## Cornerstone Church Celebrates 111 years

The Cornerstone Missionary Baptist Church of Stantonsburg and Allen Roads, Greenville, NC will celebrate its one hundred eleventh anniversary on Sunday, November 18, 1990 at 11:00 a.m. The anniversary sermon will be rendered by the illustrious Rev. Dr. Charles S. Hamilton, Dean, Morehouse School of Religion of the Interdenominational Theological Center in the Atlantic University Complex, Atlantic, Georgia. Dr. Hamilton is also the Pastor of Tabernacle Missionary Church Augusta, Georgia which is one of the ten oldest Black churches in the nation. The total community is invited to share in this glorious occasion.

In 1879, the Cornerstone Missionary Baptist Church was founded as "Hickory Hill" Baptist Church. The name "Hickory Hill" was chosen because the building was located on Greene Street near the site of the present Fifth Street Fire Station. The Reverend Ruffin Carroll was the first pastor. The service of worship was held each third Sunday of the month.

In 1903, during the pastorate of the Reverend G.W. Bucklum, the church was moved to Clark Street near the northeast corner of Fourteenth Street. The church was completely destroyed by fire on Saturday night before the fourth Sunday in April, 1923 during the pastorate of the Reverend Ike Tillery. Services of worship were

temporarily held in the Knights of Gideon Hall on Fourteenth Street.

Under the leadership of the Reverend W.H. Bryant of Kinston, NC, the church purchased a dry-kiln on Thirteenth and Railroad Streets from the Pitt Lumber Company on June 4, 1923, for three thousand dollars. This structure was renovated to become a beautiful sanctuary and the church's name was changed to the Cornerstone Missionary Baptist Church. The Cornerstone-laying ceremony and the service for dedication were held on November 18, 1923.

After the pastorate of the Reverend J.H. Jones for six months in 1925, the Reverend Joseph E. Tillett, an educator from Edenton, NC, was called as pastor in 1926. The church experienced unprecedented growth under the leadership of Reverend Tillett. Another regular service of worship was added on each first Sunday as well as a youth service of worship on each second Sunday. Many new auxiliaries and activities were organized during this time. The zenith of this period was the construction of an educational building in 1953.

On August 13, 1969, the Reverend Williams B. Moore of New Bern, N.C., was called as pastor. Reverend Moore gave able leadership to the church and community and also served as principal of the Bruce Falkland Elementary (continued on page 2)

## In The Name of Decency

Why do people own more pocket calculators? Why do people use less oil? We don't have to consult an expert to give us a dose of psycho-babble. It's simple and obvious: The cost of pocket calculators has fallen, and the cost of oil has risen. People are behaving just as the law of demand predicts.

Here's another simple question: Why has crime, hoodlumism, and wanton property destruction risen? Depending on the "expert" you'll get psycho-socio-babble like: poverty, discrimination, Vietnam, Reagan, the times, and assorted other nonsense. But the real cause is quite simple: The cost of crime, hoodlumism, and wanton property destruction has fallen. Let's look at it.

In some cities, a teen-age hoodlum can be arrested up to 17 times, on misdemeanor, even felony charges, before he spends one night in jail. He's "counseled and released" to the custody of his parents. He laughs at the law, but more devastating, he becomes living evidence to his peers that laws can be ignored at very little cost. Years ago, a judge might have declared such a hoodlum incorrigible and sentenced him to a term in reform school until he became an adult. Today, through the miracle of psycho-socio-babble, judges see the habitual hoodlum as a victim to be spared from the dictates of a civilized society.

It's the same story with adult criminals. They commit armed (continued on page 2)

## AIDS cure gets grudging acceptance here

Grudging acknowledgment of the efficiency of Kemron, brand name of the potential anti-AIDS "wonder-drug" discovered by research scientists in Kenya, finally made the pages of a New York City daily newspaper, Monday Oct. 15.

Such acknowledgment took the form of a report on "Interferon for AIDS" written by Dr. Stuart Berger, in the last segment of his column at page 29 of the New York Post.

The article came out some two months after an Amsterdam News front page headline quoted Kenya President Daniel arap Moi as asserting that, "50 AIDS victims have already been cured," following treatment with Kemron.

That story in the August 18, 1990 edition of the Amsterdam News was on the formal Presidential announcement of what the Kenya Medical Research Institute had reported late last

year. And President arap Moi wondered why the world media, especially those in the U.S., had neglected the story.

Such benign neglect persisted even after an African-American, Lonnie Edwards, returned from Nairobi where he went for treatment after testing HIV positive here. His account about Kemron's effectiveness in reversing HIV positive to negative, was reported in the Oct. 6 Amsterdam News.

So writing in the Oct. 15 N.Y. Post, Dr. Berger stated:

"Low-dose orally administered alpha-interferon is showing promise in the treatment of AIDS, according to preliminary reports."

"First shown to be effective at Kenya's Medical Research Institute, oral interferon is now being tested in humans at Mt. Sinai Medical Center in New York."

"In the Kenyan study," Dr. Berger continued, "99 percent of 101 patients in advanced stages of AIDS were free of such symp-

toms as fatigue, mouth sores and appetite loss after eight weeks of treatment with interferon, reported Biotechnology News-watch.

