"We created these questions because we wanted students to learn different things and people who influenced history," said Bowden.

Representing ASO at the dinner were Augustine Akyaw and Leroy Ediage. They performed a

Bowl ring stolen from coach's home

The Greenville Police Department released Tuesday that the university Assistant Football Coach Marc Yellock's football bowl ring was stolen from his home.

Other items were stolen between the hours of 3 p.m. on Feb. 7 and 9 a.m. on Feb. 10, according to Greenville Police Department reports.

The ECU New Orleans bowl football ring, worth \$500, was stolen along with

fur clothing and seven pairs of tennis shoes, worth \$1,400 altogether, according to the case report.

The thief entered the home in the 3300 block of Ellsworth Drive by kicking in the back door and is still at large.

"At this time, there are no clear leads and the case is still pending. We do know that Yellock was away from his home during the robbery and returned home afterwards,"

said Kristen Hunter, Greenville Police Department Public Information Officer.

Yellock began his coaching career with the Pirates in 2010 and previously interned with the New Orleans Saints.

"We definitely encourage anyone who may have information to contact the Greenville Police Department to help us find the thief," said Hunter.

happen," said Hinton.

Another focus of the candidates was how to better represent the student body.

"We think we should be representative of the student population and opinions," Lockhart said. "I want to make SGA all inclusive."

Ticket 3's platform involves the formation of a SGA House of Representatives that would allow every student organization to have representation.

"We really want to set up the House of Representatives," said Kaitlyn Dutton, Ticket 3's candidate for Treasurer. "I believe we'll involve students if we work with them personally."

Some question involved issues are currently facing the SGA, like whether or not certain SGA positions should have a pay raise. Gabe Bowman, vice presidential candidate for Ticket 2 did not believe this was important.

"If people are running based on how much money they'll get, they need to reevaluate why they're running," Bowman said.

After Associate Vice Chancellor of Student

Affairs, Bernie Schultz, was finished asking questions, audience members were allowed to submit their own.

One of Ticket 2's initiatives is to put a stoplight and crosswalk by the intersection of 33 East and Copper Beech. One student asked how that would occur when 10th Street was a state road.

"We will be working with North Carolina Department of Transportation to get that done," said Hinton.

Ticket 3 is attempting to put a Red Box on campus. However, Summer Ballard, a freshman sociology major, said she had talked to William McCartney, associate vice chancellor of Campus Living and Dining Services, and he said the option was not possible.

However, Ticket 3 believes that they can find a way to make it work.

"Change is very possible," said Dutton. "If you keep going and going for it, it's going to happen."

Sorority raises money for Make-a-Wish

The Chi Omega chapter at ECU raised \$10,400 from its first golf tournament held last November at Greenville Country Club to benefit Make-A-Wish foundation of Eastern North Carolina.

Although the tournament took place in the fall, the total amount raised was just released. Chi Omega was working with Make-A-Wish and Greenville Country Club to figure out what would be the country club's profits, according to Morgan Wray, Chi Omega president and sophomore business major.

"We were working with our treasurer, along with Greenville Country Club and Make-A-Wish to

finalize everything and to give everybody their prizes," said Wray.

Chi Omega held the golf tournament to in efforts to generate more money for the Make-A-Wish foundation. Compared to past years, she said their efforts for this event have been more successful.

"Other schools around North Carolina, like NC State and UNC [Chapel Hill], usually make a lot more money than we do, so we decided we wanted to do something bigger. We had done a golf tournament in the past, but it just wasn't ever successful," said Wray.

According to Wray, Chi Omega's Philanthropic Chair Tori Piner was adamant about doing a golf tournament last

According to Wray, Make-a-Wish wishes cost about \$10,000. In one afternoon, members raised enough money to grant a wish for a child in the area.

Wray said the golf tournament was very successful and the sisters of Chi Omega are doing a golf tournament again this coming fall.

Wray said there were over 30 teams that played in the tournament.

The event was a double shotgun event, meaning different teams golfed in the morning and in the afternoon. For \$90 a person and \$360 per team, players

received a full game of golf, raffle prizes and food. There were over 20 prizes donated for golfers to win and Jimmy Johns, Chik-fil-A and Bojangles donated food.

