

Six Pirates earn conference honors

Six East Carolina football players earned All-American Athletic conference honors, as announced Wednesday.

Seniors Zeek Bigger and Bryce Williams have been named First-Team All-American Conference.

Senior outside linebacker Montese Overton and junior inside receiver Isaiah Jones earned second-team honors, while offensive linemen Ike Harris and J.T. Boyd received honor-

able mention, in the Pirates second season in the AAC.

Williams finished his senior season with 58 receptions for 588 yards and four touchdowns while playing tight end for the Pirates. He recorded multiple catches in all 12 games, helping him earn an invitation to play in the 2016 Reese's Senior Bowl.

While playing inside linebacker, Bigger led the Pirates by racking up 98 tackles, placing seventh in the conference. It marks Bigger's third all-conference selection, as he earned second-team honors the last two seasons. He has now finished his career with 333 career tackles,

ranking 10th in ECU history.

Jones pulled in a conference-leading 98 passes for 1,099 yards and five touchdowns this season, making him just the sixth Pirates to register a 1,000-yard season in school history.

He finished seventh in the nation, catching 8.2 passes per game and currently ranks third on ECU's all-time receptions and receiving yards list.

Overton earned his second all-conference selection, as he was third on the team with 70 tackles and led the Pirates' pass rush with 7.5 sacks and 10 tackles for a loss. He set the single game conference

record, totaling four sacks against Southern Methodist. The Greenville native finished his ECU career with 217 tackles, 17.5 sacks and 35.5 tackles for a loss.

Honorable mentions, Boyd and Harris, were each chosen to second-team honors last season and anchored an injury-depleted offensive line unit this year. The duo helped pave the way for two 100-yard performances from running back Chris Hairston, as well as protecting Blake Kemp, who threw for over 300 yards five times.

Compher says no to possible bowl invite

The East Carolina football team found itself given a tiny ray of hope that it may actually be eligible for post-season play when the NCAA announced on Sunday that a few 5-7 teams would play in a bowl.

ECU Athletic Director Jeff Compher quickly shot down any talk of the Pirates sneaking into the bowl schedule, however, saying ECU's (5-7, 3-5 American Athletic Conference) focus is no longer on the 2015 season.

"Following yesterday's NCAA Division I council's approval of a recommendation to allow five-win teams to possibly fill bowl openings this year, there has been much speculation about our interest should an invitation be extended to East Carolina University," Compher said. "Our efforts should be centered on positioning the Pirates for future championships."

The chances that ECU would have been selected to compete were unlikely, regardless of Compher's decision. The NCAA is giving the bowl bids to teams with high APR scores, which are determined by academic success. ECU ranks 10th in APR out of the five win programs, trailing Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas State, Minnesota, San Diego State and Rice, to name a few.

"While we understand there are still numerous programs with higher APR scores ahead of us who merit stronger consideration, we have already determined that we would decline an offer should one be extended," said Compher.

Still, some of those programs have already decided that they would decline an invitation to participate in a bowl even if one was extended. Missouri, for example, chose the same path as Compher, choosing to focus on offseason plans.

There are 41 bowl games slated for this season, with 80 teams needed to fill them. Only 75 teams currently have six or more wins, but three 5-6 teams have a game yet to play. It's likely that only three or four slots will be available to sub-.500 teams, and with so many teams ahead of ECU, it does seem unlikely that the Pirates would have gotten a shot.

ECU had plenty of chances to qualify for a bowl game the old fashioned way, but failed to deliver in the final game of the season against Cincinnati. While the Pirate seniors likely would have enjoyed the chance to play one last game and perhaps go out on top, the program is already looking towards the future.

"These boys down there, these young boys, you're going to see a lot of them in the next few years," senior linebacker Zeek Bigger said after Saturday's loss. "We shed tears down there, but this was not a disappointing season."

Bigger bids farewell to ECU

The time has come — East Carolina will have to say goodbye to 17 of its beloved seniors now that the 2015 season has come to a close.

The Pirates' (5-7, 3-5 American Athletic Conference) season ended prematurely for the first time in four years Saturday, following a 19-16 loss to the Cincinnati Bearcats.

The loss marks ECU's second consecutive Senior Day defeat, as it lost to UCF on a well-documented Hail Mary pass last year, something that just added to the sad aura surrounding the visibly upset Pirate players.

"There's a pretty bad feeling down in that locker room right now," ECU head coach Ruffin McNeill said following Saturday's loss. "I told them, football is in a direct correlation with life. This team handled adversity just like they will in life."