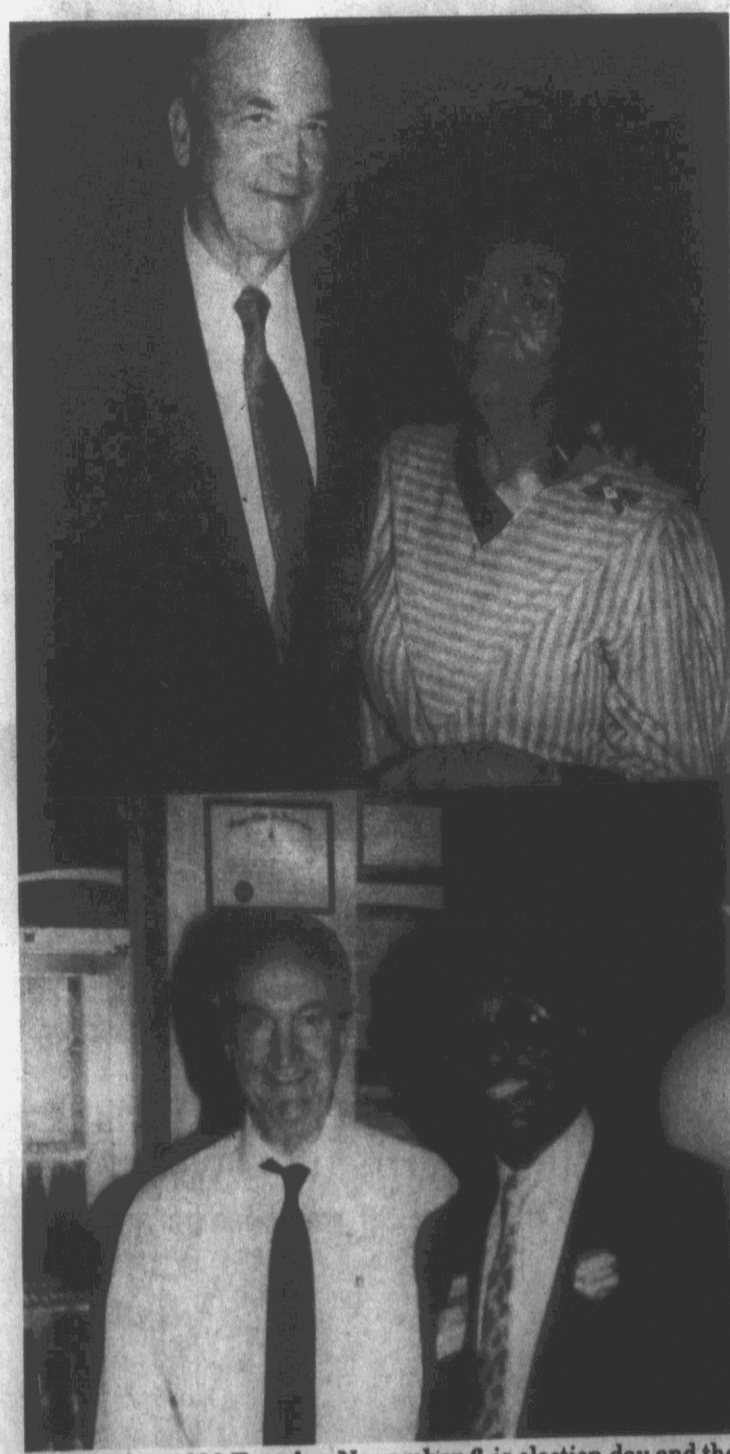
"In addition, all had significant increases in their T-4 cell counts - a sign of increased immune strength," Dr. Berger also said in his article.

Reporting on his visit to Kenya, Mr. Edmonds had warned that the rush of HIV positive persons and the demand for the drug had created problems.

The Kenyan government had, as a result, restricted the issuance of visas to those who would like to travel there for treatment.

And persons already inside the country were finding it difficult to get Kemron, which the Kenya Medical Research Institute restricts for use in treating people at its clinics.

And where sources outside the Institute have obtained Kemron, they charge exorbitant prices for it, Mr. Edmonds stated.

School. Services of worship were held each Sunday and a parsonage and bus were purchased. The church pledged to become a supporting member of the "Unified Plan of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina".

On August 3, 1975, the Reverend O'Kelly Lawson of Henderson, NC, was called as pastor. Rever-

end Lawson's leadership emphasized long range planning for the renovation or relocation of the church. The church became a member of the Progressive National Baptist Convention.

On March 20, 1980, the reverend Arlee Griffin Jr. of Elizabeth, NC, was called as pastor. Reverend Griffin's leadership challenged the

church to a deeper Christian commitment and discipleship. An annual scholarship was established at the Shaw Divinity School in honor of Dr. J.E. Tillett. Two annual scholarships are given to graduating seniors in Pitt County. In January, 1983, the church moved to its new building on Stanstonsburg Road. On March 30, 1986, new church facilities valued at 1.2 million dollars were dedicated to the glory of God.

On December 1, 1989, the Reverend Sidney A. Locks, Jr., of Opelousas Louisiana, was called a pastor. Reverend Locks life has been filled with opportunities to minister both in the church and community. Reverend Locks serves as a member of the Executive Board of the North Carolina General Baptist State Convention; the Progressive National Baptist Convention Program Committee; Vice Chairman of the Progressive National Baptist Convention Board of Education and Publication; and members elect of the North Carolina House of Representatives. Reverend Locks has brought to the church a new level of excitement and commitment in doing God's work. He has challenged the church to create and develop a "vision of the future". His encouragement, fortitude, aptitude and attitude of Bible study and knowing and practicing God's word is the key to "Doing God's Will, God's Way".

Senior Resident Superior Court Judge David E. Reid, Jr. is pleased to report to the people of Pitt County that their access to civil court is the best in the State of North Carolina. The most recent report of the Administrative Office of the Courts in Raleigh indicates that civil cases in Pitt County Superior Court have the lowest age as a group of all Judicial Districts in the state: 154.5 days. The age for civil cases in District Court is only 69 days.

The judges and attorneys serving Pitt County have worked hard to achieve this high level of public service at a time when many courts have years of backlogs. Access to justice is not delayed in civil cases in Pitt County.

robbery, rape, and murder. District attorneys plea bargain the offense down to simple robbery, assault, and voluntary or involuntary manslaughter. Often this is done with neither the knowledge nor the consent of the victim. A quirk that allows D.A.'s to get away with this atrocity is the fact that, in criminal matters, the state is the plaintiff, and the victim has little say in the prosecution of the case. More often than not, criminals receive short sentences and, if they receive longer sentences -- like life in prison -- they're out on the streets in seven years or less. In states like California, nearly 50 percent of inmates entering prison were on probation or parole at the time of their crime. Older people recall the term "three time loser," which is gone from today's vocabulary, wherein judges would sentence habitual criminals to life in prison.