Founded in 1895, Chi Omega is the largest women's fraternal organization, and in Chi Omega selected Make-A-Wish as its national charity in 2002. Since then, the organization has contributed more than 430,000 volunteer hours and raised more than \$6.8 million to grant the wishes of children with life-threatening medical conditions.

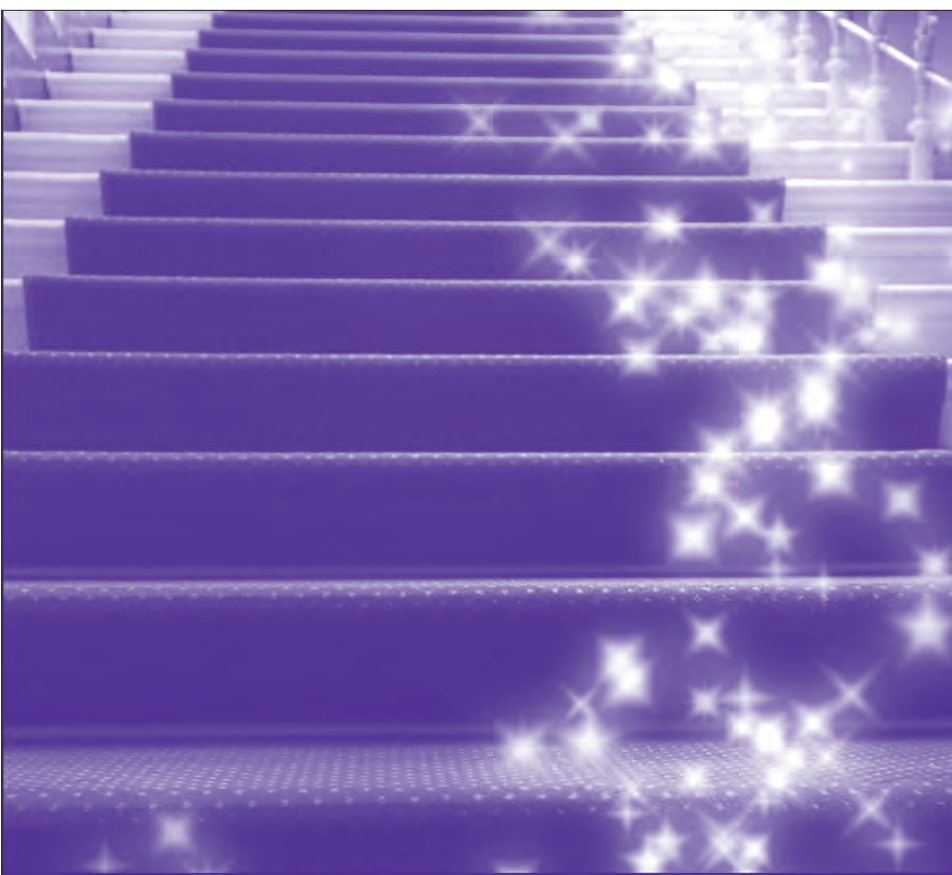

Alan Watts once explained that crest implied trough, and without either we wouldn't have a wave. What matters at the end of the day is that something resulted because of the two.