Pirate fans got their last look at the likes of Zeek Bigger, Montese Overton, Bryce Williams and Terrell Stanley, just to name a few.

"We shed a couple tears down there just a minute ago," Bigger said. "Them 17 seniors, we've been through the ups and downs man. Sometimes arguing and fighting on things, but we became brothers."

Had the Pirates beaten Cincinnati, the

seniors would have gotten one final bowl game to participate in, something that Bigger shook off.

"I'm a Pirate at heart so it makes no difference," an emotional Bigger said. "I can always say I'm the best in North Carolina. We did what we had to do and in the last couple of years, nobody beat us in North Carolina did they? That's all that matters to me."

As a two-year starter, two-year leading tackler and the undoubted leader of this year's team, Bigger tallied 333 tackles in his ECU career, ranking him 10th on ECU's all-time list.

"It's been unbelievable. Being able to play with some of the best players, see some of the best players go, and now it was my time," Bigger said. "These coaches believed in me. Nobody else in North Carolina believed in me but these coaches. I tip my hat off to them and I love them."

Due to his personality and leadership ability, as well as his production on the field, some have wondered if Bigger's football days are just beginning, with a potential future in the NFL looming.

"His legacy is hard to tell... I think Zeek on the field got after it, got after it in the classroom, never had anything off the field with Zeek ever," McNeill said. "I think he'll have a chance to play in the NFL. Montese

will, but most importantly, in a couple of weeks they'll have their degrees."

Bigger and the rest of the seniors were recruited to compete in Conference USA. They were then asked to make a very difficult change midway through their careers to a bigger and more competitive American Athletic Conference.

They have been key ingredients to the Pirates' record-breaking successes in the past couple of years, something that the younger players have taken notice of.

"These seniors I grew up with. They taught me," sophomore wide receiver Trevon Brown said. "I'm losing a piece of me when they leave next year... I'm going to do the best I can to follow in their footsteps."

While the 2015 season will be seen as a step back from recent years, the seniors will be remembered from their coach and their teammates, despite the win and loss column.

"Heart, never stop, fighting, courage, bravery, going through adversity, life lessons learned," McNeill said about the senior class. "Those guys you saw today will walk out with their degrees, all of them. Some of them already have it now, but everyone by May."

Women's hoops prepares for game with Auburn

The East Carolina Pirates (6-2) will play their first game of December on the road against the Auburn Tigers (5-1).

Head coach Heather Macy currently sits at 100 wins at ECU now and will look to get her 101st against Auburn Saturday at 1 p.m.

"I've had a lot of good players over the years, and have had a lot wins happen, we've worked incredibly hard and it has taken countless hours from a lot of different people to reach this mark," said Macy.

The Pirates head into the game coming off a tough loss against the No.15 Northwestern Wildcats. The travel has taken a toll on the players, especially the younger ones new to the college schedule. Auburn serves as yet another road trip that will likely test the mental strength of the team's players.

"We're trying to get our legs back, playing three games back-to-back-to-back and the travel

is not factored in when people look at the schedules, so there are some fatigue factors that comes into play. The new ones struggle with it, since they haven't been part of it before," said Macy.

The Pirates will get a few days before they

travel to prepare for the game. As they prepare, one player in particular is starting to come in form this season. Senior forward I'Tiana Taylor had dominant performances in the past few games. In the last three games, Taylor has averaged 18.7 points, 2.3 assists, and 10.7 rebounds per game, compared to only averaging 6 points, .7 assists, and 6 rebounds in her first three games of the season.

"She competed harder during those three games, which I think is a result for her improvement statistically," said Macy.

The match against Auburn will be a good chance for the Pirates to try out some new strategies before heading into the conference play and have experience against harder teams that play in conference like the SEC.

"It will be a test for our team. I think we'll learn a lot from our team, this time of the year you're trying new things out, trying different lineups out and seeing what best works as we prep to play for conference play," said Macy.

The game will be a nationally televised affair, appearing on the SEC Network.

"That's why our players came to East Carolina, they want to be on TV, they want to be recognized nationally," said Macy.

The Tigers boast four players that average double digits. Brandy Montgomery and Tra'cee Tanner lead the crop with 17.5 and 14.2 points per game respectively. The Montgomery-Tanner duo represents an inside-outside presence that will likely test ECU's defensive skill.