The criminal huggers might ask, "Williams, our jails are overcrowded; where are we going to put the criminals?" Fly across our country and you'll see plenty of space. Besides, the United States has territorial possessions in the Pacific that can be made to alleviate our jail overcrowding. We lack the will, not the space.

Some huggers might argue that it's too costly to build jails, pointing out that it costs \$20,000 a year per inmate. I say it's more costly not to build jails. The average criminal costs us at least \$100,000 a year in losses from burglaries, arson, robbery, and grand theft auto. And that doesn't include intangible costs, such as personal trauma from rape, assault, and the loss of loved ones. Neither does it include the cost of protection, including security services, locks, bars, and the inconveniences we suffer such as fear and having to have exact change. Considering these costs, the \$20,000 to keep a criminal behind bars is quite a bargain.

Protecting us from criminals is the major function of local, state, and federal government. And they have failed miserably in that role. The primary reason for that failure is that politicians have given a higher priority to things they shouldn't be doing. Short of politicians making crime more costly, citizens will have to raise the cost by arming themselves. "Williams," you say, "that's a Dodge City mentality." I say check Dodge City's record; when everybody owned a gun there was less crime. We must instill fear in those who would prey on others.

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# NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC CHAIRMAN ROB BROWN VISITS N.C.

RALEIGH, NC - Bringing with him a theme of "Making a Difference in America", Democratic National Chairman Ron Brown came to North Carolina for two days last week to help boost democratic candidates chances in November, encourage efforts of workers across the state and help raise money.

Brown started his two-day stay in the Tar Heel state in Raleigh on Friday (Sept. 21), by talking to state democratic party officials and staffers at the Goodwin House, the home of the NC State Democratic party.

A reception and rally in Clinton, NC with party leadership and elected officials in the 3rd Congressional District was held Friday afternoon, followed by an address to the 3rd Congressional District Minority Council in Sampson County.

Speaking to a full house at the Sampson County Agri-Civic Center, where Brown was introduced by 3rd district congressman, Martin Lancaster. Brown told an enthusiastic, and mixed audience that most of the good things that have happened in America over the past 40 years have happened only because of dedicated democratic leadership.

"We offer America a different set of values. A different set of priorities, and we are beginning to bring about that kind of change again," said Brown.

He pointed to six of eight congressional seats democrats have won during 1989, and victories in Governor's races in New Jersey and Virginia, and the Mayor's race

in New York City.

"We have a rejuvenated party, building a future for America and this state. Doug Wilder did it in Virginia and Harvey Gantt must do it in North Carolina," he said.

Brown was referring to Douglas Wilder's democratic victory in Virginia, and the campaign of the democratic nominee for U.S. Senate in North Carolina.

"Speaking about the democratic party's nominee for the U.S. Senate from North Carolina," Brown said. "Harvey Gantt stands up for what he believes in. He reaches out to all voters. Electing Harvey Gantt will send an important signal to all people throughout this country and around the world. That we choose people to represent people, based on their qualifications, and reject the politics of hate. The way Harvey Gantt is campaigning here in North Carolina is the way candidates should be campaigning all across the country," Brown added. Brown also criticized Gantt's opponent, Jesse Helms' negative campaign ads, saying that they had nothing to do with the "bread and butter" issues concerning the people of North Carolina. Brown called Helms' campaign, "dirty gutter politics".

He called the (George) Bush administration a continuation of the (Ronald) Reagan administration, who promised to balance the federal budget and get waste out of federal government.

"They haven't done either of those three things. We've got a kinder and gentler rhetoric, but no kinder and gentler ac-

tion," Brown said.

He added, "The decade of the 90s was a disaster, a turning back of the clock on civil rights, human rights and social justice. The rich got richer, the poor got poorer, and those in the middle got the very life blood squeezed out of us. Permanent underclass was created. They dropped out of school, they dropped out of work, they dropped out of life. They feel no connection in our society... engaging in anti-social conduct... and unless we start doing something about some of these problems through education, through rebuilding our families, through reaching out and helping one another, through understanding the appropriate roles of the private sector, government and the community working together, we may lose an entire generation of Americans."

On Saturday morning, Brown appeared in Wilmington, NC at a breakfast given in his honor by the New Hanover Democratic party and then it was on to Chapel Hill and Orange County where he attended a luncheon reception given by the Orange County democratic party. On Saturday afternoon he talked with supporters, other democratic candidates including Gantt, and 4th Congressional congressman,

David Price, who introduced Brown to the group.

Brown praised the "hard work" of N.C. Congressman, David Price, and 3rd district congressman, Martin Lancaster. He called them "representatives of the people whom the people could be proud."

"It accomplished just what we wanted it to, increasing enthusiasm for this campaign and all of our candidates," said Davis.

"The national party under the leadership of Ron Brown has provided state parties across this country a real campaign oriented support base which enables democrats to develop a successful campaign," said Ward.

## Confucius Say: "Do For Self"

### Leaders Should Look In The Mirror

President George Bush vetoed the Civil Rights Act of 1990 because he believed it would cause undue legal harm to businesses because of excessive lawsuits. The Congress promptly failed to override the veto. The President is Republican and the Congress is overwhelmingly Democratic.

It appears that Blacks either have no real political friends when it comes to so-called civil rights or both parties are bowing to the reality of White public opinion.

"This is the first civil rights bill in the history of the nation

where the President has vetoed it and Congress has failed to override it," said one Black leader. "There's a new wave of racism in this country epitomized by David Duke," he added.

But I wonder if David Duke, who recently received 45% of the total vote and 9% of the Black vote in his failed attempt at being a U.S. Senator from Louisiana, should be singled out for all or most of the blame.

What about the voters in Louisiana (56% White and 9% Black) who find his White su-

premacry message so appealing?

And what about the voters across the country who can't wait for Duke to run for Governor in 1991 or President in 1992? The big gun in his arsenal is affirmative action. He aims it at the fears that increasingly more and more Americans have that Blacks are too lazy to work, but too eager to have a job given to them in spite of their disqualifications.

