ECU hosts clash with UNC

When the Pirates host North Carolina on Saturday, it will mark the 17th meeting between the schools with the Tar Heels holding a dominant 12-3-1 lead in the series.

However, while the Tar Heels have controlled the overall series, they are only a season removed from a 55-31 loss at the hands of the Pirates in Chapel Hill. But if you ask Head Coach Ruffin McNeill how that result factors into this week's matchup with the Tar Heels, he'll tell you, in short, that it doesn't.

"Our team is different from last year," said McNeill. "Larry's (Fedora) team is different from last year. He's had some years to get his kids in there at UNC and his team is changing as well."

One of the main differences in this year's matchup with UNC is the emergence of Tar Heel

quarterback Marquise Williams. Williams, a dual threat quarterback, has completed 67 percent of his passes, while amassing 539 yards of total offense with 115 of those being on the ground.

"He's big, strong and athletic," said McNeill of the Tar Heel quarterback. "He'll know what Larry wants as far as ball distribution and being able to extend plays with his feet, but he's got some weapons around him, so we have to be concerned with doing our job."

Another contrast of this season's meeting is that the game is being held at Dowdy-Ficklen stadium. UNC has traveled to Greenville just four times with the last visit coming in 2011, where the Tar Heels claimed a 35-20 victory.

"It's always good to come home," said senior quarterback Shane Carden. "You can communicate a little bit better on offense at home. We're excited about it regardless of what the situation is."

In last season's victory over the Tar Heels, the Pirates amassed 603 yards of total offense and seven touchdowns. Offensive coordinator Lincoln Riley will be tasked with helping his committee of running backs that includes Breon Allen, Chris Hairston, Marquez Grayson and Anthony Scott make up for the loss.

"We've got some depth there," said Lincoln of his committee of running backs. "We just need to continue to get that group in sync with our offensive line. This is the game last year that our group really came together in so we're progressing towards that."

This in-state game carries more weight than just bragging rights for the often under looked Pirates. A victory over the Tar Heels would more than likely boost ECU into the Top 25.

Cops on alert from shooting

A 17-year-old male was shot in the leg Tuesday afternoon on Lakeview Terrace at the entrance of the Carolina Cove apartments. The victim has been identified as Devontay Miles.

According to the Greenville Police Department, the victim was treated and released from the hospital shortly after the incident occurred. The victim is not in custody.

The GPD said in a press release on Wednesday that the victim has gang affiliations and detectives believe at this time that the shooting was gang-related.

"The Greenville Police Department recognizes the potential for retaliation and will have an increased presence, to include gang officers, around area schools until further notice," according to the press release.

According to Kristen Hunter, Greenville Police Department public information officer, the best thing a student can do if they see suspicious activity near their campus is to call authorities instead of taking matters into their own hands.

The investigation is still ongoing and detectives are asking anyone with information about this incident to call Crime Stoppers.

"Meet the Greeks," an event sponsored by ECU's National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), took place in front of nearly four hundred students on Saturday afternoon, giving the students in attendance the ability to learn more about an organization that Joshua Pyant, NPHC President, says is not well known on campus.

"A lot of people do not know what the National Pan-Hellenic Council is," said Pyant. "Its basically an organization that houses all of the Divine Nine or historically black fraternities and sororities here on campus."

Students who attended the program were given the opportunity to learn about each of the six organizations that the NPHC represents on campus, giving them the chance to broaden

their horizons and learn what each organization has to offer.

"They get to see a little bit of everything," said Pyant. "Some people come into college and they may know about one sorority or fraternity or some people may come to college and they don't know anything about these fraternities or sororities."

By providing an open forum to the students to ask questions, the event also give the students the opportunity to become a part of one of the organizations.

"Everyone who wants to be a part of a sorority or fraternity for that semester is required to go," said Pyant, who added that students perusing membership to one of the fraternities or sororities should be on the lookout for informational programs.

The NPHC organizations that are currently active on ECU's campus are Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc., Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc., Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc., Delta Sigma Theta Fraternity Inc., Zeta Phi Beta Sorority Inc. and Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority Inc.

Pirates get creative

ECU establishes a program where students can create a unique major

In the past year ECU has recently offered a new interdisciplinary degree program which lets students who don't currently fit in a major to combine different programs so they can graduate with a Bachelor of Science in University Studies.

This new program contains a "thematic core" of classes that must first be approved by the University Studies Council.

According to Rondall Rice, the Director of the University Studies program, the major is perfect for two different types of students, which he categorizes as a journey student and an off-ramp student.