Montgomery is the team's best outside shooter, shooting 34.2 percent from behind the arc, while the 6-foot-3 tanner has been a force down low, making 61.9 percent of her shots, and averaging 8.7 rebounds per contest.

If ECU is going to steal a road victory from the Tigers, stopping the duo will certainly be priority No. 1.

With her late-season heroics, Bidgood will fight to keep her starting spot in the off-season where she'll improve for the season to come.

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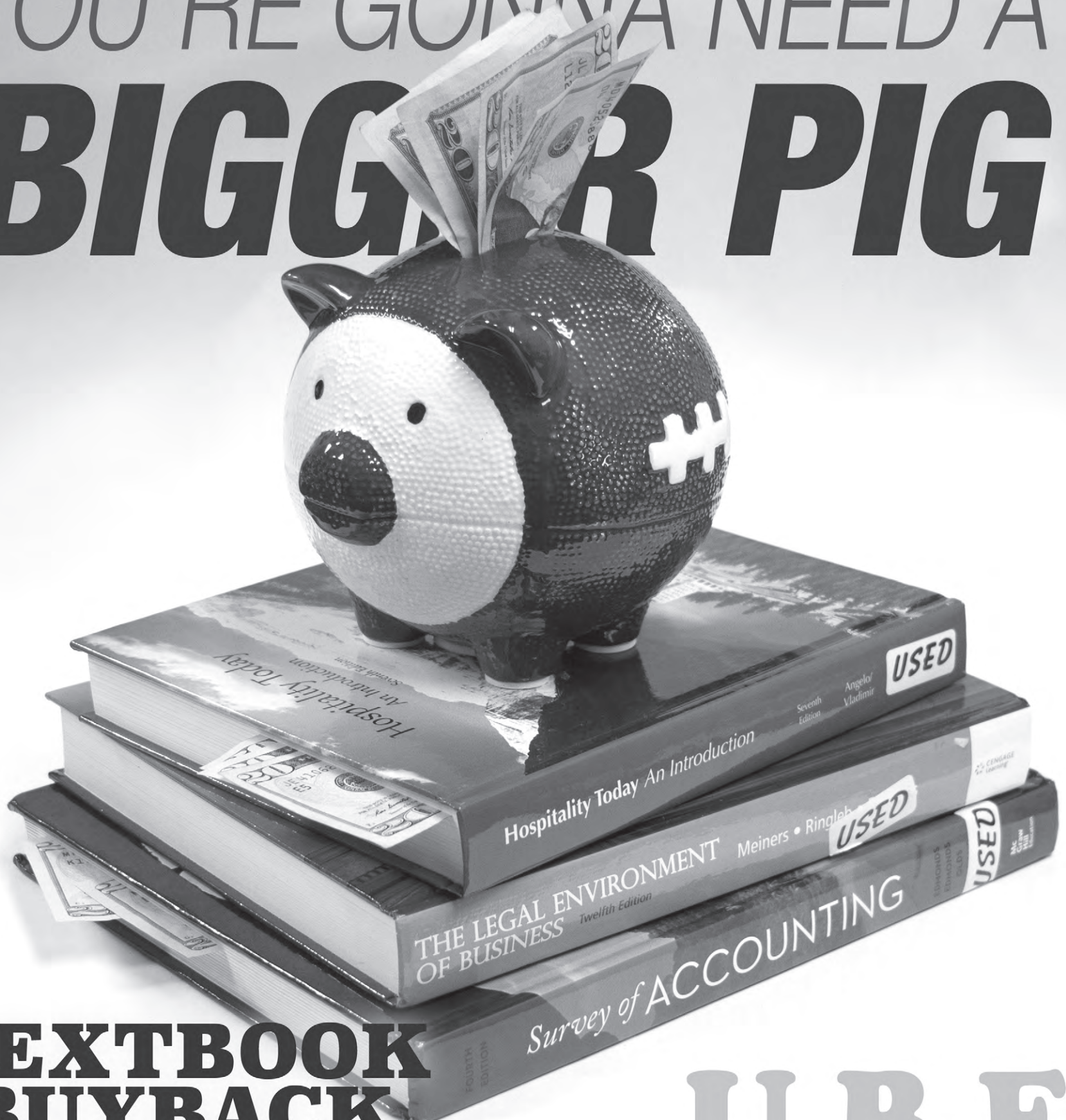
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Track and field looks to winter season

After a disappointing first season in the American Athletic Conference, the East Carolina indoor track and field team will look to improve on its finish from last year as the 2016 season looms ahead.