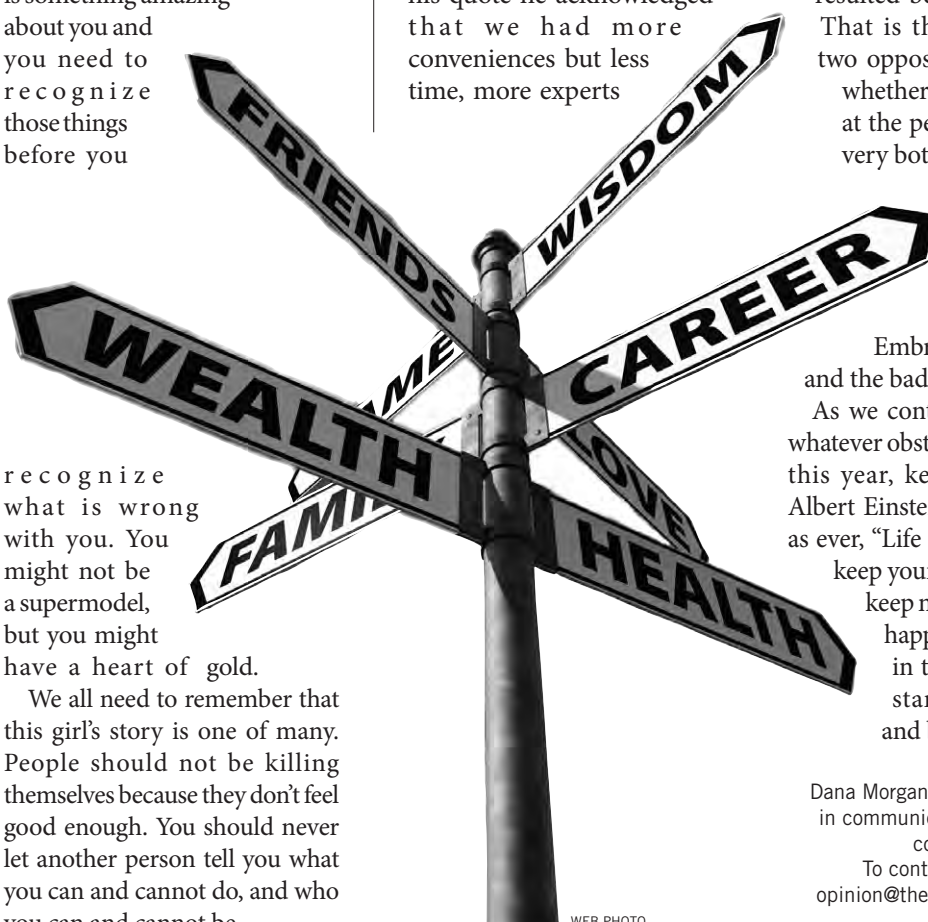
That is the true nature of two opposites. It isn't about whether you are currently at the peak of the crest, or very bottom of the trough,

Diamond Bucs cruise at home Pirates halt recent losing skid against Campbell

Despite allowing two runs and two hits with a hit-batsman in the first inning, freshman Davis Kirkpatrick settled in and picked up the win in the Pirates 8-3 victory over Campbell Tuesday night.

Danny Pardo got the game started for the Camels as he reached on an error by Drew Reynolds. Kyle Leady drove Pardo in on an RBI single to give Campbell the lead with one out in the first.

Leady was driven in two batters later by Will Albertson with another RBI single. Kirkpatrick settled in and retired the last two batters of the inning.

Fortunately for Kirkpatrick, the bats showed up for the Pirates and anchored the win.

Garrett Brooks got the home half of the first started with an infield single. Reynolds followed him up with a single. Brooks and Reynolds advanced to scoring position after an errant throw by Pardo. Zach Houchins forced a walk from Campbell's Bobby Thorson to load the bases.

With runners on base, Ian Townsend took a fastball to left center that drove in Brooks and Reynolds. Ben Fultz followed Townsend with an RBI of his own. With two outs in the inning, Travis Watkins drove a pitch up the middle to bring in Fultz, who scored from third.

"We get guys on base, we get a lot of hits, but we're just not driving them in in key situations," said Watkins. "So that's what we had to do, we just started driving guys in."

Kirkpatrick started to settle in as he took the mound for the second inning, as he set down the frame in order. Reynolds took the first pitch he saw and doubled to right center. Townsend came up with a two out single to drive in Reynolds and extend the Pirates lead to 5-2 at the end of two frames.

Kirkpatrick set down the third inning in order and picked up his first strikeout on Trail to end the inning. The Pirates continued their fantastic two out hitting as Bryce Harman picked up a double. He was driven in by a Kirk Morgan single later in the inning.



The Pirates had their best day at the dish so far in the young season, plating eight runs, which was more than enough for Kirkpatrick and the stingy ECU bullpen.