"A journey may have gone through ECU, taken a lot of different courses and never declared a major, or they declared a major that didn't fit, or tried maybe multiple majors that didn't fit," said Rice. "So we are trying to put together a program to find their passions, get different pieces

from the majors that do fit what they want to do in the future."

He said that the "off ramp student" is the type of student who was in a traditional major and liked parts of it, but wanted to do more with it than what the major offered. Rice said that the major allows these students to mix the parts they liked with other courses that ECU offers, like leadership, communication, or education, they can put together a program that meets the students wants.

The University received approval from the UNC Board of Governors in August 2013 to offer the Bachelor's of Science in University Studies degree, according to their website.

Rice said that there are 149 students currently enrolled in the major, which is a considerable amount considering the program is less than a year old. This past August, the first four students in the Uni-

“The more and more we are out there the students will become more comfortable,” said King. “They put a name to a face and know who you are, and then long term they will feel free to come up to you, speak with you and voice their concerns.”

Attending these programs is not the only way students can learn more about the SGA. King says that students are more than welcome to visit their office if they have questions or concerns.

“No one needs to be intimidated by the office,” said King. “We really just want it to be all inclusive and a really laid back atmosphere.”

versity Studies program graduated and 22 are on track to graduate in December of this year.

According to Rice, ECU is very unique in this program in that it is assisted by two committees, the Faculty Oversight Committee, who has to approve each student’s “thematic core” they’ve created, and the Workforce Advisory Committee, who helps students in the program with internship and job opportunities.

Rice said that the major is important to students whose interests and talents do not fit into a major currently offered.

“Everyone is different, everyone is unique. Sometimes a traditional major does not fit,” said Rice. “I also think that in the emerging world we are seeing, there is an emphasis placed on more individuality and more tailored programs and I think this is the way to do it if a traditional major does not fit.”

If students are interested in a University Studies major, they should speak with Nicole Johnson in the University Studies program. Students can make appointments with Rice or the Assistant Director, Stephanie Bailey. Rice said that students who are looking into the major should be prepared when they go speak to an advisor.

“Students should tell us what they’ve done, what they want to do, what they want their ECU degree to do for them when they graduate...and then we recommend that they should either go to a traditional major first, or we try to help them put together an interdisciplinary program that helps them meet their goals and desires,” said Rice.

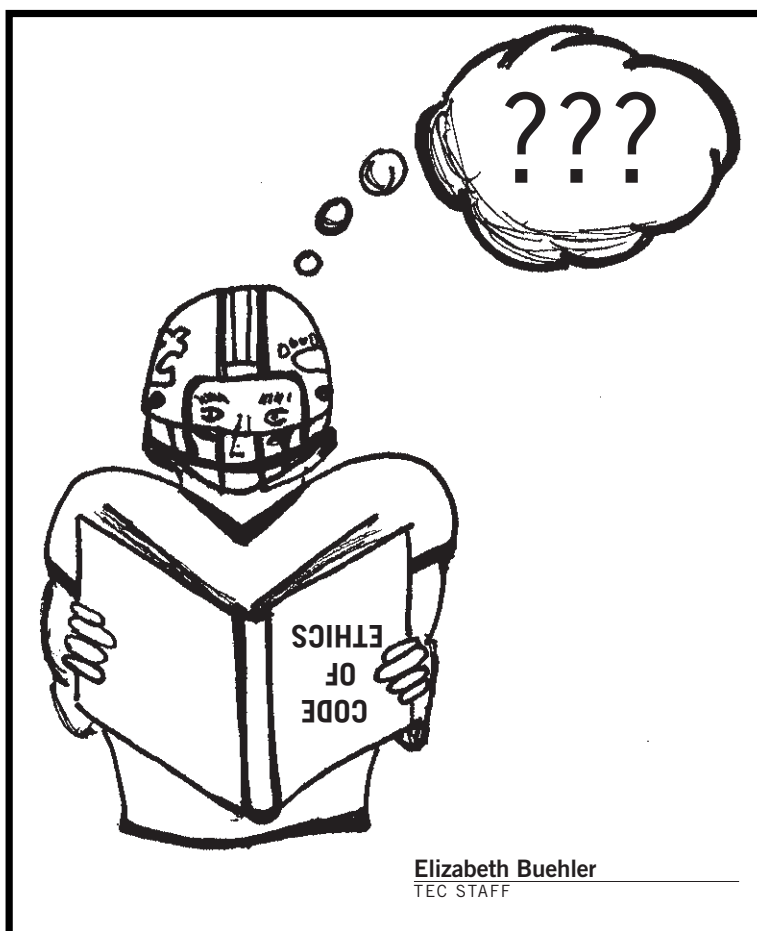

Bethel to host festival

The Town of Bethel will hold its annual Harvest Festival on Saturday.