Last season saw the men's and women's team finish in seventh and ninth place respectively in the AAC. It stands as a mark that head coach Curt Kraft is determined to improve on.

"Obviously finishing seventh and ninth was totally unacceptable and we were not happy about that at all, especially because we're not used to that," said Kraft. "It was very disappointing and the students-athletes knew that and the

coaching staff knew that."

After a dominating year in Conference USA during 2014 where the men's team finished in third place and the women's team finished in first place, the teams did not achieve the results they desired in the new conference.

Joining a new conference can present a team with many challenges, but for Kraft and his runners, the challenge was simply better competition.

"This is a good league with good teams. Absolutely, there is no question that it is harder, but that's a good thing," said Kraft. "I'm glad that we're in this league and we belong in this league."

Kraft knows that the high level of competition that his teams will

face can only make them better.

Despite not placing on the podium as a whole, they boasted two individual event winners in the AAC Indoor Championships last season. Avion Jones placed first in the high jump and Cheyenne Hutchinson placed first in the 60-meter hurdles. The Pirates also produced 17 personal best times and 11 all-conference selections.

More individual success will be necessary for the team to place higher within the conference in the coming season and their near-bottom finish will serve as motivation.

"What everyone does as an individual affects the team," said Kraft. "Everyone has to get focused mentally, prepare physically by working hard in practice and have a good attitude."

With no indoor facility in the area for the Pirates to call home, all meets will be held on the road.

ECU will open their season on Jan. 15 at the Carolina Cup in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. This event will be followed by three meets held in Blacksburg, Virginia, throughout January and February.

The Pirates will compete in their second AAC Indoor Championships on Feb. 28-29 in Birmingham, Alabama. The season will officially wrap up as runners who qualify will travel to Birmingham again to compete in the NCAA Indoor Championships, which will take place on Mar. 18-19.

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

Sophomores find early season success

Breakout performances from sophomore forward Grant Bryant and sophomore guard B.J. Tyson led East Carolina to a blowout victory over Florida Atlantic Tuesday night.

Bryant recorded 12 points and Tyson finished with 15 to help lead the Pirates to a 26-point victory over the Owls, 74-48.

Michel Nzege sat out the game with an ankle injury suffered in practice, allowing Bryant to record a career-high 20 minutes played.

Bryant was told before the game that he would likely get a large portion of Nzege's playing time, so he knew it was his chance to show what he can do.

"It was a good opportunity for me, to just put myself on the floor, earn coach Lebo's

trust, show that I can play defense, score the ball and execute," Bryant said.

Bryant's 12 points tripled his previous career best, as he finished the game 6-of-8 from the field. To many, his breakout performance came as a surprise, but his teammates and coaches knew he had the necessary talent for a strong performance.

Teammate B.J. Tyson said Bryant's hard work goes unnoticed to the fans, but is definitely evident in practice.

"I'm proud of him, I've been waiting for that opportunity for the longest. Nobody sees it, but behind closed doors this man is fighting and working his tail off in practice," Tyson said.

Head coach Jeff Lebo said that even

Pirate hoops picks up win over FAU

Having dropped three of its last four during a recent west coast trip, the East Carolina basketball team returned to Minges to beat Conference USA foe Florida Atlantic, 74-48, Tuesday.

"I'm really proud of my team after coming off a long road trip coming from the west coast. I thought we looked fresh. I thought we played with energy, enthusiasm," head coach Jeff Lebo said. "We had a lot of good play off of our bench and I thought defensively, especially in the first half, we were really solid with our zones."

The Pirates (4-3) kept the momentum on their side, as they managed to take a 15-point lead in the first 11 minutes of action.

"[Tyson's] playing better and gaining some confidence," Lebo said. "He took the ball well to the basket tonight; finished with his right hand, which was nice to see. He's worked really hard on using the correct hand,"

ECU kept the heat on the Owls and

entered the locker room at halftime with a 32-14 cushion. The Pirates didn't take the pressure off Florida Atlantic to start the second half, as Tyson finished a layup only 24 seconds in.

The Pirates took their largest lead of the night at 1:08 in the second half, putting a 31-point lead between them and their opponent. Tyson led the Pirates with his 15 points, and nine rebounds. His performance made for his third double-digit scoring effort this season.