While we may differ with that argument, there is no arguing the fact that affirmative action is the rallying point for anti-Black sentiment in America. Blacks won the battle of cohesive legislation, but lost the war of public relations to bigots like Duke.

And opinion works its way through all levels of society and is eventually reflected in electoral politics and legislation. The new head knooks's name, after David Duke, may be Mickey Mouse, but with the givens of the perception of affirmative action as something for nothing, there will always be a new head-hater of Black people waiting in the wings.

Which leads me to my point. How much responsibility should the Black leaders bear for spend-

ing all of the political and moral capital of Black America during the last two decades on an affirmative action program that has largely benefited the Black middle class and created the image that all Blacks are lazy and incompetent?

And why did the same leaders never design these affirmative action programs to benefit poor Blacks, which would have been a justifiable reason for their existence? Or an empirical means to demonstrate that those Blacks who benefited did something for the non-benefited among us?

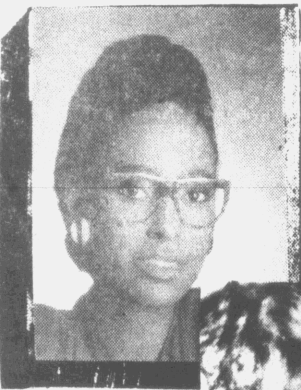
With no emphasis being placed on self-sufficiency over the last 20 years, and all of it on social programs sanctioned by Whites, Black leaders are now reduced to blaming David Duke for our negative position.

I don't doubt for a moment that Duke would like to see Blacks hung and dried, but in all honesty, I cannot blame him for our condition. A good look in the mirror would do all of us a lot more good.

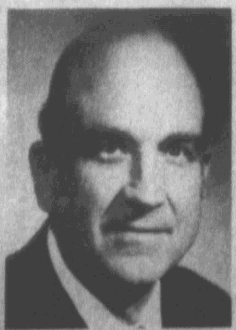

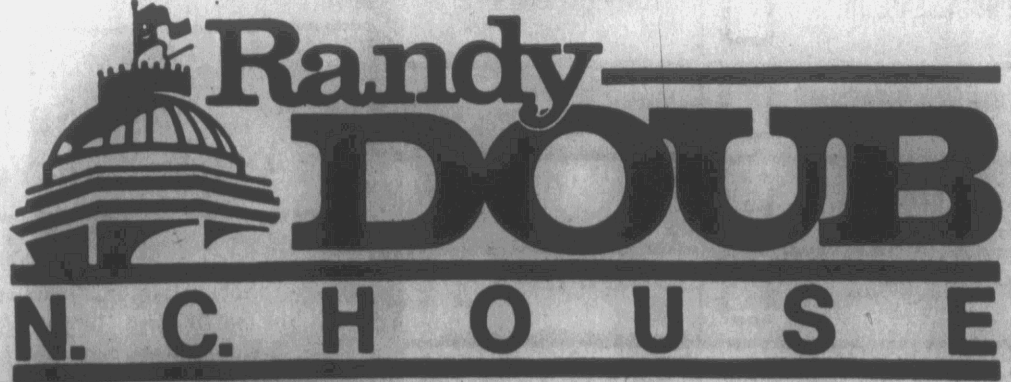

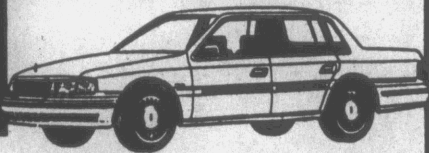

## Military Personnel in the Middle East can Vote by FAX Machine

Pitt County military personnel in the Middle East may vote absentee by electronic transmission for the November election.

The Pitt County Board of Elections will provide the service through Fax No. 919-830-1157 to military personnel in Operation Desert Shield according to instructions received Thursday from Office of the Secretary of Defense through The Federal Voting Assistance Program under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 USC 1973 ff.

Regular absentee ballots cannot be received voted and returned in time to be counted for the November 6 election.

The federal Post Card Application form (FPCA) will be routed through the fax network to the local election officials to request registration and/or absentee ballot.

Election Officials will fax election materials to an 800 number where the transmission will be routed through the AT&T Desert Fax Service to the Middle East. The faxed material will then be placed in a special envelope and delivered by military mail to the addressee. The estimated delivery time should not exceed 48 hours. Pitt County citizens receiving absentee ballots in this manner will use the official Federal Write-In Absentee Ballot Security Envelope and Transmittal Envelope to return the voted ballots by mail to the local election Board. Transit time is estimated to be five to seven days.

This special service will be available only to those addressees with APO/FPO zip codes.

The public's interests were certainly not a priority for Jones during the Columbus Day weekend.

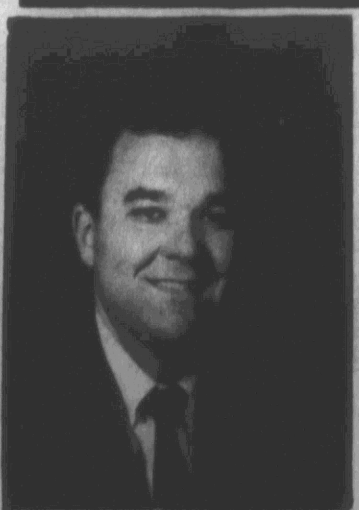
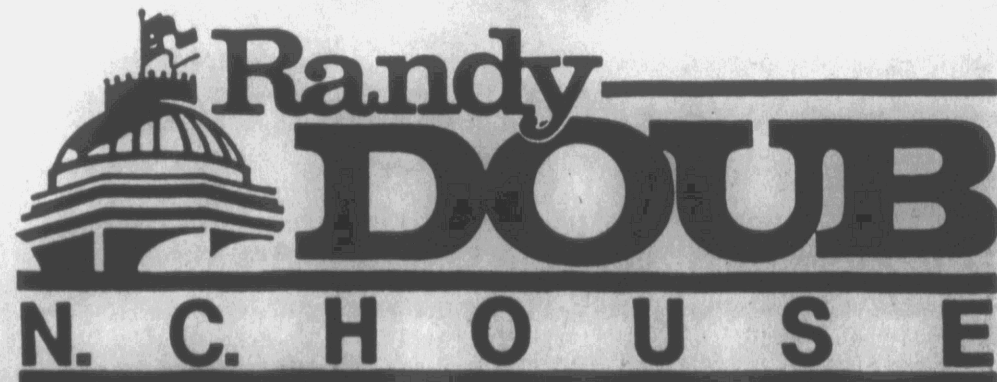

Five minority high school students from the Greenville area have completed eight-week research apprenticeships at the East Carolina University School of Medicine.