Mary Sue Gooch said that the event was started as a way to show appreciation for farmers in the area. Gooch said that the event was put on hiatus for several years before returning in 2009. Gooch is the president of Hometown Bethel, the organization that sponsors the festival.

"We had things like tobacco tying contests and things related to farming," said Gooch. "When we brought it back five years ago, we didn't have some of the contests, but we still did it to salute our farmers."

Gooch said that the biggest attraction this year will be the day's musical performances that span a variety of genres.

"We're going to have a gospel group called 'Curtis Hyler and Jubilation' followed by The Vine Sisters, who are a black gospel group," said Gooch. "We'll have David Jones and his band—he's a local boy, but he's done some singing in Nashville. We'll have a group called 'Stairwell,' and they've just released a CD. They'll be doing our night concert."

Headlining band Stairwell is a local alternative group that released its second album last week. According to the band's official website, the band formed in 2005 and draws inspiration from alternative, pop and metal groups. In addition to its original music, the audience can expect to hear covers of popular tunes by the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Led Zepplin and the Foo Fighters.

Gooch said one of the bands performing on Saturday is a returning favorite.

"We're going to have the Breeze Band, and they've been to our festival for the last three years," said Gooch. "They just love coming back."

Gooch said there will be one performer throughout the day who intends to entertain attendees with a show that isn't normally seen at events like the Harvest Festival.

"We have a young man who does basketball tricks and he's called the 'Spin Man.' He does different tricks with Harlem Globetrotter music," said Gooch. "He's going to do three shows that day."

Gooch said that in addition to listening to performances, festival goers will have the opportunity to visit vendors. Gooch said that there are more than 55 confirmed vendors that will sell everything from cosmetics to jewelry and, of course, food.

"There'll be lots of food," said Gooch. "We have funnel cake, and some of the churches are doing barbecue chicken plates. The fire department is doing barbecue sandwiches. Just all kinds of food."

Hometown Bethel is a women's community activist group that started in 2001 that seeks to "create and promote the village concept of a better Bethel." Gooch compared the organization to a chamber of commerce and that the group's primary focus is to put on events that showcase the town in a positive light.

"We try to have events that honor our veterans or help our schools," said Gooch. "We raise money that goes back into the town; we've done the Field of Dreams Park that's outside of town. We do anything that we think we can afford to do to better Bethel."

The Bethel Harvest Festival starts at 10 a.m. and will be located along Railroad Street.

Uptown presents pop-up park

Tomorrow Uptown Greenville will present a pop-up park to the urban downtown area. For twelve hours, the pop-up park, or Park(ing) Day, will provide a space for students and locals to sit down and enjoy a cup of coffee or have a conversation with friends.

Director of events and branding Tiffany Gay explained how Greenville decided to join the national movement to bring pop-up parks to urban areas.

"We've already gotten a lot of excitement from the community," she said. "The design is really neat so I think people are going to really enjoy it and feel like it is a space that they can really just relax in, or hang out in, or have a meeting in."

Greenville is not the first North Carolina town to join the national movement, which was started in San Francisco by Rebar. Other cities that have participated include Wilmington, Raleigh and Durham.

"In Wilmington they started with one space and now they have five or six," Gay said. "As

both an organization and a place, Uptown Greenville exists to promote quality cultural, economic and residential development within the city center of Greenville. Having great urban spaces in your city center is definitely one way to go about doing that."

Park(ing) Day will take place in the loading zone between Starlight Café and The Scullery. When asked why this location was chosen, Gay explained that

Uptown believes that the corner of 5th and Evans is the epicenter of the Uptown District.

"We want people in Greenville to enjoy their city center, to enjoy the restaurants, the food, the shopping, all the ways to can live play, eat and shop in the Uptown District," said Gay. "We also want them to enjoy just the outside area."

Park(ing) Day will feature live music from the Wright School

of Music. Other teasers that Gay shared include that there will be plenty of seating for people to enjoy lunch or coffee with friends, and that there will be an interactive chalkboard for pop-up park goers to share their thoughts.

"Folks should be prepared not only to enjoy it but to voice their opinions about it if they'd like too," said Gay.

When asked whether having a pop-up park will be forth a discussion about adding more green spaces to the Uptown district, Gay explained that its all a matter of how Friday goes.

"I think it's up to the public," she said. "It really depends on how much demand it gets on Friday and it will be really fun to see how many people choose to interact with it and I think that alone will tell us [if there is any interest]."