Matt Nadolski picked up a one out double for Campbell and was driven in by Clayton Brown the give the Camels their third and final run of the game. In the fourth inning, the Pirates padded their lead as Watkins drove in Houchins and Fultz.

Kirkpatrick exited the game after the fifth inning having allowed five hits, three runs (two earned) and picking up five strikeouts in his win.

"I came out a little nervous, a little amped up, but I know I have great teammates behind

me and they came through," said Kirkpatrick.

After a five-inning performance, the freshman pitched was greeted with a pie to the face delivered by Brooks in postgame.

Kirkpatrick candidly vowed to get revenge after Brooks' stunt.

From there, the Pirates cruised and picked up three scoreless innings of relief from Nick Durazo. After Evan Kruczynski allowed a walk and hit a batter, Reynolds moved to the mound and closed out the game to give the Pirates their third win in the opening week.

The Pirates bullpen has not allowed a run in 18 and a third innings of work this season.

"If week keep this streak alive we will be very good," said Coach Godwin. "We try to get some different guys looks. It didn't work out for Kruczynski in his first time out there and he'll be better next time."

The Pirates will travel to Charlottesville to take on No. 1 Virginia for a weekend series.

Pirates take to the road Matchups in Texas will test teams

The ECU women's basketball team will begin its longest road trip of the season, in terms of traveled miles, tonight to the "Lone Star State." They will travel about four thousand miles round-trip after road games at Texas-San Antonio and UTEP.

Both games are separated by just two nights rather than the ordinary three-night layoff that the Pirates (21-3, 9-2 Conference USA) have grown accustomed to.

So with the added miles and quicker turnaround, ECU coach Heather Macy adjusted the team's preparation accordingly.

"It will be a little bit different with the one-day preparation," Macy said in a phone interview with TEC, "but we will be traveling to UTEP right after the (UTSA) game on Thursday. So we'll have all day Friday with the prep and we don't have a game until Saturday (at 5 p.m.). So I

don't think anything as far as legs being fresh will be a concern."

The Pirates' matchup against UTSA (12-12, 3-8 C-USA) marks the first ever meeting between the schools, but features a pair of teams trending in different directions. Although the Roadrunners won on the road at Rice last weekend, they have still lost six of their last seven games. To make matters worse, all of the losses were by double-figure deficits.

On the other side of the spectrum sit the Pirates. Indeed, ECU has won five straight games and eight of its last nine leading up to this week's road trip. Leading scorers Jada Payne and Abria Trice combined for 41 points in its last outing - a 56-49 victory against North Texas, Saturday.

UTEP (20-5, 9-3 C-USA) has enjoyed similar success but had its eight game win-streak snapped Wednesday at North Texas, 73-64.

Aside from creating

Pirate earns golfer of the week

Sophomore Spang overcomes rough start in tournament

The ECU Women's Golf team kicked off the spring portion of their season last week with an 11th place finish at the UCF Challenge in Orlando, Fla.

Despite the eleventh place finish, which was the first not top-10 performance of the season, Frida Gustafsson Spang captured her fourth Top-20 finish of the season. Spang finished 1-under par after starting the tournament off with a triple bogey on the first hole. This was a performance that earned her the honor of Conference USA Golfer-of-the-Week, which was announced on Feb. 12.

Spang expressed the good feelings that honor gives her and that she is taking the award as a sign that her hard work is paying off.

Head coach Kevin Williams credits Spang's success in Orlando to going back to the basics after the fall season in

which he says she struggled. He believes the source of the issue spurred from her not "clicking" with the coach she worked with this past summer in her home country of Sweden.

"She just didn't play as good as she's capable in the fall," said Williams.

Entering the spring, the team was ranked 10th out of the 19 teams participating in the UCF Challenge. Williams mentioned that despite doing "pretty much what we're supposed to do," he thinks they are better than what they are ranked.

"I thought we hit the ball really good but we just didn't putt well," he said.

Even though the team failed to pick up a victory in the Lady Pirate Intercollegiate, Williams thinks they have had moments that they can build on.