The apprenticeships, which place the students under the direction of senior faculty researchers, are intended to stimulate interest among minority students in careers in biomedical research and the health professions.

Now in its sixth year at ECU, the apprenticeships program is funded by the National Institutes of Health, the federal agency with responsibility for biomedical science in this country.

Nina Blount, coordinator of the program through the medical school's Center for Student Opportunities, said the apprentices are selected on the basis of motivation, ability and academic performance, as well as on their potential interest in a career in health research. 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

Young also told reporters in Atlanta that he would continue on the national lecture circuit, though he would accept fewer commitments.

"I will continue to be involved in the political and economic development of Georgia," said Young, who was defeated in an August runoff primary by fellow Democrat Zell Miller. "Whether that leads to another bid for governor would probably be determined way down the road."

His new job is designed to let Young, a 58-year-old Congregationalist minister, spend 30 percent of his time as unpaid chairman of the 1996 Olympic Games and to keep his political irons warm with the blessings of R.K. Shegal, chairman of the Law Companies Group.

At an Atlanta news conference, announcing his new executive job, Shegal was reported to have thrown Young's hat in the political ring again if Miller

is elected governor and sticks to his promise to serve one four-year term.

"If we twist his arm and the public is ready, I can assure you Andy will run for governor," Shegal is quoted as saying. He was a major financial backer of Young's campaign this year.

Shegal helped underwrite Young's campaign for governor with a \$50,000 cash contribution, a \$50,000 campaign loan and a salary of more than \$100,000 for consulting work while Young was a candidate, The Atlanta Constitution reported.

The most recent slur by a member of the Japanese establishment against 30 million American citizens tries the patience of the African-American community and the vast majority of all Americans including those of Japanese heritage. Japan's new Justice Minister, Seikoku Kajiyama, focused world attention on his blatant racism when he compared the flight of shoppers and businessmen from a luxurious district of Tokyo, due to growing numbers of prostitutes in the area, to the flight of whites from American cities because of the increased presence of African-Americans.

Nor is this the first time a high Japanese official has publicly uttered a slur against African-Americans. Prior to this, former Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone suggested that

"Blacks, Puerto Ricans and Mexicans" were responsible for the lowering of intellectual standards in the U.S. Another Japanese official said Black Americans do not pay their debts.

While the ignorance reflected in these statements is disturbing, the real disappointment is the mild rebuke of responsible Japanese leaders to this most recent incident. The response to date suggests a true misreading of the unity of virtually all Americans on matters of this nature, and demonstrates the inability of Japan to come to the forefront of world leadership on affairs non-economic.

In France, for example, incidents of anti-Semitic remarks involving public officials have been met by immediate condemnation in clear and unequivocal terms by virtually the entire French establishment. Japanese leadership has not been nearly so decisive.

Slandering a community that indirectly, but significantly, helps power the Japanese economy suggests that the Japanese still do not know on which side of the Pacific their bread is buttered. The U.S. remains Japan's number one market for goods and services. The 30 mil-

lion African-Americans who make up more than 12 percent of the total U.S. population earned a collective income last year of \$260 billion. They and many, many more Americans who identify with an America of true equality and justice spent over \$90 billion on Japanese exports in 1989. The vast majority of these consumers abhor racial slurs against any group of Americans.

Surely Japanese leaders do not expect incidents like these, which evidence disrespect for American values, to lessen American resentment of past and potential Japanese investments in this country in such landmarks as Rockefeller Center, Columbia Pictures, Pebble Beach, and countless others. All of this is most unfortunate because the Japanese have a vested interest in discouraging this sort of behavior.

Those of us who believe in a true international market for finance, goods and services and ideas expect Japan's leaders, whose nation must trade internationally because of its scant natural resources at home, to provide some leadership in the movement to create such a market and international climate. Episodes like this one, including

the response to date, appear to undermine the efforts of others in Japan to foster such a movement.

Recently Beatrice Foods, which does business in 25 countries, conducted the sale of one of our companies located in Hong Kong. A major Japanese company was interested along with companies from the U.K., the Netherlands, France and the U.S. I recall one of my advisors asking whether we should send the Japanese a message by not selling them this prize in Hong Kong because of the earlier slur on African-Americans by the Japanese Prime Minister. I responded immediately that such an action would promote nationalism at the expense of the creation of a true international business community based on mutual respect.

That was the right decision then and would be the right decision today. However, if a pattern continues to emerge on this issue from the Japanese leadership, others perhaps would be less inclined to adopt our attitude. And the American public would understandably feel less goodwill toward the Japanese people, which would be unfortunate.

African-Americans at this moment are making a major contribution to the U.S. and allied effort to keep oil flowing from the Middle East—a fact that Japan, one of the most oil-dependent industrial nations in the world should not fail to recognize. They are also stationed in Japan itself to protect the home islands from invasion or threat of war. Altogether, African-American soldiers represent more than 20 percent of the total U.S. Armed Forces strength of 2 million troops.

To improve the situation, leaders in Japan must make it clear in public that racist comments of this sort are unacceptable and hurt people in both countries unnecessarily; strong condemnation in Japan by the business, university and high government officials is called for, following the spirit of the French example.