Not only will Friday be celebrated as Park(ing) Day, it is also a Freeboot Friday, which is located across the street from the pop-up park's location.

"[You will] be able to see the park from Freeboot and see Freeboot from the park," said Gay. "It's a way to extend the community that happens on a Friday night in Greenville."

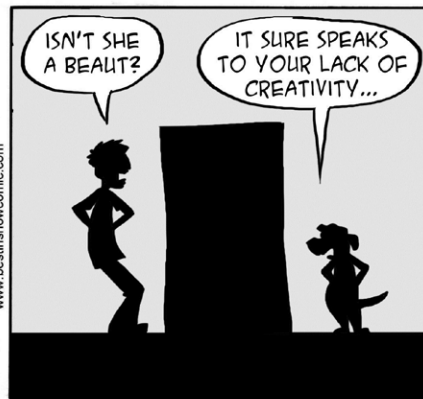

Runners ready for Raleigh

The ECU cross country team is looking to place on top at the Adidas Invitational tomorrow. The meet is otherwise known as the Wolfpack Invitational, hosted by N.C. State at the WakeMed Cross Country Course in Cary, N.C.

Last season at the event, the men's team finished strong completing the event in third place accumulating 82 overall points behind N.C. State. The first Pirate to cross the finish line was Chase Miller, now a redshirt senior, placing 10th. The Pirate clocked in at 15:12.8. Following Miller in 15th place was Jakub Trzasalski, now an ECU alumni, with a 15:28.8 time. Trzasalski and Miller were the only two Pirates to place in the top 20 of the race.

On the women's side, only one Pirate was able to complete the race in the top 20. Now an alumnae, Brooke Kott placed 20th and clocked in at 17:57.7. Following her was Stephanie Fresenius, now a redshirt senior, timing in at 18:15.4.

Clocking in right after was Sydney Teague, now a sophomore, timing in at 18:23.2. The lady Pirates achieved 117 points during the meet. The ladies trailed Duke (23), N.C. State (41), Bull City TC (93), and North Carolina (102), placing them in fifth place overall.

This Friday, both squads are looking to extend their victories from the Covered bridge Invitational that took place in late August.

The women's team placed fourth while the men's team placed eighth.

The men's team competed in a 6,400-meter course. The top finisher

Torbett heads home

Coach ready for tournament at alma mater

The Lady Pirates' (4-0) volleyball team will have a grueling weekend in front of them as they set sail for the Penn State invitational where they will play Eastern Illinois, University of Illinois-Chicago, DePaul and Penn State.

Penn State (8-1) is the most notable of the group with a team that consistently ranks in the top five in the country, is the defending national champion and currently sits at No. 3. The host team will play the Pirates on Saturday evening to wrap up the tournament.

"We know anytime you're playing a defending national champion, it's going to be a very tough match," said Head Coach Julie Torbett. "We have three matches prior to that to prepare for. We think our opening weekend was a good warmup for us, but these teams are going to be a lot tougher which will prepare us for conference play."

It will be a homecoming for Torbett as she

returns to her alma mater in Penn State.

"It will be fun to get comfortable as a visitor in the gym that I spent countless hours practicing in and playing in," Torbett said. "There's a lot of history there and it will be nice to play in front of a couple thousand people for our match against Penn State."

Torbett said playing in front of such a large crowd will just mean that her Pirates will have to have better communication.

"It's similar to what the football team does with crowd noise; they practice with it, calling play and other communication just becomes difficult," said Torbett. "It will be fun to play in that environment, we just have to up the communication level and be prepared that we won't be able to hear everything."

The Pirates will kick off the weekend against Eastern Illinois (5-4) tomorrow. The Lady Panthers suffered two losses last weekend against Iowa and North Dakota. They earned a

win in their middle game against South Dakota State. Eastern Illinois will be evenly matched with the Pirates.

UIC (4-8) has started off their season with stiff competition with the likes of Virginia, Syracuse and Indiana. The Flames will have their match against ECU on Friday. Despite experiencing more challenge this season than the Pirates, this is still a winnable match for the undefeated squad.

DePaul (2-7) has struggled this season against teams comparable to the Pirates. The Blue Demons will be playing the Pirates on the tail end of a three matches in a 19 hour span. Again, this match will be very winnable match for Torbett's team.

Torbett said it is tougher to prepare for four games in two days than it is to keep stamina and intensity in her players.