"We picked up some nice quality wins," said Williams, as they were able to capture multiple victories over both Texas A&M and Florida State.

Looking forward, Williams has his eyes set on nationals as their ultimate goal.

"We know we have a team that's good enough to be one of the 24 teams in the country playing for a national championship," he said.

Making it to nationals would mean the Lady Pirates would have advanced past regionals, something they have accomplished for six consecutive years.

Nicoline Skaug, a sophomore who led the team in stroke average during the fall, thinks the program has given them the tools to accomplish this goal.

"Everything is so well established for us to be as good as possible," she said, which is something that allows her to enter each tournament with a "play it to win it" mentality.

according to Baseball America. Virginia is, after all, coming off of a 50-win 2013 campaign highlighted by a trip to the super-regionals.

This year's Virginia team is returning its top five hitters from last year that combined for 24 homeruns and 227 RBIs. To compound things, Virginia returns 11 pitchers, including two weekend starters, Brandon Waddell and Nick Howard.

Waddell could potentially toe the rubber on Friday for the Cavaliers with Jeff Hoffman slated to get the start in that game for the Pirates. For a player who hopes to be a top pick in the draft, facing the Virginia lineup will provide Hoffman with a chance to play against some of the nation's top collegiate players.

"We started off with them last year. They have kind of the same lineup minus a few guys. They added a few younger guys in there," said Hoffman. "I know a little about them but we try to leave that stuff to (pitching) coach (Dan) Roszel. He does a great job with scouting and stuff like that."

Last year, the Pirates faced Virginia to start the season and got outscored 27-13 in

the two games they played. Hoffman started the first game of the matchup; a game in which the Pirates lost 14-4, and allowed four runs in four and two-thirds innings.

Winning one game against the top ranked team on their turf would be impressive for the up-start Pirates. But inside the clubhouse, ECU has higher expectations.

"I think if we come out of this weekend winning 2 out of 3 and make it in the top 25, that'll be huge for our club and our conference," said Hoffman.

ECU will see David Lucroy take the mound on Saturday and Tyler Bolton on Sunday. Lucroy is coming off of a start against JMU where he got roughed up for four runs in just two innings of work.

The Pirate bullpen will be relied on as well. So far this season, the bullpen has not allowed a single earned run, and with the offensive prowess that the Cavaliers hold, they may see extended duty this weekend.

With a victory, the Pirates may be able to put themselves on the map nationally. They are on the cusp of a top-25 ranking,

and with an impressive win or two over one of the nation's best teams, people around the country may begin to take notice.

"We always want to come in and play well against a great team like that and I know all the guys are amped up to play this week," said freshman pitcher Davis Kirkpatrick.

It's still early in the season, but thus far, the Pirates have shown improvements in some of their weaker areas from last year.

The fielding was sporadic at times last weekend, but the pitching staff, most notably the bullpen (18 and a third scoreless

innings), was solid.

If nothing else, this weekend in Charlottesville will be a barometer for just how much Billy Godwin's team has improved. The Pirates were throttled at the hands of the Cavaliers last season.

The Pirates will not likely face a complacent Virginia team come Friday as the Cavaliers slipped up against Kentucky last weekend in an upset.

meeting in El Paso, but were eventually overwhelmed by the Miners. UTEP won comfortably, 81-66, behind its 54-point scoring output in the second half.

The conference-leading Bulldogs (21-5, 9-2) have won four games in a row and 13 of their last 15 matchups. Meanwhile, the Pirates (13-13, 2-9 C-USA) are coming off road losses at Tulsa and North Texas and sit at the bottom of the Conference USA standings.

Louisiana Tech will pose a challenge for ECU due to its balanced offense and variety of playmakers. The Bulldogs are the 12th best rebounding team in America with 40.3 rebounds per game (rpg) and the fourth highest scoring team with 84.2 points per game (ppg).

"They have quickness, speed, a shot blocker and they turn you over," said ECU Head Coach Jeff Lebo. "They're used to winning and they're used to winning away from home."