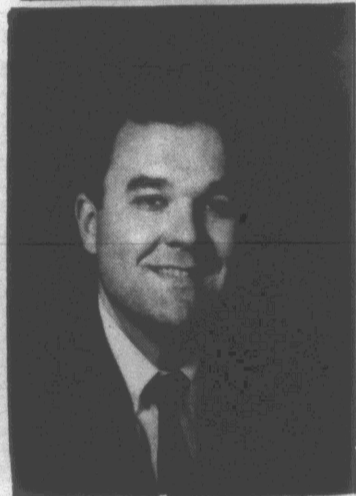
It is ironic that these statements have been made by Japanese males who are old enough to remember earlier racial slurs made during the World War II era against the Japanese people. These gentlemen should be the last to seek the humiliation of citizens of other nations through their words.

My first visit to Japan in 1969 and subsequent trips in the 70's and 80's have been marked by unflinching courtesy and respect from the Japanese people. It would indeed be unfortunate if thoughtless remarks by a few Japanese officials served to undermine favorable world opinion toward Japan and its citizens.

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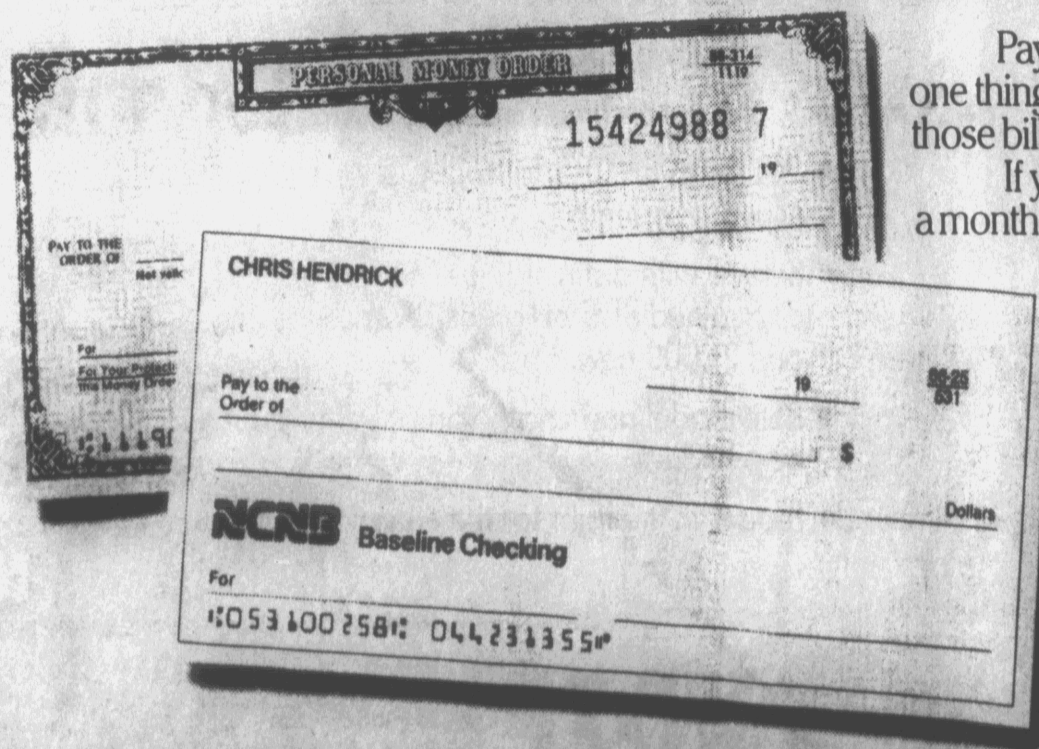

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## SORORITY'S ESSAY CONTEST AIMS TO PROMOTE LEARNING FOR AFRICAN-AMERICAN YOUTHS

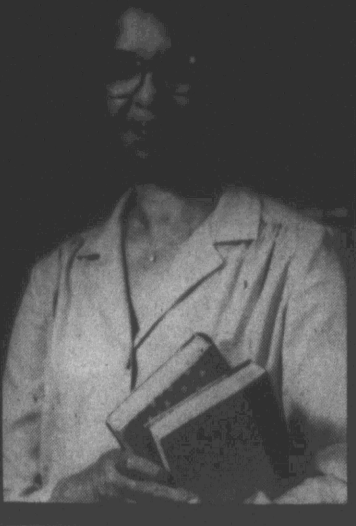
To strengthen the understanding of African-American youths of their African heritage and culture, Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc., in cooperation with Africare, has launched a program to encourage young people to conduct relevant research and to write essays. The project, titled "The Mwanamugimu Project" (Wah-nah-moo-gee-moo), is designed to increase the knowledge of African-American youths about their ancestral homeland.

The focus of the pilot project is student essay contest to be sponsored by Sigma Gamma Rho graduate chapters. Contests will be undertaken at the local community level with the winning essay writers receiving U.S. savings bonds as well as public recognition.

The winning essayist on a national level will also be honored with an African diplomatic reception at Africare House in Washington, D.C. Additional project activities include the publishing of top student essays and the establishment of a database of in-print literature on African peoples and cultures written for young people.

The project title, "Mwanamugimu," is a proverb from Uganda that literally means, "from small acorns come mighty oaks." The proverb captures the project's focus on increasing the factual knowledge of African-American youths so that as adults they will have a strong sense of connectedness to their ancestral roots and cultural heritage. First year activities in the Mwanamugimu project will take place in the northwest region of the United States.

Tips to Help Clear the Air

To improve indoor air quality:  
 - Use an electronic air filter to get rid of near-microscopic particles in the air. Whole-house units cost about \$1000; room units cost \$200-\$600.  
 - Open doors and windows when weather permit and use exhaust fans vented to the outside in your bathroom and near your stove and clothes dryer. Or install a heat recovery ventilator in your windows or as part of your central air conditioning.  
 - Get a plant. Certain houseplants can absorb many home pollutants. NASA scientists estimate that one 10- to 12-inch potted plant per 100 square feet of floor space should do the trick.

Your best bets: for formaldehyde—philodendrons, spider plants, golden pothos and snake plants; for benzene-gerbera daisies, chrysanthemums and other flowering plants; for general air purification-reed palm, English ivy, peace lily, mother-in-law's tongue, Chinese evergreen, dracaena, aloe and banana tree.