"It feels great," Tyson said. "I just want to give credit to coach Lebo and coach [Mike] Netti for staying with me throughout the whole thing. The first couple of games were rough; seeing it not go in the small hole, but now [the basket] it's starting to get bigger. I worked on my shot everyday before practice and after practice so it's starting to come along."

though Bryant has not been getting much playing time over the last two seasons, he has continued to work hard.

"His attitude has been good and he has worked hard, gotten better and he was rewarded tonight," Lebo said.

Lebo said Bryant is quick and can get to the basket well, which he did with authority against the Owls.

"He understands who he is and what he is and I thought he did a great job tonight playing to his ability and his strengths," Lebo said.

Tyson followed up a strong performance against Stetson, where he recorded 22 points, with another strong outing against FAU with 15 points on 7-of-9 shooting and added a career-high 9 rebounds.

He said his coaches have been very helpful getting him out of the slump he was in to start the season, shooting 6-of-24 in the team's first four games. In the team's last three games, he has gotten his shots to fall, shooting a combined 18-of-26 and recording 47 points.

Lebo knew that once Tyson got going and got his confidence back,

he would begin to perform on a much higher level.

"He's playing better, I think he's got some confidence and he took the ball to the basket well tonight," Lebo said.

Both Bryant and Tyson credit their hard work in practice to their success in their team's victory over FAU.

"I worked on my shot every day before practice and after practice, so it's starting to come along," Tyson said.

Bryant added, "I wasn't getting down on myself or be negative about things, I was just being positive and in practice I continued to work hard and prove to myself I can play."

Both Tyson and Bryant received loud cheers from the 3,700 plus fans in attendance as they came out of the game for the final time. Every ECU player on the active roster received playing time in the game, including walk-on Drew Bost.

Bost drained a three with just over a minute left, to give ECU its largest lead of the game, 74-43, erupting the crowd and bringing his teammates on the bench to their feet.

Also seeing double-digits against the Owls was junior guard Caleb White with 10 points, and sophomore forward Grant Bryant with 12.

"Nzege didn't play so it was a good opportunity for me to put myself on the floor. It was a good team win," Bryant said.

Bryant received the "junk-yard dog award" after the game was over. The last person to receive this award was freshman forward Kentrell Barkley after his performance in the season-opener against Grambling State earlier this season.

"I'm proud of him. I've been waiting for that opportunity for the longest time. Nobody sees it, but behind closed doors this man [Bryant] is fighting and he's working his tail off at practice," Tyson said. "I'm glad that he got the opportunity to show that he can fight, and show that he can play, execute and rebound."

The Pirates kept their winning streak by shooting 54.2 percent from the field, 38.5 percent outside the arc, and 45.5 percent from the free throw line.

ECU will continue playing on its own court when it hosts USC Upstate Friday night at Minges.

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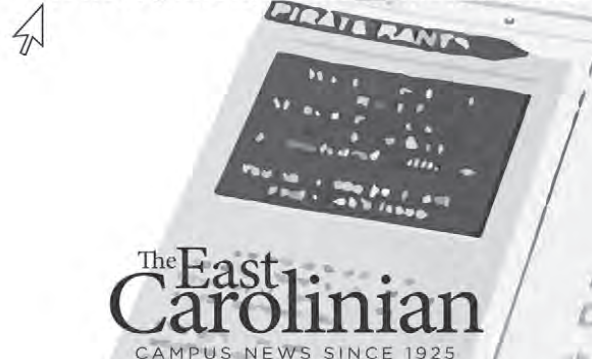

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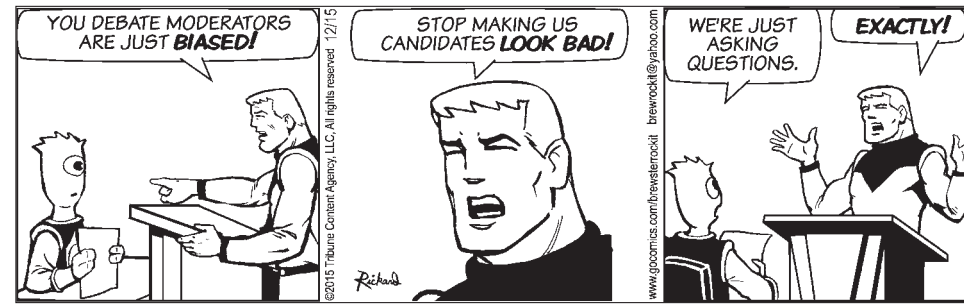