A month ago, the Bulldogs suffered an 80-71 road loss to Southern Miss (21-5, 8-3). They experienced their second conference defeat 11 days later on the road against UTEP (19-7, 9-2) in an 89-79 game.

Besides those two road shortcomings, Louisiana Tech has been spectacular with tough wins over Tulsa, Tulane and Charlotte. Last Saturday, the Rice Owls got demolished on the road by the Bulldogs, 85-46.

Despite losing their leading scorer Raheem Appleby to an ankle injury, the Bulldogs have been remained resilient. Sophomore guard Alex Hamilton has been very effective with 14.8 points and 3.6 rebounds a game.

The 6-foot-9 junior forward Michale Kyser will likely cause some trouble in the paint for the Pirates. Kyser averages 6.9 ppg and a team-high 6.6 rpg. Senior forward Chris Anderson has also chipped in with 11.7 ppg and 5.8 rpg.

Junior guard Kenneth Smith has been effective as the Bulldogs' main facilitator this season. His 7.8 assists per game are the second most of any player in the NCAA Division I. In his last game against Rice, Smith had an incredible stat line of 11 assists and no turnovers.

The Owls have lost their last two games as well as 12 of their last 14. Their only conference wins were both narrow

victories at home. The first one was versus Charlotte (14-10, 5-6) on Jan 25. The other was nearly two weeks later against North Texas (12-13, 3-8).

Senior guard Austin Ramljak, who averages 11.8 ppg and makes 40 percent of his three point attempts, has been a veteran leader for Rice. The Owls have been carried on the glass by freshman forward Sean Obi and his 9.7 rpg.

ECU has struggled during their last few games and both the coach and players know the importance of getting back on track.

"We haven't had the type of balance offensively that we really needed," said Coach Lebo.

"I feel like we'll come out and play well [against Louisiana Tech]," said senior guard Akeem Richmond. "That will give us momentum going into Saturday's game."

Coming all the way from Senegal, Keur Gui, a group of rap activists, or as they call themselves “raptivists,” will be coming to ECU to share their message of global activism through music.

“They’ve been very prolific in Senegal in talking about some of the injustices and the lack of civil rights there,” said Melissa Haithcox-Dennis, director of the Ledonia Wright Cultural Center. “We were able to bring them down here with a professor out of African Literatures, Maramé Gueye. She knows them because she is from Senegal. When she found out they were going to be here she invited them down to come and do a discussion about hip hop, Senegal, and Africa and how [rap] is used similar here to talk about social issues.”

After the luncheon, Keur Gui will be performing a concert in Fletcher Music Hall at 7 p.m. Although they do not rap in English, a discussion panel will be held after the concert.

“They are an interesting group, they’re all over YouTube and they’re very well known in world music arenas so it’s a really nice option to have them come perform for us,” said Haithcox-Dennis. “They will do a lecture afterwards to discuss where their music comes from and why it’s so important to them to do this activism.”

Feb. 26 at 4:30 p.m.: Heritage Month Dinner “A Day in the Diaspora”

West End Dining Hall will be hosting this Heritage Month Dinner. “It’s a premium night and we’re going to have foods from around the Diaspora,” said Dr. Haithcox-Dennis. “There will be food from Africa, the Caribbean, Southern Comfort foods, so people will have an opportunity to taste a variety of foods in addition to the pizza and other stuff that is available.”

Not only will there be different meal options to try, there will also be plenty of entertainment that will certainly not want to be missed. There will be campus groups dancing, a quiz bowl hosted by the Black Student Union, and even a jazz trio. While the dinner itself begins at 4:30, the entertainment will begin at 5 pm and end around 8 pm.

Feb. 21 at 6:30 p.m.: First Year Student Recognition

The First Year Student Recognition is an event honoring an ALANA or the African, African American, Latino, Native American or Asian Pacific Islander, who achieve a GPA of 3.0 or higher their first year at ECU.

“Every year we’ve been doing this and it’s been a wonderfully successful program,” said Haithcox-Dennis. “We had 650 people come last semester.”

This year, The First Year Student Recognition has decided to change their program.