Your Job and Your Health

Would you be surprised to learn that in the U.S.:

- Male physicians and dentists are more than twice as likely to take their own lives as other male workers?

- Secretaries and typists die of breast cancer at rates one-third higher than other female workers?

- Farmers, gardeners and other agricultural workers incur 60% more deaths from accidents than more deaths from accidents than other male workers?

These findings are derived from the most recent edition of California Occupational Morality, a report by James J. Beaumont and James A. Shingleton of the University of California at Davis.

The report is based on three sets of data: 1) an analysis of 180,000 death certificates in California from 1979 to 1981; 2) reports of residents' occupations at the time of the 1980 census in California; and 3) an isolation of occupational risks due to health habits, compiled by the National Center for Health Statistics.

On the basis of these data and a review of overall death risks, the healthiest occupations for women include sales work, bookkeeping and housekeeping. The men with the healthiest jobs include managers, teachers, business-sales workers, clerical workers and janitors.

According to the study, the heaviest male smokers are construction workers, roofers, carpenters, truck drivers, painters and plasterers, and auto-body workers. The heaviest female smokers are waitresses, sales supervisors and production workers. The heaviest male drinkers are bartenders, performing artists, cooks, construction workers and roofers. Waitresses top the list of female drinkers. Workers with little education and the lowest salaries are frequently victims of poor access to health care and consequently suffer premature death.

In short, your job may be killing you.

ALTERNATIVES TO LASHING OUT AT YOUR KID

The next time everyday pressures build up to the point where you feel like lashing out—STOP! And try any of these simple alternatives from the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse. You'll feel better and so will your child.

- Take a deep breath. And another. Then remember you are the adult.

- Close your eyes and imagine you're hearing what your child is about to hear.

- Press your lips together and count to 10. Or better yet, to 20.

- Put your child in a time-out chair. (Remember the rule: one time-out minute

for each year of age.)

- Put yourself in a time-out chair. Think about why you are angry: Is it your

child, or is your child simply a convenient target for your anger?

- Phone a friend.

- If someone can watch the children, go outside and take a walk.

- Take a hot bath or splash cold water on your face.

- Hug a pillow.

- Turn on some music. Maybe even sing along.

- Pick up a pencil and write down as many helpful words as you can think of.

Save the list.

Age Changes Eating Habits

Q. Does aging have an impact on nutritional status?

A. Yes. Many physical and psycho-social changes that effect nutrition wellness occur with aging.

There is a decline in metabolism, which results in decreased calorie needs. This often causes obesity.

A loss of taste buds decreases taste sensation and an impaired sense of smell may cause a disinterest in food.

Periodontal disease often makes eating difficult. Softer, less fibrous and often high-calorie foods can help these symptoms.

Decreased motor abilities also may afflict older persons, which may make it difficult to shop, prepare meals and even feed oneself. Finally, a fixed income and loneliness from infrequent social activity can foster an apathetic attitude about meals.

Encourage healthy eating habits by providing transportation for shopping or assistance in eating. Shopping for the elderly or preparing meals for them or both may prove good means of improving nutritional status.

The National Nutrition Program of the elderly, which provides meals at congregate feeding sites, or Meals on Wheels for those that are home-bound also may provide better nutrition and more socialization.

Minorities and Math

- Blacks make up 12 percent of the national population, but only 2 percent of all employed scientists and engineers.

- Out of all of math Ph.D.s awarded in the United States in 1987-88, the count for minority Americans was five Hispanics, four African Americans, and one Native American.

- There's a new minority group in mathematics: Americans with doctorates. Of the 804 math Ph.D.s awarded in the U.S. two years ago, Americans accounted for 363; the rest went to foreign students.

North Carolina Educators Choose Gantt For Senate

The U.S. senate campaign of architect-businessman Harvey Gantt has been endorsed by the North Carolina Association of Educators representing some 42,000 teachers and other educators across the state.

"The NCAE feels very strongly about Mr. Gantt's candidacy. We know he will be a strong voice for education in the U.S. Senate. We are prepared to invest the resources it will take to get him elected," said NCAE President Julia Kron.

"I am absolutely delighted that North Carolina's teachers and educators have put their faith, as well as their votes and their money, in my campaign," said Mr. Gantt. "Together, we will retire one of the worst education records in the U.S. Senate and send to Washington a voice for our children."

Mr. Gantt has made improving education in North Carolina a cornerstone of his campaign for the United States Senate. Among other things, he has called for expansion for early childhood education programs so that children enter the school system with a desire to learn and an appreciation of the value of an education. He also said that no student who successfully completes 12 years of schooling should be denied the opportunity to continue his or her education and training because of a lack of money.

"The future of our nation will be judged in the 21st Century by how well we can compete in the international market place. That means we must begin now to arm our children with the best possible education and training," he said. "The average job by the year 2,000 will require a minimum of two years advanced education, and our young people simply will not be able to meet that requirement if they graduate reading at an eighth grade level."

In a news conference announcing the endorsement, Me. Kron said: "Harvey Gantt is committed to investing in our children. He knows that education is vital in preparing all of our citizens for the next century. Educators in North Carolina are tired of Senator Jesse Helms. Judging from his voting record, it is safe to say Jesse Helms has the worst record of support for education programs of any member of the Senate."

She said the NCAE will conduct an independent campaign to educate voters about Mr. Gantt's record in support of improving education and about Mr. Helms' record of no support for education.

"My parents always said that if you study hard and get an education, anything is possible. And I am living proof of that," Mr. Gantt said.

He graduated second in his class from Brooke High School in Charleston, S.C., and attended Iowa State University on an academic scholarship. Deciding he wanted to study nearer home, in 1963 Mr. Gantt became the first Black student to enter Clemson University. He graduate with honors from Clemson with a degree in architecture and later earned a Master's Degree in urban planning from Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT).

Mr. Gantt's wife, Cindy, is an accountant who teaches at UNC-Charlotte. Their oldest daughter, Sonja, is a journalist. Daughters Erika and Angela are attending UNC-Chapel Hill, and son Adam is in the ninth grade in Charlotte's public schools.