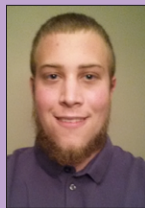

Receivers show their depth

During the ECU's first offensive drive in Blacksburg, it became clear that there is no lack of depth in the Pirates' receiving core going forward.

Many people are aware of quarterback Shane Carden's primary weapons: seniors Justin Hardy and Cam Worthy and sophomore Isaiah Jones.

However, receivers such as sophomore Jimmy Williams, junior Bryce Williams, and freshman Trevon Brown made the big plays to kick start ECU's 21-0 first-quarter lead. These players are starting to have an enhanced role in the Pirates' fast-paced offense.

A foot injury limited Williams to just a pair of games in 2013, but he is on pace to have a breakout season with the Pirates.

The Washington, N.C., native's eight catches and 137 yards already trump his 2013 stat line of five catches and 66 yards. Last week, he had a career-high four receptions for 77 yards, including his early 35-yard gain from Carden.

In the Pirates' 55-31 rout of North Carolina last September, the inside-turned-outside receiver made his collegiate debut and picked up two receptions for 28 yards. He will continue to share playing time with sophomore Davon Grayson going into Saturday's matchup with UNC.

"It's always good when they want to call on your name," said Williams. "It's just fun being apart of the offense. These are my brothers."

Jimmy isn't the only Williams recipient of Carden's passing repertoire.

Bryce Williams, a junior tight end, has had an interesting collegiate career so far. In 2011, the junior from Winston-Salem was redshirted as a walk-on in Marshall's football program and then transferred to ECU before preseason camp in 2012.

His 6-foot-6, 250-pound frame was very useful to the Pirates in the red zone last year. Williams was tied for second on the team with five touchdowns and was subsequently named an All-Conference USA honorable mention.

However, it wasn't until Saturday that he picked up his first two receptions of the season on ECU's first drive at Lane Stadium. The first catch occurred when he snatched a deflected pass from Carden at the line of scrimmage and ran 22 yards down the field.

"To be honest, I missed my assignment on that," Williams said with a grin. "I was supposed to go out for a pass. When I saw the ball up in the air, I just reacted and tried to get as many yards as I could."

Carden's following throw was a four-yard touchdown to Williams to give the Pirates a 7-0 lead. It was Williams' first

touchdown catch since last November's game at N.C. State.

Trevon Brown is another name that Pirate fans should get more familiar with.

The 6-foot-2, 206-pound freshman out of Wilmington had three catches for 45 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown versus the Hokies. Along with Hardy and Jones, Brown leads the Pirates with two touchdowns receptions this year.

ECU Offensive Coordinator Lincoln Riley is confident about Brown's growth playing behind senior Cam Worthy at the outside receiver position.

"He's got as much potential as anybody that we've had come through here," said Riley. "Potential is one thing and getting it done is another, but he's starting to get it done and getting better. I think he'll continue to be a big part of what we're doing."

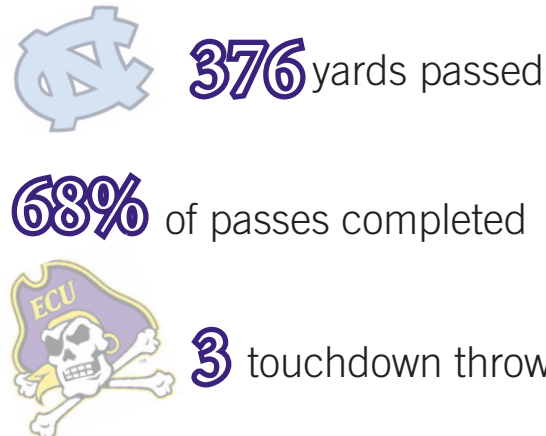

for ECU was redshirt senior Chase Miller who finished the course in 34th place.

Redshirt junior, Brather Cline, placed in 39th, just less than 10 seconds behind Miller, finishing with a time of 22:02.33. The Pirate following Cline was C.J. Buck, finishing in 63rd.

On the women's side, Caroline Reiser, sophomore transfer from FIU, completed the 5K finishing in 14th place. The next Pirate to cross the finish line was sophomore Caitlyn Sheva coming in 22nd place.

The Pirates will face competitors from N.C. State during this upcoming meet. The Pirates have already faced N.C. State this season at the

Covered Bridge Invitational. The Wolfpack finished four places behind the Pirates in the women's 5k event as the team came in eighth place. N.C. State ranked 11th place on the men's side, behind all the other competition.

The Pirates are looking to advance over the Wolfpack, among other competitors this season. Following two previous successful seasons, the ECU cross country team hopes to top the scoreboards and head to the American Conference Championship later this fall.