“One thing we realized was that first year students don’t have a GPA so they would have to wait until their sophomore year to even be recognized,” said Haithcox-Dennis. “What we did new this year was have a first year ALANA, where we would specifically identify and recognize students who achieved at least a 3.0 their first semester at ECU.”

This semester, the recognition event was planned to be held during Parent’s Weekend so that families of those being honored would be able to attend.

March 1: Charleston trip

Students are invited to join the Ledonia Wright Cultural Center in traveling to Charleston for a day to learn about slavery and visit sites that were used by abolitionists. “It is an opportunity for people to explore their personal identity in relation to historical landmarks, events, or different people,” said Haithcox-Dennis. “When we get to Charleston, we will tour some of the sites that were very relevant to slavery and the abolitionists.”

Students will have an opportunity to learn and see first-hand what it was like to live the life of a slave.

“We’re giving students the question of, slaves were sold here, how does that make you feel now? Or, we have to pay to see a traditional slave quarter, how does that make you feel?” said Haithcox-Dennis. “Talking about some of the emotion that comes up when visiting sites like that and what does it mean to you. It gives you an opportunity to understand some of the culture and things that have happened in the past.”

Students who are interested in the trip to Charleston may purchase a ticket, which costs \$50, in the Student Ticket Office. The fee covers the cost of the trip and dinner, and a boxed breakfast will be provided.

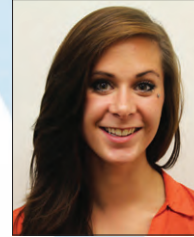

The 2014 Winter Olympics are being held in the small Russian coastal city of Sochi and American athletes have made their presence in Russia known by taking winning medals of all colors. Local musician releases album

On Saturday the 22nd, Peasants Pub will host an album release show for local musician Rebekah Todd and her band, The Odyssey. Her new album, entitled "Roots Bury Deep" was released via iTunes on February 18th, and hard copies will be available at the show. This will be the first show Todd has played at Peasants since July 2013 when she performed without the full band.

The album release is being split between two shows,

one at Tir Na Nog in Raleigh on Friday, and the other on Saturday at 10 p.m. Peasants Pub and is open to all ages. Both shows will feature supporting act Darkwater Rising. The Odyssey bassist William Seymour says "I want to see this place packed beyond fire code."

"I come from a folk background," Todd said. "But I always sang like I had a bigger vocal sound than what fit into the folk category." Bigger than folk indeed. Todd has the type of voice that commands an audience's attention. Trombonist Evan Roberson recalled one of the first times he heard Rebekah sing, saying he literally "stopped playing and just looked at her."

Todd says playing with a group has broadened her horizons. "I had gone through several bands trying to find a good fit for the songs that I had written. I was still learning what kind of musician that I am." The Odyssey's drummer, Brandon Shamar, said "the music now is a lot more diverse because all of [our] different influences." Playing as a group has built an interesting relationship between the musicians. Todd said "We're forcing each other to grow and at the same time were growing together."

She writes about growing in the title track "Roots Bury Deep." She speaks of returning to your roots, in order to

grow and evolve. She took her own message to heart. Since the release of her previous EP, Rebekah says she has grown by leaps and bounds as a musician. She said "I have personally grown in my writing skills and vocally." Not to mention the progression due to the addition of her backing band, the jazz infused groovyness that is The Odyssey.

Fans of Rebekah Todd and The Odyssey can expect big things in 2014. Todd said "Were excited to partner with Home Grown Music Network. They're going to be helping us a lot with booking and promotion in the future." This LP comes in a pivotal moment in Todd's career, as she tries to break out of her small town shell and take the world by storm.

With expansion in mind, The Odyssey noted that one

of the only things holding them back was a lack of proper travel arrangements. Seymour jokingly added "we're in desperate need of a van if anyone wants to donate."

Excited to open for Rebekah Todd and The Odyssey is the rock and country inspired band, Darkwater Rising. Charly Lowry, the band's lead singer, said she met Rebekah Todd at DWR's show at Peasant's Pub last August. "She just came out to see [our] show but she introduced herself to us and now we have a show together which is pretty cool," said Lowry.