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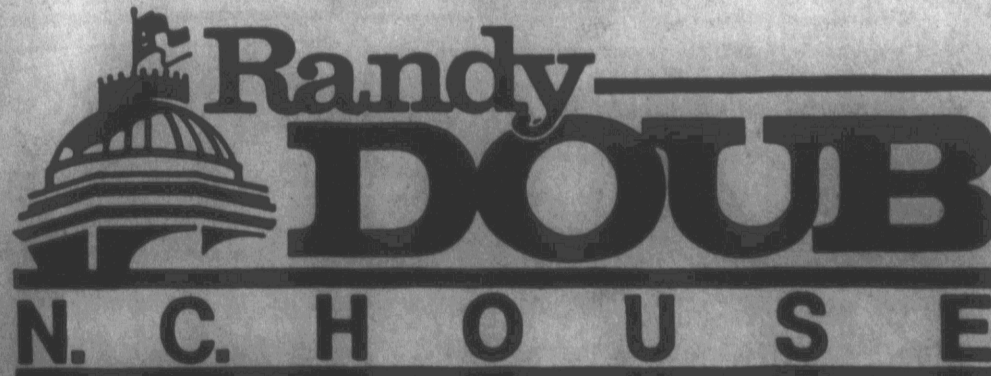

# James Earl Jones blasts Spike Lee over Malcolm X Film

On Friday, October 26, 1990, the Homecoming Court consisted of 12 girls and DeRonde was chosen as one of the Queens to represent the school for 1990-91 school year.

DeRonde enjoys acting, dancing, modeling, and hairstyling. She received one year hairstyling at Mitchell's Academy, and plans to complete that training during the summer of 1991. After graduation, DeRonde plans to attend Bauder Fashion Designing College, Atlantic, Georgia, and get a degree in Fashion Designing. She aspires to open her own boutique in Atlantic, Georgia.

In an interview for TV Guide magazine, James Earl Jones took a swipe at Spike Lee for reportedly interfering in the hiring of a white director to do a film on the life of Malcolm X, which is slated to star Denzel Washington as Malcolm.

Jones, in the interview by Michael Leahy, maintained years ago he was supposed to play the lead role in "The Confessions Of Nat Turner" but at the last minute Black militants objected to some aspect of the film, perhaps that Sidney Lumet was going to direct it. Anyway, the studio people got nervous and cancelled the project. Jones was angered because although he'd won an Academy Award nomination, few jobs were coming in and he'd wanted that one badly.

"So you'll excuse me if I'm not swept off my feet by talk from so-called activists who let race get in the way of so much. They hamper good art. And now it's happening all over again."

"Denzel Washington is supposed to play Malcolm. Sounds great, huh? Then insanity started. The talk had been there might be a white director, and that infuriated some people, like Spike Lee. Spike said the director ought to be a Black, which was Spike's way of saying it should be Black. Once the bull started, all Spike had to do was throw one match on the flame to set off a blaze, and Spike did. I respect Spike Lee," said Jones, "but when he gets silly, he ought to be reminded of it."

Jones went on to say that Spike Lee is always putting his foot in his mouth one way or another. He also charged that for Spike Lee to suggest that he be involved is "destructive."

James Earl Jones should be ashamed of himself. Does he really believe that only Spike Lee objects to a white director doing the life of Malcolm X, no matter how well intentioned he may be?

Does James Earl Jones realize that to this day, to this very

hour, Hollywood clings to the notion that there are no suitable Black directors despite the achievements of Ivan Dixon, Sidney Poitier, Bill Duke, Bert Parks. Kevin Hooks. William Greaves, Euzhan Palcy ("Dry White Season") Charles Burnett ("Killer Of Sheep" and "To Sleep With Anger") and yes, Spike Lee, why not? Or would Jones prefer a white director to Spike Lee to direct such a film. Someone like white director Sir Richard Attenborough who directed "Cry Freedom" which was greatly appreciated, but focused too much on the white character, Donald Woods, leaving out vital information on Steve Biko—like when he was born, something about his parents, how he came to found the Free Clinic and community center. Something about his column, "I write what I like," which he wrote in college and which was such a personal inspiration to me that I almost named Media Watch by that title.

Then there's Steven Spielberg, who depicted Mister as Alice Walker had written him, but left out entirely Cealy's missionary husband who was Black, kind and good and written as a natural balance to Mister. Even Clint Eastwood, and I personally like "Bird" very much, has the focus too much on Parker's relationship with his white companion, Chan, and not enough on Parker's playing, and his influence on other musicians, and the music of the era. All these films are good. My criticism is academic. But a solid argument could be made for the special insights of a Black director, aside from the obvious political argument. Fact is, unless I'm totally out of tune, that studio better not get a white director!

August Wilson in an interview told me that his play "Fences" was held up for almost two years because Paramount tried to insist he accept a white director for the film version of the play. They told him there weren't any Black directors! Wilson told them they'd better find some and suggested Spike Lee saying he liked Spike's work and attitude and insights and would trust him with his Pulitzer Prize-winning hit play worth millions.

So now, here's James Earl Jones—who in the same interview complained about being pigeonholed by journalists as one of the prominent Black actors of his generation.

Nobody's bothered Jones. We all loved him and enjoyed his successes and supported him as best we could, although we can't take his success and pay our rent with it either! But there's one thing we don't like and that's a prominent person getting up and telling white folks how much of a

burden it is being labeled and how they're no role model, etc. Variations of this tune are often time played with or without irony, i.e. Vanessa Williams who found out being Black wasn't so bad after all—Blacks not only being her friends in need, but indeed her only friends for a very long while.

James Earl Jones may feel Spike Lee talks too much, but in this case Spike is dead on and Jones is wrong.



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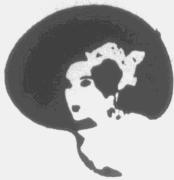


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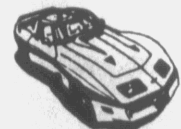