Back in 2004, college sophomore Lowry performed on the national scale as a semi-finalist on American Idol. Four years later, she started a band with high school friends Aaron Locklear, Corey Locklear, Shay Jones,

and Tony Murnahan.

Corey Locklear and Lowry attended UNC-Chapel Hill together and a couple years after graduating, Locklear bought himself the video game Guitar Hero and taught himself how to play the guitar. Around the same time, she was doing solo recording work with his brother Aaron.

As they tied their talents together, Lowry said the biggest thing she learned from being a musician is patience, something she continually works on everyday. "Give it time," said Lowry. "You might think you're ready but there is always better that comes from you and you never know when it's going to come."

Restaurant Spotlight: Winslow's

While many view downtown as a weekend hot spot, Fifth Street offers more than just clubs and bars. Winslows Deli, Tavern, and Market, located on Fifth Street in Uptown Greenville offers a unique dining experience. Whether people are looking to have a nice meal or shop their various collections of beer and wine, Winslows has something for everyone.

Unlike many Greenville restaurants, Winslows is not a chain. Its center focus is the people who live and have lived here. Roxanne Parnell, the bar manager, described the feel of the venue as well as their décor.

"The atmosphere of Winslow's has a rustic feel and all around the restaurant there are pictures of Greenville back in the day," said Parnell. "People will come up and say 'Hey, I know that person' or 'that's my aunt'."

Katherine Wetherington, the restaurant manager, shared the development and the start of the business as well as their goal.

"It was a group of investors that were interested in bringing an upscale bar," said Wetherington. "They were very interested in the world of class here and offering drafts and more expanded products but at

a casual price point."

As for the name, it took an immense amount of historical research before they made their final decision. "Personally I did not develop name, but it was a group effort of myself and investors and their families, we wanted something to reference the history of the building," said Wetherington. "J.E. Winslow's was original owner of building; it was a livery and a stable, so we went with Winslows."

Though many view Winslows as a bar and restaurant, some overlook their offerings such as the deli section and café bar.

"In the bar we have our TVs where people will sit at the bar and watch games," said Parnell. "We have the deli that has lower tables and is more of a dining atmosphere, that's where the coffee bar is as well."

Not only does Winslow's offer a restaurant experience, but they also have a widespread bar and wine market. This exclusive shop carries many locally brewed beers and wines.

"We have stuff from stone brewery like the stone IPA and a lot of gluten free options such as ciders from New Planet," said Parnell. "We also carry local beers like Mother Earth and Duck Rabbit and Lone Rider which are all in North Carolina."

As for the bar, Winslows has one of the largest

selections in town. From beer to liquor, everyone can find something to appease his or her taste. They also serve 22 wines by the glass, which creates a variety of choices.

"We have 46 beers on draft and over 40 different bourbons and scotch and whiskeys and I would say our beer and wine market is different," said Parnell. "We have over 400 different craft beers and wines, and you can create your own six or four pack and it's nice to be able to try a lot of different beers that you haven't tried before."

One of the many points people go downtown is for entertainment, whether it be socializing with friends, seeing a band or even watching a sports game. Winslows offers all of those options and more, including a Sunday brunch buffet.

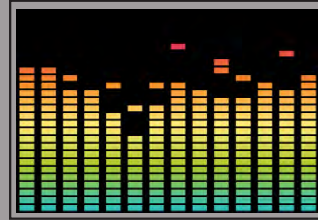
"We have events all the time," said Wetherington. Winslows offers Karaoke on Tuesdays and trivia on Sundays. They often have live bands perform in the bar section as well as acoustical groups on the weekends with the occasional DJ performance. In addition to musical events, they also host beer tastings. "We always have something going on."

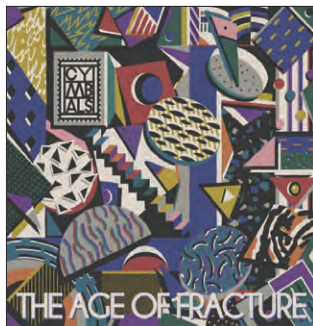
